Justices take on divisive issue by tackling parental notification law

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court said Monday it would take up a new abortion case this fall, raising the polluteal stakes just as the court faces the possibility of replacing alling Chief Justice William H. Rehnquist.

The justices, in agreeing to review a parental notification law the bijustices, in agreeing to review a parantal notification law from New Hampshire, showed suprising zeal to take on a divisive subject — especially considering the uncertainty of the courts future and the partisan fighting in the Senate over President Bush's nominees for federal Judgeships.

The last major Supreme Court abortion case splintered the justices 5-4. A similar split could occur again, with or without Rehnquist, with additional

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — The father of two children who have been missing for more than a week from a home where three people were killed is not a suspect in the case, even though he failed portions of a lie detector test, a sheriff's spokesman said Monday.



On Dec. 20, 1951, scientists at the INL site powered up a small nuclear reactor attached to four light bulbs. That experiment helped clear the way for devel-opment of peacetime nuclear

power plants.
"People do not realize the earthshaking events that happened in their back yard, by the people who lived next door," sald David Pennock, the museum's executive director.

The museum exhibit includes a model of a life-size reactor containment vessel, a building that envelops a nuclear reactor.


