

Terror suspect can see secret data, judge rules

WASHINGTON — A federal judge ruled Thursday that government prosecutors must turn owe alleged letrorist Zacarias Moussout their top secret plan for gwing him limited access to information from one of the al-Quida networks top lieutenants.







At least seven local soldiers were exposed to a green powder while changing filters designed to protect occupants from chemical and biological substances. The carbon filters contain several types of heavy metals, including the carcinogen chromium VI.

The 13 tanks were part of a shipment of 44 that the National Guard received from a refurbishment facility in Texas.

The Army recommended in July that the filters be changed and upgraded, but added that handling them was not considered hazardous unless the filter was ruptured or otherwise leaking.

Senate approves bill aimed at schools lawsuit

BOISE (AP) - Legislation that would effectively end a 12-year-old class action lawsuit that some school districts say is needed to fix crumbling buildings cleared its final Legislative hurdle on Thursday.

The bill, which started in the House Ways and Means committee, passed the Senate 21-12.

The lawsuit started in 1990, The lawsuit to claim is joined a lawsuit to claim is joined a lawsuit to claim to planed a lawsuit to claim. The courts later narrowed the focus of the suit to deal only with unsafe school buildings.

In 2001, a Boise judge declared Idaho's system for funding school construction unconstitutional, and ordered the Legislature to fix it.

Several bills intended to fix the problem have passed, and some of the schools have used those option and removed themselves from the lawsuit. Others say the problem remains unresolved. If signed by the governor, the bill would require that the com-

solved.

If signed by the governor, the bill would require that the combined lawsuit be divided into

parts.

Instead of proceeding as plaintiffs through one Boise court, the individual districts would become plaintiffs in their home judicial districts. The bill would also allow school districts to seek a judge's approval to impose an emergency levy for buildings considered dangerously unsafe.

Proponents of the bill called it a chance to end an expensive, drawn out case that has done nothing to fix the school build-



ings. Opponents said it was an end-run around the state's constitutional responsibility to provide safe schools and would only lead to more legal action.

GOP Sen. Brad Little of Emmett sponsored the bill on the floor, saying that of the 20 original districts in the lawsuit, only six remain. Of those, he said, several exceed the state's average for teachers' and administrators' salaries.

Little said school-loan subsidy programs passed in recent years have been districts tools to

administrators' salaries.

Little said school-loan subsidy programs passed in recent years give the school districts tools to fix their problems – if they choose to use them.

"These other districts need to get on board with the rest of the districts, utilize this laundry list of tools we have and get on down the road," Little said.

Opposition came from a few Republicans and all the Senate Democrats, including Fred Kennedy of Mountain Home.

Kennedy said it not the role of the Legislature to interpret the job of the courts.

"How can we sit in this body and throw away II years of litigation, and flush it down the toilet, and start over? Because start over we will. We'll be right back in the courtroom," Kennedy said.





Irrigation needs dry stretch of Teton River

REXBURG (AP) – Hundreds of fish have died as the South Fork of the Teton River was dried up by irrigators.

The river vanished for about five miles from the head gates of the Resburg Irrigation Canal Co. of Highway 20, angle Gary Richardson said.

He discovered the dead fish on Monday afternoon and took photos of them on Tuesday moming.

Ninety-nine percent of the

dead fish are suckers, although there were some trout, Richardson said.

"Maybe that is why nobody cares," he said. "Still, I don't think it's right."

The river channel dried up over the weekend when the Rexburg Canal Co. diverted its natural flow rights into its canal, said District 1 watermaster Ron Carlson of the Idaho Deparment of Water Resources.

"We just didn't have the flow in the river because people took their right," Carlson said. "The groundwater returns to that part of the river just isn't there this year. It is unfortunate, but the irrigators have the right." The Rexburg based canal com-pany delivers water to about 200 rights holder. Dan Kauer, the canal compa-ny's watermaster, said the river goes dry 19 out of 20 years.

American Airlines CEO resigns amid struggles

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) – American Airlines chairman and chief executive Donald Carry resigned Thursday as labor lead-ers and negotiators for the carri-er reached a tentative deal to help the company avert bank-ruptcy.

Gerard Arpey, the company's president, will replace Carty as chief executive, while board member Edward Brennan will take over as chairman.

Carty's resignation came after the boards of the pilots' and transport workers unions approved the new concessions prackage.

The flight attendants' union reportedly balked at the tentative deal, which improves potential bonuses for employees and shortens the length of concessions by one year to five years. The deal work of the pilot winder the pilot winder of t

It was not clear, however, whether the combination of Carry's resignation and the sweetened labor deal would be enough to prevent a bankruptey filing by the world's largest carrier. Members of the company's board met all day Thursday, but declined to comment afterward and referred questions to the company.

Adding to the pressure on Carty was Wednesday's first-quarter financial report from AMR Corp., American's parent, which posted a worse-than-expected \$1.04 billion loss. Carry blamed the first-quarter results on weak travel demand caused by the sluggish economy, war in Iraq and the SARS outbreak, along with high fuel prices and low fares.



SARS SYMPTOMS, PRECAUTIONS

Health officials around the world are grappling with a rapid-ly spreading epidemic of a severe respiratory ailment known as SARS. Here's a quick look at who's at risk and other basic questions about the disease.

O. What is SARS?

A. SARS stands for severe acute respiratory syndrome. It's a new disease that doctors still don't know much about.

Q. What are the symptoms of SARS?

A. They are a led like pneumonia or the flu. People go a very high fever — at least 100.4 degrees. They also usually have shortness of breath or other problems breathing and a dry cough. Some people get other symptoms, including a headache, stiff or achy muscles, a loss of appetite, fatigue, a rash and diarrhed.

Q. How do you get SARS?

A. It seems that you have to have very close contact with someone who has it. Almost all the people who have gotten SARS—have either been hospital workers—who cared for sick people or members of a victim's family.

Doctors believe that it is spread by tiny droplets that get airborne when so by tiny droplets that get airborne when someone sneezes or coughs, or by contact with other bodily fluids such as blood. The people who have gotten SARS outside of Asia have all either recently traveled to Asian countries where it is spreading or had close contact with someone who recently returned from there. Experts don't think it's easy to catch SARS from sitting next to a sick person on a plane, but they are investigating incidents in which the virus spread through a Hong Kong apartment tower.

People over age 40 and those who have other medical prob-lems, such as heart or liver dis-

ease.

Q. What causes SARS?

A. Scientists discovered that the disease is caused by a previously unknown microbe known as a coronavirus. Coronaviruses usually just cause the common cold, but can eause serious resuiratory.

Q. Where did SARS come from?

A. The disease is believed to have first emerged in Caungdong province in China in November and then spread to Hong Kong and elsewhere.

Q. What is the incubation period?


