# ANOTHER KIND OF DOWNWINDER?

## Residents may have limited say on coal-fired power plant

GLENN'S FERRY — Residents in Twin Falls and Gooding counties may not get much say on whether a \$1 billion coal-fired power plant will be located just west — and upwind — of their respective county lines.

Since Idaho lacks statewide regulations that spell out where power plants can locate, that decision might fall into the hands of Elmore County commissioners exclusively.

Sempra Energy, a San Diego-based energy company, continues its quest to construct a 750-megawatt coal power plant between Glenn's Ferry and Bliss.

Martin Holland, who owns property near Sempra's proposed construction site, initially opposed the coal-processing plant. However, representatives of the company recently approached him about acquiring his property if the company proceeds with its plans. Holland has not received a formal offer from Sempra.

"I was impressed," Holland said. "I was really impressed by the way they handled me."

### Across the county line

Retiring state Sen. Laird Noh, R-Kimberly, says there's no doubt Sempra Energy Resources — a division of Sempra Energy, the country's largest utility — handles opposition effectively. The fact that Sempra has not only the experience but also the resources to deal with opponents such as Holland only adds to the argument that Idaho needs siting laws, Noh said.

From his property near the Sempra site, the wind blows east into Twin Falls and Gooding counties, Holland said. The plant would be located on the very eastern edge of Elmore County.

"It's a hypothetical example," Noh said. "But we would theoretically be the downwinder."

Other states, such as Oregon and Wyoming, have siting provisions that make locating a power plant a state rather than county issue. Idaho does not have these regulations, which outline a state-approved process for companies to follow when considering building a power plant. Companies that are required to submit environmental studies, obtain

designated permits and hold public meetings before the state approves their proposed power plants. A state committee frequently makes the final decision based on the company's application and public comment.

"The Idaho Legislature considered similar legislation in one point, Noh said.

"I think the last time that a serious run at it occurred was when Phil Batt was in the Legislature," Noh said. "That was quite a few years ago."

Interest in state siting legisla-

tion surfaces most frequently when a major power plant considers coming into the state, Noh said. Legislators were more serious about adopting these regulations in the 1970s when Idaho Power proposed to put in a coal plant between Boise and Mountain Home. Opposition to the plant prevented the power company's plans from taking hold.

"I tried to generate some interest three years ago," Noh said. "There certainly was some interest then."

However, "I don't think peo-

ple felt the urgency of siting," he said.

Natural gas prices were lower at the time. Today, with the price of natural gas rising, companies search for other sources of power, such as coal.

"That suddenly means that coal is back on the table again," Noh said.

## Bin Laden strikes a new tone

### Videotape tries to court new supporters

CAIRO, Egypt — Osama bin Laden's new videotape clearly targets American voters days before an expected tightly fought presidential election, but also courts another constituency: young Arabs who are frustrated and disenchanted but not committed to radical Islam.

Al-Qaida's leader already has extremists on his side, who made it clear in their remarks posted Saturday on Islamic Web sites that they were elated to see him looking healthy and in control of the cause.

But analysts say he is trying to broaden his base and that his words were chosen for more secular young Muslims as well as Americans.

In the tape, parts of which were aired Friday by the Arabic TV network Al-Jazeera, bin Laden dropped the usual religious rhetoric and historical references in favor of plain language.

And he pointed to Israeli aggression as his inspiration for the Sept. 11 attacks on New York and Washington, U.S. policy in the Israeli-Palestinian issue drives frustration among many Arabs, from moderates to radicals.

He struck a tone that was almost conciliatory — through things with which he is familiar, telling the American people only four days before the election between President Bush and Sen. John Kerry that he wanted to explain why he ordered the Sept. 11 attacks so Americans can act to prevent a similar strike. Stop harming Muslims, he said, and an attack will be averted.

"Your security is not in the hands of Kerry, Bush or al-Qaida. Your security is in your own hands," bin Laden said. "America's security is bound to the policy they adopt regardless of the winner."

Analysis After months of campaigning and a half-billion dollars spent on attack ads, Bush and Kerry are still at the whim of unexpected events such as Osama bin Laden's sudden emergence on Friday, a videotape appearance that sent both candidates scrambling to pledge victory in the fight against terrorism.

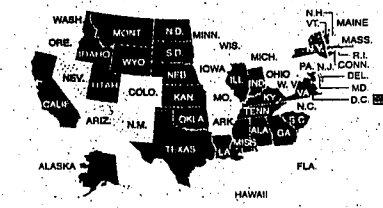

## Nevada mines may pose mercury threat to Idaho

BOISE — Some Nevada gold mines should be monitored for mercury pollution across the border into Idaho, a handful of Idaho environmental officials said.

Gold mines are among the nation's largest sources of mercury pollution, federal environmental regulators say. But the mines remain unregulated and officials with the Idaho Department of Environmental Quality say they did not learn about the pollution until last year, when they began writing rules to protect Idaho water from mercury pollution.

Even at low levels, mercury pollution can cause neurological damage, especially in young children.

The department officials hope to get air scientists from

the Idaho National Engineering and Environmental Laboratory to monitor snow and air for mercury in the Jarvis Mountains along the state line.

Meanwhile, the environmental advocacy group Idaho Conservation League is threatening to sue the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency if the EPA does not begin to regulate mercury from gold mines. Justin Hayes, the group's conservation director, said the state Department of Health and Welfare should also study health records across southern Idaho. Health officials have already warned anglers, pregnant women and children not to eat fish from some lakes in the region because of high levels of mercury.

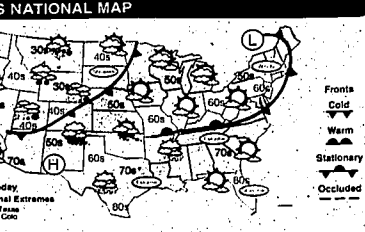

Continued from A1. This late in an election, however, these are not normal circumstances. This is a time of war, said Michigan pollster, Steve Mitchell.

Two other states fall just outside the toss-up category — Michigan and New Hampshire, both of which tilt slightly toward Kerry. An additional six to 12 states, including the slow-moving Democratic bastion of Hawaii, could come into play if neither Bush nor Kerry wins a clear majority of the popular vote.

Each of the toss-up states presents different challenges for the two candidates. Pennsylvania is Kerry's best state of the eight toss-ups. "If I were a betting person, I would probably say that Kerry's ability to do well in the Philadelphia and Pittsburgh suburbs will allow him to carry the state," said Jerome Maddox, political science assistant professor at the University of Pennsylvania.

Among the three toss-up states that went GOP in 2000, Nevada may stick with Bush despite his support of a hated nuclear waste dump and the influx of Democrat-leaning Hispanics. But it offers just five electoral votes.

Continued from A1. communities and determine if gold mining in Nevada is poisoning children in Idaho," Hayes said.

Agency opted to offer mining companies a voluntary reduction program, hoping it would bring immediate benefits, said David Jones, associate director for the agency in San Francisco.

Gary Goodrich, environmental manager for the Jerritt Canyon mine near Elko, said until the federal program required miners to report emissions in 1998, he didn't know the extent of mercury pollution they were sending into the air. That year the mine reported emitting 9,410 pounds — the largest source in the nation.

"I guess it was a testament to the value of the program," Goodrich said. Jerritt has cut its mercury emissions to 800 pounds this year, but it remains one of the nation's largest mercury polluters.

# Gay issue may sway election

Voters in 11 states will decide Tuesday whether to ban gay marriage, and two of those states — the political hotbeds of Michigan and Ohio — will be watched closely to see if the emotional issue might tilt the outcome of the tight presidential race.

As much as the amendments themselves, the political pull of this issue will be tested next week.

While legislatures have moved with unusual speed to place constitutional bans on gay marriage before voters, the issue has not overtaken voter concerns about the economy, health care, the war in Iraq and the fight against terrorism.

But political analysts say the proposals could encourage additional turnout from people concerned about the issue and provide the margin of victory in tossup states like Michigan, with 17 electoral votes, and Ohio, with 20. In Missouri, for instance, the first state to approve a constitutional ban on gay marriage this year, almost 1.5 million people cast ballots on the marriage amendment in August, roughly 40,000 more than the total vote in the state's hotly contested gubernatorial primary election.

The election polls in Missouri showed about 60 percent of voters supported the measure. The proposal passed with a whopping 71 percent. Louisiana voters approved a similar ban in September, with 78 percent.

Interviews with registered voters around the country show morality-based issues — abortion, prayer in school, religion, gay marriage — are prominent concerns, especially among Republicans.

When that means for Election Day, however, is not clear because these issues cross party lines and are not exclusively identified with particular candidates.

"You may see a 3-to-4-percentage point increase in turnout over 2000," John Green, a political scientist at the University of Akron, said of the Ohio ballot measure.

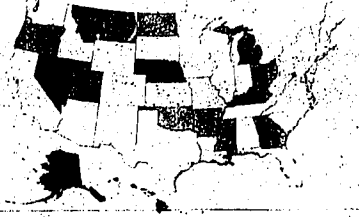

politics and religion. "A lot of these people may not vote for (President) Bush. Some African-Americans will come out for the marriage amendment, but they will vote for (Sen.) John Kerry."

Ed Sarpolus, vice president of EPRC-MRA, a Michigan-based public research firm, said the gay marriage proposal "may add 4 percent."

"Will it have an impact? Some. Significant? No," Sarpolus said.

On Tuesday, Oregon, Montana, Utah, North Dakota, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Mississippi, Georgia, Kentucky, Ohio and

Michigan will decide proposed constitutional amendments that would say marriage is a union between a man and a woman.

Nearly all opinion polls have shown the measures getting strong, if not overwhelming, support. An Ohio poll from the University of Cincinnati released last week showed 57 percent of voters intend to vote for the measure, while 40 percent signaled their opposition.

That represents an 8-percentage-point drop in support from September, the poll said.

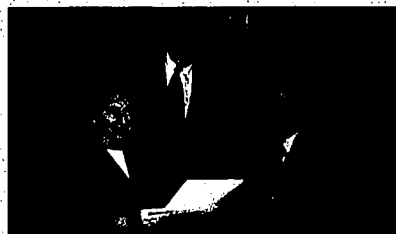

# Lost chance?

Did U.S. mistakes let bin Laden escape three years ago?

WASHINGTON — Osama bin Laden's reappearance on Friday in a videotape has revived the controversy over how the al-Qaida leader and many of his fighters escaped from American troops and their local allies in Afghanistan three years ago.

Sen. John Kerry has suggested several times that the Bush administration failed to kill or capture bin Laden because it turned the job over to Afghan warlords.

"The right choice was to use American forces to hunt down Osama bin Laden" on the Afghan-Pakistan border at the end of 2001, Kerry said Friday in an interview with WISN-TV in Milwaukee. "He outsmarted the job."

Bush administration officials, however, said they used a combination of Afghan fighters, American military advisers and U.S. air power to attack al-Qaida and Taliban forces in the mountain Tora Bora region.

Writing in The New York Times on Oct. 19, retired Army Gen. Tommy Franks, who led the wars in Afghanistan and Iraq, said it isn't clear that bin Laden was in Tora Bora at the time and denied that the United States "outsourced" military action. Who's right?

Several Knight Ridder investigative reporters found that Franks and other top officials ignored warnings from their own and allied military and intelligence officers that the combination of precision bombing, special operations forces and Afghan forces that had driven the Taliban from northern Afghanistan might not work in the heartland of the country's dominant Pashtun tribe.

While more than 1,200 U.S. Marines sat at an abandoned air base in the desert 80 miles away, Franks and other commanders relied on three Afghan warlords and a small number of American, British and Australian special forces to stop al-Qaida and Taliban fighters from escaping across the mountains into Pakistan.

"We did rely heavily on Afghans because they knew Tora Bora," Franks wrote.

Military and intelligence officials had warned Franks and others that the two main Afghan commanders, Hazrat Ali and Haji Zaman, couldn't be trusted, and they proved to be correct. They were slow to move their troops into place and didn't attack until four days after American planes began bombing.

Leaving time for al-Qaida leaders to escape and leaving behind a rear guard of Arab, Chechen and Uzbek fighters, Zaman and Ali began trying to negotiate an al-Qaida surrender even before they began their ground attack. Then, on the second day of the attack, Zaman declared a cease-fire. Ali and a third commander, Haji Zahir, who joined the attack at the last minute, resumed fighting after a few hours, and the U.S. bombing never stopped. But Zaman left open an escape route through the Wazir Tangi valley.

U.S. intelligence analysis estimated that 1,000 to 1,100 al-Qaida fighters, along with some of the group's top leaders, escaped the American dragnet at Tora Bora.

It isn't clear, however, whether bin Laden and his top aide, Ayman al-Zawahiri, were among them, as Kerry has alleged. Bin Laden was last seen heading out of the Afghan city of Jalalabad toward Tora Bora in a convoy on Nov. 15, 2001. U.S. officials thought they'd heard him on a local radio transmission in Tora Bora in December, but later said they might have been mistaken.

In democracy's annals, a noble thread of tradition links those ordinary Americans who have stepped forward from daily life to serve their fellow citizens and embody hopes of a brighter future. George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, Abraham Lincoln, Harry S. Truman, Bubba the Love Sponge.

You heard right. The nasty-boy Florida deejay — if you who specialized in radio shows that included "on-air sex talk by George Jetson and Scooby-Do" — is doing what comes naturally to so many Americans: I'll seek public office.

But wait — there's more. With the 2004 elections, you also get: • Democratic in Camden County, N.J., having to troll for their candidates this year. They sent postcards to about 500 citizens saying they'd make great local officeholders. Ninety-seven sent in resumes, and now one — Carmen Rodriguez — is on the ballot for freholder.

Bubba the Love Sponge's rhymes have been of a different ilk. The erstwhile Tampa shock jock, whose real name was Todd Clem before he legally changed it to Bubba the Love Sponge Clem, was fired after he was sanctioned by the Federal Communications Commission for on-air ribaldry.

Now he's running for sheriff in Pinellas County, a retirement haven, and his candidacy doesn't appear to be a gag. He's criticized the sheriff's office on the air for years

and has a plan to raise salaries and promote women and minorities.

"You certainly know who I am," Bubba/Clem, 38, said after a recent speech. "Now I just have to

convince you that I can be the person you may not know."

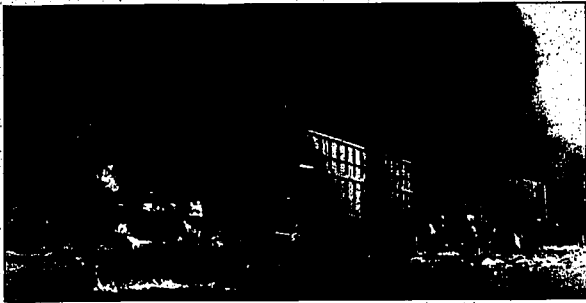

BAGHDAD, Iraq — Nine Marines were killed and nine others were wounded in a car-bomb ambush near the insurgent stronghold of Fallujah on Saturday in the deadliest single attack on U.S. forces in nearly nine months. Another 30 men in a g

In a third incident, Iraqi security forces reportedly killed 14 people when they opened fire on vehicles carrying civilians in the aftermath of a roadside bomb attack on a U.S. Army convoy roughly 25 miles south of Baghdad, the capital. The attack on the Marines underscored the growing use of car bombs as the weapon of choice in attacking military convoys. Vehicles such as trucks and even motorcycles can be packed with far more explosives than artillery shells or land mines, which commonly are used as roadside bombs, and can inflict greater casualties. Saturday's mayhem came as U.S. forces readied themselves for an all-out assault on Fallujah and

clashed with militants on the city's outskirts during scouting missions. U.S. military officials say the city has long provided refuge to insurgents, as well as Jordanian militant Abu Musab al-Zarqawi. The city west of Baghdad, they say, must be retaken if Iraqi national elections are to be held as scheduled in January. Over the last month in Fallujah, aerial bombings and raids by the Marines and Iraqi soldiers have destroyed numerous homes and structures suspected of hiding members of al-Zarqawi's network. News of the Marines' deaths came in the form of a news release, issued by the 1st Marine Expeditionary Force based at Camp

Pendleton in California, which has formed a partial cordon around Fallujah. Unlike the U.S. Army, which describes the circumstances of soldiers' deaths, the Marines do not provide such information for fear it will endanger their security. But a military source who requested anonymity said the deaths occurred when a suicide car bomber rammed a Marine convoy just southwest of Fallujah. Insurgents then fired on the convoy, which was towing a disabled vehicle. Another source said the attack was near Abu Ghirab, slightly to the east. The death toll was the worst in a single incident since Jan. 8, when nine U.S. soldiers were killed as an

American Black Hawk helicopter crashed west of Fallujah. In the Baghdad attack, 19 people were injured in addition to the seven killed as the car bomb exploded in a parking lot near the offices of Al Arabiya television, a Dubai-based satellite television network that has drawn the ire of insurgents, as well as the Iraqi and U.S. governments. Not all of the dead could be identified immediately, according to Al Arabiya staffers, but it appeared that the bombing injured seven network employees, mostly technicians and drivers. The dead and remaining injured appeared to be passers-by.

## Looters overran Iraqi sensitive site; U.N.-sealed chemical arms at risk

Looters unleashed last year by the U.S.-led invasion of Iraq overran a sprawling desert camp where a cache of weapons, by U.N. monitors held old chemical weapons, American arms inspectors report. Charles Dueller's arms teams say all U.N.-sealed structures at the Muthanna site were broken into. If the so-called Bunker 2 was breached and looted, it would be the second recent case of restricted weapons at risk of falling into militants' hands.

Officials are unsure whether this latest episode points to a threat of chemical attack, since it isn't known if usable chemical warheads were in the bunker, what may have been taken, and by whom. "Clearly, there's a potential concern, but we're unable to estimate the relative level of it because we don't know the condition of the things inside the bunker," said Ewen Buchanan, spokesman for the U.N. arms inspection agency in New York, whose specialists have been barred from Iraq since the invasion.

Chief arms hunter Dueller told The Associated Press by e-mail Friday from Iraq that he was unaware of "anything of importance" looted from the chemical weapons complex. The report, his Iraq Survey Group issued on Oct. 6 said, however, that it couldn't vouch for the fate of old munitions

we're never found. In its Oct. 6 report, summarizing a fruitless search for banned weapons in Iraq, Dueller's group disclosed that widespread looting occurred at Muthanna, 35 miles northwest of Baghdad, in the aftermath of the fall of the Iraqi capital in April 2003. A little-noted annex of the 985-page report said every U.N.-sealed location at the desert installation had been breached in the looting spree, and "materials and equipment were removed."

One chemical weapons expert said even old, weakened nerve agents — in this case sarin — could be a threat to unprotected civilians. The weapons involved would be pre-1991 artillery rockets filled with sarin, or their damaged remnants — weapons that were openly declared by Iraq and were under U.N. control until security fell apart with the U.S. attack. They are not concealed arms of the kind President Bush claimed Iraq had, but which

BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP) — A Polish woman hostage being held by militants pleaded for her life and asked Poland to remove its troops from Iraq in a video aired Saturday by Al-Jazeera television. Teresa Sorcez Khalifa, a 54-year-old with dual Polish-Iraqi citizenship, was wearing a black top and sitting in front of a banner with the militant group's name, Abu Bakr al-Siddiqi Fundamentalists Brigades. "Once again I call on you to help me, by saving my life," she said. "My life is in great danger."

The one thing that will save my life is any response to the Iraqi demands: by first getting the Polish troops out of Iraq and second, giving any help to release the female Iraqi prisoners from the various American prisons in Iraq."

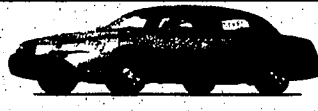

# Church celebrates haunted history

Does ghost of 19th century priest still linger?

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — As the legend goes, St. Mary's Episcopal Church is haunted by the ghost of Father Henry David Jardine, a 19th century priest whose footsteps still echo throughout the Gothic-style sanctuary.

On the eve of Halloween, St. Mary's will try to separate fact from fiction by bringing together the ghostly tales and historical documents about Jardine's life, which has been shrouded for years in mystery and intrigue.

He is quite a legend. And sometimes it's hard to know what to believe," said Todd Chenault, the unofficial church historian who organized Saturday's \$45-a-plate dinner. The event will feature fake fog and music from the church's 30-foot organ.

Chenault, 45, who has gone to St. Mary's all his life, remembers trading spooky stories about Jardine with his fellow Sunday school students in the 1960s. As an adult, however, he has worked to get the true story about the priest.

On more than one occasion, Chenault says, he has heard footsteps shuffling from behind the organ. When he was a child, Christmas trees fell off ledges near the instrument for no reason, year after year.

"Have I heard things? Yes, plenty of times," Chenault said. "Have I seen any ghosts? No, never."

According to church archives, from 1879 to 1886 Jardine increased St. Mary's membership, created a hospital and schools for children.

Betty Herndon, who will help lead the Saturday event billed as "The Historic Haunting," said many church members during Jardine's time praised his emphasis on old

Roman Catholic ways, but others were not as accepting. Influential members spread rumors, hoping for his resignation, Herndon said.

Jardine also was accused of misusing parish funds, drug use and immoral behavior with young church girls. The scandal prompted the priest to file a libel suit against a former editor of The Kansas City Times, John Shea. Jardine lost the case.

"It was a kangaroo court; witnesses made outrageous claims with no evidence. You name it," said Chenault, who said he reviewed court documents from the lawsuit. Jardine then traveled to St. Louis, where his priesthood was revoked. Days before he was scheduled to contest the decision, he was found dead. In his hands, according to newspaper accounts, were a crucifix and rag soaked in chloroform.

Herndon said Jardine commonly inhaled the toxic drug to ease facial muscle spasms,

so his death might have been accidental. He said few believed Jardine committed suicide or the allegations that came before. Arriving by train, Jardine's casket was covered in black cloth and his congregation came to view it.

"The scene was sorrowful, even to a stranger," The Kansas City Times reported.

Church archives show St. Mary's buried the priest a day later on unconsecrated ground for \$88. The funeral procession stretched for more than a mile.

Over the past 100 years Jardine's remains have been exhumed and moved three times, most recently in 2000 to return his remains to St. Mary's. His ashes rest by the organ, under the church's high altar.

"Religious believers live in a spirit world," said the current rector, Father Jeffrey Cave. "We pray to be surrounded by angels and so forth. Ghost stories like Jardine's are all too common."

# Comic who impersonated Kennedy dies at age of 68

Vaughn Meader, who created a national sensation impersonating President Kennedy on the hit 1962 comedy album "The First Family" but saw his career come to a virtual end when Kennedy was assassinated a year later, died Friday. He was 68.

Meader, a longtime smoker, died of chronic obstructive pulmonary disease at his home in Auburn, Maine, his wife, Sheila, told the Los Angeles Times.

During the early days of the Kennedy administration, the New England-born Meader was a struggling young piano-playing comedian performing in

small clubs in New York City's Greenwich Village.

His act consisted of song parodies and one-liners, but the routine that had audiences howling was the one that he did for a sure-fire finish: a mock presidential news conference in which he fielded questions from the audience and ad-libbed his answers with a pitch-perfect Kennedy impersonation.

"No matter what I was doing in the act, I knew I could do that last five minutes and save it," he once recalled.

Meader first came to national attention in July 1962, when he did Kennedy on TV's "Celebrity Talent Scouts."

MARSHVILLE, N.C. (AP) — A man who was arrested this month with raping and kidnapping his estranged wife went home to house and fatally shot her and three family members before killing himself, authorities said.

The body of David Edward Wyzanowski, 37, and his wife, Michelle, 31, were found inside a burning house Thursday after a passer-by saw smoke coming from the home, Union County Sheriff Eddie Cathey said. A 22-caliber rifle was found with the bodies.

Several hours later, investigators went to a mobile home 10 miles away where relatives lived and found the bodies of three men.

The sheriff said authorities are not searching for a suspect. "We are confident we are not looking for anybody," he said. "We're looking at it that he (Wyzanowski) is the basis for all of this."

The Wyzanowskis were separated, and she had been living with her father. She had charged her husband Oct. 12 with rape and kidnapping, but he was released on \$50,000 bond, Cathey said.

She later received a protective order, which Wyzanowski violated Tuesday by sending her text messages from his cell phone. He was released a day later on \$1,000 bond.

The judge who set a \$1,000 bond said he didn't know of pending rape and kidnapping charges and would have made the bail higher if he had.

"I would not have knowingly set a bond of that nature knowing what I know now," Judge Kevin Bridges told the Charlotte Observer. He said he knew only of minor traffic violations.

Authorities believe the other three victims are Michelle Wyzanowski's father, Ronald Eugene Faulk, 52, and her brother, Ronnie Joe Deese, 19. The third victim, a young man, was believed to be another family member, the sheriff said.

# Afghan militants threaten to kill hostages

Group holding U.N. workers demand British withdrawal, Guantanamo release

KABUL, Afghanistan (AP) — Taliban-linked militants threatened Saturday to execute three foreign U.N. workers kidnapped in Kabul unless British troops withdraw from Afghanistan and Afghan prisoners are freed from U.S. custody in Guantanamo Bay, Cuba.

Armed men kidnapped the three — Annetta Flanigan of Northern Ireland, Filipino diplomat Angello Nayan and Shqipe Habibi of Kosovo — in Kabul on Thursday, stirring fears that Afghan militants were copying the bloody tactics of their Iraqi counterparts.

A spokesman for the Taliban splinter group Jalsh-al-Muslimeen, or Army of Muslims, said video of the hostages, all of whom were working on Afghanistan's landmark presidential vote, would be sent to an Arab television channel "in two or three days."

"If these countries don't agree to our demands, we will do the same thing as the mujahideen are doing in Iraq," Shiqi Manzoor told The Associated Press by satellite telephone.

"We may kill them if we could not get a positive response," he said, adding that he was speaking from near the Afghan-Pakistan border.

In the clearest indication of the claim of responsibility could be genuine, a Western official in Kabul said British officials and relatives had identified one of several 16-digit ID numbers supplied by the group as fitting Flanigan's credit card.

"It's definitely hers," said the official, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

Naveed Moez, an Afghan Foreign Ministry spokesman, also said government sources had "confirmed" Jalsh-al-Muslimeen's claim of responsibility, but didn't elaborate.

Afghan forces and NATO troops have mounted extra patrols and roadblocks since unidentified armed men on Thursday kidnapped a Filipino diplomat and two U.N. workers — Kosovan Shqipe Habibi and Annetta Flanigan from Northern Ireland.

Other Afghan officials, however, said it was still unclear whether militants, renegade warlords or criminals were responsible.

"We don't know exactly who they are," President Hamid Karzai said Saturday after meeting with NATO commanders in Kabul. "Let's hope the U.N. workers are safe and sound, and we are working very hard to bring them back to their families."

NATO and U.S. troops and Afghan security forces have mounted extra patrols and roadblocks in and around Kabul since the election workers were forced from their clearly marked U.N. car into a black sports utility vehicle on a busy street.

Prime Minister Tony Blair did

not immediately comment on the demand that Britain withdraw its 1,700 troops from the NATO force in Afghanistan. British soldiers serve under U.S. commanders hunting Taliban and al-Qaida militants mainly in the south and east of the country.

Police detained seven suspects for questioning Friday, but said they had found no links to the abductions. Three of the suspects picked up in the Kabul area were armed and wore military uniforms — matching witness descriptions of the kidnapers.

Officials say the kidnapers' vehicle was seen heading toward Paghman, a valley west of Kabul with a reputation for banditry, but one suggested that the victims might still be in Kabul.

# Former Dominica premier dies

ROSEAU, Dominica (AP) — Former Dominica Premier Edward Oliver LeBlanc, described by some as a founding father of the Caribbean island in its transition to independence, died Friday at his home. He was 81.

LeBlanc, who died of unknown causes at his home in the community of Velle Case, was premier from 1967 to 1974, when the island had internal self-government under British rule. The island obtained full independence from Britain in 1978.

LeBlanc was responsible for introducing island-wide cultural festivities leading up to Dominica's independence day on Nov. 3, and he died during those very festivities, which include the speaking of French Creole and traditional foods and dress.

# Decapitated body of Japanese hostage found

BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP) — A decapitated body wrapped in an American flag and found in an insurgent-controlled section of Baghdad was that of a Japanese man kidnapped by Islamic militants, a Japanese official said Sunday.

Foreign Minister Nobutaka Machimura said in Tokyo that the government confirmed that the body found Saturday was that of Shosei Koda, 24.

An al-Qaida-linked group led by Jordanian terrorist Abu Musab al-Zarqawi showed Koda, a backpacker, on a video posted on a militant Web site Tuesday.

The group vowed to behead Koda within 48 hours unless

Japan withdrew its troops from Iraq. Prime Minister Junichiro Koizumi said he would not give in to terrorists.

Japanese Embassy officials in Baghdad sent fingerprints of the body to the Foreign Ministry in Tokyo, and police experts there positively identified the body as Koda's, Machimura said.

"It is to our great sorrow that after putting all our efforts into securing his release he has become a victim of terrorism," Machimura said.

"We cannot allow this kind of action. Japan, in cooperation with the international community ... must continue the battle against terrorism."

# Arafat's tests find no signs of leukemia

CLAMART, France (AP) — Initial results from a battery of tests on Yasser Arafat found no signs Saturday of leukemia, a Palestinian diplomat said, and blood doctors were still probing the cause of the ailing Palestinian leader's dramatic deterioration in health.

After being rushed from the West Bank to a French military hospital, the 75-year-old Arafat "spent a very good night" and awoke Saturday "in very good humor, rested," said Lella Shahid, the Palestinian envoy to France.

"The doctors exclude, already from what he has done in terms of exams, any possibility of leukemia," Shahid told reporters. "I repeat: the doctors exclude for the time being any possibility of leukemia."

But a Palestinian official who spoke on condition of anonymity had said there was a strong possibility Arafat was suffering from the bone and blood cancer and that a team of French physicians specializing in the disorder examined the Palestinian leader for a second day Saturday.

Shahid, speaking in several languages to reporters outside the Percy military training hospital southwest of Paris, did not take questions or explain what she meant by "for the time being" or whether results from further tests on leukemia were pending.

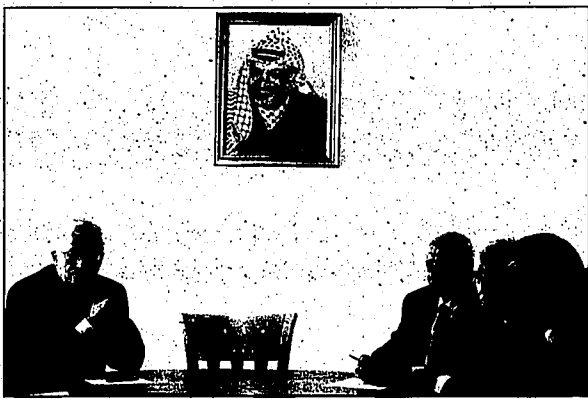
In Arabic, she said other tests also have "not shown any sign of other dangerous disease." But "there are other possibilities and we are still exploring," she added in English.

In an interview with Palestinian Satellite Channel television, Shahid said Arafat spent half the day undergoing medical treatment and spoke by phone to his young daughter, Zawiha, in Tunisia.

"So far the test results are good," Shahid said. "The president is relaxing now, and he hopes will return to take up his responsibilities soon."

Testing for leukemia usually involves blood smear tests and examination of bone marrow aspirate and of a bone marrow biopsy. Results from the blood tests and the bone marrow aspirate usually are clear within a few days. However, it takes several hours to get results from a biopsy.

One possibility is that a blood

smear test revealed no leukemia cells but doctors are waiting for results of a bone marrow test, which is more likely to show abnormalities.

A blood test may also have shown no sign of leukemia, but evidence of a different, non-cancerous disease.

In Ramallah, where Palestinian officials put on a show of unity to dispel concerns about possible chaos and infighting in Arafat's absence, the Palestinian foreign minister also said initial test results were encouraging.

"The president is in good health. So far, all the tests have been good and have shown no serious problem," said Nabil Shaath as he entered a meeting of the top committee of the Palestine Liberation Organization.

It was one of the few weekly sessions of the PLO executive committee held over past decades without Arafat presiding. Convened by Arafat's deputy, Mahmoud Abbas, it was held in the Palestinian leader's office in the crumbling compound where he had been confined by Israel for nearly three years until being airlifted to Paris.



Abbas, a former Palestinian prime minister who has feuded with Arafat in the past, declined to sit in Arafat's chair at the head of the conference table.

"There is no vacuum and things will go on as if Arafat is here," said Palestinian Cabinet minister Saeb Erekat.

Arafat had been sick for two weeks but took a turn for the worse on Wednesday when he collapsed and briefly lost consciousness. Blood tests revealed a low platelet count — a possible symptom of leukemia, other cancers or other maladies. It is also possible that the platelet problem has nothing to do with what is making him sick.

French physicians gave Arafat a transfusion of platelets — blood components that aid clotting — that helped increase his count, but they did not know whether the improvement was permanent, said a Palestinian official who spoke on condition of anonymity.

The official said Arafat was sleeping most of the time when he was not undergoing tests. Other Palestinian sources said Arafat got out of bed briefly early Saturday and was able to speak a few words to doctors.

"We can say that his general condition between yesterday and today, between last week — before he came — and today is much better, both physically and psychologically," said Shahid.

Outside the hospital, well-wishers and admirers gathered in an anxious wait for news and shouted slogans of support.

"Arafat shall live," "Arafat shall return," and "With our blood and our souls, we sacrifice to you, Palestine," chanted the group of about 20 people, mostly young Arab students, some carrying Palestinian flags.

Some blamed the Israeli siege of Arafat's Ramallah compound for his illness.

## Ukrainians prepare to vote while under threat

KIEV, Ukraine — Amid fears that disputes over the vote count could trigger violence, citizens head to the polls here today in a presidential election marked by a fierce battle between pro-Western and Moscow-oriented candidates.

Opposition leader Viktor Yushchenko, widely viewed as a free-market, democratic reformer, is facing Prime Minister Viktor Yanukovich, who is popular in Ukraine's largely Russian-speaking east, in an exceptionally harsh campaign.

Three years after the collapse of the Soviet Union, the election marks a critical moment in Ukraine's history.

The outcome could move this country of 46 million either toward warmer ties with Western Europe and the United States or back into a tighter post-Soviet relationship with Russia.

# Cleaning the bones

## Mexican Indians clean exhumed bones to welcome spirits of departed

POMUCH, Mexico (AP) — Antonio Ihas pulls a wooden box from a small cement cube, brushes a year of dust from the top and pushes back the lid to reveal a pile of coffee-colored bones and a small skull covered with patches of hair.

It's what remains of his father who died five years ago, and with the Day of the Dead approaching, it's time for their annual cleaning.

Without blinking an eyelash, Ihas pulls one bone after another out of the box, wiping away black grit with an embroidered handkerchief. The handkerchief has served as a bed for his father's remains for the past year.

Bone-cleaning is believed to date to pre-Hispanic Mayan cultures, and is carried on today "so that when the souls return they will see they haven't been forgotten," says Yvanovic Tuz Chi, 42, a cemetery employee who for 25 pesos (\$2) will clean bones for families who don't have the time.

Modern-day Maya in the Camino Real Alto initially bury their dead in coffins, but after three or four years, they exhume them, dry the bones in the sun and scrub them with a soft cloth or small paintbrushes.

The bones are placed in small wooden boxes and laid in cement cubicles, viewable from the outside through wrought-iron doors.

Some chambers are multi-tiered. The top chamber of the

and piled high with the favorite foods of the deceased, including tamales, small skulls made of sugar, and "bread of the dead" — round, sugar-sprinkled loaves, topped with strips of crust symbolizing bones and a knob representing the skull.

Ihas family's tomb is reserved for the father, the middle one for the mother and the bottom one for a son and grandmother.

Before and after the Day of the Dead celebrations, the boxes are left open to view and decked with flowers and votive candles. Empty eye sockets peer out from skulls perched on piles of carefully arranged bones.

Each year, the newly cleaned bones are placed on, or wrapped inside a new handkerchief embroidered with brightly colored flowers, initials or symbols reflecting the departed person's personality or favorite things. It's like "changing their clothing so they will rest more peacefully," explained 24-year-old Valdemar Ihas, who cleans his grandmother's bones.

Most Mexicans, claim Indian and Spanish ancestry and are at least nominally Catholic, and Christian beliefs suffuse the bone-cleaning tradition. Crosses adorn most of the tombs and a Roman Catholic priest presides over a Mass at the cemetery on Nov. 2 — All Souls' Day on the Catholic calendar.

"Some people are afraid of touching the bones," says Maria de la Luz Canun, 55, who last Sunday cleaned the dismantled skeletons of her son, great-grandmother and her two in-laws.

"But it's like when you visit your mother: You may help bathe her, dress her, comb her hair. This is the same thing."

# Princess Alice, oldest British royal, dies

LONDON (AP) — Princess Alice, aunt of Queen Elizabeth II and the oldest member of the British royal family, has died. Buckingham Palace said Saturday. She was 102.

The palace said the princess died peacefully in her sleep on Friday with her family around her.

A spokesman said the queen was greatly saddened by her aunt's death. He said the queen "remembers with gratitude Princess Alice's service to the monarchy and to the country."

Born Lady Alice Christabel Montagu Douglas Scott on Christmas Day, 1901, the princess married Henry, Duke of Gloucester — the third son of King George V and brother of the queen's father, King George VI — in 1935.

After helping to boost morale on the home front during World War II, Alice moved with her husband to Australia, where the Duke was governor general from 1945 to 1947. Back in Britain, she kept a busy schedule of charitable work and official duties until she was in her 90s.

She was the second member of the royal family to reach her centenary, after the Queen

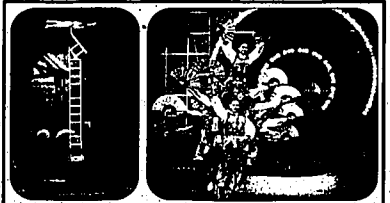
Mother Elizabeth, who died in March 2002 at the age of 101.

The princess and her husband had two sons — William,

who died in a flying accident in 1972, and Richard, the current Duke of Gloucester.

The princess's husband died

in 1974. She is survived by her son and three grandchildren. Funeral details were not immediately announced.

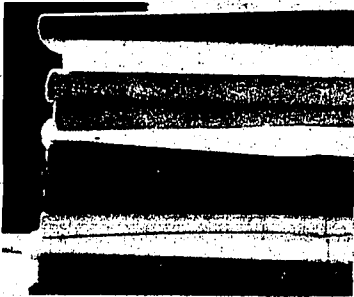

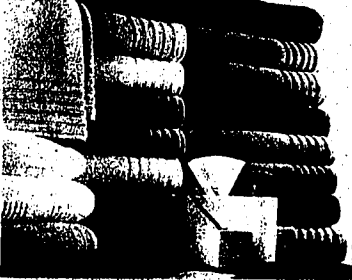

**Treat or trick?  
The Mike and Ike Standard**

I was in line at the checkout counter the other day, standing behind an elderly woman buying Halloween candy. She had a coupon, but evidently the wrong one. So instead of \$1.99 for a bag of Nestlé's Crunch, the tab was \$3.49.

Clearly on a fixed income, she was reluctant to part with that much money for a sack of candy bars. "Well, ma'am," the checker said helpfully, "we have Mike and Ike on sale for \$1.99."

"No," the customer replied firmly, closing her purse and pushing her lips. "I will not subject my neighbors' children to Mike and Ike."

Just so. In this age of sweet treats without any actual organic matter in them, it's nice to know that some forms of our respect the Mike and Ike Standard for Halloween candy — the rule that says you don't give just anything to trick-or-treaters.

Mike and Ike, of course, is a chewy, fruit-flavored confection that's been on the market since 1940. It's well, not very good. And hasn't been for some time. When I was trick-or-treating in the '60s, the packages of Mike and Ike we got would find their way to the tops of our bags and eventually get thrown out by our mothers. Happened to my kids too.

Same deal with Sweettarts. Nestlé's unfortunate 41-year-old fruit candy, "Bleem for a burst of flavor!" Its TV ads used to proclaim, "Nobody on my street ever did, and as far as I can tell, the product has still failed to find a frenzied constituency."

Who kids really want, of course, are M&M's, Hershey's, Reese's, Snickers, Milky Way, Nestlé Crunch, Twix, Cadbury and Health. Or cash, if it's all the same to you.

When I was growing up in Pocatello, we lived in a four-plex apartment. Two of our neighbors were divorced guys — both factory shift workers — who would trudge home about dark on Oct. 31, only to be confronted by squadrons of costumed urchins, ceaselessly ringing their doorbells.

Now lesser men would have turned off their porch lights and gone to bed, but these were truly nice guys. So when they had given away any candy and fruit at hand, they'd stand handing out cash.

What got around. One year, both of them respected business until 3 a.m. One of the fellows even resorted to writing \$1 checks.

You don't see character like that in anyone else. And with all the paranoia that surrounds trick-or-treating, the range of goodies on offer is pretty circumscribed — and pretty dull.

The Halloween my kids came home with boxes of rump in their bags. Another year they got little packages of Kleenex.

That's pathetic. Any homeowner with that little imagination ought to be doorbell-ditched, wrapped in toilet paper and have his glasses soaped.

One of my college professors used to hand out Hershey Bars or Kit Kat, wrapped in Shakespeare and Wordsworth poems.

Imagine ripping off the foil and finding "Sonnet on the Punishment of Death."

For Aunt Maude, a saintly woman, I decided one year to dispense homemade hot speed cider to trick-or-treaters. But nine out of 10 of the kids grabbed the paper cups without really looking, and thinking they were full of candy, dumped them into their bags.

By the time they got home, of course, their cider-soaked sacks had burst, leaving a trail of candied apples on the sidewalk.

Maude didn't have much business the following year, but her neighbor, Maura, sure did. Word got around that Maura was giving away apples.

**Three judges face retention vote**

TWIN FALLS — Citizens in three counties will be able to cast votes in support of or against magistrate judges in their respective counties.

Three magistrate judges are up for retention votes next Tuesday: Thomas Borreson in Jerome County, John Varin in Camas County and Randy Stoker in Twin Falls County.

Although many judges travel to preside over cases in other counties, only voters in the judges' home counties will be able to cast ballots for their judges, said Linda Wright, 5th District Trial Court administrator.

Retention votes require a simple majority.

If a judge does not get a simple majority, Wright will convene a magistrate commission to begin seeking his replacement.

Stoker, who has been on the bench for less than four years, is the only one of the three judges who has not faced a retention vote.

In conjunction with the elections, The Times-News sent out surveys to attorneys across the 5th District and asked them to grade the judges' performance in various areas.

Surveys were mailed to individual attorneys in the 5th

Judicial District, which includes Jerome, Gooding, Twin Falls, Blaine, Camas, Mindoko and Cassia counties. The 5th Judicial District provided the attorney list.

Some judges received no ratings in any category because attorneys wrote "non-applicable" or "no experience with that judge."

Any individual or single category boxes left blank were not factored into their total score.

**About the elections**

Three of the 11 magistrate judges in the 5th Judicial District are up for retention Tuesday, when voters will decide whether to keep them on the bench. Magistrate judges face retention votes every four years. Retention is based on simple majority votes.

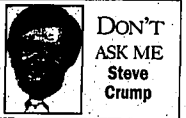
If 53 percent or more of the votes cast are against retaining a judge, a magistrate commission will convene and begin looking for a replacement. This is done by announcing a vacancy, bringing candidates before the commission for interviews and selecting a finalist.

To qualify as a magistrate judge, a person must be at least 30 years old, must be a member in good standing of the Idaho State Bar, and must have at least five years' experience practicing law.

The standard yearly salary for a magistrate judge — set by the Legislature — is \$92,632.

Former Gooding County Magistrate Judge Thomas Cushman, however, lost his seat after the 1994 vote.

Tousley listed \$12,900 in expenditures this political year.

Robbin Stubblefield, Tousley's Republican opponent, listed \$3,657.29 in contributions this year, most of them donations he made to his own campaign and a \$500 contribution from the Twin Falls County Republican Committee.

He listed \$3,612.34 in expenditures.

Paul Bach, the Democratic candidate for Twin Falls County sheriff, reported \$1,134 in contributions and \$1,052 in expenditures for the political

year to date.

Tom Mikesell — the Republican incumbent for District 2 county commissioner, received \$1,100 in contributions for his campaign this year, according to his financial disclosure report, including a \$500 contribution from the Twin Falls County Republican Committee. He listed \$960 in expenditures.

Bob Powers, the Democratic candidate for the same position, has outraised and

outspent Mikesell. Powers' campaign finance disclosure forms indicate he's raised \$3,235 this year and spent \$3,130.

Abbey \$1,800 of Powers' war chest comes from his own pocketbook. He's also netted several \$100 contributions from individuals.

Bill Brockman, the incumbent Republican candidate for county commissioner in Dis-

trict 3, has outraised and outspent Mikesell. Powers' campaign finance disclosure forms indicate he's raised \$3,235 this year and spent \$3,130.

**Ketchum residents will vote on new facility**

KETCHUM — Voters in Ketchum have a lot to decide this Nov. 2.

Not only will residents elect new officials this Tuesday, but they will

provide their opinion on the fate of the Wood River Community YMCA facility.

Ninety-five percent of the people that signed said, 'Why are they putting it in Ketchum and not in Hailey?'

Jack Corroek, one of the leaders bringing the petition before the city

Residents will be asked to vote "yes" or "no" as to whether the city of Ketchum should agree to a 99-year lease with the YMCA.

The city would lease a portion of the Park and Rite Lot to the YMCA for \$1 a year.

Voters can cast their votes regarding the YMCA on an advisory ballot — a ballot that is not legally binding.

Instead, the Ketchum City Council will take the results into consideration before making a final decision.

For more than 10 years, residents have pushed for a YMCA to serve the entire Wood River area.

The measure has seen its share of controversy.

In July, residents collected signatures for a petition, demanding the issue of the YMCAs location be put to a vote.

Jack Corroek, one of the leaders bringing the petition before the city, said the location of the YMCA was a major concern.

Corroek was a Ketchum City Council member from 1974 to 1980.

"Ninety-five percent of the people that signed said, 'Why are they putting it in Ketchum and not in Hailey?' and we feel that way," Corroek said.

Many disputes using the Park and Rite Lot for the YMCA facility, saying that the property is too valuable to be used for a YMCA.

Representatives of the YMCA have estimated — the project would cost \$16 million to construct.

Petitioners also take issue with the city of Ketchum contributing funds to cover YMCA operating costs.

The City Council previously agreed to put a \$3 million revenue bond before voters to benefit the facility.

The city has an obligation to contribute the \$3 million only if Ketchum voters approve.

## Police find transient crushed to death in trash

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — The crushed body of a homeless man was found between layers of compacted cardboard at recycling plant.

Police have identified the 42-year-old man but are withholding his name until his family can be notified.

Investigators believe his death was accidental, Sgt. Christie Wood said.

The body was found Friday in a 40-foot pile of crushed cardboard at Bluebird Recycling, which uses a compactor truck to

service recycling bins between Hayden and Coeur d'Alene.

In what's being called a coincidence, a piece of cardboard on one side of the man's body was fashioned to look like a graveyard tombstone and marked "R.I.P. Here Lies Ray."

The overnight-sighted "Ray" died from a mountain climbing accident.

The victim's name was not Ray, but the distinctive piece of cardboard could provide a clue to the location of his death, Wood said.

Police were able to identify the man from a picture identification card and a medical bracelet, and determined he was homeless from others who knew him.

He likely climbed into a recycling bin to stay warm, Wood said.

Overnight temperatures in Coeur d'Alene dipped below freezing last week.

"I've been doing this 20 years, and I've never had this happen before," said Willie Lampe, Bluebird Recycling's general manager.

"He was dead. Dead people don't look too good," Lampe said. "We feel real sorry for the young man who found him."

The men's emergency shelter at St. Vincent de Paul is filled beyond capacity, as it often is in fall and winter, said Kathy Reed, social services director there.

The shelter offers beds for a dozen men but can make room for 22.

"The only reason we stuff so many people in here is that it's better than being on the street or in a Dumpster," Reed said.

## Qwest wins reduced property tax assessment

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Tax districts in eastern Idaho and others throughout the state must refund Qwest Communications International Inc. \$4.68 million in overassessed property taxes.

The refund comes as part of a court settlement of property values over a three-year period. Qwest had filed a petition in state court disputing its Idaho property values.

The money can either be paid back or credited to the company's future property tax bills, the Idaho State Tax Commission told 32 affected counties.

But it is still unclear exactly how much each local tax district owes the telephone company. Bonneville County Clerk Ron Longmore said he expects to get the numbers within a couple of weeks from the tax commission.

"I'm sure the amount is really unusual," Longmore said. "There are occasional reductions that do occur, but not of this magnitude."

There are more than 30 tax districts in Bonneville County alone, including cities, school districts, fire districts and cemeteries. The Idaho State Tax Commission assesses the val-

ues of operating property for utilities such as Qwest and furnishes the county with the value.

Preliminary figures — not including interest — indicate that Bonneville County's districts owe about \$412,000. From there, the numbers vary from just a few dollars for cemetery districts to more than \$100,000 for the Idaho Falls School District.

Although it is a large refund, appeals of assessments are a valid part of the tax process, said Daniel Chadwick, executive director of the Idaho Association of Counties.

"We have taxpayers that appeal those assessments, which is their right under the law," he said. "Sometimes you win, and sometimes you lose. We've seen it go both ways."

Qwest spokeswoman Stacia Dahl said in a prepared statement that the company was pleased to reach the agreement with the Idaho State Tax Commission.

"We are also satisfied that the commission recognized that Qwest property had been overvalued and that the return of property tax funds was justified," Dahl said.

## Deputies link teenagers' deaths to methadone use

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — Kootenai County officials say as many as three recent teen deaths may be linked to methadone use.

Kootenai County Sheriff's Detective Sgt. Brad Maskell said deputies received the toxicology reports on two 16-year-olds last week confirming that methadone played a role in their deaths.

Drew Rampant of Hayden Lake died at home on Sept. 7.

Though an initial autopsy report showed he suffered from a heart defect, believed to be a factor in his death, the toxicology report found a high level of methadone in his system.

A small amount of marijuana was also found.

Douglas Delano Jr. of Athol died Sept. 12.

His body was found in a small outbuilding outside of his home the morning after a teen party.

In addition to methadone, Maskell said the toxicology report showed Delano had hydrocodone in his system and a blood-alcohol level of .17, more than double the alcohol level for drunken driving.

A third teen, Shane Wesley Nelson, 18, of Coeur d'Alene, was found dead Sept. 24 at his home.

Though investigators are still waiting for toxicology test results, Maskell said a significant quantity of methadone was found at the house, among other substances.

Maskell said the Idaho State

Police is assisting deputies in tracking down the source of the methadone.

The painkiller has been prescribed for decades to ease the withdrawal of heroin abuse.

But deputies say teens are using the drug by itself and with alcohol and other powerful painkillers in an attempt to get high.

The drug usually is in the form of a white tablet, said Sheriff's Capt. Ben Wolfinger.

Unprescribed methadone use is new to the area, said Idaho State Police investigator Curtis Kastner.

Federal authorities describe methadone as a safe and effective treatment for drug withdrawal.

The Office of National Drug Control Policy said that taken once a day, methadone suppresses narcotic withdrawal for between 24 and 36 hours.

But though the drug can eliminate withdrawal symptoms of heroin and other opiates, it is not an effective treatment for other abused drugs.

Methadone works by reducing the cravings associated with heroin use and blocks the high from heroin.

It does not provide a euphoric rush, so users may consume dangerously large quantities of the drug in a vain attempt to get high.

Still, deaths from methadone abuse are on the rise nationwide, according to the National Drug Intelligence Center.

## Officials look into shooting of grizzly bear

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — Idaho Fish and Game officials are investigating the illegal shooting of a grizzly bear in Boundary County.

Fresh remains of the adult male grizzly were found in early June near Hughes Meadows, which is in a remote area near the Washington state line and Canadian border. Fish and Game officials only recently released information about the poaching case.

The Selkirk Mountain grizzly population is among the most endangered on the continent, with fewer than 40 bears thought to be remaining in the region's forests.

Conservation Officer Brian Johnson said the case was not disclosed until now because investigators had hoped to conduct interviews without arousing much suspicion among potential informants.

"In wildlife crimes very rarely is there a witness," Johnson said.

A reward of as much as \$5,000 is now being offered to help solve the case.

The bear's carcass was discovered by a hunter. The hunter contacted Idaho Fish and Game conservation officers, who collected the remains. The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is assisting in the investigation.

**Idaho kayaker strives for world stage**

LEWISTON (AP) — Devon Barker was sitting in third place going into her last ride of the season and knew she had to nail it to defend her national kayaking title. She hit the frothy hole at Tennessee's Rock Island State Park with confidence.

"I put my head down and threw cartwheels right off the bat," she says. "I never stopped."

When her 45-second ride was over, it was clear the Lewiston native would once again be crowned the best female freestyle kayaker in the country.

In freestyle kayaking, competitors perform tricks with their boats, like the end-over-end cartwheels, while staying on a rapid.

Barker, 33, is the daughter of John A.K. and Marjorie Barker and grew up rafting and kayaking on Idaho's abundant whitewater.

Four years ago, she shelved her teaching career to pursue greatness riding green waves and playing in nasty, frothing whitewater holes.

Last year, she started her way to the top of the little-known sport, where the top prizes have more to do with glory than financial security.

"This year I think I won maybe \$500 and that was a lot," she says of the freestyle kayaking tour that starts in April and wraps up in October.

About 40 women compete on the tour and 20 or so tend to be at every event, she said.

It's a life of drifting, camping and kayaking all over the country.

Some events feature mellow waves and others intense and angry rapids.

Kayakers have 45 seconds to ride the rapids, known as "features," and complete as many tricks as they can.

Barker prefers bigger, more dangerous features that mimic the rapids found on Idaho's rivers.

Barker did qualify for the world championships in the squirt boat competition. The event is similar to freestyle kayaking, but instead of being held in whitewater, squirt boat events are held on slow-moving or flat water.

"I'm pretty amped up for it, for sure," she says of the January competition.

Between now and the world championships, and after that event, Barker will be looking for teaching opportunities.

She would like to land a temporary job somewhere near one of Idaho's whitewater rivers.

"Anytime I can teach, which I love to do, and still train it works out well."

**Pocatello hopes to draw horseshoe fans**

POCATELLO (AP) — City officials hope to score another ringier in 2006.

The 2004 World Horseshoe Pitchers Tournament brought almost 3,000 people to Pocatello for the summer event, officials said, and now the city is a leading candidate to host the tournament again in 2006.

Fifteen cities have shown interest in hosting the event so far, but only Pocatello and St. George, Utah have submitted letters of intent and signed contracts.

The winner is expected to be announced in January.

This year's event brought in more than \$400,000 in hotel lodging revenue alone, said Re-

becca Satter, executive director of the Greater Pocatello Convention and Visitors Bureau.

"There were 1,201 participants in the tournament and brought in an estimated 3,000 people from out of the area," she said.

"It had a real impact on our business," said Stan Haies, co-owner of Perkins Family Restaurant. Sales jumped 30 percent for one week of the event and 12 percent for the other week compared to the same period a year earlier, he said.

## A collection to die for

Utah delights in horror film curios

SUNSET, Utah (AP) — If you develop a chill down your spine after entering Mark DeWolfe's house, it's completely understandable.

Creeping you at the door are two serial killers. To the right, the entrance to the kitchen is the machine used by Jason from "Friday the 13th Part VI: Jason Lives." And a few feet away from that is Jason himself.

Well, at least Jason's bullet-ridden clothes from "Jason X: Jason Goes to Hell" are there. DeWolfe has worked for the State Department of Corrections since 1997. But the scariest things he has seen may be right in his own home.

DeWolfe is a horror film fanatic. His hobby is collecting costumes and props used in actual horror movies. His house is barely 700 square feet. But a visitor would swear he has 300 square feet of horror movie memorabilia.

"They're a little bit overwhelmed their first visit and then they kind of go used to it," he said of the typical visitor reaction. "They're like, 'Man, this is surreal.'"

The costumes worn by two of the killers in the 2003 film "Wrong Turn" greet visitors at the door with clubs and bows and arrows. The bloodstained clothes from one of those killer's possible female victims hang nearby. Along the wall above those costumes are letters of authenticity proving the costumes were actually used in the movie.

"Authenticity is a big thing when you're spending as much as you are for some of these items," DeWolfe said.

In the living room, surrounded by autographed pictures from most of the performers in the Friday the 13th saga, is DeWolfe's prize possession: the actual hockey mask used by Jason in "Friday the 13th Part VI: Jason Lives." It was one of just 10 masks used in the movie.

"I've seen a mask used when the skull shoots Jason in the head," he said. "It was used for maybe 10, 15 seconds on film."

"Friday the 13th," "Nightmare on Elm Street," "Psycho 2" and other horror movies and people probably have never heard of are all represented in the house. DeWolfe admits he was a big horror movie fan growing up.

"I loved 'em. Absolutely loved them. 'Friday the 13th' was my favorite," he said. "It was always the one as a kid I remembered being so terrified of when the scariest movie ever would probably be 'The Exorcist,' but for me there's such a connection to 'Friday the 13th.'"

As a kid, DeWolfe said he collected Star Wars memorabilia, but he said that eventually "got out of control" with all the action figures and whatnot

## Judge reinstates candidate on ballot for state auditor

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A judge reinstated on the ballot a Libertarian candidate for state auditor who filled out an Internet application but failed to press the "send" button.

Third District Judge Robert Hilder ruled Friday that Mike Stoddard "substantially" complied with financial disclosure laws when he logged onto the state-elections Office Web site but failed to transmit a campaign spending update.

Hilder ordered Lt. Gov. Gayle McKeachnie, who had disqual-

ified Stoddard, to certify him for the 2004 ballot. His name already appears on preprinted ballots.

It was the second time in two days that Utah courts decided a ballot controversy. On Thursday, the Utah Supreme Court reversed a lower-court judge and reinstated candidate Ellis Ivory on the ballot as a Republican candidate for mayor of Salt Lake County. Republican Mayor Nancy Workman withdrew after being charged with misusing public funds.

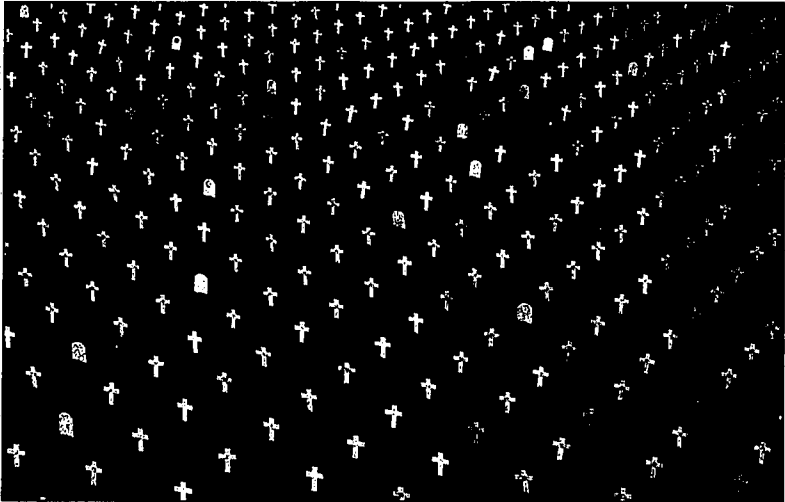

# Service to country is family tradition

POCATELLO (AP) — For one Inkom family, service to country is an honored tradition spanning 60 years, three generations and four wars.

Three generations have served with the acclaimed U.S. Army Rangers.

Steve Johnson served with the Rangers 3rd Brigade, 75th Regiment, 9th Infantry in Vietnam from 1969-1970. His father, Matthew Johnson, was one of Darby's Rangers in World War II and Steve's 20-year-old son, Jesse Johnson recently returned from service in Iraq and is training with the elite group.

"My dad started in North Africa in 1942, fought his way through Italy and France and walked into Berlin in 1945," Steve Johnson said. "He fought at Normandy and in the Battle of the Bulge."

Less than half of servicemen who apply to be part of the Rangers are accepted, according to a recent promotional publication.

A younger brother also served in the Korean conflict and another was killed in a motorcycle accident shortly after returning from Vietnam.

His mother, Mary Johnson, joined the Women's Army Corps during World War II, but contracted rheumatic fever and was not able to serve, Johnson said.

Among them are a Purple Heart, a Bronze Star, the Presidential Unit Citation, Combat Infantryman's Badge and the South Vietnamese Cross of Valor awarded by the South Vietnamese government.

Johnson enlisted during the Vietnam War because it was the right thing to do. His children share that sense of duty and patriotism regarding service.

At one time, two of Johnson's sons, a daughter-in-law and two nephews he raised were all in active military duty.

"His son and daughter-in-law are now in the Naval Reserve, one nephew is stationed in Japan with the Navy and the other, Steve Valdez, just returned from Iraq."

"Steve was a gunner on a Bradley Fighting Vehicle. He was one of the first people to roll into Baghdad," he said. Johnson claimed his son and nephew encountered members of al-Qaida and the Taliban in Iraq.

"My son told me the men he served with believed in what they were doing," he said. "It

told me he would rather go back to Iraq and give his life than see American civilians killed. We'll take the fight to their backyard so we don't have to fight them in ours."

Johnson advised his son and nephew that their service in Iraq would impact them for the rest of their lives.

"I told them they might see things that they'll have to deal with the rest of their lives," he said. "I told them to never let their guard down and to come home alive."

Jesse Johnson and Valdez may be redeployed to Iraq, he said.

Johnson said he has not early to compare Iraq to Vietnam.

"This is a new generation. We need to deal with this Vietnam over," he said. "It'll serve to unite the country. At first, people supported the troops, but the longer it lasts, support wavers. It needs to be resolved."

Johnson was wounded three times in Vietnam and he admits that he suffered long-term effects after returning from the war, but has no regrets, he said. The bonds forged with fellow soldiers in that war remain intact.

"I had some problems, nightmares, problems sleeping, but I straightened out," he said. "It's

going to spread the good word to battleground states. Like other tightly contested states, Nevada with its five electoral votes has drawn unprecedented attention this year. Voter registration is almost even in the state, and both sides are trying to gain any advantage they can in a race that polls show as extremely close.

Arriving last Saturday in a cavalcade of cars and buses at the union hall far from the Las Vegas Strip, the Democratic volunteers from Southern California were given a boxed lunch before their weekend marching orders.

"If we knock on enough doors and we make enough calls, we will win Nevada and we will win the United States," 21-year-old organizer Joe Green told the cheering crowd.

From a state where Kerry leads Bush by double-digits, the California volunteers say they are desperate to make a difference this election year.

"I want to know that I did everything I could, that I did something," Harryman said, before she left for her second phone bank shift, asking registrars to register voters before ballots in the state's early voting program.

"It's humbling for paid staffers to see people that committed to this campaign," said Sean Smith, Nevada spokesman for the Kerry campaign.

# New technology could keep public water safe

NORTH SALT LAKE (AP) — Using an anti-terrorism grant, a consortium of technology companies is developing a system to monitor and quickly purge public water supplies of microbial contamination and keep people informed every step of the way.

The system could respond to earthquakes that introduce natural contaminants or tampering of drinking water supplies. The technology worked flawlessly in 100,000 tests last week and "looks promising," said A. Richard Melton, deputy Utah state health director. "This has the potential to revolutionize drinking-water safety."

Operating as a consortium called WaterWorks LLC, the four companies began a routine of tests last week at a Daguerre County water-treatment plant. The testing is being funded with a \$40,000 state grant relayed from federal aid for terrorism prevention.

It takes several days for water purifiers to analyze samples by growing suspect bacteria in petri dishes — a standard test that looks only for fecal chlorophyll or bacterial contaminants from warm-blooded animals.

"In other words, if the water were laced with anthrax, it would still meet current regula-

tory rules," said Stan Parrish, president of two Salt Lake-based companies, WaterWorks and WaterWare. Parrish said his optical detection technology can reveal deadly viruses, bacteria or spores by fluorescent illumination.

Computer software could transmit the data by wireless telecommunication to a remote computer or a central government clearinghouse, said Walter R. Ellis Jr., a program manager at the Utah State University Research Foundation. Utah State University has spun off a company named MicroBioSystems headed by Christopher Lloyd to operate the detection equipment.

Lloyd said last week's results demonstrated that sensors didn't once give off false positives by incorrectly flagging a deadly pathogen.

More tests are scheduled for this week. The Utah company, ECONOVA, is developing a patented system to quickly cleanse culinary water of contaminants.

# New poll: Open space effort has wide support

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Backing the results of a different poll released a day earlier, a new survey shows formidable support for Initiative I, the \$150 million bond issue aimed at preserving open space.

The Dan Jones & Associates poll, published Saturday by the Deseret Morning News and KSL television station, found support for the measure running 58 percent to 35 percent. Only 6 percent were undecided.

The telephone poll of 1,228 registered Utah voters was conducted Oct. 21-28. It had a margin of error of 3.3 percentage points.

Initiative I authorizes the 13-member Quality Growth Commission to acquire wildlife habitat, private ranches and farms and build parks and trails. The \$150 million bond would be paid off with an increase in the sales tax on one-twentieth of a cent.

The poll showed support dipping from an earlier survey in September, when 65 percent favored the bonding measure.

Still, the latest poll turned over the results of a Salt Lake Tribune-KUTV poll, published Friday, which found 39 percent of voters against the measure and 61 percent in favor. In that poll, 25 percent were undecided.

Valley Research Inc. quizzed 1,200 registered voters Oct. 21-26. The poll had a margin of error of 3.8 percentage points. The initiative has lost support in the past month from several top state leaders, including Gov.

Olene Walker and House and Senate leadership who said they want open space but that the initiative was packed for pork barrel projects — convention centers, fair grounds and local government buildings.

Opponents also claim the Utah Thumpers Association and leaders of Utah farm organizations.

"When you first look at it, you're for it. It's apple pie and baseball and Chevrolet. It's got a nice shiny body, but it's a tanker inside," said former U.S. Rep. Jim Hansen.

Hansen and others say the initiative process usurps the legislature's control over the budget.

The Utah Tax Review Commission has lodged similar complaints, and six mayors in Salt Lake County added their opposition Friday, saying the tax increase won't benefit all Utahns but that all state residents would pay.

Initiative advocates also include some heavy hitters, including governor candidate Jon Huntsman Jr. and Scott Matheson Jr., former U.S. Sen. Jake Garn, LaVell Edwards and conservation groups statewide.

Initiative I campaign president Amanda Smith said she's confident Utah voters will vote to pay the "equivalent of two movie tickets a year to preserve open space in Utah."

"This is something Utahans care about, and they drink, driving water and preservation," Smith said.

# Activists flood key Western battleground states

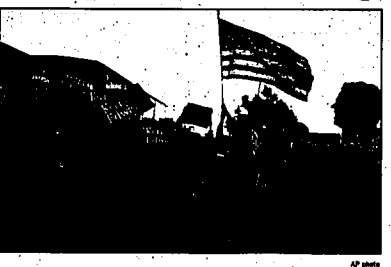
LAS VEGAS (AP) — Karen Harryman is certain California will go for John Kerry on Election Day, so the high school English teacher drove nearly 300 miles from home to sway voters in the battleground state of Nevada.

"I'm tired of wanting things to be different and never having done anything about it," said the 35-year-old Harryman as she sat on a Las Vegas union hall floor, grabbing lunch with her husband between shifts at a Democratic phone bank.

The Burbank, Calif., resident is just one of thousands of Democrats and Republicans from so-called "safe states" who are packing their own way to walk precincts and staff phone banks in the battlegrounds of Nevada, Arizona, New Mexico, Oregon and Colorado.

"There's a greater sense of urgency," said Ricardo Ramirez, a political science professor at University of Southern California, explaining why this year there are so many people like Harryman willing to give up their weekends to volunteer in other states. "It's that sense of fulfillment of making a difference."

Harryman and her husband were among more than 300 Kerry supporters who came to Las Vegas last weekend from Southern California with a goal of knocking on more than 6,000 doors and making 17,000

to the polls and voting for the president," said Chris Carr, executive director of the Nevada Republican Party. "They know that here in Nevada it's all about turnout."

A Republican group called "The Mighty Texas Strike Force" also has been making battleground visits. About 2,000 volunteers will have worked in Nevada, New Mexico, Florida, Ohio and Pennsylvania by the time America votes Tuesday.

"They are confident that Texas is going to be in the president's column," said Karen Johnson, coordinator for the group. "They are voting before they leave, and then they're

# Tradition doesn't always carry a price tag

The message wasn't sponsored by anyone, but somehow Michigan and Ohio State managed to hear it just in time.

"Tradition doesn't carry a price tag. And some things — like 107-year-old rivalries — shouldn't be for sale."

Granted, it took a while for the people running the two universities to figure it out. But, at a time when even the granddaddy of them all can become the Sony Playstation granddaddy of them all and national championships can be won in a bowl game named after a corn chip, give them some credit for finally taking a stand.

In case you missed it, the annual football meeting between the schools known to everyone involved as simply The Game was about to go corporate and be rechristened the SBC Michigan-Ohio State Classic.

To the bean counters and marketing types at both schools, the million dollars being offered by SBC Communications must have seemed like found money. And what's really in a name anyway?

Plenty. It seems to the fans who let Michigan athletic director Bill Martin know that tampering with this tradition was unacceptable. In them, it didn't matter that SBC sponsors the annual Red River Shootout between Oklahoma and Texas or that Dr. Pepper has naming

rights to the Big 12 championship game.

Just don't mess with The Game.

"In the final analysis this was inconsistent with the values that we share with the greater Michigan family," Martin said.

"The decision probably came as good news for the Ohio State marching band, which dets its 1 with a great flourish but would have had to practice long hours to come up with a new SBC formation.

"The Buckeyes would have gotten \$260,000 a year from the deal, but don't think the Ohio State football team will be holding car washes to pay for new uniforms. The school has an athletic budget of \$85 million a year, the most of any university in the country.

While the money was insignificant to the two athletic powerhouses, the symbolism of their decision wasn't.

"This is a triumph of integrity and tradition over the over-commercialism of a great event," raved NCAA president Myles Brand.

Brand could be excused for

engaging in hyperbole. He could also be accused of being hypocritical.

His is the Cent Cola CBS NCAA, propped up by companies that will payout more than \$500 million this year for television and sponsorship rights. Try to drink a Pepsi courtside at the Final Four and either you or your drink will be escorted from the arena.

The NCAA sits by idly as television controls college sports, forcing teams to play on odd nights or late at night while abruptly changing game times without regard for the inconvenience caused to the fans who want to attend the game.

It won't allow Jeremy Bloom to play football at Colorado because he has skilling sponsors, but then goes after anyone who might try to make a dime off of terms like March Madness, Final Four or Big Dance without its permission.

About the only thing not for sale is an official online sports book to make wagers on the games.

And then there's the BCS, which long ago hijacked college football's biggest games for profit, giving rise to a new season filled with "Justins delivered by FedEx ordered on cell phones made by Nokia.

Even the Rose Bowl was forced to get a sponsor if it wanted to remain the granddaddy of them all.

"Tradition is one thing, but money and mlngs are another, and if you need any proof just look at how fast the Rose Bowl dumped its Pac-10 vs. Big 10 winner format so it could stay in the big bowl mix.

Fans, for the most part, have reacted passively to almost all of it. They're willing to be bombarded with sponsor messages, willing to see traditions uprooted, willing to allow computers to decide which school has the best football team and willing, to let television tell them a Thursday night game is better than a Saturday afternoon on campus.

Don't expect that to change, just because some Michigan fans finally stood up and said, "The Game was not for sale, not even for a million dollars.

Still, for one Saturday afternoon this fall, some of the purest fans will return to college football when Michigan travels to Ohio State Nov. 20 for the 103rd meeting of one of the great rivalries ever.

The Ohio State band will be at its 1 dotting best, and Michigan fans will pump fists in the air with each "Ball, ball" of their fight song.

And there won't be a SBC logo anywhere in sight.

## Some athletes jump into the political arena

The knees, hips and ankles are still holding up.

Jim Iyuan is thankful for that at 57, a generation removed from the days when he held the world record in the mile. He also knows how foolish it would be to time himself on the track now.

"I think I'd have to use a sturdier instead of a stopwatch," he says.

Iyuan tries to run every day, but finds that hard to do during a campaign. He is up for reelection Tuesday, seeking a fifth term in Congress as a representative from Kansas.

Iyuan's track exploits are practically legend in his home state,

but he insists his aim of celebrity is balanced by the fact that he's lived in his district and his children have gone to school there.

"I've had the experience of letting them see me as who I am," he told The Associated Press by phone from Lawrence, Kan., between campaign stops.

Iyuan is among a few big-name sports figures going before voters. Also up for reelection in Congress are two fellow Republicans — Rep. Tim Osborne of Nebraska, the former coach of powerful Cornhusker football teams, and Sen. Ernie Hahn of Kentucky, the Ball of Fame pitcher.

Hahn is going for a second term in the Senate after a dozen

years in the House. His big lead has eroded amid guffaws and editorials questioning his mental fitness at 73.

Colorado's Ben Nighthorse Campbell, a one-time Olympic judo competitor, is retiring from the Senate.

President Bush, of course, is a former owner of the Texas Rangers, although his foray into baseball was hardly his springboard to the national stage.

Darrell West, a political science professor at Brown University and author of "Celebrity Politics," says voters are willing to pull the lever for ex-jocks, who bring important assets to their new line of work.

"Athletes have many attributes of successful politicians,"

he says. "They're in the public eye, used to being in the media. Their thick skins help them overcome their critics."

But the sports figure-turned-politician is bolstered by something even more valuable. He — and it's predominantly men who have jumped from the sports arena to the political arena — is already a familiar face before hitting the campaign trail.

"The advantage for the candidate is name recognition and visibility and the cut of personality," says Andrew Kolut, president of the Pew Research Center for the People and the Press. "The disadvantage is the image of the athlete as not very thoughtful."

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Vikings of Terrell Owens coming across the middle have probably raced through Ray Lewis' mind all week.

The All-Pro linebacker hasn't admitted having such thoughts recently, but he sure isn't going to hold back if he gets a shot at Owens when the Baltimore Ravens visit the Philadelphia Eagles on Sunday.

The two friends became adversaries when Owens rejected the Ravens, forcing a trade to the Eagles less than two weeks after San Francisco initially sent the four-time Pro Bowl wide receiver to Baltimore last March.

Lewis and Owens had a few testy exchanges leading up to a preseason game in Philadelphia, beginning with Lewis warning Owens not to cross the middle. But both insist they're focused on the game this time.

"I look forward to anybody with an opposite-colored jersey coming over the middle. There's no more emphasis on T.O. than anybody else," Lewis said. "My way to heaven doesn't go through Terrell Owens, so I wish we'd stop bringing him up."

Owens would rather talk about his success with the Eagles, who are seeking the first 7-0 start in franchise history.

"I'm just thankful that I'm here," he said. "I know that for

me to be productive and play like the receiver that I know I can be. I had to be put in the right situation."

The eloquent Owens never made a secret of his desire to play with quarterback Donovan McNabb. But, he said for the first time this week that an "offensive" racial comment by Ravens general manager Ozzie Newsome also persuaded him to spurn Baltimore.

In his recent autobiography, Owens wrote that Newsome told the wide receiver's agent that, "He was a black man from Alabama just like I," and that "sometimes a black man's gotta be slapped."

Owens made a statement on the first play against the Ravens in the preseason meeting, racing past cornerback Gary Baxter and catching an 81-yard touchdown pass from McNabb.

With Deion Sanders joining Baxter and All-Pro cornerback Chris McAlister in Baltimore's secondary, Owens might have a tougher time going deep.

"He's a great receiver, so how can you not look forward to the matchup?" Baxter said. "It's exciting personal. He's just going to go out there and do his thing and I'll do my thing and we'll all get on the same page."

Owens have almost been a weekly occurrence in his first season with the Eagles, a team that used to avoid any controversies.

Owens traded verbal jabs with Minnesota's Randy Moss before Philadelphia's victory over the Vikings in Week 2. He challenged cornerback Ricky Manning Jr. before the Eagles' victory over Carolina earlier this month.

Owens also faced his former coach, Steve Mariucci, who feuded with the mercurial wideout in San Francisco, and his old quarterback, Jeff Garcia, a main target of his criticism.

In two weeks, Owens will return to Dallas, where he once posed on the Cowboys' star at midfield after scoring, nearly inciting a riot.

So far, Owens hasn't let any of it become a distraction. He has 34 catches for 506 yards and eight touchdowns.

Baltimore will be without All-Pro running back Jamal Lewis (suspension) and All-Pro tackle Jonathan Ogden (hamstring). They also likely won't have Pro Bowl tight end Todd Heap, who has been sidelined since the second week of the season with a sprained ankle.

## Falcons, Broncos can't wait to turn page

DENVER (AP) — The Denver Broncos were humbled. The Atlanta Falcons were humiliated.

Both teams would agree that their game Sunday can't come soon enough.

"You have to be a player to actually know what it's like to experience something like that," Falcons quarterback Michael Vick said.

Indeed, Atlanta's 56-10 loss to Kansas City and Denver's 23-10 loss to Cincinnati has left both teams embarrassed about the game that has shocked people.

This was the top-ranked rushing defense in the NFL, before the Chiefs game. Now, the Falcons are ranked ninth, and coach Jim Mora rattled things up in

their respective divisions and, most tellingly, their style of football.

In Atlanta, questions about Vick's effectiveness in the West Coast offense have become more prevalent. Largely considered the most dynamic quarterback in the NFL, he has a passer rating of 72.8 - 23rd in the league - and just four touchdowns passes.

More than that, though, it was the record eight touchdowns rushing the Falcons allowed last week that has shocked people.

This was the top-ranked rushing defense in the NFL, before the Chiefs game. Now, the Falcons are ranked ninth, and coach Jim Mora rattled things up in

practice this week.

"I think after you get gashed like we did, you've got to come back with a little bit of that anger in you, and they need to feel it from me," Mora said. "I don't know if anger is the right word, but emotion or resolve."

The Broncos, meanwhile, played the 59th game in two fronts after their ugly and unexpected loss.

Yes, they admit, they were implicitly unprepared for the Monday night game against the Bengals, but they view it as more of a slip-up than anything drastic.

"We learned a lesson from it and we will move on," quarterback Jake Plummer said.

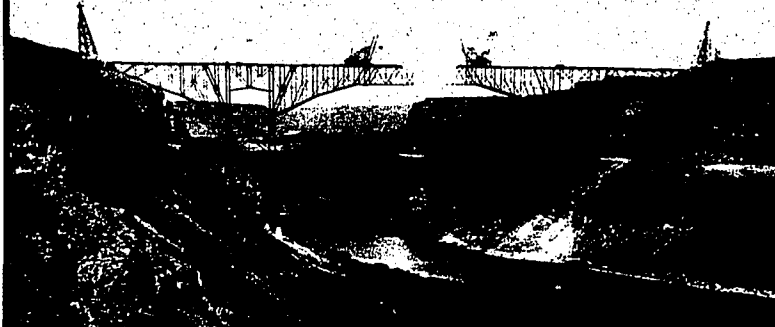

TWIN FALLS — We designed our "Women in Business" issue to seek out and recognize Magic Valley's successful business women, and we found them.

From outstanding women leading and educating Magic Valley's health care sector to small-business entrepreneurs to the director of Twin Falls' downtown business improvement district, the women were spotlighting some of the valley's most influential positions.

While we've got nothing against businessmen, it's important to realize the business contributions made by women. Like the old cigarette ads say, we've come a long way, baby.

Women own an estimated 10.6 million — or 47.7 percent — of privately held American companies, generating more than \$2.4 trillion in sales and employing 19 million people, according to the

Center for Women's Business Research. Since 1997, the growth of women-owned firms has outpaced the growth of businesses run by men by 14 percent, the center's data show.

In Magic Valley, women entrepreneurs make up more than 50 percent of the clients seeking the advice of the College of Southern Idaho's Small Business Development Center, said director Bryan Matsushita in 2003. Of the 320 businesses that took advantage of the center's opportunities last year were wholly or partially owned by women.

And those women are more likely than the men to take the center's advice and use it to succeed, Matsushita said.

"By far and away, women (business owners) are more receptive to education than men," he said.

According to recent statistics from the U.S. Department of Labor, working women spend about an hour more doing household chores and caring for family members than men, while men spend about an hour more at the office.

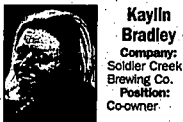

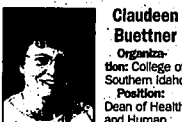
"I realized there are so many talented artists here on Camas Prairie who really do have a showroom," Bradley said.

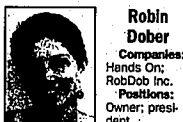
"You couldn't get (work for all students) in Twin Falls," he said. "Anywhere there's a health care facility, we've got students."

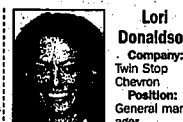

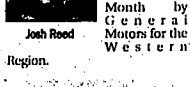

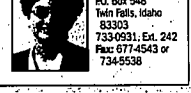

Check the top of your resume, after the name and address bit. How do you kick it off?

An evaluation of more than 100,000 resumes found that most of its (58.4 percent) state your career objectives and aspirations. Yes, according to Vermont-based resume company ResumeDoctor.com, this approach doesn't accommodate one central fact about most job openings: Employers typically want to know what you're qualified to do, not what you'd like to do.

"I could say that I want to be

a CEO of a large company, but that doesn't mean I'm qualified for the job," said Brad Fredericks, a ResumeDoctor.com partner.

So the company has a few tips:

- Create a headline. Begin with a concise statement conveying your title, industry background, and area of expertise.

# Vacationers use time off to do holiday shopping

**RETAIL TRIPPING:** Vacationers aren't just for rest — plenty of us shop up a storm.

In fact, more than half of people in a recent survey (51 percent) said they'd done holiday gift shopping while on vacation, spending an average of \$2,000.

And how much are we retail addicts? It's pretty bad. Nearly three-quarters said shopping is as important, or even more so, than nightlife when planning a trip. Almost half leave space in the suitcase for travel booty, and 17 percent said they buy another suitcase to get the stuff home.

To save money for retailing, more than a fifth (21 percent) said they had booked a cheaper hotel and 19 percent have skipped a meal or gotten cheaper food.

Not surprisingly, New York was deemed the best shopping city, cited by 41 percent. Las Vegas, San Francisco, Los Angeles and Chicago were also mentioned.

The survey was conducted in August by Chicago-based Citibic Inc. It involved 2,696 adults.

# Learn about pros, cons of revamping student loans

**NEW YORK** — Most recent college graduates are still years away from having to start repaying their student loans.

But before you put student loan payments into your budget — and before panicking over your debt — weigh the pros and cons of consolidating your loan. So writes Brian O'Connell in his new book, "Free Yourself From Student Loan Debt."

The pros of consolidation: Fixed interest rates. If you consolidate your loans, you get one rate throughout the life of the loans, instead of a variable rate that changes every year. This can help if interest rates rise.

Immediate debt relief. Your monthly payments will be stretched out over a longer term of repayment, and will be lower than if you made separate payments for each loan.

Easy payments. Instead of sending out multiple checks to several lenders, you send one check per month to a single lender.

Payment incentives. When you consolidate, you may be offered a discounted interest rate

if you sign up for automatic payments debited from your bank account, and if you make payments on time for a stated length of time.

Prepay. Many lenders allow you to pay off your loan early — without penalties. Tax-deductibility. You can deduct up to \$2,500 in student loan interest payments annually, as long as your gross annual income is below \$50,000 (or below \$100,000 if you're married).

Cons of consolidation: Long-term cost. Although your monthly payments are lower, you make more of them, and over a longer period of time. This means you may also pay more in interest.

Loss of privileges. You may not be able to defer payment, or to cancel your loan.

Fixed interest rates. If interest rates decline, you're stuck with the rate you consolidated under. No grace period. Many consolidated loans require you to start paying as soon as your consolidation application is processed.

## Philanthropy becomes a career for some volunteers

DALLAS — The altruistic bug bit Tom Simon Jr. in 1988. While working in retail management, he supported a fund-raiser for muscular dystrophy.

"People would come in and donate a dollar, and they could put their name on a shamrock. We'd put the shamrock up in the store," said Simon, 44, who lives in Garland, Texas.

Since 1993, he has spent a week every summer volunteering at a muscular dystrophy camp. The experience led him to quit selling residential real estate and start selling home medical equipment such as wheelchairs, walkers and canes.

As health care volunteers become immersed in patients' lives, experts say, the desire to switch careers isn't all that unusual. Some consider it a tryout that can turn into a lifelong line of paying work.

"Look at me," said Carol Bourland, Odyssey HealthCare Inc., a national hospice provider based in Dallas. "I volunteered for 20 years, not knowing that I was going to end up as a professional volunteer coordinator."

Under her leadership, there are about 50 volunteers. At Odyssey, many of the helpers are community college students.

"It gives them a chance to test their jobs," said Bourland, 55, founder of the Dallas Junior Forum, a women's service organization. "They might decide it's not for them, it's much easier to volunteer for a few hours than to be hired into a position and find out later."

If interest remains, the unpaid service becomes an impressive resume builder.

"It shows they're well-rounded," said Bourland. "We give out several professional referrals for volunteers who are looking for positions."

Among them is Sharyn Hamilton, who donates therapy hours to Odyssey and The Family House, a home for kids in families plagued by HIV/AIDS.

## Watch your bags at airport security

NEW YORK — The Transportation Security Administration, which is responsible for protecting the country's transportation systems, is toughening up its work. It has just effect new procedures for airport security, increasing the frequency of pat-down searches and requiring that passengers, remove coats, jackets and other outerwear for screening.

With more hoops to jump through, travelers may find it harder to keep track of their belongings, according to Susan Foster, author of the new book "Smart Packing for Today's Traveler."

To prevent the loss or theft of your carry-on items, Foster recommends the following:

• Pare down what you pack. Anything fragile, expensive, absolutely necessary, or irreplaceable should go in your checked luggage, but Foster advises that you avoid traveling with expensive items. "The less you take with you that has value, the better you are," she said. "You have less to watch."

• Limit the number of carry-on bags. If you're bringing a bag, a briefcase and a purse, put the

"Do almost anything they want," Hamilton said. "Do their nails. I give them massages. I

Simon took a big pay cut to go from Re/Max to Majors Medical Service, a store in Dallas. But it's the most rewarding job he has ever had.

"When you help somebody with equipment, they're very happy," he said. "All of a sudden, you give them the means to be mobile again and get a drink of water or go outside by themselves. It means a lot to them; and to me to be able to do that."

"The marketing allocations (meant to align production with expected demand) are too high (and) they're (USDA) managing below forfeiture level," he said.

## Growers take issues to Crapo

TWIN FALLS, Idaho — Home from the Hill and hot on the campaign trail, Senator Mike Crapo got what he came looking for — constituents' concerns.

Gem State sugar beet growers and representatives of Amalgamated Sugar Co. didn't mince words on Tuesday when telling the senator just what was wrong with government policy as well as other challenges facing growers.

"I don't think USDA is implementing this sugar program as it was written in the farm bill, and no one wants to take responsibility," said Perry Meuleman, a Rupert grower and president of the Idaho Sugarbeet Growers Association.

Idaho farmer Jeff Hincy said the USDA's management of the sugar program is troubling.

"They keep prices as low as possible," just high enough to cause as few forfeitures as possible, he said.

ISGA Executive Director Mark Duffin said what it boils down to is "mismanagement."

## New pinto bean resists anthracnose disease

PROSSER, Wash. — A new pinto bean germplasm line resistant to anthracnose is now available for use in developing new varieties of the legume crop.

Phil Miklas, a plant geneticist at the Agricultural Research Service Vegetable and Forage Crops Production Research Unit, Prosser, Wash., was leading the research.

In dry edible beans, anthracnose causes disease symptoms that include unsightly cankers on the plant stem, pods and seeds.

Commercial pinto beans derived from the new germplasm line would be the first to resist anthracnose, according to Miklas.

Shree Singh, at the University of Idaho was among those who collaborated with Miklas on the pinto's development, testing and evaluation.

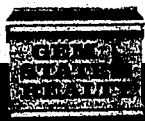

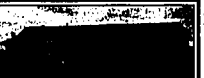

ANSWER: Yes, I am not surprised slam was good. I'd expect your holding to be very useful to partner. Since he has shown a much better hand than an overcall, you should have bid five hearts, agreeing spades and showing a heart control.

Dear Mr. Wolff: Which defenses to weak and strong no-trumps do you favor? And are there any that you would warn me against playing?

Arling Up, Mancie, Ind.

ANSWER: Any defense should feature a way to bid major onesuiters immediately, as well as a way to get major two-suiters in, whether directly or indirectly. Lady is the best simple defense, maybe Woolsey the best complex defense. And do not give up penalty double against the no-trump!

Dear Mr. Wolff: As a beginner just learning defense, I keep hearing about the rule of 11. What is it, and how does it work?

Tyjo Banker, Syracuse, N.Y.

ANSWER: When your partner leads a high-ranked card, subtract his spot-card from 11 to find out how many cards higher than it are held by the other three players. Say you hold the A-10-9-4 in a suit in which your partner leads the seven. If dummy has K-5-2, there are four (11 minus 7) cards of the suit higher than the seven held by the players other than partner. You can see them all, so if dummy plays low on the seven, you can do so too.

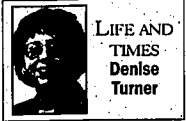
## Do bald guys really get fewer chicks?

## It's going to be tougher than usual this winter

**TWIN FALLS** — The possibilities are sobering.

Five to 20 percent of Americans come down with influenza during any given flu season. About one-third of us get a flu shot. But this fall, you can cut that vaccination rate by at least two-fifths.

Since the British government shut down a flu-vaccine plant earlier this month because of concerns about contamination, the vaccine — even for individuals considered high-risk — is beyond scarce in the United States. Only 61 million doses are available this year, but 98 million people — including 9 million children — need the vaccine.

The South Central District Health Department doesn't have much, and has stopped scheduling vaccination appointments. Area hospitals have little or none.

"Saint Alphonsus (Regional Medical Center) will not be accepting our shipment of vaccine, and as a result we cannot offer flu shots to our patients and community as we have done in the past," said Vicki Jekich, spokeswoman for the Boise hospital, which is Idaho's largest.

So basically, you and your family are on your own. There's no cure, but there is prevention.

There are important things you can do to help stop the

spread of flu and lower the risk of getting the flu," Jekich said. "Wash your hands frequently, avoid crowds and close contact with people who are sick, stay home if you are sick, cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when you're coughing or sneezing, don't share cups, utensils and food with others."

"And maintain healthy habits, such as getting plenty of rest and eating nutritious food."

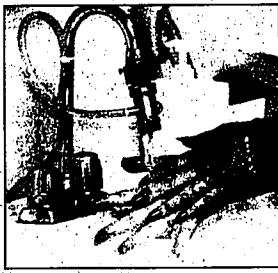
But what if you get the flu anyway?

Apart from the usual advice — rest, fluids and Tylenol — medical science has a few arrows in its quiver, in the form of a class of drugs called antivirals.

Three antivirals (amantadine, rimantadine, and oseltamivir) are available in the United States for preventing flu. All of these medications are prescription drugs, and when used for prevention, they are about 70 percent to 90 percent effective for staving off illness in healthy adults.

Four antivirals (amantadine, rimantadine, zanamivir, and oseltamivir) have been approved for treatment of the flu. If taken within two days of getting sick, these drugs can reduce the symptoms of the flu and shorten the time you are sick by a day or two. They also can make you less contagious.

Antivirals are most often used to control flu outbreaks in nursing homes and hospital wards where people at high risk for

complications from flu are in close contact with each other. Doctors also can prescribe antivirals to people not living in institutional settings, but treatment must begin within two days of the onset of symptoms for it to be effective. Also, while all antivirals lessen the symptoms of illness and shorten the duration of illness, only one of them — oseltamivir — has been shown in a study to reduce some complications requiring antibiotics.

In short, while antivirals work, they don't work for everybody all the time.

Far better not to get the flu at all.

Easier said than done, although most infectious-disease specialists agree that a single ac-

tion — washing your hands regularly — substantially lowers your odds of catching the flu.

Elaine Larson, associate dean of research at the Columbia University School of Nursing, advocates using alcohol-based hand sanitizers sold at pharmacies and grocery stores.

"You can carry them in your pocket," Gerberding told the Washington Post. "You don't have to have a sink, you don't have to have a towel. And they actually are faster-acting and kill more viruses" than traditional soap-and-water washing.

The flu season is starting slowly, according to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention. But there's no way of predicting whether it will be

Imagine a school where you don't need permission slips to take a field trip, where you can take a break from studying to go swimming, and where if you don't understand long division, the teacher can spend as much time on it as you need.

Well, that's the kind of school that at least 1.1 million of the nation's 52 million school-age kids go to.

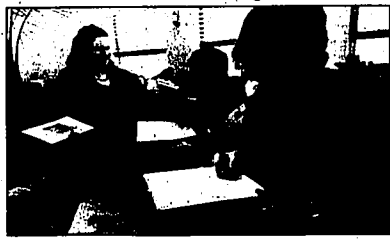
It's called home school.

Home-schooling is pretty much like it sounds. Kids get taught at home by their parents or the parents of friends who are also home-schooled.

If you're being home-schooled, it's probably because your parents chose that for you.

Parents give different reasons for home-schooling. Some say schools go too slowly or don't pay attention to children's individual needs. Some say schools don't teach moral or religious values. Some don't like the bullying and teasing on school playgrounds. Many think they use valuable time with their children when they send them off to school.

Michelle Shaver, of Springfield, Ill., home-schools her son, Alex, 16, and her daughter, Abigail, 6. It's hard work, she says, but allows her to "get to know

my children, especially my son, as a person, an individual, not as a member of that mysterious group called teen-agers."

Jeffrey Loomis, of Waynesboro, Va., said he sometimes questions his decision to pull his two sons out of school, but then remembers the day the plane Venus passed across the face of the sun and he got up early with his older boy to watch the sun rise over the Blue Ridge Parkway before 6 a.m.

Student opinions of home-schooling are like kid opinions of regular schools. Some love it;

others would just as soon skip it.

## Make the kids do it

Raking leaves and shoveling snow can pose a risk of heart attack and injuries to the back, shoulders and wrists, the American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgeons cautions.

The academy offers these tips for safe raking and shoveling:

- Check with your doctor. Because these activities place high stress on your heart, you should always talk with your physician before raking or shoveling. If you have a medical condition or do not exercise regularly, you might want to hire someone to remove the leaves or snow.
- Pace yourself. Raking and shoveling are aerobic activities, comparable to weightlifting. Take frequent breaks and replenish fluids to prevent dehydration, which affects muscles. If you experience chest pain, shortness of breath or other signs of a heart attack, call 911.
- Rake or shovel early and often. Begin when a light covering of leaves or snow is on the ground. Before you begin these physical activities, warm up your muscles for 10 minutes with light exercise.
- See what you are raking or shoveling. Do not let a hot or scarf block your vision. Watch out for large rocks, branches,

tree stumps, ice patches and uneven surfaces. Avoid falls by wearing shoes or boots that have slip-resistant soles.

Use a rake or shovel that feels comfortable for your height and strength. Avoid using a rake or shovel that is too heavy or too long. Space your hands on the tool grip to increase your leverage.

• Push the snow, instead of lifting it, but if you must lift, do it properly. Squat with your legs apart, knees bent and back straight. Lift with your legs, without bending at the waist. Scoop small amounts of snow into the shovel and walk to where you want to dump it. Holding a shovelful of snow with your arms outstretched puts too much weight on your spine. Never remove leaf snow all at once; do it piecemeal.

• Do not throw the leaves or snow over your shoulder or to the side. This requires a twisting motion that stresses your back.

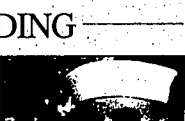

West Hartford, Conn., pastry chef Carol Murdock once made a wedding cake in the shape of the Matterhorn and perched a tiny sugar tent on one of the layers. For another bride, whose profession was horse training, Murdock included a horse among the decorations.

Southington, Conn., cake decorator Ana Parzych, who specializes in lifelike gum-paste flowers, has embellished bridal cakes with cascades of roses, the bright pinks, yellows and dark reds taken straight from nature.

Style maven Martha Stewart set off a flurry of chatter in Web forums among brides when she featured a tiered wedding cake of decorated cupcakes in her magazine.

The pure white cake with restrained icing artwork of lace and flowers remains the symbol of the classic wedding cake. Yet wedding cakes today also are whimsical, contemporary, architectural wonders — one designer has even mastered the upside-down tiered cake — and reflective of the bridal couple's personalities.

Brides — and bridegrooms, who are increasingly more involved in choosing the cake — are much more adventurous, colorful and creative," says Collette Peters, owner of Collette's Cakes in New York City and a designer whose cakes are often featured in national magazines.

Peters, author of a number of cake decorating books, including "Collette's Wedding Cakes" (Little Brown, \$27.95), knows how to make a dramatic statement with her art. That swooping four-tier cake that won a prize at the Food Network Beaver Creek Wedding Cake Challenge in June was a riot of colors, stripes and flourishes of pink, gold, magenta and silver.

Only the most forward-thinking bride might choose Peters' award-winning cake, which looked like a towering crown fit for the Mad Hatter. Cakes created for contests or national magazines often are over-the-top, but they get bridal couples and decorators thinking about the possibilities.

"Ideas come from the movie stars and celebrities whose weddings are covered in depth in popular magazines," says Christophe Bruchwiler, a Swiss pastry chef and owner of Bruchwiler's Bakery & Cafe in Old Saybrook. And don't dismiss the continuing influence of style maven Stewart, who has more on her mind right now than wedding cakes. "It's all about Martha Stewart," he says. "She comes out with something new and everyone wants it."

What's in and what's out? The plastic couple on the top of the cake is yesterday's decoration. Fresh or sugar flowers or an icon that reflects the couple's interests top the cake.

Round layers are still No. 1, but square, heart-shaped and octagon offer more contemporary looks. "My favorite is the hexagon," says Murdock, who owns Classic Cakes and Pastries in West Hartford. "I think it gives you a good surface for decorations. The newest shape is a scalloped oval. I love this shape."

Pillars separating the cake tiers also are passé. "Today, there are no pillars," Bruchwiler says. "It's all stacked."

Fruitcake, the traditional choice for wedding cakes but never a crowd pleaser, has given way to more exotic flavors. Lighter flavors such as lemon cake and raspberry mousse or fresh fruit fillings fit spring and summer weddings. Winter choices tend to be more assertive: spice, chocolate, glich buttercream frosting gives cakes a softer, more frothy look, while fondant, a cooked sugar syrup mixture that be-

comes soft and pliable, looks like fabric draped over the tiers. "If a bride wants a smooth look, I know she wants fondant," says Parzych, whose business, Ana Parzych Custom Cakes is in Southington.

Surf the Web, peruse bridal magazines or flip through the scrapbooks at a cake designer's shop, and color makes a statement.

"We're seeing more color," Murdock says. "We do a lot of reds, oranges and bright yellows and pinks." We do a huge amount of (fresh or gum paste) roses, especially Black Magic, a deep velvety red."

The seasons often inspire certain shades or tints, says Gina Mozzicato whose family owns Mozzicato De Pasquale Bakery & Pastry Shop in Hartford, Conn. In the fall and winter, jewel tones such as burgundy or silver and

gold touches are popular. For spring weddings, brides choose pastels or vibrant, clean colors. Some opt for frosting tinted a pale shade and lacy icing work in white, which "looks like embroidery on fabric," Mozzicato says.

Although the white "tone on tone look" is timeless," Mozzicato says, even white is no longer one shade. The trend is toward softer hues. "I get a lot of requests from brides who don't want stark white (icing)," Parzych says. "They want ivory, antique silk or iridescent pearl."

There is one color that some decorators wish would disappear as a choice for icing decoration: black. Although the other details of the wedding, cake scheme has gained favor in recent years, black just doesn't cut in on a cake, decorators say. "I don't like black on a cake," Murdock says. "If I show you a

picture of a (white and black) cake, your eye goes right to the black."

\*\*\* If the tiny bridal couple perched on the top of the cake is out, what goes in its place?

Fresh flowers continue to be a simple but desirable embellishment. Flowers handmade from royal icing or gum paste also are an elegant look.

"Every time a bride comes here, I feel like I have to educate them at what can be done with sugar. They look at my flowers and think they're either silk or porcelain," Parzych says. She relies on her fine arts background to paint sugar blossoms that look like they've just been plucked from the garden.

Parzych also offers brides the option of preserving the flowers that decorate the top of the cake. "Like the idea of keeping the top," she says. "If the bride brings back the arrangement, I will arrange the flowers in a small vase. If you keep these flowers in a dry place, away from light, they will keep for decades."

Ribbon and fabric offer another way to add color and texture to cakes' overall look. "We're using a lot of ribbon (such as grosgrain) as accents, particularly when there is a color that you can't duplicate in the frosting," Mozzicato says.

Regardless of whether the cake's embellishments are simple or elaborate, the couple should think about the style of the cake they way they consider the other details of the wedding. Like the bride gown, the flowers and the theme of the wedding, the cake will make a lasting impression on the guests.

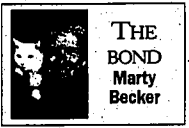

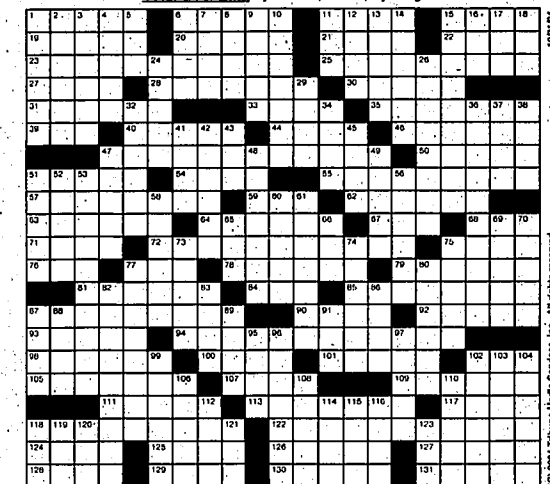

# Ex-wife can still claim benefits

**Knight Rider News Service**  
Q: I am a 62-year-old woman who was married for almost 30 years before my divorce several years ago. I know that I can expect to get a relatively small Social Security retirement check, since I mostly worked part-time jobs. However, I am thinking of remarrying my ex-husband. He is 66 and already getting about \$1,600 per month from Social Security. Would I be entitled to wife's benefits if I remarry him?  
A: Yes, you would be. You also should know that you would be due the same benefits

**Social Security Q&A**  
even if you do not remarry. Under Social Security, a divorced wife who was married for more than 10 years and is currently unmarried is entitled to the same benefits as a wife.  
Q: I get Supplemental Security Income (SSI) for a physical disability. I would like to try going to work. Am I allowed to get a part-time job without risking my benefits?  
A: Yes. Social Security encourages recipients with disabilities

to try working. For example, if your only income is SSI and you start to work, only a small portion of your income is used in determining your monthly benefit amount. Also, in most cases you are able to keep your medical coverage. Social Security has a number of work incentives to help you attempt working without taking away the security net of your benefits.

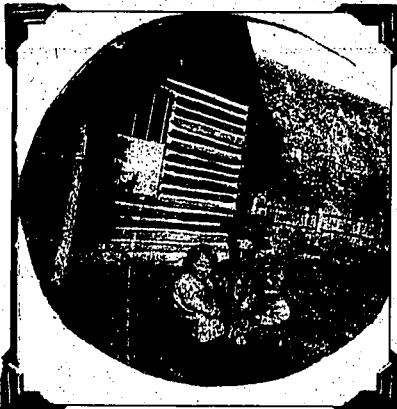
