Driver unhurt: Perrine Bridge closed after noontime mishap

Ancient manuscript gives a different account of Jesus and Judas

National Geographic Society translates Gospel of Judas'

WASHINGTON — For 2,000 years Judas has been reviled for betraying Jesus. Now a newly translated ancient document seeks to tell his side of the story. The "Gospel of Judas" tells a rd different tale from the four gospels in the New Testament.

It portrays Iudas as a favored disciple who was given special knowledge by Jesus — and who turned him in at Jesus request. You will be cursed by the other generations — and you will come to rule over them, Jesus tells Judas in the document made public Thursday. The text, one of several anchest documents found in the

Egyptian desert in 1970, was preserved and translated by a team of scholars. It was made public in an English translation by the National Geographic Society. Religious and lay readers alike will debate the meaning and truth of the manuscript. But it does show the diversity of beliefs in early Christianity,

said Marvin Meyer, professor of Bible studies at Chapman Uni-versity in Orange, Calif.
The text, in the Copitc lan-guage, was dated to about the year 300 and is a copy of an ear-lier Greek version.
A "Gospel of Judas" was first mentioned around A.D. 180 by Bishop - Irenaeus of Lyon, in what is now France. The bishop denounced the manuscript as heresy because it differed from mainstream Christianity. The

actual text had been thought lost until this discovery.
Edine Pagels, a professor of religion at Princeton University, and the professor of religion at Princeton University, and the professor of the Catholic Theological Union of Chicago: "Let a vigorous debate on the significance of this fascinating ancient text begin."







Raises in the homeowner exemption are still a favorable idea to many Idaho leaders, since that figure has not been raised since 1983. But neither the sales tax increase nor the M&O switch make much sense, especially the latter.

Members of the Senate argued against the tax shift rimarily out of concerns for the risk it would pose to state public schools. Most districts are already skittish about the roller-coaster world of state education funding. By taking maintenance budgets away from local property taxpayers, and into the hands of the state, local control is lost and the pollitical realities of state budgets exact a higher toll on local schools.

But what's most disappointing is to hear conservative legislators convince themselves that this tax shift will scare away the property tax bugaboo. Not true.

The property tax relief created by the M&O switch would vanish in a short matter of years, School districts, cities, counties and other taxing districts, would take advantage of the relief and start pushing

more projtaxpayers. Those projects, along with steady increases annual budgets, you think?

Scientists discover ancient dental work

WASHINGTON (AP) — Scientists have now proven what patients in dentists' chairs have often though: Drilling teeth is downafght prehistor. It was the prefer that have the prefer that have been resolven to perfect that below in the teeth of the patients between 7.500 and 9.000 years ago, according to curbon-dating of skulls unearthed in a Pakistan graveyard.

This was no mere tooth tinkering. The 11 drilled teeth found in the remote graveyard were hard to-reach molars. And in a tleast one instance, the ancient dentist managed to drill a hole in the inside back end of a tooth, boring out toward the front of the mouth.





Federal court upholds dismissal of charges against wolf biologist

CHEVENNE, Wo, (AP) — A rederal appeals court has up-held the dismissal of trespassing and littering charges against a federal woll biologist and a priace contractor who were found with tranquillized wolves on private property near Cody.

The 10th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals concluded in a ruling released Thursday that the prosecution of Mike Jimenez. Wyoming's wolf recovery coordinator for the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, and Wes Unigston, a private contractor from Cody, was more an 'artempt to hinder a locally unpopular federal program. Unan a 'lona fide effort to purish a violation of Wyoming

trespass law."
Rancher Randy Kruger pursued the charges after he found limenez and Livingston on his private land near Meeteetse Feb. 14, 2004. The men had four trangulized wolves they were collaring because of depredation problems in the area. The incident raised speculation by some that they were trying to secretly transplant wolves into the area.

creby transplant wurses into dra area.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service said Jimenez and Liv-ingston inadvertently wound up on the private land while working to place radio tracking collars on the wolves. Fish and Wildlife regional di-rector Ralph Morganweck

apologized for the incident.
U.S. District judge Alan Johnson later disnissed the charges saying that federal employees earling in their official capacity cannot be prosecuted under the trespass law. He also concluded the charge was 'ridiculous.' Park Country Attorney Bryan Skoric appealed the case to the 10th Circuit in Denver. In a telephone interview from its ranch, Kruger said he wasn't surprised by the federal court's ruling.

"They don't seem to have much sympathy for people's rights nowadays," he said.

Kruger said he was uncertain whether he would pursue the case further.



Boys accused of plot face terror charges

CAMDEN, N.J. (AP) — Four teenagers accused of plotting to kill about 25 people in a lunch-period massacre at a high school were charged Thursday under a terrorism law created after the Sept. 11 attacks.

take: "I think it's just kids hanging out together and having a little wild time, that's all." Authorities said the boys did not have any weapons to carry out the alleged plot. enough that prosecutors could ask a judge to move the case to adult criminal court. Prosecutors have 30 days to consider. .

Louis Eppolito, 57, and Steven Caracippa, 64, could get life in prison for their roles in eight murders committed between 1986 and 1990 while they were simultaneously on the

tween 1986 and 1990 while they were simultaneously on the payroll of both the NYPD and Luchese crime family underboss Anthony "Gaspipe" Casso. Federal prosecuror Dantiel Wenner described the case as "the bloodiest, most violent betwayal of the badge this city has ever seen."





Wesbury is encouraged that the Federal Reserve mentioned the risk of higher commodity prices in its latest policy statement. "Using commodity prices will significantly decrease the risk of Fed mistakes." But others are skeptical. "There hasn't been a lot of correlation between commodity prices and inflation since 1990, said Peter Krezmer, an economist for Bank of America. "We don't have a lot of inflation." Krezmer said.



A. Your Toyota pickup, like many manual transmission-equipped cars and light trucks, uses a hydraulically operated clutch. How does it operated cluten. 110-1-22 work? When the clutch pedal is depressed, a plunger within the clutch master cylinder forces hydraulic fluid through a steel/rubber line to a slav a steel/rubber line to a slawe cylinder, located on the transmission bell housing. The fluid, being incompressible, transfers motion to a plunger located within the slawe cylinder. This plunger extends, applying force to the clutch release fork.

Air, being compressible, reduces the transfer of movement from one plunger to the other. This, in turn, reduces the force applied to the clutch fork, releasing the clutch less – or not at all, which can cause gear grind-

ing.
If you should find the reservoir empty, you'll want to check for leakage from the rear of the clutch master cylinder (inspect both sides of the firewall), the slave of the firewall), the slave cylinder (right side of the transmission bell housing, visible from under the hood), and the line/hose connecting between them.

With eight tricks on top, declarer's three-no-trump contract ap-pears to depend on the heart fi-nesse, but the bidding strongly suggests that that finesse will be suggests that that these will be wrong. One alternative would be to play for East to have the single-ton or doubleton heart jack, but that also seems unlikely on the bidding.

nyou duck two rounds of chos, you will deduce from your opponents' carding that West began with four and East three. Can you see a way to make your vulnerable game?

You know West started with
five hearts and four clubs. Provided he is 2-2 in spades and diamonds, you can succeed by cashing the ace and king in both those monds, you can succeed by cashing the ace and king in both those suits before exiting with a club. This will also work if he started with one spade and with three diamonds headed by the queen, which he either could not or did not unblock. After West has marken is clubs, he will have to lead into your ace-queen of hearts.

Of course, in a perfect world you would like to cash your other two spade, winners as well before attempting the throw-in, but if you do that; you cannot get back to hand to play a club.

Note that if your throw-in play does not work, you can always try the heart finesse later or, better, play the ace and queen of hearts. West has only hearts left, so if he has the king and East the single-ton or doubleton jack, you will still succeed.

ANSWER: Bid feur hearts. Your partner's three-spade call is a try for no-trump, looking for some help from you, which you cannot provide. You are happy to play four hearts opposite a chunky doubleton, so emphasize that possibility. Partner can always retreat to five clubs if he has the wrong hand for you. succeed.
