## Key to development?

### Federal money would pay for sewer line southeast of Jerome

**JEROME** — Efforts to protect the quality of Twin Falls' water supply while making possible more commercial development north of the Snake River have gone all the way to Washington, D.C.

The U.S. House last week appropriated \$5 million for a wastewater system to be devel-

oped through the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers' Civil Works Program. But approval still is needed from the U.S. Senate. And that is where the prospect dims.

It will take work just to get the Senate to even consider the proposal seriously, said Roy Prescott, a member of the Jerome Water and Sewer District. The district was formed by property owners in the area south and east of

Jerome between city limits and U.S. Highway 93.

There are several residential developments, particularly along Golf Course Road, and multiple property owners in the area, Prescott said.

About 400 acres at the intersection of Interstate 84 and Highway 93 belong to Crossroads Point — formerly Crossroads Ranch — owned by Arlen Crouch. Lack of sewer and water service

has been an obstacle to his plans for commercial development in that area.

As the area between Jerome and Highway 93 develops, sewer services are the most pressing need to protect groundwater from contamination. Wells at Blue Lakes supply most of Twin Falls' water, which is piped across the river. The groundwater also

## Workers say they are losing ground fast

### Public employees voice concern over salaries

**TWIN FALLS** — Low pay and diminishing benefits translates into low morale.

That's what six legislators heard from 80-plus state employees who had traveled from as far away as Blaine, Cassia and Owyhee counties to Twin Falls to vent their dissatisfaction with frozen pay the past two to three years.

Organizers of the event said they had expected only about 20 state employees to show. Lawmakers said they appreciated the input, but in the end they stopped short of promising more money.

The meeting took place a day after the governor's Division of Human Resources released a report saying state workers are making 14.6 percent less than their counterparts in the private sector. Craig Vaughn, an Idaho Transportation Department worker from Richfield, warned the lawmakers the job market is so hot in the Wood River Valley that it may not be sense for many Transportation Department workers to stay with the agency.

Vaughn pointed to the inefficiency of spending money to train people to work on state roads only to see them quit in short order. An 18-year-old can push a broom on a construction site in Blaine County and make \$12 an hour, while a beginning worker hired by the Transportation Department is only making \$10 an hour, he said.

"It's getting so I have to make a decision about whether I'm going to make my power bill one month, or my heating bill or the water bill," Vaughn said.

Health and Welfare workers described what they perceived as the ineffectiveness of centralizing all the agency's management in Boise. They said efforts to save money have led to only five people doing all the hiring and firing from Boise.

Without proper management at the local level, programs are spiraling out of control. More people are applying for welfare, but there are fewer people to manage the cases. In just the past six months, five employees have left the Twin Falls office, and no one has been replaced, several agency workers said.

"We're doing the work of three people," said Miltie Cawthon, of the Twin Falls Health and Welfare office. She explained the caseload for each worker has doubled and that they no longer have anyone to do the clerical work.

Another worker said because of too much work, the error rate on food stamp applications in the Twin Falls office is reaching 16 percent, which is the point where the federal government steps in with sanctions.

## Hospital: Ambulance costs hamper its efforts

**TWIN FALLS** — Magic Valley Regional Medical Center is losing about \$500,000 a year providing ambulance service to Twin Falls and Jerome counties, Chief Executive Officer John Kee said.

And that takes away from the hospital's ability to provide quality health care, he told Twin Falls County commissioners Thursday.

As a result, commissioners in both counties are seriously considering creating an ambulance district that could levy property taxes to help pay for the service. Magic Valley Regional has been subsidizing the ambulance service for 15 years, an unusual thing for a hospital to do, Kee said.

"In Idaho, it's virtually unheard of," Kee said Thursday at a meeting with Twin Falls County Commissioners Gary Grindstaff, Bill Brockman and Tom Mikesell.

All in all, the hospital's ambulance service is \$521,552 in the red. Calls in Twin Falls County accounted for \$291,463 of the loss, and calls to Jerome County accounted for \$230,089 of the loss.

If an ambulance district is formed, property owners would see an increase in their property taxes. Mikesell said the owner of a \$130,000 home could expect to pay an additional \$18 a year on his property tax bill for an ambulance district.

"The question is, 'Are people willing to pay an extra \$18 a year to make sure someone is going to be there when they need them?'" Mikesell said.

Each county's share of the costs would be determined by the share of services each county receives, Kee said.

"We need to reassure the citizens of Twin Falls County that they're not going to subsidize Jerome," Mikesell said. Kee said the hospital wants to continue to provide quality services inside a quality facility. But people have to be willing to pay for that.

## Candidate acknowledges past bad behavior

### Schwarzenegger says he's changed his ways

**SAN DIEGO** — Confronted with fresh allegations that he groped women, Arnold Schwarzenegger apologized Thursday for his "bad behavior" and pleaded with voters' just days before California's recall election for the chance to show that he has changed.

The admission came just as the action hero appeared to be picking up steam as the front-runner to replace Gov. Gray Davis in Tuesday's historic election. It was followed hours later by a

report on ABC News that Schwarzenegger told an interviewer during the filming of the bodybuilding documentary "Pumping Iron" in 1975 he admired Adolf Hitler.

Schwarzenegger, with wife Maria Shriver at his side, told a late-night news conference at Los Angeles' Century Plaza Hotel

## Ban on partial birth abortion clears House

**WASHINGTON** — The House voted decisively Thursday for the first ban of an abortion procedure since the Supreme Court's Roe v. Wade ruling that women have a right to end their pregnancies. Strongly supported by President Bush, the bill could be on his desk for signature in days.

The 281-142 vote culminated an eight-year drive by the Republican-led House to end the procedure that abortion opponents call partial birth abortion. The Senate could take up the bill as early as Friday and send it to the president.

Second District Congressman Mike Simpson (R-Idaho) voted for the ban.

"Today's action is an important step that will help us continue to build a culture of life in America," Bush said in a statement. "I look

forward to the Senate passing this legislation so that I can sign this very important bill into law.

Abortion rights groups, citing court rulings striking down similar state laws, say the legislation is unconstitutional and they will challenge it as soon as it becomes law.

Doctors who violate the ban would be subject to up to two years in prison. The law would not affect women having the operation.

The legislation bans a procedure, generally in the second or third trimester, in which a fetus is partially delivered before a doctor punctures the skull. The opposing sides differ on the medical necessity or the numbers of such abortions, but they agree the bill will have far-reaching ramifications.

"Abortion will stay legal," said

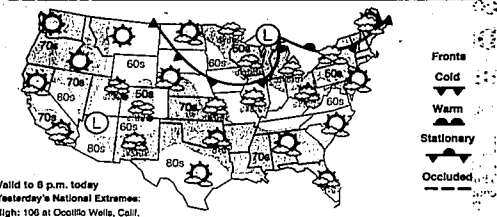

 House Majority Leader Tom DeLoay, R-Toxey, a strong supporter of the restriction. But he added, "After a generation of bitter rhetoric, the American people have turned away from the divisive politics of abortion and embraced the inclusive politics of life."  
 "Don't ever forget, this is about Roe v. Wade," said Rep. Rita Lowrey, D-N.Y., referring to the 1973 Supreme Court decision making abortion legal. "It's about restricting access to safe medical procedures throughout a pregnancy."  
 While the vote was mainly

along party lines, four Republicans voted against the bill and 63 Democrats supported it.  
 The House has passed the bill on an almost annual basis since Republicans won control in 1995, but President Clinton twice vetoed it, saying it lacked an exception to protect the health of the mother.  
 The health factor was also key to the Supreme Court's 5-4 decision in 2000 to overturn a similar Nebraska state ban. The high court also ruled that the Nebraska law was unconstitutional because its definition of partial birth - not a medical term - was too vague.

## Gulf war's speed left troops vulnerable to friendly fire

WASHINGTON (AP) - In its swift and decisive defeat of Saddam Hussein's army, the American military exposed some of its own weaknesses, including a vulnerability to friendly fire, officers who led a review of the Iraq war said.  
 Gen. Edmund P. Giambastiani Jr., chief of the Joint Forces Command, told the House Armed Services Committee that despite advances in technology to mini-

 mize fratricide, the preventive measures were not applied uniformly.  
 "Iraq had a more complex battlefield" that made it more difficult in some circumstances to distinguish friend from foe, Giambastiani said.  
 Unlike the 1991 war against

Iraq, when U.S. ground forces attacked largely along a defined battle front, this time the attack came from several directions and was executed simultaneously with air and special forces.  
 "As you get a much more complicated battlefield, as you bring in more converging assets, you lose these capabilities in closer it's a greater challenge" to avoid fatal mistakes, Army Brig. Gen. Robert Cone said later at a Pentagon

news conference.  
 Cone was part of a team of about 35 U.S. officers who were in Iraq to observe the war and interview commanders as it unfolded.  
 Giambastiani asserted: "In his testimony that there were fewer friendly fire deaths in Iraq than in the first Gulf War, he has offered no numbers to support that. Asked about this, Cone said such statistics exist but he was "not at liberty" to disclose them.

 "Health care is expensive, and we're not in control of that," Kee said.  
 Still, the hospital is looking at ways to trim costs.  
 "We're looking at salaries to see what overtime we can take out of the system," Kee said.  
 Two Magic Valley Regional paramedics more than doubled their salaries in 2001-02 through overtime, shift differential and on-call pay, according to hospital records. Several others nearly did so. One paramedic grossed close to \$70,000 on base pay of less than \$25,000.  
 Another reason for higher hospital operating costs is nursing and technician shortages. Hiring travelers to fill vacancies is expensive, but if hospitals are going to provide services to their patients, they don't have much choice, Kee said.

And when it comes to recruiting and keeping those hard-to-find nurses and technologists, hospitals must pay competitive wages, Kee said.  
 And then there's the costs of facilities.  
 "You need to make a net profit if you're going to continue to invest in the physical plant," Kee said.  
 So far, Twin Falls County commissioners have been discouraged by the idea of creating an ambulance district.  
 "I think it's an achievable goal," Mikasek said.  
 The next step is for hospital officials and commissioners to take the plan to service groups and senior citizen centers. They also plan to hold public hearings.

 On top of that, because of restructuring, Health and Welfare workers no longer have job security, said Marie Haugel of the Burley Health and Welfare office.  
 House Speaker Bruce Newcomb, R-Burley, said his observation of the agency is that Boise management is mostly focused on its own job security.  
 "Instead of getting service down the road where it's needed, the money is being spent on management in Boise," Newcomb said.  
 Newcomb asked everyone at the meeting if they have been discouraged by their managers from speaking to legislators about agency problems. Several Health and Welfare workers said they had

been specifically instructed to run comments past their managers first but that they were afraid to do so. They said they are even afraid to write letters to the local newspapers about problems in the agency.  
 Gov. Dirk Kempthorne spokesman Michael. Journeaux would not say Thursday if the governor supports giving significant raises to workers this coming year.  
 The "Division of Human Resources gave two recommendations. One would finance pay increases over five years, which would cost the state general fund \$24 million. The other would provide state agencies with a one-time 2 percent increase in salaries - allowing workers to get temporary

raises of up to 10 percent in a "retention and recognition award program." That could cost about \$10 million.  
 But Sen. Dean Cameron, R-Burley, who chairs the Senate Finance Committee, didn't give the workers much reason for optimism.  
 "We indeed are very grateful for our state employees, but we are in a box," Cameron said. "I can't say that report will be welcomed with open arms."  
 In order to overcome a projected \$155 million deficit by 2006 when this past session's one-cent sales tax increases expires, the state will have to see about a 4 percent increase in revenues in 2005 and a 6 percent increase in 2006,

Cameron said. The \$155 million shortfall is based upon a 3.6 percent growth rate for both 2005 and 2006.  
 In addition, Cameron told the workers that \$110 million has to be replaced in the endowment fund because of losses in the stock market.  
 He also warned them that officials with the Public Employee Retirement System likely will be approaching the Legislature with a request to increase employer and employee contributions to the tune of one percent each year during the next two years.

 that he didn't recall making the reported Hitler remarks.  
 "I don't remember any of those comments because I always despise everything that Hitler stood for," Schwarzenegger said, calling Hitler a "disgusting villain."  
 Asked about the new allegations of groping against her husband, Shriver referred to his apology earlier in the day in San Diego.  
 "As I say to my children it always takes great courage to stand before anybody and apologize and I think that's what Arnold did today," Shriver said.

Some political analysts predicted serious harm to Schwarzenegger, whose standing among women voters was poor even before the latest furor.  
 Schwarzenegger's apology came at a campaign event kicking off the final leg of his campaign. Taking the stage to chants of "Arnold, Arnold," he immediately addressed the issue.  
 "I have behaved badly sometimes. Yes, it is true that I was on rowdy movie sets and I have done things that were not right, which I thought then was playful but now I recognize that I offended people," he said.  
 From this point on,

Schwarzenegger said, he would prove he is a "champion for the women." As he made that pledge, the crowd interrupted him with cheers.  
 The admission came hours after the Los Angeles Times reported the accusations of six women who accused Schwarzenegger of sexually harassing and groping them over the past three decades.  
 Three of the women told the Times that Schwarzenegger groped their breasts. One said he tried to take her bathing suit off in a hotel elevator, and another said he put his hand up her skirt and grabbed her buttocks. Still another said he pulled her on his

lap and asked if she ever had a particular sex act performed on her.  
 The Times, quoting two of the women by name and the rest anonymously, said the incidents occurred as far back as 1975 and as recently as 2000.  
 "All is not forgiven. He's got a pattern of this for 30 years, it doesn't just go away," Karen Pomeroy, a spokeswoman for the women's group CodePink, said after the apology.  
 Megan Seely, president of the California chapter of the National Organization for Women, said: "It's clear Schwarzenegger is not so safe for women."

 feeds the Snake River.  
 For several years the city of Jerome has worked to obtain federal money to extend a trunk line out to meet the city's sewer proposed by the Water and Sewer District. The wastewater would head to the city's treatment plant.  
 "If we can prevent or limit the number of septic tanks punched into the ground and still have development occurring, we all win," said Travis Rothweiler, Jerome city administrator.

Development of the area will continue east of Jerome without the sewer line, Prescott said, although commercial development would be more limited without it. Sewer service is essential to having the growth, he said.  
 "If it's going to be developed right - it's absolutely critical," Prescott said.  
 Raising money for the project with local property taxes would be difficult, he said.  
 House passage of the proposed \$5 million appropriation was

announced last week by Idaho U.S. Reps. Mike Simpson and C.R. "Butch" Otter.  
 The city of Jerome is looking for federal money, because the city is opposed to burdening its residents with a tax levy for services that would be offset outside the city tax base, Rothweiler said.  
 "Rothweiler and Prescott said they support efforts to preserve the canyon rim in Jerome County from development encroachment."

East of Highway 93 there are plans for a Northside Park Planning by the city and state under way to create a recreational area over about 7,200 acres that are roughly bound by the canyon, Highway 93, Interstate 84 and the Hansen Bridge. The area would be protected from commercial development.

# Officials: Leak probe likely will expand beyond White House

WASHINGTON (AP) — The investigation into the leak of a CIA officer's name is likely to expand to other sensitive information agencies, including the State and Defense departments, officials said Thursday.

A senior Justice Department official, speaking on condition of anonymity, said those agencies, and possibly others, could get letters, urging officials to preserve documents such as phone logs and not to delete e-mails. Similar letters have already gone to the White House and CIA.

Defense Department officials confirmed Thursday they were told to expect such a letter. At the State Department, spokeswoman Susan Pittman said she did not know if a letter had been received but that her agency "would cooperate fully" if asked.

Preventing loss of evidence is a key part of the early stage of the FBI's investigation, which is focused at the outset on narrowing the list of government officials who

may have known the CIA officer's identity.

White House spokesman Scott McClellan said reporters Thursday that the White House had not received any subpoenas in the investigation and that, to his knowledge, no staffers had been interviewed by the FBI.

He promised to publicly disclose any such subpoenas should they be issued to the White House or its staff, if the Justice Department didn't object to releasing the information.

To his knowledge, no White House staff member has hired a lawyer because of the investigation, McClellan said.

The FBI has assembled a team of about a half-dozen experienced agents to handle the investigation into who leaked the name of a CIA officer, married to former Ambassador Joseph C. Wilson. Wilson had accused the Bush administration of manipulating intelligence to exaggerate the threat posed by Iraq.

The officer's name, Valerie Plame, first appeared in a July 14 story by syndicated columnist Robert Novak, and she was identified later by Newsday as a undercover officer.

In Congress, Democrats and Republicans sparred over whether a special counsel should be appointed to investigate. Democrats contend an agency headed by Bush appointees cannot adequately investigate the administration. Republicans have labeled that claim politically motivated.

Overseeing the investigation is John Dan, a 30-year career prosecutor who has headed the counterespionage section at the Justice Department since 2002.

## Federal appeals court declares DNA act to be unconstitutional

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A 3-year-old law that requires federal prisoners to give blood samples for the FBI's DNA database was declared unconstitutional Thursday by a federal appeals court.

The 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals ruled that requiring the blood samples amounts to an illegal invasion of privacy because they are taken without legal suspicion that the convicts were involved in other crimes.

The San Francisco-based court, the first federal appeals court to address the federal DNA Analysis Backlog Elimination Act, said that is a violation of inmates' Fourth Amendment rights against illegal searches.

"The blood samples 'violate the Fourth Amendment because they constitute suspicious searches with the objective of furthering law enforcement purposes,'" Judge Stephen Reinhardt wrote. "Compulsory searches of the bodies of parolees... require, at a minimum, reasonable suspicion."

The Justice Department did not have immediate comment on the court's 2-1 decision.

## Nose cap inspection might delay shuttle's return to flight

NASA wants to find out if the nose cap of the space shuttle Atlantis was inspected properly for corrosion, an action that could further delay the first shuttle launch since the Columbia disaster, an agency official said Thursday.

Officials planning the return to space next year have questioned the inspection of the metal framework inside the nose cap, which can corrode. The problem has been found and fixed on the shuttles Discovery and Endeavour, said James Hartsfield, a NASA spokesman in Houston.

"Whether or not (Atlantis) inspections were satisfactory has come into question," he said. NASA officials had hoped to launch Atlantis as early as March of April but acknowledged last month that the schedule will be pushed back.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The military practices a simulated airliner shutdown scenario twice a week, and the exercise is not limited to the cockpit. It also involves ground crew members, including pilots, who are drilled on the procedures as

well as the flight deck. The military also has an order to shoot down a civilian plane only if there is no other option to prevent a Sept. 11-style attack on the ground, the general said. There are authentication procedures for such orders to make sure "someone can't just get on the radio and say, 'This is the president, I order you to shoot down that plane,'" Eberhart said.

Active personnel can be confident that their planes will not be accidentally shot down, Eberhart said. "It would take issue with anyone who would say that men and women in our armed forces are trigger happy," Eberhart said at a breakfast meeting with reporters. "I'm more worried that they would be trigger hesitant than trigger happy. We have long discussions with people to see if they're ready to do this."

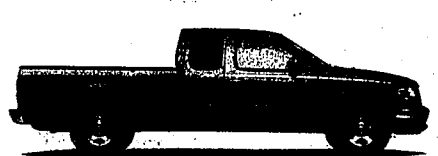

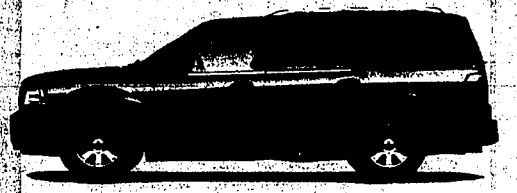

### Changing nuclear waste law won't help at INEEL

Give kudos to members of Congress for staving off the Energy Department's attempt to revise the Nuclear Waste Policy Act. Now, the Energy Department should drop its stealthy politics altogether. The more the agency tries to dodge a judge's order to remove high-level nuclear waste, the more credibility it loses with Idahoans.

The issue revolves around July's ruling from U.S. District Judge Lynn Winnill's ruling that prohibited the Energy Department from reclassifying approximately 100 million gallons of high-level nuclear waste stored in Idaho, South Carolina and Washington.

That poses a hazard to the public. What's this mean for Idaho? The feds have about 1 million gallons of high-level radioactive material stored in 40 underground tanks at the Idaho National Engineering and Environmental Laboratory.

**Our view: The Department of Energy will lose credibility with Idahoans if it circumvents a judge's order to remove waste. What do you think? We welcome viewpoints from our readers on this and other issues.**

The Energy Department says it would remove the liquid waste, then rinse the tanks a number of times. About an inch of residual liquid waste would remain in the bottom of each tank, totaling about 1,000 to 1,200 gallons per tank. For 10 tanks, that amounts to approximately 12,000 liquid gallons of waste at INEEL.

Energy Department officials say dilution would make that amount no longer high-level waste. Once mixed with grout, it could be reclassified as low-level or "incidental" waste and left in place.

Critics don't buy the dilution theory. They say even as low-level waste, it's radioactive enough to pose a serious threat to the Snake River Plain Aquifer, the main water source for thousands of Idahoans.

If the federal government really thinks the diluted waste is not high-level, it should stick with appealing Winnill's decision.

But by trying to change the law, the department is admitting its court case is weak. Abraham's proposed legislation is an end run around the judicial system.

That tactic hurts the agency's credibility with the people of Idaho. How can we trust the Energy Department to make a good-faith cleanup effort while it lobbies to weaken the law? And if the Energy Department gets this change, what's to stop it from trying to weaken other cleanup laws?

Congress, and Idaho's delegation in particular, should remain opposed to any further attempt to rewrite federal waste laws.

### Judge made bad call on no-call law

When U.S. District Judge Edward W. Nottingham recently ruled that the government could not sue third parties from unwanted commercial telephone calls, he admitted that millions of Americans had made their preferences clear by adding their names to the "do-not-call" registry, and he also admitted that marketers had no general right to impose upon a captive audience.

But the problem, said the Denver judge, is that the government rules creating the registry were "content-based," meaning they made a distinction based on the topic of the calls. The rules allow charities and political organizations to call phone numbers on the registry, but these numbers are off-limits to commercial telemarketers. That content-based discrimination, the judge said, violates the First Amendment.

Really? True, the Supreme Court has sometimes spoken as if the Constitution features a near-absolute ban on content-based distinctions. But there is also a vast amount of case law, everyday practice and constitutional logic on the other side — more than enough to justify a reversal of Nottingham's ruling. American law, and always has been, rife with content-based distinctions. And rightly so.

Consider this: A nonprofit organization dedicated to science or education qualifies as a charity and receives benefits in the tax code. A nonprofit that teaches terrorism, however, does not. This is a content-based rule.

Accreditation laws requiring all elementary schools — public and private — to test the three Rs favor those subjects over all other content. Government may post billboards urging citizens to give to charity or to vote, even though these billboards are plainly content-laden.



The very phrase "freedom of speech" came into Anglo-American law via "freedom of speech and debate" in legislative assemblies. But legislatures have always featured content-based restrictions. Today's topic in the House of Representatives may be deemed to be Iraq; legislators orating on other topics will be out of order.

And some kinds of expression may never be in order on the legislative floor, which is reserved for political speech as opposed to commercial solicitations. This proves that government can favor political discourse, contrary to Judge Nottingham.

Indeed, the First Amendment itself favors those who assemble to "petition the government for the redress of grievances" over those who meet for any other purpose. This too is content-based discrimination. Interestingly, Nottingham noted that the Supreme Court had consistently ruled that political discourse deserved more protection

than commercial advertising. If judges may properly say that political speech is of higher value than commercial speech, why can't Congress and federal regulators on one side of a debate while unleashing the other violates the essence of free speech. Though the government may run ads urging Americans to vote, it may not run ads urging us to "Vote Republican." The government itself gives nonprofit tax breaks or urges you to donate to nonprofits, but it couldn't do it only for nonprofits associated with the Democratic Party.

Nothing in the do-not-call registry favors liberals or conservatives, Republicans or Democrats, incumbents or challengers. Nor does the registry come between willing speakers and listeners. It shields only

known unwilling listeners whom speakers have no general right to hector. On this point, the registry differs decisively from the main case relied on by Nottingham, which concerned a Cincinnati ordinance that the Supreme Court invalidated in 1993. That ordinance regulated newstands in a manner that abridged the ability of commercial advertisers to reach a willing audience.

Though the registry gives political speakers of all stripes a right to call where commercial speakers may not, this should be a permissible nod to the special importance of political speech in a democracy.

So the new registry does take sides in a way. It privileges political discourse. So does the First Amendment.

in underground tanks and reclassifying this material as low-level waste so it can be left alone.

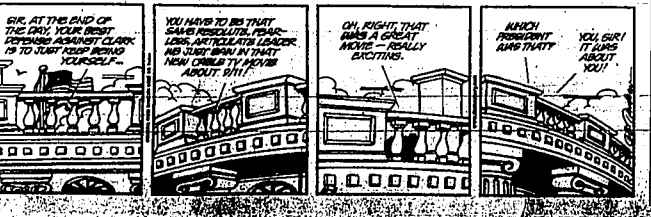
The DOE should be thinking about protecting public health and the environment, not finding ways to reduce cleanup costs at the expense of public health and the environment.

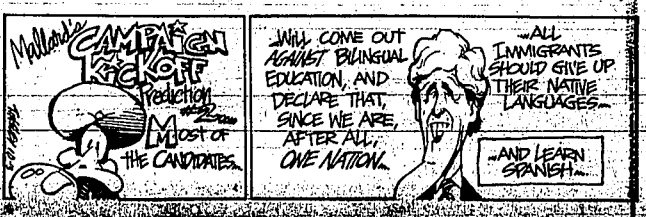

## Recall candidates can't keep promises

**T**hey say it again and again, but they don't mean it. Despite suggesting they were in it for the long haul, Bill Simon, Peter Ueberroth, Darrell Issa and now Arianna Huffington have dropped out. Their common reason: The polls made me do it. But what does that mean, really? Did they drop out because their opponents shared their views? Or because their opponents had bested them in debates? Did they drop out because they secured a firm commitment on a key issue from any remaining candidates? No.

That's what makes their decisions to drop out all the more disturbing. Think of it from the viewpoint of the hard-working volunteers who trusted their assurances. Or worse, think of the thousands of people who already have voted absentee for candidates who are no longer in the race - and whose votes are now wasted. Or think of the rest of the public, whose trust in the words of political aspirants has been frayed still further.

In our nation's history, giving an opportunity to third-party candidates, independents and primary challengers has infused new ideas into the system, moved agendas, drew more voters to the polls and laid the groundwork for breakthroughs or victories in subsequent elections. One need only scan the history of abolitionists, suffragettes, trade union backers and farmer-progressive reformers in the 19th century to make this case. Even by losing, they were winning. The blasphemy they articulated one day became the commonplace the next.

The two-party duopoly spent the 20th century passing legislation to squelch small starters and third parties and bar them from even getting on the ballot. It fought to keep us out of the debates. To the winner-take-all

structure of American elections was added the notion that there would be only two well-funded candidates, at best. One now can see the frantic drive to reduce the number of candidates in Tuesday's vote. The ease of getting on this exceptional ballot has been followed by the realpolitik of trimming the choices down. With Huffington out, the pressure from the duopolist crowd is now bearing down on Republican Tom McClintock, at a respectable 18 percentage points in some polls, and Peter Camejo, at about 5 percent in some surveys. McClintock's campaign manager, John Feliz, told me that his candidate would stay in the race, but added: "You don't know the state and national pressures we are under."

Why did the GOP from the outset abandon a veteran state legislator, who embodies the authentic tradition of conservative Republicanism, in favor of an actor of uncertain stands who is famous simply for being famous? Because he has more money and was ahead in the recognition polls. No other reason.

It is not because Schwarzenegger is vanquishing McClintock on the merits. The muscular front-runner is running away from debates, unscripted questions and inquiring reporters. He is playing an image strategy with smiles and handshakes in the midst of crowds whose daily assemblages are about as spontaneous as Potemkin villages. The marauding Terminator in the movies runs down his adversaries, while in real life he is running away from mild Gray Davis' challenge to debate. None of this is helping the voters. Isn't it more likely that the deficiencies of celebrity candidates or incumbents will be pointed out more clearly when

there are more debating candidates in the ring than when there are fewer?

A sports analogy comes to mind. Players are in the game to finish. If they drop out, they are humiliated.

As the candidate most often called upon to drop out of a race, I believe that doing so betrays the faith and effort of supporters and that it eases the pressures on the pollsters' front-runners to be their best.

Whether dropouts nourish atrophy or anomie, the public and future generations are the losers. The time to drop out is before they drop in.





**Gun laws may not stop violence**

ATLANTA (AP) - A sweeping federal review of the nation's gun control laws - including mandatory waiting periods and bans on certain weapons - found no proof they reduce firearm violence.

The findings from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention could be used to undercut the gun-control movement.

The CDC said its report, released Thursday, suggests more study is needed, not that gun laws don't work. But the agency said it has no plans to spend more money on firearms study.

Some conservatives have said that the CDC should limit itself to studying diseases, and some have complained in the past that the agency has used firearms-tracking data to subtly push gun control. In fact, since a 1995 fight in Congress, the CDC has been prohibited from using funds to press for gun control laws.

Since then, an independent CDC task force reviewed 51 published studies about the effectiveness of eight types of gun-control laws. The laws included bans on specific firearms or ammunition, measures barring felons from buying guns, and mandatory waiting periods and firearm registration. None of the studies were done by the federal government.

In every case, a CDC task force found "insufficient evidence to determine effectiveness."

Most of the studies were not funded by the CDC. Gun-control advocates quickly called on the government to fund better research.

"There have not been enough good surveys to know whether these laws work, and that's a very sad and troubling fact," said Peter Hamill, spokesman for the Brady Campaign to Prevent Gun Violence.

### Commissioners approve raising fees

**TWIN FALLS** - County commissioners Wednesday raised some planning and zoning fees to cover increased costs of providing services.

"We need to keep up with the increased cost of administration," said County Commissioner Bill Heckman.

By law, commissioners can only raise fees to actually pay for services.

The county cannot make a profit, said County Commissioner Gary Grindstaff.

County commissioners instituted a new \$150 fee for a final plat. They increased other fees from \$20 to \$275.

The biggest hike was for a conditional use permit for a telecommunications tower.

The fee went from \$200 to \$475, a 275 percent increase.

State lawmakers passed a new law during the 2003 Legislative Session that opened the door to allow counties to raise fees for county services.

Planning and Zoning Administrator Sue Switzer said there are two main reasons for higher costs and the need for fee increases.

First of all, the department is now in charge of notifying adjacent property owners of new applications, which previously was the applicant's responsibility. Secondly, the office has started holding monthly work sessions for Planning and Zoning commissioners.

Notices of the work sessions must be published in the paper, Switzer said.

Last year, the planning and zoning office collected 33,000 in fees, Switzer said.

### Legal legislator is chosen for training

**TWIN FALLS** - Rep. Sharon Block, R-Twin Falls, has been tapped to participate in the Western Legislative Academy from Oct. 14 to 17 in Colorado Springs, Colo.

The purpose of the academy is to build excellence and effectiveness in state legislators in the West region.

"As a second-term legislator, Block will learn about such things as the legislative institution, ethics, team building, communications and legislative strategies."

"Admission to the academy is based upon commitment, desire and interest in the legislative process."

Block is one of three legislators to be chosen from Idaho.

### Claim deadline nears in Cardizem settlement

**TWIN FALLS** - The deadline to file claims for reimbursement in the Cardizem settlement has been extended to Nov. 15.

Idahoans who purchased Cardizem or its generic equivalents from Jan. 1, 1998, through Jan. 29, 2003, might be eligible to file a claim.

"The claim form and filing information is accessible via the Idaho Attorney General's Web site or by calling (800) 372-2406."

Cardizem is used to treat high blood pressure and chest pain. The manufacturers were found guilty of delaying the introduction of generic versions, said Attorney General Lawrence Wasden.

Claims must be postmarked by Nov. 15, 2003.

# T.F. County awards jail study contract

**TWIN FALLS** - Boise-based architectural firm Lombard-Conrad will step in to help deal with Twin Falls County's jail overcrowding.

Twin Falls County commissioners, Sheriff Wayne Tousey, Magistrate Judge Howard Snyser, Prosecuting Attorney Grant Loeb and jail officials made the selection Thursday morning.

The firm - which will work in tandem with Dan Smith & Associates and Rocky Mountain Corrections Inc., whose co-

founder is Blaine County Sheriff Walt Penning - was the top choice of everyone on the ad hoc committee.

The group's original bid was \$60,000, but commissioners whittled it down to \$50,000.

"We reviewed the contracts and discussed them with all parties at the meeting," Commissioner Tom Mikesell said.

"Lombard-Conrad provided the most information and the process that most fits our needs to get us where we want to be."

Commissioners have sent the firm a letter of agreement and contracts. Once the firm returns the contracts signed, it'll get

to work, probably within the next couple of weeks.

During presentations Tuesday, representatives of the firm - which designed the existing county jail - highlighted how they would facilitate communication among county entities by forming a criminal justice council.

Invited members would be the public defender, prosecuting attorney, school superintendent, judges, health and human services representatives and the county clerk.

The firm also plans to work within existing alternative sentencing options to ease

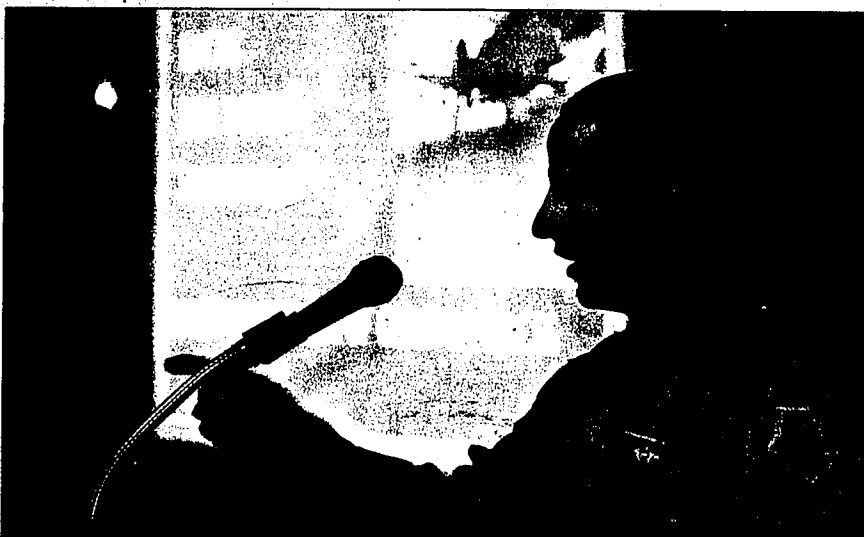
jail overcrowding. That might include building a work-release center.

County officials haven't said what construction project might emerge from the jail study. Nor have they said how they would pay for it.

Conrad-Lombard's other past projects include Gooding Memorial Hospital, Idaho State Police headquarters in Jerome, a women's correctional facility in Pocatello and the Ada County Courthouse.

"Because we already work with the county," Penning said, "we just need to work with the data we've collected and make a profile of the facility."

# Pilots home from Iraq share tales of war

## Airmen speak at Kiwanis Club's weekly luncheon

**TWIN FALLS** - At home in Boise's Gowen Field, Maj. Ronnie Kaufman of the Air National Guard deals with floods, blizzards and fires.

But nothing could have prepared him for the giant arachnids he encountered in Iraq.

"Those spiders will hunt you down," he said.

Kaufman and his friend Capt. Billy Soper, also based at Gowen Field, offered glimpses into the lives of airmen Thursday at the Kiwanis Club's weekly luncheon.

Both were born and raised in Boise and attended Boise State

University.

But rumblings in the Middle East took them far from home.

What began for Kaufman as a 30-day assignment turned into four months of active duty over the skies - and in the sand - of Iraq.

As activity grew during late winter and early spring, and their mission turned from Operation Southern Watch to Operation Iraqi Freedom, 42 A-10s, or "Hogs," and 8,000 personnel descended upon Kaufman's base in southern Iraq.

Kaufman flew 29 combat missions during the Iraq war. The country was divided into 30-by-30-mile sectors dubbed "kill boxes," and pilots were assigned an area to target.

During his missions, Kaufman was shot at, and returned in kind.

"We were willing to accept losses to get the job done," he said. "That's what we do."

Anxiety didn't just come from below, though.

"My biggest fear was getting slimed by missiles full of chemicals," he said.

It was a five minute process to get gear on, he said, so if an alarm sounded incoming missiles, everybody scrambled to suit up.

Even times when nerves weren't being rattled, conditions were less than pleasant.

"It was army standard," he said, "but us Air Force guys need a shower and a bed."

Those amenities were not always forthcoming.

"It was a bit rustic," he said, noting he lived in trailers with several other personnel.

Capt. Billy Soper piloted a C-130, or "Hercules," during 20 combat sorties in Afghanistan. As a cargo plane - it can carry more than 42,000 pounds and requires a minimum of five air crew - the plane is not exactly

lithic.

While he and his crew navigated above the beautiful mountainous terrain of northern Afghanistan, the view largely escaped their attention, he said.

Most of the time, they flew in complete darkness, donning night vision goggles to take off and land.

"It was like looking through two peep holes," he said.

Sixteen-hour days were tempered by rounds of beer back at base.

"We had beer cards and were allowed three beers on 'beer night,'" he said. "But not if we were flying."

Questions "frequently swirl" around the airmen from people eager to know whether they've been shot and how many injuries they've inflicted.

But there's another aspect they want people to know.

"Rarely do people ask if I like my job," Kaufman said. "I do. I can't imagine doing anything else."

## M.V.-bred bassist sues magazine

**LOS ANGELES** - Motley Crue bassist Nikki Sixx has sued a skateboarding magazine and the Vans shoe company for allegedly using his image in an ad without his permission.

Sixx, who grew up in Magic Valley and whose real name is Franklin C. Ferranna, said in the lawsuit filed Tuesday that the defendants used photographs of him with pro skater Tony Trujillo at a San Francisco ceremony which Thrasher magazine organized and Vans sponsored.

Sixx said he agreed to present Trujillo with a "Skater of the Year" award at the December 2002 ceremony because he knew Trujillo was a Motley Crue fan.

The 44-year-old musician said he was surprised to see photos taken at the ceremony in an ad for Trujillo's signature Vans shoes.

The photo also showed a marquee with the words "Thrasher Magazine's Skater of the Year Tony Trujillo."

The lawsuit said the ad appeared in Revue, Maxim, Stuff, FHM, Blender, and Alternative Press. It said the caption above one photo, "Live Fast, Die Young," was "somewhat reminiscent of the title of Motley Crue's first album, 'Too Fast For Love'."

Sixx also noted that he has a clothing line, "N. Sixx by Dragonfly," that seeks out the same youthful consumers Vans targets.

Vans attorney Craig Gosselin said the company hadn't seen the lawsuit, but planned to fight it.

Thrasher publisher Ed Riggins said he didn't believe the magazine should be named in the lawsuit because no one from Thrasher had asked that the publication's name be included in the ad.

Sixx spent eight years in Magic Valley schools during the late 1960s and early '70s.

He attended Twin Falls' Harrison Elementary School and Jerome Junior High School, but went to high school in Seattle.

Prosecutors drop kidnapping charges against Utah couple

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) - Prosecutors dropped kidnapping charges against Daren and Barbara Jensen on Thursday, with the couple pleading guilty to criminal interference in a deal that holds no jail time or fines. The misdemeanor conviction of criminal interference will be erased in a year if they stay out of trouble with the law, Salt District Judge Judith Atherton told the Jensens.

The parents were charged with kidnapping for taking their 8-year-old son out of Utah on Aug. 8 despite an order placing him in state custody for chemotherapy. They fear the treatment would leave 12-year-old Parker Jensen sterile and stunt his growth. The plea deal came six days after state child-welfare workers notified the parents of their custody and efforts to force chemotherapy on the boy. However, a juvenile court judge still could force the treatment at an Oct. 8 hearing. Because of the family's fierce resistance to chemotherapy, re-

commended by at least five doctors - state officials said the boy probably wouldn't benefit from treatment because of his unresponsive psychological state. The Jensens have accepted responsibility for custodial interference, said their lawyer, Blake Nakamura. "They understand why the DA's office filed these charges. Their fundamental concerns have always been with the state's use of the judiciary for allegations of neglect." Outside the courtroom, where they smiled while answering "guilty" to the charge of custodial interference, Daren Jensen said he and his wife were "feeling great." They refused further comment because of the pending juvenile court matter.

While the parents appear victorious in their highly publicized battle with the state, they still had to stand before a judge and plead guilty to a misdemeanor, Morgan district attorney Kent Morgan said. "If that conviction gets dismissed in a year, it's because they've had complied with all the laws of Utah," Morgan said. The Jensens "ended up in a year in jail for defying state custody by taking Parker to Idaho, where they stayed for weeks without releases." Parker Jensen was diagnosed with Ewing's sarcoma when a thigh tumor was removed last May from the soft palate of his mouth. Boise symposium mulls Patriot Act

BOISE (AP) - Every president has embraced secret intelligence gathering to some extent to support their own personal power, but the Bush administration "displays an unprecedented contempt for the idea of its own accountability," former Vice President Walter Mondale said Thursday. The former Democratic vice president under President Jimmy Carter spoke at a symposium on "Freedom and Security: Trading Liberty for Security." It was organized by former Idaho Gov. Cecil Andrus' Center for Public Policy. Andrus also served with Carter as his interior secretary.

Mondale said he is on a panel which included staff members for the late Idaho Sen. Frank Church's 1975 investigation of the CIA and FBI - said that review of the government's covert activities was a senator to protect Americans' civil rights. As a general from Minnesota, Mondale served on the Senate Select Committee on Intelligence, the so-called "Church Committee."

"That's almost too much to resist," he said. "What those presidents shared was also a fear that we might not be able to protect ourselves from enemies without breaking the law. These fears have always been exaggerated." But he blasted Attorney General John Ashcroft's efforts after the September 2001 terrorism attacks. The Patriot Act expanded government surveillance capabilities, toughened criminal penalties for terrorists and allowed greater sharing of intelligence information. Former U.S. Sen. Slade Gorton of Washington now serves on the independent commission investigating the 2001 attacks. The Republican told the symposium that federal officials likely knew a great deal about the Taliban activities in Afghanistan before the terrorist attacks, but neither President Clinton nor Bush could have persuaded Americans to go into that country in a pre-emptive strike if the airliner crashes had not happened. Mark Gittenstein, a counsel to the Church committee, said the investigation of the intelligence departments occurred in the

Gittenstein praised the oversight the committee placed over the FBI, CIA and other offices. "None of the abuses we've cited today could really occur if they're honestly reformed," he said.

# Craig will tour Iraq reconstruction

**ROME, Italy** — U.S. Sen. Larry Craig (R-Idaho) will lead a congressional delegation to Iraq to evaluate reconstruction projects in that country.

The group is expected to arrive in Baghdad in late September and will spend several weeks there before heading back to Washington. Craig and four others on a Senate subcommittee depart for an eight-day tour of Iraq, Jordan, Kuwait, Afghanistan, Pakistan and Turkey.

The purpose of the trip is to evaluate military and civilian infrastructure needs in Iraq and to see firsthand the problems — and successes — the United States is having as it rebuilds a foreign nation.

"I think it sends a very straightforward answer, and I don't mind being blunt about it," Craig said when asked whether he thought his position on the French and German companies might harm

reconstruction projects in Iraq. "There's been a lot of talk in this presidential election environment," he said. "All money spent (on reconstruction contracts) will be transparent and bid," he said.

Bush has asked Congress for \$87 billion in federal funding for Iraq. About \$20 billion would be spent on infrastructure — highways, power plants, industrial yards — to prop up the country's economy.

Idaho-based Washington Group International currently has no contract work in Iraq, but it has a project of about \$20 million in Afghanistan and has bid on work in Iraq, company officials said Thursday.

Craig said he "thought it was critically important that I get over there and listen and look, to

kick the tires" and see for himself what the military, political and economic needs were before he voted to approve the requested spending.

He also conceded that he is at odds with the administration over how much support should be granted to Iraq outright and how much should be delivered as loans.

"There's a lot of pros and cons about that, and I and the administration happens to disagree," he said.

Craig's tour is being led by Sen. Mitch McConnell, R-Ky., chairman of the Senate Appropriations' Foreign Operations Subcommittee. Security will be tight, but he said he will try to speak to ordinary Iraqis as well as officials in the U.S.-backed government.

The tour returns to Washington on Oct. 11.

# Sisters get probation for leaving kids alone

**BURLEY** — Two Burley sisters received suspended prison sentences last week after each pleaded guilty to some charges stemming from a Feb. 15 incident where they left their children alone while they went to a bar.

Graciela Herrera, 32, was sentenced to one to four years in prison on Sept. 25, but 5th District Judge Monte Carlson suspended the sentence, as recommended in the plea agreement, placing Herrera on probation for three years. Several conditions were placed on her probation, including that she not consume alcohol nor drugs, undergo a drug and alcohol evaluation, stay out of

bars, perform 100 hours of community service and either be employed or be in school while on probation.

Herrera was ordered to pay the public defender's office \$600 and assessed \$88.50 in court costs and fees. She was charged \$25 per day for the 38 days she spent in the county jail, too.

Lara's probation also carries conditions, which include that she undergo a drug and alcohol evaluation, not consume drugs or alcohol, stay out of bars and either have a job or be in school while on probation.

Herrera had been charged with five counts of felony injury to a child, but four counts were dismissed as part of a plea agreement with the Cassia County prosecuting attorney. She pleaded guilty to one count of felony injury to a child.

# Helicopter crash probe looks at pilot performance

**LAS VEGAS (AP)** — Investigators are focusing on pilot performance after finding evidence of engine failure or rotor problem in a Grand Canyon helicopter crash that killed seven people last month.

Wayne Pollack, the National Transportation Safety Board official heading the inquiry into the Sept. 20 crash, said people familiar with the flying tendencies of pilot Takashi Mezald have been interviewed.

"We're currently evaluating the pilot's conduct," Pollack said. Mezald and six passengers died when their Sundance Helicopters aircraft crashed into the western rim of the Grand Canyon about 80 miles southeast of Las Vegas.

Medical examiners have said all seven aboard the helicopter died from multiple blunt force and burns.

The passengers were identified as Dr. Joseph Hanna, 52, and his wife, Noohad, of Huntington, W.Va.; Masami Kato, 24, and Makiho Hatano, 23, both of Japan; and Julia Hueyng, 33, and Wolf-Dieter Mueller, 46, both of Germany.

Pollack declined to say whether Mezald was a native of Japan who lived in California, who was known to take chances in the air during the six-minute flight from the Grand Canyon West Airport near Zanele Springs, Ariz., to the Colorado River.

However, Pollack said investigators "received information that indicates the pilot at times presented passengers with more than a scenic ride down. Descend. You cannot tell you what the 'more is," he added.

Jim Granquist, Sundance Helicopters chief executive, said Mezald had top ranking as a helicopter pilot and was safe.

# Ex-con man has advice on stopping crime

**NAMPA (AP)** — A former con man whose life was detailed in the movie "Catch Me If You Can" says white-collar crimes like identity theft and embezzlement are easier to accomplish than ever.

Frank Abagnale Jr., now the head of an anti-fraud consulting firm, spoke at Northwest Nazarene University on Wednesday.

"Society cares more about violent criminals than someone who tips off an insurance company or banks," Abagnale said. "And of those white-collar criminals who are caught and ordered to pay restitution, less than 5 percent of that restitution is ever paid."

Those crimes cost the nation more than \$200 billion every year. And it comes out of everyone's pockets, to the tune of \$500 for every American in higher prices for goods and services.

As a teenager in the 1960s, Abagnale traveled the globe by misquoting as a pilot, stole millions of dollars with phony checks and seduced "an abundance of unwitting women while forging credentials as a doctor, lawyer and teacher."

Later, he was sentenced to 12 years in prison but was released after five years to help the FBI improve its anti-fraud investigations by turning his expertise against other con artists.

Technology has made things much easier, he said. A sophisticated counterfeit check can be created on a color copier. Counterfeit money can be scanned and printed on a computer. Identity theft is made simple by a number of Web sites that sell personal information.

There are less internal controls, he said. More companies have one accountant to write, send and reconcile checks. Without a separation of those duties, it is easy to embezzle. "And it is a relatively safe crime to commit."

Less than 2 percent of forgers ever go to jail.

"There are no criminals looking for a challenge," Abagnale said. "They're looking for opportunities."

He has plenty of advice on making such crimes tougher to commit. Abagnale advised consumers to reconcile their bank accounts every month.

"Banks aren't liable for bad checks if you don't cash them within 30 days. And they aren't responsible if you're negligent with your checks," he said.

Do not use document shredders that cut in straight lines. Those documents can still be reconstructed. Get a crosscut shredder that turns the documents into confetti.

When a person applies for a job, their prospective employer should call the organizations on their resume.

"Diplomas, for example, can be borrowed from a friend, scanned, altered, and mailed in a manila envelope acquired from the college when you request a catalog."

Employees in businesses handling money should learn to check for the security marks which ensure the cash is not counterfeit. Watermarks and microprinted words visible with a magnifying glass are things to watch for in genuine bills.

"Write checks with a gel pen, available for \$1 in convenience stores and many other places," he said. "It's the only kind of ink that can't be removed with chemicals."

**SILVER CITY, N.M. (AP)** — The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is investigating the deaths of four endangered Mexican gray wolves over a two-week period.

The fourth wolf, the dominant male of the Capitol pack, was found Sunday on a road near the northern edge of the Gila Wilderness.

"It's a blow to lose any animal in a pack, but especially the alpha," said Colleen McWay, an assistant wolf recovery coordinator. "The pack had been doing good."

People in the area reported hearing a gunshot shortly before the wolf was found, but the cause of death has not been determined. The wolf and three others that have been found dead since Sept. 15 were sent to a lab for tests to

determine the cause of death. One of the other wolves was found near Gilita Creek, not far from Snow Lake. Another was found off U.S. 180 near Silver City. The third was across the New Mexico border in southeastern Arizona.

"My assumption is that all these wolves were shot. We may have a wolf serial killer out there," Craig Miller, southwest director of Defenders of Wildlife, said Wednesday. "This clearly is a calculated effort to sabotage the recovery program."

The Fish and Wildlife Service will not comment on the cause of wolf deaths until its investigations are complete.

Buchanan said that federal law enforcement officers are discussing the string of wolf deaths.

**Utah unveils online database of public school records** SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — The State of Utah has unveiled an online database that contains information from some 40 million school records.

The database includes allows computer users to look up student attendance, test scores and other facts and figures.

# Debt might force shelter to shut down

**MOSCOW (AP)** — A local homeless shelter may be forced to close its doors soon due to debts totaling about \$80,000, but shelter board members say the Idaho Housing and Finance Association refuses to reimburse it for providing shelter services.

The tentative closing date for the Sojourners' Alliance shelter is Nov. 3.

"Sojourners' board doesn't want to close the homeless shelter at all," said Tom Whitney, the shelter's attorney. He added that the association has "incited this crisis and it truly is a crisis in the local community."

The Housing Association, which is not a state agency but administers funding for some government housing programs, denied that it was blocking the funds.

The potential shutdown comes at a time when late fall and winter begin to settle over the

"Twenty-nine people currently live at Sojourners' shelters. Six women, 11 men and one child live in the main shelter. Another 11 people live at Sojourners' transitional living apartments.

The grants that pay for Sojourners' operations come from the federal Department of Housing and Urban Development but are processed by the Housing Association.

Steve Rector, the Housing Association's director of public affairs, said his organiza-

tion was unable to release the money because HUD "has some questions that they have asked of Sojourners, and those questions are unresolved as we know it."

Rector said he did not know what those questions were, but "When we get that release, we will immediately wire the funds to Sojourner."

Whitney said those questions are part of an on-going, technical dialogue that have produced "crates full but amounts only of documents" to nitpicking.

"This is just a little agency in the middle of Idaho that takes care of homeless people," Whitney said. "We do not understand why we're getting this treatment from IHFA."

Sojourners' successfully applied for grant money in question from the Housing and Urban Development department for the past four years to fund its operations, Whitney said.

The grants were awarded and the money was earmarked for the Moscow shelters. But clearly, somewhere between the federal government and the Housing Association, it's gotten hung up. Sojourners' leaders have been unable to find out where or why, Whitney said.

# Would-be rescuers find Utah divers' bodies

**HIGHLAND, Utah (AP)** — Two brothers who went scuba diving in an irrigation canal marked by "No Diving" signs were pulled out dead Thursday after being trapped overnight.

The bodies of Ashton Hobbs, 23, and Byron Hobbs, 21, were found inside a 1,200-foot concrete tube that divers water from the canal into a farm field.

Rescuers partially drained the canal and rappelled into the 8-foot-wide tube, which extends some 100 feet downward before leveling out, Utah County

Sheriff's Sgt. Spencer Cannon said. The end of the tube emptying into the field has a grate on it. "It's not at all for diving," Cannon said.

The brothers told their parents about the dive Wednesday night, telling them to call authorities "if they don't hear from them by 10," Cannon said.

The rescue did not start until Thursday morning because the canal and tube had to be drained, which took several hours.

Family members were present when the bodies were pulled out.

# Hoodlums decide 'Devil Boat' number is up

**ARCO (AP)** — Vandals have again targeted Idaho's only submarine memorial.

Arco residents discovered Sunday that the identification number on the USS-Hawkbill's sail had been changed from SSSN-666 to SSSN-GOD. It's the second time dogmatic defacers have changed the number since the memorial was dedicated in July.

Many people associate the number 666 with Satan, believing it to be the mark of the beast as foretold in the Bible's book of Revelations. But the number that earned the Hawkbill the nickname "Devil Boat" denotes that the ship's keel was the 666th laid by the Navy since the USS Holland was built in 1900.

Woodrow "Doc" Reed of Pocatello said local submarine veterans were angry about the vandalism.

"Of course we're going to get hot," said Reed, who served six years on the USS Sturgeon and is active with the United States Submarine Veterans-Hawkbill Base. "We spent a lot of time and effort getting this memorial. It had 30 years of honorable service

I'm not so sure if it's an easy life to give it up with it is for him, but I love it with my heart and my husband." Tirrell Moore is a chemical decontamination specialist with the 520th Maintenance Company. His wife has served as a helicopter electronic technician with the 52nd Aviation Regiment. They are both staff sergeants. The couple was married in a civil ceremony eight years ago while stationed at Fort Drum, N.Y. With the new infusion of

Her husband has long claimed that someday he was going to win the lottery, Danielle Moore said. But when he returned from buying tickets this week, she didn't like the numbers and sent him back to the fast-food store to try again. The Moores are due to return

to the South Korea on Oct. 16. They say they may ask for an extension considering their change of fortunes. In the meantime, Tirrell Moore plans to do plenty of fishing while home in the south Georgia town where he grew up. "We have some time for the dream wedding. But fishing, that's what's coming up soon," he said. "It's relaxing, nobody bothering you and you can listen to the water."

# Companies get better at 'gene chips'

**SAN FRANCISCO (AP)** — Scientists from two rival companies announced Thursday they had succeeded in placing vital bits of man's 30,000 genes on a chip, the size of a dime, bringing so-called personalized medicine one step closer to reality.

Affymetrix Inc. and Agilent Technologies produced so-called gene chips — small pieces of glass infused with genetic material. Until Thursday, Affymetrix, and Agilent needed two chips to hold the same genetic material. Chips with parts of the genome have become indispensable in biology labs around the world. Now, Affymetrix, the industry leader, said researchers can buy the entire genome for between \$300 and \$500 each — roughly half the old price.

"It's a significant milestone," said Affymetrix chief executive Stephen Fodor. Employing semiconductor manufacturing technology, workers "print" genes one molecule at a time onto the glass until they stand up like microscopic skyscrapers, each about 25 molecules high. Researchers then drop onto the chips specially tagged RNA. The portion of a chip on which genes interact with the RNA becomes fluorescent, highlighting bad genes that may need a closer look. The twin announcements Thursday came on the heels of similar breakthroughs by Applied Biosystems and Genentech, and Madison, Wis.-based NimbleGen Systems, both of which said in July

they had created a genome on a chip. In addition, a research team from two German science institutes made a similar announcement last year. Because Affymetrix owns 80 percent of the commercial market, however, its announcement was greeted as an industry turning point. Even the chips touted Thursday, however, don't contain whole genes. Instead, they contain vital pieces of each gene. But more

Today, researchers mostly use the chips for basic genetic research.

Scientists believe many diseases are caused by genes "turning on" when they shouldn't. Knowing this, researchers can design drugs to attack suspect genes. Until gene chips came into vogue about five years ago, genetic scientists slogged slowly through their research, often investigating one gene at a time. Now they can analyze thousands of genes simultaneously, more quickly identifying disease causes.

Researchers even envision a day when pediatricians and other physicians can be armed with chips, technically called microarrays. The hope is that a drop of a newborn's blood can quickly be converted into a genome on a chip. From there, a doctor could determine the baby's predilection to disease and other genetic traits.

# Poll: Confidence in Bush fades

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — Doubts are growing about President Bush's ability to deal with international crises and the economy, says a poll released Thursday night. The CBS-New York Times poll found that 45 percent say they have confidence in Bush's ability to handle international crises and 50 percent say they have confidence in his ability to handle the economy. Four in 10 said they have confidence in his ability to handle it, while 56 percent did not.

His overall job approval rate was at 51 percent, with 42 percent disapproving. Bush's job approval rating ranged from the high 40s to mid-50s in several recent polls as approval on his handling of Iraq and foreign policy has dropped below 50 percent. People were evenly divided on whether they would probably vote for or against the Democratic candidate in next year's election. But by a 50-35 margin they expect Bush to win re-election.

A majority of people, 63 percent, said Bush has strong qualities of leadership and more than half, 53 percent, think he has more honest and integrity than most people in public life. The public view of Bush as a strong, honest leader who has done well in the fight against terrorism has been a major source of support, despite sagging ratings on economy, Iraq and other issues.

# Governor's ex-mistress pleads guilty to fraud

**LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP)** — Gov. Paul Patton's former mistress pleaded guilty Thursday to mail fraud for applying to have her husband's business get special consideration it did not deserve. Tina Conner pleaded guilty to the federal count in exchange for prosecutors recommending probation instead of prison time. "This has been very devastating to my family, my children," Conner said outside court. "But I have accepted responsibility for my actions and I can feel good

about that." She expressed indignation, however, that she had been charged, calling it "a chilling message to whistleblowers." Patton at first denied, then tearfully acknowledged his affair with

Conner, effectively ending his political career. He has consistently denied doing anything illegal or misusing his power to help Conner — or to harm her business — after the affair, as she alleged in a sexual harassment lawsuit.

## Study: Vibrating insoles might help elderly

LONDON (AP) — A buzz in the soles may keep elderly people on their feet and reduce the risk of debilitating falls, preliminary research suggests.

The experiment, outlined this week in *The Lancet* medical journal, found that elderly people showed signs of better balance when they stood on a pair of battery-operated randomly vibrating insoles.

Although users aren't conscious of the subtle buzz, the idea is that the vibrations amplify balance-related signals between the feet and the brain that become dulled with age or illness.

Experts said the research shows promise but scientists need to see if the technique improves balance when people walk, turn or reach, which is when they are most vulnerable to a fall.

When a person leans or sways to one side, the pressure on the sole of that side increases. Normally, the nervous system senses the change in pressure and sends a message to the brain so the posture can be adjusted. However, those messages can be blunted by age, stroke or conditions such as diabetes.

"I think the vibrating insole holds promise and is definitely worth studying," said Dr. Mary Tinetti, chief of geriatrics at Yale University School of Medicine, who was not connected with the study.

The research, funded by the U.S. National Institutes of Health, was conducted by scientists at Boston University and Harvard Medical School.

They recruited 27 healthy volunteers — 15 people in their 20s and 12 elderly people — to stand on the gel-based insoles, which were placed on the floor for the experiment. The volunteers were told to keep their eyes closed and their arms by their sides. The insoles were connected to a large battery pack and each was implanted with three small vibrating discs.

The intensity of vibration was set individually so that it was just below the threshold that could be felt.

The scientists conducted before and after tests on various tasks involved in balance control.

### Buzzing for balance

Elderly people showed signs of improved balance when they stood on a pair of vibrating insoles, new research suggests. The insoles could help reduce the risk of debilitating falls.

22% Loss of balance, dizziness, lightheaded or seizure

The nervous system dulls with age and the ability to sense "off balance" pressure in the foot is reduced.

With subtle vibrations delivered through small discs in the experiment, balance-related signals are amplified.

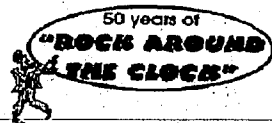

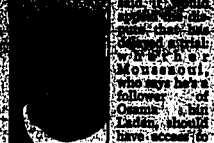


# U.S. bars death penalty for Moussaoui

# Phillip Morris pays \$2M to settle suit over car fire

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — A federal judge on Thursday barred the death penalty for Mohamed Moussaoui and prohibited the use of evidence linking him to the terrorist strikes in the Sept. 11 attacks. Judge Leonie Brinkema handed down the sentence in response to the government's refusal to obey her orders granting Moussaoui access to three al-Qaida prisoners that he claimed would testify he was not involved in the Sept. 11 attacks. She rejected the more severe option of dismissing all charges, as the government, Moussaoui and his court-appointed lawyers had asked.

The government did not contest a demand, but only because prosecutors believed that was the quickest route to intervention by a federal appeals court. The Justice Department previously

Moussaoui is accused of participating in a broad conspiracy to commit terrorism against the United States, a conspiracy that includes but is not limited to the Sept. 11 attacks. The defendant, a French citizen, has denied he was involved in the Sept. 11 planning and contended al-Qaida witnesses could back him up.

## U.S. bars death penalty for Moussaoui

The judge said in her ruling that Moussaoui "deserved" the chance to present that testimony. "That the United States has deprived Moussaoui of any opportunity to present critical testimony from the detainees at issue in defense of his life requires, as a sanction, the elimination of the death penalty as a possible sentence," she said. "The defendant remains exposed to possible sentences of life imprisonment."

Brinkema's evidence against the defendant because "it would simply be unfair" to require Moussaoui to defend against such "prejudicial" accusations "while being denied the ability to present testimony from witnesses who could assist him in contradicting

## Phillip Morris pays \$2M to settle suit over car fire

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Phillip Morris USA has agreed to pay more than \$2 million in the case of a toddler severely burned in a fire blamed on a cigarette left in a car — the first time the nation's No. 1 tobacco company has ever settled a personal injury suit.

The settlement was reached in May and was first reported this week by the Los Angeles Times. Shannon Moore, now 13, was 21 months old at the time of the blaze 11 years ago. She was asleep in her car seat when her mother got out for a quick stop at her grandparents' Fort Worth house and left a burning cigarette between the car's two front seats. After about 10 minutes the car was in flames, searing her face, ears, torso and hands — more than three-fourths of her small body.

Phillip Morris argued that the fire was started by the car's faulty

cigarette lighter, but that the child's mother ultimately was to blame, Lynn A. Grisham, the girl's lawyer, said Thursday.

Phillip Morris has a history of fighting lawsuits vigorously, but settled this case because it was "unique, isolated and not likely to be replicated," said John Sorrells, a spokesman for Altria Group Inc., the parent of Phillip Morris USA.

Since the settlement, Phillip Morris and three of its rivals agreed last month to pay a total of just \$900 — \$200 each — to resolve a flight attendant's claim of injury from secondhand smoke, Sorrells said.

Grisham said he sued Phillip Morris in 1994 after investigators closed a cigarette as the cause of the blaze and after he learned that the Marlboro 100 and other cigarettes are designed to continue burning down to the filter even when someone is not inhaling.

# Winter arrives early in Great Lakes region

It is less than 2 weeks old, but it almost felt like winter Thursday as it snowed in parts of the Great Lakes region and temperatures plunged as low as the teens and 20s.

In Wisconsin, the mercury fell to 13 Thursday in the north-central town of Phillips, and traces of snow fell as far south as Fond du Lac, some 60 miles northwest of Milwaukee.

Michigan was hard-hit with an overnight low of 23 degrees and 4 inches of snow since Wednesday in the Upper Peninsula town of Ironwood. One traffic death in the state was blamed on the weather.

Arctic air from northern Canada caused the mercury to dip about 15 degrees below normal, said Stan Levine, a meteorologist with the National Weather Service in Buffalo, N.Y.

In Barre, 30 miles south of Rochester, N.Y., the chill couldn't hang on at a worse time. None of the seven new boilers at the high school was ready to provide heat yet.

"The plan was to have heat next week," Superintendent Richard Sturzman said. He added, "Today was supposed to be Formal Thursday, but Student Council made it Snowsuit Thursday."

It also snowed Thursday in Lake Placid, N.Y. Veterans Memorial Highway, which leads to Whiteface Mountain, was closed temporarily for a second day because of 2 inches of snow.

"At the going rate, I wouldn't be surprised if in a few weeks we have someone skiing the highway," said Sandy Caligiore, a spokesman for the agency that runs the mountain.

# Judge blocks rock band's suicide show

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (AP) — A judge Thursday barred a rock band from holding an onstage suicide that its leader vows will occur this weekend during a performance to be broadcast over the Internet.

St. Petersburg city officials had asked Circuit Court Judge John C. Lunderman for the injunction after the group Hell on Earth announced plans to have a terminally ill person commit suicide during a show somewhere in the city Saturday night.

The judge had issued a temporary order Monday blocking the performance and any advertising for it.

Hell on Earth leader Billy Topfelor, who did not attend the hearing, had said earlier the band will defy a city law passed Monday that makes it illegal to conduct a suicide for commercial or entertainment purposes, and to host, promote and sell tickets for such an event.

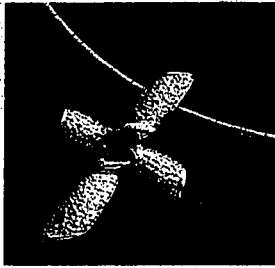

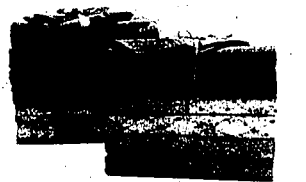

## Company of Fools considers 'Shirley Valentine'

**HAILEY** - Ever feel like a wall? You'll fit right in at "Shirley Valentine."

Company of Fools star Denise Simone is looking for all the "walls" she can get as she rambles on about life and the pursuit of happiness in this poignant yet inspirational one-woman comedy about a British housewife who's trapped in a dreary Merseyside marriage.

"Marriage is like the Middle East," she confides in her walls about her plodding insensitive husband who suffers culture shock if he ventures as far as Manchester. "There's no solution."

Shirley's husband's libber friend Jane has offered her an expense-paid trip to Greece - something she's always dreamed of. But Shirley tries to talk herself out of it, fearing that her husband and children will have a conniption.

"You know what Greece is. Greece is what you cook chipi' egg in."

By mid-play, however, she does venture out beyond the walls of her dingy Liverpool flat, leaving her husband a note, "Gone to Greece. Back in two weeks." Then she heads for a chance at a new life.

"The play shows that we don't need lightning bolts crashing around us to jar us," said E.L. Crowley, COF's musical director. "Sometimes a change in life can be prompted by something as simple as taking a couple deep breaths."

The play was written by playwright Willy Russell, who also wrote "Educating Rita." Opening on Broadway in 1988, it won the 1989 Tony Award for Best Play and netted English actress Pauline Collins the Best Actress award. Collins later reprised her role in a film of the same name. Russell also won the Olivier Award for Best Comedy.

On the face, Shirley is a dull housewife with a high school education, but she utters some great truths as she re-evaluates her life in the face of her children leaving her home alone with a husband who expects the same meal on the table every day of the week.

"We don't do what we want to do. We do what we ought to do and pretend it's what we want to do," she says.

It's not so much about finding out who we are but remembering who we are, remembering what we wanted and why we gave our dreams up and then doing whatever it takes to realize them now," Simone said. "As Shirley says, 'Dreams are never in the places we expect them to be.'"

man plays. But she had no inkling of how much energy it would take to star in one.

Simone entertains a pre-play ritual of eating a carbohydrate meal three hours before each performance, following it up with an hour and 15 minutes of yoga and vocal exercises on the stage. But she says she'll have to eat a protein meal this time just to give her the energy she needs to stay on top of her performance.

"I'm terrified really," she said. "But that resonates with Shirley. She talks about how as a child she jumped off roofs just for the fun of it. Now, in her 40s, she's looking to jump again. And so am I." The first act alone is 45 pages of single-spaced type without so much as a paragraph indentation. At one point Simone gave up trying to memorize it page by page and skipped to the last page to memorize it backwards. As of Wednesday, she had one page left in the middle to memorize.

"It was becoming torture to the point I didn't feel I could fit anymore into my brain," said Simone, who began committing the script

to memory July. "Bless my friends, they'd be talking to me and I'd be looking at them with a blank stare like I've got to memorize these lines."

"Of course, once you learn them, you have to unlearn them, meaning they become an organic extension of yourself so it's not about the lines anymore but the sharing of the story," he said. "And Shirley has many stories to share."

COF has imported foodstuffs from England - blue cans of Heinz baked beans, Moshy Chip Shop peas and H-P Sauce - to authenticate Shirley's kitchen. And set designer Stephanie Miller, a professor of theater arts at the University of Idaho, purposely designed a set according to Simone's petite height and weight. The kitchen door, 8 inches shorter than the average door, gives her a larger-than-life presence, almost like shining a spotlight on her for the two hours she's on stage.

"It's like a Montessori School," Simone said. "It snuggles around me. It's very comfortable, really." When Simone finishes her

three-week run in Hailey, she will take the play to Boise's Fulton Street Theater, a converted downtown warehouse. She also expects to stage it in the Pandita Theater in Sandpoint.

The expansion is part of the theater company's attempt to expose more people to Company of Fools and gain more income through ticket sales and new financial partners.

COF plans to take its spring show "Death of a Maiden," a political thriller about a woman who encounters a man who tortured her as a young girl, to Boise, Moscow and Sandpoint.

But make no mistake about it, said Director John Glenn: The company plans to remain in Hailey, where it's found the support that has enabled it to expand. "We're like a tree," he said. "Our roots are here in the Wood River Valley. We're just branching out a little at a time."

Sunday matinees will be followed up with Fools Unplugged, a chance to chat with actress Simone and Glenn over light refreshments.

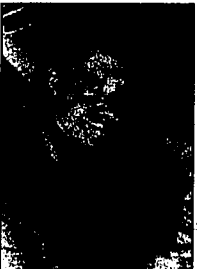
**BURLEY** - From the Alps to the Grand Tetons, Mini-Cassia Community Concerts will bring the world to the King Center this season.

• **"Bruce Almighty"** - A disarming comedy about the uses and abuses of omnipotence. PG-13 (profanity, sexual content, crude humor).

• **"Cable Fives"** - Filled with coarse comedy and flesh-eating dung, this impressively icky stave pic combines the hillbilly-country horror of the first "Blair Witch Project" with the viral destination and paranoia of "28 Days Later." It's not as grimy as the former, nor as good as the latter, but it's damn scary - and funny, too. R (violence, gore, sex, nudity, profanity, drugs).

• **"Cold Creek Manor"** - Gifted, idiosyncratic director Mike Higgin puts a subtly satirical spin on the old-dark-house thriller, which finds an attractive Manhattan couple (Dennis Quaid and Sharon Stone) ditching stressful city life for the expected peace and quiet of the chthonic, but the forbidding look of the dilapidated mansion they envision as their dream house proves all too prophetic. • **"Dickie Roberts: Former Child Star"** - Starring David Spade as the self-titled, has-been, "Dickie Roberts: Former Child Star" is a cookie-cutter production from Adam Sandler, whose films celebrate arrested-development crumbs who belatedly learn social skills. Narrated in the style of an "E! True Hollywood Story," the film is intermittently funny and strangely intermittent. PG-13 (drug and sex humor, profanity).

• **"Seven Years in Tibet"** - An improbably entertaining, if overlong, adventure that brings new meaning to the term "summer camp." Doubtless! Ripped bodiless Unabomber swastika "Pirates of the Caribbean" has it all. PG-13 (violence, sexual innuendo, skeleton zombies).

• **"The Rundown"** - With his first contemporary role (costume drama like the sand-and-sorcery epic "The Scorpion King" don't count) the Rock moves immediately to the top of the rock-'em-sock-'em crowd. "The Rundown" comes on like gangbusters with snappy tough-guy banter, colorful characters and abundant visual flair from director Peter Berg ("Very Bad Things").

Alas, as is often the case with lower-end genre movies, the story cooked up by Wiseman and his friends, actor Kevin Grevioux and the film's screenwriter Danny McBride, is decidedly less important than the look of the film and its influences. 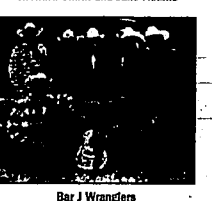

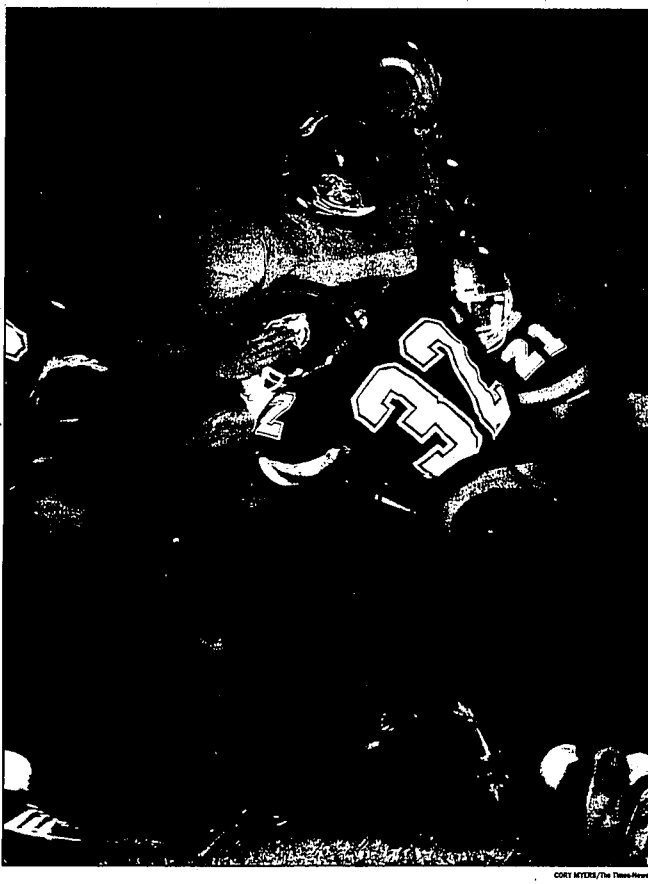
In contrast, the Bruin offense clicked from nearly the first snap.

# Maddux, Prior prepare for duel

## Marquee pitchers meet in Game 3 of Cubs vs. Braves

CHICAGO — There was a time when the Atlanta Braves knew they were going to win when Greg Maddux took the mound. The Chicago Cubs get that same feeling these days when Mark Prior gets the ball.

Something has to give Friday night at Wrigley Field when Maddux and Prior square off in the pivotal Game 3 of the National League division series. With the series tied, 1-1, the Braves and Cubs are counting on their respective aces to make a statement.

"I think one of the reasons we're in prime time is because of that matchup," Atlanta manager Bobby Cox said. As far as experience and style of pitching, Maddux and Prior could not be further apart. In his 17th big-league season, Maddux, 37, is pitching in his ninth divisional series, has 289 career victories and four Cy Young Awards and relies on finesse, pinpoint control and mixing speeds to keep hitters off-balance.

Prior, 23, just completed his first full season in the majors, is making his first post-season start, has 24 career victories and is a power pitcher who blows away hitters with a devastating fastball and nasty curve.

"They're completely different types of pitchers," said Cox. "Prior is one of the top guys in the game already, at a tender, young age, and Greg is still at the top of his game. He's had another super year for us."

Asked what he considered the most intriguing part of the pitching matchup, Cubs manager Dusty Baker said, "I guess the fact that you have the new, young lion on our side and you have the veteran-of-many-wars lion on that side."

When either pitcher is on his game, hitters have little chance. The dominating days don't come

as often as they once did for Maddux, who battled his way to a 16-11 record and 3.96 ERA — his highest since 1987 — in 36 starts this season.

Some folks believe Maddux's decline is connected to the new QuesTec umpire evaluation system, which prompted umpires to pull in the borders of the strike zone. Maddux used to live on the outer fringes of the strike zone, with hitters complaining that strikes were called on pitches far off the plate.

"I've never felt like my strike zone is any bigger than the guys I'm pitching against," Maddux said. "Whoever throws the most pitches on the corner gets most of the calls."

When Maddux was winning his first Cy Young Award with the Cubs in 1992, Prior was 12 years old and playing Little League ball in the San Diego area. He admit-

ted to being oblivious to Maddux's accomplishments at the time but made it clear he knows how formidable his mound opponent can be.

"Over the last 10, 12 years, he's had such a winning tradition," said Prior. "He's kind of a student/professor now. He knows every hitter, every ballpark, every umpire. He knows what he can do, and in a given situation, what he can get away with. That's the fun part of watching him."

The second player taken in the 2001 draft out of Southern California, Prior rose quickly to the big leagues, starting 19 games last season (6-6) for the Cubs. He established himself as one of the top pitchers in the majors this year, forging an 18-6 record and 2.43 ERA in 30 starts, with 245 strikeouts in 211 1/3 innings.

Oddly enough, it was a collision with Atlanta's Marcus Giles on the base paths at Wrigley Field on July 11 that proved pivotal in Prior's fabulous season. He suffered an injury to his pitching shoulder that forced him to miss the All-Star Game (Giles also sat

and) and spend three weeks on the disabled list.

After returning to the rotation, Prior was nearly unbeatable, going 10-1 with a 1.52 ERA in 11 starts. Over the span, he allowed only 67 hits and 16 walks in 82 2/3 innings while striking out 95.

"Having three weeks of knowing I'm not allowed to pitch or able to pitch, you kind of get a chance to regenerate and get your mind clear and refocus on what you want to do," said Prior.

## Castillo shifts to Florida where massive crowd is expected to turn up

MIAMI (AP) — The first two games of the playoffs have shown the San Francisco Giants how to beat the Florida Marlins: Keep Juan Pierre and Luis Castillo off base.

It's easier said than done. San Francisco succeeded in Game 1, when Pierre and Castillo went a combined 0-for-8 as Jason Schmidt shut out Florida 2-0.

But in Game 2, the Marlins' pesky little rally-starters came to life. Pierre and Castillo totaled five hits, and the Marlins won 9-5 to earn the split they wanted at PNC Ball Park.

Now the series moves Friday to Miami, where Pierre, Castillo and the Marlins' largest crowd since Game 7 of the 1997 World Series await.

More than 58,000 fans are expected in support of a team that a month ago was drawing barely 10,000. The roar from the burgeoning bandwagon is likely to be deafening when crowd favorite Pierre steps into the batter's box in the first inning against Kirk Rueter, with Castillo on deck.

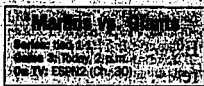

Oakland has been in this situation before, however. The A's won the first two games of their 2001 division series against the New York Yankees, only to lose the final three.

"Anyone who was around in 2001 knows we can't take anything for granted," Byrnes said. "I guarantee that nobody in here has thought beyond today's game."

# Austrian cardinal says pope is dying

**VATICAN CITY** — One of Europe's top cardinals said Thursday that Pope John Paul II was nearing "the last days and months of his life," the first ranking prelate to say the 83-year-old pontiff is dying.

With John Paul visibly weaker in recent weeks of concern over his health has been growing, Austrian Cardinal Christoph Schoenborn was the second leading prelate this week to express alarm over the pope's health.

"The entire world is experiencing a pope who is sick, who is disabled and who is dying — I don't know how near death he is — who is approaching the last days and months of his life," Schoenborn, who is the archbishop of Vienna, told Austrian state broadcaster ORF.

Schoenborn is considered a possible candidate for the papacy. His spokesman, Erich Leimbacher, later told The Associated Press the comments were "to be interpreted philosophically."

## Japanese city plans to use tracking system to find kids

**TOKYO** — Struck by the kidnapping of a teenage girl, a rural Japanese city plans to use a satellite-linked tracking system to help parents find their children.

In the northern town of Hirakami has asked two security companies to provide the service for the families of 2,700 elementary and junior high school students, said Kenkichi Kimura, an official on the city's Board of Education.

The abduction of a 15-year-old girl last month prompted the program. A 26-year-old man took the teenager to his home on a nearby island, where she was rescued 11 days later.

With the new service, students will carry devices that will send out signals allowing their parents to pinpoint where they are through a Web site on the Internet, Kimura said Thursday.

It will use a combination of technologies provided by mobile phone companies and the Global Positioning System, a U.S. satellite navigation service used by everyone from hikers to ship captains.

The device also will be equipped with a button that can be pushed to call for help.

## South African wins 2003 Nobel Prize for literature

**STOCKHOLM, Sweden** — South Africa's J.M. Coetzee, whose stories tell of innocents and outcasts oppressed by the cruel weight of history, won the 2003 Nobel Prize for literature Thursday.

The 63-year-old writer, long a favorite for the book world's most prestigious prize, was cited as a "scrupulous doubter, ruthless in his criticism of the cruel rationalism and cold calculation, pragmatism and morality of Western civilization."

The Swedish Academy said Coetzee's novels, which include "Disgrace," "Waiting for the Barbarians" and "Age of Iron," are also characterized by their "well-crafted composition, pragmatic dialogue and analytical brilliance."

Coetzee, currently a visiting professor at the University of Chicago's Committee on Social Thought, said the award "came as a complete surprise. I was not even aware that the announcement was pending." He noted that a previous Nobel laureate, Saul Bellow, had also been a committee faculty member.

## Swedish foundation awards 'alternative' Nobel prizes

**STOCKHOLM, Sweden** — A foundation that believes the Nobel prizes ignore accomplishments from less-developed nations issued its annual alternative version Thursday, citing people and groups from New Zealand, the Philippines, South Korea and Egypt.

The Right Livelihood Award Foundation announced the recipients of its "alternative Nobels," as the Swedish academy began awarding their prestigious namesake.

The Swedish academy awarded the 2003 Nobel Prize for literature on Thursday to South African writer J.M. Coetzee. The remaining prizes will be announced starting Monday.

The Right Livelihood recipients include David Lange, a former prime minister of New Zealand who has campaigned against nuclear weapons; and Walden Bello and Nicanor Perlas, anti-globalization activists in the Philippines.

Also sharing the prize are the Citizens' Coalition for Economic Justice from South Korea and SEKEM, an Egyptian network of businesses and social civil groups.

## World in brief

### British Labor conference closes with party divided

**BOURNEMOUTH, England** — Prime Minister Tony Blair left his ruling Labor Party's annual convention Thursday with members still bitterly divided over the war in Iraq and restless over the government's domestic policies.

Blair's unflinching speech to the party, in which he defended sending British troops to war and also lauded the virtues of strong leadership, earned him far applause from delegates earlier this week.

In a speech closing the convention, Deputy Prime Minister John Prescott appealed for unity and to praise Blair's leadership.

"Listening is important, proper debate is important," said Prescott, a laborer by profession.

"So is leadership. Seeing Tony in action underlines what a great leader we have."

But resentment over the U.S.-led campaign to topple Saddam Hussein and dissent over the government's plans to reform public services are simmering.

## New York fair will display bombed bus

**JERUSALEM (AP)** — A bus destroyed in one of the deadliest Palestinian suicide bombings will be displayed at a New York fair alongside a booth promoting Jewish culture and tourism to Israel.

Relatives of the bombing's victims are outraged, and Israeli government officials have quietly questioned the wisdom of the plans by ZAKA — Rescue and Recovery, an Israeli disaster response group.

The idea is to bring home the horror of the terror attacks that have plagued Israel, as well as to raise funds for ZAKA, a group of mostly ultra-Orthodox Jewish volunteers who assist ambulance crews and identify and collect body parts for burial.

In three years of Israeli-Palestinian fighting, 413 people have been killed, in 142 of Palestinian "suicide" bombings, many of them targeting cities and buses.

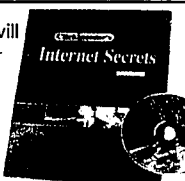

# Coalition forces become more lethal

### Guerrillas kill an average of 10 to 15 Americans a week

**BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP)** — Coalition forces are becoming more lethal since the fall of Baghdad in April, the commander of coalition forces said Thursday. U.S. soldiers are facing 15-20 attacks a day, including roadside bombs, Lt. Gen. Ricardo Sanchez said. Seven to 10 attacks a day involve small groups of fighters. "Most attacks occur in Baghdad and the surrounding Sunni Muslim stronghold to the west and north of the capital, although it's unclear whether Iraqi or foreign forces account for the majority. "The enemy has evolved — a little bit more lethal, a little more complex, a little more sophisticated, and in some cases, a little bit more tenacious," Sanchez said.

Since the start of the war, the hospital has treated 6,584 patients — 5,377 after May 1, she said. "What we don't see is a lot of, though we see some, is gunshot wounds," Shaw said. "We see a lot of shrapnel wounds, some amputations, some burns — mostly from individual explosive devices."

Shortly before the attack in Fallujah, a fuel tanker in a U.S. convoy near Amiriyah, southeast of the city, was hit by a mine or roadside bomb, according to Mohammed Hamid, who lives nearby. He said a soldier in the passenger seat of the cab pulling the tanker was killed and the driver was wounded. The military had no information on that attack.

In nearby Khaldiya, a roadside bomb exploded as a U.S. con-

voy was passing, but did not damage the American vehicles. Elsewhere, a soldier from the 101st Airborne Division and an Iraqi bystander were wounded in an ambush in Mosul. U.S. officials and Iraqi police said.

Meanwhile, U.S. officials said soldiers from the 101st Airborne Division raided three weapons caches in the Mosul area this week, seizing 15 surface-to-air missiles, 300 rocket-propelled grenades, 100 grenade launchers, 8,000 rounds of machine gun ammunition, rifles, mortar shells and two crates of plastic explosives.

The raids took place Tuesday. On the same day, Iraqi police raided a mosque in Mosul and confiscated two machine guns, 267 mortar shells and hundreds of rounds of ammunition, according to U.S. officials.

Iraqi officials have been urging the coalition to transfer security responsibility to Iraqis, echoing calls by France, Germany, Russia and other major powers who want to see a quick restoration of Iraqi sovereignty.

# North Korea says it is making atomic bombs

**SEOUL, South Korea (AP)** — North Korea said Thursday it was using plutonium extracted from some 8,000 spent nuclear fuel rods to make atomic bombs, alarming South Korea and other Asian countries that feared the assertion would jeopardize efforts to resolve the nuclear dispute peacefully.

It was unclear whether the announcement was sign North Korea has turned its back on the possibility of giving up its nuclear capabilities, or was an attempt to gain leverage ahead of any talks on the matter. The North has made similar provocative statements since the nuclear crisis started a year ago, but has engaged in two rounds of talks involving U.S. officials in Beijing since then.

"The (North) successfully finished the reprocessing of some 8,000 spent fuel rods," an unidentified spokesman from the communist nation's Foreign Ministry said in the statement carried by its official news agency, KCNA. American intelligence analysts believe North Korea already has at least one or two nuclear bombs. When reprocessed with chemicals, 8,000 rods can yield enough plutonium to make five or six more, according to experts.

North Korea may have reprocessed some rods after U.N. inspectors left the country in January, U.S. officials believe, but how many rods remain is unclear. It is believed to be well under all 8,000, however. American officials say reprocessing stopped a few weeks ago and has not restarted.

White House spokesman Scott McClellan said Thursday the

United States had not confirmed the North Korean claim, adding "they've made that statement before."

"There's no legitimate use for plutonium harvested during these procedures," McClellan said. "It would be a clear indication that they are intent on enlarging their nuclear arsenal, despite the call from the international community for North Korea to change its behavior."

In its statement Thursday, North Korea accused the United States of a "hostile policy" toward the country and said it had "made a switchover in the use of plutonium churned out by reprocessing spent fuel rods in the direction (of) increasing its nuclear deterrent force."

North Korea has claimed before to have reprocessed its pool of 8,000 spent rods, but Thursday marked the first it said the plutonium has been used to make nuclear weapons.

South Korea expressed concern this latest North Korean statement could hurt efforts to resolve the nuclear problem peacefully, hurt development of South-North Korean relations and damage the atmosphere of dialogue. South Korea's Foreign Ministry spokesman Shin Bongkil said.

Japan and China did not comment, but other Asian governments said they were concerned. "South Korea is bringing near the prospect of nuclear proliferation on the Korean peninsula would be a source of great concern to Indonesia," Indonesian Foreign Ministry spokesman Marty Natalegawa said.

# Israel announces plans for new homes in settlements

**JERUSALEM (AP)** — Israel announced Thursday it would build 565 new homes in Jewish settlements in the West Bank, violating a U.S.-backed peace plan and angering Palestinians already seething over plans to build a security barrier deep into the West Bank.

The "road map" peace plan requires a freeze in construction in some 150 Jewish settlements throughout the West Bank and Gaza Strip which Israel seized in the 1967 Middle East war.

However, an Israeli official said Israel did not have any responsibility to meet its obligations until Palestinians crack down on militant groups.

"The road map is stalled as long as there is no action taken by the Palestinians to dismantle the terrorist infrastructure," said Zalman Shoval, an adviser to Israeli Prime Minister Ariel Sharon.

When asked whether the U.S. government backed that interpretation, he said, "This is our understanding, the understanding that the two units were planned for a single settlement that is being dramatically expanded."

The government announced Monday after the Cabinet approved a plan for a security barrier that runs into the West Bank to shield key settlements — as well as Israel — from suicide bombers, who have killed hundreds of Israelis over the past three years.

Also Thursday, incoming Palestinian Prime Minister Ahmed Qureia announced he would submit his proposed Cabinet for approval to the Palestinian Parliament on Wednesday.

He then accused Israel of trying to circumvent peace talks by seizing land. Palestinians want for an eventual state.

The decision on the security wall — and new settlement units — "proves that the Israeli government is not serious about peace and that its goal is to draw the borders unilaterally and to sabotage the possibility for establishing a viable Palestinian state," he said.

The United States has said the wall's route could be interpreted as an effort to pre-empt negotiations and unilaterally define the border of a future Palestinian state.

In an effort to deflect the U.S. criticism, Israel is for now leaving large gaps in the barrier, which will be closed as the wall's final route will be decided in coming months.

# Putin says Russia can maintain its military might for years

**MOSCOW (AP)** — President Vladimir Putin said Thursday that Russia can modernize its aging strategic arsenal and maintain its military might for years, relying on stockpiles of Soviet-built missiles that he boasted are capable of overcoming any defense system.

Separately, the Defense Ministry warned that Russia will have to radically change its military reform plans — and its nuclear strategy — if NATO fails to shed what it called an "anti-Russian orientation."

Putin said at a meeting with top military brass that Russia has several dozen of what the West calls SS-19 Stiletto missiles, which he added were stockpiled without fuel and "in that sense are new." He said they will gradually replace older missiles that are taken off duty.

Highly toxic liquid missile fuel deteriorates over time and gradually erodes the missile's structure, thus limiting its lifetime. "Their capability, in particular in the sense of their ability to penetrate any missile defense systems, is unparalleled," Putin said. Russia sought in vain to per-

suede the United States not to abandon a Soviet-era treaty in order to develop a national missile defense system.

Military analysts have warned that Russia could soon find itself unable to maintain its parity with the United States as its aging Soviet-era missiles gradually come out of service. Putin's statement was apparently intended to reassure both the military and the public that the nation's nuclear deterrent would not dwindle.

"Thus, we have enough time to develop new types of weapons of the 21st century without rush," Putin said. He added that Russia had made "serious" progress in designing a new type of missile. Putin said that Russia was stockpiling the missiles in accordance with the latest nuclear arms deal with the United States, which he and President Bush signed in 2002.

# Weapons hunter finds no evidence of mass destruction arms in Iraq

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — Chief weapons searcher David Kay said Thursday he has found no weapons of mass destruction in Iraq so far, but he cautioned his team was still in the middle of an intensive hunt.

On the issue of whether Saddam Hussein had been in the process of retooling efforts to develop a nuclear weapons program, Kay said investigators had found no evidence beyond a possible tentative restart "at very most rudimentary level."

"It clearly does not look like a massive reurgent program," Kay said at Capitol Hill after briefing lawmakers in private.

Kay said his team had, however, found "dozens of WMD-related program activities, including thousands of pieces of equipment that Iraq concealed from the United Nations during the inspections that began in late 2002."

"We have not yet found stocks of weapons," Kay told Congress, according to a declassified version of his remarks, released by the CIA after the briefings.

"But we are not yet at the point where we can say definitively either that such weapons do not exist or that they existed before the war and our only task is to find where they have gone."

On another specific item, mobile trailers that were found after the war and cited as possible evidence of a biological weapons program, Kay said it is still unclear what they were used for. He cited biological weapons and helium weather balloons as two possibilities.

"We simply are continuing our investigation," Kay said. His report had been keenly awaited as six months of postwar searching passed without any announced findings that would validate most of President Bush's

# Pakistani army kills 12 suspected terrorists

**ANGORE ADDA, Pakistan (AP)** — Pakistani soldiers swooped down on an al-Qaida mountain hideout in the country's forbidding tribal region Thursday, killing 12 suspected terrorists and capturing 18 others in the military's largest-ever offensive against Osama bin Laden's network.

It was not clear whether any senior al-Qaida figures were among the dead or captured, who all appeared to be foreigners, army officials said. The area in Pakistan's fiercely autonomous Waziristan region has long been considered a likely hiding place for bin Laden, a Saudi exile, and his top deputy, Ayman al-Zawahiri, an Egyptian.

A battle was ongoing late Tuesday and authorities believed several dozen al-Qaida fugitives were still in the area, said Maj. Gen. Ameer Faisal, the commander of the operation.

**Shipping industry adopts new strategies to handle tough economy**

To cut costs when the economy wilted, Pine Hall Brick Co. turned to its shipping budget. By keeping extra spare parts on hand, the Madison, N.C., brick maker has reduced the number of pricey next-day shipments it needs.  
"Link-Belt Construction Equipment Co. of Lexington, Ky., also looked at its shipping expenses but took the opposite approach. The crane manufacturer scheduled smaller and more frequent supply deliveries - a net savings because it sharply lowered inventory costs.  
The contrasting strategies of these two companies illustrate the shipping industry is picking up the pieces. Indications that the economy is perking up are tempered by signs of corporate stinginess.  
"We do remain optimistic that the economy will strengthen," said Kurt Kuehn, senior vice president of investor relations at United Parcel Service Inc., although he said right now there are mixed signals. Home deliveries have been good, Kuehn said,

but business-to-business deliveries have lagged behind expectations.  
Likewise, executives at FedEx Corp. were disappointed with shipping volumes in the retail and manufacturing sectors during the June-August period, its fiscal first quarter, although the company reported its first quarterly increase in U.S. express-delivery volume in 2 1/2 years.  
To be sure, FedEx and UPS, the biggest integrated shipping companies, have weathered these tough financial times pretty well. They've cut costs, brought in new customers in underserved international markets and focused on expanding niche businesses domestically.  
A year ago FedEx committed \$1.8 billion to nearly double the size of its ground transportation unit, FedEx Ground, by 2009, in a bid to increase market share in an area where UPS is the industry leader. UPS, meanwhile, has made gains in the lucrative domestic air parcel business dominated by FedEx.  
Yet while analysts and executives talk up these successes, and point to evidence of a U.S. econ-

omy on the mend, a measure of caution persists.

"We also saw some slow economic recovery in manufacturing," he added.

Penney chairman and chief executive Allen Questrom has said consistently that Eckerd is a prized business in a growing category that needs to be fixed before the board can decide to keep it or

sell it at a premium price.  
That decision is due before the end of this year, the third in Eckerd's three-year turnaround plan.  
Some analysts expect that Eckerd's setbacks will also put pressure on the five-year timetable for turning around the J.C. Penney department store chain.  
Citing the newly revised second-half outlook, Standard & Poor's analyst Gerald A. Hirschberg said that "management's five-year plan for improving the overall business will probably be extended by at least a year or two because of the extremely competitive retail environment, challenging economic conditions and the difficulties at Eckerd."  
Robert A. Olstein, an accounting expert and manager of the \$1.6 billion Olstein Financial Alert fund, wants Eckerd sold or

**U.S. beef farmers still must pay fee**

**Charge continues until appeals are complete**

SIOUX FALLS, S.D. - It's no bull. American beef farmers and ranchers still have to pay a \$1-per-head fee on cattle sold in the United States until a lawsuit on the beef checkoff is settled.  
The 8th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals ruled in July that the national program known for its "Beef: It's What's For Dinner" slogan is unconstitutional. A three-judge panel affirmed a lower court decision that the mandatory program violates the constitutional rights of cattle ranchers by infringing on the First Amendment.  
But the trial judge and the appeals court also required ranchers and farmers to keep paying the fee until all appeals are exhausted.  
That part of the ruling has been misunderstood, said Diane Henderson, communications manager for the Cattlemen's Beef Promotion and Research Board in Denver, which uses checkoff money to promote beef.  
Farmers, ranchers and reporters are "calling, saying we don't have to pay now," she said.  
"The point we want to make clear is that beef producers are still required to pay \$1 per head on every bovine animal sold."  
The parties are waiting to find out if the full appeals court will hear the case, Henderson said.  
Three South Dakota ranchers, the Livestock Marketing Association and others sued the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Agriculture Secretary Ann Veneman and the Cattlemen's Beef Promotion and Research Board over the checkoff program.  
They argued that ads paid for through the program promote beef in general and not just beef raised in the United States. In effect, they don't want to pay for a marketing campaign they don't agree with.  
Since 1985, livestock producers have had to pay the mandatory fee on cattle sold in the United States. Half of that money goes to the Cattlemen's Beef Promotion and Research Board and half to qualified state beef councils. The checkoff collects more than \$80 million a year.  
Money from the checkoff helps fund advertising, education and research programs.

Wall Street ends day with modest gains

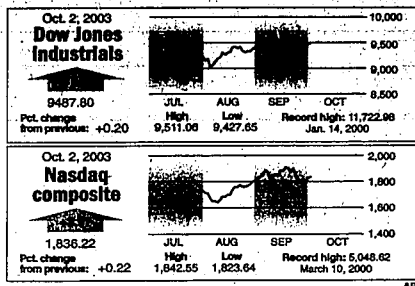
NEW YORK (AP) — Wall Street ended a mostly indecisive session with modest gains Thursday as investors, still uneasy about stocks' high prices, continued to extend the previous session's huger rally.

But analysts said investors, despite their nervousness, are concerned about missing out on the next bull market and so are more inclined to buy stocks than sell.

"It seems to be somewhat tentative," said Peter Cardillo, president and chief strategist of Global Partner Securities Inc., of Thursday's trading. "But nevertheless, I kind of think what we are seeing is people trying to get in the market who held out in the month of September... Investors were not too far off."

The Dow Jones industrial average closed up 18.60, or 0.2 percent, at 9,487.80, having surged 194.14 — its biggest daily gain since June — in the previous session.

The broader market also finished higher. The Nasdaq composite



positive index rose 3.97, or 0.2 percent, to 1,836.22, following Wednesday's gain of 45.31, its biggest one-day increase in three months.

The Standard & Poor's 500 index advanced 2.02, or 0.1 percent, to 1,020.24, having climbed 2.25 in the previous

session, its biggest daily gain in six months.

Stocks had a tough time advancing given investors' concern about prices. Some market observers are worried that economic data is not sufficiently upbeat to keep the market on its upward path.
