# Hospital lease on hold

## County says it wants to ensure any deal offers adequate compensation

**TWIN FALLS** — In a surprise press conference late Friday afternoon, Twin Falls County commissioners said they will put on hold plans for a lease agreement with Magic Valley Regional Medical Center.

Commissioner Gary Grindstaff

said the county wants to explore other options for the hospital.

"Citizens want to know what it is worth, and this is the way to find out," he said.

The commissioners had been in discussions with the Magic Valley Regional Medical Center's board to develop a lease that would change the hospital's governance structure. Commissioners said

Friday they must change the way the county hospital is run to continue providing quality health care.

But Grindstaff said the county does not want a lease in which the county receives only a token payment from a nonprofit entity created to run the hospital. An appointed citizens committee had recommended a "nominal" lease

payment — potentially as little as \$1.

"Though critics say it token payment is essentially a free transfer of a valuable county asset, some members of the citizens committee argued that any larger payment would be a "stick tax" on patients.

# Ashcroft postpones execution

## Attorney general rips FBI for 'missing' files

**WASHINGTON** — Attorney General John Ashcroft Friday postponed the execution of Oklahoma City bomber Timothy McVeigh until June 11 and ordered a Justice Department investigation into how the FBI failed to give McVeigh's defense team thousands of pages of investigative files before his 1997 trial.

"Our system of justice requires basic fairness — essential to protecting the constitutional rights of every citizen and to sustaining public confidence in the administration of justice," Ashcroft said at a press briefing.

He delayed what was to be the first federal execution in 38 years, originally set for May 16.

The attorney general bluntly conceded that "the FBI failed to comply fully" with an agreement to produce all the material for defense lawyers.

Rob Nigh, one of McVeigh's attorneys, said Friday that the defense team may ask an appellate court in Denver for a longer stay of execution after it has an opportunity to review the 3,135 pages of documents turned over after McVeigh's execution.

"A month is not enough time," Nigh said minutes after meeting with McVeigh at the federal penitentiary in Terre-Haute. "You have to look at documents and analyze them in the context of the evidence in the case."

The material turned over to McVeigh's lawyers includes reports, correspondence, photographs, tapes and witness interviews taken soon after the bombing of the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building on April 19, 1995. Although legal experts doubted it would provide evidence to overturn McVeigh's conviction, they said it might provide his attorneys with an opening to challenge McVeigh's death sentence.

At the very least, the episode was an embarrassment to the FBI, exposing the bureau's sloppy handling of thousands of documents. News of the delay infuriated

# Man shot by police might face charges; officer unidentified

**TWIN FALLS** — A Greenfield, Mass. man who was shot twice by a Twin Falls police officer Thursday will probably face charges, a police sergeant said Friday.

Meanwhile, police were still

withholding the name of the officer who shot 48-year-old David A. Smith at Canyon View Psychiatric and Addiction Services of the Magic Valley Regional Medical Center.

Police say Smith somehow got access to a knife at Canyon View and threatened employees and the before the officer shot him.

The officer was treated for a cut on his hand and released from Magic Valley Regional Medical Center Thursday, according to police reports.

The shooting was under investigation Friday by Twin Falls police detectives and the Idaho State Police, said Twin Falls police Sgt. Mike Covington. The

officer involved was on paid leave Friday, he said. Covington said Smith was in stable condition Friday at Magic Valley Regional Medical Center in Twin Falls. A hospital spokeswoman declined to comment on Smith's condition, and said only the

# Squeezed out of urban areas, meth labs sprout in forests, parks

**ASHFORD, Wash.** — With sunlight trickling through the tall pines and west Mount Rainier looming above, the secluded dirt roads of Tahoma State Forest beckon to hunters, hikers — and meth cooks.

The recent discovery of a methamphetamine lab here forced the closure of the entire 26,000-acre forest until at least June 10. Now men-in-moon-suits hunt for contamination and clues in the mossy woods, roping off sickly brown "dead zones" where people dumped the "poisonous byproducts of meth-making.

As police crack down on the highly addictive drug in cities and towns, meth manufacturers are moving to isolated campsites in vast, lightly patrolled state and federal forests. The number of busted meth labs increased tenfold over the past year in Washington state alone, mirroring a national trend. The meth epidemic is changing the job description for rangers and foresters; and creating environmental wounds that will take

years to heal.

"It poses a danger to anyone out there in the woods," said forester Bob Brown, as he drove his Jeep down a pitted dirt road toward the Tahoma meth lab. "The public needs to be aware of it. Somebody could get killed or injured very badly by this stuff."

When Brown started work with the Department of Natural Resources 27 years ago, he worried about growing trees and running off the occasional poacher. Now every campfire attracts his suspicion. He looks for the innocuous household items that

# Compromise tax bill trims Bush's break for wealthy

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate's top Republican and Democratic tax writers offered a compromise tax cut package Friday that would benefit the wealthy less than President Bush's plan. It would also give taxpayers cash quickly by dropping the bottom income tax rate retroactively.

The changes reflect the decision by a Senate divided between Republicans and 50 Democrats to trim Bush's 10-year, \$1.5 trillion tax cut to \$1.35 trillion over 11 years. It also demonstrates the influence of moderates in both parties who want greater tax cuts for lower- and middle-income people than the president proposed.

"You don't put together the biggest tax bill in two decades without considering all points of view," said Sen. Charles Grassley, Iowa, chairman of the Senate Finance Committee.

The bill unveiled by Grassley and the Finance Committee's

ranking Democrat, Sen. Max Baucus of Montana, would lower the current 33 percent income tax rate to 36 percent, instead of the 33 percent sought by Bush.

The bottom 15 percent tax bracket would drop to 10 percent, retroactive to Jan. 1 of this year. The Treasury Department would be ordered after the bill becomes law to begin withholding less money from taxpayers' paychecks to reflect the change, returning \$300 to each individual taxpayer and \$600 to each married couple, committee aides said.

The bill would also eliminate the estate tax as Bush proposed but not until 2011, but the current \$575,000 exemption would go to \$1 million in 2002 and \$4 million by 2010. The legislation would ease the marriage penalty paid by millions of two-income couples, expand contribution limits for 401(k) plans and gradually raise the \$500 child tax credit to \$1,000.

# Missile-defense plan gets cool reception

MOSCOW — President Bush's missile-defense plan, rolled out across the world this week seeking support for, or at least acceptance of, his plans to build a missile defense system, a gesture of inclusion welcomed by allies and others fearful he was developing a go-it-alone foreign policy.

But if he hoped to win converts to his vision of a nuclear shield, Bush might be disappointed when his representatives return home. Leaders in Western Europe expressed lingering skepticism, while Russia continued to warn that construction of a comprehensive anti-missile system could unravel decades of arms control agreements.

"I would put it like this: We still have more questions than answers," Russian Foreign Ministry spokesman Alexander Yakovlev said after Bush aides met with senior officials in Moscow Friday. But he added, "The most important thing is that consultations have begun and are going to be continued."

The sweep of the Bush team was unusually wide as envoys

move that engendered bitterness even among friends of the United States. He would make such a decision without consulting them. Missile defenses seemed to be shaping up along the same lines, but last week Bush promised to seek advice from key countries, including not just U.S. allies but also outspoken opponents of missile defense.

In many of the meetings over the last several days, the U.S. delegations have explained Bush's rationale for developing a defense against missiles developed by hostile, small nations such as North Korea, and then listened to often detailed and sometimes pointed questions posed by military and civilian leaders from host countries.

"We presented our point of view, but we were very, very interested in what the Turkish side had to say," Undersecretary of State Marc Grossman said Friday after returning from Istanbul, where he hoped to win support of a strategic NATO ally in a neighborhood that includes two of the nations most worrisome to the Pentagon, Iran and Iraq.

signal a meth lab: empty 'cold pill' containers, coffee filters, lithium batteries.

Cold pills contain ephedrine or pseudoephedrine, a main ingredient in meth. Other possible components — rock salt, camphire fuel, butane — are readily available hardware and drug stores. Meth makers use empty propane tanks to store anhydrous ammonia, a fertilizer they often steal from farms.

The simplicity of making meth has fueled its popularity as the new crack cocaine: cheap to produce, and with a potent high. When users eat, inject or snort meth it makes them feel euphoric, energized and powerful. Addicts can go days, even weeks without sleep. But the downside of the drug strikes quickly: irritability, paranoia, aggression and weight loss. In the words of one investigator: make good environmental stewards.



Investigators found open containers of solution with a pH of 14 — a positive sign to be a flash of bones. A blast of anhydrous ammonia, a substance that leaches moisture from whatever it touches, could "take your eyeball and shrink it down to the size of a catfish," says Ashford Fire Chief Jim Gregory.

and firefighters. Washington foresters, who don't carry weapons, have been trained on how to recognize the signs of a meth lab and what to do when they find one. In California, every state firefighter knows how to recognize a meth lab, says a spokesman near a suspected meth lab.

"A lot of our training is starting to emphasize more and more that we have a good chance of running into drugs and especially these methamphetamine labs because they're so easy to set up," said Randy Hancock, president of the North American Wildlife Enforcement Officers Association and a game warden in Colorado.

Drugs in national and state forests are nothing new. Vast, uninhabited acres have always attracted illegal activity, from moonshiners to marijuana growers. But officials say the meth cookers — who often sample their products — are a new breed.

"They're less grounded mentally. They can go off at any second," says Dennis Herold, chief investigator for DNR law enforcement. Marijuana growers are likely to cut and run when discovered, he said, while meth cookers often come out shooting.

# Bush says United Nations dues should be paid in full

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush criticized the House vote to withhold some overdue payments to the United Nations in a display of anger over the U.N.'s Human Rights Commission.

"I think we have made an agreement with the United Nations, an agreement that had been negotiated in good faith, and I think we ought to pay our dues," Bush told a news conference Friday, several hours after meeting in the White House with U.N. Secretary-General Kofi Annan.

The House voted 252-165 Thursday to pay \$582 million in back dues but to withhold an additional \$244 million until the United States is restored to the human rights panel. An initial \$100 million back-dues payment occurred last year.

Bush also criticized the U.S. ejection from the seat it has held

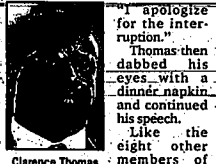

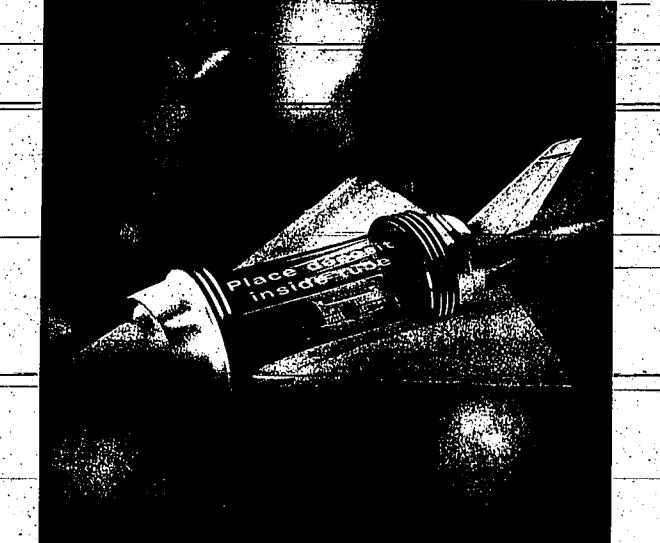

## Escapee's sister claims officers overstepped bounds

JEROME — A lawsuit filed against Jerome County by the sister of a jail escapee names a defendant a deputy killed Jan. 3 in an unrelated Eden killing.  
 Cpl. James Moulson is among the defendants in a lawsuit filed Friday by an attorney representing Victoria Saucedo of Jerome. Saucedo is the sister of Monty Ray Boston, 23.

### Still at large

Monty Ray Boston, 23, is 5 feet 11 inches tall and weighs 200 pounds. He has black hair and brown eyes and a tattoo across his chest that says, "Confessing a Feeling." 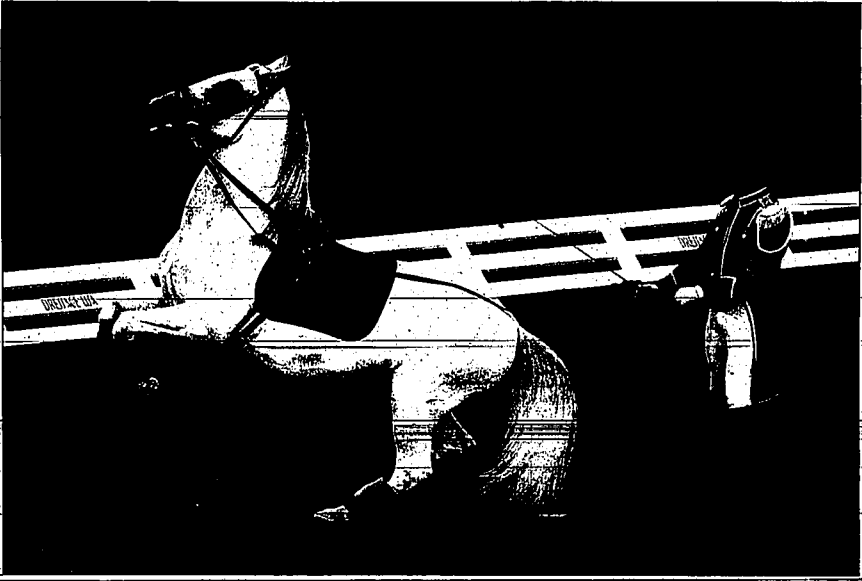
later turned themselves in. In an unrelated case, Moulson,

30, was among several Jerome County officers who on Jan. 3 attempted to serve a drug warrant at the Eden home of George Timothy Williams, 47. Shooting broke out and Moulson, Williams and Cpl. Phillip Anderson, 23, all died in the house.  
 Saucedo's suit, filed by Twin Falls attorney Lynn Dunlap, claims that on the night of her brother's escape, Moulson and other deputies forced their way into her home, held her at gun point on the floor and threatened to shoot her brother.

The suit also names Jerome County and Jerome County Sheriff Jim Weaver as parties responsible in part for the deputies' alleged negligence the night of Boston's escape. In court papers filed Friday, the other deputies are called "John Does." Dunlap said that as the case moves forward he intends to name the other deputies in court files.  
 Jerome County Chief Deputy Prosecutor Erick Shaner — who handles the county's civil suit cases — declined to comment Friday. Jerome County Sheriff's

Office spokeswoman Nance Strickland and other sheriff's department officials could not be reached for comment Friday.  
 Saucedo's suit blossomed from a tort claim which detailed the same allegations and was filed earlier this year by Dunlap.  
 According to Idaho law, a government agency has 90 days to respond to a tort claim before an actual lawsuit can be filed.  
 Dunlap said Jerome County will have 20 days from the filing of the lawsuit to respond. Then both sides will be given time to bolster their cases before a judge decides whether and when a trial should be held.

MERIDIAN — For the first time in several years, the crowd of police who filled the grounds of the Idaho Peace Officers Memorial in Meridian Friday mourned the loss of two of its own.

The mood of the annual memorial service for fallen police officers was somber this year as the names of Jerome County sheriff's deputies Phillip Anderson and James Moulson, who were killed during a drug raid in Eden in January, were added to the monument.

"It's a very spiritual service — and very sad," said Melissa McPherridge, a Boise-area resident, after watching a single file of police from all over the state place roses on the monument for each of the 57 officers slain in Idaho since 1883. "They are such good men ... It's a tragedy that these people (Anderson and Moulson) who protect us had to lose their lives."  
 Family members of Anderson, a Kuna native, and Moulson were presented memorial plaques during Friday's ceremony.

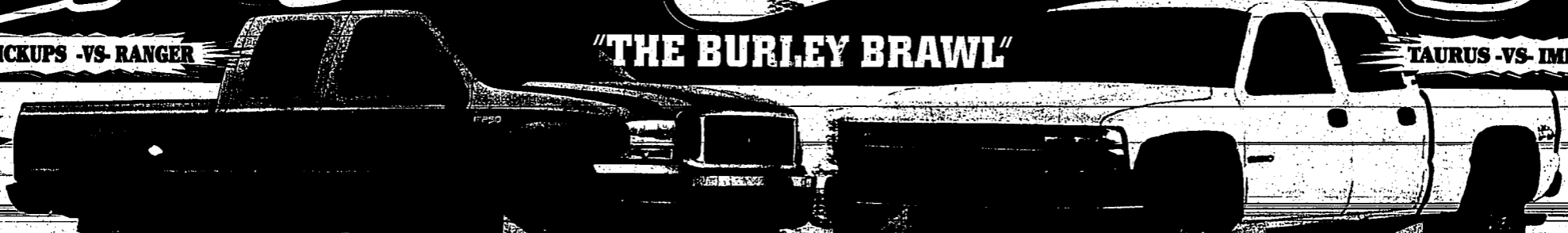

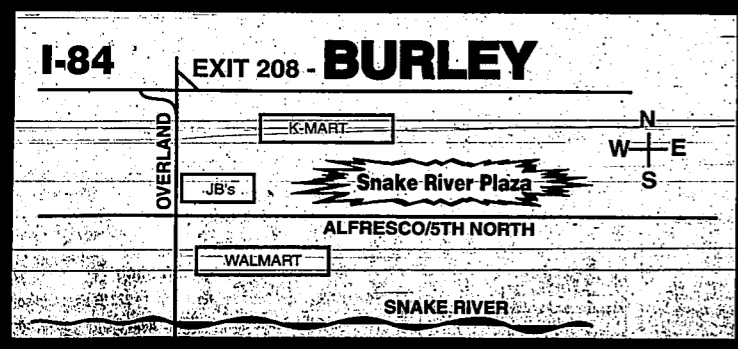

Idaho lawmakers praise USDA's extension response

Idaho's congressional delegation said on Friday that Agriculture Secretary Ann Veneman had agreed to its request for an extension of the deadline to apply for a potato diversion program aimed at reducing a price-depressing market glut.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture extended the application deadline for the \$107.5 million program from May 13 to June 12, and changed the time frame for submitting reimbursement claims from May 14-June 13 to June 13-July 13.

"I am pleased the USDA responded so quickly to the needs of Idaho's potato farmers," U.S. Sen. Larry Craig said. "It is important growers have the opportunity

to participate in this program and the original application deadline interrupted critical planting time on potato farms."

Craig, along with fellow Republican Sen. Michael Craig and Reps. Michael Simpson and Butch Otter, asked Veneman Tuesday to give russet potato producers 15 more days to apply for participation.

The 30-day sign-up period began April 30 for the program, which the federal government will pay farmers up to a penny a pound for the russet potatoes they give to charity or ethanol processors, feed to cattle or bury in the ground.

Former fiancée of murder convict pleads guilty to perjury

MOSCOW (AP) - As part of an agreement with prosecutors, the last defendant in a double murder case has pleaded guilty to perjury.

The charges stem from the 1999 shooting death of Shackelford's ex-wife and her boyfriend near Kendrick. Abitz, then fiancée of Shackelford, was convicted of killing the two and then burning down the building they were in.

the mafia gave it to her mother and brother, the report says. Prosecutors said the tape was of a staged argument between Shackelford and Bernadette Lasater - former lovers - designed to throw investigators off track.

Sonja Marie Abitz, 31, the former fiancée of convicted murderer Dale Carter Shackelford, told 2nd District Judge John Stegler that she lied under oath during her grand jury testimony last year.

Abitz's perjury charges emerged from details she shared with the grand jury about the day of the murders and a cassette tape she claimed to have received in the mail.

Abitz's attorneys said Thursday that they do not think the judge will sentence her to any more jail time than the eight months she has already served.

The plea averts a lengthy trial and eliminates four charges Abitz faced: conspiracy to commit murder, conspiracy to commit arson, preparing false evidence and accessory to murder.

She told the grand jury that on May 29, 1999, she was in Kendrick and saw Shackelford driving towards Lewiston around the time the murders were committed, she said.

The woman's mother, Mary Abitz, and Lasater both pleaded guilty to perjury and being an accessory to murder.

Latah County Deputy Prosecutor Robin Eckmann and Special Prosecutor Rich Christensen agreed to recommend up to 10 years in prison out of a maximum of 14 in exchange for the plea and Abitz's testimony against Shackelford at his sentencing.

Later that day, she said, both she and Shackelford arrived home to find their dog missing and went to look for him, an alleged reason for Shackelford's presence at the crime scene later that day.

Martha J. Millar has pleaded guilty to being an accessory to preparing false evidence.

Agidius, an attorney, has his own practice in Moscow where he served as mayor for eight years.

Agidius will take the seat vacated by Tom Boyd of Genesee, former chairman of the board.

He received his bachelor's and law degrees from the University of Idaho.

"He has demonstrated a commitment to public service, and I'm confident that he will do an outstanding job as the newest member of the board," Kempthorne said.

In February, Boyd - who served as an Idaho state representative from 1977 to 1992 and was speaker of the House for six of those years - decided not to seek reappointment to a second term on the board.

CASTLEFORD - Castelford School has been recognized by the Idaho Department of Education for its youth mentor program.

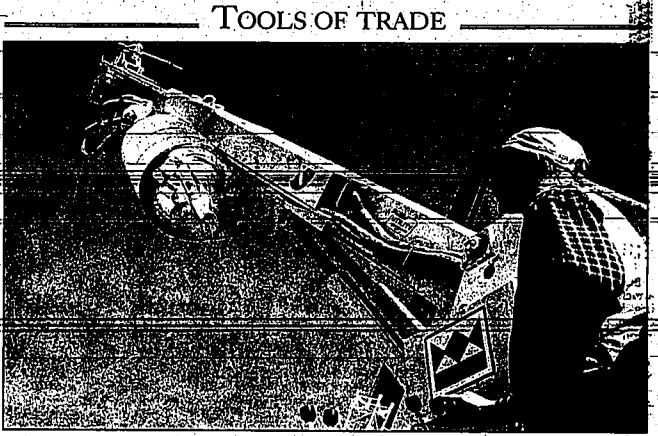

## Should America tap into its coal reserves?

### It's America's ace in the hole

The nation's troubled energy situation— soaring natural gas prices, rolling blackouts in California, and gasoline pump prices heading north again— has revived the old arguments about how we should supply our energy.

Age by conservation is like telling an anorexic to diet more. "Renewable" energy, meanwhile, remains uncompetitive in the marketplace, even with government subsidies. And just because an energy source is "renewable" does not mean that it is environmentally benign.

Environmentalists stress conservation and "renewable" sources of energy such as wind and solar power. The Bush administration and other voices urge stepped up production of traditional fossil fuel energy.

To the contrary, renewables have significant environmental effects. Hydropower has already lost its luster with environmentalists because river dams disrupt fish habitat. Biomass actually involves higher carbon dioxide emissions than coal.

At first glance this appears to be a rerun of the original energy crisis of the 1970s, when we were told that it was urgent for us to develop alternative "renewable" sources of energy because we were running out of fossil fuels any moment now.

Windpower is arguably the worst form of electricity generation from the standpoint of harm to wildlife. Nationwide, it is estimated that windmills kill 10,000 birds a year.

Today we are told just the opposite—we must develop renewable sources of energy because we aren't running out of fossil fuels fast enough. Proven reserves of oil, gas and coal have increased over the last two decades, contrary to the dire predictions of the late 1970s.

Solar power is the most expensive renewable technology, and would require huge amounts of land to produce any significant amount of power.

That's exactly the problem for environmentalists. "We are running out of sky, not oil," says Gary Cook, legislative director of the Greenpeace Climate Campaign.

There are still major gains to be made in reducing pollution from coal and other fossil fuels. The experience of the last generation shows that we can have reasonably priced energy from fossil fuels and reduce pollution at the same time.

Fossil fuels, especially coal and oil, are politically incorrect because they contribute to air pollution. But alternative "renewable" sources of energy are still not suitable for America's mass energy needs, and while conservation through increased efficiency is possible, there are limits to how much conservation can achieve by itself.

heat waves, floods, droughts, extreme weather, rising sea levels and spreading infectious diseases.

Don't be fooled by the Orwellian newspeak of industry's proposed "clean coal"—it's a coat of "green wash" trying to hide one of the most polluting energy forms around.

We have no choice but to see through industry's attempt to fool us with "clean coal" and instead start reducing the pollution that causes global warming.

"Clean coal" only strives to reduce some of these pollutants—they don't disappear. It's not hard to make some progress with the dirtiest form of energy production, but "clean coal" is still dirty.

Regardless of what you call it, extracting all types of coal harms our health, disrupts communities and ruins the environment by polluting water, depleting drinking water supplies and destroying land.

No coal company excites its children breathing from the end of a "clean coal" smokestack.

Mountain top removal methods of coal mining are particularly egregious and are responsible for looting off entire Appalachian hilltops and burying streams under huge waste piles.

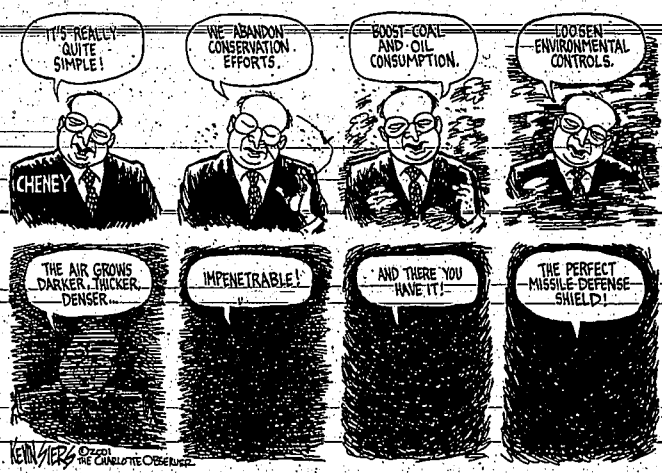

There is something amiss in the coverage of Bob Kerrey's mission in Vietnam. A number of journalists have suggested an investigation into Kerrey's conduct would help to clear up contradictions.

dare say, a good many otherwise well-educated men counted Vietnam to be a war they would sit out and let others combat with death. I can understand that. What is required of those who never served though is to try, somehow, to understand what Bob Kerrey and the six Navy SEALs under his command confronted on a dark night, behind enemy lines, in the thick brush and among Viet Cong unknown to them. They were commanded to carry out a perilous task, and they did what they were instructed to do. This is called "duty," and if you don't understand what that word means, then you cannot comprehend the Kerrey mission and what happened that night to these brave men.

The plain fact, sorry to say, is that much of the hazy ambiguity about the Kerrey mission comes from observers who have never faced that terrifying moment in war when the dagger is at their belly and death stares at them.

If the Pentagon wants to stir old memories of the killing fields and chooses to investigate Kerrey's mission, then it has to investigate the past combat performance of millions of young men, including me, who served and defended their country and who, unhappily, killed civilians in dirty wars.

It is easy to judge others when you have no comprehension about how men in battle feel, how they react and how they do what they have been charged to do.

So to the journalists who want an investigation, I say let the inquiries begin, but don't single out Bob Kerrey. Include us all.

When I was so very young, I was a pilot of a B-25 low-flying attack bomber. I flew 51 combat missions over Italy. One of our prime objectives was to interdict Nazi troop movements and supplies flowing into Italy through the Brenner Pass and into the Po Valley.

Each of us, from 19 to 24 years old, was frightened out of our wits on every mission as we took heavy fire from the Nazis who manned the anti-aircraft guns determined to blow us out of the sky. God only knows how many civilians, including women and children, we killed on those missions.

# Administration pledges new AIDS contribution

WASHINGTON — Flanked by African leaders, President Bush pledged \$200 million to a new global "war chest" to fight AIDS around the world. Health advocates said it's not enough, especially in African countries where half of today's 15-year-olds could die of the disease.

"In a part of the world where so many have suffered from war and famine, these latest tribulations are the cruellest of fates. We have the power to help," Bush said at a Rose Garden ceremony with Nigerian President Olusegun Obasanjo and United Nations Secretary-General Kofi Annan.

"The U.S. pledge, which Bush said could "reduce suffering and spare lives," is seed money for a \$7 billion to \$10 billion fund. Annan wants the world's rich nations and private philanthropists to establish to fight not only AIDS but also malaria and tuberculosis.

Since the vast majority of people suffering from infectious diseases who cannot afford treatment are in Africa, the continent is expected to get a large share of the funds. Of 35 million people around the world infected with HIV, roughly 26 million live in Africa, and of the 23 million people killed by it worldwide, 17 million were sub-Saharan Africans.

## Supporters say governor will sign hate crimes bill

AUSTIN, Texas — Gov. Rick Perry has said he will sign the James Byrd Jr. Hate Crimes Act into law, toughening penalties for crimes motivated by hate against minorities, gays and others, supporters of the bill said Friday.

Rep. Genforino Thompson, the bill's House sponsor, said she felt like a load was lifted off her shoulders when she found out from the governor's office that Perry would sign the bill.

"When you've fought so long and so hard, you're glad it's over with and he's going to sign it," Thompson said.

A spokeswoman for the governor would say only that Perry planned to announce his intentions regarding the hate crime legislation Friday afternoon. As recently as Thursday he had said he hadn't made up his mind.

## FDA approves drug that targets leukemia molecule

WASHINGTON — The Food and Drug Administration Thursday approved a new cancer drug that produced dramatic results in patients with a type of leukemia by targeting an abnormal molecule in the cancer cells that causes their runaway growth.

The FDA took only two and one-half months to review the drug, called Gleevec — the fastest agency action on record for a cancer drug. Health and Human Services Secretary Tommy Thompson hailed the drug's approval, calling it the first of what medical experts hope will be a new generation of more precise, less toxic cancer therapies.

"This new drug, we believe, is the picture of the future of cancer treatment," said Richard Klausner, director of the National Cancer Institute.

In people with chronic myeloid leukemia (CML), Gleevec — which can be taken orally — has produced striking reductions in the number of cancerous white blood cells, with relatively mild side effects compared with other treatments.

## Lawmaker pleads innocent, will represent himself

YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio — Rep. James A. Traficant Jr. pleaded innocent Friday to a 10-count indictment charging him with taking kickbacks from staff members and payoffs from people looking for favors.

Traficant, a nine-term Democrat who successfully defended himself against bribery charges 18 years ago, also won permission to represent himself, although he is not a lawyer.

Traficant, 60, was indicted last week on charges, that include racketeering, bribery and conspiracy. If convicted on all charges, he could be sentenced to 60 years in prison and fined \$2.2 million.

When U.S. District Judge Lesley Wells, who will preside at Traficant's trial, questioned whether Traficant really wanted to represent himself and asked him if he grasped the potential hazards, the lawmaker responded, "That is an astute question."

Traficant represented himself in 1983 when he was accused of taking mob bribes. He was acquitted after he convinced the jury that he was running a sting against the mob, though he had not yet been sworn in as sheriff.

## College closes fraternity that printed newsletters

HANOVER, N.H. — Dartmouth College said Friday it is shutting down a fraternity for printing newsletters in which members detailed their sexual escapades with undergraduate women who were identified by name.

The Ivy League school that inspired the movie "Animal House" said the 48-member Zeta Psi fraternity will no longer be allowed to hold meetings or other activities on campus, and all members must move out when the spring term ends on June 10.

Zeta Psi underwent fundamental values we hold dear," said Dartmouth President James Wright.

The decision was made by Martin Redman, dean of residence life, after a 5-hour hearing with fraternity members on Sunday. Redman said the fraternity harassed fellow students and violated ethical standards.

## Rolls-Royce recalls its vehicles after one explodes

WASHINGTON — Rolls-Royce Motor Cars Inc. is recalling five models after a brand new car exploded at a Michigan dealership.

The recall affects 2000 and 2001 models of the Corniche and Bentley Azure and Continental T, R and SC. Only 539 of those vehicles were made and 408 were sold in the United States.

The explosion occurred after a dealership technician put the first tank of gas in a \$260,000 2001 Corniche convertible that had just arrived from the British assembly plant.

As the technician drove away from the pump and hit a switch to roll up the windows, the explosion blew out the windows and damaged the convertible top and interior.

## Chief executive 'auctions' his mom over the Web

LOS ANGELES — Kids. They never call. They never write. And now one of them — the chief executive of a dot-com startup — is "selling" his mom over the Internet. The highest bidder will get the benefit of her advice at least twice a month for three months. The winner of the Mother's Day stunt can expect to get the usual questions, like "When are you coming to visit?" and "Have you met anyone nice?"

"She will call to make sure they are eating right and to make sure they are cleaning up their room — whatever my mom normally does, she will do to them," said Charles Low, the CEO of Surpluz.

As of Friday morning, the bidding for Marilyn Low had reached \$30, with bids posted at www.surpluz.com, based in suburban Canoga Park.

# Missing evidence embarrasses FBI

WASHINGTON — For an agency still reeling from the discovery of an alleged spy in its ranks, the last thing the FBI needed was the disclosure that it withheld evidence from lawyers representing the man convicted of the worst act of domestic terrorism in U.S. history.

Timothy McVeigh was scheduled to be executed by lethal injection on Wednesday. Now his lawyers are weighing whether to seek a stay of the execution, which would have been the first federal death sentence carried out since 1963.

Attorney General John Ashcroft put off the execution until June 11 to allow McVeigh's attorneys to review the evidence and ordered an investigation into the FBI's failure to turn over thousands of pages to McVeigh's defense team.

"I know only Americans will question why the execution of someone who is so clearly guilty of such a heinous crime should be delayed," Ashcroft said. He said he made his decision so that there would be no lingering questions over the case that "would cast a permanent cloud over justice."

"The mishap comes a little more than a week after FBI Director Louis Freeh said he plans to retire in June — two years short of his 10-year term. Law enforcement officials familiar with the case said there was no connection between

Freeh's decision to retire and the problem with the McVeigh documents.

The revelation shook the law enforcement establishment — and people waiting to see closure more than six years after a bomb destroyed the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building in Oklahoma City, killing 168, including many women and children.

"I'm appalled," said Kathleen Treanor, who lost her 4-year-old daughter and her in-laws in the bombing. "The FBI knew from the very beginning that this was a huge case. How could they have possibly made a mistake like this?"

The documents mishap also follows the arrest in February of Robert Philip Hansen, a 20-year veteran agent accused of selling national secrets to Moscow.

Hansen, a counterintelligence agent with access to highly sensitive information, carried on his alleged spying activities for 15 years without being detected by his bosses. Investigations are underway to figure out how.

"Other controversies" from a crime-lab scandal in the 1990s to the botched investigation last year of former Los Alamos scientist Wen Ho Lee, have dogged the FBI in recent years.

The revelation that some 3,135

investigation materials — including interview reports and physical evidence such as photographs, letters and tapes — were inadvertently withheld from McVeigh's attorneys is another embarrassment for the FBI.

Law enforcement officials familiar with the documents mishap, speaking only on condition of anonymity, said the mistake resulted from an antiquated records system. The FBI was in the routine process of gathering all documents from the Oklahoma City bombing investigation — amounting to more than 1 million — from its bureaus when officials discovered that some pages had never been shared with defense lawyers.

"One thing that's overlooked here is that there were thousands and thousands of these statements that have to be stored and cataloged," said Andrew Cohen, a legal analyst who has followed the case. "Certainly you don't

want to encourage the government to lose this sort of thing, but in some ways it's a bit understandable."

As soon as the mistake was discovered, the bureau acted quickly to turn the documents over, the sources said. The Justice Department received the documents Wednesday and sent McVeigh's attorneys copies of everything.

The department says none of the documents creates any doubt about McVeigh's conviction or sentence. McVeigh's lawyers could still ask for a stay of execution so they can examine the materials.

Paul Heath, who was injured in the bombing, said he was taking a wait-and-see approach to the news.

"I'm convinced it wouldn't make any difference to Mr. McVeigh," said Heath. "It does not upset me."

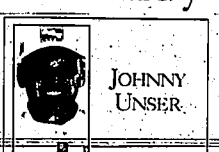

But not to William Joppy. "I think he's a little overrated," Joppy said. "I want to show he doesn't belong in the ring with me."

Roberto Duran, who in 1989 was the last former welterweight champion to win a middleweight title, thinks Trinidad has the match to knock out a middleweight but that he should not go looking for KO.

Duran also believes Trinidad would be mistaken not to respect the punching power of Joppy, who has 24 knockouts in a 52-1-1 record.

Duran, the former champion in four weight divisions, was stopped in the third round of a title bid against Joppy on Aug. 28, 1998. But Duran was 47 at the

It was the best match so far at the \$1.185 million clay court event, which started with three of the world's top four players until No. 2 Venus Williams was upset Thursday.

Top-seeded Martina Hingis also won, besting Arantxa Sanchez-Vicario 6-3, 7-6 (4) to gain a measure of revenge for a straight-sets loss to the Spaniard last month at Amelia Island, Fla.

In other quarterfinals, Belgium teen-ager Justine Henin defeated German wild card entry Miriam Schmitzer 6-4, 6-2 and France's Amelie Mauresmo ousted South Africa's Amanda Coetzer 6-7 (5), 6-3, 6-3.

In today's semifinals, Capriati will face Henin, while Hingis will take on Mauresmo.

Capriati, ranked sixth in the world in 1990 when she was 14, and the 28-year-old Martinez, who reached the French Open final last year, engaged in long ground-pounding rallies as each tried to probe the other, looking for an opening. The Spaniard tried drop shots, overheads and volleys as she tried to keep Capriati off-balance.

Henin, ranked 18th in the world, upset Williams in the previous round and is looking forward to playing Capriati.

"I'll go out there and do my best. I have nothing to lose. But I am thinking of winning the event," said Henin, who opened the year by winning two tournaments.

Hingis led a 4-2 third-set lead against Sanchez-Vicario slip away, then rattled off the last three points of the tiebreak to beat the three-time French Open winner for the 16th time in 18 meetings.

### Peaking Kuerten rolls over Spain's Corretja

ROME — Gustavo Kuerten had to work overtime Friday before advancing to the Italian Open semifinals and serving notice that he is ready to defend his French Open title later this month.

The Brazilian, seeded No. 1 at the annual Foro Italico showdown, used his searing groundstrokes to beat Spanish clay-court specialist Alex Corretja 6-2, 5-3 in a night match.

Earlier in the day, Kuerten beat Argentine Franco Squillari 6-1, 6-2 in a match that had been delayed from Thursday because of rain.

Kuerten showed why most consider him the world's best clay-court player as the two-time French Open champion mixed vicious backhands with well-placed topspin lobs.

He will face Andreas Vinciguerra in the semifinals today after the young Swede saved two set-points on his way to a 7-6, 6-2 win over Israel's Harel Levy.

The other semifinal will feature Spain's Juan Carlos Ferrero against Ecuador's Nicolas Lapentti.

Ferrero, seeded eighth, continued his own sharp clay-court play, rolling over South Africa's Wayne Ferreira 6-0, 6-2 in less than an hour in their quarterfinal show-down Friday afternoon. The 21-year-old Spaniard, coming off a win on clay in Barcelona last month, has lost just 14 games this week in Rome.

With three tournament wins this year, Ferrero will be considered one of the top challengers at this month's French Open, where he reached the semifinals last year.

"I'm in my best form on clay," said Ferrero. "I felt so good today, and all week."

Ferrero's quarterfinal win came less than four hours after he finished off Julien Boutter of France, 6-3, 6-2 in a third-round match that had been suspended by rain.

Lapentti came back from a set, down to dominate Spain's Jacobo Diaz 3-6, 6-1, 6-2.

Tiger Woods, playing his first tournament since sweeping the majors with his Masters victory, was five strokes back at 134 after a 68. He's seeking his fourth straight PGA Tour victory.

One day after matching a career-low 62, Verplank overcame a sluggish start with back-to-back birdies and had a 67. He and Duval were at 11-under 129, one stroke shy of the 36-hole record last set by Woods two years ago.

Robert Damron had a 64 and was another stroke back. Vijay Singh, the last player besides Woods to win a major, birdied four of his last five holes and was at 131.

## Hanson holds lead at Electrolux USA

FRANKLIN, Tenn. — Tracy Hanson shot her second straight

5-under 67 to take a one-stroke lead in the rain-suspended second round of the Electrolux USA Championship.

Swedish star Annika Sorenstam was at 6 under with three holes left as she tries to win for the sixth time in her last seven tournaments.

Australia's Karrie Webb, playing her first LPGA Tour event since late March, was 3 under with 16 holes to play.

Pat Hurst, who held a one-stroke lead after a bogey-free first round, was a stroke behind Hanson after a 71. She just finished as the horn blew for the third and final time, leaving her tied with Jill McGill, who still has four holes left.

Only 48 players completed the round.

Watson shot a 68, Irwin had a 68 and Stockton fired a 69.

## Co-composer of 'Rock Around the Clock' dies

FORT MYERS, Fla. (AP) - James Myers, whose two-minute, eight-second tune "Rock Around the Clock" is considered the granddaddy of all rock 'n' roll songs, has died of leukemia. He was 81.

# Boys' deaths shock community

**Jewish settlement sorts through fear, defiance after attack**

TEKOA, West Bank (AP) — Thirteen-year-old Judah Milstein turned down an invitation to join two friends on a wilderness hike in the Judean Desert because he wanted to make baseball practice.

The Brooklyn-born teen's friends never returned — they were stoned to death in a cave near their homes, presumably by Palestinians.

The horrific slayings this week, the latest attack on Jewish settlers during almost eight months of Israeli-Palestinian fighting, left residents of this small, isolated West-Bank settlement sorting through a complex mix of fear and defiance.

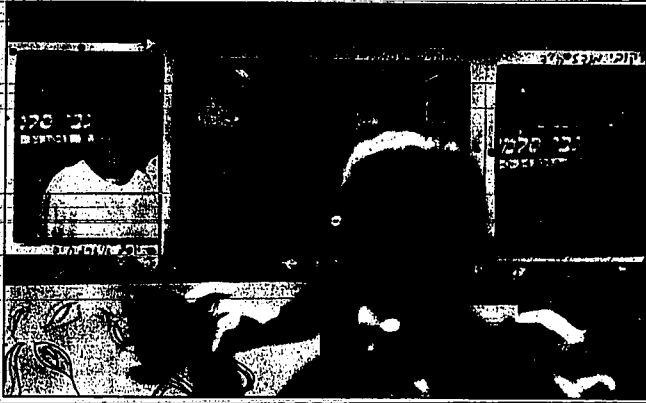
"We are afraid of them (the Palestinians) but we're still going to go down to the cave," Judah said.

Fear was something Judah's father had hoped his son wouldn't grow up with.

Harvey Milstein moved with his family to the West Bank six years ago from Crown Heights, Brooklyn, where his father's drug store was held up at gunpoint 36 times.

As a young boy, Milstein, 41, remembers watching a robber put a shotgun barrel into his mother's mouth.

"My father was so upset he couldn't see the money out of the cash drawer. And I remember the look of fear on his face," said Milstein, who guides tours of the desert and carries a handgun in

his belt. "I always wanted my children to grow up without fear."

Since the Palestinian uprising began in September, fear has plagued his neighborhood.

Putting on a bulletproof vest for a drive has become as common as fastening a seatbelt. Seventeen settlers have been shot and killed driving in the West Bank. Israelis are not permitted to hike there without an army escort.

In October, settlers touring near Mount Ebal in the northern West-

Bank traded gunfire for five hours with Palestinians and had to be rescued by Israeli combat helicopters. A settler and a Palestinian gunman died.

Despite the dangers, many settlers insist on maintaining their daily routines to show they won't be moved off the land, and have tried to install that same resolve in their children.

For 20 years, the 250 families in Tekoa — including 40 from the United States — went about their

lives quietly, "a group of people just trying to live in the Holy Land where they belong," said Shimon Seidner, 42, who came from Nashville, Tenn., six years ago.

He initially settled in Efrat, a West Bank settlement that could easily be mistaken for a U.S. suburb, then moved to Tekoa, a hill-top community nestled among vineyards and olive tree groves because he wanted to find a spiritual place.

**Court convicts men in deaths of immigrants**

ROTTERDAM, Netherlands (AP) — In a case that dramatized Europe's illegal immigration crisis, a Dutch court convicted seven men in the deaths of 58 Chinese migrants who suffocated in a truck container while seeking a better life in Britain.

The seven were given prison terms of up to nine years each — less than half the punishment demanded by prosecutors. They were acquitted of manslaughter

by the three-judge panel, who ruled the defendants never intended to kill the migrants.

Two men were acquitted of all charges and walked free.

Defense attorneys said they would appeal.

The bodies of 54 men and four women were discovered June 18 by customs officials in Dover, England. Only two Chinese survived the ferry crossing from Zeebrugge, Belgium.

## Macedonia forms new government

SKOPJE, Macedonia (AP) — Macedonia's disparate political parties formed a new coalition government Friday, offering a measure of stability to a country struggling to quell an ethnic Albanian insurgency.

The central-safety government engaged in talks with key ethnic Albanian party, dropping its objections to joining. The coalition replaces Prime Minister Lubco Georgievski's previous, smaller alliance of parties.

The last holdout, the Party for Democratic Prosperity, had demanded that the government halt attacks on militants before talks could begin — and acquiesce after the army holds fire for the better part of a day.

Western organizations exerted their own pressure, alarmed that the escalating exchanges of machine-gun fire and mortar rounds would suck this fragile country into another Balkan war.

"The parties reiterated their common interest that the security situation in the country should be their basic task," Georgievski said in announcing the new coalition.

Resolving the crisis, however, may be the only goal the parties share. The new panel includes leftists and central-right conservatives, but few are considered to be moderate. Members of the new Cabinet will be announced Saturday, Georgievski said.

International officials were pushing for the new coalition's success. NATO Secretary-General Lord Robertson said it was time for all of Macedonia's parties to "unite in the interest of survival," and U.S. State Department spokesman Richard Boucher hailed the coalition as "a major step forward."

## Blood tests came up negative for foot-and-mouth

LONDON (AP) — More than a quarter of supposedly confirmed cases of foot-and-mouth in Britain tested negative in blood tests after the livestock had been killed, the government said as an independent report bolstered its claim that the epidemic is now under control.

Though officials said it was possible the livestock were at the stage of the disease where it wouldn't show up in blood tests, the admission Thursday raised questions about the government's slaughter of the animals.

The disclosure was likely to provoke anger among farmers whose livestock was culled, but the National Farmers' Union said Friday it wanted to examine the figures in more detail before passing judgment.

NEW YORK (AP) — Stocks slid Friday after a new batch of data showing resilience in the economy cast doubt over how aggressively the Federal Reserve will continue to cut rates.

Trading was light and choppy throughout the session, which was among the slowest of the year for both the New York Stock Exchange and Nasdaq Stock Market, according to preliminary figures.

The Dow Jones industrial average closed down 89.13 at 10,821.31, also according to initial calculations. The index has "closed down four of the last five sessions."

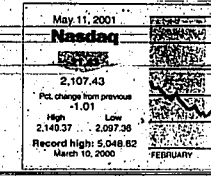
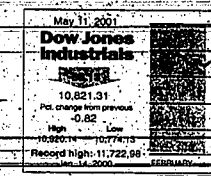

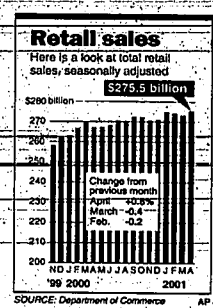

Numbers suggest economy might be in better shape than thought

WASHINGTON — Better-than-expected economic numbers released Friday showed that consumers have not yet given up on the U.S. economy.

The Commerce Department said that retail sales rose by 0.8 percent in April from the previous month, \$275.5 billion. Part of the steeper-than-expected increase was due to a revision of March sales, which dropped by 0.4 percent from February.

# For death row inmates, it's really not over until it's over

WASHINGTON - Throughout history and especially now, death-row cases have come with wrenching twists in the last weeks, days, hours, minutes. Even last meals don't mean it's over.

The postponement Friday of Timothy McVeigh's execution date was extraordinary in that it was motivated not by the condemned man, who seems detached about his fate, but by the government on the basis of a blunder.

Yet 11-hour detours from the death chamber are practically commonplace in the annals of American capital punishment, for the infamous and the unknown.

"Spies Get 1 More Day," screamed the headline in a

tabloid clutched by the bewildered children of Julius and Ethel Rosenberg in June 1953, before their parents were put to death for giving atomic-bomb secrets to the Soviets.

In a modern-day case that contributed to the moratorium on Illinois executions, Anthony Porter had ordered his last meal and been fitted for burial clothes before winning a temporary reprieve in 1998.

Then another man confessed to the murder, clearing him.

Typically people have two or three or four execution dates before it's carried out - if it's carried out," said Richard C. Dieter, director of the Death Penalty Information Center.

The Rosenbergs' trial was a sensation, many protested his fairness

168 people in the 1995 Oklahoma City bombing, was scheduled to be put to death Wednesday in the first federal execution since 1963.

The government ordered a 30-day stay after the FBI said it found documents it had failed to turned over to McVeigh's defense.

Officials said the documents do not contain anything that clouds the jury's verdict or McVeigh's admission of responsibility.

Still, Bush, overseeing his first execution stay as president, said the postponement "is an example of the system being fair."

Last year, Bush authorized the only 30-day stay he granted as Texas governor, in the case of Ricky Nolen McGinn.

McGinn was only 18 minutes from death and had eaten what

was supposed to have been his last meal when Bush put off the execution so new DNA evidence could be considered. McGinn, a convicted child-killer, was executed in September after the evidence failed to exonerate him.

In normal circumstances, Dieter noted, most condemned prisoners never are put to death. Only about 10 percent of the 7,000 death penalty sentences ordered since capital punishment was reinstated in 1976 have been carried out.

Those executed in 1999 spent an average of 11 years and 11 months on death row, a government study has found.

McVeigh decided earlier to drop all appeals, but as his lawyers pored over the withheld

documents, they indicated he could decide to pursue avenues available to him.

Public demands to save the lives of the condemned have animated other famous cases, including that of Nicole Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti, anarchists executed in 1927 for robbery and murder six years after a trial considered unfair by many then and now.

No such movement has sprung up for McVeigh.

The last prisoner executed by the federal government tried until the end to save himself.

Last year, President Clinton twice delayed the federal execution of Juan Raul Garza, each time within a week of the scheduled date. The Texan is scheduled to be executed June 19.

## Church should welcome strangers

The truth is: God loves those people who live and work in the sinful world and, in spite of all the temptations, still seek spiritual mercy. God knows, that's amazing.

That divine challenge is the beginning and end of the problem.

Christians often don't know how to engage the world or the people in it without destroying the Gospel message.

That's why so many church buildings look like mausoleums, and congregations act like frightened, embattled organizations. They have not realized yet that God wants us to save the culture, not hide from it.

There's a clever little book on the market, written by the Rev. Tim Wright, executive pastor at Community Church of Joy in Glendale, Ariz. Church of Joy is a monstrously huge place that has grown radically because the ministry focus is embracing the world to reach needy people.

The pastors at Church of Joy don't want to steal members from other congregations. They are concerned about the impact on those who have avoided or rejected church membership in the past.

It's a tough audience, but in "The Hugging Prodigal Church" (Joy Resources), Wright says that Jesus' approach to culture was filled with risks and dangers: "(Religious leaders) criticized him because he constantly surrounded himself with what they considered to be the lowest of society — people like despised tax collectors, filthy prostitutes and non-religious sinners."

Wright says, and I believe the Gospel message also says, this is the ministry of the Christian church — to reach into culture and rescue those who are lost. But that is not the focused ministry of believers in our day, because there is that concern that the world will muddy and destroy the ministry.

I remember giving a speech to a group of clergy in Iowa. They were all good men and women who were veteran leaders of congregations.

I gave them my pitch on rural evangelism and how good people were moving into abandoned farmhouses and low-rent homes in small towns.

Then one young pastor challenged me. "He said most of the people he invited to church were never greeted, and none was made to feel welcome."

There was unrest and anger in every committee meeting over the new people sitting in the pews.

By the end of that year, all the people he had invited had dropped out.

"They were angry and forever signed off from church. With his spirit lagging, he gave up the effort."

As he told his sad story, other clergy in the room nodded their heads.

"They understood the constraints of parish ministry in the modern day."

That's the changing point — the culture today is filled with people who have never heard the Gospel of Jesus Christ. And many church buildings are sitting empty.

Believers must begin to welcome the stranger, or this entire enterprise will be doomed. Either religion makes a difference, or it doesn't matter.

## McVeigh execution provides catalyst for nun's 'declaration'

TERRE-HAUTE, Ind. — Publicity surrounding Timothy McVeigh's scheduled execution is generating renewed interest in an anti-death penalty document already signed by thousands.

Brooklyn, N.Y., started the group in 1993 that is responsible for distributing the Declaration of Life. McVeigh, convicted in the 1995 bombing of the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building in Oklahoma City that killed 168 people, was scheduled to die by lethal injection on Wednesday at the federal penitentiary in Terre Haute; but Attorney General John Ashcroft postponed the execution until June 11 and ordered an investigation into the FBI's failure to turn over thousands of documents to

McVeigh's defense team. For a related story, please see page A-1. "People are sick to death of the killing," said D'Arienzio. Those who sign the two-page declaration, she said, feel in control because it "relieves the signer of absolute powerlessness" over the death penalty.

Since 1998, D'Arienzio has been a spiritual adviser to David Paul Hammer, an inmate incarcerated in the Terre Haute prison. He's on death row for strangling his cell mate in 1996 while in Pennsylvania's Allenwood Federal Penitentiary.

From within the prison in Terre Haute, Hammer was received into the Catholic church. An article D'Arienzio wrote about Hammer and the Declaration of Life published Feb. 19 in America, a weekly Catholic magazine, prompted many to seek out a copy of the declaration, she said. Those who sign the declaration are asked to trim a portion of it off and send it — along with \$1 — to Cherish Life Circle, D'Arienzio's group. In return, they receive a wall-size card, making it clear they have made the declaration.

Speech upsets evangelical group

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) - An evangelical caucus in the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) has issued an open letter to church officials saying they failed to set boundaries for acceptable doctrine.

Presbyterians for Renewal, the evangelical group, is upset that the officials did not object to a speech given by a Presbyterian minister who proposed belief in salvation apart from Jesus Christ. The speech was delivered to the Presbyterian Peace-making Conference last July by the Rev. Dirk Ficca, who directs the Chicago-based Parliament of the World's Religions.

Ficca asked, "If God is at work in our lives whether we're Christian or not, what's the big deal about Jesus?"

Rather than insisting that salvation comes only through Jesus - and therefore that Presbyterians should try to convert all people of other faiths - Ficca suggested Presbyterians should seek some converts but realize that God is working "in all people to bring about salvation."

The Ficca dispute and tolerance for same-sex rituals provoked the formation in March of a conservative "confessing church" movement, supported so far by 72 Presbyterian congregations.
