## County tightens rules on employee spending

### Lax controls left petty cash funds open to abuse

TWIN FALLS — Three years after a county clerk embezzled money for gambling, the county has finished tightening control of its finances.

The last piece was a policy governing petty cash, approved Wednesday morning by the Twin Falls County commissioners. The policy was the last of many recommendations made to the commissioners by independent auditors after former County Clerk Bob Fort pleaded guilty to misusing more than \$60,000 in county funds.

Lax oversight meant many petty-cash transactions were poorly documented, said Commissioner Tom Mikesell.

"I think there were some petty cash funds that no one knew who had them (during the audit)," he said.

The new policy will prevent that. All petty-cash requests will need to be approved by the appropriate elected official and the commissioners, and cash funds will be limited to \$200. In addition, the commissioners will abolish all petty-cash accounts for the moment. Departments will have to apply for the accounts again to get them in the new system.

Other recommendations from the audit, which began in August 2003, included creating policies on fraud, travel expenses and claims, and rearranging the county's business practices to deter fraud. All of those have been implemented.

"We did everything except for the petty cash," Mikesell said. "We had people who really said they needed it. It just took a long time to get to it."

In the years since, Mikesell said, the need for petty cash has mostly disappeared, thanks to quicker turnaround for financial requests in the clerk's office. Even Sheriff Wayne Rousley plans to close his revolving account, leaving petty cash only under the Safe House and Status Offender programs, the latter of which only uses \$30 to make change.

Current Clerk Kristina Glascock is to be thanked for that, Mikesell said.

"When Kristina came on board as clerk, she got the clerk's office working in a very efficient manner," he said. "We have money, if not, in a couple hours, in the same day."

## Lincoln County Sheriff's investigation continues

TWIN FALLS — Reed Simmons, a Gooding-area teenager, was listed in critical condition with a gunshot wound Wednesday night, according to a Magic Valley Regional Medical Center spokeswoman.

Chief Deputy Kevin Ellis of the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department would not name who had been shot. The victim, Ellis said, was shot by his brother at the home of Scott Simmons, and was taken shortly before noon to the hospital.

"He is claiming that he

accidentally shot his brother," Ellis said of the shooter, who was later released into the custody of Scott Simmons.

"He's with his parents," Ellis said. "We are investigating the boy. This whole situation is under investigation."

Deputies from Lincoln, Gooding and Twin Falls counties found the alleged shooter unarmed in a field about two miles north of where the shooting happened, Ellis said. The field is a half mile east of the Gooding County line and about seven miles west of Johnny's Country Store, 421 N. Highway 75.

"We sent (tracking dogs) out but they didn't find him. He had gone far enough," Ellis said. "Someone sighted him and called."

During the hunt and ensuing investigation deputies

barricaded the road around the Simmons' home and were not letting traffic pass.

Ellis said deputies have found no connection

## Power usage breaks record

BOISE — Records are meant to be broken.

At the end of June, Idaho Power Co. hit an all-time record of electricity used by its roughly 455,000 customers. Company officials attribute the surge in consumption to the summer heat. Meanwhile, the power company has requested an extension from the state utilities commission for the latest update in its longterm resource plan.

On June 27, Idaho Power customers used 3,042 megawatts, breaking a four-year-old record of 2,963 megawatts set on July 12, 2002, when Boise saw 108-degree heat. With increased air conditioning coupled with irrigation pumping, Idaho Power experiences its peak power demand in the summer.

The company uses its gas-fired plants at times during the summer to offset increased requirements. Idaho Power officials have identified a need to develop additional resources in the future.

Every two years the utility files its 10-year energy resource plan with the Idaho Public Utilities Commission. The company asked to push back the plan deadline to Sept. 29. The commission has not ruled on the matter yet, said a spokesman for the PUC.

Idaho Power officials like Karl Bokenkamp decided to expand the plan to take a look at the company's needs over the next 20 years. Bokenkamp recently told Magic Valley residents that Idaho Power will consider both nuclear and coal-fired power to keep up with energy demands in the future.

## Cricket invasion stopped

ALMO — Area farmers wasted no time contacting the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) to ask for help in stopping the march of Mormon crickets across southern Cassia County last week.

When farmers in Grouse Creek, Yost and Park Valley, Utah, began losing the fight to millions of Mormon crickets, their Idaho neighbors began a

watch because the insects make a straight migration in whichever direction they are traveling.

"If two bands of the crickets cross each others' paths, each band just keeps going straight," said Almo resident Larry Henson, who toured some areas hit by the crickets with Cassia County commissioners Monday.

In Grouse Creek, Henson said farmers there watched as the crickets moved through alfalfa fields, stripping the

plants of all foliage.

"Then they turned back after exiting the fields and cleaned out even the stalks," Henson said. "One home there had its entire basement window wells full of the crickets. They died in there and had to be shoveled out."

Henson and other Almo area farmers first saw the crickets showing up on the border about two weeks ago.

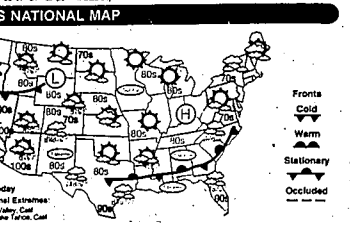

# With few problems, shuttle ready to dock

HOUSTON (AP) — Early inspections have revealed no damage to the space shuttle Discovery, NASA said Wednesday after a day of checking out the spacecraft with on-board cameras.

That means that when the shuttle meets up with the international space station Thursday morning it likely won't need emergency repairs while hooked up with the orbital outpost — unlike last year's daring spacewalk fixes.

Discovery's delicate heat shield and everything else appear at first glance to be in near perfect shape, NASA officials said, although it's still very early in the analysis.

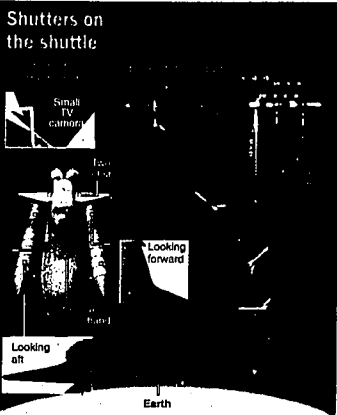
Engineers are nowhere near finished poring over 70 minutes of video that astronauts shot using an extended boom armed with a laser and cameras to inspect Discovery's delicate reinforced carbon wing and nosecone.

It took Discovery's crew more than six hours to get 70 minutes of video because they had to move the boom slowly so not to bump the fragile shuttle skin.

In 2003, a piece of foam insulation from the shuttle's external tank knocked a hole in a wing during launch, causing Columbia to disintegrate as it returned home for a landing.

And last year, film captured damage during the first space flight after Columbia, requiring a special on-the-belly repair spacewalk.

Engineers will painstakingly go over Wednesday's images of Discovery — and others shot by cameras during Tuesday's launch from various locations

— and report any possible losses of foam from the tank or damage points on the shuttle. So far the list of "areas of interest" for possible damage is empty, lead flight director Tony Ceccacci said in an early afternoon news conference.

Launch photos show only five minor cases of debris shedding, all occurring after the shuttle was at such a high altitude there was little air pressure and no force to cause damage, shuttle program manager Wayne Hale said on Tuesday.

"We have a very clean vehicle," Ceccacci said.

Clean except for what looks like powerful bird droppings.

The first video of the right wing of Discovery showed whitish splotches on the black coating. When Ceccacci saw that in Mission Control, he said he laughed. That's because three weeks earlier he had noticed the same splotches on Discovery as it sat awaiting launch. He said they looked like bird droppings from a distance of about 10 feet.

"We didn't touch anything if that's what you're asking," Ceccacci told reporters, drawing a big laugh.

said Wednesday. Charges could have nullified the conservative radio host's plea agreement in a "doctor shopping" case. Limbaugh, 55, was detained for more than three hours at

Palm Beach airport on June 26 after he returned on his private plane from a vacation in the Dominican Republic.

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# As population nears 300 million, U.S. is fastest growing industrial nation

WASHINGTON (AP) — As the U.S. population speeds toward 300 million, the growth is producing headaches for Americans fed up with traffic congestion, sprawl and dwindling natural resources.

But the alternatives are pretty scary, too. Just look at Europe and Japan, which are on the verge of such big population losses that several countries are practically begging women to have babies.

"Europe and Japan are now facing a population problem that is unprecedented in human history — declining population over time with an increase in the percentage of old people," said Bill Butz, president of the Population Reference Bureau, a Washington think tank.

Countries have lost people because of wars, disease and natural disasters but never — at least in modern history — because women stopped having enough children, Butz said.

The U.S. is the fastest growing industrialized nation in the world, adding about 2.8 million people a year. That's a little less than 1 percent, but enough to mitigate the kinds of problems facing Japan and many European countries.

Europe, with 728 million people, saw its population shrink by 74,000 since the beginning of the decade, according to the United

Nations. By 2050, it is projected to lose a total of 75 million people.

That ought to give motorists on Germany's Autobahn some about enough to maintain stable population. About 40 percent of the nation's population growth comes from immigration.

Landmark Projections show the population will reach 300 million around October.

Others: Many industrialized nations have shrinking populations and fear this will cause labor shortages and tax retirement programs.

The problem is that birth rates are so low there aren't enough young people entering the work force to support an aging population, said Hans-Peter Kohler, an associate professor of sociology at the University of Pennsylvania.

"Presumably, many people would not be so concerned about the numbers declining if it wasn't combined with an aging population," Kohler said. "I think it's more the age structure that gives rise to these concerns, and these concerns are well justified."

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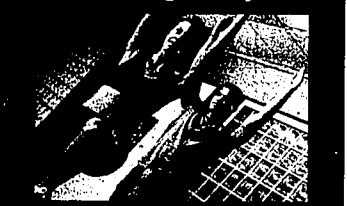

## Bill would add land to WWII camp monument

BOISE — The U.S. Bureau of Reclamation has agreed to a proposal to transfer 10 acres of land in southern Idaho to the National Park Service to expand visitor services at a site recognizing a World War II, prison camp for Japanese-Americans.

Sen. Mike Crapo, R-Idaho, is sponsoring legislation to convey two parcels owned by the federal water management agency to the Park Service, which manages the nearby 73-acre Mindoka Internment National Monument.

Designated as a national monument in 2001, the Mindoka site was originally a 33,000-acre prison compound created by the War Relocation Authority at the Jerome County farming community of Hunt. It operated from 1942 through 1945 and held as many as 5,397 U.S. citizens of Japanese descent, most of whom were residents of Seattle and Portland, Ore.

Crapo introduced legislation to transfer the two Bureau of Reclamation parcels that lie within the original 33,000-acre camp to the Park Service in December. A 2.3-acre parcel includes an old warehouse and three historical buildings from the original camp while a 7.8-acre parcel was undeveloped when the camp operated.

"These two publicly owned properties are critical for long-term development, visitor services and protection and preservation of historical structures and features at Mindoka Internment National Monument," Crapo said on the Senate floor. "I ask my colleagues to join me in enacting this small land transfer for the benefit of a step closer toward properly memorializing an important, but often forgotten, chapter of our nation's history."

During a hearing last week, before a U.S. Senate subcommittee considering the Crapo bill, Acting Bureau of Reclamation Commissioner William Rinne testified that the Department of Interior is supportive of the legislation and that the agency also calls for transferring title of other parcels and the Milner-Gooding Canal within the bureau's Mindoka water project to the American Falls Irrigation District, an affiliate of Gooding. The Idaho Department of Fish and Game would also receive Reclamation land in the area for wildlife habitat under the bill.

"The acquisition of these parcels will place those properties more directly under the administrative control of the appropriate governmental entities and will allow Reclamation to better focus on its core mission of delivering water and power," Rinne told the Senate Energy, Commerce and Labor subcommittee June 28.

"The Idaho Department of Environmental Quality Board recently indicated that it wants to opt out of the program, as have the majority of state senators.

## EPA reports mercury decrease

TWIN FALLS — Mercury emissions nationwide have been cut almost in half since 1990, according to a new report released by the federal government Wednesday.

Mercury use in products and processes also has declined significantly by 83 percent over a 17-year period, according to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency report.

The news comes as state officials debate whether

Idaho should join a federal mercury trading program for coal-fired power plants. Mercury can cause neurological damage in humans and fish contaminated with the pollutant.

"We're moving in the right direction regarding mercury emissions," have declined dramatically over the past two decades," said Susan Hazen, acting assistant administrator for EPA's Office of Prevention, Pesticides, and Toxic Substances.

In the last 15 years, EPA has focused its mercury reduction efforts on large point sources of air emissions from municipal waste combustors or incinerators, medical waste incinerators and hazardous waste combustors.

"While the agency has done a commendable job with limiting mercury from those sources, its actions are lagging when it comes to reducing mercury from coal-fired power plants and gold mining operations," said Justin Hayes, with the Idaho Conservation League.

The League threatened litigation when high levels of mercury were discovered at the Salmon Falls Creek Reservoir just north of several large Nevada gold mines. The state of Nevada has since implemented regulations on mining operations.

Hayes also criticized the EPA's mercury reduction program for coal-fired power

The plan allows energy companies to swap emission credits in a national trading program, thus allowing concentrations of mercury emissions.

Gov. Jim Risch intends to make a decision on Idaho's participation in the program later this summer.

The Idaho Department of Environmental Quality Board recently indicated that it wants to opt out of the program, as have the majority of state senators.

## Forest Service worries about fire danger

SOUTH HILLS — It's every nature lover's dream and every forester's nightmare.

In the Sawtooth National Forest, a rustic red-sided cabin sits tucked away between lodge pole pine trees and aspens. The cabin boasts the benefits of seclusion while also providing proximity to recreational trails.

But, some of its underling qualities give Forest Service officials fits.

Just inches above the cabin's chimney hangs the limb of a lodge pole pine. Several trees stand only a few feet from the cabin. Limited access and high fuels in the area would make it dangerous, if not impossible, for the Forest Service to defend cabins in the South Hills against wildfire. "That's why the agency launched a timber-thinning project recently in parts of the forest south of Hansen.

"We're trying to reduce the timber around homes," said Karl Fuelling, a Forest Service ranger, who helps oversee the project.

The agency's staff targeted 20 cabins and four organizational camps in the South Hills for timber-thinning following the Eagle Springs Fire in 2002, said Scott Nannenga, district ranger. A campfire ignited the 250-acre fire that, at one

point, headed for a group of summer homes.

"The wind shifted 180 degrees and the fire went back onto itself," Nannenga said.

Otherwise, the cabins likely would have been lost — the area around the homes was too densely forested, and thus too dangerous, to send firefighters.

That's logic cabin owner Ray Stroberg understands. He's owned a cabin in the Sawtooth National Forest for nearly 20 years.

"We love that place," he said. "We love the serenity."

Thinning trees near his cabin would also provide Stroberg with some sense of security that the trees won't topple into his home and cause damage. Several trees contain heavy mistletoe loads at their crowns, making them more unstable under heavy snows and high winds.

Yet, Stroberg says, not every camp or home owner feels the same. The Forest Service intends to cut trees within 30 feet of homes — removing some cabin dwellers' shade and sense of privacy. And, there's the agency's tactics that seem to attract complaints from owners

like Stroberg.

"I have some consternation for their approach, but we appreciate that they're trying to protect our homes," he said.

The Forest Service sent out letters informing the homeowners of their plan and received little to no response, Nannenga said. After operations started, concerns grew. The agency halted thinning near homes so that they can meet with residents. In the meantime, cabin owner can flag trees that hold sentimental value and foresters like Fuelling will take their requests into consideration when deciding which trees to cut.

Some of the timber from the project will go to the contractor and some will go up for public bid. Fuelling said. The Forest Service will pay a contractor about \$157,000 for the project.

Stroberg sees some positives coming out of the experience even for homeowners who adamantly opposed the project. First, it encourages them to plant fire-resistant trees such as aspens around their cabins. Second, it has banded them together.

"We will develop an organization for homeowners now," he said.

## Commission approves small-power projects

BOISE — The state utilities commission approved four small-power agreements with Idaho Power Co., including two Cassia County wind projects.

The Idaho Public Utilities Commission gave the OK on four deals between small power producers and the electric company. Besides inking agreements with the two wind farms and a small hydro producer near Kuna, Idaho Power also signed up its first devel-

oper of electricity from an anaerobic digester at a dairy near Caldwell.

The Cassia Wind Farm LLC is a 10.5-megawatt facility that will include five, 2.1-megawatt turbines.

The Cassia Gulch Wind Park LLC is an 18.8-megawatt facility consisting of nine, 2.1-megawatt turbines. Both projects are anticipated to begin operation by Dec. 31. The project manager for both is Jared Grover of Hagerman. Developers of small-power projects are entitled to a rate

now about \$61 per megawatt-hour that is determined and then published by the commission as required by the Public Utility Regulatory Policies Act of 1978. The federal act requires electric utilities to offer to buy power from qualifying small producers of renewable energy projects. The published rate is the price developers is called an "avoided-cost rate" equal to the cost the utility avoids if it would have had to generate that power itself or purchase it from another source.

## Mexico begins review of votes in crucial test

MEXICO CITY — Mexico began a marathon review of vote tallies Wednesday to determine whether conservative candidate Felipe Calderon really won the tight presidential race, while his leftist challenger insisted he was victorious and denounced what he called widespread irregularities. Calderon told The Associated Press that he would be willing to include his charismatic challenger in his Cabinet in an effort to avoid weeks of political impasse. But he said he didn't think Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador would accept, adding that the two men hadn't talked since the election.

A preliminary count showed Calderon, of President Vicente Fox's conservative National Action Party, ahead by just 1 percentage point. Lopez Obrador demanded a

recount of every ballot, saying Wednesday: "The political stability of the country hangs in the balance."

Lopez Obrador could mobilize millions if he doesn't get his way. In a news conference Wednesday, Calderon raised the possibility that he would do the same.

"We could also call for protests, but the vote can't be replaced by demonstrations," he said. "They are trying to undermine an election without having the results to back it up."

Federal Electoral Institute President Luis Carlos Ugaidé said late Tuesday that 2.6 million votes were not included in the preliminary count because of "inconsistencies," such as poor handwriting or extraneous marks on the tally sheets attached outside each ballot box.

Lopez Obrador had initially said those 2.6 million were "missing."

## Oakley man strives for success in family, business

OAKLEY — All that glitters isn't necessarily gold.

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# NYC mayor: Economy would fail without illegal immigrants

PHILADELPHIA — The economy of the country's largest city and the entire nation would collapse if illegal immigrants were deported en masse, New York Mayor Michael Bloomberg told a Senate committee hearing Wednesday.

New York City is home to more than 3 million immigrants, and a half-million of them came to this country illegally, Bloomberg testified.

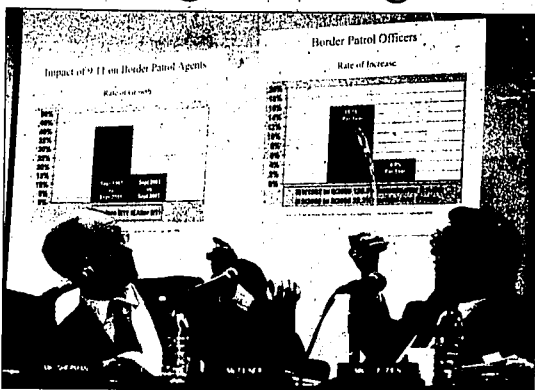
"Although they broke the law by illegally crossing our borders ... our city's economy would be a shell of itself had they not, and it would collapse if they were deported," he said. "The same holds true for the nation."

The hearing, led by Senate Judiciary Committee Chairman Arlen Specter, R-Pa., in Philadelphia, was one of several held nationwide as congressional Republicans take the road to discuss overhauling immigration laws.

House GOP leaders called for the hearings last month in a blow to President Bush's ambitious election-year plan that includes a guest worker program and path to citizenship for millions in this country illegally.

At a House subcommittee meeting at a Border Patrol station in San Diego, Republicans tried to focus on the potential for terrorists to enter the United States through Mexico. Immigration reform must be national security reform," said Rep. Ed Royce, the subcommittee chairman.

Democrats at the hearing sought to portray GOP immigration and border policies as failures.

"This is a charade," said Rep. Bob Filner, whose district includes the patrol station. "It's a cover-up for the fact that they can't produce a bill and they can't secure our borders."

Specter and fellow senators are trying to build support for a Senate bill that would allow a majority of the illegal immigrants to eventually become legal permanent residents and citizens after paying at least \$3,250 in fines, fees and back taxes and learning English.

The competing bill passed by the House focuses on

enforcement and has no provision for illegal immigrants or future guest workers.

President Bush, visiting in Alexandria, Va., promoted his view that immigration legislation should provide some means for illegal immigrants who have been in the U.S. for a long time to stay.

"We cannot kick people out who have been here for awhile," Bush said, adding that they should be "treated with respect and dignity."

At the hearing in Philadelphia, a Pennsylvania

mayor who has pushed for local ordinances cracking down on illegal immigrants asked for federal government assistance.

"We must dig deep into the city's accounts to pay for illegal immigrants, while illegal immigrants do not pay their fair share of taxes, either to the city, the county, the state or the country," said Louis J. Barletta, the mayor of Hazelton.

The panel that met in San Diego was set to meet again Friday in the border city of Laredo, Texas.

Leaving behind his pueblo in Guajalato, Mexico, Jose Gasca traveled north across the border to pick fruit and vegetables in places he never heard of — Arkansas, Michigan, Arizona. Living and working conditions were grueling. He often slept in cramped barracks with dozens of other men and worked at dawn to till 12 hours in the fields.

Like his father before him, Gasca, 70, was a "bracero," a Mexican worker contracted by the U.S. government to fill labor shortages during and after World War II.

The work was hard, the pay low and the experience at times humiliating, but Gasca credits the bracero program with changing his life. He was able to buy furniture for his parents, send his younger siblings to school and pay for his own home. "Many of us had an opportunity to prosper," said Gasca, a naturalized U.S. citizen who lives in Harbor City, Calif.

More than half a century after the first Mexican guest worker program was implemented, the Republican-controlled Congress is sharply divided over whether to approve a new program that would give an estimated 1.5 million undocumented farm workers a chance to earn permanent legal residency.

Under the Senate proposal, eligible participants would have to prove they worked in agriculture before the law was enacted and work another three to five years before being granted residency. "The bill would allow up to as many as 200,000 people outside the country to fill vacant jobs during the first year with the opportunity to gain permanent residency after working four years."

Gasca and other braceros named for the Spanish word "brazo" for arm, said they support the Senate plan. But they worry that the new foreign workers would be paid better wages, receive long-term contracts, and be given an opportunity to gain citizenship.

"They deserve it because they are giving a lot to the country," Gasca said. Guadalupe Garcia Gonzalez, 74, a former bracero, said she favors a new guest-worker program because it would help reduce the deaths of migrants crossing the border. "Poor people would not die in the deserts anymore," said Garcia, a retired landscaper who lives in Anaheim, Calif.

If a review of the uncounted votes inside prove the numbers on these tally sheets are valid, Calderon would still lead, but by just 0.4 percent — about 250,000 of the 41 million votes cast, Ugalde said.

Electoral officials across Mexico began to review all the tally sheets Wednesday, a process that by law must continue around the clock until the final, official result is determined. It was unclear when that might be.

The final count will be turned over to Mexico's electoral courts, where political parties can dispute the results. The electoral court is to certify the winner Sept. 6.

Ugalde said officials would open ballot boxes to conduct individual counts only where there are tally sheet problems.

In an initial meeting between electoral officials and party representatives, Horacio Duarte of Lopez Obrador's Democratic Revolution Party demanded that officials recount all the votes "for the health of the republic."

"There is one thing missing in this process: certainty," Duarte said.

National Action's German Martinez responded, "They want to throw out the election because it didn't favor them. Pressure and blackmail should not prevail."

The review that began Wednesday is crucial to proving the balloting was clean to a nation that emerged six years ago from 71 years of one-party rule replete with election fraud. Some fear this failure to convince the public and candidates it was a fair vote could spark widespread civil unrest.

"Such a close race is a nightmare scenario," said Ted Lewis, an election observer for the San Francisco-based Global Exchange. "If the ruling party wins by a hair, a lot of people will jump to the conclusion that something is amiss."

Lopez Obrador aide Claudia Scheinbaum said Wednesday that the party found "very

grave inconsistencies" in at least 50,000 polling places, including 18,646 in which votes cast outnumbered ballots distributed by officials. There was no immediate response from election officials.

"The entire handling of the preliminary count was irregular," Lopez Obrador told Mexico's TV Azteca in an interview Tuesday night. "We are convinced that we won and we're going to prove it."

Directing his remarks to electoral officials, he said, "Make the review thorough so all will be satisfied."

Ugalde said officials will open up ballot boxes to conduct individual counts only if there is evidence of specific irregularities. Mexico became accustomed to widespread accusations of electoral shenanigans during seven decades of rule by the Institutional Revolutionary Party, or PRI.

Fears of such fraud have sharply diminished since the electoral institute was founded in 1990s. The now-autonomous institute oversaw Fox's peaceful defeat of the PRI in 2000 and has been praised as a world-class electoral body that has advised emerging democracies, including Iraq and Haiti.

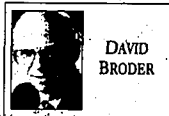
Court delivers message to Bush

Justice John Paul Stevens, the author of the majority opinion in last week's historic decision on Guantanamo detainee trials, was appointed to the Supreme Court in 1975 by President Gerald R. Ford.

It was that first Supreme Court decision requiring Nixon to turn over the incriminating evidence of his complicity in the Watergate cover-up that set the tone...

No more than the security threats Nixon invented in order to justify his rogue police state operations will the war on terror relieve the president of the burden imposed by the Constitution...

The Supreme Court that lined up Bush in the presidential election after the recounting of Florida votes sent him a clear message that he must operate in ways that Congress and the Constitution permit.

By engaging the Democrats in a lively debate about the president's counter-terrorism strategy, the first reaction to the 9/11 attacks, Congress gave Bush broadly worded authority to protect the country and strike back at the terrorists.

As Jane Mayer has detailed in the July 3 issue of the New Yorker, Vice President Cheney and his counsel, David Addington, saw the liability of the supervision from the Republican Congress as an invitation to reassert more and more power for the executive branch.

Monitoring of phone calls and other communications, travel and financial transactions in our history. Other byproducts have been the lengthy detentions of suspects in Guantanamo and other overseas locations.

It was only in the past year — when the first anti-terrorism statute, the Patriot Act, came up for renewal and when newspapers disclosed some of the steps the administration had secretly taken that Congress began to raise questions about what was going on.

As Stevens put it, Salim Ahmed Hamdan, the Guantanamo detainee, may be "a dangerous individual

whose beliefs, if acted upon, would cause great harm and even death to innocent civilians... but in undertaking to try Hamdan and subject him to criminal prosecution, the executive is bound to comply with the rule of law that prevails in this jurisdiction."

There is no reason for Democrats in Congress to fear the coming debate. They need not feel embarrassed about affirming the rightness of Stevens' decision and finding ways to legislate the needed rules for handling these detainees.

Congress is coming late to this task, but it is not too late to make our laws and our practices conform to the Constitution. And to remind this president that the law applies to him, too.

Clarifying the inconvenient truth

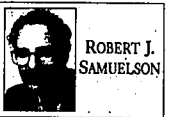
Al Gore calls global warming an "inconvenient truth," as if merely recognizing it could put us on a path to a solution. The real truth is that we don't know enough to relieve global warming.

From 2003 to 2050, world population is projected to grow from 6.4 billion people to 9.1 billion, a 42 percent increase. If energy use per person and technology remain the same, total energy use and greenhouse gas emissions (mainly carbon dioxide) will be 42 percent higher in 2050.

But that's too low, because societies that grow richer use more energy. Unless we condemn the world's poor to their present poverty — and freeze everyone else's living standards — we need economic growth. Energy use and greenhouse gas emissions more than double by 2050. Just keeping annual greenhouse gas emissions constant means that the world must somehow offset these huge increases.

There are two ways: Improve energy efficiency or shift to energy sources with lower (or no) greenhouse emissions. Intuitively, you choose this is tough.

China, for example, builds about one coal-fired power plant a week. Now, a new report from the International Energy Agency in Paris shows that the world's population, economic growth and energy projections cited above come from the report.

modest global warming. I'm unqualified to judge between those scientists (the majority) who blame man-made greenhouse gases and those to small minority) who finger natural variations in the global weather system.

We can't end annual greenhouse emissions, and once in the atmosphere, the gases seem to linger for decades. So concentration levels rise.

Never mind. Having postulated a crash energy diet, the IEA simulates five scenarios with differing rates of technological change. In each, greenhouse emissions in 2050 are higher than today.

That didn't. But it hasn't reduced carbon dioxide emissions (up about 25 percent since 1990), and many signatories didn't adopt tough enough policies to hit their 2008-2012 targets.

Ambitious U.S. politicians also practice this self-serving hypocrisy. Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger has a global warming program. Gore counts 221 cities that have "ratified" Kyoto. Some pledge to curb their greenhouse emissions. None of these programs will reduce global warming.

It is, I had never heard, a nuclear fuel that is more plentiful and safer than uranium without waste disposal problems. It's an exit from the global warming trap.

After reading many articles I gave up trying to decide whether he is correct. But his larger point is correct: Only an aggressive research and development program might find ways of breaking our dependence on fossil fuels or dealing with it.

The trouble with the global warming debate is that it has become a moral crusade when it's really an engineering problem.

The inconvenient truth is that if we don't solve the engineering problem, we're helpless.

LaVerne was an avid reader. She especially loved English history because her grandparents had migrated with the Mormons from Darby, Utah, Derbyshire, England, when her mother was just 2 years old.

From the age of 16, she was a Magic Valley resident living in Kimberly until 1963. Dale and she bought 19 acres in Hagerman and started raising baby calves. They camped out in a dilapidated shack until they could remodel it into a beautiful showplace that overlooked the Snake River. They had lots of fun raising grapes, making their own wine and playing pinochle with friends. In about 1976, they purchased eight acres in Jerome and again remodeled the house. Dale was killed in a freak accident on May 9, 1984. In 1988, LaVerne moved to a beautiful home on Seventh Avenue East in Twin Falls so she could be closer to her daughter and friends. Later, she again was moved to several assisted living centers until July 2, when her final journey home began.

LaVerne always had the coffee pot on and her many wonderful friends in Kimberly, Hagerman, Jerome and Twin Falls were always welcome. She was a great listener and the type of friend who made life interesting and a fun

adventure for those she spent time with. Some of her best times in later years were spent with Eloise Damschroder and her daughter, Marilyn. They traveled to Butchart Gardens in Victoria, Canada, and the Oregon Coast in 1992. In 1994 they decided Eloise's son, Gary, and all the other wonderful aides, thank you for the gentle and loving care during the past two months for LaVerne. ## Tricolored final

France beats Portugal, will take on Italy in World Cup final

MUNICH, Germany — Leave it to the French to give this World Cup a sense of déjà vu.

Zinedine Zidane had been there before, standing behind the penalty spot, with a chance to gain glory for himself and France.

With sweat dripping off his bald pate, he faced Ricardo Pereira, 12 yards from the goal. And with the composure gained from so many tough games over the years, he kicked the ball just inside the post.

The shot was perfect. Though the goalkeeper correctly chose a dive to his right, the ball barely eluded his fingertips.

In a match that turned on one penalty kick awarded and another denied, Zidane's goal in the 33rd minute gave France a 1-0 victory over Portugal on Wednesday night and a berth against Italy in an all-but World Cup final, Les Bleus vs. the Azzurri.

"If we win, it will be wonderful for those who have supported us. I'm not talking about the ones who jumped on the bandwagon, but those who supported us from start to finish," Zidane said.

Others may have not expected the 34-year-old Zidane, who is retiring after Sunday's final, to carry his aging teammates this far. Pardon him, though, if he feels like this has all happened before.

Six years ago, Zidane's penalty kick beat Portugal in the European Championship semifinals to set up a final against — who else? — Italy. France won that one.

Three-time champion Italy will be appearing in its sixth final. The last time the Azzurri won it was 1982.

The French were supposed to be soccer's over-the-hill gang, written off as too old and too tired. This will be their second appearance in a World Cup final — the other came in 1998, when Zidane scored twice in their famous 3-0 victory at home over Brazil. Six players remain from that team.

They earned their chance at a second title after Ricardo Carvalho tripped up Thierry Henry a yard inside the penalty area.

"It was a penalty. We can't contest it," Portugal coach Luis Felipe Scolari conceded.

Just three minutes after Zidane scored, Portugal's players and Scolari were livid — that Uruguayan referee Jorge Larionda didn't award them a penalty in return. Cristiano Ronaldo went down in the outer penalty area trying to reach a cross, claiming he was pushed by Willy Sagnol.

A yellow water bottle was kicked onto the field from Portugal's bench when no call was made.

"He was right when he called the penalty on the French player but was wrong when he did not call it on Cristiano," Scolari said.

After the final whistle, Portugal captain Luis Figo walked over to the referee, spoke with him, then gave him mock applause.

"Anyone who understands soccer saw that the referee wasn't fair,"

Ronaldo said. Scolari, who spent much of the match in front of his bench and throwing his arms up in frustration, wagged a finger at the officials as they walked off, and was blocked from getting close to them by a FIFA official.

Zidane's goal was his 30th in 107 international appearances, tying Just Fontaine and Jean-Pierre Papin on France's career list. "I told myself that if I score and we don't allow any goals, we will be in the final," Zidane said. "I didn't think of anything else."

With just a few minutes to go, French fans in one corner of the stadium started singing "La Marseillaise," the French anthem, and followed with chants of "Allez, Les Bleus!"

Now unbeaten in nine straight

games, France started the World Cup slowly with ties against Switzerland and South Korea before beating Togo to get to the knockout phase. The French then defeated Spain, defending champion Brazil and finally Portugal to reach the finals.

Waiting for them will be a familiar tricolor opponent. The French rallied to defeat Italy 2-1 in the 2000 Euro final when Sylvain Wittord scored with 30 seconds left in second-half injury time and David Trezeguet got a goal 13 minutes into sudden-death extra time. France also beat the Italians on penalty kicks in the 1998 World Cup quarterfinals.

Portugal, a 20-1 shot last December, advanced to the World Cup semifinals

Fortunately for the fans of the Twin Falls Cowboys AA squad, the team will resume play next Wednesday at Skip Walker Field.

A quote from Twin Falls head coach Tim Stadelmeier in the June 30 edition of the Times-News led to speculation on whether the Cowboys would be able to field a team to finish the season.

"Hopefully we have nine players eligible by then," Stadelmeier had said of the Cowboys' team-wide two-week suspension. "We'll see."

Stadelmeier would not comment Wednesday on if any players are no longer with the Cowboys, but that could be apparent when the team takes the field next week.

However, the coach has assured that Twin Falls will have at least nine players to field a team.

"At the time, I didn't know," he said. "But we're okay."

The implications of losing players at this point in the season could have grave consequences. The Cowboys roster included no more than 12 players this year, which means that losing even one player would keep them from participating in postseason action beyond the district tournament. The rule allows an exception to the tournament host, allowing Twin Falls to participate with less than 12 eligible players.

Even so, the AA team cannot bring up a talent because of American Legion rules which state that rosters must be locked in by June 30. Idaho state American Legion Baseball chairman Derrick Ater confirmed that the rosters were received by deadline and are final.

Stadelmeier said that the team has been doing some "soul searching" while preparing for next week's games.

"We're practicing," he said. "We're well and we're getting ready. We'll get them in practice and see what happens."

"The Cowboys should" have played against the Minico Spartans Wednesday but were serving the suspension that cost them a spot in last week's Cowboy Classic and six conference road games this week.

The Cowboys host the Idaho Falls Russetts on July 12 for an Area C doubleheader at 6 p.m.

## Appreciating soccer on TV a learning experience for Americans

It's not easy for a non-soccer-comprehending American to watch a World Cup match on TV.

Among other things, you need a bladder the size of a Frenchman's ego; an ability to keep reminding yourself that despite all the evidence to the contrary, what you're watching really isn't tedious; and a willingness to forgo beer for 45 minutes at a crack.

Speaking of beer, how does a World Cup hold in Germany end up sponsored by Budweiser? That's akin to having Chef Boyardee sponsor an Italian World Cup.

If nothing else, France's victory over Portugal yesterday on ESPN proved the color commentators in soccer are no more present than their counterparts in the major U.S. sports.

After a brief flurry of early activity, John Harkes boldly told his colleague, J.P. Dellacamera, that "there could be a flood of goals tonight."

"Scored" might be too flattering a verb. The play that decided the game came on an unimpeded penalty kick from about 13 inches in front of the Portuguese goalkeeper by a bald man on the verge of retirement.

That kick was awarded not because of some flagrant violation, but because two players inadvertently touched toes in whatever it is they call that box in front of the goalkeeper.

At least now I know why soccer passions run so high. Since no one is capable of scoring during the regular course of play, the only goals (when on free kicks, penalty kicks and corner kicks. Why does a game with so many "kicks" provide so few?) leaves far too many opportunities for referees to —

as happened yesterday — decide the outcome. The Wall Street Journal reported yesterday that avid soccer fans have been upset by the American broadcasts. They're finding all the graphics and talking too distracting.

After having watched France vs. Portugal, my only question is this: What exactly are they being distracted from?

There appeared to be less happening in the game than in an average American Idol episode — which, perhaps not coincidentally, is another worldwide phenomenon I don't get.

However, I would agree with those soccer dieters who complain that ESPN/ABC may be dumbing down its broadcasts in an effort to capture the vast apathetic American audience.

## Mismatched rematch: Federer whips Ancic to reach semis

WIMBLEDON, England — The "Ooohs" and "Aahs" from an appreciative crowd began during warmups, when Roger Federer volleyed one ball through his legs. His on-site grew more impressive once play began for real.

Facing the last man to defeat him on grass, three-time Wimbledon champion Federer quickly turned the Centre Court rematch into a mismatch, beating No. 7-ranked Mario Ancic 6-4, 6-4, 6-4 on Wednesday to reach the semifinals.

If the score was routine, Federer's play was anything but. Some shots were so sublime that even the Swiss star was taken aback.

"I definitely had a period where it was so good, it was just incredible," said Federer, bidding to become the first man since Bjorn Borg in 1976 to win Wimbledon without dropping a set. "You're not afraid to try anything, you're not afraid to hit the

ball hard, you're not afraid to go for acres. That's the sensation you get when you're playing so well. That's exactly what I felt today.

Ancic's assessment was more succinct: "He's just Roger. What can you say?"

Federer will be joined in Friday's semifinals by two far-less-expected participants. Unseeded Jonas Björkman of Sweden eliminated No. 14 Radek Stepanek of the Czech Republic 7-6 (3), 4-6, 6-7 (5), 7-6 (7), 6-4 to become, at 34, the oldest Wimbledon semifinalist since Jimmy Connors in 1987. And No. 18 Marcos Baghdatis of Cyprus knocked off 2002 Wimbledon champion Lleyton Hewitt 6-1, 5-7, 7-6 (5), 6-2.

The last member of the final four won't be decided until Thursday: No. 2 Rafael Nadal's quarterfinal against No. 22 Jarkko Nieminen of Finland was postponed after two rain delays totaling nearly 2 1/2 hours interrupted play early in the day.

Federer wasn't bothered one whit by the weather.

Or the two jokers who jumped out of the stands in the first set with rockets and bats, but were quickly shooed away by security.

Or, most impressively, anything Ancic threw at him.

It was Federer's 26th consecutive victory at the All England Club, and 46th in a row on a grass court, extending his "Open era" record. His last loss on the surface came against Ancic in the first round at Wimbledon in 2002.

"He is a completely different grass-court player than he was then," said Ancic, whose serve-and-volley skills carried him to the Wimbledon semifinals two years ago. "It's very hard to say, 'Be aggressive. Attack him.' Because if you're just a little bit off with the speed of the ball (on the approach, you're passed."

Federer finished with more than twice as many winners (35) as unforced errors (17). He broke Ancic four times, matching the total of service games lost by the Croat

# American emerging as favorite

## McEwen wins fourth stage

**SAINT-QUENTIN, France (AP)** — In a sport ruled for so long by Lance Armstrong, fellow American Levi Leipheimer is hardly a household name, but in the next two weeks of the Tour de France he might become a little more familiar.

The consistently high-performing Butte, Mont., native has reason to fancy his chances of becoming Armstrong's heir. Of the 172 racers still left in cycling's showpiece race that lost top contenders to doping allegations, a crash and illness only four have ever finished above Leipheimer — and one of those is now his teammate.

Leipheimer finished comfortably in the main pack on Wednesday's fourth stage, won by Australian sprinter Robbie McEwen with a remarkable final burst of speed. Tom Boonen of Belgium kept the overall lead, proudly wearing the yellow jersey on his home turf.

Leipheimer, who is 27th overall, is the first to admit that it is still early days in the three-week race and that a surprise winner could emerge before the finish in Paris on July 23. Nevertheless, as others have dropped out, his star has risen.

"Someone could pop up and do really well," he said after Wednesday's stage for where he accomplished one of his top priorities for the fast and dangerous first week: staying safe.

Of having been beaten by so

few riders in this year's field, he said: "That's the past, and this is a different year and riders get stronger and more experienced."

"It means a lot, but it's not an absolute truth that you can place your bets on," he added. When asked, Leipheimer named three riders who placed above him in the three Tours he's finished: Spaniard Carlos Sastre of Team CSC, the Discovery Channel's Portuguese climber Jose Azevedo and T-Mobile racer Andreas Klöden, a friend and teammate of Jan Ullrich, who was among nine riders barred before the start because of doping allegations.

But Leipheimer is forgetting

a fourth: his Gerolsteiner teammate Georg Totschning, the Austrian finished seventh at the 2004 Tour, two spots above Leipheimer, who was then racing for Rabobank.

Leipheimer's spotty memory is perhaps not accidental. At some point on this Tour, he may have to shove his own ambitions and ride in support of Totschning if the team decides that the Austrian has the best chance to win. But the reverse could be true, too.

For the moment, the squad says that both are team leaders and that the decision on who is in the best position to ride for the Tour crown will be judged on Saturday's long time trial and their performances

during the tough climbs of the Pyrenees and Alps.

"We have two jokers to play with," said the team's press officer, Mathias Wieland.

The real racing for the overall title won't start until the time trial and mountains.

Leipheimer finished 56th in Wednesday's 129-mile stage from Huy, in Belgium, to Saint-Quentin in northeast France. McEwen dedicated his 10th stage victory in nine Tours — and his second this year — to his American teammate Fred Rodriguez, who crashed out of the race in Tuesday's accident-stricken stage three when another favorite, Alejandro Valverde, broke a collarbone and dropped out.

# Fan killed in subway accident at World Cup

**PARIS (AP)** — With shouts of "Zizou, Zizou" and "We're in the final" on the lips, tens of thousands of French fans poured out on the Champs Elysees after France advanced to the World Cup final Wednesday night. One fan was killed in a subway accident disrupting traffic while the metro system was packed with people.

The victim had climbed atop

a train at the Opera metro station, in central Paris beneath the famed Open Garmer and fell at around midnight. Police said circumstances of the accident remained unclear.

Most fans remained unaware of any trouble following the 1-0 victory over Portugal, however, running, galloping and partying toward the Arc de Triomphe on Paris' most famous boulevard.

for just the second time. Eusebio, the hero of Portugal's 1966 run, was on hand as was former French captain Michel Platini, considered by many his nation's greatest player.

France's win ended Portugal's 19-game unbeaten streak dating to a February 2005 exhibition loss at Ireland. It also stopped Scolari's 12-game undefeated string in World Cup matches.

Zidane's goal was the first goal scored at the stadium since the 29th minute of its first round finale against Mexico.

"It's a real star, but a real star in the real sense of the word, someone who brings something to his team, and helps the French public to keep dreaming," France coach Raymond Domenech said.

Ronaldo nearly created a tying goal in the 76th, when French goalkeeper Fabien Barthez — another of the 1998 heroes — let his 30-year-old free kick bounce off his arms and up in front of the goal. Figo, another former world player of the year, had an open header that he sent over the bar.

# Bonds' trainer sent to jail for refusing to testify

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Barry Bonds' personal trainer was held in contempt of court and taken to prison Wednesday for refusing to testify to the federal grand jury investigating the San Francisco Giants' slugger for perjury.

Greg Anderson, who served three months in prison after pleading guilty last year for his role in the Bay Area Laboratory Co-Operative steroid scandal, was led out of U.S. District Judge William Alsup's courtroom by two deputy U.S. marshals. He will be housed at the Federal Correctional Institution in nearby Dublin, but his stay may be short.

That's because Anderson will be set free once the grand jury's term expires, which will occur within weeks, Alsup said.

Anderson was initially ordered in March to testify to the grand jury investigating whether Bonds perjured himself when he testified to the original BALCO grand jury in December 2003 that he never knowingly used steroids or other banned performance enhancing drugs.

"Every person, even the President of the United States as held by the Supreme Court, has to give testimony," Alsup said in ordering Anderson to testify.

Alsup denied Anderson's request for bail or to remain free while his attorney, Mark Geragos, appeals the decision.

"You have done a masterful job of postponing this day of reckoning," the judge told Geragos, "and if you wait a few more weeks, the grand jury will go away."

Geragos said Anderson won't testify, and will be released once the grand jury's term expires.

While Geragos, the federal prosecutor and the

# Woods looks for turnaround at Western after rough U.S. Open

LEMONT, Ill. (AP) — Tiger Woods went spearfishing. He spent time with his family, too. And yes, he watched the final rounds of the U.S. Open after missing the cut.

"That was my punishment," he said Wednesday.

He hopes to do better this weekend at the Western Open, which starts Thursday. The same goes for Phil Mickelson, whose meltdown on the final hole at Winged Foot cost him the U.S. Open. Woods and Mickelson head a star-packed field that includes Vijay Singh and Jim Furyk.

A three-time Western Open winner, Woods hopes to rediscover his stroke after shooting 12-over par and failing to make the cut in a major for the first time in 10 years as a professional.

The rough going on the course came during the most difficult time away from it.

Woods took nine weeks off between the Masters and U.S. Open to tend to his father Earl, who died of cancer on May 3, and he went a month without picking up a golf club because it was just too painful. It reminded him of his father and of his loss.

"He made a break. I'm sure it gets easier, but it's something you'll never forget," Woods said. "I don't think it's ever something you really want to forget or every really want to truly put behind you because having a parent that is so loving in your life and that you love so much, you never, ever, forget that."

"Life lessons always come about, each and everyday," he added. "I've talked to a bunch of friends who have gone through it before, and they think about their lost parent

everyday. It happens. That's something I've done and I will continue to do probably for the rest of my life."

Woods would probably like to forget his performance at the U.S. Open. He led by one heading into the final hole before a double-bogey dropped him into a tie for second with Colin Montgomerie and Jim Furyk, one shot behind Geoff Ogilvy.

Mickelson made some questionable decisions and brought back memories of the Lefty who was 0-for-42 in majors as a professional before breaking through at the 2004 Masters.

He used a driver instead of a 4-wood on the 18th tee, and the ball landed off to the left, near the hospitality tents. Then, he went for the green rather than a safe shot, and hit a branch. And his next shot landed in a bunker.

"I think the biggest thing about this is I don't want the one hole to affect my play in the next couple majors," Mickelson said.

Furyk was disappointed, too. His putting game deserted him after the first hole on the final day of the U.S. Open. "I'm proud of the way I played," said Furyk, the defending Western Open champion. "I didn't close the door like I could have."

Woods thought Montgomerie should have won. The ball was on the right side of the fairway, on a flat spot, with a good angle.

"It doesn't get any better than that," Woods said. "With Phil on the tee, anything can still happen. He could still make bogey on the last hole and lose the tournament. I thought it was Monty's tourna-

ment. Put the ball on the green and it's over. Obviously, that didn't happen."

Woods had an unusual vantage point. For once, he was an observer and not a participant. And it was a strange feeling. He thought he was ready for the U.S. Open. He had put in the time in practice, but everything was off.

Furyk said Woods had "a very aggressive look" on that Friday, the look of a man trying to get back in contention and not merely survive the cut.

"He's looking to win all the time, whether he's laid off for nine or 10 weeks or not," Furyk said.

Woods used the past few weeks to regroup.

Besides spearfishing and spending time with family, Woods worked on his game, and exchanged text messages with U.S. Women's Open winner Annika Sorenstam.

The British Open is later this month. But first comes the Western.

"I've had some good success here," Woods said. "Even the times I've played poorly coming in, this golf course has allowed me to turn it around. So hopefully, this will be one of those years where I can really play well and win the championship and then head off to the British for some good, positive vibes."

# Sorenstam and Wie set for Match Play openers

GLADSTONE, N.J. (AP) — Annika Sorenstam got a little more rest than she wanted before the start of the IHSC Women's World Match Play Championship.

After taking Tuesday off following her playoff victory Monday in the U.S. Women's Open, Sorenstam missed a chance to play the Hamilton Farm course Wednesday when heavy morning rain forced officials to move the pro-am round to the adjacent par-3 course.

"I remember quite a bit," said Sorenstam, a quarterfinalist last year on the hilly course. "My caddy has been out and he's been able to maneuver me through a lot of different courses. I'm not too worried about that."

The top-seeded Swede will open against No. 64 Viradia Nirapathongorn on Thursday. On Monday in Newport, R.I., Sorenstam beat Pat Hurst 70-74 in an 18-hole playoff for the third U.S. Women's Open title and 10th major victory.

"I got some rest yesterday and rested a bit on Monday afternoon," Sorenstam said. "I think when you go through something like this, it's just so much energy and so much adrenaline still that I don't think about how I feel. ... I was lucky I had two weeks off before the Open. My batteries are totally recharged."

In the other half of the draw, second-seeded Michelle Wie will face 63rd-seeded Candy Hannemann. The 16-year-old Wie, coming off a third-place tie in the Women's Open, got a look at the course Tuesday morning during a practice round, then had a long practice session and played in the pro-am Wednesday afternoon.

"Just getting out here today was important," Wie said. "After the bad weather this morning, it was nice to be able to get out and walk some and play a little. ... I played a lot of par-3 courses growing up, but nothing like this. It's awesome. The holes are so secluded, not like some little rinky-dink par-3 course."

Wie went to work soon after the rain stopped, fine-tuning her wedge play and blasting some drives off the back of the range. She also spent a lot of time on the practice green before and after the pro-am, stopping occasionally to chat with Paula Creamer and possible second-round opponent Christina Kim during the first session.

Fourth-seeded Karrie Webb, set to play Nancy Stanbury, missed a chance to see the course Wednesday after taking Tuesday off.

"I'm not overly concerned about it, especially with the rain," Webb said. "It's going to play pretty similar to what it did last year. The fairways are probably the widest we play on tour. Then with them being wet, it makes them doubly wide."

"Mentally, this course isn't as challenging as a U.S. Open course. ... It's more of a mindset where you're setting up to try and play pretty aggressive."

Webb, the Kraft Nabisco and Michie's Ultra Open winner, reached the quarterfinals last year before losing to eventual champion Marisa Baena.

"It's a different mind-set," the Australian said. "You're just playing your opponent on the day and obviously you can shoot 64 and lose or shoot a couple over and win."

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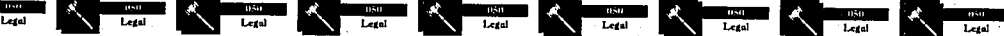

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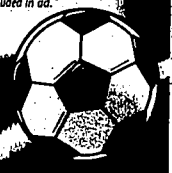

## THE ACES ON BRIDGE

Bobby Wolff

Today's bidding brings up a number of teaching points. To start with, North has an entirely sound double of the opening bid, and despite the unfortunate outcome, he would be quite wrong to pass or to bid one spade.

The redouble by East is clearly indicated, and South can only bid two clubs and hope for the best. West and North should pass, and East, although his clubs are moderate, should not hesitate to double. His partner's pass suggests a relatively balanced hand, so East must try to exploit the vulnerability. Any rescue attempt by North-South can be set 800 or more, and for this, a nonvulnerable game is a poor exchange.

When the heart queen is led against two clubs, South's most likely play is to win dummy's ace and play a diamond. If East is allowed to hold the trick with the 10, his next play is critical. He must shift to a trump, for his partner is virtually marked with the king, and it is important to prevent dummy from ruffing.

When declarer wins the trump shift in dummy and leads a second diamond, West can overtake the king with his ace to lead a second trump.

Now all of dummy's trumps can be drawn before any diamonds are ruffed, and South will be set 800. But if East, for example, wins the first diamond lead and continues hearts, declarer may well escape for down one — a poor return for East-West, who can make game.

ANSWER: Bid two spades. Passing would not be a huge mistake, but I like to raise partner when I can. Note that a bid of two no-trump here would show 18-19, not 12-14, so you cannot do that. Incidentally, a support double — if you use that convention — would show a three-card spade raise to describe this hand perfectly. More on this in another column!

N. Korean

NEW YORK — Concerns over North Korea's nuclear ambitions and record oil prices sent stocks lower Wednesday and added to Wall Street's worries about the economy and interest rates.

After North Korea test fired a seventh missile Wednesday, stocks around the globe sagged as investors worried that tensions between North Korea and the United States could intensify.

Nervousness about North Korea's actions, along with concerns about gasoline supplies, pushed crude oil futures to a new intraday record of \$75.40 per barrel before they retreated slightly. A barrel of light crude nonetheless set a settlement record of \$75.19, up \$1.26, on the New York Mercantile Exchange.

With the U.S. economy still strong — a report on factory orders out Wednesday was stronger than expected — investors worrying about interest rates remained hesitant to buy stocks.

The Labor Department's report on June employment due Friday added to the market's hesitancy, since a strong report could encourage the Fed to continue raising interest rates.

"Investors aren't really looking for opportunities to get in. They're looking for reasons to get out," said Scott West, equity strategist for A.G. Edwards & Sons. "I read the Fed statement last week as dovish, but with that employment report coming up, nobody wants to get into the market in front of that."

According to preliminary calculations, the Dow Jones Industrial average fell 76.20, or 0.68 percent, to 11,151.82, after gaining 77.80 in holiday-shortened trading Monday.

Broader stock indicators also fell sharply. The Standard & Poor's 500 index lost 9.28, or 0.72 percent, to 1,270.91, and the Nasdaq composite index fell 37.09, or 1.69 percent, to 2,153.34.

Bonds fell sharply, exacerbating the drop in stocks.

The yield on the 10-year Treasury note shot up to 5.22 percent from 5.15 percent late Monday. The dollar made gains against most major currencies, while gold prices moved higher as well.

## Railroad plans improvements in Idaho

## Crapo gets a first-hand look

BURLEY — They'll be working on the railroad all the live-long summer.

Eastern Idaho Regional Railroad's parent company, Watco Companies Inc., plans \$4.5 million in capital improvements to new and existing infrastructure, thanks in part to a tax credit supported by U.S. Senator Mike Crapo, said Watco Chief Commercial Officer Ed McKechnie.

The capital improvements include replacing 30,000 railroad ties this year, McKechnie said. A portion of those ties will be installed on the short rail line that runs from Buhl to Rupert, serving companies such as McCain Foods and Amalgamated Sugar. The line

carries heavy axle railcars that hook onto Southern Pacific trains. The replacement cost of each tie is about \$65, with about 3,000 ties per mile, though not all the ties will be replaced at once.

On Wednesday, Crapo visited the railroad line in front of McCain to watch the installation of new rail ties. A machine called a tie remover drove along the rail, using a pincher to pull defective ties from beneath the rails. Another machine, called a tie inserter, then grabbed the new ties and slid them into place. A man on the ground replaced the metal plate between the tie and rail. A third machine, called a spike, then inserts the spike that holds the rail to the tie.

"This is an opportunity to show Senator Crapo what he

does in Washington does local," McKechnie said during the press conference.

Crapo said he enjoyed the experience.

"This is the fun part of my

job," he said. "Seeing success happen."

Federal actions such as the tax credit help people grow the economy, he said, adding that infrastructure is significant for

the success of Idaho's economy because transportation is a key element in allowing participation in national and international markets.

Several local companies depend on the railroad. For example, it carries in about 3,000 cars of supplies such as coal and coke to Amalgamated Sugar's plant in Paul and hauls out 4,000 cars of sugar products, said Bryan Whipple, the company's sales and transportation administrator.

"Eastern Idaho is just critical for us to get our product to market," Whipple said. "There just aren't enough trucks."

Crapo supports the extension of tax rates that allow a 50 percent tax credit on reinvestment in rail facilities. The tax credit for Watco, about \$750,000, will help pay for capital improvements and also free funds so the company can purchase new equipment, McKechnie said.

Enron's victims  
contemplate

It was a man, after all — not just some abstract symbol of corporate thievery and vanished investor billions. Kenneth Lay, founder of Enron Corp., was also a grandfather to 12, a husband to the woman who sobbed at his side on the day of his conviction.

And yet his sudden death early Wednesday in Colorado — his pastor said "simply gave out" — deprives the thousands of victims of the Enron debacle the satisfaction they said they would feel at his spending perhaps decades in prison, reflecting on his crimes.

The Enron founder's death, three months before he was to be sentenced, left many grappling with difficult questions of forgiveness, retribution and the meaning of justice itself.

On Internet blogs, some went so far as to suggest the death was conveniently timed. There was this, for example, from a poster to a forum on the Web site of Lay's hometown paper, the Houston Chronicle: "The only sad ending to this story is that Ken Lay will never see a day in prison."

A statement from a family spokesman gave little more detail than saying Lay died in the early morning hours in Aspen, Colo., where he vacationed. His pastor in Houston said the 64-year-old Lay died of a heart attack.

It was the least, it was an unexpected twist in the saga of the Enron founder, a once-high-flying Houston civic leader who was convicted May 25 of fraud and conspiracy.

And it left some victims scratching their heads about just what to make of the news. Some, speaking in religious terms, suggested Lay was now facing a different kind of justice.

"I hate this happened. I personally wanted to see him go to jail. But maybe this is God's way of 'having justice' done," said Charles Prestwood, a former pipeline operator who retired from Enron in 2000 and later lost \$1.3 million in retirement savings.

Others were less forgiving. "He got off easy," said a blunt Sherry Saunders, who worked for Enron and its predecessor company for 24 years before she was laid off in 2001 and lost \$1.1 million in retirement savings.

"To those of us who 'lost' everything, we still have to struggle every day," Saunders said, adding that she had taken comfort in knowing that "if he was going to die, he was going to die in prison."

## Lay's life echoed Enron's rise and fall

HOUSTON — Enron Corp. founder Kenneth Lay, who, faced decades in prison for one of the most sprawling business frauds in U.S. history, died Wednesday while vacationing in Aspen, Colo. He was 64.

His pastor in Houston said Lay died of a heart attack, which had not yet been confirmed by an autopsy.

Lay ascended from near-poverty as a minister's son in Missouri to the pinnacle of corporate America.

He was considered a visionary who had President Bush's ear during Enron's halcyon days, but his reputation and monumental wealth shattered with that of his company. He spent his last years optimistically insisting he was no criminal, even after he became a felon.

"I guess when you're facing the rest of your life in jail and in your heart you know you're an innocent man, I guess it's too much to bear," said close friend Willie Alexander.

Lay had stayed out of the public eye since a federal jury on May 25 convicted him and former Enron CEO Jeffrey

Skilling of fraud and conspiracy for lying to employees and investors about Enron's financial health.

Lay, who described himself as naturally optimistic, displayed no signs of ill health throughout the grueling four-month trial that started Jan. 30. His lead lawyer, Michael Ramsey, was sidelined for several weeks during the trial because of heart problems.

"It's a very sad ending for the whole Lay family saga. There are very few people of his age and abilities who flew as high or who fell so low," said John Olson, an analyst who angered Lay with his skeptical takes on Enron's often indistinguishable financial reports.

Along with fraud and conspiracy charges, Lay also was convicted in a separate federal trial of bank fraud and making false statements to banks. Those charges related to his personal finances.

Lay was scheduled to be sen-

tenced Oct. 23, along with Skilling, who also faces a long prison term.

Skilling, reached by telephone at his home in Houston, told The Associated Press that he was aware of Lay's death.

"No, I don't have any comment," he said quietly. But his lawyer, Daniel J. Petrocelli, described Skilling as "devastated."

"Jeff and Ken worked closely over the years, and Jeff will miss him dearly," Petrocelli said. Lay led Enron's meteoric rise from a staid natural gas pipeline company formed by a 1985 merger to an energy and trading conglomerate that reached No. 7 on the Fortune 500 in 2000 and claimed \$10 billion in annual revenues.

Lay traveled in the highest business and political circles, lived an extravagant lifestyle and gave generously — as much as \$6.1 million in 2001.

Lay's doubt enveloped when Enron spiraled into bankrupt-

cy protection in December 2001. The crash obliterated Enron's more than \$60 billion in market value and thousands of jobs, and Lay was pushed out as chairman and CEO in January 2002.

The government launched a widespread fraud investigation that enveloped Enron's finance, trading, broadband and retail energy units. The probe amassed 16 guilty pleas from ex-executives, eight of whom testified against Skilling and Lay during their trial.

Lay and Skilling insisted no fraud occurred at Enron except from a few employees who skimmed money behind their backs. Jurors were unconvinced.

# Video shows Arab fighters in Somalia

**NAIROBI, Kenya** — A recruiting video issued by members of the fundamentalist Islamic movement in Somalia shows Arab radicals fighting alongside the local extremists in Mogadishu, and invites Muslims from around the world to join in their "holy jihad."

The video, obtained by The Associated Press, provides the first hard evidence that non-Somalis have joined with Islamic extremists in Somalia.

The Supreme Islamic Courts Council, which defeated U.S.-backed warlords in Mogadishu last month and is now the country's most powerful force, has repeatedly denied links to extremists such as al-Qaida.

But the one-hour video appears to confirm U.S. fears — al-Qaida's boss, Osama bin Laden, President Bush expressed concern last month that Somalia could become an al-Qaida haven like Afghanistan was in the late 1990s. And recordings attributed to Osama bin Laden portray Somalia as a battleground in his war on the United States.

The videotape, produced to both recruit new fighters and raise funds, features the Islamic victory over U.S.-backed, secular warlords in Somalia. U.S. officials cooperated with the warlords, hoping to capture three al-Qaida leaders allegedly protected by the Islamic council, especially three men accused in the deadly 1998 bombings at the U.S. embassies in Kenya and Tanzania.

The singled out by the United States include the courts council leader, Sheikh Hassan Dahir Aweys, branded a terrorist by the Americans.

Aweys, speaking on Somali

radio over the weekend, said his movement had no contacts with bin Laden or al-Qaida. He also rejected accusations that foreign fighters were in Somalia.

But the video, shot on a handheld recorder, shows Arab fighters preparing for a major battle on the northern outskirts of Mogadishu. Arabic anthems and poetry play on the audio track urging Muslims to join the global holy war to advance Islam and defeat its enemies.

The video starts with a black flag featuring a Quranic verse

and a saber fluttering in the wind. Such black banners have only recently appeared in Somalia but have been used by Islamic extremists in Iraq, Afghanistan and Lebanon for years.

After a few minutes of battle footage, the tape documents the Arab fighters' preparation for battle, including prayers, a commander's speech to his troops and the preparation of weapons. The Arab fighters then climb onto two pickup trucks mounted with heavy machine guns.

As the sun rises, the location of the Arab camp north of Mogadishu becomes clear and six more trucks loaded with Somali fighters come into view. A senior member of the Islamic group, Yusuf Indohaadde, is filmed walking among the men, before the pickups roll out of an old warehouse compound. The rest of the footage follows one group of Somali militiamen as they battle troops loyal to warlords who controlled Mogadishu for 15 years and had ties to the United States.

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## Two Italian officers held in alleged CIA abduction

**ROME** — Prosecutors said Wednesday they had arrested two Italian intelligence officers as part of their investigation into the alleged CIA kidnapping of an Egyptian cleric in Milan, providing the first official sign that Italian agents were involved.

They also announced they were seeking the arrest of four more Americans after earlier demanding the extradition of 22 purported CIA agents.

The arrests of the two SISMI intelligence officials fueled allegations by a German investigator that Italy and 13 other European countries had aided the United States with the secret transfer of terror suspects to detention centers around the world.

Osama Moustafta Hassan Nasr, an Egyptian cleric and terrorist suspect also known as Abu Omar, was allegedly kidnapped from a Milan street on Feb. 17, 2003. Prosecutors say the operation represented a severe breach of Italian sovereignty that compromised their anti-terrorism efforts, and have already incriminated 22 purported CIA agents.

Prosecutors say Nasr was taken by the CIA to the joint U.S.-Italian Aviano air base, flown to Germany and then to Egypt, where he says he was tortured.

The operation is believed part of an alleged CIA program in which terrorism suspects are transferred to third countries where some allegedly are subjected to torture. The CIA describes such operations as "extraordinary renditions."

Prosecutors and a lawyer for Nasr say he is being held in a CIA prison. Italy's new center-left government released a statement late Wednesday saying that its intelligence services had denied any part in the alleged kidnappings and vowed to cooperate with the investigation.

Prosecutors in Milan said three of the latest Americans being sought were CIA agents, while the fourth worked at Agosno. Their statement did not provide the names of those targeted.

## Stop the madness: No more movie video games

Nothing is sacred. Nothing is safe.

In a frantic land grab, game makers are snatching up Hollywood TV and movie properties and pumping out gaming schlock like there's no tomorrow. The atrocious console games "Jaws" (you play it as the shark) and "The DaVinci Code" are just the latest offenders to chagrin discerning gamers.

Game publishers — once satisfied with producing game versions of the latest action-hero movies — have gotten their mitts on some classic pieces of American cinema and television. Sure, "The Godfather" was a decent offering from the deep-pocketed Electronic Arts. But it stands alone amid the rubble of dozens of disastrously rushed movie and TV-show games.

There are games that should never become movies. But more importantly, there are movies that should never become game versions. Let's put it this way: Would you rather lose \$8 on a bad game movie or \$50 on a bad movie game?

These are movie games that should never be made, along with some notes about what they might look like if they were:

• "Anchorman: The Legend of Ron Burgundy"

With voice acting from Will Ferrell, Steve Carell and Christina Applegate, this game allows you to play the role of ladies' man Ron Burgundy. On early missions, you use your groovy 'stache, swanky polyester suits and the ever impressive "nonnonbaaaaaaahhhhhhhhh" to seduce the babes. *Awww yeah!* Collect enough power-ups, drop study lines such as "You have a fantastic heinie; I want to be friends with it," and they'll be like puppy in your hands.

That is, until you encounter your nemesis, Veronica Corningstone. In a series of boss battles, you have to thwart her nefarious plot to establish credibility for the little ladies on network news. Beat the game on medium difficulty, and you can also play as Brian Fantana.

• "Fair and Balanced: Fox News, the Game"

In this role-playing game, you can choose the characters Bill

# Shiver me timbers!

The conventional wisdom said that Jerry Bruckheimer was crazy to make "Pirates of the Caribbean." The last couple of pirate movies — "Pirates," "Cut-throat Island" — had lost enough money to float the economy of an Eastern European nation. Pirate movies were just another genre whose time — the '20s through the '40s — had come and gone.

Guess again. "Pirates of the Caribbean" succeeded in finally making Johnny Depp a commercial movie star by dint of humorously deconstructing the pirate movie, cross-breeding it with a ghost story, and still maintaining its essential narrative — larger-than-life characters, a sense of humor, and some swashbuckling fun. It was, in essence, a musical comedy without songs and it had the inestimable help of being based on a theme park ride that everybody loves.

All those qualities were present at the creation of the pirate movie, which took place during the '20s, stimulated mainly by the novels of Rafael Sabatini ("Captain Blood") and the paintings of Howard Pyle and N.C. Wyeth, who were in turn stimulated by the classic adventure of Robert Louis Stevenson's "Treasure Island."

The movies could capture all that color and adventure with ease, and they did. In early silents like "The Sea Hawk" and "Captain Blood," both of which were remade with Errol Flynn.

But it was Douglas Fairbanks Sr. who made the pirate movie culturally respectable by shooting his 1926 "The Black Pirate" in early two-color Technicolor. Seen today, "The Black Pirate" has its share of exhilarating physicality, and some early examples of cold-blooded humor — a wise old pirate taps his fingers impatiently while a prisoner is gutted off-camera in order to retrieve a valuable ring.

Fairbanks bogged Errol Flynn, who began Tyrone Power and in between these Wallace Beery

made a satisfactory, if noticeably softened, Long John Silver in MGM's version of "Treasure Island."

By this time, it seemed that practically any leading man who looked good in the pouffy sleeves "Seinfeld" would later have some much fun with could do a pirate movie.

Deeply unlikely pirates such as Paul Henreid ("The Spanish Main") and Louis Hayward ("Son of Captain Blood") did it with some success, and the strenuous help of the stuntman that Fairbanks Sr. had laughed away. It was only a question of time until the -manor-born Fairbanks Jr. ("The Corsican Brothers") asserted his birthright.

And all these men began Charles Laughton. Charles Laughton? Yes. Because right around the mid-'40s, the pirate movie, which was almost invariably about the captured innocent rebelling and seizing the pirate ship for himself, had reached a dead end.

You could tell he had reached a dead end when Bob Hope made "The Princess and the Pirate," a parody of a conventional pirate picture, and a pretty good one. So Hollywood flipped the plot and made the main character the pirate king himself. Laughton played Captain Kidd a couple of times, once in a movie entitled

"Captain Kidd," once, God help us, with Abbott and Costello.

By 1948, when Gene Kelly and Judy Garland made "The Pirate," it seemed the most natural thing in the world for the title character to actually be a self-enchanted ham actor who was only playing at being a pirate.

The '60s brought a gradual end to pirate movies; a new generation of actors was largely reacting against the tradition of showbiz derring-do, and they were above such child's play, although child's play is, at bottom, the point of a pirate movie.

Also, most of these actors didn't have the requisite light touch, as Dustin Hoffman would prove in his remarkably humorous "Captain Hook" in the remarkably humorous "Hook." Modern filmmakers couldn't quite figure out a way to bring the pirate movie into the modern age, as people such as Sam Peckinpain and Sergio Leone, for instance, did with the western. Roman Polanski's "Pirates" never even figures out whether or not it's a spoof.

But the disreputable Captain Jack Sparrow brought a sense of wozzy fun back to the pirate movie, thereby proving that child's play is nothing to be sneezed at.

# 'A PRAIRIE HOME COMPANION'

## Down-home magic from a movie master

Some early moments in Robert Altman's *'A Prairie Home Companion'* suggest that the director is on one of the minor adventures that produces a doty picture like 2000's *'Dr. T and the Women.'* But he and Garrison Keillor have turned Keillor's beloved radio show into the sort of backstage entertainment allegory that brings out the best in the director.

His 38th theatrical feature isn't as politically incisive as *'Nashville'* nor as satirically vicious as *'The Player.'* What *'Prairie Home Companion'* does, however, is bring us the 81-year-old Altman in a reflective state of mind.

Distilling the radio show to its live performances and homemade commercials, Altman and Keillor emphasize the melancholic undercurrents that flow through the airwaves during hours 38th of the show.

In doing so, these two Midwesterners make a surprisingly cozy pair. Altman's hostility would seem to shut-circuit Keillor's earnestness. But neither man has much need for sentimentality or nostalgia. They've turned their collaboration into a pungent wake for a bygone era.

The film imagines the evening of the final live broadcast of *'Prairie Home.'* According to Keillor's script, the owners of the St. Paul, Minn., theater that puts on the show have sold it to a Texas corporation whose key CEO (Tommy Lee Jones) watches from a skybox. Backstage, entertainers and crew carry on unaware that the plug is soon to be pulled. They include the Johnson Sisters, Yolanda and Rhonda (Meryl Streep and Lily Tomlin), who blow into their dressing room, dragging Yolanda's arthritic

daughter, Lola (Lindsay Lohan) behind them; and Dusty and Lefty, the sparring, folksy, and vulgar singing trail hands, played by Woody Harrelson and John C. Reilly.

Altman integrates the performers and backstage personnel with his usual deceptive effortless. The small-scale mayhem feels firmly under control. The concerned makeup lady (Sue Scott), the neurotic stage manager (Tim Russell), the frankish, pregnant stagehand (Maya Rudolph), and the seasoned woman (Marylouise Burke) running the food stand and carrying on a lusty affair with one of the show's even more seasoned performers (L.Q. Jones): They all move seamlessly in and out of the story's focus. (Jacob Goyer, *Pratt & Gertie*, and the great Ed

ward Lachman shot the picture.)

Keillor plays the broadcast's narrator, G.K., whom Yolanda chides for being unfeeling. Indeed, Keillor's expressionless carriage really is more for radio. But his voice is something else. No one will hear a tweller sound in a movie this year than his intoning the words "hubarb pie."

His diction is so impeccable you can hear the "h" and almost smell the pie.

The actors harmonize on stage and off with the energetic off-key idiosyncrasy that Altman prefers. Tomlin and Streep, who's busy and blowsy, have an amusing honey-and-vinegar rapport that even requires them to sing over each other. Lohan, meanwhile, can frequently be seen scribbling in a composition book. I can only hope she plans to use her notes to get herself into more movies this good.

The seemingly inessential character here is played by Kevin Kline. He wanders inconspicuously through the film, playfully hitting guns that

works as the backstage door-keeper. He knows about the sale and spends the movie trying in his own inept fashion to save the station.

Kline's combination of pratfalls and urbanity is funny, but it rubs against the rest of the movie's effortless rustic charm. He's like Errol Flynn on a hayride.

But he does last after the movie's best invention: Virginia Madsen, who wanders from scene to scene, luminously in a white trench coat, playing an angel of death. Some characters can see her and some can't. Either way, her appearance here goes from silly to ethereal to utterly holy, transforming a trifle into a genuinely affecting movie.

Like *'Nashville,'* *'Prairie Home Companion'* culminates in a jamboozie. This one moves Tommy Lee Jones's character to observe that it makes him feel like an anthropologist who's discovered a lost tribe. He's not wrong. Before our eyes, it seems like a form of entertainment is dying right along with the people who make it.

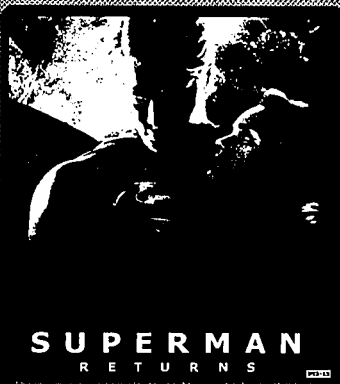

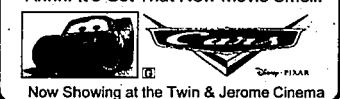

So broke even the capable stars can't fix it. The movie is being sold as a cute-romantic-comedy starring a few they-or-aren't-they hot couple Jennifer Aniston and Vince Vaughn as a Chicago couple who've broken up. Problem is, neither is willing to leave the condo they share. Reportedly, it was meant to be a darker film, but, as is, the abysmal script sends hell-to-the-planet messages that will leave an audience at first confused, then frankly uncomfortable. Too bad, because this is had some intriguing possibilities. Rated PG-13 (sexual content, some nudity and language). 1 hour, 46 minutes

• "Cars" / C A critic-proof horror, a girlish, neoclassical, sure-fire hit from John Lasseter and the folks at Pixar. Yes, the same geniuses who gave us the "Toy Story" movies, "Monsters, Inc." and "Finding Nemo." In this cute take on an old concept, the story is told (voiced by Owen Wilson) to spend time in a sleepy little town, where he discovers life after the last lane. And gets some more time to spend in the mysterious old Hudson Hornet (Paul Newman). The animation is terrific, but the life lessons are imparted with zero charm or nuance and, at almost two hours, it somehow manages to be both frenetic and leaden. That said, the kids will love it though you may feel like you've been run over. Rated G. 1 hour, 56 minutes.

• "Click" / C Will click best with die-hard Adam Sandler fans. He plays a workaholic architect who's putting his career before his wife. In a fun, whimsical way, Walken offers him a magical remote control so he can better time-manage his life. Sandler makes some bad decisions. So does "Click" trying to give sentimental elements of "It's a Wonderful Life" onto poop jokes. The result is a movie at odds with itself sometimes sweet, sometimes funny, but mostly schizoid. Rated PG-13 (language, crude and sexual humor, and some drug references). 1 hour, 37 minutes.

• "The Da Vinci Code" / B If you're not the best you'll probably love this movie. If not, well, it's hard to say. Ron Howard's very literal adaptation of Dan Brown's best-seller stars Tom Hanks as a Harvard symbologist (he does code) and the title unveiling is caught up in a mystery that could crack two millenniums of... traditional Christian doctrine... wide-open. Less blasphemous

than boring (If you know the book) or confusing (if you don't know the book), the film is, please remember, not a novel, well, gospel truth. Rated PG-13 (disturbing images, violence, some nudity, thematic material, brief drug references and sexual content). 2 hours, 29 minutes.

• "The Devil Wears Prada" / A This shiny comedy is dressed to kill. Killer cast, killer clothes, killer laughs. And you don't have to know the difference between Donna Karan and Donna Summer to delight in its wicked workplace politics. Based on Lauren Weisberger's roman — cleft about life as a lowly and abused assistant to Vogue's famed editor Anna Wintour, the movie casts Anne Hathaway (ever more impressive) as our luckless heroine and Meryl Streep (beyond impressive) as her monster boss at Runway magazine. Crisp as a starched white shirt, clever as the perfect par of Jimmy Choo and as self-confident as a supermodel, the movie is devilish fun. For anyone. Rated PG-13 (some sensuality). 1 hour, 46 minutes.

• "The Fast and the Furious: Tokyo Drift" / C Lucas Black ("Sling Blade," "Friday Night Lights") is a bad-boy American street racer as the third installment of the "Fast" franchise movie series. It's a high-octane car culture is spot-welded to disaffected youth culture in a video-phone version of "Rebel Without a Cause." The adrenaline-charged movie has some flashes of brutally modern elegance. But when their fingers slip from the nitro fuel-injection buttons, and the teens are forced to say a few syllables, big chunks of the movie come to a fire-screching halt. And that stop-and-start action ultimately makes "Tokyo Drift" exhausting to watch. Rated PG-13 (reckless and illegal behavior involving cars, violence, language and sexual content). 1 hour, 44 minutes.

• "Garfield's Tale of Two Kitties" / No rating The big orange fur ball is mistaken for royalty when he follows his owner, Jon, to England. With Breckin Meyer, Jennifer Love Hewitt, Billy Con-

nolly and the voice of Bill Murray. Written by Joel Cohen and Alec Sokolow, based on the comic strip "Garfield," directed by Jim Davis. Created by Tim Hill PG for some off-color elements.

• "An Inconvenient Truth" / B Lights! Camera! Take Action! That's the message of this entertaining, exceedingly well-researched and documentary about global warming. Narrated by a new and improved Al Gore (funny, passionate, adorable), the film uses statistics, charts, photos, graphics, even a cartoon to show us a planet cooking itself to death. Gore, who comes off as your favorite science teacher ever, insists this is a moral issue, not a political one. Rated PG (mild thematic elements). 1 hour, 40 minutes.

• "The Lake House" / C+ The sort of movie you either go with or run from. Based on a true life story, it's a time-trip romance that's part "Ghost," part "Twilight Zone," part "You've Got Mail." Former "Speed" co-stars Sandra Bullock and Keanu Reeves share a lake house outside Chicago and fall in love via notes they leave in their magical mailbox. See, she's living in the house in 2006 and he's there in 2004. Rated PG (some language and a disturbing image). 1 hour, 38 minutes.

• "Nacho Libre" / C The deadpan scribe of director Jared Heston's "Napoleon Dynamite" doesn't quite translate to this south-of-the-border sendup of "Rocky" style sports flicks. Jack Black plays a Mexican monk who decides to be a boxer, a luchador, a masked freestyle wrestler. A lot of toilet humor and praffals ensue. Kids will probably love it, and maybe so will the grown-ups who see the movie without watching. Rated PG (some rough action and crude humor, including dialogue). 1 hour, 31 minutes.

• "Over the Hedge" / B This energetic family-pleaser should make a lot of kids and their adults happy. With winter gone, some woodland chums greet spring, only to find a subdivision in the middle of their former forest. The excellent voice talent includes Bruce Willis, Steve Carell, Wanda Sykes and Garry Shandling. Rated PG (some rude humor and mild comic action). 1 hour, 24 minutes.

• "Pirates of the Caribbean: Dead Man's Chest" / No rating.

Johany Depp, Orlando Bloom and Keira Knightley reunite in a tale chronicling the further maritime adventures of Captain Jack Sparrow. PG-13.

• "Poisoned" / B Water, water everywhere and not a thought to think which is just as it should be. This kinda-sorta remake of the cheery 1972 disaster classic "The Poseidon Adventure" treats water when something's not being heroic (or getting killed). But that's what movies like this are all about: not a special effect, not a complex emotion. Josh Lucas, Keri Russell and Richard Dreyfuss are among those trying to keep their heads above water. Rated PG-13 (intense prolonged sequences of disaster and peril). 1 hour, 39 minutes.

• "A Prairie Home Companion" / A As an invitee as a plate (but better) of results, as an expected as a vice of thurbarb pile and as wistful as a round of "Red River Valley." This comic collaboration between director Bob Altman and radio raconteur Garrison Keillor is the best of its kind, it's the (fictional) final performance of Keillor's beloved radio show a hodgepodge of homespun humor and old-timey music and stars like Meryl Streep, Lily Tomlin, Lindsay Lohan, John C. Reilly and Kevin Kline mingle with the program's regulars, while Virginia Madsen waltzes around in an ethereal, blue dress, as an expected as a farewell (Altman's now 81). It's a lovely one. Rated PG-13 (risqué humor). 1 hour, 45 minutes.

• "Superman Returns" / B+ A high-class picture with high ambitions. Directed by Bryan Singer, who jumped ship from the "X-Men" movies to breathe new life into one of our most iconic superheroes, the film is the sort of satisfying blockbuster Hollywood does best. "Superman Returns" begins five years after Richard Donner's 1978 version (the first one with Christopher Reeve) left off. Nestor Lee-Luthor (Kevin Spacey) plans to become a god, creating a new world born out of a single crystalline shard of the exploded planet Krypton. Nestor Lee of Steel, Brandon Routh assumes the cape with authority and grace. The movie has some things on its mind, most notably the relationship between father and son. But it has fun, too, including several stunning action sequences. Rated PG-13 (some intense action violence). 2 hours, 34 minutes.

## New on DVD Synopses of films recently released for home viewing.

**"The Matador"**

In *"The Matador,"* a delightfully sly diversion, Pierce Brosnan breaks the mold and turns in what might be considered the performance of his career, the kind of witty, relaxed star portrayal that recalls those of Cary Grant and other Golden Era legends.

Setting him up to perfection is Greg Kinnear, every bit as amusing and assured. As if this weren't enough, Hope Davis, one of the most protean young actresses working in films, lends further sparkle and droolery.

*"The Matador"* marks a fine feature debut for Richard Shepard, who exhibits that precious gift of being able to work in the mainstream yet maintain the utmost sophistication in his point of view and in dialogue that crackles with inspired wit and humor.

Imagine that James Bond, the role from which Brosnan has just graduated, has begun to lose his nerve—and started to go to seed. That's a rough description of Brosnan's Julian Noble, who has arrived in Mexico City for reasons not immediately clear. Unshaven and mustached, he's raffish, with a roughneck quality, and given to knocking back quite a few drinks and smoking heavily. Attractively weathered, he knows full well he's still devastatingly handsome, can turn on the charm like a faucet and has a gift of outrageous gab. Indeed, his milenge may actually heighten his appeal.

His frayed-around-the-edges aura also bespeaks an undeniable vulnerability, even desperation and instability, as he determinedly latches on to Kinnear's Danny Wright, a Denver businessman who has a lot riding on a perding deal. They cross paths in a Mexico City hotel bar, and Julian just won't let go of Danny, even though Julian's sudden outbursts of crudeness and insensitivity threaten to drive Danny away. But Julian's persistence and innate charisma prevail with Danny and pretty soon Julian, a

crack marksman, reveals that he is on assignment as, he likes to call himself, a "facilitator of fatalities."

At first Danny is struck with disbelief, then horror. *"The Matador,"* in which a bullet-bitten becomes a metaphor for Julian's profession and his romantic view of it, deftly moves ahead six months. Now Julian is on a job in Budapest in what his controller, Mr. Randy (Phillip Baker Hall) reminds him is a make-or-break situation, since Julian is clearly shaky after 22 years in the racket. A couple of plot developments later, Julian knocks on Danny's front door like one snowy night. The stage is set for one final adventure for the two men.

Shepard is a genuine high-wire artist, and although Julian may be losing his grip, *"The Matador,"* which manages to be stylish without ever seeming slick, never does. It is contemporary in tone but has that combination of sentiment and worldliness of beloved Hollywood classics with their confident effortlessness and throwaway humor — Billy Wilder comes to mind.

**"The Libertine"**

If you are a Johnny Depp fan, you've surely been awaiting word on *"The Libertine,"* starring Depp as John Wilmot, the Second Earl of Rochester, friend-and-adversary of King Charles II,

playwright and deboucher extraordinaire. Well, await no longer but, alas, expect no royal rap-ture. This British movie, which also features John Malkovich as the king and Samantha Morton as a young actress, may be almost all Depp all the time, but in this case, more is less.

As Wilmot, who died apparently of syphilis at age 33 in 1680, Depp is certainly alluring in 17th-century bad-boy regalia — the chiseled face, the gorgeous locks, lacy white sleeves, satiny jackets and thigh-hugging hose. But in this ill-conceived story, Depp's luster is futile despite his signature glints of the eye, sexy puckering and prince-of-darkness swagger.

We are supposed to thrill to the devil-may-care attitude of this Byronic rebel-gent, yet we never find out what he's about or what he stands for.

In *"The Libertine,"* directed by Laurence Dunmore, Rochester's unlikability is meant to signal higher ideas, including a ruthless honesty, a fearless satirizing

of the king in plays and poetry, and a deeply held disdain for his immoral times. But instead, he's just a petty nihilist going to gratuitous insults and preening self-importance.

It doesn't help matters that *"The Libertine"* seems to unload every olde English cliché on file. Look for whores with heaving cleavage and lusty laughter, ale frothing over pewter cups and ribald, post-post-Chaucerian English — as if the characters have been forewarned of a 21st-century English-lit class passing through.

**"Annapolis"**

Neither lagging military recruitment nor movie attendance is likely to be helped by *"Annapolis,"* a by-the-numbers underdog drama set at the storied U.S. Naval Academy in the Maryland part of the title.

James Franco stars as Jake Huard, an Annapolis shipyard worker who raves by day and hoists beers with his laborer buddies at night, but has long harbored a notion that he belongs at the imposing military institution just across the water. Then, to the strains of a clouds-parting music score that practically mounds him, Jake is accepted into the academy, where in his piebe year he encounters unforgiving rules, unwavering

brotherhood, an unsparring superior and an unexciting boxing movie.

Bizarrely, *"Annapolis"* isn't a glimpse inside the workings of an officer farm — which might have made for an anthropologically nifty tale — but instead *"Rocky"* in occasional pressed whites, with Jake's talent in the ring representative of his shot at respect in his company.

The story's dramatic buildup is toward the academy's real-life Brigade Championships, a pugilist smackdown in which Jake hopes to waylay Tyrese Gibson's ex-Marine midshipman Lt. Cole, the film's nominal villain but really just your garden variety boot-camp movie hard case. It's a little hard to get worked up over Cole's meanness when the worst thing he does is follow procedure in getting plebes kicked out over a rule infraction or for failing a physical test, but Gibson goes for bad-guy broke anyway in a performance composed almost entirely of steely glares.

The director is Justin Lin, whose stylish, stereotypic-disssembling breakthrough movie from a few years ago, *"Better Luck Tomorrow,"* — about Asian American high schoolers caught up in very bad things — indicated he might have a future twacking mainstream genre fare. Better luck tomorrow.

# Inside Sushi Tokyo: A tasty surprise

TWIN FALLS — Call it Blue Lakes blindness.

For almost nine months after Sushi Tokyo opened — street-side on Blue Lakes Boulevard North — I failed to consider the former sandwich shop location in Centre Pointe Plaza as an option for an evening retreat.

But this isn't last summer's quick-serve restaurant.

The menu is extensive, the kitchen staff talented, the service gracious and prompt, the atmosphere soothing. Inside Sushi Tokyo, lanterns, woodwork, art, music, screens and sunlight filtered through reed shades are remarkably effective in turning the small strip mall location into a date-worthy oasis.

And the compact layout offers this advantage: a small window

opens to the kitchen, with seats for a handful of sushi fanciers to watch sushi chef Michi Sawada at work. His wife, Yoshiko Sawada, is the face of hospitality at the couple's restaurant.

On our belated first visit, my husband and I bypassed the sushi menu in favor of a dinner special and gyozu, a \$3.95 appetizer. **Please See SUSHI, Page 16**

# Dowwwn is up for rapper Yung Joc

St. Petersburg Times

Since rapper Yung Joc's panic-button-sounding single "It's Goin' Down" hit the radio this summer, everyone from grandmothers to grade-schoolers has been mimicking his pronunciation of "dowwwn."

The single from "New Joc City" hurled the 23-year-old from Georgia to No. 1 on Billboard's R&B/Hip-Hop albums chart.

We caught up with hip-hop's Rookie of the Year to find out what was going dowwwn:

**Q: "It's Goin' Down" has become the song of the summer. Did you think it would be such a success when you were recording it?"**

**Y:** "I knew it felt good. It was catchy. It was the fact that we needed to make a good record for the people to chant to."

**Q: "So what does 'it's goin' down' mean?"**

**Y:** "This interview is going down right now. It's happening. It's what's up, the best thing you can be doing at that moment."

When I get to the city. It's going down."

**Q: "You have a dance called 'Joc-in,' which is sort of a lean, and bob with hand movements like you're riding a motorcycle. How did you come up with that?"**

**Y:** "When I first started performing ('It's Goin' Down'), people thought it was a snap record. People wanted to snap to it. I said, 'I'm going to do something different. I'm going to do what comes from my swagger.' We were on stage and I had my little George Jefferson walk going, and I started doing that on the hook. We started looking back at

the tapes, and we all said, 'We need to do that.'"

**Q: "Where did you get the name Yung Joc?"**

**Y:** My mama. Remember the show "Dallas," with J.R. Ewing? (J.R. Ewing's father was named Jock Ewing.) My mama said she loved his swag. He was very respected, very wealthy, and she said she wanted me to be the same way.

**Q: "A lot of people don't know there's a difference in Southern rap music. There's crunk, which is more Lil' Jon, fight club-type music, and then there's snap, which is more slow and easier to dance to. 'It's Goin' Down' has a**

lot of snap influences. Where did snap start?"

**Y:** "Bankhead (a predominantly black neighborhood on the west side of Atlanta). It got to the point where them cats said they were going to make their own music. They started making their own beats, and they started using snaps instead of snares, and before you knew it, everybody was snapping. I'm not a snap artist; a lot of snap records tell you what to do, like Shake Dat Laffy Taffy. 'But I'm not telling you what to do.'"

**Q: "For most of the album you come off kind of hard core, but then you hit us with 'First Time,' a lovey-dovey, R&B-infused rap song. Has Joc found love?"**

Shaw, who was from Camas County, was the unchallenged king of Idaho fiddlers before his death in 1992. In his memory, several dozen fiddlers are expected to participate in the annual Mannie's Jamboree Sunday in City Park.

The party started as a fiddling jamboree on Shaw's farm at Conard. Eventually, 1,500 folks would show up and camp in the fields around his house. So Shaw moved the party to Shoshone in the 1950s.

Shaw, who could not read music, is best known as founder of the Old-Time Fiddlers of Idaho in 1961. A Wyoming native who came with his family to the Camas Prairie at age 11, he began fiddling for community dances — at one point riding in rodeos and then picking up \$2.50 a night more with his fiddle.

During the Great Depression, Shaw once traded five calves and broke a neighbor's bronc in exchange for a used fiddle.

A flag ceremony follows in the park around 11:15 a.m. Live entertainment commences at 12:15 p.m.

The annual Lion's Club Barbecue, the centerpiece of the celebration, starts at 1 p.m.

The latest album from Chris Carrabba's super-successful emo-rock outfit Dashboard Confessional continues the artist's emotional excursions into the world of young love — with all its heightened yearnings and frequent sorrows.

"Magnificent City" brings together much-respected Southern California rapper Aceyalone and Philadelphia-based beatmaker RJD2. Acey, as he's often called, helped to establish underground West Coast hip-hop as a founding member of the FinSyle Fellowship.

They've worked together on a couple of songs in the past, and the results made this release a highly anticipated one. It lives up to expectations for the most part. Acey has a voice as flexible

as a gold-medal gymnast. He can go smooth and polished for a Loverman rap or hard-edged for a sledge-hammering dismissal.

The two make use of Acey's versatility and create a varied sound over the CD's 14 tracks. It opens with a horn-driven "All for U" followed by the stylized slice of soul "Fire." But that's followed

by "Cornbread, Eddie & Me," a rock-rap number influenced by 1970s movies, and "Moore," which is full of electronic blips and a rhythm that forces Acey to stretch his vocals, sort of a "chopped and screwed" extra lite.

A completely different and highly entertaining number is "Solomon Jones." Acey tells the story over a simple, straightforward folk-blues sound, calling to mind such decades-old underground recordings as Snatch &

the Pootnangs' "The Signifying Monkey."

"Magnificent City" isn't a masterpiece. Some of the beats, while good, can grow repetitive, especially after a few listens. But when it's on point, it lives up to Acey's soaring in "Fire": "I take flight, boasting to higher heights/I'm so light that God blesses everything I write/ Plus I stick to your ribs at night/ I'm like oatmeal, peanut butter, beans and rice."

tizer of six dumplings. Originally a Chinese dish, gyoza has grown popular in Japanese cuisine. The Sawadas use a seasoned filling of chicken, cabbage and green onions (rather than pork, a common meat choice) and cook their gyoza with a combination of pan-frying and steaming (never deep-frying) to produce the requisite crunchily bottoms.

I ordered a \$12.95 dinner special that's particularly popular among Sushi Tokyo customers: Salmon Teriyaki and Tempura, served with miso soup, salad and rice.

The miso soup — a Japanese breakfast staple made from fermented soybean paste and revered as a nutritional wonder food — was garnished in this case with green onions and thin noodles. A fine start to any supper. The small side salad was standard fare except for the

chopped seaweed sprinkled atop the dressing.

The entire plate was pure, artistry.

Salmon fillets in a soft-spoken teriyaki sauce, dusted with sesame seeds, rested on a bed of flour noodles, mushrooms and vegetables. Sushi Tokyo grills its chicken and beef but pan-fries the salmon in soybean oil for flavor's sake; the kitchen will grill the salmon at customers' request.

In fantastically light and airy tempura (cooked, once again, in soybean oil), I discovered shrimp and a surprising variety of vegetables: green pepper, long beans, white onion, zucchini, squash and sweet potato. The Sawadas used to put broccoli in their tempura. Yoshiko said, but found that customers left it on their plates.

For nutrition, the Sawadas add a small mound of shredded

cabbage to the plate, and for a fresh finish, tiny servings of fruit gelatin and watermelon. Never mind the strip mall.

My husband and I are mightily pleased to find our dinner options expanded in so pleasant a fashion.

"Vindicated," is responsible for most of it.

Lead track/first single "Don't Wait" sets the overall tone, with sunny guitar chords evoking the curatorial seashore where Carrabba seeks intimacy. Such poetically expressed passions, proffered in his ever sincere, intensely emotive high-pitched whine, can have an authentic quality; they also trend toward monotony, as the singer's mystical and lyrical ideas seldom stray. "So Long, So

Long," with its seamless vocal assist from Counting Crows' Adam Duritz, wistfully evokes a long-gone small town summer romance — but so does title track, "Dusk and Summer."

Still, Carrabba's fans will fully relate with the hopes and fears of new love manifested in "Bonfires and Invitations" and "Slow Decays," a pull-ridden conversation between a soldier come home and his father.
