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Judge: Brigade can proceed

ELKO, Nev. — A federal judge has denied a U.S. Justice Department attempt to block a citizens' revolt aimed at working on the remote South Canyon Road near Jarbridge, Nev., over the Fourth of July holiday. At the conclusion of arguments Thursday, U.S. District Judge Philip Pro ruled the government didn't prove work by the Shovel

Ruling says feds didn't prove irreparable harm to trout

Brigade would cause irreparable harm to the threatened bull trout or violate the Clean Water Act. Pro also denied the government's argument that protesters would be trespassing because they failed to obtain necessary U.S. Forest Service permits. Pro said he was reluctant to issue a restraining order because it came too close to infringing on First Amendment rights of free

speech and assembly. The ruling relieved Shovel Brigade leaders, who say the rally will go on as planned. "I think this is a great day for local government and is a step in the right direction for us in the West who are tired of the government telling us what is best for us," Demar Dahl, one of the organizers of the Shovel Brigade, said in a news release.

Organizers expect up to 5,000 people for the two-day event in the tiny town of Jarbridge on the Nevada-Idaho line. The 1 1/2 mile section of dirt road, washed out by a flood in 1995, has become a symbol of resentment in the West over federal control of public lands. Elko County leaders say the Forest Service promised to fix the road that leads to camp-



grounds, but never did. While denying the injunction, Pro said the Justice Department has other means to enforce laws, and added that his ruling shouldn't be construed as approval of any possible violations of federal law.

Controversy draws a crowd in Filer

FILER — A day after officials said they would take another look at the county's 2-year-old livestock ordinance, Filer and Buhl area residents focused their attention on large dairy operations.

"We're not after the mom and pop dairies, we're after the industrial-sized dairies," Filer resident Ed Smith said at a meeting to dis-

cuss dairies and their impacts. The meeting, which packed the auditorium at Filer Middle School, was not attended by dairymen or county officials, although officials from the state's Division of Environmental Quality and Department of Agriculture did attend. Several speakers at Thursday's meeting commented on the absence of county officials, who had been invited. Speakers said the battle has

just begun in Twin Falls County, over large livestock operations that neighbors say are forcing them from their homes and ruining their livelihoods. "We want to get a broader base than we have. Tonight's meeting is not a final shot, it's kind of the first salvo," said Len Miracle, a Filer resident and organizer of Thursday's meeting. The debate could center on a citizens' committee to review Twin Falls County's livestock

ordinance, passed in 1998 after more than three years of work. County commissioners Wednesday said they supported forming a citizens' panel. Commissioner Gary Grindstaff acknowledged problems with the county's ordinance and with odors from several large dairies. "I know folks are not happy with how many cows we have in the county and they want some

Court: Couple faces trial

Justices focus on issue of intent

BOISE — A Twin Falls couple will face trial on first-degree murder charges after the Idaho Supreme Court Thursday reversed a District Court judge's earlier decision to reduce the charges to second-degree murder.

The Supreme Court's unanimous decision ended 15 months of waiting for Richard Dale Cheatham, 42, and Alicia Nicole Duyungan, 22, who were supposed to go on trial in April 1999 in connection with the 1997 killing of Wayne Lafferty.

But the trial was delayed when the Idaho attorney general's office appealed District Judge Daniel Meehl's decision to reduce the charges to second-degree murder. Meehl ruled prosecutors did not provide enough evidence to show the defendants intended to rob Lafferty when he was killed, so the case did not meet the requirements of Idaho's felony murder rule.

Under the felony murder rule, a defendant can be charged with first-degree murder if a homicide was committed during the commission of another felony. In this case the state is trying to prove Cheatham and Duyungan intended to rob Lafferty before they killed him.

The Supreme Court agreed with Meehl's ruling — saying that if the prosecution cannot prove the defendants' intent to rob Lafferty, the felony murder rule doesn't apply. But the Supreme Court disagreed with Meehl on whether sufficient evidence existed to prove intent. It reversed Meehl's decision, saying there was at least enough evidence to

Dangerous docs Secret database keeps tabs on physicians' problems

WASHINGTON — In a database kept secret from patients, the government has recorded the names of nearly 500 doctors and dentists across the country who have been slapped with at least 10 disciplinary actions and malpractice payments over the last decade. One of every seven U.S. doctors and one of every eight dentists has at least one malpractice payment or

disciplinary report in the National Practitioners Data Bank, which the Department of Health and Human Services has been compiling since 1990.

Consumer advocates and a key congressional Republican are pressing to disclose the names to help patients shop for doctors. Medical experts oppose such a release, fearing the data is skewed by malpractice insurance settlements. "I don't feel that I'm dangerous to

my patients at all. I feel like I've always acted in my patients' best interests," said Dr. Gary Hall, a Phoenix ophthalmologist who has paid \$2.5 million in malpractice claims and is listed 27 times in the federal database.

Hall was censured last year by the Arizona Board of Medical Examiners, fined \$15,000, placed on three years probation and barred

Fire burns radioactive waste sites at Hanford

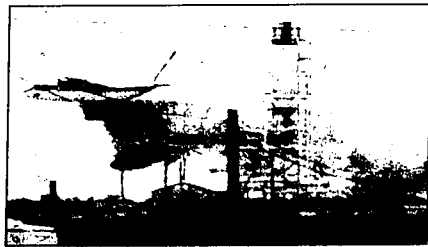

RICHLAND, Wash. — Crews were making headway Thursday against a wildfire that gobbled at least 150,000 acid acres on and around the Hanford nuclear reservation and burned across three old radioactive waste sites. No radiation releases had been detected by state or federal air-monitoring devices, Department of Energy spokeswoman Julie Erickson told an afternoon news briefing.

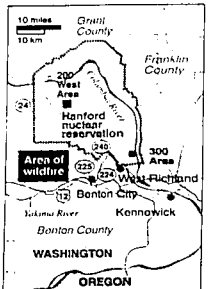
Homes burn too — B2

Followup tests were planned on vegetation samples and air-monitoring filters flown to a state lab in Olympia, said state Health Department spokeswoman Debra McBaum. Initial samples of smoke from the fire detected no radiation hazard, the Health Department said.

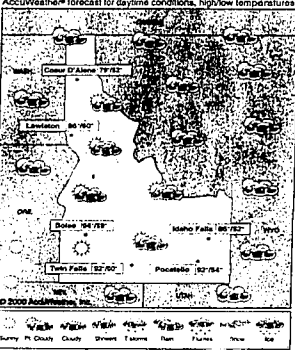

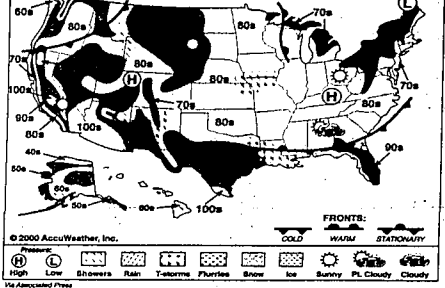

Federal officials have said any attempt to dig out the road would violate federal law. Shovel Brigade leaders have maintained they will not conduct any work near the Farbridge River, home of the nation's southernmost population of bull trout.

Elko County commissioners Wednesday said they would more time to consider a proposed agreement that would give the county the right-of-way, but not ownership, of South Canyon Road.

Commissioners listened to public comments for more than three hours before voting unanimously to delay action until after the Fourth of July.

The proposed agreement came out of a mediation involving the county, federal government, state of Nevada and the three organizers of the "Farbridge Rebellion," a group that advocates reopening the road.

Under the proposal, the Forest Service would complete an environmental impact statement within a year to restore South Canyon Road. If it is determined that the road could be opened without violating Environmental Protection Agency guidelines and without endangering bull trout, the federal government would rebuild it.

Elko County would contribute \$150,000 in cash, materials and labor. The county would be given the right-of-way and would be responsible for maintenance.

Justice Department attorneys would resolve a second potential lawsuit asking the county to pay fines for Clean Water Act violations, when county crews

changes, so we'll see what comes out of it," he said before Thursday night's meeting.

Doug Howard, regional administrator with DEQ's Twin Falls office, said his agency would help the citizens' committee.

"The DEQ would lend some expertise," Howard said.

Darcy Thornbrow of Filer, who sat on the original committee that helped draw up the county's current ordinance, said she is collecting names of people interested in being on the committee.

"We have some good input from the past that we can use," Thornbrow said at Thursday's meeting.

The debate also could center on a familiar request—a push for a livestock moratorium, opposed by commissioners in the past.

This time, longtime Twin Falls resident David Mead and Buhl resident Bob DeJinhaus are pushing the moratorium idea. They made their request to commissioners earlier this month.

from performing one type of eye surgery, radial keratotomy.

Being identified as one of the doctors with the most records in the database "makes you look very guilty," he acknowledged. But he said most of the malpractice cases were settled by insurers "for economic reasons" without his consent.

Federal law requires insurance companies, hospitals and state and federal health care regulators to report malpractice payments and disciplinary actions against doctors, dentists and other health care providers. It is a voluntary compliance system—with no auditing by the government—and nearly 60 percent of hospitals have yet to make a report.

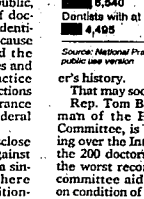
The government provides a version of the database to the public, but strips out the names of doctors and dentists and other identifying information. That's because the 1986 law that created the database allows the identities and most details of the malpractice payments and disciplinary actions to be shared only with insurance companies, hospitals and federal and state health regulators.

Although many states disclose their disciplinary actions against doctors, dentists and other health care providers, patients don't have a single national repository where they can check their practitioner

Nation: Storms speckled the Southeast and Plains and the West stayed fair and dry Wednesday, while partly to mostly cloudy skies covered the Northeast.

at about noon Thursday, the fire burned over a former radioactive waste-disposal area near the site of the 560-square-mile Energy Department's Hanford. An agency news release said DDE and the state set up radiation-monitoring sites nearby to check for possible airborne contamination.

The site, called a "crib," was used to store low-level radioactive liquid waste during plutonium production. Waste was piped to the area to percolate through the soil. Erickson compared it to an underground septic system.

At some point the fire also burned over two waste-storage ponds that had not been used for many years, Erickson said. They were dry and overgrown with vegetation.

"The plan is to continue monitoring after the fire is contained," said Katie Larson, another DOE spokeswoman. Hanford firefighting personnel are equipped with dosimeters to detect radiation.

All three sites are near the center of the reservation, where firefighters were working to extinguish two "hot spots" Thursday, Erickson said.

The fire was at least 40 percent contained, Erickson said.

The 700 firefighters at the scene by midday Thursday. Tankers were dropping flame retardant on parts of the fire.

At least 73 structures, including 20 homes, were destroyed and approximately 7,000 people were evacuated at the height of the blaze Wednesday, though they were allowed back into their homes Thursday afternoon. One man was seriously burned and 13 people were treated for smoke inhalation. One firefighter was treated for a minor leg injury.

U.S. Energy Secretary Bill Richardson was headed to Hanford and planned to survey the damage Friday. Gov. Gary Locke was on site earlier Thursday.

Hanford, which contains the nation's largest volume of nuclear waste, was established to help build the atomic bomb during World War II. Today, its workers clean up radioactive and hazardous waste created during 40 years of plutonium production for nuclear weapons.

Congress approves first campaign financing restrictions in two decades

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress approved the first restrictions on campaign financing in two decades Thursday, sending President Clinton legislation that forces tax-exempt political organizations to reveal who is paying for their campaign-style TV ads, radio spots and other activities.

Clinton promised to sign the bill, meaning those reports should be available before this fall's elections.

The bill, approved by an overwhelming majority in the Senate on Thursday, would leave many interest groups free to continue broadcasting commercials without naming their donors. And groups affected by the legislation may reorganize themselves under the tax laws to avoid disclosure.

But backers argued it was crucial to preserving one of the pillars of post-Watergate reforms: public disclosure.

"Today is only the first step," said Sen. John McCain, R-Ariz., who led a bipartisan group of lawmakers as they rolled the measure past GOP leaders in the House and Senate. "It is indeed a great day for democracy."

The bill only requires disclosure of donations made after it becomes law. Some backers feared GOP leaders might drag their feet in sending the bill to the White House, and supporters speculated that affected groups were now scrambling to raise money before the bill is signed.

Despite initial opposition from Republican leaders, the legisla-

tion was approved by huge majorities in each chamber of Congress. It passed the Senate 92-6 Thursday.

Even the Senate's fiercest opponent of campaign finance reform urged his GOP colleagues — particularly those up for re-election — to vote yes.

"I do not think this is a spear worth falling on four months before an election," said Sen. Mitch McConnell, R-Ky., who was joined by just five other senators in voting against the bill.

He noted the legislation only affects groups that organize under the increasingly popular section 527 of the tax code, which is reserved for groups created for political purposes.

Elected officials free of drug tests

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court just said "no" Thursday to a state's plan to require its elected officials to take random drug tests.

The justices refused without comment to revive a Louisiana law that allowed such random testing.

Louisiana officials had argued that the tests, even if they required of people not suspected of any crime, would not violate the Constitution's ban on unreasonable searches because the state has "special needs" to deter drug use.

The nation's highest court in 1977 ruled in a Georgia case that states cannot force political candidates to take drug tests merely to demonstrate the government's commitment to the war on drugs.

Louisiana's drug-testing law focused not on candidates but on "elected officials." The law required elected officials, except for judges, to undergo random tests to ensure they "are persons of integrity, sound judgment, reliability and seriousness of purpose."

The officials were to be tested for illegal drugs including marijuana, opiates, cocaine and amphetamines. An official who failed two tests could end up before a public hearing, be censured and fined up to \$10,000.

The law was challenged in federal court by Avery C. Alexander and Arthur A. Morrell, state lawmakers representing Orleans Parish.

A federal judge struck down the law, and the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals upheld that ruling in late 1998.

"The public's interest in preventing drug abuse among elected officials, while not insignificant, cannot supersede one of the Constitution's most fundamental proscriptions," the appeals court said.

Court orders abortion study

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court ordered lower courts Thursday to study two states' bans on "partial-birth" abortions in light of its ruling that struck down a similar law in Nebraska.

The justices ordered federal appeals courts to take a new look at laws from Illinois and Wisconsin under the standards set by Wednesday's 5-4 ruling, which said the Nebraska law created an "undue burden" on women's right to end their pregnancies.

In a separate order, the court let stand a ruling that struck down Iowa's partial-birth abortion law the same day Nebraska's was declared invalid by a federal appeals court.

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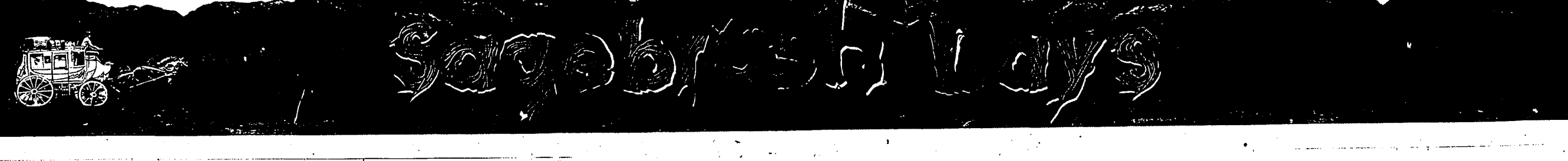

Feds continue to stumble over Jarbidge road issue

The impasse over reconstruction of a road near Jarbidge, Nev., illustrates Uncle Sam's growing intransigence on the issue of access to public lands. The dispute over South Canyon Road isn't just about road building. It is about control.

The final mile and a half of the road was washed away by the West Fork of the Jarbidge River in 1995. Over the objections of locals, the Humboldt-Toiyabe National Forest chose not to rebuild the South Canyon Road, but since become a rallying point for thousands of people fed up with federal land management in the West.

The dispute is now an embarrassment to the feds. This is an issue with legs, and it's gaining momentum. So how does Uncle Sam deal with it? By seeking an injunction to bar the peaceful assembly of people who want the road rebuilt. Remember, this isn't about roads anymore; it's about control.

Fortunately, a judge in Reno rejected the injunction request on Thursday. U.S. District Judge Philip Pro said the Jarbidge River, along with its resident bull trout, would survive this weekend's rendezvous of the Jarbidge Shovel Brigade. He also said the Justice Department failed to prove its claim that the Shovel Brigade would violate the Clean Water Act.

Perhaps more significantly, Pro rejected the argument that Shovel Brigade members would be trespassing because - you'll love this - they failed to obtain the necessary permits from the U.S. Forest Service. Good ol' Smokey Bear, spending your tax dollars to keep you off of public lands.

The Shovel Brigade isn't a terrorist organization. It's simply a collection of ranchers, miners, loggers, off-road vehicle enthusiasts and other public lands users. They've grown weary of Uncle Sam's imperious way of barring the public from public lands.

So now they're getting together, en masse, for a Fourth of July hootenanny near Jarbidge. Though armed with 10,000 shovels, organizers concede they can't open the road. They've vowed not to conduct any work near the river, which is home to a threatened population of bull trout.

Thus, the event promises to be long on indignant oratory - and short on actual earth moving. Is that so wrong?

If we are free to burn Old Glory on the steps of the courthouse, we certainly should be free to gather in Jarbidge for a weekend of bellyaching about the government.

To your credit, the feds have proposed a settlement that could allow everyone to retreat from South Canyon Road with dignity.

The offer - on which Elko County commissioners won't decide until after the Fourth of July - would allow the road to be rebuilt, but only if construction wouldn't pollute the Jarbidge River and further threaten the trout. The agreement also would absolve Elko County of fines for alleged violations of the Endangered Species Act and the Clean Water Act.

It could be a genuine attempt to solve a simmering problem, or it could be a ploy to divert attention and buy more time. Either way, the sincerity of the government's offer remains to be seen.

The Supremes are singing off-key

For more than 50 years, since a 1947 case called "Everson," the Supreme Court has been getting it wrong on religion. In that long-gone case, the Court ruled that what the federal government was prohibited from doing - establishing a national church - the states also could not do. Fifteen years later, activist leader Madalyn Murray O'Hair successfully challenged prayer and Bible reading in public schools, and it's been downhill for certain expressions of religious views ever since.

In his dissenting opinion on the latest case, which forbids student-led prayer at public-school football games, Chief Justice William Rehnquist said the majority opinion "bristles with hostility to all things religious in public life." He is right, of course. But the decision offers an opportunity for religious believers if they will seize it.

The greater power to do good lies within individuals, not the state. Conservative Christians, especially, are fooling themselves when they think public prayers are a sign that all must be right with the world. Such prayers before football games do nothing for the quality of the game, and there is no evidence, nor could there be, of fewer injuries because God's name has been invoked over the loudspeaker.

Furthermore, such prayers trivialize the act of prayer. No less an authority than Jesus spoke about public displays of worship when He said of the Pharisees (the fundamentalists of His day): "Everything they do is done for men to see. They make their phylacteries wide

and the tassels on their garments long; they love the place of honor at banquets and the most important seats in the synagogues; they love to be greeted in the marketplaces and to have men call them 'Rabbi'."

Elsewhere, Jesus has this advice on prayer: "Be careful not to do your acts of righteousness before men, to be seen by them.... And when you pray, do not be like the hypocrites, for they love to pray standing in the synagogues and on the street corners to be seen by men.... But when you pray, go into your room, close the door and pray to your Father, who is in secret."

The Supreme Court said nothing at all about that far more powerful and effective type of prayer. But in our culture, which highly values what the world values (fame, stadiums, television appearances and other visible expressions of "success"), things done out of public view don't count for much. In fact, the only kind of faith that actually does work is that which is first practiced. St. Francis of Assisi is credited with the statement: "Preach the gospel. Use words if necessary."

The behavior the Court did not and cannot proscribe is the kind that will make a far greater impression than

teenagers praying at high-school football games. It is the behavior that begins with the discipline of deeds, including prayer for one's enemies, visiting those in prison, feeding the hungry, clothing the naked and caring for widows and orphans. Conservative Christians ought to stop looking to the state for permission and validation and start looking to God for their commission and marching orders. With this kind of faith, they won't have to petition government. Government will petition them to find out why what they're doing works.

If and when they do, they will find they are exerting real influence. They will stop believing that public displays of their faith are changing anything, from the outcome of football games to the transformation of culture. Their influence is needed more than ever, but it will not be felt so long as they settle for a lesser, worldly power, which is really no power at all.

People with faith that the next election will turn the Court and the nation over to their way of thinking might wish to consider that three of the justices who voted to prohibit prayer at football games were appointed by Republican presidents. If George W. Bush is elected president, who can guarantee any judges named by him will not also lean to the left? Whether they do or don't should have no effect on the prayer life or acts of people who worship an authority higher than the state.

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Life flourishes along Maine river after breaching of dam

A year after giant backhoes tore down a dam that had blocked the Kennebec River in Maine for 162 years, sea-run fish are swimming upstream in stunning numbers and the water is more full of life than it's been in generations.

Little River to American and hickory shad, alewives, shortnose and Atlantic sturgeon and striped bass, American Rivers says.

Conservationists say something else has been accomplished in the months that have passed since Edwards Dam was demolished.

On Maine's Kennebec, alewives migrated back from the ocean in such numbers this spring that people were scooping them by the bucketful from the water 20 miles upstream from where the Edwards Dam once sat.

"It has made people realize that dam removal isn't a crazy idea," said Margaret Bowman of American Rivers, which also is targeting other dams around the country including four on the lower Snake River in Washington.

Atlantic salmon had found their way to their native waters above the former dam site just weeks after Edwards was gone, and so many striped bass were back that fly fishermen were having a field day on the upper Kennebec.

Since the Edwards Dam's removal, two dozen smaller dams in other states have come down and at least 18 others are scheduled to be removed this summer or fall, according to American Rivers.

Recently, sturgeon have been seen leaping from waters where they had been absent since the days of Henry David Thoreau.

For example, the removal of the Rains Mill Dam in North Carolina opened 49 miles of historic spawning grounds on 400

In the stretch of river just above the dam site, water quality has improved to a point where it supports a healthy river ecosystem, say state environmental offi-

cial, who see more creatures and a more varied range of life in the river.

And on the surface, canoes slowly ply the water that was once roiled below the timber-and-concrete hydroelectric dam that was targeted by conservationists and sport fishermen a decade before Edwards finally came down.

Environmentalists call the Kennebec's revival a monumental success story. "Hopefully, what it will do is help other people's attitudes as they look at other dams" that may be ripe for removal, said Andy Goode of the American Salmon Federation.

Edwards Dam was built in 1837 to provide riverside factories in Augusta with mechanical power. On July 1, 1999, church bells tolled, Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt watched and hundreds of other spectators cheered as workers gouged an opening that let water flow through the dam that had spanned 917 feet of the Kennebec.

With its relatively low power output and advanced age, Edwards had long been targeted by conservationists nationally as a prime candidate for removal.

When its owners sought relicensing in 1997, the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission ruled that more benefit would be gained by opening the river to several species of sea-run fish than by keeping Edwards' power generators humming.

Edwards became the first hydroelectric dam in the country ordered removed by the government against its owners' wishes.

Edison Electric Institute, which represents shareholder-owned utilities that produce 75 percent of the nation's electricity, still believes FERC overstepped its dam relicensing authority when it ordered Edwards removed.

Moreover, EEI is concerned about the impact the dam's removal could have on the country's overall energy supply, said spokesman Dan Riedinger. "We don't want to see anything erode our ability to have a variety of sources of electricity available to us," said Riedinger.

Considering rising fuel costs and the growing demand for clean energy, hydroelectric power "should be considered a

sensible energy source," said Riedinger, adding it is by far the largest source of renewable energy in the country.

Unswayed by such arguments, environmentalists want to see four dams on the lower Snake River in Washington breached in order to protect wild salmon runs. U.S. Sen. Slade Gorton, R-Wash., has pledged to prevent their removal, which he said could cost the government \$1 billion.

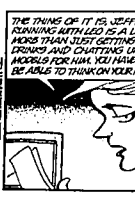
"Removal of Edwards doesn't prove the Snake River dams should be removed," said Bowman of American Rivers, which is a leader of the Washington effort. "But it shows that rivers can restore themselves when given the chance to do so."

Of the dams that have come out, Goode said he has seen only positive results. "I don't know of any dam removals that are horror stories," said Goode.

Still, Goode acknowledges that the economic stakes are much different in other regions, notably the West.

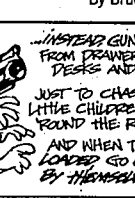

CDC issues warning on meningitis at colleges

ATLANTA — College freshmen living in dorms should be told about the risks of contracting meningitis, and a vaccine should be made available to those who want it, the government said Thursday.

The recommendation was issued by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

The rate of meningitis among college students living in dormitories is about 4.6 per 100,000, higher than that of any age group other than children under 2. Still, the rate for college students falls under the threshold for a mandatory vaccination campaign of 10 per 100,000.

"We are pleased the CDC has finally published its recommendation regarding college students and the increasing threat of meningococcal disease on campus," said David Spilker, president of the Meningitis Foundation of America.

Meningitis strikes as many as 3,000 Americans each year and is responsible for about 300 deaths annually. Symptoms include headache, fever and a stiff neck.

Government delays taking eagle off endangered list

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is not ready to remove the American bald eagle from the endangered species list in time for the Fourth of July after a presidential veto.

President Clinton announced on July 2, 1999, that the bald eagle was back from the brink of extinction after a three-decade struggle and was expected to be removed from the endangered species list by July 2000.

But a Fish and Wildlife spokeswoman in Washington said Thursday that the move has been delayed and that she does not know when it will happen.

"It's not going to happen in July," spokeswoman Cindy Hoffman said. She said government lawyers are trying to figure out whether existing federal law can be interpreted to protect the birds' habitat once the bald eagle is taken off the endangered species list.

"It's taking a little longer than we thought. We want to make sure we do it right," she said.

Senate moves to prevent genetic bias in insurance

WASHINGTON — Spurred by

the landmark announcement Monday that the text of the human genetic code is nearly in hand, the Senate on Thursday voted to bar insurance companies from denying policies to people based on their genetic predisposition to disease.

On a vote of 58-40, the Senate endorsed a proposal by Sen. James M. Jeffords, R-Vt., that offered new but milder limits on insurers than most Democrats liked. Three Democrats joined Republicans in supporting the measure.

Current law bars insurers from denying coverage to the 170 million people in group health plans based on genetic testing, or from raising premiums on an individual in a group plan based on the tests. The Jeffords measure would extend those protections to the 13 million people who obtain insurance as individuals.

Democrats said that the Jeffords proposal lacked several important protections, including provisions to stop insurers from revealing the results of genetic tests to other parties, such as employers. "It's not half a loaf; it's no more than a thin slice," Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., said of the Republican measure.

The legislation's future is uncertain. It is attached to a huge appropriations bill that President Clinton has threatened to veto for unrelated reasons.

Branch Davidson case stays alive after judge's decision

WACO, Texas — A federal judge on Thursday refused to dismiss wrongful death claims by Branch Davidson survivors and family members.

Government attorneys argued that the plaintiffs, who wrapped up their case against the government at midmorning, had failed to prove their claims.

U.S. District Judge Walter Smith denied the motion without comment and instructed the government to begin its defense.

The plaintiffs are seeking \$675 million in the deaths of more than 80 people on two days in 1993, when the government raided the sec's complex and on the final day of the group's standoff

with the government, when the complex caught fire.

Clinton should postpone missile decision, experts say

WASHINGTON — Forty-five U.S. experts on China have written to President Clinton urging him to delay his decision on building a national missile defense. They argue that a "precipitous decision" would increase tensions and lead China to accelerate the modernization of its relatively small nuclear arsenal.

"U.S. plans for (national missile defense) are viewed by China as a sign of increased hostility toward their country," they wrote in a letter to the president Thursday.

At the Pentagon, spokesman Kenneth Bacon said Defense Secretary William Cohen will travel to Beijing next month to discuss missile defense and other security issues with his Chinese counterpart and possibly with President Jiang Zemin.

Cohen will stress that the U.S. plan for missile defense "is not a system we're building in response to what China is doing" and is entirely defensive in nature, Bacon said. He said the Pentagon is convinced China will continue modernizing its military forces regardless of whether the United States has missile defense.

Declaration of independence copy sells for \$8.1 million

NEW YORK — A 1776 copy of the Declaration of Independence sold for \$8.14 million Thursday in an electronic auction on Sotheby's Web site.

The auction house said the price was the highest for any item ever sold on the internet and for any American historical document.

Two would-be buyers fought for the copy, posting 29 separate bids that began at \$4 million and ended at \$7.4 million. Sotheby's commission brought the price to \$8.14 million.

The buyer's name was not immediately released, the seller was Visual Equities, an Atlanta fine art investment firm.

The copy was produced by John Dunlap, a Philadelphia printer, the night of July 4, 1776.

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"Are we going to have a better chance of compromise after the July Fourth recess? I very much doubt it," Rockefeller said.

Clinton has threatened to veto any bill reaching his desk that looks like the House GOP measure. It would rely on a blend of private insurance companies and federal subsidies to spread coverage nationwide.

Prescription drug question moves to Senate

WASHINGTON (AP) — Republicans are hailing their House-passed prescription drug bill as a historic new Medicare benefit, but its prospects are iffy in the Senate and President Clinton has threatened a veto to force major changes in a measure Democrats claim is an election-year scam.

"This plan is sound, it is in Medicare. It is an entitlement program and it is a guaranteed benefit," Rep. Bill Thomas, R-Calif., a chief architect of the GOP plan, said Wednesday night as the measure cleared the House in a close, mostly party-line vote, 217-214.

House Speaker Dennis Hastert, R-Ill., said he had received assurances from Senate Majority Leader Trent Lott, R-Miss., that "they are going to take it up," and added that his door was open for negotiations with Democrats.

"We've always said we're willing to sit down with the president," Hastert said.

Meanwhile, Sen. William Roth, R-Del., who chairs the Senate Finance Committee, said his panel was working behind closed doors on bipartisan Medicare legislation he would like to begin action on in July, after Congress returns from its Independence Day break.

Committee Democrat Sen. Jay Rockefeller of West Virginia said he wasn't confident that the result would be a viable bill, however.

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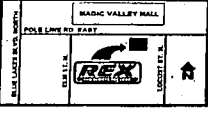

Big schools benefit most from lottery

TWIN FALLS - Boise schools used their \$1.1 million 1999 lottery payment to help build a new occupational education building, while Avery School in northern Idaho used its \$1,276 share to buy new windows for the gym. Money the Idaho Lottery raised for public

schools in fiscal year 2000 won't be distributed until later this summer, but the lottery announced this week public schools will split half an \$18 million dividend check with the state Permanent Building Fund.

So, the Idaho Department of Education will distribute \$9 million in lottery revenue to public school districts based on their average attendance. And that means

bigger districts get more money. Boise had more than 26,700 students compared with Avery's 32 pupils in the 1999-2000 school year.

More than 10 percent of Idaho's public school students attend Boise schools. During the lottery's first 10 years the district has received more than 10 percent of the \$88.6 million in dividends distributed to public schools. That compares with

Avery's \$15,863.

Among Magic Valley schools, the differences aren't that extreme but remain large. Twin Falls School District, the region's largest with about 7,000 students, received more than \$305,000 in 1999 and bought technology infrastructure. That compares with \$368 the nine-student Three Creek school used for sidewalks.

New challenges come to recreation

TWIN FALLS - Standing atop a mountain, a U.S. Forest Service recreation technician points to a clearly visible dirt road a mile away, curving up a hillside. All-terrain vehicles travel the road regularly, Max Yingst said, leaving marks carved into the mountain.

"That is not a designated trail. It just formed," he said. It's a symbol of how recreation has changed over the years, and how some officials say recreation will have more impact on public lands than uses such as logging and mining.

"To me, recreation is going to become the biggest impact on our public lands," Forest Service district ranger Pete Peterson told Cassia and Twin Falls county commissioners during a tour of a portion of the Sawtooth National Forest that straddles the two counties.

For the Forest Service, proper land management is crucial. Preventing hazardous roads from forming, for example, will keep the Forest Service being forced to close roads in the future. "From my point of view, it's a lot easier telling someone they can't do something, than to stop them from doing something," Peterson said. "Maybe that

route's OK, but we don't want another one on the other side of the mountain."

Recreation today is not our fathers' recreation, Peterson said. Cars and trucks are bigger, often pulling good-sized loads, which means parking doesn't go very far anymore.

The Magic Mountain ski area and the Diamondfield Jack snowmobiling area, within 1 1/2 miles of each other, sometimes make for congested winter traffic, Yingst said. And with snowmobile bans

elsewhere, the Sawtooth forest might have to be more accommodating. That means strategic planning, good trailheads and a good road system, Peterson said.

But there's also a question of where to draw the line. "Do you just keep expanding for them? That's a tough one," Cassia County Commissioner Paul Christensen said.

As recreation grows and changes, so do the burdens placed on taxpayers who maintain the county roads leading there. Regular snowplowing

becomes a higher priority when the vehicles visiting an area are 30-foot RVs with snowmobiles in tow, Yingst said.

"It's not just snowmobiles, it's how they get the snowmobiles up here," Yingst said.

According to the state Department of Parks and Recreation, Idaho had 20,000 registered snowmobiles in 1988; 10 years later, the number had reached 38,000.

Twin Falls County Commissioner Bill Brockman acknowledged counties are obligated to maintain the roads leading to recreation sites.

"It may still even be a cost we bear, to keep kids out of trouble," he said. Part of the challenge is making sure increased use doesn't lead to increased pollution. At Maggie Basin on Rock Creek, water quality is a concern, and hypodermic needles have been found in the area, posing a threat to other users and Forest Service employees.

Brockman said he's concerned that grazers or dairymen could suffer because of the actions of recreation users. No one knows exactly what is contaminating Rock Creek, he said, and it could be campers.

The trick is not discouraging recreation users, by taking away what drew them in the first place. "We don't want to keep people from doing what they want to do," Peterson said.

Lawyer resigns from bar

Action lets man avoid disbarment

BOISE - A former Twin Falls lawyer charged with mishandling a client's money and then lying about it resigned from the Idaho State Bar instead of facing possible disbarment.

M. Gary Atkinson faced four other counts but resigned in late April before disciplinary hearings were held. The resignation does not admit or deny the allegations, but it means Atkinson cannot practice law in Idaho for at least five years, the same punishment as being disbarred.

Very few lawyers in that position have ever even tried to return to practice, Idaho State Bar lawyer Michael Oths said. In his 14 years with the bar Oths has seen some try, but they all failed, he said.

In a complaint filed before the Idaho State Bar's Professional Conduct Board, bar lawyer JoAnn Bowen charged Atkinson with misappropriation, conflict of interest, lack of communication, neglect and two counts of misrepresentation in a disciplinary matter, all violations of the lawyers' rules of professional conduct.

Atkinson's lawyer, Dan Grober, declined comment on the case.

Half of the charges arose from Atkinson's dealings with Virgil and Judy Wilson, who sent the lawyer in 1995 to help with their estate planning. Atkinson convinced the Wilsons to liquidate 18 annuities and life insurance policies, put the money in a living trust and then use the money to buy a new life insurance policy, the complaint says.

More than \$826,000 went into a trust account after the liquidation. In September 1995 Atkinson used about \$800,000 of that money to buy a life insurance policy for the Wilsons, leaving nearly \$26,000 left in the trust, the complaint says.

Five months later only \$73.31 of the original \$25,800 remained in the trust account. Atkinson had spent the rest on personal expenses, the complaint says.

Atkinson repaid the Wilsons in September 1996, but the Wilsons

Residents return to see what's left after fire

BENTON CITY, Wash. (AP) — Kristin Peck shot hoops in a driveway basketball court Thursday, 20 feet from the charred, empy remains of the mobile home she'd shared with her grandmother.

When a wildfire raced through pastureland north of town late Wednesday, she only had time to grab a blanket and an album of photographs of her mother, who died when she was 3.

Then the flames came down nearby Rattlesnake Mountain. It wasn't the first time she'd seen a summer wildfire on the mountain. But this time, high winds brought the blaze to her front door.

"We watched it come over the hill. I just saw this wall of fire and it was clear that there wasn't anything... that was going to stop it," said Kristin, a 17-year-old summer lifeguard who seemed unfazed Thursday by the lingering, acrid smell of smoke.

Her father, electronics worker Marty Peck, 43, estimated the flames were traveling at about

40 mph. "You could see it jetting toward us. It was smoky and you couldn't see the flame until it got

right here. And then it exploded on the pasture," he said, sipping water from a neighbor's well. His own was destroyed.

"It was just a fireball two or three times taller than our house," said Peck, sweat beading on his face in the 90-degree heat.

"I thought we were goners." He said he had to leave behind the chickens kept in the field behind the Pecks' two mobile homes.

"I thought I might find some roasted chickens this morning, but they're OK," Peck said.

So was the second mobile home. Just 40 feet from the ruined one. Their barn burned to the ground. One car was destroyed, though a truck in the same driveway was unscathed except for a melted taillight.

"I was amazed at how much was still standing," he said. "I thought it all would be gone."

Flames leaptfrogged through grassy fields near this community of 2,110, leaving a checkerboard pattern of blackened waste and untouched greenery. By Thursday afternoon, the fire had receded back behind Rattlesnake Mountain.

Union: Insurance costs will eat up pay increase

LEWISTON (AP) — Most of the Idaho Department of Correction's 1,400-plus employees will get a 40-cent-an-hour pay hike starting next month.

The 300 entry-level workers also will receive a 5 percent hike, which Gov. Dirk Kempthorne recommended for all entry-level state jobs.

The 5 percent hike will mean an \$1,165 increase to \$23,982 a year for entry-level officers.

The department also will hand out \$400,000 in merit raises in August from its \$2.1 million fund for pay raises, department spokesman Mark Carnopis said.

The Republican-dominated Legislature appropriated 3 percent more for pay raises in the budget year starting in July. About 1,386 of the department's 1,427 employees received the 40-cent-an-hour pay hike, said Carnopis. That is \$832 more for

employees working 40 hours a week for the full year.

The increase means a lot more to a clerk making \$6 an hour than a deputy warden earning \$30, he said.

But Warren Lundquist, business agent for Service Employees International Union Local 687 in Boise, called the hike merely a token that will be cut by increased health insurance costs.

The cost of the most common insurance package for the employees' families will increase \$24 for the next year. Single employees will pay about \$13 more.

The latest study shows salaries of Idaho's correction officers lag 14 percent behind other western states, said Lundquist, whose union represents more than 200 officers in the prisons near Boise.

Carnopis said the Idaho Board of Correction has not discussed raising Director Jim Spalding's \$95,000 salary.

Court: Law limiting jury awards is constitutional

BOISE (AP) — Considering a Blaine County case, the Idaho Supreme Court said a state limit on non-economic damage awards does not unconstitutionally infringe on the right to a jury trial, constitute special legislation or violate the separation of powers.

The unanimous opinion issued Thursday came in response to questions put to the high court by U.S. District Judge Edward Lodge, who presided over last year's malpractice trial of Wood River Medical Center and Dr. Ian Ross Donald, a Ketchum obstetrician.

Bryce Kirkland and his parents, former Carey residents Sandy and Quinn Kirkland, sued a federal jury in June 1999 in one of the largest such verdicts ever returned in Idaho.

The Kirklands, who by then had moved to Hamilton, Mont., alleged Bryce suffered serious brain damage because Mrs.

Kirkland received poor treatment under Donald's care at the hospital when she was pregnant in 1995.

Of the overall jury award, \$18.5 million was for non-economic damages — those not directly related to expenses incurred or expected to be incurred by the Kirklands as a result of Bryce's injuries.

But under Idaho law, the Kirklands were limited to recovery of \$573,000 in non-economic damages from Wood River Medical Center instead of the \$3.75 million awarded by the jury. There was no cap on Donald's liability under that law since the jury specifically found that he had acted recklessly.

Jurors had apportioned 75 percent of the responsibility for Bryce's injuries to the hospital and 25 percent to Donald.

In the Kirklands' suit, Bryce received poor care following an amniocentesis that Donald per-

formed to determine whether the boy could survive a premature birth. Failing to notice Bryce was bleeding after the procedure led to permanent injuries, they alleged.

Before entering a final judgment after the four-week trial, Lodge asked the Supreme Court to consider whether the law limiting non-economic damages violates the Idaho Constitution by infringing on the jury's role as a finder of fact in such cases, by establishing arbitrary, capricious or unreasonable classifications or by infringing on the power of the courts.

In each case the high court found the statute to pass constitutional muster.

Rather than infringing on the jury process, the law "simply limits the legal consequences of the jury's findings," Chief Justice Littleton wrote.

"In this case, the Kirklands had a jury trial during which they

were entitled to present all of their claims and evidence to the jury and have the jury render a verdict based on that evidence," she wrote. "That is all to which the right to a jury entitles them."

Trot said the law does not constitute special legislation because it was part of a larger legislative package aimed at addressing concerns that large civil jury verdicts were driving up the cost of liability insurance. In passing the law, she wrote, the state was acting on "a legitimate interest in protecting the availability of liability insurance for Idaho citizens."

In addition, Trot wrote, since the Legislature clearly may establish states of limitations, create new causes of action and otherwise modify the law, "it necessarily follows that the Legislature also has the power to limit remedies available to plaintiffs without violating the separation of power doctrine."

BOISE - Gov. Dirk Kempthorne's \$85,000-a-year education adviser, former Cassia County school official Tom Morley, was the only one of six gubernatorial policy advisers not granted a pay raise effective June 1.

The pay hikes ranged from water policy adviser Stan Clark's \$1,040 increase to \$43,035 a year to human services and labor policy adviser Tana Shillingstad's \$2,683 hike to \$70,179 a year.

Morley, a former Cassia County School District superintendent, could not be reached for comment Thursday. The governor's office has had little to say about the raises.

"The numbers speak for themselves," said Kempthorne spokesman Mark Snider, who would not elaborate.

"Either they started him too high or he's just not doing as well as we would like to be. I would say the same thing about myself. It's a tough place to make changes."

Law enforcement becomes issue in forest

TWIN FALLS - Parties, firearm use and vandalism are increasing in the Porcupine Springs area in the Sawtooth National Forest, U.S. Forest Service officials say. As a result, adequate law enforcement is becoming an issue.

Rock Creek Road curves in and out of Twin Falls and Cassia counties, alternating jurisdiction between two sheriff's departments. While Twin Falls County supplies deputies to patrol that

area, the Forest Service wants to increase police presence and isn't sure who should provide it.

The Sawtooth forest has one law enforcement officer covering Twin Falls and Cassia counties and also has cooperative agreements with the sheriff's offices in both those counties to provide protection.

District Ranger Pete Peterson asked Cassia County commissioners Thursday whether it would be possible to increase law enforcement in that part of the forest. Peterson wondered whether it might be possible, and more sen-

sible, to put the entire area in Twin Falls County's jurisdiction.

Currently the Forest Service pays Cassia County around \$11,000 a year for law enforcement. Cassia County also patrols Sawtooth forest land elsewhere in Cassia County. Cassia County Commissioner Paul Christensen said everyone who would be involved should discuss it first.

Peterson said it would be difficult for the Forest Service to hire additional officers because of funding. There are only three officers for the entire Sawtooth forest.

Officers find vending machine key in car

BURLEY - A Cassia County deputy discovered a homemade box key used to open vending machines, while looking into a suspicious car parked at Checker Auto in Burley.

No charges were filed. Deputy Chris Jensen and an Idaho State Police trooper noticed the car at around 1:20 a.m. Wednesday, according to a Cassia County police report.

While talking to the man and a woman in the car, the trooper

asked about a small wooden ball that appeared to be part of a drug pipe and asked what it was. Jensen said he realized it was a homemade box key for vending machines, he reported.

The man said he had more keys. According to the report, he said he got some of the keys from a man he had met in prison in Utah and also got codes to cut his own keys. The man in prison had told him the keys were good for vending machines along the highway.

Officers decided there wasn't

enough evidence to file charges at this time, the report said. Officers got written statements from the man, and kept the keys and three bundles of empty paper wrappers found in the car as evidence.

Cassia County Capt. Jim Hignens doesn't think the people in the car are linked to a week-long series of Minidoka vending machine burglaries. Those machines had been severely damaged, as if with clubs, in an attempt to gain entry, Hignens said.

Despite the small appropriations many districts receive, they say it helps stretch money for buildings and equipment needs. It's used for repairs, remodeling, or equipment.

Wendell School District plans to use 2000 lottery revenue to rent a 28-by-70-foot modular classroom building for the middle school campus, Superintendent Larry Manly said. It will cost the district \$1,225 a month and that includes delivery and set up. Lottery money also will be used to pay for the modular classroom's utility hookup costs.

Buhl School District uses lottery revenue to address prioritized building safety needs and energy-cost saving measures, Superintendent Richard Hill said.

In 1999-2000, Buhl received

\$60,908 from the lottery. Buhl's appropriation for the coming school year, like that for other districts, will be determined later this summer.

Overall, Idaho's schools will receive less lottery money from fiscal year 2000 revenue than they did this past school year. Slower ticket sales, combined with a smaller share of revenue earmarked for public buildings are reasons for the drop.

A \$26 million decline in dividends can be attributed to dropping sales, smaller Powerball jackpots and the completion of a \$2 million computer system conversion, Lottery director Robert Ginkel said.

"The average jackpot was down 23 percent," Ginkel said. "Total sales were down four percent."

Total Lottery sales this year

were about \$88 million, said Steve Woodall, deputy director for lottery administration. Schools and state buildings received about 20.5 percent of that revenue, which is less than last year because of the lottery's new Y2K computer accounting system, he said.

Total sales last year were \$91 million with a 23 percent share - \$20.6 million - going toward school and state buildings.

This year's 11th anniversary dividend check brings total revenue for public schools and state buildings, including college campuses, to more than \$196 million.

through on a job, and then lying to investigators, the complaint says.

Atkinson closed his practice in December.

Right to bear arms: Veterans plan to boycott parade over rifles flap

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — Local veterans have declared war on the city ordinance blocking them from marching with guns in parades.

The Kootenai County Veterans Council, representing 10 veterans organizations, said on Wednesday that it would boycott the Fourth of July Parade in Coeur d'Alene unless color guards are allowed to carry rifles.

Instead of marching unarmed in the "American Heroes" parade, the veterans plan to march in Spirit Lake, "which has a council with adult leadership," Kootenai County Commissioner Ron Rankin said.

"That city administration is like the Keystone Kops. They come up with a \$40,000 ordinance that is thrown out the first time it is challenged," Rankin said. "This is a stupid, ill-conceived, ill-planned, ill-informed, ill-considered ordinance."

City Council President Nancy Sue Wallace, in turn, criticized Rankin for meddling in city

affairs. She also disagreed with Sheriff Rocky Watson's attempt at compromise by deputizing veterans.

"I take great offense that one of our commissioners would try to interfere with city government at that level," Wallace said. "If we do decide to revisit the ordi-

nance, we will. But I don't appreciate the pressure from the sheriff, the veterans or Mr. Rankin."

Wallace said the City Council has not discussed making concessions.

"I don't understand why veterans don't want to march in our parade without a gun. Why is it so crucial? Does that make them any less of a veteran?" she asked. "They are still honored with or

without a gun."

The prohibition is contained in one of three laws passed in May 1999 in an effort to tighten control of the Aryan Nations parade. One of those laws bans weapons within 1,000 feet of a parade or public assembly for all but law enforcement officers and active military personnel.

Veterans protested, and city leaders agreed to modify the law so that nationally recognized veterans groups could march armed. But that all changed with a ruling earlier this month from U.S. District Judge Edward Lodge, who dismissed a claim by Gary Edwards that his First Amendment rights were violated.

Edwards, a protester in the 1998 Aryan Nations parade, was arrested after he refused to give up the stick he was using to hold up a protest sign at the event.

But while dismissing his complaint, Lodge wrote that the veterans exemption "does unconstitutionally favor veterans groups over all others and must be found invalid."

Gas prices might not stop travelers

BOISE (AP) — In the year that gasoline prices have eclipsed all records, 37.5 million Americans plan to travel this Fourth of July holiday, according to Triple A of Idaho.

The travel organization said that, based on its Holiday Fuel Gauge Survey, the average price for a gallon of self-serve unleaded gasoline costs \$1.60. That is up two cents from a month ago, but five cents lower than the national average price of \$1.65.

However, motorists will reduce the impact of gasoline costs by staying closer to home, taking fewer trips this summer and reducing the number of days away from home, said Triple A Idaho spokesman Dave Carlson.

In spite of high gas prices — which have climbed above \$2 per gallon in parts of the Midwest — Triple A said car travel will be up

4 percent more than a year ago. Part of that increase is attributable to the July 4 holiday falling on a Tuesday; many travelers are taking a four-day weekend.

"In general, consumer confidence in the economy gives travelers a comfort level with their pocketbook at the pumps," Carlson said. "But they'll use their judgment, too, when counting the total costs to travel this summer."

In the West, 32 percent of the population, or 7.7 million people, are expected to travel 100 miles or more during the July 4 weekend, a 3 percent increase over last year's numbers.

Illinois and Michigan have the highest average prices for self-serve unleaded gasoline at \$1.97. South Carolina and Georgia are the lowest at \$1.47.

The nation's gasoline prices are more than 50 cents higher than a

year ago. High crude oil costs, tight supplies, a federal requirement for reformulated gas in some areas and driver demand all are contributing to the increase.

Woman goes home after attack

PORT TOWNSEND, Wash. (AP) — A woman who was repeatedly stabbed and struck with a baseball bat on a deserted road in southern Idaho has returned home to continue her recovery.

Linda Welsh LeBrane, 52, was released from St. Alphonsus Medical Center in Boise on Saturday.

On June 14 at about 2:30 a.m.,

LeBrane was forced off Interstate 84 near Caldwell by four people. They robbed, grabbed and beat her, then slashed her throat.

She said her car was set on fire before the suspects left her, presumably for dead. LeBrane was lying next to the burning car but managed to crawl 20 feet into a field to escape the flames.

No arrests have been made in the attack.

Officials praise departing regional director of EPA

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — The Environmental Protection Agency's top regional administrator is resigning to take a job as Seattle's deputy mayor and state officials say they will miss his cooperation.

Chuck Clarke, the federal agency's Northwest director based in Seattle since 1994, likely will leave next week and begin his new post on July 17.

Idaho leaders expressed disappointment, but praised Clarke's consensus-building style. Clarke helped Idaho gain an unprecedented role in mine waste cleanup in the Coeur d'Alene River basin.

"I'm really sorry to see Chuck leave," said Steve Allred, Idaho's head environmental official. "I'm going to miss his help."

Clarke and Allred brokered several pivotal cleanup policy decisions; one included ensuring Idaho took the main role in a study of lead's impact on human health.

The two also provided over negotiations to settle a lawsuit filed by the Coeur d'Alene Tribe and the federal Justice Department against Silver Valley mining companies.

Tribal leaders expect little to change once Clarke departs, a spokesman said. In fact, they say a settlement concerning the lawsuit appears closer than ever.

"The momentum is there," said tribal press secretary Bob Bostwick. "Certainly our expectation is that (acting administrator Chuck) Finley is going to finish the work that's already been done."

Finley will serve as acting administrator until officials find a permanent replacement.

Agency staffers received the news of Clarke's resignation last week.

"It's not a surprise," said spokesman Bill Dunbar. "He's a political appointee and we're coming to the end of this administration."

The president appoints regional administrators. It is likely a replacement will wait until a new president takes office.

Cactus Petes gamers four diamonds again

JACKPOT, Nev. — For the eighth consecutive year, Cactus Petes Resort Casino received the American Automobile Association's Four Diamond Award.

Participating establishments then are compared with rating criteria and given Diamond status. Four Diamond properties are considered excellent and "reflect an exceptional degree of hospitality, service and attention to detail, while offering upscale facilities and a variety of amenities."

The award plaque will be on display at the hotel desk, and the honor will be included in the 2000 California/Nevada AAA TourBook.

ConAgra meets earnings forecasts; sales jump

KANSAS CITY — ConAgra Inc., the second-biggest U.S. food company, met Wall Street earnings expectations Thursday and posted a 6 percent rise in sales thanks to the completion of its massive restructuring program.

Excluding one-time restructuring costs, ConAgra, which makes Wesson oils, Butterball turkeys and Healthy Choice meals, said it earned \$210 million in the fourth quarter, or 46 cents per share. This represents a 12 percent rise from \$196 million, or 41 cents a share, in the same period last year.

Omaha, Neb.-based ConAgra's per-share earnings met First Call Corp. consensus forecasts, and it posted a 6 percent sales growth to \$6.4 billion which beat some market predictions.

"The numbers looked pretty good," said Leonard Teitelbaum, an analyst with Merrill Lynch. "There's not too many (food) companies putting up those kinds of numbers."

Though the restructuring is done, investors showed concern about its next challenge — ConAgra's plan to buy International Home Foods Inc., maker of Clabber Girl yeast and pastas and Bumble Bee seafood. ConAgra revealed last week it plans to pay \$1.6 billion for the Minneapolis-based company and assume its \$1.3 billion in debt, which investors worry could put additional charges on its income statement in fiscal 2001.

Including \$385 million in restructuring costs, the company actually lost \$19 million during the quarter ended May 28. However, the restructuring has realigned ConAgra's business units into three main divisions: packaged foods, refrigerated foods and agricultural products.

The restructuring, which cost slightly over \$1 billion, furthered ConAgra's 20-year transition from a farm-conmodity to a packaged-foods business.

Potlatch cuts 260 jobs, takes \$26 million charge
SPOKANE, Wash. — Forest products company Potlatch Corp. said Thursday it cut 260 full-time jobs to reduce costs and will take a \$26 million charge in the second quarter for severance expenses.

Spokane, Wash.-based Potlatch has about 7,000 employees. The company said in May it would cut jobs after announcing in April that its first-quarter earnings fell below Wall Street's expectations. Potlatch said it expects the job cuts will save \$21 million a year, Dow Jones News Service reported.

Potlatch had \$1.7 billion in sales last year.

Builders battle theft

Cost passes to customers

TWIN FALLS — A construction company might spend thousands of dollars every year replacing stolen tools.

Many in the construction business say it is a major problem, but some are resigned to thinking of tool and supply theft as a routine cost.

"When it happens repeatedly it becomes the cost of doing business," STARR Corp. President Glenn Arrington said. "It's a major problem in the industry."

STARR Corp. of Twin Falls, one of Magic Valley's largest construction companies, has lost an estimated \$5,000 to \$5,500 worth of tools in the past 2 1/2 years, he said.

"We have made the efforts to try to secure our vans and job-site trailers better, but nothing is burglar proof," Arrington said.

Other companies, too, said that despite their precautions tools still get stolen.

Thieves even took a trailer full of tools for a total loss of \$25,000 from Gary D. Jones Construction Co. Inc. of Burley, said the company's accounting manager, Calvin Jones.

"It's aggravating — that's money that you could do something else with," Jones said. "It's certainly costly."

Although most construction companies have their tools insured, deductibles often are so high it doesn't do them much good when a few tools are stolen, he added.

"Usually we don't even turn in claims" to the insurance provider, Jones said. "You don't usually collect a lot. We have a \$1,000 deductible." The loss comes out of our profits. It's a cost of doing business; if it doesn't pass on to the customer eventually we aren't doing business."

So, what do the companies' owners do? They make it harder for thieves to steal their equipment, said Bob Mogensen, Twin Falls-area construction manager for Beniton Construction Co.

"The industry is self-policing itself," Mogensen said. "We're not making it as easy for the crooks. People were leaving too many things out there for the thieves to get. We lost \$10,000 and \$15,000 in one year on two different jobs. Now we don't leave anything in the job sheds. We're taking more precautions in locking up tools or taking them back to the shop."

A lock isn't always enough.

"The tools are picked up and locked at night, and we encourage the superintendents to pull their trailers to the shop or take them home at night," Jones said. "We've established policies that if they are not in a locked and enclosed fence they take the trailers with them."

Owners have little hope of recovering stolen tools, they say.

"All of our tools are marked and we record the serial numbers, but usually that does little good," Arrington said. "Most of the tools that are stolen are out of the state in the next day."

Police officers suggest marking tools.

"We treat it like any other theft," Twin Falls police Staff Sgt. Steve Benkula said. "What would help us out are serial numbers and having the tools marked in some way. About the only way to identify if a tool has been stolen is by a serial number."

The Boise Police Department instituted a program that has helped cut down on construction-site thefts, Benkula added. A builder in Boise can obtain a registration number from police, then engrave that number on its tools. They also paint tools with colors of their own choosing.

Something similar to the Boise program

would work in Twin Falls, Benkula said. "I wouldn't mind seeing a program like that here," he said. "I think it would absolutely work here. I think that would be a big boost in prevention."

When staffing allows, Twin Falls police try to patrol construction sites more in the summer. But builders should be sure to put every tool away at night.

"Maintain control of your tools," Benkula said. "Don't leave them on the job sites."

BIDs ask for a plan

Downtown will ask City Council to help fund strategy study

TWIN FALLS — Downtown and Old Towne leaders want to see a comprehensive business development plan so they have a clear, concise mission.

The development plan would build on the much cited "Center and Edge" strategic plan for regeneration of old Twin Falls, compiled by McGraw-Hill-based Tom Hudson Co. in 1994.

That same company helped the Historic Downtown Business Improvement District pick its new executive director and last month it helped the downtown BID and the Old Towne Business Improvement District toward eventually merging the two organizations.

Tom Hudson Co. would complete the proposed study over six months at a cost of \$55,000, the BIDs' Executive Director Tim Jones said at Thursday's downtown board meeting.

"This is an outstanding opportunity for us to move ahead," he said. "It will help us identify niche markets, give us specific ways to sell downtown and give us landscape and promotional tools."

Members of the city's Urban Renewal Agency by telephone conference have pledged \$25,000 to the study — a grant to be formalized at a meeting later — and downtown board members Thursday dedicated \$3,000 to it. The \$5,000 will come out of the education expenses provided for Jones in next year's budget. His Main Street training may be put off for a year in lieu of the study. Historic Downtown BID board chairman Ron Thompson said.

The BIDs plan to ask the City Council July 10 to provide the remaining \$25,000 for the project, Jones said. He's optimistic, based on the city's recent support of other downtown projects.

"The city is behind downtown

WorldCom takes a look at Nextel again

With the demise of its plan to merge with Sprint in late May, WorldCom Inc. reportedly is taking another look at the mobile phone company it almost bought 14 months ago — Nextel Corp. of Reston, Va., which recently began doing business in the Magic Valley.

Buying Nextel now, however, will cost WorldCom at least four times what it would have had to pay in early 1999 — when WorldCom walked away from the deal because the price was too high.

Nextel shares rose after Monday, when speculation began about renewing the courtship with WorldCom.

Adjusted for a two-for-one split, Nextel shares were around \$40 when the previous talks broke off in April 1999. Nextel has issued millions of additional shares since then.

As a result, the total value of Nextel's stock has grown from less than \$12 billion to almost \$46 billion.

Further escalating the potential cost to WorldCom is theumping price of its own shares, which are the currency it probably would use to pay at least part of the price for Nextel.

But even at a much higher price, Nextel is still the most attractive mobile phone company available to WorldCom, telecommunications analysts say. The only other possibility would be to buy VoiceStream Communications, the Seattle

company that acquired ComiPoint Corp. of Bethesda in February for \$46 million.

"If I was WorldCom, my favorite would be to go with Nextel," said analyst Christopher Larsen of Prudential Securities in New York.

"If you're going to get into wireless communications, you probably want to do it on a nationwide basis and you don't have a lot of choices," he said. "Nextel and VoiceStream are it."

Nextel officials Wednesday repeated their standard answer to inquiries about whether the company is interested in a merger. "We will listen to anyone who wants to talk to us," their spokesman said.

Tech-savvy bank chief aims to improve customer service

SAINT PAUL, Minn. — U.S. Bancorp's computer system was near collapse more than a decade ago, and newly arriving chief executive Jack Grundhofer quickly picked up and coming executive Phil Heasley to fix it.

Heasley was an obvious choice. He had been a frequent critic of the bank's efforts to update its 30-year-old technology, and he had talked about leaving — a situation Grundhofer was directed to fix by one of his new bosses on the board of directors.

The choice proved a wise one. Grundhofer asked him to stick around. "Before you do anything crazy, we've got a real opportunity here," he recalled saying. "He took that risk and he's paid it back many times, and he's also

been rewarded."

The latest reward came a year ago, when U.S. Bancorp — which has Magic Valley bank branches — again found itself on the ropes. Grundhofer promoted Heasley to president, chief operating officer and, to many observers, heir apparent as chief executive of the nation's 13th largest bank.

Under Heasley, technology had become the backbone of U.S. Bancorp and the envy of the industry, but he wasn't an obvious choice for the No. 2 spot, according to people who know him. He's a firm believer in using technology to solve the problems of banking; yet U.S. Bancorp's biggest problem these days — a reputation for poor customer service — largely came about because of the bank's reliance on technology.

On the retail side, that technology centers on mining customer data to enable the bank to predict behavior such as deposits so that it can cover checks that might otherwise bounce and to pick products and services customers might want to buy at the right time.

Heasley also has been involved in developing U.S. Bancorp's payment processing business, which includes everything from cash-machine transactions to managing sales of gasoline and oil changes for large corporate motor pools.

Heasley is regarded as very bright and brimming with ideas. He's also considered by analysts and some in the Twin Cities banking business as somewhat

Analysts mark independents' day

Investors and reporters have long groused about the too-cloze relationship between an investment bank's money side and the part of the shop that writes reports and analyses about the very same companies on which the bank stands to make or lose money. The joke is that there are many, many more "buy" than "sell" suggestions.

Wednesday, a group of analysts made the unusual move of not only weighing in on this issue

but also walking out of their banks. Baltimore investment bank Legg Mason Wood Walker lost two of its best-known analysts, Scott Cleland and William Whyman, who think there's an ethical problem with banks that have financial interests in the companies their analysts tout. Cleland and Whyman have taken their entire staff to form their own independent technology research firm, called the Precursor Group.

"We think the Wall Street research system is broken and rife with conflict," Whyman says. "The companies control the information flow." "Does the research analyst like the company because he likes the company or because he wants banking business?" he asks. "The answer could be both. But it's hard to disentangle the two." Whyman wants to make clear, though, that he and Cleland think the industry has a problem, and that they had no particular issue with Legg Mason.

Stocks fall on Fed announcement

NEW YORK (AP) — Stocks fell Thursday as investors worried that rising interest rates have begun cutting into corporate profits...

A series of earnings warnings topped a market already struggling to digest the Fed's decision on Wednesday to leave interest rates unchanged but warn about risks of inflation. Selling was broad-based.

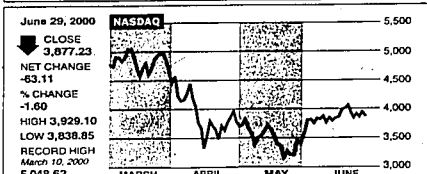
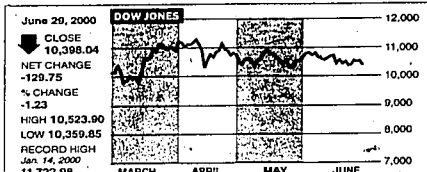
"The market has been fixated on the Fed, and it will continue to be," said Britain Ellis Prigge, vice president at Balentine & Co. in Atlanta.

The Dow Jones industrial average fell 129.75 to close at 10,398.04.

Broader stock indicators also dropped. The S&P 500 index fell 14.43 to 1,442.39, and the Nasdaq composite index was down 63.11 at 3,877.23.

Quarterly earnings disappointments dragged the market lower. Unisys plunged \$9.063 to \$14.563 after warning that its second-quarter revenue and earnings will miss analysts' expectations.

The warnings sent a chill through a market that had already lurched before the Fed's announcement on Wednesday. The central bank's warning on



inflation led many analysts to expect that the Fed will raise rates at its August meeting.

"I don't think the game is over. This is more like the seventh inning stretch," said John Forelli, senior vice president at Independence Investment Advisors in Boston.

In the meantime, analysts said, the market may find comfort to remain stalled in a narrow range. Stocks had advanced modestly in the days leading up to the meeting, leading investors to take some profits Thursday. Also, training said investors were unloading some stocks ahead of the Independence Day weekend.

Financial stocks, which are highly sensitive to rising interest rates, pulled the Dow lower. J.P. Morgan fell \$4.125 to \$112.50 and Citigroup fell \$1.50 to \$52.625.

Investors were also taking profits from the technology stocks that have risen in recent sessions. LSI Logic fell \$5.75 to \$55.25 and Cisco fell \$2.375 to \$61.188.

On the New York Stock Exchange, Eli Lilly soared \$15.125 to \$102.25 after announcing that an independent board gave a favorable review to its drug Zovant, used to treat sepsis.

The experimental drug, which still needs approval from the Food and Drug Administration, would be the first drug approved for the treatment of sepsis, a disease in which the body's systems fail due to infection.

Inflation indicator surges due to energy prices

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. economy grew robustly in the first three months of this year, while a key inflation measure took its biggest leap since late 1994, largely reflecting surging energy prices.

The country's total output of goods and services, called the gross domestic product, rose at an annual rate of 5.5 percent during the January-March quarter, the Commerce Department said Thursday.

That was slightly faster than the government's two previous estimates of first-quarter GDP, which both clocked in at a 5.4 percent rate. But it was slower than the 7.3 percent growth rate in the fourth quarter of 1999.

Meanwhile, an inflation gauge tied to the GDP — and one watched closely by Fed Chairman Alan Greenspan — rose at an annual rate of 3.5 percent in the first quarter, up from 2.5 percent in the fourth quarter.

Higher energy prices accounted for most of the first-quarter gain.

That was the biggest increase since 3.5 percent in the third quarter of 1994. The 3.5 percent first-quarter increase hasn't been exceeded since a 3.6 percent gain in the first quarter of 1992.

On Wall Street, investors worried about higher interest rates sent the Dow Jones down 105 points in afternoon trading.

1 A portable master controller synchronizes music and fireworks. It picks up a digital firing code or recorded voice cue track from music broadcast simultaneously over two-way radio and a public address system. It then transmits the code or voice cues to a field controller.

Field controller
2 A pyrotechnician listens for voice cues over a radio headset and flips switches on an electronic field controller to the preselected mortars at the appropriate times. This system can also operate off an automated digital relay.

The mortars
3 Fiber glass mortars ranging from 3- to 8-inches (8- to 15-cm) wide are arranged in dumpsters lined with sand or in wooden racks mounted together in large groups, or banks.

Ignition
4 3-4 seconds after the switch is flipped, the time fuse ignites a burst charge that ignites several layers and patterns of stars with chemical compounds that create colors as they burn. The spherical design has one burst, but may contain several layers of stars that break at different times.

The "break"
5 An electric charge ignites black powder in a lift cone beneath the shell. This propels the shell out of the mortar and ignites a time fuse which burns into the center of the shell through a tube as the shell flies into the night sky.

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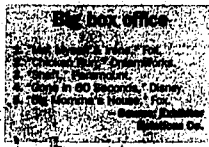

Damon is Tom Ripley, an angelic psychotic who befriends irresponsible rich boy Dickie Greenleaf (Law) and his forlorn girlfriend Marge (Paltrow). But Tom's motivations are suspect from the get-go. A friendly obsession becomes an overwhelming desire to consume Dickie, to take over his personality. In terms of psychological profundity, the movie isn't one millimeter deep. Law is persuasive and likable as Dickie. But Damon's Tom is weird and unexplained. And Paltrow isn't much of anything. The best actor: Philip Seymour Hoffman, as Dickie's pal Freddie, who's suspicious of Tom and needles him with nasty innuendo about his true motives. Now there's a scary fella. Contains nudity, violence and mature sexual themes. Rated R.

In modern London, is a relentless battery of encounters among upper-class Brits, cockney yobs and newly landed eastern Europeans. In one of many plotlines, soccer fan Griffin Midge (Danny Nussbaum) falls asleep inside a canvas-covered crate at an airport, only to find himself being parachuted into wartime Bosnia. Seeds to the wind: Sampras stays, top women fall

WIMBLEDON, England — Pete Sampras is out of the hospital and into the third round of Wimbledon, hoping to continue his quest for a seventh title despite acute tendinitis in his left leg.

Sampras limped past Karol Kucera 7-6 (9), 3-6, 6-3, 6-4 Wednesday, then went to a hospital for an MRI and treatment.

“It hurts like heck,” said Sampras' coach, Paul Annacone. “He can walk. He's not going to be breaking the 100-meter record today, though.”

The top-seeded Sampras is to face the former American Justin Gimelstob today. Annacone said Sampras could have played Thursday, but whether he can make it through five more matches to the championship is uncertain.

“It's a matter of accepting what's thrown at you, and see what you can do,” Annacone said. “If he can't do it, he can't do it. That's just the way it is.”

The soft grass and short points at Wimbledon help Sampras' chances. He was being treated with ice, electrical stimulation and anti-inflammatory medicine to lessen pain in his shin, where

Champs sidestep early exit

Undhjem, Frank snatch first Latham matches

TWIN FALLS — Several upsets of the order of No. 16 bearing No. 1 were already posted on the Latham Chrysler Match Play Championship scoreboard before Tracy Frank tied off Thursday.

Through eight holes of his first-round match with friend and 16th seed Terry Spackman, Frank, the No. 1 seed and defending men's champion of the 12th annual tournament, looked like he might become the next one.

On a sunny, sizzling day for golf, Frank trailed by two holes as he, Spackman, Mustang 18-year-old Brady Stanger and Sun Valley golfer Brian Saksa approached the ninth green.

Then, in a display of granite grit, Frank, from just inside 35 feet, bottomed the long putt to pull one hole closer at the turn.

“That's my Terry Spackman imitation,” Frank snickered, referring to the 40-foot birdie Spackman, the 1996 champion, sank at the par-3 No. 4 for his first of two, two-hole leads on the front.

The putt at No. 9 would be the momentum grabber Frank needed on the backstretch. He pulled even with a birdie on the 11th before extending to a two-hole lead with a par on 15.

“I couldn't make any mistakes, and I did. On 15, I gave him a hole with a par,” Spackman said. “When you play Tracy, you can't let him win a hole with a par. You can't beat yourself. And basically, on 15, you do too many of those and you inevitably don't play very far.”

Though he gave it right back at 16, Frank masterfully played par golf on 17 and 18, getting up and down with a touchy chip from off the green at 18 before draining the four-foot putt to win 1-up.

Spackman had a chance at 18 after his 9-iron approach found green with 24 feet remaining for the tie. But he left the putt short from a foot away.

“That's a championship match is what that is,” Frank said. “The 2up was real big, but we both played real solid.”

On the women's side, and vying for her third Latham title, defending women's champion Virginia Undhjem had an equally tough opening-round test with sometime playing partner Jennifer Hedberg.

Hedberg, who was playing her second round of 18 after winning the Rocky Mountain Section PGA Junior Championship at Canyon Springs Golf Course earlier Thursday, played Underhjem a stiff test, but the wily veteran held tough with her own 1-up win as nightfall approached.

The biggest shocker of the day came late in the day as well, when No. 15 Mike “Turbo” Magallan upset second-seed and Albion College All-American James Brooks, 3 and 2.

Spackman said his lack of birdies from 11 through 14 proved too much to overcome. On the 14th, Spackman sent his 7-iron drive to 10 feet from the hole, but pushed the birdie putt just to the left.

“When you get into those holes for match play, you've got to at least birdie one of them,” he said. “If I'd birdied 11 or 13, or made 11 or 14, I'd be in a kind of keep him to where he had me.”

Saksa ousted Stanger from championship consideration with a 2 and 1 win. With a one-hole lead at the turn, Saksa added three holes.

Stevenson were unsuccessful. In Salt Lake City, David Allred, vice president of public affairs for the Jazz, said the fight did not affect Stevenson's standing with the team or the scheduled Thursday press conference to introduce him.

"We think DeShawn is the victim in this situation," Allred said. Stevenson, a 6-foot-5 shooting guard, had signed with Kansas but made himself eligible for the draft when it wasn't certain if he would be eligible as a freshman. He was selected by the Jazz as the 23rd pick overall.

Jayhawks coach Roy Williams has called Stevenson one of the most gifted recruits he ever pursued. Last season, Stephenson averaged 30.4 points, 9.7 rebounds and 6.2 assists a game as a senior at Washington Union High School.

Buchanan administrator Lemarr Treadwell also witnessed the fight and told the Bee he saw Stevenson leave the gym with two individuals in pursuit. One of those, according to Treadwell, was ex-Clovis High School standout and Fresno State football recruit Chris Sims, who played in the all-star game.

Sports had influence in 'Stars and Bars' deal

COLUMBIA, S.C. (AP) — For almost six months, South Carolina's sports fields and stadiums lived in the shadow of the Confederate flag.

When the flag is lowered Saturday from the Statehouse and raised on a nearby pole, officials wonder if the cloud of the N.A.A.P.'s boycott also will lift from arenas, golf courses, tennis courts and ballparks.

"I think that's difficult to say right now," said Russ Pate, race director of the U.S. women's Olympic marathon trials held here in February.

From Darlington Raceway to Harbour Town Golf Links to the 26-mile blue marathon line that wanders through the streets of the capital, organizers, coaches and athletes have dealt with the tourism boycott.

There were marches that included football coaches Lou Holtz of South Carolina and Tommy Bowden of Clemson; statements condemning the flag from the Southern Conference, the NCAA and USA Track & Field; withdrawals from state events by the New York Knicks and tennis star Serena Williams; and even a meeting between another tennis player, Alexander

Stevenson, and Gov. Jim Hodges. While not everyone is pleased with the legislative compromise, organizers and officials know that people were paying attention. "I guess this shows that sports have a place in our society more than people give it credit for having," Southern Conference Commissioner Alfred White said.

Armstrong relishes another shot at doubters

FUTUROSCOPE, France (AP) — Winning the Tour de France after beating cancer made Lance Armstrong a global star. But fame, he says, hasn't spoiled his appetite for victory or his desire to make a statement.

"I'm not here for the money or the notoriety," Armstrong said Thursday, two days before he defends his title in the world's most prestigious cycling event. "I'm doing it to win a bike race and prove that a cancer sufferer can overcome the illness and win the hardest sporting event in the world."

"I'm coming here with the ambition to win." Armstrong won the 1993 World Championship and competed for the U.S. Olympic team in 1992 and 1996. But in October 1996, he was told he had a 50 percent chance of survival after testicular cancer was detected and spread to his lungs and brain.

It was a diagnosis that made racing in, let alone winning, the Tour de France a remote part of his thoughts. But he did just that



last summer, beating his closest rival by more than seven minutes. The incredible victory has made Armstrong a household name in the United States, a rarity in a sport dominated by Europeans. Personal endorsements have made him a multimillionaire and he's been feted at the White House. Some have nicknamed him "Lance Inc."

He says the motivation remains the same, and it seems that a simple look around him when the race gets underway may give him an extra edge. Cynical rivals still quietly brand his 1999 success a fluke. French media, at a loss to explain how he could have won the grueling race, launched a campaign of innuendo to suggest he had been on drugs. "Armstrong on another planet," read one headline in sports daily L'Equipe.

BETHLEHEM, Pa. (AP) — Bruce Fleisher wouldn't even let Hubert Green sleep on it.

Hours after Green had the best opening round in the 21-year history of the U.S. Senior Open, Fleisher went one stroke better. His 7-under-par 64 Thursday tied the record for the lowest score in any round of the Senior Open, matching Orville Moody's third round in 1969.

"I drove the ball well, but it's early," Fleisher said. "A lot can happen in three days."

Fleisher held a one-stroke lead over Green and was two strokes in front of Dave Stockton, Isao Aoki and Hale Irwin.

Irwin finished the 18th hole at Saucon Valley Country Club after a 95-minute rain delay. Play was suspended for the day at 6:24 p.m. MDT with nine players still on the course.

"The score I am standing on right now is probably not indicative of how I hit the ball," Irwin said. "It was one of the uglier five under par rounds I've ever had."

Jack Nicklaus shot a 67, which tied his best round in any Senior Open.

"I haven't played a good round of golf in a long time," said Nicklaus, who excited the gallery with his performance. "It was kind of fun. I haven't seen anywhere near a major for a while either."

Jerry Bruner also shot a 67, while four players had 68s. Defending champion Dave Eichelberger shot a 1-over 72.

Begay contends for back-to-back wins

CROMWELL, Conn. — Four days after getting his third PGA Tour victory, Notah Begay had some butterflies as he pursued a second straight tournament win.

He bogeyed his first hole at the Greater Hartford Open on Thursday but ended with four consecutive birdies for a 6-under-par 64 that had him tied for the first-round lead with Robert Gamez, Dan Forsman and Kirk Triplett.

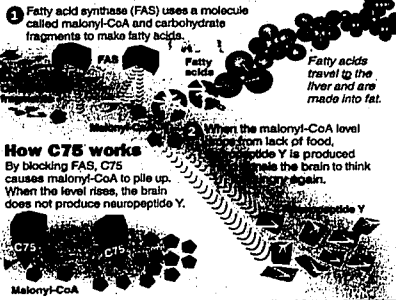

Process of the fat-fighting drug

Scientists have discovered that a chemical causes mice to lose weight rapidly. Here is how the brain is normally triggered to think of hunger and how the chemical, C75, blocks the process.



Scientists discover a drug that might help fight fat

WASHINGTON (AP) — Scientists are testing a possible cancer treatment when they spotted a side effect that might prove rather valuable: The experimental drug made mice lose a dramatic amount of weight, without apparent side effects.

Just 20 minutes after taking the chemical, the rodents' appetites were wiped out.

The discovery indicates scientists may be able to regulate a major pathway in the brain responsible for appetite and fat-burning. The chemical apparently fooled the brain into thinking the mice had eaten, so their metabolisms never slowed and they burned fat, researchers report in today's edition of the *Journal Science*.

It is a real trick. The mice drop their weight like a stone, losing 25 percent of their body mass in a couple of days," said Dr. Frank Kuhajda, who led the research team at Baltimore's Johns Hopkins University that produced the chemical, code-named C75.

No one yet knows if C75 would be useful in humans, caution. More animal research is needed before dieters could even test it.

But, the Hopkins discovery is "extraordinarily intriguing and provocative," said Debra McGarvey, an expert on fat metabolism at the University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center in Dallas. If confirmed, he said, it could obviously have a profound impact on the field of obesity research.

Doctors have long hoped for better weight-loss treatments. Over half of all Americans are

overweight, and about one-quarter are obese, government estimates show.

At issue is "fatty acid synthase" or FAS, an enzyme system pivotal for turning carbohydrates into the building blocks of fat.

Surprisingly, in the early 1990s scientists discovered cancer cells use FAS to produce their own fat for fuel, Kuhajda said. No one knows why. But the Hopkins researchers created a FAS blocker to see if it could fight cancer. In mouse testing, this so-called C75 made cancer cells die without harming nearby normal cells, he said.

But the mice all had a stunning side effect: They stopped eating and dramatically lost weight until the drug wore off.

Weight loss in a cancer patient is a serious problem, so the puzzled scientists began hunting an explanation.

It turns out that production of a brain chemical called neuropeptide Y — a well-known appetite regulator — plummeted in the C75-treated mice. Normally when animals fast, neuropeptide Y sharply jumps and appetite consequently increases. But the C75 prevented that, fooling animals into thinking they were fed, Kuhajda said.

How? To burn fat, FAS uses another molecule called malonyl-CoA. Blocking FAS didn't stop the body's normal production of that molecule. Instead, malonyl-CoA just piled up without that next step in the fat-burning assembly line. High levels of the molecule somehow signaled the brain not to produce neuropeptide Y, Kuhajda said.

Reno looks for ways to mend Miami rift

WASHINGTON — With Elian Gonzalez back in Cuba with his father, Attorney General Janet Reno turned Thursday to one of the lingering issues left by his seven-month stay: healing the wounds among the Cuban exiles in her hometown of Miami.

Those wounds run deep, according to experts and observers, caused by Reno's insistence that the six-year-old shipwrecked boy be returned to his father and by the exiles' inability to flex the political muscle to prevent it.

Reno is unsure whether she can heal the rift between her and Cuban exile leaders.

"Some of the messages that I

get from them indicate maybe I can't," Reno said. "But I am devoted to that community. I believe in it. I believe in its caring nature, and I'm going to do everything I can to heal it."

Meanwhile, in addressing another loose end, Reno said that before the details of Elian's case fade, she also wants to "sit down and see if there is anything we can do" about asylum policies for young children, an area that law and regulations don't address.

Pondering how to determine when a child understands enough to make a decision like applying for political asylum, Reno asked, "Where do you draw the line between the 6-year-old and the 12-year-old? How do you make these judgments?"

And she offered her retrospective of Elian's case: "It's a mixture of so many different things: a little boy who lost his mother, a country that is not free... a story of families that have disagreements... a story of so much of human life."

But she added, "And yet in the end he is with his father, and I am glad of that. I just wish he were with his father in a democratic, free country."

The case of Elian was so unusual, and so unlikely to be repeated, that Reno and others say it will not necessarily teach important lessons or even set legal precedent.

But the little Cuban boy has left a long shadow across the public image of the Cuban-American

community, said politicians, academics and Latin American experts.

The exile community is acutely aware that their fight over Elian backfired, said Dario Moreno, a political science professor at Florida International University in Miami.

"For the first time in 42 years, the U.S. government and public opinion did not back the Cuban exile community in Miami in a battle with (Cuban President) Fidel Castro," he said. "The issue wasn't framed as a political issue, but as a parental rights issue."

In the exile community, he said, there is now soul searching and a quest for new leadership because many feel that current leaders botched the public relations fight.

55-year odyssey ends with American citizenship

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. (AP) — As a boy in a mud-hut village in China, he befriended a company of U.S. Marines, and later suffered under the Communists because of it.

Now, after an odyssey that lasts 55 years, Charlie Two Shoes, as the Marines called him, is about to become a U.S. citizen.

"I always believed this day would come," 56-year-old Tsui Chi Hsi said in an interview at the Chapel Hill restaurant he owns. "No matter how many hurdles I had to cross, I always believed victory was possible."

Sixty of Tsui's Marine buddies from Love Company have been invited to attend Saturday's citizenship ceremony. The 5-foot-2 Tsui plans to wear the Marine pants the leathernecks given him in China in 1946 when he was a boy.

"I don't know how many Americans would have sacrificed themselves like Charlie did," said Jack Hutchins of Hazel Green, Ky., a former Love Company Marine. "He was true to himself, true to the Corps and true to his beliefs."

Tsui's journey began in Chuksuehuan, the village where he was born.

After World War II ended,

Marines who had fought the Japanese in the South Pacific were shipped to China as the Communists and Nationalists resumed their civil war. Some were assigned to protect an air base near Tsui's home.

One day in 1945, Tsui brought

the men of Love Company, 4th Marines, 1st Marine Division kindling for their fires.

"The thing I most remember about him was his bright, smiling eyes," said Hutchins, who befriended the tiny, malnourished child. "He was a giver. He

was loyal and attentive and dedicated and honest."

The boy's firewood was appreciated by the Marines, who lacked sleeping bags and winter coats as the chill, late-fall winds blew from the Gobi Desert. Tsui returned a few days later with boiled eggs and 10 pounds of warm peanuts. He used the money the Marines gave him to buy necessities for his family.

The Marines called him Charlie Two Shoes because they couldn't pronounce his name. They taught him English, dressed him in a cut-down khaki uniform and taught him how to spit-hine his shoes. He swapped food and firewood every day for the Marines' K-rations.

When the Marines left for Tsingtao several miles away, the boy's father let Tsui go along.

"For his father, it meant there was one less mouth to feed at home," and a chance for the boy to better himself, said David Perimutt, co-author of the book "Charlie Two Shoes and the Marines of Love Company."

The Marines gave him a bunk in their barracks and sent him to a Catholic missionary school. He studied English, became a Christian and began setting his sights on becoming an American citizen.

Senate votes for limited new patient products

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Republican-controlled Senate resisted attempts to limit new patient protections, including a restricted right to sue their HMOs, overriding Democratic protests that the plan was an election-year sham.

The vote was 51-47, largely along party lines, and capped two weeks of intense partisanship in both the House and Senate over health care issues

expected to resonate in the fall campaign.

Senate GOP Whip Don Nickles, R-Okla., said the proposal marked a "significant concession" over legislation that Republicans approved last year that barred lawsuits. He also said the proposal had built on progress made in months of closed-door negotiations with Democrats on the issue of patients' rights.

Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., countered that the bill had been "drafted solely by Republicans," and fell short of covering all 161 million insured Americans who would be covered under a rival plan backed by Democrats and the White House.

The vote did little to clarify the future of patients' rights legislation, one of two major health-related measures that Congress

is considering in the run-up to the fall campaign.

The other, a bill to provide prescription drug coverage to Medicare recipients, cleared the House on Wednesday under political circumstances akin to the Senate's vote on patients' rights. On that issue, it was House Republicans exercising their majority muscle to advance a bill that Democrats said would do little to address the needs of Americans.

Indonesian refugee ship sinks; officials fear hundreds are dead

JAKARTA, Indonesia — Hundreds of refugees fleeing bloody religious fighting were feared drowned Thursday after their overloaded ship sank without a trace in the stormy waters of eastern Indonesia.

Radio contact with the wooden vessel, carrying nearly 500 passengers and crew, was lost after its captain radioed that it was fast taking on water during a violent storm, the National Search and Rescue Agency said.

"We are sure it has sunk," said Col. Yuneman Besau, a navy base chief in Manado, capital of North Sulawesi province. "There were 500 ships searching, but they have found no sign of the vessel. There have been no bodies or survivors found."

The boat was on a journey of more than 200 miles to Manado from the Maluku Islands, a corner of the Indonesian archipelago where violence between Muslims and Christians has killed almost 1,000 people in the past 18 months.

About 290 of the passengers were refugees from Duma, a Christian village in the Maluku where more than 100 people were killed in an attack by Muslim fighters June 19.

Philippine police charge Love Bug suspect

MANILA, Philippines — Philippine investigators filed criminal charges Thursday against a computer programming student suspected of having released the "LOVE BUG" computer virus which crippled e-mail systems worldwide.

The filing of charges against Onel de Guzman, 23, had been

delayed while lawyers for the National Bureau of Investigation studied evidence and applicable laws. Until President Joseph Estrada signed a new law last week covering electronic commerce and computer hacks, the Philippines had no laws specifically against computer crimes.

The new legislation, however, cannot be applied retroactively to the "Love Bug" creator.

Investigators charged de Guzman with "traditional" crimes such as theft and violation of a law that normally covers credit card fraud, NBI Director Federico Opinion said.

De Guzman, a student at the Philippines' AMA Computer College, has acknowledged that he may have released the virus by accident. He refused to say whether he authored it.

World in brief

Rebels say they battle anti-drug offensive

LOS POZOS, Colombia — Rebels threatened Thursday to introduce surface-to-air missiles into Colombia's civil war and vowed to battle a planned U.S.-backed offensive against the country's drug crops — a source of wealth for the insurgents.

Critics of Washington's \$1.3 billion aid package, expected to be passed by Congress by week's end, have said it will intensify the war and pull the United States into a quagmire. Analysts expect the rebels to fiercely resist attempts by U.S.-trained Colombian troops, backed by U.S.-supplied helicopters, to seize coca-growing areas. Coca is the raw material for cocaine.

Ann Rio, a commander of the Revolutionary Armed Forces of Colombia, or FARC, said his group would arm coca farmers if needed to resist "U.S. aggression." Rio said rebels may purchase surface-to-air missiles to shoot down combat helicopters, which form the most expensive component of the U.S. aid package.

Washington's assistance is an attempt to stem the flow of cocaine and heroin from Colombia and to shore up the country's fledgling democracy. Both drugs are produced in Colombia in huge quantities.

Leader of Big Mac attack goes on trial after uproar

PARIS — In a nation that loves its dinner, the mustachioed folk hero who led a Big Mac Attack is leaping his vandalism trial into a planetary protest against

what he calls malbouffe: lousy food.

"Eating is not a neutral act," Jose Bove tells reporters, explaining how what began as a riposte to a punitive U.S. duty on French cheese bloomed into a popular uprising against big agriculture and globalization in general.

At least 30,000 people are expected today in Millau, in the heart of Roquefort country, where Bove and nine others were arrested last August after trashing a soon-to-open MacDonald's.

The food fight began when France refused to import hormone-laced U.S. beef unless it was labeled. Washington added a

100 percent tax to Roquefort, foie gras and other French delicacies. Bove's farm lobby group struck back.

Army wants Fiji hostage compound to be isolated

SUVA, Fiji — Gunmen holding 27 Fijian lawmakers hostage briefly detained 16 journalists Thursday after the army spoke of plans to cut water, electricity and telephone lines to the besieged compound.

Guards armed with machine guns stopped the journalists from leaving the parliamentary compound where the govern-

ment hostages, including deposed Prime Minister Mahendra Chaudhry, are being held.

An hour later, the journalists were released, but the incident has raised fears the gunmen might try to take more hostages in the government crisis now in its sixth week in the Pacific island nation.

"It actually marks a dangerous escalation in this business," said Michael Field, a reporter for *Agence France-Presse* who was among those detained. Nine of the detained journalists were from abroad.

Enjoy holiday fireworks from a distance

DEAR ABBY: Each year on the Fourth of July, thousands of adults and children are seriously injured by fireworks. Many burns and injuries affect eyesight, permanently damaging, and in some cases, blinding the victims. Because of this, the American Optometric Association has joined the Millennium Fireworks Safety Partners, a coalition of 35 national organizations, in urging people to avoid private fireworks and instead enjoy professional displays.

According to the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC), an estimated 20 percent to 25 percent of fireworks injuries are to the eyes. In a special study of fireworks-related injuries covering the period of June 23 to July 23, 1999, CPSC reports that there were 6,300 emergency room-treated injuries, most involving fireworks, rockets and sparklers. Forty percent of the victims were under 15 years of age, and about 75 percent were males.

Sparklers are the second most frequent cause of fireworks injuries that result in trips to the emergency room. In addition to potential burns, a sparkler can literally "poke someone's eye out."

Please be careful this Fourth of July. Protect your precious eyesight by avoiding fireworks at home. Enjoy professional displays from a safe distance.

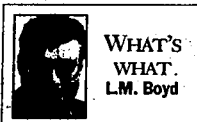

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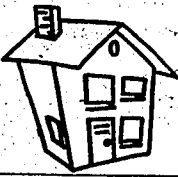
