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# GOP sets up confrontation

WASHINGTON (AP) — Republicans took a step Thursday toward a Senate confrontation over filibusters of President Bush's judicial nominees by advancing two of the White House's favored candidates for prospective votes.

By sending Texas judge Priscilla Owen and California judge Janice Rogers Brown to the full Senate for confirmation, GOP senators now have two of the candidates they want to use to challenge the Democrats' threat to filibuster U.S. Appeals Courts candidates.

"We have now the vehicle. We have two qualified women. They have met every test," said Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison, R-Texas. Owen is nominated for a seat on the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans and Brown is nominated to serve on the U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in the District of

Columbia. Democrats blocked them from lifetime seats on the nation's second highest courts during Bush's first term, but they were renominated by the president after he won a second term in November.

Democrats — who want to block the two women again — agree that a confrontation with Senate Majority Leader Bill Frist, R-Tenn., over whether to ban judicial filibusters is imminent following the strictly partisan votes in the Senate Judiciary Committee.

Republicans are "doing this as a prelude to sending up the greatest constitutional crisis that the Senate has faced," said Sen. Charles Schumer, D-N.Y.

Frist, R-Tenn., has threatened to ban judicial filibusters to stop Democrats from blocking nominees, which Republicans say is against Senate tradition. It requires 60 votes in the Sen-

ate to overcome a filibuster, but only 51 votes to ultimately ban the procedure.

Senate Democratic leader Harry Reid has vowed to slow or halt Senate action on much routine business if the GOP bans judicial filibusters and forces up-or-down votes in which nominees could be confirmed by a bare majority.

Frist has been working to secure the 50 votes he needs from his 55-member Republican caucus to make the rules change. At least a half-dozen Republicans have not yet committed to his plan.

GOP Conference chairman Rick Santorum, R-Pa., denied reports that he has urged Frist to go slow on the rules change and he said he is still behind getting all of Bush's judicial nominees confirmed. "As far as the timing, that's up to the majority leader," he said.

# Senate OKs intel chief

WASHINGTON (AP) — John Negroponte won easy approval by the Senate on Thursday to become the first national intelligence director, a job created last year to better coordinate U.S. spy agencies following the Sept. 11 attacks and other intelligence blunders.

Within 45 minutes of his approval, Negroponte was sworn in at the White House by chief of staff Andrew Card. President Bush witnessed the ceremony. Negroponte will take over the task of giving Bush a daily briefing on intelligence matters, White House spokesman Scott McClellan said.

Negroponte, 65, has said this was his "most challenging assignment" in more than 40 years of government service.

# Teens turn to prescription drugs to get high, study says

NEW YORK (AP) — About one in five teenagers have tried prescription painkillers such as Vicodin and OxyContin to get high, with the pill-popping members of "Generation Rx" often raiding their parents' medicine cabinets, according to a study by the Partnership for a Drug-Free America.

The 17th annual study on teen drug abuse, released Thursday, found that more teens had abused a prescription painkiller in 2004 than Ecstasy, cocaine, crack or LSD. One in 11 teens had abused over-the-counter products such as cough medicine, the study reported.

"For the first time, our national study finds that today's teens are more likely to have abused a prescription painkiller to get high than they are to have experimented with a variety of

illegal drugs," said Partnership Chairman Roy Bostock. "In other words, Generation Rx has arrived."

According to the study, the most popular prescription drug abused by teens was Vicodin, with 18 percent — or about 4.3 million youths — reporting they had used it to get high. OxyContin and drugs for attention-deficit disorder such as Ritalin/Adderall followed with one in 10 teens reporting they had tried them.

Fewer than half the teens — 48 percent — said they saw "great risk" in experimenting with prescription medicines. "Ease of access" was cited as a major factor in trying the medications, with medicine cabinets at home or at friends' homes a likely source, the survey found.

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# Virginia man sent to prison for selling dogfight videos

PITTSBURGH (AP) — A man was sentenced Thursday to more than three years in federal prison for selling mail-order videos of fighting pit bulls, after becoming the first person convicted at trial under a six-year-old animal-crueity law.

Robert Stevens, 64, of Pittsfield, Va., is appealing his conviction and 37-month sentence, which federal public defender Michael Novara called "inappropriate and unreasonable."

Stevens was convicted in January of three counts of selling depictions of animal cruelty.

He never denied selling tapes like "Kick-A-Wino," on which he described dogfighting like a

sportscaster calling a boxing match. Stevens claimed not to know selling the videos was illegal.

Prosecutor Stephen Kaufman noted that the tapes were advertised in a publication he called the leading underground dog-fighting magazine in the country.

"The brutal nature of the dog-fighting (videos)... I think would be apparent to anybody who viewed them," Kaufman said.

The animal-crueity law, signed in 1999 by President Clinton, was spawned by so-called "crush videos." Those tapes show small animals being crushed by women wearing spiked heels.

# Greenspan warns of deficits

WASHINGTON — Federal Reserve Chairman Alan Greenspan told lawmakers Thursday that large government deficits threaten the U.S. economy and called on Congress to return to the budget discipline of the 1990s.

Controlling government spending is an especially urgent matter, Greenspan told the Senate Budget Committee, because some 76 million baby boomers turn 65 between 1994 and 1964 — will begin leaving the work force soon. There won't be enough tax revenue coming in for the federal government to meet retirement and health promises to boomers.

"Unless that trend is reversed," Greenspan warned, "at some point these deficits would cause the economy to stagnate or worse."

The federal deficit, which reached a record \$412 billion last year, is projected to grow to \$427 billion in the fiscal year that ends Sept. 30. Greenspan advocated a return to the Budget Enforcement Act of 1990, which forced lawmakers and the president to agree to spending caps and other increases in spending with comparable cuts.

Government spending on Social Security and Medicare last year totaled about 8 percent of the nation's gross domestic product — the broadest measure of trade in goods and services. The number is expected to grow to 13 percent of the national economy as more boomers retire.

# Court: Baby should be allowed to die

LONDON (AP) — Rejecting a bid by her parents, a British judge on Thursday upheld a court order allowing doctors to let a critically ill baby die if she stops breathing — a move doctors say is the only humane way to end the child's suffering.

Eighteen-month-old Charlotte Wyatt can hardly see or hear and weighed about a pound when she was born prematurely. Her brain and other organs are so seriously damaged that she has "no feeling other than continuing pain, according to physicians."

Darren and Debbie Wyatt, who believe in preserving life at any cost, sought to overturn a court order granted in October. But Justice Mark Hedley was not persuaded by the parents' pleas.

"I am quite clear that it would not be in Charlotte's best interests to die in the course of futile aggressive treatment," Hedley ruled Thursday at London's High Court.

Hedley said he would review the order again, probably in October.

If the baby stops breathing, she will be given treatment except for invasive routines of intubation and ventilation — "but nothing further," Hedley said.

The case echoes that of Terri Schiavo, a Florida woman in a vegetative state whose parents and husband fought over whether she should be allowed to die. She died March 31, almost two weeks after her feeding tube was removed by court order.

# Pope keeps hierarchy intact

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope Benedict XVI made a seamless transition of church leadership Thursday by reappointing the entire Vatican hierarchy from the last papacy while showing increasing signs that he is not the aloof and dour prelate that many anticipated.

He waved and smiled at crowds gathered along the short stretch between the Vatican gates and his old apartment, where he spent some time in the afternoon. "Viva il papa!" some shouted. The pope, dressed all in white, raised both hands in a greeting.

His schedule also shows hints of the openness and symbolic gestures that were at the heart of John Paul II's reign: a meeting with journalists Saturday; an outdoor Mass to formally take the papal throne Sunday and a visit Monday to a church built over the tomb of St. Paul — an apostle who carries deep significance for Roman Catholics and Christian Orthodox.

The Vatican even unveiled new e-mail addresses for Benedict, following an innovation started by John Paul.

In the first days of his papacy, the 78-year-old Benedict has projected two clear styles.

One was expected: the confident and well-prepared Vatican insider who was one of John Paul's closest advisers for more than two decades. His decisions on the top-level posts

came quickly — some posts have struggled for weeks — and showed continuity with his predecessor. There were no changes in any major Vatican office all the way up to the No. 2 slot, the secretary of state, Cardinal Angelo Sodano. The only question remains who will fill the powerful job that the new pope held since 1981: overseeing church doctrine and punishing those who stray.

The second image emerging — a humble and welcoming pastor — has caught many off guard.

The pontiff's name, Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger, became synonymous among Catholics with the church's strictest factions and earned him nicknames that played off his German background, such as "God's remodeler."

All agree that he is strongly rooted in church traditions and inflexible on issues such as the church's bans on contraception and women priests. But so was John Paul. The new pontiff may lack his predecessor's charis-

ma, but he shares his sense of reaching out to the faithful, they say.

"He was a follower and servant of the late Pope John Paul II," Vatican-based Colombian Cardinal Lopez Trujillo told Colombian radio RCN. "He is a simple man, serene, cordial, with a fine sense of humor and very kind. ... No one has seen him in a moment of indisposition of rancor or intolerance. These are myths the press invented."

Another cardinal, Italian Tarcisio Bertone, who had worked as Ratzinger's top aide, described how the new pope always paid attention to the street cats around the Vatican and how they sometimes followed him as he walked to his office.

### Merger of area chambers could benefit Magic Valley

**B**elieve it or not, time does heal all wounds, even among old foes. Peace has a way of bubbling to the surface of world affairs. The sons and daughters of Rebels and Yanks now share barbecue sauce recipes at rib cookoffs. The Hatfields and McCoys get together every summer for a reunion in the Kentucky hills.

And even in the Magic Valley, the Twin Falls County and Jerome County rivalry has evolved into a prosperous detente.

So perhaps now is a good time to consider how the two cities can make that relationship even stronger — by merging their two separate chambers of commerce.

A small cloud of dust was kicked up recently over the Jerome Chamber of Commerce's decision to hold a Business After Hours event at a Twin Falls hotel and convention center.

Chamber president Elizabeth Thomas skillfully addressed the complaint (in a letter to the editor on this page) by noting how Jerome has a number of members outside its city limits.

The mingling of merchants expands the circle of commerce for the city's major employers.

And in the future, the Twin Falls-Jerome communities will be brought even closer together through two major projects: Development of Casper's Pointe at the I-84/Highway 93 intersection, and construction of a third Snake River bridge crossing.

As time passes, those efforts should create a more regional identity for business.

So why not explore ideas today on how a collaborative chamber — call it a Greater

Magic Valley Chamber of Commerce — might take shape in the future?

Both chambers already have members that come from outside their host cities. Thomas estimates that about a quarter of the Jerome chamber comes from Twin Falls.

That's obviously a good starting point.

Likewise, Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce President Shawn Bariga says most of the chamber's 95 members

come from outside Twin Falls, come from Jerome.

We recognize that chambers of commerce

serve a distinct mission in helping the budding small business prosper. A merger might frighten some businesses that the individual focus would be lost.

But in many ways, the regional ties that bind Jerome, Twin Falls and their surrounding communities, have already proved prosperous.

• The two counties already share a tax district that helps build the College of Southern Idaho.

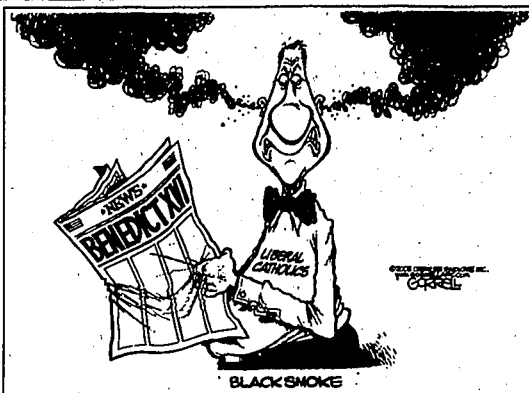
• The Southern Idaho Economic Development Organization has recruited good jobs successfully to both sides of the canyon.

• Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce's leadership courses, for adults and youth, utilize the area as a whole to educate members about business development.

Nobody would dare say this meeting of the minds must happen immediately.

But given the growth of the region — in both population and in development — there's much we can do by working together years down the road.

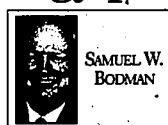

ergy independence and lessen energy production's impact on the environment. From 1998 to 2003, wind generation in America has been growing at an average annual rate of about 25 percent. As a result of research and development efforts, many of the Department of Energy, the efficiency of wind power systems has increased, and the cost to generate wind power has declined to become more competitive with power produced from traditional sources such as coal and natural gas. By supplying a significant portion of our energy needs with wind power, the United States can supplement the use of these other domestic resources and eliminate significant amounts of pollution.

The Department of Energy also strives to educate Americans and encourage the use of wind power as a viable energy option through our Wind Technology Program. While considerable progress has been made in making wind-power

production more efficient, practical and cost-effective, energy legislation currently being considered by Congress contains provisions to further enhance the prospects of this important technology.

That is why it is so important for Congress to pass a comprehensive energy bill this year. This legislation supports the development of wind power, in addition to addressing a broad range of other energy issues that are critical to our nation's economic future, such as increasing conservation and modernizing our energy infrastructure that will make blackouts less likely. President Bush has called on Congress to pass energy legislation for four years, while prices for gasoline and natural gas have continued to climb. 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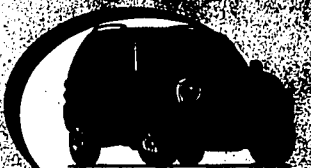

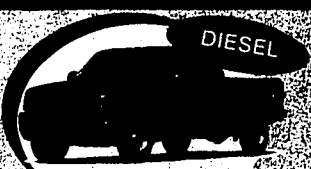

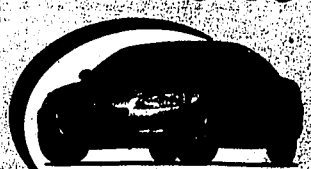

## Parents learn about reading program

**TWIN FALLS** — At least one parent said presentations Thursday helped change his mind about the Twin Falls School District's new reading program.

The district is in the process of implementing Open Court Reading in its seven elementary schools with the help of about \$2 million in federal Reading First grants for curriculum and training at several schools.

About 35 people came to hear from district administrators and

Marsha Rolt, one of the authors of the program. She is from Baltimore and has a doctorate from Harvard University where she studied reading and language development.

Superintendent Wiley Dobbs said the district invited her to speak a few months ago after a complaint and question-filled parent meeting at Sawtooth Elementary. Open Court Reading's publisher paid for her trip.

At its April 11 meeting, the School Board accepted a resignation from a teacher at Pettine Elementary and early retirements from two teachers at

Sawtooth Elementary. All three cited either the Reading First grant or Open Court Reading as part of their reasons for leaving the district.

Dobbs said Thursday that he appreciates the service from those teachers and respects their decisions to leave.

Chuck Hardin, a parent with children in kindergarten and second grade at Harrison Elementary, said he came to Thursday's session thinking the program itself might have problems. After learning more about it, he said he feels the challenge might be more in how teachers

are learning to use it.

"It's more in the support of the teachers," Hardin said.

Itish Bravender, a parent of children in kindergarten, third and fifth grades at Pettine Elementary, said she hopes the teachers at her school get the support they need from the district to put the program in place.

"I think the program is probably better than what I had originally envisioned," Bravender said.

Rolt's presentation included two videos of classes in California

## Filer district pours funds into its weight program

FILER — Student athletes will have a chance to get a jump on next year's sports season.

The Filer School Board approved Wednesday a request for funds to support the summer weight-training program at the high school.

Football Coach Jaxon Schweikert presented a survey of 225 high school athletes showing that about 95 percent want to use the facility remain open during the summer months.

But only 30 percent would be willing to pay a fee to use it.

"We are always encouraging

the kids to be active and ready to go for fall sports, but if they gotta pay, it's going to be pretty tough to get them in here," Schweikert said.

A portion of the \$2,000 stipend — that will pay coaches who supervise the program — could be taken from the remaining budget of each sport.

Athletic Director Loyd Geary reported that an amendment to Rule 3-1 of the Idaho High School Athletics Association policy now requires coaches who fall under its jurisdiction to complete a first-aid and cardiopulmonary resuscitation course.

The ruling states: "At no time may a team practice, travel or compete without having at

least one adult who has met the requirements. Schools shall keep a roster verifying those who have completed the course."

"This includes not only athletic coaches but speech, band or any competition like that," Geary said.

The Filer School District employs 35 coaches who must meet the new standard.

Also on Wednesday, the board approved renewing employment contracts for 115 certified and classified staff members.

A public hearing to discuss the proposed 2005-06 district budget has been scheduled for 6:30 p.m. June 15 at the Filer Elementary library.

## Agency gives rec district more funds

top financial backer

JEROME — The Jerome Urban Renewal Agency agreed on Wednesday to provide the Jerome Recreation District an additional \$200,000 in a contingency fund for the district's expansion plans.

However, there will be strings attached.

The Urban Renewal Agency already is providing \$2 million of the \$2.4 million project, which will add 19,000 square feet to district facilities with a

second gymnasium, a running track, weight room, cardiovascular equipment, multi-use classroom and gathering area.

The recreation district plans to borrow \$400,000 from D.L. Evans Bank on a 15-year loan to pay its share of the costs.

City Administrator Travis Rothweiler told the Urban Renewal Agency that the recreation district is negotiating with Kreizenbeck Construction and Rockwell Architects of Boise on designs for the expansion.

The recreation district has a cost estimate of just under \$2.4 million with no leeway for unforeseen costs. Therefore, Rothweiler requested the agency provide the additional \$200,000.

"It bothers me that the cost estimate is going to be right at

the full amount we have agreed to provide," said Urban Renewal Agency Chairman John Shin. "We do not want to open the door to extra costs. I do not intend to allow it to escalate to a \$2.6 million dollar project. If we approve the \$200,000 contingency fund it will have to be a true contingency fund."

Mike Pepper, a consultant with the recreation district, said staff would probably do further trimming on the design to get the price more affordable.

Staff also will seek additional funds from other granting agencies.

The Urban Renewal Agency will draft a new agreement retaining the right to refuse to provide the contingency money if agency members do not feel costs are true contingencies.

earnings of 73 cents a share. Revenue in the January-March period rose nearly 11 percent to \$9.89 billion, compared with \$8.92 billion recorded a year ago.

"We grew our international operating profit by more than 25 percent and we did a very good job of managing

McDonald's Corp., the world's largest fast-food chain, reported a 42 percent jump in first-quarter profits despite slower sales growth at its U.S. restaurants.

Improving sales in Europe and continued momentum in the United States fueled the latest strong quarter by the Oak Brook, Ill.-based company.

Net income for the January-March period was \$1.1 billion, or 33 cents a share.

## Companies plan for a graying population

**NEW YORK** — The baby boomer market is so lucrative that entrepreneurs are literally competing to capitalize on it.

At the 2005 Boomer Business Summit, held last month in Philadelphia, 40 contestants vied for a \$10,000 prize in the Boomer Business Plan Challenge.

The finalists ranged from a company that makes a high-tech knee brace to a low-tech moving company.

The competition was organized by Santa Clara University, the American Society in Aging and Mary Furlong, a consultant to businesses that want to market to older people.

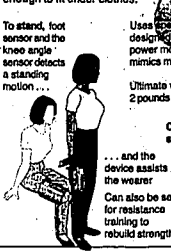
The stakes for the contestants are huge — more and more money is in the hands of people who are likely to spend on reading glasses rather than the latest computer game.

People over 54 had more than twice the net assets of younger people in 2001, according to the most recent Federal Reserve data.

And they have needs that businesses have overlooked, according to David Yarnell, one of the judges at the competi-

Millions of seniors have trouble walking due to diseases like Parkinson's, injury or surgery or just plain age. So engineers Kern Bhugra and Robert Horst developed the PowerKnee, a motorized brace that fits over the knee, and won the \$10,000 top prize at the competition.

The device, still in the prototype stage, uses sensors along the leg to figure out the wearer's intentions, then starts its power electric motor to help the movement along.

"It really takes some of the load off the quadriceps and puts it on the device," Bhugra said.

To make the PowerKnee small enough to fit under clothes, Bhugra's small company, Tibion Corp., plans to use a patented motor with sliding, electrically charged plates which fit flat along the leg.

Bhugra said the PowerKnee could be on the market in a year and a half, provided Tibion and common sense. The non-profit group plans to distribute the device to seniors.

## New anti-Wal-Mart group launches first ad campaign

**LITTLE ROCK, Ark.** — A newly formed, union-backed anti-Wal-Mart group, which draws support from environmentalists, political activists and women's rights groups, launched its first media campaign to call for the world's largest retailer to reform its business practices.

In its campaign called Wal-Mart Watch, Five Stones — formed in December 2004 along with its larger umbrella, The Center for Community and Corporate Ethics — took out an ad in Wednesday's New York Times. The ad accuses Wal-Mart Stores Inc. of low pay and meager employee benefits that force workers to rely on Medicaid, food stamps and federal hous-

ing to survive.

Wal-Mart — which has Magic Valley stores in Burley and Jerome and proposes opening one in Twin Falls — accused Five Stones of engaging in a partisan attack, and questioned the group's information.

Andrew Grossman, Wal-Mart Watch director, said the group wants to "provide a national debate." He hopes the group will help improve Wal-Mart as a neighbor, employer and corporate citizen.

The moves follow stepped-up campaigns against Wal-Mart by the United Food and Commercial Workers International Union, which is trying to organize workers at the discount store. Earlier this month, the UFCW announced it was funding a new Web site called [wakeupwal.com](http://wakeupwal.com), a grass roots movement to rally Americans to change practices at Wal-Mart, which has been criticized for taking advantage of its employees and hampering competition.

Unlike other anti-Wal-Mart groups, the Center for Community and Corporate Ethics, based in Washington, D.C., encompasses a wide network of members on its board including the Sierra Club, National Partnership for Women & Families and Common Cause. The non-profit group plans to distribute Wal-Mart-related data and draw on hundreds of other anti-Wal-Mart organizations through its Web site called [wakeupwal.com](http://wakeupwal.com) and offline efforts.

"This is just one more example of labor unions playing fast

and loose with the facts in an attempt to discredit Wal-Mart," Wal-Mart spokeswoman Mona Williams said. "We don't know where they got these numbers. And most sources they cite are from dubious studies they commissioned."

Wal-Mart Watch claims in The New York Times ad that Wal-Mart pay and benefits structure costs taxpayers \$1.5 billion per year in government assistance that some of its 1.2 million domestic workers receive.

As part of its campaign, the group pledged to mail information to each state legislator in the nation and to local officials on "how they can pass laws to put the brakes on Wal-Mart and the Wal-Mart Tax once and for all."

Williams said the company was eager to work with "people with legitimate concerns about smart growth, the environment, health care and the like." She said the anti-Wal-Mart group likely includes people with legitimate concerns but the group comes across as "cliches (who) are simply focused on their own self-interest and narrow political agendas."

"We just hope the sincere, open-minded people are smart enough not to be misled by the cynics," Williams said.

The Center for Community and Corporate Ethics started with initial funding from the Services Employees International Union, but now has diversified with individual and institutional donors, according to Tivy Sell, a spokeswoman.

## M.V. Symphony, Chorale team up for spring pops concerts

**TWIN FALLS** — It won't require the clockwork precision of an opera or a musical, but it's no mean trick choreographing a symphony concert with 160 people on one stage.

"Everything has to work just right," said Ted Hadley, musical director of the 60-member Magic Valley Symphony, which will combine with the Magic Valley Choral and the Twin Falls High School Chamber Singers for their pops concert next Thursday and on April 29.

The highlights will be composer Daniel Bujvick's "From the Journals of Lewis and Clark." It's a work in 12 movements for symphony, choir and two narrators, and it includes both words and music.

"Not only does he invoke the likely sounds of the expedition—birds, a lullaby for Sacagawea's baby, the roar of Great Falls, the Sioux and others—but he captures the spirit of the expedition," explained Paula Brown Sinclair, a French horn player with the symphony who

doubles as the orchestra's historian and researcher. "Imagine the profound unexpectedness of planning a long river voyage and instead finding Idaho. All of this is interwoven with beautiful melodies and innovative rhythms."

The symphony performed Bujvick's "Portraits," a musical history of Twin Falls, last fall in conjunction with the city's centennial celebration.

"Anyone who liked 'Portraits' will definitely enjoy this," Sinclair said.

The Symphony and the Choral have teamed up to perform "Journals" before, in April 2000.

"In style, it is vintage Bujvick," Sinclair said. "That is to say 'quirky'."

In a form that defies orthodox classification, the composer examines the people of Lewis and Clark's Voyage of Discovery and their experiences. There are vignettes that include historically accurate fragments of fiddle tunes of the period and singing in Shoshoni and French. Readings from President Jefferson's instructions to Lewis, though

### 'Born into Brothels'

The Oscar-winning documentary follows Western photographer as she befriends a group of children living in Calcutta's red light district. This beautiful-looking film provides a glimpse into a taboo subculture, and shows how the energy, and innocence, of children can be found — and fostered — in even the bleakest spots on Earth. No MPAA rating (adult themes, profanity, poverty and squalor)

### 'The Interpreter'

So much is right about Sydney Pollack's thriller that it's easy to forgive the fact that the essential story is a static assassination plot whose climax hits with a dull thud. For most of the way the film is a thoughtful meditation on the power of sophisticated dialogue and understated suspense. The movie's first half presents a riveting dynamic between Nicole Kidman as a U.N. translator who overhears a death threat and Sean Penn as the chief fed on the case. Yet the filmmakers have mustered bottomless mood in support of a poster narrative that never quite pays off. It's hard to invest emotionally in the peril to the potential victim, a murderous dictator, while the storytelling also tumbles near the end. ### 'King's Ransom'

Unfortunately for Malcolm, he is not the only one with a kidnapping plot. PG-13.

### 'Kung Fu Hustle'

Set in a mythical 1940s gangster past, 'Hustle' is about a feud between the neighborhood called Pig Sty and the Axe Gang — guys who dress like The Blues Brothers and fight with hatchets. The Axe Gang sends various vengeful messages to the Pig Sty and the 'hood keeps discovering new champions within its walls to defend it. The defenders have asserted unnatural and supernatural skills that they can employ to hang on to their turf. But each time they think the foe is vanquished, a more deadly hired hand from the Axe Gang appears. Directed by Wong Kar-ai, Chow himself is merely the last, and funniest defender. R.

### 'A Lot Like Love'

Ashton Kutcher is an easy target. He's pretty, he's popular. He has his TV series ('That '70s Show') and a hot girlfriend (Demi Moore). But Kutcher should silence the cynics and critics here. He shows unexpected depth and range as the slightly nerdy half of a star-crossed 'When Harry Met Sally'...style duo, opposite the lovely, slightly bohemian Amanda Peet. The two keep meeting each other over a seven-year period and form an easy, comfortable friendship that morphs into an amorphous romance. The TV ads for the film, in which Peet and Kutcher spit water at each other and shove things up their noses — make it look like a wacky physical romp. While they do have a goofy playfulness, their relationship is surprisingly warm, funny and sweet. PG-13 for sexual content, nudity and language. 107 minutes.

Not quite a return to form for director Woody Allen, but an improvement on his recent films. The story is told two ways, comedically and then tragically. So is Will Ferrell, who makes the most sweetly appealing stand-in for Allen in years. If the goal is to teach us something profound about comedy and tragedy, the movie doesn't succeed, but we do have a fun time. PG-13.

## CSI offense looks to break slump

**TWIN FALLS** — Spunter, spitter, choke, wheeze. It's how your car sounds when high gas prices force you to push it a little too far without a refill. It's also similar to how the College of Southern Idaho baseball team has performed at the plate over the last eight games.

CSI will get a chance to break out of its doldrums this weekend when it travels to Henderson, Nev. to face the Community College of Southern Nevada for a pair of Scenic West Athletic Conference doubleheaders. The Golden Eagles will take on No. 9 CSN today at 5 p.m. MDT and Saturday at 1 p.m.

CSI (23-22 overall, 16-15 SWAC), which has lost eight straight, is in danger of dipping below .500 for the first time

since March 12, largely because of its offensive struggles. The Eagles hitters were overwhelmed by the Dixie State pitching staff last weekend in failing to score a run during a four-game sweep.

But CSI has been flat at the plate dating back to when it played Salt Lake Community College in Twin Falls two weeks ago. In the SLCC and Dixie State games combined, the Eagles scored just eight runs and hit a paltry .212 (38 for 179) as a team.

"We just need to get back to basics," said CSI head coach Boomer Walker, who held three separate practices on Monday.

"We're trying to find a way for them to go back to things that we've gone away from a little bit to get successful. It's a really bad

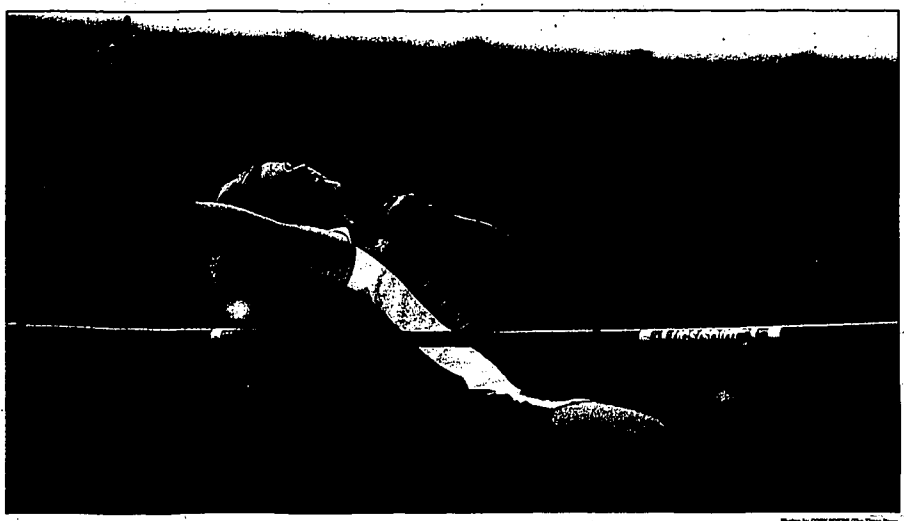

TWIN FALLS — They're not the same Bruins, but they're playing for the same result.

The towering blasts and liners to the gaps may have given way to drag bunts and double steals, but a pair of home runs over the Idaho Falls Tigers Saturday could put Twin Falls High School's baseball team back on familiar ground — atop the Region Four-Five-Six standings.

The 10-9 Bruins will begin play Saturday in a four-way tie for the regional lead. The Bruins, Tigers, and Skyline Grizzlies all hold 1-1 records, while the Highland Rams are 2-2.

"If we can sweep, it will be as big a sweep as we've had all year," Bruins head coach Mike Federico said. "It would be huge, so it's a big weekend for us."

But the road to a 3-1 conference record will be no cakewalk. While Federico will put his ace on the mound for Game 1, senior pitcher Nick Carr will likely battle Idaho Falls senior pitcher Nick Birch.

"Birch is a kid who's their ace, who throws real well," Federico said. "He's a next-level pitcher."

More pressing a matter for

Carr and the Bruins defense will be Tigers senior outfielder Jake Miller. The slugger is one of the most consistently dangerous batters in Idaho and is a terror with men on base.

"He's a legitimate (NCAA D-I) hitter," Federico said. "Keeping the bases empty when Miller takes the batter's box will be a major focus for the Bruins defense."

Especially if the wind is blowing out," Federico said. "And in Twin Falls, especially at our place, it tends to do that a lot. Getting the first out and the first strike — getting ahead in the count — those are going to be big keys in winning the game."

Offensively, the Bruins will rely on steady execution at the plate. Senior catcher Drew Bernhard and second baseman Kenny Steelman have been the Bruins most consistent hitters and give stability to the top of their order.

"The one constant we've had is Bernhard," Federico said. "He's been phenomenal behind the dish, and for big hits, we haven't had a bigger hitter. Steelman's been pretty consistent this year, too. Those have been the two guys we can throw out there and just count on offensively and defensively, day in and day out."

How well younger players like Remington Pullin, Bo Folsing, and Kasey Jerome approach hitting will be key, as the Bruins will need production from the bottom of their lineup in what are expected to be two close games.

"We have to play a lot more small ball," Federico said. "In our last win, we had two sacrifices, two drag bunts, two hit-and-runs, and two pushes we all executed. That's the best game we've played, because we have to find those different ways of getting on base instead of just standing there and swinging the bat. There's no question we're a different team. We're a good team, we just have to win in different ways."

The Bruins will put Chance Elam on the mound for Game 2, likely against Idaho Falls' Trent Johnson.

"Nick and Chance have really separated themselves from the rest of the staff as far as being the two leaders," Federico said. "Chance has thrown wonderfully. Nick kept us in every ball game he's pitched and he's really established himself as our No. 2 guy."

The Bruins are finally finding some stability in their lineup, which will likely bode well during the season's final games. Players like Pullin and Folsing will continue to be looked upon for timely hits.

"I think our young guys have progressed well," Federico said. "I'm worried that they're almost progressing too fast, that they don't leave their confidence behind. Sometimes it seems like they're doing pretty good. Other times, they get a little down on themselves. But jeez, they're 1-1."

In the end, Saturday's doubleheader will be the final step in the progression of these teams as they begin focusing on the looming Region Four-Five-Six tournament.

A 3-1 regional record after Saturday would guarantee the Bruins no less than a 500 finish within the conference, which may be just enough to host a game in the tournament's first round.

Play Saturday begins at noon.

TWIN FALLS — Twin Falls senior pitcher Nick Carr takes his baseball seriously.

Whether it's because he enjoys the control he has over the game or knowing that he pitches for a team and not just himself, Carr doesn't mess around.

"Every day I come to the field with the attitude that we can win," he said. He expects no less from his teammates either.

The Bruins recently brought up some younger players to fill spots left vacant when members of the varsity squad were suspended for violating district policy. On the field, it didn't seem to matter to Carr, who struck out 13 Highland batters in a close Class 5A Region Four-Five-Six victory, 5-4.

"I would rather have the younger guys than these guys doing stuff they're not supposed to be doing," Carr said. "I'd rather have our younger guys step up and give it all they've got."

The Bruins overcame the setback to win, and now Carr and the team look forward to their conference game with Idaho Falls.

"We're still fine, and we'll get better," he said. "I'm excited to stick it to (Idaho Falls). The guys we have now are doing a good job for us. We've been winning." Most pitchers form the strongest bond with a particular teammate — his catcher. For Carr, it's senior catcher Drew Bernhard.

"Drew and I have an outstanding relationship. He pumps me up, but he can also put me down," he said. "Not so that I can't get back up, but lets me know that I'm doing something wrong so I can fix it."

Carr described Bernhard as his best friend and a trusted teammate.

"I trust him catching. I don't know if I'd trust anybody else back there that much," he said. "He works as hard as he can to be the best of his abilities."

### State and beyond

Carr is serious about the future, immediate and long-term. The Bruins have Idaho Falls and Skyline standing between them and the conference title.

"I definitely think we're state contenders," Carr said. "But I'll be tough. If we can't beat Skyline, we're in trouble."

Carr said that the road to state is one of improvement and that the team is starting to come together.

"Coaches pound in our heads the little things that make you better," he said. "I really believe in that."

Signing a letter of intent with the College of Southern Idaho is

Carr will join the Eagles in the fall, and although CSI is struggling to stay above .500, Carr has no reservations about his choice.

He said he chose to stay at CSI because he knows the guys there care about him, and that he'll feel right at home.

"I wouldn't have wanted to go anywhere else."

Another reason for choosing a college like Southern Idaho has to do with his chances at being drafted by a Major League Baseball club.

Carr said his chances are "pretty high."

"I can't get drafted my freshman or sophomore year at a four-year college," he said. "But he can attend a two-year college and be eligible for the draft. If it doesn't happen, he can transfer to a four-year school for his junior and senior year. That way, Carr can have four years of eligibility instead of just two."

"I can see it happening. I can feel it happening," he said.

### Dream job

Every ball player has that one professional team that epitomizes baseball from childhood onward. For Carr, his "dream come true" is to pitch for the Boston Red Sox.

"It's my favorite team, since I was young. It just seems like their rotation knows how to get the job done," he said.

"It's a loyalty thing, unwavering, even to the big bucks of the 'Big Empire.' Carr said that even if New York called him up, he'd want to go to Boston.

"I hate the Yankees."

## Nation's top high school player applies for NBA draft

HOUSTON (AP) — Top-rated high school shooting guard Gerald Green said Tuesday he has applied for early entry into the NBA draft.

The 19-year-old Green, a 6-foot-8 senior at Houston's Gulf Shores Academy, hasn't hired an agent so he can withdraw from the draft before June 21 and retain his college eligibility. He signed with Oklahoma State in November.

"My decision is based on what was best for me and my future," said Green, who is ranked the nation's top shooting guard by recruiting Web site Rivals.com.

His father, Gerald Green Sr., said they are working with an adviser to determine his draft position.

"If he's a lottery pick, it's pretty much safe to say I'll be in the NBA-bound," his father said. "If not, he'll be OSU-bound."

Green's draft stock shot up after his commitment to the Cowboys began to waver after he scored 24 points and won the slam-dunk contest at the McDonald's High School All-American game in March 30.

Before that game, Green said he hadn't seriously considered making the jump to the NBA. But afterward, many speculated that Green would be this year's only high school lottery pick.

He averaged 33 points, 12 rebounds and seven assists this season. He has great 3-point shooting range and leaping ability.

# Singh takes first-round Houston Open lead

HUMBLE, Texas (AP) — Fresh from inclusion in the World Golf Hall of Fame, Vijay Singh tied the course record with an 8-under-par 64 for a one-shot lead Thursday after the first round of the Houston Open.

The 42-year-old Riktor, No. 2 in the world rankings, extended his streak of par or better to 56 holes at the Redstone Golf Club, where he won this event a year ago.

Singh laughed when told of his bogey-free string going back to last year, when he finished 11 under and won by two shots.

"Don't mention that," he said. "I struck the ball really well

today, had a very good feel of the greens and my speed was good, and when you do that you can make some birdies."

After Singh came Australians Gavin Coles and Brendan Jones. Eight players were at 67, six others, including John Daly, were another shot back.

Singh was announced Wednesday as the latest inductee into the Hall of Fame, although he said he learned three weeks ago the honor was coming, meaning it wasn't a distraction now.

"My focus this week is coming out here," he said. "Still, the recognition, both off and on the course Thursday, was appreciated."

"Every player out there said something about it, so that was good," Singh said.

So was his round. Starting on the back nine, he had pars on four of his first five holes, then birdied 16 and 17 and made the turn at 4-under. He finished the front side with a flurry, getting birdies on three of the last four holes.

"You sort of expect him to be

there," said Coles, on pace to share the lead with Singh before he missed the green and landed in a bunker for a bogey at No. 17.

It was the only glitch in his round.

"That was a lot of fun," Coles said. "The balls were just going in from everywhere. It was tremendous. The first three holes, I had three putts over 20 feet and I made two of them. So that was quite a nice start."

Then he had consecutive birdies at Nos. 5 and 6 and again at Nos. 8 and 9 to finish the front side 6 under at 23.

"Anything is possible, mate," Coles said of his chances for a first PGA Tour victory.

## Gulbis takes two-stroke lead at Morelia Corona

MORELIA, Mexico — Natalie Gulbis shot a 5-under 66 to take a two-stroke lead after the first round of the Corona Morelia Championship on Thursday, while Lorena Ochoa struggled to a 1-over 71 in her second pro event in her homeland.

Audra Burks had an eagle, three birdies and a bogey and finished tied for second with Sweden's Carin Koch, who had five birdies and a bogey in a round 4-under 68.

Nancy Scrantom offset three bogeys with six birdies and was tied for fourth place with Sweden's Maria Hjorth and Italy's

Giulia Serges at 69 on the Tres Marias Residential Golf Club.

The 22-year-old Gulbis started on the back nine and, after opening with a par, reeled off three straight birdies.

# Armstrong struggles in time trial at Tour de Georgia

ROME, Ga. (AP) — Lance Armstrong has plenty of work to do if he wants to win a seventh straight Tour de France.

Armstrong finished a disappointing ninth in Thursday's time trial at the Tour de Georgia, nearly two minutes behind the winner in a go-all-out style of cycling the usually domestics.

American rider Floyd Landis won the third stage in 39 minutes, 58.09 seconds. The other spots on the podium also were claimed by U.S. riders — David Zabriskie in second and Christopher Baldwin third.

Shocking, Armstrong was not among them. Racing in a light rain, he failed to make up ground on the climb up Mt. Alto and had no chance of closing the gap by the time he pedaled onto the slick streets of downtown Rome.

"Clearly, I'm disappointed," said Armstrong, who could only manage a time of 41:48.57. "I didn't feel great, but I thought I'd have a better ride than I did."

Armstrong plans to retire this summer after going for a seventh straight victory in the Tour de France. Already, he's the only cyclist to win the world's most famous race six times.

The Tour de Georgia is a tune-up along the way, a six-day chance for Armstrong to gauge his conditioning against the best field that will be assembled on American roads.

He won this race a year ago, taking control in the time trial

held over the same 18.6-mile course in northwest Georgia. Armstrong's winning time was 39:51.78 — far better than he managed Thursday as leader of

the Discovery Channel team.

"I'm probably behind on my fitness," Armstrong said. "Last year I definitely got a jump on fitness, and this year I was way

behind. I thought I caught up, but like I said, now I know I haven't. Now it's time to re-evaluate the season."

With only 2.5 months to go before the Tour de France, Armstrong knows he must step up his training if he wants to slip one more glass of champagne on the Champs-Élysées.

"We just have to improve from here," he said. "It means gaining fitness and losing weight, focusing on every little aspect of the sport — the diet, the bike, the training, the team. I think they are even a little bit behind, so we've got work to do."

Landis, who was Armstrong's right-hand man in several Tours with the old U.S. Postal Service team, is now the lead cyclist for Swiss-based Phonak. It felt a little strange to finish ahead of the former boss.

"He's not in the shape he was in last year," Landis said. "I don't think he has huge aspirations here. He won't be shattered if he doesn't win this race."

Landis has the yellow jersey and a lead of 1:42 over Armstrong, who dropped to ninth overall.

Zabriskie is 19 seconds behind Landis in the overall rankings. Baldwin is third, 22 seconds off the pace for the Navigators Insurance team.

Olympic medalist and CSC leader Bobby Julich is lurking 28 seconds behind the lead, giving Americans the top four spots on the leaderboard. But the most famous American of all was not among them.

This season, there's no marquee team and no superstar tandem to be topped, creating a much greater sense that it's a wide open race for the title.

"It is clear that the Lakers are the team to love or hate, and a playoffs without the Lakers are going to draw lower (ratings) than one with them," commissioner David Stern said. "But aside from that, there are some interesting and exciting teams that are generating coverage, and a lot of young players and player combinations that people are talking about."

# San Francisco gets top pick in draft without top player

SANTA CLARA, Calif. (AP) — According to one theory, the San Francisco 49ers must choose a quarterback with the first pick in the NFL draft. It's the most important position — and when a player costs as much as the No. 1 pick, he better be the most important player in his team.

But while the 49ers spent the last three months deciding whether Alex Smith or Aaron Rodgers was most likely to be the next Steve Young, the incoming Hall of Famer had another view of his former team's future.

"I would not weigh it to-

wards a quarterback unless I knew I had a kid who could play 10 to 15 years and lead my team to championships," Young said. "This is a team that needs impact players, and I would weigh it towards a guy that I knew that would make the biggest impact for the 49ers over the years."

And that's just the problem for the 49ers, who earned the top pick in Saturday's draft by matching the worst record in franchise history at 2-14 last season under fired coach Dennis Erickson and general manager Terry Donahue.

While Smith and Rodgers

both are thought to be solid pro prospects, nobody is certain they'll be longtime stars. But with the NFL's eyes on them, the 49ers' new brain trust almost certainly will choose one of them anyway.

The 49ers have the troublesome top pick, but they also have the first picks in the second, third and fourth rounds. Nolan's goal is to land a starter

with each of his first three picks, bolstering his club's shoddy depth with every one of the 49ers' 12 draft choices, including four compensatory picks for departing free agents.

"Everybody talks about the No. 1 pick in the draft, but we have 11 other picks that are just as important," McCoughan said. "Whatever position we take with the first pick, whoever we take around that is going to have to help that guy out. Those other ones are going to be gigantic for this organization. That's the only way we're going to get back to where we need to get."

So teams with high picks want to trade out, although there are few takers.

"Just because you have the second pick in the draft doesn't mean it's a bad thing. It's time — and circumstances — whined. Nick Saban, the new Miami coach, who seems to want to trade the pick."

# Nonsensical MIT paper accepted for publication

BOSTON (AP) — Three MIT graduate students set out to show what kind of gobbledygook can pass muster at an academic conference these days, writing a computer program that generates fake nonsensical papers. And sure enough, a Florida conference took the bait.

The program, developed by students Jeremy Stribling, Max Krohn and Dan Aguayo, generated a paper with the dumfounding title: "Rooter: A Methodology for the Typical Unification of Access Points and Redundancy." Its introduction begins: "The authors would agree that, had it not been for active networks, the simulation of Lamport clocks might never have occurred."

The program works like the old "Mad Libs" books, generating sentences taken from real papers but leaving many words blank. It fills the blanks with random academic buzzwords. And it adds to the verbiage random mathematical charts and graphs.

Earlier this month, the students received word that the Ninth World Multi-Conference on Systemics, Cybernetics and Complexity, scheduled to take place in July in Orlando, Fla., had accepted the four-page "Rooter" paper. A second bogus submission — "The Influence of Probabilistic Methodologies on Complexity" — was rejected.

The offer of accepting a paper and inviting the students to present it in person in Orlando was rescinded after word of the hoax got out, and the students were refunded the fee to attend the conference and have the paper published.

But they still hope to go, using the more than \$2,000 raised in contributions to their grant, much of it from admirers who tested the program on the students' Web site.

"We wanted to go down there and give a randomly generated talk," Stribling said. E-mails to a conference address and to organizer Nagib Calloos were not immediately returned.

Stribling doubts the paper fooled anyone who read it, which keeps the hoax a notch below a 1996 prank in which physicist Alan Sokal persuaded a Duke University journal to publish his paper with a bogus article titled "Transgressing the Boundaries: Towards a Transformative Hermeneutics of Quantum Gravity."

Sokal's addition to mocking academic jargon, the pranks sheds light on what Stribling sees as a problem: conferences with low standards that pander to academics looking to pad their resumes, but which harm the reputations of more reputable gatherings.

"We certainly exposed this conference as being willing to publish any paper regardless of whether it's been peer-reviewed, which is kind of a dangerous precedent to set," Stribling said. "It's kind of dangerous to be able to pass anything off as scientific."

According to its Web site, the conference featured more than 2,900 papers last year, and a program for this year's event lists presentations by researchers from numerous universities, including highly respected ones like Northwestern and the University of Texas, as well as companies such as Intel Corp.

But the conference had apparently been targeted by pranksters before.

An Australian computer scientist, Justin Zobel, describes on his Web site three papers that were accepted without comment for the 2002 conference.

One submission tried unsuccessfully to sabotage itself by publishing a paper that said the method proposed "does not work at all."

## Farmers take out loans to meet water-call order

POCAHONTAS (AP) — Some groundwater irrigators are having to bet the farm to meet the state mandate requiring them to replace water they pump out of the Snake River aquifer so senior water-right holders can get all they're due.

The order issued by Department of Water Resources Director Karl Dreher on Wednesday requires junior water-right holders to replace the 133,400 acre feet of water they pump out of the Snake River Plain aquifer in eastern and southern Idaho. An acre-foot is the amount of water it takes to cover one acre of level ground with 12 inches of water.

The order means junior holders will have to arrange for replacement water if they want to keep irrigating their fields. They have until April 23 to present their plans to the state.

Dreher is to rule May 6 on whether their plans are acceptable.

Farmer Kevin Michaelson, who farms 2,000 acres near American Falls, is one of many groundwater irrigators who plan to take out 30-year loans to cover the cost of replacement water.

Michaelson has been paying about \$2,500 a year for water to irrigate his crops. He expects to pay about \$10,000 a year under Dreher's ruling.

"That hurt quite a few of us including me — it's hurt me big time — but we are on our way to providing water to the surface water users," Michaelson said. "I think we will be able to irrigate, but it's going to cost us a lot of money."

Groundwater pumpers have been negotiating to buy water from upper valley canal companies and high-left water-rights holders, many of whom have stopped irrigating because of the high cost of pumping water to elevated land.

Some pumpers are considering other options, such as leasing dry ground to another farmer or paying other farmers not to pump from the aquifer in exchange for rights to their water.

This summer, Michaelson will cut back his production of sugar beets and potatoes, which require a lot of water. Instead, he'll grow wheat, which tolerates drier conditions.

## Military convicts soldier for killing Boise man in Kuwait

FORT BRAGG, N.C. (AP) — An Army sergeant was convicted Thursday by a military jury of premeditated murder and attempted murder in the 1991 Shiite attack that killed two of his comrades — including a Boise man — and wounded 14 others in Kuwait during the opening days of the Iraq war.

Qasim Akbar, 34, now faces a possible death penalty, which the 15-member jury will consider at a hearing that begins Monday.

Prosecutors say Akbar told investigators he launched the attack because he was concerned U.S. troops would kill fellow Muslims in Iraq. They said he coolly carried out the attack to avenge his comrades' deaths.

The verdict came after 2.5 hours of deliberations following seven days of testimony in a court-martial — the first time since the Vietnam era that an American has been prosecuted on charges of murdering a fellow soldier during war.

Akbar stood at attention as the verdict was read by the colonel who headed the jury panel, but he hid his face, giving no other outward sign of emotion.

Defense attorneys acknowledged that Akbar carried out the attack, but argued he was too mentally ill to have premeditated the attack and was fueled by emotion.

Killed in the middle-of-the-night attack were Army Capt. Christopher Selfert, 27, who was shot in the back, and Air Force Maj. Gregory Stone, 40, of Boise, who suffered 13 shrapnel wounds. The 101st was preparing to move into Iraq in support of the U.S. invasion when the attack occurred in March 2003.

Qwest's latest bid of \$30 a share reflects their uncertainty in a deal in which MCI directors would have twice embraced Verizon over Qwest — could now be forced to accept a far higher offer.

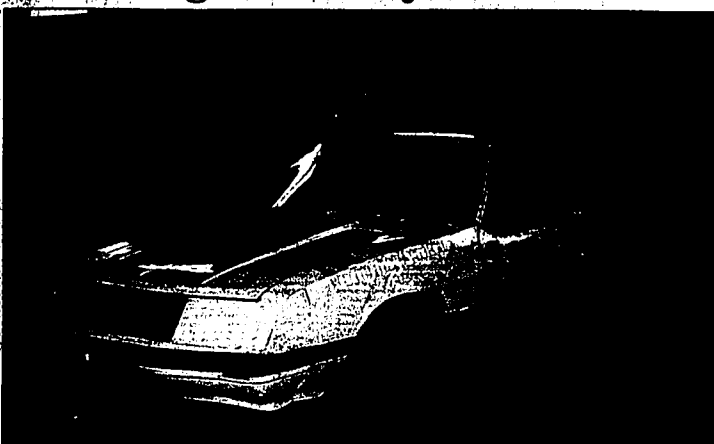
The Qwest bid consists of \$16 a share in cash — about \$2.50

Setting up to what was then the Winston Cup series All-time in 2003 presented a whole new challenge. Biffle was not an instant success this time.

Rookie year, Biffle won the July race at Texas but lost only five other top-10 finishes and would up an undistinguished season.

Next year, Biffle started slowly but came in the second half of the year to win races at Michigan and Homestead — the season finale — and moved up to 17th in the standings.

While everyone agreed he was a talented driver, Biffle has five top-10 finishes, including a victory in the first seven races of the season. He has lost Sunday night Sub-

stant 100 at Phoenix International Speedway by just 145 points.

But he's not alone against Biffle. The media and fans have doubted Biffle's ability to beat him. Johnson said he's been beat hand on the gas when

you're in a race with him, he's definitely going to be very aggressive, and that's not a bad thing. I'm not saying that in a negative way at all.

Biffle's truck and Busch titles were the first NASCAR championships for Roush. Now he has the opportunity to give the team owner his third straight Cup title, joining 2003 champ Matt Kenseth and retiring champion Rusty Wallace.

It takes two things to make these teams work," Roush said. "It takes a driver that can do it. It takes technology that is competitive and it takes a team that can."

The last two years have been frustrating

for the team at times, something that usually doesn't create a driver to his crew or team hierarchy.

The speculation has been that Biffle, in the final year of his contract, would not be rehired by Roush. He has been mentioned as the front-runner for just about every other possible ride next year.

But Biffle insists he isn't going anywhere. "Because I'm on a list to drive somebody else's car doesn't mean that they've talked to me," Biffle said.

Asked if that means he plans to stay with Roush's Ford team, Biffle said, "The absolute. There isn't any question about it and there hasn't been this year."
