

# Taliban rejects U.S. demand

## Afghanistan asks for evidence before it will turn over bin Laden

ISLAMABAD—Pakistan—Afghanistan's ruling Taliban militia Friday dismissed President Bush's demand that it immediately surrender alleged terrorist Osama bin Laden, vowing instead to engage in a "showdown of might" with the United States.

The Taliban's ambassador to Pakistan said his government wants proof that bin Laden was involved in last week's attacks on the World Trade Center and the Pentagon before considering whether to extradite him. "We are not ready to hand over Osama bin Laden without evidence," said the envoy, Abdul Salam Zaeef.

In Washington, U.S. officials said they would not provide evidence to the Taliban about bin Laden's involvement in the Sept. 11 attacks. White House spokesman Ari Fleischer said there would be "no discussions and no negotiations" with the Taliban. Releasing evidence about the attacks, Fleischer said, could provide "meaningful assistance" to suspects still being sought by law enforce-

ment authorities. With a U.S. military attack on Afghanistan appearing increasingly likely, panicked residents continued fleeing Afghan cities into remote mountainous areas and toward the 1,500-mile-long border with Pakistan. Because the standoff over bin Laden has led to a stoppage of aid shipments to the drought-ravaged nation, U.N. officials warned of an impending humanitarian cri-

sis as donated food supplies are exhausted in the next few weeks. In addition, U.N. diplomats in New York said the Taliban threatened Friday to execute any Afghan U.N. workers who try to communicate with anyone outside the country.

U.S. officials note that bin Laden, who is accused of heading a terrorist organization called al Qaeda, already has been charged in connection with the bombings of two U.S. embassies in Africa in August 1998. Secretary of State Colin Powell told the BBC Friday that the United States has "enough intelligence information as well

## Analysts say Saddam doesn't seem to be involved in attacks

WASHINGTON — While President Bush's top advisers debated Friday whether to target Iraq for devastating bombardment as part of the U.S.-led war on terrorism, U.S. officials and terrorism

experts say there is little evidence Saddam Hussein's regime played a role in the attacks on the World Trade Center and the Pentagon. The issue of who — if anyone — helped suspect Osama bin Laden and his al Qaeda network plan

and execute the Sept. 11 terrorist tragedy — has taken on new urgency as Bush decides how and where to retaliate with a growing military arsenal being deployed overseas. In the hours after the attacks, U.S. intelligence obtained con-

gratulatory messages from bin Laden operatives that seemed to confirm the Afghan-based Saudi exile's culpability. Members of groups allied with al Qaeda, such as the Egyptian Jihad organiza-

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## Airline analysts say passengers should adopt aggressive stance

Kathy Rockel was amazed when her United Airlines flight last weekend began with an extraordinary message from the pilot. He informed passengers how to rise up and fend off hijackers.

"If anybody stands up and is trying to take over the plane, stand up together, take whatever you have and throw it at their heads," she quoted the pilot as saying. "You have to aim for their faces so they have to defend themselves."

The pilot also said passengers could fight hijackers by throwing blankets over their heads, wresting them to the ground and holding them until he landed, Rockel said. And referring to the "five the people"

preamble to the Constitution, she recalled, he said, "We will not be defeated."

"Everybody on the plane was applauding," said Rockel, a medical transcriptionist traveling from Denver to Washington, D.C., Sept. 15 on United's Flight 564. "People had tears coming down their faces. It was as if we had a choice here, that if something were to happen we're not completely powerless."

Peter Humphord, a public affairs consultant on the plane, wrote about the incident in a column published in The Washington Times. He described how the pilot urged passengers to use books, glass

## Recession now seems certain

### Real question is how long it will last

WASHINGTON — Massive airline layoffs. Empty hotels and restaurants. Wall Street's biggest weekly point decline ever. The economic damage from the terrorist attacks has virtually guaranteed a recession this year, many economists said Friday.

The only questions remaining: How long and how deep? "I think we will have a mild recession that will end sometime in the first three months of next year, but we really don't know yet. Things are very uncertain and everybody is nervous," said David Wyss, chief economist at Standard & Poor's in New York.

Two closely watched forecasting groups — Blue Chip Economic Indicators and the National Association for Business Economics — surveyed economists in the wake of the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks. Both released surveys this week finding that an overwhelming majority of economists believe a recession is unavoidable.

## Lawmakers approve aid deal for airlines

Congress swiftly approved a \$15 billion federal aid package for the battered U.S. airline industry Friday while setting up a government fund to compensate the families of victims of the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks. President Bush was expected to sign the measure.

The relief bill, approved by the House 356-54 and the Senate, 96-1, was designed to help the airlines recover from crushing losses stemming from the unprecedented

# Many terrorist suspects landed in U.S. carrying visitors' visas

The Justice Department Friday provided the first glimpse of 80 foreign nationals it has rounded up in connection with the Sept. 11 terrorist strikes, releasing documents that show they include numerous Middle Easterners who arrived on visitors' visas as well as two Pakistanis who sneaked over the Mexican border shortly before the attack.

Authorities provided the nationalities and alleged infractions of 33 of the 80 people being held on immigration charges, but withheld their names for privacy reasons. In addition, U.S. authorities have arrested at least six people as material witnesses in the case.

A U.S. official said some of the people in the group may eventually be found to have no relation to the airplane attacks, which left more than 6,000 people missing and presumed dead.

However, "there's a belief we have some very probable terrorists in the group," said the official, speaking on condition of anonymity.

In other developments Friday, federal prosecutors in Illinois said they had charged a Yemeni man with trying to fly to Chicago with an illegal passport and Lufthansa crew uniforms on the day of the terror attacks. In a complaint filed under seal Sept. 14, prosecutors said Nageeb Abdul Jabbar Mohamed Al-Hadi was carrying three Yemeni passports and had two airline crew uniforms.

British anti-terrorist police announced they had arrested three men and one woman for questioning in connection with the attacks. The arrests followed the detention of seven people in France a day earlier. The German government Friday issued international arrest warrants for two suspected accomplices in the terrorist plot.

The FBI is investigating whether some of the hijackers received training in military exchange programs for foreign officers at the Pensacola Naval Air Station in Florida, a spokesman for Sen. Bill Nelson, D-Fla., said.

The 33 people whose immigration violations were detailed Friday included six Jordanians and six Egyptians, as well as citizens of Israel, Iran, India, Saudi Arabia and other countries. Most entered the United States legally on temporary visas for work or tourism and stayed longer than they were allowed, according to the documents.

But the list included some unusual cases too: a pair of Pakistanis who sneaked across the Mexican border near Brownsville, Texas on Aug. 24, less than three weeks before the terrorist attack; two Egyptians who crossed the border illegally near Laredo, Texas on Sept. 14, three days after the attack; and a Syrian who crossed the Canadian border without a visa on Sept. 8, 2001.

Among the 80 detainees is a Yemeni gas station employee in suburban San Diego, who was flown to New York for questioning about his ties to some of the hijackers, according to the San Francisco Chronicle.

FBI agents wanted to talk to Omer Bakrabash, 26, about their suspicions that he coached at least two of the hijackers in English usage and how to use the Internet, and also furnished them

money, the newspaper said.

The FBI has drawn up a list of over 240 people it is seeking to question in the hijackings of the four jets that crashed into the World Trade Center, the Pentagon and a field in Pennsylvania. It was unclear how many of the 80 detained on immigration infractions are part of that list.

The fact that so many of those held for questioning were in the United States beyond their visa deadlines sparked immediate criticism of U.S. immigration policy. In recent years, an increased number of foreign visitors—at least 2.5 million, by official estimates—have simply stayed on after their visas expired.

A Justice official said that it was difficult to weed out people planning to settle in the United States from the over 30 million visitors who arrived each year on visas. And he noted a 1996 law stiffened the penalties for those found to have overstayed their visas, barring them from returning to the United States for as long as 10 years if their infractions are discovered.

The FBI's investigation has extended to U.S. military installations, private flight academies, and driving schools.

# Stars turn out to pitch for relief

NEW YORK (AP) — In an extraordinary benefit across the television dial, entertainers from Tom Hanks to Bruce Springsteen united Friday to raise money for victims of the World Trade Center and Pentagon terrorist attacks.

Making understated appeals for donations, actors told stories of innocent people killed and heroic acts. They alternated short speeches with singers who performed on sets decorated by hundreds of burning candles. "We are not healers," Hanks said. "We are not protectors of this great nation. We are merely artists, entertainers, here-to-raise-spirits and, we hope, a great deal of money."

The unprecedented event was being shown on more than 30 TV networks, including all the six biggest broadcasters ABC, CBS, NBC, Fox, UPN and the WB simultaneously. "America: A Tribute to Heroes" was also being heard on more than 8,000 radio stations.

It was reminiscent of the Live Aid concerts for famine relief in 1985, but that wasn't available across such a wide spectrum of networks. Within the first 15 minutes, Springsteen, Stevie Wonder and the rock band U2 performed on stages in New York, Los Angeles and London. "This is a prayer for our fallen brothers and sisters,"

Springsteen said opening the telecast, before singing a new song, "My City of Ruins."

Wonder condemned hatred in the name of religion before singing "Love's in Need of Love Today." Neil Young performed the late John Lennon's hit, "Imagine." Tom Petty and the Heartbreakers played their defiant, "I Won't Back Down." Wyklef Jean, dressed in stars and stripes, sang Bob Marley's "Redemption Song."

With such stars as Tom Cruise, Julia Roberts and Jim Carrey and a two-hour limit, it was hard to fit in everybody interested in pitching in. Celebrities like Meg Ryan, Jack Nicholson and Sylvester Stallone were relegated to the phone bank, answering contributors' calls.

# Clinic director admits she stole money

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) - The co-founder of a pioneering health clinic for low-income residents has resigned as clinic director, admitting she stole money to feed her gambling habit.

Sandy Mamola told the board of directors of the Dirne Community Health Clinic that she used a clinic credit card to cover gambling losses.

"I used my husband's and my money, and then I used the clinic's money," Mamola said. "The hardest thing is that I betrayed my husband and the people at the clinic. Now, somehow, I will

have to figure out how to pick up the pieces."

She made her comments to The Spokesman-Review on Thursday.

The board has hired Ginger Seaman, who previously served as the clinic's administrative assistant, to replace Mamola.

Mamola, 54, did not keep track of the amount of money she took. Board chairman Kathy Ream declined to comment beyond that the clinic would protect its options to recover any loss.

"Certainly we would want a final accounting of all lost funds, and we would seek legal counsel, and

then develop a plan for the quickest remedy for replacement of those funds from the person responsible," Ream said in a statement.

Mamola said the board has agreed not to press charges in exchange for restitution once she finds another job. Her habit began about five months ago with social outings to a casino. About weeks ago, she and the clinic's bookkeeper confronted Mamola with the credit card charges, she confessed and offered to resign.

The Dirne Clinic was founded in 1989 as the Lake City Health

Care Clinic. It provides low-cost health care to residents who have no insurance or insufficient income to pay for care. Last year it served 2,100 patients from four counties. Some pay a modest amount. Others pay nothing.

As a nonprofit operation, the clinic relies on donations and support from Kootenai County for its \$87,000-a-year operating budget. It accepts no federal money. Kootenai County provides \$30,000 to \$40,000 a year as part of its legal responsibility to provide health care for the indigent.

# Department reschedules Yucca Mountain hearings

LAS VEGAS (AP) - Public hearings on the Energy Department's plans to bury nuclear waste deep inside Yucca Mountain will be held in Amargosa Valley and Pahrump next month.

The hearings were originally set for Sept. 12 and 13 but were postponed because of last week's terrorist attacks on the East Coast.

On Thursday the department rescheduled the hearings for Oct. 10 in Amargosa Valley and Oct. 12 in Pahrump.

The government earlier this month gathered public comment in Las Vegas on a scientific report that identified no major obstacles to making Yucca Mountain the national dump for 77,000 tons of highly-radioactive waste.

Energy Secretary Spencer Abraham is expected to recommend to President Bush by the end of the year whether the site 30 miles northwest of Las Vegas is suitable to begin accepting nuclear waste as early as 2010.

# Cleanup advocate wins \$130,000

KELLOGG (AP) - Silver Valley activist Barbara Miller, the leader of the People's Action Coalition, has won a top award and \$130,000 for trying to secure tough standards for cleaning up lead contamination from a century of mining.

The award from the Ford Foundation was made over the spring process. Many residents who have objected to Miller's seeming attacks on an industry that had been the economic life of their community.

"It's a slap in the face," Kellogg Mayor Roger Mangum said. "Talk

to 1,000 normal people, and they'd be surprised she was even considered for it."

Of the 3,000 nominations submitted to the foundation for recognition, Miller was the only one to draw opposition. The flurry of critical letters was prompted by a local newspaper editorial, but it came after judges had winnowed the nominations down to 36 finalists. Miller was among 20 people to receive the award and cash grant.

"All the winners are tackling very tough social-justice issues and have committed their lives to

it," said Laura Chambers, program director for Leadership for a Changing World in Washington, D.C. The organization is a partner with the Ford Foundation in the community leadership program.

Miller, whose organization has been striving for economic development and environmental justice for 15 years, said she did not know how her name surfaced.

"There are many unrecognized leaders in the Silver Valley," she said, predicting that some of the cash grant will go toward educating residents about the cleanup and its human health aspects.

# Prosecutors say student attended party before crash

LARAMIE, Wyo. (AP) - A University of Wyoming student charged in the traffic deaths of eight fellow student-athletes had attended a party before the accident, prosecutors said Friday.

Clinton Haskins, 21, had a blood-alcohol content of 0.16 after the Sunday morning accident, higher than the legal limit of 0.10, prosecutor Cal Rerucha said.

Haskins of Maybell, Colo., made his initial court appearance on eight counts of aggravated vehicular homicide. Each count is punishable by up to 20 years in prison.

Rerucha declined to be more specific about the so-called roody party Haskins attended.

He also presented documents

showing Haskins had pleaded guilty on two separate occasions, in 1998 and 2000, to possessing or drinking alcohol as a minor. He was fined \$160 on each conviction.

Circuit Judge Robert Castor kept Haskins' bond at \$100,000, saying he was concerned about Haskins' mental state. Haskins' attorney, Mike Krampner, had asked that the bond be reduced to \$25,000. Rerucha wanted it increased by an unspecified amount.

Haskins remained in the county jail. Castor set his preliminary hearing for Wednesday.

Police charge that Haskins was

# Divided court voids land transfer

BOISE (AP) - A divided Idaho Supreme Court on Friday ordered land returned to a Franklin County man, whose sister and brother-in-law had refused to sell it back to him after he let them have it so the government would not take it for back child support.

In a 3-2 ruling, the slim court majority admitted the outcome was not desirable but concluded that the law was the law. Justices Wayne Kidwell and Gerald Schroeder said the law could have been read to deny Joseph

Morrison a victory.

Morrison and his common-law wife, Patricia, had reached a verbal agreement with his sister, Evelyn Young, 15 years ago to sell the property back to him once he had his financial problems, including the child support, straightened out.

But when he tried to get the property back in 1987 the Youngs refused, and Morrison finally went to court in 1998 to enforce the verbal agreement that he buy back the property.

Sixth District Judge Randy Smith ruled that the deal was an illegal attempt to avoid Morrison's child support responsibility and voided the resale provision, leaving the Youngs in possession.

But Chief Justice Linda Coppel Trout, writing for the majority, said if the transaction was an illegal attempt to avoid child support - which she said it was - the entire transaction, including the original transfer to the Youngs, must be voided.

# Church wants to retain strict ad laws

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) - Utah should stand by its policy to restrict alcohol advertising, an attorney representing the Mormon church told members of the state's Alcoholic Beverage Control Commission Friday.

"The church strongly subscribes to the common sense conclusion that there is a direct correlation between alcohol advertising and alcohol consumption," said Jerry Fenn, a private attorney speaking on behalf of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. He said the church urged the commission to carefully review what alcoholic beverage advertising restrictions are permissible.

Fenn read the statement as part of a public hearing on revamping state alcohol advertising rules.

Utah's stringent alcohol advertising laws were relaxed temporarily after federal courts found the rules unconstitutional.

The temporary rules allow Utah's private clubs, taverns and restaurants to advertise the sale of liquor and wine. Before, the businesses could only advertise beer with an alcohol content of 3.2 percent or less.

Fenn is a past chairman of Utah's Alcoholic Beverage Control Commission and has represented the Mormon church before the commission in recent years.

Utah's laws governing liquor advertising were overturned by a July ruling by Denver's 10th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals that said Utah's prohibition against hard liquor and wine advertising, but not beer, was "irrational" and violated commercial free speech rights.

The Alcoholic Beverage Control Commission then issued an emergency rule lifting the outright ban of alcohol advertising in Utah and is in the middle of a three-month public comment period on these rules.

"In the meantime, the church

urges manufacturers, restaurateurs, private clubs and others to use restraint in advertising alcoholic beverages," Fenn read in the statement.

Discussion about alcohol advertising comes attached to the bigger discussion about the availability of liquor during February's 2002 Winter Games.

With the crush of international visitors on the horizon, Salt Lake Mayor Rocky Anderson has called the laws "complicated."

At the 2000 Olympics in Sydney, Australia, Anderson expressed concern Salt Lake City would be considered "a dull place without a nightlife" if changes aren't made before the February event.

The Distilled Spirits Council of the United States said in a statement that alcohol advertising is a protected right.

"As an industry, we have a right to communicate to our adult consumers and we are committed to exercising our First Amendment rights responsibly," the statement said.

# Idaho board directs schools chief to trim budget request

## Ed panel will pursue compromise

POCATELLO (AP) — The inability of the presidents of Idaho's four-year colleges to agree on distribution of state support for higher education has left the State Board of Education assigning the dispute to a subcommittee.

By a unanimous vote, board members directed the new panel to find a compromise.

Board members Rod Lewis and Darrell Manning will confer with staff and the school presidents and give the board a recommendation at next month's meeting in Twin Falls.

The equity issue came to a head earlier this year when a board study found a \$27 million disparity in how the state's \$314 million higher education budget is allocated to the three universities and Lewis-Clark State College.

The board wanted the schools' presidents to recommend a solution, and all but Boise State University President Charles Ruch agreed that \$23.3 million be split among the institutions to correct the financial imbalance.

That plan called for increased support of \$8.4 million for Boise State, \$8.3 million for Idaho State University, \$5.5 million for the University of Idaho and \$11 million for Lewis-Clark. The money, from state tax revenues and higher student fees, would be disbursed over seven years.

Ruch objected, arguing that the plan did not fundamentally change the budget distribution formula to eliminate inequity in the future. He also objected to raising student fees to correct part of the imbalance.

His alternative called for the state to simply buy Boise State an extra \$6.9 million and Idaho State another \$3.8 million. The other two schools would get nothing more.

Idaho State President Richard Bowen called that approach "potentially very divisive" and urged a united front behind the original recommendation that increased cash for all four schools.

POCATELLO (AP) — Adamant about maintaining fiscal restraint, the state Board of Education has directed Schools Superintendent Marilyn Howard to provide a public education support package for 2002-2003 school year that limits increased spending to 4 percent or less.

And board member Blake Hall of Idaho Falls said that the three universities and Lewis-Clark State College can expect only a 1 percent increase in support from the state treasury.

Board members said those figures reflect the reduction in revenue growth the slowing state economy caused.

"It's very difficult for us to fund beyond what we think will be available," board member Rod Lewis of Meridian said. "But we are willing to fund up to what's available."

The percentage increases mentioned by Hall translate into about \$35 million in new money for public schools, which was allocated \$868 million in state support for this school year. For higher education, that means just \$3 million on its current \$315.5 million state allocation.

In August, the board took the unprecedented action of rejecting the public school budget proposal developed by the state's education coalition of teachers, parents and administrators because it called for a 13.7 percent increase in state support.

It prompted former four-term Republican State Schools Superintendent Jerry Evans to accuse the board of putting spending and revenue concerns that are the responsibility of the Legislature and governor ahead of the best interests of Idaho school children, which he said should be the board's top priority.

In ranking the education coalition's proposal as a priority basis,

Howard told the board this week that increasing the state's contribution to teacher salaries ranks highest. But that alone would require a 6 percent increase in state support. She also mentioned teacher training, implementation of new academic standards, transportation and technology as top priorities.

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## Enrollment soars at WSU

PULLMAN, Wash. (AP) — Washington State University is reporting record enrollment of 21,794 at Pullman campus and three branches.

The fall enrollment is a 2.5 percent boost from last year's 21,248 students.

The freshmen class on the Pullman campus is the second largest in the university's history and the most diverse ever. Students of color totaled 409, or 15 percent of the class.

The freshman class increased to 2,619 from a fall 2000 total of 2,473.

"We are pleased with these solid numbers," said Charlene Jaeger, vice president for student affairs. "The university plans to attract the most able students to study at its campuses."

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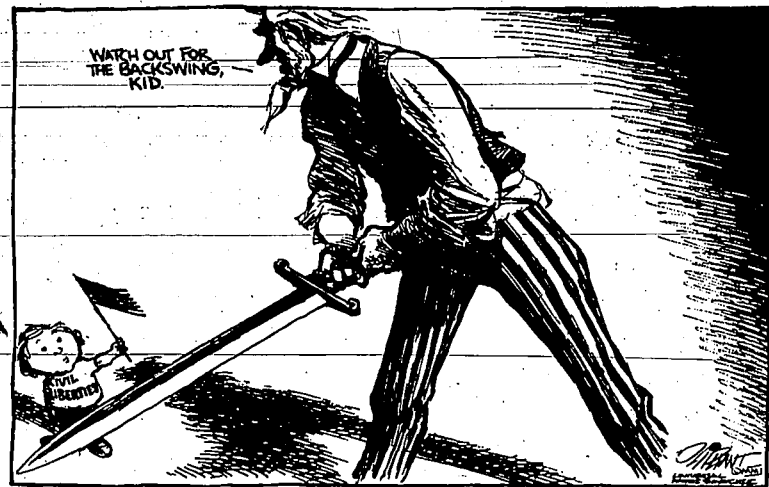
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## Right to self-defense is right to defend life

America is at war. To win, we must destroy not just individual terrorists like Osama bin Laden and his allies in Afghanistan but the power of brutal, authoritarian governments to send out their armies of terrorists against us. Central among these is Iran, but the enemy includes Iraq, Syria, Sudan, the PLO and others.

The task ahead may be difficult, but we must not waiver. We should constantly remind ourselves that these dictatorial regimes are arming themselves with nuclear, biological and chemical weapons aimed at our destruction. We dare not wait for another massacre before we eliminate their ability to attack us.

Many are now wondering, aloud or silently: Should the United States use nuclear weapons to destroy the enemy? Determining what are the proper military means of achieving America's objective in the war, and whether those means include nuclear weapons, is an issue for our generals. But the real worry behind the question is whether the U.S. government has the moral right to use its full military arsenal in waging the war. To this question I can say, as a philosopher, that morality answers with an unequivocal "Yes."

The basic issue is that of self-defense. When men are initiating force against you in order to destroy you, you have the moral right to kill your would-be murderers by any means possible. To think that one thereby descends to the moral level of one's attackers is as absurd as to think that a policeman descends to the level of Al Capone if he kills Capone in a shoot-out.

The U.S. government is simply the agent of its citizens, charged with one and only one responsibility: to secure and defend the rights - and very lives - of its citizens against aggressors. If in waging war our government were to consider

deaths in enemy countries as a cost that must be weighed against the deaths of American citizens or soldiers, it would be violating its most basic function. It would no longer be an agent for our self-defense, but theirs.

What could be more morally obscene than 20,000 additional Americans killed in another attack on our cities because our government failed to bomb Iran, worried that Iranian casualties would be too high? Equally obscene would be to send our soldiers to war - courageous individuals ready to defend their freedom and ours - and then have our government not do everything in its power to minimize their deaths.

Morally, the responsibility of the U.S. government is to destroy our aggressors and minimize U.S. casualties. If our military decides that in this war, as in WWII, it needs nuclear weapons, so be it.

But what of the "innocent" civilians in enemy states that could be killed in the process? Many civilians in those states hate us and actively support, materially and spiritually, their tyrannical regimes. They are not innocents. As we drop our bombs, should we worry about the lives of Palestinians who celebrated by dancing in the streets on September 11?

Other civilians in enemy states are passive, unthinking followers. Their work is economic production, however meager, supports their terrorist governments and so they are in part responsible for the continued power of our aggressors. They too are not innocent - and their deaths may be unavoidable for America to defend itself.

The civilians in enemy territory who actually oppose their dictatorial regimes are usually the regimes' first innocent

victims. Any such individuals who remain alive and outside of prison camps should try to flee their country or rebel.

The truly innocent should not be the target of our strikes - but they will welcome American attacks on their country. They know they might be killed in the process, but they will also know that it is their only chance at freedom. In WWII, occupied Europe welcomed American invasion, even though this meant that some civilians who actually resisted the Nazis would die in American bombings.

We must not allow human shields to deter us from defending ourselves. The U.S. government, properly and morally, in the name of defending the lives of its citizens, ordered the shooting down of any airplanes-become-missiles, even though this meant the deaths of the American captives onboard. If this principle applies to Americans onboard their own planes, how much more so does it apply to people in Afghanistan or Iran?

The responsibility for all deaths in war lies with the aggressor who initiates force, not with those who defend themselves.

War is terrible but sometimes necessary. To win this war, you must not let an immoral concern with "innocents" weaken your resolve. You must have the profound moral conviction that you have the right to exist. You have the right to destroy those who initiate force to deprive you of your (and everyone else's) rights and life. With full moral certainty you must urge your government to defend your life, even if that requires nuclear weapons and hundreds of thousands of deaths in terrorists countries.

## Unit consolidation seems long overdue

The watchdog did not bark just once. The alarm was sounded over and over again about the threat to the United States from terrorist organizations with vendettas against this country.

On March 11, 1999, exactly 2 1/2 years before the attacks on the World Trade Center and the Pentagon, Republican Sen. Pat Roberts of Kansas opened the first hearing of his newly formed Armed Services Subcommittee on Emerging Threats and Military Capabilities by focusing on "the arsenal of weapons now potentially available to terrorist groups and the weakness of the government's organization to counter those groups."

In words that now appear to be eerily prescient, Roberts warned that there is "a real opportunity for a handful of zealots to wreak havoc on a scale that no other armies could attain." Targets will be "selected for their symbolic value, like the World Trade Center in the heart of Manhattan," he said, "because terrorists need to escalate their attacks, making each more spectacular and horrific than its predecessor."

Of great concern, Roberts said, was the fact that "some 40 federal departments and agencies, as well as local governments in virtually every state in the Union," share the responsibility for countering terrorism - with no one certain who is in charge.

Roberts' warning has been echoed and amplified by no fewer than 40 separate blue-ribbon commissions in the past year, most recently by a bipartisan congressionally mandated group headed by former Sens. Gary Hart of Colorado and Warren Rudman of New Hampshire.

After three years of work, that remarkably diverse group unanimously declared last February that domestic terrorism is the primary national security threat and said, "The United States is today very poorly organized to design and implement any comprehensive strategy to protect the homeland."

Commission leaders briefed Secretary of Defense Donald Rumsfeld, Secretary of State Colin Powell and White House national security officials. There were a couple of hearings on Capitol Hill. But the report soon slipped from sight, even losing its place on the Pentagon Web site, Rudman told me.

Rep. Mac Thornberry, a Texas Republican, introduced legislation to carry out one of the principal Hart-Rudman recommendations: creation of a National Homeland Security Agency, headed by a Cabinet-level position reporting directly to the president. It would con-

solidate the current Federal Emergency Management Agency with three other governmental units that now divide the responsibility for safeguarding U.S. borders - the Border Patrol in the Department of Justice; the Customs Service, in Treasury; the Coast Guard, in Transportation. Currently, Rudman said, they cannot even share information because they have separate computer and communication systems, making the difficult challenge of monitoring the people and goods entering this country an almost impossible task.

Thornberry's bill got one hearing, but then nothing happened. That may be changing now. Thursday night, in his televised address to a joint session of Congress, President Bush announced that he was taking at least a portion of the Hart-Rudman commission's advice. He called for creation of a Cabinet-level position with authority to coordinate the government's scattered homeland protection activities, but did not make it clear how much consolidation of agencies he has in mind.

Wise President Cheney, who was assigned by Bush last May to review the nation's anti-terrorism strategy and structure, may have more to say in a report his staff says is imminent. Meantime, Hart and Rudman are scheduled to testify before a Senate committee today and have been invited to another next week. Whatever form the reorganized homeland defense structure finally takes, "the magnitude of the issue should overwhelm the presidential agenda," Hart said. He and others point out that the Sept. 11 tragedy could have been much worse. New York City and the Pentagon had available an abundance of medical facilities, police, firefighters and other emergency personnel. Most communities are, not nearly so well equipped.

And we have not yet seen the worst havoc that terrorists might cause. "We face even greater danger with chemical, biological and nuclear weapons," said former House Speaker Newt Gingrich, who pushed or creation of the Hart-Rudman commission. There is no excuse for dilly-dallying.

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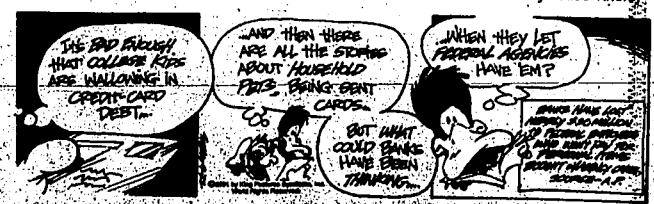

# Anti-U.S. rally draws fewer than expected

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan — Burning effigies of President Bush, thousands of people held rallies in Pakistan on Friday during a nationwide strike to protest their government's support for Washington's campaign against terrorism. At least three people were killed.

The demonstrations were called by Muslim parties after Pakistan's leader, Gen. Pervez Musharraf, backed U.S. efforts to apprehend alleged terrorist mastermind Osama bin Laden and to break up his suspected network operating from neighboring Afghanistan. However, the crowds were smaller than expected and strikers failed to shut down the city, as had been planned. The day of strikes was seen as an early test of the strength of Islamic militants who support bin Laden and Afghanistan's Taliban rulers.

## Arab-American men removed from Utah flight

MINNEAPOLIS — Four Arab-American men were removed from a Northwest plane when the flight crew raised security concerns, then were allowed to board a later flight, the airline said.

Airline spokesman Doug Killian would not say what the worries were. Northwest employees escorted the men off Thursday's flight to Salt Lake City, and they were questioned by local law enforcement officers, he said Friday. The plane took off while they were being questioned.

Three of the men, however, told reporters in Salt Lake City that they were removed because other passengers refused to fly with them on board. The men refused to give their names and said they felt discriminated against.

## Reports: Taliban deploys troops to peaks on border

TORKHAM, Pakistan — Taliban troops have taken up positions in the jagged mountain peaks overlooking Afghanistan's border with Pakistan, border officials said as they built up their own forces on the slopes across the frontier.

"They are in a warlike posi-

tion. They have prepared themselves for full-scale war," Pakistani border guard Mohammed Gul said in Torkham, a town that is normally a bustling border crossing but was quiet Friday.

Fears of a U.S. assault have sent thousands of Afghans fleeing toward the borders, compounding a refugee crisis already in full swing before the terror attacks, with tens of thousands of Afghans on the run after two decades of war and three years of devastating drought.

Hismat, an 11-year-old boy wearing tattered plastic sandals, said he and 6-year-old sister walked for three days to reach Pakistan. They left their widowed mother in Afghanistan. "We said there would be war and that we had to get to Pakistan," Hismat said, his long eyelashes beating quickly as he tried to fight back tears. For one whole day of their trek, they ate nothing.

## Report: Israel spies knew of attack, but not when

TEL AVIV, Israel — Israeli intelligence services were aware months ago that Osama bin Laden was planning a large-scale terror attack, but did not know what his targets would be, a senior intelligence official said Friday.

The Israeli official, who briefed journalists on condition of anonymity, said "everybody knew about a heightened alert, and knew that bin Laden was preparing a big attack."

The official said Israeli intelligence shares information with its U.S. counterparts on a regular basis, but denied the Mossad spy agency passed on concrete warnings.

## Missing toll tops 6,000 at World Trade Center

NEW YORK — As the number missing tops 6,000, Attorney General John Ashcroft, accompanied by FBI Director Robert Mueller, got a firsthand look at the World Trade Center devastation Friday and promised: "We

will rebuild New York." The two men walked through ground zero, congratulating rescue workers along the way. The pair toured the site with Mayor Rudolph Giuliani, who reiterated that hope is all but gone of finding anyone alive among the more than 6,000 missing. "The chance of recovering any one alive is very, very small,"

Giuliani said. "We're not going to recover significant numbers of people. We know that. We recognize that." The mayor said the number of missing at the Trade Center — 6,333 — could go up or down as city officials try to determine how many foreign citizens were lost. At least 63 countries lost citizens in the terrorist attack. — compiled from wire reports

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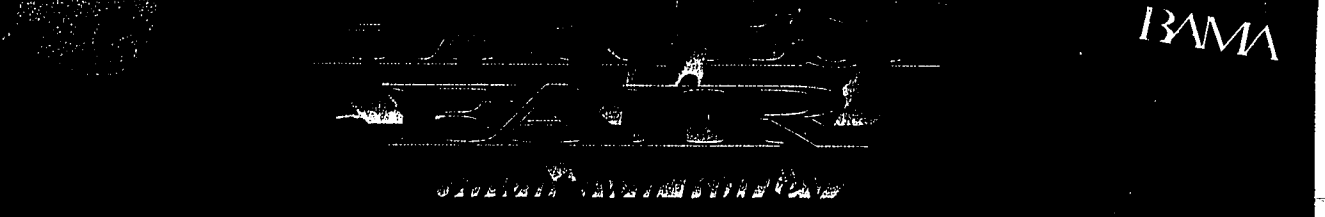

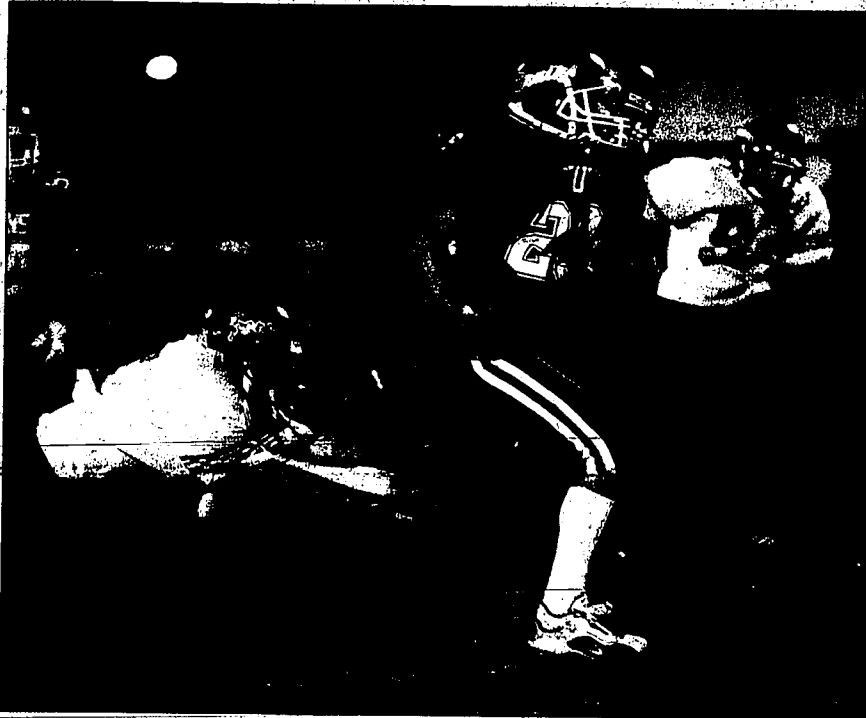
Association poll. The Lady Sharks entered the tourney as the No. 2 team in the nation, but also took its first loss, forfeiting an early

The victory overshadowed a comeback engineered by quarterback Bruin sophomore Luc

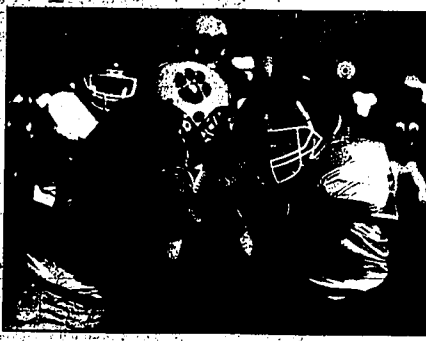
Martin. The sophomore threw a pair of touchdowns in the final six minutes to give the Bruins the lead.

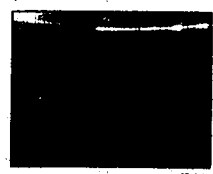

The World Trade Center’s twin towers were still standing, covered by a red, white and blue ribbon.  
“I hadn’t noticed it,” the New York Mets pitcher said, pausing to take a long, deep breath. “I’m glad they left them up. Those people will not be forgotten.”  
Amid tight security at Shea Stadium, baseball returned to the city Friday night for the first time since last week’s terrorist attacks. Mike Piazza hit a two-run homer in the eighth inning as the Mets rallied to beat Atlanta 3-2.  
Mayor Rudolph W. Giuliani, singers Patti LaBelle and Marc Anthony and bagpipers took part in a pregame tribute that was

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**Home Injury**

Unintentional injury is the leading cause of death among children ages 14 and under. In 1996, nearly 6,300 children died from unintentional injuries; nearly 40 percent of these deaths occurred in and around the home. Home injury deaths are caused primarily by fire and burns, drowning, suffocation, choking, firearms, poisoning, and falls. Young children are at the greatest risk from unintentional injuries in the home because it is where they spend the majority of their time. As children grow older, they spend less time in the home and the incidence of home injury deaths diminishes. The percentage of non-fatal unintentional injuries that occur in the home also decreases with age.

**Deaths in the Home**

In 1997, approximately 2,600 children age 14 and under died in the home from unintentional injuries. Nearly 70 percent of these deaths occurred among children ages 4 and under.

**Fire and Burns**

- In 1997, approximately 680 children ages 14 and under died from fires and burns in the home. Of these children, two-thirds<sup>a</sup> were ages 4 and under.

**Drowning**

- In 1997, an estimated 540 children ages 14 and under drowned in or around the home. Of these children, 83 percent were ages 4 and under.

**Suffocation**

- In 1997, an estimated 540 children ages 14 and under suffocated in the home. Of these children, more than three-quarters were ages 4 and under.

**Choking**

- In 1997, more than 150 children ages 14 and under choked to death in the home. Of these children, more than two-thirds were ages 4 and under.

**Unintentional Firearm Injury**

- In 1997, an estimated 180 children ages 14 and under died from unintentional shootings in the home. Of these children, more than 80 percent were ages 5 to 14.

**Poisoning**

- In 1997, nearly 100 children ages 14 and under died from poisonings in the home. More than half of these deaths were due to solids and liquids such as medicines and cleaners; the remaining deaths were due to gases and vapors, principally carbon monoxide.

**Falls**

- In 1997, more than 100 children ages 14 and under died as the result of falls in the home. Of these children, more than half were ages 4 and under.

**Injuries in the Home**

Each year, more than 4.5 million children ages 14 and under are treated in hospital emergency departments (EDs) for injuries incurred in the home. Nearly two-thirds of the injuries requiring ED visits among children under age 3 occur in the home. Conversely, one-third of the injuries requiring ED visits among children ages 12-14 occur in the home.

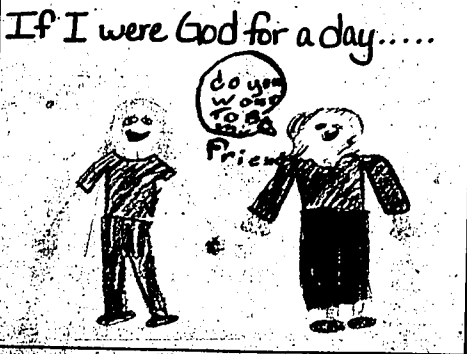
"We teach our students that God is an integral part of everything you do all day long," she explained.

Lanier added that the staff members at the center, along with the church's pastor, have helped the children understand a lot about the Bible by teaching them the stories in it.

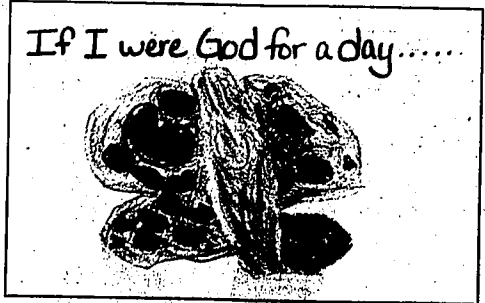
In August, the children were asked what they would do if they were "God for a Day." Several of the answers
