## T.F. eyes running its own court

TWIN FALIS - The city of Twin Falls is ready to open its own, magistrate court rather than pay the dues the county says it owes them.

"We could operate on our own and save \$200,000," said Fritz Wonderlich, the city's at-

torney.

A group of magistrate judges led by 5th District Administrative hudge Barry Wood heard from the county and the cities Friday about what each thinks its portion of the bill should be for services the county provides to process misdemeanor cases and infractions.

Those numbers differ dramatically.

The county says the city of Twin Falls owes it \$250,000 in Compensation for the costs of running the magistrate division, costs that include use of facilities, equipment, clerical staff, supervisors, bailiffs and housekeeping.

Meanwhile, the city says its taxpayers are already paying for those services in their property tax bills and in revenue the county receives from sales tax and other general revenue which is partially based on city market values.

"City taxpayers ought to receive credit for those taxes, city Manager Tom Courtney said, "Instead, city residents are being charged twice, once in property tax and secondly through the fees the county receives from sales county not out assessments.

### Utah woman denies accusations of murder

SALT LAKE CITY - The woman at the center of a fetal-murder case who allegedly refused a Caesarean section that doctors sald would have saved one of her bables denied in a lailhouse interview, Friday that she killed the fetus.

Melissa Ann Rowland, 28, rejected claims she refused the surgery because of cosmetic worries. SALT LAKE CITY - The

"It was all medical concern. None of it was vanlty," Rowland told The Associated Press a day after prosecutors charged her with exhibiting "deprawed in avoiding the C-section." In ever imagined having a stillborn would get me national enves coverage or a murder charge," Rowland told the Aftering a 30-minute interview at the Salt Lake County lail. Rowland, who has been in the lail since mid-January on a

child endangerment charge in-volving the surviving twin, said she was informed of the mur-der charge—Thursday evening by monoters.

"I feel like I'm getting a lot of attention that (should be) my private business," she said.

Critics of the charges say the case could affect abortion rights and open the door to the prosecution of mothers who smoke, fail to follow their ob-settriclan's diet or take some other action that endangers a fetus.

"It reaches a level that is extraordinary in our legal understanding of bodily integrity and what that means in this country," said Kim Gandy, president of the National Organization for Women and a former prosecutor.



## Explosion in Tikrit kills two soldiers, wounds four more

TIKRIL Iraq (AP) – An explosion early Saturday in Saddam Hussein's hometown killed two American soldiers and wounded four, the U.S. milliary said. The soldiers were on patrol in downtown "Thirit", north-of-Baghdad, when a roadside bomb exploded, said Capt. Tim Crowe of the U.S. Army. Small arms fire erupted after the explosion. Initial reports said six soldiers

were wounded. But the military later said two of the wounded had died. The four other sol-diers were evacuated to a military hospital north of Tikrit. It was not immediately uncleir -how serious the wounded sol-

It was not the wounded soudlers' injuries were. The soldiers were from the U.S. Army's 1st Infantry Division, which is taking over security in the Tikrit area on Saturday.

## Survivors return to Iwo Jima

IWO JIMA, Japan (AP) - When ordon Ward first hit the black-nd beach at Iwo Jima as a byear-old U.S. Marine, the air 23-year-old U.S. Marine, the air vas alive with the crash of naval guns and buzz of bullets. The battle of Iwo Jima – the name means Sulphur Island – Im February-March 1945 was crucial for both sides. The Voltano Islands, of which Iwo was part, were 700 miles south of Tokyo and part of the capital prefecture, thus the first part of japan proper to be invaded.

## **GOP** takes new look at importing drugs

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Bush administration and Republican obngressional leaders are being forced to take a hard new look at the idea of importing cheaper prescription drugs from foreign countries as an election-year clamor grows formowing prohibitions.

Continuing increases in prescription drug prices - the fastest growing item in health care—and the pitched partisan battle over the new Medicarl law have given the topic greater prominence in Congress and on the campaign—trail.

AARI! the 35-million-mem-

AARP the 35-million-member seniors', group that gave Republican-backed Medicar legislation a critical endorsement last year, backs allowing imports. So do two Republican senators, former GOP leader Trent Lott of Mississippi and John Cornyo of Texas, both changing their position in recent days.

And so do nearly two-thirds of Americans, according to a recent AP poll.

Drug importation has become a proxy for talking about the high cost of prescription

drugs in the United States.

Spending on prescription drugs is the fastest-growing component of health care costs, rising 15.3 percent in 2002.

Drug costs are expected to onistrip the overall growth in health care spending for the next 10 years, and that projection doesn't even take into account the new Medicare prescription drug benefit that begins in 2006. Many commendates believe the change will lead to an additional increase in costs.

## House approves teacher pay raise package

BOISE — The Idaho House gave final legislative approval Friday to a bill that boosts start-ing pay for teachers but provides no state funding to give more ex-perienced teachers a raise. The House voted 41-28, with 12 Republicans joining all 16 House Democrats who voted availast it.

against it.

GOP Rep. Scott Bedke of Oak-ley presented the 2004-05 pay package as an overall increase of 3.1 percent. He pointed especial-ly to a portion of the plan that ralses pay for starting teachers



from \$25,000 to \$27,500 next school year.
The \$25,000 pay floor has been a state mandate since 2001, but the state never ap-

state never ap-propriated enough money

Rep. Scott Bodto to cover it, leaving school districts to raise property taxes to make up the difference.

Severall lawmakers noted that Idaho was recently raiked 44th among the states for starting

teacher pay, and 30th for experienced teacher pay.

Bedke said the move up to 527,500 benchmark would raise Idaho's ranking for new teacher pay to about the same as the ranking for experienced teachers.

Additionally, Bedke said school districts that have been using other resources to fulfill the \$25,000 pay quota could use those funds for anything else they choose, such as boosting experienced teachers' pay.

## House approves new drug-testing scholarship

College money for drug-free students might have to wait for next year.

By Julie Pence Times-News writer BOISE — Legislation creating a new scholarship for students proving to be drug, alcahol and tobacco-free through random drug testing passed the House 52-5 on Friday.

Sponsored by former kindergarten teacher Rep, Sharon Block, R. Pubr. 1 Falls, it would allow students to get up to 51,000 per year to apply to their college or post-high-school technical education.

But though the House approved the bill overwhelmingly, senators aren't sure there will be time to get it through their chamber. Most lawmakers are predicting March 19 as the date for adjournment. In order to accomplish — that, Senate leadership has to start shutting down committees in which the bills are considered before hit ting the floor, and that could happen early next week.

Block's bill, which has strong

## Uranium at Nevada mine stirs fear Idaho Senate OKs

RENO, New (AP) – New tests show extremely high levels of uranium in groundwater beneath an abandoned northern Newada copper mine, and federal regulators say more tests are needed to determine in nearby wells could be contaminated.

The Atlantic Richfield Co. has agreed to provide bottled water to at least 10 households with wells near the mine even though most private wells and all of the municipal wells met U.S. drinking water standards in the latest round of tests. The company-1s-responsible for cleaning up the 3,500-acre for

mer Anacond mine site that has been mined since 1953.
Tests conducted in December found concentrations of uranium in a monitoring well at the mine at more than 200 times the Environmental Protection Agency's standard for public drinking water. Tests found the well had 7200 micrograms of uranium compared with the legal limit of 30. One mine collection pond recorded 11,200 micrograms of uranium per liter. Uranium is considered a carcinogen.

per liter. Uranium is considered a carcinogen. Armed with the new data, the EPA, with added pressure from Sen. Harry Reid, D-Nev., is

pushing the state to broaden its Investigation into how far the pollution may have moved off the site bordering the small, ruml community of Verington.

Aides to Reid resumed tailst this week with Gov. Kenny Guinn and the Nevada Department of Environmental Protection to explore whether the state should reverse its long-held opposition to declaring the mine a Superfund site.

## Senate committee introduces key changes in public charter school law

A second bill resolving financial problems with charter schools is awaiting House and Senate approval and has the support of the governor.

Charter school officials said they needed to evaluate Schneeder's policy proposal before commenting on it.

The state commission would consider appeals of charter proposals rejected by local school boards and then oversee the new schools if the commission majority votes to issue the charter anyway. Kempthorne had wanted the commission to have initial chartering authority, allowing it to grant a charter in a school district even if the local district board had never been asked.

## Regents approve tuition hikes

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — The state Board of Regents on Friday approved tuition hikes averaging 9.3 percent across the board for the state's nine public colleges and universities

coaux or me states mine public colleges and universities. Regents spokesman Dave Buller said that annual student fees for health services, com-puters, athletic and student-activities increased 5 percent on verage. Currently, fees range from \$300 at Snow College to \$630 at the University of Utah. The tuition and fee hikes at the university's flagship campus mean that undergraduates will pay an additional \$306 and graduate students will pay an additional \$373 each semester. Buller said.

Out-of-state tuition will increase \$333 for undergraduates and \$558 for graduate students each semester.
An undergraduate Utah resident with a full 15-unit course load will now pay \$3,394 in tuition for the full year.
Business graduate students will pay even more under a differential tuition increase, which 13 university graduate professional programs use to address unique needs — in this case, laring faculty.

Differential tultion increases will increase the cost of each credit hour from \$58 to \$91.50 for masters program students



## Judge orders university to turn over student records

BOISE, Idaho (AP) – Three University of Idaho professors were ordered by a federal judge on Friday to turn over all files and other information about the graduate student accused of aiding terrorism.

The brief order from U.S. District, Judge Edward Lodge granted the government's request to obtain the files and other records on Sami Omar Al-Hussayen prior to his scheduled April 13 trial on two-charges of supporting terrorism and 11 counts of visa fraud.

Named In the subpoena's were lames Alves-Foss, a faculty member in the university's Computer Science Department; fohn Dickinson, a rotined member of the computer science faculty, and Deboral Finika, another department faculty member currently on a leave of absence.

On advice of the university's attorneys, he declined to discuss his relationship with Al-Hussayen beyond saying that he was not his faculty adviser and that Al-Hussayen had been taking one of his classes. All three professors have been subpoenaed to appear at the trial.

Al-Hussayen, 34, had been jailed for more than a year since his arrest at his home on the university's Moscow campus in late February 2003.

Bookstore closes its doors time year.

"We just card keep up, said Scott Baumert, who bought the store in 1992 and relocated it from Centennial Mall to Main Street in 2000. "So much Christian product has gotten in general stores, like Costco and Walmart and Hissings and Barnes and Noble – and discount stores, in most cases, can sell the merchandise cheaper."

ers now carry the top 20 percent of Christian bookstore items. Baumert added, which accounts for 80 percent of saccounts for 80 percent of sac. Meanwhile, lite restaurant inside The Christian Bookstore is doing well, and the Christmas store has grown every year.

Curriculum sales at Baumert's shop were a problem, too, with Internet sales and mail-order businesses taking an increasing chunk of he market.

said Baumert. "We are down to my wife and me and two part-time employees. We have laid off everyone else." In the, store's glory days, Baumert recalled, he had 12 employees.

Playing six spades, you find yourself in a contract with no top losers but quite a lot of work to be done. On a club lead, you win in dummy to pass the heart king — a ruffing finesse that is quite likely to succeed on the auction, given West's pre-empt. Alas, the finesse loses, and back comes a second club, which you win in hand, pitching a diamond from dummy as East produces the club queen.

You now need to avoid a spade lose, singleton king, or East for the singleton king, or East for the singleton king, or East for the singleton jack? The auction suggests that West will be short in spades — but you actually have a chance to obtain some extra information by cashing the diamond ace now and ruffing a diamond in dummy. If West follows once-then-discards on the second diamond, pitching a heart.

Since West is highly unlikely to have two singletons, you cross back to hand wilh a heart ruff and play the spade queen from your hand, crossing your fingers as you do so. The queen holds the trick, and obviously you have been nice rather that haughly in the past year since East contributes the jack. You take a further spade finesse, draw West's outstanding trump, and claim the remainder.
