



Just before 11 p.m. EDT on May 14, 1988, the bus was carrying 67 people home from King's Island, an amusement park near Clincinnat.



Rebozo, 85, died Friday night at Baptist Hospital, said his sister, Hospital officials wouldn't disclose the cause of death The Manni-Herald reported that doctors said he died of a brain aneurysm. Rebozo had grown up in modest circumstances, and regarded himself modestly even when keeping presidential company. "Women loved him. He had all kinds of girlfriends. He was very sociable and very popular with everybody. He didn't have any memies."

When Rebozo chartered his Key Biscayne Bank in March 1964, Nixon—then a Wall Street lawyer—welded a shored at the groundbreaking. Nixon was also the first depositor. It was during a visit with Rebozo in June 1972 that Nixon first learned that five men hied a street of a benoeratic Party headquarters in the Watergate office building.

Observers have noted for years that the park's bears rely on meat they find or kill, but now there is data to back them up, researchers

data to back them up, researchers say.

And the meat seems to suit the bears. Females are now bearing-larger, litters of cubs and doing so. at an earlier age, the study shows. Adult male grizzlies in the park take '79 percent of their energy from other animals and adult females get 45 percent of their energy that way, according to Gunther, head of the Yellowstone bear management office.

The tests results come from hair samples gathered in Yellowstone over-the-years and-

ane tests results come from hair samples gathered in Yellowstone over-the-years and recently evaluated at an independent abovatory in Washington.

"Major things in the diet show up in the hair," Gunther said. The analysis abows high levels of precin in the diet, though it is not detailed enough to show how much comes from the herd animals and how much comes from the rod animals and how much comes from the for animals and how much comes from the ford animals and how much comes from the state of the same and the sam





Feet through the soil by not in a single season. Leaf color varies from light to dark green and are lance shaped with spines. Plants are often found growing in patches, and flowering generally occurs in July through August. This thistle is especially troublesome in crops. rangeland, pastures, roadside, ditch banks, and around the home grounds. Various herbicides can offer the best means of control. In non-crop areas, early bud to bloom stage and/or. fall regrowth is the best time to treat. Mowing can be effective if conducted every two weeks throughout the growing season for several years. Tillage alone is not recommended. When

choosing any method of control, assure that it suites your particular situation.

goes up.

Q. When family members are eligible for Social Security benefits on a worker's record, how much can the family members get?

A. Each family member may be eligible for a monthly benefit

that is up to 50 percent of the worker's retirement or distribution rate. However, there is a limit to the total amount of money that can be paid to a family on a person's record. 

The next step was to keep the block free of the drug trafficking.

We made sure garbage was bagged and picked up. We basically changed the appearance of the block."

The West 163rd Street barricades were removed last Oct. 4. As I drove along the block with McCarthy, I saw two building superintendents hosing down the sidewalks. It was after school, and kids were out playing. Later, a 14year-old girl named Maria told me that her mother had never let her be on the street alone before because of the violence that had existed.

Even more startling for me was the thought that an adjoining police precinct, the 30th, had been the center of a horrific committee scandal just four years before, when a quarter of the cops posted there-the so-called "Dirty 30"-were accused of not only shaking down drug dealers but also dealing in drugs them-

"Most of the families in my precinic are awfully poor." he noted. "But I found their homes to be immaculate. Now we're working together to help make their external environment the same."

For Mayor Guiliani, the anti-drug task forces and the Model Block Program are an integral part of the Quality of Life" agenda for the city that he put forward following hts 1993 election. "The old artitude was pessimism and cynicism: This can't be done, the told time. "We had a city out of control, a city that was losing self-respect. Improving the quality of Hife is not a destination. You never get there. It's a work in progress. But along the way, you keep making things better. And that's what we are determined To did."

THad To Let, Go Of My Anger

D BEEN WORKING IN films since I was 13," said MOIP Ringwald. "I became famous as a teenager." Ringwald's portrayals of girls muddling through the traumas of high school in three John Hughes films anoimed her as the "Sweet I6" ioon for a generation. But as Ringwald grew older, her carreer came to a standstill.

"And then I struggled," she continued, "My early 20s were very angry. I was told more than once that I was the angriest girl anyone knew." I met, with Ringwald

backstage at Manhattan's Century Center for the Pergforming Arts, where she was starting in Paula Vogel's off-Broadway play. How I Learned To Drive. Now 30, Ringwald was as radiantly attractive as ever, with her sweet face, head-turning figure and waif-cut red locks.

"I started singing with my dad's jazz band when I was 3."; she said. "Performing! was a very important part of my life." Her father. Robert, was an established jazz musician, and her

She also gained a reputation for being 'difficult.'

"A person's early 20s are not an easy time in anyone's life," she said. "And I'd grown up in the public eye. I hadn't learned how to live."

Still, while other actors of her generation from the group called the "Brat Pack" were making head

lines for drug or alcohol abuse, Ringwald kept clean and sober. "I sensed that, because I have a compulsive personative, I wouldn't be able to stop, andit would possibly kill me," she said.

"I went through some bad times with people that I met in Hollywood." she continued, "dealing with hypocrisy, people who aren't truthful: It forced me to look inside myself, at what really matters."

She was a teenage movie star when suddenly Molly Ringwald's career—and her life—came to a standstill. But that was the beginning of growing up.

When agents, directors, friends and even some family members shrugged off her concerns. Ringwald turned to her mother, who provided strength—and a prayer. "I'm not a very religious person, and I don't know a lot of prayers," Ringwald said. "My first brother died of leukemia when les was 3, and the only thing that kept my mother sane was the Sereinty Prayer."

The prayer, a staple of 12-step programs, is: "God grant me the screnity to accept the things that I cannot change, the courage to change the things I can, and the wisdom to know the difference."

Her mother had embroidered the prayer

on fabric and kept it on a wall. "At that very difficult time in my life," Ringwald said, "when no one else took me seriously, my mother gave it to me and said. "I want you to keep this now."

In 1992, with her mother's support.
Ringwald decided to make a bold move:
leave Hollywood, friends and family
and her country for a place where she
was virtually unknown. She accepted a
part in a French film and moved to Parts.
It was a decision that changed her life.

Walking down the streets unrecognized gave her "a sense of euphoria." she said. After work on the film ended, she decided to stay. "People in Holly-

wood see it as the center of the earth," she said, "and that if you leave, you won't be able to work anymore. I decided not to live by those rules."

What had begun as a six-week job stretched into a four-year stay, Ringwald wrote, studied the language and acted in more French movies. "I lost a lot of anger when I went to Paris," she said. Aust, for the first time, she fell deeply-inlove. She met Valery Lameignêre, a writer, while he was a member of one of her film crews. They've been together for more than five years, "the longest relationship I've had, by far," she said.

relationship I've had, by far," she said. Ringwald returned to the U.S. in 1996 to star in Townies, a new TV sitcom. It was dropped midway in its first season. Last October, she took over the lead in How I Learned To Drive. The subject of the play-a sexual relationship between a young girl and her uncle in the 1950s-has generated controversy. Her character allowed Ringwald to display an acting range and depth she had not shown before. "It's emotionally draining," she said, "but it's the easiest thing for me to do, because it's so good." The play won the Pulitzer Prize on April 14 but ended its run on April 19.

"What appeals to me is that she's a survivo," Ringwald continued. "She uses her ability to forgive as a strength rather than a weaknesis. Paula Vogel says her play is about the gifts you get from people who hurt you. From my experience, forgiving is the only way to survive."

Her performance garnered good reviews from crities and from Bruce-Davison, who played her uncle. "She really gained her chops in this role." he said, "probably one of the most difficult roles in the theater."

Ringwald also recently starred in a black comedythriller, Office Killer, a film in which she played "the office sha", she said, "I was delighted. It's a much derier character than T mustally offered." She now is in Montreal filming another thriller called Requiem for Murder. Reflecting on her teen years, she even.



### The Rankie and the Kid

If the sign of a true comic novel is that it makes you laugh out loud, Sieve Klucer's Last Days of Summer (Bard-Avon, \$21) is a winner all the way. It has to do with baseball-specifically with a rawboned rookie third baseman named Charlie Banks, as seen by a precocious 12-year-old Brooklyn boy named Joey Margolis back in the early 1940s. Joey is an ingenious plotter, the kind of kid who writes to his hero asking him to hit a home run for him since he's dying of malaria or something. Charlie is the kind of ballplayer whose

sponse to all such cases is to send out an autographed picture. But this time he feels a growing curiosity about this crazy



flowing with imagination, ideas, fantasies and, as it turns out, is desperately in need of a hero in his life.

Someday the sky will fall, warns an array of TV shows and movies that depict runaway comets or asteroids on a collision course with the Earth: A noted astronomer looks at the evidence:

# Was Chicken Little Right?

IT IS AN EVENING IN MAY 1999... The sky is clear, and there is no Moon. High in the north, just below the Big Dipper, a comet blazes. Found only a few weeks earlier by an amateur astronomer through her small telescope, it has been getting brighter until, tonight, it far outshines everything else in the sky.

The end comes swiftly. The comet breaks through the upper atmosphere. destroying the Earth's protective ozone

layer. There is a denf- 1 ening sonic boom. Seconds later, with the force & of 100 million hydrogen bombs, the comet slams into the Pacific Ocean just off the coast of Los

Angeles. Virtually every David H. Lev rock within 5 miles of ground zero is instantly vaporized. The Earth Hyakutak trembles as a force-12 quake topples any animal trying to stand up. In less than a minute, a Earth. The mighty shock wave exposure, 5 gouges out a crater 100 shows the miles wide and 25 miles slow trailing wave tears the comet North Star.

vaporize as they plow into the Earth Mile-high tsunamis rush upward from the point of impact and speed across the Pacific, flooding coastal cities from Los Angeles to Tokyo. The force of impact generates enormous heat, and a fireball of hot gas, visible for thousands of miles, rises high into the atmosphere. Millions of tons of rocky debris and dust billow upward in a gigantic cloud. All over the Earth, storms of heavy rocks-the debris dredged up by the impact-strike the ground with enough violence to tear it up. Anyone outdoors feels temperatures as high as an oven set to broiling. Ground fires ignite and quickly spread around the world.

That's just the overture. As the world-



wide fires burn for months, fine dust thickens high in the Earth's atmosphere. The sky becomes black as a darkroom. and for more than six months there is no sunlight anywhere on Earth. Cooling rains fall, but they are poisoned with sulfuric acid. After more than a year of darkness, the sky finally clears, and temperatures begin a slow rise as the Earth

turns into a giant greenhouse. What a scenario for Armageddon this is! Fortunately, no such comet has been discovered that is in any danger of striking Earth a year from now. However, the scene I have described has happened on Earth before, and it will happen

again. We just don't know when. Our Earth is no stranger to impacts. from space. For proof, just look at the Moon. Our closest neighbor-in space. has suffered from impacts as Earth has, but unlike the ever-changing Earth, the Moon has preserved its record of impact for billions of years. A relative handful of craters from ancient times are left on Earth, but a small telescope reveals hundreds on the Moon, each one

### Let's Take It Seriously


For more than 15 years, Jim Scotti has been looking for asteroids and comets that could pose a threat to the Earth, Last Dec. 6-observing at the Spacewatch telescope on Kitt Peak in southern Arizona-Jim tracked a large, rapidly moving object. Other observers tollowed it and predicted its course, and for a scary day astronomers thought that 1997 XFIT as it was cataloged might scrape by the Earth in 2028. But then taint images of the same asteroid were spotted on tilms taken in 1990. providing a much more accurate picture of its orbit. There is no danger that 1997 XFII will strike the

Earth in 2028. However, the chances that it will

strike us someday in the distant tuture are pretty

good. A mile in diameter, Jim's object is potentially a hazardous one. We will watch it closely, along with some 200 asteroids and several dozen comets. The worrisome problem has not with these ob-

jects but with the estimated 2000 large asteroids and an untold number of comets that have not yet been found. One of these could strike withouty a tew Seconds' warning. But finding asteroids costs money. According to the astronomer David Morrison. the funding for all currently active searches for these asteroids is less than for a single shift at one McDonald's restaurant! We might seriously consider increasing funds for these searches. The devil we know is a lot easier to deal with than the one we don't.

Another crater, one of the biggest. lies under Mexico's Yucatan Peninsula and is 65 million years old. 
