"It allows us to notify the judge about Issues in their life," said jim Woods, district manager for the Department of Corrections so Shi Distriot office. "If they are static factors — ones they can't change — or dynamic, like family issues and self esteem."

"In every felony criminal case 1 order a presentence investiga-tion, either a full-blown PSI or an update," 5th District Judge

"I look at the PSI, then I go in and listen," 5th District Judge John Hohnhorst said. "You have to have a sense of whnt you're going to do, but I don't make the decision until I hear what (the offender's) got to say to me."

A statement from the victim is included in the report. The Department of Correction makes a sentencing recommendation, but the judge is not bound by it. Options could include probation, jail time or Drug Court.

world record.

gulped down 53.5 wieners in 12 mintues and shattered his own world
record by three dogs, in 2002, he had
wolfed down 50.5.

Prison officials look for alternatives

One plan calls for rerouting of drug offenders

TWIN FALLS — A tight state budget and a burgeoning prison system are straining staff in the criminal justice system. The Department of Correction has a luge mission, running prisons, administering parolees, doing (presentence investigations). St. District Judge John Hohnhorst said. "Its

really difficult because what happens is the shortage of staff makes them rob Peter to pay Paul. There's only so many quarts in a gallon, and there just sint any more to give."

The caseload in Magic Valley is especially onerous, due in part to the area's crime rate.

"The growth in crime in Magic Valley outpaces the growth elsewhere." Hohnhorst said, "in large part because of

methamphetamine, which leads to other criminal activity."
Meth traffickers rely on a network of highways for distribution, and major interstates like 184 and 1-15 facilitate transport, he said.
"You may not be able to build enough prisons," Hohnhorst said, "It seems obvious that some of the things we're doing now don't work."

Those people working in the criminal justice system are not the only ones affected by the backlog. "I will set a sentencing date six weeks out from the day someone pleads," Hothothorst said. "The financial consequence is

that from the time he pleads until I sentence him, he's being held at Twin Falls County's expense. From the time I sentence him until he guess to the pentientary, it's on the state's dime.

The expense of housing in—The expense of housing in—The state pays the county all is about \$24 per Inmate per day. The state pays the county \$50 per day for each inmate who has been sentenced to the state pentientiary. Jut.—Is—awaiting, transport.

The sooner they can get sentenced, the sooner they can become wards of the state, Hohnhort said.

With tight budgets and in some cases overcrowded jails, felony offenders spending time in county jails creates an additional burden on the local sys-

rins.

"Its a problem without a good saver to it." Hohnhorst said. "Coming up with more money to run the criminal justice system isn't the seciest proposition to put in front of the tax-paying public. We're hard put to justify spending the entire state budget on the criminal justice system. Every buck you spend in one place is a buck you don't have in another."

Problems for defendants

Convicted offenders who wait in jail for their sentencing hearings may end up getting sentenced to probation, but have spent the interim behind bars.

"Somebody who's a first-time

Somebody whos a first-time meth possessor who has plead-ed guilty but can't make the bond for his release, or can't get into Drug Court ... you've got them sitting for six or seven

weeks," Holmhorst said. "Those kind of people might get granted probation."

kind of people might get granted probation.

An extra-week or two while they wait for psychological tests or PSI completion can 'mean time away from family, work or other outside obligations.

"What you have is someone sitting in the county jail for six or seven weeks before they get sentenced." Holnthorst said. "In a perfect, world., that, isn't, how you'd have it. You'd like to have (the PSI) in a week, but that's not reasonable."

Prosecutors can work out an OR release — releasing an offender under his own recognizance — or lower ball so he's not sitting there, the judge said.

But time on the outside waiting for sentencing can present its own set of problems, too.

The stress of the unknown can compel some drug offenders to relapse into their old habits.

No end in sight

Those winning the random drawing represent a small portion of the estimated 600,000. Medicare beneficiaries nation-wide believed to be paying for prescription medication without insurance coverage.

While patient advocacy groups citicize the benefit, they say its better than nothing. The groups have been lobbying for coverage of drugs that replace older Medicare-covered therapies only administered in a doctor's office.

"Science had taken us to a place where there were more and more cancer drugs in oral form," said Wendy Selig, vice president for legislative affairs for the American Cancer Society in Washington, D.C. "It

didn't make sense for Medicare to cover some chemotherapy

to cover some chemotherapy drugs and not others."

Dr. Stephen Anthony, re-search director at Spokane's Cancer Care Northwest, called the program "a half-billion dol-lar giveaway for pharma (the pharmaceutical industry)."

lar givenway for pharma (the pharmaceutcal industry). He said the Medicare lottery doesn't address the real issue: the prohibitive cost of niche drugs. Patients on some drugs would be financially better off by staving with an assistance program offered by drug companies, Anthony said.

He said sometimes the lottery price reduction can't beat what is already offered by drug company assistance programs.



Congress refines its House rules

n its final act before the In-dependence Day break, the House of Representa-tives rejected alternative tives rejected alternative proposals from Republicans and Democrats designed to control federal spending and future budget deficits. Once again, partisanship prevented action on a project of national importance.

If this were an isolated instance, it would be bad enough. The upshot of the laternative is that Congress will almost certainly make its spending decisions this year

enough. The upshot of the lacest impasse is that Congress will almost certainly make its spending decisions this year without the benefit of an overall fiscal plan.

The budget resolution that is supposed to serve that function never emerged in final form, and must be added to the long list of other measures—including an energy bill and a wellare reform measure—that have been sidetracked.

It is against this background that House Minority Leader—Nancy Pelosi offered last month an outline of a better way to approach the work of Congress—an approach she promises to follow in the event that Democrats regain the majority in November's elections. America's great divide is all political

et me raise a red flag about the "red and the blue states," which is the reigning theory of American politics. All those blue states (heavily urban and mainly on the East and West coasts) voted for Al Gore. The red states (more rural, Southern and Western) voted for George Bush. Presto, the map defines us. We're a country geographically "polarized" by values and lifestyles. This is a masterful explanation for the increasing nastiness of politics, with only one big drawback. It's wrong.

No one denies that the nastiness is real. It stems partly from the presidential campaign, the doubt over Iraq and the intense personal contempt let by many for President Bush. But the nastiness pre-ceded these causes and will survive them. Why?

If the country were more polarized, you'd expect to find in the polis. You don't. After socuting surveys, sociologist Paul Diblaggelo of Princeton

scouring surveys, sociologist Paul DiMaggio of Princeton concluded that "the public ac-tually has become more unified in attitudes toward race, gender and crime si the 1970s."

race, gender and crime since the 1970s.

Of course, strong disagreements (on abortion, for instance) remain. But these disguise large areas of consensus 80 percent or more of Americans regularly support environmental regulation.

What's even more absurd is the idea that regions have—after jet travel, interstate high-ways, air conditioning. TV and mass migration—become more different, Texas and New York have more in common now than in 1960.

The discovery that bacteria taken from the letters all grew in the double pattern was made at least a year ago, and it is not known whether the FBI's hunt for a matching sample has succeeded. The bureau and its scientific consultants are screening dozens of anthrax samples collected all over the United States and in some foreign countries, seeking the closest match to the spores used in the attack, according to a scientist who advises the FBI.





WATERBURY, Conn. (AP) —
This-hardscrabble-city-onceknown for its brass mills had
hoped favorite son John G.
Rowland would stay above the
aura of political scandal that
has become all too familiar in a
state now tagged "Corrupticut."
Instead, the brash young
politician once considered a
rising star in the Republican
Party has resigned amid a federa
al corruption investigation and
a threat of impeachment—
adding another name to the list
of Waterbury politicians tainted
by misdeed.
There's no arguing that the
place he fondly called "the center of the universe" has become
the center of something else
disgraced politicians driven
from office.

Still, even as Rowland an
nounced that he would leave
office in the middle of his third
term rather than battle the burgeoning scandal, his Waterbury
constituents stuck by him.

No matter what, Waterbury
will roll our the red carpet for
him,' said 55-year-old Charle.
Nappi, who lives across from
Remolard and was replaced by
L. Gov. M. Jodi Rell.
Rowland, 47, never forgot his
roots in this city of 108,000
where he was the young
wresdling star who went to Holy-

Cross High School, the one-time state legislator, who rose, up through the ranks to be-come the state's youngest congressman — and then its youngest governor, first elected in 1994 at age 37. He championed revitaliza-tion projects for his hometown — from a new campus for the University of Connecticut to restoration of a historic theater. Those gestures weren't for-gotten.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE⁸

As today's deal demonstrates, it generally pays to conserve your entries to the hand containing the suit that you intend using for dis-

ros. West's club lead against six West's club lead against six spades immediately set up a potential winner for the defense. Declarer cashed the spade ace, then the king, discovering the trump, loser. Declarer's top diamonds came next, and a heart to dummy's ace was followed by the diamond queen. All would have been well had East followed suit. South would have discarded a losing heart or club and would then have pitched his other loser on a further diamond. Here, however, East was able to ruff in, and although one of South's losers went away, there was no entry to dumaway, there was no entry to dum-my to take care of his second los-

"Since a 3-1 break in, spades is nearly twice as likely as a 4-1 split in diamonds, the right approach on winning the club ace is to play a spade to the king at once. But the ace and king of diamonds should be cashed next. When they estand-up, a trump should be led to-dummy's ace. This reveals the 3-1 break, but leaves declarer in control, since North has retained the critical extra entry of the heart critical extra entry of the heart

ace.

ANSWER: Lead the diamond king (or ace if you prefer). Yes, partner bid clubs, but when fate deals you an ace-king, you should lead one of them and decide what to do next, rather than lead something else and perhaps have no recovery if you made the wrong choice.

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
