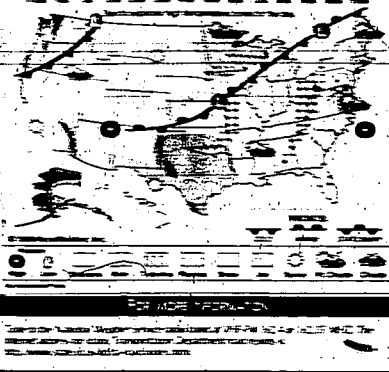

Wouldn't man still miss in Falls Creek

MISSING - Crews finally had not yet found the body of a Washelli man authorities believe drowned in Falls Creek, the Idaho State Police said.

Timothy Stanley, 33, of Washelli is presumed to have drowned when the car he was driving along Falls Creek Road early Sunday morning, skidded into the water. Stanley's car was found in a shallow, approximately 100-foot-deep swamp around 200 feet along the creek, the SP said.

Washelli resident Matthew Brock, 20, was also in the car. Brock never climbed out of the vehicle, but only became aware of it after the SP said.

Believe man dies after motorcycle accident

HELLIFIVE - A Bellevue man died Saturday at a Boise hospital after a motorcycle accident Sunday night, the Idaho State Sheriff's Department said.

Gregory Alan Moore, 42, resident of Coeur d'Alene, died about six miles south of Bellevue. Moore was taken to the West-Alber Medical Center, and then transported by helicopter to St. Alphonsus Regional Medical Center, where an hour later, authorities said.

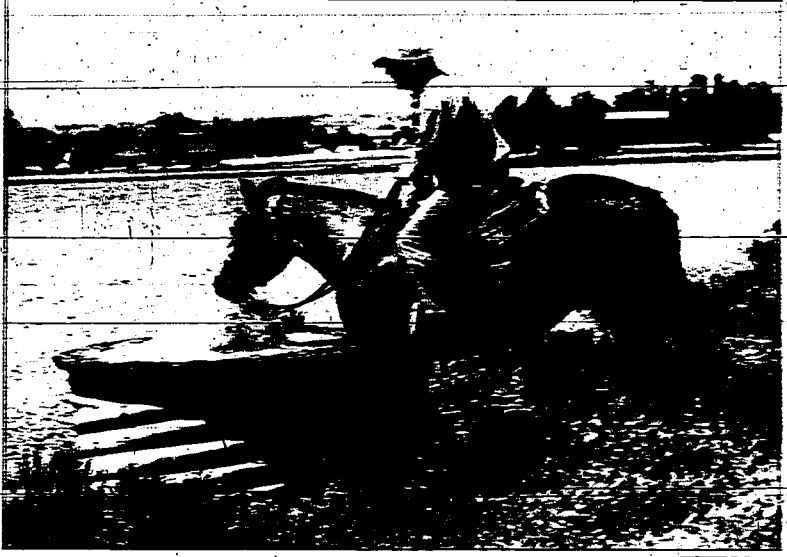

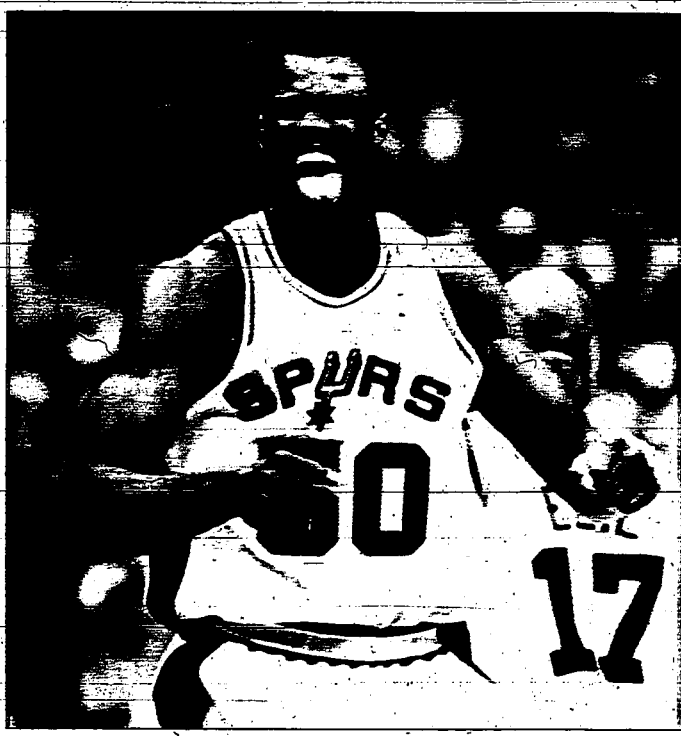
