



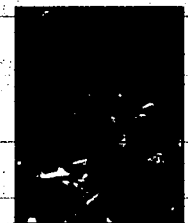

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Business program takes shape

TWIN FALLS — A group of local businessmen is six weeks away from raising \$1.5 million to help create higher paying jobs in Twin Falls County.
"Business Plus II" is the fund-raising project it knows is \$300,000 away from its goal and will probably meet or exceed that amount by its July 24 deadline, said Kent

Fund-raiser nears July deadline; money would help create higher paying jobs

Just, director of the Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce.
Following lunch Friday for about 30 of the project's investors, Just credited Atlanta-based fund-raising company

National Community Development Services Inc. with the project's success.
"It's been good," Just said. "There was a lot of skepticism about hiring a team to do this, but everybody has been pleased. All

of us have jobs. All of us have careers. It is just too difficult for us to do ourselves."
In all, the fund-raising team will cost less than \$200,000, Just said.
A 1988 fund-raiser known as "Business Plus One" brought in only \$500,000 from 100 businesses. So far, the fund-raising firm has doubled that amount with donations from only 70 businesses.

Punk rockers tear into state songs

CHICAGO — For everyone who ever thought, "Gee, if only there were a double CD of all 50 state songs, and if only they were performed by punk rock bands like 9 Spine Sickbeak, Dead Clown Pile and Pinhead Circus," Jack Ball has just the thing.
The founder of New York City-based Coolidge Records has put together "Coolidge 50," a compilation of punk versions of all 50 state anthems, arranged in order of the states' entry into the Union.
Ball, 27, spent two years listing up 50

bands to donate their talents. He wanted a band from each state, but in a few cases had to settle for having at least one member from the state.
Idaho's song, "And Here We Have Idaho," is performed by the Boise punk band Haggis. The Coolidge Records Internet site quotes Gov. Phil Batt describing bands the rendition as "very creative."
"I let the bands try to be as free as possible as far as performing the songs," Ball said. "I didn't want to be restrictive."
He wasn't, according to Delaware Gov. Thomas Carper, who thought The Crank's rendition of "Our Delawares" was "too

edgy" for his taste.
"I wouldn't, however, rule out its use during the inauguration of a new governor — if we ever get around to electing someone with green hair and multiple piercings in curious places," Carper wrote in a thank-you note.
Ball sent a copy of the album to every governor as well as President Clinton and Vice President Al Gore.
Gore "didn't respond, so I'm thinking maybe Tipper got hold of it," Ball said.

Despite 1 death, avalanche doesn't quell quest to scale Mount Rainier

PARADISE, Wash. — Hours after an avalanche slammed into a party of climbers on Mount Rainier — killing one and injuring seven — others were setting out for the 14,410-foot summit at dusk.
"There's something about the way of mountain climbing that has inherent risk," said veteran climber Lou Whitlock, whose Rainier Mountaineering Inc. was guiding them caught in the slide.
"There's probably been the loss of a mountain climber on the peaks. Even

can you justify it? The mountaineer can justify it, but it is difficult on others," Whitlock said at a news conference Friday at Paradise, site of a lodge at the

peak's 5,400-foot level.
"I really think it's the can't-happen-to-me syndrome," said climber Andy Juknelis, 32 of San Jose, interviewed as he headed up the mountain Friday. "It's all so random and I think, 'How often does it happen?' Not very often."
"This time of year there is particular danger from avalanches as rising temperatures melt the snow that each winter buries the slumbering volcano 50 miles

CSI may move service to Crossroads

JEROME — It's all about location.
Or so say officials eyeing the possibility of moving the College of Southern Idaho's business incubator to near the Interstate 84-U.S. Highway 93 interchange, on property owned by the Crossroads Ranch development company.
Serious talk of moving the incubator could indicate that development might soon start on the Crossroads property, said Jerome County Commissioner Roy Prescott.
But Crossroads Ranch Manager Steve Thorson declined to comment on the incubator proposal or the status of Crossroads.
Prescott said the possibility of moving the business incubator doesn't tie in with a county-sponsored proposal to open residential development and a 7,000-plus acre public park near the Crossroads property.
And the city of Jerome isn't near a deal to run out a sewer line, said city administrator Jon Cecil.
Lack of sewer service has long been cited as the biggest barrier to development at Crossroads and nearby properties.
"(Crossroads owners) are still interested in the line, but there's no clear proposal on the table," he said.
The business incubator can't reach its potential at CSI, said Region IV Development Association Executive Director Joe Herring.
"Being on the inside of a pedestrian college campus is not the best place for us," he said.

China: U.S. needs ally in troubled Asia

WASHINGTON — The Chinese ambassador suggested Friday that the United States needs China as an ally in a region troubled by fresh nuclear threats and political crisis.
Just two weeks before President Clinton was to visit China, Ambassador Li Zhaoxing also offered assurances that his nation has only peaceful and prosperous ambitions. "China is pursuing a peaceful foreign policy," Li said at a news conference a day after Clinton defended his upcoming trip. "China presents no threat to any country, at all."
As for congressional critics of China, who complain the administration is engaging a human rights violator and a "paramilitary aggressor," Li dismissed them as Cold War thugs.

ACROSS THE NATION

Jury finds youth guilty of killing 2 classmates

HATTIESBURG, Miss. (AP) — Luke Woodham was found guilty Friday of killing two classmates — including a girl he had dated — during a shooting rampage at his high school. It was the second time in two weeks a jury rejected claims the 17-year-old boy was insane. He had previously been found guilty of killing his mother just before the attack at Pearl High School and sentenced to life in prison. The Oct. 3 attack was the first of several high-profile school shootings around the country. The jury, which deliberated about five hours, also found Woodham guilty of wounding seven other students during the shooting. He received two life sentences plus 20 years on each aggravated assault charge, all to run consecutively. After the sentencing, Woodham again apologized to the victims and their families. "I am sorry for the people I killed and

During the last six weeks of the campaign, National Community Development Services will focus on getting donations from about 70 small businesses. Most of the current 70 investors are large companies with more money to spend on the project. "We want to be completely inclusive in our approach, we want the participation to be reflective of the business community as a whole," said Mark Bengeon, NCD's development director for Business Plus II. The money, once raised, will go toward business recruitment, expansion and employee training. It could be spent on enlarging existing facilities, luring outside firms with incentives, such as free land or utilities, and helping to train workers and high school students. Already businesses are requesting money for projects, such as expanding their facilities. But they must abide by a strict plan to create jobs, not just expect help with remodeling, just said. A trust board consisting of donors — large and small — will review ideas for spending the money. The Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce Board will approve or reject the board's recommendations. Backers of Business Plus II want to create 1,000 jobs over the next five years that will pay at least 15 percent more than what the average worker already makes in Twin Falls County, about \$17,000 annually, just said. Only certain types of companies are sought for Twin Falls County. They must not compete with any of the current businesses in Twin Falls County. Manufacturing and service jobs are likely candidates. Jurors hear story of occult, demons

HATTIESBURG, Miss. (AP) — Lake Woodham testified Friday that heartbreak over losing a girlfriend and fascination with occult rituals led to his mother's stabbing and his "reign of terror" over classmates. "I'm sorry, I'm so sorry," Woodham sobbed as he tried to explain why he opened fire with a hunting rifle at Pearl High School, the first of several high-profile shootings at schools around the country. The jury began deliberating Friday. The 17-year-old boy told jurors that after his breakup with Christina Menefee, 16, he fell under the influence of Grant Boyette, 19, a friend he described as both a mentor and a tormentor who introduced him to the occult. "He told me I had to kill my mom," Woodham said. "He told me I had to get the gun and the car and go to school and get my revenge on Christy and cause a reign of terror."

Woodham, who is pursuing an insanity defense, testified against the advice of his defense team. "I believe the killing of your dog, killing of your mother and shooting of the school — killing everything you love — is insane," said defense attorney Leslie Rossell.

Albright scolds Rubin for secrecy

WASHINGTON (AP) — In a rare public display of high-level disagreement, Secretary of State Madeleine Albright has chastised Treasury Secretary Robert Rubin for failing to inform her about a money-laundering sting operation in Mexico. "I would appreciate being kept personally informed of developing investigations in Mexico and other foreign countries that could have a significant foreign policy fallout," Albright said in a letter to Rubin, dated May 22. "It is our wish to interfere with your law enforcement work, but I do believe we need to do a better job of coordination," she wrote.

The letter was inserted in the Congressional Record by Sen. Charles Grassley, R-Iowa. It was not disclosed how Grassley obtained the letter. Albright expressed concern about the negative tone this development introduces into the relationship and that Mexican cooperation on several fronts, particularly counterterrorism, may be affected. Efforts to obtain comment from the Treasury Department on the letter were unsuccessful.

Journalist faked stories

WASHINGTON (AP) — Editors at The New Republic are apologizing to readers after finding that ousted reporter Stephen Glass invented all or part of 27 of the 41 articles he wrote for the publication. "We offer no excuses for any of this," the magazine says in its upcoming issue. "Only our deepest apologies to all concerned." Glass, who is 25, was fired last month as an associate editor after confessing he had "embellished" a story about computer hackers that ran in the May 18 issue. The confession prompted a monthlong investigation by the journal to analyze the stories that Glass wrote during his 3-year stint. Glass cooperated with the investigation and apologized this week in letters to Charles Lane, the magazine's editor.

southeast of Seattle. And warm temperatures Thursday followed two days of cold that dumped new snow on the peak.
Patrick Nestler, 29, of Rowayton, Conn., died after he was hit by the slide, fell about 100 feet and spent several hours dangling from a rope at Disappointment Cleaver, a sharp-edged rock formation on Reiner's upper reaches that divides two of the peak's major glaciers.
Death was attributed to hypothermia, said the Pierce County medical examiner's office. Nestler also suffered blunt injuries, the autopsy found.
Guide Ruth Mahre, 25, of White Pass, at the upper end of the rope from which Nestler dangled, was able to secure it to the rockside for hours until rescue crews arrived.
"If anyone moved it was all over for all of us," Mahre said.
She shrugged off praise from the others for her efforts.
"I wasn't the hero," Mahre said. "I was just lucky."
The slide swept over two climbing teams — both part of a 27-member group in a 5-day, \$745 mountain-aiding school arranged by Ashford-based RMI. One group held their ground using ice axes to arrest their fall. The other was swept over Disappointment Cleaver.
Nine people — including Nestler, the four injured men and three injured women —

were evacuated Thursday. The others completed their descent Friday.
"I saw people go right by me," said Mark Hunter, 39, of Westport, Conn., who came off the mountain Friday. "The avalanche was just a few feet from hitting us all."
"I heard people screaming help, screaming that they were cold, screaming that they were going to die," said Jeff Fisher, 38, of Bloomington, Minn., who was standing with Hunter when the slide swept by.
"At the end, it was like tumbling bodies and they just kept going," Fisher said.
But many of the party said they would be back.
"It's more dangerous to drive on the freeway than to climb Mount Rainier," said Lori Cowen, 28, of Sacramento.
The avalanche struck without a sound at about 2 p.m. The only warning was a shout from someone higher on the mountain.
"It felt like we were going down a waterfall," Ilkerhan Nuz Redman of Manhattan Beach, Calif., told The Seattle Times in an emergency-room interview.

Panel: School tests not comparable

WASHINGTON (AP) — Schoolchildren may smother an array of standardized tests that the different results should not be compared to each other, an expert panel said Friday in a report that could bolster President Clinton's call for national testing standards.
The special committee took no position on whether there should be national tests that would measure individual reading and math performance against a uniform standard.

But the panel from the independent National Research Council did say existing tests developed by states and private companies are too diverse for the results to be compared to one another on a national or international benchmarks.
Clinton proposed early last year that a voluntary national goal be developed for fourth-grade reading and eighth-grade math.

Clinton offers plan to save oceans

MONTEREY, Calif. (AP) — President Clinton today served up environmental medicine including a 10-year extension of a ban on most offshore oil drilling and an order to stop the degradation of coral reefs in U.S. waters.

With picturesque Monterey Bay as his backdrop, Clinton also proposed spending an extra \$194 million over five years to reduce over-fishing and to protect fish habitats, plus the proposed building two new unmanned deep-sea observatories.

"In our daily lives the oceans play a crucial role," Clinton said, with the dull roar of waves crashing behind him. "Our oceans are the key to life-support systems."

He proposed spending \$224 million over five years on various projects to improve marine life.

Clinton spoke in San Carlos Park, a stone's throw from a sandy patch of shoreline, to address the National Oceanic Conference. The sea abounds brightly and seagulls cruised overhead as the president highlighted the importance of oceans to America's businesses, national security, energy and recreation.

The president also called on the Senate to clear the way for the United States to join the Law of the Sea Convention, which provides the international legal framework that supports activities at sea, including fishing and military operations. There is a November deadline for

nations to join.

Before leaving Washington, Clinton issued an executive order directing federal agencies to avoid actions that "degrade the condition" of coral reef ecosystems. It also provided \$5 million to restore 15 damaged reefs — 11 in Florida, two in the Virgin Islands, three in Puerto Rico, and one each in Guam and Hawaii.

Marine conservation groups have been lobbying the White House to produce a comprehensive strategy for preserving and protecting the oceans.

In proclaiming 1998 as the Year of the Ocean, Clinton said in January that decades of pollution were threatening ocean life.

Astronaut back home after Mir trip

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — Space shuttle Discovery returned to Earth on Friday, bringing home the last American to live aboard Mir and closing out three years of U.S.-Russian cooperation aboard the aging space station.

"They'll have your legs and crew inside line around waiting when you get there," Mission Specialist American astronaut Andrew Thomas said as the shuttle landed.

"The landing forward to that (ground)," he recalled. "It's truly a wonderful day. 4 1/2 months in zero gravity, Thomas was careful from day one on it, including, seat belt, cables to Kennedy Space Center's crew quarters, where dinner and a shower of medical tests awaited him."

The 46-year-old unarmored cosmonaut from Australia was the seventh NASA astronaut to live on Mir as part of the international space station; he boarded the Russian outpost in January.

All together, the six men and one woman totaled up 577 days in orbit beginning with the first expedition in 1993, and endured a major fire, a near-catastrophic collision, computer breakdowns, power outages and toxic leaks.

NASA Administrator Daniel Golden greeted Thomas with a bouquet. "It's getting a big hug from me because he did a terrific job and he maintained this little machine," Goldstein said.

Show features railroad art by Monet, Manet

WASHINGTON (AP) — A new exhibit at the National Gallery of Art, featuring two painters who are sometimes confused with each other, puts art lovers and train buffs on the same track.

For the first time since the works were completed 120 years ago, the gallery has brought into one room all 11 paintings that impressionist Claude Monet did in and around a big Paris rail station. And there's a 12th he did at a suburban station near his home in Argenteuil, on a line leading into the Paris terminal.

The show, which opens Sunday, also includes "The Railway" by Edouard Manet — a landmark Impressionist painting. The work shows a little girl with her governess and dog, going across the tracks of the same Paris station. No train can be seen, only great billows of smoke — the kind of atmosphere in oils that the Impressionists loved.

Though he lived and worked near the station, Manet lacked Monet's love of trains. Manet did once ask the management of a railroad for permission to paint a locomotive, with the engineer and fireman. He had more interest in the crew than the train, and his perspective never came off.

"For Manet, man is always at the center," Juliet Wilson-Bureau, co-curator of the show, wrote in the catalog. "For Monet, it is the spectacle, the visual experience itself."

It's not only train buffs who may get the idea that Manet and

say, "Monet, Manet. I've heard both, but don't worry — both are right."

Manet came from a wealthy family, while Monet was poor for much of his life.

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) — An 89-year-old man was charged with attempted murder for allegedly clubbing a 34-year-old woman with a crowbar after she rejected his Viagra-charged advances.

Larry Demorest, who was arrested and jailed Thursday, said the woman made up the story.

Kimberly Henriet, who has lived at Demorest's home off and on for 10 years and said they had a romantic relationship, told sheriff's deputies that Demorest popped a Viagra, then tried to kill her after she refused to perform sex for money.

Self-help writer known as 'Dr. Hug' dies at 74

GLENBROOK, Nev. (AP) — Self-help author Leo Buscaglia, the bearded, teddy bear-like figure of love who customarily ended his motivational speeches by giving everyone in the audience a hug, died of a heart attack Friday at 74.

Buscaglia (pronounced Bus-KAL-yah) died at his home on the streets of Lake Tahoe.

Known as "Dr. Hug," he shook up the University of Southern California in the '70s when he shared classes on love, including "Love 101," covering sociology and psychology. His first book, "Love," came out in 1972 and examined the phenomenon of human love as the one unifying force in life. PBS used his taped lectures during fund-raising drives.

"I spoke to anybody who wanted to hear me, including 1,000 men who could not live only with homemade bread," he said.

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U.S. adds safety rules as golf carts move to roads

WASHINGTON (AP) — Golf carts aren't just for duffers any more.

With senior citizens and others using the carts on city streets, the government decided Friday to put the motorized buggies in a special class and make them fit certain safety rules, including a requirement that faster ones have seat belts, turn signals and rear-view mirrors.

Golfers won't have to buckle up as they trundle down the fairway, though, since most carts used for golfing are so slow to be covered by the new standards.

Officials think the rule will encourage nationwide use of the souped-up golf carts already pop-

ular on the streets of senior citizen communities.

"We see two benefits: increased mobility for the elderly, and a plus for the environment since most of these carts run on electricity," said Mike Russell, spokesman for the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

Under the rules, "low-speed vehicles" — classified as those with top speeds of 20 to 25 miles per hour — will need safety features including seat belts, headlights, windshields, signals and rear-view mirrors. But they will be exempt from federal crash-test standards used for automobiles.

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NATO says air power will send message

BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP) — U.S. Defense Secretary William Cohen said Friday that NATO's planned air power demonstration and consideration of armed intervention is sending a message to Yugoslav President Slobodan Milosevic that he should halt the slaughter of innocent people in Kosovo.

"We are looking at a very short time frame ... to solve this peacefully," Cohen told a news conference at the end of a two-day defense ministers' meeting at NATO headquarters.

Cohen had a private meeting with Russian Defense Minister Igor Sergeev, in the morning, then again in the afternoon with the other 15 NATO defense ministers as part of the NATO-Russia Permanent Joint Council.

Tourist ship sinks off Galapagos

QUITO, Ecuador (AP) — Navy and private boats searched Friday for three elderly Americans missing after a charter boat sank off the coast of the Galapagos Islands. One 70-year-old American woman was confirmed dead.

Nigeria dispels protesters

LAGOS, Nigeria (AP) — Firing into the air, unleashing tear gas and arresting a leading dissident, security forces of Nigeria's latest military boss sent a clear signal Friday to the nation's pro-democracy forces: Muscle still rules this junta-weary country.

Opposition activists demanding an end to military rule took to the streets in a planned mass protest, but they were quickly confronted by a wall of police and soldiers in Lagos, Nigeria's commercial hub.

Throughout the city, convoys of heavily armed troops and riot police roared through the streets, firing weapons and clashing with protesters, dragging some of the demonstrators away.

Faced with his first major test — the prospect of defiant opposition — Gen. Abdulsalam Abubakar — responded — with enough might to quell hopes that his 54-year-old regime would differ from that of the 5-year-long military dictatorship of his predecessor, Gen. Sani Abacha.

India, Pakistan bicker again

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — Crushing short-lived hopes of a breakthrough, Pakistan denied India's claim Friday that it had agreed to top-level talks to try to cool hostilities between the two neighbors and nuclear rivals.

Pakistan Foreign Minister Gohar Ayub Khan said India was "trying to pull a fast one" by

announcing the talks without Pakistan's agreement.

The dispute came as the foreign ministers of eight leading industrial nations stepped up sanctions against India and Pakistan, deciding at a meeting in London to deny all loans except those earmarked for humanitarian projects.

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Know your limitations — or wait for a Good Samaritan

My sister, Kathy, and Dad's wife, Jean, took our 87-year-old father to the doctor recently. The doctor asked if Dad had any difficulty getting out of a chair. Dad said, "No — no problems at all." Training great! Kathy and Jean looked at each other nervously, and then Jean cleared her throat and gently told the doctor that, yes, he does need assistance getting out of a chair.

When the doctor asked if he ever fell for a stumble, Dad said, "No — I don't ever fall." Jean and Kathy looked at each other again, chuckling, and then Jean reported that he is frequently wobbly and falls fairly often.

Then the doctor asked if he needed any assistance in walking. "No," Dad said. "I'm doing just fine in walking." Jean interjected again, reporting that he does just fine as long as he uses two canes, or if there's someone strong alongside to help hold him up.

The doctor smiled patiently. "I think I already know the answer to the next question," he said, "but how is your memory? Are you finding yourself forgetting things?"

"No, I don't have a problem with that at all," Dad said. Then he looked at Jean and asked, "Do I, honey?"

In other words, situation normal with our ever-optimistic father. He thinks he's in great condition for someone in his condition. And he probably is. But that sort of begs the point, doesn't it? The fact is, age isn't creeping up on Dad; it has overtaken him, and left him in the dust. But Dad has a hard time seeing it. He still thinks he's 70, which may sound old to most of us, but for Dad 70 was a walk in the park. Dad was a stud at 70 — strong, active, alert, dynamic, energetic, vibrant. I'm in worse shape at 43 than Dad was at 70.

But Dad isn't 70 anymore. You don't have to spend much time with him to see that. He's sweet and wonderful and charming.

But he can't do everything that he could do when he was younger. You know — like getting out of a chair. And walking. And remembering stuff. None of which is problematic for those of us who know and love him. It's just a problem when he tries to do things that he can't — or shouldn't — do anymore.

Like the other day when he awakened early and decided to go for a walk without telling Jean and without his canes.

He got as far as the driveway outside his home before he fell, dislocating his finger and cutting his hand badly enough to require stitches.

We don't know how long he was out there on his hands and knees, bleeding and unable to get up, before a Good Samaritan came along to help him back to the house (thank you, sir, whoever you are). And we don't know if he really understands that he can't go for walks — canes and all — anymore, which means we are now in the uncomfortable position of having to limit his freedom so he doesn't hurt himself.

There's nothing quite as frightening as someone who is unaware of his limitations — the child who thinks he can carry the toddler up the stairs, the teenager who thinks he is invulnerable behind the wheel of a car, the middle-aged father who thinks he can keep up with his 18-year-old son on the basketball court, the second soprano who thinks she can hit the high notes in "The Star Spangled Banner."

Just as it is important to know our strengths and cultivate our talents, we also need to be aware of our weaknesses.

Sure, we can work on them, maybe even turn a few into strengths. But even then, we need to make sure we know when a weakness really has become a strength, or we may find ourselves on our hands and knees — bleeding, dislocated — waiting for a Good Samaritan.

Young Life delivers hope

Wood River group serves in Mexico

KETCHUM — Giving up their spring break vacation was no big deal for two dozen Wood River Valley teenagers.

While other teens slept in, watched television or vacationed with parents, this group traveled to Mexico to build hope and promise for the future for three families struggling to get by.

Under the leadership of Stewart Sommeland, Wood River Young Life raised funds to build houses for needy families across the border. This is the second year of the project.

Young Life is a nationwide, interdenominational Christian ministry for teens and young adults. The home-building trip was sponsored through Amore Ministries, whose mission is to build homes for the needy.

The 24 students and nine leaders quickly agreed that what they received from making this journey was far more valuable than a lost vacation.

"I came away aware of two things," Sommeland said, "first, of the great need that exists in Mexico and second, I was staggered by how, with very little effort and very little time — just four days — we were truly able to change the lives of these families."

In the four days the Young Life group was in La Mirada, a rural town 15 miles southeast of Tijuana, the students constructed two houses and completed a third left unfinished by a previous group from Amore.

While the houses are smaller than those of American homes — just 14 feet wide by 22 feet long — they are built well and are steps above the prevailing living conditions.

Sommeland described the living conditions in La Mirada as "shocking."

When the group crossed the border into Tijuana, an eerie silence filled the vans. This was far from the Wood River Valley. Homes were little more than tin-paper shacks with dirt floors and cardboard walls.

There is no running water in La Mirada. Water trucks bring water to

residents daily. But the Young Life students said it was broken.

Toilet facilities consist of holes dug into the ground with plastic barrels placed on top for the small pitways was afforded by thinkins built up by sticks.

"They had so little, but no them, they were so happy," said Wood River High School sophomore Natalie Heywood. "They never complained."

In order to make their trip possible, the students had to sell "stuffs" in the homes. By raising \$400 in spare and receiving additional donations, the group accumulated \$20,000 to purchase the construction materials to build the homes with concrete floors, stucco siding and roofs that do not leak.

A "double-wide home," which measures 22-by-44 feet, was constructed for a family of six. This replaced the 10-by-12 room trailer in which the family had been living, Sommeland said.

"When we blessed the house, the family and the mother started crying, and that was the coolest thing," said student Shannon Olson. "That was the best part of going down there, and it made it all worth while."

The experience has certainly made a lasting impact on Mattie.

She said she tries to make her selfish, share what she has with others, and not want so many things. She also said that, in 10 years, she'll like to see herself as a leader with Young Life, making a group of homes in Mexico.

When asked why effort wasn't made to help needy Americans here at home, Sommeland explained that as a goal of this, but building homes in other states would be done eventually due to building costs, permits, expense and time.

But primarily, Sommeland said the benefit of exposing teens to Third World conditions generates invaluable, lifelong experience.

"The Wood River Valley is an isolated and insulated place," Sommeland explained. "In a lot of ways we do not have the exposure to the real world, and by sharing the experience it is as how most of the world lives. Opportunities like this become much more important."

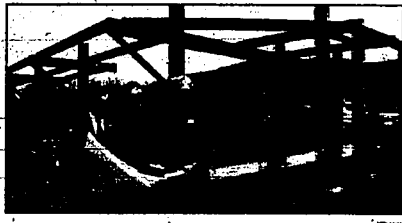

The Unfinished Project
HRODSBURG, Md. — Cubit by cubit, the Rev. Richard Green's vision is taking shape.

"Noah's Ark being rebuilt here" reads the message sign he stuck on a western Maryland mountain two decades ago. At last, it is.

Small beams and girders are rising on the site, amid the Allegheny mountains, after 24 years of paper, solicitation and ridicule. The boat won't float. But it will house a Christian school, Bible college, auditorium and broadcast studio. And Green is certain it will be built.

God's message is clear, he said: "You just keep on keeping on."

Support for the four-story structure began going up this spring — the most visible sign of progress since 1976 when work on the foundation began. It will be 450 feet long, 75 feet wide

and 45 feet high, close to what Greene calls the Biblical blueprint of 300 cubits by 50 cubits by 30 cubits.

But with construction proceeding as donations become available, don't expect the project to be finished on any earthly schedule. So far, Greene said, his God's Ark of Safety Ministry has spent about \$500,000 on a project that could exceed \$10 million.

"No banker will loan that to me," he conceded. "So I have to wait for God to speak to people and tell them to help me."

Now 61, Greene said he received a vision of the ark more than 20 years ago, in 1974, while leading a tiny Church of the Brethren congregation in Frostburg. Greene and his wife, Lottie, had moved a year earlier to this mountain town.

Japan's recession deepens fears of crisis

Asia's recession

Six months into this tiger year, the once roaring Asian economies have fallen deeper into recession or are slumping in that direction.

TOKYO — For nearly a year, Asia has been looking to Japan to lead the troubled region back to prosperity. But with Friday's news that Japan is mired in recession, the world's second-largest economy looks like more of a liability to its neighbors than a potential savior.

In a much-awaited announcement, the Economic Planning Agency said Friday that the country's gross domestic product slunk for two consecutive quarters, and that it suffered the first full year of negative growth in 20 years.

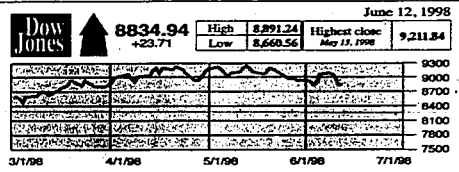
That bodes badly for the rest of Asia, which has been nursing the wounds of last year's regionwide currency crisis. Asian countries have been heavily reliant on Japanese investment and Japanese loans, and they consider Japan a vital import market.

But with its own economy in tatters and consumer confidence at all-time lows, Japan will be more tempted than ever to embark on a path of export-led growth — and if it does, the government will be very reluctant to stem the yen's slide against the dollar. A cheap yen makes Japanese exports cheaper, and thus more popular, overseas.

A continued plunge in the yen — it fell again Friday to its low of 144.75 to the dollar — could spark another round of regional currency devaluations as Asian countries fight to keep their products competitive in key foreign markets.

Friday's numbers out of Tokyo depicted an economy in need of serious first aid. The government said gross domestic product, the sum of all goods and services produced in Japan, fell by a steep 0.7 percent in the first quarter of 1998, following a drop of 0.4 percent in the previous quarter.

Stocks bounce back in late rally

NEW YORK — Bargain-hunters helped snap a three-day losing streak on Wall Street in the final hour of trading Friday, reversing a decline that briefly sent the Dow industrials tumbling more than 127 points.

Early on, the trading day looked like a fourth-straight session of selling, with the Dow weighted down by worries that Asia's economic woes are worsening and would lower corporate profits in the United States.

But investors attracted by falling prices and short-sellers — who had sold borrowed stock in a bet that stocks would slide before they had to buy shares to cover their commitment — led the rally.

The Dow, which fell almost 160 points Thursday to cap a three-day slide of 257.83 points, closed with a gain of 23.17 to 8,834.94. While it lost 202.77 points over the bruising week for blue-chip

stocks, the Dow still is up 11.7 percent for the year, or by 52.2 percent. With the latest rebound, which left broader indicators mixed, the outlook was brighter for next week.

"If we were down at the end of the day, Monday could have been a lot higher," said Ronald J. Hill, investment strategist at Brown Brothers Harriman & Co. "But we could be turning. And with bonds at new highs, stocks should probably follow along" on Monday. U.S. Treasury bonds, a traditional haven for nervous investors in times of economic unrest, have been big winners for much of the week. Yields on 30-year Treasuries, which move in the opposite direction of prices, fell Thursday to 5.65 percent, the lowest level since the government began regular sales of the securities in 1977. Yields dipped even further Friday morning as stocks sank at home and abroad, but later nudged higher to finish the day at 5.66 percent.

Case could affect public land grazing

More state power to protect water may result

TWIN FALLS - A case pending the 9th Circuit Court of Appeals has the potential to affect grazing and some say it could give states more power to protect water quality.

A ruling by the court could require federal land managers to get state certification that permits for grazing and other activities on federal land comply with the Clean Water Act.

The case is the February federal court arguments on an appeal of the 1996 ruling by Oregon U.S. District Court Judge A. Roger Haggerty, who said the Forest Service must have state approval before allowing cattle grazing

along polluted Oregon streams.

A decision on the case is pending. About a dozen streams that run through federal grazing land in southern Idaho recently were added to a list of polluted streams in Idaho. Cleanup plans may be required for these streams and they may include restrictions on grazing.

Haggerty's ruling came in a 1996 lawsuit filed by the Oregon Natural Desert Association and five other environmental and conservation groups.

A ruling upholding Haggerty's decision would give states authority to require livestock grazing allowances on federal public lands to meet state water quality standards - something it hasn't done, said David Lucas, a Boise attorney with the Land and Water Fund of the Rockies.

The state could waive certification or issue certification with conditions, said Mike McMasters with the state Division of Environmental Quality in Twin Falls. DEQ could require the adoption of management practices designed to protect water quality - known as "Best Management Practices" or BMPs.

The Sawtooth National Forest has standards for grazing meant to resolve water quality issues, said Don Oman, ecosystem staff officer with the Sawtooth.

"The standards have been implemented with varying degrees of success. Enforcement in some areas has been better than in others, and some areas have shown water quality improvements, he said.

But in some grazing allotments in steep country with fragile soil, it is harder to meet grazing standards, Oman said. And stricter water quality standards could affect those ranchers more.

Water quality is the soft underbelly of grazing, Lucas noted. And not only the Forest Service would be affected by the court's ruling. The Idaho Watershed Project and the Committee for Idaho

High Desert have challenged 68 grazing permits issued in 1997 by the Bureau of Land Management, saying they required state water quality certification.

The challenges are on hold pending the appeals court ruling. If the court upholds the Oregon lawsuit, those permits would have to be thrown out, Lucas said.

In response to the 1996 lawsuit, Oregon's Department of Environmental Quality has written rules for certifying grazing permits on federal lands.

"They are weak, but they are rules," said Jon Marvel, president of the Idaho Watersheds Project. The Idaho Cattle Association could not be reached for comment this week.

Wet spring sparks heavy grass growth on ranges

Ever wonder if there's a big fire year brewing?

TWIN FALLS - If it keeps on raining, 1998 won't be much of a fire year - but conditions are ripe for a scorching fire season if the sky stops crying.

Unusually wet spring weather has led to unusually thick grasses across most of southern Idaho's rangelands, said Andy Payne, fire manager for the U.S. Bureau of Land Management in Shoshone.

"It could be 30 to 40 percent more than in a typical year, as acre of rangeland holds 400 to 700 pounds of grass - but early estimates

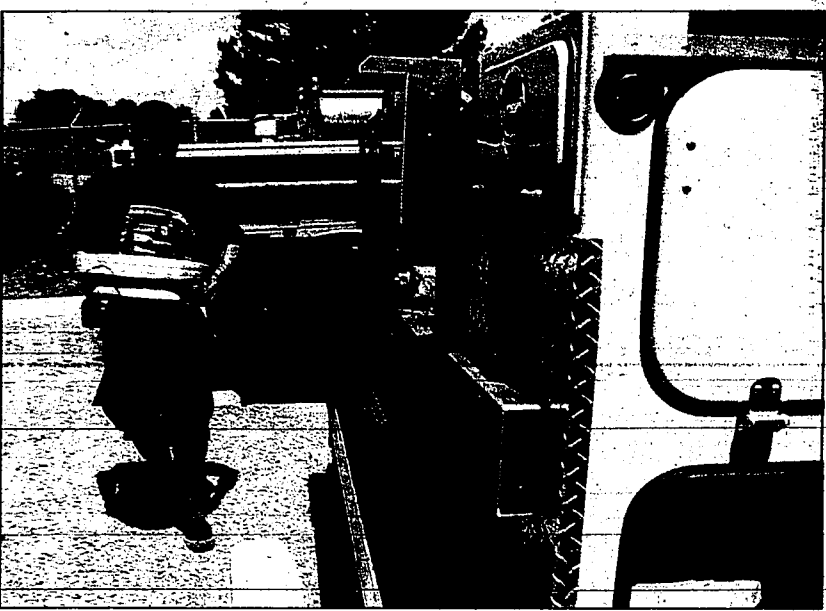
this year are in the 1,200-pound range, he said.

Fire officials with the Sawtooth National Forest say it's too early to predict what lies ahead.

"It all depends on whether the spring rains slack off and things dry out," said Tomma Begg, assistant fire management officer for the Sawtooth.

"There's plenty of light, fine fuels and the old, dry stuff from last year is still standing out there pretty thick," Begg said.

Generally speaking, southern Idaho's fire season begins in mid-June and extends into mid-October; the most-damaging fires usually occur between July and September, when conditions are driest.

Most of Payne's 5-million-acre dispatch area is still green, but spots near Devil's Corral and King Hill already are starting to turn brown.

"They will probably be light-

able in two weeks," Payne said. "An inordinately wet year doesn't necessarily mean fewer wildfires," Payne said.

"Last year, we had an extraordinarily wet year and we had

almost the same amount of fires," he said.

About 130 to 135 fires per year is the average.

Though the number of fires was about the same, far fewer

acres burned in 1997 than in a typical year. The long-term average for fire damage in a typical year is 75,000 acres, Payne said, but only 8,000 acres burned last year.

Former beauty queen pleads guilty to burglary

BURLEY - "Miss Congeniality" in the Miss Miss-Cassia contest of 1995 is facing a different kind of judge these days.

Rupert resident Jennifer Johnson, 29, who pleaded innocent to burglary charges in 7, changed her plea to guilty Friday in Cassia County Sixth District Court.

Deputy Prosecutor Howard Sawyer is recommending a 1 1/2- to 3-year prison term with credit for time served. That is, she will spend 120 days in a work center for rehabilitation. If she receives a favorable recommendation, she may be placed on probation.

Sawyer's recommendation has one consequence: Johnson will not receive a Miss-Cassia County case involving possession of methamphetamine.

District Judge Roger Burdick, filing in Friday for the deceased Judge George Gomez, agreed to state Johnson's bond from \$15,000 to \$5,000 if she submits to searches, random drug testing and a substance abuse evaluation.

"Methamphetamine is the damndest drug I've ever seen in terms of its addictive quality," Burdick said. "If you've been using it as I think you have, you've got a long road ahead of you."

Johnson is represented by public defenders Robert Crandall and Blaine Cannon, after attorney Robert Nielson withdrew from her cases in both counties.

"Jennifer Johnson is uncooperative," Nielson said then. "She refuses to take the charges seriously and refuses to pay me for my time. I can't work with her."

Traditionally, Miss Congeniality is voted by her peers as the most encouraging, friendly and helpful contestant. Johnson received a College of Southern Idaho Presidential Scholarship at the time.

Johnson, 29, is being held in the Miss-Cassia Criminal Justice Center and is believed to be the last in a complex list of burglary suspects responsible for burglarizing and vandalizing a storage house near Burley belonging to Jay and Linda Wrigley.

She was charged with operating in concert with one of the bands of suspects which included Todd Osterhout and Danny Hunter. Both men have pleaded guilty to burglary charges and have begun serving sentences.

Hunter, court records said, tipped off detectives that Johnson had several items from the burglary in her home. Hunter said he'd tried to get her to return them on her own, but she refused.

Detectives spoke with Johnson in March. She relinquished some property, then became uncooperative, police affidavits said. A search warrant was then sought.

During the search, 16 items belonging to the Wrigleys were recovered, including beads, purses, antique glass marbles, a sewing machine cabinet, and red crystal glasses.

Johnson was then charged with burglary in Cassia County.

Several items of drug paraphernalia as well as three grams of methamphetamine were discovered during the search of her Rupert home, resulting in controlled substance possession charges in Minidoka County.

Burley collision kills man

CASTLEFORD — Students from Lucerne School, now ranging in age from their 20s to 30s, will get together again this weekend.

"Come we're all going to the one of these days soon," said Opal Stanley Earlsbarrow, who graduated in 1941.

Lucerne School, on U.S. Highway 30, opened in 1909 and was a community meeting house and church as well as primary school. The school taught first through eighth grade and was one of many small schools in the valley. Norman Chandler and

Bob Eggleston, of the 1932 graduating class, said classes averaged about eight students and there were two teachers at Lucerne School — one for first through fourth grades, and another for fifth through eighth. Students took lunches or walked to school.

Earlsbarrow, now a retired teacher, said the biggest change between school then and now is discipline. Her schoolmates agreed; Eggleston recalled a teacher making him go outside and pick up his own trash.

"I only got two whippings in school," he said.

Agnes Wilson, who graduated in 1925, said, typically for her generation, she wore a dress before school, then wore trousers and walked to school. She lived a mile away and didn't get a ride unless the weather was miserable. After school she said they changed clothes, did chores, had dinner and cleaned the dishes, then settled down to study.

Wilson said their home life was as disciplined with chores and responsibilities as school.

"Good basic fundamentals education, from the first grade and up," said Eggleston about their schooling. Aside from traditional subjects, students also had Bible study and hygiene every day.

Shirley Eggleston said they managed to have plenty of fun. Most students participated in sports — baseball and track primarily — and would travel to games and see in somebody's grain track.

Earlsbarrow said they had no socials every other week. Girls made lunches that were auctioned anonymously, and whichever boy bought a lunch shared it with the girl who made it. Ron Eggleston said with a chuckle that a girl would walk around in her bra and knickers, which lunch was hers if she liked him.

Students also managed to pull pranks. Tipping over the girls' outdoor was per for the course, Bob Eggleston said. They couldn't tip the boys' because it was attached to the coal shed.

Being inventive, Bob Eggleston said students managed to raise a few trunks and carriages onto the school's roof over the years. They would tie ropes on the vehicle, throw the ropes over the building and have a few guys with horses tie them to their saddle horns.

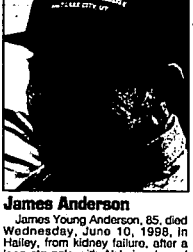

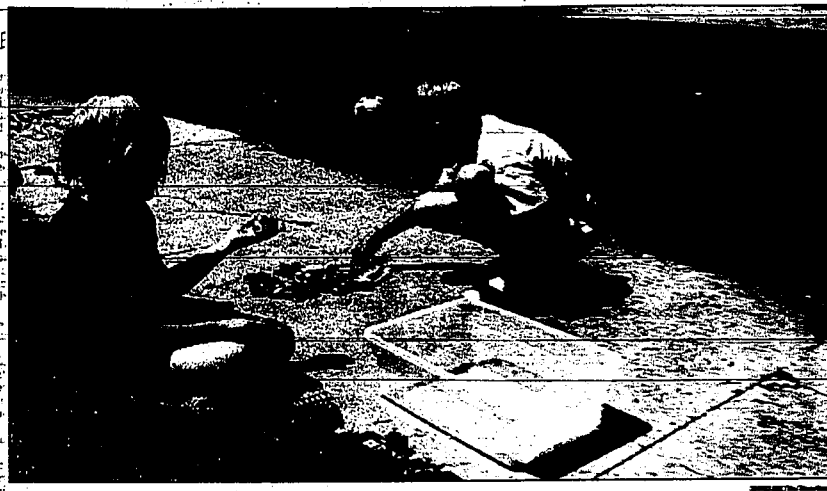

Effort for memorial to slain Jewish girl gets under way

BOISE (AP) - Although Idaho is far away from the Netherlands and the Nazis of World War II, it is taking a stance for human rights in a memorial to Anne Frank.

Organizers are embarking on a \$1.6 million fund-raising campaign to build an Idaho Anne Frank Human Rights Memorial off the Boise Greenbelt. The 1.5-acre memorial and educational park will feature a long granite wall etched with quotes from human rights leaders.

Anne's Jewish family spent 25 months in the attic of her father's Amsterdam office, hiding from the Germans. During that time she secretly kept a diary in her diary. They eventually were betrayed and sent to concentration camps. Anne died of typhus at age 16.

The memorial also will include a weeping table with a bronze replica of her famous diary, a sculpture and a fountain. It could be completed in two years.

"The time is right. It's so important for Idaho to come right up front on the issue of diversity," said Kathy Yamamoto, who directs the Boise Education Association and is organizing the schools in the project.

It comes at a time the Black History Museum kicks off its own Boise campaign and the Hispanic Cultural Center begins its efforts in Nampa.

About 46,000 people visited the International Anne Frank in the World exhibit which came to Boise in 1995, compared with 12,000 in New York.

The city of Boise has offered park land for the memorial and school children have helped raise funds.

"She was a fine writer who managed in a lot of ways to capture the universal feelings of people who are suffering," said Rabbi Daniel King of Congregation Ahavath Beth Israel in Boise. "The idea of someone who was so incredibly gifted and so young is something we continue to resonate with people."

Drunken driver will go to prison

Fleeing authorities yields time for repeat offender

BURLEY - A repeat offender described by the prosecutor as "a jerk" will go to prison for fleeing from sheriff's deputies.

Other judges in the 5th Judicial District are filling in as well this summer, until Gov. Phil Batt fills appoints Gramma's replacement.

"Except for the circumstances, we'd be happy to see Judge Burdick," Sogser said.

Report: Clothes may provide new evidence in Ramsey case

BOULDER, Colo. (AP) - Police have new evidence in the Justice Ramsey slaying investigation, forensic experts say. The clothes belonging to the little girl's parents, a television network reporter.

Police television quoted sources as saying an examination of clothes worn by John and Patsy Ramsey on the eve of the 6-year-old's killing is giving investigators new hope of solving the case.

The autopsy performed on the child found clothing fibers in the pelvic area, the investigation sources told Fox.

Boulder Police Cmdr. Mark Beckner, the lead investigator, told reporters earlier this month that there had been an important development in the case. He refused to discuss it further.

The test results had only become available a few days earlier.

Boulder District Attorney Alex Hunter, who met with police for the first time last week, said the case should go to a grand jury, agreed the new evidence was important. He also said he was leaning toward giving the case to a grand jury, which could compel the Ramseys to testify.

Fox also reported laboratory tests confirmed that a Sharpe pen found in the Ramsey home was used to write the ransom note. The note was dated the day the child's body was discovered in the basement of the family's home.

Earlier tests confirmed the note was written on a notepad the family says it used. However, the handwriting on the note has proved inconclusive.

SPOKANE (AP) - The body found near Mount Spokane this week is a short woman with light hair, and is still considered a possible victim of the Spokane serial killer, police said Friday.

Standoff leads to shooting of fugitive

CHEWELAR, Wash. (AP) - An armed man was shot and critically wounded Friday after a six-hour standoff with law enforcement officers that closed U.S. 325.

Douglas J. Lefebvre, 41, of Spokane, was in critical condition at Sacred Heart Medical Center in Spokane with a gunshot wound, hospital officials said.

Lefebvre was shot by members of the Spokane County SWAT team, who ended the standoff by using an explosive device as a diversion in January of this year.

Officers then chased at the retreating Lefebvre, and attempted to make him at least one shot, according to video footage broadcast on local television stations.

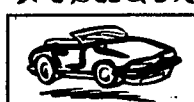

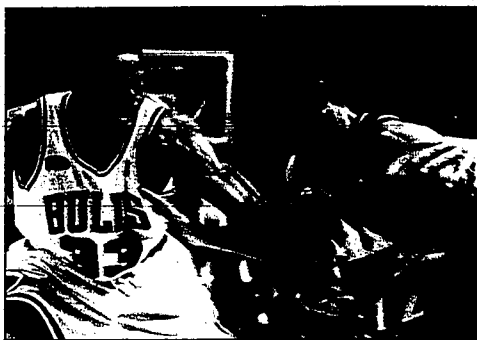

CHICAGO — Not so fast, Chicago Bulls

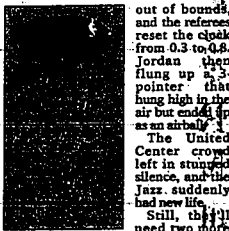
Michael Jordan missed a last-second 3-pointer that would have won the championship, and Karl Malone made sure the Bulls would have to earn their sixth championship away from home.

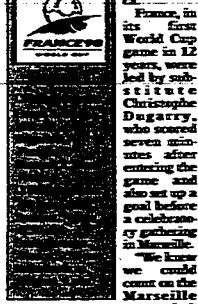

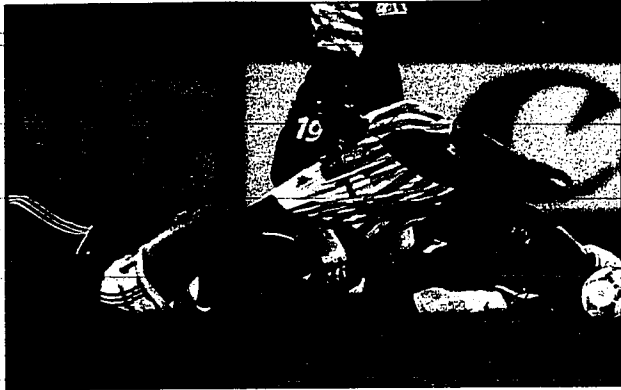
Host France blanks South Africa

Bomb threat mars Day 3

PARIS (AP) — Bomb threats, ticket scandals and Marseille. Mania marked the third day of the World Cup, when host France made its tournament debut with a 3-0 rout of South Africa.



France, in its first World Cup game in 22 years, were led by substitute Christian Dugary, who scored seven minutes after entering the game and also set up a goal before a celebratory gathering in Marseille. "We knew we could count on the Marseille crowd," coach Aimé Jacquet said. But the day was not nearly all celebration. World Cup organizers canceled the two bomb threats before the match in Montpellier between Bulgaria and Paraguay, but dismissed them as "no serious." The game ended 0-0, the first



scoreless tie of the tournament. In the other game Friday, Denmark edged South Africa 1-0 on Marc Regnier's header in the 68th minute. FIFA and World Cup organizers will investigate two soccer fans who were arrested and a branch of FIFA's own marketing arm concerning ticket sales. They also are ready to sue agents who sold tickets illegally. Ticket shortages have been reported in Japan, the Netherlands, Belgium, Germany, England and Brazil. The problem, officials claimed, lay with unscrupulous businesses. "There's a confusion here, and that is creating excuses for the operators," said Isabelle Delaye, the organizing committee's ticket chief. "We should criticize them. They found the ideal way of making money, by deceiving people." Despite whipping winds, the host team whipped up on the South Africans, making their World Cup debut — they'd never qualified when eligible and were barred for 28 years until 1992 because of apartheid. Dugary back-headed a corner

kick by good friend and French star Zinedine Zidane into the net to open the scoring. Dugary also laid off a ball for Youri Djorkaeff, who hit a falling, slow roller that goalkeeper Hans Vanck appeared to have. But a sliding attempt to clear the ball by defender Pierre Issa caused it to bounce over Vanck and land softly in the net. Thierry Henry closed it out in injury time. "We will savor this win, but we won't rest on our laurels," Henry said. The closest Paraguay came to a goal against Bulgaria was in the

78th minute on a free kick. Goalkeeper Jose Luis Chilavert came upfield to take it and curled a left-footed shot over the wall, only for Bulgarian counterpunch Zdravko Zdravkov punch away the shot as it approached the crossbar. "I already saw the ball in the net," Chilavert said. "Too bad I did not score, I could have made history." There wasn't much for the history books at Lens, although Danish star Michael Laudrup appeared in his 100th game for the national team.

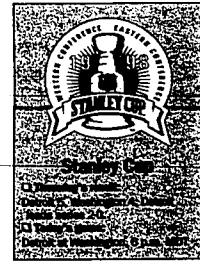

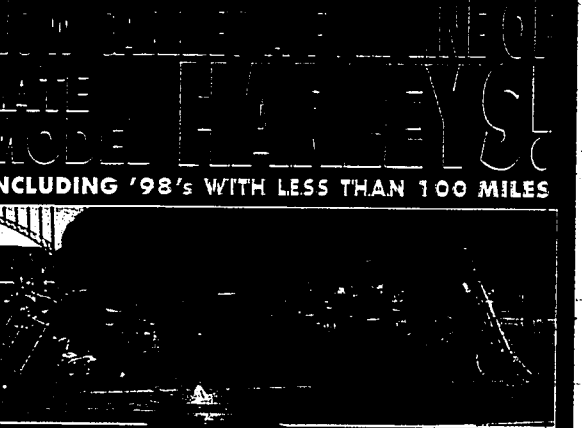

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A tough week for the tobacco business

Senate bill threatens to raise prices, firmly control industry

WASHINGTON — In Richmond, Va., the heart of Marlboro country just 100 miles south of Washington, Gov. James S. Gilmore III spoke at a rally of tobacco farmers Thursday and sent a message to Congress: "These workers here today are under attack from politicians in Washington who want to regulate and tax them out of existence."

Gilmore was probably aiming at too narrow a target. This week, Washington was just one front in the war on tobacco — and things weren't looking good for the industry on most of them.

There was attacking the Senate's sweeping tobacco bill, which would raise the price of a cigarette pack by \$1.10 and place firm controls on tobacco, from how it is made to how it is sold. At the start of the week, Senate Majority Leader Trent Lott declared the bill "dead in the water." But a flurry of negotiations Tuesday led to quick approvals of a tax cut for low- and middle-income married couples and anti-drug provisions. Suddenly, the bill is quite alive.

While this turnaround was unfolding on Capitol Hill, a Jacksonville, Fla., jury reminded the industry that pending legislation is only one of its problems. The jurors found the Brown & Williamson tobacco company guilty of conspiracy, negligence and producing a defective product — cigarettes — that contributed to the death of Roland Maddox, who died of lung cancer at age 57 after 50 years of smoking.

The jury awarded the Maddox family almost \$1 million, half of it in compensation and half to punish the company.

It was only the second time since the 1950s that a tobacco company had lost in court. But the Maddox case also had one

element that separated it from every case that came before privileged documents. In March, Supreme Court Justice Clarence Thomas ordered the tobacco companies to release 39,000 of their closest-held documents, primarily letters to and from company lawyers. The documents detail the companies' systematic suppression of evidence on tobacco's harms, as well as strategies discussed to lure teens to smoking.

The documents are now available on the Internet for use by the small army of trial lawyers and attorneys general that have cases pending against Big Tobacco. Lawyers around the country immediately called the courthouse after the Maddox verdict requesting transcripts of the trial, in search of a legal roadmap for their own cases. Congress certainly took notice.

"Do not underestimate the impact of the Thomas decision. That was a very significant decision," said Sen. John Kerry, D-Mass., hinting that Democrats may not be as open to compromise on tobacco in the future as they were this week. The stock of BAT, the British company that owns Brown & Williamson, dropped sharply after the verdict was announced. Kerry said the belligerent tobacco companies ought to be more cooperative now that they are legally vulnerable and have ditched stockholders. Regardless of what Congress does, the lawsuits, pending in almost every state, will go on.

The weeklong stalemate in the Senate was broken in part by phone calls from President Clinton to Senate leaders on Tuesday. Only minutes later the Senate approved a tax cut for married couples making less than \$50,000, then a series of anti-drug provisions. These moves gave

the bill a sweet taste for many in the Republican majority, who love tax cuts and fighting drugs, and they are now more likely to support it.

On Thursday the Senate defeated a cap on fees of lawyers who have sued tobacco companies on behalf of the government. Most of them will earn what amounts to \$52,000 per hour. Had that amendment passed, it would have made the bill bitter for Democrats, traditional allies of trial lawyers. The only major hurdle left for next week is an emotional one: how to help the

tobacco farmers that will be hurt by the decline in smoking. By the end of the week the Senate is expected to vote on the bill.

Of course, there is also the little matter of the House of Representatives. The House has not taken up any tobacco legislation, and Speaker of the House Newt Gingrich, R-Ga., said Wednesday that his members were not interested in doing so.

Given the simultaneous ride in the Senate, however, such statements are not given much weight here. Members of the Senate

and the White House expect that the passage of a bill in the Senate will put enormous pressure on the House to pass — and pass quickly — a minimal tobacco bill. Then the leaders of both houses and the White House will roll up their sleeves and draft a compromise bill the president can sign.

Otherwise, Democrats have made clear that tobacco will be an issue in the fall elections. Kerry even tested a slogan: "If you have failed on campaign finance and failed on tobacco, you have failed as a party."

THE ACES ON BRIDGE

Bobby Wolff

"I dance to the tune that is played."
— Spanish proverb

A flexible declarer chooses a plan that may work best against the enemy's attack. In today's example, when a trump lead prevents declarer from ruffing his losers in dummy, he must look for another way to make his game.

If West leads the club jack from the top of a solid sequence, South has an easy time. He wins dummy's club ace, leads a diamond to the king, and plays another diamond. East wins and shifts to trumps, but it's too late. South wins and ruffs a diamond in dummy. A club back to his king allows another diamond ruff, and South has his 10 winners.

A trump lead complicates matters. However, South survives if he helps to this defense. Recognizing the ability of pursuing diamond ruffs, South must discard his losers on dummy's spades. He wins his trump ace and leads his low spade, dummy's eight falling to East's jack. A second trump goes to dummy's 10, and South leads dummy's spade queen, ruffing East's king high. South leads a trump to dummy's jack and passes dummy's spade 10 to West's ace, discarding a diamond. Now dummy's spades are high, and South can discard two more losers to make his game.

What if East switches to diamonds after winning his spade jack? South retains control by ducking in hand, dummy's jack forcing West's king. On lead, West has no effective response. If he switches back to trumps, South sets up dummy's spades. And if he doesn't, South can still get his two diamond ruffs with dummy's two high trumps.

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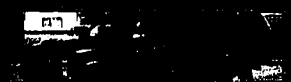

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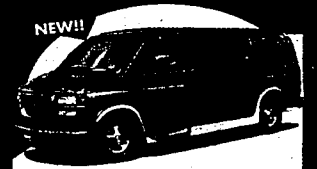
