

Indeed, similar damaging waves have struck Alaska and Hawaii and an offshore earthquake fault threatens to send them to the Pacific Northwest. Earthquakes from the Cascadia fault have generated major tsunami over the last several, thousand years, Hull said, with an estimated recurrence rate of 300 to 600 years. The last such quake was in January 1700, he said.





Sudanese rebels charge U.N. with corruption

NAIROBI, Kenyn (AP) — A Sudanese rebel spokesman urged donor nations this week to investigate claims of inefficiency and corruption in the U.N. aid agency leading relief efforts in famine-stricken southern Sudan. 

DEAR CATHY: My first year Peace rose is producing blooms with virtually no color. The first round of blooms was OK, but now they are white: Is ir due to the heat we have been having or is there something else wrong? DEAR PALE: Sounds like you're doing everything right. The clue here is that the leaves look like they're supposed to. If the leaves are a healthy great and the size and shape they're supposed to be, then you are just seeing the signs of summer. The hot sun can bleach out a lot of flower petals. We see it most on red perunias. Sometimes the soil pH will affect bloom and leaf color, as will the nitrogen level. But I don't hear you saying anything that greather support. Keep doing what you're doing.

Fix your cracked, fallen

mortar with new mortar

Q. Our house is built with pricks, and some of the mortar has cracked and fallen out from between the bricks. How do we replace it and with what?

A. The cracked and missing mortar should be replaced with more mortar, in a process called tuck pointing. If a lot of mortar is damaged, or if the house was built before about 1930, the work is best done by an expert masonry contractor. Old houses can require special mortar mixes.

"Minor repointing is not difficult and can be done by doi-tourselfers using mortar mix available in bags at most home centers and hardware stores. A pow blade about the width of the cracks between bricks, will be needed.

The first step is to remove cracked and loose mortar to a depth of about an inch. An ordinary steel chisel (cold chisel) and small sledgehammer can be used to clear out the old mortar. Be sume 10 wears, goales and glosses.

Be careful not to get mortar on the face of the bricks — it can leave stains that are very difficult to remove. Hardened mortar ans sometimes be removed from brick surfaces with a stiff brush. Keep the new mortar damp for several days by spraying it occasionally with water from a hose.

New York — U.S. consumer con-fidence slipped in July as Americans worried that a slowing economy would make jobs more difficult to find rivate business research group, said Therday that its index of U.S. consumer confi-dence fell to 135.4 in July from a revised 138.2 in June. 
