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## Small wind farms take hit

### Regulators reduce the size eligible to sell electricity to Idaho Power

**BOISE** — One Magic Valley farmer envisions a small string of wind turbines on his property in the near future. Armand Eckert of Buhl still clings to his dream of having his small wind farm operational by year's end, despite a recent decision by the state utilities commission that may make similar ventures a little more challenging.

On Thursday, the Idaho Public Utilities Commission reduced the size limit for wind projects to qualify for a special rate with utilities such as Idaho

Power Co. In their order, commissioners decreased the limit from 10 megawatts to 100 kilowatts.

The order came in response to Idaho Power's request to temporarily suspend its obligation to enter into contracts with small wind power producers.

For Eckert, the news was bitter-sweet. The commission effectively grandfathered projects like Eckert's that are far enough along in the process. "I have mixed feelings," Eckert said. However, he said, "I think, in effect, it kills the small wind power generation projects."

## Crimson court?

### Roberts would be fifth Harvard law grad on U.S. Supreme Court

**BOSTON** — Black-robed for two centuries, the Supreme Court justices could be sporting a new color next term: crimson. That would be to honor Harvard Law School, which — if John Roberts is confirmed — could make an unprecedented boast: five of its graduates serving on the high court simultaneously. A sixth justice, Ruth Bader Ginsberg, attended Harvard Law but finished her degree at Columbia.

Some schools just have a knack for producing particular kinds of fame: Notre Dame's football players who went on to the pros, Follet Lora High School in California graduated two pitchers who threw perfect games for the New York Yankees. Ole Miss had consecutive Miss Americas in 1959 and 1960.

In Washington, a Yale graduate has occupied the White House since 1989, and the Roberts nomination, Harvard Law is poised to become the first law school with a count-majority (though most justices did not formally study law until the 20th century).

"I sort of like this friendly take-over," laughed Glenn Kagan, Harvard Law School's dean.

Some aren't persuaded it's good news.

"Where is the graduate of the University of Colorado law school, or the Ohio State law school?" said Kermit Hall, president of the University of Albany and a court scholar. He has no gripes with Harvard or its graduates per se. But he worries the pipeline to the Supreme Court is narrowing to those on the kind of career path Harvard Law grads excel at: judicial clerkship and judgeships, top jobs in big law firms or the government.

In many legal circles, Yale and Stanford have the stronger academic reputation, and both have been well represented on the court. But Harvard seems to have the most cache, a product of popular culture franchises like "The Paper Chase," "The Firm" and even "Legally Blonde" and a superior faculty that attracts many of the brightest and most ambitious. With nearly 1,800 full-time students, it also is considerably larger than either Yale or Stanford.

The result: 14 graduates have served on the high court (plus another four justices who attended), more than any other

### Wendell man's WWII-era mementos featured in Smithsonian magazine

**WENDELL** — It's been 60 years since Richard "Dick" Hagerman wrote to his "dearest briny marlin" that World War II had ended, but he has a lot of things to remind him of that day.

The letter and Hagerman's photo are featured in the August issue of Smithsonian magazine with a collection of stories from VJ Day.

Since then, Hagerman has gotten a bit of attention. "They made me a cover boy," Hagerman said. On issues sent to subscribers, his photo is on the front of the magazine. Newsstand issues have a must-



room cloud on the cover. "We've had a lot of fun with that so far," said his wife of 58 years, Dorothy "Dot" Hagerman, the "briny marlin" addressed in his letter. Richard has had phone calls

in Aschaffenburg, Germany, when fighting ended with Japan on Aug. 15, 1945.

Smithsonian magazine solicited VJ memories from its readers. Hagerman mailed a copy of the letter he wrote to his fiancée. His was the only letter featured in the text with a group of items from around the country.

Hagerman's letter is surprisingly well-preserved. He keeps many items from the era in plastic. The envelope still sports a bright orange air mail mark. Hagerman's handwriting is dark and slopes up toward the right.

Smithsonian asked him to share photos and memorabilia

## Schools check visitor IDs with offender database

**RATHDRUM** — Two northern Idaho school districts have installed new security systems that will check visitors' photos and identification against registries of convicted sex offenders in Idaho and 41 other states.

Beginning this fall, visitors to schools in the Lakeland and Post Falls districts will be required to present a state driver's license or a state-issued photo identification card to school employees, who will then use an optical scanner to check names, photographs and birth dates against a database of registered sex offenders in 42 states.

Eight states — Oregon, Nevada, Hawaii, North Dakota, Missouri, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania and Maryland — do not compile their state sex offender registries with enough unique identifying information

to be searched by the software system marketed by Texas-based Rapitor Technologies, according to company officials.

If the system finds a match, the registered offender's picture appears on a computer screen along with a flashing red message. Cell-phone text messages notifying school administrators and local law enforcement officers of a sex offender on premises can also automatically be sent by the system.

"School districts are trying to provide safe learning environments for their children," Ron Schmidt, assistant superintendent of Lakeland School District in Rathdrum, northwest of Coeur d'Alene, told the Spokesman-Review newspaper. "This is one more way to ensure that."

**EVENDALE, Ohio** — John Dyer went home and prayed after hearing on the radio that Marine from his 19-year-old son's battalion had been killed. "Is he dead?" Dyer asked the pair of Marines on his doorstep. With a nod from one, his world went blank.

Lance Cpl. Christopher Dyer and eight other Marines from Columbus' 25th Marine Company were among 14 killed Wednesday in the deadliest roadside bombing of U.S. troops in Iraq.

"It's a terrible thing wishing that it can be someone else's tragedy," John Dyer said Thursday at his home in suburban Cincinnati.

The news came two days after the same battalion that the Lima Company is part of — 3rd Battalion, 25th Marines — lost five other members in

## Illegal immigrants clash with locals on Long Island

FARMINGVILLE, N.Y. — This middle-class Long Island community an hour from New York City and 2,000 miles from the Mexican border has become an unlikely flashpoint in the national debate over illegal immigration, with Hispanics beaten, harassed and evicted in recent weeks.

For more than a decade, immigrants from Mexico or Central America have been drawn to Long Island by the prospect of jobs. Many stand on street corners in Farmingville, waiting for contractors, landscapers and others to offer them a day's work at about \$10 an hour. At night they go back to their illegally overcrowded single-family homes.

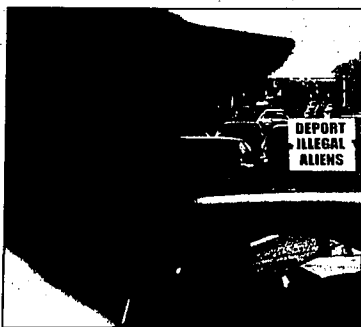
The immigrants, many of whom are believed to have entered the country illegally, have been source of tension among longtime residents since at least the late 1990s, but things have gotten worse this summer — so bad that the head of the Mexican Consulate in New York City said Farmingville was "clearly a red zone after the Arizona border" in the abuse of immigrants.

In late June, two men were charged with a hate crime for allegedly burning a Hispanic woman and her husband as the couple backed their van out of a parking lot. Within weeks, two more were arrested and accused of yelling racial epithets and throwing a beer bottle at a Hispanic day laborer.

On the same day, four people demonstrating at a 7-Eleven in support of day laborers were arrested when they surrounded an anti-immigration supporter's car and refused to let him out.

Police are also investigating an attack in nearby Patchogue on a 61-year-old Ecuadoran man. He was beaten by three men who supposedly asked if he had a green card.

The tension was ratcheted up in mid-June when officials in the town of Brookhaven, which includes Farmingville, and Suffolk County police began evicting men from crowded houses, citing health violations. Dozens of people were jammed into the

tiny one-family homes.

So far, at least six houses have been shut by authorities — including three “last Friday” — leaving more than 100 men homeless, advocates said.

Advocates claimed the immigrants have been thrown into the streets without warning. “Many local officials have pun-

ted, saying this is a federal issue and we can't do anything about it. Well, there are some things you can do,” Suffolk County Executive Steve Lony responded. “Crack down on these contractors, crack down on illegal housing and create a better relationship with immigration officials.”

Lony complained that it is the Mexican government's “failed policies, both economically and otherwise, that have been pushing millions of his residents over the border for a better life in America.”

Arturo Sarukhan, head of the Mexican Consulate in New York City, agreed that Mexico needs to solve its economic problems so that its citizens do not leave for a better life in America. But he said officials on Long Island must realize “that the day laborers are here to stay and there is a need to work together.”

“At the end of the day, they may or may not like it, but it is the reality,” he said. A spokeswoman for the Town

of Brookhaven estimated there are 150 houses, each with dozens of unauthorized illegal workers. In Farmingville, though some landlords have preemptively evicted some tenants for fear of trouble with the law.

“If they're going to throw anybody out of an apartment, they have to give them time,” said Carlos Turicó, a 26-year-old day laborer from Mexico City who has been in Farmingville for about nine months. “These people are not the cause of the problem.”

Farmingville saw immigration-related violence a few years ago. In 2000, two Mexican men were beaten by two locals who promised them work. On the fourth of July 2003, a Mexican family barely escaped with their lives after teens set their house ablaze by shooting fireworks through a window. But tensions appeared to ease after three of the assailants were sent to prison — two of them for 25 years to life. Residents are largely cheering the crackdown on immigrants.

“I think they are doing a terrific job,” said Turry Sherwood, who complained that residents in the jammed houses often drink late into the night and urinate and defecate on lawns and backyards. “I don't care who they are, what color they are. I don't care where they come from. Why should people have to live this way?”

Lisa Marino placed a Mexican flag on her front lawn in solidarity with the workers but also applauded efforts by officials to curb illegal housing.

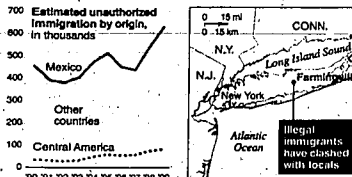
“There's a lack of assimilation,” she said of the workers. “You don't leave garbage on your lawn, you don't whistle at neighbors. You need to understand that, but by keeping them marginalized they don't learn that.”

Nadia Marin-Molina, an advocate for the day laborers, understands the concerns expressed by neighbors, but insisted “it's a two-way street.”

“Some of these same people who are complaining are the people who benefit from the work these guys do,” she said. “Because every house has landscaping done, or has to have some job done on their roof, or some painting done.”

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## NASA clears Discovery for re-entry

SPACE CENTER, Houston — After much soul-searching and analysis, NASA cleared Discovery to return to Earth next week, including Thursday, after there was no need to send the astronauts out on another spacewalk to repair a torn thermal blanket near a cockpit window.

Mission managers could not guarantee that a piece of the blanket won't rip off during re-entry and slide into the spacecraft, but they said the chance of that happening was remote and that it would be riskier to try to fix the problem.

“The lowest risk, the best choice and the unanimous decision of the engineers in the management team is that we should re-enter as is,” deputy shuttle program manager Wayne Hale said in a news conference.

NASA had been considering sending the astronauts out to snip away part of the blanket for fear a 15-inch section weighing just under an ounce could tear away during the latter stages of descent and strike the shuttle, perhaps causing grave danger.

More charges filed in leak of classified info  
WASHINGTON — Two former employees of a pro-Israel lobbying organization were charged Thursday with conspiring to obtain and disclose classified U.S. defense information for five years.

A five-count indictment unsealed in U.S. District Court in Alexandria, Va., named Edward Turner, formerly the director of foreign policy issues for the American Israel Public Affairs

Committee, and Keith Weissman, the organization's former senior Iran analyst.

The charges follow the indictment in June of Pentagon analyst Lawrence A. Franklin, who is accused of leaking classified military information to an Israeli official and the AIPAC employees.

The lengthy FBI investigation that led to Thursday's charges has been closely followed in Washington, where AIPAC is an influential interest group. The case also has served as a reminder of a tense time in U.S.-Israeli relations: the 1985 spy scandal.

### Chief Justice Rehnquist returns to hospital

WASHINGTON — Chief Justice William H. Rehnquist, was taken to the hospital with a fever on Thursday, the second emergency treatment for the 80-year-old ailing justice in two months.

Rehnquist, who has cancer, had been taken to ambulance to Virginia Hospital Center in Arlington, Va., in July and admitted for observation and tests.

Supreme Court spokesman Ed Turner said Rehnquist returned to the same hospital “for evaluation” after developing a fever on Thursday.

Rehnquist had been working at the court earlier in the day and has maintained a full-time schedule while being treated for thyroid cancer.

He has refused to release specific details about his illness, but in July he released a statement pledging to remain on the job.

“I want to put to rest the speculation and unfounded rumors of my imminent retirement,” he said then, the day he was released after two days in the hospital. “I will continue to perform my duties as chief justice as long as my health permits.”

Al-Jaafari unveils Iraqi security plan

BAGHDAD, Iraq — The Iraqi government on Thursday announced an ambitious plan for improved border protection and intelligence gathering and for the formation of an elite Iraqi force to prepare the embattled country for an eventual drawdown of American troops.

Iraqi Prime Minister Ibrahim al-Jaafari's announcement of the 12-point security program follows a particularly bloody week for U.S. forces battling Sunni Muslim insur-

gents in western Iraq. At least 24 Marines have been killed in action in the last week, underscoring the sophistication and persistence of an enemy that fledging Iraqi forces are so far unable to combat on their own.

Al-Jaafari said multinational forces would stay in Iraq.

"The multinational forces have a role to play. If not, we would have already asked them to leave," al-Jaafari told a news conference in Baghdad. The security plan "is an entirely Iraqi plan, with an Iraqi perspective, Iraqi timing and an Iraqi way of dealing with matters."

Iraq's premier offered few details on the 12-point security plan.

One of the cornerstones of the plan is better coordination among Iraq's intelligence agencies. Among the other measures is the formation of an elite Iraqi quick-reaction force, the creation of a War Information Office to counter insurgent propaganda, and increased security along Iraq's borders — especially with Syria, Saudi Arabia and Iran — to staunch the flow of insurgents and weapons.

Al-Qaida's No. 2 man threatens attacks

CAIRO, Egypt — Al-Qaida's No. 2, Ayman al-Zawahiri, threatened more destruction in London, saying in a videotape broadcast Thursday that British Prime Minister Tony Blair would be to blame.

Al-Zawahiri also threatened the United States with tens of thousands of military dead if it does not withdraw its troops from Iraq immediately.

In Crawford, Texas, President Bush dismissed the threat, saying, "We will stay on the offense against these people. They're terrorists and they're killers and they will kill innocent people... so they can impose their dark vision on the world."

The tape, aired on the pan-Arab satellite channel Al-Jazeera, was delivered exactly one month after the July 7 bombings in London that killed 56 people. In excerpts aired by Al-Jazeera, al-Zawahiri did not directly claim that al-Qaida carried out the July 7 London attacks.

But he brought the July 7 attacks under al-Qaida's wing and depicted the terror network as still capable of delivering strikes around the world despite arrests in Europe and blows against its leadership in Pakistan and Afghanistan.

He presented the attacks as a result of Blair's decision to deploy troops in Iraq.

Blair has brought to you destruction in central London, and he will bring more of that, God willing," al-Zawahiri said in the broadcast excerpts.

Al-Zawahiri, an Egyptian doctor who merged his militant faith with that of al-Qaida leader Osama bin Laden in Afghanistan in the late 1990s, spoke with a Kalashnikov rifle propped up behind his right shoulder against a plain background.

He has been in hiding since the United States invaded Afghanistan in late 2001.

In June, Al-Jazeera broadcast a videotape of al-Zawahiri disparaging the U.S. concept of reform in the Middle East and saying armed jihad was the only way to bring change in the Arab world.

Bahir Hoorzook of the media relations department in Al-Jazeera, said Al-Jazeera received the latest tape Thursday. "It was left at one of our offices and we got it from there," he said, refusing to say which office received it. The network aired about 10 percent of the tape, he said.

The parts that weren't broadcast were "the usual rhetoric, speaking about the occupation of Islamic lands and other things that we did not find newsworthy," he said.

In the excerpts, al-Zawahiri warned the United States it could expect significantly more casualties from its military campaigns in Iraq and Afghanistan.

"As for you, the Americans, what you have seen in New York and Washington, what losses that you see in Afghanistan and Iraq, despite the media blackout, is merely the losses of the initial clashes," he said.

"If you go on with the same policy of aggression against Muslims, you will see, with God's will, what will make you forget the horrible things in Vietnam and Afghanistan."

He said the Bush administration was repeating the "same lies they said in Vietnam... that they are bringing freedom."

"There is no way out of Iraq without immediate withdrawal, and any delay on this means only more dead, more losses," he said.

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# A-bomb on Hiroshima saved American lives

Sixty years ago this month Aug. 6, Hiroshima, Japan, became the first target of an atomic bomb, with Nagasaki the second target three days later. Thus, a war that lasted four years was ended in four days.

To those who decry the devastation caused by President Truman's decision to develop and detonate this awesome weapon, I remind them of the lives saved, hot hot.

I'm very proud of the fact that my uncle was not only a member of the Enola Gay that dropped "Little Boy" on Hiroshima, the first atomic bomb in history, but he was actually the bombardier. The bottom line, as my uncle said many times, was that he slept well at night knowing that he helped save more lives than he killed by bringing the war to a sudden halt.

The late Tom Ferbee, a native of Mocksville, N.C., was an Army Air Force lieutenant, hand-picked for a highly secret mission by pilot Paul Tibbets Jr., to be part of the Enola-Gay's 12-man crew.

Debate still swirls around the exhibit of the rebuilt Enola Gay at a Smithsonian museum near Dulles International Airport near Washington, mostly by liberals awash in shame that the United States of America would wreak such damage upon the population of Hiroshima. Never do they show remorse that the Imperial Japanese bombed Pearl Harbor in a sneak attack that got us into World War II.

In a story I wrote years ago about my uncle's participation, here's what I said:

He quietly answers accusations that he must feel guilty with "all that blood on your hands," responding firmly that

he has never tossed and turned in his sleep, never second-guessed his country's decision and knows in his heart he was responsible for saving thousands, probably hundreds of thousands of lives — American lives.

How do real Americans, that is, those outside the confines of political Washington, feel about Ferbee? Let's take a look at a celebration in Mocksville in 1991 in which the town erected a marker to its famous son.

A local news story of the occasion, unembellished with political nuances, read in part: "Ferbee changed the world when he launched the first atomic bomb on Hiroshima, Japan, August 6, 1945. A second atom bomb was dropped by a different crew on Nagasaki on August 9, Japan surrendered on August 10 and World War II ended."

The marker erected at the city limits simply reads: "Family Home Site of Colonel Thomas W. Ferbee, Bombardier on the Enola Gay, Dropped Atomic Bomb on Hiroshima, Japan, August 6, 1945."

To refute today's politically correct critics, perhaps it should also have some fine print explaining the stark fact that the action saved 30,000 American lives, the "low ball" estimate by revisionists, or up to 1 million, if you value the judgment of those who participated in the decision to drop the bomb. It also saved 100,000 Allied prisoners of war.

Why? Because Tokyo was ordered that at the very moment the U.S. invaded Japan, these 100,000 POWs were to be

stabbed, shot, beheaded or otherwise slaughtered. But Hiroshima and Nagasaki changed all that.

Let's pick up the rest of the story at Ferbee's hometown celebration as reported by Susan Shinn in the Salisbury, N.C., Post in 1991:

"Several hundred Davie Countians turned out to honor their native son Monday with a parade at town square and the dedication of a marker at Ferbee's homeplace on U.S. 64. ..."

"And Ferbee brought his best friends: Brig. Gen. Paul W. Tibbets, pilot of the Enola Gay; its navigator, Maj. Theodore (Dutch) Van Kirk; and Col. Harry Boothie. No one here can imagine how proud I am to be here," Ferbee said. "You people have remembered me. I am happy to have three of my best friends here with me."

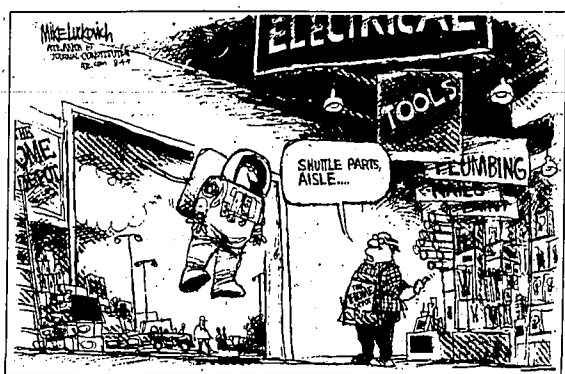
"The men worked together 10 and a half months before their mission. Tom put the bomb where it belonged," Tibbets said. "What we did that day as a crew changed the nature of wartime forever. ..."

"If I could pick a brother, I'd pick Tom Ferbee."

"Someone once said war is hell. Kill or be killed. Even Japanese survivors at Hiroshima have said that "if Japan had the bomb, it might have used it in a worse way." Others have said, "We need to admit the crimes committed by Japan before we can ask for an apology from the United States."

Atrocities? The Bataan death march. Guadalcanal. Iwo Jima. Those are names for Americans to remember, but most of all, Pearl Harbor.

Windmills pay property taxes, too, with no environmental or human health hazards. Sempra has stated it will sell its power to the Northwest. If we develop wind power as a community, we'll have all we need at a cheaper rate and can sell the excess to the Northwest without needing a big shovel for the elephant in our living room. Zigich, of Twin Falls, was 18 when he and four other firefighters were killed June 21, 2002, when their 15-passenger Ford van rolled over. The others killed were Betha Shirley, 19, of La Grande, Ore., Daniel Rama, 28, and Bartholomew Bailey, 20, both of Baker City, Ore., and Jake Wintdale, 20, of Boise.

Those killed were among 11 firefighters from Idaho and Oregon riding in the van on their way to battle the Hayman wildfire in Colorado.

The families of the five who were killed and three more who were injured, including Brandon Fiola of Twin Falls, took Ford Motor Company to court in Multnomah County District Court in Portland. The parties reached an out of court settlement on April 4, just one week prior to a scheduled trial.

# Office pay draws questions

## Heyburn officials wrangle over salary fairness

HEYBURN — Across-the-board raises of 3 percent for city employees were approved at a special July 29 meeting of the Heyburn City Council.

Council members wrangled over the raises, resulting in a 2-2 vote broken by Mayor George Anderson. The split arose over pay rates for some workers in the city office.

Salaries of \$17 to \$20 per hour for secretaries "is pretty high in an office" while city workers who tell outdoors in the hunt make \$12, Councilwoman Cleo Gallegos said. "Our office (staff) is paid very, very well. We're putting office workers way above the guys in the field."

Gallegos advocated a salary cap for some city positions.

Councilman Dee Jay Bailey also cast his vote against the blanket raises, saying he was in

favor of raises based on merit.

However, Councilmen Rocky Baker and Roger Denker voted for the across-the-board raises.

"We're asking our office (workers) to do a lot of stuff," said Baker, adding that he didn't see how the council could grant raises to seven-eighths of city staff and not the other eighth.

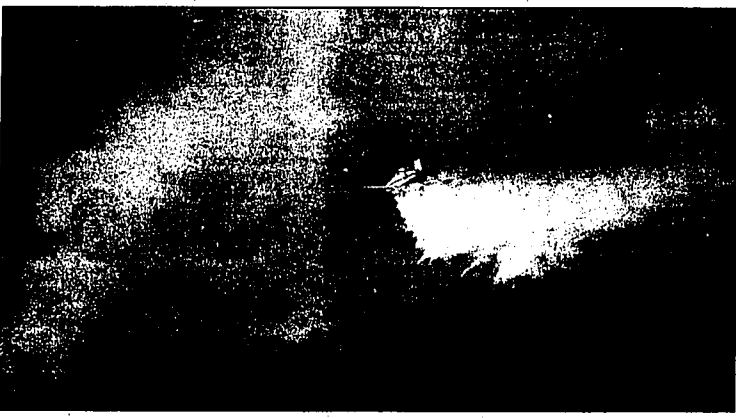
With the council members deadlocked, Mayor George Anderson cast the deciding vote in favor of the raises.

"Leaving one or two off (the list for a raise), you're not going to destroy the budget, but it will destroy people," he said.

"The council did approve two exceptions to the across-the-board raises. The lowest-paid person in the police department was given an 11 percent merit raise, and the lowest-paid city worker was given a 6 percent raise to bring her pay up to match her responsibilities, Anderson said."

## Police celebrate firearm auction success

TWIN FALLS — After waiting nearly ten years, it was over in a matter of about six hours.

Those six hours made for a very long day, said Sgt. Mark Marvin of the Twin Falls Police Department. For 14 buyers and three other nonbuyers, the police firearm auction was an almost intimate affair. Buyers showed up from local pawn shops and from as far away as Florida.

Marvin said the preliminary results showed gross sales of between \$26,000 and \$27,000. The

final tally, which won't be available for about a week, minus all fees, will go into the city's general fund.

Sales ranged from \$750 for an 1894 Marlin lever action, 25-20-caliber rifle to \$25 for some of the more basic guns, Marvin said.

"Every gun sold and everything went well," Marvin said. He was very pleased with the way Hunt Brothers set up the auction and conducted the sale of the guns.

Red's Trading Post manager, Ryan Horsley, also was pleased with the auction. Other than that he didn't get all the guns he

set out to buy.

"But the fact of the matter is, the city wins," he said.

One of the things Horsley didn't plan on was how he was going to transport the guns.

"Just throw them in the back of my Jeep, where in Idaho," Horsley said. "Even if they get confiscated, we can just buy them back next year."

At about 25 percent of Horsley's purchases were "lower-end" guns, guns most dealers weren't interested in.

However, Horsley's opinions is that even though they are somewhat cheaper guns, they do fit the needs of some who

cannot afford to buy the "higher-end" guns.

Some things that some people consider junk, other people collect, Horsley said. He did find several treasures among the 58 he "finally" bought. One "piece" turned especially good for him.

Horsley bought an old Sears IG Higgins bolt-action shotgun. What people don't know is that Sears issued a recall for the bolt. Horsley said they will pay \$160. Horsley got the shotgun for \$50.

# Pena hearing shapes up

RUPERT — The arraignment of Rupert attorney Raymond G. Pena on three new felony charges — procurement of prostitution has been postponed.

Originally set for Aug. 1, arraignment is now scheduled for 1:30 p.m. Aug. 29 in 6th District Court in Rupert. The case is being heard by

retired Judge William H. Woodland of the 6th Judicial District in Pocatello.

Woodland also will hear prosecutors' motions and defense motions at that time, but as of Tuesday no new motions had been filed with the court.

A motion likely to be heard will be a prosecution motion to consolidate into one case the three new charges with an earlier felony count pending against Pena. Minidoka County Prosecuting Attorney Jason Walker said in July that such a motion would likely be filed.

Pena, 47, was indicted in June by a Minidoka County grand jury on the three new charges. He is accused of reducing legal fees for female clients in exchange for sexual services.

He also was indicted in February on two other procurement of prostitution charges. One of those counts was dismissed in June and the other was reduced to a lesser charge of attempted procure-

ment of prostitution. Procurement of prostitution is punishable in Idaho by a fine ranging from \$1,000 to \$50,000 and imprisonment from two to 20 years. Attempted procurement is punishable by half those amounts.

For example, a "patronizing a prostitute" statute makes it a misdemeanor to offer a fee to a prostitute. The crime, however, becomes a felony upon a third conviction.

Red Cross closes Lewiston office

LDS church excommunicates author involved in DNA debate

SALT LAKE CITY — The Australian author who wrote that DNA evidence fails to support the ancestral claims outlined in the Book of Mormon has been excommunicated by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.

After a three-hour disciplinary council meeting on Sunday in Canberra, Australia, Simon Southerton, author of Losing a Lost Tribe: Native Americans, DNA and the Book of Mormon" was informed his relationship with his religion of 35 years would be officially severed.

Southerton said in an e-mail to The Associated Press. Southerton was charged by church authorities with adultery but finally excommunicated for "having an inappropriate relationship with a woman," he said.

Southerton accused the relationship, which occurred two years ago, while he was separated from his wife. "The Southertons have since reconciled, and I have been readmitted (to the church) on behalf of her husband."

Southerton said he refused to discuss his personal life with church leaders on Sunday, instead asking them why he wasn't answering to charges of apostasy for having widely published on the Internet and in his book his doubts about the church and his beliefs about DNA science.

Church leaders responded that he was evading the issue of apostasy and that the charge they were investigating

was more important. "I am now convinced that they were intent on seeking a council on the charge of apostasy," Southerton said in his e-mail to the AP. "I was clearly instructed before the meeting that if I attempted to talk about DNA and my apostasy that the council would be immediately shut down and that it would be completed in my absence."

A former church bishop, Southerton voluntarily left the Mormon church seven years ago after deciding he could no longer believe some of its teachings.

His book, published in 2004, outlines how existing DNA data for American Indians does not support the Mormon beliefs that the continent's earliest inhabitants were descendants of Israelite patriarch Lehi.

The church teaches that Lehi was an ancient seafarer who came to the New World about 600 B.C., according to church founder Joseph Smith's 1830 Book of Mormon. Smith claimed to have translated the text from inscribed gold plates unearthed from an upstate New York hillside. His book is viewed by many members as a literal record of God's dealings with early Americans.

Australian church authorities have discussed the book at length with Southerton, who works as a plant geneticist for the Commonwealth Scientific and Industrial Research Organization and believes that concerns about his writing are the underlying reason they sought his excommunication.

"I also told church leaders that it was extremely unusual for the church to pursue some-

one who hadn't had anything to do with the church for the last seven years," Southerton wrote.

Southerton plans to appeal the decision to the Mormon church's Salt Lake City-based leaders, known as the First Presidency.

Mormon church officials do not comment on the decisions of local church leaders, church spokesman Scott Trotter said Thursday.

If Southerton appeals, the First Presidency (rumor has it would have several courses of action, Trotter said. Church President Gordon B. Hinckley and his two advisers could agree with the decision, modify it or send it back to Australian church leaders for a rehearing.

That process "takes some time," Trotter said.

Ultimately, if the decision stands, Southerton's name will be removed from the official church rolls in Salt Lake City.

Southerton's excommunication makes him the seventh author from the Salt Lake City-based Signature Books, a publishing house for Western and Mormon studies, to be released from the church after publishing a work critical of Mormon beliefs.

Signatures managing director, Ron Fiddis, called the decision "unfortunate" for Simon and his family. "I agree with Southerton's contention that a subset of his excommunication is the author's public use of science to challenge church beliefs."

"We just wish there was a more open, healthier climate for the discussion of matters of science and religion," Fiddis said.

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Hybrid vehicles score California car pool lanes

LOS ANGELES — Hybrid car owners who have waited months to drive solo in California car pool lanes should soon get their chance.

State lawmakers passed a bill last year that gave some types of the high-mileage, low-emission vehicles access to the coveted lanes — a perk meant to encourage drivers to buy them.

But while California law was supposed to take effect Jan. 1, it first needed approval from the federal government.

With that permission tucked into a \$286 billion transportation bill that Congress passed last week, only one last strand of red tape is keeping hybrids out of high-occupancy vehicle lanes. State air regulators still need to clarify which vehicles meet mileage and low-emissions standards.

The poll's supporters hope hybrids will be allowed in the lanes by year's end.

"Knowing that you're able to drive in that car pool lane would be huge, and they would attract others to say 'Hey, I should have a car like this as well,'" said Andrew Werts, a 31-year-old marketing director from Redondo Beach, who recently sold his SUV and bought a Toyota Prius.

Only two other models — Honda's hybrid Civic and Insight — meet eligibility standards of getting at least 45 miles per gallon and producing 200 or fewer grams of carbon emissions, according to an aide to the author of California's bill, Assemblywoman Fran Pavley.

Debra Hill, a spokeswoman for California Air Resources Board attorneys are reviewing the bills to determine officially which vehicles will qualify, said spokeswoman Gretchen Panove.

Solo drivers in hybrids that don't meet those standards would remain stuck in the regular lanes.

Hybrids get better mileage by supplementing gas with electricity harnessed from energy during braking and coasting, but some are more efficient than others.

California will become the second state to allow hybrids into the car pool lane. Virginia enacted the change in 2000, and Arizona, Connecticut, Georgia and Minnesota are considering it.

In Virginia, some drivers complain that the crush of new cars has slowed on-speedy commutes. Some California hybrid drivers say they understand the argument that they don't deserve the same advantage as car poolers.

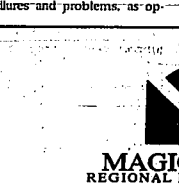

# Plane crash risk left out of Yucca plan, staff says

**WASHINGTON (AP)** - The Energy Department left out risk factors related to potential airplane crashes and hazards at the Yucca Mountain nuclear waste dump in planning for the project, nuclear regulatory staff told the agency in a memo released Thursday.  
The department undercounted the number of Air Force plane crashes at the site in Nevada during the 1990s, and discounted the possibility of jetisoned ordnance, bombs hitting planes and cruise missile testing at the Nevada Test Site, the memo by the Nuclear Regulatory Commission staff said.  
The Energy Department also made an unsupported assumption that airplanes that malfunction outside the no-fly zone would never enter the zone and crash into the dump, the memo said.  
The memo relates to aircraft failures and problems, as opposed to potential terrorist attacks, at the proposed dump site 90 miles northwest of Las Vegas. It was written as part of the consultation between the Energy Department and the Nuclear Regulatory Commission so the department prepares a license application to operate the dump.  
An accompanying cover letter says the NRC has concluded its review of aircraft hazard issues at Yucca Mountain, but that the issues outlined in the memo remain unresolved.  
"DOE should note that it may need to address some or all of these items in a potential (license application), depending on the final aircraft hazard analysis approach used," says the letter signed by Lawrence E. Kozalko, deputy director of the division of high-level waste repository safety at the NRC's Office of Nuclear Material Safety and Safeguards.

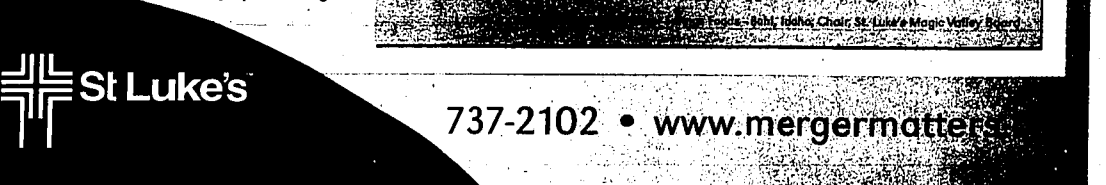

**SALT LAKE CITY (AP)** — State Sen. Chris Butters is thinking again about making teachers teach divine or intelligent design as an alternative to evolution.

He said he will meet with education officials next week to inquire about discussions of evolution and humans in public schools.

Meanwhile, the state Office of Education is preparing a position statement on teaching evolution and its already-established place in the state curriculum. The statement will come before the State Board of Education in September, state education director Brett Moulding told the Deseret Morning News.

Intelligent design is based on the idea that life is too complex to be explained solely by evolution.

"Teaching both intelligent design and evolution appears to get some backing from President Bush on Monday when he spoke with Texas reporters. He said he believes in a position governor, he said. "I felt like both sides ought to be properly taught."

"I love it," Butters, R-West Jordan, said of the president's statement. "I believe the president believes exactly as I do. I believe he believes in God, and

the story found in the scriptures. We are children of God and created in His image. We didn't wait for some ape to evolve."

But his main concern is whether students are being taught humans evolved from other species.

The state high school biology course curriculum includes the theory that "Earth's present-day species developed from earlier species," and that "evolution is related to their environment. One of its five standards is 'students will understand that biological diversity is a result of evolutionary processes.'"

It doesn't specifically mention anything about humans evolving from apes.

But Butters says a handful of parents in the past year have told him that's what their children have been taught in school.

"This really bugs me," Butters said. "I don't want it taught, the evolution of humans, as fact. It's not fact. It's a theory, with holes you can drive a truck through. The missing link's still missing, and so is the rest of the chain."

Butters believes that if students are taught that humans evolved from ape-like ancestors they also ought to be taught the theory of intelligent design.

"You shouldn't try to tell to talk and look at this," Butters said. "I want to see the whole picture."

Moulding said intelligent design has no place in the state course curriculum.

"Evolution is one of the fundamental principles around which biology is organized. It's necessary students understand those concepts in order to address the sciences."

Moulding said.

"We're entering an increasingly global society and the economy that has sprung forth requires doubling numbers of individuals with backgrounds in science, and they need to be taught science," he said.

Earlier this year, Butters raised the possibility of legislation to require teaching of intelligent design. But he said last month that he had decided to drop it after talks with the state Superintendent of Public Instruction Paul Harrington.

"She assured me in a phone call and then followed up with a letter that she would not be teaching human evolution of any kind," Butters said at that time.

## Search resumes for Utah Scout who's been missing for a year

**SALT LAKE CITY (AP)** — Seventeen hundred volunteers returned Thursday to Utah's rugged Uinta Mountains for the final search for a 12-year-old Boy Scout who has been missing for more than a year.

Garrett Bardsley disappeared Aug. 20, 2004, near Carbant Lake. His father, a 12-year-old to camp, just 150 yards away, to change his wet shoes and socks. The boy and his father were among 10 Scouts and a half dozen adults who had been camping at the site since the day before.

The search about 60 miles east of Salt Lake City is expected to last through Saturday, and the boy's father, Kevin Bardsley, said he was thankful for the people who showed up Thursday.

"People are there because they want to be there, and a lot of them I don't even know," he

told Salt Lake City television station KSTU.

Search organizer Steve Wilson said the area being searched is as rough as any part of the United States.

There are three 11,000-foot peaks within one mile of Carbant Lake, and within a 1-1/2 miles there are five more such peaks.

The volunteers will comb a four-mile radius from Carbant Lake, and the Utah Department of Public Safety's dive rescue team planned to explore three high-altitude lakes. The sheriff's office also invited high-angle rescue teams from other counties to explore ledges, cliffs and steep faces.

Most of the search costs are being paid by donations of food and money.

Summit County Sheriff Dave Edmunds said at the search site Thursday. He has said although

Garrett's case won't close until he is found, the sheriff's office probably won't make another large search effort this year.

Edmunds said the terrain where searchers are working is "rougher than the area where another missing Scout, Brennan Hawkins, was rescued in June."

Another Scout, 15-year-old Paul Ostler, was killed at Camp Steiner in the Uinta Mountains on Tuesday night by a lightning strike. Three other scouts were injured.

# Deputies search for backcountry vandal

OROFINO (AP) — Police in north-central Idaho have stepped up their search for a man they believe may be trying to prompt an armed confrontation with law enforcement in the backcountry.

The Clearwater County Sheriff's department is searching for David Pruss, 34, who is believed to be living in the timber-covered mountains near the logging community of Welpee, 18 miles west of Orofino. A warrant has been issued for his arrest, charging malice destruction of property and burglary.

Pruss is being investigated in a series of crimes including using a high-powered rifle to shoot idled logging equipment, electrical transformers, telecommunications equipment and a small hydrogenerator on Jim Ford Creek near Welpee. He's also suspected in connection with a string of home burglaries in the area where small items and food were taken.

"We have crimes scattered over about six weeks," Clearwater County Sheriff's Sgt. of investigations Mitch Jarred told the Lewiston Tribune newspaper.

"He is a suspect in lots of them, but we can't say for sure he is involved in all of them."

Wednesday police asked for any tips on Pruss' whereabouts after posting fliers with Pruss' picture on them in Welpee and nearby areas. Jarred said Pruss is believed to have ties to constitutionalist groups, may be involved in eco-terrorism and is considered armed and dangerous.

"He supposedly has made statements that he would like to shoot one of our deputies at random," said Jarred.

Since the vandalized hydrogenerator was part of a federally funded program, the FBI has assisted Clearwater County authorities in researching Pruss' background, but is not involved in the actual search, Jarred said.

Pruss has been living in the woods around Welpee for the past year and usually travels on foot or by bicycle. Jarred said police believe he carries multiple weapons.

Pruss is described as 5 feet, 6 inches tall, about 155 pounds, with brown hair and hazel eyes. Police are asking people to report any sightings of Pruss.

# Searchers look for missing park ranger

DENVER — More than 100 searchers and five dogs combed a remote and rugged corner of Rocky Mountain National Park on Thursday, a day after they heard a gunshot and radio signals that may have come from a ranger missing nearly a week.

Jeff Christensen, 31, was last seen by co-workers July 29 when he left on a routine backcountry patrol in the Mummy Range, in the northwest part of the park and about 65 miles northwest of Denver. The search began after he failed to report for work Saturday.

Park spokesman David Eaker said rangers fired a gun Wednesday in a standard search procedure and then heard a gunshot, possibly in a response. They also heard clicking noises on their two-way radios, which may have been someone trying to communicate from a spot where the terrain blocked voice transmission.

"Our hopes have been raised and encouraged by this," Eaker said. "We hope this isn't a hoax. We really believe this could be Jeff."

It is illegal for civilians to carry firearms in the park, but rangers are authorized to do so.

Park officials also said visitors had reported seeing smoke in the area, and no lightning strikes had been reported there.

The search, across 26 square miles, was complicated by low clouds and rain that kept helicopters grounded. Peaks in the Mummy Range reach 13,560 feet above sea level.

Christensen, a ranger for four seasons, is an experienced mountaineer who works as a ski patroller at the nearby Winter Park resort in the winter.

Park officials said he was carrying a radio and a backpack equipped with various gear, though he hadn't been planning to spend the night in the backcountry when he left.

"We feel he would have waked out by now if he was able. We feel he's injured," said his mother, Chris Christensen, on Wednesday.

She and Christensen's father, Dale Christensen, arrived in Colorado Tuesday from their home in Forest Lake, Minn. They said they believed the best they could hope for was that their son had a broken leg and was waiting to be rescued.

"He's very strong in what he does. He's good. He's been doing backcountry trips since college," Dale Christensen said.

# Report: Escape routes inadequate in deadly wildfire

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — Firefighters failed to give themselves enough escape routes while battling a wildfire in the Stanislaus National Forest last fall, according to a report by state and federal investigators Wednesday. Three firefighters were injured and one was killed.

California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection firefighter Eva Schieke, a star athlete in college, was not able to outclimb the wildfire up a steep slope to a safe zone a mere 35 feet away.

Schieke, 23, was the department's first female firefighter to be killed in the line of duty

when she died Sept. 12.

The firefighters started backfires designed to burn toward the wildfire. But when the wind suddenly shifted, the backfires themselves were what burned over the crew, the report concluded.

The crew immediately began running to the previously identified safety zones — a riverbed below and a road above.

"However, due to the steepness of the slopes and rapid change in fire behavior, they did not all reach safety," concludes the report by a joint investigative team of the state forestry department and the

U.S. Forest Service.

The report said the fire burned over crew members in just 30 seconds. They never had time to unfold their tent-like fire shelters; the entire flare-up lasted less than two minutes.

One firefighter was already on the ground retrieving equipment. Four others downhill headed to the river.

Schieke and her closest colleague, Shane Newsum, headed uphill, but Schieke was caught by the firestorm just five feet from the road; she "was killed by inhalation of superheated air; she died within seconds."

So steep was the slope that her body slid 100 feet downhill.

Chiefs at the crew's former unit and air base declined comment on the report, referring calls to department spokesman Michael Jarvis.

"The report speaks for itself," Jarvis said. "People can draw their own conclusions."

In a statement, the department said the Accident Investigation Team "determined no individual was at fault," but said it will use the report to improve its policies, procedures and coordination with other agencies.

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# Lapwai councilmen resign

## Town's government has lost its insurance

LAPWAI (AP)—Lapwai has lost its insurance coverage and two members of its five-member city council have subsequently resigned.

Edmund W. Berry and Harold Williamson quit the City Council on Wednesday in the latest wave of exits from the embattled government of the town of 2,000 residents on the Clearwater River east of Lewiston.

The Idaho Counties Risk Management Program, a cooperative of local governments that operates an insurance pool to cover property and casualty claims against cities, canceled the town's insurance coverage effective Monday. Program officials say actions by the city leadership in recent months posed too great a financial risk to other members to justify continued coverage.

Since January, the city's police chief, clerk, deputy clerk and two city attorneys have quit their posts. The City Council has taken a vote of no confidence in Mayor James Angle, who fired one of the city attorneys and the police chief.

Williamson, mayor pro-tem of the Lapwai City Council, said the lack of insurance cov-

erage prompted him to quit.

"The big reason is we've got no insurance," Williamson told the Lewiston Tribune. "I just don't want to be involved in a situation where the City Council is going to have to be responsible if someone gets hurt."

Angle refused to discuss the council resignations and said he canceled Wednesday's scheduled council meeting, where he was to have reported on efforts to find a new insurance carrier, because not enough council members would be present for a quorum.

Angle, who was the target of an unsuccessful recall in 2003, can appoint replacements to the two vacant seats, which

then must be confirmed by the remaining council members.

In January, Angle fired Police Chief Brad Mittenendorf, who was reinstated less than 24 hours later on advice from the insurance cooperative. Mittenendorf later resigned and was awarded a \$32,779 settlement by the city's insurer.

Angle also fired City Attorney Edwin Littenecker in January and hired David Nisley as his replacement, but Nisley resigned in July at approximately the same time two city clerks quit. Both clerks have filed tort claims, which must be ruled upon before they can proceed with litigation against the city in court. Both claims were filed before the city lost its insurance coverage and are being investigated by the Idaho Counties Risk Management Program.

The claim by former City Clerk Jeanette Calkins-Greiner has not been made public by the city but former Deputy City Clerk Lois Sonnen has asked for \$250,000 in damages in her tort claim. She alleges she was forced to resign because "harassment, intimidation and coercion" created intolerable working conditions at Lapwai City Hall.

# Chinook season closes this weekend

BOISE (AP)—The first chinook salmon season on the upper Salmon River in nearly three decades has been a success, Idaho fish and game officials said.

During the season that ends Sunday evening, anglers often have been skunked but state officials said merely having the first season in 27 years restored a vital heritage for residents of Salmon and Challis.

"It was really fun to be part of such a momentous event," said

Jim Lukens, the regional fish and game supervisor, in a prepared statement. "I enjoyed visiting with anglers and hearing their stories."

Fishing along the Salmon River from the mouth of the Pahsimero River downstream about 20 miles to the Iron Creek Bridge, began July 9 after fish managers decided there would likely be a surplus of salmon from the Pahsimero hatchery.

Managers said the harvest

would be limited to between 150 and 450 chinook did not state on Wednesday how many of the fish have been caught. The end of the season was set according to a permit from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, officials said.

While the salmon season is closing, the Fish and Game Department announced that steelhead anglers can now keep what they catch on the lower Clearwater River.

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## Registered sex offender faces charges in assault

NAMPA (AP)—A registered sex offender accused of sexually assaulting a 17-year-old girl after knocking her off her bike with his car has been charged with three felony counts.

Mark Melville Mead, 35, of Nampa, was charged Wednesday with attempted rape, battery in the commission of a crime and leaving the scene of an accident. Mead was released from an Idaho prison in 2002 after serving 10 years for a rape conviction in Ada County.

Police allege that at about 10 p.m. Tuesday, Mead purposely drove his Dodge pickup onto a Nampa sidewalk to bump the rear wheel of the girl's bike, causing the teen to crash.

Witnesses told investigators that Mead got out of the car, asked her if she was all right, and then pushed her down and tried to remove her clothing.

"He obviously knew what he was doing," witness Gretchen Kirkman told Boise television station KTVB. "I mean, like, I said, 'It was no accident. So he had just bumped her enough to knock her off her bike.'"

Four teenage boys saw Mead's car hit the bike and then drive off without headlights, said Nampa police Assistant Chief Tim Vincent. Two of the boys stayed with the girl while the other two pursued the vehicle until police arrived. The car got a flat tire and police arrested Mead after he jumped into a canal while fleeing.

"Clearly, in my opinion, these boys saved her from further harm. If not saved her life," said Vincent.

Mead's wife told the Idaho Press-Tribune newspaper that she was talking to her husband on his cell phone when the accident occurred and that he had merely tried to comfort the girl by putting his arm around her.

"He tried to help her and she screamed," said the woman, who name was not published by the newspaper. "Sex offenders have a bad name and they're using his past against him."

She said Mead was driving home from his last assignment to a sex offender treatment program when the incident occurred.

Mead is scheduled for a preliminary hearing on Aug. 17, where a magistrate will determine if enough evidence exists to bind him over to district court for trial.

At Mead's arraignment Wednesday, Magistrate James C. Peart questioned the attempted rape and leaving-the-scene charges and told prosecutors he could find probable cause if the charges were amended to sexual battery of a minor, which is punishable by life in prison. Because Mead remains under investigation for potentially violating terms of his parole, Peart set Mead's bond at \$500,000.

### Jefferson Starship celebrates anniversary at Hailey folk festival

**H**ALLEY — It's been 40 years this month since Jefferson Airplane touched down in the psychedelic surround-sound of San Francisco in the 1960s.

Now its space-age spawn — Jefferson Starship will celebrate four decades of songs such as "White Rabbit," "Somebody to Love" and "Miracles" at the 28th Annual Northern Rockies Folk Festival.

The band will headline tonight, breaking out its psychedelic mesh of electric music at 8:30 p.m. at Hop Porter Park.

"I'm pretty excited," said Festival Director Kit Neraas. "They were critical in developing the San Francisco sound. They're in the Hall of Fame. They're a pretty big catch."

## Gone country: The Standards changing their name, leaving home

**TWIN FALLS** — A group of local musicians is calling Nashville, Tenn., home. "And I'd never have guessed it in a million years," said Valerie Williams, mother of Jordan, Morgan, Nathan, Nicholas and Quinn Williams, all members of The Standards, a five-part harmony band that for most of its 12 years has been based in Twin Falls.

The group experienced some early success by doing the opening acts for The Oak Ridge Boys, Lonestar, All-4-One and others. But their big break came in 1999 when they took first-place in competition on "Destination Sardonyx."

The prize for the nationally syndicated television show — whose productions are currently "Star Search" — was \$25,000. In walking the road to fame, the Williams brothers have toured Canada, China and most of the 50 states. And along the way, they've sold some 40,000 albums. Nevertheless, while they con-

tinued to perform the familiar sounds of pop, The Standards are changing their tune. "We're changing from pop to country," said Morgan Williams, 29, the second-oldest brother in the group.

"For business reasons. The late 90s was a challenging time for us," said middleman Nicholas Williams.

With the success of formulated by bands such as the Backstreet Boys and 'Nsync management companies and record labels began flooding the marketplace, he said.

And because these groups were generating enormous amounts of money, "the (music) industry fed the market so much of the same thing that it began to kill the golden goose," Nicholas said.

Feeling that the public was tiring of such sounds, The Standards opted not to enter the music scene "on a wave that had already passed," said Jordan, the oldest of the Williams brothers. "It became too much," he said. Hence, musically, they've done a 180-degree turn. And the

change they've made also includes the name they'll use on their country labels.

Along with the new sounds of country, the band will be known as "Spencer's Own."

And though timing for change seems to be in their favor, the transition promises to be anything but easy. In February of this year, all five brothers — three of whom are married — packed it up and moved to Nashville.

Once there, they made connections with James Duttie — a former publicist for Reba McEntire — who will be the group's manager.

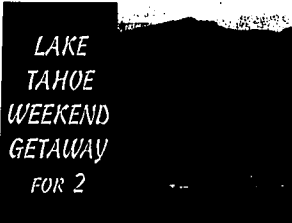

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# 'Battlefield 2' brings combat to online masses

"Battlefield 2" is the latest computer game from Electronic Arts Inc. that focuses on all-out war between teams of dozens of combatants.

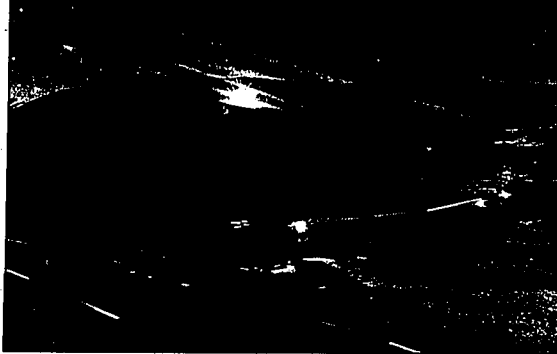
There's an option to play alone against teams of artificially enhanced computer opponents, but you'd be missing out on the thrill of joining up to 63 other real people online.

The biggest stumbling block to online cooperative play is the human element. Random players regularly assaulted the enemy with a complete disregard for formations, strategy or logic.

If you really want to get some enjoyment out of this game, find a group of like-minded gamers and play with them regularly. And make sure your team has a commander to call in artillery fire and spot hidden forces.

There are several types of soldiers to choose from in three factions: the Chinese Peoples

Army, the Middle East Coalition and the U.S. Marines. Not all well in this fictional—and mostly fun—combat world.

Gameplay will need a powerful PC. My home computer, considered tops a year ago, often struggled to smoothly display the lavish landscapes that include desert and forest settings.

Realism isn't a goal here, either. Artillery fire raining down on your no problem, just wait into the nearest shack and you're seemingly impregnable from such skyward forces.

The game already has been

patched twice to address various problems. A third patch is on the way to fix more than 140 other issues, such as one where medics, engineers and ammunition dispensers would find a quiet corner and unfairly rack up experience points by helping each other out for the entire round instead of fighting.

Battlefield 2 has some quirks, requires a lot of patience and is quite hard. But if you're gunning for some video game year action and prefer real human faces to fake ones, it's about as good as it gets.

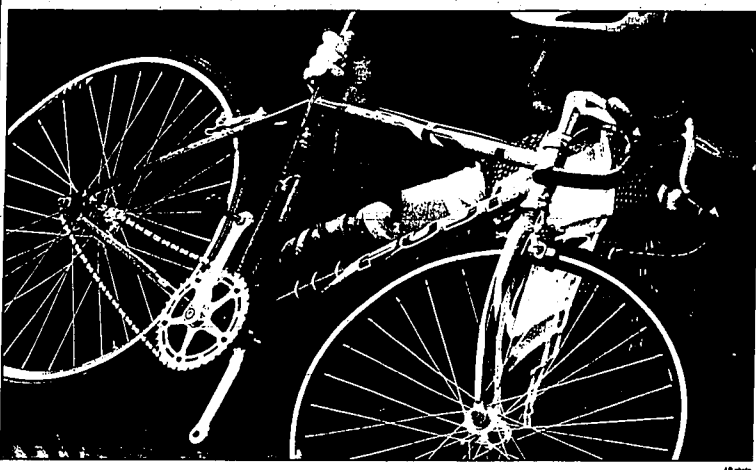

### Legs a-blur, Portland cyclists make fixed-gear bikes fashionable

PORTLAND, Ore. — Mike Murray's first encounter with a fixed-gear bike ended in pain. He was a 19-year-old college student in Michigan. The bike belonged to a friend. Murray hopped on and began to sprint to the end of the street. He stopped pedaling, forgetting that on a fixed-gear bike when the rear wheel moves so do the pedals, and thus, your feet and legs.

Murray said he lost control and "I landed on my private parts on the top tube."  
 "I thought, why the hell would anyone want one of these," he said.

Three decades later, Murray is a passionate advocate of fixed-gear bikes; he has four of them. And in this city that has a love affair with bikes of all kinds, Murray is far from alone.

Road cyclists are riding fixed-gear bikes up and down the Cascade foothills at Portland's doorstep. A growing number of commuters ride fixed-gear bikes as well.

"What's unique now is that casual bike riders are riding a fixed gear," said Murray, including "50-year-old bald guys like me."

"Fidles," as they are called here, are sort of the Platonic ideal of bicycles: stripped of all but the most vital components, and with just a single speed.

Pure form.  
 "I like to think of it as really getting close to the purest realization of the wheel," says 55-year-old David Auker, who rides a fixed-gear bike about 200 miles a week.

"With their skinny tires and sleek frames, fixed-gear bikes look like multi-speed road bikes. But the similarities end there."

The rear hubs of fixed-gear bikes are built in a way that keep you from coasting, a configuration that can throw you off balance until you get the hang of it. Fixed-gear bikes even require you to change the way you get on — you can't lift up or lower a pedal, place your foot on it and take off.

Fidles have just one speed. If you ride one out in the countryside, you have to pedal manly to gain momentum to make it to the top of a hill because of the single speed, and pedal madly again going downhill because of the fixed-gear hubs.

Some fixed-gear bikes have no brakes. To stop them you have to use back pressure against the pedals — the faster you're going, the stronger your leg muscles need to be.

There is no city in the United States with a greater passion for bicycles than Portland — which was anointed the nation's best city for cycling by Bicycling magazine in 2001.

## Another pioneer enters Hall of Fame

No less an authority than Red Grange called Benny Friedman one of the NFL's greatest players.

On Sunday in Canton, Ohio, 72 years after his retirement and 23 after he died of a self-inflicted gun wound, Friedman will join Grange and many of those other greats in the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

It took some aggressive campaigning by Friedman's former players at Brandeis University to finally convince the voters to admit the former quarterback Grange dubbed "the best I ever played against." Friedman and Fritz Pollard, another pioneer of the NFL's early days, were nominated by the veterans committee presented in by the 39-member panel that annually chooses new Hall of Famers.

Dan Marino and Steve Young are the other inductees.

"For a variety of reasons we can speculate on, he didn't make it into the Hall of Fame," said Bill McKenna, a receiver with Friedman's team at Brandeis and a former CFL player. "But unquestionably those who remained in football aren't too thin and who knew football, they were all confident he would get in the Hall."

"A group of us, mainly the players of Brandeis, maybe 40 or 50, got together and we didn't, recognized that and made a series of objectives, put together presentations and wrote letters to the Hall of Fame. They would come true and get Benny Friedman into the Hall."

At 5-foot-8 or so and just 170 pounds, Friedman looked like the prototype quarterback. But he became a star at Michigan — his field goal in 1925 lifted the Wolverines past Grange and Illinois — and then moved into the pros.

With no draft, he was able to choose his team, and Friedman signed with the Cleveland Bulldogs in 1927. A year later, the franchise moved to Detroit and became the Wolverines. It seemed Friedman had come full circle.

While starring for that team, his popularity was noticed by New York Giants owner Tim Mara, who needed a headliner to stop the flow of red ink he was enduring. He acquired Friedman, and fans began showing up at Giants games with Mara turning a profit during Friedman's first season on the roster.

Nearly three-quarters of a century later, Mara's son Wellington returned the favor, endorsing Friedman for the Canton shrine.

"In all, Friedman played for four teams from 1927 and 1934."

Stanozolol: Muscle builder, recovery booster, but risk of detection is high

NEW-YORK (AP) — Stanozolol, the muscle-building anabolic steroid that Rafael Palmeiro tested positive for, can help athletes avoid being sidelined by injury and may even perform better — but it's so easily detected that one expert said he's amazed any player would dare to drug screening would detect it.

"No tested athlete in their right mind should be using that drug," said Dr. Gary Vadas of Pennsylvania State University, who said he was "shocked" when he heard reports that the Baltimore Orioles slugger had tested positive for the drug.

No known masking agent can hide stanozolol use from a drug screen, said Dr. Gary Wadler of New York University, an expert on drug use by athletes. When taken by pill it can linger in the body and be detected for several weeks to a month, while an injection can be identified for up to several months, he said.

Palmeiro began serving a 10-day suspension Monday for failing a drug test that took place sometime after his testimony on Capitol Hill in March that he never used steroids. House Committee Reform Committee chairman Rep. Tom Davis, R-Va., said Wednesday in a telephone interview with the AP that the panel would look into whether Palmeiro committed perjury.

Major League Baseball has not specified what drug the test found, but a person with knowledge of the sport's drug-testing program told The Associated Press on condition of anonymity that it was stanozolol.

Palmeiro has said he never intentionally took steroids and that he doesn't know what caused the test result. Stanozolol, an anabolic steroid also known by the brand name Winstrol, can help an athlete get stronger, build muscle mass, boost acceleration, recover faster from workouts and

other physical stresses and become more assertive, Wadler said. He said there are no firm data on how well stanozolol works in comparison to other anabolic steroids when abused by athletes.

Yadus said stanozolol appeared to be moderately effective at building muscle, but not as potent as some alternatives. Wadler said there's some indication that stanozolol is less associated with highly bulked, body-builder type muscles than other anabolic steroids are.

He also said stanozolol could help a player avoid serious injury because it helps the body recover from physical stress. Palmeiro forged potential Hall of Fame career numbers based largely on longevity — in 20 years, he never went on the disabled list, and joined Hank Aaron, Willie Mays and Eddie Murray as the only players with 3,000 hits and 500 homers despite never finishing higher than fifth in MVP voting.

# Chelsea has two teams which could contend for title

LONDON (AP) — Chelsea's biggest challenge in defending its Premier League title won't be beating Arsenal or Manchester United. The tough part will be picking the Blues' first team.

Jose Mourinho's squad is so deep with talent that he could realistically field two separate rosters capable of winning the championship.

Backed by the unlimited funds of billionaire Russian owner Roman Abramovich, Mourinho guided the Blues to their first league title in 50 years last season. The "Special One," as he called himself, also won Champions League, UEFA Cup and Portuguese titles with FC Porto.

Mourinho, whose team won the title by 12 points last season, appears to be the best prepared. He has at least two top quality players at every position. Who to pick?

Chelsea's main rivals may find it even harder to keep up this season.

Manchester United, under Sir Alex Ferguson, has had a frustrating two seasons without a league title. The veteran Scottish manager, who led the Reds to eight league championships in 11 seasons, now has new owners watching his every move.

For the first time in nine seasons, Arsenal will without midfield general Vieira, who has moved to Juventus. Vieira helped the Gunners win three league titles and four FA Cups. Manager Arsene Wenger missed out on signing Brazilian star Julio Baptista, who went to Real Madrid instead.

Manchester United's new signings include South Korean star Park Ji-sung and experienced Dutch international goalkeeper Edwin van der Sar. Manager Alex Ferguson has had a frustrating two seasons without a league title. Rain washes out play at international

CASTLE ROCK, Colo. — As sure as the ball will fly 10 percent farther at altitude, the International will be delayed by rain.

For the 20th straight year, weather delayed the PGA Tour's only stop in Colorado. Heavy, persistent rain wiped out play Thursday, meaning the tournament will begin Friday when the forecast for calls for a 30 percent chance of rain.

PGA Tour officials said they would try to get the first round in Friday, then determine the rest of the schedule depending on how things go.

The PGA Championship is next week. Most players want to be at that venue to begin practicing Monday, but PGA Tour official Slugger White said the Tour would not make any decisions on the season's final major.

After a difficult offseason in New England, and with serious questions remaining about the defense in Indianapolis, the Eagles should be ranked at the very top of the league. If they get past all the summer distractions — T.O.'s threatened MIA, Brian Westbrook and Corey Simon's real MIAs, Jerome McDougale's shocking J.F. Reed's freak injury — and perhaps most significant, the verbal spat between Owens and Donovan McNabb — the Eagles should breeze through the mediocre NFC.

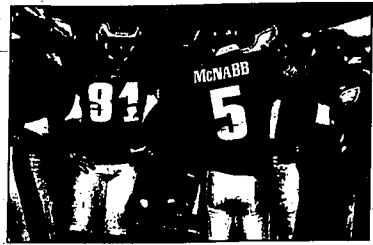
But they haven't made the trip any easier with all the offseason trouble. At least they haven't had any real problems (Ted Johnson, illnesses (Tedy Bruschi) and defections (Roméo Crennel and Charlie Brown) the way the Patriots have.

Still, the Eagles aren't exactly a happy family these days. Not that they have to be, according to me.

"I don't think you particularly have to like the individual or hang out with the individual," he says, not specifically in respect to Owens, who rarely gets had a kind word for his quarter-back since the Super Bowl loss to the Patriots. "I think all you have to do is have a good business relationship."

"When I say that, I say it in a way where it's not just sports related. It's in business in general. I'm sure a lot of you guys don't particularly agree with or hang out with all of the people you work with. But you have to do it when so you have a good relationship, and you have to have a good bond and chemistry that you all know what you're doing. And that's kind of how it is in sports."

"You may look across the field and say, 'Guys look like they love each other, or 'He's always over his house, playing with his family, or playing with his kids.' Could that be the case? Minor, maybe not. No one knows. It's funny how the assumptions come out for

us and our situation. Everyone said last year how we (Owens and McNabb) were just the best of friends, and we were hanging out and doing everything."

"We had a good business relationship then, and we have a good business relationship now."

Perhaps. But what happens when Owens isn't the primary target of McNabb's passes once the real games begin? Will McNabb become the primary target of Owens' barbs?

Be on it. Perhaps coach Andy Reid already has learned in just over one year to accept Owens for what he is: a self-absorbed, spotlight-hogging superstar receiver who can help the Eagles win a championship. Reid seems intent on letting T.O. be T.O. as long he doesn't tick off too many people in the organization.

Asked if Owens' boycott of the media at training camp could last into the season, Reid says, "To be honest with you, I don't even care. That is the least of my worries."

For a coach of such a strong team, one which could clinch its division by Thanksgiving, there sure are more worries than necessary. Westbrook, for instance, Westbrock, for instance, is a trend offer for \$1.5 million as a restricted free agent, then surprised everyone — including his new

agent, Fletcher Smith — by not showing up at camp. He wants a new deal, but has absolutely no leverage.

"I would tell you every day, I think that it is very important to come in and get your tummy down," Reid said of his versatile running back. "You get your legs and your wind, get used to the heat and so on. That's all part of it."

Defensive end Simon is the team's franchise player and has refused to sign the one-year tender. He also can't go anywhere else: look for him to be back sometime this month.

McDougale has been released from the hospital after being stung during a robbery.

"We are counting on him being back," Reid said. "He worked his tail off this offseason to get himself in great shape. He is not going to fall out of shape that fast."

Reed, who developed into a solid special teams player as a rookie, sustained nerve damage in his foot after he cut the back of his knee while jumping over a fence.

The biggest obstacle to continued success in Philly, where the Eagles have been in the last four conference title games, figures to be any on-going feud between Owens and McNabb. Another Eagles receiver, Greg Lewis, doesn't see it being disruptive — even though Owens has helped bring down a team before in San Francisco.

## Announcer flies often to call games in Spanish

SEATTLE — When Anthony Pi-Gonzalez was a boy in Cuba, he would whip a broom upside down and pretend to call baseball games.

Those days of make-believe are long gone. The sticks and straw have been replaced by real microphones, and instead of broadcasting fake games from his front porch he now looks down upon major league fields from his radio booth.

For the past 30 years, Pi-Gonzalez has been living his dream. And, lately, it's been twice as full.

The 60-year-old Pi-Gonzalez does Spanish play-by-play for two teams — the Seattle Mariners and the San Francisco Giants — and that leads to lots of frequent flyer miles.

"I know most of the pilots on Alaska Airlines," he said.

On a recent weekend, Pi-Gonzalez, who lives in Fremont, Calif., was in San Francisco calling Giants games. Then he flew to Seattle to do broadcasts for the Mariners.

"The fact that he can do this dual broadcasting job is incredible," said a friend of his. "Two different leagues, which means he has to know every player in major league baseball."

Only a handful of announcers have worked concurrently for two major league teams, including legends Jack Brickhouse and Harry Caray.

At the time the seasons end, Pi-Gonzalez will have worked 81 home games for the Mariners and 25 for the Giants. Former San Francisco broadcaster Fuenfuentes takes his spot when Pi-Gonzalez is in Seattle.

Randy Adamek, vice president of communications for the Mariners, said that the broadcast about Pi-Gonzalez from fans has been very positive.

"This delivery is exciting, and the enthusiasm that brings to the booth is great," Adamek said. "It's something you can't teach. When Pi-Gonzalez gets rare time off to spend at home, he works San Francisco Bay area, he works

on the autobiography he hopes to finish later this year.

He plans to recount the highlights of his 30 years of broadcasting baseball to Spanish-speaking audiences. He also has done Spanish broadcasts for the Golden State Warriors of the NBA and the Oakland Raiders of the NFL.

Pi-Gonzalez began his career in 1975 doing baseball game recaptions in Spanish, and started broadcasting live in 1979 with the Oakland Athletics.

Pi-Gonzalez recalled that when eccentric Oakland A's owner Chaele Finley first hired him, he sent a messenger to tell him to "come and broadcast the games in Mexican."

After 17 years with the A's, Pi-Gonzalez started doing play-by-play for the Giants in 1994, and began doing double duty with the Giants and Mariners in 2003. In Seattle, he joined in the broadcast booth by former Mariner Julio Cruz.

In his book, Pi-Gonzalez also will tell of his childhood years in Cuba, when as a passionate young fan he used that broom to emulate the voice and style of legendary announcer Rafael Brelvi, who called the broadcast Cuban Winter Professional League baseball games for many years.

"He later collaborated with his childhood hero in a 1998 play-off in the United States. Ramirez, 82, now calls games in Spanish for the Florida Marlins.

One of only four Cubans

broadcasting in the major leagues, Pi-Gonzalez was inducted last year into the Cuban Sports Hall of Fame in Miami, which he said was "the thrill of a lifetime."

Pi-Gonzalez has interviewed many great Latin American players during his career, but he counts Tony Perez, Fernando Valenzuela and Jose Canseco as the most charismatic. But he said his most memorable interview was with a non-Latin player when he interviewed Hank Aaron.

"The most thrilling moment in his career came during the 1989 World Series between the Giants and the A's when a 7.1 earthquake struck the Bay Area before Game 3. He was doing A's play-by-play for San Jose station."

"I know an earthquake," he shouted over the air. "The station went off the air moments later. I thought it was the end of the world."

More recently, Pi-Gonzalez was calling a game in Seattle when Rafael Palmeiro of the Baltimore Orioles became the first Cuban player to reach 3,000 career hits. Pi-Gonzalez said it was the first time he'd had the chance to call such an achievement by a Latin player.

"ESPN also joked that I was the first Cuban announcer ever to call the first Cuban ever to hit 3,000. Pi-Gonzalez said.

# Stewart heads back to Indy searching for elusive win

Tony Stewart isn't kidding when he says he'd trade every win and every trophy for just one victory at Indianapolis Motor Speedway. As a budding young racer growing up in Indiana, it was the only track that really mattered.

But he's always come up short in the end.

Indy, his shrine, is also Stewart's demon.

He would give anything to change that, and will try to again this Sunday in the Alfarette 400 at the Brickyard.

"I like the one thing in your life that you're the most passionate about and you'll have a good understanding of what Indy means to me," he said. "If I could give away my championship and just get one win at Indy, I would do it in a heartbeat."

This season might be his best shot at ending his curse at Indy. He heads into the race on a roll, winning three of NASCAR's last five events. His calm, clicking and the temperamental Stewart has never been more at peace.

Everyone around him attributes his relaxed approach this season to Stewart's decision to leave North Carolina and move back into the home he grew up in Columbus, Ind. There he's the famous young star, but here, he's just a regular guy in the community.

"The neighbors on both sides and across the street and in the middle are all the same neighbors, they're just older now," he said. "They don't treat me any differently than they did when I was a kid. I'm still their kid, who used to hit the baseball through their windows."

All grown up now, Stewart says he joined the local Lodge and the Eagles Lodge to gain a sense of community. He has keys to the neighbors' homes and can be counted on to take care of their pets. They are all in the favor. Stewart now blends in at the local restaurants, goes unnoticed at Dairy Queen, and is just another guy out bowling

with his buddies — on a week-night.

Everyone around him has noticed the calming effect it's had on Stewart.

"He's very comfortable in that element and that's probably the most important thing," crew chief Greg Zipadelli. "He's relaxed during the week. He doesn't get bothered by a lot of people and just gets to hang out with people who were friends with him before he got to where he is today."

But Zipadelli knows that when Stewart pulls into Indy for Friday's first practice, everything will probably change. The calmness will likely be gone and Stewart will be on edge, ready to snap at the slightest thing.

"The speedway wants the court to be at its end with people and with our guys and everything else because of the pressure

and stress that he feels," Zipadelli said. "It's hard for me to understand."

That's just how it is with Indy and Stewart.

He's led a total of 122 laps in his five Indianapolis 500 starts, but he faded at the end and finished 12th. Frustrated as he left the track, he punched a photographer in the lowest moment of his career.

He came back to challenge again in 2003, leading three times for 60 laps, but a slow final pit stop and a late caution continued to give him another 12th place finish.

His struggles don't yet rival the heartbreak that Michael Andretti has suffered at Indianapolis — he failed in 21 years to score a win there as a driver. Stewart only has to look to Andretti's cruel breaks to feel better about his own shortcomings.

"No race track ever owes you anything. I've heard that from drivers, but Michael Andretti was the one who straightened a lot of people out on that one," Stewart said. "He said that all those years that he led laps at Indy didn't and didn't win — it's a place that you have to earn victories. They're not given to you, Indy doesn't owe me anything."

There are a bunch of them out there that are crummy tracks that need to give up one of those dates so they can have one here."

Track officials might phrase it more delicately, but that's basically their stance, too — which has led to the long-simmering dispute with NASCAR. The rhetoric from both sides increased in the weeks before the suit was filed.

NASCAR spokesman Jim Hunter did not return repeated phone messages left at his office by The Associated Press, and since the suit was filed Carroll has declined interviews.

# Kentucky Speedway's bid for Cup race turns to court

**SPARTA, Ky. (AP)** — Kentucky Speedway routinely packs in the fans, is wildly popular with drivers and has all the amenities one would expect at a \$152 million track. But just one year old, it has been vocal about the date of a Cup date and NASCAR officials have been equally as adamant that there is no room on the 36-race Cup schedule to accommodate Kentucky Speedway.

Now the dispute is in federal court, and there seems to be no

shortage of animosity on either side. On July 13, Kentucky Speedway sued NASCAR and International Speedway Corp., alleging the companies have violated federal antitrust laws by illegally restricting the awarding of Cup races.

NASCAR sanctions and oversees its racing series, while ISC owns or controls 12 of the 22 tracks at which Cup cars currently race. Both companies are controlled by the France family.

The speedway wants the court to require NASCAR to award the track a 2006 Cup date and implement a competitive bidding process "to permit full and

competition for the right to host a Nextel Cup race" according to the suit. The speedway also asks for \$400 million in damages, an amount that could be tripled if the track wins the case.

Stan Chesley of Cincinnati is representing the speedway. Chesley is known for pioneering work in product liability cases and also represents elderly abuse victims who have reached a multimillion-dollar settlement with the Roman Catholic Diocese of Covington.

Drivers such as Rusty Wallace have wondered about the track's absence from the Cup schedule, and the veteran driver said in

# Historic building for sale

## Radio Rondevo gets attention of local arts group

**TWIN FALLS** — A downtown landmark's familiar neon sign could soon go dim. But the building is attracting attention from a local arts group.

The Radio Rondevo building at 241 Main Ave. W. — once a showplace for touring big band and jazz stars like Tommy Dorsey and Louis Armstrong and now used for weddings, reunions and other special events — recently was put up for sale by its owner, Gus Bowman.

Bowman, who also owns a chain of discount and close-out merchandise stores known as Thursdays, said he simply doesn't have time to tend to the 66-year-old Main Avenue building any longer. In addition to the Thursdays store at 702 Fairfield St. W. in Twin Falls,

Bowman operates stores in Boise, Mountain Home, Buhl, Greeting and Arco.

"Radio Rondevo is a night-time business, and I am not a nighttime person," Bowman said Thursday. "I don't have time to run the business and devote myself to Thursdays."

Bowman has leased the Rondevo building for nearly four years and exercised the option to buy the building in January from the Florence Gardner Foundation. In addition to its open events space, the Rondevo building includes several smaller spaces that are currently leased to businesses including Intermountain Martial Arts.

The building is also home to fledgling community dodgeball and volleyball leagues, as well as dance lessons.

Bowman said he has continued to make money from the

Rondevo building through his tenants, and he said he hates to sell the landmark.

When Forbes magazine released its ranking of the 100 most powerful women in the world last week, the list reflected more than a few changes since 2004 — mostly less politics, more business.

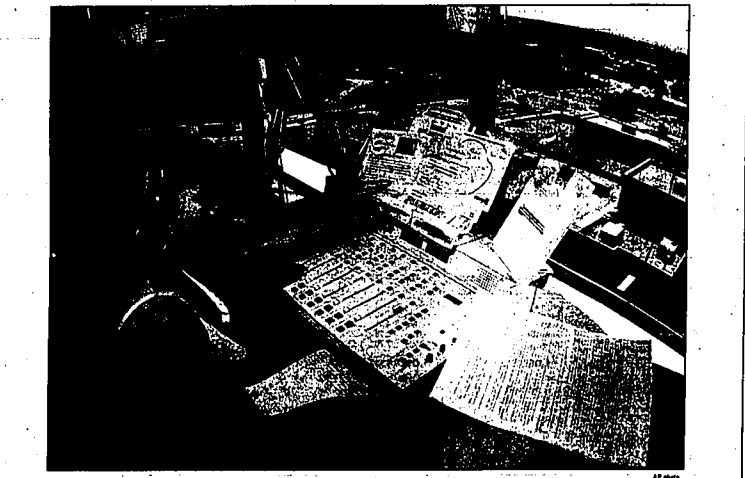

Getting sacked from HP knocked Carly Fiorina from the list completely, but other female executives more than made up for the gap, including Meg Whitman (eBay), Brenda Barnes (Sara Lee), Anne Mulcahy (Xerox) and Salie Krawcheck (Citigroup). Public-sector stars Sonia Sotomayor, Laura Bush, Hillary Rodham Clinton, Sandra Day O'Connor and Ruth Bader Ginsburg were all pushed down to make way for these new players.

"But this doesn't necessarily mean there are better opportunities for women in business now than in politics, said Jo Miller.

The women's leadership coach in San Jose, Calif., has clients in a variety of jobs, such as software developers and rabbis.

More likely, it's just that business is what has been on our collective minds this year. "It has not been a big year in politics," Miller said.

## Latino music finds growing clout in U.S. radio

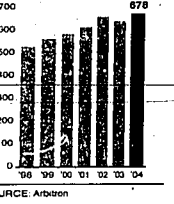
**DENVER** — As he waited for the bus on a scorching hot day in Denver, Chuz Aguinaldo leaned back and listened to the syncretic text and Spanish lyrics coming through his headphones.

No Beck for Aguinaldo, no Black Eyed Peas — he was tuned in to KMGG-FM and a new format the radio chain giant Clear Channel Communications Inc. calls Iurban, for Hispanic urban. The playlist includes everyone from crossover stars like Shakira to Daddy Yankee, the Puerto Rican artist who mixes hip hop and Latin beats in a musical fusion called reggaeton.

The DJs, like the songs, mix English and Spanish, sometimes in mid-sentence. Clear Channel's slogan for its new Hispanic stations is "Latin and Proud," a slogan that resonates with Aguinaldo.

"It's in both English and Spanish, the way it should be," he said.

English is still the language of choice for most of the nation's nearly 14,000 radio stations, but a booming Hispanic population is pushing dramatic change. Spanish-language radio is at an all-time high, with more than 678 stations across the country, according to Arbitron Inc.

"That number could double in two years," said Mike Henry, a Denver-based radio consultant.

In 2000, the U.S. census counted 35.6 million Hispanics, and that number has grown to 41.3 million. Estimates of Hispanic purchasing power now top \$530 billion, up nearly threefold from \$233 billion in 1990, and it's expected to reach \$926 billion in 2007, according to Denver marketing firm Heinrich Hilsparndt.

"When the population is over 40 million, people take notice, including advertisers and broadcasters," said Alfredo

Alonso, a Clear Channel official hired to convert 20 to 25 of its 1,200 English-language radio stations to Spanish formats.

Spanish-language radio is no longer about mom-and-pop stations on the fringes of the AM dial. Iurban has a growing appeal for broadcasters, and syndicated shows dominate mornings and afternoon drives in certain markets, many of them drawing the 18- to 34-year-old crowd coveted by advertisers.

While Hispanics account for nearly 14 percent of the U.S. population, expenditures by companies trying to reach this market account for only 3.2 percent of total advertising dollars, according to the Association of Hispanic Advertising Agencies. Broadcasters are hoping to close the gap.

"We're not even close to that," said Jeff Liberman, president of

## Dinner beats diamonds in dating game, research shows

**NEW YORK** — New research out of the U.K. indicates that men who spend money on so-called "worthless" gifts — such as theater tickets or expensive dinners — aren't wasting cash. They're actually using financial strategy that is beneficial for both them — and the women they're wooing.

The study showed that rather than running through a lot of money on extravagant material items, spending on less-expen-

sive activities gives you a better indication of how someone feels about you, without exciting the human temptation to "gold dig."

Researchers Peter Seaton and Robert Seymour at University College London used mathematical modeling to show different combinations of dating approaches.

In the model, both the males and females had to secretly indicate their prospective partner's attractiveness to them. Each male then had to decide what kind of gift to offer a female, in terms of extravagant, valuable

or cheap, based on his attraction to her. The female had to either accept or decline the gift and then choose whether to mate with the male based on her attraction to him.

The outcome demonstrated that if the males gave valuable gifts regularly, the females would take advantage, and the males would not be able to accurately assess the females' feelings. But the offering and acceptance of "worthless" gifts — dinners rather than diamonds — showed who the truly interested and attracted fe-

males were.

Though this study was based on a one-way, gender-specific test, males giving to females — the results are certainly applicable to any new relationship.

No matter how attracted to and excited about a new person you are, going overboard and blowing a lot of money is not a good idea. It sets in motion a high financial precedent that may be easily manipulated.

Go easy on the spending and get to know someone new through reasonably priced or cheap activities.

## Atkins falls; spud farmers rejoice

Growers feel relief after court filing

**BOISE** — After being vilified as culprits behind rising obesity in America, potato farmers from Paul to Pocatello felt vindicated this week after learning that a company that led the low-carb diet craze has sought bankruptcy protection.

Aldins Nutritionals Inc., started by the late nutrition guru Dr. Robert C. Atkins to promote a low-carb lifestyle — for it had filed for Chapter 11 reorganization, with \$300 million in debt.

"As the world gets out to our growers, they're jumping up and down in their fields," said Frank Muir, president of the Idaho Potato Commission, a state agency that promotes the industry across the globe. "This has been a major challenge, and they've fought it."

Muir is among representatives of Idaho's largest agricultural crop, worth \$2 billion annually to the state economy, who for the last three years had sounded alarms that high-protein, low-carbohydrate diets such as Atkins were inducing profits by getting consumers to say "No" to carbohydrate-rich french fries, potato chips and hash browns.

He blamed the Atkins diet — and others like it — for cutting U.S. potato consumption by about 5 percent since 2002.

As a result, the commission has been forced to spend more than \$5 million in two years on advertising, including hiring a TV fitness personality, Denise Austin, to appear on commercials in 31 U.S. markets.

It tried to remind consumers of the tubers' benefits. A seven-ounce potato has about 240 calories and, the commission declared, is part of a balanced diet.

Heir said the counteroffensive is working: potato deliveries from Idaho — the state is responsible for about a third of the total U.S. potato crop — are due to rise by 1 percent this year, or 500,000 50-pound bags.

The diet promoted by Atkins became one of the most popular in U.S. history, prompting companies including Kraft Foods and Heinz to introduce everything from low-carb Oreos to low-carb ketchup.

It also drew criticism from nutritionists for focusing on fatty fruits such as bacon and for shunning fat and vegetable consumption.

"The most effective method of healthy lifestyle weight management is to eat a diet based on complex carbohydrates such as whole grains, fruits and vegetables, moderate in fat, and a relatively low-calorie," according to the American Dietetic Association's Web site.

The Atkins Nutritionals filing comes at a time when the percentage of adults who remain on low-carb diets has dwindled from a peak of 9.1 percent in 2003 to 6.5 percent, according to market researcher NPD Group.

"There probably wasn't a great deal of response in the fast-food industry," Fred Zerza, a spokesman for Boise-based Simplot Corp., said of the bankruptcy filing. Simplot supplies McDonald's restaurants with more than half their fries.

Calls on Wednesday to Rodman's spokesman, an Atkins spokesman, weren't immediately returned.

But the Ronkonkoma, N.Y.-based company said this week it would focus more broadly on consumers who are concerned about health and wellness with products such as its nutrition bars and shakes.

Potato Industry boosters said the filing helps mark a new era when the unassuming brown Russet, Dakota Red and Yukon Gold — may be those who grow them — can begin to move off the sidelines.

"I once heard a doctor say the potato had the nutritional equivalent of table sugar. That was the final straw for me," the Idaho Potato Commission's Muir said. "We do feel a sweet victory."

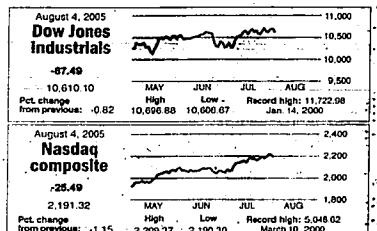

# Cadillac gets new styling, refinement

President Bush and Donald Trump aren't the only ones to ride in style in Cadillac's refreshed full-size sedan.

Beginning this fall, consumers will find the 2006 version of the Cadillac DeVille at dealerships, albeit several months after Bush and Trump received keys to their new Cadillacs.

Cadillac's largest car is restyled, inside and out, for a more modern, upscale look. It has new, more ergonomic seats and updated suspension tuning and adds 18-inch wheels for the first time.

Cadillac's largest auto isn't called the DeVille anymore, though.

Following the nomenclature that Cadillac started to adopt some four years ago when it introduced its CTS entry luxury sedan, the 2006 DeVille is renamed the DTS.

DTS may sound familiar. It was the name of one of the trim levels of the DeVille in the 2005 model year.

Starting manufacturer's suggested retail price, including destination charge, for the 2006 DTS is \$41,990. This is \$4,850 less than the base 2005 model and makes the base DTS less pricey than many full-size, luxury sedan competitors.

For example, the 2006 Lincoln Town Car has a starting MSRP including destination charge of \$42,875 and the 2006 Lexus LS 430 starts at \$51,175.

The new styling, says Cadillac, did attract attention during the test drive, with even drivers in style-conscious Los Angeles starting and looking at the car over. The front now has a look similar to the edgy style of Cadillac's CTS and Escalade, though it's not quite as sharp.

The DTS rear is a long, streamlined trunk lid that's reminiscent of the back of a Cadillac Eldorado. Overall, the look is definitely contemporary.

Unlike the major competitors, Cadillac's big car remains front-wheel drive, even as new rear-wheel-drive sedans such as Chrysler's 300C have become strong sellers. Some drivers prefer rear-drive for its predictable, sporty character and feel it belongs in large-sized cars.

But Cadillac's DTS continues to offer the cushioned, quiet ride that buyers in this segment seek.

Even in the test DTS with performance package and new 18-inch wheels, the car sort of bobbed up and down over sizable highway expansion cracks, but I was never jolted. The DTS seemed to absorb much of the impact from potholes, too, and there was no roughness conveyed to passengers.

Long straight stretches of road were delightful, because the 4,000-plus-pound DTS sometimes seemed to skim the road surface lightly, rather than

heave itself along. But in mountain twisters, I readily noticed the back-and-forth weight transfer going on as this more than 17-foot-long auto took a left-hand curve, then a right-hand curve. The tires didn't seem to be particularly performance-oriented, as they chirped easily in these maneuvers.

Front suspension is an independent MacPherson strut design with sizable stabilizer bar, while the rear uses an independent multi-link design and stabilizer bar.

The ride is quiet. Even with semi-trailers driving nearby on a freeway, I could talk in conversational tones to passengers. I didn't notice much road noise, even with the larger tires, and wind noise seemed mild.

Cadillac retains the two versions of Northstar V8 for this car, and power has been subtly tuned.

The base, 4.6-liter, double overhead cam engine generates 275 horsepower at a lower, 5,200 rpm now, rather than the 5,600 rpm of last year. Torque is a healthy 292 foot-pounds at 4,400 rpm for noticeably quick get-up-and-go.

But the uplevel V8 that was in the test DTS with performance

package has more horsepower — 291. Peak torque is 286 foot-pounds at 4,400 rpm and came on smartly — and always smoothly. The engine sounds had a satisfying, big-engine quality to them but didn't deter from the comfortable, luxurious ride.

Note the DTS powertrains compare with the 239 horses in the Lincoln Town Car with 4.6-liter V8. The Town Car's torque peaks at 287 foot-pounds at 4,100 rpm. Meantime, the Lexus LS 430's 290-horsepower, 4.3-liter V8 provides 320 foot-pounds of torque at a low, 3,400 rpm.

Fuel economy isn't great in this big-sedan segment, and the DTS is estimated to carry a rating of 17 miles a gallon in city driving and 27 mpg on the highway. This is a bit less than the 18/25 mpg of the LS 430.

I wish the DTS came with something other than its four-speed automatic transmission. It dates back to the early 1990s, and while it has been shown to be durable, it doesn't include a shift-it-yourself manumatic feature, much less a higher number of gears that could improve fuel economy and responsiveness.

The Lexus, for example, has a

is no longer offered. Officials said few consumers — only 5 percent or so — bought it. But standard DTS safety equipment includes antilock brakes, stability control, six airbags and improved structural reinforcements.

Some safety equipment isn't available, however. For example, an automatic brake drying system that BMW is adding to its sedans to help ensure good brake performance in wet weather isn't available on the DTS. Neither is an automatic pre-collision feature offered by Mercedes and Lexus that helps prepare passengers and the vehicle for impact during an impending crash.

Indeed, the DTS arrives in showrooms without a factory-installed rear entertainment system. Officials said they're still studying their choices for this feature.

Cadillac officials expect that early buyers of the DTS will be "Cadillac loyalists" who already like the brand and have bought previous Cadillac owners.

Most are expected to be married.

But officials also look for younger buyers to be attracted to the new styling. This will help reduce the average buyer age from the mid to high 60s that has been characteristic of the former DeVille, they said.

There have been no safety recalls of the new DTS. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration also has not yet reported crash test results on the car.

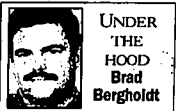

## Truck's coolant leak causes a messy problem

Q. I just discovered what seems to be anti-freeze saturating the passenger-side carpet of my 5-10 pickup. Where could it be coming from? How can this be repaired?

—Lorna Jacks, Gilroy, Calif.

A. Yuck! I have it when this happens. Your pickup's heater core has sprung a leak. It is allowing engine coolant to seep into the cab, and is making a mess of the carpet and insulation below.

The heating system uses a pair of coolant hoses and the heater core to transfer the heat of the engine to the cab. The heater core, about the size of a cigar box, is located deep within the instrument panel, and contains a labyrinth of passages and fins. The ventilation system blows air through the heater core and on to the designated heater or defroster outlet.

Your first priority is to check the radiator coolant level before driving the truck further. When coolant leakage occurs, the system might not be able to process coolant from the overflow tank during engine cool-down, resulting in a misleadingly adequate overflow tank fluid level and a low radiator/engine level. Be sure to remove the radiator cap only when the engine is cold to prevent the chance of dangerous hot fluid and/or steam escaping. It's OK to refill the system with water, as it will be drained and refilled at the time of repair.


Priority two is to pull back the passenger-side carpet as far as possible to prevent further saturation and to begin the drying process. Coolant from the heater core is located deep within the amount of intrusion, it might be necessary to remove the kick-panel trim or door-sill trim plate to gain full access to the wet area. Coolant is slimy stuff and doesn't rapidly evaporate. With the car parked, work the area thoroughly with a hair dryer, then with a fan. This should do the trick, saving you some dollars at the repair shop. If the insulation and beneath the carpet is badly saturated, I'd cut out the largest-section possible, dry it in the sun for a week or two, then reinstall it later.

Replacing a heater core can be a miserable job, requiring two to 12 hours' labor, depending on the vehicle. Fixing it might run from \$100 to several hundred dollars. Pickup trucks without air conditioning are generally the easiest, and luxury cars the worst. It's important to flush the cooling system of all remaining coolant and any particulate matter as corrosion and erosion are the leading cause of heater core failure. It's also wise to renew the heater core's hoses at this time, as the unit's fragile flange can be easily damaged during hose removal.

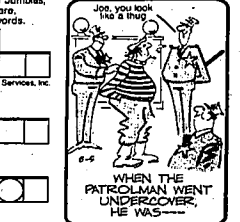

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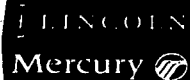

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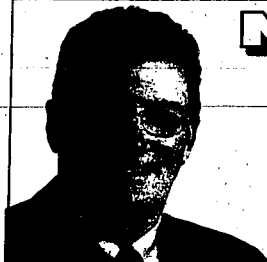

One partnership that has dominated the pairs scene in the United States over the last five years is that of David Berkowitz and Larry Cohen. They play an unusual signaling method: at the first trick, high and low cards may be suit preference; middle cards are encouraging.

On today's hand, from the early rounds of the Spingold, David Berkowitz as West had to work out what his partner was showing and then decide where to go from there. Cover up the East and South hands to put yourself in his seat.

Against four hearts, Berkowitz led a top diamond, and his partner's five was encouraging (consistent with a doubtoner or the queen). Giving his partner a ruff was one possible defense - but declarer on the auction was far more likely to have only two diamonds. If East had three diamonds to the queen, David could see three tricks for the defense, but the danger of his own hand being caught in a minor-suit squeeze loomed large. (On the run of the spades and trumps, West would have to throw away his master diamond or bare his club king.)

There was only one way to beat the hand: David led a low diamond at trick two, to his partner's queen. East accurately returned a third diamond, and Berkowitz led a fourth diamond when in with the spade ace, killing the squeeze.

ANSWER: Bid three clubs. Your partner's double is responsive: a double of a raised suit after your takeout double is also for takeout. The call tends to deny spades - with that suit your partner would simply bid them - so your task is to name your cheapest bidable suit, in this case clubs.
