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# Financing slows hotel project

TWIN FALLS — Financing snags have slowed development of a controversial Snake River canyon rim hotel and convention center plan, but the project will continue moving forward, according to a project consultant.

"We think we're on track, but we're moving slow because the

Market conditions prompt developers to trim expectations

money is not available," said Ken Edmunds, a consultant to Canyon Park North developer Craig H. Neilsen, a former Twin Falls resident. "We tried to carry out our conceptual idea and found issues that we had to resolve."

Developers have had trouble securing financing for the hotel and convention center project for

13 acres near the Perrine Bridge. They're also finding a hotel market that isn't large enough to support premium hotel rates, as project developers had hoped.

"We became much more conservative in our expectations. The market is not a strong market. It hasn't had a significant growth in room rates and occupancy for several years," Edmunds said. "We had to not be as aggressive in assuming we could achieve a premium over the market."

But there is a market for the hotel and convention center, Edmunds said — it's just a question of how big.

Neilsen representatives have begun circulating a survey around

town, asking questions about what kind of convention center businesses and associations would like to see in Twin Falls.

Neilsen is committed to the Canyon Park North project, said Gillian Silver, vice president of communications for Neilsen's Ameristar Casinos.

"Mr. Neilsen has a very strong

# Gore takes campaign to Bush country

SAN ANTONIO — Lone Star flag at his back and black cowboy boots on his feet, Al Gore stirred the Texas budget tempest on his rival's home turf Thursday, accusing Gov. George W. Bush of favoring oil companies and special interests with a \$1.7 billion tax cut at the expense of the state's children.

Bush retorted from Austin that Texas "doesn't need the vice president" to tell him to spend its money.

The vice president acknowledged Bush's popularity here. But he said the Republican presidential contender has badly misplaced his priorities.

"This is a wonderful state but I think it should be — and I think most people agree — it should be a state where it's just as easy to raise a child as it is to set up an oil rig," Gore said. "But here are the facts: Texas now ranks No. 1 in industrial pollution. It's No. 2 for child poverty. It's No. 3 for deaths from asthma."

The Democrat paid glancing tribute to the two-term Repu-

can governor's political strengths at home and his "warm and engaging personality." But, Gore added, the presidency "is more

than just a popularity contest."

side, Bush said at the Governor's Mansion in Austin, 100 miles away, that Texas "doesn't need the vice president to teach it about balanced budgets."

Bush said he had cut taxes in a "responsible way" and still managed to create a \$1.4 billion surplus. "For vice president Gore to claim otherwise for his own political purposes is a travesty. He should be ashamed," the governor said.

Bush spokesman Ari Fleischer added that money from the state's surplus had been used for such purposes as \$3,000 raises for teachers statewide.

Coincidentally with Gore's three-hour visit, Republican comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander upped her estimate of the state budget surplus to the \$1.4 billion that Bush cited, from \$1.1 billion. About half will be needed to cover at least \$610 million in recently disclosed cost overruns this year in Medicaid and the prison program. "My message to Al Gore is there is no deficit in Texas. The Texas economy is strong," she said, offering Gore a briefing on the numbers.

## Ex-Utah Olympics officials charged

Indictment alleges pair used bribes

The two top officials of Salt Lake City's winning bid for the 2002 Winter Olympic Games were indicted Thursday on a broad range of criminal charges, setting the stage for a trial delving deeply into Olympic corruption just months — or even weeks — before the Games commence.

Tom Welch, the president of the bid, and his chief aide, Dave Johnson, each were indicted on 15 counts. The federal indictments allege conspiracy, mail and wire fraud and interstate travel in violation of the Olympic organizing effort.

The charges are the result of a 19-month U.S. Justice Department investigation sparked by the worst corruption scandal in Olympic history.

Both men had previously resigned from the Olympic organizing effort.

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## Declining springs raise concern over well permit

TWIN FALLS — A Hagerman-area woman said she will not be able to graze cattle on her ranch past July, because the spring that supplies her water no longer produces enough.

Pam Wascher of Western Legends LC said the spring once provided about 35 cubic feet per second of water, but since 1993 it has shrunk to about 25 cfs.

Wascher and others like her wonder how the state can approve developing a long-dormant ground water right that would affect those springs — a

water right for land, part of which already is irrigated with other water rights. And a state moratorium exists on new water rights and the development of existing rights.

About two dozen water users met Thursday with state Department of Water Resources officials to discuss issues relating to a Gooding County ground water right.

Water Resources in June approved development of the sill-ensured 1974 water right. The water right was approved in 1976 to J.D. and Mary Baldwin, who never developed it. Last year it

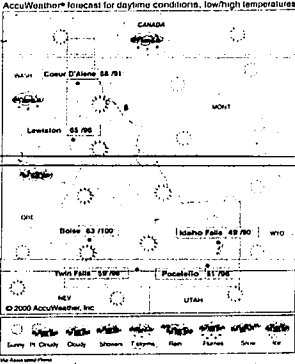

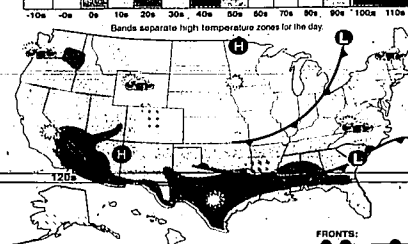

# Scientists find last of nature's basic particles

DALLAS—After decades of searching, physicists have found the last of the fundamental particles of matter known to exist in nature.

Scientists at the Fermi National-Accelerator-Laboratory in Batavia, Ill., plan to announce today that they have discovered the tau neutrino, one of the twelve basic particles that make up ordinary matter. The other eleven had already been found. "It's a great day," said Martin Perl, a physicist at Stanford University who won a Nobel Prize for discovering a related particle. "It's very important to know that this neutrino really exists."

Neutrinos are tiny, nearly weightless particles that zip through the universe with little interacting with other matter. The tau neutrino is the long-sought cousin of the electron neutrino and the muon neutrino. The three neutrinos each have counterparts in the electron, muon and tau particles. Those six particles, when combined with the six types of quarks, make up the twelve fundamental matter particles in physicists' working model of the universe.

## Bush suggests his dad's aides for new administration

WASHINGTON—GOP presidential hopeful George W. Bush says he would pack his foreign policy team with heavyweights who saw the nation—and his father—through the Cold War, such as George Shultz, Henry Kissinger and Colin Powell. "These are all people that

stood by my side when I talked about nuclear security" last spring, Bush said during an interview for CNN's "Early King Live." Also on Bush's list is his foreign policy chief, Condoleezza Rice, a Russian and Eastern European affairs specialist at National Security Council during Bush's father's administration. Powell, who was Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff during the Persian Gulf War, was reported to have said recently that he would consider serving in the Texas governor's cabinet. But said that "made me feel great." Asked whether he'd consider taking Powell for a cabinet post, Bush replied: "Of course."

## Report: McCain says he'd serve as Bush running mate

AUSTIN, Texas—Vanquished primary rival John McCain has told a prominent Republican governor and mutual friend of George W. Bush that he would be willing to serve as the Texan's running mate, sources said Thursday. McCain, who has previously ruled out a vice presidential bid, signing his change of heart in a telephone conversation this week with Pennsylvania Gov. Tom Ridge—who himself has figured prominently in the running mate sweepstakes. Three sources who had been briefed on the conversation spoke on condition of anonymity. —compiled from wire reports

for a variety of measures designed to protect the fish, including improvements to river habitat and changes to fish hatcheries. The government would again examine the health of the salmon population in five or 10 years.

Ted Bjorn, a professor of fish and wildlife resources at the University of Idaho, agrees with the decision to delay breaching. "I think it's premature now," he said. "I think we need more information to make a good, intelligent decision on the program." While happy that the White House will not pursue dam breaching, Rep. Helen Chenoweth-Hage, R-Idaho, is concerned about changes to the program. "Too often they're moving the goal posts," she said. "Without firm goals, how could we ever... work together to reestablish the salmon runs when the goals continue to be blurred?"

Even if the White House had pursued the plan to breach the dams, Sen. Mike Crapo, R-Idaho, doesn't believe it would have happened. "I have consistently said that I don't think that breaching of the dams is a politically viable option in the Pacific Northwest," he said.

Instead of concentrating on removing dams, Crapo thinks the government should consider other options for helping the fish, such as so-called "fish-friendly" turbines or changes in river management techniques. "We can take the steps now that would improve the situation, then I think that it's the step we have to take," he said.

But environmental groups say there may not be time to reconsider the health of the salmon population five or 10 years down the road. Jeff Curtis, the Western conservation director for Trout Unlimited, said some studies report that the spring/summer chinook salmon could be extinct by 2017. "I just don't think we have much time," he said.

The City Council in January approved Neilsen's request for a zoning change for his Canyon Park East project, on 12 acres to the east of Blue Lakes Boulevard. The land is earmarked for retail and commercial use. Edmunds said Neilsen representatives are working with retailers to attract them into Twin Falls.

"That includes several restaurants, which Edmunds would not name. As project developers work on refining the master plan and construction costs for Canyon Park North, the project's construction plans will change a bit, he said. "We're using more wood framing rather than steel and concrete," he said. But Tom Mikesell, a member of a citizens' committee formed to

he isn't exactly sure what to make of the company's plans. The committee met recently with Edmunds to discuss the progress on Canyon Park North. # FBI arrests former pilot after finding bombs

MILWAUKEE (AP) — A former National Guard pilot was arrested Thursday on suspicion of breaking into an Air National Guard base, scrambling "Free Kosovo" on a satellite dish and leaving behind a bag with two bombs, authorities said.

Authorities acting on a tip from a hot line arrested 35-year-old Milan S. Mitich at his Milwaukee home, FBI agent David J. Williams said.

Mitich was an officer in the Wisconsin Army National Guard from April 1988 until he resigned Nov. 1, said Lt. Col. Tim Donovan, a guard spokesman.

The suspect, a former chief warrant officer, flew UH60 Blackhawk helicopters for the 1st Battalion, 147th Aviation Command based in Madison, Donovan said. The battalion was not assigned to Kosovo and did not participate in the Gulf War, Donovan said.

"I can't characterize his service," Donovan said.

Mitich also flew commercial flights for American Eagle, American Airlines' regional carrier, company spokesman Mark Slitt said. The company declined to comment on whether he still worked for the airline.

After Mitich was arrested, a bomb squad searched his apartment, authorities said.

Mitich was expected to appear in U.S. District Court in Milwaukee later in the day.

The FBI said an intruder scrawled graffiti reading "Free Kosovo" on a satellite dish early Wednesday at the 128th Air Refueling Wing compound. Kosovo is an Albanian spelling of Kosova.

It was unclear how the intruder got in. The suspect had no credentials that would have allowed him to get past the complex gate, Williams said.

As security guards chased the intruder, he dropped a bag containing two pipe bomb-type devices, authorities said.

The Milwaukee County Sheriff's Department defused the devices later Wednesday.

During the NATO air strikes in Yugoslavia in 1999, aimed at ending ethnic repression by Serb forces against ethnic Albanians, the 128th Air Refueling Wing sent about 170 members to a base outside London, where they serviced

aircraft flying in NATO's air operations in Kosovo.

Williams said investigators contacted local Serbian and Albanian communities and went door to door in some neighborhoods with a composite sketch of the intruder.

The hot line got a call about midnight and began zeroing in on the suspect, Williams said Thursday.

# Marriage penalty tax cut heads for final passage

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Republican marriage penalty bill that would cut taxes for millions of couples beginning this election year neared final passage Thursday in Congress.

Democrats called it a waste of budget surplus dollars that President Clinton will veto.

With 51 Democrats joining 220 Republicans, the House voted 271-156 to send the final compromise to the Senate.

Where GOP leaders planned to follow suit today and dispatch the legislation to the White House before the GOP national convention on Aug. 7.

Republicans said the bill was a long-overdue remedy to a tax code disparity that forces about 25 million two-income married couples to pay more taxes than if they were single.

The GOP said the measure would use just pennies on the dollar of a budget surplus now projected at \$2.17 trillion over the next decade, not counting Social Security money.

"There's no reason on earth why the president should veto this bill," said House Speaker Dennis Hastert, R-Ill. "I find it fiscally responsible to let hard-

working folks keep more of their own money."

Clinton has proposed more limited marriage penalty relief but offered to sign an earlier version of the GOP bill if Congress also passed an acceptable prescription drug benefit for Medicare recipients.

Rep. Bill Archer, R-Texas, the House Ways and Means Committee chairman, said the GOP would entertain "no linkage or trade on an issue this important to the families of America. It stands alone."

The House vote was short of the two-thirds margin necessary to override a veto. White House officials and Democrats said the marriage bill and other GOP tax cuts would cost \$700 billion over 10 years and divert priorities such as a prescription drug benefit and education.

"While we can continue to say yes to tax cuts, we're saying no to other things that the people of this country truly tell us they want," said Senate Minority Leader Tom Daschle, D-S.D.

The legislation was part of last year's \$792 billion tax cut that Clinton vetoed.

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# House vote allows 2.7% pay raise for lawmakers

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House voted Thursday to let members of Congress receive \$3,800 cost-of-living pay raises next year, underlining how the robust economy and surging federal surpluses have helped ease what has long been a sensitive political issue.

On a 250-173 vote, lawmakers signaled their assent to a 2.7-percent increase in their current \$14,300 annual salaries that would take effect in January.

Majorities of both Democrats and Republicans supported the raise, reflecting an agreement between party leaders not to attack each other's incumbents during this year's campaigns, for their votes.

Idaho Rep. Mike Simpson voted for the measure while Rep. Helen Chenoweth-Hage voted against.

During the few minutes of debate the issue received, no one spoke in favor of the increase.

Two lawmakers complained about the obscure procedural vote that was used to decide the

matter, and only one said he opposed the raise itself.

"Where I come from, the average salary for a family in my district is \$25,000," said Rep. Ernie Fletcher, R-Ky. He said the congressional increase would cost taxpayers \$2.5 million — "a lot of money for folks back in Kentucky."

"It would be lawmakers' third pay raise in the past four years and their second in a row. During this same four-year period, the economy has boomed and annual federal deficits have changed into ever-growing surpluses. Prior to that, the last congressional pay raise took effect in 1993.

Further spotlighting the issue's softer edge, this would be the first increase lawmakers have approved during an election year since 1992.

Members of Congress automatically receive cost-of-living raises unless they vote to block them, a mechanism they established in a 1989 law.

### From Indian water claims to international claims of love

What part of "no" doesn't the Nez Perce Tribe understand? The tribe has asked - twice - for 5th District Judge Barry Wood to disqualify himself from presiding over Nez Perce claims in the Snake River Basin Adjudication. The tribe points out that Wood and two of his family members also have claims in the SRBA. So do tens of thousands of other people.

Wood rejected both of the disqualification requests. An appeal is pending before the Idaho Supreme Court. So why is the tribe pestering Wood? The conflict-of-interest charge is a red herring to disguise the tribe's real intent, which is to get Wood off the case. Why? Because he ruled against a tribal fishing claim that was masquerading as a claim to water.

"The fishing right is non-exclusive and shared with non-Indians," Wood wrote in that decision. "Fishing rights are subject to changing circumstances incurred by settlement and development, which is what has occurred in this case."

Put another way, the ruling acknowledges non-Indian rights in the region. That's why the Nez Perce are dogging Wood.

### Washington state GOP asks a valid question

While we're on a tribal theme, it's noteworthy that the Washington state GOP is calling for elimination of American Indian tribal governments. It's also noteworthy that the Republican National Committee is scurrying to throw a wet blanket on the resolution, lest it set fire to George W. Bush's presidential ambitions.

We're in no position to say whether the Washington state GOP is right or wrong. But the central question - whether Indian tribes discriminate against non-Indians - is one that deserves discussion. After all, there's no lack of discussion whenever Indians claim they are the victims

of discrimination. Determining the limits of Indian sovereignty is a legitimate subject for inquiry, even in these politically correct times.

### And you thought your in-laws were a pain in the neck

Finally, there's the star-crossed saga of former Twin Falls resident Jason Johnson and his bride, Meriam-Al Khalifa.

Johnson is a U.S. Marine, while Al Khalifa is a princess from the wealthy Middle Eastern nation of Bahrain. The pair met in a shopping mall in Bahrain and Al Khalifa was quickly smitten. After all, there's something about a man in uniform.

When Johnson returned to the States, Al Khalifa used forged military documents to flee her homeland. Once in America, the couple got married. Now they live on a military base near San Diego.

It's an international love story with a spud-digging twist: Johnson is a 1994 graduate of Twin Falls High School. Those who remember him recall a swaggering young man with tough-guy attitude.

Now he's captured the heart of a nubile Bahraini princess.

Though happily married, the couple might not live happily ever after. For one thing, the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service has a bee in its bonnet over Al Khalifa entering the country under false pretenses. For another thing, her Muslim family is mighty upset that she married a non-Muslim.

If Al Khalifa is forced to return to her homeland, the least that Johnson can do for his country is broker a trade: Bahrain gets the princess, but only if America gets lower gas prices.

If Johnson returns with his bride, he should negotiate his royalties in advance - for the inevitable made-for-TV movie, "Beheaded over Heels."



## There's a victim born every minute

I don't know whether to be concerned about American boys or happy for them. Among cultural pundits and pop psychologists, magazine editors and book publishers, boys made it to the A list this summer.

One writer has named them America's new "second sex" - lagging behind girls in reading and math, less likely to go to college, saddled with nasty behavioral labels and struggling in schools that still insist girls are the ones being shorthanded.

Either way, boys are the latest victims in the running saga, "Who's Hurt More in the Gender Wars?" Which is why I'm also inclined to be happy for them. After all, you're nobody in America if you can't claim victim status. Women and girls have been riding that horse, for legitimate reasons and not, for several decades. More recently, men, especially white men, have tried to jump on.

There is a massive abandonment of common sense and more than a bit of group prejudice lurking beneath this overheated debate. It violates the cardinal rule of sensible behavior for everyone: See a child as an individual, with unique character traits, responses and, yes, some gender-inspired circuitry.

Oh, but it's more fun to pick sides. After decades of agitation and much real progress in opening up opportunities and expectations for boys, this hyper-concern over the status of boys was bound to happen. Going from a

monopoly to a competitive environment has a way of spotlighting weaknesses. It was, for example, a lot easier for young men to dominate college admissions when young women were discouraged from even applying.

Now the standard is to expect boys and girls to perform equally well at everything. And if they don't, we look for deep, significant messages.

In the gender wars, you see, there's always a winner and a loser unless it's a perfect tie.

One of the noisiest bearers of bad news about boys, Christina Hoff Sommers, stated categorically that it's "a bad time to be a boy in America." The triumphant victory of the U.S. women's soccer team at the World Cup last summer has come to symbolize the spirit of American girls. The shooting at Columbine High last year might be said to symbolize the spirit of American boys.

That might ring true if all girls were world-class athletes, and all boys potential murderers.

Are there legitimate issues we ought to worry about concerning boys? You bet. The fact is, boys have been the culprits in a number of school shootings that so wounded the nation in the last couple of years.

Boys are more likely to perform poorly on standardized reading and writing tests. They are also more likely to perform brilliantly.

They are more likely to be diagnosed with attention deficit disorder and other behavioral problems. As anyone who's ever raised boys will tell you, they're also more likely to play with plastic fighter jets, bang their heads a lot and fight with their brother than girls are.

Last time I checked, they're still more likely to grow up to become president. These are not pathologies (except, perhaps, for becoming president). They are issues with an important gender component. Girls are more likely to fail geography quizzes, obsess over their weight and suffer from migraines. Those aren't pathologies, either.

Gender differences will fascinate us endlessly because they go to our very cores. And it's crucial to study the similarities and distinctions in the ways boys and girls learn, react and grow.

But the research should not be misused or perverted to satisfy a political agenda or an interest-group complaint. As Sommers has rightly pointed out, that happened with some of the overwrought studies in the last decade predicting a "crisis" for American girls. Spare us the sequel, please.

### Crapo fights for filthy water

Sen. Crapo announced recently that he would fight the new Environmental Protection Agency's total maximum daily load requirements. This euphemism is used to describe the amount of pollution that is allowed by the EPA.

The senator is well-meaning, but what isn't known by 99 percent of the public is that there are 21,309 streams and segments that fish can't breed in and/or you shouldn't swim in within the 50 states.

These streams are in a mess because of chemical, nutrient, sediment or pesticides or a host of other reasons (cattle and other animals destroying the purity, road building, commercial pesticide use, etc.). This enormous number could be compounded by the fact that many states under-report their TMDLs by as much as 100 percent. (The Western Center for Environmental Information has this information documented.)

WECE applauds the EPA for raising the standards and fully will reverse the trend now seen - the threatened and endangered species lists generated by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

WECE is documenting all the polluted streams (TMDLs) in the United States

(see www.wcei.org). It is hoped that this effort will cooperate with the EPA rather than fight about how much more polluting they can do. The state of Idaho needs to lead the way toward clean streams which mean clean water for everyone.

Sen. Crapo must have misread what the new EPA requirement is and what the EPA wants Idaho to do.

# I am America, hear me groan

For all the advances scientists have made mapping the genome and fighting disease, the sad truth is we may be a nation of hypochondriacs.

More than two out of five people, when reading about new illness or syndrome admit they fancy they find symptoms in themselves, according to a recent Cyber Dialogue survey. Over 55 percent of those online respondents take vitamins. Sixty-nine percent with Internet access have consulted a medical Web site, and more than one in five have memorized their doctor's phone number.

The Howard Hughes syndrome, it seems, is not so eccentric. Almost two out of three people claim to always wash their hands before they eat and after they use the bathroom. Twenty-nine percent wash up after handling money.

The Gallup Organization found 89 percent of adults experience pain at least once a month. Forty-six percent of women and 37 percent of men say they experience pain daily.

The Arthritis Foundation survey of 2,000 adults found the most common type of pain was joint pain, followed by backaches, sore feet, muscle pain and neck or shoulder pain. The survey also found that 89 percent said they missed work in the past year due to pain. This preoccupation with our health is determining what sells in the supermarket.

A Food Marketing Institute survey found more than four out of five purchases in U.S. grocery stores are made for health reasons.

sons, and analysts predict demand will rise quickly. Between 1998 and 1999, "functional" food sales jumped nearly 13 percent, compared with just 1 percent to 2 percent in sales of more common grocery items. Function food sales are expected to reach \$22 billion by 2003.

It's also determining how we eat as well as what we eat. One-third of Americans claim they never share utensils and cups. Half will share a fork or spoon with a family member, but only 17 percent say they always share with friends. If an office colleague has a cold, 75 percent will go out of their way to avoid using his or her phone at work.

Americans also prepare: Twenty-three percent of respondents keep more than 10 medications in the medicine cabinet, and another 35 percent keep five to 10 different remedies. Americans spent \$100 billion on prescription drugs last year. Prozac and Claritin have become household names, impotence and herpes, dinner conversation.

So are aches and pains. Only 7 percent admit to a low pain threshold, while 49 percent boast a pain threshold so high they can take almost anything.

Yet for a nation so focused on every sniffle, our actual medical knowledge is not so sound. Nearly 30 percent of us can't name a single illness-causing bacteria, despite the widely reported findings from a team of microbiologists at the

University of Arizona. These infectious disease experts measured levels of contaminants on frequently touched public surfaces that can transmit infectious diseases. One in four surfaces tested positive for certain proteins that indicate poor hygiene and can carry illness-causing germs.

One in five surfaces tested positive for at least one bodily fluid, such as blood, urine, saliva, mucus and sweat. The most contaminated environments were children's playgrounds and day-care centers.

But three or more contaminants were also found on each of the public surfaces tested on buses, shopping carts, arm chair rests, vending machine knobs, escalator handrails and public phones.

Researchers warn people unknowingly bring contaminants such as staph, salmonella and E. coli home, where starting with the front door knob, they spread.

Forty-four percent of people believe their risk of bacterial exposure in their own home is really one of the cleanest places because it's more likely to be disinfected on a regular basis, compared to doorknobs, telephones and TV remote controls.

And while most of us recognize "How are you?" is a rote greeting, as meaningless as "Have a nice day," 6 percent of respondents give the gory details.

# Cancer survival rates don't equal longer lives

The good news about America's war-on-cancer efforts is that prostate cancer: The five-year survival rate of patients is now 94 percent, up from 43 percent in 1950. Lung cancer: Cases detected early using spiral CAT scanning have given patients an expected five-year survival rate of 60 percent, up from 14 percent. Colon cancer: American patients now have a five-year survival rate of 60 percent, compared with 35 percent for British patients.

Does this mean that fewer men are dying from prostate cancer, that we should encourage lung cancer screening with spiral computerized tomography (CAT) scans and that cancer care in the United States is far superior to care in the United Kingdom? Maybe not.

Most of us assume that rising five-year survival rates mean that cancer death rates are falling. But in a study for the Journal of the American Medical Association, my colleagues and I found no relationship between changes in five-year survival rates and changes in how many Americans die from cancer, as measured by the number of cancer deaths per 100,000 population.

Despite all the press about recent declines, the current death rate from prostate cancer is actually a little higher than in 1950, and the death rate from melanoma is more than twice as high.

To understand how five-year survival could be so misleading, you have to understand the statistics. A five-year survival rate is the proportion of individuals with cancer who are alive five years after receiving the diagnosis.

First, to keep the math easy, let's consider one group of men: those who died of prostate cancer at age 78 (the median age of death for men with the disease). If everyone in that group had been diagnosed when they were 75, their five-year survival rate would be 0 percent. But if everyone in that same group had been diagnosed when they were 70, the five-year survival rate would be 100 percent. What has changed? Reported five-year survival has gone up, people are aware of a cancer diagnosis for a longer period of time, but everyone still died at age 78.

One thing we know is that five-year survival rates will increase over time, even if death rates don't change, simply because we are telling people they have cancer earlier in their lives and because we are finding more nonprogressive cancer.

Another thing we know is that new diagnostic tests and aggressive screening programs will always look good using five-year survival rates, even if early diagnosis doesn't help people live one day longer. And because we test so much more frequently than most other countries, we know that international comparisons using five-year survival

Mother objects to endangerment charge

JEROME - A Jerome mother said she feels fortunate her daughter is alive after she was missing for several hours Tuesday, but she also said the criminal charge city police brought against her is unfair.

Lisa Harshbarger, 31, received the citation on a child endangerment charge Tuesday, after dozens of people spent the morning trying to find her 5-year-old daughter, Kayla Harshbarger. Lisa Harshbarger called police at around 10 a.m. Tuesday and reported the girl missing, not knowing the girl had simply

caught the bus to her preschool, as she normally does.

After several hours, authorities and Kayla's parents were starting to fear the worst. Then, at about 12:30 p.m., the school bus dropped Kayla off by her house.

The Jerome Police Department charged Lisa Harshbarger with misdemeanor child endangerment, which carries a maximum penalty of six months in jail and a \$1,000 fine.

Chief Investigator Sgt. Jim Baker said parts of the mother's account did not match the facts - facts like what time she had last seen her daughter, and what clothes the girl was wearing. He said the circumstances warrant-

ed the misdemeanor citation she received.

Lisa Harshbarger said she is seriously thinking about entering an innocent plea at her initial court appearance July 31. She and her husband, David Harshbarger, said they feel the citation is a slap in the face for seeking help.

"Everybody makes mistakes. Nobody in this world is perfect," David Harshbarger said. "That's what irritates me is that she tried to do the right thing and they're essentially saying she's a bad mother."

Baker and the Harshbargers both say Kayla has wandered from the Harshbargers' home before. A November 1999 inci-

dent prompted Department of Health and Welfare officials to remove Kayla and her younger sibling from the home for a couple of days, the Harshbargers said Thursday.

Health and Welfare officials instructed the Harshbargers after the November incident to call the police if their children should wander off again. That's what they did Tuesday, which is why Lisa Harshbarger believes the charges are unjust.

"Now I feel like I'm being punished for doing what they told me," she said.

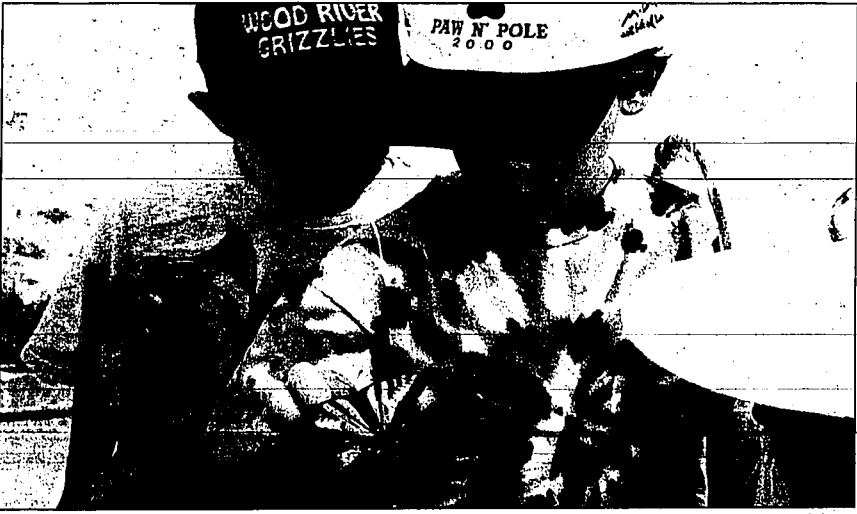
Baker said this week's incident did not merit a felony charge, but he thought it certainly earned the misdemeanor charge.

"These people have been in trouble like this before. Ultimately the only way to get their attention is to take them into the court system and make them legally accountable," he said.

No matter what the result in court is, the Harshbargers said they've learned plenty.

"The main thing that should be emphasized here is always know where your kids are," David Harshbarger said. "It doesn't matter what their age is. Always know where they are."

Class offers look at creepy-crawly critters

TRAIL CREEK - As Ann Christensen forges across the sagebrush plateau above Trail Creek, 10 children follow in her footsteps.

"Now let's put on our spider eyes," she said, her eyes scanning the bushes for webs. In moments she's down on her knees, examining stripes on a spider's belly, children crowded around her.

The Ants and Plants class offered every summer by the College of Southern Idaho is, it seems, a child's little idea of Nirvana.

Four days of wading through a marsh, looking for leeches and toads. Of crawling through tall grasses in pursuit of snakes. Of running through a meadow, net in hand, chasing black and yellow swallowtail butterflies.

"It's a class guaranteed to set the woodland north of Ketchum abuzz - the commotion coming from the children, not the creepy crawlies they're on the prowl for.

"My desire is for them to get a love of nature, an appreciation of the outdoors and a sense of the interconnectedness of things," Christensen said.

Christensen is a veteran naturalist who drops tidbits of information tailored to the youngsters' level, at every turn in the marsh.

When the children capture a snake she has them examine the tail length to see if it's a boy or girl. Girls need more room for their eggs so their tail is shorter, she tells them.

"When someone finds an antise swallowtail with a bite taken out of the wing, Christensen encourages the children to put on their detective hats and figure out what happened to it.

"Note the butterfly's tail," she said. "If a bird aims for it, it twiggles its tail in hopes the bird will go for the tail. It can spare its tail."

"These classes are a lot more fun than reading a book about the subject. It's like learning about life for real," said 16-year-old Blake Schenby of Hootley, who took the class several times

as a youth and now assists.

Christensen has been teaching the Ants and Plants class for years. The class evolved from the Snails and Wholes and Bugs and Slugs classes she used to teach in Marin County, Calif. But every year is fresh.

This year, for instance, there are more butterflies than usual because of the mild winter and long mild spring. At the same time, the heat could kill them off more quickly, she said.

She doesn't resist taking the lead from a student - especially one like Nicky Allen: a three-time class participant and a natural at finding creepy crawlies.

Following Allen on an Indiana Jones-type expedition across a placid part of Trail Creek, the class gets a close-up look at a beaver lodge, two mouse tracks and a large pile of moose scat.

Christensen also teaches her students to be respectful of the animals.

When the children find a snake, Christensen encourages them to hold it loosely so the snake thinks it's in control. She admonishes them to rinse their

hands of suntan lotion before handling the frog since it

Suit reopened against Heyburn; family might settle

HEYBURN - A judge this week reopened a civil suit filed by a Heyburn family against the city, alleging negligence.

This ruling reverses an earlier decision to dismiss the case involving James and Janice Hollahan. The Hollahans sued in February 1999, alleging that in May 1997, a Heyburn maintenance worker was negligent when he broke open a sewer line that flooded the basement of the Hollahan's home.

In December 1999, 5th District Judge William Hart dismissed the Hollahan's case, claiming default. The Hollahan's attorney had withdrawn from the case, leaving them 20 days to appoint

a new attorney to appear, or appear themselves.

The Hollahans did not meet the deadline.

In an affidavit signed by James Hollahan, the family had been unable to appoint a new attorney because they were spending long periods of time traveling to and from Utah, where their son Ricky was being treated for health problems.

In Hart's Wednesday opinion, that was sufficient reason to reopen the case.

"... (The) plaintiffs have offered a reasonable defense of excusable neglect," Hart wrote.

James Hollahan has been unable to work since he hurt his back after slipping on a step while trying to get the sewage

out of his home. Ricky Hollahan received a kidney transplant earlier this year. At one time, he had been taken off the transplant waiting list because the mold spores in his home would have risked his chance for a successful transplant.

The Hollahans and the city had agreed in August 1999 to dismiss the claims and settle for \$15,000, but the Hollahans subsequently changed their minds.

A September letter from Heyburn's attorney, James Davis, to the Hollahans' then-attorney, John Looze, said Heyburn intended to enforce the terms of the settlement.

Looze posted notice in October that he intended to withdraw from the case, saying his rela-

tionship with the Hollahans had "broken down," so it would no longer be in their best interest for him to represent them.

After Hart dismissed the case by default, a February letter from Davis to James Hollahan recalls a phone conversation in which James Hollahan indicated he was ready to accept the \$15,000 settlement.

Although the action had been dismissed and the check canceled, Davis contacted city officials to see whether there was any interest in paying at this time. City officials said no, according to the letter.

The Hollahan's new attorney, David Penna, said Thursday he thinks the matter will probably settle, most likely for \$15,000.

Back to face charges?

Prosecutors try to extradite woman from Des Moines

TWIN FALLS - A former Twin Falls woman is being held in jail in Des Moines, Iowa, and Twin Falls prosecutors are trying to extradite her.

Peggy Sue Williams, 34, is charged with forgery in Des Moines, according to Des Moines court records. Local officials want her back in Idaho, saying she failed to appear in court on forgery and grand theft charges.

"We're trying to get her back," Twin Falls Deputy Prosecutor John Brody said.

Williams was scheduled, in April to appear in District Court in Twin Falls, for arraignment for a forgery charge and a probation violation disposition stemming from a grand theft conviction, Brody said.

Brody said he issued a warrant for Williams in April. Subsequently, the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office listed Williams in its "Wanted in the Magic Valley" list, which runs Saturdays in The Times-News.

Williams won't be sent back to Idaho until her charges in Iowa have been resolved, Brody said.

She was assigned a public defender in Iowa - Valorie Wilson, who was unavailable for comment Thursday. She has had a preliminary hearing there, according to court records, but it's unknown if she has entered a plea.

Local officials don't know how long a wait is ahead of them.

"It depends," Brody said. "It might not be long, or it could be drawn out if she fights extradition. If she gets a sentence there it could take a long time."

If Williams were extradited and convicted, she could get up to 14 years in jail for the forgery charge and four to eight years for grand theft, Brody said.

In 1994, Williams pleaded guilty to two grand theft charges. Brody said. Williams was sentenced to three years' supervised probation and a suspension of grand theft of eight years in prison for grand theft.

If extradited, Williams could serve the remaining years of the suspended sentence, Brody said.

Jerome group helps homeless pets

JEROME - Animals in Jerome now have a corporate friend in the city center.

Jerome Pet Pals, a nonprofit organization that raises money for the care of homeless animals in Jerome and other areas of the Magic Valley, filed articles of incorporation with the State of Idaho June 30, Fred Tate told the City Council Tuesday.

Tate, a spokesman for Pet Pals, said the group's mission is to improve and expand the Jerome animal shelter and to promote better treatment of animals in Jerome County. The corporation is totally independent of the city and "county" of Jerome and any other government body, Tate said.

Pet Pals grew out of the animal control ordinance committee appointed by Mayor Dennis Moore in November 1998. The committee was given the task of designing a workable animal control ordinance for the city of Jerome. The final version of the ordinance was adopted in January 2000, said Karen Kramer, a local animal groomer.

control committee members, along with Richard Evans and Ulysses Vaccello make up the board of directors of the newly-formed corporation. The directors do not receive compensation.

According to the articles of incorporation, if the corporation should dissolve, all remaining funds will be distributed to the Jerome city budget fund for the maintenance and improvement of the animal shelter. In the meantime, the Pet Pals money is totally and completely separate from the city budget.

Pet Pals memberships are \$5 per year and members will be able to vote on issues that come

up at Pet Pals meetings. Meetings will be held as needed and annual corporate meetings will be held the second Monday of July.

Tate told the council that between Jan. 1, 1999 and June 30, 2000 there were 64 animal control violations in the city and in fines were collected for animal control-related violations and \$498 in fines are outstanding and still need to be collected. Tate requested the city consider eventually channeling all animal control fines to the Pet Pals Inc. The council will consider his request.

All of the council members as well as several city employees purchased Pet Pals memberships at Tuesday's meeting. Tate said all of Jerome's city commissioners joined the organization and Jerome County Clerk Cheryl Watts was the first Pet Pals member.

Pet Pals is now trying to attain humane treatment, Kramer said. Moore said he would like Pet Pals to eventually take over the management of the Jerome Animal Shelter.

Jerome might expand courthouse

JEROME - The county has outgrown the courthouse, county planning and zoning administrator Art Brown told the Jerome City Council Tuesday evening.

Jerome County recently bought a house at 121 Third Ave. E., directly adjacent to the courthouse on the east side, and is remodeling it into an office building. The county requested a rezoning from residential to business.

The remodeled office building would include handicapped access, and house non-judicial county offices. The lawn would be converted into parking adding four-to-eight parking spaces to the courthouse area, Brown said. The council held first reading on the request Tuesday. A final decision could be made at the council's Aug. 15 meeting.

In other business: Jacob Miller, 408 E. Ave. A., requested a variance to allow

him to raise homing pigeons. Miller said he wanted to house around 60 pigeons on the property.

"The city code has no provision for pigeons," City Administrator Jon Cecil said. "Only horses, cattle and sheep are mentioned in the city code."

Mayor Dennis Moore said Miller would need to go to the city Planning and Zoning Commission and request an ordinance change before the city could allow him to raise pigeons.

Jeff Martin - representing Horizon Estates, a 23-acre subdivision to be located in the northeast corner of Jerome between Horizon School and 16th Avenue East - presented the preliminary plat to the council for approval.

The subdivision would contain "middle-to-upper priced homes built on 1,400-square-foot lots," and would be developed over time, Martin said.

The council gave tentative approval for the subdivision, owned by Bonnie Ross and Dan Suhr, with the stipulation that

sidewalks are added to plans, and one share of irrigation water per acre is provided.

The council approved hiring Scott Bybee as a permanent administrator until a permanent administrator can be hired. Bybee was hired in May for 30 hours per week as the city engineer, at an annual salary of \$45,625. Bybee will work as the temporary administrator with no increase in salary.

Cecil will step down from his \$45,000-a-year job at the end of July, to take a research position with Boise State University. Councilman Joe Skaug said he was concerned about Bybee having enough time to perform his engineering duties and the administrative tasks.

He really puts the heat on to fill this position as soon as possible," Skaug said.

The council is reviewing applications for Cecil's job.

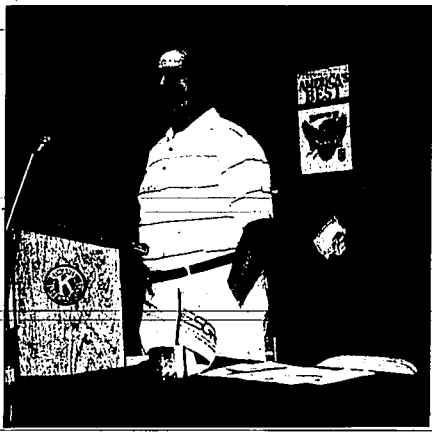
Gene Stoker, a 32-year member of the U.S. Marine Corps, Army National Guard and Guard Reserves, said that the military is very dependent on reservists.

"We are a combat unit," Davis said. "We are fully trained and ready."

He said most of the recruiting is now done at the high schools where it has become a popular choice for graduating seniors. Reservists receive a number of benefits including financial help for college.

# Report: Cost concern hampered New Mexico fire-fighting effort

LOS ALAMOS, N.M. (AP) — The National Park Service shied away from using bulldozers and chain saws to contain the Cerro Grande Fire in its early stages out of concern that doing so would harm the woods and cost too much, according to a report by the U.S. General Accounting Office.

Instead of using the machines, Park Service officials tried to stop the spread of the fire by lighting new fires in an attempt to steal fuel from the blaze.

But as winds kicked up, those secondary fires spread out of control, ultimately burning more than 47,000 acres and leaving hundreds of Los Alamos residents homeless.

Barry Hill, associate director of Energy, Resources and Science Issues for the GAO, had been scheduled to present the agency's report to the Senate's Energy and Natural Resources Committee on Thursday. But the hearing was postponed indefinitely while the

committee considers other matters.

The GAO report says Park Service officials decided to fight the fire because of a policy that dictates officials must follow fire-fighting tactics that "minimize costs and resource damage."

"The existing Park Service policy requiring fire managers to protect resources while trying to suppress a wildfire should be revised in instances like Cerro Grande," the report states. "In these cases, where the threat of a prescribed fire's getting out of control poses direct and serious public safety risks, there should be no question that fire suppression should be top priority."

The Cerro Grande Fire spread into Los Alamos on May 10, forcing the evacuation of more than 20,000 people from the town and its nearby suburb of White Rock. More than 200 homes were destroyed.

In the future, the GAO recom-

mends that all federal agencies planning controlled burns in risky areas offer their plans to peer review by knowledgeable officials outside their first match.

On the question of what caused the Cerro Grande Fire, the GAO reached the same basic conclusion as two earlier federal studies, that Park Service officials underestimated the complexity of conditions in the mountains west of Los Alamos before lighting the fire.

The GAO report states that the Park Service generally agreed with the report's conclusions. However, it states that the U.S. Forest Service questioned the practicality of requiring burn plans be peer-reviewed by people outside the agency.

Nonetheless, the report says the dangers of prescribed burning warrant the kind of check and balance that an outside peer review would provide.

# Fire forces evacuation of park

MESA VERDE NATIONAL PARK, Colo. (AP) — Authorities closed Mesa Verde National Park and ordered as many as 1,500 people to leave after a wildfire raced through tinder-dry brush, growing from 50 acres to 500 acres in about three hours.

Meanwhile, about 40 firefighters worked Thursday to protect livestock and a home from a wildfire burning on about 950 acres in national forest and private land northeast of Moab.

The lightning-caused fire was burning in pines, sagebrush and juniper. Two air tankers and six engines were helping fight the fire.

Firefighters were battling at least six other fires across Colorado that were smaller than 100 acres each. Many were ignited by lightning and were worsened by strong winds, low humidity and parched trees, shrubs and grass.

# Supreme Court discards special orders in circumstantial evidence

BOISE (AP) — It is time for Idaho to join a growing number of states that do not require a special jury instruction in cases based entirely on circumstantial evidence, the Idaho Supreme Court has ruled.

In doing so, the high court has affirmed the first-degree arson conviction of a Mountain Home woman accused of setting fire to a trailer owned by her estranged husband.

The court emphasizes that the traditional protection afforded by an instruction on reasonable doubt makes an additional instruction on circumstantial evidence unnecessary, in the unani-

mous decision written by Justice Wayne Kidwell.

On April 24, 1998, the Mountain Home Fire Department responded to fire in a trailer occupied by Nellie Humphreys and her daughter. After the blaze was extinguished, firefighters became suspicious about the cause.

The fire chief and state fire marshal concluded it started in two places and a volatile accelerant was used.

Humphreys spoke Spanish, but little English. When the fire chief confronted her with the possibility of arson, she "started crying, blaming her ex-husband for starting the fire, ranting and raving,

going on, and she was at that time kind of difficult to understand." At trial, Humphreys' attorney requested a special jury instruction on the use of circumstantial evidence. Prosecutors argued the instruction was not appropriate because even though they had no direct evidence of her guilt, they did have evidence of arson. The request was turned down.

The special instruction stemmed from the conviction of an Idaho man in the burglary of a sporting goods store. Witnesses related how they spotted vehicles resembling his at the time the crime occurred.

# Firefighters sick with mystery illness

BOISE (AP) — About two dozen fire fighters in the Salmon-Challis National Forest have come down with an illness that officials feared may be E-Coli, but further test results are pending.

Fire Information Officer Frank Finley said early tests showed E-Coli bacteria, but further Health Department analysis determined the bacteria did not cause the outbreak.

Officials are waiting for more results so they can identify the illness that sickened 25 fire fighters last weekend after they drank from a Forest Service water truck. The affected crew members exhibited E-Coli-like symptoms including vomiting and diarrhea.

They were hospitalized and 12 remain under medical care, being treated mostly for dehydration.

Finley said the contaminated water came from a municipal water source. He said the water tank and all equipment that comes in contact with it has been sterilized.

"The good part of the story is that the number of people reporting problems to the medical unit is decreasing," Finley said. E-Coli bacteria take up to 72 hours to incubate.

# Hiking trail murder still unsolved

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — The Kootenai County Sheriff's Department said Thursday it is seeking help from law-enforcement agencies nationwide to try to solve the April 26 slaying of a man stabbed to death along a popular hiking trail.

Information about the case, including a composite drawing of a man seen leaving the area before the body was found, has been sent to other agencies via nationwide databases on unsolved crimes, Sheriff Rocky Watson said.

"Two of the department's eight investigators continue to work

full time on the slaying of Joe Murphy, 43, of Coeur d'Alene.

Investigators have devoted more than 1,800 hours to the case, visited four states and sorted through more than 500 photos.

"The man seen leaving the area is considered a possible suspect, but detectives have been unable to identify him.

Investigators have asked the FBI's Behavioral Science Section to develop a criminal profile of the killer, Watson said. This week, a hypnotist interviewed people who had been in the area at the time to see if they could remember any more details.

Detectives have searched with specially trained dogs and metal detectors but no weapon has been found.

Hikers found Murphy's body near the parking lot of the Memorial Ridge Ski Area about five miles south of Wolf Lodge Bay at the northeastern corner of Lake Coeur d'Alene.

There was no sign of a struggle, and Murphy's clothing suggested he had been hiking, investigators said.

Friends of Murphy have offered a reward for information in the case and have posted flyers showing the composite drawing.

# Officials worry about stigma of designation

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP) — Washington state interests fear a five-mile stretch of mining wastes generated in Idaho, yet worry about the stigma of a potential Superfund designation.

Robert Martin, the Environmental Protection Agency's national ombudsman, is in the Inland Northwest to survey reaction to plans for cleaning up mining wastes in the Coeur d'Alene River Basin.

But the agency also is doing a

preliminary investigation into expanding Idaho's 21-square-mile Hill Superfund site near the Spokane River, which flows into Washington from Lake Coeur d'Alene.

On Tuesday, Spokane city and county officials told Martin they fear a Superfund designation would dampen economic development.

Certainly, all of us are very concerned about the economic effects of a Superfund designation," Martin said.

There is a huge stigma attached to a Superfund site,"

Therrie Rodgers, a Spokane city councilwoman, discounted McCaslin's fears, saying most people are unaware the county has more than a dozen Superfund cleanupsites.

Martin said he has heard from major Washington state companies concerned about the possible negative economic effects of a Superfund designation.

# Attorney general names phone company in suit

BOISE (AP) — Attorney General Al Lance is accusing AT&T of employing deceptive and misleading advertising practices that lead to customers paying more for long distance service than they thought.

Lance's Consumer Protection Unit filed a lawsuit on Thursday alleging violations of the Idaho Consumer Protection Act by long

distance telephone company AT&T.

Lance said AT&T adds charges to consumers' monthly "On Rate Seven Cents Plan" bills. He said the company does not adequately disclose the monthly carrier line charges, a \$3.95 monthly fee or the in-state long-distance rates

between 12 and 15 cents per minute.

Lance wants the court to order AT&T to disclose the full cost of service. He also is seeking restitution for Idaho consumers who have been overcharged as a result of the plan and asking for civil penalties to be imposed against AT&T.

# Pediatrician pleads guilty to Internet sex charge

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A former pediatrician caught in a sting operation pleaded guilty to using an Internet chat room to try to solicit sex with a boy.

Brent Blackburn, 36, of Salt Lake City, entered the plea Thursday afternoon before U.S. District Judge Dale Kimball, according to the U.S. Attorney's Office.

He faces up to 15 years in federal prison and a \$250,000 fine at an Oct. 2 sentencing. As part of his plea agreement, however, prosecutors agreed to recommend a reduced sentence and to not file charges on an alleged similar incident that occurred in July 1998.

Blackburn was indicted last September on charges of trying to entice a minor in sexual activity.

Blackburn admitted Thursday he traded computer messages with a person he thought was a 13-year-old boy, prosecutors said. He actually was corresponding with a Salt Lake City police detective.

Blackburn was arrested when he showed up at an arranged late-night meeting behind a Salt Lake area high school.

"I know when I take my daughter out after one of these classes, she examines the bushes. She knows why the tree's so tall. It really makes her aware of her surroundings."

Continued from B1 The U.S. Department of Justice has threatened a \$27,500-per-day fine against the county stemming from work the county did on the road back in 1998. That fine would now amount to about \$19 million.

Under the proposed settlement agreement, those fines would be dropped and the Forest Service would continue to study to see if the road could be rebuilt without damaging the environment or harming the bull trout which is on the threatened species list. If the study results show an elevated road can be rebuilt without damaging the environment, the federal government would rebuild the road. The county would pay \$208,000 to help with the road construction and to improve the bull trout habitat. Nannini said the county's insurance carrier would pay a large portion of the \$200,000. The county would receive the right-of-

way on the road, but would not own the road, which doesn't sit right with three of the five county commissioners.

# State agency approves INEEL permit

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — After more than a year of controversy, construction could begin in 30 days on a plant to sort and ship Idaho's stockpile of radioactive garbage out of state.

The Idaho Department of Environmental Quality has approved an air quality permit for a new treatment facility at the Idaho National Engineering and Environmental Laboratory.

The permit allows the Department of Energy and contractor British Nuclear Fuels Ltd. to construct and operate the Advanced Mixed Waste Treatment Project for the treatment of plutonium-contaminated waste. The facility will not be an incinerator.

"We're thrilled that things are moving forward," said Ann Riedesel, a spokeswoman for BNFL. "For so long things felt like they were in a hole. Now we were caught up in red-tape. But now we're starting to see things happen." The plant is scheduled to be completed by 2003, as part of a

deal reached in 1995 between the state and federal government. All transuranic waste is to be removed from Idaho by 2018, under the agreement. The treatment facility is part of the plan to meet that deadline.

The project could generate 80 to 100 construction jobs by the end of this year. During the busiest part of the building boom, between 150 to 300 people could be employed. In addition, BNFL intends to double its Idaho staff from 28 to 53.

The Advanced Mixed Waste Treatment Project hit a major snag last spring when residents in the resort town of Jackson, Wyo., found out about plans to burn some of the waste, which is filled with hazardous chemicals considered too dangerous to bury underground.

Worried about the health effects from plutonium fallout, the town raised \$500,000 and launched a court battle to stop the incinerator last fall.

They dropped their lawsuit after the DOE agreed to convene a scientific panel to look for

other technologies to treat that waste. In exchange, the plaintiffs agreed not to contest permits for parts of the plant that would simply sort and crush the waste.

"We're legally bound not to interfere with the parts of the permit that didn't have anything to do with incineration," said Erik Ringelberg, executive director of Keep Yellowstone Nuclear Free, in Jackson.

About 65,000 cubic meters of plutonium-contaminated waste now is stored at the INEEL. The radioactive refuse — boots, rags, equipment and sludges — was largely generated during nuclear bomb production in Colorado and has been stored in Idaho for decades.

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# Acquitted teacher might face revocation

OGDEN, Utah (AP) — Teacher Merrill Harris has been acquitted of a charge that he fondled a student, but still faces proceedings to revoke his teaching certificate.

Harris, a teacher at North Ogden Junior High, on Monday was found innocent of sexual battery. He was accused of inappropriately touching a female student as they walked down a school hallway on Feb. 28.

"It only took the jury 25 minutes to arrive at a verdict that it never happened," said Mike Boyer, director of the Weber and Ogden Education Association. Boyer, an attorney, also assisted in Harris' defense.

But despite the dismissed charge, the Utah Office of Education has not dropped its petition to revoke Harris' teaching certificate, he said. "They're going to say theirs is a

separate proceeding, but it's really an un-American concept," Boyer said.

"Despite the acquittal, they can take away his livelihood. He's innocent, totally innocent, and the state can still do this," he said.

The certification action was filed by Carol Lear, an attorney in the state education office. She was out of town and unavailable for comment.

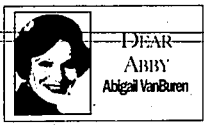

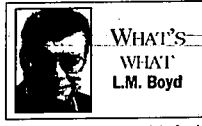

## Two defendants go free in murder case

KENDRICK (AP) - Charges will be dropped against two of the six defendants in a double murder case.

Latah County prosecutors made the decision on Wednesday. John Lawrence Abitz of Kendrick, and Martha J. Millar of Ironton, Mo., were accused of being minor players in a group plan to kill Donna Fontaine and Fred Palahniuk during the 1999 May Locust Blossom Festival in Kendrick.

Abitz was accused of committing perjury during a grand jury investigation for allegedly lying to investigators about his knowledge of the murders.

Millar was accused of being a

principal to preparing false evidence for allegedly taped recording a conversation between two other defendants in the murder case to throw investigators off the trail.

Deputy Prosecuting Attorney Robin Eckmann said new evidence in the case prompted the motion to dismiss charges against Abitz and Millar.

That evidence came from testimony from Bernadette Ann Lasater, a Potosi, Mo., woman who agreed to testify against other defendants in exchange for a reduced charge.

Lasater's plea bargain included a guilty plea to charges of being an accessory to first-degree murder and perjury. Her written statement apparently cleared Abitz and Millar of involvement in the crime.

The bodies of Fontaine, a lawyer from Ironton, Mo., and her boyfriend Palahniuk, of Newman Lake, Wash., were found in a burning garage near Kendrick.

Both had been shot with a .32-caliber pistol. Fontaine also suffered a shotgun wound.

Now only three defendants are left facing trial: Dale Carter Shackelford, who is accused of being the mastermind behind the murders and of carrying them out; his fiancée, Sonja Marie Abitz; and her mother, Mary Margaret Abitz.

## Father kills cougar seen near children


BLANCHARD (AP) - A northern Idaho man has killed a cougar which appeared to be snarling his children.

Leland Tripp guessed the cat was only 150 feet from 5-year-old Marista and 8-year-old Brandon on Tuesday. And it was moving closer. The family dog, a Jack Russell terrier, was growling. Tripp tried to scare off the big cat, but it only ran about 350 feet away and sat down. "I felt like it was a danger," Tripp said. "Something like that, that isn't startled enough to run away, that's a problem."

So Tripp located his children inside the house and shot the cougar with a rifle at about 500 feet.

But he had only one bullet and was not sure the animal was dead, so he notified authorities: Bonner County Sheriff's Cpl. Wade Wills called the Idaho Department of Fish and Game and a neighbor with some tracking dogs.

Death toll rises to hundreds from landslides in China

BEIJING - The death toll in a landslide set off by heavy rains in central China has risen to 213, while landslides have killed 23 people in western China, state media reported Thursday.

In western China, seasonal downpours caused massive shifts of rock and soil in the Liangshan area, a mountainous region of Sichuan province inhabited by the Yi minority people, the government's Xinhua News Agency reported.

Son of political leader kidnapped in Tijuana

TIJUANA, Mexico - A son of a local political party leader was kidnapped in this violence-plagued border city and two other victims - one the son of a well-known singer - were found slain.

The state attorney general's office said four armed men intercepted the car carrying 13-year-old Victor Lagunas Penolosa in a residential area of Tijuana on Wednesday.

Tijuana, a fast-growing city of 1.2 million people, has been plagued in recent years by murders linked to drug gangs who take advantage of the city's location on the U.S. border. It also has seen numerous kidnappings, though reported incidents had seemed to taper off in recent months.

Fiji could split in wake of ethnic resentments

SUVA, Fiji - Turmoil in ethnically divided Fiji deepened Thursday as the prospect of rival governments emerged and figures were released that outlined the economy's devastation since a coup in May.

In the capital, Suva, interim government officials met with coup leader George Speight over his demands for greater representation in a new Cabinet. Neither side commented after the meeting at the central police station.

At the same time, members of the ousted Cabinet huddled in Ba, on the western side of Viti

Levi Island, to plot strategy, with establishment of a separate government emerging among the possibilities.

Speight's coup was carried out in the name of guaranteeing political superiority to indigenous Fijians.

He freed his last 18 hostages on July 13 as part of a deal that Speight said would disenfranchise ethnic Indian Fijians. They make up 44 percent of the 514,000 population but dominate the economy in Fiji, a nation of 320 islands about 2,250 miles northeast of Sydney, Australia.

Building collapse in Egypt kills firefighters, workers

ALEXANDRIA, Egypt - A six-story building collapsed after a devastating blaze while firefighters and workers were inside, killing 15 people including the commander of the city's fire brigade, officials said Thursday.

At least 38 factory workers and firefighters were injured in the collapse or from smoke inhalation, said officials at Muwassa Hospital in the Mediterranean city of Alexandria. The fire broke out Wednesday, and the collapse occurred hours later.

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Russia, North Korea oppose U.S. anti-missile shield

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) - The leaders of Russia and North Korea on Thursday urged the United States to scrap its proposed anti-missile shields, saying the North's missile program is meant for peaceful purposes, official media reported.

As Russian President Vladimir Putin concluded his first-ever visit to North Korea and meetings with Kim Jong Il on Thursday, the North's news agency released a Kim-Putin statement that promised close relations between the two countries. The statement also focused on the missile issue.

North Korea "stated that its missile program does not pose any threat to anybody but is purely peaceful in its nature," said the statement, carried in its entirety by the official Korean Central News Agency.

The statement came a day after Russia's Interfax news agency quoted Putin as saying North Korea's "preparations to abandon its missile program if other nations offer it rocket boosters so it can launch satellites" for peaceful space research. Some analysts said that appeared to be an effort to invalidate the rationale behind the U.S. missile shield.

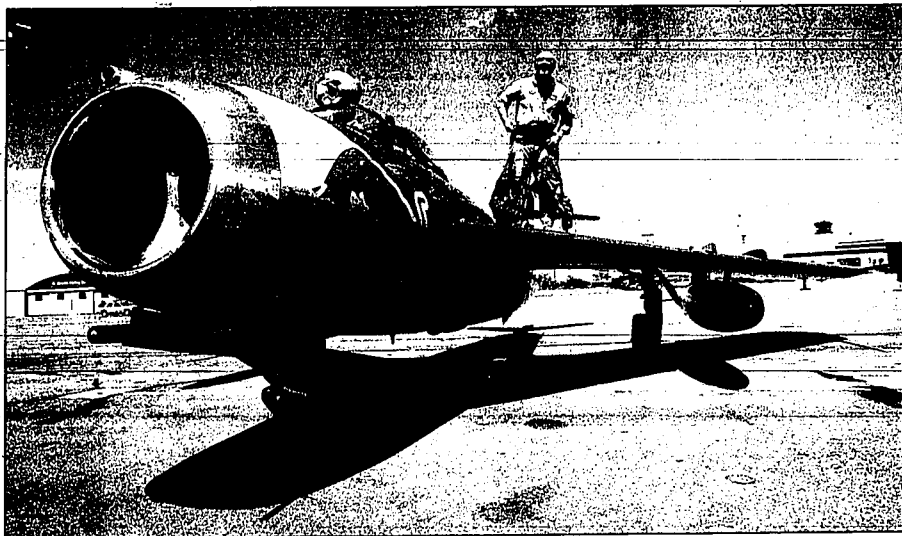

## A dazzling Cold War relic will be at Saturday's Air Magic Valley 2000

TWIN FALLS - When ex-fighter jock Bill Reesman is cruising along at the speed of a shout, he mostly counts his blessings that he didn't meet his MIG-17 sooner.

"I flew F-100s in Vietnam, and none of our pilots wanted to run into a MIG-17," said Reesman, whose defiantly red Russian jet will be the highlight of Air Magic Valley 2000 on Saturday at Joslin Field, Magic Valley Airport. "They were maneuverable and they could turn. (North) Vietnam's top ace, Col. Tomb, got most of his kills in a MIG-17."

For Reesman, the barrel-nosed fighter is just about the ideal plane to thrill the customers at air shows, where he spends much of his summers. It's fast - it can fly at the speed of sound - but not too fast.

"That's the trouble with the (Navy's) Blue Angels," he said. "If you're on the ground, you see them for about five seconds. Then they're in the next county."

Ex-Soviet Bloc aircraft have proliferated in the West since the end of the Cold War, but Reesman knows of only five flyable MIG-17s in the United States. Remarkably for an aircraft that first flew in 1950, there are a few hundred still in service with air forces around the world - mostly in China, which made

To their relief (and ours), things have hardly changed. The filmmakers remain true to the smart, hip sensibility of the cartoon's creator, Jay Ward; aiming the puns and satire at grown-ups, things have hardly changed. Good bet. **'Boys and Girls'**

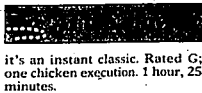

Director Ridley Scott's latest is a supremely atmospheric film that shrewdly mixes traditional Roman movie elements with the latest computer-generated wonder. It's intensely masculine actor Russell Crowe commanding as the here gladiator Maximus. But the movie - too long at 2 1/2 hours - is not as nimble outside the arena as inside. With Joaquin Phoenix, Richard Harris, Connie Nielsen, Djimon Hounsou and, in his last screen role, Oliver Reed. (2:30. R for intense graphic combat.)

**'Gone in 60 Seconds'**

The annual summer fireworks display from producer Jerry Bruckheimer ('Armageddon', 'Con Air') is built on the cheesy chassis of a 1974 drive-in movie, and puts Nicolas Cage in the driver's seat. He's a retired car thief who takes on one last job, stealing 50 cars in 12 hours, to save the life of his little brother (Giovanni Ribisi). Leaving aside anything like logic, the film, which costars Oscar winners Robert Duvall and Angelina Jolie, is competently made and forgotten in less than 60 seconds. The big chase, saved until the end, somehow manages to be both exciting and contrived. Rated PG-13; violence, language. 1 hour, 55 minutes.

**'The Patriot'**

This is exactly what you'd expect in a summer movie about the Revolutionary War produced by the makers of 'Independence Day': flag-waving, bombastic, star-driven entertainment with all the subtlety of a cannonball. Mel Gibson is a citizen-soldier reluctantly drawn into the conflict by a savage attack on his family; Heath Ledger is the idealistic son who fights beside him. The bad guys wear powdered wigs. The script, credited to Robert Rodat ('Saving Private Ryan'), is one-diche-afier-another, all designed solely to ring your lumpy bell. Rated R; graphic violence. 2 hour, 40 minutes.

**'The Perfect Storm'**

Wolfgang Petersen ('Das Boot') is at the helm of this white-knuckle adaptation of Sebastian Junger's riveting account of the impact 1991's Storm-of-the-Century had on the residents of the fishing village of Gloucester, Mass., and particularly the crew of the Andrea Gail, a sword-fishing boat that sailed into the storm's eye. George Clooney is the captain who stubbornly elects to fight instead of flee, and the special effects wizards at Industrial Light & Magic conjure an impressive, realistic adversary. Mark Wahlberg and John C. Reilly are among the crew, while Mary Elizabeth Mastrantonio and Diane Lane fear the worst. Rated PG-13; violence, language. 2 hours, 9 minutes.

By the time the 16th season of Sun Valley Summer Symphony concludes, concertgoers will have had the opportunity to bask through 15 free open-air tented concerts.

### 'Pokémon the Movie 2000'

Here's a shocker: 'Pokémon the Movie 2000' is surprisingly entertaining, wonderfully visual and — if you separate it from the marketing frenzy around it — a cartoon that can hold the interest of kids and adults alike. It's actually two movies — a 22-minute short called 'Pikachu's Rescue Adventure' and a longer feature called 'The Power of One.' The short chronicles the rescue of Pikachu and the Pokémon clan after they fall down a knothole. 'The Power of One,' darker and more intense, has more of a Speed Racer-meets-Godzilla flavor. The landscapes are lush and the predicaments temporary — and that's a message that, whether you're a kid or an adult, never gets old. **C** 84 minutes.

### 'Road Trip'

A blatant attempt to replicate the grass-out goofiness of 'American Pie,' sending fresh-faced Breckin Meyer and three pals on a mission to retrieve a screaming videotape before his lifelong girlfriend sees it. Disgusting and depraved behavior ensues, but none of it inspires us to set comic standards aside and go with J. Edgar Hoover's 'The Green,' MTV's provocateur of poo-poo, is the film's narrator, but he barely appears on screen. That, along with the gratuitous nudity, qualifies it as a scurrying videotape movie. **R** 97 minutes. **R**, for strong crude sexual humor, language, drug use and violence.)

### 'Scary Movie'

Keenen Ivory Wayans, with help from his brothers Shawn and Marlon, among many others, sends up the 'Scream' franchise, a slew of other horror pictures and skewers the clichés of teen pics with an envelope-punching dose of raunchy, gross-out humor. Thanks to Wayans' all-crucial light touch, the result is very funny and frequently hilarious. (1:27. **R**, for strong crude sexual humor, language, drug use and violence.)

### 'Small Town Crooks'

Woody Allen goes lowbrow in this comedy about a gang of hapless would-be bank robbers (Allen, Michael Rapaport, Tony Danza and Jon Lovitz) whose cookie-shop cover turns them all into millionaires. The first half is all slapstick and gags; the second examines how Allen and wife Tracy have been affected by their new prosperity. The great cast includes Hugh Grant as the sophisticated Ullman hires to tutor them in the way of the rich and Elaine May as her dimwitted cousin. It's a throwaway, but an enjoyable one. **R** 97 minutes. **R**, for strong crude sexual humor, language, drug use and violence.)

### 'Titan A.E.'

Don Bluth and Gary Goldman ('The Secret of NIMH,' 'Atlantis') aim for an audience that may not exist with this animated sci-fi adventure that is too

overwhelming for little kids, too silly for grownups and too cartoony for the teenage boys who are the primary audience for space junk. Matt Damon provides the voice of a reluctant and dashing young hero who is mankind's last hope, but the more the movie tries to be hip the more desperate it seems. The mishmash of animation styles at least matches the hodgepodge of a plot. **R** 97 minutes. **R**, for violence. 1 hour, 35 minutes.

### 'What Lies Beneath'

The summer's real terror flick, the parody 'Scary Movie' aside. This ghost story stars Michelle Pfeiffer as a wife tormented by visions of a young woman. Harrison Ford co-stars as her philandering husband, whose dalliance with a college student gradually reveals deeper, darker secrets in their marriage. Though there are some awkward plot contrivances and a few too many cheap scares, 'What Lies Beneath' has enough chills and twists to satisfy viewers in need of a fright fix. ## Isiah Thomas takes reins of Pacers

INDIANAPOLIS — Isiah Thomas was hired by the Indiana Pacers on Thursday and like the man he replaced, he starts his first NBA head coaching job with no bench experience.  
 Just as Larry Bird did in 1997, Thomas takes over the Pacers as a Hall of Famer, former Indiana college star and rookie coach.  
 Thomas reportedly signed a four-year, \$20 million contract.  
 The Pacers were unable to persuade Bird to stay beyond his original three-year commitment, even though they reached the NBA Finals this season for the first time.  
 Thomas brings instant recognition and credibility earned through his 13 years as a player in the NBA, 12 as an All-Star. Four years ago, he was selected as one of the



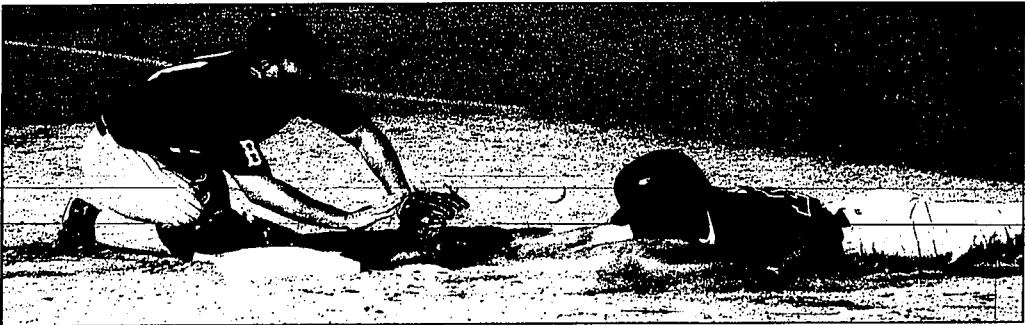
Isiah Thomas of Indiana basketball. Let's go," Thomas said.

Thomas, 39, arrived in Indianapolis on Wednesday and pledged not to speak to the media about the coaching position until it was filled.  
 He was told by NBA officials that he had to sell his ownership of the Phoenix-based

league's 50 greatest players.  
 "I feel he's got the leadership, intelligence and determination to be successful as an NBA coach," Pacers president Donnie Walsh said.  
 "I'm looking forward to the challenge, looking forward to the opportunity and looking forward to the continued success of Indiana basketball. Let's go," Thomas said.  
 Thomas, 39, arrived in Indianapolis on Wednesday and pledged not to speak to the media about the coaching position until it was filled.  
 He was told by NBA officials that he had to sell his ownership of the Phoenix-based

CBA, a nine-team developmental league, to accept any NBA coaching job.  
 Earlier in the week, Thomas paid off at least part of the \$750,000 he owed CBA team owners — reported to be the last obstacle before he could coach the Pacers.  
 Thomas, Pacers assistant Rick Carlisle and former Pacer Byron Scott, then an assistant at Sacramento, were considered for the coaching job when Bird left after Indiana's loss to the Los Angeles Lakers in the NBA Finals. Scott accepted the head coaching job at New Jersey, leaving Thomas or Carlisle to follow Bird after the Pacers had the best three-year run in their 24-year NBA history.  
 Thomas' link to the state goes back more than 20 years, to when he was recruited out of his hometown of Westchester, Ill., to play for Bob Knight at Indiana.  
 After playing on the Knight-coached Pan

American Games championship team in 1979, he averaged 14.6 points as a freshman and 16.0 as a sophomore, when he was a first-team All-America and led the Hoosiers to the NCAA title. He then left Indiana for the NBA, where he was a first-round pick of the Detroit Pistons.  
 He eventually completed work at Indiana for a degree in criminal justice in 1988, and retired as a player after the 1994 season with 18,822 points, 9,061 assists and 1,861 steals — all Pistons records — along with NBA championship rings in 1989 and 1990.  
 He averaged 19.2 points and 9.3 assists over his 979 game NBA career.  
 Thomas became vice president and part owner of the Toronto Raptors and more recently worked as an NBC analyst on NBA games. He was voted into the Basketball Hall of Fame in May and will be inducted in October.

 Kevin McMahon, the 1997 U.S. champion and 1999 Pan Am silver medalist, was the only other automatic qualifier at 235.5.  
 Meanwhile, the decathlon began in hot, humid conditions,

and without Dan O'Brien, the world record-holder and Olympic champion who withdrew because of a foot injury.  
 O'Brien's heir apparent, Chris Huffins, opened a 128-point lead after the first three of the 10 events — the 100 meters, long jump and shot put.

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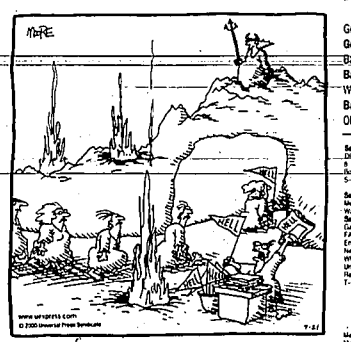

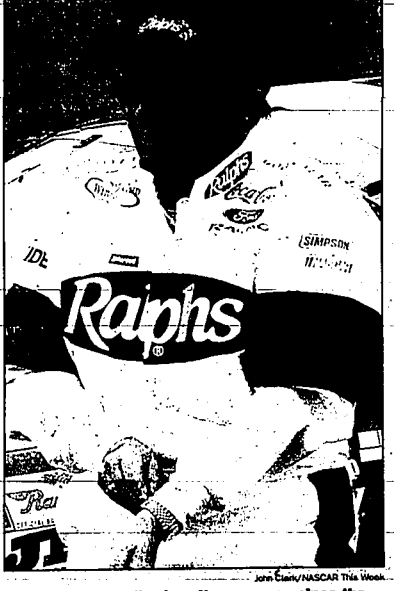

### U.S. Bancorp announces quarterly results

MINNEAPOLIS - U.S. Bancorp - which has bank branches throughout the Magic Valley - Thursday reported operating earnings of \$402.6 million for second quarter 2000, compared with \$383.8 million for second quarter 1999.

Second-quarter operating earnings of 54 cents per diluted share were 1 cent higher than the same period of 1999. Operating earnings on a cash basis increased to 62 cents per diluted share in the second quarter from 58 cents in second quarter 1999. U.S. Bancorp said.

Return on average common equity and return on average assets, excluding merger-related charges and available-for-sale securities transactions, were 20.5 percent and 1.93 percent, respectively, in the second quarter, compared with returns of 24.4 percent and 2.02 percent in second quarter 1999. The company said reduction in its return on average common equity reflects the effect of recent acquisitions, which were accounted for using purchase accounting.

Including after-tax merger-related charges and available-for-sale securities transactions of \$9.5 million in second quarters of both 2000 and 1999, the company recorded net income for second quarter 2000 of \$393.1 million, or 52 cents per diluted share, compared with \$374.3 million, or 51 cents per diluted share, for the same period of 1999.

"Last December, we announced that we were making investments to improve service quality and to accelerate growth. We are beginning to see the results of these investments," U.S. Bancorp Chairman and Chief Executive Officer John F. Grundhofer said. "During the second quarter, we recorded strong loan and fee growth and on-balance deposit growth in both consumer banking and wholesale banking has had a negative impact on net interest income growth."

"We are confident that we are on the right course, but higher EPS growth will take longer to achieve than we previously expected," Grundhofer said.

## TF costs hover below average

TWIN FALLS - Twin Falls consumers paid more for transportation and for certain goods and services than the national average, but low utility prices and an improved housing-cost comparison kept the city's cost of living three percentage points below the average in the first quarter of 2000.

That's according to the latest cost-of-living report from the American Chamber of Commerce Research Association, a nonprofit organization based in Alexandria, Va.

The overall cost-of-living index takes into account groceries, hous-

ing, utilities, transportation, health care and miscellaneous goods and services. For January through March, Twin Falls' index stayed down at 97 percent of the average for cities surveyed - after falling exactly at the national average for the first three months of 1999, inching up to 100.9 percent in the second quarter and falling to 98 percent in the third and 97 in the fourth quarter of last year.

As the latest results show, the first three months of 1999 proved to be the start of a rapid trip back down to the city's first-quarter composite cost measure, which was at 98.7 percent in 1996, 98 percent in 1997 and 102.1 percent

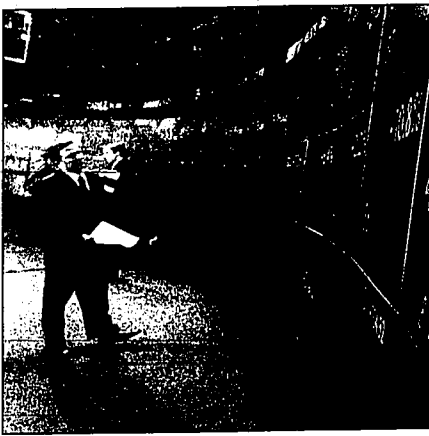

### Whyoming company buys MagicNET

TWIN FALLS - OneWest.net, based in Jackson, Wyo., will announce today the acquisition of Twin Falls-based Internet service provider MagicNET.

The roughly 4,000 MagicNET customers in and around Twin Falls should look for expanded services with little interruption to their Internet capabilities, OneWest.net CEO Michael Pruett said this week.

"Our goal is to impact our customers as little as possible if at all," he said. "Email names will stay the same, and domain names will stay the same. Our goal is to really be about bringing a higher caliber of level to their service."

OneWest.net calls itself the largest regional provider of Internet services in Idaho, Montana and Wyoming. It has 270 subscribers in the three states and has grown through a combination of acquisitions and new subscribers, Pruett said.

MagicNET began six years ago as an offshoot of 25-year-old computer software company Idaho Computer Services. MagicNET has grown so much in the past six years that the owners cannot continue to operate both businesses, said Phil Jones, former managing member of MagicNET.

"It's in our best interest and the software company's best interest to focus on one business," Jones said. "MagicNET took so much of our time to run that we didn't focus as well as we wanted to on this business."

Over the past five years MagicNET has been approached by seven would-be buyers, but OneWest.net followed its philosophy most closely, Jones said. "They are an organization that wants to have businesses in small, rural American cities," he said. "These are not giant people running mammoth services and don't want to operate both businesses. We wanted an organization that would feel the same way about our customers as we did."

OneWest.net's business strategy is to focus on smaller, rural communities in the Intermountain West where the local populations typically have been underserved by telecommunication companies. "They are an Internet service providers, Pruett said.

The company plans this summer and fall to install a fiber optic loop connecting its Twin Falls operations with the central office of U.S. West - now Qwest - which will provide for faster Internet connections, he said.

"We are going to greatly expand our services we can provide," Pruett said. "We will have better connection speeds to move around the Internet faster. We believe and we feel that we want to bring the level of service to rural markets that people can get in bigger cities."

"As the Internet continues to grow, people's demand for speed continues to grow as well. Residential customers and business customers like it, and it is our job to provide it," he added. "Typical dial-up speeds for existing MagicNET Internet customers are about 56 kilobits per second; with the installation of fiber optics those speeds will exceed 256 Kbps."

Customers will also have immediate access to services such as wireless connections and dedicated services for offices. Within the next few months the company also will offer digital subscriber line or DSL - in Twin Falls, which will allow for high-speed Internet access over existing telephone lines.

U.S. West in June launched its own DSL service in Twin Falls, after a group of local business leaders pushed to round up support for high-end digital telecommunication upgrades. "DSL is a high-speed Internet service that transmits data on existing copper phone lines at the same time the customer is chatting on the phone."

## Regional group interests Jerome officials

### Governments could form development agency for the valley

JEROME - Area community leaders seem to like the idea of regional economic development, suggested in a consultant's recent report.

They want to know where the money for the effort might come from, and how to entice other Magic Valley counties to come aboard.

Nearly 25 people attended a briefing Wednesday on a community audit and marketing plan recently completed by Lockwood Greene, an Atlanta consulting firm. With some help from

Jerome and other Twin Falls interests, the Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce hired Lockwood Greene to study economic development prospects for the Magic Valley.

The consultant's most ambitious formation is a six-county stand-alone organization made up of Gooding, Jerome, Twin Falls, Lincoln, Minidoka and Cassia counties. The regional organization would hire an economic development director to sell the region to businesses.

"The regional entity would not replace anything that currently exists, but would enhance it," said Lee Wagner, general manager of KMYV, who presented an overview of Lockwood Greene's recommendations in Jerome Wednesday.

A regional economic development organization would be gov-

erned by a 15-member board of directors, representing the counties, cities, utilities, economic development organizations, businesses, public institutions and the region's senior state legislator.

The Lockwood Greene report suggested the regional group hire an executive director, assistant director and administrative assistant.

Such a group's annual budget of more than \$300,000 would include personnel, operating and marketing costs. Funding could come from businesses, utilities, public institutions and state, county and city governments in the six counties.

When Lockwood Greene unveiled its economic development report last month, the company stressed that a six-county collaboration isn't the only approach to marketing the Magic Valley.

Some Jerome-area officials

favored a regional strategy.

Twin Falls and Jerome need to fuse the deal so the other counties can be approached to join in on the project," Jerome County Commissioner Roy Prescott said. Jerome Mayor Dennis Moore also supported a regional economic approach and said economic development "is critical to the health of an area."

The Jerome City Council members and Jerome County commissioners in attendance discussed pledging \$25,000 of city and county money to get the project started. The county and city will meet separately to discuss funding options, then meet again later to further discuss the regional economic-development concept.

## Bon's parent warns amid Fingerhut credit problems

NEW YORK - Shares of Federated Department Stores Inc. fell after the department store operator said it expects to report earnings significantly lower than analysts' expectations after its Fingerhut unit failed to obtain late payments from its client base.

The Cincinnati-based company - which has a Bon Marche store in the Magic Valley Mall - said it expects to lose \$150 million from its Fingerhut unit, the No. 2 U.S. catalog retailer, in the second quarter before interest and taxes, reducing earnings by 43 cents a share. Analysts pegged earnings at 65 cents a share in a poll by First Call Corp. Shares of Federated, which also owns upscale department stores such as Bloomingdale's and Macy's, have fallen about 59 percent since the beginning of this year as the retail sector has suffered on concerns of a slowing economy and a drop in consumer spending. Federated Chairman and Chief Executive James M. Zimmerman said the company is

"taking numerous steps" to address the late payments, adding the company "anticipates that it will take time to rectify the problem and alleviate its earnings impact."

"We expect these changes will negatively impact mail-order catalog sales in the short term," Zimmerman said. "It is important to emphasize that this situation does not reflect on the performance of our department stores."

Fingerhut, bought by Federated in 1999, plans to cut down on its debt by strengthening its collection activity and tightening its credit lines and grants. The company also plans to clean up its billing statements for customers, who have been confused by receiving invoices from Federated as opposed to Fingerhut.

The company also said increased reserves for bad debt combined with anticipated lower catalog sales from the credit tightening, could potentially lower earnings in its direct-to-customer segment by about \$200 to \$250 million in the full season. Federated also expects a negative short-term sales impact.

## Evel Knievel falls into role as spokesman for scooter maker

EXETER, Pa. - And you thought Bob Dole and Viagra were the consummate match of health product and honest pitchman.

Evel Knievel, the motorcycle daredevil of the 1970s who tried to jump the Snake River Canyon 26 years ago and who claims the world's record for broken bones, is championing Pride Mobility Products Corp. and its motorized scooters for people who need a little help getting around, company officials announced this week.

And like the guys in the hair replacement advertisements, Knievel is not just a spokesman - he's a Pride client.

"In my career I've taken many risks, but one thing I never took a chance with was the performance of my mobility equipment," Knievel says in corporate releases.

But the man who once jumped a stack of 50 cars in front of 35,000 people in Los Angeles was a little shy at first to admit his battered 62-year-old body has trouble walking distances, company officials said.

After an extensive Internet search for a power scooter, Knievel found Pride and the Legend, a luxury scooter "with all the bells and whistles," said Mark Miller, general manager of marketing.

"He test drove the product and he said, 'I will be happy to work with you,'" Miller said. "He loves the product."

Since early this year, Knievel has been featured in print and Internet advertisements and other testimonials.

In one picture he's shown giving a thumbs up as he drives by what appears to be a golf course. Fans might remember that gesture from his daredevil days.

Knievel was known for jumping his motorcycle and "Skycycle" - a vehicle that looked like a homemade rocket - over almost anything, including 14 Greyhound buses at King's Island in Ohio and a tank full of live sharks at the Chicago Amphitheater.

He also was known for not always nailing the landing. "For some, the most vivid memory of him is of his body flopping around like a fish in a red-white-and-blue jumpsuit. (Contrary to

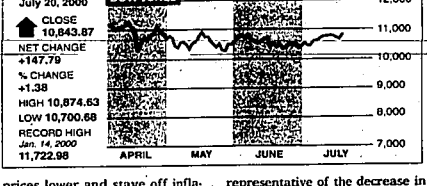

## St. Maries approves drug tests

ST. MARIES - Drug testing now is mandatory for students wanting to take part in extracurricular school activities.

Last week, school trustees voted 4-1 to begin random drug testing of youths taking part in any extracurricular school activity from sports to academic clubs to student government. Board members believe the urine tests will lessen drug use among middle- and high-schoolers.

The district will strive to test 25 percent of its seventh- through 12th-graders each year beginning this fall. It is part of a community effort to clean up Benewah County's drug problem.

"Drug use affects their lives - and even the lives of kids not on drugs - in a very meaningful way," Superintendent Dave Cox said. "It robs kids of an education they need and deserve."

The policy has its naysayers - including trustee Jeff Wolter, who said it violates students' privacy rights.

Wolter said his vote against the random testing is not a vote for drug use in schools. He said the district's mission is education, not child-rearing.

"The school system is not a parent," Wolter said.

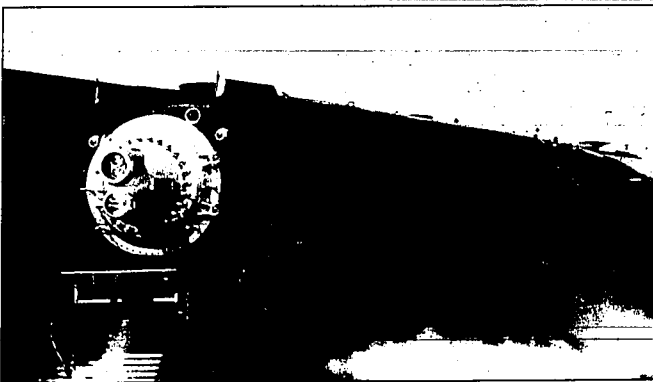
"These concerns were not ignored, yet the board decided stopping drug use outweighs privacy rights," Cox said.

The drug testing policy focuses on intervention and treatment rather than punishment.

If a student tests positive, he or she can remain in extracurricular activities once agreeing to counseling sessions paid for by a parent or guardian. Students do not face punishment until a second offense.

Other school boards, such as West Bonner County and Blaine-Worley have taken similar action.

## Feds' dam comments find support, opposition

LEWISTON - Environmentalists and Indian tribes believe the federal government's plan to save threatened and endangered salmon and steelhead runs falls short by not including dam breaching.

But those who support the dams say they are pleased with the plan and would like dam breaching scrapped altogether.

George Frampton, chairman of the White House Council on Environmental Quality, released testimony Wednesday that indicated the decision to breach the dams would be addressed for at least eight years and the soonest the dams could be removed would be in 10 years.

His testimony confirmed news reports the federal government will instead concentrate its salmon recovery efforts on habitat restoration, hatchery reform and harvest restrictions.

Scott Bosse of Idaho Rivers United said environmentalists would sue the government if the plan proceeds without addressing the hydro system.

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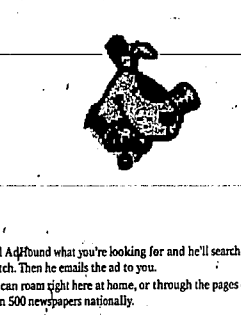

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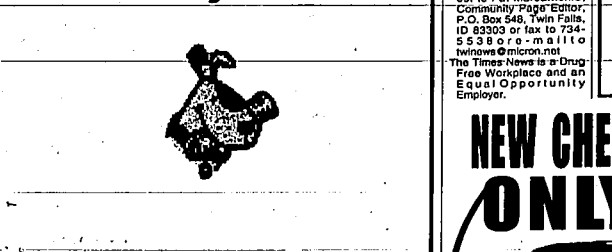

# THE ACES ON BRIDGE

Bobby Wolff

"Second thoughts are ever tuiser."

—Euripides

"Perhaps I should have sacrificed at four spades," offered East. "That would probably have cost us only 100 points instead of 450."

"I can go one better than that," countered West. "Let's get our signals raised to avoid a phantom sacrifice in the future."

West led his spade ace to look at dummy. He didn't like what he saw. Obviously, he had to shift to a minor, but which one?

"Today's East dia a miserable job of signaling. He played his spade deuce at trick one requesting a shift—a need that was already painfully obvious to West. West correctly read the deuce to be a suit-preference signal, and shifted to a club. Gratefully, South won his ace, drew trumps, and scored an overtrick after discarding two diamonds on dummy's high spades."

At times like this, West must get help from his partner. When it comes to both ends, a shift is critical. East must cooperate by signaling which suit will better serve the defense. A low card shows interest in the lower-ranking side suit; a high card does the opposite.

Had East signaled correctly with his spade jack, West would have led a diamond instead of a club. East would have won his ace to return the suit, and instead of winning 11 tricks, South would have taken only nine.

Accurate defense is rarely a solo flight. Partnership cooperation is a must, and the suit-preference signal often plays a vital role.
