# Bush gets go-ahead in Iraq

## House votes for war powers resolution; Senate approval pending

WASHINGTON - The House voted overwhelmingly Thursday to grant President Bush the authority to attack Iraq unilaterally, remove Saddam Hussein from power and abolish that country's nuclear, chemical and biological weapons.

Moving the nation a step closer to a possible second war with Iraq, 296 of 435 members voted to authorize the president to "use the armed forces of the United States as he determines to be necessary and appropriate in order to defend the national security of the United States against the continuing threat posed by Iraq."

The Senate was poised to approve the resolution late Thursday night or early today with even broader, bipartisan support. Majority Leader Tom Daschle, D-S.D., who last month bitterly accused Bush of politicizing national security issues, announced he will vote for the resolution.

Idaho Reps. Mike Simpson and Birch Otter, both Republicans, voted for the resolution. Sens. Larry Craig and Mike Crapo, also Republicans, have said they would vote "yes."

Once the Senate votes, the president will need no further congressional approval to deploy troops, order air strikes and wage

a ground war with Iraq. "The gathering threat of Iraq must be confronted fully and finally," Bush said after the House vote. "The days of Iraq acting as

## Candidate blasts governor's response

FILER - Democratic challenger for governor Jerry Brady says the Kempthorne administration has been too slow to respond to the problems that came with the Magic Valley's burgeoning dairy industry.

While the industry has become indispensable by boosting the state's economy by \$2.1 billion, at the same time some large confined animal feeding operations have brought with them unprecedented problems, Brady told Cedar Draw residents on Thursday. He stopped at the Filer neighborhood on a campaign swing through the Magic Valley.

Brady said Idaho was unprepared for CAFOs. "These changes can be traced to a single phenomenon: a large group of dairy farmers who sold high in California and bought low

in south-central Idaho. Our counties were largely uneducated and unaware of what would follow," he said. "Some have also brought odors, flies and health hazards, which have become a major source of anger and contention."

For the past three years the Cedar Draw residents with whom Brady visited have called upon various government agencies from the county to the federal

level for some relief from strong dairy odors from two nearby CAFOs. Gov. Dirk Kempthorne visited with the residents in January and promised them the summer of 2002 would not be as bad as the two previous summers. Recently, some residents in the neighborhood said the dairy odor wasn't as bad this year as last but that the problem is not fixed. Members of the Kempthorne

administration have acknowledged there is still work to be done.

Nonetheless, Brady said Kempthorne did not keep his promise.

"He has allowed the worst offenders to escape the consequence of their operations on those downwind and downstream. He has not used the authority already available or sought to add serious penalties to our existing odor management laws," Brady said.

Brady put much of the blame on the Department of Agriculture. He said they have been reluctant to respond to complaints. The latest example of the agency's dallying is its failure to get proposals for odor standards ready for the 2003 Legislature, Brady said.

Rich Carlson, an attorney who works for a local environmental

## Residents seek dairy odor relief

### Speakers make point during state hearing

TWIN FALLS - How to determine the point that a smell becomes strong enough to violate the state's new law governing agricultural odor was the focus of a public hearing Thursday.

About 30 people including dairymen, neighbors of large-scale dairies, and state lawmakers attended an orderly hearing conducted by Boise attorney Frank W. Stoppello. Acting as a hearing officer hired by the state, Stoppello will take public testimony and then make a recommendation to the department on a proposal that outlines how it should enforce the state odor law.

Stoppello asked Mary Patten, chief of the department's Dairy Bureau, if it's possible to definitively measure odor.

## Dock strike hampers area supplies

BURLEY - Santa's suppliers might be running behind schedule, but they should have the toys under the tree by Christmas.

Two shipping containers of Hasbro, Tonka, Playskool and stuffed plush toys bound for the Magic Valley are stranded in Seattle - one on a pier and one on a vessel - said John Haran, buyer vice president for Burley-based Valley Wholesale.

"We're incurring more expenses (for pier space) because of this, and we've also had to start adjusting our ad dates for this merchandise," Haran said Thursday.

Valley Wholesale, a supplier for King's stores and a few other retailers in Magic Valley, is rotating the delayed merchandise to

## Kempthorne promises no further cuts in education

BOISE - Urging his Blue Ribbon 2020 Task Force to provide a fresh perspective to resolving Idaho's financial crisis, Gov. Dirk Kempthorne on Thursday promised educators and their allies that they are safe from any future budget cuts.

"Education is still our top priority," Kempthorne told more than 40 task force members gathered for their first session. "Public schools and higher education will not feel any further pressure from this session."

Critically important is "how we continue this conversation over the next two decades will meet the needs of our children and colleges and univer-

"We're not looking for a quick fix but real solutions that can be implemented and have results," he said.

To cope with the state's deteriorating economy while protecting last year's record tax cut, Kempthorne and the Republican majority cut more than \$64 million from last year's budget and over \$100 million in basic spending from this year's. That included \$23 million in state support for public schools and over \$30 million in state support for colleges and other education programs.

The 47-member task force is larger than the state Senate and with more Democrats than the 105-member Legislature - spans the philosophical spectrum. Republican

Continued from A1. man's riches, so to speak," Stoppello said. "Is it possible to measure odor?" It is possible, but it is difficult, Patten said. Whether a proposed standard could be determined in time to come before lawmakers when they convene for the 2003 session in January is questionable. The Odor Rules Advisory Committee has asked its technical advisors, including state odor expert Ron Sheffield, to set a standard that would determine when an odor merits enforcement. Sheffield, who testified during the hearing as a neutral party, said it will take six to nine months to gather defensible scientific data before a standard can be set. Filer residents weary of strong dairy odors said they didn't want to wait that long. They've waited three years already. "The residents of Filer are like a Geiger counter or like a canary in a mine," said Betty Slinger, who lives near large Filer-area dairies. She and others who testified questioned if large-scale dairies should be considered acceptable agricultural practices, and whether large-scale operations can provide a sustainable food source without wearing out the Earth. Several Filer-area residents testified that they need relief now. "It affects me not only physical,

but emotionally, mentally and causes me a lot of stress," said Phuong Smith, who lives near Filer. Twin Falls dairyman Mike Quisenberry said rules governing agriculture won't be effective if they don't recognize the economics of agriculture. He urged for patience for the technical team. "It is important they be given the time to come up with a product that is workable for the citizens of Idaho," Quisenberry said. The proposal on the table - absent the permanent threshold that determines when an odor violates state law - basically outlines administrative procedures for enforcing the law. It would be sent to the Legislature when it convenes in January. The Ag Department has been operating under a temporary rule that allows it to regulate odor while permanent rules are being developed. Under the permanent proposal, violators would be required to develop an odor management plan after a first violation and could be assessed a \$10,000 fine for each subsequent offense. Environmental activist Bill Chisholm, a Democrat running for the state Senate, held up a roll of wet toilet paper wrapped in a plastic sack. That is how effective the standards are. If there is no penalty that shuts down an operator who continues to stink out a neighbor, he said.

White House reportedly pressures CIA to tailor reports to make case

WASHINGTON - Senior Bush administration officials are pressuring CIA analysts to tailor the assessments of the Iraq threat to help build a case against Saddam Hussein, intelligence and Congressional sources said. In what sources described as an escalating "war," top officials at the Pentagon and elsewhere have bombarded CIA analysts with criticism and calls for revisions on such key questions as whether Iraq has ties to the al-Qaida terrorist network, sources said. The sources stressed that CIA analysts - who are supposed to

be impartial - are fighting to resist the pressure. But they said analysts are increasingly resentful of what they perceive as efforts to contaminate the intelligence process. "Analysts feel more politicized and more pushed than many of them can ever remember," said an intelligence official, speaking on condition of anonymity. "The guys at the Pentagon shriek on issues such as the link between Iraq and al-Qaida. There has been a lot of pressure to write on this constantly, and to not let it drop." The pressure has intensified in the weeks leading up to this week's debate in the Senate on a

With Congress's debate behind him, the president will turn his focus back to the United Nations, which he is pressing to adopt new resolutions demanding that Saddam immediately dismantle his weapons of mass destruction or face possible military action by the United States. "Not since Congress passed the 1964 Gulf of Tonkin resolution - a precursor to the Vietnam War - has a president won such broad and flexible authority to carry out an undefined military operation, historians say. The bipartisan endorsement of Bush's Iraq strategy shows how dramatically the terrorist attacks on Sept. 11, 2001, have changed U.S. foreign policy and altered views about preemptive military action to disarm hostile regimes." "This is a time when Iraqis joined together to defend their country. Terrorists not only seek to attack our interests abroad but also to strike us at home," House Minority Leader Dick Gephardt, D-Mo., told the House. Still, 126 of 208 House Democrats objected to the resolution, a higher number than some had expected. Many cited concerns that Bush might launch military action without United Nations approval and provoke a terrorist reprisal. Six Republicans joined the resolution. "This has not been an argument about ends, but about means," said Rep. John Spradlin, R-Texas, who authored a more restrictive resolution but voted with Bush in the end. "We all agree that Saddam Hussein is a menace and that Iraq should be stopped. The question is whether we should use weapons of mass destruction, by armed force or otherwise."

Astronauts put up station girder

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) - Two astronauts attached a new 14-ton girder to the international space station on Thursday using an immense construction crane, then another pair took a spacewalk to wire it up. As soon as the last of four motorized bolts secured the thick aluminum girder to the station, visiting shuttle Atlantis' astronauts David Wolf and Piers Sellers shouted "yippee" and "excellent" and ventured out. Their job to make all the vital electrical connections. It was the first of three spacewalks required for the installation. "I'm looking straight down at a beautiful view of the shuttle and the ground from the station," said Sellers, a first-time spacewalker. He said he was impressed that Brady believes an agency that has the mission to promote the ag industry is probably not the right one to regulate the industry. "Brady pointed out that here we have a few people causing problems, it makes sense to have tough enforcement for them," Carlson said. But the governor's spokesman Mark Snider, saying Kempthorne has always given the dairy industry in Magic Valley the highest priority. "The governor made commitments and honored those commitments," Snider said. Snider noted that the Ag Department has cited dairies for excessive odor - but factive in September. He also pointed to the fact that the dairy industry in North Carolina State University, who now lives and works in the Magic Valley, as an example of the governor's commitment to the dairy industry. # Sniper appears to be using more caution

The last three attacks linked to the elusive Washington area sniper were carried out near major highways that would have allowed the killer to come and go quickly. A marked shift from the severe, previous stealth shooting incidents, which occurred closer to Washington D.C. in congested areas.

This apparent tactical change—similar to the one used by David Berkowitz, the serial killer known as "Son of Sam" who terrorized New York City in 1976 and 1977—comes as law enforcement authorities have dramatically increased the size of their manhunt. A fatal shooting Wednesday night near Manassas, Va., was the

seventh killing attributed to the sniper since the single-shot attacks began Oct. 2. Two people, including a 13-year-old boy, have been wounded. Another shot whistled through a Michaels craft store but hit no one.

More than 100 local, state and federal investigators flocked to the shooting scene just north of Manassas Wednesday night where a 53-year-old Gaithersburg, Md., man was killed at a gas station at Sudley Road and Balls Ford Road—a mere 940 feet from the closest ramp leading to Interstate 66.

Immediately after the shooting was reported to police, ramps to the interstate were closed, and two Virginia State Police cruisers watched the eastbound lanes,

hoping to spot a suspect. But they waited in vain.

"The perpetrator appears to be much more organized than previously believed, in part because now the ante is higher, the hunt is more intense, and he has responded by coming up with more efficient escape routes," said Richard Walter, a former prison psychologist who is head of the Omega Crime Assessment Group in Montrose, Pa., which does crime analysis and profiling.

"At this phase, he is concentrating more heavily on how to outfox the police after striking," Walter said. "Previously, he was able to hit, blend and go away with less risk because people were still trying to put it together. He had more of an advantage then."

later Christmas-shopping advertisements.

And along with businesses across the country, Valley Wholesale is keeping a close watch on West Coast ports, where mountains of cargo greeted dockworkers when the ports creaked back into motion Wednesday evening.

Retailers are reeling over a 10-day shutdown of 29 ports, which left holiday merchandise backed up on docks, The Associated Press reported.

Analysts expect it to be four to six weeks before the merchandise reaches stores around the nation, barely in time for Thanksgiving and the traditional start of the holiday shopping season. Analysts expect discounts, which would hurt profit margins, of merchandise that comes all at once or too late, AP said.

Haran doesn't know when to expect the Burley wholesaler's two containers of toys — perhaps more than a month late, probably still in time for Christmas.

The port shutdown snagged the final two containers of Valley Wholesale's Christmas goods, and its summer goods don't start shipping until late November and December, Haran said. Still, the delay is expensive and has complicated advertising schedules.

"It's a sensitive situation ... takes a lot of extra work to manage it," he said.

Expect to see holiday wares appear later than usual on Old Navy's store shelves in Twin Falls, corporate parent Gap Inc. said Thursday.

The West Coast port closures "have impacted the receipt of holiday merchandise that was anticipated to be delivered to stores in late October and mid-November," Gap's Chief Financial Officer Field Kuntz said. "As a result, we expect portions of the holiday flows to arrive in stores up to a few weeks later than the original anticipated in-store dates."

The Old Navy parent doesn't expect that to hurt its third-quarter earnings.

"It is still too early to accurately assess the impact on fourth-quarter results," Kuntz said. However, assuming that the ports remain open, we currently estimate fourth-quarter earnings risk in the range of 2 cents to 7 cents per share.

San Francisco-based Gap attributes that risk to about 2 cents per share in transportation and distribution costs, and up to 5 cents per

share in profit loss associated with marking down the late arrivals.

Some other Magic Valley retailers so far remain unaffected by the port labor dispute but see potential for trouble. "We do have a lot of things that come from China" and other foreign countries, said Amie Levine, a saleswoman for Demarcos, a men's clothing store in Magic Valley Mall. "So far we have not had a problem with it."

Current stock is sufficient, Levine said, but Demarcos is beginning one of its big annual leather sales. And any stock fill-in or replacements for popular sale items such as shirts or leather jackets — might be tough to get if they're on delayed shipping containers.

"But we have enough to survive right now," he said.

Fred Meyer One Stop Shopping anticipated problems at the ports and before the shutdown was ordering shipments, such as a couple of "replacements" for popular sale items such as shirts or leather jackets — might be tough to get if they're on delayed shipping containers.

When the gates opened, Fred Meyer had a number of containers already loaded and waiting at ports, ready to leave by truck Thursday on their way to the chain's stores, Boley said.

"We're glad that we had a number of containers ready to go," he said.

Fred Meyer faces logistical challenges to get distribution caught up, he said. The key is how long it takes to unload the ships waiting in West Coast ports.

On the other hand, Boley said, "we've managed to keep our stores well stocked."

A Jerome superstore, meanwhile, reports smooth stocking.

"It hasn't had any effect on us. We were preparing for it. We thought it would affect us," said Wal-Mart manager Jeff Hansen. "We buy so far out in advance. I already have almost all my Christmas merchandise in. Fortunately,"

Hansen expects a few stocking glitches in the post-holiday months, but only for a tiny percentage of items.

"It won't be an issue in my store," he said.

## Concerns prompt agency to review recent land swaps

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Interior Department announced Thursday a three-month review of all federal land exchanges across the West after receiving a report that sharply criticized the agency for putting political pressures on regional land appraisers.

The report to the department's Bureau of Land Management called the land exchange program highly politicized and said that the appraisal process in some cases might have violated federal law. The program was "rife with internal dissension, confusion, controversy, and outside political pressures."

The criticism from The Appraisal Foundation, a nonprofit group Congress once enlisted to examine the troubled savings and loan industry, prompted the BLM, which oversees the land exchange program, to launch a three-month

review of all land exchanges in 12 Western states.

The exchanges that have been under intense scrutiny include a swap of federal and state land in Utah's San Rafael Swell totaling nearly a quarter-million acres. Some BLM appraisers have alleged that the deal negotiated by senior agency officials, state officials and federal lawmakers amounts to a giveaway to the state.

"They have complained that the federal land was not properly appraised. They say it could be worth as much as \$117 million more than the \$36 million appraisal because of potentially recoverable oil shale deposits not included in the valuation."

The Appraisal Foundation urged an immediate moratorium on all land exchanges, including the one in Utah.

Chuck Winder, an unsuccessful 1994 candidate for governor, and Democrat J.D. Williams, who just resigned after nearly 14 years as state controller, head the panel.

It has been charged with making initial recommendations by early December on how to deal with additional red ink in the current budget and as much as \$200 million in the next. Kamphorne also wants recommendations on the state's priorities through 2020 and an assessment of the viability of Idaho's tax structure.

Winder acknowledged that Democrats on the panel have taken a political risk to serve on what some have suggested is an attempt by the governor to let him avoid specifically addressing the key issue in his re-election campaign — the economy and Idaho's financial future.

But, Winder said, "we're all here to take a risk that indeed we can accomplish something, that this is not just an election-year stunt."

# Candidate drops out after TV ad

Says it portrays him as gay hairdresser

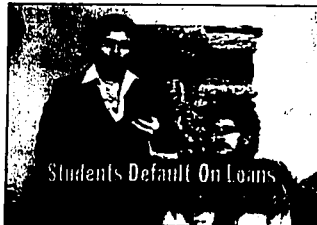
HELENA, Mont. (AP) — Republican Mike Taylor dropped out of the Senate race against Democratic Sen. Max Baucus on Thursday, complaining that a Democratic Party ad was calculated to make him look like a gay hairdresser.

Taylor, who was trailing Baucus badly in the polls, said the commercial amounted to character assassination.

Choking back tears with his wife, Janina, by his side, Taylor said: "I'm willing to suspend my campaign because my opponent's lies about me are hurting my wife, my family, my friends, my party and most of all, Montanans from all walks of life."

Taylor's surprise decision all but assures Baucus of re-election. Montana law bars the replacement of a candidate if he withdraws within 35 days of the election. The Libertarian and Green parties have candidates in the race, but they have done little campaigning.

Taylor's surprise announce-

ment came less than a week after Democrats began airing a TV ad accusing the state senator of a scam involving student loan money when he ran a beauty school in Colorado in the 1980s.

The commercial includes videotape from the 1980s of Taylor, wearing an open-front shirt and gold chains while massaging a man's face. The videotape was from Taylor's "Beauty Corner," a segment he used to host on a Colorado TV news program.

"There's no question about it, what they're trying to imply,"

Taylor said. "They're trying to say that every barber and every cosmetologist, every manicurist or anybody in the beauty and hair fashion industry is homosexual."

Brad Martin, executive director of the Montana Democratic Party, denied use of the old tape was intended to suggest Taylor, a married father of two, is gay.

Baucus, chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, did not immediately return calls seeking comment. He held a 19-point edge over Taylor before the ad began running.

# Malaysia sends militant suspect to U.S.

KUALA LUMPUR, Malaysia (AP) — Malaysia deported a suspected American Islamic militant to the United States on Thursday to face charges of conspiring to fight with the al-Qaida terror organization in Afghanistan.

His was flown to Guam where charges were read against him and is expected later in Portland, Ore., where he had been in indicted, said Charles Gorder, assistant U.S. attorney in Portland. "Ahmed Ibrahim Bilal was turned over to U.S. officials this morning by the Royal Malaysian Police and was promptly

removed from the country to return to the United States," the U.S. Embassy said in a statement.

Bilal's lawyer, Darshan Singh, issued a statement claiming to "have information that he was tortured and was under intense FBI interrogation" while in custody. Because of that, Darshan said, he had never been allowed to see Bilal.

Malaysian police denied the allegations.

"We don't do such things," said Assistant Superintendent Shamsuddin Ali, the chief police

spokesman. "These are wild allegations ... we act strictly according to the law."

Bilal was not present at a hearing Wednesday when a Malaysian court cleared the way for his deportation, ruling that he was an illegal immigrant since his passport had been revoked by the U.S. government.

The ruling put the case in the hands of immigration authorities and avoided the possibility of a lengthy extradition process that could have required the detailed examination of the U.S. evidence against him.

# Study: Cancer survival rates are improving

LONDON (AP) — The chances of surviving many types of cancer are better than statisticians thought, according to a new way of calculating the odds that takes into account improvements in treatment.

The new technique, outlined this week in The Lancet medical journal, separates recent patients from those who received less advanced treatment in years past.

The method is increasingly being adopted in Europe, where

it was first proposed. American experts are starting to evaluate its merits. The new approach, proposed by German epidemiologist Hermann Brenner, is commonly used in other areas of medicine, such as predicting life expectancy.

In the Lancet study, Brenner analyzed more than 1.7 million patients recorded in the U.S. National Cancer Institute database.

He found that the new method estimates American breast can-

cer patients had a 71 percent chance of surviving 15 years, while the conventional approach put the chance at 58 percent.

Similarly, the 15-year survival rate for American men with testicular cancer was 91 percent, compared to 86 percent with the old method.

The survival rate for ovarian cancer five years after diagnosis was 55 percent with the new method, compared with 49 percent previously.

# House OKs \$355B defense bill with plenty of Pentagon buildup

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House overwhelmingly approved a compromise \$355.4 billion defense bill on Thursday brimming with money for new destroyers, helicopters and missiles and granting President Bush most of the Pentagon buildup he requested following last year's terrorist attacks.

While the day's spotlight shone on the congressional debate over authorizing Bush to use force against Iraq, the massive defense spending package — one-sixth of the entire federal budget — underlined the bipartisan consensus behind beefing up the military. Quick Senate approval was also expected.

"Now more than ever, we must

secure our nation's security," said Rep. Sue Myrick, R-N.C.

The bill's 409-14 passage, less than four weeks before congressional elections, also reflected a desire by Democrats to head off campaign-season accusations by Bush that they had delayed a measure urgently needed in the U.S. effort against terrorism. Most of Congress' budget work has been stalled because Bush wants to spend less than Democrats and even some Republicans want.

The bill's popularity was also a tribute to the billions it would spend from coast to coast for weapons and other equipment.

# 9-11 probe panel deal falls apart

WASHINGTON — A tentative congressional deal to create an independent commission to investigate the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks fell apart hours after the White House and House Republican leaders objected to the plan, sources said Thursday night.

Proponents of the commission questioned whether the White House was trying to scuttle the panel privately while endorsing it publicly and planned a news conference today to air their complaints and push again for approval of the proposal.

"I worry the White House may try to run the clock out as we near the end of the session and might not be as supportive of this concept as they have indicated," said Rep. Tim Roemer, D-Ind.

Earlier Thursday, three of the four top leaders of the Senate and said a fourth, House Intelligence Committee Chairman Porter Goss, R-Fla., had signaled his approval.

**Jury awards \$2.2B to woman who got diluted cancer drugs**  
KANSAS CITY, Mo. — A jury awarded \$2.2 billion Thursday to a cancer patient whose pharmacist admitted watering down her chemotherapy drugs.

As the jurors left the courtroom, each of them hugged plaintiff Georgia Hayes, who brought the first of more than 400 lawsuits against former pharmacist Robert R. Courtney. The award includes \$2 billion in punitive damages and more than \$225 million in actual damages.

Courtney pleaded guilty earlier this year to watering down the chemotherapy drugs he prepared for Hughes and other cancer patients. He faces up to 30 years in federal prison. He has said he diluted the drugs for profit.

**Diocese will pay 16 who claimed abuse by priests**

MANCHESTER, N.H. — The Manchester Diocese agreed Tuesday to pay \$300,000 to settle lawsuits brought by 16 people who said they were molested by

priests as far back as 1957.

Collectively, the plaintiffs accused eight former priests. The diocese said four have died, two are alive but no longer act as priests, and two left the ministry in the 1960s. The most recent accusation dated to 1982.

The plaintiffs' names and the specific amounts each will receive were not disclosed, but no one will get more than \$150,000.

**Upstate N.Y. bridge collapse kills one, hurts 13**

MARCY, N.Y. — A pedestrian bridge under construction collapsed Thursday as concrete was being poured onto its steel girders, killing one worker and injuring 13 others, authorities said.

Some of the workers were standing on the bridge and others, including the worker killed, were beneath it when the girders crashed onto an unfinished highway 15 feet below, said Alice Romanych, an assistant to the regional state Transportation Department director.

It took dozens of emergency workers about 45 minutes to free everyone from the debris.

**School bus, truck collide in Michigan; at least 21 hurt**

ERIE TOWNSHIP, Mich. — A steelhulking truck rammed into the side of a school bus Thursday, injuring more than 20 people, at

least two critically. "It was just bodies all over the place," said Cliff Moore, an Erie Township firefighter who said he arrived at the scene 30 seconds after the crash. The bus was taking kindergartners, first- and second-graders on a field trip.

Hospitals reported treating at least 21 people. Aerial photos showed the front of the truck embedded in the bus, which was one of four from Pierre Toussaint Academy, a charter school in Detroit. A boy clutching a teddy bear was seen being carried off on a stretcher.

**Bushes attend funeral of White House doorman**

WASHINGTON — President Bush and his wife, Laura, paid their final respects Thursday to a "very beloved" White House doorman and elevator operator who died last week.

Harold W. Hancock, a five-year veteran of the White House residence staff, died Oct. 4 of bone cancer at the age of 72.

The president and first lady traveled by motorcade to a suburban Maryland funeral home for the private services laying Hancock to rest.

"Every time the president would go in the elevator, (Hancock) was the person who would greet the president and take him to the various floors. And he's a very kind man, always had a smile on his face," presidential spokesman Ari Fleischer said.

### Murderer alone deserves blame for Hunter death

The civil case involving the tragic murder of Wendy Hunter may once again go before the Idaho Supreme Court, if Hunter's family has its way.

But that may not happen — it shouldn't. The Idaho Supreme Court ruled fairly last month in an appeal of the Hunter case. The court sensibly recognized that one person alone carries the blame for Hunter's 1996 death. That person is Corey Hood, her convicted killer.

The Hunter case goes all the way back to 1995, when Hood was released on parole for a statutory rape charge.

He was ordered to have a job and to have no intimate relations with a minor. He soon took a job at a Mr. Wash car wash in Burley, where he met Hunter, then 17.

In May 1996, a few weeks after Hunter left her job, Hood raped and murdered her at his home. Hood eventually pleaded guilty to her murder, as well as killing his grandmother three weeks earlier. He is serving a life sentence with no chance for parole until 2029.

A jury later awarded the Hunters \$1.8 million in a civil suit, finding that the state and Mr. Wash had failed to monitor Hood adequately. But now the Supreme Court has ruled unanimously that there was no reason, based upon Hood's past behavior, for the state to suspect he would murder. It also struck down the claim of negligence against the employer.

**Our view:** The Idaho Supreme Court made a sensible decision in overturning the Wendy Hunter wrongful death ruling. What do you think? We welcome viewpoints from our readers on this and other issues.

Justice Gerald Schroeder, writing for the court, said the verdict extended "the duty of an employer too far for consequences outside employment over which the employer has no realistic control."

"Mr. Wash was found to have half as much responsibility for Hunter's death as Hood who actually killed her," Schroeder wrote.

"That defies common sense. The man who actually killed Hunter had virtually all, if not all, the responsibility for her death."

The high court's ruling wisely affirms that businesses shouldn't be held liable for what their workers do off the job. The court also reasonably ruled that state parole officers never would have released Hood, had they thought he might commit murder.

Last week, the Hunter family petitioned the Supreme Court to reconsider its decision. Along with their petition, the Hunters have called on state lawmakers to require Idaho employers to notify families when their children are in a workplace with convicted sex offenders.

The Legislature should consider that request carefully, seeking advice from business, parole board members and parents, including the Hunters. The idea raises some complicated legal and practical issues, but it deserves discussion.

Meanwhile, the court's ruling should stand. While it's easy to sympathize with the Hunters, laying the blame on anyone but the killer would not have made the situation better.

No one should question the patriotism of those arguing against giving President Bush the authority to take out Saddam Hussein, but their judgment is an entirely appropriate subject for political criticism.

It's legitimate for Democrats challenging the president's plans to depose Saddam to raise questions about Bush's policies.

There's no question that every senator loves his or her country, and some, such as Hawaii's Daniel Inouye, who lost an arm in World War II, have scars from their service. But being a war hero doesn't confer omniscience.

By the same token, it's not out of bounds — and in no way impugns the patriotism of those trying to sidetrack Bush's policy — to question their wisdom.

That's why it's important to consider the records of those who oppose giving Bush the authority he may not legally need, but politically would like to have, to attack Iraq.

American who claim there is no difference between Democrats and Republicans on national-security matters are either living in a fantasy world or deluding the obvious — and the historical record.

Perhaps the best evidence is the 1991 Senate vote on how to respond to Iraq, which had invaded Kuwait and then seemed likely to march on Saudi Arabia.

Some Democrats who were warning about the wisdom of sending American troops to fight Saddam's vaunted military machine then are making many of the same arguments now. They predict it might lead to a wider war, there would be massive U.S. casualties and the price of oil would jump off the charts for a long time, crippling the American economy.

But how much worse off would the world have been had Saddam continued gobbling up his Middle-Eastern neighbors and cornering the world's oil supplies in the early 1990s? Instead of it

being peaceful and prosperous, the past decade would have been poor and painful.

For the record, in 1991 the Senate voted 52-47 to force Saddam to withdraw. Forty-three of the 52 were Republicans, and of the nine Democrats, one has since joined the GOP.

All but one of the 47 naysayers were Democrats, including Ted Kennedy, current Majority Leader Tom Daschle and Foreign Relations Committee Chairman Joe Biden.

It is hardly the case, as House Democrats leader Richard Gephardt argued earlier this year, that "this is not a partisan issue." With many more Democrats than Republicans having cast what in this post-9-11 world might be considered questionable votes on national-security positions, it's not surprising that Gephardt and Daschle want the area out of bounds for political discourse.

Anyone with an ounce of political sense would do the same. But that sense doesn't change the need for public officials to be accountable for their votes.

Like it or not, Iraq is becoming

a partisan issue.

Pointing out the clear pattern of deep divisions between the two major parties about how best to protect the United States is as much a part of the democratic process as arguing a president's views are not synonymous with the national interest.

Therefore, it's within the bounds of legitimacy — regardless of whether it's polite cocktail party conversation — to hold politicians responsible for what they've said in the past about national security in evaluating their current views.

For example, virtually all of the current 49 Republican senators will support giving Bush authority to act against Iraq. Enough of the 51 Democrats will back the president so that he'll get his resolution.

However, because the president has questioned the opposition's wisdom, Democrats such as former Vice President Al Gore have gone ballistic. They understand that the president has the poll numbers on this issue, so they've tried to argue that the White House can't criticize their views and values because that

casts aspersions on their patriotism.

That's nothing but the party of victimization reverting to type. Bush and his supporters are questioning those Democrats' judgment and priorities. When Kennedy says Bush has not made his case, it's reasonable to ask what, if any circumstances — short of it coming from a Democratic White House — would convince him.

Perhaps Kennedy doesn't think there is anything that would justify such an attack. Feeling that way wouldn't be unpatriotic, but it would be foolish, and certainly make a legitimate political target.

Everyone, Democrat or Republican, wants to protect our national security. But the major disagreement about the wisest course is an important matter deserving voter consideration.

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### There are things worse than animal euthanasia

I have had the privilege of working with Laurie, Debbie and the rest of the staff at the Humane Society. These are caring and genuine people who go the extra mile for any animal they feel has even a small chance of being placed in a good home. For those who have never worked around animals, please understand that there are worse things than euthanasia.

I have seen puppies infected by parvovirus, dehydrated and with diarrhea so severe they could barely hold their heads up, a situation that could have been avoided by an inexpensive vaccination. Or a year-old dog that has been tied out, so neglected that the collar has become imbedded in the neck and must be surgically removed. Not to mention those hit by cars because an owner is unwilling to or financially unable to keep the dog confined to a yard or, at the very least, a reasonable-size dog kennel. And if they can't afford to keep the animal confined, then almost certainly they can't afford to have a broken leg or hip fixed.

These are the types of situations that the employees at the Humane Society strive to avoid by putting certain requirements on prospective owners.

In reading the articles and letters in the paper, the perception is that the employees are waiting with buckets in hand for the next victim to be brought through the door. That percep-

tion is wrong! These are people that are being forced to clean up someone else's mess and what an awful task! I have witnessed almost every employee break down and cry as they told me about a particular situation or just couldn't bear the thought of killing yet another animal.

The People for Pets group is not afforded the luxury of turning away animals, but it is being treated with contempt for the actions it must take to remedy the situation. The hours that the people of the public is a huge pot of conflict but understand that funding for the staff presents a problem — the shelter is run by a few not highly paid employees (that already work long hours) and garners a tremendous amount of help through volunteer work.

It is unfortunate that the Sheena Foundation is not willing to be a back up for the Humane Society rather than thinking that it can solve the problem by assuming control.

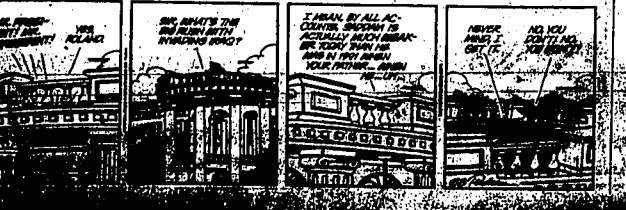

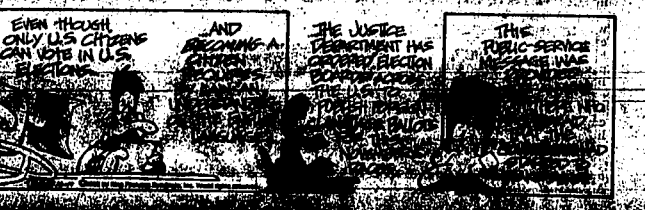

# Cheney acts ready for a second term

On the day last month that President Bush was in Houston, raising money for Republican Senate candidate John Cornyn, Vice President Dick Cheney was in Dallas, doing the same for GOP House hopeful Jeb Hensarling.

In July, Cheney made two Texas visits, one to Houston in behalf of Cornyn and another for a Dallas fund-raiser for Rep. Henry Bonilla of San Antonio.

It was typical vice-presidential campaign duty for an untypical vice president, who was picked more for his governing experience than for his political assets.

In August, Cheney did something even more unusual, virtually announcing his candidacy for re-election as Bush's running mate.

Vice presidents traditionally sidestep that question and say it is up to the president. But in response to a question, Cheney made clear he wanted to stay on.

"I have enjoyed immensely my time with the president," he said, calling it "the high point of my professional life, and I wouldn't have missed it for the world."

True, he included the appropriate cautionary notes, declaring "if the president's willing, and if my wife approves, and if the doctors say it's OK, then I'd be happy to serve a second term."

Presumably, the only real doubt there concerns his health. Cheney's wife, Lynne, seems to be enjoying life as the nation's second lady, and Bush never has seemed anything but delighted with his vice presidential choice.

But it was health that made Cheney seem like a good prospect for a single vice-presidential term — both his history of heart trouble and the fact that he had two heart-related incidents within six months of the 2000 election.

For much of the administration's first year, there was talk that, since Cheney was unlikely to seek the presidency in 2008, Bush might seek a running mate who could extend the GOP's hold on the White House.

When Bush tapped Pennsylvania Gov. Tom Ridge to supervise homeland security, some suggested he would be groomed for the No. 2 spot.

But it is almost always easier to keep a vice president than to get rid of him. After all, only one vice president has been replaced since the days of Franklin Roosevelt.

Bush got a lesson of the perils of change in 1992, when, according to some reports, he wanted Dan Quayle replaced as his father's vice president.

Any such move would have stirred a ruckus between the president and the GOP's powerful right while conservatives were mad at the elder Bush for abandoning his 1988 vow to oppose tax increases.

Similarly, in both 1956 and 1972, GOP conservatives were upset over rumors that Vice Presidents Richard Nixon and Spiro Agnew might be dropped from the GOP ticket. Both stayed.

On the other hand, enmity from conservatives and the looming challenge of Ronald Reagan in 1975 prompted President Gerald Ford, Nixon's non-elected successor, to drop Nelson Rockefeller, his choice as vice president and the party's most prominent liberal.

A year later, Ford moved to pacify Reagan's backers by selecting Sen. Bob Dole of Kansas as his new running mate. But the move did little to appease disgruntled Reaganites. It upset some moderates, and the ticket lost. The displacement of Rockefeller stands as the only modern instance in which a president actually switched running mates.

Or the Democrats' under there were reported rumors in the early 1960s that President John F. Kennedy would drop his vice president, Lyndon B. Johnson. But Kennedy's ability and dedication to his job, and his personal rapport with Johnson, ended his presidency and his life.

## Streets were oriented to keep sun out of drivers' eyes

"Those cockeyed Twin Falls downtown streets" do have a history, but it may be simpler than stated in James Varley's recent article. I am the oldest of John Hayes' grandsons and worked with him in the summers from 1946 to 1951 as part of his survey crew. I lived in his home, watched him work and listened to many conversations while on the job and at the dinner table about various surveys in and about the region. He was a careful, meticulous man, who did things deliberately.

Measurements had to be exact ("down to the gnat's behind") or redone.

But about those streets. The reason for the northeast-southwest bias of the original town site was stated many times in my presence. It was to keep the setting and rising sun out of the eyes of wagon and automobile drivers. I never heard the one about wind sweeping the streets. It was also a copy of a number of European cities and towns that were laid out in the same manner for the same purpose. Most older cities and towns were laid out according to the topography of the land on which they were built, not

according to compass directions. We can see that in many eastern U.S. cities that front rivers or lake shores. Manhattan, for example, is laid out in accordance to the lay of the island.

Its streets are roughly on a northeast-southwest line. Toronto, Canada, is similar, with streets running diagonally to compass directions because of the lake shore line. Even my wife's hometown, Joensuu, Finland, that dates back to the 17th century or earlier is laid out according to a riverfront and not the compass. These cities do not have problems with street names or with people finding their way around. There is no reason why Twin Falls should have a problem either.

The major problem came with the addition of new streets. This was after John Hayes had left Twin Falls and when city engineers decided to change the lay of the town to straight compass directions. Had they continued the original plan, the "five points" problem would never have existed.

Finally, I would like to complement Mr. Varley. He is a careful researcher. I have had several conversations with him and have supplied him with a number of biographies and photographs including the one printed in the article.

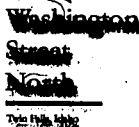
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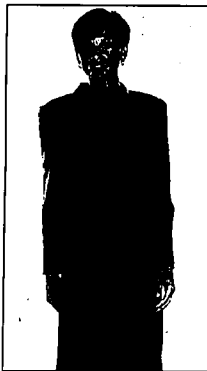

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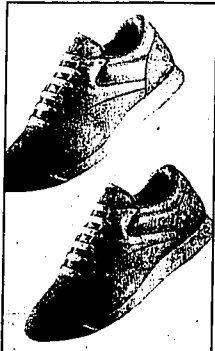

#### Federal commission sues Idaho Power

**BOISE** - The U.S. Equal Employment Opportunity Commission has sued Idaho Power Co., claiming it discriminated against a 57-year-old Hispanic man from Twin Falls who sought employment with the company eight times but was turned down.

The commission filed suit on behalf of Marlon Herrera, who has been seeking employment at Idaho Power since last year, commission spokeswoman Kathryn Olson said. The commission is asking for monetary damages, mandatory training on anti-discrimination law, ceasing of equal employment opportunity notices and other injunctive relief.

"All individuals deserve equal consideration when seeking employment. National origin and age should not factor into the hiring process," said Jeannette Leino, the commission's Seattle district director.

Idaho Power spokesman Dennis Lopez said company policy prevented him from commenting on litigation.

The original discrimination complaint was filed in September in U.S. District Court for the District of Idaho. An amended version was filed Tuesday, said Olson, to clarify that one of the allegations is discrimination based on national origin.

The complaint offers few details about the allegation.

# Women face kidnap charges again

**TWIN FALLS** - Two women who faced kidnaping charges after the brief disappearance of a Twin Falls toddler in April have again been charged - this time in connection with allegations that they held another woman against her will and beat her severely, according to court records.

Christina Ann Rovig of Hansen and Tiffany Rose Brave of Boulder, Colo. - both 19 - were each arraigned Wednesday on a charge of second-degree kidnaping and aggravated battery.

Brave was held Thursday in the Twin Falls County Jail in lieu of \$40,000 bond.

Rovig was held in lieu of \$25,000 bond, and both face preliminary hearings on Oct. 18.

The charges stem from the allegations of Christine Marie Smith of Twin Falls, who told investigators that Rovig and Brave beat her first at Rovig's home - using a flashlight, a hammer head and what appeared to be the hammer's handle, according to an affidavit written by Kimberly police officer Eric B. Foster and filed with court documents.

Smith told officers she was later taken somewhere outside Hansen, beaten again and then abandoned by Rovig and Brave, according to the affidavit.

The document gives this rough outline of events:

Foster at about 1:15 p.m. Tuesday was called to Magic Valley Regional Medical Center in Twin Falls to help interview Smith, who was being treated for injuries she said she suffered during assaults the night before.

Smith told investigators that late Tuesday, Brave telephoned her and invited her to come spend the night at Brave's house in Hansen. Brave and Rovig later arrived in a car at Smith's house and took Smith with them to a mobile home in Hansen.

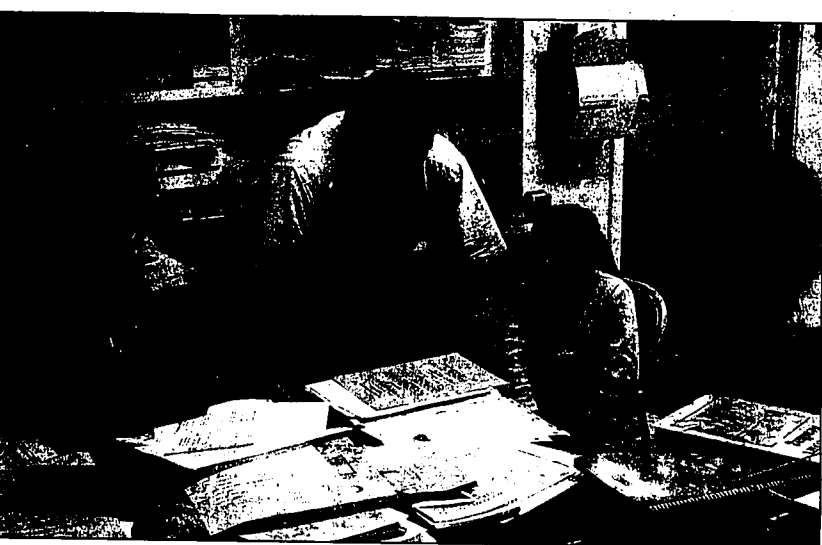
Smith told police she and the other women visited in the living room and wrestled on the floor - until she told them she

didn't want to wrestle any more, got up, and went to the back porch.

Rovig and Brave followed her, and a short while later, Rovig began to yell, and she and Brave started to hit Smith, she told police. Smith said Rovig hit her with what looked like a hammer handle, and Brave was using the head of a hammer. Smith reported that she tried to pick up a metal flashlight to defend herself, but the others took it and began hitting her with it as well.

Smith contended that after the beating, Brave and Rovig made her strip and put her in a bathtub. They brought her Please see KIDNAP, Page B3

# School offers assistance at conferences

**RUPERT** - Fifty percent of the families at Big Valley Elementary have Spanish-speaking parents, school officials said. That poses a problem when parent-teacher conferences come around.

Teachers and parents might not have as productive a meeting if they can't speak the same language.

Interpreters to the rescue. In Minidoka County no one is specifically hired as an interpreter, said federal programs director Jodie Mills, but people are available.

Sylvia Benavidez is one of those people. She is an English-

as-a-second-language instructional aide at Big Valley Elementary School and she speaks Spanish.

Teachers set appointments for conferences and then let Benavidez and fellow employee Jesse Torres know so they can be in the right place at the right time to break the language barrier, Benavidez said.

Heyburn Elementary, ESL teacher Tina Hernandez and, this year, Principal Randy Reddington, walk the hall with radios. When their bilingual skills are needed, the office calls them on their radios.

In Cassia County, bilingual aides and teachers in each school try to be available for translating, but are spread too thin to accommodate everyone,

Burley High School teacher Yolanda Sapien said. The plan for upcoming conferences is to bring in volunteers and high school students who speak Spanish to boost the number of translators available.

Not only does that help Spanish-speaking parents have a successful conference, Sapien said, it gets young people involved within the community.

When families are aware there is a translator, they are more likely to participate in parent-teacher conferences, Benavidez said. There is usually a good turnout of Spanish-speaking parents at Big Valley.

"When you don't have someone who speaks your language, you won't go," Sapien said.

Hernandez said having translators available does make a difference. Teachers have commented to her about an increase in Spanish-speaking parent participation.

There are about 35 families with students at Heyburn Elementary who have indicated they would use translators if available at conferences, Hernandez said. Each family fills out a home language survey which asks, among other things, if a translator is preferred.

Participation of Spanish-speaking parents at conferences at this time of year is usually low, Hernandez said, because it's harvest time and families are working in the fields. A higher Please see CONFERENCE, Page B3

## Teen's parents want driver charged

**TWIN FALLS** - A Twin Falls couple whose firefighter son was killed in a Colorado van crash this summer wants criminal charges pursued against the driver. Two more were seriously injured.

Families of some of the other firefighters killed or injured in the crash, however, are calling for charges to be dropped.

Among five firefighters who died from injuries when their van rolled was Zachary Ziglich, 18, of Twin Falls, who graduated from Twin Falls High School. Ziglich's parents, Mike and Angie Ziglich, said Thursday that they want driver Megan Helm held responsible.

"I want to see that girl have charges in court," Mike Ziglich said. "I would like someone just to sue and sue that driver."

Angie Ziglich said she is angry that the Oregon District Attorney, Mac Myers, is prosecuting the case in

(Colo.) District Court Oct. 23.

Helm was driving the van of firefighters headed to the Hayman fire in central Colorado on June 21 when the vehicle rolled on Interstate 70 near Parachute, Colo. Four people were killed instantly, and a fifth died of his injuries three days later. Two more were seriously injured.

While some believe that Helm is responsible for the accident, the families and victims who want the charges dismissed are preparing to sue Ford Motor Co. Some safety experts say the type of Ford van Helm was driving has a high center of gravity and is prone to rollover accidents.

"Megan Helm is also a victim of this accident and will carry the memory of those fallen firefighters and friends for the rest of her life," lawyer Janice Eppitt wrote in a recent letter to Garfield County District Attorney Mac Myers.

Trying Helm would compound the psychological wounds from the accident, Eppitt said.

The letter was written on behalf of Patrick Sborre, 25, of

LaGrande, Ore., who was injured; and the families of Daniel Rama, 28, and Retha Mae Shirley, 19, both of Baker City, Ore., and Bartholomew Bailey, 20, of Corvallis, Ore. Another Oregon attorney, Bill Gaylord, wrote a similar letter on behalf of Anthony Kyle of LaGrande, who was injured.

If Helm is convicted, it could make it hard to prevail in a van lawsuit, Mike Ziglich said.

While the Ziglichs agree that these types of vans are dangerous, they also said that Helm should be held responsible for the accident.

"We went out there and walked the tracks and looked at the van," he said. "We have some pretty strong convictions."

After studying the accident site, the couple concluded that Helm must have taken her eyes off the road for a lot longer than 30 seconds, Angie Ziglich said.

"She's not a victim by any stretch of the imagination," Mike Ziglich said. "She's reckless and careless."

## Risch, Perry deliver debate

**TWIN FALLS** - A successful trial lawyer by trade, retiring Senate majority leader Jim Risch, R-Boise, doesn't often get his hands in a debate, but he did Thursday with Democrat Bruce Perry.

The two candidates for lieutenant governor faced off in a quick-paced debate sponsored by the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce and Cable One. They will be two more - on Oct. 17 and Oct. 22 - with candidates from both local and state levels.

With 22 years in the Idaho Senate, Risch said his experience will pay off when he uses the office to promote economic development.

Perry, who also has a law degree, turned his business experience and lack of exposure to politics as the qualities voters would most trust. Both candidates are from Boise.

Though the swapped good-natured barbs as they responded to questions posed by narrators Dan Olmstead and Kent Just, their differences in philosophy were obvious.

Perry said he predicted a tax increase to help make up for a \$200 million to \$250 million shortfall in next year's budget. Risch said the budget of government must be balanced right along with that of the private sector.

Perry said economic development in the state is stymied because state leaders don't respond to opportunities. Risch, who said he carried the bill that established the Department of Commerce, said government workers involved in economic development are getting a lot done.

Perry said though he didn't believe in term limits, he said he thought the 2002 Legislature was wrong in lowering out an initiative passed by the voters. Risch said term limits had seemed like Please see DEBATE, Page B3

# Blaine County, Ketchum sign off on housing agreement

**KETCHUM (AP)** — Blaine County and the city will now share equal oversight of the local housing authority's efforts to arrange affordable housing for the employees who work in the restaurants and on the ski lifts.

The pact grants both the county and Ketchum appointing power over two of the five authority seats. A fifth seat will be filled by housing authority members, with Ketchum and county ratification. Previously, Blaine County appointed all

five members of the board. The new entity is called the Blaine-Ketchum Housing Authority. Since it was created in 1997, the Wood River Valley's affordable housing program has been funded only by Blaine County and Ketchum. The Blaine County Housing Authority, however, held the

legal right to act as a landlord or to undertake building an affordable housing project on its own. Blaine Housing director Gates Kelleit, who resigned in August and the system was broken and the joint-powers agreement was a real solution. Kelleit had worked on a controversial

affordable housing project in downtown Ketchum. She said her former post was difficult because she was called a Ketchum employee, but the city and residents did not necessarily advocate the project. "I was forced into this middle position I found really awkward," Kelleit said.

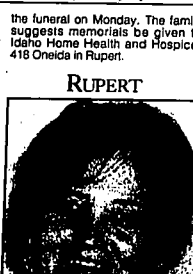

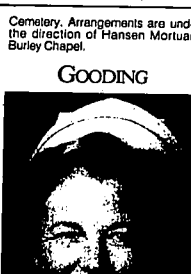

# Declo seeks electric grant

Pons reported that with acquisition of a new brush truck, the department now has four trucks.  
Other council business included:  
• Trailer removal — The deadline for a local couple to remove a trailer house that is violating

the city's mobile home ordinance was extended.  
• Sheriff's issues — Council members voiced concerns to Cassia County Undersheriff Cary Bristol about problems with out-of-town people at football games. The council mentioned people were skate boarding where they shouldn't be and there had been some vandalism incidents.  
• Speed limit — The 15 mph speed limit signs for Main Street in front of the schools have arrived and will be put up as soon as possible.  
• Crosswalks — Paint for crosswalks on Idaho Highway 77 through Declo has been ordered.

# Goose Creek pipeline might stay

**OAKLEY** — A pipeline built last summer to supply water to cattle on U.S. Forest Service land 20 miles south of Oakley could become a permanent fixture.  
Forest Service and Bureau of Land Management employees are conducting an environmental assessment to see if a permanent pipeline would impact the natural systems in the area. Forest Service personnel will send out letters requesting public comment on the project this winter.

Sawtooth National Forest spokesman Ed Waldpfel said. Officials will probably make a decision next summer or fall. The pipeline provides additional water to cattle during droughts when the springs on the land don't produce enough water, said Scott Nannenga, Burley and Twin Falls District forest ranger. Most of the pipeline lies on Forest Service land with a short section on BLM land. The people holding grazing permits for the land could probably provide the water transported by the pipeline.

Nannenga said.  
Mike Poulton, Bruce Bedke, Scott Bedke and Bud Bedke hold the grazing permits on the allotment. In the summer of 2001 they received a grant from the Natural Resource Conservation Service to build the temporary pipeline. The Forest Service conducted an environmental assessment of the project before approving it, Nannenga said.  
The pipeline is now owned by the permittees, but it would be publicly owned and linked to the grazing allotment if it becomes permanent.

# Brady keeps pace in dollar derby

**BOISE (AP)** — Republican Gov. Dirk Kempthorne and Democratic challenger Jerry Brady matched each other nearly dollar for dollar in the race for campaign cash, but Brady kept up only with more of his own money.  
Campaign finance disclosure statements filed with the secretary of state on Thursday showed Kempthorne raising \$447,000 between June 8 and Sept. 30. More than \$71,000 came in on the final day of September.  
Brady, the Idaho Falls newspaper publisher making his first bid for elective office, raised nearly \$350,000 in the same period and added another \$100,000 from his address book. That brings to \$247,000 his own investment in his uphill campaign to oust the incumbent governor.  
Both made no television advertising buys during the summer. But each had sizable balances heading into the final five weeks of what has been a relatively lackluster campaign.  
Kempthorne with \$262,000 in the bank and Brady with \$200,000.  
"But overall, Kempthorne has raised less than \$800,000 in his

bid for a second four-year term. At the same time during the 1998 campaign, he had raised over \$1.1 million.  
Brady has generated almost \$770,000, but a third of that came from his own bank account.  
Among the governor's contributors were many of the people he has appointed to various state jobs since taking office as well as the maximum \$5,000 contribution from Corrections Corp. of America, the operator of the state's newest prison.  
Kempthorne also got \$2,500 from a key official of the WestRock resort development, that just received approval of a needed state land lease this year, and \$3,500 from three of the big tobacco companies — Philip Morris, R.J. Reynolds and Brown & Williamson.  
Moneytree, the payday loan company that has come under some criticism for its huge interest rates, gave the governor the maximum \$5,000.  
Brady's supporters included former Clinton administration Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt; Heinz food heiress Teresa Heinz,

who is married to Massachusetts Sen. John Kerry; Starr Kello, the Panhandle attorney who unsuccessfully challenged Supreme Court Justice Linda Copple Trout last spring, and the Idaho Falls law firm that Republican U.S. Sen. Michael Crapo used to belong to and which still carries his last name.  
In the race for attorney general, considered one of the closest on the Nov. 5 ballot, Democrat Keith Roark raised \$58,000 during the summer against Republican Lawrence Warden, the chief deputy to retiring GOP Attorney General Al Lance who raised \$76,000.  
But \$20,000 of Warden's support came from McAlaluce and allied companies run by conservative Idaho Falls businessman Frank VanderSloot. Roark's biggest support was the Idaho Education Association at \$5,000.  
But while Roark has made a large television advertising buy and started October with just \$8,500 in the bank, Warden has held his cash and went into the last five weeks with a balance of \$56,000.

# Parent says conferences are valuable

**RUPERT** — Parent and classroom aide Mary Brisbin likens parent teacher conferences to riding a tandem bicycle.  
If just one person is pedaling, the bicycle doesn't go very fast; but if both teachers and parents are pedaling, "You can really make that thing move," Brisbin said.  
Brisbin always saw the need to be an involved parent, but working as an aide taught her it's even more important. Attending conferences allows parents to see where the child stands and how parents can help their child.

Often there are important simple things a parent can do.  
"Practice at home is key," Brisbin said. "The student will get by (without practice at home), but not excel, and we want them to excel."  
Also, if a parent has questions about what or how the child is learning in the classroom, the conference is a great place to ask. Brisbin said. Asking questions may lead to finding out new ways to help the student.  
Brisbin had concerns about the way new math concepts were being taught to her child. When she asked about it, the teacher was able to explain how

teaching that way would allow for an easier transition to more difficult math concepts.  
Always ask about behavior too, Brisbin said. A child may act differently in a school setting than he would at home.  
"Go in with an open mind," Brisbin stressed. "The teachers have a wealth of things they can tell us if we're receptive."  
As a parent, Brisbin always felt being involved in a student's life at school is important, as an aide she sees how important it is.  
A child with an active parent at school is more likely to be successful, Brisbin said.

number will usually attend conferences later in the year.  
Benavidez said her own parents don't attend conferences when she has in school because of the language barrier. Her father spoke just a few words of English and, "My mom didn't speak English, so she didn't go," Benavidez said.  
It is important for parents to attend conferences, Benavidez said. Attending makes the child feel cared for and lets the teachers know the parents care. Many teacher-parent conferences are embarrassing but can't speak English and don't come to conferences.  
How translating works depends on the teacher, Hernandez said. Some teachers talk in a manner that makes sense when translated

straight across; some include too much educational jargon. Hernandez strives to make sure the concerns and successes of the child are heard.  
"We do a lot," Benavidez often conducts the conference rather than translate for the teacher. She talks with the teacher and gets test scores and other information from the teachers, then goes through the conference herself.  
Sapien said that while translators in Cassia schools try to translate word for word for the teachers, they also try to make the conference a parent-friendly. Sometimes the vocabulary of the teacher will be too high for the parent. As long as the main message is conveyed, the translation is a success.  
Sapien said work is being done

to put information about standards and benchmarks and the "50 in a minute" program in Spanish. Having documents such as the students' report card in Spanish would also help.  
"We do have a bit of Hispanics," Sapien said, but there is always room for more to become involved.  
Getting parents to conferences and involved in their students' academics in the early grades lead to more success in later years, Sapien said. The more parents get involved, the more success the students may have. Parents are teachers too.

hands in front of her with a chain, stuffed the sock in her mouth and began to scrub her in an apparent attempt to clean blood from her body and hair, Smith told investigators. She told police Rovig and Brave then made her take eight to 10 pills, which she couldn't identify.  
• After leaving her alone in the bathroom for some time, Rovig and Brave returned with Smith's clothing — some of which appeared to have been freshly washed — and told her to get dressed, Smith reported.  
• After making Smith clean the bathroom, Rovig and Brave drove her outside Hansen, made her get out of the car, threw her down, kicked her repeatedly, then got back into the car and left without her, Smith told police.  
Smith said she walked to a nearby road and caught a ride to the hospital from a passing motorist, according to Foster's affidavit.  
Rovig was later interviewed by police and gave a similar account of the events, but said she was under duress from Brave to participate in the police interview, according to the affidavit.  
Kimberly Police Chief Pat Bermingham said it wasn't yet clear to investigators what might have prompted the attacks or just how well Smith knew Rovig and

Brave. He said some aspects of the case were still under investigation Thursday, but no more charges or new suspects were expected. Bermingham said he didn't know the extent of Smith's injuries.  
Smith was no longer a patient at Magic Valley Regional Thursday, a hospital spokeswoman said.  
This isn't the first time Rovig and Brave have faced kidnapping charges, according to police and court records.  
Rovig and Brave were arrested on April 25, two days after Joy Thompson of Twin Falls reported her 14-month-old son, Kurtin Konrad Herbst Thompson, missing.  
Thompson told police she had given two women — whom she knew by first name only — permission to watch Kurtin for about an hour, according to police reports.  
Kurtin was later found safe in a Twin Falls area home, and Rovig and Brave were charged with second-degree kidnapping, according to reports. They told investigators they had taken Kurtin because they were concerned over living conditions at Thompson's home.  
The charges against Brave were dropped.  
Rovig on May 3 agreed to plead guilty to a misdemeanor charge of custodial interference, and the kidnapping charge against her was dropped, accord-

ing to court records. She was sentenced June 5 to 180 days in jail — suspended — 24 months' probation, a day's work detail and ordered to pay \$63.50 in court costs, court records say.  
Meanwhile, police were ordered by a judge to search Thompson's home and found some drug paraphernalia, including two syringes — and possible drug residue, according to reports. The firefighters were employees of Grayback Forestry Inc., a private Oregon company that contracts with public agencies to fight wildfires. Workers' compensation offered the Zigichs \$6,000 on behalf of Grayback, but they refused the money, Mike Zigich said.  
"That's not even enough to bury him," Angie Zigich said.  
One of the injured in the wreck was Brandon Flala, 20, of Twin Falls. He suffered multiple trauma and head injuries. Flala spent two recent summers on *The Times-News* staff as a reporting intern.  
Flala's father, David Flala, said his son is now doing well. He is no longer using crutches or a neck brace and is attending Boise State University.

But David Flala said it is hard to say whether charges against Helm should be dropped.  
"We don't wish ill upon Megan Helm," he said. "She's got to live with that the rest of her life."  
Flala said he understood that tentative driving was involved. He said he does not know enough about the van to comment.  
"We have no real opinion one way or another," he said.  
If the matter goes to trial, Brandon Flala could be called to testify, his father said.  
The question of whether to drop the charges is a tough one, said Eileen Helms of Burley, whose son, Robert, was also injured in the crash.  
"My son's OK. It would be easy for me to say to drop the charges," she said. "If my son had been

killed or injured worse, I honestly don't know what I would say."  
Helms said she feels bad for the families who lost children.  
"It was an accident that could happen to anybody," she said.  
But the question of pressing charges is too hard to answer, Helms said. "There has to be some consequences," she said.  
While the Zigichs are waiting for consequences against Helm, they continue to mourn their son.  
"It's been horrible," Mike Zigich said. "We're not even close to recovering yet. It's been a tough, tough deal."

a good idea 10 years ago, so good he even backed it, but since then he has come to understand it isn't a good idea.  
Perry said the state is losing its competitive edge in its higher education system because of funding cuts.  
Rich said that during the first three years of the Kempthorne administration, colleges and universities got unprecedented increases and could stand to grow without until the economy improves.  
Perry said the state needs to

crack down on dairies by enforcing the laws already in place. Rich said the industry is young and has growing pains, but at some point in time, the state will have to get tough because there are more people who don't dairy than there are dairies.  
The Idaho Constitution says the lieutenant governor presides over the Idaho Senate, fills in for the governor when he's out of state and does what the governor "deems necessary for the good of the state." For many lieutenant governors, that last phrase means the lieutenant governor defines

the office himself.  
Since Rich announced he was running for the office, he has repeatedly said he'll use it to promote economic development, particularly of Idaho products. In an earlier debate, he even suggested he would go on foreign trade missions.  
Perry said Thursday he intends to use the office to focus on issues that need attention. He used the example of the minimum-wage law for farm workers that lawmakers could not pass until because of the attitude of the governor and the lieutenant governor.

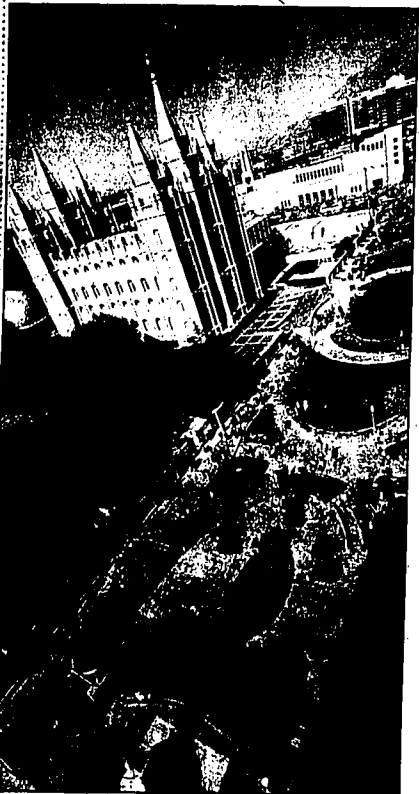

and the community — Paul G. of the Nature Conservancy, Edie Martin, owner of Twin Falls Knerys restaurant, and community activist. Both were under treatment for depression and both committed suicide.  
As an intern before the high, Flala's suicide rate is fifth in the nation, which, she said, could be

attributed to Idaho being the 49th in the nation in spending for mental health services.  
"Only 25 percent of all children have access to mental health services. One in five adults nationally suffer some form of mental disorder," according to the U.S. Surgeon General.  
In the Wood River Valley, Evans said there have been at least 21 suicides since 1985 — but

perhaps more that went not properly identified. Mental health services, which customarily represent about 3 percent of the state budget, are being drastically cut because of rising shorefalls.

# Mormon church will appeal to regulate speech in plaza



SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — The Mormon church said Thursday it will appeal a court decision that reopened a section of the city's Main Street to anyone who wants to picket, smoke or sunbathe on the sidewalks through the Mormon church plaza.

The 10th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Denver ruled Wednesday that Main Street plaza sidewalks are traditional public spaces. The ruling said that restricting free speech on sidewalks, even those owned by the church, is unconstitutional.

Before the ruling, The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints could limit activities on the downtown lot, which was purchased from the city in April 1999 for \$8.1 million. Though the city maintained an easement to ensure public access, city and church attorneys approved numerous restrictions on conduct.

"The city cannot create a 'First Amendment-free zone,'" said the three-judge appeals court panel. Mormon church attorney Von Keetch said the church was "very troubled" by the decision and will appeal to the full 10th Circuit court and possibly the U.S. Supreme Court.

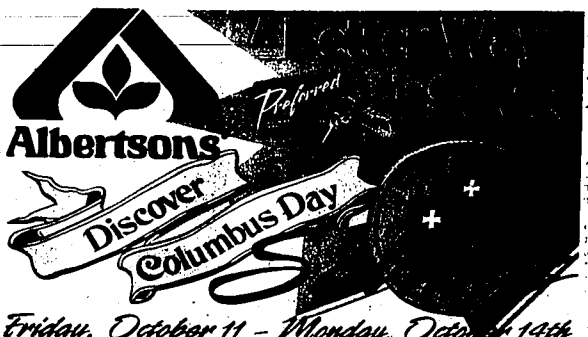
"We bought it, we are the full property owners and we agreed to the right to have people walk across it," Keetch said. "But we didn't think that meant we would have groups demonstrate, picket and hand out literature."

The walkway runs in front of the Mormon temple in the heart of downtown Salt Lake City and is landscaped and maintained by the church. City leaders also granted the church exclusive rights to distribute literature and broadcast speeches and music on the block.

"There are plenty of areas to protest that aren't right up against the temple, with the reflecting pool and brides taking wedding pictures," Keetch said.

Kurt Van Gorden, a Baptist minister, drove all night from his home in Victorville, Calif., to be on the plaza Thursday. He has been arrested twice on the plaza for handing out religious pamphlets for the Utah Gospel Mission.

The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints cannot restrict speech on this plaza, which the church built, a federal appeals court ruled Wednesday.

## Trailing of the Sheep celebrates history

HAILEY — You're familiar, no doubt, with Scottish highlanders — those bagpipers and kilts-clad lassies that do some fancy footwork around a dance spread out on the ground.

But Polish Highlanders? Who knew?

Yet you'll be able to see them for yourself at 12:50 p.m. Saturday when the Polish Highlanders of North America strut their stuff at the Trailing of the Sheep Folklore Fair here.

The Highlanders, who have maintained their traditions even while living in Chicago, heard about the annual festival last year, presumably, as the celebration of the Wood River Valley's sheep heritage was featured by Bill Geiss on his "CBS

Sunday Mornin'" program. And they begged to be part of it, flying in from Chicago at their own expense, said festival coordinator Diane Joseph Peavy.

The Polish Highlanders will present the folk music and dance of their ancestors — shepherds from the Tatra Mountains of southern Poland during the fair. The singing was used to communicate from mountaintop pastures to valleys below and the dance is a style found only in that part of Europe, Peavy added.

In their effort to keep the festival fresh, organizers have also added another new event this year — the Western Regional Championship Sheep Dog Finals. The top 50 sheep dogs from around the West will show off their ability to herd sheep between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. Friday and Saturday at Cutters Ranch.

The ranch is on the northeast corner of Hailey, accessible from Buttercup Road and Hiawatha Drive.

The best 10 sheep dogs will compete in the finals of the competition on Sunday, with a break from 11 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. for the Trailing of the Sheep Parade in Ketchum.

Other new additions to the sixth annual festival include Bersolari — a friendly improvisational competition between two Basque poets from Wyoming and Nevada who will sing improvised poetry to topics suggested by the audience. A sort of "Whose Line Is It" in Basque.

The Bersolari will be part of tonight's Sheep Readings and Music at 8 p.m. at Ketchum's American Legion Hall, at 220 Cottonwood St. W., a few streets northwest of the river street

Lodge.

At the same event, Heather Parkinson of Boise's Oinkari Basque Dancers will present an audiovisual presentation on a history of Basques in Idaho at 3 p.m. at the Hailey Public Library.

And Sue Barney and Leeanne Garton will conduct spinning and weaving workshops at 11:30 and 1:30 at the Blaine County Senior Center, across the street from the Folklife Fair in Hailey. (Call 787-6687.)

## Jamboree organizers expect 7,000

SUN VALLEY — Sun Valley may have gained recognition as a ski resort. But it's the falling of the golden aspen leaves — not snow — that heralds the single biggest crowd to hit the resort each year.

Some 7,000 jazz enthusiasts and 200 musicians from around the world are expected to hit Sun Valley this coming week for the 13th Annual Swing 'n Dixie Jazz Jamboree.

The jazzfest is as colorful as the red and golden aspen leaves fluttering in the afternoon breeze, with participants doing face-pog, woging, tapping their feet to fast-paced barrelhouse piano and happily nodding along as piano men plunk out some ragtime on the ivories.

It's so much fun that Margie and Harlen Feraday of Idaho Falls even dropped the jamboree four years ago in 1998. "We figured there was no better place for a honky-tonk," Margie said.

This year's new offerings include Cornet Chop Suey of St. Louis and the Bob Crosby Bob Cats, an East Coast Dixieland band.

Returning favorites include Linda Dixie, which queues up the place with its "Mississippi Squirrel Revival"; Dixieland Express, which makes trombones sound like bagpipes on its rendition of "Rocky Mountain"; Mardia Gras, which performs such Western flavored tunes as "Tumblingumbleweeds" and "Battle Hymn of the Republic"; in addition to the more traditional jazz offerings and Crazy Rhythm Hot Society Jazz Orchestra, which does a Fade-In-Fade-Out set in which it pairs up with recordings of great jazz bands of the past.

And, of course, there will be plenty of improvisational jazz being played around the campfire at the fall of golden aspen leaves.

"It's an experimental music," said jazz pianist and composer Tomasz Stankiewicz.

This year's jamboree will feature some new venues, what with Elkhorn Resort closing a couple weeks ago and part of the Sun Valley Inn under construction.

A heated tent will be set up on the plaza outside River Run Lodge, said Dick Black, the jamboree's assistant director. And swing dance lessons will be held in the "River Run Pavilion" banquet rooms.

The Sun Valley Lodge Terrace and the Continental Room at the Inn will figure into this year's equation. And the Ram Restaurant, normally a diner facility, will be open for lunch and breakfast, as well.

As always, the Jamboree will kick off Tuesday night with a free Community Concert at 7 p.m. at Sun Valley's Indoor Ice Arena.

This year's performers will include Wood River High School's Wolverine Jazz Band, which plays some mean jazz, and Swing Design Big Band from the Netherlands, which touched a lot of people at last year's jamboree with its tribute to America in the wake of 9-11.

The Jamboree gets underway officially on Wednesday at 11 a.m. and continues throughout its five-day run from 9 a.m. until midnight with a variety of acts performing simultaneously.

Thursday will feature a special tribute to the Ladies of Jazz. Traditional Jazz—the original two-beat style of early Dixieland music—will be featured on Friday. And Saturday will be devoted in part to the Big Swing Bands.

A badge good for all events costs \$80 for adults and \$10 for students between the ages of 13 and 17. Children under free are admitted free when accompanied by a parent.

## Symphony opens with young soloists

TWIN FALLS — She's a bit nervous about her upcoming debut with the Magic Valley Symphony. But College of Southern Idaho sophomore Jenete Miller says that's a good thing.

"This is the type of performance I get a nervous about," said Miller, who will be one of three featured soloists in the Magic Valley Symphony's season-opening concert Sunday afternoon. "However, the more nervous I get, the harder I work on my performance... I put all that energy back into my performance."

Miller, Nichelle Holloway, a senior at Pacific Lutheran University in Tacoma, Wash., and Twin Falls High School senior Nyle Matsuoka, will join the symphony on Sunday.

They were chosen earlier this year after competing in the symphony's annual Youth Soloist Competition. Symphony Conductor and Music Director Theodore Hadley says 27 young musicians showed up for the competition.

"All who competed were excellent and all did their best, but we can pick just three," he said. "The three winners are serious musicians, striving to improve their technique and musical skills. But more to the point, they are learning the amazing power of music to reach inside people and affect them."

Miller, 19, plans to continue her education after CSI by earning a degree in music performance. Over the years, she's performed with the Junior Musical Playhouse and the Magic Valley Chorus, and has been a member of various school choirs. On Sunday, she'll sing Mozart's "Exultate, Jubilate."

Now in her final year at PLU, Holloway is looking forward to completing her degree in music performance on the clarinet. She's been playing the wind instrument

since the sixth grade when she was hoping to pick up the flute in the school's band.

"I just couldn't get a sound out of that flute," Holloway recalled. "So I tried the clarinet as a last resort and, amazingly, I could hit any note the instructor asked me to. I haven't stopped playing it since."

On Sunday, she'll perform Carl Maria von Weber's Concertino for Clarinet.

"I've won other competitions, but being selected to play with the Magic Valley Symphony is extremely fulfilling," Matsuoka said. "This is an opportunity that just doesn't come around all that often for someone my age. I'm excited and grateful that I have this opportunity."

In Sunday's concert, the symphony will play the first movement of one of Beethoven's most famous works, the "Eroica" symphony (Symphony No. 3 in E flat) and an overture by Italian composer Giuseppe Verdi.

Following the concert, there will be a reception served by the young musicians of Strings Alive, an after-school elementary string program in Twin Falls.

## 'Late Marriage'

In an impressive feature-film debut, Israeli writer-director Dover Kosashvili tells the story of 31-year-old Zaza (Lior Ashkenazi), who has disgraced his parents, Georgian immigrants to Israel, by not yet having married a Georgian virgin younger than he. Zaza dutifully attends the tribal-like sit-downs between his family and those of prospective brides, but he is not overly picky; he is secretly in love with a divorced Moroccan (Ronit Elkabitz) who, as we can discern in the film's extended and graphic sex sequence, is decidedly not a virgin. Though much of the film is hilarious, it also has an

unapologetically bitter tone that doesn't prepare us for its final twist but does preclude any thoughts of a big group hug in the end. Not rated; sexual theme, sexual situations, nudity, language. 1 hour, 40 minutes. In Hebrew and Georgian, with English subtitles.

## 'Mostly Martha'

For all the talk of pig bladder, there's not an original dish on this romantic-comedy menu. Her life changes when she is forced to take

in her sullen, impossible-to-please 8-year-old niece. The change upsets her carefully ordered routine so much that the restaurant owner is forced to hire a sous-chef who is her emotional and culinary opposite, and we fully expect him to teach Martha something about pleasure. 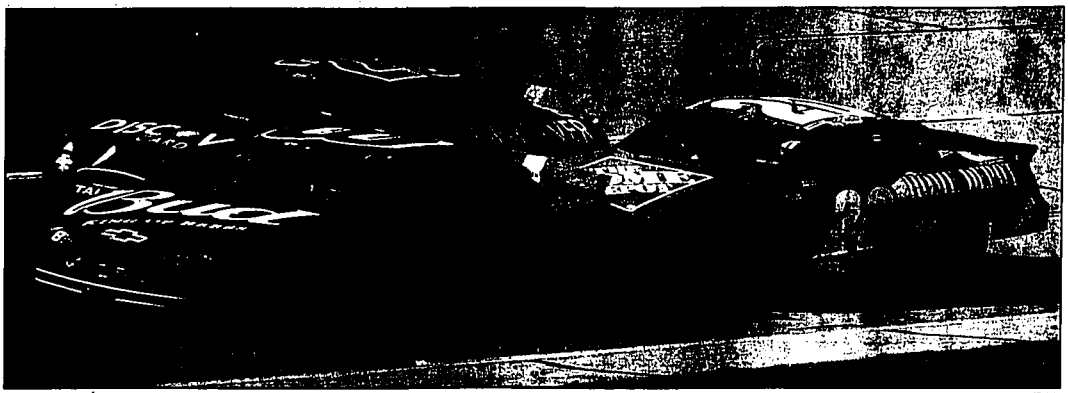

The road since has been full of crashes, controversy and criticism, but Tony Stewart has weathered it all to climb from the absolute bottom all the way to the top.

Stewart, one of the preseason picks to win the Winston Cup, is on the verge of actually doing it. With six races left in the season, he's on top of the points standings for the first time in his NASCAR career.

It's a spot he didn't know if he could get to, especially after his last-place finish at Daytona — a race he was heavily favored to win after dominating runs in the days leading up to the event.

"There was no way I ever could have dreamed after Daytona that we were going to be where we are today," Stewart said on a media conference call to discuss his 72-point lead over Mark Martin.

"I'm ecstatic, to be honest. ... That first race of the year when we left Daytona, we were devastated after the wreck that we had had. It just shows that

you can't give up."

There have been plenty of times Stewart could have given up on this season, his fourth in Winston Cup. He rebounded after the Daytona disappointment by winning at Atlanta in March, but he had a nasty wreck the next week at Darlington that left him hospitalized for a night with a sore back.

The injury forced him out of the car the next week at Bristol midway through the race, putting Stewart back into his routine of struggling through the early part of the schedule.

His Joe Gibbs Racing team eventually got Stewart and the No. 14 Pontiac back on track — even as the driver was battling a series of off-track problems.

In August, he punched a photographer following a disappointing day at Indianapolis Motor Speedway. That led the

temperamental Stewart to seek anger management help, but the worst was still to come.

He was bombarded by other accusations in the weeks after Indy, with one fan's claim that he shoved her at Bristol even going to a grand jury last month before he was cleared of any wrongdoing.

It meant that no matter how good he was running on the track, critics still shrugged Stewart off — certain his problems would prevent him from ever winning a Winston Cup title.

And they pointed to last season, wondering if Stewart's almost yearlong stint on probation prevented him from making a stronger run on champion Jeff Gordon. Stewart finished a distant second to Gordon in the standings, never challenging for the lead.

They're certainly the favorite now, starting with this weekend's race at Lowe's Motor Speedway. He's won at four of the six remaining tracks on the circuit and has always been strong at the suburban Charlotte track.

Although he's never won at Lowe's, he scored a career-best second in the October race here last year and has four top-fives and six top-10s on the 1.5-mile track.

But Stewart, the 1997 Indy Racing League champion, isn't making room for the championship trophy just yet.

"I'm cautiously optimistic right now," he said. "I've run for enough points championships in 23 years of racing, and I won enough championships. I mean there are six races left to go and the best attitude that we can take going into those six races is, 'We've got to win a couple of these.'"

As much as we want to protect our lead, the best way to protect our lead is to go out and win races, and then the points seem to take care of themselves."

## Drivers ignore injuries to pursue points

CONCORD, N.C. — In 1992, Davey Allison gingerly climbed through the window of his No. 28 Ford, wincing with pain, as he prepared to start a race at Talladega.

The previous Sunday, he had survived a crash at Pocono, somersaulting 11 times after colliding with Darrell Waltrip, and the wreck left him with a broken forearm, a shattered wrist, badly bloodshot eyes and bruises virtually from head to toe.

Allison, in fact, was still healing from separated cartilage, fractured ribs and torn ligaments and muscle in his right shoulder from a crash earlier in the year.

Now, the second-generation NASCAR star found himself waiting for the Talladega race to start so he could drive a few laps and earn that day's championship points before giving up the seat to relief driver Bobby Hillin Jr.

Allison, who later died in a helicopter crash, endured pain most of the season, going into the last race with a shot at the title before winding up third.

If a NASCAR driver wants to win the Winston Cup championship, he can't afford to miss races. Allison is just one of many examples of drivers racing while injured in the sport's 53-year history.

Two weeks ago, Dale Earnhardt Jr., whose father drove numerous times with broken bones and other injuries, revealed he drove part of this season with a concussion that left him unable to concentrate fully or communicate with his crew chief.



Earnhardt said he did not report it to doctors because he was worried about a concussion injury, had had concussions before and didn't think this one was serious, and, most importantly, didn't want to be barred from the track.

That's what Sterling Marlin was thinking about before it was determined last week that he would miss the final seven races of 2002 after fracturing a vertebra in his neck in a crash at Kansas City.

"If your arm was cracked or something else, we'd go on and race," Marlin said. "But you talk about your spine, and that's a pretty delicate piece."

He didn't think about that initially.

Marlin, who was fifth in the closest points race in NASCAR history after the race in Kansas, would have been in his No. 40 Dodge at

Talladega on Sunday if the team trainer hadn't been persistent in urging the driver to get X-rays.

"When I called him, he was on the farm cutting weeds," car owner Chip Ganassi said. "Now he says 'If I just didn't answer the phone, I'd still be driving.'"

That's the mindset of a driver dealing with a points system that puts a premium on getting into a race car, no matter what.

In the wake of Earnhardt's revelation, other drivers talked about driving while affected by concussions.

NASCAR reacted by setting a new policy requiring a driver to undergo a CT scan if race-track doctors suspect a concussion following a crash.

If the scan shows a concussion, the driver will not be allowed to compete until

obtaining a medical release, NASCAR president Mike Helton said.

Will that change the way drivers approach their jobs? Probably not, unless NASCAR changes the points system.

"The option you have is to say, 'No, I'm not going to drive it,' or suck it up, and everyone sucks it up," said Mark Martin, second in the points heading into Sunday's UAW-GM 500 at Lowe's Motor Speedway.

"This is a manly man sport. ... I really don't think you need someone to tell you that you have a head injury and you shouldn't be driving. I would assume that you would know that yourself," Martin said.

Marlin said he doesn't like the idea of someone else deciding if he is fit enough to race.

## Dodges look for help as season heads to Charlotte

CONCORD, N.C. (AP) — Their championship hopes ruined when Sterling Marlin was lost for the year with a neck injury, the Dodge camp is seeking help from NASCAR to salvage the season.

Dodge officials head into the UAW-GM Quality 500 at Lowe's Motor Speedway this weekend contending the Intrepid's engines are underpowered and the cars are at an aerodynamic disadvantage.

"We've had somewhat of a catastrophe the past few weeks," said Jim Julow, vice president for Dodge Motorsports. "With Sterling being injured, that put a big hole in our plans. And we've seen that our cars have not been real competitive, and we still have not had any rules relief."

Marlin, who had the strongest Dodge all season and led the Winston Cup standings for 25 straight weeks, was ordered out of his car last week when doctors discovered a broken vertebra in his neck.

So Marlin, the defending race winner, wasn't in the No. 40 Dodge for Thursday's qualifying and he won't be able to finish his quest for his first Winston Cup title.

His injury has left Dodge without a championship contender this season — Bill Elliott is a distant eighth in the points and Marlin, the only other Dodge even in the top 20, will continue to plummet in the standings as he misses the final six races.

It's just short of devastating for Dodge, which returned to NASCAR last season after a long absence from auto racing and has come close to being a consistent contender. Marlin finished third in the championship standings last season and the Dodges have six victories this year.

But none have come since last summer, when Ward Burton and Elliott put the Intrepid in the winner's circle in three straight races.

Since that stretch of Dodge domination, NASCAR allowed the Chevrolet and Pontiacs to extend their front air dams, and Dodge officials believe they've suffered from it.

Chevrolet drivers have won five of eight races since the rules change, with Ford's taking the other three. In that same time, the Dodges have failed to run up front at the top finishing Intrepid was Burton in 10th at Talladega last weekend and his next closest was Kyle Petty in 16th.

It's not clear where the Dodges need the most help. They've been complaining to NASCAR for months that their engines are underpowered, but deficiencies in aerodynamics have become a new issue since Chevrolet got its help in August. NASCAR is unlikely to provide any assistance before the end of the season.

**Bus driver subdues suicide bomber, minimizing number of people hurt**

TEL AVIV, Israel - A driver and passenger in a crowded Israeli bus subdued a Palestinian suicide bomber as he tried to board the vehicle along a busy highway outside Tel Aviv during rush hour Thursday morning, pinning him to the ground for five minutes while citizens fled to safety. But when they released the bomber and dashed for cover themselves, the man ran toward a group of people and detonated the explosives, killing himself and an elderly woman and injuring several other people, witnesses said.

The swift reaction of the driver and passenger and the bomber's own apparent carelessness - he fell and hurt himself while trying to get on the bus - helped avert what could have been a bloody terrorist attack, with many more people dead and injured, police said.

"Had that suicide bomber gotten on the bus, the damage would

have been catastrophic, since it was crowded with rush hour citizens and soldiers and students," said the Israeli police spokesman, Gil Kleinman. "This was very, very good work by the bus driver and the citizens. They definitely saved the day."

Thursday's was the first suicide bombing in Israel since back-to-back bombings on Sept. 19 and 20 killed six and wounded more than 50. Those bombings were followed by Israeli military raids focusing on Gaza Strip strongholds of the Islamic Resistance Movement, or Hamas, that have killed 33 Palestinians and injured more than 200 others, including 16 people killed Monday in an Israeli missile strike on a crowded street in the southern Gaza city of Khan Younis.

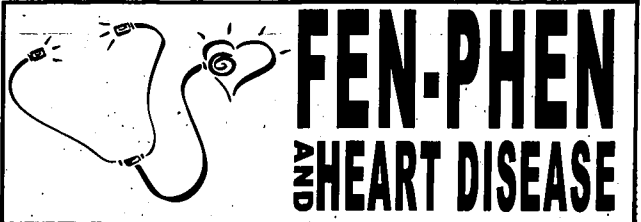
Many of the killed and injured were unarmed civilians, and Hamas and other militant Palestinian groups have vowed revenge. No group claimed responsibility for Thursday's attack.

Witnesses said that when the bomber tried to leap through the back door as the bus was pulling out of the station, the door suddenly closed, and he stumbled and fell back to the ground, hitting his head.

"The first thing I thought was that a passenger fell off the bus," the driver, Baruch Neoyman, said in an interview. "Everyone in the back yelled, 'Stop! Stop! Someone fell!' I stopped and got out to help, and then a woman came up and said she was a paramedic and someone else who said he was a doctor."

"The first thing you do with an injured person is open their shirt," said Neoyman, 50, a father of three who has worked for Israel's Dan bus company for 24 years. "I saw something that looked like a holster and some wires, and I thought this was someone who obviously had a heart problem and a pacemaker. But by the time we got to the third button, it was evident he was wearing an explosive belt."

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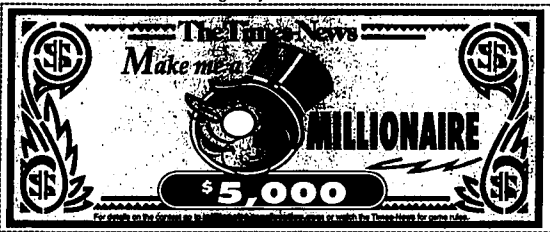
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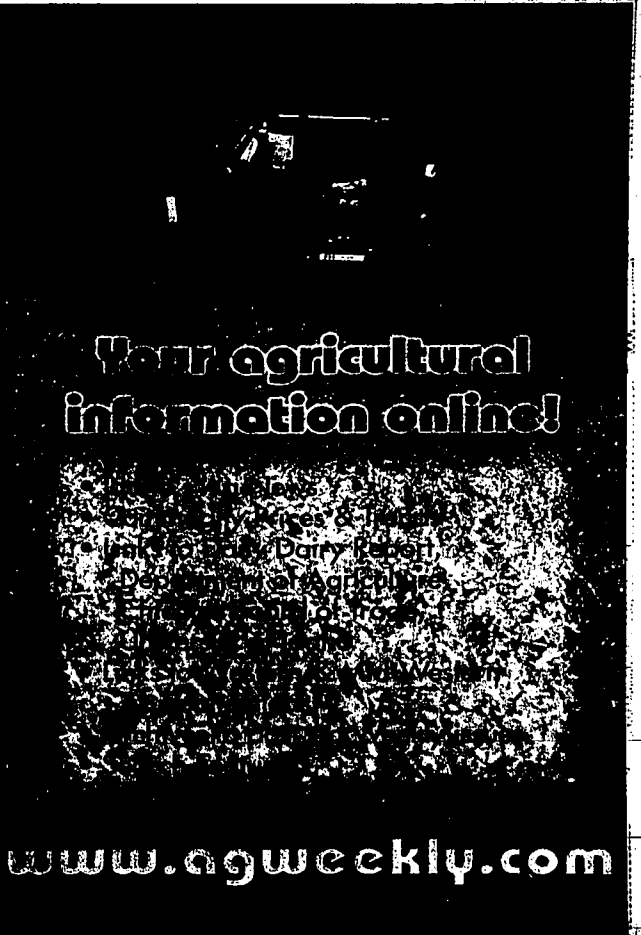

# Nobel Prize goes to Hungarian for literature about Holocaust

After Auschwitz, to write poetry is barbaric, a philosopher once concluded. A long line of poets and novelists have thought otherwise, and on Thursday, the Nobel Prize in literature went to Imre Kertesz, a Hungarian novelist and Auschwitz survivor.

Honoring the 72-year-old Budapest Jew for his uncommon, single-minded gift for saying the unsayable, the Swedish Academy singled out his 1975 debut novel, "Fateless" ("Fateless"), about a young man who is taken to a concentration camp but conforms and survives.

"For him Auschwitz is not an exceptional occurrence," the academy said. "It is the ultimate truth about human degradation in modern experience."

Kertesz was deported in 1944 to Auschwitz in Nazi-occupied Poland, then to the Buchenwald concentration camp in Germany, where he was liberated in 1945. Of the 6 million Jews killed in the Holocaust, some 600,000 were Hungarian.

Kertesz is the first Hungarian to win the award, worth about \$1 million.

"My immediate reaction is one of great joy. It means very much to me," he told The Associated Press in Berlin, where he is on a teaching scholarship.

"There is no awareness of the Holocaust in Hungary. People have not faced up to the Holocaust. I hope that in the light of this recognition, they will face up to it more

Approaches vary in style and format. Wiesel's "Night" is an autobiographical novel, while Levi's "Survival in Auschwitz" is a philosophical memoir. The telegraphic violence of Celan's poem "Death Fugue" mirrors the madness of the camps ("he whistles his Jews into rows has them shovel a grave in the ground").

Aaron Appelfeld, a Romanian-born Israeli, has written about the prelude and aftermath of the Holocaust but has shied from recording his experiences of the concentration camps, likening them to a flame you dare not touch. Louis Begley, a Polish-born Jew now living in New York, was a refugee during World War II and hesitated before writing his award-winning novel "Wartime Lies."

"I was very concerned that to write a novel about the horror of the German occupation of Poland was morally wrong and I questioned myself very hard," said Begley, who proceeded with his book after encouragement from his wife.

Kertesz was honored for writing "that upholds the fragile experience of the individual against the barbaric arbitrariness of history," in the citation by the Swedish Academy.

Wiesel, an Auschwitz survivor who won the Nobel Peace Prize in 1986, applauded the award.

"He is a great writer," Wiesel said. "His style and his approach are of such high quality that he deserved to be given the highest prize in literature."

# German authorities arrest terror suspect

BERLIN - A Moroccan with alleged ties to al-Qaida training camps and the terrorist cell that plotted the Sept. 11 attacks was arrested in Hamburg Thursday as police intensified their search for those who provide logistical and financial support to extremist networks.

Abdelghani Mzoudi is not suspected of belonging to the inner circle of the terrorist group led by Mohamed Atta, the Egyptian believed to have piloted the

Boeing 767 that struck the north tower of the World Trade Center. But over the years, according to prosecutors, Mzoudi had contacts with the Sept. 11 hijackers and attended terrorist camps in Afghanistan in 2000.

Authorities allege Mzoudi had connections to Mounir Motassadeq, who faces an Oct. 22 trial on charges of managing a bank account that "transferred large sums of money" to members of Atta's extremist group. Mzoudi also shared a Hamburg apartment with suspected terror-

ists Zakariya Essabar and Ramzi Binalshibh. Essabar remains a fugitive; Binalshibh was arrested in Pakistan last month and is in U.S. custody.

Prosecutors said Mzoudi "was aware of the aim of the group to commit terrorist attacks and supported it logistically."

Surveillance on Mzoudi began a year ago, when Hamburg police - stunned that several of the Sept. 11 hijackers once lived amid the city's mosques and alleys - began wiretapping suspected radicals.

# Al-Qaida's latest message focuses on Iraq, survival of key leader

After a summer of silence, al-Qaida leaders are back on the Mideast air waves, framing their latest anti-American message around a possible war with Iraq.

Experts say the terrorist network is on a renewed public relations campaign aimed at keeping itself in the public eye and associated with events which could turn the Arab public against the United States.

U.S. counterterrorism officials believe the tapes - coinciding with the one-year anniversary of the war in Afghanistan - are a sign of al-Qaida's leadership asserting it is still viable to its rank-and-file followers.

Last month, the al-Jazeera network aired voice recordings of Osama bin Laden and top al-Qaida operatives. The CIA authenticated bin Laden's voice, but officials said the recordings probably weren't made recently.

U.S. officials have not verified bin Laden's whereabouts this year and say a previously aired videotape of him having dinner with his associates in early November in Afghanistan is the last absolutely certain sign he

was alive.

Those thought to be alive because of their recent recordings include bin Laden's No. 2, Ayman al-Zawahiri, and his spokesman Sulaiman Abu Ghathib.

A U.S. official said this week that a recent recording from al-Zawahiri appears to be genuine and made in the last few weeks.

The recording, obtained by Associated Press Television News, was produced by a shadowy production company behind previous al-Qaida videotape. But the format of the al-Zawahiri recording is entirely different from the videos released in April which were crude, 30-minute compilations of violent images strung together with Quranic verses and old footage of bin Laden.

The latest disc features snapshots of al-Zawahiri and news footage of anti-American protests while he is heard answering an interviewer's questions about America's aims in the region and its future.

The interview runs for a brief five minutes and ends abruptly with the juxtaposition of two images: the collapse of the World

Trade Center and Israeli bulldozers destroying a Palestinian home.

Speaking about Iraq, he accused Washington of seeking to subjugate the Arab world on behalf of Israel - America's strongest supporter in the region.

"The campaign against Iraq has aims that go beyond Iraq into the Arab Islamic world," al-Zawahiri is heard saying. "Its first aim is to destroy any effective military force in the proximity of Israel. Its second aim is to consolidate the supremacy of Israel."

Mohammed Salah, an Egyptian journalist who covers militant movements for the respected Arab daily Al-Hayat, said the tape was an attempt to piggyback on to world events and drive them in the direction of holy war.

"They are trying to convince people that they're cause also includes fighting for the Iraqi and that this is the only way to keep Americans out of the region."

At the same time, Salah said, the organization "is trying to tell the world that they are still strong, that they are a network that is everywhere, not an army that can be conquered."

# American radio will seek young Iranians

"These surveys inspired us to try the same idea in Iran," said board member Norman Pattis, founder and chairman of Westwood One Inc., the largest U.S. radio network.

The challenges and potential in Iran are clearly evident.

Iran's powerful clerics have relentlessly vilified America - the "Great Satan" - since the 1979 Islamic Revolution. Chants of "Death to America" still resonate with some groups, particularly the deeply religious classes convinced that the United States is an enemy of their faith.

But many younger Iranians

don't feel so threatened; American culture - fashion, music, political freedoms - is absorbed via the Internet, clandestinely imported Western magazines and satellite television channels from the large U.S. Iranian community.

On Sept. 10, the Voice of America began its own youth-oriented satellite TV broadcasts to Iran called "Next Chapter."

The potential audience is huge. About half of Iran's citizens were born after the revolution. They have no memory of its seminal events: The collapse of the U.S.-backed monarchy and the 44-day hostage crisis at the U.S. Embassy that severed diplomatic relations.

Last month, a poll by an Iranian government-run research group found nearly 75 percent of respondents favored improved ties with the United States. A court then closed the polling firm.

Trend could be sign of tough holiday season

**NEW YORK** - Shoppers, spooked by stock market plunges, the prospect of war in Iraq and a weak job market, held tight to their pocketbooks in September, leaving stores with dismal sales and indicating a difficult holiday season could be ahead.

As the nation's retailers reported September sales Thursday, department stores and apparel stores were hit the hardest. Discounters Wal-Mart Stores Inc., Target Corp. and Kohl's Corp. also posted disappointing results.

"Consumers are unwilling to spend, and if they do, they are only buying necessities," said Walter Loeb, president of retail consulting firm Loeb Associates.

The weak performance led several merchants to reduce their

attacks, rose only 0.9 percent. Same-store sales are sales at stores opened at least a year. They are considered the best indicator of a retailer's health.

While discounters produced disappointing results for September, they still fared better than other mall-based apparel stores.

Wal-Mart announced same-store sales rose 3.3 percent, less than the 3.5 percent increase forecast by Thomson First Call. Kohl's same-store sales decreased 3.2 percent, in line with expectations. Target's same-store sales were down 0.8 percent, slightly better than the 1.1 percent decline Wall Street expected. TJX's same-store sales were down 1 percent and Sears' same-store domestic sales were down 5.9 percent.

Among other stores' same-store sales: Gap (Old Navy parent) down 2 percent; Federated unchanged; J.C. Penney's department store business down 3.1 percent; May Department Stores down 6.2 percent; and Talbots down 6.1 percent.

## FCC rejects proposed satellite TV merger

**WASHINGTON** - The Federal Communications Commission rejected on Thursday a proposed merger between EchoStar Communications Corp. and Hughes Electronics Corp., scuttling a \$18.5 billion deal that would have created the nation's largest pay-TV service.

The FCC vote was 4-0. It was the first time the commission had rejected a major media merger since 1970, a commission attorney said.

Based on the record, the commission cannot find the merger is in the public interest," FCC chairman Michael Powell said.

The companies said in a statement they plan to continue pursuing the deal, taking advantage of a 30-day window in which they can file an amended proposal with the FCC.

"The whole point is everyone is going to put forth best efforts to get this deal and all the companies want to see this merger approved. We're still moving in that direction," said Hughes spokesman Richard Dore.

Both companies also plan to continue negotiations with the Justice Department, which is scrutinizing the deal's compliance with antitrust laws, Dore said. The companies have agreed, Jan. 21, 2003, as a condition of approval of the deal, but that can be changed by the boards.

EchoStar, based in Littleton, Colo., runs Dish Network, while EchoStar's parent, Hughes, operates DirecTV. Together, they serve about 18 million subscribers, including ones in Magic Valley.

Opponents said a merger would create a monopoly in many areas, particularly in rural places without access to cable television.

"Those Americans would be left with only one choice for their subscription services now and in the foreseeable future," Powell said.

The FCC will send its findings to an administrative law judge before whom EchoStar and DirecTV can make their case in favor of the merger. The judge's ruling would then be sent back to the commission for a final vote.

EchoStar and Hughes also have 30 days to file an amended application to address the FCC's concerns.

In promoting their plan, the companies offered uniform pricing nationwide to ease fears that its dominant market position would be used to gouge consumers where no alternative was available.

EchoStar and Hughes also said a merger would produce a more viable alternative to cable television. And they said they would carry local channels in markets such as Magic Valley, where the companies offer services now and provide high-speed Internet access to places not served by cable TV.

The commission was unconvinced by the argument.

"EchoStar and DirecTV not only compete but compete vigorously, not only with cable but with each other," Powell said.

"Others (dollar stores) have failed here, but they didn't start with a big enough inventory," she said.

Location is also a key factor, Ernie Sadler said.

## Investors seek to buy truck company

**FORT WORTH, Texas** - A group of investors that includes two businesspeople from Fort Worth and Dallas is proposing to buy Consolidated Freightways Corp. out of bankruptcy and return the company's trucks to the road.

"Rollin' International, a company created specifically to make the purchase, has offered \$500 million for the 73-year-old trucking company, including its air freight division, spokesman Frank Snell said.

Snell said the Metroplex Investors represent about 40 percent of the group, with the rest coming from private investors elsewhere in the United States and Mexico.

"I don't believe that the company will be a profitable investment," said a spokesman for the group. "Our objective was to get operations back on the road in

some form or fashion by Nov. 1." Consolidated, which had a small terminal in Twin Falls, filed for bankruptcy protection in September and immediately fired the bulk of its 15,500 workers.

Vancouver, Wash.-based Consolidated billed itself as the nation's third-largest "less-than-truckload" carrier, combining partial shipments from multiple companies to fill its trucks. It has 350 terminals and 30,000 trucks in the United States, Canada and Mexico.

Snell said Rollin' International's acquisition bid contains two potential price-cutters - \$50 million for the status quo and more than \$20 million if the company has resumed some operations by the time of purchase.

He intended to make that pitch this week to Consolidated's creditors, who will eventually make a recommendation to the court that

is overseeing the company's bankruptcy.

Standard & Poor's analyst James Corridore said it would be difficult for new managers to resuscitate the money-losing freight hauler.

He noted that many customers have given their business to other company's rivals in the past month. And he said Consolidated may be reluctant to give up its entire operation, preferring instead to keep its air freight division and sell other assets separately.

"I don't know that Consolidated wants to come back out of bankruptcy," Corridore said. "There are many parties who can block the sale. There are many parties who would have to agree."

Consolidated spokesman Mike Brown said Monday that the company has stated a preference between selling its entire business or dismantling it piecemeal.

Stocks soar on jobless report

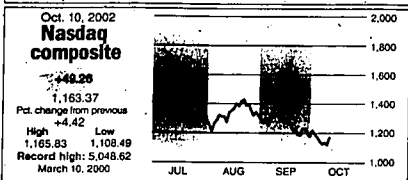
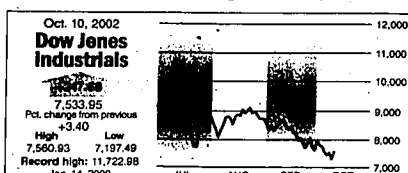
NEW YORK (AP) — Stocks rallied Thursday, boosted by encouraging news on jobless claims and upbeat outlooks from Yahoo! and Aetna. The Dow Jones industrial average rose 248 points a day after dropping to a five-year low.

Analysts said a rebound was expected after Wednesday's steep decline, but doubted it would last given uncertainties such as war with Iraq. Indeed, the Dow lurched lower in early trading before posting solid gains.

"I don't think fundamentally anything has changed from the pessimism of yesterday," said Matt Brown, head of equity management at Wilmington Trust. "The fact is, there are still declining earnings estimates."

"That, along with the uncertainty of an Iraqi war and the terrorism threat, makes it difficult for the market to get moving again."

The Dow Jones industrial average climbed 247.68, or 3.4 percent, to close at 7,533.95, after losing as much as 69 points earlier in the day. The gain more than offset Wednesday's 215-



point decline, which pushed blue chips to their lowest close since October 1997. The broader market also finished sharply higher. The

Nasdaq composite index rose 49.26, or 4.4 percent, to 1,163.37, having reached a fresh six-year low in the previous session. The Standard & Poor's 500 Index

gained 27.16, or 3.5 percent, to 803.22.

The Labor Department reported Thursday that new jobless claims dropped unexpectedly by a seasonally adjusted 10,000 to 384,000, the lowest level in nearly two months. Analysts were expecting claims to rise.

While the report offered investors some hope of an improving job market, Labor Department analyst Thomas Stenge cautioned against reading too much into the decline, saying it may partly reflect difficulties adjusting for seasonal factors.

Meanwhile, Yahoo rose \$2.29 to \$12.27 after the Internet company reported third-quarter profits that beat expectations and raised its year-end predictions for the full year. The news lifted other tech stocks including Intel, which gained 72 cents to \$14.18.

Aetna climbed \$5.11 to \$36.80 after the health insurer said it expected earnings for the third quarter and the rest of 2002 to be higher than analysts' estimates.

The retired Murrough couple's decision to locate a business in Rupert. The couple had owned the Greenwood truck stop for five years but sold it a few years ago.

"We're thriving," said the Burley Honk's 31 manager, Mel Page. "As long as people are willing to save a buck, dollar stores are going to thrive."

Ever-changing merchandise is also a factor. "We have a lot of different items all the time," he said. "It keeps people coming back. It's like Christmas every day with what's coming in that's new."

Rates on 30-year mortgages drop to a new low

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rates on 30-year mortgages fell to a new low this week, offering Americans — who haven't done so — a good reason to jump on the home mortgage refinancing bandwagon.

Mortgage giant Freddie Mac, in its weekly nationwide survey of mortgage rates, reported Thursday that the average interest rate on 30-year fixed-rate mortgages fell to 5.98 percent, the lowest level since Freddie

Mac began tracking these rates in 1971.

That not only was an improvement over last week's average rate of 6.01 percent but also represented the sixth time this year that rates on 30-year mortgages hit record lows. This week's rate barely inched out the prior low of 5.99 percent, which was set at the end of September.

Mortgage rates have been falling amid an uneven economic recovery and a rollercoaster

stock market that has sent investors to the bond market, helping to push long-term rates down.

"The economy appears to be growing, albeit very slowly," said Phil Colwell, economist with the Mortgage Bankers Association of America. "This growth, combined with stock market losses and no signs of inflation, have pushed interest rates down — until there is economic news that leads to a sig-

nificant and sustained stock-market rally, we can expect interest rates to remain near their current levels," he added.

Low mortgage rates are feeding a boom in mortgage refinancing.

"There's an extra cash coming out of refinancing deals is helping to support consumer spending, including home buying, amid uncertain economic times and an eroding consumer confidence."

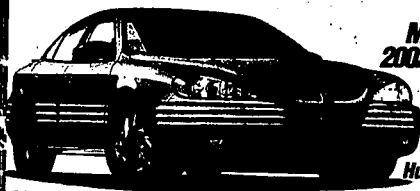

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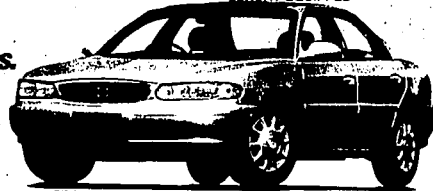

# THE ACES ON BRIDGE

Bobby Wolff

"Banish plump Jack, and banish all the world."

— Shakespeare

Planning the defense against your opponents' contracts is not just a matter of counting, but if you do not start by counting, you will never be able to succeed at the thinking exercise that follows the arithmetic.

Consider the following deal, in which East has to defend against three no-trump. When the spade jack is led to dummy's king, and the club queen is played next, East wins this trick, probably rather to his surprise. At this point the first part of the exercise kicks in; East knows that his partner has the club ace, and since he himself has nine points, with South and dummy also holding 13-cards, West can have virtually nothing else.

Since declarer is threatening to set up the clubs, the defenders have to establish a suit of their own. There seems little future in either spades or diamonds, but how about the hearts? East should try for three heart tricks, but a low heart will not get it done. Declarer will run this to dummy's jack, and the suit will remain under control. So the right way is to lead the heart queen, keeping the jack to yourself.

If South ducks, East follows up with a low heart. But in practice South will take his king and play another club. West will continue hearts when he gets the lead with the club ace, and the defense will have two tricks.

Be awake to this possibility of "surrounding" an opponent's vulnerable honor. It comes up more often than you might think!
