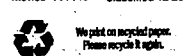

# Tales of massacres emerge in Kosovo

**POKLEK, Yugoslavia** - Even with her ears ringing from the blast of the grenade, Elhame Muqolli could hear the screams of women and children dying around her.

The 14-year-old ethnic Albanian girl, along with dozens of neighbors and relatives, had been herded into a first-floor room in a house in her family's compound. Then, she said, a Serb policeman opened the

door and tossed in a hand grenade.

In a haze of smoke, to a chorus of chaotic shrieks and cries, police then sprayed the room with gunfire, she said. Elhame and five others managed to leap out a window, but everyone else in the room - 62 in all, by villagers' reckoning - died in a tangle of bloody, intertwined limbs.

So closely packed were the victims and so intense the carnage that blood pooled and dripped down through the floorboards - still visible two months later in dark streaks and splatters on the tile ceiling of a basement room just below.

Accounts of brutality in Kosovo emerged Thursday in different tones - the stunned, flat voice of a teenage girl and the measured sentences of a British official - but they both told of

# Jury cites 'reckless' behavior

### hospital and doctor must pay \$29.7M

**BOISE** - Wood River Medical Center and a Blaine County obstetrician were ordered to pay \$29.7 million in damages in one of the largest medical malpractice awards in Idaho history.

The jury's verdict in U.S. District Court in Boise Monday said Dr. Ian Ross Donald was "reckless" and Wood River Medical Center failed "to meet the applicable standard of health care" in their treatment of Bryce Kirkland, who was born with significant brain damage 3 1/2 years ago.

Bryce's parents, Quinn and Sandy Kirkland, said they were pleased by the verdict, but the award will not change the hard life ahead for their son.

"He'll never be a normal person like everybody else," Quinn Kirkland said from his Hamilton, Mont., home. "This is something that could have been totally avoided."

Bryce's problems began in August 1995, when he was still in the womb. Sandy Kirkland went to Donald for an amniocentesis, a procedure where a doctor sticks a needle in the womb to sample the fluid surrounding the fetus.

During the procedure, Donald stuck the needle through a placenta or a fetal blood vessel, causing the unborn child to bleed, the lawsuit said.

Hours later, while under the care of Wood River Medical Center nurses, Sandy Kirkland noticed her child was not moving and wanted the nurses, but they ignored her. Signs of trouble were also evident on the fetal heart monitor for more than 12 hours, the suit said.

An emergency Caesarean section was performed the next day, but Bryce had already lost nearly half his blood. He was airlifted to St. Luke's Regional Medical Center in Boise, but never fully recovered, the suit said.

Three and a half years later, Bryce is mentally retarded, near-

# House schedules vote on new gun bill for today

**WASHINGTON** - Emotional arguments raged the day and night on Capitol Hill Thursday, with lawmakers struggling over the appropriate legislation to respond to the school shootings in Colorado and Georgia.

Since Wednesday, the House has voted on a slew of amendments to a juvenile crime bill dealing with issues ranging from religion to juvenile prosecution to violent movies.

But perhaps more contentious

than the cultural amendments is the proposed gun legislation, which was taken up in a separate bill Thursday night. The final measure is scheduled for a vote on Friday.

The gun legislation at stake is largely based on the juvenile crime bill that passed the Senate last month, which included provisions that would require three-day background checks at gun shows and trigger locks sold with handguns. In the House, contention surrounds how long gun show background checks should

be - with choices ranging from instant to three business days.

Rep. Mike Simpson, R-Blackfoot, voted for the amendment requiring a 24-hour background check at gun shows, a measure offered by the most senior Democrat in the House, Rep. John Dingell, D-Mich., and supported by the National Rifle Association. The roll call was unavailable at press time.

While the amendment would require a background check on private sales at gun shows, it

**Can You Get Back to School?**

The vote was 248-180 for a proposal by Rep. Robert Adair to allow states to display the commencement. Critics said the provision was unconstitutional, but the Alabama Republican countered that it would "promote morality and work toward an end of children killing children."

Idaho Reps. Mike Simpson and Helen Chenoweth both voted with the majority.

# Scientists pick Einstein's brain

## Researchers study unique anatomy

**LONDON** - We always suspected something must have made Albert Einstein smarter than the rest of us.

Now, scientists have found that one part of his brain was indeed physically extraordinary.

In the only study ever conducted of the overall anatomy of Einstein's brain, scientists at McMaster University in Ontario, Canada, discovered that the part of the brain thought to be related to mathematical reasoning - the inferior parietal region - was 15 percent wider on both sides than normal.

Furthermore, they found that the groove that normally runs from

the front of the brain to the back did not extend all the way in Einstein's case. That finding could have applications even to those with more pedestrian levels of intelligence.

"That kind of shape was not observed in any one of our brains and is not depicted in any atlas of the human brain," said Sandra Witelson, a neuroscientist who led the study, published in this week's issue of The Lancet, a British medical journal.

"But it shouldn't be seen as magical," she added. "We also know that environment has a very important role to play in learning and brain development. But what this is telling us is that environment isn't the only factor."

The findings may point to the importance of the inferior parietal region, Witelson said.

While the differences may be extraordinary between Einstein and everyone else, there may be

more subtle, even microscopic, differences when the anatomies of the brains of people who don't fall into the genius category are compared with each other, she said.

The researchers compared the founder of the theory of relativity's brain with the preserved brains of 35 men and 50 women known to have normal intelligence when they died.

With the men's brains, they conducted two separate comparisons - first between Einstein's brain and all the men, and next between his brain and those of the eight men who were similar in age to Einstein when they died.

They found that, overall, Einstein's brain was the same weight and had the same measurements from front to back as all the other men, which Witelson said confirms the belief of many scientists that focusing on overall brain size as an indicator of intelligence is not the way to go.

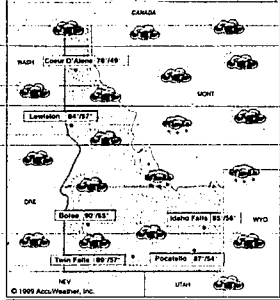

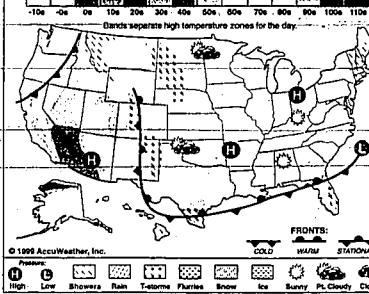

# Debris misses space station despite mishandling Kosovo

## Flight controllers fail to ignite engines due to 'human error'

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — Flight controllers botched an attempt to move the new international space station out of the way of a speeding piece of space junk, but the rocket debris ended up passing at a safe distance. The incident was disclosed by NASA on Thursday. NASA said the sequence of computer commands sent up by flight controllers to fire the station's engines failed because of human error. Initially, the U.S. military organization that tracks objects in space predicted the rocket chunk

would pass within two-thirds of a mile of the space station on Sunday. It ended up coming no closer than 4.5 miles. If the rocket debris — Russian in origin, but size unknown — had collided with the space station, it could have destroyed the empty outpost, which has been in orbit for only seven months. The first residents are not due to arrive at the station until next spring. Measures already have been taken to prevent this from happening again, said Frank Culbertson, NASA deputy program manager for space station operations. At last count, the U.S. Space Command in Colorado Springs, Colo., was tracking more than 8,700 manmade objects in orbit,

most of that junk. Any one of them could do serious damage to the space station, which consists of only two compartments so far. "I'm very glad we learned what we learned at this point in the mission before we have more hardware up there and before we have people up there," Culbertson said. But he noted that if astronauts had been aboard, they could have maneuvered the space station more easily than ground controllers. The maneuvering command, drawn up by both U.S. and Russian engineers, was sent from the Russian-control center outside Moscow on Saturday night. But the command contained faulty instructions, and the space station's computers rejected it.

Flight controllers may not have factored in the changes in the space station's mass and center of gravity since Thursday's Discovery launched 2 tons of gear earlier this month, or else the changes were entered incorrectly. Culbertson said it wasn't immediately clear whether Americans or Russians were to blame. By the time flight controllers learned of their mistake, it was too late to send up a corrected command. "But because the probability was low, we weren't too worried about it," Culbertson said. In any case, the Space Command soon revised the projected distance between the two objects from 0.6 miles to 4.5 miles.

irrational savagery mixed with careful planning. Just six days into the international military presence in Kosovo, officials have discovered so many mass graves and killing sites and heard so many wrenching accounts of atrocities that they now estimate at least 10,000 people were killed in the Serb crackdown against Kosovo Albanians which began shortly before NATO began its 78-day air bombardment March 24. The mounting evidence is likely to add to calls for the arrest of Yugoslav President Slobodan Milosevic, who has been indicted by the international war crimes tribunal in The Hague. But President Clinton said Thursday that peacekeepers will take a "land and sea" approach toward Milosevic's army.

According to villagers' accounts, the killings occurred April 17, when Serb police and paramilitary men blocked a group of people — mainly women and children, nearly all of them members of a single extended family — from going to the adjacent town of Kocani to see their relatives. They were safe for the moment. At 5 p.m., the Serbs returned. The head of the family, Sino Mujagic, 63, was taken out into the courtyard and shot along with his brother as they pleaded for their lives. "They knew we were going to die. We could hear them calling out," said Elham, a slender, long-haired girl whose flat, almost expressionless voice was hoarse from crying. "I was there, but I was never still, picking constantly at a blanket or blades of grass or the bandage on her ankle. The men's bodies were thrown, weighted into family wells. When relatives tried to retrieve them 10 days later, they were too decomposed to be hauled out of the water, and some body parts remained at the bottom of the stone-lined, 25-foot-deep well. NATO troops, who entered the village for the first time Thursday, went to the family compound after hearing what had happened. They had called in war-crimes investigators and were in the meantime taking statements and checking the area for land mines and booby traps. The room where the killings were said to have occurred was heavily charred, but a crater could be seen in the center of the floor where the bodies had lain and the walls were pocked with deep pits. Serbs torched the house after the killings and buried the remains in a forest, villagers said. On a sheet of plastic lay a pile of blackened bracelets, rings and keys that villagers had plucked from the ashes. The villagers said they could not be certain exactly how many were dead because they still found a few more of those trapped in the room might have managed to escape. The yard of the compound and the porch of the house were strewn with belongings — clothes, children's boots, suitcases, the gold-embroidered bodice of a wedding gown — that family members said police and paramilitary men had thrown from the windows before the slaughter.

would have to be done within 24 hours of the transaction, not three days like other Democratic amendments expected to come before the House. "The Dingell amendment does several important things," Simpson said. "It reduces unnecessary delays for purchases at gun shows. It allows for sales at gun shows, it improves firearms theft prevention and creates an enhanced penalty for use of large capacity magazines in crime."

"I support and stand up for the Constitution and the Second Amendment is very clear, and that is why I supported the Dingell amendment," Simpson said. In addressing the cultural issues surrounding juvenile violence, Simpson voted in favor of an amendment that allows states to display the Ten Commandments publicly. The measure passed, 248-180, in spite of arguments that it violates the separation of church and state. "I have always been an advocate for state rights," Simpson said. "Decisions like these should be made on a local level. This amendment puts power back where it belongs — to the states." On a controversial amendment to create a standard labeling system for media materials including video games, motion pictures and music to warn of explicit violence, Simpson voted no. The amendment failed. Roll call numbers were not available at press time. "While I think that too much violent material exists in video games and related products, I

ly blind and unable to walk. The jury found Donald 75 percent liable and the medical center 25 percent liable for Bryce's injuries. Another doctor named in the suit, Randy Coriell, was cleared of any liability. The jury awarded Bryce \$11.2 million in economic damages and \$15 million for pain and suffer-

ing. Another \$3.5 million went to Bryce's parents. "I'm overwhelmed by the numbers," Donald said. "This is a real bummer." Donald said he would probably appeal the verdict and file a suit against his insurance company, which refused to settle the claim before it reached trial. Joel Cunningham, a Seattle

lawyer who helped represent the Kirklands, said the Kirklands offered to settle several times for much less than the jury award. Medical center officials expressed sympathy for the Kirklands and would not answer any questions about the case, a hospital news release said. With the 16-day trial behind them, the Kirklands hope the

# Reputed fugitive appears in court

ST. PAUL, Minn. (AP) — Sara Jane Olson waved to her family Thursday as she was in court to face accusations she is really Symbiase Liberation Army fugitive Kathleen Ann Soliah.

Her attorney, Howard Bass, did not acknowledge that Olson and Ms. Soliah were the same person. But he argued that the crimes Ms. Soliah are charged with in California are not punishable by death or life in prison, and that bail should be set for his client.

"And these are only regarding the allegations against Kathleen Soliah. I haven't even addressed the issues with Sara Olson," Bass said.

Ramsey County District Judge Kathleen Gearin said she could not decide on setting bail until she studied the California statutes.

County Attorney Susan Gaertner said California authorities were seeking extradition within 30 days. Olson did not waive her right to challenge the extradition request, but her next court appearance was set for July 15.

Dressed in an orange jail jumpsuit, Olson did not speak, but smiled and waved to her husband and their daughter.

Olson, 52, who lived with her doctor husband in an ivy-covered home in an upscale neighborhood, was active in community theater work, where her acting drew notice from local reviewers.

One singled her out as the strongest performer in a 1999 production of "King Lear."

Another praised her "vibrant" 1993 performance in "All's Well That Ends Well."

But if the FBI is right, she is really Ms. Soliah, a onetime member of the SLA, the band of 1970s radicals who kidnapped Patricia Hearst.

Agents arrested the fugitive Wednesday after receiving tips from viewers of "America's Most Wanted," which featured her in a recent broadcast. The FBI offered a \$20,000 reward for Ms. Soliah last month, on the 25th anniversary of a Los Angeles shootout that killed six SLA members.

Ms. Soliah has been wanted since 1976, when she was indicted in Los Angeles on murder conspiracy and explosives charges for allegedly placing pipe bombs under two police cars. The bombs did not explode.

# Microsoft solicits support online

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Microsoft Corp. has discreetly added a message to the Internet site visited by millions of people who use its Windows software urging them to write to Congress about the government's antitrust case.

The move suggests an intensified public relations campaign by Microsoft as trial testimony nears an end and pressure grows to resume settlement negotiations with government lawyers. It comes days after Microsoft's billionaire chairman, Bill Gates, testified before a sympathetic Senate panel and met privately with key lawmakers.

The affected Microsoft Web site draws millions of visitors each month to update their copies of Windows, the operating system software that runs most of the world's personal computers.

When Microsoft's lawyer showed the site to the trial judge during a courtroom demonstration last week, the message was not there.

This week, however, Microsoft added the note urging visitors to

its "Windows Update" site to "click here" for details about how its legal fight with the Justice Department and 19 states might affect them and how to write about the lawsuit to their elected officials.

Microsoft said Thursday it added the message to Windows Update in what it described as a routine change. It said it wasn't trying to prevent U.S. District Judge Thomas Penfield Jackson from seeing it on the page during last week's demonstration.

# Report: Most impoverished kids have parents who are working

WASHINGTON (AP) — Nearly two in three young poor children have working parents, the highest rate in more than two decades, a report concludes.

Researchers said the trend can be traced to welfare reform, which has helped move many families into the work force.

"Welfare reform has done better at moving families off the rolls than it has at moving families out of poverty," said Lawrence Aber, director of the National Center for Children in Poverty at Columbia University.

the need for a college degree has become acute in recent years. Over time, poverty has increased markedly for children whose parents have a high school degree but no college degree.

Researchers have known for a long time that children of high school dropouts were likely to live in poverty.

"Now we need to recognize that a high school diploma or even some college education have become far less likely to protect a family against poverty," said Neil Bennett, the report's main author.

# UN ambassador hopeful gains support after apology to senators

WASHINGTON (AP) — Richard Holbrooke gained some Republican support for his confirmation as the nation's U.N. ambassador Thursday after saying his own "carelessness" led to questions about his ethics and apologizing to senators.

Holbrooke said he violated no laws, but acknowledged that he "may not have been careful enough about the appearance" of his contacts with State Department officials abroad just months after leaving a top position with the agency in 1996.

At the time, he was a private investment banker while also serving as an unpaid foreign policy adviser to the State Department.

Senate Foreign Relations Committee Chairman Jesse Helms, R-N.C., remained mum on his position toward the nomination despite beginning the first of three hearings with sharp criticism of Holbrooke's conduct.

However, influential Republican Sen. Richard Lugar of

Indiana said during the hearing he would back the nominee. And Sen. Chuck Hagel, R-Neb., said afterward: "I had said unless something comes out of the hearing... that I don't know about, that I don't anticipate, then I think he is qualified and I'll vote for him."

Sen. Gordon Smith, R-Ore., also is "likely to support the nomination," his spokeswoman Mary Healy said after the hearing. Smith is chairman of the European affairs subcommittee, which is slated to look at Holbrooke's work as envoy to the Balkans.

# Gore pushes tax cuts for high-tech, new businesses; Hatch considers bid

MANCHESTER, N.H. - Vice President Al Gore called Thursday for tax cuts for businesses which invest in high-tech research and told a crowd in a state that is politically crucial and home to a growing high-tech industry that he'd "invest aggressively" to create information-age jobs.

"I'm going to be talking about my economic ideas in real specifics," Gore said, at an "issues forum" in New Hampshire, moving to build on his front-runner status in the Democratic presidential fight.

Meanwhile, Gore says a U.S. Senate bid by First Lady Hillary Rodham Clinton would be "a positive force" and generate Democratic enthusiasm throughout the country.

"I'm all for it," Gore told reporters on Air Force Two. "It will generate enthusiasm here and around the country. Aides were even more direct, saying likely Republican assaults on Mrs. Clinton would galvanize women voters."

Gore brought his economic message to New Hampshire, site of the nation's first presidential primary. The centerpiece of Gore's economic proposals focused on incentives for research and development.

The proposals came as Gore opened his first full days as an officially declared candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination, speaking with about 300 people jammed into a college gymnasium for a detailed policy discussion.

Aides hope to contrast the opening of Gore's campaign with that of Texas Gov. George W. Bush, the Republican front-runner often criticized for being vague on the issues. In the process, Gore was sketching out his own agenda apart from President Clinton.

ering joining the crowded race for the Republican presidential nomination, GOP sources said Thursday.

These Republicans, who spoke only on condition of anonymity, said Hatch, a fourth-term senator and chairman of the Judiciary Committee, had begun to search for staff in the event of a candidacy.

Asked whether he was thinking about entering the race, Hatch said: "I've had people come to me and I'm certainly courteously listening. I'm not pushing them away. I'm just listening."

Hatch, 65, would face difficult

obstacles if he were to decide to enter the race. Texas Gov. George W. Bush is the commanding front-runner in the polls and in money raised.

Quayle speaks out for 'real compassion'

MANCHESTER, N.H. - One day after Texas Gov. George W. Bush and his "compassionate conservatism" left New Hampshire, former Vice President Dan Quayle came for a "look at what he called "real compassion."

Quayle visited a privately funded home for mothers battling drug addiction. He said the work done there is a good example of the compassion conservatives have shown for years.

It was a shot at Bush, who has made "compassionate conservatism" the theme of his campaign.

"Conservatives are compassionate," Quayle told reporters in Concord. "We care deeply about our friends and neighbors."

Aides said Quayle did not change his game plan in light of Bush's first visit to the state with the earliest presidential primaries. However, the timing did help Quayle highlight differences he sees between himself and the Texas governor - namely that he considers himself a conservative alternative to Bush, the darling of the moderate Republican "establishment."

#### Sentencing delayed in Jerome slaying

**JEROME** - The sentencing hearing, scheduled for today, for convicted murderer Jimmy Yurel Thomas has been postponed.

The hearing has not been rescheduled. A Boise jury in April convicted Thomas of first-degree murder, in connection with the November 1997 shooting death of 38-year-old Steven Louder of Eden. Louder was the boyfriend of Thomas' ex-wife, Anna Marie Thomas. Thomas could face the death penalty.

#### Motorists can expect delays along Idaho 46

**SHOSHONE** - About 10 1/2 miles of pavement on Idaho 46 from Wendell north to Gooding will be re-paved beginning Monday, the Idaho Transportation Department said.

The project should be completed by mid-July. Traffic delays are expected to last about 15 minutes.

Crews will improve the roadway by pulverizing the old road surface, and mixing it with a strengthening agent, such as cement. The mixture is then compacted and used as the base for a layer of new asphalt. The project will cost about \$1.3 million.

#### Reception Monday will honor CSI technical dean

**TWIN FALLS** - A reception for Mike Glenn, retiring technical division dean at the College of Southern Idaho, will be held at 4 p.m. Monday at CSI.

The reception will be in the cafeteria on the second floor of the Taylor Building. It will run through 5:30 p.m.

Glenn has worked at CSI since 1966, just two years after the college was established.

#### Public comment sought on rate hike proposal

**BOISE** - The public has until Thursday to request a hearing on a proposed Intermountain Gas Co. increase in annual revenues by almost 8.5 percent.

If no written requests for a hearing are submitted by then, the Idaho Public Utilities Commission will consider the company's proposal without formal public hearings.

Intermountain Gas says the proposed increase reflects the expiration of low-cost gas supply contracts, temporary gas and transportation cost adjustments, surcharges and credits. In requesting the \$9.6 million increase in annual revenues, Intermountain Gas says rates will increase for residential and commercial customers, the PUC said.

Residences using natural gas for heating would see their rates increase by 5.7 percent, under the company's proposal. Those using natural gas to heat their homes and water would see a 9.9 percent cost increase.

Commercial customers would experience about an 8.6 percent rate increase.

Written comments regarding Intermountain Gas' proposed rate increase - or requests for public hearings on the issue - should be sent to the Intermountain Gas Co., Idaho Public Utilities Commission, P.O. Box 83720, Boise, ID 83720-0074.

### Some Magic Valley residents worry about salmon preservation hurting irrigation

**TWIN FALLS** - For local people, the one thing more important than recovering Snake River salmon runs is the irrigation water federal officials want to help save those fish. Those points were made Wednesday evening during a five-hour forum designed to gauge local opinions about efforts to restore endangered

salmon runs. About two dozen participants in the forum, conducted by the University of Idaho for the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, generally expressed satisfaction with and optimism about Twin Falls.

At least one participant said the exercise seemed biased to favor the idea of breaching four federal dams on the lower Snake River - one option for recovering salmon being considered by the Corps of Engineers.

People from across the community sat at tables together and discussed the issues with people they might never talk to otherwise - there were a few spirited exchanges, but no fights erupted.

#### Assessing the options

The first option, maintaining the salmon passage system as is, got a mixed but generally negative response. Participants Please see F111, Page B3

## Third annual mule roundup pulls into Filer

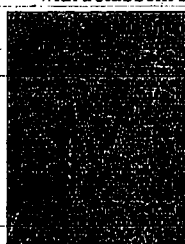
### Supporters say the event continues to grow with a stubborn brand of consistency

**FILER** - A mule show in Filer is growing rapidly. Jan Kubs of Twin Falls, manager of the third annual Magic Valley Mule Roundup scheduled today and Saturday at the Twin Falls County Fairgrounds in Filer, said the show has registered about 250 mules, up from 150 last year.

"There's the people coming in from seven or eight states and there's a lot of local people coming from the Magic Valley and from the Boise area," Kubs said.

She said the event will feature good family entertainment and often humorous racing events - the public's favorite, she said. Few riders were bucked off their unpredictable mules at last year's event and others had run-aways in the hide race, a race in which a brave light-highted person tries to hang on to a hide being dragged full speed at the end of a rope.

The ranch mule class measures a mule's ability to work cows and the trail class tests a mule's degree of willingness to take on strange obstacles. In the



boot race, contestants ride to the far end of the arena where one foot from each rider is in a pile. They find their own boots, put them on, mount up and race back across a finish line. In the con jumping event, mules hop over a rail from a standstill, with the highest jumper winning. The sport, popular in Missouri and other eastern states, originated when raccoon hunters had to

cross fences every square mile. George Silver of Jerome, a mule owner and dealer for 30 years, will be grand marshal of the parade which will begin at noon Saturday in downtown Filer. He said he plans to enter several of his own mules in the Roundup.

Kubs said this year's entrants include five-time world champion mule teamster Ralph

Atkinson of Reno, Nev., and nationally-known mule trainers and clinicians Brad and Sherry Cameron.

Gordon Edwards, owner of the Piedford Mule Ranch in Elba, said he plans to bring plenty of mules to the Roundup and will enter every class just to show off the versatility of his animals.

"Mules are a lot to ride and play with," he said. "If you want to have a good time, come to a mule show. You will be entertained all right long."

Kubs said she enjoys the unique personality of mules. "I like how, if you treat them right, they get attached to you," she said. "Mine, I can call her and she'll come running to me. She's very personable."

Mules have had a bad reputation in past years, Kubs said, but much of the problem was caused by the inability of their owners to train them in an understanding way. "You can't abuse a mule," she said. "You have to outsmart them."

## Panel wants more thought on waste incinerator

disposal site. \* A proposed 54-acre landfill at the INEEL for contaminated radioactive soils.

"We think the health effects of these are health concerns to the citizens of Idaho," said Roy Ellsworth, a Boise physician and chairman of the INEEL Health Effects Subcommittee. "It's a no-brainer not to bury plutonium over the equifer."

The group wants independent assurances that the proposals will not pose a health threat. The federal Agency for Toxic Substances and Disease Registry assesses whether contaminants are likely to harm people living and working near polluted sites or industries.

Rick Collins, an environmental health scientist at the agency who is working on a health study at INEEL, said he would include

the incinerator and landfill in a list of projects that could warrant more detailed attention.

The group's first resolution called for a study of the health implications of the cleanup plan for the Idaho Nuclear Technology Center - formerly known as the Idaho Chemical Processing Plant - and called for the Energy Department to ban plutonium reburial.

Proposed cleanup at INTEC includes plans for a 54-acre disposal site for 2.5 million cubic feet of contaminated soil. The contaminated soil would be put in a lined pit, which would include a collection system for any liquids that might leach out of the waste. The pit would be covered to keep out rain water and snowmelt.

Critics have questioned the wisdom of disposing of any

radioactive waste in the ground above the Snake River Plain Aquifer, which supplies drinking and irrigation water for about 200,000 southern Idaho residents.

Federal and state officials say the pit would be the most cost-effective way to dispose of contaminated soil. And the pit would be designed to keep the water from leaking into the aquifer.

The subcommittee's second resolution called for a study of the INEEL's proposed Advanced Mixed Waste Treatment Plant, with an emphasis on the proposed incineration of plutonium-contaminated waste and the emission control system's ability to filter out the smallest plutonium particles.

The Energy Department last year signed a \$1 billion contract Please see WASTE, Page B3

## Polygamous family sues support group

SALT LAKE CITY (AP)—A polygamist and his five wives filed a lawsuit Thursday accusing an anti-polygamist group of spreading lies that their family is incestuous and abusing children.

The group, Family of Polygamy is comprised of "bitter and vengeful" women who want to prevent people from practicing their religion, Tom Green said at a press conference after filing the defamation lawsuit in 3rd District Court.

"We're not the bogeymen Tapestry wants everyone to believe," said Green, flanked by

two of his wives, Linda Kunt Green and Leah Ann Bentley Green.

The parents and their 25 children live in several mobile homes in Utah's west desert, 100 miles from the nearest town—Delta to the west and Weaver to the north and Ely, Nev., to the west.

Their press conference was the first for polygamists who have become increasingly fearful of prosecution and angry about the spotlight focused on their lifestyle in the past year. The internationally publicized prosecutions of two brothers in the Kingston polygamy clan—for

child abuse and incest, respectively—gave fuel to Tapestry, a support group for women and children leaving polygamous families.

The group has turned up the heat on prosecutors throughout the state, encouraging them to prosecute polygamists. It was as if incest and abuse when those crimes are found—Green labbed-out at the approach Thursday, saying the state should go after fornicators and adulterers and anyone else having "sex without a license" if it tends to go after people living in plural marriage.

## Hagerman City Council to check school's propane tank for safety

HAGERMAN — City Council members decided Tuesday to have the new high school's 14,000-gallon propane tank inspected for safety to see if it complies with local fire and building ordinances.

Hagerman Fire District Chief Tim Peterson told the council the tank's location and size had raised some public safety concerns. He said the size of the propane tank exceeds fire code regulations by 12,000 gallons and that no one on the fire board was aware that the construction of the new high school would call for such a large tank.

Peterson said there are records showing that the contractor applied and received the necessary permits required to install the tank. However, the contractor should have submitted plans to the fire board to get its permission to set up an oversized tank.

"We (the fire board) would have denied their (the contractor's) request," Peterson said. "We would have OK'd a 2,000-gallon tank according to code."

The tank's location also came under fire. The tank sits on the southwest side of the high school's campus 10 feet from Second Avenue North. According to Peterson, the tank should be 50 feet away from any public right-of-way, which would have placed the tank in the middle of the football field.

Peterson said precautions should be taken to prevent tampering or a systems malfunction of the tank. He suggested that the district install fencing, placards, safety caps and a secondary shut-off.

"It just worries me that something like this is big of a deal slipped through the cracks," Peterson said.

Hagerman Mayor James Norwood said Thursday the city would look into the matter and will work with the school district, building inspector and the fire board to see if there were any violations to any building or fire code. He said whether or not the city takes any action will be determined after the investigation is completed.

In an interview Thursday Hagerman School District Superintendent Lee Mitchell said he was unaware there was a problem with the new tank until Peterson approached him last week. Mitchell said the propane tank was set in place in March during the first phase of construction of the new high school and that the tank's size and location appeared on the blueprints approved by the State Department of Education and by the City of Hagerman's building inspector.

As for the safety precautions, Mitchell said he promised Peterson they would be in place within a week.

"We tried to comply with everything that has ever been requested of us," Mitchell said. "Whether it be the city's building inspector or the fire chief, I've not been resistant to anything they've requested."

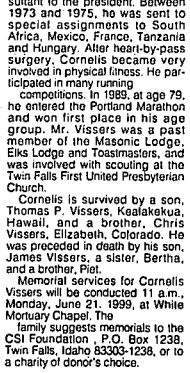

## MGM chief warns of political showmanship

LAS VEGAS (AP)—On the eve of the publication of a federal study on gambling, MGM Grand Chairman J. Terrence Lanni has warned of an impending onslaught of political rhetoric from congressional spin doctors.

The National Gambling Impact Study Commission report contains 76 recommendations, including setting a national minimum age for gambling at 21, helping problem gamblers and

curbing political contributions by the gambling industry.

But the \$5 million, two-year study contains 1,000 pages of "anecdotal" descriptions of gambling and its problems that Lanni says is ripe for political "cherry picking."

"I think you're going to find that people who don't care for gambling are going to reach these anecdotal statements to support their premises," he told a

luncheon audience at the 20th Annual Las Vegas Hotel and Restaurant Show on Thursday.

"For whatever reason of view you have you can find some anecdotal comment to support your particular positions," said Lanni, himself a member of the commission.

The report will be presented to Congress, the White House, state governors and Indian tribes. It is to be released today.

# Salt Lake City man sentenced for moving drugs in Cassia area

**BURLEY** - A 21-year-old Salt Lake City man was sentenced to more than eight years in prison Thursday for drug trafficking in Cassia County.

Julio Calata, clad in white and yellow striped Mini-Cassia Criminal Justice Center inmate attire, sat quietly as 5th District Judge Monte Carlson handed down the sentence in Cassia County District Court. Calata was sentenced to a minimum of seven years and maximum of 15 years in prison, and faces more than \$10,000 in fines.

"There is nothing in this case to excuse or justify his (Calata's) conduct, except maybe his age and inexperience," Carlson said. Carlson said he must look at several factors before issuing a sentence, including the protection of society.

"If I sentence Mr. Calata too lightly, I may encourage others to commit a crime," he said. "The punishment must be equal to the crime to deter others."

Calata declined to comment about the sentence. Raymond

Pena, Calata's attorney, had argued in court for a lesser sentence. Because his client was not a drug kingpin and has never been convicted of a crime before, Calata should not spend more than eight years in prison, Pena said.

"Three to nine years is appropriate to this case," Pena said, adding that rehabilitation would be a better solution. "Nine years in prison for a person that is 21 years old would constitute almost one-third of their life. It would not be a benefit to society to put Mr. Calata in prison for more than nine years."

Cassia County Deputy Prosecutor Howard Smyser said Calata was involved in a serious drug dealing operation in Utah and was attempting to bring his criminal activities into Idaho.

"If it pleases your honor, counsel, we are dealing with a defendant that wasn't unsophisticated when it came to drug trafficking," Smyser said. "Mr. Calata was in the upper levels of drug dealing. This was the biggest deal I've ever seen in Cassia County."

Calata and several others were

arrested on July 22, 1998 in Burley during a drug transaction at a Burley gas station parking lot. Calata pleaded guilty to charges of drug trafficking and delivery of a controlled substance.

In other Cassia County 5th District Court business Thursday, a 23-year-old Rupert man was sentenced to at least five years in prison after pleading guilty to aggravated battery. Jesus Ortiz was arrested in February for stabbing Kevin LeGault of Heyburn more than 13 times at a vacant lot on Overland Avenue and 14th Street in Burley, court records say.

Ortiz had originally pleaded innocent to the charges, but then changed his plea to guilty. Eddie Dugan, 23, of Heyburn, who was with Ortiz the night of the stabbing, already had pleaded guilty to battery in connection with the attack. He was sentenced Feb. 19 to six days in the Mini-Cassia Criminal Justice Center, which he completed.

thought the second option, calling for major system modifications, would be worse.

The idea of taking 1.4 million acre-feet from southern and eastern Idaho drew the most negative response.

Scientists predict that continuing current efforts would give salmon a 50 percent chance of recovery within 48 years, said Dennis Becker, a University of Idaho graduate student. Current operations include taking 427,000 acre-feet of water from southern and eastern Idaho to boost lower Snake River flow.

One acre-foot is enough water to cover one acre, one foot deep or 43,560 cubic feet.

Major system modifications include an improved collection system to gather young salmon on their way to the sea, load them into trucks and barges and transport them around all the dams - from the lower Snake and four on the lower Columbia - to the mouth of the Columbia River.

It could bring a small rate increase for Bonneville Power Administration customers, but it gives the fish less chance of recovery, Becker said. Some residents in Mini-Cassia get their power from BPA, but in the Twin Falls area, residents get their electricity from Idaho Power Co.

Many participants thought continuing to take water from eastern Idaho, and continuing to spend tax money to accomplish little or nothing, would have a negative effect on quality of life. But others thought current efforts would have little effect on the community.

Participants generally objected to doing something but not improving anything - and continuing to take southern Idaho irrigation water without improving the salmon's chances of recovering.

But losing the salmon would mean losing one of the reasons people come to Idaho.

Most people agreed that more water in the river would be good, but the loss of 1.4 million acre-feet of irrigation water would

harm the community.

Some participants noted that increasing river flow has been tried for several years with no visible benefit to the fish.

The average amount of water that flows into the state in the Snake River is about 37 million acre-feet. And the river carries about 75 million acre-feet out of the state annually.

Though the water would come from willing sellers, the transfer may affect Magic Valley agriculture by reducing groundwater recharge above American Falls, reducing flows that supply Twin Falls Canal Co.'s water rights, Becker said. And it could reduce the storage entitlement for the North Side and Twin Falls canal companies.

The transfer also may reduce groundwater levels in the Snake River Plain Aquifer by 44 to 46 feet in some areas, Becker said. Depending on the source and timing of the water, the increased flow could mean a loss of power generating revenues up to \$27 million a gain of up to \$19 million.

It also would bring a loss in reservoir recreation of \$4 million to \$13.7 million annually.

Running 1.4 million acre-feet down the river could help improve water quality in the middle Snake River, but scientists have no conclusive evidence that the increased flows help salmon - nor do they have conclusive evidence that the water doesn't help.

### Breaching the dams

The third option calls for taking out the earthen portion of the Ice Harbor, Lower Monumental, Little Goose, and Lower Granite dams, but leaving the concrete portions - the powerhouse, spillways and navigation locks. This controversial proposal got the most varied response.

Breaching the dams would mean the loss of about 15 percent of BPA's generating capacity -

about 5 percent of the Pacific Northwest's regional capacity. The Corps recommends replacing the capacity with gas turbine generators.

The change - if spread among all Northwest ratepayers - would mean a \$6.50 increase in typical commercial monthly power bills, and a \$1 increase in residential power bills, Becker said. The increase would be higher for BPA customers - \$36 for commercial customers and about \$5.75 for residential customers.

But the costs would be offset by increases in recreation worth \$71 million to \$100 million annually and 1,000 to 1,500 new jobs in 10 to 25 years.

The change would eliminate river barge traffic to Lewiston. But less than 1 percent of the grain produced in the Magic Valley is shipped by barge - most of it goes out by train and truck.

Taking out the dams and associated repairs would cost about \$1.1 billion, Becker said. But it gives the salmon their best chance at recovery to the point they are no longer in danger of extinction. Scientists estimate an 80 percent chance of recovery within 48 years.

Some people expressed concern about the effects on economic development of increased power rates, but others noted that BPA could not raise power rates above market value. For some, the costs would be offset by improved opportunities for recreation and the chance for salmon recovery.

No one disagreed that recovering the fish would restore pride and quality of life in all of Idaho including Twin Falls. And the option included no mention of taking irrigation water from southern Idaho.

# Ex-principal accused of corruption

**IDAHO FALLS, (AP)** - The state Professional Standards Commission alleges a former high school principal fixed student grades, falsified information on a job application and bilked the Bonneville School District.

The commission recently filed the complaint after investigating Bruce Casper, former principal of what now is the Lincoln Alternative High School.

Casper has requested a hearing before the commission, which

reviews whether teachers or administrators violated the state's code of ethics. No date for the hearing has been set.

Casper denies any wrongdoing, said his attorney, Greg Mueller of Rexburg.

The complaint alleges Casper misrepresented students' grades and credits during his tenure at the alternative school and falsified information when he applied for a job with the Lander County School District in Battle Mountain, Nev.

It also alleges he bought items for himself and obtained reimbursement from the Bonneville School District.

Department of Education officials would give no other details about the allegations. No criminal charges have been filed against Casper.

If the commission finds he committed ethics violations, his punishment could range from a letter of reprimand to a loss of his state teaching certificate.

"We need to respect that person's feelings, but not overreact."

He said it's also important for a judge to thoroughly examine court records to get a sense of how serious the crime is. To make a decision about a case, a magistrate judge needs to have the ability to cut through all information about the case, he said.

He said child abuse is an epidemic, mainly caused by methamphetamines. He said grants should be applied for to establish an "alcohol court" which would deal with alcohol and drug-related crime through treatment and recovery. An alcohol court program was recently opened in Caldwell and has been quite successful, he said.

Original cases have increased

so much that more people are needed to prosecute. Crabtree said. He said cases need to be heard in a timely manner.

Crabtree said arbitration should be used often, but added that it should not be mandatory.

"Some cases are not solvable with mediation," he said.

When asked during his interview about gun control issues, Crabtree said people have the right to bear arms, but he would uphold whatever new laws Congress passed. He believes in responsible use of a weapon, he said, and has tried to instill that responsibility in his children, who he has told "if you are going to kill it, it's going to be for supper."

Crabtree said he's been involved as a volunteer with Habitat for Humanity, the

Guardian ad Litem program - an advocacy program for abused children in the child protection program - and Magic Valley Rehabilitation Services.

He said one of his goals as a magistrate judge will be to expose school children to the court system at an early age. He said he also wants to make jury duty an honor rather than a burden.

"We are grateful they will come and take the time out of their day," he said.

Crabtree said he wants to emphasize that the court process is not behind closed doors.

"I want to be accessible," he said. "I really is an honor."

# Owyhee plan would limit cyclists to trails

BOISE (AP) — Motorcyclists will have to stay on roads and trails when they ride on public land in Owyhee County under the Bureau of Land Management's new plan for managing the sprawling Owyhee Resource Area.

But they will not find much of the 1.3 million acres entirely closed to motorized use, and that frustrates conservation groups that have been seeking to protect the area's canyons, rare plants and wildlife.

"The BLM can provide for protection of sensitive resources and provide for motorized recreation," said Ann Libengood, secretary of the Treasure Valley Trail Machine Association. "The two are not mutually exclusive."

The BLM initially proposed closing 244,430 acres to motor-

ized recreation in its draft plan for managing the resource area. But after hundreds of motorcyclists protested at public hearings, the new proposal issued this week calls for closing 101,994 acres to automobiles, all-terrain vehicles and motorcycles.

Previously, 420,000 acres were open to cross-country travel. The new plan, which should become final next January, allows unrestricted motorized travel on only 192 acres.

Closing off cross-country travel is designed to prevent soil erosion, damage to rare plants and habitat for sensitive species like sage grouse.

Eventually, the agency plans to designate open trails and close others that are damaging the landscape.

# Mayor votes: Utah town will keep pool closed on Sundays

FARMINGTON, Utah (AP) — The city's public pool will remain closed on Sundays.

City Councilman Dave Connors introduced a motion Wednesday to reopen the pool, and the council split 2-2 on the issue. The mayor broke the tie in favor of closure.

Season-pass holders asked that the pool be reopened or they be given their money back.

Opponents of the pool closure said the issue is not noise or profitability. They said the council chose Sunday because of pressure from Mormon residents.

"There is something about Sunday," said Jane Miner, a member of the Farmington Recreation and Leisure Board.

"The only people who seem to think that the decision was not about Sunday are the people who made the decision," she said.

Max Forbush, city manager, lives about 250 feet from the pool. He said, "Weekends are valuable to me as an individual, father and husband. I look forward to Saturdays and Sundays when I can go home and relax. I hear the noise along with my neighbors. I'm entitled to a break also." Forbush was supported by neighbors who sent a signed statement to the council supporting the closure.

Pre-season advertising for season pool passes — costing as much as \$100 — said the Farmington pool would be open on Sundays from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m.

Mayor Gregory Bell said he wanted to give pool neighbors a once-a-week break from the noise from the pool. He alleged low attendance, profitability and staff reluctance to work on Sundays as reasons for closing the pool on Sundays.

- Be certain your dog or cat is in good health. Some states and foreign countries require current rabies and health certificates. Arrange with your veterinarian for a physical examination and necessary vaccinations and certificates.
- Starting a week or more before a car trip, take a few short rides with your dog or cat to acclimate it with travel.
- Plan to keep control of your dog or cat at all times, using a leash if possible. (A harness is better than a collar for a cat.) Keep car windows closed far enough to prevent the animal from jumping out.
- Never leave your dog or cat unattended in a closed car during hot weather. Heat builds rapidly in an enclosed space, resulting in heat stroke and death within a relatively short period of time.
- If motion sickness has been a problem, medication is available to prevent it and it can calm the animal. Always restrict food and water before traveling.
- Many motels and hotels welcome pets, but you should check to be sure when making reservations. You may want to carry a covered litter box in the trunk of your car.
- Upon arrival, give food and water sparingly and offer plenty of understanding and affection.

# Conservation groups oppose a plan to suppress bark beetles with logging

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — A coalition of U.S. Forest Service conservation groups announced it would be logging to fight a Douglas fir beetle infestation, environmental groups went to federal court to block that move.

If they win, there won't be any logging on 4,000 acres around Hayden Lake this summer, where the Forest Service has an emergency waiver to start dropping trees.

"On Monday, the agency announced it would cut between 130 million and 176 million board feet of timber in northern Idaho and Eastern Washington in response to a beetle outbreak that is killing trees and exacerbating fire danger."

The Land Council, Ecology Center, Idaho Conservation League and Hayden Lake resi-

dent Jules Gindraux filed the injunction Tuesday in U.S. District Court in Missoula, Mont.

The emergency exemption "excludes public discourse, it excludes public involvement," said Lew Parsons, executive director of the Lands Council.

The fact that the Forest Service has been marking trees for logging for several months has "the tint of a false process (and) smacks of a predetermined outcome," he said.

Parsons acknowledged the Forest Service has promised to remove 150 miles of logging roads as part of the timber sales. That's insignificant considering the thousands of miles of logging roads in the forests, he said.

Any delay means the beetle-killed trees will start to dry, crack and decrease in value. That means less money for restoration work because the trees will fetch less money, he said.

"We've heard from some of these folks repeatedly about the need to reduce roads and improve the water quality," Wright said. "I'm disappointed people would want to jeopardize that effort."

While the Forest Service can't do anything about the beetle outbreak, it can ease the aftermath, especially the fire danger posed by the dead trees, Wright said.

The timber industry, eager for Douglas fir to feed their mills, expected the challenge.

# Judge must decide on suit over dairy waste pollution

KENNEWICK, Wash. (AP) — It's up to U.S. District Judge Ed Shea to decide if a Yakima Valley dairy farmer should face millions of dollars in fines for polluting water with cow manure.

Closing arguments were offered Wednesday in the lawsuit against Zillah farmer Henry Bosma.

"What this man and his operation have done ... is truly criminal," said attorney Charles Tebbutt, representing a Yakima Valley citizen activist group known as CARE.

Tebbutt used his closing arguments to label Bosma a "sophisticated manipulator" and "bully." "I am exhausted," Bosma, 60, said outside court. "This has kind of been a media circus for Mr.

Tebbutt."

Plaintiffs are alleging hundreds of violations of the federal Clean Water Act for everything from ongoing manure leaks to improper recordkeeping. Fines could add up to several million dollars.

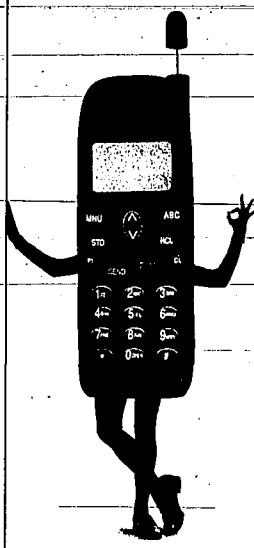
If Shea finds Bosma liable for the violations, the trial would move to the penalty phase this fall.

In his closing arguments, Bosma lawyer Jerry Neal discussed his client's manure management upgrades since 1997.

Bosma has spent hundreds of thousands of dollars for work on berms, lagoons and grading the land to prevent manure from getting into nearby waterways, Neal said.

# Feds resist handing cemetery over to Jarbidge

RENO, Nev. (AP) — Forest Service officials are fighting a proposal to give Elko County title to a small cemetery on a national forest near the historic mining town of Jarbidge.

Many of those buried there are miners and their families, "the very founders of the small Elko County community" surrounded

by the Humboldt-Toiyabe National Forest along the Idaho border, said U.S. Rep. Jim Gibbons, the Nevada Republican behind the transfer proposal.

The agency would consider selling the land to the county or perhaps trading the 2-acre parcel for similar land, Deputy Forest Service Chief Ron Stewart said.

But the Clinton administration opposes Gibbons' bill because "it does not require fair market compensation," Stewart said in testimony prepared for the hearing before the House Resources subcommittee on forests chaired by Idaho Republican Rep. Helen Chenoweth. The county continues to have the option of obtaining 10- to 20-

year special-use permits for the cemetery, as it has done since 1915, Stewart said.

Gibbons said agency officials should be ashamed of themselves for demanding the county pay for the cemetery "where generations of residents of this historic community have been laid to rest."

## Too many cooks combine to spoil Travolta's soufflé

Trying to understand who contributed what to a Hollywood script is an elusive task. Apparently, "The General's Daughter" went through several rounds of rewriting before it landed in the hands of Christopher Berolli and William Goldman.

But I'll wager all the good parts in the movie came from Goldman, the scriptwriter of "Buck Cassidy and the Sundance Kid" and Hollywood's dead of scribes. Alas, isolating the better elements is about as positive as we can get. It seems the rest of the cooks spoiled this broth.

The movie, starring John Travolta, has the spit and polish of a military whodunit, but it's a confusing, meandering case to follow. At first, you think you're watching a James Bond film, as Paul Brenner (Travolta), a military warrant officer, defends himself from a ferocious arms buyer trying to drill him full of bullets.

Brenner leaves him floating in tuna-sized chunks all over the harbor. Then the movie seems to be a romance, as Brenner meets Captain Elisabeth Campbell (Leslie Stefanson), an intelligent woman loaded with poise, class and beauty, who happens to be passing by when he gets a flat. Brenner — who's talking with a

Gomer Pyle accent to fool people into thinking he's a simpleton or something — charms the captain and gets her a basket of soaps for helping him change the tire.

Then the unthinkable happens: Campbell is found dead, her mude body tent-peeged to the ground.

Another explosive revelation: she's the daughter of General "Fighting Joe" Campbell (James Cromwell), who's being touted as vice-presidential material in the coming elections.

Brenner, one of the Army Criminal Investigation Division's top investigators, gets the case. He immediately drops the funny accent and teams up with former partner Sarah Sunhill (Maddeline Stowe), whose experience as a rape investigator brings much insight to the investigation.

But as soon as Brenner starts asking questions, General Campbell summons him to his residence.

There are three ways to do this, says Campbell's grim-faced adjutant, Col. Fowler (Clarence Williams III): "The right way, the wrong way, and the army way."

From now on, you're in the formulaic grip of "A Few Good Men." Or something like it. Brenner's investigations lead him to many people, including Campbell, Fowler, Col. Moore (James Woods, once again a master of the edgy role), who was the slain captain's mentor and com-

manding officer, and Capt. Ely (Boyd Kestner), who may have been having an affair with Campbell. You know how these things go.

The movie, directed by Simon "Can Ali" West isn't bad, although the repeated shot of Campbell lying spread-eagled on

the ground, and the amount of detail we're forced to swallow about the horrors she underwent border on the offensive.

As Brenner, the central player, Travolta remains in a multi-star performance full of beans, quips and savvy statements. He's a character with Capt. Campbell (is he work-

ing off his "Primary Colors" accent? you wonder). He heroically withstands the blistering attacks of Fowler and Moore. And when a suspect suggests that all men hate their fathers, he retorts "My dad was a drunk, a gambler and a womanizer. I worshiped him."

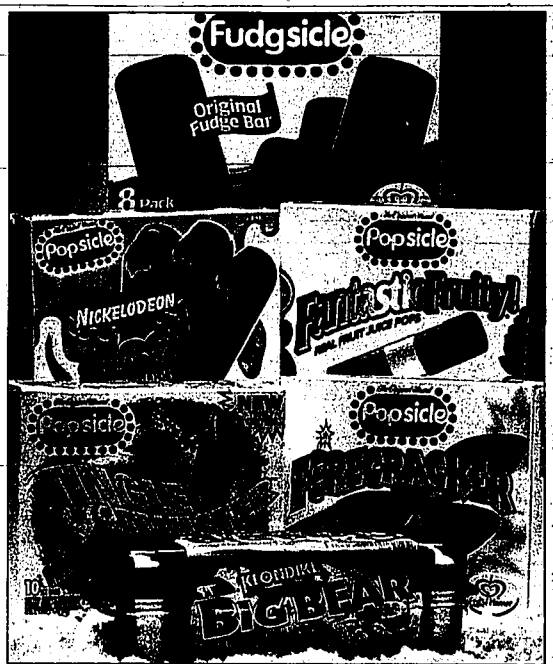

# Disney's version of 'Tarzan' swings into theaters this week

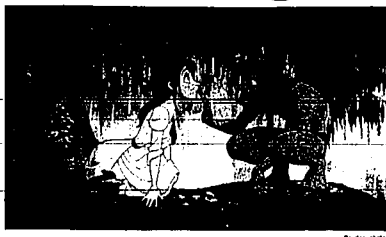

- "Analyze This" - This Harold Ramis comedy about a mobster (Robert De Niro) who's enough of a meanie to help his son seek professional help from a shrink (Billy Crystal) sounds funnier than it plays. (R) for language, a scene of sexuality and some violence.
- "Austin Powers: The Spy Who Shagged Me" - The world's most inept superhero and his equally dodgy nemesis Dr. Evil (both played by Mike Myers) star in the raucous, off-color corruption of spoof fun that takes gleeful and mostly on-target potshots at a wide range of pop-culture targets. (PG-13) for sexual innuendo and crude humor.
- "Election" - This sharp and merciless comedy depicts a devastatingly funny world where fumbling adults are powerless when confronted by devious, determined young people motivated by the devil of self-interest. Powered by expert performances by Reese Witherspoon and Matt Dillahunty, Brock is the best and brightest dad high school adventure since the groundbreaking "Heathers." (R) for strong sexual, sex-related dialogue and language, and a scene of drug use.
- "Entrapment" - An indifferent script and the 40-year age difference between stars Sean Connery and Catherine Zeta-Jones hamper this derivative romantic caper set in the world of daring cat burglars and their nemeses. (PG-13) for some language, sensuality, violence and drug content.
- "The General's Daughter" - This muddling, so-so thriller about a

murder investigation on an army base stars John Travolta and Madeleine Stowe. (R) for graphic images relating to sexual violence, nudity and language.

- "Instinct" - A lame psycho-thriller in which an ambitious psychiatrist (Cuba Gooding Jr.) tries to get inside the head of a lethal primatologist (Anthony Hopkins) with a secret. (R, for some intense violent behavior).
- "Life" - A very funny and surprisingly poignant story of two unjustly-imprisoned-convicts and their life on a Mississippi work camp. Classy teamwork by Eddie Murphy and Martin Lawrence. Obba Babatundé, Ned Beatty and Bernie Mac co-star. Directed by Terry Demme. (R) for strong language and a shooting scene.
- "The Love Letter" - Director Peter Ho-Sun Chan, Hong Kong maestro of edgy romantic comedy, makes his graceful American debut with this beguiling story of an anonymous love letter that surfaces in a New England town, setting off an emotional deep charge among a clutch of locals headed by Kate Capshaw's single parent, craving for romance more than she realizes. Ellen DeGeneres, Tom Selleck, Tom Everett Scott and Gloria Stuart are among those involved. (PG, for some sexuality, nudity and strong language).
- "The Matrix" - A computer crash nightmare, with Keanu Reeves as a kind of hacker Christ, sent to redeem the real world from cyber men in black who have reprogrammed it as a computer game in which everyone wears black and speaks in epigrams. Anyone confused, technology is our undoing can use this effects-laden, brain-bend here as evidence. Rated PG-13, violence.
- "The Mangrove" - Energetically written and directed by Stephen Sommers, this silly and cartoonish remake of the 1932 horror classic, is crammed with such familiar genre elements as secret brotherhoods and savage hoarders on horseback, ancient booby traps and characters who exclaim, with as much of a straight face as they can manage, "Beware of the nurse!" and "What have we done?" Brendan Fraser, Rachel Weisz and Arnold Vosloo

star. (PG-13 for pervasive adventure violence and some partial nudity).

- "Never Been Kissed" - Drew Barrymore reclaims her place as America's sweetheart in this lightweight romantic confection about a dowdy newspaper copy editor who goes undercover at a high school. (PG-13 for sex-related material and some drug content).
- "Notting Hill" - This film, a collateral descendant of "Four Weddings and a Funeral" is a smartly cast and consistently amusing romantic comedy about an unlikely romance between Hollywood's biggest star (Julia Roberts) and a shambling British bookstore owner (Hugh Grant). The key to this film's considerable charm is the script by Richard Curtis and the able direction of Roger Michell. (PG-13 for sexual content and brief strong language).
- "Pushing Tin" - If they could have figured out how to land this nerve-jangling comedy about air traffic controllers pushing their stress levels to the max, it might have been a minor classic, a kind of "Broadcast News" in real air. Instead, we have to settle for a fresh, bright sitcom that pits cocky air boss Chuck Caslick and Zen cowboy Billy Bob Thornton against each other in a workplace war of wits

and skills. Rated R; language, brief nudity.

- "Star Wars: Episode I The Phantom Menace" - While this prequel to the original "Star Wars" trilogy is certainly serviceable, it's noticeably lacking in warmth and humor. Though its visual strengths are real and considerable, from a dramatic point of view it's ponderous and plodding. "Episode I" stars Liam Neeson and Ewan McGregor as the Jedi Knights Qui-Gon Jinn and Obi-Wan Kenobi, Natalie Portman as Queen Amidala of Naboo and Jake Lloyd as the young Anakin Skywalker. (PG for sci-fi action violence).
- "Tarzan" - The new Disney version is the first time Edgar Rice Burroughs' 1912 tale of a man raised by gorillas has been done as animation and this unpretentious "Tarzan" (directed by Kevin Lima and Chris Buck) turns out to rank with the best of the group. (G).
- "10 Things I Hate About You" - A sharp, sassy adaptation of "The Taming of the Shrew," reset in a Seattle high school, where lovely Bianca (Larisa Oleinik) can't date until her outspoken older sister Kat (Julia Stiles) does. (PG-13 for crude sex-related humor and dialogue, alcohol and drug-related scenes, all involving teens).
- "Thirteenth Floor" - A fabu-

lous-looking time-travel mystery, murky plotted and not nearly as original as it means to be. Craig Bierko and Gretchen Mol are colorful leads, but Armin Mueller-Stahl, Vincent D'Onofrio and Dennis Haysbert lend strong presence in supporting roles. (R for violence and language).

- "William Shakespeare's A Midsummer Night's Dream" - As written and directed by Michael Hoffman, this starry version of Shakespeare's lighthearted comedy is overly slapstick, and in trying too hard to be funny it ends up being almost no fun at all. Modern farewells Kevin Kline is a standout as Nick Bottom. The rest of the ensemble includes Michelle Pfeiffer, Rupert Everett, Stanley Tucci, Calista Flockhart and Christian Bale. (PG-13 for sensuality and nudity).

'Lugnasa,' 'Enemy of the State' reach local video stores

New videos in Twin Falls-area stores this week:

"Dancing at the Lugnasa" - (PG) Ah, those inscrutable Irish! They've given us three dead-from-the-waist-up Riverdancers and the limitless wonders of the humble potato.

Now, we have "Dancing at Lugnasa," based on Brian Friel's subtle-to-the-point-of-somnolent 1990 play about five Mundy sisters sitting in Donegal in the '30s talking about cigarettes and the weather.

OK, Meryl Streep is great as the eldest sibling, and director Pat O'Connor has captured a lovely shot of red flowers illuminated by moonlight, but the introverted and strange-bound "Lugnasa" could do with a little less repressed blather about nothing and a little more fancy footwork. Contains little that is objectionable other than vague discussions of infidelity and premarital sex.

"My Name Is Joe" (R) - Peter Mullan, Louise Coddall, Gary Lewis, David McKay, Lorraine Mcintosh. A recovering alcoholic looking for a job finds love instead in his Glasgow neighborhood. Director Ken Loach's tasty slice-of-life is drolly funny and intensely dramatic. In Scottish dialect English with English subtitles.

The script was inspired by a statistic: There's a 10-year difference in life expectancy between the rich and the poor who are represented in two different ZIP codes in Glasgow.

"From the beginning, Joe and Sarah's affair seems doomed by the fact that their backgrounds are so different, yet that doesn't make their connection seem any less vital.

She is initially attracted - and put off - by his boisterousness. It doesn't necessarily help when he tries to be honest about his reprehensible past.

But as they get to know each other, she begins to understand his loyalties to people she might regard as beyond the pale, and a fragile relationship forms from that sense of trust.

"Little Voice" (R) - Brenda Blethyn, Jane Horrocks, Brian McGregor, Annette Badland, Michael Caine. Horrocks stars as a strange shut-in with an eerie talent for mimicking cabaret grandees - Piaf, Garland, Holiday, Bassey - in this somber, comical-tinged character study adapted from Jim Cartwright's play "The Rise and Fall of Little Voice." With Caine and Blethyn, both yelling at the top of their lungs.

It's a fantastic showcase for the actress ("Life Is Sweet," "TV's 'Absolutely Fabulous'), whose vocal and physical impersonation of a pantheon of cabaret crooners is remarkable. But when Horrocks stops singing, "Little Voice" screams to a halt, too - literally. It's an ear-piercing, mawkish affair, full of loud, loud-yelled characters bawling and coming into each other.

"Enemy of the State" (R) As a man hunted by the government for a videotape he doesn't even know he has, Will Smith is cool, funny and sexy, and so is Gene Hackman as a former National Security Agency operative who

might be his only hope. It's the super-secret spy agency itself that wants the tape, and renegade executive Reynolds (spooky Jon Voight) will stop at nothing to get it.

"Enemy" is pulse-pounding escapist fare for the extremely paranoid, but it pushes the limits of plausibility and audience patience well beyond the limits of the logical mind. Leave that pesky part of your anatomy at home. Contains profanity, explosions, murder and skimpy lingerie.

"The Faculty" (R) - A cut above the average teen-terror flick, the Robert Rodriguez-directed, Kevin Williamson-scripted film is still slightly derivative - chiefly of "Invasion of the Body Snatchers," which it shamelessly refers to in its own dialogue.

Set in a nicely grubby high school, the familiar story concerns the efforts of six students to save the world from parasitic aliens inhabiting their teachers' bodies. The frights actually frighten, although the alien special effects are remarkably cheap.

In the end, the supporting cast of "The Faculty" is its forte, with cameos by comedian Jon Stewart, Keanu Newirth, Salma Hayek, Summer Phoenix and Harry Connors, the red-haired, 300-pound proprietor of the www.aint-it-cool-news.com film-gate Web site. Contains profanity, drug use, murky nudity, sexual allusions, the dissection of a lab rat, gore, and stabbing with creative implements.

# 'N Sync's hard work pays off

To hear Lance Bass tell it, he and the other members of 'N Sync are five of the hardest-working guys in show business.

It isn't just that the quintet puts on a show with enough singing, dancing and eye-popping razzle-dazzle to rival the attractions at Universal Studios amusement park. As much work as this may be, it's only part of the job of being in a teen-sensation like 'N Sync.

"We never knew how difficult it would be," Bass says, over the phone from a tour stop in Albany, N.Y. "You just never imagine that it would really be a 24/7 job, that you would be on (24 hours a day, seven days a week).

"But that's the way it is. You're not ever 'N Sync. You're always going to be that, and there's people looking at you ...

"All of us had always dreamed about what it was like to do this kind of stuff," he adds. "It was way beyond than what we thought it would be. It's a lot harder. You just never see what work really was involved in it."

Not that he's complaining. So far, 'N Sync's hard work has paid off beyond the group's wildest dreams. "'N Sync," the group's debut album, has sold more than 6 million copies in the United States, and its current tour, which ended May 16, sold out.

The group has generated the sort of fan fervor only teen idols can inspire. Among the faithful are the five — Joseph "Joey" Fatone, Christopher "Chris" Kirkpatrick, Joshua "J.C." Chasez, Justin Timberlake and James "Lance" Bass — are referred to on a strictly first-name basis, and were to any older foolish enough to dismiss 'N Sync as being "just like the Backstreet Boys."

Being compared to the Backstreeters is an issue for the group, although for entirely different reasons. Although 'N Sync hails from Orlando, Fla., the group was first launched in Europe, and while the five did well over there, they worried that some other pop-oriented harmony group would beat them to the punch at home.

"We wanted to release (the album) back in '96," says Lance. "But the record company was like, 'We don't think it's the time for your kind of act.'"

'N Sync disagreed and worried what would happen should they follow some similar act onto the scene here. "We were afraid that someone like us was going to come out, and because we would be the second group, no one would like us," he says. "People would hate us because we were trying to be like the other group."

As it turned out, 'N Sync did get beaten-to-the-punch, by fellow Floridians the Backstreet Boys. "We thought, 'Well, it's going to happen,'" admits Lance. "Thank goodness everyone gave us a chance and found out for themselves that we are totally different."

Granted, both groups offer songs built around sweet soul harmony and surging synth-beats. But 'N Sync's sound is lighter, sweeter and more pop-oriented than the Backstreet Boys, making the two no more identical than Madonna and Mariah Carey.

Now, 'N Sync faces a new challenge: Convincing people that the group isn't just for 10-year-old girls. "Well, we're No. 6 on the Adult Contemporary (radio) charts right now," says Lance, laughing. "I think that's definitely not true that our audience is all

under-10-year-old girls." Instead, he says, the crowd 'N Sync gets is very mixed, running the gamut from middle-schoolers to college kids, along with a healthy smattering of parents and grandparents. "I had one guy come up to me, and he was, like, 'I was so afraid to go to your concert,'" Lance says. He thought he was going to be the only guy there. But he wasn't.

"I think on the next tour, people are more likely going to be afraid to go to an 'N Sync concert."

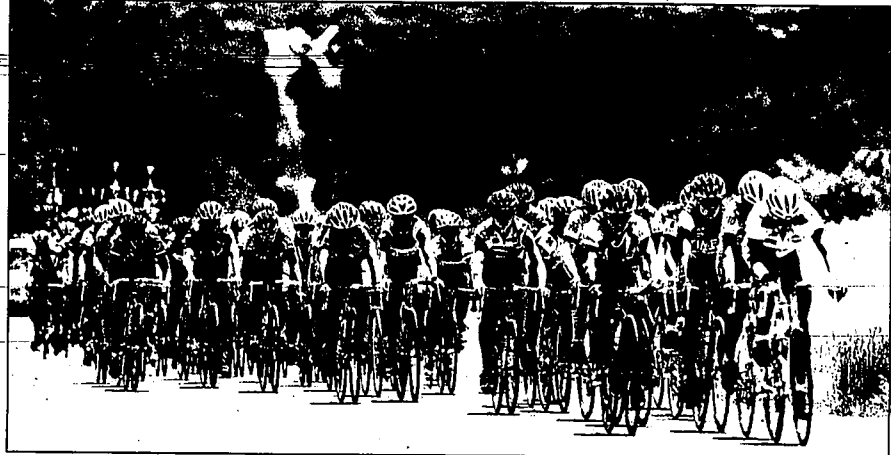

## HP Toner wins another stage

GLENN'S FERRY — With the focus of the Hewlett-Packard Women's Challenge on Michael Jordan and the Dream Team for so long, Friday's All-In-One Road Race between Twin Falls and Glenns Ferry showcased other talents.

With four of the race's 13 stages to go, France's Jeannie Longo-Ciprelli had all but secured her 576th career victory, adding her oft-mentioned status as "the Michael Jordan of women's cycling," and Team HP Toner, the international squad known by insiders as the "Dream Team," was looking to finish with the fastest overall team time as well as the overall individual points leader.

So most of Friday's race involved the struggles of Team Saturn, the attempt by one of its riders to grab sprint points and move the team higher in the standings, and the emergence of an ailing Dream Teamer with the stage win.

Battling the effects of a bad night's sleep (see story, this page), Zulfia Zabirova outspinted a small chase group in the final few miles of a race dominated over the majority by Canadian Lynne Bessette, who has already won three races this year but began the day a good seven minutes behind Longo-Ciprelli in overall time.

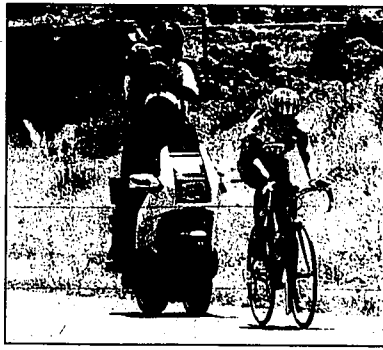
Zabirova's 3:00:15 broke Heather Hall Albert's 1997 stage record, set the last time the stage visited the Thousand Springs area.

Petra Rossner of the German national team led a group of nine bikers nine seconds behind Zabirova, while Boise's Brooke Blackwelder took third for Team Goldy's.

Bessette wasted little time announcing her intentions. As the group passed the Perrine Bridge and took a left onto Golf Course Road, she was the first to try to pull away.

A mile later, the pack was back intact, and another attack at the 3.6-mile mark was thwarted.

The race picked up as the group descended down Bob Baker Highway, with attacks and counterattacks before the main descent into the Snake River Canyon.

"I was very tired. I didn't sleep well," the Russian said through an interpreter. "About 10 kilometers (6.25 miles) before the finish, everybody started fighting for position. It was a high level of excitement and that woke me up."

The Olympic champion had been part of the large peloton, or main pack, for most of Thursday's 76.7-mile 10th stage of the Hewlett-Packard LaserJet Women's Challenge.

She broke free just a few miles east of the finish line and sprinted to the stage win, becoming the third member of the HP Toner team — which started the day with a seven-minute lead — to win a stage.

Teammate Mari Holden won Stage 3 between Stanley and Ketchum, and is on her way to winning the overall points title that Zabirova won in 1997. Two stages later, HP Toner's Jolanta Polkowicz, who is fifth in the points race, rode through a broken wrist to win the Elkhorn circuit race.

Zabirova entered Friday's hilly stage sitting 15th in the standings and 29th in overall points. But when the field was evened on the outskirts of Glenns Ferry, she broke free of the lead group and displayed the form that won her a gold medal in the 1996 Olympic time trials.

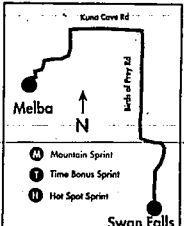
"I got a second wind, and decided to give it a shot," she said at the awards ceremony, where Glenns Ferry mayor Glenn Thompson presented her with the gold medal.

Her lead wasn't much — just four seconds with less than three miles remaining — but it was enough for the stage win and a course-record 3:00:15.

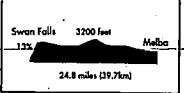
And it helped her forget about her slow start that morning.

## Sabres lose to Stars, face uphill battle

DALLAS — If the Buffalo Sabres are going to win the Stanley Cup, they're going to have to do it the hard way.

A 2-0 loss to the Dallas Stars Thursday night put the Sabres on the brink of elimination for the first time this postseason. Buffalo trails 3-2 in the best-of-7 series.

Only three of 15 teams which have lost Game 5 of a tied finals have rebounded to win the championship, none since the 1971 Montreal Canadiens.

For the Sabres to do it, the seventh-seeded team from the East must win two straight, beginning with Game 6 Saturday night in Buffalo. The Sabres are 8-1 at Marine Midland Arena in the playoffs.

Buffalo had chances early as Dallas committed many of the same mistakes it made in the Sabres' 2-1 victory in Game 4. But the Sabres rarely challenged Stars goaltender Ed Belfour — and when they did, he was sharp.

Jay McKee and Geoff Sanderson each got good looks as they were flying across open ice, but Belfour saw the shots all the way and caught both.

Buffalo create traffic in front of Belfour with about six minutes left, but didn't have a player in the right place at the right time.

One shot deflected just wide of the post, and Belfour went behind the net to make a save when the puck came off the boards. Shortly thereafter, he let a rebound squirt into the zone but he dove on it before any

Sabres arrived.

Buffalo goalie Dominik Hasek kept his team within a goal for more than 55 minutes until getting faked out of position on a 2-on-1 and allowing a goal by Pat Verbeek.

It gave Dallas a two-goal lead for only the second time this series, the only other being the final 26 seconds of Game 3.

The Sabres trailed 1-0 early in the second period on a power-play goal by the Stars. Buffalo had overcome a similar deficit in Game 1 when Dallas tried playing keep-away to protect its lead. The Stars didn't make that mistake this time and the Sabres weren't able to slow their aggressiveness.

Buffalo had just two power plays in the game, one in each of the first two periods.



The Sabres didn't get off a shot on the second.

This is only the third time Buffalo has trailed a series in the playoffs. The Sabres were down 3-0 to Boston in the second round and were in a 2-1 hole against the Stars.

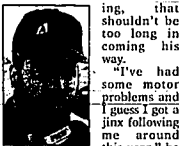
"I like jumping out of airplanes, snowmobiling in the winter and parachuting off the Perrine Bridge," Larson said. "Stuff that's generally exciting."

Twin Falls - The Cactus Petes Intermountain Late Model Super stocks make their Magic Valley Speedway season debut Saturday.

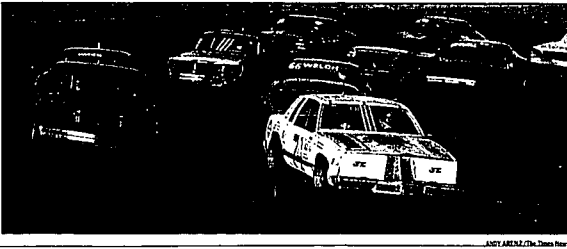

### Billionaire to retire from Micron board

BOISE - J.R. Simplot, the billionaire who bankrolled what now is Idaho's largest employer, announced he will retire from computer chip maker Micron Technology Inc.'s board of directors July 1.

## MICRON

The 90-year-old potato magnate, who remains active and continued to snow ski until last winter, also said he would step down from the board of directors of personal computer maker Micron Electronics Inc. (Nasdaq: MJET) on the same day.

"I think I can say that I have put in my time," Simplot said in a statement issued by Micron Technology (NYSE: MU). "I have nothing but support for the company and its management. It certainly has been a pleasure to represent the shareholders and watch the company grow."

Micron and its subsidiaries, with 11,000 of their 15,000 employees in Idaho, manufacture semiconductors, graphics accelerators, personal computer systems, and radio frequency identification products.

Simplot was 71 in 1980 when he invested \$1 million with twins Ward and Joe Parkinson on a 40-percent share of what would become Micron Technology. He later provided \$20 million more to help Micron build its first chip fabrication plant and weather downturns in the cyclical computer market.

Simplot's stake in Micron is down to less than 12 percent from more than 20 percent in 1995.

### Morrison Knudsen gets Colorado highway project

BOISE - Morrison Knudsen Corp. announced it has been selected as the design/build contractor by The Northwest Parkway Non-Profit Corp. for a 1/2-mile-long limited-access highway near northwest Denver.

Total project costs are anticipated to exceed \$200 million.

MK (NYSE:MK) was selected from six finalists, the company said. The four-lane highway will connect Interstate 25 with U.S. Highway 36 in Brentwood, Colo., to the west and eventually will be part of a beltway around Denver.

The beltway will include a 29-mile-long section of E-470, a tollway in southern Denver recently completed by an MK-led design/build team.

"Morrison Knudsen Corp. brings a wealth of experience in the design and construction of tollways," said Steve Hogan, executive director of the nonprofit corporation, in the MK statement. "As a full partner in this project, Morrison Knudsen's first task will be to ensure that the feasibility studies that are essential to the funding of the project are completed in a thorough and expeditious manner."

## Magic Valley towns measure their centers' health, administer cures

FILER - She wasn't a customer, but Shari Hart was sad to see a downtown barber shop close recently.

"It was here forever," said Hart, the city clerk and a lifetime Filer resident.

The shop's owner, she said, was one of Filer's older men who used to gather at Filer Appliance to talk about the state of Filer and to solve the world's problems.

The appliance store, another downtown landmark, had closed its own doors a couple of years ago - another casualty in a downtown weakened by the allure of nearby U.S. Highway 30.

When Hart was a kid in the late '60s, she saw Filer businesses start moving south to the highway from the traditional city center at Main Street and Yakima

Avenue. Now, she said, "they're kind of split."

Similar tales around the Magic Valley and the rest of the nation have people calling for preservation of old town centers and the businesses that give them economic life.

One of the most endangered spots in the United States could be right in the middle of anyone's small town, the National Trust for Historic Preservation said this week.

At the head of its annual table of the "11 most endangered" sites, the trust listed simply "The Corner of Main and Main."

Instead of naming a town, the table said "Nationwide."

"Sites are chosen to illustrate highly significant symbols of our American heritage that are threatened by neglect, lack of maintenance, insufficient funds, inappropriate development or insensitive public policy," the announcement

said.

But downtowns aren't all dying.

In the face of Twin Falls megastores and more planned in Twin Falls and Jerome, several Magic Valley towns are putting up a fight.

Giving them new life

Rupert's promotion of its historic square is paying off as the square and its businesses become known throughout the valley, said Chris Jackson, coordinator for the Rupert Renaissance Initiative.

The initiative still hopes to offer marketing workshops to business people, particularly to Hispanic business owners who are vital to Rupert's economy but need help getting the word out, she said.

Also, the initiative is readying for a feasibility study for renovation of the 1920 Wilson Theater,

said Jackson, who envisions the theater as a cornerstone for development of a 1920s- and '30s-style business district at the square and surrounding areas.

"I think the outlook for Rupert is really bright," she said.

A claim to history may be key to the future of Buhl's downtown, too.

Residents' pride in Idaho's early days - has spurred 175 or 200 people to volunteer in "Building Buhl's Future," a revitalization effort that covers two blocks in each direction from the intersection of Main Street and Broadway Avenue, said Barbara Phillips, executive director for the Buhl Chamber of Commerce.

"We want to preserve our uniqueness, and yet we want to keep up with changing times," Phillips said.

## That caller could be the chamber

TWIN FALLS - Many companies around town can expect a knock on their doors soon or a call from the Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce, which wants to know their business.

To prepare for a half-day chamber board retreat July 22, board members and chamber ambassadors will survey 250 members and nonmembers about their businesses, the chamber's activities and whether the chamber is meeting their needs, Executive Vice President Kent Just said.

The chamber will start making those calls right after the Fourth of July. At the retreat, the board will analyze where it's been during the first half of the year and how to make the second half work, Just said.

Also upcoming, the chamber board will meet Thursday with the city's Second Century planning committee to comment on that process and give feedback on what the long-term strategic planning committee has done so far, he said.

On Wednesday, the chamber has invited the area's large employers to meet with NationJob to talk about bringing that company's Internet job and worker-search service to town.

In other business, the board this week authorized the chamber to ask Logan, Utah-based Lynn Leisure Associates to submit a \$17,000-plus-expense contract for the chamber to purchase the city's centennial committee and perhaps the county. Under the contract, the firm would prepare a plan to create an interpretive center and expand the role of the chamber's visitor center, probably in conjunction with the city's centennial celebration, Just said.

"Any entity that would invest money in the study would have to sign off before the project proceeds, he said. If the chamber does go ahead, he expects it will happen in July.

# US WEST to sell 530,000 telephone access lines

## Southern Idaho service unaffected

TWIN FALLS - U.S. West's plan to sell properties serving about 530,000 telephone access lines won't change Magic Valley's phone service and doesn't bode ill for the company's plans to keep improving its offerings here, a spokesman said Thursday.

Though eight exchanges in the Lewiston area are among those in the sale, U.S. West's Mike Reynolds said, "none of our southern-Idaho areas are affected by this."

U.S. West Communications Inc., a wholly owned subsidiary of U.S. WEST (NYSE: USW) and Citizens Utilities (NYSE: CZN, CZNPR) announced late Wednesday they had entered into a series of definitive

agreements for Citizens to purchase local exchange telephone properties serving about 530,000 telephone access lines - representing about 3 percent of U.S. WEST's total - in nine states for about \$1.65 billion in cash.

Both companies in a statement described the transaction as a move that will enable each to provide better service and advanced products to customers in its core markets, achieving synergy and create immediate and long-term value for shareholders.

The transaction is part of U.S. WEST's strategic effort to sell a small percentage of its local-exchange properties in markets that may be of greater long-term strategic value to other telephone-service providers, the company said.

U.S. West has no plans to sell any access lines in southern Idaho, Reynolds said.

South of the Salmon River, U.S. West is the local service provider for 80 to 90 percent of the area, so it's able to offer customers a comprehensive package of services, he said.

Company officials plan to keep improving that package, Reynolds said, "and plan to operate in southern Idaho for many years to come."

The Lewiston exchanges, however, are in a separate LATA - or Local Access and Transport Area, the name for operating areas of regional Bell companies - than southern Idaho is, he said. So U.S. West isn't allowed to carry long-distance calls from southern Idaho to Lewiston or vice versa.

"It was difficult for us to offer a full range of services in that area" without a long-distance package in Lewiston, Reynolds said.

The announcement did generate criticism from one Idaho group. A Nampa-based nonprofit coalition calling itself Idahoans for a Competitive Edge in Telecommunications issued a statement

Thursday saying the sale agreement indicates phone service for Idaho and the rural West is in jeopardy as U.S. West, the coalition said, begins to dismantle itself and sell off assets.

"The company will use its assets as a cash cow until it sells it off for slaughter. It is an overall strategy to abandon its network and provide cash for offshore Bermuda-based Global Crossing Ltd.," the group's statement said, referring to a recently announced merger plan between U.S. West and Global.

Reynolds's response: "It's not based in any kind of fear. So I'm not sure it merits any kind of response or comment."

The transaction involves certain U.S. WEST local-exchange properties in Arizona, Colorado, Idaho, Iowa, Minnesota, Montana, Nebraska, North Dakota and Wyoming - including the Cottonwood, Craigmont, Grangeville, Kamiah, Kooskia, Lapwai, Lewiston-Clarkston and Nezperce exchanges. The transaction does not include the sale of

# Europe wants lead in effort to rebuild Kosovo

PARIS — When then-Secretary of State Warren Christopher inaugurated the rebuilt Sarajevo airport in August 1996, it seemed entirely natural that America's top diplomat had flown halfway around the world to preside at ceremonies marking the symbolic renewal of war-torn Bosnia.

When the reconstruction of Kosovo is complete, however, it will be a European official who cuts the ribbon.

The United States dominated the military action against Yugoslavia, but there is near-universal agreement that European nations will pay most of the cost of rebuilding the Serbian province.

And in sharp contrast to Bosnia, whose reconstruction was largely American designed, Europe wants to bring the Balkan region into its own sphere. If Europe is going to pay, the thinking goes, it also is going to make the decisions.

Ambitious and as yet unspecified, the goal represents a radical departure in perhaps 10 years' time, it could allow such countries as Macedonia, Albania and even Yugoslavia to join the richest club in the world, the European Union. If so, it would transform the Balkans and mark a new willingness of the wealthier part of Europe to embrace its poorer neighbors.

After years of complaining that the United States interferes in European affairs — then turning to U.S. military power to resolve conflicts — European nations in the last few months have decided to shoulder the burden of peace-time Kosovo more or less alone.

"From now on, all countries of south-east Europe — including the Federal Republic of Yugoslavia — should be anchored into an integrated Europe," German Foreign Minister Joschka Fischer said last week. "Europe is the only perspective that offers a real chance of reconciliation and ending peace to the ethnic groups of the region."

The European Union, with a population and a combined economy comparable to those of the United States, always has had the resources for such enterprises. The EU's expansion to the Balkans would extend a principle — that already has brought in the more developed Eastern European countries Poland, Hungary and the Czech Republic.

But Europe's determination to assume financial and political responsibility for the Balkans is an assumption of authority unprecedented in the EU's 42-year history. Until recently, European leaders have vacillated and disagreed on key foreign policy issues. The huge EU free-trade zone had created a united economy, but never agreement, for instance, on what policy to pursue in Bosnia.

One sign of how that is changing came last week when EU leaders agreed to create a joint defense force, appointed a foreign policy czar and took over the rebuilding of the Balkans.

"Maybe we will say tomorrow that Europe was born in 1999," said an editorial in today's *Le Monde* newspaper. "For this year, several months from the end of the millennium, Europe has finally become the future collective of the nations and the peoples that compose it."

The reconstruction of Kosovo has been likened to the Marshall Plan. That plan to repair the devastation caused by World War II in Europe was a huge investment of money, but it also brought

formerly warring nations together. This fledgling effort is designed to do the same.

Some officials say the bill for rebuilding Kosovo could be \$1 billion a year for several years. European Commission President Romano Prodi has put the cost of all aid to the region — including aid to induce neighboring countries to enact Western-style economic reforms — at as much as \$5 billion a year for six years.

The European Union budget is \$100 billion per year, including funds for aid to countries on the periphery of the EU. Peace will cost more than war. The bombing campaign against Yugoslavia cost between \$2.5 billion and \$4 billion,

according to defense analysts. The United States paid the largest share by far, between \$1.8 billion and \$3 billion. These expenses do not include the cost of the peacekeeping force.

The immediate need will be housing for returning refugees whose houses have been destroyed, to provide heat and electricity to those houses and to repair the infrastructure of roads and rail.

"What is in place is a broken infrastructure, a broken economy, no health system, no education system, no law and order, no civilization," said Rory O'Sullivan, the World Bank's special representative for Balkan reconstruction.

"Everything has to be done."

Europe's enthusiastic embrace of Kosovo reconstruction has failed to resolve a central problem, however. While Yugoslav President Slobodan Milosevic remains in power, countries and agencies will not provide aid to Serbia, Yugoslavia's dominant republic.

While Milosevic is in charge, there is no question of giving aid to Serbia. But how can we deal with the problem on the regional level if we leave Serbia aside? asked Yves-Thibault de Silguy, EU commissioner for monetary and economic affairs. "There is a real political problem that I think will hamper the process of financing the reconstruction."

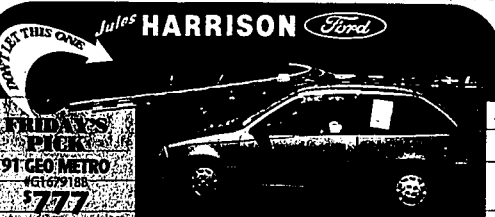

## THE ACES ON BRIDGE

"I do not mind lying, but I hate inaccuracy." — Samuel Butler

"I couldn't make it," asserted South, "because of who has the diamond king. I had four tricks. North challenged the accuracy of South's excuse. Perfect defense would have ensured defeat. However, after the defense slipped, South should have made his game. West led his spade queen followed by his jack, dummy ducked twice, and South ruffed East's ace on the third round. Facing two rounds of trumps, he led his diamond jack, hoping to catch West napping. The "impossible" line was to East's king, and East's club shift derailed the game. With only one discard on dummy's diamonds, South had to concede two spades and a trick in cashonor for one down.

"It was an insult to me to expect him not to cover your jack," chastised North. "Better to go after your only legitimate chance." After West fails to shift to clubs at least three, South should lead to play for a defensive bluff. He should ruff the third spade, cash his jack and ace of trumps, and lead a low diamond from dummy. If East takes his king and shifts to clubs, it's too late. South wins, cashes his diamond jack, and crosses to dummy's trump queen. He discards both club losers on dummy. A Q of diamonds and claims 10 winners.

If East bravely ducks his diamond king, South wins his jack, returns to dummy's diamond ace, and ruffs dummy's second ace. As long as East does not hold four diamonds, South holds his losses to only two spades and a club and scores his vulnerable game.

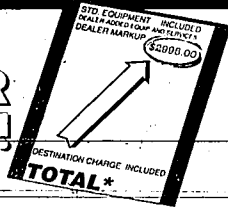
