## Idaho Power: Rates will drop if no recharge

Newcomb has introduced two bills that would divert Snake River water from hydroelectric dams to replenish the Eastern Snake Plain Aquifer. The natural underground reservoir, which provides water to cities, farmers and industries in the southeastern third of the state, has been depleted by six consecutive years of drought.

Newcomb is basing the bills on a March 9 opinion from the Idaho attorney general that found the state could take water from the river as long as the state's biggest utility was given enough water to satisfy minimum limits set in a 1984 pact known as the Swan Falls Agreement. In that pact, Idaho Power received the right to a 5,000-cubic-foot-per-second minimum flow during winter months, and 3,900 cubic feet per second in summer. Above those flows, the company subordinated its hydropower water rights to upstream beneficial use.

In 1994, however, lawmakers said Idaho Power had a right to as much as 17,250 cubic feet per second in winter, and that Idaho Power's water right takes priority over recharging the aquifer.

In his opinion, Attorney General Lawrence Wasden wrote that Idaho lawmakers were wrong in 1994 and that the utility only had a right to water up to the 1984 limit.

Idaho Power officials said they will request a rate reduction of about 12 percent for its 455,000 customers when it files its annual power-cost adjustment in April.

The cost adjustment makes up part of the bill Idaho Power customers receive, and rises or falls each spring depending on how much electricity Idaho Power must purchase from other suppliers to meet its customers' needs.

The more water that flows through Idaho Power's hydroelectric facilities on the Snake River, the less power it has to

erosion isn't as severe, Shelly said. The ponds that form behind the dams also allow sediment to settle, improving water quality. A variety of grasses and trees grow around the ponds, providing cover and forage for big game animals, waterfowl and other birds. The shade also cools the water, benefiting fish. This habitat can provide a continuous water supply and grazing for livestock, as well, Shelly said. "I think we've changed some of the old-time attitude," he said. ## Firefighters free frightened feline

TWIN FALLS — Pet Psychology 101: Probing the feline mind. Cat Watch, a block-wide research project into the mind of an anonymous black cat lodged 40 feet up a tree on south Walnut Street for three days, came to a dramatic end Friday when firefighters plucked it from its lofty perch. Twin Falls Fire Chief Tom Clark called the high-altitude rescue "an exception to the rule." "We usually don't send anybody unless the cat is stuck," he said. The cat ran away when the firefighters started the truck to return to the station. Neighbors volunteered their opinions for why the cat refused to come down. Chief among them, 26-year-old Nathan Sommer, captivated reasons from his front lawn next door.

"You'd think he'd turn around and come down," Sommer speculated. A minute later, "It's just... waiting," he said, dragging on a cigarette then returning to silence. Clark said he gets calls about stranded cats all the time. Unless a cat is stuck, they always come down on their own. "Have you ever seen a cat skeleton in a tree?" he asked. "We tried to catch a parent one time," he said. "We went from rooftop to rooftop and never caught him." On Friday, firefighters made several passes by the cat and decided it was stuck. At 3:30 p.m., a firefighter from Station No. 1 climbed a ladder and rescued the cat. Battalion Chief Jack Barnes noted the cat wore a blue collar, had long hair and no tags. "That is the spriest north," Barnes said. "That is the last we've seen of him," Barnes said.

## AG must sign off on abortion bills before hearings

BOISE — Two abortion bills introduced Friday in a Senate committee won't get formal hearings until Idaho Attorney General Lawrence Wasden agrees they've been written to "stand up to a potentially costly court challenge."

One bill, a so-called "parental consent" law from Rep. Bill Sall, R-Kuna, would set rules for young women under 18 seeking to end a pregnancy.

The other, from Sen. Hal Bunderson, R-Meridian, is an "informed consent" measure to require that doctors provide information to women wanting an abortion, such as a description of the commitment of what the fetus looks like.

The Senate State Affairs Committee requires that Wasden sign off on the bills before lawmakers' committee hearings attempt to rewrite Idaho's abortion laws, which cost the state thousands of dollars more in defending laws that don't pass muster with the courts.

Since 2000, Idaho has spent \$350,000 to defend previous parental consent laws that failed separate challenges in U.S. District Court in 2005 and the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals a year earlier.

Before a hearing is held, "We need a written commitment from the attorney general's office that they have strong confidence in this language," said Senate Majority Leader Hart Davis, R-Idaho Falls. "I don't want an opinion from those of us who are passionate on one side. I want to see an opinion that says, 'word-for-word,'" the bills separate challenges in U.S. District Court in 2005 and the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals a year earlier.

Davis Bivens Cloyd, a spokeswoman for the Idaho attorney general, said her office had received a copy of Bunderson's informed-consent bill and was reviewing it. She hadn't received Sall's parental-consent bill by mid-Friday, but would review it when it arrived.



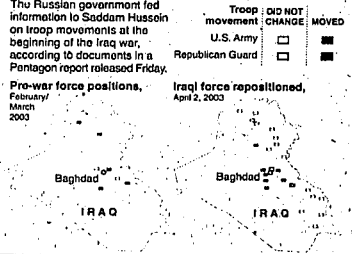

## Documents: Russians kept Saddam informed on Iraq invasion

WASHINGTON — Russia collected information about U.S. troop movements and battle plans at the outset of the Iraq invasion by tapping sources inside the American military, and the intelligence was passed to Saddam Hussein in Baghdad, according to Iraqi documents cited in a Pentagon report released Friday. The unclassified report does not assess the value or accuracy of the information Saddam got or offer details on Russia's information pipeline. It cites captured Iraqi documents that say the Russians had "sources inside the American Central Command," and that intelligence was passed to Saddam through the Russian ambassador in Baghdad. Maria Zakharova, spokeswoman for Russia's U.N. mission in New York, said the alle-

the evidence cited in the report. "Somebody wants to say something, and did — and there is no evidence to prove it." The Iraqi documents leave unclear who may have been the sources at Central Command's war-fighting headquarters, which is at Camp As Salihyah just outside Doha, the capital of Qatar. No Russians were authorized to be at the closely guarded base. A classified version of the report, titled "Iraqi Perspectives Project," is not being made public. It was assembled by U.S. Joint Forces Command, which reviewed a vast array of

captured Iraqi documents and interviewed Iraqi political and military leaders, not including Saddam. The report does not address the possibility that the U.S. military deliberately fed false information to the Russians, expecting them to pass it to Saddam. It does say that "such external sources of information were only one of the fog-generators obscuring the minds of Iraq's senior leadership." Among the information the Iraqis said they received from the Russians, some of which proved inaccurate, was: "That the movement of U.S. troops into northern Iraq from Kuwait was a diversion. In fact it was the main avenue of attack, supported by special forces entering from Jordan and paratroopers flying into northern Iraq."

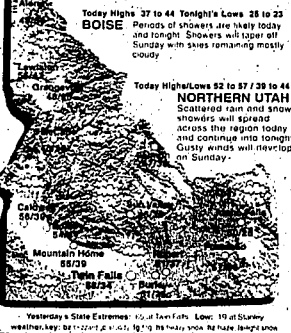

Iran on brink of first steps to uranium enrichment

VIENNA, Austria — With efforts to halt its nuclear program at an impasse, Iran is moving faster than expected and is now just days from making the first steps toward enriching uranium, according to diplomats who have been briefed on the program.

Iran's progress, engineers at a pilot plant in Natanz are likely to start crucial testing to ensure that the centrifuges and the fuel rods connecting them are properly vacuum-sealed in the next couple of days. They are likely to begin feeding uranium hexafluoride gas into a series of 164 connected centrifuges within about two weeks, the officials said.

Iran has foregone usual testing periods for individual centrifuges and small series of linked centrifuges, instead appearing to be trying to put together as many as possible, as quickly as possible. 'They said Iran also was likely to begin assembling more centrifuges in mid-April to the point of connecting them to other additional cascades of linked centrifuges. The pilot plant can hold up to six cascades of 164 centrifuges each, it could take many months to complete that work, the diplomats said.

Opponents of S. Dakota's strict new abortion law seeking ballot measure

SIoux FALLS, S.D. (AP) — Opponents of South Dakota's new ban on nearly all abortions began a petition drive Friday to let voters decide its fate. The law, among the strictest in the nation, is scheduled to take effect July 1 but will automatically be placed on hold if opponents collect the 16,728 signatures necessary for a voter referendum.

initial paperwork signed by a lead opponent, Dr. Maria Bell. 'The new law has abortion in all cases except when necessary to save a woman's life, with no exceptions for rape or incest. The measure was aimed at sparking a court fight that supporters hope will lead to the Supreme Court overturning Roe v. Wade, the 1973 decision that established the right to an abortion. Opponents complain the South Dakota legislation is too extreme. But Leslee Ulrich, an anti-abortion advocate in Sioux Falls, said the petition drive is a slap in the face of the legislative process. Supporters of the ban will turn the petition bundle into an educational campaign. 'I think that it's a great chance for South Dakota people to be informed about how abortion hurts women and what abortion does to the child,' Ulrich said Friday.

Continued from A1. buy on the open market. Reducing those flows by passing House Bill 809, Idaho Power officials have said, could cost ratepayers up to \$120 million. 'The proposed bill threatens such benefits in the future,' said Idaho Power President and Chief Executive Officer Larry Keen. 'By taking the higher Snake River flows and diverting them to the desert rather than allowing them to flow through the power turbines, less low-cost electricity will be produced. This stream-flow diversion could reverse this year's reduction in future years, and drive rates up in all years.' 'Those in favor of recharging the aquifer say diverting the water would only cost ratepayers about \$8 million. 'In my view, the bill won't have any effect on the water they use to generate electricity with,' Newcomb said.

Continued from A1. 'That the ground assault on Baghdad would not begin until the Army's 4th Infantry Division was in place, around April 15.' 'In fact, the 4th Infantry, whose original plan was to enter Iraq from Turkey by bypassing the Basins, actually reinforced a U.S. military deception effort. 'That the main focus of U.S. ground forces moving toward Baghdad had from the southwest was the area around the city of Karbala. (This was true. After crossing a bridge over the Euphrates River outside of Karbala, the 3rd Infantry Division hid a clear path to the Iraqi capital and Saddam's chances of stopping the assault had ended.) 'That U.S. troops moving through southern Iraq would not attempt to occupy cities but instead bypass them. (This was true as well as a central feature of an invasion plan that stressed speed and tactical surprise.) The lead author of the Pentagon report, Kevin Woods, told reporters at a Pentagon brief-

ing that he was surprised to learn that the Russians had passed intelligence to Saddam, and he said he had no reason to doubt the authenticity of the Iraq documents. 'But I don't have any other knowledge of that topic,' Woods added, referring to the Russian links. In Moscow, a duty officer with Russia's Foreign Ministry declined to comment on the report late Friday. A Pentagon spokesman, Lt. Col. Barry Venner, referred inquiries seeking comment to Central Command. At Central Command, headquarters in Tampa, Fla., officials did not immediately respond to a request. State Department spokesman Adam Ereli declined to comment. It is standard procedure for Russia and other countries not part of a U.S. coalition to try to gain inside information on U.S. military plans. It's certainly not surprising in the case of Iraq, a country which had long-standing economic and military ties to Saddam. But until now, the Pentagon

# Minister's wife charged with murdering husband

## Shooting shocks congregation

SELMER, Tenn. (AP) — A minister's wife was charged Friday with shooting her husband to death in the parsonage in a crime that shocked the congregation and shattered the couple's happy and loving image.

Mary Winkler, 32, was arrested on murder charges and confessed to the slaying after fleeing to Alabama in the family's minivan with the couple's three young daughters, authorities said.

Tennessee Bureau of Investigation agent John Mehr said authorities know the motive for the killing, but he would not disclose it. When asked whether police believed the motive was infidelity, Mehr said no. But he would not comment when asked whether Mary Winkler had accused her husband of abuse. Court papers offered no hint of a motive.

Her husband of 10 years, Matthew Winkler, a popular and charismatic 31-year-old preacher at a fundamentalist Christian church, was found dead in a bedroom at the couple's home Wednesday night in Selmer, a town of about 4,600 in western Tennessee.

Mehr said that the couple's daughters were at the house when their father was shot and that authorities had found the weapon used to kill him. Mehr would not give any further details.

Judy Woodlee, a member of a church in McMinnville where

Matthew Winkler had been a youth minister before moving to Selmer, said Mary Winkler's arrest was a shock.

"They were a good Christian family. They always seemed happy," she said.

After a daylong search, Mary Winkler and her daughters were found Thursday night leaving a restaurant in Orange Beach, Ala., about 340 miles from home. Orange Beach Police Chief Billy Wilkins said she had rented a condo on the beach after the slaying.

She agreed to be returned to Tennessee and was expected to arrive on Saturday.

A judge sent the three girls — Breanna, 11; Mary Alice, 8; and Parlicia, 8 — back to Tennessee to live with their paternal grandparents, said David Whetstone, the district attorney in Baldwin County.

Matthew Winkler's father, Dan Winkler, attended the hearing and spoke to reporters later. "Thank you for your love, support and prayers," he said. "Now we want to turn our attention to remembering our son and to the care of three young children."

Mary Winkler was led into the hearing but did not respond to questions from reporters.

Members of the Fourth Street Church of Christ found Matthew Winkler's body after he missed a Wednesday evening service. The slaying of the third-generation minister shocked those who knew him.

Winkler was hired at the 200-member church in February 2005. The congregation quickly came to love his by-the-book sermons, said William Ash, an elder.

Church members also took to his wife, whom they described as a quiet, unassuming woman who was a substitute teacher at an elementary school.

Eva Ferrell, principal of a Christian school in McMinnville where Winkler taught Bible classes before moving to Selmer, said Winkler was a good teacher and seemed to have a "strong, solid Christian marriage."

Mary and Matthew Winkler were married in 1996. They had met at Freed-Hardeman University, a Church of Christ-affiliated school in Henderson where Matthew's father was an adjunct professor. Mary took education classes, and Matthew took Bible classes. Neither graduated.

Churches of Christ do not consider themselves a denomination since every congregation is independently governed by a group of church elders. They generally believe the Bible should be interpreted literally and that baptism is essential for salvation.

The church is also noted for its prohibition of using musical instruments during services.

# Arizona issues drug warrant for pair who were snowbound in Oregon

ASHLAND, Ore. (AP) — Arizona authorities have brought drug charges against a couple who were rescued with four family members from their snowbound motor home in Oregon this week.

Warrants were issued in Snowflake, Ariz., for Elbert and Becky Higginbotham on Wednesday, a day after they were found in the mountains. The couple were charged with possession of dangerous drugs for sale — methamphetamine — and possession of drug paraphernalia. Elbert Higginbotham is also wanted on a charge of misconduct involving weapons.

The Ashland Daily Tidings newspaper said the warrants were issued after Arizona authorities saw TV coverage of the rescue.

In an interview in Friday's newspaper, Elbert Higginbotham acknowledged he had been arrested on drug charges in Arizona,

where the couple live, but said the drugs were not his. "I was in the wrong place at the wrong time," he said.

The family — the two Higginbothams, Becky Higginbotham's son Peter Stivers, his wife and their two children — had set out from Ashland in the motor home on March 4. They were found stranded on a back road on Tuesday.

Higginbotham said he would contact Arizona authorities. "I've got to call them and take care of business. We don't run from things," he said.

Deputy Cmdr. Kelly Clark of the Navajo County Sheriff's Department told the newspaper that the Higginbothams were arrested last year but were not

charged at the time because they agreed to cooperate with investigators.

"We let them go because they expressed an interest in working with law enforcement," Clark said. "We haven't seen hide nor hair of him since."

Police in Ashland said Friday they had not been contacted by Arizona authorities about the warrant and had no reason to arrest the couple.

The couple's whereabouts were not immediately clear. Stivers' mother-in-law, Rose Hill, said Friday the family had not heard from the Higginbothams since Thursday afternoon.

# GOP still likes Bush money

WASHINGTON — Many worried Republicans on the ballot in November have been pushing away from the White House, not wanting to be dragged under by President Bush's sinking approval ratings and growing anxiety over Iraq.

That doesn't mean they're fleeing his cash offerings, however. Despite approval ratings in the mid-to-upper 30s, Bush remains the nation's most successful fundraiser. Vice President Dick Cheney, whose poll numbers are even lower than Bush's, is not far behind. Both have raised tens of millions of dollars for GOP congressional and gubernatorial candidates running in this year's midterm elections.

Even as some Republicans are becoming increasingly defiant on a range of issues, they're still lining up dutifully for the president's campaign dollars.

"I would be shocked if a legitimate Republican candidate, not just a fringe candidate, who got word that the president was coming to do a fundraiser said, 'No, don't come to my house to raise GOP consultant Rich Galen.'"

That said, Republican candidates don't want to be forced off message by such a visit and "have to spend the next two or three days talking about the president's policies ... or what happened yesterday in Ramadi (Iraq)," Galen said.

It has resulted in some fine GOP footwork as candidates in tight races step away from Bush and Cheney on divisive issues but dance toward them when the subject is money.

Bush presided over a fundraiser Friday for Rep. Mike Sodrel of Indiana at The Murat Centre in Indianapolis, a calling Sodrel "a strong supporter of the United States military" and citing "trophies and medals."

Another one was scheduled for later Friday for Sen. Rick Santorum, R-Pa., at a private residence in the Pittsburgh area.

"I'm doing another fundraiser in Washington, D.C. on Monday for Sen. Conrad Burns, R-Mont., where \$1,000 will get you in the door, and \$10,000 in combined contributions from others will get you a 'photo opportunity with the president,' according to an invitation."

Bush and Santorum, the Senate's No. 3 Republican, are not scheduled to appear together publicly on Friday. Santorum, trailing Democrat Bob Casey in polls, broke with Bush on a plan to have an Arab company based in Dubai run terminals at some U.S. ports and has raised concerns about the administration's conduct of the war in Iraq.

When Bush went to Cleveland earlier in the week to make a major speech on Iraq, there was a noticeable absence of top Ohio Republicans, including Sen. Mike DeWine, who is locked in a tight re-election race.

## Family buries remains of airman found on mountain

BRainerd, Minn. (AP) — A World War II airman whose frozen body was chipped out of a California glacier last fall was laid to rest in his hometown Friday, more than six decades after the young man disappeared during a training flight.

Leo Mustonen's two nieces were among about 100 people who gathered at First Lutheran Church to say goodbye. A full military funeral followed at a cemetery overlooking the Mississippi River.

"This is one of the most unique and special days that any of us will ever be a part of," Pastor Andy Smith said. "Today we are burying a small-town boy from Brainerd, Minnesota, who dreamed of flying."

Mustonen was 22 when his AT-7 navigational plane disappeared after takeoff from a Sacramento, Calif., airfield on Nov. 18, 1942. An engine, scattered remains and clothing were found over the following years, far from the plane's intended course. All four men aboard were killed in the crash.

But Mustonen's remains were not found until last year, when two mountain climbers in California spotted an arm jutting out of the ice. Forensic scientists at Hickam Air Force Base in Hawaii analyzed bones, DNA samples and the airman's teeth before declaring in February that the body was Mustonen's.

At the cemetery, Mustonen was honored with a three-vol-

## Colorado students injured in bus collision

WIGGINS, Colo. (AP) — A school bus collided with a cattle truck in heavy fog early Friday, injuring four students and sending animals spilling onto a northeastern Colorado highway in a chain-reaction wreck, officials said.

The students were taken to a

hospital in Greeley with minor injuries, said Wiggins School District Superintendent Sharol Little.

The bus had just turned onto U.S. Highway 34, right in front of the truck, state patrol Trooper Sgt. Rob Marone said. He said the truck hit the back of the bus

and rolled, coming to rest across the highway, where it was struck by two other vehicles.

He said no charges had been filed in the accident.

# Mars probe sends back view from orbit

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A high-resolution camera aboard NASA's latest spacecraft to reach Mars sent back its first view of the Red Planet from orbit, the space agency said Friday.

The crisp test image from the Mars Reconnaissance Orbiter was taken late Thursday at an altitude of 1,547 miles and shows a 30.9-mile-by-11.7-mile area of the planet's mid-latitude southern highlands. The mosaic of 10 side-by-side exposures shows a cratered surface with ravine- or canyon-like channels on both sides.

NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory said the smallest discernible objects are about 25 feet across, but that the camera will be able to capture images of objects less than three feet across once it reaches its much lower "mapping orbit."

The quality bodes well for future pictures, said Alfred McEwen of the University of Arizona, principal investigator for the High Resolution Imaging Science Experiment camera.

"The performance of the spacecraft looks superb; there's certainly no obvious smearing here," he said in a telephone interview. "They have pointed us and oriented us just right to get

unsmeared images."

The spacecraft reached Mars on March 10 and went into a giant elliptical orbit. Over a period of months it will dip into the upper atmosphere in a process called "aerobraking" to reach altitudes between about 193 miles and 158 miles and to make its orbit more circular. The science phase of the \$720 million mission should begin in November.

The first image is comparable in resolution to those from the Mars Orbiter Camera aboard the Mars Global Surveyor spacecraft, which has been orbiting the Red Planet since 1997, McEwen said.

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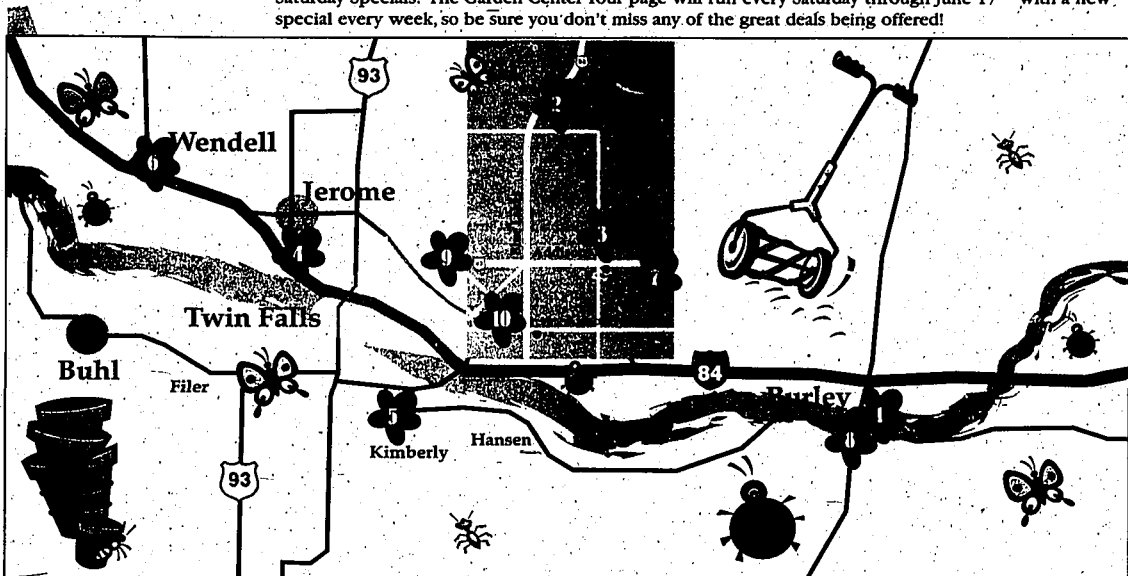

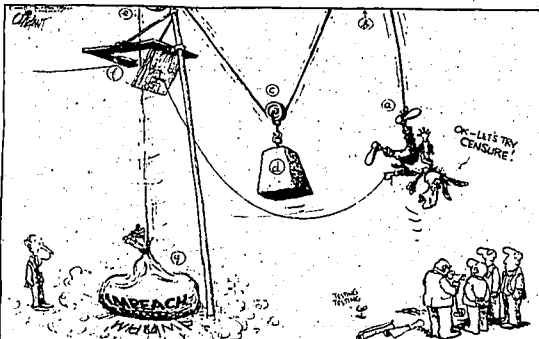

## Censuring Bush benefits no one P Parks a vital key to Idaho landscape

**I**t's a close call whether Sen. Russell Feingold's proposal to censure President Bush has attracted more enthusiasm from the president's liberal Democratic critics or his Republican defenders.

But this much is clear: It's a bad idea that can only increase the negative tone of American politics and distract all concerned from the vital, international and domestic issues the country faces.



That was clear in the zeal with which Republicans claimed the senator's statement proves the only Democratic agenda is to attack Bush, a stance helped by the party's failure to put forth a positive 2006 campaign agenda.

"New Dem Agenda: Moving Forward," declared a release by the Republican National Committee, noting Feingold's proposal to censure the president by an "impeachable offense" and adding that "Some Dems in the House Are Already Moving Toward Impeachment."

It cited a resolution introduced last week by Rep. John Conyers of Michigan, an outspoken liberal in line to head the House Judiciary Committee in a Democratic House. It would create a special panel to probe and make recommendations on impeachment as a result of that body's vote. Bush's misuse of intelligence data in launching the war against Iraq.

A new Newsweek poll shows 42 percent support censure of Bush, but only 27 percent say Congress should impeach him.

So any impeachment move aimed at Bush, like what 1991 Congress did to impeach one against Bill Clinton, might

play poorly with the public.

More important, it's probably the last thing this politically divided nation needs. And it would almost certainly fail since, even with a strong showing in November, the Democrats won't win enough Senate seats to convict the Republican president, even if they wanted to.

Indeed, a censure or impeachment effort would look like delayed revenge for the way Republicans took advantage of President Clinton's false testimony about his relationship with Monica Lewinsky to spend months in a futile attempt to force him from office.

Even many Republicans didn't think in retrospect that was wise.

The fact is that impeachment — an even census — ought to be reserved for the most serious offenses. In the mid-1950s, the Senate censured the late Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy for dishonoring the Senate with unsupported, headline-grabbing attacks on alleged Communist sympathizers.

In the case of President Nixon, who would have been impeached and convicted if he hadn't resigned, congressional Democrats proceeded with

caution until it became clear he had misled the CIA and FBI to cover up his and his top aides' involvement in the Watergate break-in.

Even today, some Republicans believe his impeachment was a Democratic vendetta, though the public disagrees. But the 1950 impeachment of President Andrew Johnson was mainly political, as was Clinton's.

Yet another impeachment effort aimed at another president would make this beacon of democracy seem no better than the Philippines, which has seen repeated efforts — some successful — to oust elected presidents in recent years.

However much they disapprove of Bush, Democrats should resist the siren call of the Feingolds, the Conyerses and the netroots and concentrate on devising alternatives to his policies.

# Iraqi president optimistic on Cabinet

## Violence kills 51

BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP) — Iraq's president Friday said he is optimistic about progress on forming a new government, while at least 51 more people, including two U.S. soldiers, were reported dead in rampant violence.

President Jalal Talabani said the government could be in place for parliamentary approval by the end of the month, though he acknowledged "I am usually a very optimistic person." He spoke to reporters after a fifth round of military talks among the country's polarized political factions.

U.S. Ambassador Zalmay Khalilzad brokered the sessions with the Bush administration applying extreme pressure on Iraqi politicians to form a government. Washington hopes to begin withdrawing troops this summer, banking on a decrease in violence once a national unity government is in place.

A less optimistic Prime Minister Ibrahim al-Jaafari, whose nomination by the Shiite bloc for a second term ended the political stalemate, has said a Cabinet list could be ready by the end of April, a full month beyond the Talabani estimate.

The political talks resumed as some among the politicians floated what appeared to be trial balloons suggesting that the Shiite bloc would seek a way out of the impasse over al-Jaafari by naming three candidates for prime minister, according to politicians and officials close to the talks. They spoke Thursday on condition of anonymity because of the sensitive nature of the negotiations.

Among those suggested for the post is former National Security Adviser Cassin Dannon, some said.

Dannon told The Associated Press, however, that he had not heard such a suggestion.

"No one has told me about that. I have no comment," he said.

After Talabani spoke to reporters Friday, fellow Kurdish politician Mahmud Ghannam said the high-level talks resumed and took up a 26-point political statement that would outline the program of any new government, once formed. Another negotiating session was set for Saturday, he said.

Talabani said politicians agreed Friday to a method for choosing the government.

"All the political blocs agreed upon the mechanism of forming the government, and in the near future there will be a government of national unity," he said. He provided no other details.

# CRUISE TERMINATED

## Company will fly passengers home after fire

MONTEGO BAY, Jamaica (AP) — Princess Cruises was flying home more than 2,600 passengers here with full refunds this weekend after a fire — possibly caused by a cigarette — broke out aboard a giant ship, leaving a Georgia man dead and 11 other people injured.

About 1,600 people were expected to leave Friday and the test on Saturday, said Paul Penneck, Jamaica's director of tourism.

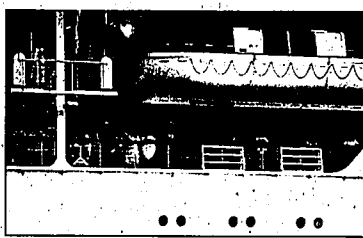
"We believe the best course of action is to terminate the current cruise in Montego Bay," Princess Cruises said in a statement late Thursday. "All passengers currently onboard will be flown home over the next two days, and will receive a full refund of their cruise and air fare."

The fire broke out early Thursday as the Star Princess sailed through the moonlit Caribbean, carrying some 150 tons and leaving a big black spot on the white ship.

"We consider ourselves very lucky," Toronto resident Klement Fess told The Associated Press after he and his wife were evacuated Thursday with other passengers. "When we got out of our stateroom ... there was someone lying in the hallway passed out. It was being attended to but it was very, very scary."

A smoldering cigarette is suspected as the cause of the blaze, said Horace Peterkin, president of the Jamaica Hotel and Tourist Association, who toured the ship after it docked here.

An official with knowledge of

the investigation said on condition of anonymity that the victim was Richard Liffidge, 72, of Lacust Grove, Ga. Liffidge collapsed on deck, although the exact cause of death was not immediately known.

After the fire started about 3 a.m. Thursday, passengers grabbed life jackets and raced to "muster stations," said Julie Benson, spokeswoman for Princess Cruises, which is owned by Miami-based Carnival Corp. The crew put out the fire, then did a cabin-by-cabin check, she said.

The Star Princess was sailing from Grand Cayman to Jamaica when the blaze started. Reportedly built at a cost of more than \$30 million, it has four swimming pools, a half-dozen restaurants and dining rooms, a casino, two theaters and sev-

eral nightclubs. It stretches about three football fields long.

"This is the first time such a tragedy has occurred during the history of our company, and we are devastated by this incident," the statement from Princess Cruises said. "Our heartfelt thoughts and prayers are with those affected by the fire."

Zach Bramlage, 19, of Columbus, Ohio, said he was having a late-night meal when word spread of the fire.

"Some people just ran in where we were eating and told us the ship is on fire, and we got our life vests real quick and headed downstairs," Bramlage said. "I was pretty scared initially but the captain came over the (intercom) and told us everything was going to be all right."

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# New protest promised despite police action

MINSK, Belarus (AP) — The opposition promised to go ahead with a rally today, even though a police raid on its tent camp showed the regime is not relaxing its hard line against dissent. The U.S. and EU said they will impose sanctions on President Alexander Lukashenko.

Helmeted riot police broke up the camp on Minsk's main square before dawn Friday, arresting hundreds of demonstrators who had been part of unprecedented round-the-clock protests in this tightly controlled former Soviet state. Protesters were loaded on to trucks and taken to jail, some who escaped or were freed said they were beaten by police.

Opposition supporters holding flowers returned to the square at twilight Friday, but

police seized some of them, pushed the rest of the small crowd down the street and prevented pedestrians on their way home from work from walking through the square.

The European Union and the United States called Friday for an immediate end to the crackdown on opposition activists, who are protesting Lukashenko's overwhelming victory in last weekend's presidential election as fraudulent.

EU leaders said the bloc would take "restrictive measures" against Lukashenko, including a likely travel ban to its member nations and a possible freeze of Belarusian assets in Europe. White House press secretary Scott McClellan said Washington would act in unison with the EU on such measures.

# Love hurts: From first to worst

PONTE VEDRA BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Davis Love III thought he had a chance to make history in the Players Championship. This wasn't what anyone imagined — a two-time champion losing a share of the lead Friday until there was nowhere to go but home.

In a turnaround that was shocking even by Sawgrass standards, Love was 18 shots worse than his opening round and entered the PGA Tour record books as the only player in the 33-year history of its first event to go from first to the weekend of 103.

Love took a quadruple-bogey 9 on his final hole for an 11-over 83, missing the cut by four shots.

The thought the toughest part of his day was falling farther behind Jim Furyk, the co-leader after the first round who kept his lead in front with a 16 under 71 to build a one-shot lead over Adam Scott and Stephen Ames.

Love tried to keep in range. That he tried to simply make the cut. And then he fell apart with a tee shot that landed behind a tree on the par-5 fifth, three shots from 114 yards to reach the green, and three putts from 15 feet.

"It was one of those days," Love told a PGA Tour media official after declining to speak to reporters. "When I hit a bad shot, I never got away with it."

No one has ever won three times on the TPC at Sawgrass, and Love appeared to be on track when he opened with a 65. Four straight pars to start his second round didn't raise any alarms. But with a double bogey on No. 14, he dropped 11 shots to resign to final 103, a humiliating finish to his first tournament.

The last player who went from the top of the leaderboard to a weeked off was Brian Kortsan 45-70 in the 2000 MasterCard Championship in Milwaukee. Others were Trevor Immelman in the 2003 Bay Hill Invitational and Kirk Triplett in

the 2001 Nissan Open. Perhaps the most famous — until Friday — was Rod Pampering at Carnoustie in the 1959 British Open.

Maybe it was just a coincidence, but Pampering was leaving the locker room as Love arrived to pack up his belongings.

"You can't say all that much," said Furyk, who played the first two days with Love. "We've all been in that position, and I, personally, I'd just kind of want to be left alone. Davis had a rough day, and didn't shoot anywhere near the score he could have. I felt not that far off."

Furyk, who was at 8-under 136, is not that far away from everyone else chasing him in the tour's richest event.

Ames, the runner-up in 2002 when Craig Prieck produced his eagle-birdie-par finish, had a 66 for the low round of a cool, blustery afternoon on the Stadium Course. Scott birdied his last two holes for a 67. Among those two shots behind were Vijay Singh (70) and Sergio Garcia (69).

The conditions weren't that tough — the 10 scores in the 80s were more a product of bad breaks or bad play. The tour was expecting much more wind and cooler temperatures, so it only cut the greens once.

"That being said, it was still a rough day," Furyk said. "And I think if the conditions stay a little breezy and sunny like this, we're going to see a firmer, faster golf course and a tougher course on the weekend."

All-around what figures to be a wild weekend.

Twenty-five players were within five shots of the lead, including Tiger Woods, who survived what seems to be his annual struggles on the 17th and 18th holes, taking bogey on both of them that slowed his charge. Tiger Woods, who finished 17th nearly got him in a strange way when his putt from the front of the green went 12 feet by the hole, off the green and

about 20 inches from going into the water.

"I've played those holes worse," Woods said.

"He was lucky to stay within five shots, hitting into the water on the ninth, then going over the green with a wedge. Furious about his play, he quickly stepped over his clip and holed it to save par."

Furyk started quickly with birdies on the 11th and 13th hole to open a two-shot lead. He took bogey on the rare occasion he missed the fairway, and was steadily down the stretch as Love fell apart.

"It's all about trying to put yourself in a good position," Furyk said. "I could have played better. I could have played worse. I'm in good position for the weekend, and I need to go figure out how to get it around for the next 36 holes."

Love was trying to figure out what went wrong.

"It began on the 14th hole, when he chipped along the rough for a double bogey, then three putts for bogey on the next hole. He still was only three shots behind making the tournament, but his hopes were crumbling out of control."

A tee shot at No. 4 took one last hop into the rough, and when Love got to his hole, his folded his arms across his chest and wondered what else could go wrong. He found out quickly, with a lie from the rough, over the water, the green, some of the gallery and leaving him a tough pitch simply to make bogey.

His good shots went into the green, making him scramble for par. His bad shots went deep into the rough.

"I was trying to get back in the tournament there for a while, and then when I bogeyed 8, now I've got to make a par or a birdie on the last hole," Love said. "I drove up against a tree, took an unplayable penalty stroke, then hit it left and it kind of half-buried in the bunker."

# Keyshawn Johnson signs with Panthers

NEW YORK (AP) — Keyshawn Johnson says he doesn't want the ball. He wants to win a Super Bowl.

The free-agent receiver signed a four-year, \$19 million contract Friday with the Carolina Panthers, becoming the complement to Pro Bowl wide receiver Steve Smith. The deal includes a \$2 million signing bonus.

Johnson called Smith "the most dominant force in the NFL, at wide receiver" and said he was looking forward to lining up next to him.

"I didn't come here to catch 100 balls," Johnson said. "I came here because I feel Carolina is the team with the best chance to get to the Super Bowl."

Johnson's former Cowboys player to find a new team Friday. Larry Allen, the Cowboys' 10-time Pro Bowl guard and perhaps the most dominant offensive lineman of his generation, agreed to a two-year contract with the San Francisco 49ers.

Also, former New England Patriots tackle Tom Ashworth has agreed to a \$13 million, five-year contract with the Seattle Seahawks, the Patriots' resigned their favorite tight end and the Eagles' resigned veteran tight end Jon Runyan.

With Johnson on the field, defenses cut zero in on Smith because they'll know the Panthers have at least a second option. Carolina lacked that for most of the year because its running game took months to develop, and No. 2 receiver Keary Colbert had a big drop-off from his outstanding rookie season.

# Seventeen months after title, Red Sox are hard to recognize

FORT MYERS, Fla. (AP) — The 2004 World Series trophy has a permanent home in Fenway Park. Most of the Red Sox players who won it already are gone.

Seventeen months after becoming champions, only nine players from that team appear certain to be on this year's opening day roster. Why such a shakeup, especially since the last time Boston won the title it parted with a key contributor — Babe Ruth — 16 months after he died and didn't win another one for 86 years?

Why tamper with success? "I have no doubts that this team still has holes," reliever Mike Timlin said. "People want to make a good thing better. That's just the nature of America."

Other players whose contracts run out command more money than the Red Sox want to pay (Johnny Damon, now with the New York Yankees) or decline in performance (Kevin Millar, now with Baltimore). Young players develop to the point where they deserve to be in the majors (pitcher Jon Papelbon).

Starting pitchers find better free agent deals elsewhere (Derek Lowe and Pedro Martinez), while brilliant outings in the 2004 World Series or have reasonable contracts that make them good trade material (Bronson Arroyo).

"I have enormous respect and admiration for the members of our 2004 club," general manager Theo Epstein said, "but things don't stay exactly the same for long in life, let alone in baseball. You can't

bring the same team back year after year just by bringing back the same players."

Arroyo is the most recent Red Sox champion to leave, going to Cincinnati on Monday in a trade for 24-year-old outfielder Wily Mo Pena, a raw talent with exceptional power. That left Boston with Curt Schilling and Tim Lincecum as the only regular starting pitchers from the 2004 team that swept St. Louis in four games.

"I talked to Millar yesterday," the popular Arroyo said the day after he was traded. "That's all we talked about is how there's probably 30 of us that were at some point on the team, or maybe a couple more in '04, and there aren't very many guys left."

But personal feelings don't matter. It's about making money and it's about having the best team that you think can win on the field.

Boston used 51 players in 2004 — eight of them for three games or less. Only 13 are still in the organization.

Two of them, pitchers Abe Alvarez and Phil Seibel, were sent to the minors during spring training, and a third, lefty Leny DiNardo, could make the opening day roster. A fourth, outfielder Gabe Kapler, is recovering from a ruptured left Achilles tendon.

The nine players from the 2004 team certain to start the season with the Red Sox, barring injury, are pitchers Timlin, Schilling, Wakefield and Kelti Foule, designated hitter David Ortiz, catcher Jason Varitek, outfielders Manny Ramirez and

Trot Nixon and first baseman Kevin Youkilis.

The Red Sox were swept in the 2005 AL division series by Chicago White Sox. Other recent champions also declined after making wholesale changes, although none had fewer returnees than Boston 17 months later.

Arizona won the title in 2001, then used 16 of the same players in 2003 when it finished third in the NL West.

Anheim won the title in 2002, then used 20 returnees on the 2004 team that was swept by Boston in the AL division series.

Florida won in 2003 and had 13 players back in 2005 when it finished third in the NL East.

Three of them — Josh Beckett, Mike Lowell and Alex Gonzalez — joined the Red Sox after last season.

"In this game of baseball, you never know what's going to happen," said right fielder Nixon, ending his eighth full season with Boston. "You just take it in full stride and go out there and don't change the way you play."

The trade for Pena, who figures to platoon in right field this year, leaves Nixon's future in question. He can become a free agent after this season.

"Players get older, players get hurt, players get more expensive," Epstein said of his team-building approach. "It's important to keep one eye on the present and one eye on the future in putting together a roster. Branch Rickey articulated it sixty years ago and it's still true today."

# Opening day starters look strong

NEW YORK (AP) — Randy Johnson and Jason Schmidt were among the half dozen opening day pitchers who put together strong outings Friday with the regular season a little more than a week away.

Johnson allowed one run and five hits in 6 1-3 innings in the New York Yankees' 3-1 loss to the Minnesota Twins. The left-hander struck out six and didn't walk a batter.

"For me, these are meaningful games," Johnson said in Fort Myers, Fla. "They prepare me for getting ready for even more meaningful games."

"I've had miserable spring trainings before. But you know what, we all want to go out and do well."

Twins first baseman Terry Franzen hit a home run in the fourth inning to account for the Twins' only run against Johnson, who struck out 11 in the seventh.

"He was throwing gas," said Twins center fielder Torii Hunter, who went 0-for-3 and struck out twice against the 6-foot-10, Johnson. "He was throwing 96, 97 miles an hour."

Schmidt pitched seven innings of five-hit ball in the San Francisco Giants' 6-4 win over Colorado in Scottsdale, Ariz.

"The right-hander gave up just two infield hits in the first five innings before Colorado rallied for two runs — just one earned in the sixth. After battling injuries throughout last season, he improved to 3-0 with a 2.00 ERA this spring.

"I've been pretty happy, (but) once the season starts, your concentration goes up another level," Schmidt said. "It's nice to get seven innings."

Giants closer Armando Benitez also worked a perfect inning in his first major league action since aggravating his sore knee on March 11.

At Peoria, Ariz., Seattle starter Jamie Moyer prepared for his opening day start with a near-flawless performance.

Moyer held the defending-champion Chicago White Sox to one hit in six shutout innings to lead the Mariners to a 4-3 win.

"I was throwing mostly fastballs and had pretty good location," said Moyer, who struck out three and walked two. "I was able to keep the ball down and work quickly."

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A judge denied Barry Bonds' bid to block the authors and publisher from making money on a book claiming the San Francisco Giants slugger used steroids and other performance-enhancing drugs, and said Bonds' suit against them has little chance of success.

Bonds' attorneys argued that the authors, publisher Gotham Books and the San Francisco Chronicle and Sports Illustrated, which published excerpts of the book, should be held liable for publishing "illegally obtained grand jury transcripts."

The book, "Game of Shadows," by Chronicle reporters Mark Fainaru-Wada and Lance Williams, is based partly on grand jury testimony from a 2005 investigation into the Bay Area Laboratory Co-Operative, where Bonds and several other major league players allegedly

obtained performance-enhancing drugs.

But Judge James Warren rejected the bid for a temporary restraining order against the authors and publisher, citing free speech protections. And though he did not throw out the lawsuit, Warren said it has little chance of success.

Meanwhile, Bonds' attorneys also sent a letter Friday to U.S. District Judge Susan Bliton demanding that the writers and publishers be held liable.

"The true victim is not Barry Bonds, but the sanctity and integrity of the grand jury process," attorney Alison Berry Wilkinson wrote.

The book claims Bonds used steroids, human growth hormone, insulin and other banned substances for at least five seasons beginning in 1998.

"We fully stand behind our reporting of the book," said

Mark Fainaru-Wada, one of the authors.

"We certainly stand by our reporters and the reporting they did for us," Chronicle executive vice president and editor Phil Bronstein said. "Nothing that's happened will change that."

Spokeswoman Lisa Johnson said publisher Gotham Books supports both authors.

"We at Gotham Books are shocked that Barry Bonds would take such a foolish step," she said. "Any respected First Amendment lawyer in America knows that his claim is nonsense."

Attorney Michael Reins said Bonds will not comment directly on the lawsuit, but strongly supports the case. Bonds has refused to discuss allegations.

"He just speaks for himself and he's not going to speak on this action and this book," Reins said.

# Senate to hear moratorium

**BOISE** — A Senate committee will weigh in Monday on a proposed coal-fired power plant moratorium.

If enacted, the legislation would halt the permitting and building of coal-fired power plants in Idaho for two years. In essence, the bill would block at least temporarily efforts by Sempra Energy to build a 600-megawatt facility northeast of Jerome. Sempra officials have said they may



look elsewhere if the bill becomes law.

House Speaker Bruce Newcomb, R-Burley, will try to convince the Senate State Affairs Committee to send the bill, the Senate floor.

Newcomb's legislation passed the House with a vote

of 64-5 on March 22.

Other sponsors of the bill include Rep. Sharon Block, R-Twin Falls; Rep. Magpie Bell, R-Jerome; Rep. Wendy Jaquet, D-Ketchum; Rep. Bert Stevenson, R-Rupert; and Sen. Clint Stennett, D-Ketchum.

Stennett sits on the state affairs committee. The only other Magic Valley lawmaker on the nine-person committee is Sen. Denton Darrington, R-Deer.

On Friday, the same committee agreed to send Newcomb's companion bill,

House Concurrent Resolution 62, to the Senate floor. The resolution calls for a bipartisan legislative committee to re-vamp Idaho's energy plan, last updated in 1982.

Monday's hearing will begin at 9 a.m. in the Gold Room at the state Capitol.

## Eden man recovers in SLC from car wreck

An Eden man seriously injured in a March 3 wreck is recovering in a Salt Lake City hospital.

The Jerome County Sheriff's Office cited a 17-year-old woman driving the second vehicle for running a stop sign at Eden Road and 490 South, colliding into Darrell Schutte's pickup.

The sheriff's office would not release the woman's name.

Schutte, 32, was ejected from the driver's seat of his Ford F-250 pickup.

His truck rolled three times, the report said.

"He doesn't have a whole lot of skin on the right side of his body," said his wife, Jennifer Schutte, who travels between Eden and Salt Lake City with their 6-month-old baby.

Jennifer described Darrell's surgery as "quite an artwork."

Surgeons harvested muscle and skin from his abdomen and chest, stretched it and wrapped it around his right leg, filling in gaps of flesh.

"The skin should heal in the next two weeks."

"His lower leg got crushed," Jennifer Schutte said. He suffered several breaks to his foot, his lower leg and below his knee.

Above his waist, two broken ribs caused his lungs to bruise, while a broken collarbone will make walking on crutches harder as he recovers in parts of his foot, pins and rods hold his bone together.

"He is a strong guy. They kept telling him to use his morphine in the hospital," she said. "But he's like, 'I'm fine.'"

Two weeks after surgery, Darrell Schutte is in the healing stage.

He sits in a recliner all day, normally standing up briefly no more than twice a day.

As his health improves, he feels a tingly pain, blunted by the depletion of his nerves.

"He says the feeling is God's knitting his leg back together," his wife said.

### Teacher's trip to China will bring real life to classroom

**FILER** — Sharon Lurkehus isn't much of a world traveler, but this was an opportunity she couldn't refuse.

Today, she is one of 20 teachers statewide going overseas to participate in the Idaho Department of Education's Mission to China.

The mission will continue through April 4.

Lurkehus, who teaches seventh- and eighth-grade health classes at Filer Middle School, says that much of her time will be spent visiting schools and meeting with officials in Beijing, Xian, Quindao, Hangzhou and Shanghai.

"We'll definitely be into their schools and meeting with some of the real important Chinese education leaders and dignitaries," she said.

Since the state became involved with the international education programs in 2003, delegations of Idaho educators have also visited Spain, Germany and Mexico.

Funded through grants from the U.S. State Department, U.S. Department of Education and non-government or-

ganizations, the mission goal is to provide firsthand and global perspectives on the political and cultural environments that teachers can present to students whose exposure might otherwise be limited to what they read in textbooks.

"Myself and Richard Leander, from Moscow (High School), are the first representatives for health education to be chosen," Lurkehus said.

"Our job will be to come back and de-

sign some lesson plans so health teachers can bring China into their classrooms. I have no idea what I'll be doing, but my guess is that it'll be something with either nutrition or HIV/AIDS."

Until the phone rang in December, Lurkehus wasn't aware that an international education program even existed, and still doesn't know exactly how she was selected.

However, for the past five years she has been involved with the Idaho Comprehensive Health Education Cadre.

A team of nine teachers, supported by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, present workshops throughout southern and eastern Idaho showing their colleagues how to use hands-on activities to incorporate the subjects of AIDS prevention, risk behavior, emotional health and nutrition health.

"They say it's excellence in health teaching and I hope that's true," she said. "Health education is my passion."

### House, Senate leadership aiming to kill high school redesign rule

**BOISE** — Members of the House and Senate leadership are working to kill a plan passed this week by the House Education Committee to increase math and science requirements in Idaho high schools, say lawmakers including Sen. Gary Schroeder, R-Moscow, and Sen. Bert Marley, D-McCammmon.

House Speaker Bruce Newcomb, R-Burley, has asked Senate leadership to put together legislation that would halt the State Board of Education's push to require four years of math and three years of science. Schroeder and Marley told The Associated Press late Thursday.

Currently, just two years of each subject are required.

The House committee voted 11-7 in favor of the changes on Wednesday.

The changes, slated to cost \$1.4 million in 2007, are awaiting funding in the Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee.

The issue is being pushed by the Education Board as a way to boost preparedness of Idaho students who now trail their peers across America in being ready for college.

Schroeder, sponsor of the resolution to kill the rule, and Marley said they're concerned the politically appointed board has encroached on territory that should be the purview of lawmakers and that the board needs to do more outreach work to secure public support for the changes.

"We're all for more (academic) rigor," said Marley. "But we don't want it shoved down our throats."

Some opponents have fought the expanded math-and-science plan, which is supported by Gov. Dirk Kempthorne and businesses such as Micron Technology, for fear it would cut into elective subjects such as music, art, and religious seminars classes, including those attended by members of the Mormon church.

A phone call late Thursday to Education Board spokeswoman Lund Willis seeking comment wasn't immediately returned.

### Bill would swap state, federal land

**BOISE** — U.S. Rep. Mike Simpson, R-Idaho, has added a provision to his bill to create a 3,001-acre federal wilderness in central Idaho that could also boost the chances of creating a new state park in eastern Idaho.

The provision is designed to answer concerns about Simpson's Central Idaho Economic Development and Recreation Act, which some have criticized because it transfers 162 acres of the Sawtooth National Recreation Area to the city of Stanley in a complex plan to protect national forest and Bureau of Land Management lands as federal wilderness.

The provision would define 630 acres of state land along the Salmon River northwest of Stanley for federal land in eastern Idaho. That would increase the size of the Sawtooth recreation area by a net 482 acres and provide state land in eastern Idaho for a park.

The recreation area includes 1,200 square miles of public and private land, with 50 peaks that top 10,000

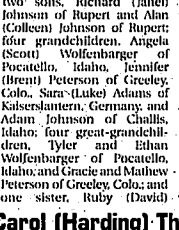

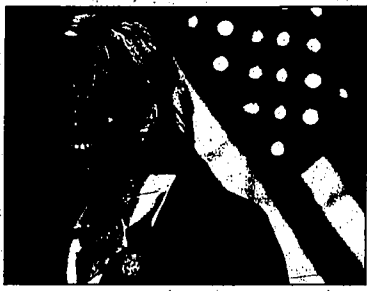

## Old hymns stir wistful longings

My wife and I had a conversation about faith and pensiveness. We were on the way to a friend's 60th birthday party the other night when the subject came up. It wasn't the advance of age, though, that moved us to wonder whether there's a place in our spiritual lives for a hint of melancholy.

It was some old hymns. Alan Jackson, one of the last of the great country music irredimentalists, has released a CD entitled "Precious Memories." I'm sure Jackson realizes these simple, spare versions of such classics as "Blessed Assurance" and "I'll Fly Away" won't crowd out the drinking and carousing songs that country radio craves. But I doubt he cares, since he did this as a Christmas gift for his mom. Visit [www.alanjackson.com](http://www.alanjackson.com) for more about the 15 familiar hymns you'll find on "Precious Memories."

I popped in the CD on the way to the party. Sharon's first impression confirmed what I've been thinking since the first time I heard these stripped-down offerings on God, weariness, promises, heaven and hope.

"These are sad," she said, preferring to affirm what she believes in a more optimistic, upbeat, joyful way. In all facets of life, that's her style. "They are sad," I agreed as I turned off the music. But even in the stillness, I found myself coming back to the hymns, and to the belief that their haunting echo is enriching no matter what faith we choose to follow.

For these hymns stir a wistfulness that deepens who I am, what I believe and how I live out those convictions. They remind me of my own shortcomings, all of our shortcomings, and the endless journey that we all ought to be taking to make things better.

They say to me, "Rejoice. But not so much that it blinds you to the need to help the next person find the contentment missing in his life."

They say to me, "Be more, to do more, doesn't just spring from Alan Jackson singing old church hymns."

I feel it when the cantor sings the songs and prayers of the Jewish faith with a tear in his or her voice.

I feel it when an imam chants the prayers of his Muslim brethren at Ramadan.

It's not just music, either. I appreciate clergy who ooze pure optimism. But I find myself more taken by pastors who seem to carry the weight of the world on their shoulders and in their sermons.

A healthy longing. I've come to believe, as a healthy longing in any faith language. As we headed down the road the other night, Alan Jackson opened "Precious Memories" with the rich, tender, quietly inspiring words that ring true in any faith.

I'd make one little change, though, if I could. "This is our story," he said. "This is our song."

## Christian business owners say it's the principle of the thing

WASHINGTON — When Linda Brown wants to get her car fixed, she takes it to an auto repair shop that she found in the Shepherd's Guide, a directory of local businesses owned by self-professed Christians.

She turned to the site again when her mother died and she needed a lawyer to handle the estate.

For Brown, 47, who worships at Victory Gospel Church in Manassas, Va., using the "Christian equivalent of the Yellow Pages is an expression of her faith and a smart way to shop."

That's where I go first for anything, really," said Brown, who lives in Manassas and has been using the guide for about eight years. "Usually, with Christians, they are honest people, and they put God first, not money."

With many other Christian consumers adopting Brown's approach, the popularity of Christian business listings has surged. The Shepherd's Guide, which

started in 1980 with 150 advertisers, now has 20,000 advertisers and publishes 4 million books in more than 100 markets, including cities in Canada and Mexico. The guide went online in 2004. Several smaller Christian business directories also have expanded in recent years.

Their growth reflects a steady increase in the number of Christian evangelicals, but it also can be seen as part of a broader trend in which people are striving to integrate their moral and political values into all aspects of life, some scholars said.

"People want to be who they are 24-7," said David W. Miller, executive director of the Yale Center for Faith & Culture at Yale Divinity School. The belief in "holistic living" applies not only to faith groups but also to people embracing their ethnic identity or sexual orientation, he said.

There also are business directories for Mormons, Jews and Muslims, but not on as large a scale as the Christian guides.

## Well-traveled priest returns to M.V.

RUPERT — Two months ago, the Rev. Mike St. Maries blew into town. His office is clutter-free. He is tall and lean. And his parishioners are having a blast.

"He's a joker," Susan Fowler said. "He makes things fun. You never know what kind of joke he'll come up with."

The Fowlers are longtime members of St. Nicholas Catholic Parish; they've seen priests come and go for perhaps 40 years. Susan doesn't know Father Mike well yet, but she does know he likes ketchup on his potatoes and shows up for almost all parish committee meetings, even though he doesn't try to control or lead them all.

"That sits well with her. St. Maries was born and raised in Lewiston. The 47-year-old is fully bilingual, and he conducts Mass in both Spanish and English."

"We have these new missalette that have the English in the front and the Spanish version in the back half," he said. "It makes it so everyone can follow along."

"His congregation is about two-thirds Hispanic — mostly emigres from the central Mexican state of Michoacan, but also including some folks from Argentina, Guatemala and El Salvador."

In total, St. Nicholas has a total of 425 households and about 2,000 members. That's

quite a load for anyone to carry, but St. Maries does so with aplomb, according to Mae Bufel, another long-time church member.

"I think attendance is going up," she said. "I want to get the word out about him. I love the joy and laughter that he brings. And still, the sincerity of his sermons. He just makes going to church a joy. Even during Lent I'm trying to go every day."

Bufel says she has never been a "priest Catholic," meaning that she doesn't go to church just because the pastor is entertaining.

But it's nice to have such a pleasant priest, she says. That's a bonus.

St. Maries has long been in the business of clean-up. When a parish begins to deteriorate, he is called in to get things back in running order. St. Maries has worked at other Catholic churches in southern Idaho, including Gooding, Jerome and Wendell.

Normally, he is actively involved for a year or two, and then moves to another needy church.

"But this time I've asked if I can stay the full six years that would be the average?" St. Maries said. "This area has the best organized group. They know who does what and they are always on time. Anyway, I do best with farmers and ranchers. I grew up with people like them."

St. Maries also served in 47 of the 50 United States and two Canadian provinces. But he was ordained in Jerome.

"I can hardly go into Costco without hearing, 'Hey, Mike! 'Hey, Padre!'"

Because of his mobile lifestyle, St. Maries set a goal a few years ago.

"I wanted to get all of my possessions into one pickup load," he said. "I already had it. Then I took a three-year leave of absence, and now I'm trying to trim things down again."

Most of his stuff consists of books, clothing and a bicycle.

"I'm looking forward to getting my mountain bike up into

the City of Rocks," he said. But that will be delayed until warmer weather. In the meantime, this week he's hearing confessions in American Falls along with half the priests in southeastern Idaho. Next week they'll all help him with confessions in Rupert. Then his mother will come down from Lewiston to celebrate Holy Week with him before they travel to England, Ireland and

Italy together.

"My family likes to laugh," he said. "I took the leave of absence because I was getting too serious. I had a kind of tunnel vision, perfectionism. I wanted to draw people to God, but I had lost the laughter."

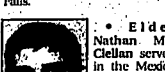

Priesthood sees increase in Asian-Americans

San Jose, Calif. — It wasn't the role of God that prompted Mal Thanh Luong to a church every Sunday as a youngster in his native Vietnam. It was the voice of his mother, persistent, unyielding, non-negotiable.

"My mom influenced me in a very concrete way. She dragged me to church at a very early age. Luong recalled, unable to stifle a chuckle. "I slept right through, but it became a custom."

Six decades later in 2003, Luong became America's first and only Vietnamese-American bishop. As auxiliary bishop of the Diocese of Orange County, Calif., Luong, 65, is the Catholic spiritual leader of the largest Vietnamese population outside of Vietnam.

At a time when priesthood ranks in the United States have been shrinking — down 26 percent from 57,117 in 1985 to 42,528 in 2004 — the number of Asian-Americans in seminary schools is growing, according to the Center for Applied Research in the Apostolate at Georgetown University.

"And while exact numbers by ethnicity are not available, church officials say the number of Filipinos comprise the largest segment of the Asian seminarian population. Indeed, from Australia to Canada, where their numbers are in abundance, Vietnamese priests have been dubbed "the new Irish."

American Catholics are Asians or Pacific Islanders, but make up 12 percent of U.S. seminarians. That's up from 9 percent five years ago, from 313 out of 3,474 in 2000, to 397 out of 3,308 seminarians in 2005, according to C.A.R.A.

Justin Le, 33, of San Jose came to the U.S. in his late teens and hopes to be ordained in three years. Luong, however, is another taking him to different churches in Saigon each week allowing him to sample the aura and aromas emanating from each cathedral. At home his family worshipped together.

"The family was where my faith grew," Le said. "About 10 percent of Vietnamese in Vietnam are Catholic, with most others practicing Buddhism, Confucianism or ancestral worship."

"When the family leans strongly toward a direction," said Le, "children tend to follow. In the business world or spiritual. For years, church leaders have been anxiously monitoring the dwindling number of priests-in-training. Two factors are often blamed: the pursuit of consumerism over spiritualism and the scandalous revelations about priests abusing minors.

The noted rise of Asian-American priests seems to lie in the catholicness of the immigrant family and the central role of Catholicism in Asian cultures. From family prayers to the prominence of the crucifix and rosary, from the sacrament of infant laymen — religion is part of everyday life.

No wonder that when a child announces his intention to become a priest, it can be a cause for celebration bestowing the whole clan with a blessed social rank. For Asians, Bishop Luong said, "Religion defines the meaning of being human, and that is definitely different from the Western concept of religion. My family instilled in me the seed or germ that blossomed as I journeyed through life."

Luong provides foreign-born priests with broad cultural exposure, after ordination they are assigned to English-speaking communities. Many, like Father Phan "The Luc, the 45-year-old pastor at St. Patrick's Church in San Jose, Calif., return to lead Vietnamese parishes, more comfortable worshipping in their native tongue.

The Rev. isn't changed his mind on Islam

If people think Islam is such a wonderful religion, just go to Saudi Arabia and make it your home.

The Rev. Franklin Graham, who outraged Muslims in 2001 when he said that Islam "is a very evil and wicked religion," told a nationally televised ABC News "Nightline" last week that he hasn't changed his mind about the faith.

That article said "the persecution or elimination of non-Muslims has been a cornerstone of Islamic conquest and rule for centuries." Graham said the Quran "provides ample evidence that Islam encourages violence in order to win converts and to reach the ultimate goal of an Islamic world."

pressed concern that his comment might enrage and alienate Christian missionaries working in Muslim countries, strain interfaith relations and make America's war on terrorism seem to be a Christian crusade against Islam.

Billy Graham has avoided such comments about Islam and President Bush has consistently depicted the Muslim threat as a religion of peace.

Another U.S. evangelist, the Rev. Pat Robertson, said of militant Muslims on his Monday telecast: "These people are crazed fanatics, and I want to say it now. I believe it's motivated by demonic power. It is satanic and it's time we recognize what we're dealing with."

"The goal of Islam, ladies and gentlemen, whether you like it or not, is world domination," he said.

Mark Twain's name evoked by both sides in flap over 1860s Nevada church

CARSON CITY, Nev. (AP) — As a fledgling writer in his 20s, Mark Twain was well known for his carousing at Nevada gold rush saloons, his pranks and his irreverence toward the establishment. Now, the creator of Huckleberry Finn and Tom Sawyer is getting attention for a little-known good deed: his role in the construction of a frontier church in the 1860s.

Twain's name is being evoked by both sides in a dispute over plans to demolish the First Presbyterian Church in Carson City to make room for a new one. The plans are on hold while the city and church negotiate a settlement of the church by charging admission to his January 1864 "toast" of Nevada lawmakers in Carson City, the state capital.

At the time, Twain was a reporter for the Territorial Enterprise in nearby Virginia City. His brother, Orion Clemens, was a church member and secretary of the Nevada Territory. "I still take a religious interest in his will," Twain wrote of the church three months after his funeral. "I could sing a strong prayer for its prosperity, occasionally, if I thought it would do any good. However, perhaps it would be a mistake to tear down the venerable brick church as a time when heritage tourism is becoming more popular."

Not only is the church a rare link to Nevada's territorial days, they say, but it's one of only four remaining buildings associated with Twain in Nevada. Others are the Orion Clemens House in Carson City, where Twain occasionally stayed while covering the Legislature, and the Stewart-Nye House in Carson City and Theodore Winners House in Washoe Valley, both places where Twain is known to have attended church. "When visiting such Twain haunts as Hannibal, Mo., Hartford, Conn., and Elmira, N.Y., you find tangible vestiges of him," Nevada State Archivist Guy Rocha said. "What we have here with the church, in my opinion, is a national treasure."

Twain was not a member of the congregation, they said, and there's no proof he ever set foot inside the church. His nearly three-year stay in Nevada ended a couple of weeks after the church was dedicated in May 1864.

"His speech is fine, but we don't see the relevance of bringing it up at this point," said Ken Pearson, chairman of the church's building committee. "It's only by his association with his brother that he raised money for the church."

Other church members chided Twain for what they called his anti-Christian beliefs. "I have read where he was an atheist," Tom Schmid said after a hearing on the demolition permit. "And I'm sorry he was ever mentioned (in connection with our church)."

In a recent letter to the editor of the Nevada Appeal that circulates in Carson City, Julie Dawson of Gardnerville suggested Twain would be unhappy with being linked to the effort to save Nevada's oldest church building.

"I think I hear Mark Twain groaning in his grave," she wrote in the newspaper. "To implicate him in the preservation of the (church) would be an affront to a man who, by his own words, generally despised organized religion (and) mocked faith. Those who invoke his name would do well to consider whether this is an endeavor he would like to be remembered by."

Church that reveres 'Flying Spaghetti Monster' sees increase in popularity

HACKENSACK, N.J. — Unlike a certain other religion in the news, the First United Church of the Flying Spaghetti Monster doesn't object to cartoon depictions of the supreme being.

For one thing, it's easy to draw a tangle of pasta strands with a meatball body. In some pictures, He is shown reaching out to confer the blessings of life and happiness with what church members like to refer to as His "noody appendage."

Flying Spaghetti Monster could be the next big thing on the pop culture menu. His ad dente visage can be seen on T-shirts, coffee mugs, magnets, flags, computer games.

His Buitoni No. 10 tentacles are seen reaching out to Adam in a photo-shop version of Michelangelo's "Creation," and to the disciples in Da Vinci's "Last Supper." Flying Spaghetti Monster ShmuckAmerica appears on bumper stickers.

He's even getting his own Bible: "The Gospel of the Flying Spaghetti Monster," coming March 16 from Random House. It's written by his foremost prophet, Bobby Henderson, who launched this satiric dig at

so-called intelligent design about a year ago, and lived to see it take on a life of its own. "It's amazing that a satirical monster could get this big, but then He did create the universe," says Dee Dee McKinney, content administrator for the FSM online discussion forum and the exclusive Henderson's primary mouthpiece.

Henderson, a 25-year-old physicist and graduate of Oregon State University, conceived of the Flying Spaghetti Monster last year as a reductio ad absurdum of the intelligent design argument for inclusion in curriculums. According to intelligent de-

sign boosters, since evolution is only a "theory" and not provable, an alternative — that the universe was created by an intelligent designer — should be given equal time in science classes.

The "alternative" they presumably had in mind was Christianity. But, said Henderson, to some charms over beers, by the logic the "intelligent designer" could just as easily be, say, a Flying Spaghetti Monster.

It was only a short step to what happened next. Last summer, as the Kansas School Board was having a heated debate over whether information about intelligent design should be required in public school curriculums (in November, the board voted 6-4 in favor), board members received an e-mail letter.

"Let us remember that there are multiple theories of intelligent design," it read in part. "I am many others around the world are of the strong belief that the universe was created by a Flying Spaghetti Monster. It was He who created all that we see and all that we feel... It is for the reason that I'm writing you today, to formally request that this alternative theory be taught in your schools, along with the other two theories."

Many Hispanics find faith in Islam

HACKENSACK, N.J. — Last year, Gabby Gonzalez wore black nail polish and black eye shadow. She had a messy room, standoffs with mom and occasional drinks.

Today, the Honduras-born 20-year-old is known as Sister Gabby. She proudly wears her jade-green hijab, which forms a nearly perfect frame around her delicate features and large brown eyes. She prays several times a day and does not wear makeup, eat pork or even utter the phrase "happy hour" that is all-haram, she said, or prohibited in Arabic.

"In my past, I focused on myself. I didn't think about other people, about my parents, just myself and my circle of friends," she said. "Now, every day I strive to be better, to do good, to help others. I stopped being selfish and arrogant."

Gonzalez, who majors in anthropology at Montclair State University, is one of thousands of Latinos who have converted to Islam. So many Latinos have thronged to Islam in recent years that many mosques, including some in North Jersey, have set up special Latino

Muslim groups within their congregations. And many now offer simultaneous Spanish translations as part of their religious services.

After the terrorist attacks of Sept. 11, 2001, mosque leaders saw the fear and anger mushrooming against Muslims and decided to reach out to non-Muslim organizations and community groups to demystify Islam and to condemn terrorism.

"When we reached out, we weren't even thinking of Hispanics; we didn't know much about Hispanics," said Mohammed Al-Hayek, the imam at the Islamic Educational Center of North Hudson, in Union City, N.J. "But they were the ones who responded. That's when we realized that our outreach focus had to be specifically Hispanics."

Al-Hayek brought in the head of a mosque in Ecuador, and asked him to go out into the immigrant enclaves of Hudson County and talk about Islam. For four months, the Ecuadorian went out into the crowded streets of Union City and the surrounding towns, and encouraged people to ask questions about Islam and Muslims. He also visited homes

and spoke to local organizations.

"Here was a Latino, someone the people in the Hispanic community could relate to, speaking to them in their own language about Islam," said Al-Hayek, a thin man with a friendly face and wide smile. "It went from speaking to us, and at the beginning especially, that made a big difference."

The mosque's efforts have paid off. Since Al-Hayek began the outreach program five years ago, some 500 Hispanics have visited the mosque, sitting in prayer sessions as guests and attending seminars on Islam. Many Spanish speakers from Catholicism. Now, Al-Hayek said, of the approximately 1,000 people who regularly worship at the mosque, nearly 200 are Hispanic converts.

Hispanics and Muslims note that their communities have much in common — tight-knit families, reverence for their elders, and a tendency to date on children. They also note that Islam is a core part of the history of Spain, where Muslim Moors ruled for about 800 years. And many Spanish words, they say, came from Arabic.

"They're coming back to their roots," Al-Hayek said.

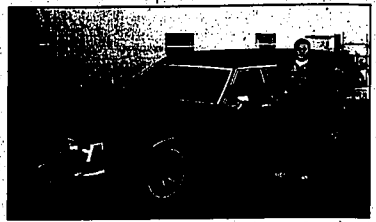

## Windows' delay opened doors

### Security, other woes create long wait between releases

SEATTLE — In the half-decade it has taken Microsoft Corp. to develop a new version of its Windows computer operating system, Google Inc. has blossomed from a little-known Internet search engine to emerge as one of Microsoft's biggest threats.

Words such as "blog" and "spyware" have entered the popular lexicon. In their own ways, transforming the online experience. The iPod and the BlackBerry have revolutionized on-the-go gadgetry, becoming just two of the myriad competitors challenging the world's largest software company.

Meanwhile, Microsoft has undergone major changes of its own, including a massive re-orientation to focus on security and moves to get further into businesses as varied as videogame consoles and online music.

Yet the company has struggled to push out the next release of its flagship product.

"The product is clearly now really late," said Bob Enders, who is among the industry analysts who once expected the in-

new Windows version as early as 2003.

Microsoft announced this week that the consumer version of Vista will be delayed again, until early next year, further extending the yearlong gap. (A version for large business customers is due out in November.)

The delay, which the company said resulted in part from efforts to improve security, is the latest in a series of hiccups for Windows Vista.

The release of Vista was thrown off track in early 2002, when Chairman Bill Gates ordered the entire company to focus on improving the security of its existing and future products, following a series of embarrassing breaches.

The time-consuming effort, which included a major security update, Service Pack 2, for the current Windows XP has helped keep Microsoft customers safe from Internet attackers. But the work also took engineers away from developing Vista.

"We made the decision that it was more important for our customers to improve the security of our existing products than it was to accelerate the in-

roduction of (Windows Vista)," said Brad Goldberg, general manager of Microsoft's Windows Vista. Client product management.

Goldberg counts the Service Pack 2 release as well as versions of Windows for Tablet PCs and computers that are meant to be media hubs — as evidence that the company has been quite busy despite what may appear to be a long stretch between Windows XP and Vista.

"We actually feel like we've released a lot in the last five years," he said.

Efforts to further improve security in Vista continues to be a

factor in more recent delays, which analysts say are likely because the company wants to make further, aggressive improvements. For example, the new version of Windows will include more sophisticated ways to prevent people from downloading dangerous software.

AI Gillen, a research director with IDC, said the improvement is important but also quite difficult because Microsoft must make sure that users can still easily use legitimate programs.

"It's one of many ways that Windows' vast popularity can be both a blessing and a curse. When a new version is released,

the company must ensure its compatibility with existing printers, photo-editing software and hundreds of thousands of other non-Microsoft products.

"They really do have a lot of baggage they drag on," Gillen said.

Security and compatibility aren't all to blame. Microsoft also is trying to make long-overdue improvements to the architecture of the operating system. Over many releases, analysts say, the system became unwieldy, making simple jobs complex because various pieces of the system were so interdependent.

"Windows itself has just grown into an enormous hairball over time," said Roger Kay with Endpoint Technologies Associates.

Goldberg said the efforts to reduce such technical dependencies inside Windows will help Microsoft more easily add more sophisticated functions later on.

But untangling Windows takes time.

Along the way, Microsoft has scaled back expectations for Vista, most notably by deciding not to ship Vista with WINSX, a highly sophisticated system for

storing and organizing data. That will be added later, and analysts point to it as an example of how Vista may not offer enough yuh-zing features to compel people to immediately upgrade.

"This issue may be that people look at this version and say, 'Windows XP is enough,'" Enders said. "That's probably a bigger problem for Microsoft."

Looking ahead, Microsoft might have even thornier problems. The industry has changed dramatically since Windows XP came out in October 2001, and analysts say that online offerings from companies such as Google and Yahoo Inc. could eventually call into question the need for a pricey Windows operating system at all.

Microsoft is working to address that problem with moves such as this week's corporate restructuring designed in part to bolster online offerings to complement Windows.

Meanwhile, consumers also are getting more interested in doing everything from sending e-mail to watching television on mobile devices, and Microsoft is struggling to find a fourth-quarter must-have gadget like the iPod and the BlackBerry.

## New home sales take largest plunge in nearly nine years

WASHINGTON — Sales of new homes plunged by the largest amount in nearly nine years in February while the median price of a new home dropped for the fourth straight month, providing fresh evidence that the nation's once-booming housing market is cooling off.

The Commerce Department reported that sales of new single-family homes dropped by 10.5 percent last month to a seasonally adjusted annual sales pace of 1.08 million homes. It was the second straight monthly decline and was much bigger than the small 2 percent dip that Wall Street was expecting.

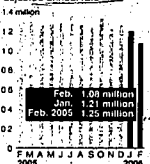
The drop in new home sales followed news Thursday that sales of previously owned homes actually rose by a record-high 5.2 percent last month following five straight monthly declines. Analysts said the trend in both reports pointed to a slowing housing market after five record-setting years.

The slowdown in sales was putting pressure on prices. The median price of a new home sold last month declined to \$230,400, down by 1.6 percent from January and 20.5 percent from February 2005. The median is the midpoint where half the homes sold for more and half for less.

In other economic news, orders to U.S. factories for big-ticket manufactured goods rose by 2.6 percent last month, the biggest gain since November, reflecting a surge in demand for commercial aircraft. Outside of the volatile transportation sector, orders

actually fell by 1.3 percent, but economists said the underlying trend for manufacturing remained strong.

The 10.5 percent drop in new home sales in February followed a 5.3 percent decline in January and was the biggest drop since a similar 10.5 percent fall in April 1997.

Sales of new homes have fallen in four of the past five months in the West, a drop of 1.08 million units the slowest pace since May 2003.

While sales of both new and existing homes climbed to new all-time highs in 2005, the fifth consecutive annual records, analysts believe sales will decline this year as the housing boom slows under the impact of rising mortgage rates.

By sector of the country, sales fell by the largest amount last month in the West, a drop of 29.4 percent. Sales were also down in the South, dropping 6.4 percent. Sales rose in the Northeast by 12.7 percent while sales in the Midwest were up by 5.2 percent.

## Wal-Mart's move to organics could shake up retail world

BENTONVILLE, Ark. — Wal-Mart Stores Inc. is throwing its weight behind organic products, a move that experts say could have the same lasting effect on environmental practices that Wal-Mart has had on prices by forcing suppliers and competitors to keep up.

Putting new items on the shelf this year, from organic cotton baby clothes to ocean fish caught in ways that don't harm the environment, is part of a broader green policy launched last year to meet consumer demand, cut costs for filling like energy and packaging and burnish a battered reputation.

Organic products are one lure for the more affluent shoppers Wal-Mart is trying to woo away from rivals like Target Corp. said Alice Peterson, president of Chicago-based consultancy Spens Global.

A new Supercenter that opened this week in the Dallas suburb of Plano features over 400 organic foods as part of an experiment to see what kinds of products and interior decor can grab the interest of upscale shoppers.

"Like many big companies, they have cleaned it up just good marketing and good reputation building to be in favor of things that Americans are increasingly interested in," Peterson said.

Wal-Mart's Lee Scott is not the first chief executive to advocate sustainability, a term for the corporate effort of doing business in a way that benefits the environment. Industrial giant General Electric Co. for example, last year launched a program called "Ecomagination" to bring green technologies like wind power to market.

What makes Wal-Mart's efforts unique, sustainability experts say, is the retailer's sheer size and the power that gives it in relations with suppliers. Wal-Mart works closely with suppliers to shape their goods. If they want them on the shelves of Wal-Mart's nearly 4,000 U.S. stores and over 2,200 international stores.

"They have huge potential because it's not just Wal-Mart we're talking about, it's their entire supply chain," said Jeff Erikson, U.S. director of London-based consultancy and research group Sustainable. The group says it does not do any consulting work for Wal-Mart.

Erikson said Wal-Mart could bring the same pressure it has

exercised over the years on prices and apply that to pushing manufacturers and competitors to adopt more sustainable business practices and larger organic offerings.

"We love to see companies like Wal-Mart taking a big step and making pronouncements as they have, because their tentacles are so large," Erikson said.

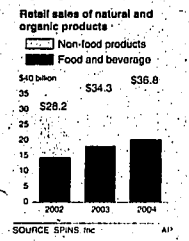
Wal-Mart plans to double its organic grocery offerings in the next month and continue looking for more products to offer in areas such as grocery, apparel, paper and electronics.

Stephen Quinn, vice president of marketing, told an analysts' conference this month that Wal-Mart would have 400 organic food items in stores this summer "at the Wal-Mart price."

Sustainability experts say what makes this program interesting is that Wal-Mart will work with its suppliers, to get more fisheries around the globe certified by MSC, instead of just buying up the existing stock of certified fish.

Wal-Mart says this means there will be more sustainable fish that will also be available to Wal-Mart's competitors, such as Whole Foods Market, which already sells about 18 MSC certified items, according to the MSC Web site. Wal-Mart plans to offer more than 200 and 250 items.

The way Wal-Mart hatched the fish plan is typical of how it operates. Peter Hedmond, vice president and divisional merchandise manager in charge of MSC and seafood, said he conceived the idea after meeting MSC board chairman Will Romm last fall. Wal-Mart and MSC worked out details and then Wal-Mart called in its 30 fish wholesalers in January to tell them it was switching to MSC certified seafood.

Wal-Mart developed a plan to work with its suppliers to encourage fisheries to adopt MSC practices. The plan includes barring its suppliers from switching fisheries in the first year to 10 months, giving the suppliers more reason to promote the changes.



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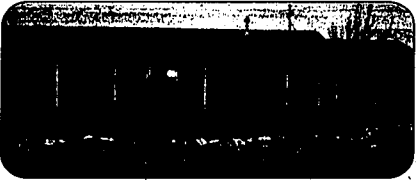

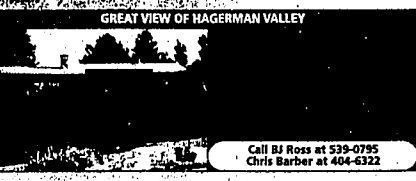

## THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Today's deal is from the 2005 Vanderbilt in Pittsburgh — all the deals in the following week will come from that event — and featured Steve Bloom. (Suitably enough, Steve is a professor of mathematics.)

On the lead of the heart 10 against three no-trump, Bloom won, pitching a diamond from dummy, and passed the club 10 successfully. The club jack was taken by West's ace, and Steve ducked the next heart, won the third, and cashed two more clubs. On the last club East quite reasonably retained his fifth heart, so had to let go of his only diamond, giving declarer a chance.

However, Bloom still had to divine the spade position to make the hand. West appeared to have a doubleton spade, but which? There are more doubleton jacks on 10s than small doubletons — but since West had not opened a 15-17 no-trump and had already inferentially turned up with 14 HCP, a doubleton spade jack was impossible. Accordingly, he was more likely to have started with two low spades than a doubleton 10.

So Bloom led dummy's spade ace and a spade to his eight, then cashed the spade king and exited with a heart. If East ducked West's heart nine, West would have to concede the ninth trick in diamonds. If East overtook the heart nine to cash his long heart, he would have to play a spade at the end to dummy. Had East split his spade honors in the five-card ending, the endplay would still have worked in precisely the same fashion

ANSWER: Bid two clubs, Stayman, planning to correct a two-diamond response to two hearts to show precisely this sort of hand, weak with both majors, letting partner pass or correct to two spades. This gadget is sometimes called Crawling Stayman.
