FALLUMAH, Iraq (AR) – U.S. Marines battled insurgense for control of this Sunni Muslim stronghold Wednesday, calling in aistrikes against a mosque compound where witnesses said dozens were killed in six hours of fighting. An anti-U.S. uprising led by a radical Shire cleric raged for the fourth day in southern cities.

The Abdel-Aziz al-Samarrai mosque was hit by U.S. aircraft that launched a Hellfier missile at its minaret and dropped a 500-pound bomb on a wall surrounding the compound.



The U.S. military said insurgents were using the mosque for a military fire base. Iraqi win-nesses estimated 40 people were killed as they gathered for aftermoon prayers. U.S. officials said no civilians died and American commanders gave conflicting reports of insurgent casualties.

Eric Knapp sald the Ameri-can force besieging Fallujah has killed more than 30 suspended insurgents and captured 51 since iluseday night. Sen. Patty Murray, D-Wash, reminded her that some people have characterized the department's strategy as "blackmail" in an attempt to get the federal nuclear waste law changed and circumvent the federal court ruling. The Energy Department is appealing that court case, but would prefer Congress change the law.

They didn't get their way in court, so now they want the law changed, "Murray said in an interview. "Pervyone is for accelerated cleanup as long as its done in a way that protects workers safety and we don't cit comers."

The waste, some in leaking lank, has been described as a "witch's brew of radioactivity left over from nuclear reprocessing. Often only haphazard records were kept as to what actually was being poured into the anks, according to deanup engineers. Dealling with this materials is at the core of a much broader waste cleanup effort hat Energy Department says will cost \$2.73 billion.

The telescope's mirror has a diameter of 24 inches, one inch smaller than the nearest telescope at the Bruneau Dunes State Park and one fourth the size of the Hubble space telescope. The Bruneau Dunes Observatory's telescope can gather about 8 percent more light, but the design of the Herrett Center's telescope will enable it to present a larger field of clear viewing. Observatory Manager Claris Anderson said.

The two telescopes will complement each other well, he said. People can get convenient access to a telescope and catch the astronomy bug in Twin Palls, then head out to Bruneau for the experience of using a telescope in a dair, sky.

### Kerry: Cap spending, will cut own programs

WASHINGTON (AP) – Democrat John Kerry sald Wednesday
that if elected president he will
tap federal spending and acknowledged that doing so will
require lihm to cut some of his
campaign promises.
Kerry said he would not allow
the federal budget, other than
spending on education and
homeland security, to grow beyond the rate of inflation.
"When I say a cap on spending, I mean if. Kerry said in a
speech at Georgetown University. "We will have to make real
choices – and that includes priorities of my own."
Kerry said he would scale
back nonessential government
programs, and gave such examples as freezing the federal
travel budget, reducing oil royafty exemptions for drilling on
federal lands, eliminating
100,006 federal contractors and
cutting—the—federal\_governments electricity use by 20
percent.
Those program cuts would

h o o d education and a proposal to provide tuition to stude en tis attending state college in exchange for two years of national service. He didn't say how much they would be scaled back. Kerry's pledge to abide by spending caps could open him to criticism that his campaign promises cannot be trusted. Kerry has yet to provide a budget that explains how much his proposals would cost and how heed pay for them.

His policy director, Sarah Slanchi, said if he sticks to the programs despite the increasing deficit "maybe you get something for consistency, but it's incredibly reckless."

WASHINGTON (AP) - The government announced Wednesday that it has issued the first license for a manned suborbital rocket, a step toward opening space flight to private individuals for the first time.

to Scaled Composites of Mojave. Calif., headed by Burt
Rutan. He is best known for designing the Voyager airplane
that made the first nonstop, unrefueled light around the world
in 1986.


The Scaled Composites craft consists of a rocker plane, dubbed SpaceShipOne, and the White Knight, an exotle jet designed to carry it aloft for a high-allitude launch. SpaceShipOne, made of graphite and epoxy, has short wings and twin vertical talls. It reached 68,000 feet in a trial flight.

# Report: FBI's abilities need addressing

WASHINGTON (AP) — Questions remain about the FBI's ability to transform itself into an effective domestic intelligence agency geared to prevent terrorism, congressional researchers, have concluded. They say one alternative is creation of a new standalone agency to do the job.



# Congress tackles deficit spending

ven the works in Wash ington find their eyes glazing over when the topic is congressional budget brocedures, so diele is no shame for citizens who wan be spared the details of that particular form of legislative sausage-making.



Nonetheless, Congress faces an important decision when it returns after Easter about the rules by which it will make fu-ture tax and spending decisions.

ture tax and spending decisions.
An uphill effort will be made to revive the "myn-as-you go" (or "pay-go" in shorthand) rule for budget-making— and anyone who cares about the staggering debts were passing on to our children and grandchildren has a stake in this fight.

Pay-go" was in effect from 1990 to 2002, when the budgetary pressures of the recession and the war on terrorism persuaded Republican leaders of Congress to abandon it.
In its time, it made a major contribution to moving the country from deflicts to surhers.

Now, with the deflict for next year projected at a record \$521 billion, many in Congress are saying its time to bring "paygo" back.

The rule was pretty simple: It basically said that any increased spending or reduction in revenues had to be offset by reduced spending somewhere "else or additional taxes.

It was in effect, the same rule that most families apply to themselves: Thin your wishes to what you can afford.

There's been nothing partisan about the approach, it was originally negotiated between the first President Bush and Democratic Congress. It was renewed by a Democratic Congress and Presence and Clinton.

In 1937, overwhelming majorities of both parties supported the idea because

months and 21 days between taking office and 9/11. Only nine days after the attack, Bush declared 'war on terror' and demanded that the Taliban regime in Kabuh hand over all al-Qaeda icaders. These demands, he told Congress, 'are not open to negotiation or discussion.'

His ultimatum unmet, Bush took the war to blin Laden in Afghanistan on Oct 7—25 days after 9/11.

This timetable speaks for itself, It will be another telling moment if Rice is asked to recite it when she testilies today.

NAJAE Iraq - Shops have been shuttered and few of this holy city's genteel residents are venturing out this week as-armed young men, clad in black, their faces half-hidden by headscarves, stream into the city.

"In the end, the confrontation will be essentially between moderates and extremists on both sides - Sunni and Shite," Pachachi sald. "It is between fundamentalism and liberal secularism."





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

### Greece's prime minister 'guarantees' safe Olympics

ATHENS, Greece - Greeces rime minister promised a safe and successful Olympics dechoking deadlines in onstruction and admissions of clays in security preparations

prime minister promised a safe and successful Olympics despite "choking deadlines" in construction and admissions of delays in security preparations at two key sites.

"Not a single hour can be wasted," Premier Costas Caramanils said in a magazine sissued Wednesday by organizers of the Aug. 13-29 Games. "Everyone knows that four months before the Olympic Games we are facing choking deadlines."

He added: "I want to be clear, our main concern and highest priority in Olympic preparations is to secure the complete safety of the country, of adhletes and visitors. Greece will guarantee safe games."

Caramanilis took personal charge of troubled Olympic preparations after his conservative party won general elections

a month ago, ending 11 years of Socialist government. His prior-ities are to overcome urgent delays in vital Olympic projects - including the main stadium and marathon route – and se-

cuity.

Greece is spending more s800 million to mount massive policing at the games, is receiving assistance from the United States and six other countries, and is seeking the active support of NATO.

"Attendance is down, it's harder to sell sponsorships and signage," Houston Astros owner Drayton McLane said. Players take heart from what's happened on the field in recent seasons. Fordia won the World Series last year with a \$56 mil-tion payroll, 20th among the 30 teams. In 2002, Anahelm won

the title with a \$62 million pay-roll.

"Maybe owners are seeing that you don't need to spend \$110 million to win," San Fran-cisco pitcher Kirk Rueter said. "Whatever the chie thing is, that's what people tend to fol-low."

The number of players mak-ing \$1 million, which had been 425 in 2001, dropped for the third straight year, to 374. The median salary – the point at

which an equal amount of players is above and below remained at \$800,000, below the 2001 high of \$375,000.

Figures for the study included salaries and prorated shares of signing bonuses and other guaranteed income for the 827 players on official opening day rosters as of last weekend; for some players, parts of salaries deferred without interest were discounted to present-day value.



# Court upholds dealer's sentence

BOISE — A federal appellate court on Wednesday upheld the 30-year prison term for a 63-year-old Twin Falls man convicted as part of a major southern Idaho drug ting. A three-judge panel of the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals re-jected the claims of Oscar Ortiz

jected the claims of Oscar Ortiz that U.S. District Judge B. Lynn Winmill improperly applied sentencing guidelines to ele-

vate Ortiz to a category permitting a stiffer sentence.
Ortiz had merged his southerral talked drug operation with a
Boise-Nampa drug ring run by
Francisco Ramos.
But he argued that because
he was not physically present,
he should not be held responsible for the 13 pounds of
methamphetamine that Ramos
delivered to drug informants in
Boise between 1999 and 2001
or for the gun Ramos always
carried.

The appellate panel agreed with Winntill that under federal sentencing guidelines, Ortiz had undertaken a drug distribution operation with Ramos and was part of the conspiracy to distribute drugs even if he was not personally present at each transaction.

The court used the same rationale in dealing with the display of a gun during one of the transactions.

"Ortiz knew that Ramos always carried a gun," Judge

Pamela Ann Rymer wrote for the unanimous panel. It does not matter that Ortiz was not personally present when the fleram was used so long as its use was reasonably foreseeable and furthered jointly undernaken criminal activity.

Ramos, 28, was sentenced to 30 years in prison.

Ortiz was charged with conspiracy to traffic methamphetamine and marjuana, possession with intentio distribute, distribute, of drugs



# Cell phones enter the backcountry

Some say they are a necessity, others counter that they ruin the peaceful solitude of nature

YELLOWSTONE NATIONALPARK Wyo. (AP) – It was a sunny spring day in Yellowstone National Park, and tourist Judy Strendalen paused for a midday snack at a roadside plenke table. Close at hand in her purse was her cell phone – Just in case. "I thuk for emergency purposes, you need it," Brendalen, of Clearbrock, Minn., said as she relaxed, not even noticing a cell phone antenna tower on a nearby ridge.

Cell phones have long been virtually unavoidable on city streets and in shopping malls. But they now are showing up in some of the very places people—go to-escape-such-things: national parks.

For park managers, this is a challenge. Officials say they want to ensure public safery and meet the needs of visitors. But they also must protect park resources and the visitor experience. There is no set policy on how to strike this balance, on what role cell phones and the antenna towers they require should play in their parks.

To succeed in today's three-no-trump contract, you need to make only four club tricks, given the opening lead. There will be no problem if clubs break 3-2, so you have to consider if you can sur-vive any 4-1 breaks. If West had a singleton queen or jack, you must first cash dummy's ace and then lead toward your 10. The only oth-er stratagem is to lead the 10 ini-tially, which would gain when East had the singleton eight or nine. If you had a surplus of en-ries, you would probably take the first-mentioned line, because it looks more likely that West has spade length and therefore per-haps club shortage. However, to you try that here, an alert West will rise with his club honor on the second round and return a spade to knock out. dummy's sole re-maining entry, thus blocking the clubs.

So you must cater to coping with the possibility that East holds the singleton eight or nine of clubs, even if you believe that East is more likely to be long in clubs than short.

Accordingly, win the spade jack and play the club 10 from your hand. West plays the jack, dummy the king and East the nine. Now play a low club toward your six, forcing out West's eight. He plays another spade, but you can win with dummy's ace, cross to your hand with a diamond to cash the heart ace and sprade king, then take the marked club finesse for nine tricks.

You have enough to drive to game her, but with your weak-spades and your values in the short suits, it can hardly be right to consider playing clubs.
