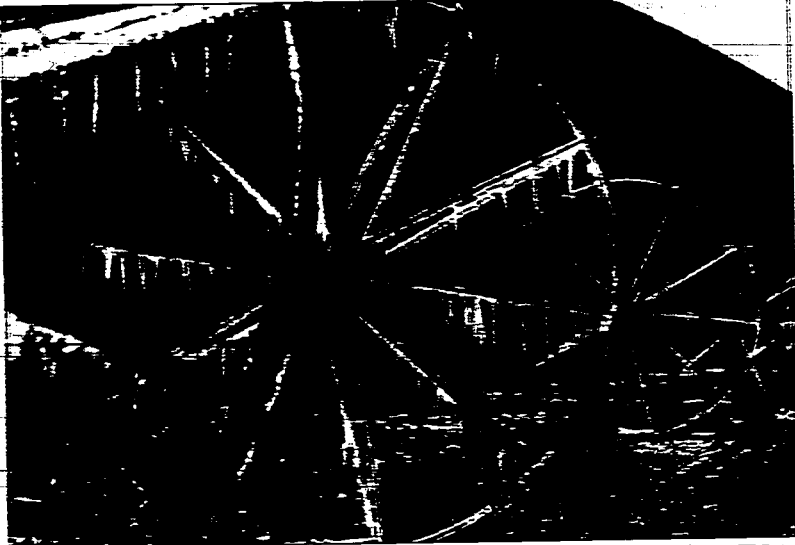

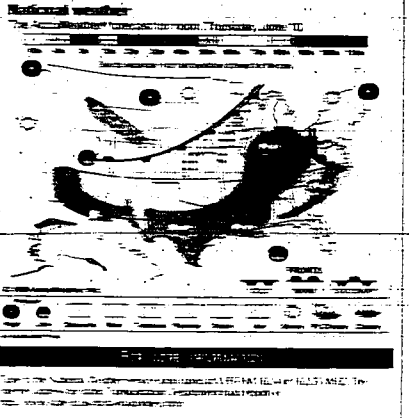
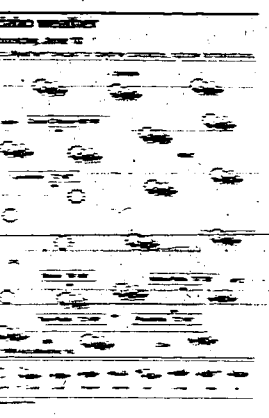

New mothers stay longer in hospital

WASHINGTON AP — New mothers are staying in the hospital a little longer — about half a day more on average — since the late 1980s, according to a study by the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Doctors say that's either long enough for healing wounds with uncomplicated vaginal deliveries or for women who are having their second babies.

In the early 1980s, many pregnant women stayed in hospitals only for 24-hour hospital stays. By the mid-1990s, the average stay had risen to 33 days.

Some question plan to keep R-rated films from teens

By Associated Press

A leading movie trade organization announced Wednesday its plan to require theaters to show youth ID to see R-rated movies, but some operators would protest Wednesday over whether the plan is a good idea.

The Motion Picture Distributors Association of industry members is "not a check-off" and will provide theaters with options including the system used by the industry and other plans.

"We are encouraging theater operators to opt for the industry plan," says Robert D. White, president of the Motion Picture Distributors Association, which represents the movie distribution industry. He said most theater owners already do not require youth ID to see R-rated movies because of the National Association of Theater Owners, which represents about two-thirds of the nation's movie theaters, adopted the plan in 1997.

White says operators, who are not bound by the NTAO's endorsement, and some operators are applying the rules to their states.

Greg Aronson, owner of Villageville Inc. in Seattle, said he didn't think making theater owners police children would work.

"We're not going to be the author of morals," Aronson said. "Personally, I'm of the opinion that it's too late. The best door has been open too long."

Dave Nighman at Tower Records-Videos in New York City, said he favors requiring a photo ID for young people.

"If you make a rule that says kids of a certain age aren't allowed to see a film, it's only right to enforce it," Nighman said. He said, however, that the responsibility for standing children from inappropriate material should be with parents.

"We had parents send their kids in to pick up X-rated tapes," Nighman said. At Blockbuster, the country's largest

video chain, staff members are trained to ask for ID if parents have said they don't want children checking out R-rated videos.

"We are telling you it happens every time. Millions are making our operators' lives miserable," says a spokeswoman for the National Association of Theater Owners.

Durand Brown, 17, of Detroit said he'd never had trouble renting an R-rated film. He said that even if kids can't see R-rated movies in theaters or on video, "it's going to be on cable."

Russia stresses ties with China

MOSCOW (AP) — Building ties with China was one of Russia's top foreign policy goals and the two nations want a strong strategic partnership, Prime Minister Sergei Stepashin said Wednesday.

Stepashin made the remarks at the start of talks with a Chinese Communist Party official, Wang Kang, deputy head of the Central

Military Commission. Russian Defense Minister Igor Sergeev also attended the meeting, which focused on military cooperation.

"We should jointly implement the policy of strategic partnership outlined by Russian President Boris Yeltsin and President of the People's Republic of China, Jiang Zemin," Stepashin said.

Asian economies are headed for recovery, analysts say

SINGAPORE (AP) — Asia's economies will likely improve this year, but more is needed for recovering that would bring back healthy growth, International Monetary Fund (IMF) analysts say.
