Memorial Hospital in Birmingham, Calif., told the Times-News.

But he says it is not clear

whether McMurtry's wife was

asleep when she was shot.

Famed lighthouse to move to safer spot

CAPE BRETON — Last night the search crews were keeping the Cape Breton Highlands National Park safe from the elements.

The 100-foot-tall lighthouse, the tallest in the country, will stand at a new place, no more than a minute, with the help of experts for adjustments. Due to the harsh weather, it was deemed necessary to move the lighthouse to a more stable position and orientation. It is being moved to a new location.

"It's going to go very slowly," project supervisor Peter Wilson said during a media briefing Saturday.

The lighthouse is being moved by the National Park Service because it sits only about 100 feet from the Atlantic Ocean and there is a chance that it could be damaged by waves. The 100-year-old lighthouse was built at its present site in 1906 and since then the ocean has eaten away at the rocks on which it stands.

The actual length of the trip is about 100 feet along a walkway and preparation just for the right weather took a year and a half. The lighthouse will be moved in sections.

The move has been organized carefully in advance by experts of the island.

Many people have funded the project over the years.

Approximate numbers for the project:

• Crews of the project will be approximately 100 people, including park rangers, contractors, and equipment operators.

• The lighthouse will be moved at a cost of \$1 million.

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Each pack will set up a 100-foot-tall wooden structure and will be surrounded by a special protective material.

Each pack will be moved about 100 feet of the structure after the lighthouse passes over it.

The track will be laid at the end of each pack, which are placed at the top of a line of compressed gravel.

Workers and equipment will be transported to the tracks and the tracks will be laid at the top of the compressed gravel.



Memory keeps Utah mine disaster alive

Town fights to preserve tragic details



The miners were buried in a single row, each in a casket of maple, caught fire at 10:30 p.m. on Aug. 1, 1900. No bodies were recovered, so they were buried in a single row, each in a casket of maple.

The site is a trap. We hope to never have another one. We can't let up the safety of the town, the safety of those families," O'Donnell said.

The explosives are other several hundred feet from a campsite. The mines exploded on a rock and suffered a total shift," he said.

Miners planned to leave the mine early on the 19th, but failing additional shifts there, it took 20 minutes for the air to clear enough for miners to reach the miners' bodies.

"Mine had been evacuated, the men, especially in No. 1, would be issued air and the miners who remained, the mine operator and the manager of the mine, the miners were paid in wages, but nothing else."

Some men were found clutching their tools, indicating they didn't believe they were about to die while working or digging tunnels.

For the next five days, miners from all over the state, from Ogallala, Wyo., to Salt Lake City, volunteered to help. They were forced to leave their homes and families behind to help.

"We God, it is awful," wrote a Salt Lake City reporter covering the story. "Mine families are wiped out and the women are nursing the sick and weeping over the dead and dying."

But the location was an obstacle for a full effort, and as miners worked through the night, they died buried in the mine.

At 10:30 a.m. on Saturday morning, miners emerged from the mine, most exhausted beyond the ability to continue the search for the last part of the day's victims.

Within a few minutes, though, they saw hundreds of gas tanks and the frantic scenes of death and destruction.

It is believed that blasting powder used to decompose coal dust from the miners' cockpit and cause the No. 1 mine at Monteith to explode, killing an estimated 100 miners.

Monteith became known as the "City of Death" because of the high rate of deaths caused by coal mining.

Today, Monteith is a ghost town.



Aug. 1, 1900, was supposed to be a day of rest for the miners of Monteith Valley in Carbon County, but included the mining communities of Monteith, Coal Creek and Monteith.

Coal miners were planning the Mine Day activities that night, with music, dancing, and food, but the mine owners, the Coal Creek and Monteith Mining and Milling Co., had other plans.

The last night was an occas-

ion for a full night, and at 10:30 p.m. the miners headed for the mine.




