

T.F. students beat state, national ACT averages

TWIN FALLS - Continuing a five-year trend, Twin Falls High School students in 2003 beat the national average for ACT college entrance exam scores.

"Compared to the state scores, Twin Falls is ahead in all four seasessment areas," said Brett Gies, director of data analysis and pregram improvement for the Twin Falls School District. "We were strongest in English and math, followed closely by reading." Compared with national scores, Twin Falls students are well ahead in reading and math.

The ACT is designed for use with high school grades to predict academic readiness for college.

Scored on a 36-point scale, the ACT is actually four exams: English, reading, mathematics

What the scores tell us is our dents are demonstrating that they are prepared and have the necessary skills for college," Gies necessary skills for conces, said. Good news, perhaps, but not

"Based on history (of performance), that's a standard expecta-tion," he said. "The Twin Falls School District continues to bring

The composite score for Twin Falls was 22.6, up from 22.5 the part score. The national average was 20.8, which duplicated last year's number.

On average, all Idaho high schoolers are outperforming their out-of-state peers. Idaho students scored higher than the national average for the sixth straight year Students oxactly matched last year's performance, averaging a composite score of 21.2.

Bush decries U.N. headquarters attack

CRAWFORD, Texas (AP) — President Bush said the United States "will persevere through every hardship" in Iraq and will not flinch in the war against terror despite attacks like Tuesday's deadly bombing of the U.N. head-quarters in Baghdad.

despite and control of the U.N. head-quarters in Baghard, "terrorists and fear," Bush said, "terrorists are testing our will. Across the world, they are finding that our will cannot be shaken."

The U.N. bombing - and the growing list of American casualties - marked a sharp escalation of violence that runs in the face of White House assurances that the U.S. occupation authority is making progress on security and will ultimately defeat those trying to destabilize the country and kill American torops.

destabilize the country and kill American troops.
Tuesday's attack comes on the heels of a car bombing at the Jordanian Embassy in Baghdad, which killed 19 people, and supected sabotage, against Iraq's main oil pipeline into Turkey and, separately, against Baghdad's water supply, U.S. forces continue to be plagued by deadly guerillastyle attacks.

Bush, spending August vacationing on his Texas ranch, learned of the bombing while on the golf course. After getting updates from national security adviser Condolecza Rice and other aides, he cut his game short at the 12th hole and hurried back to his ranch.

So reporters were assembled in a helicopter hangar on his ranch, and the president appeared short-his golf outfit into a jacket, white dress shirt and red tie.





ASPEN, Colo, (AP) – Federal Trade Commission Chairman Timothy Muris said Tuesday that efforts in Congress to establish a list of Internet users who don't want "spam" emails won't fix the growing problem.

"If such a list were established, I'd advise customers not to waste their time and effort," Muris said at the Aspen Summit, a telecommunications and technology summit. "Most spam is already so

clearly illegitimate that the senders are no more likely to comply with new regulations than with the laws they now ignore." Muris said he often is asked about a national anti-spam list because of the success of the FTC's do-not-call registry for people who want to block telemarketing calls. Since the list opened June 27, more than 32 million phone numbers have been registered. The FTC will begin enforc-

Offspring of ancient pine tree arrive in Washington

WASHINGTON (AP) - Two spiky green pine seedlings, the offspring of one of the oldest trees on Earth, were presented to the U.S. Botanic Garden Tuesday as part of an effort to study and eventually clone the world's great

part of an effort to study and eventually clone the world's great trees.

The 10-month-old seedlings, each about 4 inches high, were delivered to the Botanic Garden by northern Michigan tree farmer Pavid Milarch and his son, Jared. The Milarchs grew the trees from the seeds of a 4,768-year-old, 55-foot-high bristlecone pine named Methuselah, which grows in the Inyo National Forest on the Newada-California border.

"This is a plant that we have always wanted," said Holly Shimiza, executive director of the Botanic Garden. "These plants have survived for over 140 human green the said of the plants of the plants of the plants of the plants have survived for over 140 human after a long-lived character in the biblical book of Genesis. They only contain half of the gnarled old tree's genetic materials. But when the seedlings are three

years old, or about the height of a pencil, the Milarchs plan to graft them with more genetic material taken from Methuselah. At that point, whatever new shoots grow will be considered exact clones of the ancient pine, Jared Milarch said.

with the considered teach Luthes with the ancient pine, Jared Milarch as the seedlings, which have spent the last month in a greenhouse at George Washington's estate in Mount Vernon, Va. will be housed in the Botanic Garden's greenhouses until they are strong enough to plant, Shimizu said. A planting location has yet to be selected.

The Milarchs formed the Champion Thee Project in 1996 to plant a living legacy of trees," lared Milarch says.

Earlier this year, on Arbor Day, they planted on the U.S. Capital grounds a clone of a white ash that was originally planted by George Washington at Mount Vernon. Their next project:
Cloning Robin Hood's oak tree, estimated to be 800 years old, which lives in Sherwood Forest in Nottinghamshire, England.

Most glaring is the dire need to overhaul the nation's electrical grid, which still relies on technology from the 1950s and '60s.

held up well so far. But the Northeast outage, which was the biggest and longest on record, serves notice that the grid must be modernized. President Bush said as much in his energy report released in 2001. And that same year, the Energy Information

Blackout casts light on failed deregulation

That we have learned from the great blackout of 2003 is that electricity "deregulation" is a mirage. It's premature – and, perhaps wrong to blame last week's massive failure on deregulation, especially because we don't know the precise cause. The explanation may be as simple as human error. But it's not too early to draw some general to think about the nation's electric power system.

We've yet to hear anything of political substance. Mostly what we've seen arrewent nevelose names in search of as step to bot, of special effects. Buffett, to the extent that voters know him, has a reputation for finding hidden value in the corporate world. Yet if there is a connection here between that enviable skill and what it takes to balance the state budget while at the same time fixing our schools, assuring the safety of the public and providing adequate health care, the burden falls to the Schwarzenegger campaign to make that connection, and to make it quickly.

We need to hear Buffett's solutions to the state's fiscal woes

long before the credits roll, and this is going to be a short movie. If expenses are going to be massively cut, where does he propose to start? If taxes are to be mised, who does he think should pay the bill?

So how will Warren Buffett fit into a possible Schwarzenegger administration?

Lenhard be appointed to the FEC. That's unfortunate. The FEC has already sunk to benthic depths, and Lenhard probably would take the agency down even further.

The FEC is like a captive agency, controlled by the people and organizations it is supposed to regulate.

ganizations it is supposed to regulate. It has long been under the thumbs of congressional leaders and the political parties, to the point where the agency no longer sees its mission as enforcing the law.

Instead, it acts as a referee, making sure neither of the two major parties gets an unfair advantage over the other. The FEC's recent decision to allow the political parties to receive "soft money" for their

political conventions is a good

xample. Never mind that the campaign finance laws say soft-money donors can't give to the conven-

As long as they give equally large amounts to both parties, the FEC say it's OK.

To this agency, the form and the fer and flows the form and the form and flows Democratic Leader Nancy Pelosi recommend adding Lenhard, the associate general counsel of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees. Daschle and Pelosi claim that Lenhard "will faithfully administer the new "McCain-Feingold" campaign finance reform law in accord with the intent of Congress."

Not likely, As AFSCME's lawyer, Lenhard argued in court that the restrictions on sham-issue ads – ads that attack or support a candidate under the guise of discussing an issue – are unconstitutional.

Predictably, Lenhard's appoint-ment has been endorsed by a range of organizations that run those thinly disguised campaign

those thinly disguised conditions and the second conditions what makes this worse is that Daschle and Pelosi recommended Lenhard to replace Commissioner Scott Thomas. Thomas' term has expired, but he is eligible for, and sought, reappointment.

Thomas has shown that he believes in the campaign finance laws. For example, he dissented last year when the commission issued rules that undermine the newly enacted McCain-Feingold law.

You might have thought Thomas' actions would endear him to Daschle and Pelosi, who often claim they support the new

law. Not so. Instead, they are punishing Thomas for the sin of taking Congress seriously when it voted to crack down on cam-

taking Congress seriously when it voted to crack down on campaign finance abuses. When Congress enacted McCain-Feingold, it made a commitment to enforcing the campaign finance laws. The Democratic leadership should reverse its hypocritical selection of Lenhard and honor that commitment by recommending the reappointment of Thomas. A failure to do so would demonstrate that the only thing distinguishing the Democrats who claim they support the law from the Republicans who openly oppose it is that the Republicans are at least being honest about where they stand.







Researchers may have found Donner camp

RENO, Nev. (AP) — Archaeologists believe they may have found the site where the Donner Party camped during their fateful journey through the Sierra Nevada more than 150

their rateful journey success. Sierra Nevada more than 150 years ago. Scientists also said they may have uncovered the first physical evidence that the group engaged in cannibalism to survive the hersh winter of 1846 that trapped them in the mountains 30 miles west of Reno. est of Reno.

Using ground-penetrating radar, archaeologists located what they believe to be a campfire pit in the in the area of Alder Creek near Truckee, Calif.

They also found a bone frag-ment of a large mammal that bears the butcher marks of an ax. If human, it would provide the first physical evidence of canni-balism linked to the Donner Party, the Reno Gazette-Journal reported.

Scientists probed the Alder Creek area as part of a Discovery Channel program called "Unsolved History," scheduled to air in October, They plan to use DNA tests to provide cries including linking the possible including linking the possible and the property of the Company of the Donner family survivors.

"This is a very exciting find," said Frankye Craig, a Donner Purly researcher in Reno. Even though some people don't think that's the Donner campsite, Donner descendants have been going there since the 1960s, and they always chought it was, the place.

"To them, Alder-Creek is sacred ground, and the new research seems to prove that. I hope it riggers more investigation." The Donner Party traveled across the continent by wagon ruin in 1846, and early snowstorms in October and November trapped them in the Sierra Nevada range west of Reno.





Reports of violence mar Afghanistan celebration

KABUL, Afghanistan (AP) — Warruined Afghanistan celebrat-ed its Independence Day on Tuesday amid one of the bloodiest

ed its Independence Day of Tuesday amid one of the bloodlest newecks in a year, with heavily armed guerrillss killing at least nine policemen in the latest in a string of ambushes.

There were also fresh assaults on aid workers. A group of 20 gumenen raided a mine-clearing group's compound in a province west of Kabul, beating five employees with rifle butts.

During a speech to mark Afghanistan's 84th anniversary of independence from Britain, President Hamid Karzai urged his countrymen to take responsibility for rebuilding a nation wasted by nearly a quarter of century of fighting and dependent on for-cign aid.

"It is the duty of everybody to

fighting and dependent on foreign aid.

"It is the duty of everybody to launch a holy war to reconstruct this nation." Karzai told a crowd of several thousand that included Cabinet ministers and diplomats. "We must try harder. We must catch up with the rest of the world."

Karzai made no mention of the stepped up guerrilla activity. Visitors to the stadium were searched by Karzais American bodyguards, as well as Afghan intelligence agents and police. Outside, NATO-led peacekeepers

stood guard in armored vehicles mounted with machine guns. In the last week, Afghanistan has not seen that week, Afghanistan has not believed to be a mix of guerillas from the ousted Taliban from the ousted Taliban regime, al-Quida fighters and supporters of renegade warlord culbuddin Hekmatyar. This follows reports that the Talibana fugitive leader, Mullah Mohammed Omar, has improved coordination among his commanders, dividing Afghanism or military arts at a result of their reorganizing." Hatiquilla Luddin, a government commander in Logar province said. "Now they even have finance officers to support their operations," Luddin said.

Try these trusty tips for taming tomato troubles

When it comes to vegetable gardening, tomatoe's are king. Gardeners say the No. 1 reason for growing tomatoes is taste. Who can forget that first ripe, glossy red, sun-warmed tomato straight from the garden? But then there's the other side of the coin: The quest for the perfect tomato is not without rouble. Three of the most common tomato troubles are blossom end ret, cutacing and sunscaled blossom end ret, cutacing and sunscaled with tun-colored optical towards and sunken on the best of the side of the colored optical towards and sunken on whether soil moisture alternates between high and low. That affects the plant's calcium intake, and sets off the disorder.

To avoid blossom end rot, be sure to water evenly during hot weather and use a mulch to maintain a more uniform soil moisture content. Catfacing and cracking are sim-

tain a more uniform soil moisture content.
Catfacing and cracking are similar. Cracking shows up as circular cracks on the stem end of the fruit, while cutfacting results notes and other malformations. Fast growth during hot weather combined with up-and-down moisture levels produces these conditions. Temperature extremes when there's a huge difference between day and night temperatures - will also cause tomatoes to crack.

Again, evenly paced water is

Again, evenly paced water is key. You can do that with a slow drip system on a timer. And make sure you use mulch to help keep temperatures and water levels even.

Sunscald is just what it sounds like: Too much sun. White, shiny blisters appear when the fruit has seen too much sun. Roast red peppers for delicious dinner

Bell peppers (named for their shape) come in many colors, but are all basically the same vectoble. The green ones are picked when they are still immature; these are the sturdiest and have the most piquant flavor and fibrous skin. You can buy potato salad at any deli, but why not make some your

The best salad potatoes are the
mail, round, waxy, varieties. You
can always get white and red ones
in the market, and you might find
more, esoteric varieties in purple
or orange and some with fancy
names such as Peruvian or fingerling. Larger red Bliss and Yukon





Rupert firm snags fiber-optic contract

KETCHUM – The U.S. Forest Service has approved a proposal by Syringa Networks LLC of Rupert to install 22 miles of fiberoptic line on national forest land from Galena Summit to Lake Creek, just north of Ketchum. The decision followed the completion of an environmental assessment by Forest Service resource specialists. Sawtooth Mational Forest Supervisor Ruth Monahan issued the decision, according to a news release. "Syringa is a local network tel-phone provider. Their line from Galena Summit to Lake Creek

will become an important part of the statewide loop that connects many of the rural Idaho commu-nities," Monahan said. In addition to the fiber-optic line, Monahan's decision

nitie In line. In addition to the fiberoptic line, Monahan's decision approves the placement of a buried power line within the fiber-optic cable trench to provide electrical service to Galena Lodge. That part of the project involves a distance of about six miles from the area near the Forest Service's Russian John facility to Galena Lodge. A separate permit will be issued to Idaho Power Co. for the buried power line.

Monahan's decision limits con-

struction activities, which will begin later this month, to daylight hours — Monday through Saturday. There will be no construction work on the Fridays, Saturdays Mondays and Tuesdays of major holiday weekends so as not to conflict with major periods of recreation-oriented traffic. Construction might be halted during certain recreational

Construction might be halted during certain recreational events, such as the Sawtooth Relay Race, if needed.

The decision also sets protective measures for soil, water, vegetation and other natural resources along the construction route, according to the press release.

Home building shows strength

WASHINGTON — Housing construction jumped to a 17-year high in July in spite of rising interest rates. It was an unexpectedly strong showing and one more sign, analysts said, that the long-craved economic rebound may finally be happening.

The Commerce Department reported Tuesday that construction of new homes and apartments rose by 1.5 percent in July over the previous month to a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 1.87 million units.

After hitting a low of 5.21 percent in mid-June, rates for 30-year mortgages have risen by a full percentage point to stand at 6.24 hercent last week, according to Freddie Mac's nationwide survey. "The push to complete homes before mortgage rates show the market is on, and builders are going wild," said conomist John Maroff of Holland, Pa.

ing milk production robust in the Upper Midwest if the region's dairy processors are to thrive. Nationally, however, the swelling size of the milk stockpile is an embarrasment to U.S. agriculture boosters, including some members of Congress. That's partly because of the cost: Every pound of nonfat dry milk in storage cost taxpayers 80 cents, so it's a 51 billion mountain. And that doesn't count storage costs, from renting space in caves around Kansas City to leasing ware houses around the nation.

A mountain of government-surplus food provides a juicy tar-get for critics. During the Reagan administration, a glut of surplus government cheese became a national punch line – a surplus produced by the very program that has produced today's powdered milk moun-tain.


