





Utah river-runner wants to row his boat – across the Atlantic

MIDVALE, Urah (AP) — Four decades of rafting some of the American West's wildest stretches of whitewater rapids are merely a foretaste of what Richard Jones says will be his greatest adven-

Says with the country of Worldwide River Expeditions wants to row, row his specially designed boat across the Atlantic And yes, he knows it won't be a gentle

he knows it won't be a gentle trip.

"I'll just play it by ear," said Jones, who has spent five years getting ready for his \$80,000 ocean odyssey. "If the weather gets so heavy I can't row, the boat-has two compartments with hard-es. I can just crawl inside and wait it out."

es, I can just crawi inside and wait in out."

Jones figures he can safety navigate his torpedo-shaped fiberglass craft — 27 feet long and 47 feet wide — in seas with waves up to 25 feet high.

"After that, with the wind blowing the waves will start to bread to just bag it and wait the storm out," he said.

Starting from Lisbon, Portugal, in mid-September, Jones plans to arrive in Miami six to eight months — and 5,000 miles — later.

make sea water drinkable, a cookstove, and electronic navigational



"Viagra, in all seriousness, means more sex. And more sex means more need for effective contraception," complained Gloria Feldt, president of the Planned Parenthood Federation.

Study: Gas could rise by nearly \$1 before Americans dump gas guzzlers

DETROIT (AP) — Gas prices would have to rice by about \$1 as gallon before most Americans would dump their gas-guzzling curs and trucks for more fuel-efficient vehicles; a survey suggests. About seven in 10 Americans say they would switch to more fuel-efficient vehicles if gas prices hit \$2.09 per gallon, according to a survey being released Monday by AutoPacific Inc.

Inc.
That leaves 30 percent who are unwilling to change the type of vehicle they drive regardless of how high folel prices go, the automotive marketing research and consulting firm found in its sur-

vey.

"What you find is that while people will tell you that fuel economy is very important, they

don't actually react that way," said Géorge Peterson, president of the Santa Ana, Calif. firm.
The average price at the pump fell to a low of \$1.07 in March, but had risen to \$1.14 by early May, according to the Lundberg

but had risen to \$1.14 by early May, according to the Lundberg Survey poll of 10,000 stations. For the AutoPacific study, the nearly 25,000 people questioned had bought 1998 models in the last four months of 1997. The survey had a margin of error of plus or minus 3 percentage points. The results show that regulation is the best way to lower vehicle pollution, said Daniel Becker, director of the global warming and energy program for Sierra Club.

"The political will doesn't exist to raise gas taxes by 80 percent or 100 percent," Becker said.

Powerful quake said to have killed thousands

KABUL, Afghanistan (AP) -MAROUL, Alguanistan (AP) international aid workers scram-bled Sunday to reach a remote northern region of Alghanistan where a powerful earthquake is believed to have killed thousands of people. Helge Kvam, spokesman for the Red Cross in Geneva, said organization officials in neighboring Taijkistan were told by the Aighan ambassador in Desharbe that 5,000 people were killed. The Red Cross said it was not able to confirm the figure. According to the report, the dead included 3,000 killed in Shari Basurkh, almost 1,900 killed in a Stellenem on the corskirts of Faisabad, 140 children killed in a stood in Rossag, and 124 killed in Chab. Kvam said the Afghanistan Red Crescent Society, which has offices throughout the earthquake region, has reported it has been able to confirm at least* 1,500 dead.



Skin cancer poses dangerous threat to Idaho's farmers

TWIN FALLS — WARNING: That seed company cap you've been wearing around the farm since 1978 may be haz-ardous to your health.

If you don't keep the sun off, you could lobe an eye, the up of your nose, part of your ear — or your life. And baseball cape don't shade much.



The most obvious symptoms of heart failure are the ones Means felt in the Atlanta airport; weakness, fatigue and shortness of breath. Others include painful

breath. Others include painful swelling in the abdomen, legs and feet. Some patients have a magging day cough.

By far the most common cause of heart failure are coronary artery disease (including damage from a heart attack) and hypertension, or high blood pressure.
