# Mayor tracks town's history

His goal is to find if leases are beneficial

SHOSHONE - Mayor Ken Haught is oing a bit of detective work these

doing a bit of detective work awardows.

To find some answers, he has had to dig through the city's long history as a railroad town.

"I'm sure people land a good resolute when they signed the lease," he said. "I just kind of feel like you oughta know what you pay for."

Haught said several pieces of property are worth renning, for example, the city pays \$250 a year for land it uses for gravel storage. And the railmost downs most of the land that makes up the Lincoin County Patigrounds.

After several months of surfing

through old railroad leases, Haught compiled a list of questions and concerns and sent it to Union Pacific's corrections in Nebraska. He ended up with more questions rather than answereding to day maps, Sheshone pays a lease for the depot and the grassy area that surrounds it. But recording to Union Pacific, the lease actually covers nearly five across. "They must have a different map we don't have," said Haught, who is worried the city could lose access to its pool and nearby homes if it gave up the lease to the depot land.

## There may be fewer Mr. Rights out there, report hints Environmental factors behind dip in male births

CHICAGO — The search for Mr. Right may be getting even

nar. signt may oe getting even harder. The ratio of boys to girls born in the United States and Canada dipped ever so slightly between 1970 and 1989, and a study suggests environmental factors—such as prenatal exposure to pesticides—may be why.

The declines began even earlier in several other industrialized countries and corresponded with increases in some male birth

defects and prenatal exposure to pesticides and industrial chemicals, said Devra Lee Davis, an environmental epidemiologist at the World Resources Institute, a Washington-based policy research institute.

Davis and her colleagues examined data on birth ratios and increases in male birth defects, such as misplaced urinary openings, and testicular cancer.

They concluded the reduction

in the proportion of males born
may indicate that "some as yet
unrecognized, environmental
health hazards are affecting the
sex ratio of births are affecting the
unexplained defects in male
reproduction." Their analysis
appears in today's issue of laJournal of the American Medical

Some studies have indicated male fetuses are more vulnerable than females to prenatal expo-

sure to toxic substances, and either die before birth or are born with defects or a susceptibil-ity to cancer. Other studies have suggested environmental factors suggested environmental raction can cause harm even before gen-der has been determined and may block embryos from devel-oping into males.

"Although the death rate for males tops that of females at nearly every age, the worldwide human sex ratio hovers around





"It is clear that the Nixon estate, alone, is entitled to full custody and courtout over tape recordings containing purely personal and private material," the judges wrote in upholding a district court ruling.





# Doctors affirm girls' testimony of abuse

Pediatricians tell court about interviews, exams with girls who say they were molested

BURLEY – A stone-faced Manuel Ramiriz Curiel sat through graphic testimony Tuesday by two pediatricians describing interviews and examinations corroborating the testimony of two young girls who say the defendant molested them?

Dr. Barton Adrian and Dr. Pamela Hanson testified that they found physical evidence consistent with the girls stories of abuse.

The girls – now 9 and 10 years old – claimed, both in court and in interviews with the octors, that they were-

claimed, both in court and in inter-views with the doctors, that they were abused by Curiel and other friends or family members from April 27, 1993, to Feb. 6, 1994, while their mother was in prison on a grand theft charge. Curiel, 37, faces two counts of lewd and lastivious conduct with minors under the new of 16.

Curici, the girls, and other family members were living in a trailer at the Golden Rail Trailer Court west of Golden Rail Trailer Court west of Golden Rail Trailer Court west of Burley and in a house in Salt Lake Climbers when the girls say they were abused. The state, represented by former Youn Falls County Prosecutor Richard Bevan, rested its case Tuesday. The doctor's testimony hinged on separate examinations of the two girls. They said at the time of the interviews, Oct. 4, 1994, they know nothing specific about the cases – except that the Department of Health and Welfare

had referred them because of possible sexual abuse.

The doctors discussed their interviewing procedures and training, which require them to ask non-leading questions in a safe environment to get the children to talk.

Both testified that children are open to suggestion and want to please adults, so they are careful to allow them to tell their own stories.



# Bring spring to your table

April is full of promise: I watch and wait as stems push through the soil and buds begin to burst open, and at this time of year, I wake up very promise point for a clear, warm spring day. 

# It only takes a weekend to construct solar water heater

A batch-type solar water heater is the simplest, yet effective, do-it-yourself design. It requires no numps or controls

tive, do-it-yourself design. It requires no pumps or controls and you should be able to build one over a weeked with mostly scrap materials.

This type of batch, sometimes called a breadbox, solar water heater is primarily used as a preheater for your water heater. Installing one can typically cut your water heating costs by 20percent These savings should



provide an excellent payback of the material costs.

There are many effective batch heater designs. They are usually located on the ground against a south-facing house wall. Your existing water heater water inlet is diverted to the



batch heater to tet use som pro-heat the water. Plumbing it is simple. Install two low-cost tees in the water pipe going to the water heater. Put a simple valve between them.so that, when you close it, the water goes through the batch solar heater first. Put another valve in the pipe to the batch heater.

The simplest batch heater is basically a water tank (painted black) in a box with a clear top. As the sun shines on the tank inside the box, it continuously

inside it. Depending on your climate, it should be effective for six to nine months per year. The sides of the box should be insulated to reduce heat loss. You really want to get fancy, install some insulated hinged covers. Closs them at night to keep the water warm. Just throwing an old quilt over clear top at night is effective too.

Total material costs can be reduced by using a discarded water heater tank from a plumber, Electric water mater tanks are best.

Strip off the outer shell and insulation and paint it flat black

If there are any old solar designers in your area, they may still have some adhesive-based selective coating foil. This can increase the solar heat gain of the tank. You can use either glass, acrylic or fiberglass reinforced polyester (FRP) for the clear too.


