Worry grows of longer war

Top general sounds warning; Bush vows a fight to victory

FORWARD OPERATING BASE SHELL, Iraq — The Army's senior ground commander in Iraq, Lt. Gen. William Wallace, said Thursday that overextended supply lines and a combative adversary using unconventional tactics have stalled the U.S. drive toward Baghdad and increased the likelihood of a longer war than many strategists had anticipated.

"The enemy we're fighting is different from the one we'd war-gamed against," Wallace, commander of V Corps, said during a visit to the 101st Airborne Division headquarters here in

central Iraq. In Washington, meanwhile, President Bush, with British Prime Minister Tony Blair at his

side, said Thursday that troops would stay in Iraq "however long it takes," even as the allies sought to mend global relations torn by the war.

The two leaders also tried to work out differences over how much influence the United Nations should have in Iraq after Saddam Hussein is defeated, officials said. And they worked on a new plan for what some call the real threat to Middle East peace, the conflict between the Israelis and Palestinians.

But the close allies, taking questions together after talks stretched over two days at the

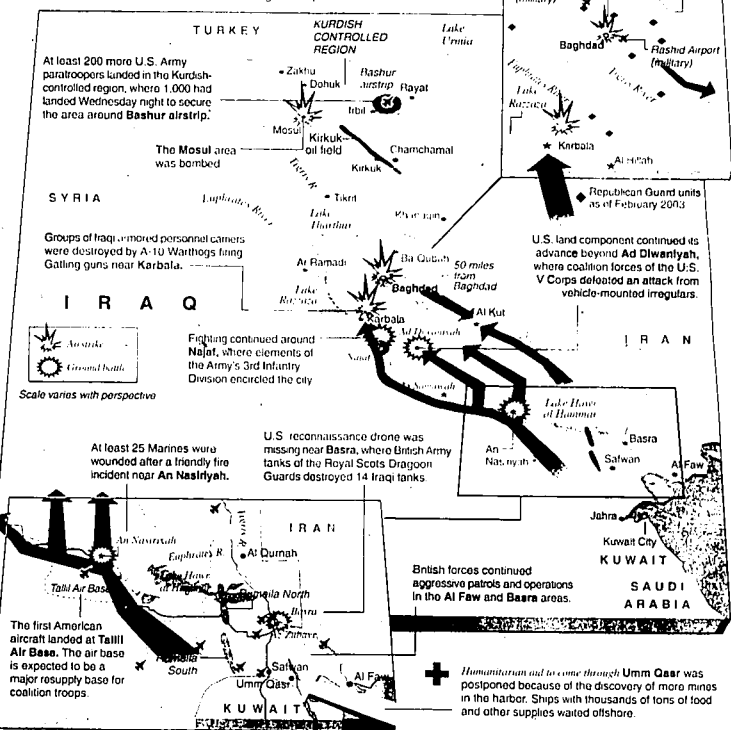

Bill would help farmers deal with high growth

BOISE — Imagine opening up the property tax bill for your home and discovering a sudden increase from \$540 to \$9,000 on just the acre of land on which it sits.

Sen. Clint Stennett, D-Ketchikan, said that's what happened to one of his constituents who lives in southern Blaine County.

There, property values have exploded over the past 15 years. But in addition, the rancher who saw that increase got to pay it three times over because he has a couple of homes for his ranch hands.

That scenario has become a fact of life for all the farmers and ranchers in Blaine County, Stennett said. It's so common that he has a petition with the names of 80 farm families asking for relief on their homes sites, which are assessed at a different rate than the rest of their land.

Stennett visited the House Revenue and Finance Committee last week.

CAFO hearing bill heads to Senate floor

BOISE — Jerome County officials didn't like it, but the Senate Agriculture Committee passed it anyway.

On Thursday, Senate Agriculture Committee members took a look at a House bill requiring every county in Idaho to hold a public hearing before siting a confined animal feeding operation. It is a companion bill to one that would restrict language about concerns of the "local public interest" in Idaho water law to the effect a water transfer or new water right would have on another use of water.

A different version of the bill was passed last week.

U.S. seeks to avoid urban war of attrition

WASHINGTON — U.S. forces are poised to begin the battle for Baghdad by pounding Republican Guard troops on the southern perimeter of the Iraqi capital, hoping that with a crushing blow they can demoralize the remaining forces and avoid a bloody urban battle of attrition.

After a week of breakneck advance and skirmishing, some 75,000 U.S. troops are confronting about 35,000 Iraq soldiers arrayed in three Republican Guard divisions south of the city. Yet tough terrain, new Iraqi tactics, restrictive American rules of combat and limited U.S. forces could make the fight longer and bloodier than U.S. commanders expected.

"It's going to be tough work, dangerous work — we're going to take casualties," warned retired Army Gen. Barry McCaffrey, who commanded a division in the 1991

Persian Gulf War.

The fight promises to be so tough that President Bush could face a momentous military and political decision: whether to move now and maintain momentum but risk heavy casualties, or await the arrival of the 4th Infantry Division, which could be weeks away.

Unless U.S. commanders decide to wait for reinforcements, the air strikes already launched against the dug-in Iraqis could soon be supplemented with an artillery and rocket bombardment. Then, hundreds of U.S. tanks would open a full-scale ground assault, with the goal of destroying most of the Republican Guard's equipment before it could be withdrawn into the city, experts predict.

U.S. leaders are eager to avoid a fight in Baghdad for fear that it would cause huge casualties

Troops kill hundreds during series of battles with Saddam's irregulars

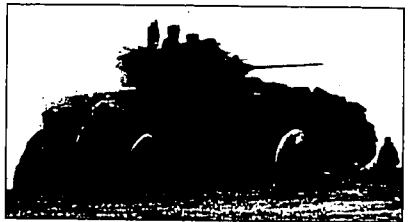
NEAR AN NAJAF, IRAQ — Army units trying to take control of An Najaf, 80 miles south of Baghdad, have killed hundreds of Iraqi men in three days of fighting, including two during a terrible sandstorm.

No U.S. soldier died in the combat, though four tanks were lost, two apparently to laser-guided, Russian-made, anti-tank missiles. The other two ran off bridges into canals during sandstorms.

Soldiers who took part in the battle described what they say in the past few days in words more sorrowful than boastful.

"The Iraqis took it bad. It was suicide," said Pfc. Jonathan Simatos of Los Angeles, who drives a Bradley.

The soldiers described the Iraqi fighters as men in civilian

clothes packed in pickup trucks, cargo trucks, buses with velvet curtains and taxis. They fired at the U.S. soldiers with AK-47s, grenade launchers, anti-tank rockets and mortars as well as 30-year-old, Russian-built tanks.

"Their technology is sad, so outdated," said Sgt. Tony Menendez of Miami, an Abrams tank crew member.

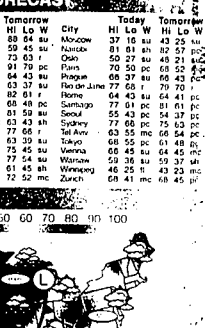

House OKs expanded Amber alert system

WASHINGTON — The House on Thursday overwhelmingly voted to expand nationwide use of the Amber alert system, which enlists the public's help in searching for missing children. The measure was included in a bill meant to detect child abductions and sexual predators.

Though expansion of the alert system has firm support in both the Senate and the House, critics of the bill said that other provisions have been added to it — including minimum sentencing, expansion of wiretap authority

and mandatory sentencing of sex offenders — would prevent it from becoming law.

The bill, approved by the House 418-14, now goes to the Senate, which in January passed legislation that approved only the nationwide expansion of the Amber alert system. The House and the Senate passed similar bills last year, but the legislation died when Congress adjourned without agreeing on a compromise.

A spokesman for Sen. Dianne Feinstein, D-Calif., a co-sponsor of the Senate's Amber alert bill, said the senator had hoped that the

House would approve the alert system expansion in a separate bill, one that "would not have held Amber alert hostage to other legislative agendas."

House Judiciary Committee Chairman F. James Sensenbrenner, R-Wis., co-sponsor of the House legislation, said that he wanted a bill that not only would help recover missing children but would also prevent crimes.

"The bill strengthens penalties against kidnapping and aids law enforcement agencies to effectively prevent, investigate and prosecute crimes against chil-

dren," Sensenbrenner said.

The Amber alert system has been implemented in more than two-thirds of the states, and it gained national attention in August when it helped locate two teenage girls abducted in California.

President Bush commended the House for enacting legislation that would expand the alert system nationwide.

Last year, Bush moved to expand the alert system by making funds available to improve it and asking the Justice Department to name an Amber alert coordinator.

Report: Moussaoui was part of second wave of terror attacks

WASHINGTON — Captured al-Qaida operations chief Khalid Sheikh Mohammed has told his interrogators that accused terrorist Zacarias Moussaoui was not part of the Sept. 11, 2001, hijack group, but was in the United States for a second wave attack, according to sources with knowledge of his statements.

The assertions by Mohammed, self-described mastermind of the terror strikes on New York and Washington, that Moussaoui was preparing for an attack that never occurred could further complicate the federal government's prosecution of Moussaoui, experts said. The French-Moroccan has been indicted on charges he conspired with other al-Qaida operatives to murder Americans.

If allowed in court, Mohammed's statements could bolster Moussaoui's claim that he was not responsible for the deaths on Sept. 11, 2001, making it more difficult for the government to prove he committed a capital offense, his attorney and other legal experts said.

Andrew McBride, a former prosecutor, said Mohammed's claim would be likely to undermine the government's claim that Moussaoui was part of an overarching al-Qaida conspiracy to attack U.S. targets, but, he said, "on the death penalty, it is quite helpful to Moussaoui."

Teen who disappeared says she left home, then became a captive

RED SPRINGS, N.C. (AP) — A girl who vanished at age 11 and recently turned up in Mexico — now 15 years old, and with two children — says she left home with an adult neighbor after becoming pregnant by him and was then kept as a virtual captive.

Before Dana Pevia came home to Raeford, N.C., this week, her family had not seen her since she walked to the school bus just after 6 a.m. on June 4, 1999. They thought she had been kidnapped, possibly killed.

But since coming home Wednesday to a tearful reunion with her mother, Dana has told authorities that she left with her neighbor, Hector Majarro Frausto, now 22.

She had been involved with Frausto, and shortly before she disappeared she told him she had been getting sick every morning. Hoke County Sheriff Hubert Peterkin said Thursday, suspecting Dana was pregnant, arranged for them to travel to his family home in Mexico, Peterkin said.

She went along with the situation and realized it was a problem once she was on a plane to Mexico," Peterkin said after interviewing the girl.

When she disappeared, Dana was just short of her 12th birthday and was attending sixth grade at West Hoke Middle School.

That was the last her mother,

Wanda Pevia, knew until earlier this month, when Dana showed up at the U.S. Consulate General's office in Guadalajara. Consulate officials contacted the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children, which contacted the Hoke County sheriff's office.

On Wednesday night, Wanda Pevia was finally reunited with her daughter — and her two new grandchildren — at the Raleigh-Durham International Airport.

"Oh, my god, my baby, my baby," Wanda Pevia repeated as she and her daughter embraced, tears streaming down both their faces.

Dana declined to speak to reporters then or at the sheriff's Thursday news conference. But Peterkin said she told authorities that after a couple of months in Mexico, Frausto abandoned her with his relatives. They abused her and wouldn't allow her to leave, the sheriff said.

Hackers replace Arab TV net site with U.S. flag

WASHINGTON (AP) — Hackers wreaked electronic havoc Thursday on Internet sites operated by the Arab television network Al-Jazeera, diverting Web surfers to pornography and to a page with a U.S. flag and the message "Let Freedom Ring."

Hackers impersonating an Al-Jazeera employee tricked one of the Internet's most popular Web addressing companies, Network Solutions Inc., into making technical changes that effectively turned over temporary control of the network's Arabic and English Web sites.

The changes — similar to replacing exit signs on a highway to misdirect travelers — were to be fixed by midnight. But it was expected to be at least 12 hours afterward before Al-Jazeera's sites would properly be available worldwide, said Brian O'Shaughnessy, a spokesman for Network Solutions.

Hackers calling themselves the "Freedom Cyber Force Militia" initially redirected Internet traffic destined for Al-Jazeera's Web site in English to a different Web page on computers operated by Network Connections Inc., an Internet provider in Salt Lake City. That site was shut down hours later.

Academy chief says he did not punish victim

AIR FORCE ACADEMY, Colo. (AP) — Air Force Academy commandant Brig. Gen. Sylvanus Taco Gilbert III disputed suggestions that he punished sexual assault victims at the school or blamed them for being attacked.

"I know that those stories are out there," Gilbert told The Denver Post for Thursday's editions.

"We have always tried to support our victims, and when we get an allegation — every one that has come to me — I have investigated every single one. I have taken every single one of them to the fullest extent of the law that I could."

Gilbert, 46, is among a handful of Air Force officials being replaced or reassigned in the wake of criticism over how the academy has handled reports of sexual assaults. The shakeup was disclosed to the Senate Armed Services Committee at a briefing Tuesday.

Dozens of female cadets have told the office of Sen. Wayne Allard, R-Colo., that they were ostracized or punished after they reported assaults.

173rd Airborne lands in north, with oil field in mind

NEAR IRBIL, Iraq - After falling out of the sky and sleeping in the mud, American paratroopers grabbed a strategic air base on Thursday and began plotting how to crack the Iraqi defenses...

Bradley fighting vehicles. It took hours to dig out the behemoth weapons after they plummeted into vast mud fields created by heavy rainstorms.

For the next several days, military officials say, the Army will stockpile the airstrip with more weaponry and supplies. A C-130 transport plane landed Thursday, as did 200 more Americans soldiers.

The paratroopers descended because Turkey, a longtime U.S. ally, has refused to allow some 60,000 U.S. ground troops to cross into Iraq.

That changed Thursday. American troops began the day wearing muddy uniforms tinged with frost. They fanned a valley nesting the airstrip, surrounded by snowcapped mountains.

By midday, an Iraqi hilltop position had fallen. From that site, Iraqi troops had fled from Kurdish civilians since the 1990s.

tank gunner. "I saw their faces and I felt so bad for them." With the sandstorms gone Thursday, elements of the 3rd Infantry Division began sweeping the town's outskirts in an effort to stop hit-and-run attacks by Iraqi loyalist forces that had disrupted the main supply route for U.S. forces advancing to Baghdad.

The rules of engagement were clear: don't shoot anyone who isn't armed; if they are armed, shoot them.

"We're looking for black flags, black uniforms and people with weapons," one commander told his troops. More fighting is expected today. Troops here reported that a column of 50 Iraqi tanks left An Najaf and were within 20 miles of an American supply post to the west of the town.

Since Monday, 3rd Squadron, 7th Cavalry Regiment, known simply as the 3-7, has been met again and again with resistance from Iraqis in pickup trucks and curbside-lined buses.

The Republican Guard units are within 50 miles of Baghdad. They include the Medina Division near Karbala, and the Baghdad Division toward Kut. A few miles behind them, in a supporting role, is a third division.

Arrayed against the Iraqis are the U.S. 3rd Infantry Division, south of Karbala, and the 1st Marine Expeditionary Force, moving into position to the east, south of Kut. Other U.S. units, including troops of the 101st Airborne Division and a Marine brigade, bring the total force near Baghdad to about 75,000 troops, said Daniel Goure, a former Pentagon official now with the Lexington Institute research firm.

Camp David presidential retreat, Bush and Blair said future plans should wait for victory in Iraq.

Asked repeatedly whether that could take months, Bush testily replied: "However long it takes to achieve our objective. And that's important for you to know, the American people to know, our allies to know, and the Iraqi people to know."

Questions about the duration of the war have become louder in recent days, shaped in part by televised images of increasing civilian and military deaths, brutal desert fighting, and the prospect of a long and bloody siege of Baghdad.

Wallace told the Washington Post the duration of the current pause will depend on advice from his logisticians. Another senior commander suggested that a 35-day strategic bombing campaign, similar to that waged before the ground attack in the 1991 Persian Gulf War, would not be preposterous.

Army sources said there is also concern about the wide gap between the Army forces driving up the western edge of the Euphrates River valley and Marines farther east, on the other side of the Euphrates along a road leading to Kut. Additional Army units are en route to Iraq, including the 4th Infantry Division and the 3rd Armored Cavalry Regiment, but it will be weeks before any substantial additional combat power moves into the fight.

Wallace described an opponent willing to make suicidal attacks against superior U.S. forces while also using threats to generate opposition to the U.S. and British invaders. "I'm appalled by the inhumanity of it all," he said, noting that intelligence reports indicate Iraqis loyal to President Saddam Hussein are giving out weapons and forcing others

a small building. But there were few reports of U.S. casualties in combat actions throughout Iraq as poorly armed Iraqis tangle with U.S. troops.

"The lesson is, never drop your guard," said Army Spec. Timmy Melia. "All it takes is one straggler. The straggler will get you killed."

Compounding the fear was the sizable number of Iraqis passing along with the road near the depot caught with cell phones and hand-held global positioning locators. Rolls of American and Iraqi money have also been found on some them. Information on the whereabouts of prime U.S. targets has become a lucrative business in Iraq during the past week.

two years ago, but it exempted Jerome County from the public hearing requirement. The updated version, sponsored by Rep. Bert Stevenson, R-Rupert, also requires every county to adopt CAFE ordinances before siting CAFE's.

Jerome County Commissioners Veronica Lierman and John Elorietta told the Senate Agriculture committee they have had a system in place for 12 years that they do not require public hearings.

"We moved away from public hearings because everyone always walked away frustrated," said Lierman, commission chairwoman.

She explained that nothing was ever settled when applicants, neighbors and planning and zoning officials weren't qualified to settle issues that people complain about, she said.

administrator. Two have gone to court after appeal hearings were held.

Lierman and Elorietta said the appeal hearings are more controlled than what would be required in House Bill 283 if it becomes law because people are only allowed to speak to the specific issues they are protesting. The commissioners said they have never heard any complaints about Jerome County's process.

Elorietta, who is an attorney, also spoke for the Idaho Association of Counties. Officials from the counties like public comment, he said, but the counties' stance is that elected public officials are qualified to respond to constituents' comments. That is why Jerome County is once again

relying on a citizens' committee to update its CAFE ordinance. Those kinds of decisions are better kept at the local level, he said.

But Sen. Tom Gannon, R-Buhl, pointed out that county officials have for decades been held to legislation designed by the Legislature to establish consistency in every county.

"What about subdivisions? Would you want that out of Idaho Code?" Gannon asked.

And Elorietta conceded the appreciative regulations at the state level that govern subdivisions.

However, "This is just taking (state control) another step," Elorietta said.

The final vote that passed the bill to the floor was 5 to 2, with all local senators approving it, with the exception of Sen. Fred Kennedy, D-Mountain Home. Kennedy said he would prefer to keep the hearings in the Idaho Department of Water Resources with the local public interest law remaining as it is.

Marines move north, see civilian casualties

AS SHATRA, Iraq - The northward march of Marines through Mesopotamia has been three days of constant fighting, leaving a trail of havoc and enemy casualties.

A 4,000-man U.S. Marine regiment won a decisive battle Tuesday for control of this Baath Party stronghold without loss of American lives. After daylong fighting, the central Iraqi town was desolate and littered with charred vehicles and the bodies of Iraqi soldiers and civilians.

But on Thursday key supply routes leading here from the south still weren't entirely secure, and the Marines' progress was slow.

The 1st Battalion 4th Marines, based at Camp Pendleton, Calif., arrived outside the town Tuesday morning and immediately began taking fire from a nearby field. A three-hour firefight ensued amid the 1st Battalion 11th Marines and 25 mm guns from the 2nd Light Armored Reconnaissance unit.

In the morning, the Iraqis fired small arms and two rocket-propelled grenades toward oil trucks near the Marines' command center. The Marines responded with Howitzer fire, then rolled into As Shatra to mop up remaining enemy elements. A poster of Saddam Hussein and enemy fire greeted them, but they suffered no major injuries among the troops.

Iraqis suffered much more. The Marines found several families whose vehicles had been caught in the crossfire. At least two people in civilian clothing were dead at the scene. A woman who appeared to be her mother stood over her body moaning and chanting prayers. The victims were to be airlifted to a military hospital for further treatment, but weather conditions prohibited evacuation. Instead, they were transferred to a combat support center.

Among the wounded were an elderly woman, a baby and a woman who died at the treatment site. A woman who appeared to be her mother stood over her body moaning and chanting prayers. When the Marines left, charred vehicles sat at the roadside, including a bus that held skeletal remains. The carnage included dead women and children and several men in the black pajamas-style uniforms of Iraqi paramilitary. The U.S. military had found the wrists of some surviving men who were considered potential combatants.

"I thought it would be quicker," said Parks, from Philadelphia. "It's like in Vietnam," he added: "You can't understand their methods because they're so devoted to their cause."

The convoy of amphibious assault vehicles and soft-back Humvees sped into the city around midnight Monday, stopping at a checkpoint for a security briefing. For crew chief John Massey, an enlisted reservist from Florida, the worst point was not the battle that followed but "at that last checkpoint - 1 Iraq over a dead body." He said the victim was wearing civilian clothes and appeared to have already been run over.

An amphibious vehicle broke down - in hot enemy territory - renounced help by another battalion. Just ahead, a house in the city center that had been hit by artillery spewed balls of orange fire. As the convoy paused for 20 minutes, more mortars were shot toward houses in the city center, from which gunfire had been heard. Then the Marines blazed a trail of fire through a hail of bullets whizzing over their heads. Seeing a resister holding a poster of Saddam, Hospitalman 3rd Class Erik Van Houten opened up with his M16 from the hatch of his amphibious assault vehicle.

Soon Van Houten and everyone else around him had expended four or five magazines of bullets - roughly 100 rounds apiece - at people who, through the Marines' night vision goggles, appeared to be threats. Two Marines from other units who were in nearby houses were reported to have suffered "friendly fire" bullet wounds to the leg and arm. No other American casualties were reported.

"The guys behind us said they saw stuff flying over our heads and hit the guy who was firing us," said Lance Cpl. Ashton Boucher.

Soldier describes capture of Iraqi troops

LANDSTUHL, Germany — A U.S. Army sergeant Thursday described how he captured four Iraqi soldiers by himself near Nasiriyah on Saturday after a rocket-propelled grenade blew him out of his Humvee and left him with a serious shrapnel wound in his left arm.

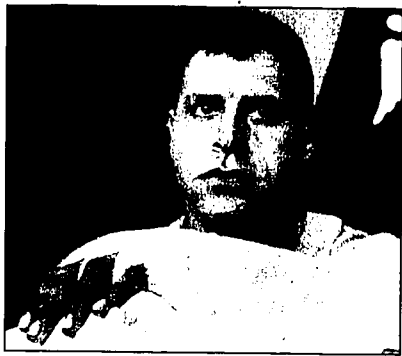
The prisoners were concealing Iraqi military uniforms under civilian robes, he said.

Sgt. Jamie Villafane and two other injured servicemen spoke to a news conference at a U.S. Army hospital here, where they are being treated before returning to the United States. He said his training had prepared him well to be in combat, but he had no desire to return to battle after being wounded.

"Getting shot at wasn't really that bad. It was the getting shot that sucked," he said.

Villafane and his guide, Sgt. Charles Horton, were in a Humvee on a bridge south of Nasiriyah when the attack took place. They saw some men dressed in civilian clothes who were acting nervous, and running away from them. Moments later, the Humvee was struck by the RPG round.

"It blew me out of the truck. I

was a little dazed," Villafane, 31, of Brentwood, N.Y., said. Shortly thereafter, a wire-guided rocket whizzed by, hitting a truck next to him. "It was pretty close. I got to

see the wire as it went by." Though aware his arm was injured, he got up and went down under the bridge where he "got the jump" on an enemy soldier.

"He was looking one way, and I happened to be looking directly at him," Villafane said. He dropped his AK-47, and then three more appeared. They surrendered, too, when "they saw I already had one guy at gunpoint," Villafane said.

"The guys I caught, it was four guys against me. They dropped their guns right away. You could see they were terrified," he said. Villafane, whose left arm was swathed in a large bandage, suffered nerve damage and will probably need skin grafts.

Villafane went back up to the bridge, where Horgan helped him put on an initial bandage even though Horgan's foot had been badly wounded. Horgan, 21, of Helena, Mont., saw the RPG round just as it was coming in. At first, he said, "I thought I was going to die," but then he realized the round was aimed low and he was likely to suffer foot injuries.

The blast hurled him up on top of the vehicle. "I looked down, and realized I still had my legs. I was pretty relieved about that," Horgan said.

The third injured serviceman was Marine Lance Cpl. Joshua Menard, 21, of Houston. He suffered a bullet wound while guarding a bridge in Nasiriyah on Monday.

Anti-war activists block NYC's Fifth Avenue

NEW YORK (AP) — Hundreds of chanting demonstrators lined Manhattan's Fifth Avenue on Thursday, and dozens lay down in the street in a "die-in" to protest the war.

Officers, some in riot gear and on horseback, clamped plastic handcuffs onto about 150 protesters who refused to get up and half-carried them into police vehicles.

Anti-war groups also called for other civil disobedience in the city to protest media and corporate "profiteering from the war."

As helicopters hovered overhead, the protesters — some beating drums or chanting "Hey-hey, ho-ho, Bush's war has to go!" — jammed police pens near St. Patrick's Cathedral and the Saks Fifth Avenue store.

Organizers of the loose coalition, which calls itself M27, said the "die-in" was intended to symbolize Iraqi war victims. A single lane of Fifth Avenue was reopened to traffic after about a half-hour.

Later, a small group staged a mock funeral march, and some protesters took up a "no business as usual" theme, including a dozen who blocked an entrance to Tiffany's. But most protesters left the area promptly, and there was little disruption around midtown by late morning.

Organizers said the civil disobedience was aimed at getting their message out. "Nothing else gets attention," said Johannah Westmacott. "It's not news when people voice their opinions."

The demonstration attracted several counterprotesters, including a man with a red, white and blue bandanna under a hardhat who argued toe-to-toe with a young protester with a pony tail and sideburns.

One counterprotester held a sign that read: "Traitors, have you forgotten Sep. 11?"

"Whether you're for or against it, we need to pull together," said Rachel Harary, 20. "Put on your flag and get them home."

Some protest signs were directed at the media. One protester held a sign showing a picture of parrots and the words, "Don't Parrot the Right-wing Propaganda."

Another, 44-year-old teacher Lee Whiting, held up a sign that said, "Embedded? Or In Bed?" Embedded, she said, means "journalists are presenting almost exclusively the military view of this war."

Elsewhere, about 4,000 Lebanese children chanted "Death to America" and waved flags from the Islamic militant group Hezbollah in Beirut, Lebanon, in one of the daily protests in the Middle East since the start of the war. Thousands of Palestinians also marched in the West Bank and Gaza Strip, urging Saddam Hussein to attack Israel with chemical weapons.

Thousands of others demonstrated in a half-dozen Middle Eastern countries, including Egypt, Jordan and Yemen.

About 10,000 people in Bahrain, led by torbaned Muslim clerics, marched through the diplomatic district of Manama chanting "Down! Down! USA!" and carrying black flags in a gesture of mourning for Iraqi casualties. They also burned U.S. flags and an effigy of Bush.

The Gulf island of Bahrain is home to the U.S. Navy 5th Fleet. There also were some demonstrations in South American countries, Indonesia and Spain.

Anti-Saddam officials rebuke U.S. battle strategy

SALAHUDDIN, Iraq — Iraq's U.S.-endorsed opposition has distanced itself from the Bush administration's war strategy, suggesting the plan to conquer the country without involving the Iraqi public has opened the way for military problems in the south.

Opposition organizations all desired direct Iraqi involvement in the war. Just how much popular resistance they could have mustered remains an open question. But from their offices here in the Kurdish-controlled area of northern Iraq, the groups have expressed little surprise that Iraqi civilians appear reluctant to give allied forces, much less take up arms to expel government militias and soldiers from their midst.

The opposition groups — loosely

allied Kurdish, Shiite Muslim and secular organizations — have long insisted that most Iraqis look forward to the ouster of President Saddam Hussein and his security-heavy Baath Party government. But they have expressed irritation that, in their view, the Bush

administration has made little effort to include Iraqis in military or political strategy.

"There is a difference between a war of liberation and a war of conquest. Liberation means Iraqis are at the forefront. Conquest means the invaders are in charge," said Hoshyar Zubari, an official of the Kurdistan Democratic Party, one of five groups recognized by the Bush administration as allied opposition forces and one of two Kurdish organizations that have administered a 17,000-square-mile region of northern Iraq that has been protected by U.S. and British air patrols since the end of the 1991 Persian Gulf War.

Unsubstantiated reports from the southern city of Basra, Iraq's second largest city, claim the beginnings of a revolt. Its strength, if any, is impossible to gauge.

Opposition leaders regard Basra, largely populated by Shiite Muslims, as one of several southern cities ripe for rebellion. Saddam's army cracked down harshly on Shiites after a failed 1991 uprising following Iraq's defeat in the Gulf War.

Opposition officials say numerous underground anti-government groups operate in the south.

They complain the Bush administration has been cautious about fomenting an uprising. As recently as Tuesday, Pentagon officials urged Iraqis to remain in their homes.

"There's a total lack of Iraqi involvement," said Ziaab Sattina, an aide to Ahmed Chalabi, who heads the Iraqi National Congress, an opposition group based in London. "We have been surprised over the months the lack of cooperation with the opposition."

Mines delay arrival of food, water

ON BOARD RFA SIR GALAHAD (AP) — British officials reluctantly postponed the start of a seaborne relief operation Thursday after discovering Iraqi mines in the shipping channel leading to the recently captured Iraqi port of Umm Qasr.

Air Marshal Brian Burridge, commander of British forces in the Persian Gulf, said two mines were discovered and detonated Wednesday during a sweep of the waterway by Royal Navy divers, who were being assisted by mine-detecting dolphins.

Burridge said further sweeping would be needed before waiting ships can dock at Umm Qasr with thousands of tons of food and other supplies for distribution to civilians in southern Iraq.

The Sir Galahad, a British Royal Navy ship loaded with humanitarian supplies, would not be able to reach port and deliver food supplies until Friday, said the ship's captain, Roger Robinson-Brown.

The port is vital to the feeding of the country, he said. The newly discovered mines can be programmed to count the number of hulls that pass over them and detonate at certain

point, U.S. Brig. Gen. Vincent Brooks told a briefing at Central Command in Qatar. Iraq developed the mines "from another country's designs" even after U.N. sanctions had been imposed, Brooks added.

"Before 1991, Iraq did not have these," he said.

A first trickle of U.S. and British food and water has reached civilians in the region — arriving via a seven-truck convoy Wednesday from Kuwait. Beyond Iraq's western border in Jordan, thousands more tons of grain have piled up in warehouses, mountains of white sacks waiting for what may be history's biggest humanitarian operation.

Crowds mobbed two British water tanker trucks that entered the port city of Umm Qasr on

Wednesday. "Not enough, please! We need a good water supply!" one man told British officials.

In the nearby town of Safwan, a five-truck Kuwaiti Red Crescent Society convoy, loaded with 45,000 boxes of food, was swarmed by hundreds of Iraqis, many of them shoeless, dirty young men who fought over the white boxes as soon as the truck doors opened.

That kind of desperation, and the televised scenes of wartime havoc from Baghdad to Basra, made it clear that an urgent need was building.

"We can spring into action with 48 hours' notice," relief official Khaled Mansour, in Jordan, said of an ambitious U.N. plan to rush massive amounts of food aid into Iraq.

Aid agencies have long worried of a humanitarian crisis in Iraq, where 12 years of economic sanctions have left some 60 percent of the 22 million people dependent on government rations distributed under the U.N.'s oil-for-food program.

Apply some political heat to cool off school lawsuit

Let's start with the premise that most Idaho citizens don't want hundreds of millions of dollars in tax increases for school construction.

The evidence for this premise is ample. Idahoans consistently seat a lopsided Republican majority in the state Legislature.

Also, when Robert Huntley was the Democratic candidate for governor in 1998, voters enthusiastically sent him packing, back to his Boise law office.

Thwarted in the political arena, Huntley has since been using the courts to pursue a goal the citizens clearly don't want. He and a small group of school districts, abetted by a sympathetic Boise judge, are steadily pressing the Idaho Legislature toward a huge payoff.

The stated goal of the school facilities lawsuit is to hold the state responsible for rebuilding dilapidated schools. This is a polite way of saying Huntley and his liberal friends want to harness the power of state government to:

- 1. Raise taxes.
 - 2. Redistribute money, from Idaho communities that already maintain sound school buildings, to those that do not.
 - 3. Strip local voters of the power to say, "no," to projects they don't want.
- So far, Idaho's political leaders have jostled politely with Huntley in court. They have negotiated. They have provided help to financially struggling school districts.

These approaches are not working. Huntley, wielding his lawsuit as a bludgeon, continues extorting Idaho taxpayers. And here's the big irony: Idaho taxpayers are paying him to do it.

Huntley's clients in this lawsuit are school districts, Superintendents and school boards in those districts are using, in this case to override the will of Idaho voters.

So we have a little suggestion. Maybe Idaho's political leaders ought to drag this debate back to the political arena, where it belongs.

communities, to tell local voters how much damage this lawsuit could do.

If necessary, replace some school board members. If necessary, fire some superintendents.

Some people will say this idea is dirty pool. They'll say you shouldn't politicize a court case.

But this court case is already as political as it can get. It's nothing more than a court-house manifestation of Democratic Party politics.

Idaho citizens don't want multimillion-dollar tax increases, right? Then let's not let it happen.

A battle for the middle ground

Years ago, I worked for an editor who ibbed me about having been a Marine Corps sergeant in Vietnam, a rarity in any newsroom. "The Marines," he said with a roll of his eyes. "They are the madness on the periphery that protects the sanity of the center."

The remark is on my mind again now, because I'm not so sure the U.S. Marines represent the wild-eyed periphery these days.

Speaking in terms of culture, not adaptation, I find myself wondering about the center and its place in society. A large share of American political energy has taken flight. From a shared sense of direction, people have dispersed to the self-righteous poles.

It took two presidents and several bloody, unhappy years of Vietnam before 100,000 people demonstrated in the streets for an end to the fighting, or before officers were frayed in their tents in the field. This time we've witnessed both in the opening hours of war.

It took a long time back then before our debates grew so hardened that we turned on the enemy among us -- the messenger, the news media. This time, 30 minutes after the opening salvo on Baghdad I received the first scorching e-mail about a glibbie media misleading a glibbie public -- as if the ability to synthesize random information was a gift accorded only those with a point of view.

What once required years to learn has now come home in days: the limits and political rickets of firepower.

This is the first U.S. military action that I've covered from home terrain, so it could be that I'm mistaking a case of Information Age jitters for something more disturbing. But, still, the only newsmakers who have my empathy without reservation are the young troops, the third-generation working-class military men, the immigrants, the new breed of warrior women, the West Pointers and the other volunteers who have been handed an awful task -- and seem to be conducting themselves with a staid hand than many of those grabbing head-



lines and seeking glory back home.

The war protesters who plunge confrontationally into police lines with their practiced V-formations in the name of peace? Those who spit into the lens of a camera? The counter-protesters who spray-paint the epithet "scum" on the garage door of an immigrant from France? Who gather up CDs from the Dixie Chicks and crush them under a tractor while waving American flags?

Count me out of those TV anti-war protesters. As for what Richard Nixon used to call the "silent majority"? Few people from my generation will accept that mindless label, and

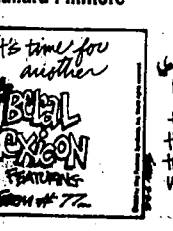

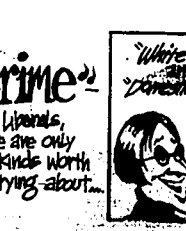

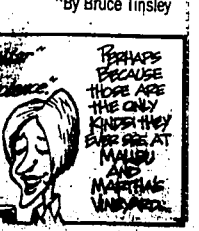

Block scheduling presents multiple problems

There has been some significant discussion regarding Twin Falls High School changing its current class schedule from six periods a day to a 4-by-4 block system, as opposed to seven periods a day, or an A/B alternating block system or combination thereof.

Sequential classes

One of the major concerns is sequential classes. These classes all have the need for building on previously learned concepts. There are schools on the 4-by-4 schedule that have problems with math scores and foreign language proficiencies. If one took Algebra II on the 4-by-4 schedule, one would finish Algebra II at semester break in January. He would take the next sequential math class in September of that year, eight months later. The administration has not shared the research that demonstrates there has been a decrease in test scores with increasing time lapse between sequential classes.

Mr. Devere Burton, director of the College of Southern Idaho's vocational programs, cited an example. He spoke with the principal of schools in the Klamath Falls area. When Mr. Burton asked the superintendent how they liked their 4-by-4 schedule, he learned that they had to stop the 4-by-4 schedule because sequential classes' scores dropped so low while on that

schedule that they had to return to a seven-period, one-hour-per-period schedule. These scores returned to their previous baseline within two years after returning to the traditional schedule.

I interpret that as a significant "red flag" to 4-by-4 block scheduling. This needs further investigation. I also find it worrisome that no other school in the state of Idaho uses the 4-by-4 block schedule.

Music classes

There is a national survey based out of Wisconsin that demonstrated 81 percent of the students rejoining music classes after a single semester absence were significantly behind the other students in skill development and were slow to regain their original proficiency. It was noted that 84 percent of the schools on the 4-by-4 block schedule found it very difficult for students to be enrolled in a music class throughout their high school career and still take the elective and core classes desired. Finally, 65 percent of those schools found that their music performing groups experienced a considerable decrease in

their performance scores and music competitions after switching to the 4-by-4 block schedule.

A/B block schedule

I discussed this with the Cassia County district administration. They did not see significant problems with sequential classes and music performance in their A/B block schedule. They have never had problems with their students carrying eight classes — four on one day and four on the following day. This also more closely parallels college class

schedules and prepares students for that next step. Our junior high schools follow this same schedule.

Class size and money

Currently, teachers are teaching five classes per day, and one period per day is used for preparation time, so that they are actually teaching five-sixths (83.3 percent) of the time. Under the proposed 4-by-4 schedule, the teachers would teach three periods per day and have the fourth period open for preparation time, teaching only 75 percent of the time. This is a 10 percent drop in teacher time with students (83.3 minus 75 equals 8.3, divided by 83.3). Consequently, that decreased teacher-student time ratio must be compensated. We'll either have to hire more teachers to make up the difference in decreased teaching time or have the classroom size increase. How will we find hiring more teachers because of decreased teaching time?

I'm confident that if we will slow down and look at this systematically, with the community and parental help that it deserves, the best and appropriate solutions will be made, students' needs will be met, test scores will improve, and quality education will continue.



Elko property owners may sell land to feds

ELKO, Nev. — Dealing with the issue of federally owned property inside Elko County is not a new issue for local leaders, with the government owning 73 percent of the land.

But now county commissioners are facing a new challenge: the Southern Nevada Public Land Management Act, which brings into play the rights of private property owners to sell land to the federal government.

The act, signed into law in 1998, allows for the sale of designated federal land in the greater Las Vegas Valley to the highest private bidder. Five percent of the proceeds of the sale go into the Nevada Education Fund, 10 percent to the Southern Nevada Water Authority, with the remainder going to the Department of the Interior for the purchase of "environmentally sensitive land in Nevada."

At the time of the program's implementation, former Democratic Nevada Sen. Richard Bryan said it was needed to accommodate the population growth in Clark County and Las Vegas in particular.

This year for the first time, property in Elko County is being considered for acquisition.

The largest proposed property — 28 acres and in cost — considered for federal purchase is the IL Ranch north of Elko. Located in the Bull Run Basin and the northern Independence Mountains, the 35,000 acres are valued at \$100.39 million, and the headwaters of the Owyhee, near the south fork of the Owyhee and the north fork of the Humboldt River are within the property.

Surface landowner Doby George LLC and mineral rights owner Western Exploration recently approached the commission for an endorsement of the proposed transaction. The request brought forth issues of financial impact to the county and the amount of control the county has on private land sales.

Commission Chairman John Ellison, the sole "no" vote on the endorsement, said the decision process on proposed acquisitions is flawed and limits the role of rural counties. He criticized the amount of time for public comment once the acquisition list was made available to the public. The

commission had sought an extension but was turned down.

Ellison explained this week the commission's endorsement is a formality once the list is drawn up, but is important to rural counties should be considered before property is considered for purchase. Any conditions put on the sale once it reaches the public comment stage are not significant because they can easily be ignored, he added.

Commissioner Sheri Eklund-Brown, in making a motion to endorse the sale, added several conditions to the endorsement. One condition stipulated that a trust fund be established to offset financial losses to the county should the property be transferred to the government, since federal property is exempt from county property taxes. IL Ranch owners previously told the county they would voluntarily set up the account.

Cesar Salcehi, county treasurer, said the federal government pays a fee, a payment in lieu of taxes, of 12 cents an acre. While he could not give an estimate of the loss of revenue for the ranch property, he said less desirable pasture land is assessed at \$1.47 per acre.

Commissioner Warren Russell, who acknowledged the rights of landowners to sell property to whomever they chose, said the process is "totally uncharacteristic of the attitude that government should be open, and decisions and the process of making decisions should be available to every citizen."

Ellison said he will continue to fight for changes in the procedure and welcomed the commissioners appointing him a liaison to work with the various agencies responsible for considering which properties to consider in the acquisition process.

In an announcement Tuesday, the Forest Service and Bureau of Land Management said the IL Ranch had not made the preliminary cut for purchase this year but the owners are considering dividing the property for further consideration.

Insanity defense usually doesn't work well in Utah

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Legal experts say Brian David Mitchell — the transient and self-described prophet argued with kidnapping and sexually assaulting Elizabeth Smart — will have a tough time avoiding prison with a defense that claims mental incompetence or insanity.

Either option would be met by a state legal system that's generally unkind to such strategies. Utah law clearly does not allow an insanity defense based on strong religious convictions or an inability to distinguish between right and wrong.

Defense attorneys have refused to discuss publicly how they plan to defend Mitchell. Mitchell, whose polgamist writings have become a focus of the case, is accused of breaking into Elizabeth's home last June, abducting her at knifepoint and sexually assaulting her in the hills behind her home. Mitchell and his wife allegedly kept Elizabeth as Mitchell's second wife for nine months, living a transient lifestyle in Utah and California. They were found March 12 in Sandy, about 15 miles south of Salt Lake City.

Student puts college on line over protest

Caleb Proulx' arrest at anti-war rally breaks honor code at BYU.

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Caleb Proulx knew he risked more than arrest, fines, and court dates when he blocked the entrance to the federal building in Salt Lake City on Monday to protest the war against Iraq.

He may have also gambled his college enrollment. Brigham Young University — the Mormon church-owned school that makes students sign an honor code as a condition of enrollment — is considering kicking Proulx out of school.

The honor code requires that students abide by conservative grooming standards; abstain from drinking alcohol, smoking and having premarital sex; and obey laws. Proulx's arrests break the honor code, and BYU officials are reviewing his case, university spokeswoman Carrie Jenkins said.

Proulx, 22, a junior photography major, knew he risked expulsion when he was arrested with other protesters at the Wallace F. Bennett Federal Building, a favorite spot for anti-war rallies. Propelled by the attack on Iraq,

anti-war protesters in cities across the country have blocked downtown streets and building entrances — often at federal offices or courts — and induced police to arrest them.

"Proulx is not sorry he protested. 'This isn't something I'm repentant for, but I think it was the right thing to do,' Proulx said. 'I respect their needs for the honor code. It was a commitment, and

I'm knowingly breaking it. I think I'm breaking it for a really good reason. I'm not repentant at all.'

In judging a student's case, honor code officers evaluate the student's remorse. Officers try to determine the likelihood the student will commit the same offense, but each case is unique, Jenkins said.

"There's not a golden-rule book when working with the honor

code," Jenkins said. "It's handled on a case-by-case basis."

Proulx has been honest with honor code officers about his protests. He doesn't plan to get arrested again, but he hasn't ruled it out, either.

"I'll accept anything that the university decides," Proulx said. "They know that I'm being open about it."

Monica Proulx, Caleb's mother, has faith that the school will treat her son fairly. She graduated from BYU and attended another Mormon church-owned college. She said she's proud of her son's stance against the Iraqi war.

"Caleb is an adult. He makes his decisions, and he knew there were consequences. He knew what might result when he did it. I think it takes a lot of courage to take a position that wouldn't be totally popular with the people around him."

Caleb Proulx likes attending BYU and hopes to eventually serve a mission for the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.

But he wonders if his views would be more appreciated somewhere else. "The atmosphere on campus isn't very conducive to what I want to do," Proulx said. "What it came down to is that their interests are different from my interests."

Suspect describes affair

Man accused of killing wife, children says his church shunned him

NEWPORT, Ore. (AP) — Christian Longo, accused of killing his wife and three children, took the stand for a second day Thursday in his aggravated murder trial and described an affair he had with his business partner's wife in the spring of 2000.

The two discussed divorcing their spouses and getting married until Longo's wife, Mary Jane, found out about the affair after discovering e-mails on his computer, he said.

She confronted Longo and said she was going to tell elders at the Jehovah's Witnesses church, as well as Longo's father, about the affair, Longo testified.

"She wanted everybody to know what a scumbag I had been," he said, adding that he told Mary Jane he didn't know if he ever loved her.

Longo, 29, has pleaded guilty to killing 34-year-old Mary Jane and their 2-year-old daughter, Madison, around Christmas 2001 and dumping their bodies into shallow waters off the Oregon Coast. But he maintains his innocence in the deaths of 3-year-old Sadie and 4-year-old Zachery.

The defense has not offered any explanation of how Sadie and Zachery died and did not give an opening statement.

Longo said Thursday he eventually ended his affair and reconciled with Mary Jane. He was soon in trouble again, however, when he was convicted of felony forgery in Michigan for passing \$30,000 in bad checks to make payroll at his construction-related business, he said. He was sentenced to probation.

Jehovah's Witness elders learned of the conviction from an article in the local newspaper and "shunned" — or excommunicated — Longo from the church, he said. After that, Longo was not allowed to participate in any spiritual activities with his wife and children.

Driver waives hearing in deadly collision near Boise

CALDWELL (AP) — A man accused of driving the wrong way on Interstate 84 and killing a Caldwell father and daughter will appear April 4 in 3rd District Court.

Edgar Vasquez Hernandez, 30, waived his preliminary hearing Wednesday. He is

charged with aggravated driving under the influence and two counts of vehicular manslaughter in the Feb. 27 crash near Caldwell that killed Shawn Marti, 24, and his 5-month-old daughter, Sage.

Natalie Carter Marti, Shawn's wife, recently came out of a

coma and was able to walk this week in a Boise hospital. But she has yet to learn the fate of her husband and daughter.

Hernandez is being held on \$250,000 bond.

Investigators said alcohol appeared to be a factor in the head-on crash.

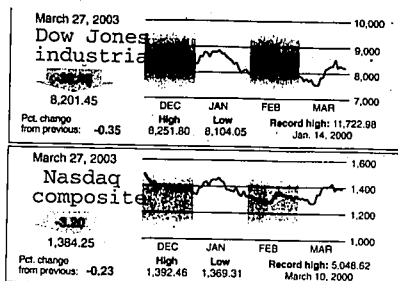
NEW YORK (AP) - Inertia settled over Wall Street Thursday, leaving stocks little changed as the market waited for news indicating allied forces were making progress in Iraq.

Every delay in ending the war is just going to be negative for the market," said Stephen Carl, principal and head of equity trading at The Williams Capital Group.

The Dow Jones Industrial Average closed down 28.43, or 0.3 percent, at 8,201.45. The Dow retreated 50.35 on Wednesday and shed 307.29 on Monday, the worst day in three months.

The market's broader gauge, the S&P 500, posted modest losses. The Nasdaq Composite index fell 3.20, or 0.2 percent, to 1,394.25.

In the last 2 1/2 weeks, investors have gone from feeling euphoric, optimistic the war would be over soon, to deeply fearful that fighting would drag

Miyazaki's magical mystery tour

Prepare to be astonished by "Spirited Away."

Written and directed by one of the world's master animators, Japan's Hayao Miyazaki, this Oscar-winning (Best Animated Feature) visual wonder is the product of a fierce and fearless imagination whose creations are unlike any you've seen before.

If you're dispirited by look-alike, sound-alike, think-alike movies, disturbed by an art form that seems not only to tolerate but also to reward a paucity of imagination, you're not going to believe your luck.

As those who saw Miyazaki's previous "Princess Mononoke" know, a version of Japanese animation is quite different from Americans'. The style is more painterly, the feeling unmistakably Japanese and the mood, even when it's light, is almost never jokey or cartoonish.

Yet, even for Miyazaki, there is something special about "Spirited Away." It's a heroic adventure story worthy of "The Arabian Nights" with an ordinary 10-year-old girl named Chihiro as the heroine. And it's got a magical air of once-upon-a-time, a fairy-tale quality reminiscent of the unexpurgated work of the Brothers Grimm, where boys can turn into dragons, door knockers talk back and even evil spirits can't go back on their word.

green and how much is possible for those who believe.

One more everyday level, "Spirited Away" also shows the potential for dubbing, usually the most generous of film techniques, when it's done sensitively. Under the supervision of "Toy Story's" John Lasseter, a friend of Miyazaki's for 20 years, this film's English-language version shows the original the best kind of respect. The voices chosen are not strident and the believably colloquial dialogue (written by Cindy Davis Hewitt and Donald H. Ketchum resident wins T-N Pick-the-Oscars

It pays to know your cinematography.

John Plunzette of Ketchum correctly predicted that Conrad L. Hall would win the Academy Award for Best Cinematography, a forecast that earned Plunzette the honors in the 10th Annual Times-News Pick the Oscars Contest.

The photography award, along with the Best Animated Film (which Plunzette rightly forecast would be "Spirited Away") were the tiebreakers in this year's Oscar contest, entered by 113 readers.

Four of them, Plunzette included, accurately predicted four of the five major Oscars - Best Picture and the best actor categories - but Plunzette was the only one to get the tiebreakers right.

"I saw Conrad Hall's name on the list, and I thought, 'Is he still alive?' I didn't think much of 'Road to Perdition,' but it looked good."

Plunzette wins two movie tickets and popcorn to go with them.

Susan Reitsma of Twin Falls, last year's Pick-the-Oscar Contest winner, Janis Motern-High of Twin Falls and Carla McDrummond of Kimberly also got four of the five of the major winners right.

The only one Plunzette missed was the Academy Award for Best Supporting Actor, which went to Chris Cooper for "Adaptation" rather than Plunzette's choice, John C. Reilly

for "Chicago."

Plunzette is a 40-year-old freelance writer.

He favors dramas, likes the films of Roman Polanski (this year's winner for Best Director) and Michael Mann ("The Insider" and "Heat") and goes to the movies at last three times a month.

"We're lucky (in the Wood River Valley) in that we've got a pretty sizable community of film-lovers," Plunzette said. "That means we get to see most of the good movies."

As a group, T-N readers accurately forecast the winners of three of the five major awards: "Chicago" for Best Picture, Nicole Kidman and "The Hours" for Best Actress and Catherine Zeta-Jones of "Chicago" for Best Supporting Actress. But they thought that Jack Nicholson should be the Best Actor for "About Schmidt"; Adrien Brody turned out to be the winner for "The Pianist." And collectively, they liked Paul Newman's turn in "The Road to Perdition" for Best Supporting Actor.

If, by the way, you never heard of Conrad L. Hall, you've seen his work.

This is his third Oscar; the last was for photographing "American Beauty" in 1999.

His first Academy Award came 30 years earlier - for "Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid."

irresistible that the parents, suddenly losing all restraint, dig in with savage gusto. "Don't worry," Chihiro's father says between mouthfuls, "you've got daddy here." Then, suddenly, everything goes incredibly wrong, and Chihiro finds herself on her own in this decidedly spectral environment.

In a panic, she comes upon an enormous building and watches in astonishment as a ferry pulls up and unloads one of the strangest cargoes in film history. For the structure turns out to be a bathhouse for the gods, a place where all kinds of nonhuman spirits come to refresh, relax and recharge. Miyazaki shows them all to us with a dazzling

variety that words can't hope to equal.

Coming to her aid is Haku (Jason Marsden), a severe-looking boy in a Prince Valiant haircut. "Don't be afraid, I just want to help you," he says, and Chihiro begins to feel that she and he have met somewhere before.

Haku sends Chihiro to one of the bathhouse's oddest corners, the boiler room, where tiny, skittish motes of dust deliver coal to the furnace one lump at a time and the wily six-armed Kamaji (David Ogden Stiers), looking like a hipster-archivist with his round dark glasses and bushy mustache, is very much in charge.

Kamaji sends Chihiro to see

Yuhaba (Suzanne Pleshette), a strange and powerful witch who runs the bathhouse despite looking like a petticoat-wearing, hair-in-a-bun 19th century Victorian lady. She lives with her gargantuan infant son, Boh (Tara Strong), and three goateed green heads that roll around her apartment for no apparent reason, like a trio of grumbling,

muttering beeh balls.

Chihiro is given a job assisting bathhouse attendant Lin (Susan Egan), and it's here that her adventures truly begin. Starting as a spoiled girl who never worked a day in her life, Chihiro gains in confidence and ability as she copes with the singular challenges Miyazaki has prepared for her.

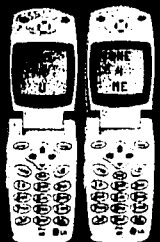





Golden Eagles need improved at-bats in Utah

TWIN FALLS — It's back to business this weekend as the College of Southern Idaho baseball team travels to face Utah Valley State College for a pair of Scenic West Athletic Conference doubleheaders today and Saturday in Orem, Utah.

CSI enjoyed two nonconference doubleheaders against a game yet outmanned Douglas College squad last weekend, going 3-1.

But that is the past. The Eagles (16-10) must continue to improve at the plate in order to be effective with only five weekends left in the regular season.

It comes down to how the team approaches its at-bats. At this point, CSI is

too uneven in its approach for head coach Jim Walker. One game, the team is patient and plays smart at the plate. The next game, the Eagles get overanxious and over-swing or let themselves fall behind in the count.

"We still fight our mentality," Walker said. "They just try to do too much."

All three wins last weekend against the Royals started with the Eagles taking advantage of opportunities in small ball — drag bunts, bloop singles and base-on-balls.

Utah Valley State College (13-11) is similar to the Eagles. Neither club boasts bases-clearing, out-of-the-park power in its lineup.

The Wolverines stumbled to an 0-5 start in SWAC play, dropping a game to Colorado Northwestern last Friday in

Rangely, Colo., before bouncing back with three convincing wins to improve to 3-5. Dixie State swept UVSC in the conference opener the week before.

Utah Valley has beaten CSI 3-2 and 7-2 this season in nonconference games.

ANSWER: Bid one heart rather than making a negative double. A double of an overall of one diamond essentially guarantees 4-4 in the majors, while bidding a major shows only four or more cards. Contrast the position when the opponents overcall a major - now your double shows four in the other major, while bidding a major shows five-plus cards.

Note also that if declarer had played low at trick one, then you would have had to play low as well to preserve your entry to the suit.

Everyone knows that if you are on lead in a trump contract, holding ace-king-fifth with the ace, leading a small card at the first trick makes a lot of sense. The same logic applies when third to play to the opening trick, but sometimes the situation is not so straightforward.

On today's defense there were distinctions to make East's defense harder. Consider what happens when partner leads the heart eight and declarer plays the queen from dummy. It feels so automatic to beat his queen with your king, but wait... This is just the same situation as the one described earlier. From the auction and opening lead, declarer is marked with at least four cards to the 10-9 in hearts. If you win the heart king, you will be able to take only your three winners, and the auction has shown that it is impossible for declarer to contribute two tricks on defense. However, if you play low on the queen, all you will need is for partner to hold the diamond ace. When West gets the lead with that card, he will be able to play another heart, and you will be able to take four more tricks. If partner began bidding on a singleton heart, it is unlikely that you could ever have beaten the contract, whatever you did.
