Businesses cashed in on Sept. 11 relief loans

Analysis finds many didn't need terrorism recovery dollars



It is estimated that more than 18 million people in the U.S. have diabetes, although some do not know it. The number of people with diabetes is believed

to have tripled in the past quarter-century.

Most have Type 2, a condition linked to obesity that occurs when the body cannot effectively use the insulin it makes. Sometimes this can be treated with pills instead of injections. 

BILLINGS, Mont. (AP) — Montana's wildlife commission approved a plan Thursday that will allow hunters to kill up to 50 bison that leave Yellowstone National Park and enter Montana in search of twinter forage. It will be the first such hunt in Montana in 15 years. The corps is authorized by Congress to maintain a shipping channel to the inland scaports of Lewiston and Clarkston that is 250 feet wide and 14 feet deep. Because of the silt buildup, the channel depth has decreased to 8.5 feet at the Port of Clarkston and 10.6 feet at the Port of Lewiston.

This spring, two grain barges became stuck in the ports and had to be pulled loose. Some shippers have been forced to reduce loads to compensate for the shallow depths, and others — most notably Poulatch Corp. the Port of Lewistons biggest.





A year ago, who had heard of 'Sideways'? Or of "The Grudge," for that matter? Or "National Thensure" Likewise, two years ago, who was looking for big things from "Elf or "School of Rock." The fall movie season arrives, as crowded as a bis at rush hour, and buried somewhere within it are this year's surprise this It doesn't take much insider savoy to predict that "Harry Totter and the Cobblet of Fire-should, make, a decent box'effec showing (gee, you thinkf), or that fans of Jennifer Weiner's best-selling novel "In Her Shoes" might flock to the film version, which stars Cameron Diaz and Toni Colbette. But it's trekief. If not impossible, to find the real dark horses.

The fall movie season arrives, as crowded as a bus at rush hour, and buried somewhere

within it are this

year's surprise hits. Consider last year's "Sideways"
— a low-budget comedy about
wine and middle age, cast with
little-known actors and based
on a novel nobody had read. On
its opening weekend last Octoher, it grossed slightly more
than \$200.000, in a tiny handful
of theaters. And then the word of mouth for this raucous but soulful comedy kicked in. Six months later, it was still in the-aters, having earned more than \$70 million (and it raked in a handful of Oscar nominations

\$70 Million (and it rates at a handful of Oscar nominations along the way). What might do the same this year? Sight unseen, I've got my eye on Cameron Crowe's Elizabethtown. Though his last movie, 'Almost Famous,' didn't make much of a fent at the box office (despite strong reviews), Crowe knows how to make hits see "leny Maguine," for example and has a knack for casting couples with warm, goody chemistry, Orlando Biomost odorative seeds — and, between the "Lord of the Rings" and "Spider-Man" franchises, both have legions of fans, "Elizabethtown" opens Oct. 14.

Stay turned. "Pride and Prejudice." directived by loe Wright and opening Nov. 23, just might catch on with the art-house crowd who made. He played the eight to show an even number, and Jason simply continued with a second round of hearts, assured that declarer still had a heart left.


