KIMBERLY - Cool, wet weather has dried up the demand for irrigation water, and that's a big help to the Tihs Falls Canal Co. workers trying to repair a break in the High Line Canal.

A hole about 15 feet across opened up in the canal bank early Wednesday morning at the spot where the Williams Express

crossed under the canal. Though it threatened to make the night shift, the leak caused no serious damage.

But company officials have no conclusive explanations for the break, company manager Vince Albert said Thursday afternoon.

"Maybe we never will," he said.

Milosevic gives OK to peace plan

MILIGRATE Yugoslavia - Coming from the U.S. National Weather Service, Yugoslav President Slobodan Milosevic accepted a peace plan for Kosovo on Thursday that is designed to end some expulsions of ethnic Albanians and 11 weeks of NATO attacks.

The breakthrough happened so quickly that it surprised many observers. It was the first time Milosevic had agreed to a peace plan since the start of the Kosovo war in 1998.

The plan calls for a ceasefire and the withdrawal of NATO forces from Kosovo. It also calls for the return of ethnic Albanians to their homes and the establishment of a peacekeeping force.



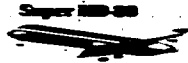

New South African president promises faster improvements

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — Nelson Mandela's hand-picked successor promised to govern South Africa "with humility" and speed up help for the nation's poor, while electing Thabo Mbeki Thursday afternoon to the National Congress winning a huge victory.

Results from Wednesday's election, the first since all-race voting in 1994 ended apartheid, are coming in slowly. The ANC's margin of victory hovered around the two-thirds mark — a level that would give it unilateral power to change the constitution.

About 85 percent of polling stations reporting the ANC had 62 percent of the vote, ANC officials cautioned that heavily populated electorates had yet to report, and the results may yet be confirmed.

"In their millions, and without equivocation, without hesitation, the people of South Africa renewed the mandate of the ANC to govern our country," president-elect Thabo Mbeki said at a victory rally.

After his expected election as president by the Parliament,

"We expect to carry some heavy work as well as much work to address economic progress and improve the standard of living," Mbeki said in a speech to parliament.

"The ANC will support the executive of power without any strings, with humility, with a deep sense of responsibility, to ensure we are able to build a South Africa that is a country in which we live in a better world and which is led by a country that is a better world," Mbeki said.

"The victory today sends a clear message of the new era with the ANC's leadership in South Africa," Mbeki said. "We will continue to work with the people of South Africa to build a better world for all."

Mbeki will succeed Mandela in a diverse nation that remains divided between wealthy whites and poor blacks, with 10 million unemployed and 10 million living in shanty towns.

Mbeki was expected to be a moderate, but he is seen as a more radical than Mandela, who was seen as a moderate.

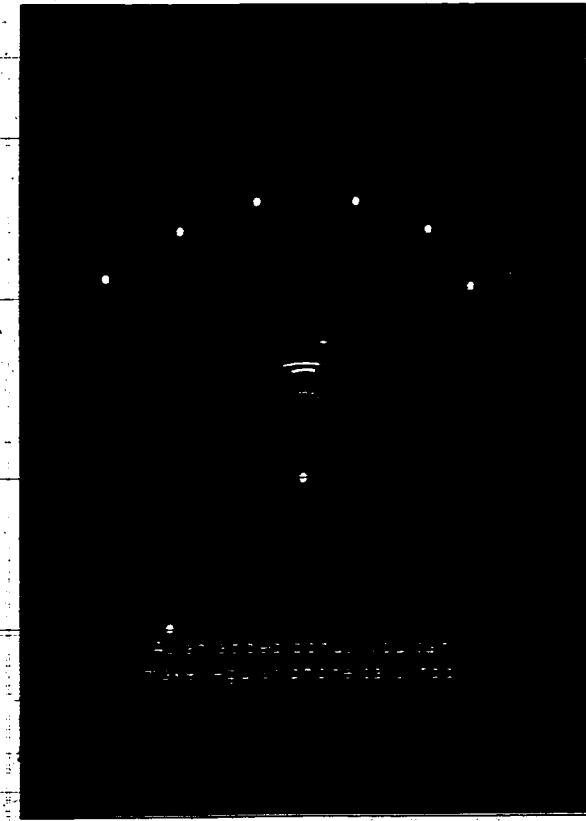

Hammon Park could be new host of skaters

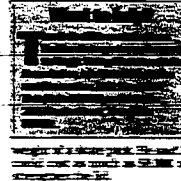
