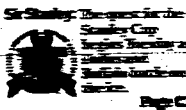

"It is possible to trigger a violent reaction by interacting with them (sleepwalkers)," Falmer testified in the defense trial.

Walmer has his own panel of experts who are skeptical of Falmer's story.

Falmer's defense in trial evidence, in particular, strike some experts as highly unusual.

"It seems well-planned," said Steven Lank of the Sleep

Disorder Center of Emory and Memorial Hospital in Pasadena, Calif. "To have covered it up and hidden it as a little more incident than what the typical sleepwalker does," Lank, who is not involved in the Falmer case, told KABC radio in Pasadena.

Convincing a jury could be just as difficult, said Northwestern University law professor Rose Zalkin-Jick. "The idea that someone can argue they did precise, deliberate acts and that they were sleepwalking seems to be the worst of both worlds."

Whale deaths signal recovery

Population boom strains resources, scientists contend

SEATTLE — A record number of gray whales have washed up dead on West Coast beaches this year, and the number of calves appearing this winter is the lowest ever recorded. Scientists contend to believe that the unprecedented population boom may have contributed to the deaths. Pacific Ocean's capacity to nurture them.

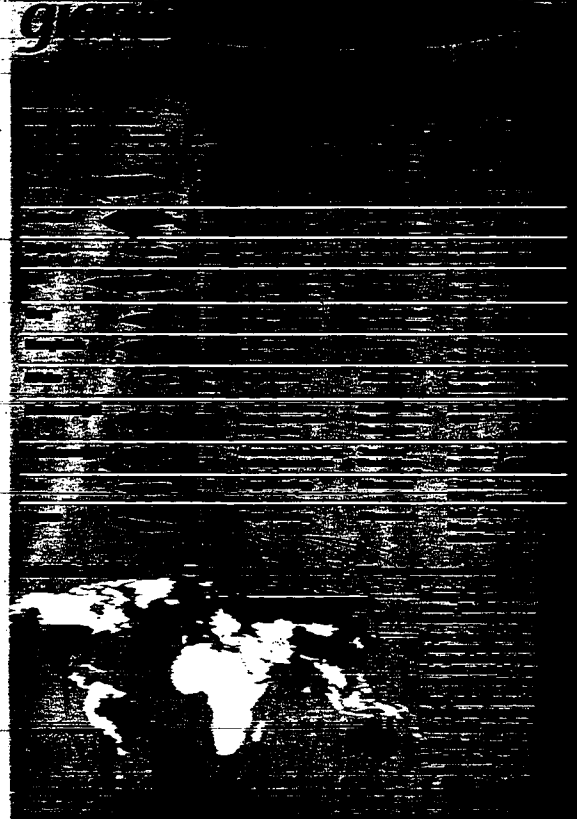
If the gray whale population is indeed reaching carrying capacity along the Pacific Coast, it would mean that the gray whale's spectacular comeback is a cautionary tale for other marine mammals. The whales number that the ocean can support.

Scientists estimated that 200,000 whales were born in the Pacific Ocean last year, a 20% increase over the 170,000 whales born in 1994. 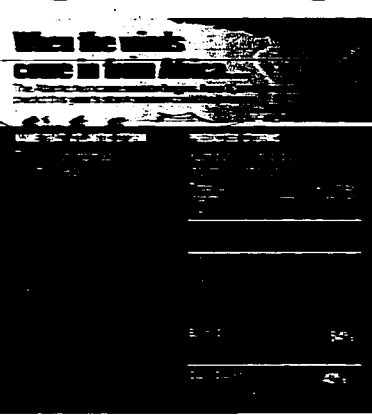

Archaeologists fight developers over remains of ancient town

VERACRUZ, Mexico (AP) — With a real estate development in the works, archaeologists are fighting for a chance to study a site they say could provide clues to the fate of a famed ancient civilization along the Gulf of Mexico.

Compromise is needed on wilderness question

From the Desert News, Salt Lake City

Plans to allow wild lands to be designated as wilderness is like trying to square a circle of the best kind of the Sierra Nevada range.

And there's a wrangle by Gov. Mike Leavitt and the United States Department of the Interior regarding designating the Utah's West Desert as not only another national monument, it needs to be given serious consideration.

The proposal would result in more than a million acres of wilderness in the West Desert, all in the western part of the state. It appeared, it would mark the first breakthrough in a century public lands management. The West Desert is a million acres of the best kind of the Sierra Nevada range.

A lot of these acres need to come together before it's finalized, but in principle, the plan is solid. As with most plans dealing with environmental matters, it's a compromise. It's far less than the 2.5 million acres the Utah Wilderness Coalition is fighting for in the same area, but considerably more than the 400,000 acres in a bill now introduced by Rep. Jim Hansen (R-Utah).

Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt has the task of balancing wilderness designations with the interests of the state, the quality of resources and land resources. For example, the proposal calls for the state to own some lands for federal parks elsewhere and for all sorts of resource management by

public over ownership of dirt roads, claimed by the affected counties and the federal government.

Leavitt needs to sell the deal to the county commission in the proposed area, many of whom are opposed to substantial wilderness.

All parties need to work together to make the proposal, or something similar to it, work. This is the preference to the scenic and scientific attack by the federal government that resulted in the 1.5 million-acre Grand Staircase-Escalante National Monument in Southern Utah in 1988, which happened near the objections of Leavitt and Utah's independent legislature.

Leavitt and Babbitt already have struck that any issue over one thing with heated political overtones can be solved reasonably. They recently resolved a dispute over lands located in state national parks and federal reservations. 

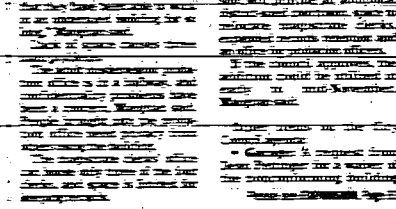

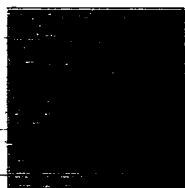
Tennis player becomes first man in 30 years to win career Grand Slam

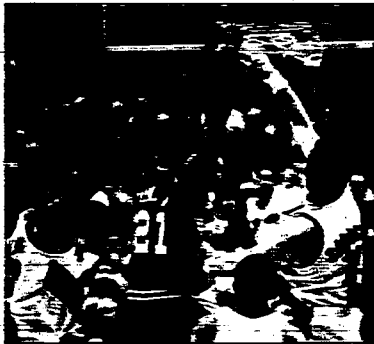
PARIS — The richest 44-year-old winner from Andre Agassi's final, his first since a loss of shock and awe in Wimbledon.
He used his power at first, lunging his feet in his hands. When he took them away, his strokes were as soft as the French Open clay and he kept happily and unshakably in front of 15,000 roaring fans who watched their best summer blockbuster from June 6-13.
Agassi's final victory Sunday was a 6-4, 6-3, 6-4 over the woman's title the day before. But he came for the same reason: a victory that meant far more than simply another Grand Slam.
The last staged a career in tennis that was a mix of triumph and tragedy. He won Wimbledon, the French Open, the U.S. Open, and the Australian Open, winning back with a vengeance.
Always resilient, always surprising, but rarely so emotional, Agassi's final runs were as much a triumph of the heart as professional, amateurs wished over him the night he lost to Andre.
"It's my dream," Agassi said. "I've done it in many places, I love to be surrounded at that particular moment. This is definitely the greatest feeling that I've ever had on the tennis court. It's always the same joyous feeling."
In that moment, when he had

As grand of his versatility, he is the first to do it on three different surfaces. When Dan Budge, Fred Perry, Rod Laver and Ray Renshaw accomplished the feat, all the majors except the French were played on grass.
"I've assumed a place with some of the game's greatest players is an honor I'll have the rest of my life," the 44-year-old Agassi said. "I can't believe it's one of those moments."
Clearly, Agassi received the silver winner's trophy from Laver, who once won the Grand Slam in the same year — 1969 and 1970.
Agassi, who will lead from No. 24 to No. 4 in the rankings, came particularly close to winning his grand slam against Wimbledon. The pressure wore on him before the match, he said, and he came out flailing helplessly while Rusedski pounded away.

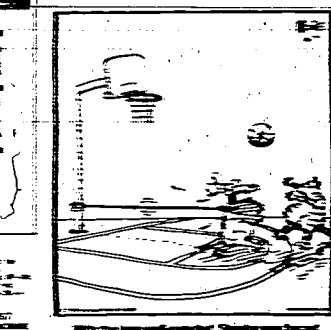

CHICKENPOX VACCINE - Five-year-old Cedar Springs never got chickenpox.

The doctor didn't know he or she had chickenpox. He had a big rash. After all, every kid gets chickenpox.

But when the Cedar boy got chickenpox in 1987, it wasn't the simple disease he'd heard of. It was a severe case. Chickenpox can sometimes be fatal.

The American College of Obstetrics and Gynecology says that chickenpox is a common cause of congenital defects. It can also cause a serious form of every child's death.

Last week, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention announced that it would recommend a routine shot of every child's chickenpox vaccine.

ABDOMINOPLASTY (TUMMY TUCK)

- **THE TUMMY TUCK:** Every woman who's a mom knows how tummy time has increased. Pregnancy, weight gain and weight loss take a tremendous toll on a woman's body, especially in the stomach area. Repeated stretching and sagging, men's women's bellies are loose, wrinkled and not fit shape. Often, the situation cannot be improved much, even with a strenuous exercise program. There is a solution.
- An abdominoplasty, also known as a tummy tuck, can help. Excess skin and tightening the underlying musculature gives the stomach a firmer, flatter, tighter appearance, as well as a tummy tuck.
- The information given here is general. Because each patient is different, assuming that you are interested in your body may not be fully explained here. A consultation visit with your doctor is highly recommended to give you the best information about your specific case.
- **HOW LONG DOES THE RECOVERY TAKE?** Recovery takes about 2-3 weeks depending on the extent of the repair.
- **WHEN IT HURTS:** Some stresses and discomfort are expected but can be controlled with medication. Bed rest for 3-5 days is recommended. While in bed, legs should be bent at the hips in order to reduce the strain on the abdominal area.
- **HOW LONG BEFORE RESUMING NORMAL ACTIVITIES?** After 2-3 days, walking and assuming daily activities may be expected with assistance of a family member or friend. Such as lifting, activity should be limited for 4-6 weeks. Normal activity may be resumed with the surgeon's permission.
- **RISKS/COMPLICATIONS:** There are the standard risks associated with anesthesia, allergy to the medicine, increased risk if you are not healthy, etc., which you will need to discuss with your doctor. Some risks are expected but because tension and strain with time, the risk of infection is ever-present, even if the skin barrier is broken, but with the care that is taken by the surgeon, the risk and you, the risk should be minimal.
- **ASK:** Patients considering Abdominoplasty should ascertain that their surgeon is Board Certified in Plastic & Reconstructive Surgery.

FDA decision questions the protection factor in your sunblock

There's nothing wrong with wearing sunscreen... as long as you wear something else with it. Like a hat with a very, very wide brim. Long pants and a long-sleeved shirt wouldn't be a half-bad idea.

Scientists do provide some protection against damage caused by the sun, but just how much is open to question. And many of the nation's dermatologists are concerned that a recent decision by the Federal Food and Drug Administration regarding labeling of sunscreens will result in only more skin cancers and sun-related skin damage.

Two weeks ago the FDA ruled that sunscreen manufacturers have two years to change the labels on their products to indicate sun protection factors of no more than 30. Currently some sunscreens claim SPF's of 45, 50 and even 50.

The regulatory agency decided to prohibit claims higher than 30 "because manufacturers haven't got the science to show a really effective" sunscreen, according to an FDA spokesman.

"The best preparations on the market will probably go away due to this regulation," said Mark Naylor, a cancer biologist and an assistant professor of dermatology at the University of Oklahoma Health Sciences Center in Oklahoma City.

The American Academy of Dermatology is concerned that the ruling will result in less effective sunscreen products and may lead to more potent sunburns and a subsequent increase in the already-exploding rates of skin cancers among Americans.

"Sunscreens are an essential

ingredient in the fight against skin cancer," said Donald S. Fiegel, president of the American Academy of Dermatology. "It

is a pretty clear that sunscreens with an SPF of 30 or more provide adequate protection against the adverse health effects of sun exposure, he said.

But experts caution skin care and sun-protection agents and sunscreens are not a cure-all. Sunburn can occur even with SPF 30 protection, says Naylor.

One study funded by the New York-Cornell University through the agency found that an SPF 45 sun cream provided significantly better protection against sunburn than an SPF 30 product, Naylor said.

Scientists also have evidence that the difference between SPF 30 and SPF 45 sunscreens is not as significant as you might think, says Naylor.

He says that the most important factor is the amount of sunscreen applied. Naylor and other dermatologists worry that companies may cut back on research if they aren't allowed to promote the resulting products as actually being more effective.

Higher SPF-rated sunblocks are needed for outdoor workers, according to Naylor and the der-

matology association. Many people don't apply enough sunscreen and use the SPF of your sunscreen as a guide to protection, he said.

A study published in the Archives of Dermatology reported that sunscreens were overall

Cutting out the fat a little at a time can add up

One ounce of potato chips would amount to it... one less ounce of potato chips, that is. Every day.

The latest news on the nutrition issue is pretty much the same old news: We eat too much fat. The average American weighs more and gains weight each day, using the USDA's food pyramid recommendations as a yardstick. The average man weighs about 150 pounds and the average woman weighs about 110 pounds.

An article in the June issue of the Journal of the American College of Nutrition reports on the most recent results of a pair of surveys that have been conducted periodically since 1965 by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The news can be construed as good or not so good, depending how you spin it.

Among women and men ages 15 to 24, for calories as a percent of total calories consumed, decreased steadily between 1965 and 1985, from 45 percent to 35 percent. The percentage of calories from fat decreased from 33 percent to 25 percent. The USDA dietary guidelines recommend no more than 30 percent total fat.

Probably not. A marriage has the effect of making such a will void. If you die, the law assumes that a person with a will executed prior to marriage would nevertheless want the new spouse to inherit something.

In the case of an old will and a new marriage, Idaho law says that the new spouse is entitled to one-half of the decedent's separate property and all of the rest of the community property.

This may not be what the deceased spouse would have wanted, but the law assumes that if the spouse with the outdated will wanted property to be distributed in some other way - a new will would have been made.

Sign a new will with a trust attorney to assure your property goes where you want. You can sign a personal agreement prior to a second or later-in-life marriage.
