## Two dairies seek digesters

### C Bar M Dairy in Jerome will receive \$450,000 grant

JEROME — Two Idaho dairies have qualified for \$450,000 grants from the federal government to help pay for anaerobic manure digesters.

with C Bar M Dairy and Jim and Marcella Stewart of Nampa with Stewart Farms Inc. will receive the grants to proceed with digesters to dispose of manure and generate electricity. Rep. Doug Jones, R-Flax, said part of the reason for pursuing the grants was to find out if they are effective in reducing dairy odor.

The money comes from the 2002 Farm Bill's Environmental Quality Incentives Program, better known as EQIP. It's the first time anyone in Idaho has been awarded money for digesters," said Richard Strums, state director for the National Resources Conservation Service. About 10 years ago, some digesters for dairies were built in New York state with federal money, and there were some a couple years ago in California, he said. Currently John Beukers is waiting to receive \$500,000 from another federal government source to build a digester in Jerome County. And a private company is constructing a digester in Mindoka County.

The \$450,000 from the EQIP program doesn't pay the entire bill, Marcella Stewart said she and her husband altogether will spend about another \$3.5 million to construct their digester. Ron Sheffield, an agricultural engineer hired by the University of Idaho to combat the state's dairy odor problems, noted that neither Ledbetter nor the Stewarts have dairy odor problems. And it's true that of the several applications from Idaho that

## Settlement could stall power rate increase

TWIN FALLS — Idaho Power Co. customers could see rates stabilize until next spring's annual adjustments after they experience another possible increase this fall.

The power company and staff for the Idaho Public Utilities Commission have submitted a proposed settlement to state utility regulators that would preclude chances for additional rate increases this year. If approved, the settlement would result in a 2.2 percent increase in base rates next year, but the increase would be offset by portions of the settlement. And rates effective June 2005 will depend on a number of other factors, including how much money the company spends on power costs this year. The settlement revolves around issues leftover from the 5.2 percent average rate increase granted to the company in May. The company had asked for a 14.5 percent increase.

"There were a number of outstanding issues that had to be addressed," said Gene Fadness, spokesman for the PUC.

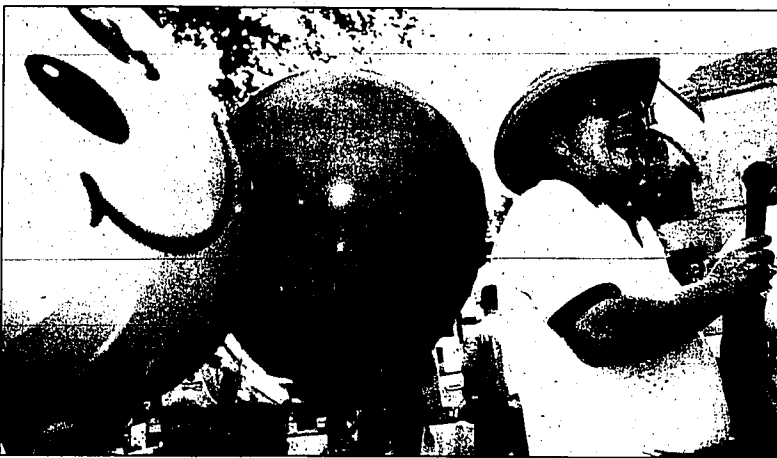
Both PUC staff and the power company had strong cases, he said, and knew the issues needed resolution.

The three-member PUC will decide in May whether to approve the settlement crafted by its staff and the power company.

Idaho Power would credit customers a total of \$19.3 million over a two-year period for several matters including abnormal power expenses unassessed in the summer of 2003. The company is part

## Aide says al-Sadr ordered fighters to leave Najaf shrine

NAJAF Iraq — Radical cleric Muqtada al-Sadr ordered his fighters Thursday to hand control of a revered Najaf shrine to top Shiite religious authorities, hours after U.S. forces bombed militant positions and Iraq's prime minister made a "final call" for the cleric's militia to surrender.

Blasts and gunbattles persisted throughout the day Thursday in the streets of Najaf, where militants bombarded a police station with mortar rounds, killing seven police and injuring 35 others. At night, at least 30 explosions shook the Old City as a U.S. plane hit militant targets east of the Imam Ali shrine.

Militants elsewhere in Iraq attacked oil facilities in the north and south, fired mortars at U.S. Embassy offices in the capital, injuring one American, and threatened to kill two hostages, a Turkish worker and a U.S. journalist.

In a speech, interim Prime Minister Ayad Allawi had warned the radical cleric to disarm his forces and withdraw from the shrine after his government threatened to send a massive Iraqi force to root them out.

Defying that ultimatum, al-Sadr sent a telephone text message vowing to seek "martyr-

dom or victory," and his jubilant followers inside the shrine danced and chanted. Later in the day, a top al-Sadr aide said the cleric had ordered his militia to relinquish control of the shrine where they have been holed up for two weeks fighting Iraqi and U.S. forces. But in a letter shown by the Arab television station Al-Arabiya, al-Sadr said he would not disband his Al Mahdi Army. Al-Sadr had said in recent days he wanted to make sure the shrine was in the custody of religious authorities, though it was unclear if the government would agree to that.

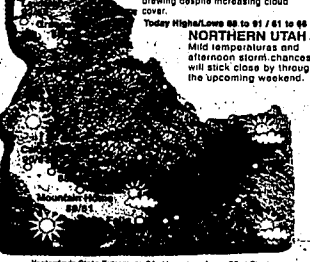

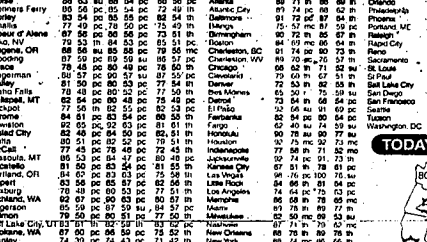

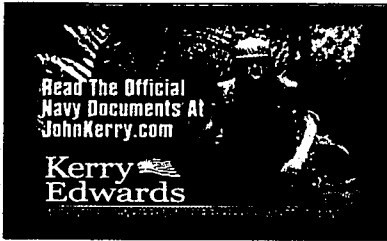

# Kerry accuses Bush of relying on others to do 'dirty work'

BOSTON (AP) — John Kerry fought back Thursday against campaign allegations that he exaggerated his combat record in Vietnam, accusing President Bush of using a Republican front group "to do his dirty work" and challenging Bush to debate their wartime service records.

"Well, if he wants to have a debate about our service in Vietnam, here is my answer: Bring it on," said the Democratic presidential candidate, reviving an old war and campaign slogan amid strong urging from party leaders for him to respond to two-week-old GOP assertions.

As Kerry denounced the criticism as "lies about my record," aides privately acknowledged that they and their boss had been slow to recognize the damage being done to his political standing.

Kerry won three Purple Hearts, a Bronze Star and Silver Star for Vietnam War combat. Bush served stateside in the Texas Air National Guard. Both men say the others were honorably discharged, but their supporters are pouring tens of thousands of dollars into television ads and other tactics to insist otherwise.

NowOn.org, a liberal group funded by Kerry supporters, is airing an ad accusing Bush of using family connections to avoid the Vietnam War. It also asks the president to denounce an ad that aired early this month by "Swift Boat Veterans for Truth," a GOP-leaning group of Vietnam veterans who say Kerry exaggerated his actions to win Vietnam War medals.

Bush campaign spokesman

Steve Schmidt said the charge that Bush was in league with the group criticizing Kerry's war record "is absolutely and completely false. The Bush campaign has never and will never question John Kerry's service in Vietnam."

Yet the White House refused to condemn the ad questioning Kerry's war record.

"Let's not be selective here," White House spokesman Scott McClellan said in Crawford, Texas, where Bush is spending the next week. McClellan said Bush has been on the receiving end of more than \$62 million in negative, false attacks by independent groups and "the president has condemned all of the ads," both those that criticize him and those that go after Kerry.

# Claims from Charley move rapidly

PUNTA GORDA, Fla. (AP) — It took years for many insurance claims to be paid following Hurricane Andrew in 1992. This time, technology is helping speed along the claims process for residents hardest hit by Hurricane Charley.

"I really think the industry can handle this without a lot of problems," Florida Chief Financial Officer Tom Gallagher

said during a tour Thursday of Charlotte County.

"The industry now knows what a major storm can be and they're prepared for it. So is the state."

Charley killed 22 people in Florida and state officials said more than 335,000 customers were without power Thursday. Charlotte County residents were not expected to have their

electricity fully restored for another 10 days.

Charley has caused an estimated \$7.4 billion in damage to homes, businesses and personal possessions, more than any other hurricane in Florida since Andrew. Gallagher recalled in the aftermath of Andrew, it took "six to eight months before we got a handle on it."

# Nichols declines to appeal; says it's for families

PONCA CITY, Okla. (AP) — Oklahoma City bombing conspirator Terry Nichols will not appeal his state murder convictions for his role in the 1995 bombing of the Oklahoma City federal building, his attorney said Thursday.

In a brief statement, attorney Brian Hermanson said Nichols did not want to prolong the pain for victims' families.

Nichols' attorneys had been advising him against appealing his 161 state murder convictions, because an appeal could mean a new trial and another opportunity for prosecutors to seek the death penalty.

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# Survey says sex, drugs go together

WASHINGTON (AP) — It's not just a cliché: Sex and drugs often do go together, says a survey of U.S. teenagers.

Teens who say at least half their friends are having sex are more likely to report having tried marijuana, alcohol and cigarettes.

The annual survey, released Thursday, asked teens aged 12-17 about their use of illegal substances. Researchers then looked for other activities of daily life that were associated with such use.

"This year's survey reveals a tight connection between teen sexual behavior and substance abuse," said Joseph A. Califano Jr., president of the National Center on Addiction and Substance Abuse at Columbia University.

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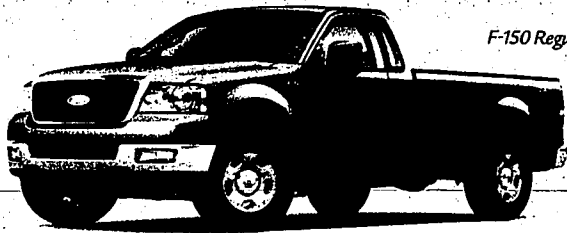
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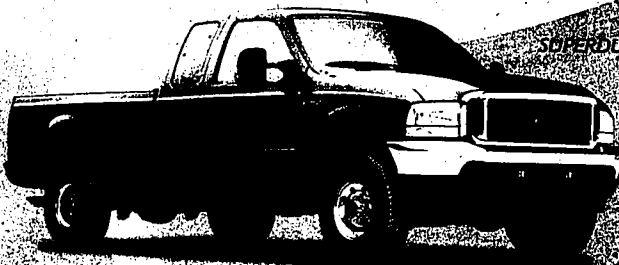

### Fish and Game politics thrive in their own season

**D**r. Wayne Wright, one of the new additions to the Idaho Fish and Game Commission, possesses three clear advantages that qualify him for his post.

He loves to hunt, he loves to fish, and he knows politics come with the job.

That last one may chafe Idaho outdoorsmen.

But most any Fish and Game commissioner knows the job comes with politics, which are similar to the rivers and streams flowing through Idaho.

They may rise and fluctuate through various seasons, years and decades. But they will always be part of the Idaho landscape.

Wright, a retired cardiologist from Twin Falls, joins Gary Power of Salmon as one of two new appointments by Kempthorne for the Idaho Fish and Game Commission. Pending confirmation from the Legislature in January, Wright will replace Dr. Fred Wood of Burley as the commissioner for Region IV (Magic Valley).

Judging by the response of hunters and fishermen in the area, Wright will probably be a popular pick for the commission that helps set regulations for fishing, hunting and wildlife in Idaho. Outdoorsmen will appreciate a commissioner who grew up in southern Idaho hooking trout and harvesting deer.

But most of all, they want a commissioner who won't ignore the science of fish and wildlife.

Wright appears willing to

live up to that. But at the same time, the doctor is a realist.

Although many hunters and anglers' view of the commission, Wright knows politics will be involved with most Fish and Game matters.

The best way to deal with those issues, he says, is to include the public on all decisions and build a consensus.

Fish and Game and its policies have an impact that goes beyond those who fish and hunt. Landowners, environmentalists and other recreationists all stake a claim on Idaho's public lands that mingle with the wildlife.

Their political interests will eventually come into play with commission decisions.

And just as Wright has said, science should play a crucial role in many of those decisions.

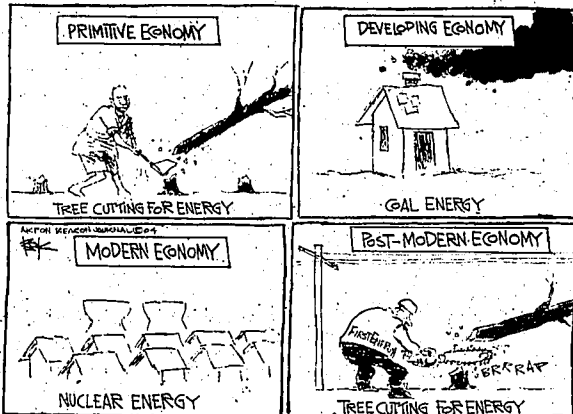
But any commission that relies entirely on that data is taking the wrong path.

The same can be said for any commission that blows by the political winds. The key goal should always be a careful balance.

Criticism and second-guessing comes with the territory for members of the Fish and Game commission. Wood found that out frequently in his two terms. But he deserves a round of thanks for sticking it out in a controversial period for the commission.

As long as Wright uses his love for the state, its hunting and fishing traditions, and listens to all the people who have an interest on those various policies, his tenure should be successful.

### Turn off that signal of progress

**S**omeday soon, I may be the last man in America without a cell phone. To those who see cell phones as progress, I say, they aggravate noise pollution and threaten our solitude.

The central idea of cell phones is that you should be connected to almost everyone and everything at all times. The trouble is that cell phones assault your peace of mind no matter what you do.

If you turn them off, why have one? You just irritate anyone who might call. They're on and no one calls, you're irrelevant, unloved or both. If everyone calls, you're a basket case.

I'm a dropout and aim to stay that way. I admit this will be increasingly difficult because cell phones are now passing a historic milestone. As with other triumphs of the mass market, they've reached a point when people forget what it was like before they existed.

No one remembers life before cars, TVs and air conditioners. So, too, now with cell phones. By 2005, without one will soon be classified as a crank or member of the (deep) underclass.

Look at the numbers. In 1995 there were 340,213 cell-phone users. By year-end 2003, there were 159 million. (These figures come from the Cellular Telecommunications & Internet Association.)

I had once assumed that age, artness or hearing loss would immunize most of the over-60 population against cell phones. Wrong.

Among those 60 to 69, cell-phone ownership (60 percent) is almost as high as among 18- to 24-year-olds (66 percent), though lower than among 30- to 49-year-olds (76 percent), according to a recent survey from the Pew Research Center. Even among those 80 and older, ownership is 32 percent.

Of course, cell phones have productive uses. For those constantly on the road (salesmen, real-estate agents, repair

Some benefits may be overstated. Cell phones for teens were sold as a way for parents to keep tabs on children.

That works — up to a point. The point is when your kids switch off the phones. Two of my teens have cell phones (that was Mom's idea; she has one, too).

Whenever I want them most, their phones are off. Hmm. Similar advantages are claimed for older people. They have cell phones to allow their children to monitor their health.

This may spawn gallows humor on voice-mail messages. (For example, "Hi, Sonny. If you get this, I'm dead.")

Cell phones — and, indeed, all wireless devices — constitute another chapter in the ongoing breakdown between work and everything else.

They pretend to increase your freedom while actually stealing it.

People are supposed to be always capable of participating in the next meeting, responding to their e-mails or retrieving factors from the Internet.

People so devoted to staying interconnected are kept in a perpetual state of anxiety, because they may have missed some significant memo, rendezvous or news or gossip. They may be more plugged in and less thoughtful.

All this is the wave of the future or, more precisely, the present.

According to another survey, 29 would choose a cell phone over a traditional land line. Cell phones, an irresistible force, may soon pull ahead of land lines. But I vow to resist just as I've resisted ATM cards, laptops and digital cameras.

I agree increasingly with the late poet Ogden Nash, who wrote: "Progress might have been all right once, but it's gone on too long."

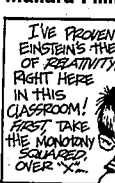

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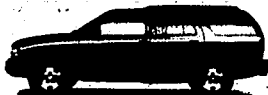

Wind farm could assist taxpayers

Officials release gunshot victim name

KIMBERLY - Police Chief Pat Birmingham of the Kimberley-Hansen Police Department verified the name of a boy who received a fatal gunshot wound Wednesday. Austin Kendall Nebeker, 6, died in Kimberley after a 22-caliber rifle accidentally discharged. Birmingham previously said he believes they know who shot the boy, but the chief declined Thursday to release more information because the incident is still under investigation. Authorities were called to a residence about 10 a.m., but the boy was dead when the ambulance arrived.

state Legislative Services Office, examined Cassia County's original estimates of the tax impact and said the school district's analysis was incomplete. Cassia Superintendent Mike Chesley had said that if the district gained about \$200 million in assessed value, the state would take away a significant amount of support that would result in a net loss of about \$194,806. Hancock said the one item missing was state property tax replacement dollars, which should be about equal to the amount of the supposed loss. "It should equal out," Hancock said. Pam Wade, the Cassia County School District's business manager, said the district conferred with state officials and found out

the state's property tax replacement should turn what the district was calling a loss into a case of gaining \$125. So the district effectively gets zero directly for maintenance and operations, she said.

Fixed levy rates

The tax windfall won't impact the amounts of money the district's voter-approved levies will raise, but it will spread them around a larger tax base, making the levy rates drop for the average person, Wade said.

Cassia County Treasurer Gyle Erickson estimated that for a property owner with \$100,000 of assessed value, those decreases could amount to about \$65 a year, if nothing else changes.

Tim Hill, the Bureau Chief of Finance and Transportation for the state Department of Educa-

tion, said the tax-lowering windfall from the proposed wind farm could make it easier for the district to pass its own levies if it needs more money.

"Let's look at it as a statewide benefit," Hill said. Rep. Scott Bedke, R-Oakley, echoed Hill's assessment. He said that through tax equalization, the windfall in Cassia County should send between \$70 and \$80 to every classroom unit around the state. And increases in assessed value help every district, including Cassia County, he said.

Superintendent Mike Chesley said his district is budgeting for about 255.67 classroom units this year, so that means between \$17,896.90 and \$20,456 more a year could come back to the district.

Architects will help create plan for district

JEROME - The Jerome School Board hired an architectural firm at its Tuesday meeting to evaluate the district's need for new buildings. The Latham, Krohn and Ocker firm, of Boise, will help the district create a strategic plan for facilities to help it get the most "bang for our buck," said Superintendent Jim Cobble.

The firm also built Horizon Elementary in Jerome and is in charge of the high school's new addition, the Memorial Library, which will have its grand opening Oct. 6, Cobble said. The district held meetings last spring to drum up support for a possible bond issue for new buildings.

A bond issue could allow the district to demolish and rebuild the aging Central Elementary School, to repair and expand the middle school, to build an additional gym for the high school and to provide new offices for the district's central administration.

Bond issues are hard to sell in Jerome, which has voted down six different bonds in recent years. However, the district has had success passing supplemental levies for smaller projects.

JEROME - The first public workshop to develop the South Jerome Interchange Management Plan has been scheduled for 7 p.m. Aug. 23 at the Best Western Sawtooth Inn, 3057 S. Lincoln. Company presents plan for former plant

HEYBURN - Those who questioned what the city of Burley would do once it took ownership of the former J.R. Simplot Co. processing plant in Heyburn got their answer Thursday - and it was a good one.

Tim Cook, senior partner of the Salt Lake City-based Boyer Company, delivered a presentation on the company's vision for the facility. Among the possibilities are industrial, logistics, office and recreational developments.

Development of the property, now named the Burley-Heyburn Industrial Park, is expected to happen in three stages.

The first stage involves the portion located in Heyburn that got a jump start last week when Gosner Foods, Inc., a Logan, Utah, cheese maker, announced its intention to build a cheese plant on 15 acres of the facility.

The second phase includes the waste water treatment facility located across the river in Burley and surrounding land. Cook said he has tenants interested in the large tracts of land the second phase would offer.

The third phase of development would happen on the current site of the Burley airport. City officials have been considering moving the airport to a location that would allow a longer strip to accommodate larger aircraft.

Cook also gave a brief history of the 32-year-old company and spoke specifically about the development over the last few years of Business Depot Ogden because of the similarities to the Simplot project.

The 1,118-acre Depot was decided to the city of Ogden in 1997 after being shut down by the military, laying off some 2,800 skilled workers. In 2000,

"The river is just a natural beauty," he said. "When I drove up to see the Simplot property I couldn't stop looking at the river."

The presentation was short but impressive.

Otter blasts Kerry

TWIN FALLS - The way Rep. C.L. "Butch" Otter sees it, a John Kerry presidency would mean "there isn't anything here in Idaho that he wouldn't put at risk." Otter met with The Times-News editorial board on Thursday. Though he's from the first congressional district, Otter has said he has plans to run for governor in 2006. He was elected to the U.S. House of Representatives in 2000 after serving as lieutenant governor from 1986 until 1992. He made a name for himself nationally last year when he convinced 309 fellow congressmen to vote for a bill that revised U.S. Attorney General John Ashcroft's Patriot Act. Otter's bill called for revisions of certain powers of surveillance that could be used against common citizens.

He said he thinks the Kerry/Edwards ticket is the most liberal ticket since the Democrats' Wallace/Edwards ticket of 1948, which was endorsed by the Communist Party. If Kerry pulls off a win,

Crapo says a Kerry presidency would mean more federal control

TWIN FALLS - If Sen. John Crapo is elected to the presidency, look for some of Idaho's most pristine mountains and canyons to be locked up as national monuments, says Sen. Mike Crapo, R-Idaho. That could include the Boulder-White Clouds in central Idaho and the Owyhee canyons, he speculated on Thursday when he met with The Times-News editorial board. For one thing, the White Clouds had been on President Clinton's list for national monument status, and another Democrat in the Oval Office would likely revisit the Clinton list, Crapo said. Since Kerry is familiar with Idaho, it's not unreasonable to predict that those areas could be locked up without working with the local populations, the Republican senator said.

When Clinton designated several areas throughout the West during the closing days of his administration, he zeroed in on the Craters of the Moon area, adding another 700,000 acres to

Otter said to look for the following things to happen to Idaho: Economy - Between 25 percent and 30 percent of the state economy would be lost due to Kerry's stalled policies. "Kerry's obviously the candidate for the most extreme environs - Jon Marvel, The Sierra Club," Otter said. That would mean places such as the Boulder-White Clouds and the Owyhee County high desert would be shut down to recreation and catmen. Grazing logging new mining would all be banned from any mountain range, Otter predicted. Even the recreation industry would suffer, he said.

## Crapo surprises benefactors with award for their contribution

RUPERT — Rupert residents Cary and Cheryl Hamilton, owners of Home Sweet Homes in Heyburn, were presented the Spirit of Idaho Award Thursday by U.S. Sen. Mike Crapo for their assistance to the Mini-Cassia Women and Children's Shelter.

For their award, they were given a certificate and a flag that has flown over the U.S. Capitol building. The Hamiltons agreed to provide at cost the modular home that will be used as the shelter. However, neither of them expected to be given an award for their efforts.

"We feel very honored to receive this award," Cheryl said. "We almost don't feel worthy to receive it because there were so many people involved to make it happen."

"We didn't do it to get an award," Cary said. "We did it because there are so many women and children in the area who need help. We hope this is just a beginning."

The Hamiltons first found out about the situation when they were approached by Mini-Cassia Women and Children's Shelter President Paul Henschel. He told them the situation and asked about costs and different options available. The Hamiltons agreed to help out.

"I had no idea there were so many cases reported each day and that there are just as many that go unreported," Cary said. "If this shelter can help out even one person, it's worth it."

Mini-Cassia Women and Children's Shelter board members were also glad to see the Hamiltons recognized.

"I think it's fantastic because Cary Hamilton is an answer to prayers to get this shelter up and running," board member Toni Atwood said.

The modular home is 1,000 square feet and includes three bedrooms and two bathrooms. The board has so far raised around \$30,000 of the approximately \$50,000 they will need to pay for the home before it can be delivered to the lot. However, they are optimistic they will reach their target date of Oct. 1 to have it set up.

"There are no requirements for the award," Crapo said. "I give the award when I see something special someone has done for the community just to be nice."

Since creating the award three years ago, the senator has given out several hundred. Crapo spokeswoman Susan Wheeler said.

# High court upholds reservation fuel-tax ban

BOISE (AP) — A federal appellate court on Thursday upheld the ban preventing the state from taxing motor fuel sold on Indian reservations.

The 12-1 ruling, the U.S. 9th Circuit Court of Appeals agreed with the Coeur d'Alene, Nez Perce and Shoshone-Bannock Tribes that such taxation violated tribal sovereignty and created a barrier to interstate commerce.

Clay Smith, the attorney who argued the case for the state, said it was too soon to know if the state would seek an appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court. That decision would be made by the tax commission after consulting with Gov. Dirk Kempthorne, he said.

"I really don't have a reaction right now. It was a close case, and it's one of those decisions that could have gone either way," Smith said.

"The long and the short of it is that we are really still taking a lot of time to figure this out."

Nez Perce Tribal Chairman Anthony Johnson said he was happy with the ruling.

All of the tribes involved in the case own and operate gas stations on reservation land. For years the Idaho State Tax Commission imposed a 25-cent tax on every gallon of fuel delivered to those stations, and the tribes collected the tax from fuel buyers and passed it on to the tax commission.

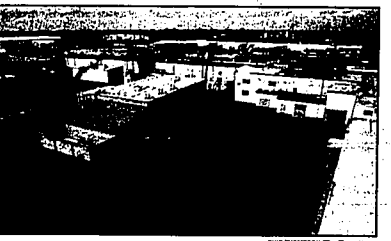

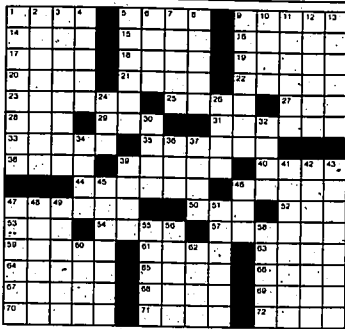

DEAR ABBY: I am in an uncomfortable spot. I met a great woman last month and have developed feelings for her. I'll call her Carmen.

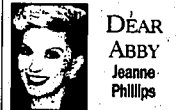
Every time I try to focus my energy into starting this relationship, my ex, "Rita," pops back into the picture. Most recently, she was calling about a cell phone we had when we were together.

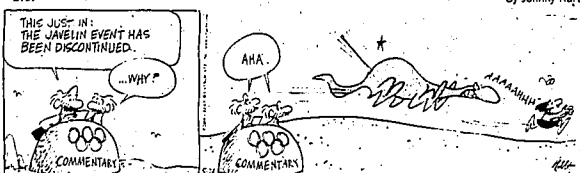

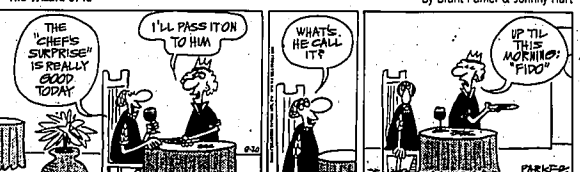

### RAT Players offer '12 Angry Men'

TWIN FALLS — Stands to trial. If you put somebody on trial for murder in Idaho, you could expect that a jury might include a moviehouse owner, a disk jockey, a health district planner, a college public information director, an audio and lighting technician and a college professor. Maybe not five actors, though.

"Twelve Angry Men" is a play that I use in my classes because it requires actors to listen to each other onstage," said Tony Mannen, theater instructor at the College of Southern Idaho. "I mentioned that to a colleague, and he uses the play as well. So one thing kind of led to another."

The result is a Random Acts of Theater (that's the old Friends of CSI Players) production of Reginald Rose's unsettling psychological drama, which opens tonight at

the Lamphouse Theater. Half of the cast has never before met a fool.

"It's been fun, watching the interaction between actors," said Mannen, who's directing the production. "Mostly, it's been 'Twelve Big Men.' The cast averages 6-2 1/2 and 222 (pounds)."

That just adds to the menace of the piece, which takes place entirely within a locked jury room of a New York City courthouse. None of the characters has a name — they're simply referred to by their juror numbers.

The story is a familiar one: A

single, courageous juror — played memorably by Henry Fonda in the 1957 movie version — holds out against 11 others ready to send an immigrant Puerto Rican boy to the river for alleging murdering his father.

Fonda rendered Juror No. 8 implacably — never raising his voice. Mannen's Juror No. 8, CSI theater student C.R. Call — plays against type. "He loses his temper at times," Mannen said. Rose was one of the Big Four playwrights — Paddy Chayefsky, Rod Serling and Gore Vidal were the others — of the so-called "Golden Age of Television," that period from 1949 to 1960 when CBS, NBC and ABC regularly broadcast live, serious drama. In 1953, Rose — who had been a juror in a manslaughter trial in New York City — wrote "Angry Men," based on his experiences. It was broadcast on CBS's "Studio One" a year later, with Robert Cummings as the holdout juror and Edward Arnold, Walter Abel and Franchot Tone among others, and earned Emmy Awards for Cummings and Rose, as well as for the di-

rector, Franklin Schaffner, who 16 years later would win an Academy Award for "Patton."

Fonda bought the rights to the teleplay and recruited TV director Sidney Lumet to make it into a movie, with Fonda in the lead role and co-starring some of the big-name actors of New York theater at the time — Lee J. Cobb, Ed Begley, Martin Balsam — along with newcomers E.G. Marshall, Jack Warden, Jack Klugman and Robert Webber.

Mannen says the most interesting character may be Juror No. 10, a racist played in the movie by Begley and in his production by Dusty Blackburn, a former CSI drama student and onetime member of The Stan-

dards, a Twin Falls doo-wop singing group.

"I don't like Dusty's character," Mannen said. "It's sinister." Other cast members are Mike Winterholler, Dale Laughlin, Chris Bragg, Jose Guerra, Michael Johnson, Troy Cooper, David Nutting, Jason Ramsey, Doug Maughn and David Woodhead.

The production continues Saturday night and Aug. 27-28. Proceeds from tonight's show go benefit the Muscular Dystrophy Association.

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

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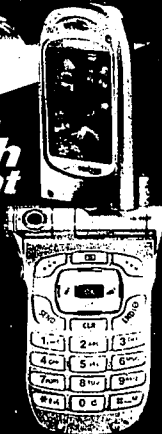

Peirsol wins, loses, wins again in brouhaha at Olympic pool

ATHENS, Greece - Aaron Peirsol stood on the dock of the Olympic pool, waiting for his gold medal to be confirmed on the scoreboard.

A mere formality. The world's greatest backstroke had touched the wall more than two seconds ahead of the runner-up. He already had shaken hands with his rivals when the shocking results were flashed.

Peirsol - disqualified. "I knew I had done nothing wrong," he said.

A half-hour later, the gold was restored - just in time for the medal ceremony. Then more protests. Finally, a late-night meeting confirmed Peirsol's victory Thursday in the 200-meter backstroke.

On a night Americans dominated at the Olympic pool, this was the most convoluted of gold medals.

Not even Michael Phelps - winning his fourth gold and still on course for a historic Olympics - could top the brouhaha that broke out when Peirsol's easy win in his signature event was momentarily

snatched away.

Peirsol hasn't lost the 200 since the Sydney Olympics four years ago, but that streak appeared over when a judge ruled

he made an illegal move on the last turn. Before the Americans could protest, the sport's governing body announced that the judge

did not adequately explain the alleged violation "in the working language of FINA" - English or French. Peirsol was given his gold.

For good measure, Amanda Beard captured the first individual gold of her illustrious career in the 200-meter breaststroke. Only a victory by Australian Jodie Henry in the women's 100-meter freestyle prevented an American sweep.

Austria's Marcus Rogan, who finished more than two seconds behind Peirsol, had briefly been fêted as the 200 gold medalist. When the decision was changed, he didn't seem too upset about settling for silver.

"Aaron is a very honest person. I am sure he swam fairly," said Rogan, a close friend of the swimmer. James Cordiani was bumped from third to fourth.

About 2.5 hours after the race, FINA rejected the appeal, giving the bronze to Romania's Razvan Florea.

Backstrokers turn on their stomachs heading into the wall, and the rule states that any kick or arm stroke must be part of the continuous turning action. Apparently the judge, not Peirsol, Please see TIME, Page D4

Patterson overcomes Khorkina

ATHENS, Greece - Sorry, Svetlana. There's a new Queen of Gymnastics, and her name is Carly Patterson.

The 16-year-old American who drew comparisons to Mary Lou Retton delivered a dazzling routine on the floor to win the all-around gold Thursday night and spoil Russian superstar Svetlana Khorkina's final chance at the Olympic title in gymnastics' premier event.

Patterson became the first American woman to win the all-around since Retton in 1984, and she matched Paul Hamm's first-place finish on the same floor Wednesday.

"Strong. Sturdy. Just like we expected. It's great. She was beautiful," said Bela Karolyi, who coached Retton and was in the stands for this one.

Patterson scored a 9.712 on floor to finish with 38.397 points and defeat Khorkina by .176. Nan Zhang of China won bronze.

Khorkina, who for years called herself the "Queen of Gymnastics," still took the one prize that has eluded her during an entertaining and wildly successful career - a medal in the Olympic all-around.

And when it was over, she acted like a champion, saluting the crowd, grabbing the Russian flag and taking it to the uneven bars, where she showed it off

and dragged it across the lower bar. She'll try to add to her silver medal Sunday, going for her third gold in the

uneven bars.

Patterson isn't close to being as graceful a ballerina as Khorkina. But she's more athletic, more explosive and in this night, she was just a little bit better.

Like Khorkina, Patterson closed the night on the floor. On all four tumbling passes, she jumped higher than any of the other 23 women in the meet. Just as importantly, she pulled off perfect landings that almost always make the difference between first and second place.

When it was over, Patterson jumped into coach Evgeny Marchenko's embrace and wrapped her arms around his neck. He then carried her around for almost a minute - and that was before the final results.

When they were posted, Patterson had the title she's worked so hard for, and Marchenko lifted her on his left shoulder and paraded her in front of the fans - a champion's chariot for a championship effort.

U.S. men's soccer team carries itself with a swagger

KINGSTON, Jamaica - They play with a confident air these days, even a swagger, more befitting the Brazilians and Germans.

And, for the U.S. men's soccer team, that's good. Very good.

In the past, before Bruce Arena was their coach and they were ranked in FIFA's top 10, the Americans probably wouldn't have had the moxie to come back and tie Jamaica in the final minutes of Wednesday night's CONCACAF semifinal qualifier for the 2006 World Cup.

"This group has that resolve. 'We kept believing until the end,' captain Claudio Reyna said. "We played well defensively on the road against a difficult and good team and we got a point."

A point that will come in handy in a group that also includes Panama and El Salvador. The United States should win the group and advance to next year's regional finals - the top two teams will move on.

But then, the challenge is much tougher, with such dangerous opponents as Mexico, Costa Rica, Honduras, Canada

and Trinidad and Tobago possibly on the horizon. Plus the experienced Jamaicans.

Arena has instilled so much toughness in his team, and created so much depth, that the United States should be favored to get to Germany in 2006.

"Many of these players have been together for a while and they have grown together," said Arena, who took over a faltering program in 1998 - the United States finished 32nd and last at that World Cup - and has resurrected it. "They've learned how to succeed together."

Most of the learning came in the buildup to the 2002 World Cup. In that event, the Americans were supposed to fall to highly seeded Portugal in their opener in South Korea, but stormed to a 3-0 lead and held on 3-2.

They were not expected to handle co-host South Korea in their next game, but got a 1-1 tie. And after advancing to the second round, they manhandled their top rival, Mexico, before losing 1-0 to Germany in a game the Americans often controlled.

# Big fourth quarter carries U.S.

ATHENS, Greece — Larry Brown believes his team is finally starting to get it.

In a game the Americans were sweating through and losing for the better part of three quarters, something clicked when the fourth quarter began.

One lousy and selfless play turned the turnabout. LeBron James eyed Shawn Marion's pass coming toward him and made a split-second decision to redirect the ball with a touch pass to Dwyane Wade for a layup.

The basket broke the last tie during a game-changing 10-point run at the start of the quarter, leading the United States to a 89-73 victory over Australia on Thursday at the Athens Games.

The victory — and the way the Americans turned the game around — might be a big step toward reversing their fortunes after they struggled to beat Greece and were embarrassed by Puerto Rico in a 19-point loss.

Brown said the players are beginning to realize what it takes to win at the Olympics.

"We don't have them all, but they're starting to care about each other and understand the importance of representing our country the right way," Brown said. "The biggest challenge coaches have today on all levels is for guys to think of coaching as coaching and not criticism."

After a defensively inept first half and a so-so third quarter, the Americans increased their defensive intensity, moved the ball with aplomb and put together a few of the showtime moments their Dream Team predecessors took for granted.

Next up is a matchup against Lithuania, the toughest team in their group. But at least the Americans will go into it knowing they're capable of playing the type of basketball the folks back home expect.

Everything's not clicking yet, but we're heading that way," Jim Duncan said. "It was a great learning experience today, being able to fight back and

staying with each other." Duncan scored 18 points, Allen Iverson and Marion each added 16 and Wade scored 12 for the U.S. team, which shot 57 percent from the field — 71 percent from 2-point range but only 3-for-17 on 3s.

The Americans kept their turnovers down, found better shots than in their first two games and realized that the only way to fuel their offense is opening defenses.

The United States forced four misses and a turnover on Aus-

tralia's first five possessions of the fourth quarter, and the ball movement was fluid and flashy during the run that put the Americans ahead 75-67.

Australia, led by Shane Heal's 17 points, never threatened again.

# Hamm could leave Athens with a collection of medals

ATHENS, Greece — After a wild night and a wild comeback, Olympic all-around champion Paul Hamm struggled back to the athletes' village only to realize he didn't have a credential to get in.

Not to worry. That gold medal around his neck served as a pretty good ID. "It's basically like a free pass into anywhere," he said Thursday, laughing.

Soon, he might have more. Although it would be hard to top his stirring performance from Wednesday night, Hamm has two individual event finals Sunday and another two on Monday.

That means he could leave Athens with as many as six medals.

And a month shy of his 22nd birthday, he has at least another Olympics in him. Maybe even two.

"I see no real reason to stop gymnastics until I've got a degree and I'm able to get a decent job," Hamm said.

Especially since he's so good at his current one.

No U.S. gymnast has won more than five medals at a single Olympics, but Hamm has a way of messing with history. He was the first American man to win the world title last summer, and now he's the first to win Olympic gold.

He will compete for medals on high bar and the floor exercise, his two best events, as well as parallel bars and pommel horse.

His best chance for a medal is probably on high bar.

Hamm has one of the most difficult routines in the world with three straight release moves, but he's missed it only once in the last year.

In the team final, his right hand slipped off the bar on the landing of his second release, and he wasn't able to do the third toss.

Still, he managed to stay on the bar.

And when he does his routine to perfection, as he did Wednesday night, he's almost unstoppable. His score of 9.857 was the highest on the event in qualifications, team finals and the all-around final.

"They never want to give anyone a 9.9 in this day and age," said Miles Avery, the Hamm's coach.

"And even 9.8s, it's so rare. It's just not too often. They'll give you 9.7s, they'll give you 9.6s. But they just don't want to give those 9.8s. That is very rare air."

Hamm's second-best event is probably floor.

His tumbling passes are so much higher than most other gymnasts, and his landings are so secure it's as if he's sinking into quicksand. He won a gold medal on it at last summer's world championships, and routinely scores above a 9.7.

# Americans dominate softball field

ATHENS, Greece (AP) — Lisa Fernandez pitched a one-hitter Thursday as the two-time defending gold medalist United States won its sixth straight shutout in softball, a shortened-games victory over Greece.

Greece (2-4) did all it could. The United States (6-0) simply wore down the Greeks — whose team includes several American Olympic stars — and put an opponent away after five innings for the fourth time under the so-called mercy rule.

China (3-3) beat Taiwan, scoring the only run on a fifth-inning fielding error by first baseman Chang Li Chiu.

Taiwan (2-4) missed a chance to tie it when Chen Miao Yi was tagged at home by Chinese catcher Guo Jia to end the fourth. Also, Iri Takayama and Yukiko Ueno combined on a three-hitter for Japan.

Another loss would have eliminated Japan (3-3) from the semifinals. Italy (1-5) got runners to first and third with more out in the third, but Takayama got out of the jam. Melanie floche pitched a complete-game shutout as Australia (5-1) clinched one of the top two spots in the playoffs and at least a bronze medal. Simone Morrow drove in the only run with a single in the second inning off Lauren Bay, Canada (2-4) can still make the semifinals, but must beat Italy on Friday and hope China (3-3) beats Japan (3-3) in the preliminary round finale. Other scores include: China 1, Taiwan 0; Japan 1, Italy 0; Australia 1, Canada 0.

**Beach Volleyball**

Brazilians Emanuel and Ricardo routed Americans Dax Holdren and Stein Metzger 21-17, 21-10 to finish a perfect run through pool play.

Despite the loss, the 12th-seeded Americans advanced to the medal round. Later, top-ranked American women Misty

May and Keri Walsh kept their toughest test of the tournament but stayed unbeaten with a 21-17, 21-17 win over 10th-seeded Czechs Iva Kolbova and

Sona Novakova.

The Americans and second-seeded Brazilians Shelda and Adriana are the only duos — men's or women's — who have not dropped a set. The Brazilian women, silver medalists in 2000, capped their run through pool play with a 21-14, 21-19 win over Cubans Fernandez, Grassel and Larra Peraza.

**Boxing**

U.S. medal prospect Andre Ward beat Italy's Clemente Russo 17-9 to advance to the quarterfinals as the Americans finished 6-1 in preliminaries. The Americans sent eight fighters into the second round, with two advancing on byes.

**Fencing**

Damien Touya scored the final touch to give France the team saber title over Italy, 45-42. Touya also scored the winning touch in a 45-44 semifinal win over the United States. In that bout, he badly cut his right hand and needed medical assistance with the score 44-44. The lengthy delay added even more drama to a day full of it.

After the loss to France, the Americans lost the bronze-medal bout to Russia, again 45-44. The United States had upset Hungary 45-43 a round earlier.

**Tennis**

Third-seeded Martina Navratilova won't win an Olympic medal after she and

partner Lisa Raymond lost 6-4, 4-6, 6-4 to fifth-seeded Shinobu Asagoe and Ai Sugiyama of Japan in the quarterfinals, one step shy of the medal round.

In women's singles, top-ranked Justine Henin-Hardenede beat two-time major champion Mary Pierce of France 6-4, 6-4, while No. 2 Amelie Mauresmo outlasted No. 5 Svetlana Kuznetsov of Russia 7-6 (5), 4-6, 6-2. French Open champion Anastasia Myskina was the first woman to reach the semifinals, beating Francesca Schiavone of Italy 6-1, 6-2. The upsets continued on the men's side, with No. 3 Carlos Moya joining Roger Federer and Andy Roddick on the sideline after a 6-2, 7-5 quarterfinal loss to Nicolas Pietrangeli of Chile.

**Volleyball (Men's)**

Stanislav Dineykin had 20 kills and three blocks to lead Russia to a four-set victory over the United States, 22-25, 25-20, 25-18, 25-23 on Thursday. After opening with a five-set loss to the Netherlands, Russia has won two straight. With opposite Clay Stanley struggling against a towering Russian block, the United States fell 1-2.

**Water Polo**

Defending Olympic champion Hungary handed the United States its first loss in men's water polo preliminaries. Tamas Varga scored his second goal on an extra-man play to seal the match with 1:27 remaining. Tony Azevedo scored two goals before he hit the post with an attempted equalizer at 6-5, then the Hungarians blocked shots by Layne Deaubien and Wolf Vigo to thwart a furious American comeback attempt in the last minute.

has twice won the Olympic 100-meter, the five-time Olympian only qualified this year when sprinter Torri Edinger's drug suspension ban was upheld, creating a spot for her.

There was speculation that Devers would reject the opportunity, focusing instead on the 100-meter hurdles and clearing the way for Marion Jones in the sprint. But Devers opted to run, leaving defending gold medalist Jones — the track star of the 2000 games — on the sidelines for this race.

Her absence won't keep NBC from turning its prime time attention to the track and field kickoff. The 6-10 p.m. MDI program's first Athens feature Wilkinson's first Athens dives, U.S. women's volleyball against Russia, women's gymnastics, and one well-known American male: Phelps, who will vie for his eighth high five gold medal and seventh overall in the men's 100-meter butterfly.

Hamm, like Devers, is an Olympic veteran — and the

world's most famous female soccer star has already said she's retiring at the end of the Athens Games. Hamm and her teammates face Japan in the quarterfinals, with the winner moving into the round of four and the loser leaving without a medal.

The game marks Hamm's 26th appearance with the U.S. team as she looks to extend her world-record total of 153 goals. Whether those numbers increase depends on the outcome; a loss means the end of her career.

"I'm old," the 32-year-old Hamm said this week when asked why she was walking away. She doesn't want to leave without collecting a third gold medal, though MSNBC will air the game against Japan live at 9 a.m.

Wilkinson, the defending Olympic champion in the 10-meter platform diving, was one of the great stories of the Sydney Games: the first U.S. woman to win the event since 1964, scoring a tremendous upset despite a right foot bro-

ken in three places.

Now healthy, she hopes to duplicate her Australian effort — minus all the drama.

Back at the track, NBC plans live coverage Friday afternoon of the men's 10,000-meter final, which starts shortly after 1:30 p.m. It promises one of the game's emotional highlights, when Olympic veteran Haile Gebrselassie of Ethiopia runs with his gold medal favorite protege, 22-year-old Kenenisa Bekele.

Last year, Bekele stole the world title away from legendary distance runner Gebrselassie. And three months ago, within just nine days, he smashed his mentor's world records in both the 5,000 and 10,000.

Gebrselassie, 31, is the two-time defending Olympic 10,000 champion, but that could change Friday in a passing of the torch on the Athens track. If he managed to somehow win, Gebrselassie would become the first runner to win three straight golds in an individual track event.

# Delhomme overshadows Manning

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — Although the spotlight was on Eli Manning, Jake Delhomme shone the brightest.

Manning had a decent debut as a starter, but Delhomme overshadowed the No. 1 pick in the NFL draft by throwing for a touchdown and running for another in the Carolina Panthers' 27-20 preseason victory Thursday night over the New York Giants.

The game was the first test for Manning, the \$45 million quarterback competing with two-time MVP Kurt Warner for New York's starting job.

After backing up Warner in last week's preseason victory over Kansas City, Manning got the start against the NFC champions. He looked every bit the carbon copy of his brother, Peyton, pointing out the defense and calling audibles at the line early.

And his passes were smooth and on the mark. He went 9-for-15 for 117 yards.

But as the first half went on, the Panthers began to figure him out.

Brentson Buckner pushed through the line for a nasty takedown of Manning in the second quarter — Buckner was flagged for encroachment — and Mark Fields sacked him three plays later to bring his night to an end.

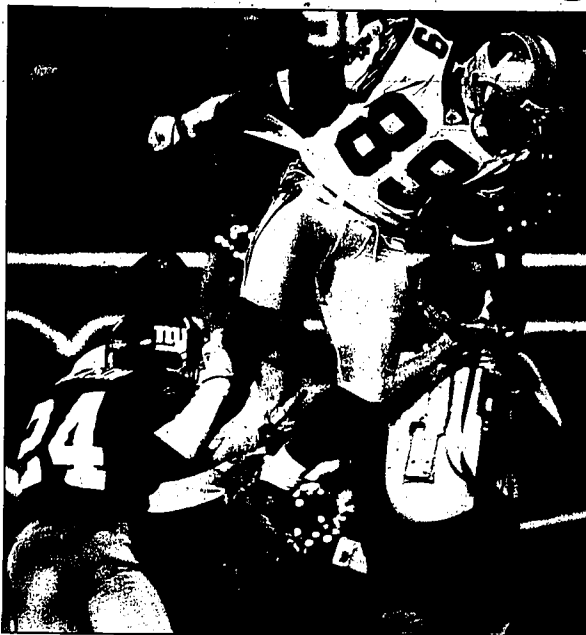
There were a few bobbles: On his second series, Manning tried to change the play from the shotgun position but ran out of time and earned a delay of game penalty.

But Manning also proved to be elusive, avoiding a safety by dumping the ball off just as Julius Peppers closed in on him in the end zone.

"I did all right," new Giants coach Tom Coughlin said. "I'd like to see him go to the next level. We don't have any problems with that."

The 23-year-old Manning made a good impression on some of the Panthers.

"He's going to be good," defensive end Mike Rucker said. "They're trying to protect him with quick counts and hard counts and quick throws. That's

understandable. He'll be good when he gets older."

On this night, it was Delhomme who sparked it.

An unheralded quarterback until he led Carolina into the Super Bowl last season, Delhomme picked up right where he left off with a sharp and confident passing game.

He went 11-of-13 for 144 yards, including back-to-back pretty passes to Steve Smith. One was for 38 yards, and Smith added a leap over his defenders

and into the end zone untouched for a 17-6 lead.

Manning probably moved ahead of Warner in the battle for the starting job.

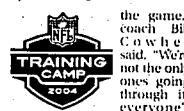

## Busch understands the booing

NEW YORK (AP) — Kurt Busch knows a lot about being booed, and his crew chief believes the noise is not necessarily a negative.

"It's been a good learning experience for me to go through," said Busch, one of NASCAR's young stars. Busch was even heartily booed after winning at Bristol Motor Speedway a year ago. Two weeks earlier, Jimmy Spencer walked up and punched him in the face as Busch sat in his car after a race in Michigan.

Both drivers were punished and Spencer was suspended for a week. Busch was permitted to race despite tapes of radio chatter where he said he intentionally tried to hit Spencer's car.

"He's a cocky, arrogant punk." Kevin Harvick, himself no stranger to contact and controversy, said after finishing second last summer at Bristol. "He just has a really, really bad attitude."

But even he concedes Busch is talented.

"He can wheel a race car," Harvick said.

In 2002, Busch won at Bristol after bumping Spencer out of the way. Last August, Busch spun out local favorite Sterling Marlin. The booing was loud and long.

It has continued but seems to be abating in both intensity and longevity. Crew chief Jimmy Fenning says he isn't concerned.

"How many times did they boo Dale Earnhardt? How many times did they boo Jeff Gordon? It's just the fans," Fenning said. "I'll get people back on his side and go from there."

A contrite Busch wound up apologizing for some of his behavior on and off the track.

A year later, he believes he has a better understanding of what happened.

"The bigger picture is what I didn't know when I came to

Fenning is Martin's crew chief for five years, including 1998, when Martin won a career-best seven races.

With the level of competition constantly growing with an influx of so many talented young drivers, it might be difficult for Busch to win quite so often. But Fenning thinks his driver has unlimited potential.

Car owner Jack Roush has noticed the improvement in Busch this year. Roush said it was important for Busch to find a level of contentment that would permit him to move forward.

The Busch he hired was always looking for an immediate remedy whenever things didn't go well with the car. But Roush doesn't think that's such a bad trait in a young driver.

Success might have played a role in that frustration, Roush believes. He's never seen a driver win so often at such a young age.

Anything less left Busch dissatisfied.

"I raced every series like it was going to be the last opportunity I had because it all seemed surreal," Busch said. "It seemed like I could never go farther than the local level because that's all my father was able to do."

It was a rare light moment these days about Victory Lane, which has become a focal point of controversy.

NASCAR has a deal with PowerAde the official sponsor of Victory Lane and expects winning drivers to speed there for the post-race celebration.

Where three PowerAde bottles gets planked on the roof of the winning car.

It matters not that PowerAde is made by Coca-Cola; that several drivers have sponsorship deals with Pepsi, or that several truck drivers have Gatorade emblazoned all over Victory Lane.

"When you win a race, you want to be able to share it with your crew, share it with your fans," Hickey Rudd said.

The rest of it, the television and all that stuff, to me it's always been a necessary evil of the business.

"Don't get me wrong, Victory

Lane is a great place to be. But it gets to be so rehearsed that you almost need to let the drivers and their teams go have their celebration. Let them have their 10 minutes, then go through the work process. Victory Lane is work."

Indeed, after winning at Watkins Glen on Sunday and despite a bad case of stomach cramps that nearly forced him out of his car during the race, Tony Stewart obligingly donned nearly 60 hats in Victory Lane.

# Grocery chain plans new store

TWIN FALLS — Albertsons Inc. is preparing — again — to build its huge planned replacement store at Blue Lakes Boulevard, North and Addison Avenue.

The Boise-based grocery retailer's first building permit expired in early January, six months after issuance, without ever leaving the city building

department. Regional spokeswoman Danielle Killpack declined to say why.

But Albertsons in mid-June resubmitted its store plans to City Hall, which issued a new permit at the end of July.

The latest permit is for a 55,985-square-foot structure, made up of 52,417 square feet for the store and a 3,568-square-foot canopy. The city building department estimated its construction value at \$2.17 million.

That's bigger than the original plan permitted in 2003: a 52,417-square-foot store with an estimated value of \$2.13 million.

The design only changed — hence the resubmission to the city, Killpack said by e-mail Thursday. The new Albertsons store will have pharmacy and fueling stations, she said, "in addition to the new Renaissance interior look."

Killpack said the grocery store is scheduled to open in

late spring or summer of 2005. It will replace the existing 35,000-square-foot Twin Falls Albertsons' close to the same spot.

Much has happened in recent years to clear the way for construction: The Twin Falls City Council in 1998 approved the sweeping development proposal for the new store and an Albertsons-operated gas station fronting Blue Lakes. Nearby duplexes have been moved off the site.

The Mongolian House vacated its former restaurant space. The Episcopal Church of the Ascension relocated elsewhere in town.

The city rerouted a sewer in early 2003 on the premise that Albertsons' construction would follow shortly, hurrying to get out of the way.

# Annual festival celebrates fabled lentil

PULLMAN, Wash. — Here they celebrate the lentil, historic legume of destiny.

Most of the nation's lentils are grown in the fertile Palouse region of Washington and Idaho, and this weekend's 16th annual National Lentil Festival will focus some needed attention on a food that many Americans ignore.

"We are always working to improve the consumption of lentils in the U.S.," said Tim McGreevy, executive director of the trade association U.S.A. Dry Pea & Lentil Council. "We are making incremental gains, but not giant gains."

That may be about to change. Promising research at Washington State University here has produced lentil puffs that can be flavored and consumed as breakfast cereal or as a snack food. Some of the snacks will be available for tasting at the festival.

Lentils — tiny beans shaped like flying saucers or eyeglass

lenses — have always been an also-ran in the United States diet. But they have a long and storied history in the Mediterranean, the Middle East, Asia and Africa.

First cultivated 20,000 years ago, lentils are among the world's oldest crops. They were found in royal Egyptian tombs. They are mentioned in the Bible and are credited by some historians with helping save western civilization by providing a rich source of food for survivors of the plague in the Middle Ages.

But in the United States, lentils are eaten primarily as ingredients in canned soups. Americans seem to prefer pinto beans that are often used in Mexican-style fast food.

"They are not as good as lentils, in my humble opinion," McGreevy sniffed.

Lentils, and their close cousins dry peas and garbanzo beans, were first planted in the Palouse early in the last century.

Around 1916, a Farmington man named Jacob Wagner planted a field with lentil seeds

that were brought to the area from Europe by a Seventh-day Adventist minister. Conditions turned out to be perfect and by the 1930s they were grown commercially in the Palouse.

By 1955, 190,000 acres of lentils were cultivated in Washington and Oregon. That number has dropped in recent years, to about 155,000 acres. But acreage is up in the rest of the nation, to 235,654 acres last year.

Only about 25 percent of the U.S. production is consumed in this country. The largest export markets are Spain, Italy, Greece and France, McGreevy said.

Farmers typically lose money on lentil sales, but grow the crop because it helps soil recover fertility and provides some weed and disease control.

The annual Lentil Festival is held in a Pullman city park, and features various dishes cooked with the legumes. It also has what is billed as the largest bowl of lentil chili, a 450-gallon metal tub consumed by attendees.

"You can have all the lentil

chili you can eat," McGreevy said.

This year's two-day festival kicks off in downtown Pullman on Friday afternoon. Saturday's events include a lentil pancake feed, a parade, a lentil cook-off and coronation of the Little Lentil King and Queen.

The big news in lentil country is that the convenience food barrier may finally have been cracked by food scientists at WSU.

Lentils typically take some 25 minutes to cook, a disadvantage in speed-obsessed America.

But scientists have discovered a way to "extrude," or puff up, dried lentils into a ready-to-eat food.

Scientists are testing various flavors, including barbecue, cheese, salted and sugarcared. Some will be available to sample this weekend.

"Basically, they're lentil Cheetos," said Michelle Poesy, director of the festival. "They taste real good."

# Petsmart earnings rise, but shares slump after lagging results

PHOENIX, Ariz. — Petsmart Inc. the top U.S. pet supplies chain on Thursday said quarterly earnings rose on improved pet services sales, but its stock sank as much as 12 percent as results lagged analysts' expectations.

Petsmart — which has a Twin Falls location — said earnings rose to \$34.1 million, or 23 cents a share, in the second quarter ended Aug. 1, from \$28.1 million, or 19 cents, a year earlier.

Earnings in the latest quarter included a tax benefit of about \$8 million as well as other items. Total sales rose 11 percent to \$806.0 million, while pet services revenue jumped 23.4 percent. Sales at stores open at least a year, a gauge of retail strength, rose 5.4 percent for the quarter.

Petsmart, with more than 675

stores in the United States and Canada, expects third-quarter earnings of 24 cents a share, with same-store sales rising 5 percent to 6 percent.

For the full year, Petsmart forecast earnings of \$1.17 to \$1.18 a share on same-store sales growth of 7 percent. Wall Street expected \$1.18 a share.

On Wednesday, smaller rival Petco Animal Supplies Inc. posted stronger quarterly earnings on a 6.7 percent increase in same-store sales.

In the past several years, consumers have consistently spent more on their pets regardless of the economy. At the same time, both Pets-

mart and Petco have posted improved results, selling more big-ticket items like accessories and pet services rather than lower-priced pet food.

Petsmart shares were down \$1.61, or 5.4 percent, at \$28.21, in heavy trading on Nasdaq. Volume topped 10.5 million shares at midday, more than five times its average daily volume of 1.9 million.

Petco climbed \$2.59, or 8.7 percent, at \$32.31, also on Nasdaq.

#### Foot Locker Q2 earnings more than double

NEW YORK — Foot Locker Inc.'s second-quarter income more than doubled, helped by a large income tax benefit and a boost in revenue.

The New York-based shoe retailer with a store in Magic Valley Mall also expects earn-

ings per share for the third and fourth quarters to improve upon last year's numbers.

In the quarter ended July 31, the company earned \$82 million, or 53 cents a share, on revenue of \$1.27 billion. In the same period last year it earned \$36 million, or 24 cents a share, on revenue of \$1.12 billion.

The latest quarter included an income tax benefit of \$37 million, or 24 cents a share, from Footaction, acquired in May.

Excluding Footaction and the tax benefit, Foot Locker earned \$55 million, or 36 cents a share.

Foot Locker acquired the Footaction stores from Footstar Inc., which filed for Chapter 11 bankruptcy-court protection in March.

Footaction contributed \$104

# Delta's debt plan raises concerns

ATLANTA — Delta Air Lines Inc.'s plan to restructure some of its debt outside of bankruptcy has raised concerns among credit analysts who believe the move could be tantamount to defaulting on the money the struggling carrier — whose Salt Lake City hub is Twin Falls air travelers' only nonstop destination — owes.

Standard & Poor's on Thursday dropped Delta's credit rating to a lower degree of junk status and warned that the rating could be lowered to default, S&P is concerned that a sweep of debt for equity in the company could be viewed as coercive if the debtholder has no other choice and ends up receiving less financial consideration than originally owed.

Atlanta-based Delta's low credit rating hampers its ability to raise additional financing. Delta's debt stands at more than \$20 billion.

"Ratings could be lowered if Delta does not make rapid progress toward significant cost reductions in its negotiations with the holders of these certificates," S&P analyst Philip Baggaley said.

In afternoon trading Thursday, shares of Delta fell 3 cents to \$4.04 on the New York Stock Exchange.

The company outlined on Wednesday a debt restructuring plan that includes certain equity certificates issued by investor groups that lease aircraft to the airline to assist in financing the planes' cost. Delta is applying the holders of these certificates to remove any restrictions that would prevent the airline from buying or holding the securities.

In addition to wanting to restructure, Delta's the nation's third-largest airline is trying to get \$1 billion in concessions from its pilots, make changes to its fare system and improve customer service as part of a broad turnaround plan.

The airline has warned of the possibility of bankruptcy if it doesn't get the pilot cuts.

On Thursday, Delta met with its pilots and behind closed doors to discuss the company's proposal. The union has offered up to \$705 million in concessions. Company and union officials refused to immediately provide any information about

# Gap sales, profits fall in second quarter

SAN FRANCISCO — Gap Inc.'s sales and profits fell in the second quarter but cleared sales and the cost of retiring some of debt early, the company reported Thursday.

For the second quarter, Gap — which has a Twin Falls Old Navy store — earned \$194 million, or 21 cents per share, compared with profits of \$209 million, or 22 cents per share, in the same period last year.

Excluding special items, including the summer clearance sales and the cost of retiring some of debt early, Gap said its profits would have been \$234 million, or 25 cents a share. Please see EARNINGS, Page E3

" We delivered solid second-quarter margin gains and double-digit earnings growth before expenses related to our debt repurchase, despite summer clearance against weaker traffic trends driving disappointing results in June and July," Gap president and chief executive Paul Pressler said.

July is one of the least important months of the retail year and is used by stores to clear out summer goods, but it nonetheless reflects consumer trends. Most of the apparel industry had a lackluster July and June.

Sales at the Gap eked up 1 percent in the second quarter to \$3.72 billion compared to \$3.69 billion in the same period last year. Same-store sales, which measure the performance of outlets open at least a year, were flat, the company said. That figure is considered the best barometer of a merchant's health.

Claire's Q2 earnings up on strong sales

PEMBROKE PINES, Fla. — Second quarter earnings increased 46 percent at Claire's Stores, which reported sales up 15 percent.

The accessories and costume jewelry retailer — with a store in Magic Valley Mall — said it earned \$32.7 million, or 33 cents a share, on sales of \$305.2 million for its second quarter ended July 31. For the similar period ended Aug. 2, 2003, Claire's said it earned \$22.2 million, or 33 cents a share, on sales of \$264.9 million.

Analysts had predicted Claire's would report earning 32 cents a share on revenue of \$301.85 million, — both targets the company exceeded.

Comparable store sales increased 10 percent, while retail sales, Claire's did not give a number for comparable store sales, but said the increase follows a 5 percent increase in last year's second quarter.

Bonnie Schaefer, Claire's co-chairwoman and co-CEO, said the second quarter results reflect the convergence of three positive events: maintained momentum at Claire's North America, dramatic improvement in performance at Icing by Claire's and the initial stages of a turnaround in the International operation.

By brand, Claire's reported comparable store sales in the positive low double digits at Claire's North America, positive single digit at Claire's South America and positive high single digit at Claire's International and positive high

The downward trend underscored that the equity market is deeply mired in the trading doldrums characteristic of late summer, though analysts noted there are additional pressures this year.

Shopko profit up 7.8 percent

GREEN BAY, Wis. — Shopko Inc. reported net income for the second quarter of \$9.3 million, or 28 cents per share, an increase of 7.8 percent compared with \$7.7 million, or 26 cents per share, for the same period a year ago.

Net sales for the discount retailer, which has a Twin Falls store, increased 1.4 percent to \$75.6 million from \$74.7 million last year.

Second-quarter same-store sales — sales for stores opened in both years — increased 1.7 percent.

The improved results were in line with company expectations and reflected the impact of marketing initiatives in both its Shopko and Pamida store divisions, said Sam Duncan, president and chief executive officer.

Charge huts Barnes & Noble's bottom line

NEW YORK (AP) — Barnes & Noble Inc. posted a 35 percent drop in second-quarter earnings Thursday, hurt by a debt-redemption charge, but results beat Wall Street's estimates.

The New York-based book-seller, which operates a Twin Falls store, also raised its full-year earnings estimates.

Net income came to \$8.9 million, or 12 cents a share, for the latest quarter, compared with \$13.7 million, or 20 cents a share, a year earlier.

Earnings excluding the one-time charge were 24 cents a share, better than the 15 cents a share seen by analysts surveyed by Thomson First Call.

Sales rose 13 percent to \$1.45 billion from \$1.28 billion a year ago. First Call had been looking for second-quarter sales of \$1.42 billion.

Barnes & Noble store sales posted a 4 percent increase for the quarter. Sales at stores open at least a year, also known as same-store sales, edged up 1.4 percent.

B. Dalton sales, which comprise about 4 percent of total book-store sales, came to \$39.9 million for the quarter, a 22 percent drop from a year earlier, due mainly to store closings.

Not surprisingly, Barnes & Noble's stock price increased 10 percent to \$2.21, placed at having grown same-

Delta, criticized for years for charging what consumer advocates say are excessive prices for flights from Cincinnati, is trying to win back thousands of potential customers who drive to other airports in Dayton, Indianapolis, Columbus, Louisville, Ky., for cheaper fares.

The competing airports for years have had billboard advertisements making that pitch to customers.

The bookseller attributed the buyout in book sales to the release of a few titles that received major media coverage, most notably former President Bill Clinton's memoir, "My Life."

Barnes & Noble completed its merger with Barnes & Noble.com on May 27. Barnes & Noble.com's second-quarter sales decreased 6 percent to \$84.5 million, resulting in a loss of \$7.6 million, or 11 cents a share.

Barnes & Noble operates more than 500 Barnes & Noble and more than 320 B. Dalton bookstores in the United States. GameStop, a video game and entertainment software store.

Limited profit rises but August sales lag

COLUMBUS, Ohio — Limited Brands Inc., the operator of Bath and Body Works and Victoria's Secret, on Thursday posted a 45 percent jump in quarterly profit on strong sales of lingerie and toiletries, but the retailer said apparel sales were off to a slow start in August.

The company, whose shares were off 2 percent, said good results at its Victoria's Secret lingerie chain underpinned profit growth in the second quarter, ended July 31, as shoppers snapped up items of sleepwear and underwear called "Pink."

The company's Bath & Body Works toiletries division also had strong spring demand, posting a 7 percent increase in sales at stores open at least a year, or same-store sales, in the quarter.

Limited, whose outlets also include Limited and Express apparel stores, reported second-quarter net income rose to \$148 million, or 31 cents per share, from \$102 million, or 19 cents a share, a year earlier.

Analyst Financial Officer Ann Hailey told analysts in a conference call that the company's overall same-store sales so far in August were trending "slightly below" the forecast for a low-single-digit percentage increase.

At the Express chain, second-quarter same-store sales rose only 3 percent, compared with a 20 percent rise at the Bath & Body Works unit.

For the entire company, same-store sales — a key measure of retail performance — rose 9 percent in the quarter.

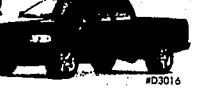



