

Millions of Americans take dictary supplements, particularly the herbs that are the fastest-growing segment. They spent \$3.2 billion last year. Supplements promise they'll slow aging, improve memory,

clean kidneys, protect the heart, even prevent cancer.

There is evidence that certain herbs, vitamins and minerals do help. Folks, acid, prevents hirthest dieters. Cathum wards the signer chart agrice that parlic may help lower cholesterol, ginger calms nausea, and valerian is a mild sleep aid. The National Institutes of Health is studying whether St. John's wort is an anti-depressant.

But scores of other products have sparse, if any, data to support claims that even some in the industry call exaggerated. The pills, tonics and teas sell with life to guide consumers about side effects.



TWIN FALLS - The process was supposed to have ended months ago, but yet another project could squeak onto a multi-million tax-increment bond that will, someday, be issued by the city's Urban Renewal Agency.

The Urban Renewal Agency will meet today at noon in City Hall to hear from Twin Falls Ice, a private developer eager to build an ice-skaring rink near the Depto Grill.

Twin Falls Ice is hoping to land \$255,307 in tax-increment financing to pay for basic site improvements, such as relocating water and sewer pipes.

The site's increased property taxes would be diverted to repay the debt; tax payments to the Twin Falls School District would not be interrupted. As things stand, roughly Sa.72 million, worth of projects have been approved for tax-increment innancing by the city's Uthan Renewal Agency. Adding the Twin Falls tee project would swell the bond to about \$8.98 million; of that sum, about \$6.500 is to refinance existing debts.

These include: avoid stressing the liver (no alcohol and any unnecessary medications, even over-the-counter medications such as acetaminophen); eat a balanced diet (low in fat, high in fiber); take prescribed medication such as Interferon aplha-2b (in some optients this medication helps improve the liver function).


