Student posters at CSI raise eyebrows

TWIN FALLS — It may be the first time a senate candidate used Osama bin Laden to promote democracy.

Campaign posters for student senate elections at the College of Southern Idaho advertised an unusual ultimatum to attract students' attention. The posters — supporting campaigns for Anthony Ranaivo and Dustin Hobbley — had a picture of Osama bin Laden and another of an unidentified individual under the American flag with a squad of military jets in the background. In bold print, it said, "Who would you rather vote for?"

However, Anil Hussainov, an exchange student from Baku, Azerbaijan, who is also a candidate in the senate campaign, was less enthusiastic about the poster.

It was one of many posted by Ranaivo and Hobbley in buildings throughout the campus. Other posters had pictures of Arnold Schwarzenegger proclaiming

that the candidates may not be like Arnold, but they are fit for senate. Students and staff at CSI said they didn't know when the posters were first put up, and they did not notice them throughout the day.

When Hussainov saw the poster, he said he was disappointed.

"It's not good," Hussainov said. "With posters like that I cannot win. I didn't expect a (poster) like that."

In a statement released through the CSI public information office by Hobbley — on behalf of Ranaivo and himself — Hobbley said, "Our intention was never to insult anybody's culture or beliefs. The purpose was actually to mock something I believe is wrong with modern-day politics."

Ranaivo and Hobbley plan on continuing their campaigns after Hobbley removed the posters.

"I have taken down all of the fliers, (and) ask that the candidate who may have been offended accept my apology and my support for his senate campaign," Hobbley said.

Hobbley and Ranaivo — both of Gooding — are running for Freshman Senate seats.

Hussainov came to CSI two weeks ago through the International Research and Exchange Board — an exchange program by the U.S. Department of State. The program is considered one of the elite because of stringent application requirements. Hussainov, who is 19 years old, speaks five languages and is currently attending business courses at CSI.

"In my own country I am very involved in social activities," Hussainov said. "So I would like to get experience that I can use in my own country."

The CSI Student Senate was investigating the posters after a complaint was filed by an unknown person. According to David Chamber, student body president, "he senate did not receive any formal complaints from students."

"It's a bigger issue. It really should be," Chamber said. "It certainly has been put up in poor taste, but it's not saying Muslims are bad, or Middle Easterners are bad."

Shift focuses to identifying bodies

NEW ORLEANS — As the floodwaters drain from the streets, the city is giving up its dead.

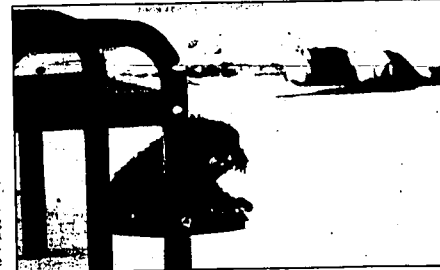
Bodies are found tied together and attached to trees, bridge abutments, fences — put there by passersby to keep them from washing away. Going house to house, with Vicks Vaporub under their nostrils to block the stench, rescue workers mark houses that hold bodies — and enter the spots on a global positioning system. Specialists will come later to collect the dead.

After racing to save the living, authorities are now overwhelmed with finding and identifying those who perished — a task with massive dimensions as Katrina's death toll threatens to climb into the thousands.

Officials have set aside 25,000 body bags as federal workers and specialists from across the country descend on the Gulf Coast to help retrieve the bodies and counsel grieving families.

The federal government also has contracted an international company with decades of experience in dealing with mass casualties, including last year's Asian tsunami, to assist in the effort. Mayor Ray Nagin has predicted that New Orleans' death toll could reach 10,000; other projections have placed the toll even higher.

Now that M-16-toting troops have encouraged many of the living still holed up in their homes to leave, many search

teams have shifted their focus to collecting bodies throughout the stricken city and adjoining St. Bernard Parish. The dead are placed in refrigerated trucks and driven to a makeshift morgue in St. Gabriel, La., just south of Baton Rouge.

At the large metal warehouse, officials with the federal Disaster Mortuary Operational Response Team, a large group of pathologists, DNA and fingerprint experts from around the country, work around the clock trying to identify the bodies.

At least 60 specialists from Houston-based Kenyon International Emergency Services Inc. are expected to assist FEMA in recovering bodies. Founded in 1929, the company specializes in disaster response and recovery and has handled more than 300 disasters, from hurricanes to airplane crashes. Kenyon specialists were deployed in the aftermath of the Sept. 11, 2001, terrorist attacks and last year's tsunami.

Half the victims brought in to the

Inhaled form of insulin gets approval from FDA advisers

WASHINGTON — Like other diabetes medicines, Wilkes Kilian would be elated if she could reduce the number of times a day she has to inject herself with insulin to control her blood sugar.

She might be able to do just that, if the Food and Drug Administration goes along with its advisers' recommendation that an inhaled form of insulin be approved for sale.

"Take four shots a day and the fourth one is the hardest one," said Kilian, of Bowie, Md., who served as the patient representative on the panel during the

hearing on the drug. "I'm tired of it. I feel like I'm being punished. I'd be thrilled. A lot of people resist it because they are afraid of the needles."

Members of the FDA's Endocrinologic and Metabolic Drugs Advisory Committee voted 7-2 on Thursday to recommend the agency approve the drug and inhaled device for each of the two major types of diabetes.

The FDA usually follows the recommendations of its advisory committees, but it isn't required to.

The insulin is being developed by Pfizer, Sanofi-Aventis and Nektar Therapeutics, which are promoting it as a convenient

alternative to the injections millions of diabetics must take several times a day. They contend that many diabetics who have trouble taking all their injections will be much more likely to use an inhaled.

Sall, the inhaled insulin, called Exubera by its developers, presents some problems, as noted by the dissenters on the panel. In a separate vote, the panel voted 5-4 that the developers had not performed enough tests to determine the effects of inhaled insulin on people with lung disease.

Other panelists expressed concerns it would be difficult to train doctors and

Businesses cashed in on Sept. 11 relief loans

Analysis finds many didn't need terrorism recovery dollars

The government's \$5 billion effort to help small businesses recover from the Sept. 11 attacks was so loosely managed that it gave low-interest loans to companies that didn't need terrorism relief — or even know they were getting it. The Associated Press has found.

And while some at New York's Ground Zero couldn't get assistance they desperately sought, companies far removed from the devastation — a South Dakota country restaurant, a Virgin Islands perfume shop, a Utah dog boutique and even sandwich shops — had no problem winning the government-guaranteed loans.

Dentists and chiropractors in numerous cities, as well as an Oregon winery that sold trendy pinot noir to New York City restaurants, also got assistance.

"That's scary. Nine-11 had nothing to do with this," said James Munsey, a Virginia entrepreneur who described himself as a "beyond shocked" to learn his nearly \$1 million loan to buy a special events company in Richmond was drawn from the Sept. 11 program.

"It would have been inappropriate for me to take this kind of loan," he said, noting that the company he bought suffered no ill effects from Sept. 11.

Arvid "Andy" Patel, 50, said he used his \$350,000 loan in fall 2002 to remodel his Dunkin' Donuts shop in New York City. He said he never knew it was drawn through the Sept. 11 program.

"Not at all," Patel answered, when asked whether his business had been hurt by the attacks.

Government officials said they believe banks assigned some loans to the terror relief program without telling borrowers. Neither the government nor its participating banks said they could provide figures on how many businesses got loans that way.

But AP's nationwide investigation located businesses in dozens of states who said they did not know their loans were drawn from the Sept. 11 program, suggesting at least hundreds of millions of dollars went to unwitting recipients.

The Small Business Administration, which administered the two programs that dolled out Sept. 11 recovery loans, said it first learned of the problems through AP's review and was weighing whether an investigation was needed. But officials also acknowledged they intended to spread the post-Sept. 11 aid broadly because so many unexpected industries were hurt.

"We started seeing business (needing help) in areas you wouldn't think of — tourism, crop dusting, trade and transportation. So there were a lot of examples you wouldn't think of, at first blush," SBA Administrator Hector Barreto told AP.

In all, the government provided, approved or guaranteed nearly \$4.8 billion in loans, and took credit for saving 20,000 jobs. That would put the average cost of saving a job at about a quarter million dollars each.

Of the 19,000 loans approved by the two programs, fewer than 11 percent went to companies in New York City and Washington, according to an AP computer analysis of loan records obtained under the Freedom of Information Act.

I had nothing to do with this," said Shirla Yum, who runs a clothing store in the former shadows of the twin towers that got a \$20,000 grant from a local advocacy group but no federal aid after Sept. 11. "I don't know if I'll be here next month."

Congress passes \$51.8 billion relief bill for Katrina victims

WASHINGTON (AP) — Acting with extraordinary speed, Congress approved an additional \$51.8 billion for relief and recovery from Hurricane Katrina on Thursday. President Bush pledged to make it "easy and simple as possible" for uncounted, uprooted storm victims to collect food stamps and other government benefits.

"We're not asking for a hand-out, but we do need help," said Sen. Trent Lott — whose home state of Mississippi suffered grievously from the storm — as

lawmakers cleared the bill for Bush's signature less than 24 hours after he requested it. The measure includes \$2,000 debit cards for families to use on immediate needs.

Bush, in a statement issued by the White House, praised Congress for "moving swiftly and in strong bipartisan fashion to approve these additional emergency funds" but cautioned: "More resources will be needed as we work to help people get back on their feet."

The overwhelming support for the measure by both Re-

publicans and Democrats — it passed 410-11 in the House and 97-0 in the Senate — masked murmurs of concern as well as a growing atmosphere of political jockeying in Congress less than two weeks after the hurricane battered the Gulf Coast.

Congressional Democratic leaders said they would refuse to appoint members to a committee that Republican leaders intend to create to investigate the administration's readiness and response to the storm.

House Democratic leader Nancy Pelosi called the GOP plan "a sham that is just the latest example of congressional Republicans being the foxes guarding the president's hen house." Senate Democratic leader Harry Reid said it was like a baseball pitcher calling "his own balls and strikes." Both urged appointment of an independent panel like the Sept. 11 commission.

Republicans said they intended to go ahead despite the threatened boycott. Senate Majority Leader Bill Frist of

Tennessee told reporters there had been a "systemwide failure" in the response to the storm. Citing problems at the local, state and federal levels, he said, "We will get to the bottom of that" in a congressional investigation.

Beyond that, said New York Rep. Tom Reynolds, chairman of the House GOP campaign committee, "It is reprehensible that some elected officials are looking to score political points in the wake of Hurricane Katrina's devastation."

Even before Bush spoke and

Congress acted, the government provided fresh evidence of the impact of the storm.

The Labor Department reported that roughly 10,000 workers filed for unemployment benefits last week after losing their jobs as a result of the storm, and said the level would rise sharply. In a painful irony, analysts said Thursday's number would have been higher yet except that the storm forced claims offices to close and prevented more of the newly jobless from filling out their paperwork.

Hurricane relief effort unites many blacks

NEW YORK (AP) — To African-Americans, Hurricane Katrina has become a generation-defining catastrophe — a disaster with a predominantly black toll tinged with racism. They've rallied to the cause with an unprecedented outpouring of activism and generosity.

The unlikely alliance touched by the disaster is not only donating money but gathering supplies, taking in friends and relatives, even heading south to help shoulder the burden of the people.

"You'd have to go back to slavery, or the burning of black towns, to find a comparable event that has affected black people this way," said Darrell M. Hunt, a sociologist and head of the African American studies department at UCLA.

If the rescue effort had not been so mishandled, and if those who suffered so needlessly had not been so black and so poor, perhaps Hurricane Katrina would have been just another destructive storm, alongside the likes of Charley and Andrew and Hugo. (There's no Keisha or Kwame.)

But Katrina's searing images — linking nature's wrath and the nation's wrongs — have fanned the smoldering resentments of the civil rights, Reaganomic and hip-hop eras all at once.

"Something about this is making people remember their own personal injustices," said author damali ayo, whose book "How to Rent a Negro" takes a satirical look at race relations.

"You don't look at Rodney King and say, 'I remember when I got beat up.' But people remember being neglected, unimportant, overlooked, thought of as 'less than.' That's a very common experience for

black people.”

Some 71 percent of blacks say the disaster shows that racial inequality remains a major problem in America, according to a survey by the Pew Research Center for the People & the Press, conducted Sept. 6-7 among 1,000 Americans. 56 percent of whites feel this was not a particularly important lesson.

And while 66 percent of blacks think the government's response would have been faster if more of the victims had been white, 77 percent of whites disagreed.

Many events have transfused African-Americans: the Rodney King and O.J. Simpson cases, the killings of icons from Martin Luther King Jr. to hip-hop Shokur, the Clarence Thomas confirmation hearings.

But Katrina is different. It has opened people's eyes — “The face, the cover has been pulled off the invisible poor,” said Rev. Ronald E. Braxton of Metropolitan African Methodist Episcopal Church in Washington, D.C. — and it has created a rare opportunity for people of all backgrounds to make a tangible, immediate difference.

Braxton spoke as his congregation loaded a 50-foot tractor-trailer with antacid, diapers, food, water and other supplies destined for AME

churches in Jackson, Miss. and Baton Rouge, La.

Before Independence Air volunteered to fly the supplies to the hurricane zone, Braxton turned away volunteers willing to drive 22 hours to Baton Rouge. In addition, he said, his church raised \$20,000 last Sunday alone to send to the national AME relief effort.

“They just probably want to talk to regular folks and be in a real home,” Lowe said. “There's nothing like being home.”

There is another reason Katrina resonates. Most blacks have family from “down South,” a sort of symbolic womb from which black America slowly went its separate ways.

“We are a population in this country of black people, but do we feel like a community?” said ayo, the author. “What really makes a community?”

Shared experiences, perhaps? “I think this is one,” ayo said. Katrina “is at the central core of black culture and American culture — I hope this is a turning point of some kind, a turning point for creating a larger community.”

morgue so far have been identified. Bob Johannessen, a spokesman for the state Department of Health and Hospitals, said Thursday. They have been in a hospital facility and had an armband or they were located in a home with an address," he said.

Once a body enters the morgue, it's decontaminated and assigned a number and an escort, a person who'll stay with that body through the process. Epidemiologists check the body for communicable diseases and hazardous materials.

"There appears to be some hazardous type materials in the water and these victims have been floating," said Dr. Louis Cataldie, the chief medical examiner of Louisiana. "We're very cognizant there could be an outbreak of illness, so we are staying on top of that."

After that assessment, a forensic pathologist determines whether the person's death was caused by the hurricane. The body is then photographed, and the victim's personal effects are catalogued.

Countless bodies are still submerged in the toxic waters or clustered in abandoned homes across the devastated landscape. The latest official death count in Louisiana was 83, but it will rise.

U.S., Iraqi forces target Tal Afar

TAL AFAR, Iraq (AP) — A joint U.S.-Iraqi force punched deep into Tal Afar, a key insurgent staging ground near the Syrian border, and the Iraqi army said Thursday it arrested 200 suspected militants in the sweep — three-fourths of them foreign fighters.

Most of the estimated civilian population of 200,000 have now fled this predominantly Turkish city, where 70 percent of the ethnic group is Sunni Muslim — the sect that dominates the Iraqi insurgency. The U.S. military reported killing seven insurgents over the past two days amid growing indications the joint force was preparing to intensify the operation.

The sweep in Tal Afar came as election officials tallied figures from three Sunni-dominated provinces, where the voter registration was extended in preparation for the Oct. 15 nationwide referendum on the new constitution.

"Turnout was unbelievable and people were very enthusiastic, especially in Fallujah and Ramadi," said Farid Ayar, an electoral commission spokesman. Those cities are Sunni insurgent bastions in Anbar province.

The large voter sign-up suggests minority Sunnis are

mobilizing to defeat the draft charter, a marked tactical shift from January, when their boycott of the parliamentary election handed control of the 275-member National Assembly to Shiites and Kurds.

The new basic law was approved and sent to voters by a coalition of Shiites and Kurds, over the objections of Sunni representatives, who fear it would allow the country to split into sectarian and ethnic mini-states. The very Sunni clerics who rallied last January against

an election "under foreign military occupation" are now urging their people to take part in both the referendum and the parliamentary balloting in December. Rejection of the charter would mean elections in December for a new parliament, which would start the entire process of drafting a constitution from scratch.

Demographics are a big problem for the Sunni Arabs — an estimated 20 percent of Iraq's 27 million people.

Sunnis form the majority in four of the 18 provinces, but their numbers are overwhelming in only two, Anbar and Salahuddin. Under election rules, a "no" vote by a two-thirds majority in any three provinces would defeat the referendum.

In the Tal Afar sweep, Iraqi army Capt. Mohamed Ahmed said one of the captured insurgents was Amr Omayar, an Iraqi who allegedly was the most-wanted militant in the city and the commander of all insurgent operations in the area.

Ahmed said some of those arrested could not speak Arabic.

"We believe they are Afghans, but we have not checked their nationalities so far," he said. The Arab-speaking captives were from Syria, Sudan, Yemen and Jordan, he said, adding that the

approximately 50 Iraqis rounded up in the sweep carried fake identity papers.

The joint force has reported heavy fighting around the perimeter of the city for several days and deadly bombings that mainly have killed civilians. Iraqi authorities said 80 percent of the civilian population has fled the city, about 260 miles north of Baghdad and 35 miles from Syria.

The U.S. military is no stranger in Tal Afar — a haven for insurgents crossing into Iraq from Syria. After the ouster of Saddam Hussein, the United States assisted a largely Shiite leadership in the city, including the mayor and much of the police force.

The Sunni majority complained of oppression by the government and turned to the insurgents — who are mainly Sunnis — for protection.

American forces swept through last fall, and the local police chief declared the city insurgent-free.

But after the operation, U.S. forces quickly scaled back, leaving behind only about 500 soldiers to coordinate with newly trained Iraqi forces. The joint force was unable to prevent insurgents from retaking entire neighborhoods.

Gulf War pilot remains 'missing/captured'

Navy maintains former regime members know his whereabouts

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Navy has been unable to determine whether Capt. Michael "Scott" Speicher, the fighter pilot shot down over Iraq in January 1991, is dead or alive, but it decided to keep his official status "missing/captured" and intensify investigative efforts.

Navy Secretary Gordon England, on Wednesday approved the findings and recommendations of a Navy board of inquiry, which concluded that "elements of the former Iraqi regime know the whereabouts of Captain Speicher."

The board's report said this conclusion was based on the fact that some years after Speicher's F/A-18 fighter was shot down over the Iraqi desert on the opening night of the Gulf War, the former Iraqi government turned over items from the aircraft and a flight suit. The report did not say who in the former regime of Saddam Hussein is believed to have knowledge about what happened to the pilot after he was shot down.

The Iraqi government maintained from the start that Speicher perished at the site where his F/A-18 crashed after being hit by an Iraqi air-to-air missile. No evidence to contradict that has surfaced since the fall of Baghdad in April 2003, but the new Navy inquiry concluded there was no credible evidence of his death, either.

Sen. Bill Nelson, D-Fla., who has followed the case for years,

said in a telephone interview Thursday that investigators in Iraq obtained new leads in the Speicher case after the fall of Baghdad, including some that led them to Fallujah. But the Fallujah leads were not pursued because the city was an insurgent stronghold until last November when a major U.S. offensive returned it to U.S. and Iraqi control.

Nelson said the case should be pursued not only for the

benefit of Speicher's family but also to assure all military pilots they will not be abandoned if shot down over hostile territory.

"That was the mistake we made with Speicher," he said.

The Navy has changed its position on Speicher's status over the years. Hours after his plane went down in 1991, the Pentagon publicly declared him killed in action. Ten years later, the Navy changed his status to missing in action, citing an absence of evidence that he had died. In October 2002, the Navy switched his status to "missing/captured," although it has never said what evidence it had that he ever was in captivity.

Members of the Navy board of inquiry, whose report was made public Thursday, did not go to Iraq or conduct their own investigation. They considered the findings of an initial Navy inquiry in May 1991, plus a report that was filed after a search of the crash site in 1996, and subsequent Navy deliberations on the case as well as a March 2005 intelligence report based on search efforts inside Iraq after Baghdad fell in 2003.

The head of an intelligence agency POW/MIA analytical group briefed members of the Navy board of inquiry in June, but details from that briefing were not made public because the information is classified secret.

The board recommended, and England agreed, that the Pentagon should work with the State Department, the U.S. Embassy in Baghdad and the Iraqi government to "increase the level of attention and effort in

side Iraq" to resolve the question of Speicher's fate.

Nelson said he would ask Defense Secretary Donald H. Rumsfeld for details on how the Speicher investigation will be intensified.

Among the board's findings: "That Captain Speicher likely ejected from the aircraft and may have been captured by Iraqi forces." Also, given that the Iraqi government turned over a flight suit and other items "associated with Speicher's aircraft years ago, the board concluded that some members of the former Saddam regime know Speicher's whereabouts.

A Pentagon team assigned to search for evidence of Speicher after the fall of Baghdad completed its efforts in May 2004. Marine Brig. Gen. Joseph J. Menamin, who led the search team, told Congress afterward that all in-country leads regarding the pilot's fate had been exhausted.

Supporters work to save bridge, but need funds

Would you buy a bridge for these folks? Many Minidoka County residents have done so. They've organized a vocal drive to save 55-year-old Jackson Bridge, which spans the Snake River near 500 East and 200 North.

The two-lane wooden bridge is iconic to many residents of Minidoka County — it's predecessor dates back to 1916, just three years after the county was organized.

Trouble is, the Jackson Bridge is a structural mess, and repairing it would take a lot of money — estimates range from \$1 million to \$6 million.

The \$500,000 at the moment that it would take to raze the bridge, but sooner or later that's likely to happen unless local preservationists can find an innovative way to restore the span — getting it listed, perhaps, on the National Register of Historic Places, and then applying for a federal grant to restore it.

We wish those to whom Jackson Bridge means so much well, but it's pretty hard to see a taxpayer justification for saving the structure. The Minidoka Highway District is correct when it says it can't in good conscience spend the half-million dollars it would take to demolish the bridge on repairing it.

Our view: The 55-year-old Jackson Bridge is worth restoring, but tax money should not be used to finance the work. What do you think? We welcome viewpoints from our readers on this and other issues.

The four-lane concrete Montgomery Bridge is just three miles downstream, and although that undoubtedly adds minutes and miles for folks who live around Jackson Bridge, using the newer structure isn't a sacrifice for the vast majority of taxpayers who live in the Burley and Minidoka highway districts.

That said, Jackson Bridge isn't an immediate threat to life, limb or property. We can't see any harm in allowing supporters of the bridge a reasonable amount of time to seek the money to save it.

We hope they succeed. It's a nice piece of local history.

Blame mother nature, not Bush

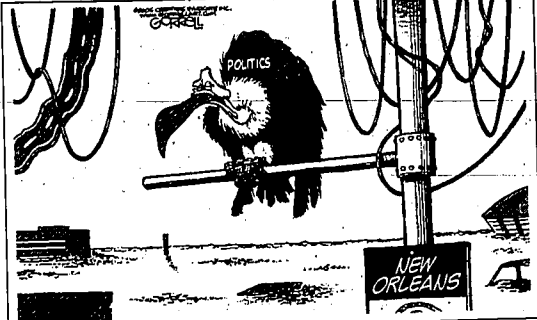

A few centuries later, our progress the thinkers have progressed not an inch. No fall of a sparrow on this planet is not attributed to sin and human perfidy. The three current favorite culprits are global warming, (2) the war in Iraq and (3) tax cuts. Katrina hits and the unholy trinity is immediately invoked to explain the suffering of George W. Bush.

This kind of stupidity merits no attention whatsoever, but I'll give it a paragraph. There is no relationship between global warming and the frequency and intensity of Atlantic hurricanes. Period. The problem with the evacuation of New Orleans is not that National Guardsmen in Iraq could not get to New Orleans, but that National Guardsmen in Louisiana did not get to New Orleans. As for the Bush administration budget request for New Orleans flood control during the five Bush years exceed that of the five preceding Clinton years. The notion that the allegedly missing revenues would have been spent wisely by Congress, targeted precisely to the levees of New Orleans, and reconstruction would have been completed in time, is a three-fold fallacy. The argument ends when you realize that, at the time, the federal government was already completing projects.

Let's be clear. The author of



this calamity was, first and foremost, Nature (or if you prefer, Nature's God). The suffering was suggested, aided and abetted in descending order of culpability by the following:

1. The mayor of New Orleans. He knows the city. He knows the danger. He knows that during Hurricane Georges in 1998, the use of the Superdome was a disaster and fully two-thirds of the residents never got out of the city. Nothing was done. He declared a mandatory evacuation only 24 hours before Hurricane Katrina hit. He did not even declare a voluntary evacuation until the day before that, at 5 p.m. At that time, he explained that he needed to study his legal authority to call a mandatory evacuation and was instituting to do so lest the city be sued by hotels and other businesses.

2. The Louisiana governor. It's his job to call up the National Guard and get it to where it has to go. Where the Guard was in the first few days is a mystery. Indeed, she issued an authorization for the National Guard to evacuate people on Wednesday afternoon — more than two days after the hurricane hit and

after much of the fleet had already drowned in its parking lots.

3. The head of FEMA. Late, slow and in way after his head. On Thursday, he says on national television that he didn't even know there were people in the Convention Center, while anybody watching television could see them there, destitute and desperate. Maybe he was busy because he can assign three 20-year-olds to watch cable news and give him updates every hour on what in hell is going on.

4. The president. Late, slow and simply out of tune with the urgency and magnitude of the disaster. The second he heard that the levees had been breached in New Orleans, he should have canceled his schedule and addressed the country on national television to mobilize it both emotionally and physically to assist in the disaster. His fly-over on the way to Washington was the worst possible symbolism. And his Friday visit was so tone-deaf and politically disastrous that he had to fly back three days later.

5. Congress. Now as always playing possum — that's what happens it might ask itself who

created the Department of Homeland Security in the first place. The congressional response to all crises is the same — rearrange the bureaucratic boxes, but be sure to add one DHS have been spent principally on bureaucratic reorganization (and real estate) instead of, say, a workable plan for as predictable a disaster as a Gulf Coast hurricane.

6. The American people. They have made it impossible for any politician to make any responsible energy policy over the last 30 years — but that is a column for another day. Now is not the time for constructive suggestions. Now is the time for blame, recriminations and sheer astonishment. Mayor Nagin has announced that as bodies are still being found and as a public health catastrophe descends upon the city, he is sending 60 percent of his cops on city furlough for a little R&R, mostly to protect American citizens. It was appropriate to party in these circumstances, he responded. "New Orleans is a party town. Get over it."

A model of judicial restraint, not activism

The death of Chief Justice William H. Rehnquist and President Bush's nomination of Judge John G. Roberts II to succeed him have led to a brief delay in the opening of Roberts' confirmation hearings — and Democrats are using the occasion to demand more of Roberts' legal records.

But the Senate Judiciary Committee has an ample record on which to proceed. The White House release of more than 50,000 pages of documents from Roberts' service as a White House and Department of Justice lawyer in the 1980s is unprecedented. No Supreme Court nominee has ever had his confidential legal work more fully disclosed to public scrutiny than John Roberts.

The phased releases of these Rehnquist-era records have predictably generated a series of morning-after news stories summarizing — sometimes accurately, sometimes not — the particular documents that seem to bear on hot-button issues. These documents shed varying degrees of light on Roberts' views from two decades ago.

We know, for example, that Roberts steadfastly defended the "bedrock principle of treating people on the basis of merit without regard to race or sex" and therefore opposed racial and gender quotas as well as forced busing of public-school students.

We also learned about his defense of equal-pay statutes and his appropriately scathing critique of the radical "comparable worth" theory, which would require an army of bureaucrats to set the wages of all workers throughout the American economy.

We know that Roberts both

described abortion as a "tragedy" and eloquently denounced those who resorted to violent measures against abortion clinics.

And we know that he supported the government's traditional role in affirming, acknowledging and promoting respect for religion generally while avoiding any sectarian endorsement of particular religions.

In other words, Roberts' records show him to be a strong and principled legal conservative with views that resonated, then as now, with most Americans.

But the clearest insight on how Roberts would approach constitutional decisionmaking is not provided by these isolated documents on hot-button issues. It is instead reflected in Roberts' consistent commitment to the jurisprudence of judicial restraint, a commitment that pervades these records.

Roberts' understanding of judicial restraint — and of its opposite, judicial activism — is comprehensively spelled out in two articles he drafted for Attorney General William French Smith in 1981 and 1982. In these draft articles, Roberts explained that judicial restraint was required by "the institutional role of the courts in our federal system and the scheme of separation of powers."

Judicial activism occurs when "judges read their personal predilections into the flexible text of the Constitution, at the expense of the policy choices of the elected representatives of

the people." Indeed, the "greatest threat to judicial independence occurs when the courts lose the basis for their independence by exceeding their constitutionally limited role and engaging in policymaking."

In particular, Roberts extensively criticized "so-called 'fundamental rights' and 'suspect classes' analyses (under the due-process and equal-protection clauses of the 14th Amendment), both of which invite broad judicial scrutiny of the essentially legislative task of classification."

For example, he wrote, while we all "may heartily endorse a 'right to privacy,'" it does not follow that courts "should discern such an abstraction in the Constitution (and) arbitrarily elevate it over other constitutional rights and powers by attaching the label 'fundamental' to it."

Judicial restraint is not to be confused with blind adherence to precedent. To be sure, any justice should recognize, as Roberts stated recently in his Senate questionnaire response, the "important role" that precedent plays in promoting the stability of the legal system. But as Roberts explained in his 2003 confirmation hearing to his current D.C. Circuit position, in the end no deference should be accorded to wrong constitutional precedent: "Obviously if the decision is wrong, it should be overruled. That's not activism. That's applying the law correctly."

For decades now, the left has relied on the courts to entrench in the guise of the Constitution the substantive policy positions that it cannot enact through the democratic process. And the stunning series of undesired victories it has been handed —

on capital punishment, criminal procedure and abortion, to name just a few — and the increasing unpopularity of its positions have made it both greedy and desperate for more.

The left now wants judges to impose same-sex marriage nationwide, to strip "under God" out of the Pledge of Allegiance, to strip away American citizenship to rules developed by foreign and international bureaucrats.

By contrast, jurists whom the left derides as "conservative extremists" would not impose conservative policies on any of these issues but would instead leave the issues to the American people to resolve.

If the people of a state, for example, want to enact same-sex marriage through the democratic process, Justice Antonin Scalia and Clarence Thomas would defer to their decision — as they likewise would if the people decide to retain traditional marriage. Scalia and Thomas would do so not because of any position they have on the wisdom or prudence of either policy but because they recognize that the Constitution does not authorize the courts to second-guess the political processes on such questions.

Consistent with his judicial record, Justice Rehnquist's documents establish that he is a long-standing and committed proponent of judicial restraint. That's why all Americans who are faithful to the Constitution should support Roberts' nomination.

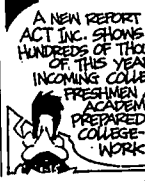

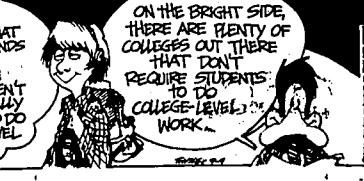

President faces 'significant' choice in filling seat

WASHINGTON—The tests for John Roberts are not really changes with the decision by President Bush to nominate him as chief justice of the Supreme Court, rather than as a replacement for Associate Justice Sandra Day O'Connor.

If anything, it makes Roberts easier to confirm, while increasing the stakes on the second vacancy Bush now has a chance to fill.

The personal qualities that would have assured Roberts a warm welcome from his colleagues on the bench—his high intellect, work ethic, good humor and friendliness—will serve him well as the court's presiding officer.

It is true that at 50, he is far younger than most of the justices and far junior to them as a writer of opinions, with only two years of appeals court service behind him.

But he has demonstrated his literary craftsmanship in the memos from his years in the Justice Department and the White House counsel's office. The members of the court know him favorably from his many appearances as an advocate.

And he is skilled enough in human relationships to show respect for his elders.

He also seems well equipped for the public role a chief justice plays as the personification of the judiciary. The man he must succeed, William Rehnquist, contributed mightily to the institution by his quiet, persist-

ent affirmation of the independence and integrity of judges.

Whether the criticism of the courts came from the left or the right, Rehnquist insisted that the judiciary be treated with respect—and Roberts, who was his clerk and is his admirer, seems certain to maintain that vital tradition.

The relevant questions for the Senate focus entirely on his view of the Constitution and the role of the courts.

Everything we know about Roberts suggests that he will be an advocate of judicial restraint, hewing closely to precedent and to a narrow interpretation of federal authority.

Because of the close proximity of his views to those of Rehnquist, a Roberts court is likely to function in the same centrist-conservative dimension that it has in recent years.

That probably spells some frustration for advocates of certain liberal causes who have come to depend on the courts to advance their agendas beyond what they can achieve at the moment in the political process.

But liberals, like conservatives, need to know that lasting changes in this country must

be ratified by public opinion, and the public speaks most clearly through its elected officials.

Whether an actual threat develops to established standards—to abortion, civil liberties, civil rights, affirmative action, gender equality, environmental protections or the separation of church and state—probably depends on the choice Bush makes for O'Connor's replacement, and Senate action on that nomination.

Because she was the swing vote on so many of these issues, where Rehnquist often found himself in dissent, it is O'Connor's seat that now provides Bush with his most significant choice.

He will be under pressure from the right wing to name someone as conservative as Roberts, or more so, to the court.

Those groups that want to reverse or curtail Roe v. Wade, end affirmative action in college admissions and hiring, limit federal environmental regulation, or restore prayer to public schools and allow the public display of the Ten Commandments can sniff a possible breakthrough.

But you have to wonder how many of these issues the political side of the White House really wants to reopen to debate.

Republicans find themselves on the defensive now about the war in Iraq, the handling of Hurricane Katrina, Social Security, immigration, health care and the budget.

"conservation," when it comes to oil. (Little hope of that, I fear.)

It is time to come to grips with the fact that the world as we knew it is going to be radically changed. And if we don't prepare ourselves and learn to live differently, we are going to be taken by surprise just as the way hundreds of thousands of people have been in the Mississippi delta.

We know now that we are not going to find leadership from our government. The people are going to have to change our ways. And in doing so, we might even rediscover what America has lost in this frenzied, greedy, war-mongering consumer society we've become. We might save ourselves and find ourselves and like ourselves again.

Commission OKs sales to Idaho Power

BOISE — On Thursday, state regulators approved a 20-year sales agreement between Idaho Power and Twin Falls Energy Company, Inc., owners of a 2.5-megawatt hydroelectric project.

Under the agreement approved by the state utilities commission, Twin Falls will sell Idaho Power allocated capacity generated by the Low Lake Midway Hydroelectric Project in Twin Falls County.

The plant is scheduled to be in operation by April 1, 2007.

The project will qualify as a small power production facility under the provisions of the Public Utility Regulatory Policies Act of 1978.

Congress passed the act during the energy crisis of the late 1970s.

Its purpose is to encourage development of renewable energy technologies as alternatives to burning fossil fuels or constructing new power plants.

The federal act requires electric utilities to buy power produced by small power producers or cogenerators who obtain qualifying facility status.

The rate to be paid to project developers is to be equal to the cost the electric utility avoids if it would have had to generate the power itself or purchase it from another source.

Trying to photograph the president lands couple in back of police car

BURLEY — Don and Marva Pickering got a close look at President George W. Bush's Secret Service agents when he visited Idaho last month. A little too close for comfort.

The Pickering's, lifelong Republicans who voted for Bush, only managed to get one ticket to the president's speaking engagement at the Idaho Center in Nampa, so they gave the ticket to a military family. But they still decided it would be fun to drive to Boise and Nampa anyway to

see Air Force One and to try to catch a glimpse of the president and the first lady arriving via helicopter at the Idaho Center.

"I just thought it would be a neat experience," Don said. "How many times do you get to see a president?"

Someone waiting in the long line that weaved around the Idaho Center told them the president's helicopter would be landing in an open area just east of the auditorium. They decided

to walk down there a ways so they could get some good photos. They didn't get far. A half-dozen serious-looking Secret Service agents and three police officers came out of nowhere, guns drawn.

"When those guys came up and said, 'Put your hands on your heads and walk backwards toward us,' I knew we were in trouble," Marva said. "It was pretty scary."

They said they were searched

and put in the back seat of a squad car.

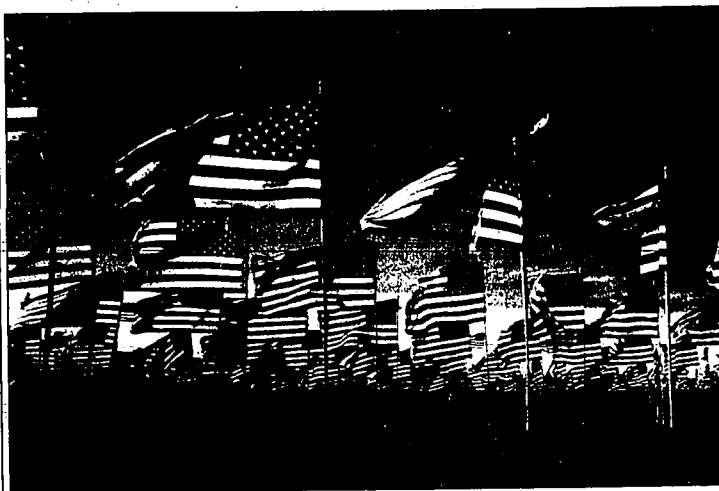
"We were told that we could not leave until the Secret Service could find time to interrogate us to find out what we were doing and how we got there," Don said.

About two minutes later, the Pickering's heard the helicopter directly above them.

"We were there for 50 seconds," Don said. "I just wanted

Valley Road wildfire continues to grow

STANLEY — A wildfire 15 miles south of Stanley in the Sawtooth National Recreation Area continued to grow Thursday as authorities brought in additional equipment and men to fight the blaze.

Estimated at 18,000 acres, the Valley Road Fire continued to burn in a northeast direction toward the White Clouds area. Authorities said firefighters have successfully kept the blaze about three miles away from Idaho Highway 75, which runs from Stanley to Clayton and then north to Challis.

Authorities said the fire does not pose a threat to Stanley or Lower Stanley, and fire crews have kept it away from homes and buildings in the Fisher Creek area.

"We've had some favorable winds to help keep it away," said Don Carpenter, an information officer with the fire management team.

The fire continued to burn in heavy timber areas in the upper Champion. Fourth of July Mountain Home and Fisher Creek drainages. Roads and trails remain closed to the public in those areas.

Approximately 900 firefighters were on the scene. Seven heli-

copters and 36 fire engines were being used to fight the fire.

The U.S. Forest Service, U.S. Bureau of Land Management and U.S. Bureau of Indian Affairs are cooperating in firefighting efforts. Also assisting are the Idaho Department of Fish and Game, the Idaho Department of Transportation, Custer County, Blaine County and the Stanley and Ketchum volunteer fire departments.

Carpenter said fire suppression is mainly aimed at protecting private property, structures, natural resources and roads. The fire was about 15 percent contained, but was not expected to be completely under

control until late September.

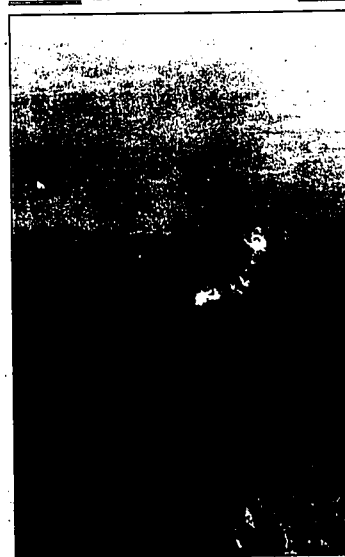
He said the fire was human-caused but is still being investigated.

Carpenter said tourists and visitors are still welcome in the recreation area, but should stay out of closed areas.

Most of the recreation area remains open, he said. Smoke normally hangs in the valleys in the mornings but clears off later in the day.

Hurricane victim faces future with optimism

LA PLACE, La. — As New Orleans residents struggle to piece together their lives, a former Twin Falls woman faces the future with cautious optimism.

Stormy Tenney and her family lived a few blocks from where the levee broke that flooded New Orleans. Their home is underwater and all their worldly possessions likely destroyed.

"It goes between being overwhelmed, and then it doesn't seem real," Tenney told *The Times-News* Wednesday. "Then I realize again — I don't have anything. It's just stuff, but it's stuff that makes life a little easier."

Tenney, the daughter of Dusty and Susan Tenney of Twin Falls, evacuated New Orleans with her fiancée, David Womax, and their 11-month-old daughter, Hailey, early Aug. 28 shortly before Hurricane Katrina smashed into the city.

Tenney recalls that many people in New Orleans weren't taking the approaching hurricane seriously. In fact, she said, Womax didn't want to leave until after an eBay auction ended. He was bidding on some electronic equipment for his music recording hobby, she said.

After convincing him to leave, the family drove to Texas, stayed there a few days and are now living with Womax's grandmother in La Place, some 20 miles west of New Orleans.

Tenney noted that they were able to take La Place without difficulty, except for debris on the roads.

"People were clearing the streets as we came through — so you get out and help them clear the trees away — it's pretty crazy. I've never been through anything like this."

In La Place, turning water, there are few days and are now living with Womax's grandmother and the family has plenty to eat since Womax's grandmother had stored provisions for such an occasion.

"We're very, very fortunate," Tenney said. "I'm thankful that we have the basic necessities — we can take a shower and get cleaned up. We didn't lose anything — we're so much better off than a lot of people."

Tenney said the family has not been able to return to New Orleans, and she fears all their belongings have been destroyed. Even possessions on the second floor, including \$12,000 worth of electronic equipment, are likely ruined from the moisture, she said.

"It's probably raining in the house. We probably lost all the music equipment. David thinks it's probably all ruined. I'm pretty sure it's gone."

Through the hardships, 11-month-old Hailey has been an inspiration, Tenney said. "She's such a trooper. When we didn't have any new shoes and it was so hot, she didn't cry at all."

Tenney said the family plans to resettle in Austin, Texas, instead of rebuilding in New Orleans. Womax is a chef, but the restaurant he worked at is likely destroyed. Tenney said he shouldn't have trouble getting a new job with "New Orleans chef" credentials.

"There's nothing keeping us here," she said. "We'll move to Austin and try again. I would not want to rebuild my life and then have another hurricane come and take it away."

On a final note: Did Womax win the eBay auction?

"Yeah, he did," Tenney said. "But we don't have a place to have it mailed to now."

Utah looks at toughening its murder sentencing policies

Father of Lori Hacking pushes for adoption of 'Lori's Law'

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — After hearing from the father of murder victim Lori Hacking, the Utah Sentencing Commission has recommended increasing Utah's minimum sentence for first-degree felony murder from five years to 15.

"Sometime in the future, your daughter might be spared because her husband might think twice," Erardo Soares told the commission Wednesday. "I'm looking out for your daughters."

Soares, who has been lobbying for the proposed legislation, which has been dubbed "Lori's Law," said he wanted to save families from the shock he received when he heard that his daughter's husband and killer, Mark Hacking, could possibly be paroled as early as in his sixth year.

"I thought it was horrible," Soares said. "I felt it was insulting."

Capital homicide is punishable in Utah by execution or life in prison, with or without the possibility of parole.

The lesser offense of first-degree felony murder is like all first-degree felonies, punishable by an indeterminate term of five years to life in prison, with the parole board deciding how long the offender serves.

In the case of Mark Hacking, who was sentenced to an additional year for use of a firearm in a crime, the state Board of Pardons and Parole announced in

July that he will spend at least 30 years in prison before he considers parole.

Soares said that with the thousands of people who searched for his daughter, he felt he owed a debt to the people of Utah to give them peace of mind.

Members of the commission said public peace of mind was the major reason for their recommendation to raise the minimum mandatory to 15 years for murder.

Paul Boyden, executive director of the Statewide Association of Prosecutors, said the commission received e-mails from people from all over the country, outraged at the news of a six-year mandatory sentence for Hacking.

Boyden said there was no real possibility that Hacking would be released that soon by the parole board. But due to the public's lack of knowledge of how the system works, it appeared that way.

Boyden said that going above 15 years could encourage the police to have more aggressive plea deals — as Hacking did.

Soares said he wanted to seek a 30-year mandatory minimum but decided to agree to 15 after hearing Boyden's concerns.

One commission member voted against recommending the 15-year minimum mandatory sentence. John Hill,

director of the Salt Lake Legal Defenders Association, said outside the meeting that he felt the penalty was too high and took away too much discretion from the parole board to weigh circumstances on a case-by-case basis.

Hill said the worst crimes, such as Hacking's, should not define lesser cases.

Soares also asked the commission to pass a two- or three-year extra enhancement for those who murder their spouses. He said he wanted to prevent another Mark Hacking from happening.

Commission members said there needed to be additional discussion about separating a married spouse from other positions of trust in the law, such as a Scoutmaster, day-care provider or sibling.

Mark Hacking confessed that he shot his wife in the head with a 22-caliber rifle while she slept at the Salt Lake City apartment in July 2004.

He apparently had confronted him about his web of lies. Contrary to what Hacking had told his wife and family, he had not graduated from college and had not been accepted to medical school in North Carolina.

Hacking disposed of Lori's body in a trash bin, then-to police said, had gone jogging up City Creek Canyon, prompting the massive search of the foothills.

In July 24, Hacking confessed to his brother that he had murdered his wife. Her remains were found after a two-month search of the Salt Lake County landfill.

Councilmen spar with Lapwai mayor

Disputed member was able to vote on his own appointment

LAPWAI (AP) — Conflict within the Lapwai City Council continues, with two members protesting that a council member picked by the mayor for the five-member panel was allowed to vote on his own appointment — before he was officially on the board.

Mayor James Angle said he was using his "emergency powers" when he asked the three current council members Wednesday to attend a city meeting as a member, Robert Brown, who was appointed by Gov. Dirk Kempthorne to the council last week along with Charles Spensor, voted against the appointment, while Taylor and another council member, David Holt, voted in favor. The mayor broke the tie.

Asked whether it was appropriate for Taylor to vote on his own appointment, City Attorney Michael Chersia said he could — provided he didn't have a conflict of interest — and told those at the evening meeting that Taylor could serve at least until the Nov. 8 election.

This is the latest development in a town-hall squabble in this 2,200-soul burg on the banks of

the Clearwater River that's seen three council members resign since Aug. 3, the cancellation of the city's insurance policy, the departure of the police chief and two city attorneys since January — and, finally, the governor's intervention. Two former city clerks are also suing the city for \$550,000, claiming they were forced out after questioning financial transactions by Angle.

The Idaho Attorney General's office has told frustrated residents who blame the mayor for running the city as a personal fiefdom, while Taylor and Spensor, who were expected for the appointment, that they can hire a lawyer and sue if they believe something inappropriate has occurred.

If we could get together and talk it out together, there wouldn't be no dispute. But they want to argue, so there's nothing we can do."

Brown, sitting near Spensor at Wednesday's meeting, attempted to protest Taylor's appointment as illegal, before being cut off by Holt, who said, "I'd like to protest the two of you also" before the session was adjourned.

Montana approves bison hunt Couple

BILLINGS, Mont. (AP) — Montana's wildlife commission approved a plan Thursday that will allow hunters to kill up to 50 bison that leave Yellowstone National Park and enter Montana in search of winter forage. It will be the first such hunt in Montana in 15 years.

The state Fish, Wildlife and Parks Commission approved hunting over a three-month period, beginning Nov. 15. Hunters will be required to undergo training to prepare them for killing one of the animals and possible encounters with protesters and news reporters, among other things.

Two commissioners deemed the requirement offensive or unnecessary — Victor Workman of Whiteside called it "unreasonable, uncalled for and unwarranted" — but others saw it as key to ensuring the long-term viability of the controversial hunt.

"I want this hunt to be a success," Chairman Steve Doherty said, adding that the mandatory orientation should not only increase the likelihood of that but also show respect both for the bison and the state's hunting tradition.

Yellowstone is home to thousands of bison, and it is common in the winter for some to leave the deep snow of the park and enter the lower valleys of southern Montana in search of food. Ranchers and livestock officials say they fear bison will transmit the disease brucellosis, which is found in Yellowstone bison, can cause cows to abort.

Under an existing federal-state management plan, bison that leave Yellowstone can be hunted or captured and tested for

brucellosis. Bison testing positive are sent to slaughter. But there is no hunting by private citizens.

Wildlife officials say the new hunt will be nothing like those of the late 1980s that sparked protests. Then, wardens led hunters to individual bison that, in some cases, were shot at close range while peacefully grazing. The execution-style killing dismayed even some hunters and drew protests nationally, including tourist boycotts, that led the state to end the hunt in 1991.

Dan Brister of the Buffalo

Field Campaign, a bison advocacy group, said in a telephone interview Thursday that the new hunt also is sure to draw national attention, and is likely to give Montana a black eye. He said his group is exploring its legal options.

The hunt as planned would allow up to 25 bison to be killed during each of two sessions — one from Nov. 15 to Jan. 15, and a second from Jan. 16 to Feb. 15. Of the 50 total either-sex licenses, 16 will be allocated to Montana tribes and 10 will go to hunters who qualified for an earlier hunt that was canceled out of concern about the state's image. That leaves 24 up for grabs this winter.

The hunt covers land near Yellowstone's northern boundary and that portion of the western border in Montana, for a total of about 460,000 acres, said Pat Flowers, a regional supervisor for the state Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks. Hunting and capture operations under the current management plan would be suspended during the hunt, except in unusual cases such as threats to public health or significant property damage.

"Two individuals breached one of the security perimeters of the landing zone for Marine One," Garner said. "They were detained by the local police department and interviewed. The incident was benign."

"Anyone someone breaches a perimeter, they're going to be detained by us," he added.

The Pickeringers were released after Secret Service agents verified they were indeed just law-abiding citizens wanting to get a closer look at the president. They asked one of the police officers if they could get a lift back across the street to the Idaho Center.

"The cop said no," Don said. "This is a one-way ride."

Police: Rising gas thefts can be hard to trace

REXBURG — Police say gasoline thefts are rising along with prices at local stations.

Over the Labor Day weekend, police reported six gas-theft complaints from stations in Rexburg. St. Anthony Police Chief Bryan Fuller said his department had received four complaints since Aug. 1, and the Fremont County Sheriff's

office reported gas thefts in Ashton and Island Park as well.

The thefts are difficult to solve, said Capt. Randy Lewis of the Rexburg Police Department. Often, he said, the pump fails to read a customer's credit card and the driver doesn't realize he hasn't paid for the gas.

Also, the license-plate numbers and vehicle descriptions provided by gas-station clerks don't always match state registration data. In such cases, the allegation is considered unfounded.

"We couldn't verify 90 percent of the cases," he said.

But even though not all reports are verified, Lewis said the number of complaints has increased.

CLARKSBURG, W.Va. — For a moment, a police group is going to try to raise money for charity by opening a restaurant with slot machines.

If it works, the Fraternal Order of Police lodge anticipates earning at least \$10,000 a month off the games.

"Video poker machines are perfectly legal," President Carl Springer said. "We'll run it strictly by the book."

Mountaineer Lodge 78 has raised thousands of dollars for charities through monthly bingo games and telemarketing campaigns, Springer said, but "everybody's been complaining about telemarketing. It's an inconvenience and it's not calling people at home."

So when it opens a new steakhouse in October, the group will take advantage of its status as a fraternal organization, which lets it operate up to 10 limited video lottery machines.

At least one law enforcement official — former Harrison County Sheriff Jeff Trupo — says the plan represents a moral conflict of interest. He believes police should be police and not gambling enthusiasts.

"I don't think it's a conflict," Springer said. "If somebody gets out of hand, hopefully they will be arrested."

Magazine: BYU earns title of nation's fittest college campus

PROVO, Utah (AP) — On those annual lists of the nation's college campuses, Brigham Young University is probably best known for its regular ranking near the bottom when it comes to party schools.

But now the university owned by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints has earned a new distinction: fittest college campus.

The ranking comes courtesy of Men's Fitness magazine, which earlier this year went in search of the fittest and fattest schools. Working with the Princeton Review, Men's Fitness surveyed more than 10,000 university students from 660 campuses and released its rankings in its October issue, which hit newsstands this week.

BYU graduate student Jeff Dixon, 26, who lifts weights about four times a week, said regular workouts do more than just whittle his middle. It also helps in life's mental games.

"When I feel good, it helps me in school. It helps me have a clear, sharp mind," he said.

He also thinks the early marriage-age of most Mormons plays a role.

Most of us get married in college, so... maybe we don't just go for the opposite sex, so we can catch a wife," he said with a laugh.

The survey asked if students had gained weight during college. If they work out regularly and what types of campus facilities or services support — or discourage — healthy habits.

Along with BYU at the top of the list are the University of California, Santa Barbara; Boston University; University of Vermont and Northwestern University.

Suppling the list of the fittest schools: University of Louisiana at Lafayette, followed by University of New Orleans, Mississippi State University, Southern Illinois University at Carbondale and Portland State University.

Men's Fitness editor-in-chief Neil Boulton said the survey found that college students are "eager to balance lifestyle House practices with a fit life."

Although the survey isn't scientific, Boulton believes it paints a profile of fit campus environments that can be instructive for their chubbier counterparts.

Schools with the highest rankings for fitness, for example, provided healthy menu programs, good access to fitness education and facilities — including fitness trainers and rehabilitation support for injury recovery — and high campus safety rates. Most also mandated at least some physical education courses as requirements for graduation.

"At the bottom of the list, maybe they just had a gym," Boulton said.

At BYU the fitness-first attitude is illustrated by steady traffic through student weight rooms, heavy use of swimming pools, booked courts for basketball, racquetball and tennis, and phys ed courses that are among the first to fill up each semester.

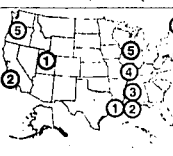
There's also a campuswide wellness program for students.

faculty and staff, where a full fitness analysis, with screenings for cholesterol, body fat and cardio-respiratory fitness is available for less than \$100. The program comes complete with a personalized training and nutrition program and three months of coaching support.

BYU also has one of the busiest intramural programs of any university. An average 13,000 — annually enrolled — students organize teams to play soccer, flag football and more, said Phil Kelly, director of intramural programs.

BYU's administration, had little to say about the ranking, but the school was recognized for being healthy, active and physically fit, but she didn't have much more to say about praise from a magazine that sometimes features bare-chested men and bikini-

clad women. Students were more enthusiastic.

"It's nice to be known for something other than not being a party school," said sophomore Lisa Horton, 19, who says she gained the "freshman 15" and now is jogging daily with a roommate.

Students credit their school's fitness ranking and their personal habits to their religious teachings. In 1833, Mormon church founder Joseph Smith laid out his doctrine for living a righteous life. Among the rules: Eat a whole-grain and fruit diet, eat meat sparingly, don't drink alcohol or "hot drinks," generally interpreted as coffee and tea.

"Our prophet (Smith) said that our bodies are what fills the work of the spirit," said junior Justin Withers, 21. "I feel better about myself when I'm fit and we're encouraged to take care of our bodies."

Energy forum set for Bozeman

HELENA, Mont. (AP) — Gov. errors from at least a half-dozen states, including Utah, are expected in Montana tests of a new energy forum. Gov. Brian Schweitzer is holding.

Schweitzer promulgated such a conference shortly after his election, saying he wanted to bring together state leaders, energy experts and other long-term officials to talk about long-term energy policy.

Oil, natural gas and electricity prices have all been on the rise, and oil prices have spiked further in the wake of Hurricane Katrina.

Schweitzer said the symposium will address energy production, conservation, environmental issues and consumer concerns.

Only by working together

will we be able to form a stable, long-term energy policy that protects the citizens and protects the environment while further strengthening our economy," Schweitzer said.

The symposium is planned for Oct. 18-19 at the Montana State University campus in Bozeman.

Bruce Measure, one of Montana's two members of the Northwest Power and Conservation Council, said Schweitzer invited West Virginia Gov. Joe Manchin III because he wanted to hear his perspective on the effects of coal development, which is expected to be a major topic during the conference.

West Virginia is one of the leading states in coal production.

Jim Jensen, executive director of the Montana Environmental

Information Center, said he hopes Manchin and others will talk not only about the economic benefits of coal development, but also the social and economic impacts.

"I also hope they would talk about reversing the trend of using more and more electricity, and start talking about how (we) can use less electricity," he said.

Jensen has criticized the funding of the conference, noting that the state's three largest energy and utility firms North-Western Corp., MDU Resources, and PPL Montana are footing most of the bill.

He said utility firms are interested primarily in selling more power, and not in forming an energy policy that benefits consumers.

Montana cattlemen ask hunters to shoot fewer sage grouse

BILLINGS, Mont. (AP) — A Montana ranching group's recommendation that landowners, ranchers and hunters reduce hunting pressure on sage grouse this fall is drawing criticism from hunting groups and wildlife advocates who say ranchers are ruining the birds' habitat.

"It is a direct contradiction to allow liberal hunting of a species at the same time that court cases are being filed to add that species to the endangered species list," Bill Donald, president of the Montana Stockgrowers Association, said in a press release.

Hunting groups say habitat is the real issue. "Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks data and other reports and research projects do not indicate that hunting is the real problem," said Craig Sharpe, executive director of the Montana Wildlife Federation. "For decades, prime sage grouse sagebrush habitat has been burned, plowed, sprayed and grazed."

Moreover, it appears the Montana Stockgrowers want us to eliminate hunting so they can maintain their grazing lands.

Ben Deebie, sage grouse project coordinator for the National Wildlife Federation in Missoula, called the request "hypocritical, inappropriate and erroneous."

The stockgrowers association adopted a resolution at its June meeting calling for voluntary hunting reductions. They also asked the state Fish, Wildlife and Parks Commission to restrict the season on sage grouse to one week with a one-bird daily limit.

The state is already well below the harvest rates recommended for sage grouse by the Western Association of Fish and Wildlife Agencies, said Ron Ansheim, a spokesman for the state Fish, Wildlife and Parks Department. This year, the state reduced the allowable harvest of sage grouse from three daily and six in possession to two daily and four in possession. The sage grouse season opened Sept. 1 and runs through Nov. 1.

"We've never seen that harvest has been a factor leading to a decline in sage grouse," Ansheim said. "We respect their

opinion, but we're balancing what's best for the habitat with what's best for the birds."

But Steve Pilcher, executive vice president of the stockgrowers association, said it's only

logical that shooting the birds, as their population is declining, doesn't make sense.

"It's a real sore spot with ranchers but there" that landowners are being asked to

alter their grazing while still allowing hunters to "deplete the sage grouse population," he said.

According to the National Audubon Society, greater sage

grouse were once found in 16 states. They now are limited to eight western states — Montana, Idaho, Wyoming, Colorado, Utah, Nevada, California and Washington.

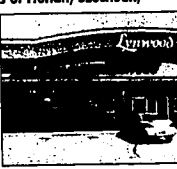

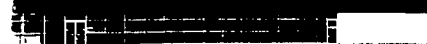

KEITH URBAN: You might not recog-
nize Willie Nelson on Saturday night,
but you might know a couple years
ago playing rock-a-billy on a street
corner.

The old boy could be sporting
dreadlocks to go along with his new
reggae album when he plays at the
wild cat concert in the Keith Urban Sun
Valley Outdoor Pavilion.

Then again, maybe not.
Nelson started the "Countryman
album" series, and it had covered in
numerous leaves at every outlet but
Wal-Mart 10 years ago.

And, while it's difficult to pinpoint
and upstroke guitar, minus, mesh per-

fectly well with his country, strains,
Nelson could be finding ahead to his
Latin and concert on Sept. 18. The con-
cert will include a special appeal for
the victims of Hurricane Katrina.

He also got the war in Iraq to
proceed about something he feels so
strongly about he released a rare politi-
cal song, "Whatever Happened to
Peace on Earth."

And it's been reported that he will do
the Keith Urban concert as a tribute to the
Dalai Lama, who will deliver a mes-
sage of healing and compassion on the
anniversary of 9/11 on Sunday.

Whatever moves him, you can bet
he will give the audience their \$5.50
worth.

Says 72-year-old Willie Nelson played a con-
cert that made his younger
counterpart the 62-year-old Mick Jag-
ger look like a meddler last time
he played Sun Valley.

He dined in with lead
off singer Ray Price
shortly after
Price got

things humming at 10 p.m. and con-
tinued to sing the hits until about
after 10 when organizers had to shut
him down.

And the hits — they are many to
this former Bible salesman and radio
disc jockey.

Keith Urban, Texas, a town near
Wood that has since been razed from
the map. Nelson recorded, imitated
and sold his first song at age 24.

He couldn't sing, he said. "Lam-
da billy" for 50 to his kids, some
shows. He followed that up with a
string of hits like "Crazy" and "Hello
Wells" that he wrote for others.

A couple of self-help books con-
vinced him that — yes, he could sing.

And since the road has been his
home, his family, the musicians, stage
hands and roadies who travel with
him as he goes from town to town
singing "Night Life," "Red Headed
Stranger," "Blue Eyes Crying in
the Rain" and, yes, "On the Road Again" on
his battered guitar.

Unlike many musicians with long
running careers, Nelson trades out
plenty of the familiar old hits from his
ever-lengthening playbook.

But it's possible — if he remembers
that is — that he might play one of his
familiar old songs, which include
one called "I'm a Worried Man" that
the late Johnny and June Carter Cash
performed when Cash lived in Jamaica.

If he doesn't, no matter. There's al-
ways "Always on My Mind," "Whiskey
River," "Georgia on My Mind."

Beleaguered theaters try supersizing, 3D, other enticers

Been to the movies lately? Not
Nothing special about the big
screen anymore? Prefer watch-
ing a DVD at home?

That's probably one reason
movie-ticket sales have been
falling for more than two years.

Even if the second half of this
year promises to be a strong one
at the box office, including the
release of "King Kong," studios
and exhibitors both realize they
must offer their clients some-

thing special to get excited
about.

"Moviegoers are looking for
something different," says Paul
Dergarabedian, an entertain-
ment-industry expert at
Exhibitor Relations Co. So a new
3D format is coming soon. And
major Hollywood films enlarged
for the supersize Imax screen are
doing well, even with higher-
than-normal ticket prices.

"Batman Begins: The Imax Ex-
perience" recently became the
highest-grossing 2D release for

the company within only nine
weeks. Last year's Christmas
movie "The Polar Express,"
which was released in Imax 3D
as well as in the conventional
size, made \$45 million on only
83 Imax screens, significantly
more than what the film took in
per screen in the normal format.
The Imax version will be re-
leased in the fall.

The Imax success is some-
what ironic. Theaters used to
have large screens, but with the
advent of the multiples, most

were downsized.

Imax, which has 130 U.S.
screens, has released feature
films in the big format since
2002. The company, founded in
1967 and well-known for its na-
ture movies, had tried to get a
piece of the Hollywood pie for a
while.

Co-CEO Richard L. Gelfond
recalled in a recent interview
how he once tried to persuade
"Star Wars" creator George
Lucas to shoot an original Imax
movie. Lucas seemed to like the

idea, but told Gelfond to come
back once there were 1,000 big
screens.

The company developed a
technology that allowed transfor-
mation of any 35mm movie into
a 70mm big-screen format. The
first such turn to be released was
"Apollo 13." Imax now reserves
six slots every year for big Holly-
wood films, which in many cases
come out parallel to the 35mm
version. Titles have included
"Spider-Man 2," "The Lion King,"
and "Star Wars: Episode II."

Directed by Gary Chapman. (120) G. Contains some scary moments for very young children.

'War of the Worlds'

Steven Spielberg's feverishly involving update of the 1898 H.G. Wells classic starring an uncommonly fine Tom Cruise and Dakota Fanning as an father and estranged daughter fleeing invading aliens. PG-13 (intense violence and gore)

Patriots start three-peat bid with win over Raiders

FOXBOROUGH, Mass. — New England's quest for an unprecedented third straight Super Bowl victory is in good hands with two stars the Patriots didn't lose: Tom Brady and Richard Seymour.

Brady threw for 306 yards and two touchdowns and Seymour made a game-turning defensive play as the Patriots beat Oakland 30-20 Thursday night, holding Randy Moss, the Raiders' new star, to one big play, a 73-yard touchdown catch.

New England's 35th win in 39 games since the start of the 2003 season was an odd one — all of defense at the start, mostly defense after intermission. 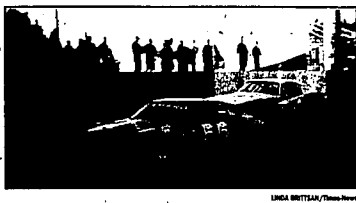

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) — His crew calls him "Money Man" because when the stakes are high, Jeff Gordon is the only driver there who can't be out of the clutch.

His reputation is about to be tested with an entire season on the line. Gordon has one race left to squeeze his way into the chase for the championship. If he wins, he still can come through in the clutch.

He'll have his work cut out for him Saturday night at Richmond International Speedway, where Gordon will enter the race 12th in the standings, 30 points out of the final qualifying spot.

It's intense pressure going into one single race," Gordon said during NASCAR's weekly teleconference. "We've been in pressure situations before. I know there is a reason and who knows — we might find out why on (Saturday) it wasn't meant to be or not meant to be."

Ten drivers will qualify for the 10-race Chase for the Nextel Cup title hunt, and Tony Stewart, Jimmie Johnson, Matt Kenseth, Rusty Wallace, Mark Martin and Kurt Busch already have

clinched their spots. Jeremy Mayfield needs only to finish 35th or better Saturday to get in. That leaves about six drivers racing for the final three spots, and Gordon is the star of the group.

A four-time series champion and NASCAR's most recognizable driver, Gordon is the one-racer capable of winning each and every week. He opened the season as the driver to beat, winning the Daytona 500 and two other events, but his Hendrick Motorsports team has been on a slide since May — dropping from second in the standings to as low as 15th.

"It's pretty hard to figure out what is going on with that team, especially with the talent behind the wheel," said Dale Earnhardt Jr., already eliminated from title contention. "He's just always been the one guy who could flip a switch and get going when he needed to."

But there hasn't been a magic button for Gordon to push lately, and the No. 24 crew figures something out before Saturday night, Gordon would

prefer to miss the Chase completely as opposed to being noncompetitive during the 10-race chase.

"Honestly, if we perform this weekend like we have the last few, we don't belong in the Chase anyway," Gordon said. "You know, all we're going to do is go out there and finish 10th in the points."

Gordon refuses to place blame for his struggles, making a point to express support for crew chief Robby Loomis. The two have one of the longest current driver-crew chief relationships in the game, teaming together in 2000, then winning the championship the next year.

"I believe 100 percent in Robby Loomis and in his abilities," Gordon said. "When we're out there, he's nobody better, and because of our lack of performance this year I really don't think that you know, Robby should be put to blame for that."

But he also hinted that a shake-up of the team could be in the works and Loomis might not be the best choice for the season even started about Robby's future.

ATLANTA — Delta Air Lines Inc. said Thursday it has completed its \$425 million sale of feeder carrier Atlanta Southeast Airlines Inc. to SkyWest Inc.

ASA will continue to operate as a Delta Connection carrier under a 15-year contract with Atlanta-based Delta.

The deal, announced last month as part of Delta's effort to raise cash as it tries to head off a possible bankruptcy filing, SkyWest Inc., based in St. George, Utah, is the parent company of SkyWest Airlines, which operates as an independently owned partner carrier to Delta and United Airlines. SkyWest has been a Delta Connection carrier since 1987.

Delta, the nation's third-largest carrier, has said the proceeds will be used for general corporate purposes and to pay down \$100 million of debt. Delta, hit by high fuel costs, has lost nearly \$10 billion since January 2001.

Katrina knocks out weather stations

The Internet-based weather information service, WeatherBug, lost half its 300 reporting stations along the Gulf Coast in Hurricane Katrina.

The company is working to restore them while adding 30 new stations at facilities of emergency personnel and storm shelters.

ComScore Media Metrics reported that WeatherBug had 9.9 million unique visitors on Aug. 29, the day the storm hit. WeatherBug is operated by privately held AWS Convergence Technologies Inc. and has a nationwide network of 8,000 weather-tracking stations.

Insurance spokesman: \$100B loss possible

Thousands of insurance adjusters have amassed in the toxic Gulf Coast territory left by Hurricane Katrina, where a national spokesman said Thursday that \$100 billion in losses "might not be far-fetched."

That sum is based on computerized risk models, not a visual assessment of wind- and flood-ravaged Louisiana, Mississippi and Alabama, noted Joseph Annoti, senior vice president of public relations for the Property Casualty Insurers Association of America. Association members provide 41 percent of the nation's homeowner, auto, commercial and private workers' compensation insurance.

"Our claims adjusters haven't been allowed into many areas," Annoti said, "but \$25 billion is probably a realistic number for insured property losses." Other potential \$75 billion in damages would involve losses beyond his group's scope — damaged infrastructure, disrupted transportation and oil and gas activities and uninsured losses, he said.

American Airlines sued in safety case

DALLAS — Federal prosecutors have filed a \$1 million lawsuit against American Airlines Inc., saying that the carrier disregarded passenger safety in its handling of a reported fuel leak.

The lawsuit, filed this week and made public Thursday, claims American failed to sufficiently inspect and repair a fuel leak observed by a Federal Aviation Administration inspector in November 2003.

The FAA proposed a \$605,000 penalty last year to settle the matter, but Fort Worth, Texas-based American said the penalty wasn't warranted.

The FAA then brought the matter to the U.S. Attorney's office in Brooklyn, N.Y., after failing to reach a settlement, said agency spokesman Paul Turk.

According to the complaint, the inspector was traveling as a passenger on a flight from Orlando, Fla., to LaGuardia Airport in New York when he noticed fuel leaking from a wing and notified the pilot.

American didn't note the inspector's observation in its maintenance logs and flew the plane on additional flights before a scheduled maintenance detected a fuel leak, the complaint says.

Businesses respond quickly Hurricane recovery aided by companies' emergency plans

NEW ORLEANS — Days after Hurricane Katrina ripped across the Gulf Coast and left this storied city a toxic swamp, defense contractor Northrop Grumman flew in more than 3,000 paychecks from Texas. Wal-Mart rushed mops and bottles of bleach to its stores across the Gulf Coast region. Hibernia Bank secured office space and apartments in a city seven hours away.

All show how nimble many

businesses were in responding to Katrina.

Hibernia Bank is 135 years old, a venerable New Orleans financial institution. When it became clear that Katrina was no ordinary hurricane, the bank's emergency plan kicked in.

Some executives relocated to the state capital, Baton Rouge, and employees who deal with computer networks, record-keeping and other administrative chores were sent farther away to Shreveport.

"The number one thing we did was to plan on how we would run the bank. A bank has to service its customers. Our goal was to get our customers to have access to their money," said Harold Turner, an executive vice president.

Katrina affected 107 Hibernia branches; 47 had reopened within a week, and another 39 are expected to open soon. Twenty-one were severely damaged.

Days after Katrina's landfall, Shreveport became the bank's de facto headquarters. One employee had been pre-assigned to secure housing and office space, and the bank snapped up both in the confusing days after the storm. More than 200

employees, their families and pets are housed in Shreveport now, and another 200 families will be moved there.

"We rented every apartment we could find," Turner said, adding that the bank is securing more hotel rooms and office space than had been envisioned. Its emergency plan, such as a short-term disaster, such as one week, not months.

"I don't think anyone would have anticipated the duration of this thing," he said. Days after Katrina's landfall, the Baton Rouge office of Spohn, a national provider of temporary workers, rushed to find receptionists, file clerks and men with strong backs to move

Business offers solar-powered video tombstones

MIAMI — All video screens have shown up — over in recent years, cell phones, car radios, car head rests, subway cars, even elevators. Next up: a solar-powered video panel embedded in a tombstone that plays a clip reminiscent of "This Is Your Life."

"While nothing ever replaces a magnet for vandals?" On the contrary, says inventor Sergio Aguirre, "this is your life."

His soothingly named Serenity Panel is all about helping families celebrate the life of a lost loved one. "While nothing ever replaces the gift of life, memories can now come one step closer to forever being remembered and not forgotten," waxes the Web site of Aguirre's company, Vidstone LLC.

The video headline concept has been around for years, but previous inventors' ambitions have been laid to rest. One gave up for lack of demand and out of concerns his invention wouldn't be able to withstand years of harsh weather.

That's not deterring Aguirre, who quit his telecommunications job last month to work full time on Vidstone. Aguirre, 32, promises the Serenity Panel will be durable, and while he hasn't said any yet, he says he's got pre-orders from families with deceased relatives. He wouldn't say how many pre-

orders, and he hasn't yet collected any payment.

The device plays a five-to-seven-minute video featuring special moments from someone's life that would be compiled by anyone from friends and relatives of the deceased to funeral homes. Vidstone doesn't do video production.

The Serenity Panel's screen is covered by a solar panel, which can be flipped open by visitors. Once opened, the video starts. The device includes two standard headphone jacks to listen to the audio. The solar panel protects the screen from sun damage and charges a battery inside, Aguirre said.

Four hours of sun provides enough juice to play the video continuously for up to 90 minutes.

The 7-inch shatter-resistant LCD screen is designed to last for 15 years, when it can either

be replaced with a new device or covered with a bronze plaque. It will come with a one-year warranty, extended coverage for 10 years is about another \$200.

Aguirre says the product is vandal-resistant and has been tested to survive the outdoors — the unit will function between 32 degrees and 120 degrees Fahrenheit. He said the panel won't be damaged if temperatures get outside that range.

The Serenity Panel should be ready for sale in October and cost about \$1,500, including the use of video-making software, he said.

G. Scott Mindrum, president and chief executive of funeral services company Making Everlasting Memories, got a patent for a similar device in 1998 but never produced it.

"I don't want to offer something that would fail," he said.

Merck succeeds in blocking ethics expert in hearing

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP) — A New Jersey judge agreed Thursday to bar an expert on business ethics from testifying on behalf of an Idaho man who blames his heart attack on the painkiller Vioxx.

Superior Court Judge Carol Higbee, who will preside over the man's product liability case against Merck & Co. beginning next week, granted Merck's request to keep W. Michael Hoffman from taking the stand after lawyers for the drug maker said his testimony would be subjective, potentially confusing for jurors and violate court rules that limit expert testimony to scientific and technical topics.

But she rejected Merck's motions to limit the testimony of three other experts who will testify, saying they can help jurors understand the case brought by Frederick Humeston, 60, of

Boise, Idaho, a Vietnam veteran who suffered a heart attack less than two months after he began taking the drug to ease pain from a war wound.

Jury selection begins Monday in the trial, the first Vioxx case to go to trial since a Texas jury awarded \$25.34 million last month to the family of a Wal-Mart produce manager who died after taking the drug Vioxx was taken off the market last September.

The rulings Thursday came in a hearing that also provided a window into the legal sparring expected when Humeston's attorneys square off with Merck.

The company, which contends Vioxx had nothing to do with Humeston's heart attack, will call experts of its own in hopes of persuading jurors that it was Humeston's age, obesity, high cholesterol and high blood pressure that set the stage for

the heart attack.

It was Humeston's experts who were at issue Thursday. Hoffman, a philosophy professor who is executive director of the Center for Business Ethics, at Bentley College in Waltham, Mass., was enlisted to testify about whether Merck met the standards of its own code of ethics when it began receiving information about complications associated with Vioxx.

But Merck lawyer Christy Jones told the judge that Hoffman would offer opinions, not facts, and that allowing him to testify would usurp the role of the jury.

The real issue is what transpired, not whether someone acted ethically or not, Jones said. "The jury can draw their own conclusions and should draw those conclusions based on what your honor says is the

rule of law."

Countering, Humeston's lawyers said it would be difficult to determine whether Merck engaged in "unconscionable commercial practices" in marketing and selling Vioxx without letting the jury hear about business ethics. They created a code of conduct and they violated their own code, said lead counsel Chris Seeger, referring to Merck.

Higbee ruled in favor of Merck on that motion, but balked at restricting the areas of testimony to be offered by biostatistician Richard Kronmal, Brown University professor Dr. David Eggleman and heart expert Dr. Benedict Lucchesia.

On Friday, Higbee will hear a Merck motion asking that television cameras be banned from the courtroom during the trial, which is expected to last up to six weeks.

2006 PONTIAC TORRENT

WASHINGTON — It was a journey into the New American Westland — a place of super-highways, tract housing developments and shopping malls. It was a disappointment. There was nothing to see.

I turned the 2006 Pontiac Torrent around and headed home, wondering if I was the agent of my own undoing.

I love driving. I can think of no greater celebration of freedom than getting behind the wheel of an automobile and setting out for points unknown. The idea is to explore — to find a new place, get to know it, and leave it alone.

That is what I intended to do on an east-west drive along Virginia Route 7, starting in Alexandria and ending in Winchester. It had been years since I had driven the length of Route 7, years covered with memories of bucolic pastures, gently rolling hills and acres of undisturbed greenery.

I settled into the Torrent, an excellent family wagon masquerading as a sport-utility vehicle, and drove off. It was a pleasant launch. The Torrent, Pontiac's discernibly upgraded version of the Chevrolet Equinox, is an easy driver. It is available in front-wheel-drive, or all-wheel-drive, the latter of which is good for traveling along snow-covered or gravel roads.

Nuts and bolts: 2006 Pontiac Torrent

Downside: We have entered a world in which 200-horsepower vehicles have become the norm. Thus, the 185-horsepower Torrent is dismissed out of hand by throttle jockeys as being an underperforming wing.

I disagree with that assessment. I think there is enough horsepower in the Torrent to move reasonable people from one place to another at reasonable speeds and costs.

Ride, acceleration and handling: Pontiac calls the Torrent an SUV. But the proof is in the ride. It's a station wagon. There is nothing at all truck-like about the Torrent's ride and handling. It's a smooth runner, in much the manner of a wagon or large sedan. Acceleration is excellent, meaning that you can change highway lanes safely and quickly.

Head-turning quotient: Most spectators said it was a nice-looking wagon. No one called it a truck.

I had the front-wheel-drive version. Front-wheel drive uses less gasoline than all-wheel drive; and with the price of regular unleaded gasoline escalating, I wanted the cheapest possible. The Torrent was helpful in that regard. The front-wheel-drive model gets 24 miles per gallon on the highway, which is decent for a compact wagon/SUV; and it runs well

Price: A base price on the front-wheel-drive 2006 Pontiac Torrent is \$20,877. Price as tested is \$24,545, including \$1,555 in options and a \$590 destination charge. Dealer's price with options and transportation fee is \$22,759. Prices sourced from Pontiac and www.edmunds.com.

an SUV.

Body style/lay-out: The Pontiac Torrent shares a platform with the Chevrolet Equinox. Both are front-engine, four-door, wagon/SUVs with a rear hatch. Construction is welded, galvanized steel — a unitized body. Both are available in front-wheel-drive and all-wheel-drive. Visually, the Torrent is more attractive than the Equinox. Inside and out.

Engine/transmission: The Pontiac Torrent is equipped with a 3.4-liter V-6 engine that develops 185 horsepower at 5,200 revolutions per minute and 210 foot-pounds of torque at 3,800 rpm. The engine is linked to a five-speed automatic transmission.

with regular unleaded gasoline, which costs less than premium grades.

Visibility in the Torrent is excellent. Its flat-black instrument panel sits low, giving the driver an unobstructed view of the road. The flat-black treatment eliminates instrument panel glare. The side-view mirrors are well placed. Rear vision is excellent. But the scenery was

Cargo and fuel capacities: The Torrent has seating for five people. Cargo capacity is 32.2 cubic feet with the rear seats up and 68.6 cubic feet with the rear seats folded down. The fuel tank holds 16.8 gallons of regular unleaded gasoline. Payload, the weight of what can be carried onboard, is 1,290 pounds in the front-wheel-drive model and 1,157 pounds in the all-wheel-drive version. The Torrent can be equipped to tow 3,500 pounds.

Mileage: I averaged 24 miles per gallon in highway driving in the front-wheel-drive Torrent.

Safety: Standard anti-lock brakes. Hood air bags are optional. Buy them.

depressing.

Shopping centers and housing developments have swallowed up the green spaces along Route 7. Superhighways with looping access and exit ramps now crisscross the land. Route 7, itself, is a permanently congested artery filled with cars and trucks and drivers commuting to jobs miles away from their faux-rural houses and rushing

to shopping centers to spend the money they've earned.

This goes on for miles — a motorized curse in which the freedom to drive has become a punitive sentence that has the convicts running from one drab scene to another. It gives a new meaning to Jean-Paul Sartre's play "No Exit."

I did not want this. I only wanted to drive, to experience the joy and freedom of autonomous movement, to revel in the glory of a machine of many parts working in concert to keep me rolling.

But what has happened along Route 7 is an exercise in extremism in which the cars and trucks I love have been transformed into marauding monsters chewing up acres of beautiful land and spitting out miles of ugly concrete to move their drivers through an eternal cycle of work and consumption.

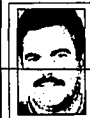
I turned around several miles before reaching Winchester, vowing never to travel Route 7 again. But knowing in my heart that we rapidly are turning America into a nation of Route 7s.

I concentrated on the traffic and listened to the steady hum of the Torrent's 3.4-liter, 185-horsepower V-6 engine, and found some peace in that. It is a five-passenger vehicle, outfitted with all sorts of storage bins, nooks and crannies — perfectly designed for a family trip. Here's hoping that there will be some place left for them to go.

Car manuals don't cover all components

Q: When is it necessary (if at all) to change the following parts: oxygen sensor, gas filter, distributor cap, distributor and brake fluid? These are not covered in my car manual and I do not want to seem an easy target by some unscrupulous service people.

A: Good questions, Betty. Some of the parts you mentioned are intended to last the life of the vehicle, some no longer exist, and brake fluid is more important than most people think. Let's consider your list:

• **Oxygen sensor.** Your car might have between one and four oxygen sensors, which are critical for optimum fuel economy and emissions reduction. O2 sensors are usually considered a lifetime component, but can "degrade or fail due to contamination or simply old age. Vehicles built since 1996 check their sensor(s) regularly and hold very tight standards for acceptability. Should a sensor fail its on-board diagnostic test, your check engine or service engine soon light will illuminate. (The light also can come on due to many other reasons.)

On older vehicles, a skilled technician can check sensor performance, perhaps every 60,000 miles.

• **Fuel filter.** Fuel filters are often considered a lifetime component, although I'm inclined to renew them at 60,000 to 90,000 miles to protect the electric fuel pump from possible stress. A dirty, restricted filter can take a toll on the fuel pump prior to exhibiting any symptoms, such as loss of power under acceleration or high speed.

• **Distributor cap and rotor.** If used, they might last the life of the vehicle, and have similar fault symptoms as the plug wires. A visual inspection every 60,000 to 90,000 miles is recommended. Distributors, if used, normally last just about forever, although a few vehicles have non-serviceable sensors inside, and might require unit replacement, should the sensor fail.

• **Brake fluid.** That leaves us with brake fluid, and if I might add it, engine coolant. Replacement of these fluids is notoriously under-recommended in most maintenance manuals. If mentioned at all, brake fluid absorbs moisture, which can cause corrosion of expensive ABS (anti-lock braking system) components, and degrade high-demand braking performance. Renewing the fluid every 36,000 to 48,000 miles is a very good idea.

When searching for a trustworthy repair shop, look for one that is AAA-approved, an ASE and/or BBB member, and employs ASE-certified technicians.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE

On this deal from the qualifying stages of the World Junior Championships in 1995, Great Britain earned their IMPs on the following hand. Nobody else got this defense right, for the right reasons. What was also impressive was the speed with which the defense handled this rather complex position.

Against five diamonds, you lead the spade king and see the eight from partner (playing normal signals) and the 10 from declarer. And for your next trick? This board was played on Vugraph, before a live audience, and we saw that the result from the other table was five diamonds raking. The defense had also led the spade king and switched to the heart jack, on which South had thoughtfully contributed the queen under East's ace. This left East an awkward decision as to what to do next, and he had guessed wrong by playing a second spade. Declarer could ruff and draw trumps, then discard his heart on one of dummy's high clubs.

Jason Hackett of Great Britain was also put in the same position at trick one, when his partner, his brother Justin, followed with the eight. He also switched to a heart, but foreseeing the problems that his partner might have, he played the king. Justin, of course, did not have to signal attitude on this trick. When the king holds the trick, both players know who has the ace. He played the eight to show an even number, and Jason simply continued with a second round of hearts, assured that declarer still had a heart left.

ANSWER: A simple rebid of two spades is better than a call of two no-trump, which ought to indicate a balanced hand—that is to say, no singletons. Your spades are chunky enough to rebid. If the spade king were in the club suit, two no-trump might indeed be the smallest lie, but not here.

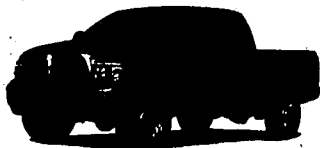

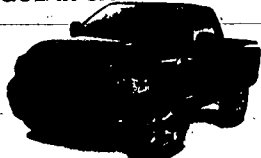
