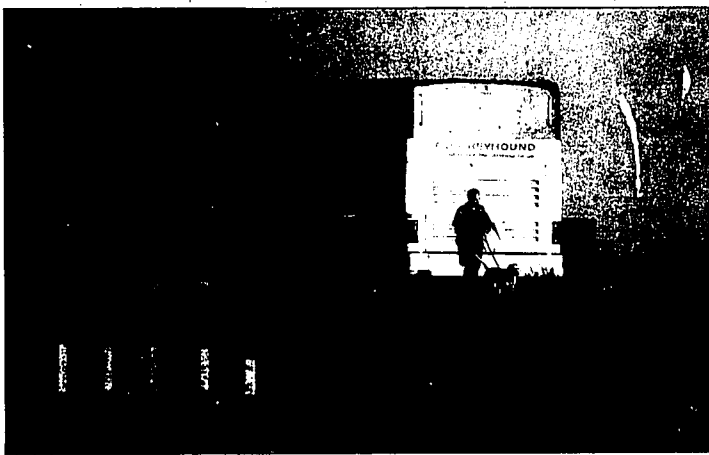

Bomb threat halts I-84

After three hours, police determine threat was hoax

HAZELTON — A bomb threat to a Greyhound bus east of here disrupted interstate traffic for more than three hours. Thursday afternoon as police kept the area secured and bus passengers relaxed at the nearby Greenwood Truck Plaza.

No bomb was found, but the incident was taken seriously by Idaho State Police and other emergency personnel.

"It's a big inconvenience. I'm post 9/11 you have to look at it that way," said ISP incident commander Kevin Ilaight.

Two heroes of the day were a Labrador retriever named Beau and his handler, Kirk York, from Boise Airport Security, who sniffed and searched the bus while emergency per-

sonnel kept several hundred feet away.

After about 15 minutes, Beau and York determined the threat was a hoax.

Authorities are investigating the bomb threat as a prank call, possibly from a disgruntled passenger who was removed from the bus in Stanfield, Ore., a small town in the north central part of the state where the bus stopped early Thursday morning.

"The bus driver kicked somebody off the bus because he was drunk and sexually harassing a woman," said Christopher Harris, a passenger from Bocatolli.

"So we think he may have did that."

Meanwhile, authorities also stopped a bus near Malad at about the same time.

ISP Spokesman Rick Oltus-

man said both buses were halted because it was uncertain which bus the prank caller was targeting.

He further stated that a bomb squad was brought in from Utah to investigate that incident.

The bus near Hazelton, Greyhound Lines No. 7266, was eastbound on Interstate 84 about two miles east of the Ridgeway Road exit when it was stopped shortly before 3 p.m. by Jerome County Sheriff's Deputy Kris Johnson, who passengers described as another hero of the day.

"I want to say appreciation for that sheriff," said passenger Eric Lopez, of San Antonio, Texas. "The sheriff stopped the bus and said there was bomb on it — yeah, it was really scary," he said, while pointing out that his knees were still

shaking a few hours after the incident began.

Passengers were unloaded from the Greyhound bus and transported to the truck plaza in a yellow school bus borrowed from nearby Valley High School.

The eastbound lane of the interstate was closed at 3 p.m. and traffic was rerouted to the north frontage road.

The south frontage road was also closed.

Eastbound traffic backed up for more than a mile, as two lanes converged into one to exit the freeway and traffic moved at a snail's pace.

Forty-three passengers and Greyhound bus driver Brian Hansen relaxed at the truck stop, some napping, others eating and drinking while oth-

Hurricane forces evacuations in Cancun, Cuba

CANCUN, Mexico — Tourists packed Cancun's airport and shuttled from luxury hotels to spartan emergency shelters Thursday, desperately trying to escape Hurricane Wilma as its outer bands battered the resort's white-sand beaches. Cuba evacuated more than 200,000 people.

Wilma, a Category 4 storm with winds of 150 mph, churned toward the Yucatan peninsula and south Florida after its outer bands hit Haiti and Jamaica, where it killed at least 13 people. The storm was expected to strike Cancun and its surrounding resorts and sidestripe Cuba early Friday.

Forecasters said Wilma likely would make a sharp right turn toward Florida, where Gov. Jeb

Bush declared a state of emergency, after getting caught in the westerlies, the strong wind current that generally blows toward the east. It is expected to make landfall in Florida on Sunday.

"At least for the next couple of days here, we think we're going to have a very powerful hurricane here in the Caribbean," said Max Mayfield, director of the National Hurricane Center in Miami.

Briefly the most intense Atlantic hurricane on record, Wilma was a potentially catastrophic Category 5 storm before weakening. Its 150 mph winds made it more powerful than Hurricane Katrina when it plowed into the Gulf coast of the United States on Aug. 29, killing more than 1,200 people.

WWII pilot removed from glacier

FRESNO, Calif. — A glacier-encased body believed to be a World War II aviator who crashed into the Sierra Nevada in 1942 was flown off the mountain and into a Fresno laboratory for identification, the county's deputy coroner said Thursday.

Blustery conditions kept rangers at Kings Canyon National Park from reaching the frozen remains for two days after two ice climbers reported last weekend they had seen a man's head, shoulder and arm protruding from the thick ice. About 80 percent of the body was buried in the glacier on the side of the 13,710-foot Mount Mendel. The remote wilderness area can only be reached by hiking two or three days, or by helicopter when the weather allows, rangers said.

Congress will shield gunmakers from suits

WASHINGTON — A compromise legislative package that would shield firearms manufacturers and dealers from lawsuits over gun deaths and injuries was approved by the House on Thursday.

Opponents called the bill a "loophole" in the House passed the gun lobby's plan to force the Republican-controlled Congress to pass the bill, but the vote moved forward to sign the bill. The laws should punish criminals who use guns to commit crimes, not law-abiding citizens, gun makers said.

The Senate passed the bill 65-41 on Friday.

The bill's passage was a national bill. Sen. Jeff Sessions (R-Ala.) and Sen. Mitch McConnell (R-Ky.) and his Republican allies on Capitol Hill have been a political ally of the gun lobby, when several top GOP House members and GOP House leadership leaders are expected to sign it.

Analysis: Diabetes pill can double risk of death

CHICAGO — A new diabetes pill that was headed for government approval has been linked to deaths, heart attacks and strokes, a medical journal reported Thursday in an analysis it said was rushed online to head off a Vioxx-like fiasco.

The study by leading heart researchers found twice as many deaths and cardiovascular problems in diabetic adults taking the drug Paraglu as those on thin pills or a competing drug.

Developed by Bristol-Myers Squibb and Merck & Co. the drug, known generically as munitigilaz, was endorsed by a Food and Drug Administration panel last month. It is a treatment for Type 2 diabetes, the

most common form of diabetes, most often in people who are overweight.

The Journal of the American Medical Association reported the analysis on its Web site Thursday ahead of the next month's publication date because of public safety concerns. The study was led by two top heart doctors who reviewed data the FDA made public before the panel vote.

If the analysis is correct, the drug could have meant a public health catastrophe, given that 18 million Americans have diabetes, said Dr. Steven Nissen, who worked on the analysis with Dr. Eric Topol and a clinical statistician.

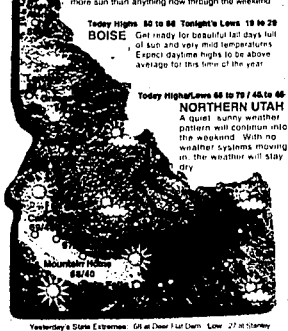

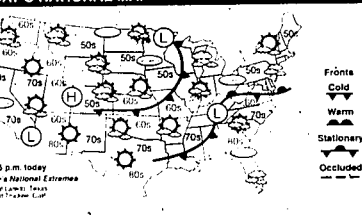

Bush vows to push on

President says investigations won't distract him

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush, fanned by investigations of White House officials and congressional leaders and an uproar over his Supreme Court nomination, said Thursday the news was "some background noise here, a lot of chatter" complicating the work of his administration.

But he said, "The American people expect me to do my job, and I'm going to."

Bush's comments, at a Rose Garden news conference with Palestinian leader Mahmoud Abbas, reflected the administration's argument that its agenda is moving forward despite a growing list of problems.

The president promised to remain focused on seeking peace in the Middle East, investing in the economy, rebuilding the hurricane-shattered Gulf Coast and protecting it from the new storm approaching this weekend. At the same time, he said, "There's some background noise here, a lot of chatter, a lot of speculation and spinning."

White House officials are quiet

ly anxious about the outcome of events over which they have little control. It's an uncomfortable position for an administration that likes to steer the agenda and has a reputation for protecting its secrets. Now, administration officials are asking reporters what they're hearing.

The most immediate problem is the investigation by Special Prosecutor Patrick Fitzgerald to determine whether there was a concerted administration effort to illegally divulge Valerie Plame's CIA

identity because her husband publicly questioned Bush on the Iraq war. The central figures in the investigation are White House deputy chief of staff Karl Rove and J. Lewis "Scooter" Libby, chief of staff to Vice President Dick Cheney. Both Rove and Libby talked to reporters before Plame was unmasked.

"We don't know what all the facts are," said White House press secretary Scott McClellan. "All of us would like to know what they are and get to the bottom of this."

Teen arrested in slaying of lawyer's wife

MARTINEZ, Calif. (AP) — A teenage neighbor was arrested in the slaying of a prominent defense attorney's wife, and a newspaper reported Thursday that she eluded her to death while looking for marijuana-growing equipment he had ordered.

Authorities would not identify the 16-year-old youth and said they were still working to determine a motive for the beating death Saturday of Pamela Vitale, the wife of lawyer and TV legal pundit Frank Horowitz.

Although we have a suspect, the investigation is still going on," said sheriff's spokesman Jimmy Lee. "Much more work still needs to be done."

Vitale, 52, was slain over the weekend at the hilltop estate where the couple were building their dream home in the wealthy San Francisco suburb

Lafayette. The teenager lived down the hill on a remote canyon road. He was arrested Wednesday night.

The San Francisco Chronicle, citing an unidentified law enforcement source, reported that investigators believe the killing was related to a scheme that involved using stolen credit card numbers to fund a marijuana-growing operation.

The source said the boy had ordered equipment for the pot operation and mistakenly thought the supplies were delivered to Horowitz and Vitale's home, the newspaper reported on its Web site.

He went there Saturday looking for the equipment and got in a fight with Vitale, striking her dozens of times in the head with a piece of molding that was left behind at the scene, according to the source.

Rep. Delay booked on conspiracy charges

HOUSTON (AP) — Rep. Tom Delay turned himself in Thursday at the sheriff's office and was fingerprinted, photographed and released on \$100,000 bail on conspiracy and money-laundering charges.

Accompanied by his attorney, Dick DeGuerin, the former House majority leader showed up about midday, appeared before a judge and was gone in less than 30 minutes, sheriff's Lt. John Martin said.

"Now Ronnie Earle has the mugshot he wanted," DeGuerin said, referring to the Travis County district attorney who brought the charges. Delay and his lawyer have accused the district attorney of trying to make headlines for himself.

The Texas Republican is scheduled to make his first court appearance on Friday in Austin.

The charges forced DeLay to give up his House leadership post.

The defense later Thursday asked Judge Bob Perkins to step aside and for the trial to be moved out of Travis County. Perkins has donated to causes and people opposed to DeLay, and his impartiality might be questioned, the motion said.

The change of venue motion "cited media attention and noted that Austin, widely perceived as a liberal town, is one of the last enclaves of the Democratic Party in Texas."

He had been expected to turn himself in in his home county, Fort Bend, outside of Houston, where a horde of reporters awaited. But under Texas law he could check in anywhere in the state.

DeGuerin said he and DeLay went to the sheriff's office in Houston because it was convenient and because "I wanted to avoid the circus."

"That's what Ronnie (Earle) wanted. He wanted a pep walk and we did not want to do it," the defense attorney said.

Someone strikes it rich in old Gold Rush town — with Powerball ticket

JACKSONVILLE, Ore. (AP) — Lady luck was waiting to find out if she and her husband would be again struck it rich here — winning the record \$340 million Powerball jackpot after purchasing a lottery ticket at one of two of the town's lottery retailers.

The winner of winners of the largest jackpot in Powerball's history had not yet stepped forward with the winning ticket — which was sold either at Ray's Local Place or J'Ville Tavern.

At the J'Ville Tavern, owner Andy Gough wanted to find out if she and her husband would be again struck it rich here — winning the record \$340 million Powerball jackpot after purchasing a lottery ticket at one of two of the town's lottery retailers.

Lottery officials said it was sold either at the tavern or a grocery store in town. The owner of the business that sells the ticket gets \$300,000.

The town began to fade as the richer ore dwindled and the railroad passed it by, and Jacksonville became something of a ghost town.

"They were so excited, she was grinning from ear to ear and he was pretty calm."

"The couple did not return phone calls to talk about their good fortune."

Randy Lewis, store manager at Ray's, was part of a 10-person pool who paid \$5 each for a Powerball ticket.

"We won \$15," said Lewis.

Although Lewis didn't win the jackpot, Ray's will pick up a \$100,000 bonus if the \$340 million powerball ticket was purchased there.

Like Ray's, J'Ville Tavern also didn't know it had sold the \$340 million jackpot ticket.

Jacksonville was a rough-and-tumble boomtown after a gold rush started in the early 1850s. Mining in the surrounding hills and creeks continued off and on after that.

"We need to have gold," she said of the historic town that grew up during Oregon's Gold Rush. "Now we have gold again."

The tavern sold an \$8.75 million winner a few years ago and Gough was bringing another customer of what she called a "working man's tavern" would still be rich.

"It's probably floating on a flood (Next night now)," she said. "I just hope it's one of our regular customers who can really use it."

Tax sales and pumpkins were stacked in front of Ray's as customers filed in Thursday morning, some of them Powerball players.

Among them was Woody Hunter, publisher of the Jacksonville Review, a weekly newspaper, who checked his ticket in the Powerball ticket reader.

"I didn't win," he said.

Ray's also sold one of four turn-of-up tickets purchased in Oregon — worth \$200,000 plus a bonus of \$650,000.

Mother arrested after allegedly throwing children into S.F. Bay

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A woman accused of dropping her three children to their deaths in the chilly waters of San Francisco Bay was arrested while pushing an empty stroller away from the pier and was jailed Thursday on suspicion of murder.

Jashuan E. Harris, 23, was taken into custody Wednesday night after someone saw her drop the youngsters from a 10-foot pier not far from Fishermen's Wharf, a major tourist spot.

The San Francisco Chronicle reported that the woman told authorities that wives had told her to throw her children in. And 16-year-old Brimley Fitzpatrick, who said she is the

woman's half-sister, said Harris talked to herself and was diagnosed with schizophrenia this year.

"She told my mama she was going to feed them to the sharks," Brimley said of the children. "No one thought it was that serious."

Harris first took off the children's clothes before dumping them in the water, according to a report in The San Jose Mercury-News.

The body of Jaronta Greely Jr., 2, was recovered late Wednesday near a yacht club, about two miles from the pier. The Coast Guard continued to search on Thursday for the other youngsters, Trayshuan, 6, and Joshua, 16 months.

FEMA official denounces his own agency on Katrina

WASHINGTON (AP) — In the midst of the chaos that followed Hurricane Katrina, Federal Emergency Management Agency official in New Orleans sent a dire e-mail to Director Michael Brown saying victims had no food and were dying.

No response came from Brown.

Instead, less than three hours later an aide to Brown sent an e-mail saying her boss wanted that night — after feeding at least an hour to eat dinner at a Baton Rouge, La. restaurant.

monde wrote. "The sooner we can get the medical patients out, the sooner we can get them out."

A short time later, Brown's press secretary, Sharon Worby, wrote colleagues to complain that the FEMA director needed more time to eat dinner at a Baton Rouge restaurant that evening. "He needs much more than (sic) 20 or 30 minutes," Worby wrote.

"Restaurants are getting busy," she said. "We now have

traffic to encounter to go to and from a location of his choice (sic), followed by well service from the restaurant staff, eating, etc. Thank you."

In an Aug. 29 phone call to Brown informing him that the first levee had failed, Bahamonde said he asked for guidance but did not get a response.

"He just said, 'Thank you,' and that he was going to call the White House," Bahamonde said.

The e-mails were made public Thursday at a Senate Homeland Security Committee hearing featuring Mary Bahamonde, the first agency official to testify. The New Orleans advance of the Aug. 29 storm. The hurricane killed more than 1,200 people and forced hundreds of thousands to evacuate.

Bahamonde, who sent the e-mail to Brown two days after the storm struck, said the correspondence illustrates the government's failure to grasp what was happening.

"There was a systematic failure at all levels of government to understand the magnitude of the situation," Bahamonde testified. "The leadership went down in our agency is unprepared and out of touch."

The 19 pages of internal FEMA e-mails show Bahamonde gave regular updates to people in contact with Brown as early as Aug. 28, the day before Katrina made landfall. They appear to contradict Brown, who has said he was not fully aware of the conditions until days after the storm hit. Brown quit after being recalled from New Orleans amid criticism of his work.

Brown had sent the e-mails, FEMA's regional director in New England, to New Orleans to help coordinate the agency's response. Bahamonde arrived on Aug. 27 and was the only FEMA official at the scene until FEMA disaster teams arrived on Aug. 30.

As Katrina's outer bands began denching the city Aug. 28, Bahamonde sent an e-mail to Deborah Wing, a FEMA response specialist. "This is going to get ugly real fast."

Subsequent e-mails told of an increasingly desperate situation at the New Orleans Superdome, where a group of about 15,000 evacuees were staying. Bahamonde spent two nights there with the evacuees.

On Aug. 31, Bahamonde e-mailed Brown and said that thousands of evacuees were gathering in the streets with no food or water and that "estimates are many will die within hours."

Sir, I know that you know the situation is past critical," Bahamonde wrote.

Report: U.S. troops burned Taliban bodies

KABUL, Afghanistan (AP) — Islamic clerics expressed outrage Thursday at American footage that purportedly shows U.S. soldiers burning the bodies of dead Taliban fighters to taunt other militants and warned of a possible anti-American jihad, the Islamic cleric said.

Hamid Karzai condemned the alleged desecration and ordered an inquiry. The operational commander of the U.S. military in Afghanistan, which launched its own criminal probe, said the alleged act, if true, was "repugnant."

Worried about the potential for an American-led jihad over the incident, the State Department said it instructed U.S. ambassadors to tell local governments that the reported abuse would not reflect American values.

Cremating bodies is banned under Islam, and one Muslim leader compared it to photographs of U.S. troops abusing prisoners at Abu Ghraib.

This is against Islam. Afghans will be shocked by this news. It is so humiliating, there will be very, very dangerous consequences from this," said Faiz Mohammed, a top cleric in northern Kanduz province.

FDA approves first brain stem cell transplant

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Federal regulators on Thursday approved what would be the first transplant of fetal stem cells into human brains, a procedure that if successful could open the door to treating a host of neural disorders.

The transplant recipients will be children who suffer from a rare, fatal genetic disorder.

The Food and Drug Administration said that doctors at

Stanford University Medical Center can begin the testing on six children afflicted with Batten disease, a degenerative malady that renders its young victims blind, speechless and paralyzed before it kills them.

An internal Stanford review board must still approve the test, a process that could take weeks.

The stem cells to be transplanted in the brain are

human embryonic stem cells, which are derived from days-old embryos. Instead, the cells are immature neural cells that are destined to turn into the mature cells that make up a fully formed brain.

The children's disease patients and stroke victims have received transplants of fully formed brain cells before, but the malleable brain cells involved here have never before been implanted.

City stays with proven leader for police chief

Twin Falls city officials didn't need a lengthy search for a new police chief. In fact, they didn't need a search at all.

City Council voted unanimously on Monday night to appoint Jim Munn as chief of police. Munn was already serving as interim chief since Aug. 31, when Chief Lee DeVore retired from the position.

Munn's selection was the right one, because he knows Twin Falls, he knows the department, and he is well-qualified in law enforcement.

A 25-year veteran of the force, Munn started as police dispatcher one year after graduating from Twin Falls High. He worked through the ranks as corporal, staff sergeant, captain and interim chief, serving the last few years under the mentoring wing of DeVore.

City officials also noted Munn's professional demeanor and strong support within the community. They were equally impressed with his ability to gain more training while working full-time. Munn completed a bachelor's degree in criminal justice from Southern California University for Professional Studies.

Having a groomed and qualified candidate with those credentials, city officials chose not to post the chief of police opening to the public.

"I don't think, regardless of who we may have been able to attract, we would have found someone of Jim's ability," said City Manager Tom Courtney. "It still came down to him having earned the opportunity to

be chief." Whether it's in the public or private sector, the dilemma of whether to hire chief executives from within or outside the institution is a slippery slope.

The culture of Twin Falls, from higher education, public education, local business and law enforcement, usually recognizes merit close to home and hires from within.

That can be a valid approach which saves time and resources.

Our view: City leaders found the most experienced and knowledgeable police chief candidate in Jim Munn.

Courtney also points out that it "creates an opportunity for others to move up, in an organization with long-tenured employees, those opportunities don't come too often."

When an institution has that wealth of experience, it speaks well about the organization, not to mention the community and people surrounding it.

But an organization or business can also succeed with new talent and fresh perspectives. Infusing some new blood into the system can be an invigorating move.

Twin Falls leaders say they'll follow that principle by recruiting candidates for the community development director's job, formerly held by Lamar Orton, as well as for the city engineer position that will be vacated by Gary Young at year's end. Courtney said city employees from within city hall will also be encouraged to apply.

In the case of Chief Munn, the best candidate was obvious. Hard work, experience, and strong support in the community all pointed to the interim chief. We applaud Munn for making it an easy decision.

Justice within reach in Baghdad

"We are able to do away with domestic terrorism and violence and aggression by those in power against the rights of their own people only when we make all men accountable to the law."
— Justice Robert Jackson, in his opening statement for the prosecution at the Nuremberg trials in 1945.

The rhetoric was soaring, the goals were grand, the ideals were large. And yet, by the standards of modern human rights and international law, the International Military Tribunal that tried and sentenced the Nazi leadership in Nuremberg should have been a failure.

From the start, the trials were clearly "victor's justice." Britain, France, the United States and the Soviet Union created the court with no real German or other "international" involvement. They called their ground rules "the Charter," not a "Charter of the question of the court's dubious legality. The list of defendants, limited to 20, was hardly comprehensive. At one point, Soviet prosecutors accused the Nazis of massacring some 20,000 Polish officers in 1940, a crime their government knew perfectly well the Soviet Union itself had carried out.

Yet Nuremberg was, in retrospect, a huge success, and as the trial of Saddam Hussein begins in Baghdad, it is worth remembering why. It achieved nothing else. Nuremberg laid out for the German people, and for the world, the true nature of the Nazi system. Auschwitz survivors and 25 officers presented testimony. Senior Nazis were subjected to cross-examination by the prosecutors. Documents produced documents, newsreels of liberated concentration camps and films of atrocities made by the Nazis themselves. There were hangings at the end, as well as acquittals. But it mattered



more that the story of the Third Reich had been told, memorably and eloquently.

Because it is taking place during an insurgency, and because it is run by Iraqis, not outsiders, the Iraqi Special Tribunal that will try Saddam and his henchmen is potentially weaker, and more easily manipulated, than the Nuremberg court. From the beginning some Iraqi politicians have wanted to use the trial to launch a political attack on the Sunni Baathists, while others want to get the whole thing over with quickly, precisely to protect some of the Sunni community leadership. Unhappily, the U.S. military still controls the captured files of Saddam's government, still restricts Iraqi access to them and will restrict who has access to the court records. Iraqi judges involved in the tribunal worry about the inexperience of the Iraqi judges and prosecutors, some of whom say privately that they are still afraid of Saddam, even sitting across from him in a courtroom.

Partly because of all that, and partly because they didn't much like the invasion of Iraq in the first place, the interna-

tional human rights groups that are normally enthusiastic about trials of dictators are squeamish about this one. Human Rights Watch has said that the tribunal has an "inappropriate standard of proof," and it worries that the accused will not have adequate defense. The International Center for Transitional Justice complains of the "legal, administrative and procedural" issues that have not been resolved, quite apart from the political issues. There is a lot of high-minded grumbling about the death penalty that will, presumably, be the end result.

And yet — if the court is able to compile a true record of events, if the judges are able to present authentic witnesses, and if tribunal spokesmen are able to communicate their findings to the Iraqi and international press, none of that matters. The fact that the court is starting with a smaller incident, the 1982 massacre of more than 140 Shiite men in the village of Dulaiji, is a good sign: The investigators do have witnesses, there is documentary evidence, and the story of Dulaiji is easier to tell than that of more complicated crimes, such as Saddam's genocidal

campaign against the Kurds or the Shiites of the south. Far from rushing or politicizing the trial, the hearings will probably be followed by a delay, so more evidence can be gathered.

In the end, it is by the quality of that evidence, and the clarity with which it is conveyed, that this trial should be judged. The trial is irrelevant: Quia frankly, it doesn't matter whether Saddam Hussein is drawn and quartered, exiled to Pyongyang, or left to rot in a Baghdad prison. No punishment could make up for the thousands he killed, or for the terror he inflicted on his country.

But if his Sunni countrymen learn what he did to Shiites and Kurds, if the Shiites and Kurds learn what he did to Sunnis, if Iraqis come to realize that his system of totalitarian terror damaged them all, and if others in the Middle East learn that dictatorship should be overthrown, then the trial will have served its purpose. That, and not an arbitrary standard of international law, is how the success of this unusual tribunal should be measured.

The safe way out for nominee Miers

It's no secret that I think the Harriet Miers nomination was a mistake. Nonetheless, when asked how she will do in the hearings, my answer is: I hope she does well. I have no desire to see her humiliated. Nor would I take any joy in seeing her rejected, though I continue to believe it would be best for the country that she not be confirmed for the Supreme Court.

And while I remain as exercised as anyone by the lack of wisdom of this choice, I part company from those who see the Miers nomination as a betrayal of conservative principles. The idea that Bush is looking to appoint some kind of closet liberal David Souter or even some rudderless Sandra Day O'Connor clone is wildly off the mark. The president's mistake was thinking he could sneak a reliable conservative past the liberal litmus tests (on abortion, above all) by nominating a candidate who is not exceptionally obscure and yet exceptionally well known to him.

The problem is that this strategy blew up in his face. Her obscurity is the result of her lack of constitutional history, which, in turn, robs her of the minimum qualifications for service on the Supreme Court. And while, post-Bork, stealth seems to be the most precious asset a conservative Supreme Court nominee can have, how stealthy is a candidate who has come out publicly for a constitutional amendment to ban abortion?

So, imagine the hearings. At first she will have to pass an implicit competency test. As case upon case is thrown at her on national television, she dare not flinch, above all by nominating a candidate who is not exceptionally obscure and yet exceptionally well known to him. (a) she has a judicial philosophy, and (b) is conservative.

And then there will be the Democrats who, in their first act of political wisdom in this millennium, have held their fire on Miers, under the old political

prongs that in a conference call of conservative leaders, two confidantes of Miers explicitly said that she would overturn Roe. The subsequent denials by one of these judges that he ever said that, and the subsequent affirmation by two of the people who had heard the call that in fact he did say so, create the nightmare scenario of subpoenaed witnesses contradicting each other under oath over Miers.

We need an exit strategy from this debacle. I have it. Lindsey Graham has been a staunch and public supporter of this nominee. Yet on Wednesday he joined Brownback in demanding privileged documents from Miers' White House tenure.

Finally, light at the end of this tunnel. A way out, irreconcilable differences over documents. For a nominee who, unlike John Roberts, has practically no previous record on constitutional issues, such documentation is essential for the Senate to judge her thinking and legal acumen. But there is no way that any president would release this kind of information — "policy documents" and "legal analysis" — from such a close confidante. It would forever undermine the

ability of any president to get unguarded advice.

Which creates a classic conflict, not of personality, not of competence, not of ideology, but of simple constitutional prerogatives: The Senate cannot confirm her unless it has this information. And the White House cannot allow release of this information lest it jeopardize executive privilege. Hence the perfectly honorable way to solve the conundrum: Miers withdraws out of respect for both the Senate and the executive's prerogatives, the Senate expresses appreciation for this gracious acknowledgment of its needs and responsibilities, and the White House accepts her decision with the deepest respect and with gratitude for Miers' putting preservation of executive prerogative above personal ambition. Faces saved. And we start again.

Feds charge anti-wolf activist

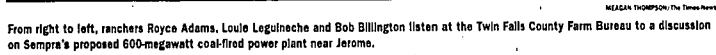

BOISE — An anti-wolf activist in central Idaho whose Web site tells how to poison wolves has been charged with placing bait with intent to kill wolves, and unauthorized use of a pesticide on U.S. Forest Service land.

Federal authorities filed the complaint Oct. 13 against Tim Sandles of Carmen. He is scheduled to appear in U.S. District Court on Tuesday in Pocatello. Both charges are misdemeanors and each carries a maximum penalty of a \$100,000 fine and six months in jail. The bait charge is a violation of the Endangered Species Act.

Sandles, an ammunition-maker critical of federal government for returning wolves to Idaho, said he views the charges as retribution for his anti-wolf activism.

"In this part of Idaho we have endured federal thugs, forcing wolves on us that hurt our businesses, lives and precious wildlife," Sandles told The Idaho Statesman on Wednesday. "When we oppose those thugs, they file devastating criminal charges on us. Is that what you intend?"

Clock ticking on coal-fired power plant

TWIN FALLS — Magic Valley residents are approaching a fork in the road.

If Idahoans don't want San Diego-based Sempra Generation to build its 600-megawatt coal-fired power plant near Jerome, they better speak up — and speak up soon, a farm power plant operator told about 20 people gathered at the Twin Falls County Farm Bureau Thursday evening.

"Coal plants are a long-term, multi-generational commitment," said Joe Ruschetti, a Twin Falls resident who operated power plants for over 10 years before getting into health care and business.

If Magic Valley residents aren't ready to make that commitment, Ruschetti said, they can voice concerns to the Idaho Department of Environmental Quality.

Idaho's proposed air-quality rule

- The Idaho Department of Environmental Quality has drafted a rule proposing to adopt federal air regulations revised as of July 1 for coal-fired power plants.
- The proposed state rule also allows Idaho to opt into the federal program for mercury emissions from coal-fired power plants. The program puts an industry-wide cap on mercury emissions. mentality. The agency has proposed a change in state law that would allow it to participate in a federal cap and trade program for mercury emissions from coal-fired power plants — like the one proposed

by Sempra.

Idaho's current law doesn't allow for mercury emissions, thus a coal-fired power plant couldn't locate in the state, Ruschetti said. DEQ will accept public comment on the rule change through Oct. 26 and will hold a meeting on it in November, he said.

Sempra officials did not attend the meeting.

The Farm Bureau did contact the company about presenting a spokesperson for Sempra told The Times-News.

However, Sempra officials declined to be interviewed or to be elected not to go because they could not be guaranteed an hour to give their presentation, said Patty Nance.

"We wanted to be able to explain the project completely," she said. "In all fairness to the people who have questions, we need the time to be able to answer them."

Nance said that Sempra officials would still be happy to attend another meeting.

"I'm not opposed to coal-fired power plants," Ruschetti said. "What I am opposed to is this plant that Sempra's plan-

Jerome voters go to polls Tuesday

They'll vote on proposals to build two new schools

JEROME — Just after two in the afternoon on Thursday, Jan. 14, a paragon of Central Elementary — walks to the intersection of Third Avenue and North Lincoln with a hand-held stop sign to do her duty as a crossing guard. The orange on her vest is as bright as the fall leaves on the trees, but some drivers still failed to see her — so they say.

"It's like the Indianapolis 500 out here," late said. "And one of these days, heaven forbid, one of the kids is going to get hit."

The location of the elementary school has been the only controversy that parents and administrators have with the old brick school building. There is a laundry list of safety hazards because it's structurally unsound, and the architecture is antiquated. The heating system fails to warm parts of the building in the summer, classroom temperatures reach the upper 90s. Students struggle to concentrate on their studies as sounds from the band and other classrooms seep into their academic domains.

Some community members have organized support for change. They are pushing for public support of the Jerome school bond levy that will give voters the choice of replacing either the elementary school, middle school or both. And on Oct. 25, Jerome will learn if the rest of the community feels the same.

Chris Bragg, an instructor at the College of Southern Idaho, and the public relations representative for Jerome School Facilities, has been working with other committee members to reach out to the public.

"It's long and at times it can be tedious," Bragg said. "In the past, the people base worked long hours to gather support for these levies, but they didn't pass."

Jerome does not have a history of strong support for bond levies — levies that require voter approval of two- thirds or more and usually are used for new or climate-change related projects. In the last 30 years, citizens of Jerome have only approved one bond levy, which paid for the construction of Horizon Elementary in 1991, because someone argued that it was only approved after the district was forced to

District trustees had considered allowing schools to open at 10 a.m. in bad weather, instead of closing schools for a full day, if the Minidoka Highway District could clear the roads by 8 a.m. to allow buses to run.

However, at Monday's regular board meeting, Superintendent Scott Rogers told trustees that school principals "felt there were more cons than pros" to the proposed late start. Therefore, Rogers recommended the proposal for late starts be dropped.

After the meeting, Rogers said one of the principals' concerns was how to address the inequity of kindergarten programs created when morning sessions would be canceled on

late start days but afternoon sessions would run. Another issue, which was raised last month by trustee Greer Copeland, was how the district would deal with students in outlying areas where roads aren't cleared as quickly.

In other business, the board approved changing the name of the Mini-Cassia Opportunity Center to Mount Harrison Junior/Senior High School.

District trustees had considered allowing schools to open at 10 a.m. in bad weather, instead of closing schools for a full day, if the Minidoka Highway District could clear the roads by 8 a.m. to allow buses to run.

However, at Monday's regular board meeting, Superintendent Scott Rogers told trustees that school principals "felt there were more cons than pros" to the proposed late start. Therefore, Rogers recommended the proposal for late starts be dropped.

After the meeting, Rogers said one of the principals' concerns was how to address the inequity of kindergarten programs created when morning sessions would be canceled on

Ex-wife's statement thrown out in coffee-poisoning case

At a hearing Tuesday, 7th District Judge Shindring said the statement by Brenda Hook could be used as evidence in her trial because detectives isolated her Miranda rights in obtaining it, the Post Register reported.

Hook, of Moreland, was arrested in July and charged with administering poison with the intent to kill her ex-husband, Jerry Hook, who survived. Brenda Hook, 47, was accused of putting roach killer in her ex-husband's coffee in early June. She's been in the Bingham County Jail since, on a \$70,000 bond. Her trial is scheduled to begin Dec. 20.

Detectives showed up at her residence on July 13 and asked her if she would answer some questions at the county law enforcement building. Before leaving her house, she called her lawyer, David Cannon, who spoke to a detective and asked that no one interview his client until he arrived.

But detectives questioned her anyway at the county law enforcement building and arrested her shortly after the interview. Details of what she told police later were not released.

Shindring ruled that the detectives should have complied with Cannon's request to wait until he was present. "The right to counsel is important to cases such as this," Shindring said. "It is because of the duress that these types of

circumstances naturally present that counsel is important if so desired." Cannon said Wednesday he would not characterize Hook's conversation with police as a confession but merely an interview.

Before Hook was booked into jail, she made a recorded call from a jail phone. That recording contains incriminating material, said J. Scott Andrew, the Bingham County prosecutor.

"The phone calls are not good for her," said Andrew, who would not discuss the recording except to say the voice at the other end was a man's. Shindring ruled that using the recording as evidence would not violate Hook's constitutional rights because she chose to make the call.

BLM looks at future energy corridors across the West

Energy bill calls for new infrastructure to feed nation's fastest-growing cities

BOISE — Federal land managers take their first public step next week in plotting routes, across the West for billions of dollars worth of future powerlines and oil and natural gas pipelines to connect the region's vast energy reserves with consumers in the nation's fastest-growing cities.

The Bureau of Land Management holds a public meeting Tuesday in Denver, followed by 10 additional sessions culminating in Phoenix and Seattle on Nov. 3, to help it draw up energy transmission and distribution corridors, a requirement of the 2005 energy bill signed Aug. 8 by President Bush.

Total U.S. energy demand is expected to grow by some 1.9 percent a year until 2025, and the West has seen an unprecedented growth in oil and natural gas production, wind prospecting and plans for new coal-fired power plants in states including Idaho, Wyoming, Nevada and Utah. The environmental impact statement, due next October, will assess the impacts of expanding existing energy corridors — and identifying new ones.

The corridors must be included in new BLM land-use plans by August 2007.

At each meeting, a map will show existing transmission corridors and the areas where new corridors could be designated. Said BLM spokeswoman Heather Eevey.

Idaho court takes up commandments case

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Supreme Court will hear arguments Dec. 2 in a Boise case dealing with a Ten Commandments monument.

Last year, a group called Keep the Commandments gathered more than 18,000 signatures in support of an initiative that organizers had hoped to place on the November 2004 general election ballot.

The initiative asked voters to return a Ten Commandments monument to Julia Davis Park

— after a 40-year-old monument was removed in March 2004.

Mayor Dave Bleter, who supported removing the religious monument from the park, refused to schedule an election, and a 4th District Court judge agreed with him on grounds that initiatives apply to legislative actions, not administrative decisions.

Bryan Fischer, co-director of Keep the Commandments, said his group is hoping the state Supreme Court will over-

turn Judge Ronald Wilper's ruling so the issue can eventually go before voters.

"We think it was entirely inappropriate for the city to deny us the right to vote," Fischer said Thursday.

City Attorney Cary B. Colaninzi said Boise is sticking by its original decision. "The city of Boise is bound by the law," Colaninzi said. "The election they are seeking would be illegal, and would involve the taxpayers and unwarranted expense."

Investigators: Equipment shortages have hindered Army National Guard

Kempthorne says Idaho soldiers will leave 400 vehicles in Iraq

WASHINGTON (AP) — Army National Guard units are short on equipment at home partly because they have been told to leave such vital items as armored Humvees in Iraq for replacement troops, congressional investigators say.

As of June, Army National Guard units had left overseas more than 64,000 pieces of equipment worth more than \$1.2 billion, and the Army cannot afford to replace it all, said the report Thursday by the Government Accountability Office, the investigative arm of Congress.

Idaho Gov. Dirk Kempthorne said his state will support leaving 400 vehicles in Iraq — many of them Humvees with added armor to provide protection against insurgents, and the understanding was that he said he worries the state will not be protected in a disaster or terrorist attack.

"We need a commitment from the federal government that the equipment that is left in Iraq will be replaced in quick order," said Kempthorne, a Republican.

On average, National Guard units at home have only 30 percent of their essential war-fighting equipment, which could leave them vulnerable in

a domestic emergency, said the report released at a hearing of the House Committee on Government Reform.

Officials believe the National Guard's response to Hurricane Katrina "was more complicated because significant quantities of critical equipment such as satellite communications equipment, radios, trucks, helicopters and night vision goggles were deployed to Iraq," the report said.

Pennsylvania Gov. Ed Rendell, whose state has 3,200 National Guard troops in Iraq — the highest per capita in the nation — said Pennsylvania troops have had to leave behind a variety of equipment, ranging from seven helicopters in Afghanistan to 50 tractors and 118 trailers in Iraq.

Replacement of the equipment has been slow, and items sent in their place are not the same quality or quantity, Rendell said.

This is a "huge problem when it comes to the integrity

of the National Guard and their ability to carry out their missions," he said.

Lt. Gen. David Melcher, deputy chief of staff of the Army, agreed with the report's findings. He said \$21 billion will be spent from 2006 to 2011 to equip and modernize the Army National Guard, which will help resolve much of the equipment problem.

The report said that in addition to what was left overseas, more than 101,000 pieces of equipment from units on the home front have been transferred to deploying units.

"Quite simply, we are robbing the Iraq-deployed Patriot to pay the deployed Paul," said committee Chairman Thomas Davis, R-Va.

The GAO said the Guard is working on an aid program in which it only deployed in the later stages of a major conflict if needed. As a result, Guard troops on average are only provided 65 percent to 74 percent of the people and 65 percent to 75 percent of the equipment needed to conduct their wartime duties, the report said.

The report noted that the Army is taking steps to implement stricter accountability over Guard equipment left overseas and a better method to replace equipment left behind.

Body found may be man missing since July

COUNCIL (AP) — Police believe a body found in Adams County may be that of a Nampa man reported missing in July.

Officials were checking dental records before making a positive identification, Idaho State Police spokesman Rick Ohmsman said in a state-

ment. But police believe the remains discovered Sunday are those of 27-year-old Nicholas Oltle.

A property owner spotted Oltle's wrecked pickup truck hidden in some heavy brush in a ravine near Highway 95, and Ada County sheriff's deputies and state police

found the body nearby. Investigators believe Oltle likely died in a car accident. Oltle was reported missing after he left on a trip to northern Idaho but never arrived. Searchers looked for him along the highway and by air.

plant to build in Jerome County," Buschett opposes Sempra's ruling for several reasons. First, the facility will use Idaho's resources to provide power to other states, Buschett said. Sempra officials said that Idaho Power will have the option to buy their electricity, but no deal between the two has been made public.

Buschett believes that Sempra has chosen a poorly-sited site because of the drought situation and because Idaho lacks state oversight which would make siting the plant more than just a local decision.

Interim legislative committee recently turned down a power plant siting bill introduced by Sen. Clint Stennett, D-Ketchum. But, at least one in

attendance still has hope for a siting legislation.

Bill Block thinks that the state will have an awakening when it comes to power plant siting. His wife, Rep. Sharon Block, R-Twin Falls, has grave concerns about Sempra's project, he said.

"Last I heard, Jerome County is not going to put up a curtain at their border," Block said.

Block, like Buschett, encouraged residents to contact their legislators and commissioners about their concerns.

"I think this project could affect our culture, our politics," Block said.

hold two elementary blocks — with the last block ending at 7 p.m.

But this year the community support is much more organized. The Jerome School Facility Improvement Committee, which was comprised of local citizens, business owners and parents — organized subcommittees to educate the community, gather public opinion and help register people to vote.

"I think because it is more organized, there are more people involved," said Jim Cobble, superintendent of the Jerome School District.

The district hopes that increased community involvement will reverse the precedent of voter rejection at the polls. The district also hopes citizens will approve a \$52 million elementary school and a \$17.2 million middle school bond levy, although voters have the option of supporting one, two or both.

"We want to make it absolutely clear to voters that they can vote on both," Bragg said. "I think that is the only way we can really solve overcrowding, because if we build, say, a new middle school, the overcrowding isn't going to go away in the elementary."

There are some who believe the district doesn't deliver on

what it promises, while others feel the community can't wait any longer to ask questions.

"I will vote 'yes,' but with a little hesitation," said Melinda Klumnes, who was waiting to pick up her daughter after school Thursday afternoon. "Central has been here for a long time. My parents went to school here and fell in love, and it's a part of this place. But I understand that we need it, and I think the majority would like to see a new school."

One woman — who declined to give her name — said she keeps giving the schools more money, and all she sees are little "rinky-dink" buildings that aren't what the district promised. She said the schools need to learn how to spend money more frugally.

But Jan Tate says the elementary and middle school students can't wait, and she sees proof of that everyday when inattentive drivers fail to yield to the students at the crosswalks.

"You know, one day I had a big orange traffic cone, a little cone and a big flashing light with a stop sign on (Third Avenue)," Tate said. "And this lady blew right passed it. When I asked her what she was doing, she said, 'Oh, I didn't see any sign.' So, I'll tell you what we need to do; we need to get off the street. That's what we need to do."

Courting success

TWIN FALLS — Good luck has its charms, but it's no substitute for a good lawyer. Three years ago, Canadian guitarist/composer Pavlo Simitkidis reached an undisclosed — but clearly lucrative — out-of-court settlement with American R&B superstar R. Kelly after Kelly used part of one of Simitkidis's songs in his 2000 record "Fiesta."

Under the terms of the deal, Pavlo — who will perform in the College of Southern Idaho Fine Arts Center auditorium Thursday night — gets 25 percent of the profits from the song, which was a No. 1 hit and is on Kelly's best-of album.

"It's not the way I wanted to get rich," Pavlo — professionally he uses his first name only — told the *Toronto Star*. "I'd have preferred my own recordings did that."

But all that the cash has allowed the 36-year-old musician, who not so long ago sold his CDs out of the trunk of his car, more freedom. "I supported my travels all over Canada and the U.S. with CD sales, and now when I play Atlanta, Cincinnati, Birmingham, Cincinnati, Calgary, South Beach in Miami, I get paid decent money," he told the *Star*.

Pavlo calls his sound "Mediterranean music." "It has elements of Greek, Italian, Spanish and North African folk music," he explained to the *Toronto newspaper*.

Pavlo earned a following by touring incessantly and selling thousands of CDs without the help of a major record label.

"I've sacrificed a lot for my music — a marriage, time with my daughter," Pavlo told the *Star*. "So it has to work out for me. I will do anything to make it happen."

Of Greek ancestry, Pavlo grew up in a section of Toronto called Danforth — known locally as "Greektown" — the son of a furrier. He got his start in music performing with blues-rock bands in nightclubs along Toronto's Danforth Avenue at age 13 (and had to have written permission from his mother every time he played a gig).

Today, according to the *Edmonton Journal*, Pavlo plays a semi-classical cutaway guitar with nylon strings, producing a sound that's been compared to flamenco. He averages 100 to 150 performances annually throughout North America.

"I took my niche and I went with it," Pavlo told *Billboard* magazine. "In the beginning I'd have two people at my shows. But I've worked at this for many years, and I generally play 1,000- to 2,000-seaters."

Meet the new, younger, blonder James Bond

He's a cool customer with genuine acting chops. But most moviegoers share the same question about the new 007: Who is Daniel Craig?

His biggest and best roles to date haven't been in blockbuster, although he did do "Tomb Raider" duty with Angelina Jolie. The 6-foot, blue-eyed Englishman played a witness to a horrific air balloon accident in 2004's "Enduring Love."

He was a jealous, ill-tempered gangster in 2002's "Road to Perdition" and a highly professional coke dealer in this year's "Layer Cake." It was this last part that really showcased the stuff that Bonds are made of: Sly confidence, coolness under pressure, a nonchalant way of disposing with problems.

Fans of the 37-year-old Craig,

whose new gig will start in next year's "Casino Royale," will also note a quality that sets him apart from Bonds past. In a \$1.3 billion franchise known for its nifty gadgets and comic book take on masculinity, Craig would be the most human Bond to date.

Nothing against Sean Connery, Roger Moore and Pierce Brosnan, or even George Lazenby and Timothy Dalton. They all put their stamp on one of film's most prescribed parts.

But Craig just seems a little more ... real. You felt his menace and lack of smarts in "Road to Perdition," but you also felt his anguish at being overlooked by his gangster father (Paul Newman).

He let you soak up his unflappable tenacity in "Layer Cake," but he also allowed a view of the cracks in the facade when crisis called.





This E-rated, \$29.99 game for PlayStation 2 is a sequel to last year's bizarre underground Japanese hit "Katamari Damacy."

It continues with the same simple, oddly addictive task as the tiny Prince of All Cosmos (or one of his cousins) you roll around bits to form a giant katamari.

That's katamari, not to be confused with calamari. And the bigger, the better.

The number and frequency of items is seemingly limitless.

in three-dimensional levels that include gardens, messy bedrooms and (watch out for the fish hooks) undersea aquariums.

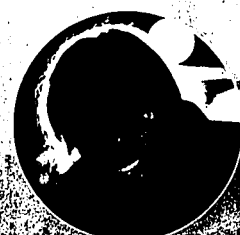

NFL will need more than a dress code

If the dress code had been by NFL commissioner David Stern succeeds in spiffing up his league's image, it won't be long before NFL commissioner Paul Tagliabue follows suit.

Business-casual probably won't cut it, though. The way some people around Tagliabue's league have been acting recently, the first time on any list of appropriate clothing could be a strapdown.

From his Park Avenue office in New York, the football czar is surveying a landscape that might not have looked this messy since the days when Ray Lewis beat a murder rap (and Rae Carruth didn't).

"It needs to go to the NFL and to Tagliabue and say, 'Give us the Cleveland plan,'" the mayor added.

Showing his usual knack for public relations, however, Tagliabue will be coming to Nagin instead.

The Cincinnati Bengals don't seem surprised they're in position to control the AFC North if they beat Pittsburgh at home Sunday. In other words, their dismal history means little to a team already 1.5 games ahead of the reigning division champions.

"A lot of it is just experience," says Carson Palmer, who's had a passer rating of more than 100 for nine straight games, tying Peyton Manning's NFL record.

"I've had a year underneath my belt and played. Last year I had it, and you try to force things in there, you do stupid things, you make mental mistakes. These are all things I learned from last year, and have tried to improve on."

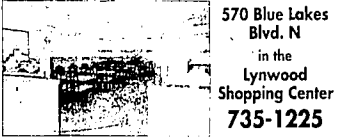

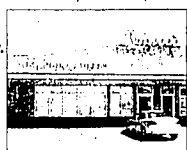

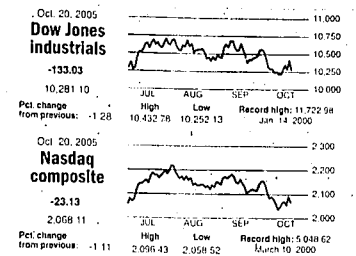

Some firms take advantage of loophole

WASHINGTON — The government's list of small businesses receiving Katrina-related federal contracts among the Gulf Coast states includes some of the largest debris-removal firms in the country and a billion-dollar corporation that has been named by the Department of Security spokesman Larry Orbeski as a "small" firm in a field where it is not a major player.

Neither company, AshBritt Inc. and EAP Worldwide Services Inc., is a small business by any conventional standard. But because of a loophole in federal regulations, a company can be counted as one if it was once small even if it is not now, raising questions about the statistics the government has been using to defend itself from charges that it has favored big

complaints in the massive Hurricane Katrina cleanup

Because both firms were small when they won their first contracts, the Corps of Engineers said it will continue to perform under those deals as work by small businesses.

Department of Homeland Security spokesman Larry Orbeski said neither reason why large companies occasionally end up qualified as "small" is that a big firm can be considered small if it is doing work in a field where it is not a major player.

Orbeski said that the department relies on the SBA's definitions of small businesses, and that those definitions vary from industry to industry. "Even if it looks like a huge company, depending on the commodity, the definition of a small business changes," Orbeski said.

A lot of the contracts that were previously awarded without competition have now been completed or are beyond the point where it would be economically feasible to re-compete," said Larry Orbeski, spokesman for the Homeland Security Department, which oversees FEMA.

want to keep organic an exclusive club of smaller farms based in the Midwest and Northeast, where there are abundant green pastures.
Driftman said that since the first large-scale organic dairy farm opened six years ago, smaller organic farmers have been contending that their demise is imminent.
"Since that time, he said, demand for organic milk has steadily increased, as has the price of organic milk and the number of organic farms.
"The price is higher than it's ever been. Just say 'All indications are that it's going to go up and not down in the future,'" Mark Kasel, a co-founder of the Comstock Institute, a farm policy think tank, said. Large-scale dairy farms are simply taking over farms that feed cows organic feed.
He argued that the USDA should have closed the loopholes years ago.
"They've allowed these farms to proliferate," he said.
Some of the larger farms have as many as 5,000 cows apiece, while an average organic farm in the Northeast or Midwest has about 50 cows, he said.
Kathie Arnold, an organic dairy farmer in New York, said she did not know when the USDA was taking so long to reverse the regulations.
But she said that most organic consumers expect their milk comes from cows grazing on pastures, a tradition reinforced by advertisements.
"They never show cows eating on dry lots, they don't promote that fact," she said.
"Many organic green pastures, the idyllic view of cows on green pastures."

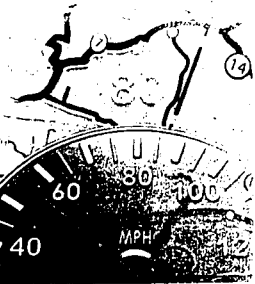

2006 JEEP COMMANDER

Commander is first Jeep with seven seats

The 2006 Jeep Commander has an old-style look on the outside. But there's a trendy surprise inside: Seats for seven people.

Newly introduced, the Commander sport utility vehicle is the first Jeep in history with seven seats. In comparison, today's mid-size Grand Cherokee can carry a maximum of five people.

The additional two seats at the rear of the Commander are standard equipment and designed to attract families that want more seating room but don't necessarily want to buy a minivan to get it. They're styled SUV styling. They also have a high-ride height and four-wheel drive.

All this, as well as Jeeps' rugged off-road capability and a Hemi V8, are available in the Commander, which has a starting manufacturer's suggested retail price, including destination charge, of \$27,995 for a two-wheel-drive model with V6 engine.

Commander's competitors include several SUVs that already offer three rows of seats.

The 2006 Ford Explorer has a starting MSRP including destination charge, of \$27,175 for a V6-powered, two-wheel-drive XLS model with five seats. The new scoring is a standard option on upper-level Explorers only, so the lowest-priced Explorer with seven seats totals \$29,715.

Nissan's Pathfinder SUV also has seven seats. They're standard on all models, including the base S, which starts at \$25,430 for a 2006 model with two-wheel drive.

For an SUV with three rows of seats, the Commander isn't that much bigger than the Grand Cherokee on which it is based. In fact, the Commander is just 2 inches longer. It has a bumpier bumper, and it's heavier, weighing more than the Grand Cherokee.

Available in base and Limited trim levels, the Commander won't be confused with anything other than a Jeep. In fact, its boxy styling which Jeep says is inspired by the Wagoneer of the 1990s looks a lot like the old Jeep Cherokee before the Cherokee was dropped from showrooms in 2001.

Maybe this is why the Commander didn't get a lot of attention from other drivers during my test drive.

Shoppers will notice the Commander's styling includes exposed bolt heads inside and outside. The bolts attaching the wheel well flares are visible, for example, and there are at least two dozen — some simulated, some real — in the front seat area.

The two-tone dashboard that sits up rather high took some getting used to, especially for the front passenger whose seat doesn't include height adjustment.

But the test vehicle's rich saddle brown leather seats that

were darker than the beige color we're all accustomed to seeing inside vehicles added a mainly almost rugged Western sense to this SUV. The upgrade price for the optional Saddle Leather on the already leather-trimmed Commander Limited is \$150.

The Commander is the only three-row, mid-size SUV to offer three engines. All also are used in the Jeep Grand Cherokee and therefore, are not new to Jeep.

The base Commander powerplant is a 210-horsepower, 3.7-liter, single overhead cam V6 with 235 foot-pounds of torque at 4,000 rpm. The mid-level engine is a 235-horsepower, 4.7-liter, single overhead cam V8 with 305 foot-pounds of torque at 4,500 rpm.

Both of these engines have the same performance numbers that they do in the lighter-weight Grand Cherokees.

But the engine that's likely to be preferred for moving seven passengers is the 5.7-liter, 90-degree, Hemi V8. There's nearly 100 more horsepower — 330 — from the Hemi than there is

from the midline V8, and torque of 375 foot-pounds at 4,000 rpm means the vehicle won't feel sluggish, even when the Commander has all seats filled.

This engine in the test vehicle performed admirably, with strong, steady power coming on during passing maneuvers and a satisfying feel of get up and go even in city traffic.

There were pleasing, powerful engine sounds, too. All Commander transmissions are automatics.

Note that the Hemi makes the Commander the most powerful seven-seat SUV on the market.

But the fuel economy rating for the Commander with Hemi is poor, at just 15 miles a gallon in city driving and 19 mpg on the highway.

Even the best Commander model for fuel economy — the V6 version with two-wheel drive and a rating of 17/21 mpg — is rated less than a typical minivan. Unleaded regular gasoline is acceptable for all Commanders, according to Jeep.

Meantime, the Explorer offers two engines: A

210-horsepower, 4-liter V6 with 254 foot-pounds of torque at 3,700 rpm and a 282-horsepower, 4.6-liter V8 with 300 foot-pounds of torque at 3,550 rpm.

The 2006 Pathfinder has one engine — a 4-liter V6 developing 270 horsepower and 291 foot-pounds of torque at 4,000 rpm.

Maximum towing capacity for the Commander is 7,200 pounds. This compares with 7,300 pounds for the Explorer and 6,000 pounds for the Pathfinder.

Don't expect a rough, noisy ride in the Commander. The test SUV was impressively quiet inside and provided a mostly cushioned ride on the pavement, with nary a bump coming through to jar passengers.

Power, rack-and-pinion steering was competent, and the vehicle had a surprisingly agile personality, given its size, in slalom maneuvers. There was none of the ineptly uncomfortable handling found in some other SUVs.

Off-road over felled logs, the Commander's independent front suspension and rear, free-

link configuration took the up-and-down motions with grace. And in four-wheel-drive mode, the Commander tracked through slick wet mud like a true capable Jeep.

The Commander has more standard safety equipment than it than any other Jeep or any other product from Jeeps' parent company, the Chrysler Group of DaimlerChrysler. This includes curtain airbags with rollover sensor, tire pressure warning system, Electronic Stability Control, traction control and anti-lock brakes.

But only onboard passengers of the Commander have head restraints, the middle person in the second row does not get one.

Every successive row of seats in the Commander sits up a bit higher than the one before it, and to ensure decent headroom, the roof of the Commander also rises in height as it goes to the back of the vehicle.

Still, as with other vehicles in this class, the third row can feel cramped, especially for adults. Indeed, the Commander has less headroom in the third row than do the Explorer and Pathfinder.

In addition, climbing into the Commander's back row requires clambering over uneven floor surfaces.

Be sure to check out the Commander's tiny skid plates in the roof above the second row. These tinted-glass windows don't open, but they add an airy feel inside, and there are manual shades to ensure that glaring sunlight overhead doesn't bother passengers.

There has been no safety recall of the new Commander, and no crash test ratings are available, according to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

Consumer Reports magazine does not list a reliability rating for the just-released Commander.

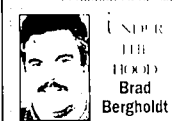
'Skip shifting' is tough on transmissions

Q. There's a technical question about fuel economy. My father-in-law, who lives in Italy, has been advocating a new idea that supposedly saves gas: 1-3-5 shifting. The idea is in first gear, accelerate to a speed where it's possible to shift smoothly into third gear, totally eliminating the first to second shift. Similarly, in third gear, accelerate to a speed where it's possible to shift into fifth, thus avoiding fourth.

Can this work? Or, should you avoid stomping down on the gas pedal for the 1-2 and 3-4 shifts. But you also run the engine at higher than normal RPM in first and third. Is there a net saving? Would it make a difference if the car had a carburetor or fuel injection? Will the higher RPM cause additional engine wear?

This might be a moot question for the third row of seats where just people drive automatics, but I'm curious.

A. An interesting theory, Dave, and one I'll be happy to try, except for one thing: It's tough on the transmission. Several manufacturers have released service bulletins to dealer advisors recommending that against skipping gears while shifting. Automatic slip shifters are becoming higher models, and a higher meter wear than that will operate the shifter in the slip shifters.

Skidpansions prevent clashing gears at the moment of blocking a shift until the two meshing numbers are brought to the same speed. They are blocked together. Slipping a shift typically results in greater speed variation between the meshing parts, accelerating wear of the synchro rings. It's a lot of paper and one that's not

Operating an engine at reduced RPM is a good way to improve fuel economy, as pumping losses are reduced. The downsides are that during mild acceleration, as well as holding the highest gear possible at steady speed, are worthwhile endeavors. With patience, one can find the bottom end of an engine's horsepower — a good RPM balance that provides smooth performance, some margin for mild acceleration, while reducing fuel consumption.

The best thing one can do to improve fuel economy are to keep up with engine-related maintenance, check the tire pressure regularly and consolidate trips which minimizes fuel-wasting high-emission cold starts.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE

Bobby Wolff

Sometimes a defender can easily spot a singleton or doubleton honor that needs to be squashed by leading a high card, rather than a low card that would let the opponents score an extra trick. Sometimes the threat in declarer's hand or in dummy may appear to be too small to look like a potential trick. But even a doubleton eight in dummy might need to be extinguished.

Today's deal took place in a match between Poland and Italy in the European Championships held in Ostend, Belgium, in 1965, proving, I suppose, that even the experts are fallible.

Declarer, Julian Klukowski as South, had reached three no-trump after East had overcalled in hearts, and West obediently led the heart three. Sitting East for Italy, Astulfi took the next king and realized that the auction had marked his partner with a singleton heart. Accordingly, the club suit represented his only hope, so he switched to the club 5. Declarer naturally enough played low from hand, and from that point onward the contract was safe. The defense could collect two club tricks and one trick in each major, but declarer had nine tricks.

Note the effect of the shift to the nine of clubs, allowing dummy's eight to be squashed on the next round. Irrelevant as that might seem, the effect of this play is to establish an extra trick in clubs. Whatever declarer does, the defenders get three club winners to set the hand.

ANSWER: Balance with one no-trump, which shows 18-19 facing a passing partner. (It suggests 12-14 if partner had bid or doubled.) You may be a point short in high cards, but your playing strength suggests you are full value for this action. As usual, try to avoid selling out too cheaply if you can find a good reason to bid.

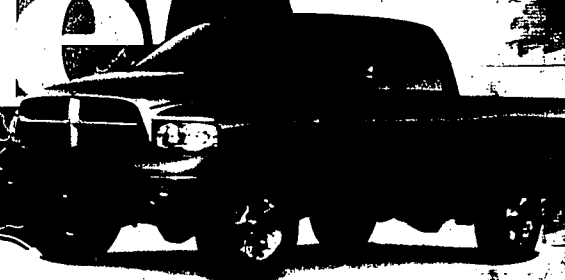
