Hezbollah: We're ready for open war

Israel says Hezbollah hit warship with unmanned aircraft carrying explosives; rockets blast guerrilla leader's home

BEIRUT, Lebanon — Hezbollah rammed an Israeli warship with an unmanned aircraft rigged with bombs and set it ablaze Friday, Israeli military officials said, after attack jets smashed Lebanon's links to the world one by one and

destroyed the headquarters of the Islamic guerrillas leader. The attack on the warship off Beirut's Mediterranean coast — which left four sailors missing — was the most dramatic incident on a violent day in the conflict that erupted suddenly Wednesday and appeared to be careening out of control despite pleas from

world leaders for restraint on both sides. "You wanted an open war and we are ready for an open war," Hezbollah leader Sheikh Hassan Nasrallah said in a taped statement. He vowed to strike even deeper into Israel with rockets.

Lack of funds sinking anti-drug program in Twin Falls schools

TWIN FALLS — Being a teenager isn't easy, and it's especially difficult for students struggling with substance abuse or emotional problems. That's where Sherri Molina comes in. Molina is the director of Safe and Drug-Free Schools in the Twin Falls School District. She works with students who have problems with drugs, alcohol and tobacco, as well as students who may be battling depression or other emotional problems.

Last year, the program helped 649 students, and there's no reason to believe this year will be any different. But there is a problem: There isn't enough money.

To keep the program's five counselors in the schools, Molina cut her own position down to half-time.

"I have great people working in the schools and we can't afford to lose them," Molina

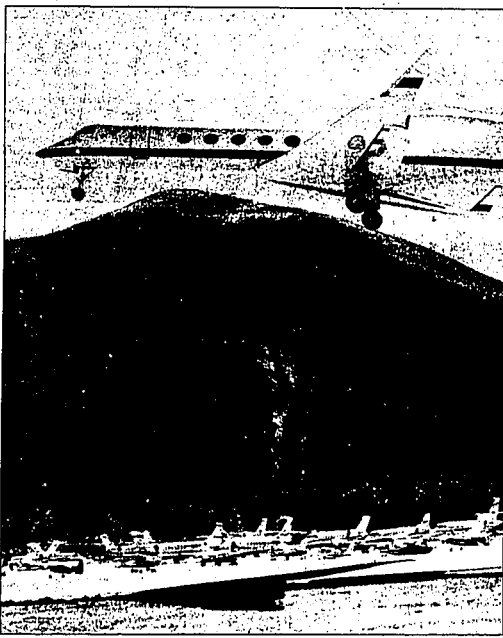

Ketchum, Sun Valley mayors make late bid to keep airport

HAILEY — One group says moving Friedman Memorial Airport is all about safety. The other group says keeping it in Hailey is all about preserving the Wood River Valley economy. Relocating the airport was supposedly a done deal in October, when a committee recommended a site south of Timmerman Hill after spending two years evaluating 16 locations.

But the mayors of Sun Valley and Ketchum have fired off a letter to the Federal Aviation Administration that threatens to derail the process.

The site committee's report "is seriously flawed, significantly incomplete and

could lead to irreparable damage to our economy if used as the basis for airport site selection," Sun Valley Mayor Jon Thorson and Ketchum Mayor Randy Hall state in their letter. "Should fewer travelers visit Sun Valley because of this obstacle, the existing air carriers would reduce service, frequency. Without adequate levels of air services, our tourism-based economy would be devastated, the resort would be crippled, the real estate industry would suffer significant damage and many of the restaurants, shops and service providers would be forced to close their doors."

They sent the letter to FAA Northwest Mountain Region manager J. Wade Bryant in Seattle on June 30, and asked

the FAA to wait 60 to 90 days for a new study funded by "interested public and private stakeholders" to retain an independent consultant to review the draft Study Report.

The Timmerman Hill location has yet to be submitted to the FAA, according to Friedman Memorial Airport Manager Rick Baird.

But Baird said safety, not convenience, is the driving force behind moving the airport.

"Obviously, those two mayors are concerned about convenience and money," he said. "I can't find anywhere in that letter where the word safety is used."

'Bionic eye' plans foiled by FDA panel

WASHINGTON — In the 1970s TV show "The Six Million Dollar Man," the strapping young astronaut got a bionic eye. A U.S. company had hoped that next year that might be your grandmothers. Not so fast, a federal advisory panel said Friday.

A tiny telescope designed to be implanted in the eyes of some elderly patients should not be used, the Food and Drug Administration panel recommended on a 10-3 vote.

The FDA's ophthalmic devices panel recommended against the pen-sized bionic device for safety reasons, spokeswoman Heidi Valetkevitch said.

The first-of-its-kind device is called the Implantable Miniature Telescope. The telescope lens could enable some patients to do away with the special glasses and handheld telescopes they now use to compensate for the loss in central vision caused by age-related macular degeneration, according to VisionCare Ophthalmic Technologies Inc., its manufacturer.

Allen Hill, the chairman and chief executive of the Saratoga, Calif., company, did not immediately return a message seeking comment.

The FDA typically follows the recommendations of its outside panels of experts, but isn't required to do so.

Group wants statewide beer and wine 'users fee'

TWIN FALLS — County commissioners are saying it's time to pay the price of addiction.

The Idaho Association of Counties (IAC) is sponsoring a resolution to create a 5 cent fee for beer and wine. The money would be used for early intervention programs for alcohol and drug addictions, such as the Safe and Drug-Free Schools program used in the Twin Falls School District.

"All the commissioners all over the state know what drug and alcohol addictions are doing to our residents," said Bill Brockman, Twin Falls County commissioner. "But federal grant money is going away, while the number of addictions is increasing."

Brockman said the IAC is arguing with legislators that the proposal would not be a tax, but rather a "user fee" paid for by consumers.

Although beer and wine sales have been taxed a little

more than 1 cent per serving since 1960, the IAC is proposing to increase the tax to 5 cents per serving, with one serving being 12 ounces. County commissioners estimate the fee would generate about \$15 million annually.

"We've all read about inadequate jail space and shortages of space for incarcerating people with these problems," Brockman said. "So we think it would be more effective if we could treat these people, and hopefully do it early."

Safe and Drug-Free Schools has seen its funding decline by almost 50 percent, and it expects more cuts this year.

Commissioners say the fee would only affect those who consume beer and wine. "If you do not consume beer or wine, it costs you nothing," commissioners wrote in the proposal. "There's no impact on the state general fund, no impact on the pocketbook to non-consumers of alcohol and there's a long-term reliable revenue stream for early intervention."

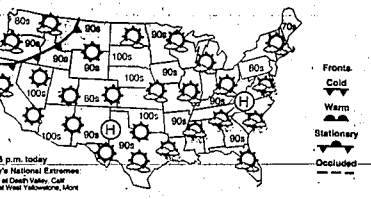

Firefighters make progress against huge wildfires

YUCCA VALLEY, Calif. — Thousands of firefighters worked by aircraft fueled Friday in fierce heat to keep two giant wildfires from gaining a foothold in the heavily populated San Bernardino Mountains where millions of trees killed by drought and bark beetles could provide explosive fuel.

Slow movement of the 53,000-acre Sawtooth fire and wind pushing the nearby 8,300-acre Millard fire away from the mountaintop Big Bear resort region were positive signs, even though heavy smoke filled the sky.

It was unclear if any portions of the blazes had joined in the rugged landscape, but scenarios in which a merger would seriously increase fire activity were believed unlikely, U.S. Forest Service officials said. Some 2,700 firefighters labored in triple-digit heat. Fire officials said it was still important to establish a line to keep flames from moving into the wilderness of dead trees on the slopes leading up to resort communities.

"It's a real critical piece of line, if we can construct it and hold it," California Department of Forestry Capt. James York said. "It's very critical we don't allow it to go up to Big Bear."

Several thousand people live in and around Big Bear Lake, which went through its last big fire in the southern California onslaught of devastating wildfires in 2003.

The Sawtooth blaze, which has destroyed 45 homes and 118 outbuildings since being ignited by lightning a week ago on the Mojave Desert floor below the San Bernardino, was 20 percent contained.

It still was a potential threat to 1,500 homes, 1,500 outbuildings and about 50 commercial buildings, said Kristel Johnson of the U.S. Forest Service.

"It's still just kind of an ongoing battle. There's definitely some progress. It's not moving all that fast," said Don Roberts, a Joshua Tree National Park ranger serving as a fire information officer.

Slightly southwest of the Sawtooth, the Millard fire, also

started by lightning, already was in timber in the San Geronimo Wilderness.

But it was south of Big Bear and winds gusting to 25 mph were pushing it away from that area, said Jim Wilkins, a Forest Service spokesman. However, about 75 scattered homes and a fish hatchery were in its path.

On Thursday, authorities told Big Bear residents that there was little chance the fire would reach their homes. But just in case, sheriff's deputies

warned residents east of Big Bear Lake that they should be ready to evacuate.

Concerns about what would happen if the fires merged focused on the possibility of an ultra-hot fire front that could create its own unpredictable winds. "If they come together, there's a potential for significant fire behavior," said Glenn Barley, a spokesman with the California Department of Forestry. "It can make for strong, erratic winds."

But a merger also could essentially create firebreaks by quickly burning up brush in each fire's path.

"They're going to burn each other out in that area," predicted Tracey Martinez, a San Bernardino County Fire Department spokeswoman.

A chance of thunderstorms over the weekend brought concern that new blazes might erupt in the parched stretches of the Mojave Desert and foothills.

EPA tightens public health standards for dry cleaners

WASHINGTON — The Environmental Protection Agency is tightening public health standards for dry cleaners Friday, saying that cleaning shops in residential buildings must stop using a toxic solvent in their machines by 2020.

Administration officials said the new restrictions on perchloroethylene, or perc, a hazardous air pollutant, would reduce Americans' exposure to a chemical linked to cancer and neurological damage. But environmentalists said the rule did not go far enough since it will take years to phase out machines using the harmful solvent.

Roughly 28,000 dry cleaners across the country, many in

major cities such as New York and Washington, use perc in the wash cycle to clean clothes. Of the total, 1,300 operate in residential buildings.

Several scientific studies have found a connection between dry cleaning employees' exposure to perc, and impaired neurological function as well as a higher cancer risk. One study of two New York couples living above a dry cleaner on the Upper West Side found elevated levels of the chemical in their blood, urine and breast milk as well as vision impairment linked to the exposure.

"This is an important step in our comprehensive strategy to expand and enhance public health protections in the dry cleaning industry," said

William Wehrum, EPA's acting assistant administrator for air and radiation. "The phaseout in residential buildings and improved protections are good for public health and good for the environment."

Judith Schreiber, chief scientist for the New York attorney general's Environmental Protection Bureau, said "there's good news and there's bad news" in the EPA's decision. She welcomed the ban on any new perc operations in residential buildings, but she questioned why the agency was allowing cleaners 14 years to get rid of their old machines and why they were allowing dry cleaners in buildings housing offices and day-care centers to meet a less stringent standard.

"An entire generation of newborns, infants and nursing mothers will be certain to be

exposed to elevated perc levels in their homes," Schreiber said in an interview.

Upper grades, lower reading skills

WASHINGTON — Teaching reading has long been considered the job of primary grade teachers. But some educators are calling for more attention to be paid to the reading needs of middle and high school students, many of whom are struggling to master this critical skill.

The Alliance for Excellent Education, a Washington-based education policy research and advocacy group, estimates that as many as 6 million middle and high school students can't read at acceptable levels. It's an issue for students well above the bottom of the class. A report released in March that looked at the reading skills of college-bound students who took the ACT college entrance exam found that only 51 percent were prepared for college-level reading.

That is what is the most startling and troubling," said Cyndie Schmeiser, ACT's senior vice president of research and development. "The literacy problem affects all groups — not exactly in the same ways, but it's affecting all groups regardless of gender, income or race."

Even in such affluent, high-achieving counties as Montgomery, one in five kids reaches high school reading at the lowest level. When broken down by race, the numbers are even more startling, with 42.1 percent of black students and 47.8 percent of Hispanic students reading at only a basic level when they reach high school.

In Fairfax County, Va., about 15 percent of students who entered high school last year had difficulty reading. But among black students, 32 percent were not reading well, among Hispanic students, 33 percent were struggling.

Timothy Shanahan, president of the International Reading Association and a professor of urban education at the University of Illinois at Chicago, said many school systems stop emphasizing formal reading instruction once children leave primary grades. "It's not like a police vaccine — a couple of shots when you're a little kid and then you're done," he said.

And often, if older kids are having difficulty reading, their middle and high school teachers lack the training to intervene. "It's a lot easier in grade school to talk about learning to read, but if you're talking about it when you get to high school, then you're acknowledging that we've somehow slipped

up," said Bob Wise, president of the Alliance for Excellent Education and a former governor of West Virginia.

Shanahan and others said the key to helping older students is less about the mechanics of reading — phonics and such — than about the nuances of reading that is, teaching students how to understand and explain what they read.

Wise and others said that unless more is done, school systems will be forced to spend

millions on remediation programs. And efforts to close the achievement gap between black and Hispanic students and their white and Asian counterparts could be stymied.

"The focus of state and federal efforts has been on the early grades, and it needs to start there," Wise said. "K-3 is necessary for building a strong foundation, but I wouldn't be much of a carpenter if I built a foundation but not the rest of the house."

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Reports of two serial killers roaming dark Phoenix streets terrify residents

PHOENIX — People aren't going out alone at night anymore. Co-workers are walking to their cars in pairs in the evenings. Parents aren't letting their children out of their sight. Fear and paranoia have gripped this sprawling city amid reports that not one, but

two serial killers have been striking separately in recent months, killing as many as 11 people at random on the dark, deserted streets.

"I'm terrified," said 25-year-old Valerie Alvarez, who lives alone with her 6-month-old daughter in the central Phoenix area where many of the killings have occurred. "It's scary. If something happens, I have to defend me and my daughter."

The killings and woundings of at least 16 other people evoked the terror of the 2002 Washington-area sniper shootings because of the randomness of the crimes and the fact the victims were struck down while going about their daily routines. People have been shot from behind while biking one victim was vacuuming her car at a carwash another was waiting for a bus.

Six of the killings are being attributed to the "Baseline Killer," whose name refers to the street where he is believed to have committed his first crimes. Police say the man likely wears a disguise — a wig of dreadlocks topped by a fisherman's hat — and strikes just after sunset. Five of his victims have been women. Police have not said how all his victims were killed but several were shot.

The second suspected predator, dubbed the "Serial Shooter," has been definitively linked to the Dec. 23 wounding of one man and authorities believe he could be responsible for a total of five shooting deaths. Police say the shooter likely victims were — mostly young men and women — who were struck from behind when no one is looking. The shootings usually occur late at night or in the early morning. Sixteen Serial Shooter victims have survived.

The number of crimes stand out, even in what is one of the nation's most violent cities for its size. Police statistics show a homicide occurred in Phoenix, which has about 1.5 million residents, every 38 hours on average in 2005.

Police have created two task forces made up of a total of 120 officers to investigate the crimes and officials have collected \$100,000 as a reward for information leading to the arrest of either suspect.

"We know we're always in a race against the clock," said police spokesman Sgt. Andy Barnes. "We don't want there to be another victim."

The latest killing was at about 9:30 p.m. on June 29, when 37-year-old Carmen Miranda is believed to have been attacked by the Baseline Killer as she was in her car at a carwash. Detective Dave Barnes said a surveillance video shows what he called a "hiltz attack."

"It appears very calculated," Barnes said. "It takes place in a matter of seconds."

Another Baseline Killer victim, Liliana Sanchez-Cabrera, 20, was shot to death with 23-

JEERS to the federal government for playing bureaucratic games with drugs intended to counteract a possible pandemic. Officials of the Idaho Department and Health and Welfare are holding off "ordering additional" stockpiles of antiviral

influenza medicines until they know whether the feds will allow Idaho's share of existing stocks to be stored here.

You know, where they might be needed.

As part of preparations for a potential pandemic, the federal government is stockpiling Tamiflu and other drugs designed to reduce the symptoms associated with influenza.

The Bush administration plans to buy enough antivirals to treat 4 million people, and Idaho has been promised more than 203,000 courses of the drugs. States can buy more if they want, with the feds paying one-fourth of the cost. They could then use the subsidy to buy antivirals for an additional 31 million people.

With more than 1.3 million Idahoans, 203,000 courses of antivirals would

only be enough for an initial response to any outbreak. Idaho has the option of buying more, but each additional course would cost \$14.43, for a cost of more than \$2 million if the state were to order the maximum allotment.

None of which will mean a thing if the flu arrives when the antivirals are somewhere else.

Funny thing about subsidized medicines: They won't do you a bit of good unless you take them.

CHEERS to the Idaho Legislature for belatedly stanching the brain drain from the state's classrooms.

The Idaho Department of Education reported this week that Idaho is losing teachers at a markedly slower rate than in the past. Last year, the number of teacher vacancies in Idaho

increased one-tenth of a percent. Between 2004 and 2005, the figure was 28 percent.

Credit the Legislature for increasing the base pay of Idaho teachers by 3 percent, and the state's institutions of higher education for doing a better job training more teachers. The Department of Education's report showed that the number of applicants for teaching positions in the state are increasing.

But Idaho is still hemorrhaging teachers in special education, math, English and music, so there's much left to do.

For 30 years, our state has done a fine job of supplying teachers to better-paying states such as Nevada, Wyoming and Oregon. Won't it be great if we could do as well by Idaho?

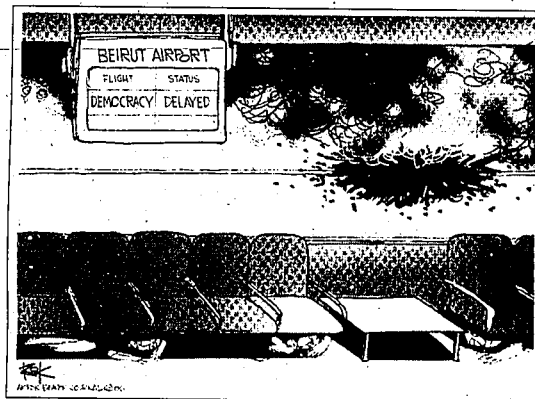

ISRAEL STRIKES LEBANON

Bush refuses to press Israel for cease-fire, allies criticize attacks

ST. PETERSBURG, Russia — President Bush refused to press Israel for a cease-fire in Mideast violence Friday, risking a wider breach with world leaders at a weekend summit already confronting crises with Iraq and North Korea.

Flying here from Germany, Bush called the leaders of Lebanon, Egypt and Jordan to explore ways to end three days of furious fighting between Israel and Hezbollah militants in Lebanon. Turning aside complaints that Israel is using excessive force, Bush rejected a cease-fire plea from Lebanese Prime Minister Fuad Saniyeh.

"The president is not going to make military decisions for Israel," White House press secretary Tony Snow said. He said it was unlikely that either side would agree to a cease-fire now.

"The eruption of Mideast violence moved prominently onto the agenda of the summit beginning Saturday.

In contrast with Bush's stand, Russian President Vladimir Putin said, "No

hostage-takings are acceptable ... but neither is the use of full-scale force in response to these, even if unlawful, actions. We will demand that all sides involved in the conflict immediately stop the bloodshed."

The summit is expected to issue a United States declaration, and the United States tried to use it to be critical of Hezbollah and supportive of Lebanon's fragile government.

French President Jacques Chirac accused Israel of going too far. "One could ask if today there is not a sort of will to destroy Lebanon, its equipment, its roads, its communications," said Chirac, who has tried to patch relations with the U.S. after disagreements over the Iraq war.

Before traveling here from Rome, Italian Premier Romano Prodi said the spiral of violence was making a return to dialogue difficult. "We have regressed 20 years. If we go on like this, all efforts made in the past years will have been in vain," he said.

Bush met with Putin ahead of Saturday's opening of the annual summit of eight leading industrial powers. Despite

political strains, the two leaders shook hands and hugged. "Solid friendship," Bush said of Putin as they and their wives went to dinner in a villa on the grounds of the opulent 18th century Konstantin Palace. The two leaders also will hold a news conference on Saturday.

Bush's firm support of Israel caused friction with allies as he seeks consensus against Iran and North Korea for their suspected nuclear weapons programs. The European Union has criticized Israel for using "disproportionate" force. From Russia to Spain, leaders voiced concern at the escalation of the conflict.

In Washington, Sen. John Warner, the Armed Services Committee chairman, urged the administration to be mindful of how Israel's response will affect the broader Mideast region.

While Israel was "the victim of provocative attacks," Warner urged the administration to "think through carefully how Israel's extraordinary reaction could affect our operations in Iraq and our joint diplomatic efforts to resolve the Iranian nuclear issue."

Mideast turmoil sends oil prices past \$78 a barrel

WASHINGTON (AP) — The price of oil briefly surpassed \$78 a barrel Friday and finished 4 percent higher for the week after Israeli attacks against militants in Lebanon sparked fears of a wider Middle East conflict and possible oil-supply disruption.

The run-up in oil raised concerns about inflation and the economy at large, sending stock prices tumbling. OPEC tried to reassure the market by stressing its commitment to "order and stability," but at the same time said it "has no influence" over the geopolitical turmoil underlying today's volatility.

Because oil accounts for more than 50 percent of the cost of gasoline, U.S. pump prices, now averaging \$2.95 a gallon nationwide, are likely to climb some more, analysts said.

On Friday, light sweet crude for August delivery on the New York Mercantile Exchange soared as high as a record \$78.40 a barrel in electronic trading before settling at a record \$77.03, an increase of 33 cents from Thursday's

record close. Gasoline futures rose by 2.36 cents to settle at \$2.3249 a gallon — the highest level since late September of last year, when U.S. refinery output was sharply curtailed by hurricane damage.

In London, Brent crude futures gained 58 cents to settle at \$77.27 a barrel on the ICE Futures exchange. "We've reached a level where we've put all the scare premium into the market that we can," said James Cordier, president of Liberty Trading in Tampa, Fla. "At this point, we have to have a disruption to move smartly higher from here."

Cordier said that while fuel demand in the U.S. is still strong, rising energy costs appear to be dampening consumer spending in other areas and that could eventually slow the economy enough to help cool energy prices.

But there won't be any significant decline until at least the end of the summer, and that assumes that the Gulf Coast sustains no serious

hurricane damage this year. Israel widened its offensive on Lebanon on Friday, with fighter bombers blasting the airport for a second day and cutting off the main highway to Syria. Hezbollah has fired more than 100 rockets into Israel. More than 80 people have died, most in Lebanon, in three days of violence sparked by the capture of two Israeli soldiers by Hezbollah militants.

While Israel and Lebanon are not major oil suppliers, the fear is that the conflict could expand in the region, which produces nearly a third of the world's oil and has almost two-thirds of its untapped reserves.

Iran has threatened to use oil as a weapon if the United Nations invokes sanctions in its dispute with Tehran over its nuclear program. While OPEC's No. 2 supplier has not raised the issue of withholding oil from the market in a sign of solidarity with Hezbollah, the possibility — while deemed unlikely — weighs on the market's psychology, analysts said.

Israel again bombarded Lebanon's airport and main roads in the most intensive offensive against the country in 24 years. For the first time it struck the crowded Shiite neighborhood of south Beirut around Hezbollah's headquarters, toppling overpasses and sheering facades off apartment buildings. Concrete from balconies smashed into parked cars, and car alarms set off by the blasts blared for hours.

The toll in three days of clashes rose to 73 killed in Lebanon and at least 12 Israelis, as international alarm grew over the fighting and oil prices rose to above \$78 a barrel. The U.N. Security Council held an emergency session on the violence, and Lebanon accused Israel of launching "a widespread barbaric aggression."

In addition to the fighting in Lebanon, Israel pressed ahead with its offensive in the Gaza Strip against Hamas, striking the Palestinian economy ministry offices early Saturday.

The Israeli warship, which had been carrying several dozen sailors, was towed to Haifa after suffering heavy damage. The fire was put out after several hours. The military confirmed news reports that four sailors were missing and said a search for them was underway.

The Israeli army said the source of the attack was still under investigation. But military officials, speaking on condition of anonymity because of the probe, said the ship had been targeted by an unmanned drone.

The explanation indicated Hezbollah has added a new weapon to the arsenal of rockets and mortars it has used against Israel.

In another maritime strike, Israel said that a Hezbollah rocket barrage missed its target and struck a civilian merchant ship. They did not know the nationality of the ship, or whether there were casualties.

Despite fears the assault could bring down the Western-backed, anti-Syrian government of Lebanon, Israeli Prime Minister Ehud Olmert vowed the campaign would continue until Hezbollah guerrillas, who are backed by Syria and Iran, lose their near-control of southern Lebanon bordering Israel.

Olmert agreed in a phone call with U.N. chief Kofi Annan to allow U.N. mediation for a cease-fire — but only if the terms include the dismantling of Hezbollah and the return of two Israeli soldiers whose capture by the Muslim guerrillas Wednesday triggered the fighting.

Hezbollah rained dozens of rockets on towns in northern Israel. One rocket hit a home in Meron, killing a woman and her grandson. Some 220,000 people in northern towns hunkered down in bomb shelters.

Nasrallah was not hurt after the Israeli missiles demolished his headquarters among two buildings in Beirut's southern neighborhoods, the militant group said. Three people died in the airstrikes.

The attack on the warship was apparently timed to coincide with Nasrallah's message on the militant group's televi-

sion station. "The surprises that I have promised you will start now. Now in the middle of the sea, facing Beirut, the Israeli warship ... look at it burning," Nasrallah boasted.

Israeli military officials said the drone apparently was developed by Hezbollah. The Lebanese guerrilla group has managed to fly unmanned spy drones over northern Israel at least twice in recent years.

"If they kill us all, we will still not give them back the prisoners," said one resident, Nasser Ali Nasser, as palls of smoke rose from fuel depots hit farther south. "We have nothing left to lose except our dignity. We sacrifice ourselves for Sheikh Nasrallah," he said.

President Bush, who has backed Israel's right to defend itself, spoke by phone with Lebanese Prime Minister Fuad Saniyeh from a G-8 summit in Russia and "reiterated his position" that the Israeli attacks should limit any impact on civilians, White House spokesman Tony Snow said.

But the promise fell short of the Lebanese leader's request for pressure for a cease-fire. Israel's campaign appeared to have a two-pronged goal. One was to batter Hezbollah and end its near control of the south on Israel's borders.

"We know it's going to be a long and continuous campaign and operation, but it's very clear. We need to put Hezbollah out of business," Brig. Gen. Ido Nehushtan told The Associated Press.

Israel's army chief, Lt. Gen. Dan Halutz, said Hezbollah has rockets that can reach as far as 43.5 miles or more,

which would bring more Israeli cities, such as Hadera, within range.

The other goal was to seal off Lebanon by repeatedly striking its airport and main roads — including the coastal highway from north to south and the Beirut-Damascus highway, Lebanon's main land link to the outside world. At the same time, Israel was gradually escalating the damage to the country's infrastructure, painstakingly rebuilding the pipeline that was cut in 1990.

Israel holds Lebanon responsible for the capture of its two soldiers in a surprise Hezbollah raid; the Lebanese

government insists it had nothing to do with the attack. However, Israel wants it to rein in the guerrillas, a move Lebanon has long resisted.

The level of damage inflicted by Israel appeared finely calibrated. For example, a missile punched a hole in a major suspension bridge on the Beirut-Damascus road but did not destroy it, unlike less expensive bridges on the road that were brought down. An Israeli strike hit fuel depots at one of Beirut's two power stations — sending massive fireballs and smoke into the sky — but avoided the station itself.

Throughout the morning, Israeli fighter-bombers pounded runways at Beirut's airport for a second day, apparently trying to ensure its closure after the Lebanese national carrier, Middle East Airlines, managed to evacuate its last five planes to Jordan. One bomb hit close to the terminal building.

Civilian casualties were mounting faster than during Israel's last major offensive in Lebanon, in 1996, as assault also sparked by Hezbollah attacks. In that campaign, 105 people were killed over 17 days, including 100 in the shelling of a U.N. base.

India to Pakistan: Rein in terrorists before peace process gets derailed

BOMBAY, India — The bombers who targeted Bombay's rail system had support from inside Pakistan, India's prime minister said Friday, warning that the nuclear-armed rivals' peace process could be derailed unless Islamabad reins in terrorists.

Prime Minister Manmohan Singh's unusually blunt comments appeared to signal a major shift in relations between India and Pakistan, whose ties had warmed over the past two years.

Also Friday, investigators named a third suspect in the carefully coordinated bombings that shattered first-class commuter rail cars Tuesday, killing more than 200 people.

"We will leave no stone unturned — I reiterate, no

stone unturned — in ensuring that terrorist elements in India are neutralized and smashed," Singh told reporters in Bombay. "These acts of terrorism are desperate acts of desperate individuals."

Singh, who met bombing victims and officials, noted that Pakistan had assured India two years ago its territory "would not be used to promote, encourage, aid and abet terrorism."

"That assurance has to be fulfilled before the peace process and other processes progress," he said.

Pakistan quickly denied Singh's accusations, with Foreign Ministry spokeswoman Tasnim Adam calling them "unsubstantiated."

However, Singh said investigators are certain that terror cells operating in India "are instigated, inspired and supported by elements across the

border, without which they cannot act with such devastating effect."

"They clearly want to destroy our growing economic strength," Singh said.

After coming to the brink of war in 2002, India and Pakistan began a peace process that has brought them closer, yet concrete agreement on the most pressing issue — the Himalayan region of Kashmir — has been minimal.

Scheduled talks July 20 between the foreign secretaries of the two countries appeared increasingly unlikely, with local news reports saying they had been canceled. Navtej Sarna, the Indian Foreign Ministry spokesman, said only that no announcement had been made.

G8 demonstrators tucked into hard-to-reach stadium

ST. PETERSBURG, Russia (AP) — Protesters demonstrating against this weekend's Group of Eight summit are barely visible, but not by choice. Authorities have limited their activities to a stadium in a hard-to-reach part of the city.

"At this stadium it's like we are in the zoo, fenced in with these bars," said Ivan Lokh, one of about 400 people who came Friday to the Russian Social Forum, the formal name of the protest gathering.

"The authorities want to show there's no opposition in the country."

The gathering indeed gives an image of activists appearing inconsequential amid the vast bowl of a 60,000-seat stadium. But organizers said authorities were taking steps harsher than just image control. More than 200 people were detained en route to the "counter-summit" or removed from planes and trains, and countless others harassed and

intimidated by police, organizers said. Some have been sentenced to short jail terms on trumped-up charges, they said.

The German Foreign Ministry said two German university students who came to report on the protests had been sentenced to 10 days in jail.

"It is the first time in recent Russian history that we have seen such a massive, coordinated nation campaign of pressure against activists," said Stanislav Margelov, a lawyer working with the loose alliance of groups that organized the gathering.

The claims of repression underline Western concerns about Russia's democratic intentions under President Vladimir Putin, and G-8 leaders are expected to raise the issue at the summit, which runs Saturday-Monday. Russian authorities denied unfair treatment of the protesters.

First lady visits Russian orphans

ST. PETERSBURG, Russia (AP) — Laura Bush danced and played with HIV-infected orphans on Friday and said it is her wish to see a generation of children free of AIDS.

Mrs. Bush visited the orphanage on the outskirts of the city after arriving with President Bush for the Group of Eight summit. She held the children's hands and joined them in the "chicken dance."

"The American first lady told doctors at the Federal Pediatrics AIDS Center that she "wished to find out what we can do to stop the transmission of AIDS to have a whole generation HIV-free as well as be able to treat children so they can live a normal life."

"We also need to reduce the

stigma associated with HIV," she said.

Many Russian parents abandon children with HIV because of social and economic pressure. The orphanage is home to about 40 children ranging in age from 1 to 8.

During the visit, Mrs. Bush danced with the children, putting her hands to her armpits and flapping her "wings," then shaking her hips from side to side as she crouched down.

Russia has one of the fastest-growing rates of HIV infection. The U.N. AIDS agency puts the number of infected people at nearly 900,000 while others say it could be above 1 million — around 1 percent of the population.

Red, white and bruised America's teams struggling across the board

On the Fourth of July, a 160-pound Japanese man overcame an American nearly 75 pounds heavier in a hot dog eating contest.

Silly? Sure. Symbolic, too. Whipped at Wimbledon, whipped in the World Cup, beaten in baseball, Americans can't seem to win much these days — whether it's on the pitch, the court, the diamond or a ridiculous eating contest. Coming soon: The World Basketball Championships, where the U.S. team is in rebuilding mode after an embarrassing bronze-medal performance at the Athens Olympics. And the Ryder Cup, where the Americans lost badly on their home turf two years ago and will probably be even bigger underdogs in Ireland in September.

What to make of all this underachieving from the world's only superpower, the country that invented half the sports it gets beaten in and that used to strike fear in the hearts of overmatched opponents from South America to Siberia?

"It is our next great challenge and it should alarm us, because we have to intensify our efforts to support our athletes," said Jim Scherr, head of the U.S. Olympic Committee.

In two years, at the Beijing Olympics, all these sports will come under one umbrella and the buck will stop with Scherr. Really, though, the problems are unique from sport to sport.

—In soccer, the United States has rarely been competitive on the international stage. The Americans went 0-2-1 at the World Cup, and on Friday, the U.S. Soccer Federation announced it would not renew the contract of coach Bruce Arena.

"Eight years is a long period," federation president Sunil Gulati said. "I'm not saying we need to change direction, the direction Bruce set is very positive. But having a fresh approach, after eight years,"

CSI volleyball heads toward season with eye on a ninth national crown

TWIN FALLS — Friday afternoon, the College of Southern Idaho gymnasium was set up for volleyball.

It was, however, empty. Empty, except for the sounds of the game — the squeak of sneakers on hardwood, the slip of skin on leather, the boom of the ball hitting the floor. Only steps away from the court the Golden Eagles called home during their 50-2 whirlwind to the 2005 NJCAA Division I National Championship, CSI head coach Ben Stroud watched, arms crossed, Styrofoam cup half-filled with water, as campers at the 2006 CSI volleyball team camp roared through elimination games.

As Stroud and his Golden Eagles prepare for their eighth title defense, this much is sure — while the Styrofoam was half-full, this year's cup of CSI volleyball talent is literally overflowing.

"I think great," Stroud said of his team's chances at

earning a record ninth NJCAA title. "You know, if the foreign kids are as good as I think they are, we're going to be tough. Because the kids around them are so good. I mean, we've probably got five All-Americans. All the pieces are there. It just depends on how bad they want it. If they want to win it, I don't see why they can't."

That brass confidence comes with being one of the most decorated coaches in collegiate volleyball, and with the return of three key players from last year's title run. Chief among them is returning NJCAA First Team All-American outside hitter Aneli Cubi-Otineru. She of the booming spikes and hard-sinking jump-serve returns for her sophomore season in better shape and with an increasing comfort level as one of this team's leaders.

"She can just about run practice by herself right now," Stroud said. "She looks pretty good. She's lost some weight and she'll be awesome."

All-SWAC Second Team member Christine Manuel will likely reprise her role opposite Cubi-Otineru this year and look to provide the same consistent play

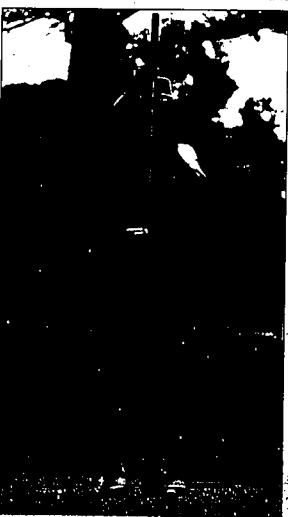

Heat exhaustion forces Wie's early withdrawal from John Deere Classic

SILVIS, Ill. — This had to be the most painful cut for Michelle Wie.

Trying to become the first woman in 61 years to make a PGA Tour cut, the 16-year-old instead was hospitalized with heat exhaustion for several hours Friday after withdrawing from the John Deere Classic with nine holes left. She was visibly sick for much of the round, struggling to keep herself from getting sick on the course on a hot, steamy afternoon.

After being treated at the course medical trailer, she was taken to a hospital in an ambulance, an IV in one arm.

"She suffered a number of different symptoms, including stomach pains, nausea, dizziness and breathing problems which worsened as the round continued," Wie's agent, Ross Berlin, said in a statement. "Michelle was diagnosed with heat exhaustion and is now resting and in very good spirits."

Wie was released about 8 p.m. and was resting comfortably according to a statement from her publicist. She'll now have a week off before a two-week trip to Europe for the Evian Masters in France and the Women's British Open.

Wie nearly got sick on the ninth tee, and walked much of the hole holding her chest. She managed to finish, but after talking with her parents said she couldn't play anymore. She was then taken to the course medical trailer.

Illinois law required she be taken to a hospital for further attention, and she left in an ambulance about a half-hour later. Her mother, Bo, accompanied the

teenager in the ambulance and her father, B.J., followed behind in an SUV.

"She's fine. She's getting better," B.J. Wie said when he came out of the course medical trailer.

This was Wie's fifth attempt at becoming the first woman since Babe Zaharias in 1945 to make a PGA Tour cut. But her chances at history were all but over after she

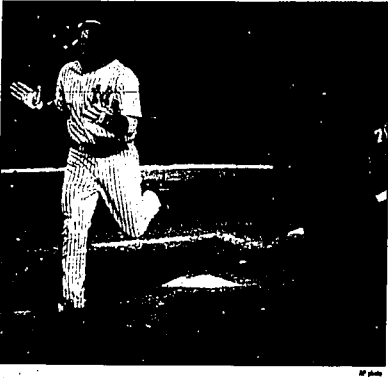
Yankees end Contreras' winning streak

Discovery finds winning ways without Lance

CARCASSONNE, France (AP) — If Lance Armstrong drops in on the Tour de France as expected next week, he'll have something to celebrate.

His Discovery Channel squad, struggling at its first Tour without the seven-time champion, had its first stage winner on Friday, in young Ukrainian Yaroslav Popovych. U.S. rider Floyd Landis kept the overall lead.

The now-named Armstrong, a part owner of the Discovery squad, is expected at the race Tuesday or Wednesday, said team spokesman E.J. Rubiec. Given the struggles they've faced, his ex-teammates could probably do with his advice and help.

Discovery came to the Tour with several riders touted as possible contenders to pick up where Armstrong left off. Geoff Hincaup, who rode with the Texan on all seven of his wins, got the opening short time trial and by placing second in the opening team time trial and by taking the overall race lead.

"It was all downhill from there. Discovery flunked the first big test of the Tour, failing to place any riders in the top 15 in the first long time trial last weekend. And hopes of a rebound seemed all but dashed when Hincaup and other Discovery riders melted on the hardest day in the Pyrenees on Thursday."

What a difference a day makes. Popovych's stylish win Friday — he rode alone to the finish in the medieval walled city of Carcassonne — could not have come at a better time, especially since Discovery had just lost two riders who dropped out of the Tour with injuries earlier in the race.

"Emergency! We were just desperate," said Discovery's 40-year-old veteran Russian rider, Vlastislav Ekimov.

Since 1968 the Tour has been won by the Pyrenees. The sun was scorching, the terrain still tricky, with one moderately hard climb early on and other hills after that. Several groups of riders, looking to triumph on the French national holiday of Bastille Day, tried to ride off ahead of the main pack of riders, only to be reeled back in.

But Popovych, only 23, emerged from rival teams succeeded where the others failed. As Carcassonne approached, with their lead on the main pack at more than four minutes, it became clear that one of them would be emerge as the winner.

Popovych made certain it would be him by shaking off his fellow riders with repeated bursts of speed on the city's outskirts. He sped over the last mile and a quarter alone and, as he crossed the line, repeatedly made the sign of the cross on his chest.

"This morning, coming out of the bus, Johan told me, 'Right, you need to go and win a stage.' Now that's done," Popovych said. "We're going to use our imagination to do some beautiful things in the stages that are left."

The 26-year-old had started the day in 23rd place, 9 minutes behind Landis. He moved up to 10th place.

T.O. claims to tell all in new book

IRVING, Texas (AP) — Terrell Owens says plenty in his new book. Except for one word he now claims he didn't say. "But making a big deal of an apparent misquotation — despite the controversy being written in the first person — is the kind of media nitpicking Owens would lament in his 242-page book that mostly offers his side of two tumultuous seasons with the Philadelphia Eagles.

In "T.O.," which debuted last week, Owens likens former teammate Donovan McNabb to a bully who spat in his mouth as a teenager while he innocently slept on a school bus.

The new Dallas Cowboys receiver also depicts pages to his perceived vilification in the press and described his quick comeback from a leg fracture in 2004 as "if you'll forgive me for saying so... nothing short of heroic."

But forgive him or not, Owens said Thursday during a book signing near the Cowboys' headquarters that it was "T.O." co-author Jason Rosenhaus who invented that particular phrasing.

Rosenhaus is the younger brother of Owens' agent, Drew, who Owens credits

in "T.O." for the three-year, \$25 million contract he got with the Cowboys in March. Jason often works with his brother on contracts.

"Herbie" was one of the words that Jason used," said Owens, after signing his book for about 400 fans and collectors at a Wal-Mart near the Cowboys' headquarters. "...I can't say that I called it 'herbie.' The discrepancy seems to contradict Owens' assertion of "These are my words, straight from me to you" on the book's second page.

But that bothered Cowboys fans at the Wal-Mart about as much as when Dallas signed the controversial receiver, who once grandstanded on the Cowboys' star logo at Texas Stadium when he was with San Francisco in 2000.

"(The book) really makes him come across more personable," said Christopher Taylor, 29, who read the first three chapters while waiting in line for two hours.

But it's the fourth chapter, titled "Philly's New Favorite Son," where Owens begins rehashing his soured relationship with McNabb. He traces the root of the

friction to when McNabb didn't throw him the ball on a play against Cleveland during his first season with the Eagles.

From there, Owens goes on to write that an unnamed Eagles offensive coach "asked me to be very positive and supportive of Donovan" because McNabb "can get nervous and tight in big games." He later accuses McNabb of cursing at him in a huddle and, by page 56, writes "we were never close again and probably never will be."

Owens also writes at length about his suspension from the Eagles ("I thought it was horrible they were going to deprive me of my livelihood") and closes the book taking comfort in Cowboys owner Jerry Jones allegedly telling him that he also "knew what it was like to be treated like Darth Vader."

First in line for Thursday's book signing was Jason Hicks, 16, a defensive tackle at Duncanville High School who recently finished a book about former Cowboys quarterback Roger Staubach.

"I'll read anything," said Hicks, holding a copy of "T.O.," that has to do with football leadership.

Steelers QB now has new outlook on life

STATELINE, Nev. (AP) — Ben Roethlisberger has a new outlook on life.

He talks to his family more. He appreciates those around him more. He even hugs more. Nearly dying in a motorcycle accident last month certainly has changed everything for the Pittsburgh Steelers quarterback.

"I think the accident was kind of God's way of saying, 'Ben, maybe you need to step back a little bit,'" Roethlisberger said Friday before teeing off at a celebrity golf tournament at Lake Tahoe. "Maybe I was taking things for granted a little bit too much. It's almost like you get a feeling of invincibility."

If he felt that way, it's because of his demeanor on the field. Roethlisberger became the youngest quarterback to win a Super Bowl in February, when the Steelers beat the Seahawks. He spoke to Joe Theismann about the accident this week while they got ready for the golf tournament at the former Redskins quarterback said all players feel invincible on the field.

"But it's almost hard not to take it off the field because people and fans — you know in Pittsburgh it's even worse because they put you on a pedestal," Roethlisberger said. "They elevate you so much to this level and sometimes you forget that you are human and I think that it's really helped me remember that I am."

Roethlisberger had seven hours of facial reconstruction surgery June 12 after ramming his motorcycle into a car that turned in front of him on a Pittsburgh street. He broke his jaw and nose and was thrown over the car onto the pavement. He was cited for riding without a license and not wearing a helmet.

Roethlisberger wasn't exaggerating when he said he was in danger of dying, said Dr. Daniel Pituach, chief of oral maxillofacial surgery at Mercy Hospital, where Roethlisberger was taken after the accident.

Pituach, one of the surgeons

who operated on Roethlisberger, said at a news conference in Pittsburgh on Friday that he has seen patients in similar accidents suffocate after their airways became obstructed by blood from their wounds.

Roethlisberger's injuries — and the plates and screws implanted in his face — won't affect his vision or increase his risk of injury, Pituach said. Surgeons kept scaring on the quarterback's face to a minimum by making incisions through the back of his lips, he added.

Though Roethlisberger has parked his bike for the season, he said the accident hasn't changed his belief that people should make their own decision on whether to wear a helmet on a motorcycle. To that end, Roethlisberger said he doesn't plan on doing public safety announcements "for motorcycle helmets."

"I'm not going to be on billboards with words about helmets and stuff like that," he said.

Rain throws hiccup into Owens Corning America

SYLVANIA, Ohio (AP) — Mi Hyun Kim shot a 5-under 66 for a share of the lead in the suspended second round of the Jimmie Farr Owens Corning Classic.

Reiley Rankin (68) also finished at 8-under 134 before rain forced the suspension of play. Natalie Gulbis was 8 under through nine holes when play was stopped.

Se Il Pak, attempting to reach Mickey Wright's tour record of five victories in one event, and Annie Sokrenstrom were both 4 under through 11 holes.

Nearly all the holes were swamped and some were at least partially underwater at the height of the storm. A rushing river flowed downhill

through the fairway on No. 9. The Highland Meadows course already was waterlogged from 3 inches of rain Wednesday.

Seventy-two players were unable to finish the round.

Ozaki leads at Senior Players Championship

DEARBORN, Mich. — Joe Ozaki made a Champions Tour-record eight straight birdies and was 8 under through 12 holes when the second round of the Senior Players Championship was suspended because of rain.

The 59-year-old Ozaki was 9 under overall and facing an 8-foot birdie putt at No. 13 when play was stopped. Six

players, including Tom Watson and 1998 champion Gil Morgan, were in the clubhouse one stroke back at 8 under.

Ozaki, the younger brother of Japanese star Jumbo Ozaki, birdied Nos. 2-9 at the TPC of Michigan, equating the Champions Tour mark held by Chi Chi Rodriguez, Jim Colbert and Lana Quinley and breaking the tournament record of six consecutive birdies.

Ozaki's 28 on the front nine was one shot off the record for nine holes at a Champions Tour event. Jay Sigel and Seiji Ebihara each shot 27 — Sigel at the 1998 Bell Atlantic Classic and Ebihara in the 2002 Senior

PGA Championship.

Clarke in front at Scottish Open

which is a very long time, is the strongest factor."

Theories bandied about for America's most recent failure started with the most obvious: that soccer is a big-time participant sport for kids, there is no significant audience for the sport in the United States, which in the long term, undermines participation at elite levels.

"They're making progress over time, but until it's as culturally important as it is in other countries, you're not going to have kids playing on every street corner," Schurr said.

Because pickup soccer isn't popular in America, kids who do play are taught in the team context, which some people say could stifle creativity needed to make stars.

"When I see youth soccer, I see too much organization, too many kids standing around in line waiting to shoot," U.S. captain Claudio Reyna said in a recent interview with Sports Illustrated.

—In basketball, the U.S.

team is coming off two embarrassments, a sixth-place finish in the 2002 World Championships and a bronze-medal performance in Athens. Looked upon as selfish players, disorganized (management) and unable to handle it all (coaches), USA Basketball had to rethink the way it does business.

In came Jerry Colangelo as the managing director and Mike Krzyzewski as coach. Their biggest change is that they will no longer go searching for teams from year to year. In place is a 24-man roster made up of players who have committed to the team through the Beijing Olympics.

From those 24, coaches will activate 12 for competitions, but the other players will remain on the roster and with the team. The hope is this system will build some continuity, which was sorely lacking in 2004, and help avoid the mad scrambles that took place when players dropped out because of injury or other reasons.

"Continuity is the key," said Krzyzewski.

"When she stood up, she put her hand to her chest again and headed toward some weeds next to the tee. She stood there for a minute or two, but didn't get sick. Shurman checked on her and walking with her to her ball and asking how she was feeling.

"With the heat and when you don't feel well, she was appropriate for what she was going through," Shurman said.

After putting out on the ninth, Wieg went to talk to her worried-looking parents. After making the decision to withdraw, she said goodbye to her playing partners.

"She just said, 'I'm going to withdraw,' which was good because she was holding us up again," said Gove, who finished at 1-over 143 and missed the cut by three strokes.

Wieg is now 0-for-5 in PGA Tour events. She will get another chance to make histo-

"It's indicating that she failed to yield," Neal said. "It's not in a normal crossing area."

Buschman, of Jerome, is listed

Friday afternoon in serious condition at St. Luke's Magic Valley Regional Medical Center. Her injuries included broken bones and head and facial injuries.

Gram, of Twin Falls, has not returned to work since the accident.

CSI President Jerry Beck said he has not talked to Gram, but was told the driver is "very concerned" about Buschman. Beck spoke with Buschman's parents after the accident.

"They understand she will make a

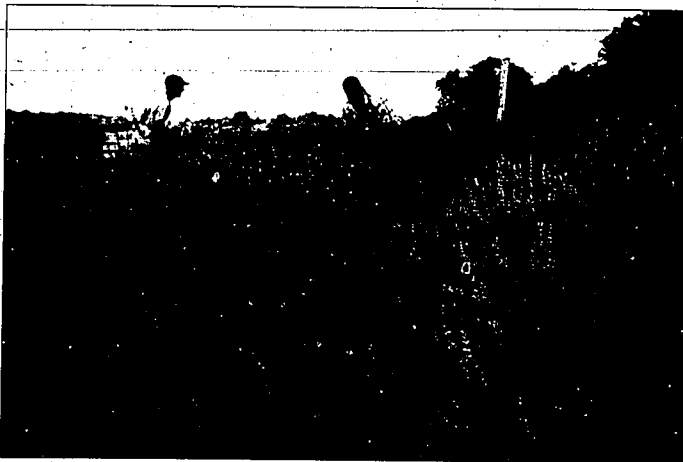
recovery," he said.

It will be demolished for a parking lot for Bower Football Field, which is across-the street.

State details road construction

SHOSHONE — The following is the highway construction update for south-central Idaho through July 21.

U.S. 93 Twin Falls Alternate Route Stage 1: Construction on the U.S. 93 Twin Falls Alternate route project from Washington Street to Blue Lakes Boulevard is under way.

Traffic on Pole Line Road from the Perrine Coulter Bridge to Blue Lakes Boulevard is expected to shift to the eastbound lanes beginning Wednesday. Traffic will be reduced to two lanes, with one lane open in each direction. Motorists are urged to use caution as they travel through the intersections of Filmore Street and Blue Lakes Boulevard due to increased congestion and altered lane configurations.

The traffic shift allows crews to prepare for reconstruction of the westbound section of the Twin Falls Alternate Route. Truck drivers are encouraged to use Blue Lakes Boulevard to Addison Avenue.

This phase of the U.S. 93 Twin Falls Alternate route project is expected to be complete by November.

Interstate 84 seal coat projects: Four sections of Interstate 84 will receive seal coats over the next few months. Seal coats prolong the life of highways and provide better tire traction.

Crews are seal-coating a 25-mile section of I-84 between the Cotton Port of Entry and the Sweetzer Interchange (mileposts 198-254). This section is expected to be complete by Tuesday.

On Thursday, crews will begin working from the Idaho 50

Interchange to the Burley Interchange (mileposts 102-208). This section is expected to be complete by Aug. 3.

I-84 will be reduced from four lanes to two, with one lane open in each direction. Flaggers and pilot cars will direct motorists through the work zone. Delays of 10-15 minutes can be expected. The speed limit will be reduced to 65 mph. Vehicles are limited to a maximum width of 16 feet through seal-coat work zones. Motorists are reminded to drive slowly and keep a safe distance from other vehicles to reduce risk of windshield damage.

U.S. 30 seal coat projects: Two sections of U.S. 30 in Twin Falls County began receiving seal coats on Friday.

The sections are Cedar Draw to Filer (mileposts 204-210); and Rock Creek to east of Twin Falls (mileposts 215-221).

Flaggers and pilot cars will direct motorists through the work zones. Delays of 10-15 minutes can be expected. The speed limit on U.S. 30 will be reduced in some areas, depending on surface conditions. Vehicles are limited to a maximum width of 14 feet through the work zones. Motorists are reminded to drive slowly and keep a safe following distance from other vehicles to reduce risk of windshield damage.

Seal coat projects begin with a layer of asphalt and then a cover coat of gravel. The highway is rolled and traffic allowed to help pack the surface before final brooming removes excess gravel. A light fog-coat of asphalt is applied several days after brooming to help seal the surface. Permanent lines will be added later.

Work on these two sections is expected to be complete by Thursday.

Idaho 75 Basin Creek Bridge: Crews began replacing the Basin Creek Bridge on Idaho 75 (milepost 197), seven miles north of Stanley, on June 19. Traffic is reduced from two lanes to one, controlled by a portable traffic signal. The speed limit is reduced to 35 mph, and delays of up to 10 minutes should be expected. Vehicles are limited to a maximum width of 12 feet in the work zone. Cannon Builders Inc. of Blackfoot is the contractor for this \$1 million project, which is expected to be complete by November.

Idaho 21, Banner Summit to Vader Creek: Rehabilitation work on Idaho 21 (mileposts 105-116) began July 6. Flaggers and pilot cars are directing motorists through the work zone. Lane closures and delays of up to 20 minutes are likely. Work is expected to be complete by September.

H-K Contractors Inc. of Idaho Falls is the contractor. The project will create a smoother ride and extend the life of the roadway.

U.S. 20, guardrail replacements: Crews are replacing guardrails on U.S. 20 from Chimney Creek to Soldier Mountain (mileposts 143-151). Flaggers will direct motorists through the work zone. Delays of up to 15 minutes should be expected. The speed limit is reduced to 55 mph. Work is expected to be complete by Friday.

Motorists are reminded to slow down in highway construction zones.

Reactor used to simulate accidents nears end

IDAHO FALLS — A test nuclear reactor in eastern Idaho that scientists originally intended to put through a meltdown to gather data about that type of catastrophe is being dismantled this year.

The Idaho National Laboratory's Loss of Fluid Test reactor, built in the late 1960s, is a 1/60th scale version of a commercial nuclear power plant.

It is being removed now as part of a seven-year, \$7.9-billion project to clean up material and equipment left over from decades of tests at the 890-square-mile federal nuclear research area. Washington Group International, based in Boise, and CH2M Hill, based in Denver, are doing the cleanup.

The Energy Commission, the predecessor to the U.S. Department of Energy and Nuclear Regulatory Commission, "carefully handled the LOFT to avoid the question of how designed to answer," Paul Leventhal, president emeritus of the Nuclear Control Institute in Washington, D.C., told the Idaho Statesman. "They were never intended to bring it to melt and see what the consequences were."

Instead, in 1977 researchers began using the LOFT reactor to test what would happen if a primary pipe break interrupted the coolant sent to the reactor. At the time, that was considered one of the most likely ways a meltdown of a nuclear plant could occur.

"If you look at the time when LOFT was being planned there were dozens of plants that had been ordered, and we were looking at a continued rapid growth of new design power," Leventhal said. "The data on LOFT was to be the insurance and verification that all future plants of similar design would be safe. But things didn't quite turn out that way."

On March 28, 1979, at the Three Mile Island nuclear power plant near Middletown, Pa., an open valve that interrupted coolant flow caused about half of the reactor's core to melt. The result was a move away from nuclear power in the United States, and no new nuclear power plants have been built in the U.S. in more than 20 years.

Three Mile Island was definitively a body blow to an industry that still hasn't fully recovered," Leventhal said.

With current concerns about energy demands in the United States, nuclear power plants are being reconsidered.

"A lot was learned from the LOFT on how systems worked and didn't work, but it may not be as applicable to new plants," said David Lochbaum, director of the Nuclear Safety Project for the Union of Concerned Scientists.

"We need to do the experiments prior to breaking ground on a new reactor," he said. "It's cheaper and safer to identify problems before the plant is built. That's a lesson I hope we haven't forgotten after all these years."

BOISE — A new facility that uses methane from a garbage dump near Boise to produce energy will net Ada County about \$325,000 a year.

G2 Energy of Atlanta, Ga., has installed two Caterpillar generators at the Hidden Hollow Landfill to turn the gas into 3.2 megawatts of electricity — enough to light 2,400 homes. The electricity will be sold to the Idaho Power Co., the state's biggest utility, and the county will get a share of the profits.

CR Energy and local government officials held a ribbon-cutting ceremony at the site on Thursday.

Previously, methane produced at the landfill was burned off in a flare, sending greenhouse gases into the atmosphere.

The air-quality benefit of removing the methane flare is equivalent to taking 25,000 cars off the road, according to Ada County.

Final testing is being done now. Full operations are slated to start in a couple of weeks, the county said.

Tired of 'zukuing' friends? Moscow gardener has a plan

MOSCOW, Idaho (AP) — A green thumb has grown into a generous spirit for vegetable gardeners in northern Idaho.

"You can't control what a zucchini plant does," said Amy Grey, who began Backyard Harvest to give away the abundance of veggies she and others produce. "It makes you generous whether you want to be or not."

So instead of "zukuing" neighbors with free zucchini, she and other gardeners have started giving away that vegetable and others to groups who supply food to low-income households.

So far, hundreds of pounds of fresh produce have been donated, said Grey, a graphic designer. She said as much as a ton will be given away this year.

"Our clients are really enjoying it," said Connie Granbois, who manages the Community Action Partnership Food Bank in Lewiston. "We've gotten some really nice looking lettuce and cucumbers, potatoes. You name it, we've gotten it."

She said the food bank served more than 1,600 households last month, and that Backyard Harvest is boosting the perishable food program.

She said elderly clients who used to have their own gardens but who are now in apartments living on fixed incomes enjoy the fresh vegetables.

"Produce is expensive to buy, so they really appreciate us giving them fresh produce," Granbois told The Lewiston Tribune. "It goes within a day."

Also receiving vegetables from Backyard Harvest are the Moscow Nazarene Foodbank, the Pullman Foodbank, the Friendly Neighbors Senior Meal Site, and Harvest House. Linda Nichols, director of the Moscow Nazarene Foodbank that serves up to 450

low-income families each month, said the fresh produce is a surprise for her patrons, who use it all.

"In summertime people do donate things from their garden, but it's often zucchini," Nichols said.

Backyard Harvest, though, supplies all types of vegetables. "You never knew what was coming, but it was always well-received, and we can put it to good use," Nichols said. "I don't think we even have it last until the end of the week, usually."

Idaho's new drug czar broke Boise police policy against drinking

BOISE (AP) — Gov. Jim Risch would still have named Jim Tibbs as Idaho drug czar even had he known Tibbs had violated a Boise city policy by driving a patrol car after drinking alcohol, a Risch spokesman said.

Brad Hoaglund also said there are no plans to change the drug czar. Tibbs was named to the post Tuesday. His driving a patrol car after drinking alcohol began to emerge Wednesday and was confirmed by Tibbs on Thursday.

"There's no reconsideration by the governor at all," Hoaglund told The Idaho Statesman.

At the time of the Dec. 18, 2004, incident, Tibbs was serving as Boise's interim police chief before retiring at the end of that year. He was at a Christmas party when he found out about a police shooting in which 16-year-old Mathew Jones died.

A community ombudsman report about that shooting released Wednesday noted that one officer, which it referred to as Officer No. 6, had admitted drinking one glass of wine before he was notified of the shooting and drove to the scene. "I am Officer No. 6," said

Tibbs, a Boise city councilman. "I believe in full disclosure. I believe in being open and honest. I'm not trying to defend it."

Tibbs said he did not tell Risch or his staff about the incident until Wednesday when the ombudsman's report was released and after he had been appointed drug czar. He said he was not intoxicated or impaired when he drove the patrol car.

"Obviously I needed to be there," he said.

It is against police department policy for employees to drive city vehicles — within eight hours of consuming alcohol. The ombudsman's report said Tibbs was aware of the policy.

City Councilwoman Elaine Clegg also went to the shooting scene and said Tibbs did not appear to be intoxicated. "I appreciate the fact that he recognized the need for disclosure," Council President Maryanne Jordan said.

Boise Mayor Dave Bieter, in a statement, said "Such behavior by a public servant is never acceptable, and I would be disturbed to learn of similar conduct by any city employee, no matter what his or her position or job assignment."

4.0 quake shakes southeastern Idaho

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A 4.0 magnitude earthquake shook southeastern Idaho on Friday, the University of Utah Earthquake Center said.

The light quake occurred at 11:06 a.m. MDT, said Walter Arabasz, director of the university's seismograph station. The epicenter was 11 miles west-southwest of Georgetown and 15 miles south of Soda Springs.

People reported feeling the quake in the Idaho towns of Grace, Lava Hot Springs, Downey, Soda Springs, Bancroft and Pocatello, he said.

A magnitude 4.3 earthquake occurred in the same area on June 30.

Since 1962, 30 quakes of magnitude 3.0 or larger have occurred within 15 miles of Friday's quake.

Killeen named Idaho's new prison director

BOISE — Former Ada County Sheriff Vaughn Killeen was named director of the Idaho Department of Correction on Friday, just days after Gov. Jim Risch criticized the previous director over overcrowding that's forcing more inmates to be sent out of state.

Tom Beauclair, director since 2001, resigned. His last day is July 28.

Risch recruited Killeen, 60, who once sued the Department of Correction for not quickly transporting prisoners to state prisons from county facilities.

At a Statehouse news conference, Risch outlined three

goals for Killeen at the 7,000-inmate, 1,350-employee agency: cut overcrowding, improve guard morale and boost inmates' access to drug rehabilitation and anger management classes to speed the release of 600 prisoners who have served their time, but haven't finished required courses.

"I share those priorities," said Killeen, whose appointment was backed by the Board of Correction.

Currently, 500 state inmates are housed in Idaho county jails. Another 450 Idaho inmates are in Minnesota and Texas. Another 100 will be sent elsewhere soon.

At a meeting Tuesday, Risch approved this latest prisoner transfer — but not before criticizing

Beauclair's agency's long-term planning to address an inmate population that's growing by 30 prisoners a month.

On Friday, Risch declined to say if he'd asked Beauclair to quit because of differences over leadership.

Instead, he praised Beauclair's three decades with the department. "I don't want to dwell on the past," Risch said.

In a statement, Beauclair said he's been thinking of retiring.

"I highly support Vaughn Killeen as the director of Idaho Department of Correction," he said.

Killeen, a Republican like Risch, served 20 years as Ada County's elected sheriff.

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Federal team takes over wildfire near Nevada-Utah line

ELY, Nev. (AP) — Beaver Dam State Park reopened Friday evening after federal firefighters took up the battle against the southern Nevada wildfire that had forced the park's closure.

Enough firefighters were on hand to protect the state park, allowing for it to reopen sooner than expected, said Chris Hanefeld, federal Bureau of Land Management spokesman in Ely.

Beaver Dam State Park is in Lincoln County, near the Utah state line.

contained, Hanefeld said. Earlier estimates put the fire at about 1,200 acres.

No injuries were reported, and no structures were threatened as flames burned through grasses, sage, piñon pine and juniper trees, Hanefeld said.

About 150 firefighters were digging in to contain the blaze about 100 miles northeast of Las Vegas, supported by several single-engine air tankers, he said.

The fire was sparked by a lightning strike late Tuesday about five miles southwest of the park.

Kempthorne visits fisheries research center

SEATTLE (AP) — Former Idaho Gov. Dirk Kempthorne visited his longtime Northwest neighbors in his first official trip as U.S. interior secretary, focusing on the U.S. Geological Survey scientists who monitor Mount St. Helens and work to increase understanding of Puget Sound.

A casually dressed Kempthorne had a private tour of the survey's Western Fisheries Research Center here Thursday before taking a short spin on Lake Washington in a research vessel, getting a hands-on look at the tools of the trade.

The secretary checked out an acoustic Doppler current profiler, which is being used to learn how currents work in troubled Hood Canal, a long, narrow waterway west of Seattle where natural and

manmade nutrients are reducing water quality and habitat.

Kempthorne also checked out a device that tracks fish fitted with acoustic tags that emit a ping sound. The tracking is designed to help scientists collect information about fish habitat preferences, such as water depth and water temperature.

Accompanying him on the water were other federal officials and some members of the Puget Sound Partnership, a panel established by Gov. Chris Gregoire to improve the health of Puget Sound and related Western Washington inland waters, including Hood Canal and area watersheds.

"I believe in management walking around, so this is an opportunity for me to come out and see one of the outstanding partnerships,"

Kempthorne said. "I believe strongly in public-private partnerships," he said, adding, "The Puget Sound Partnership is one of those that is a great role model."

The partnership issued an assessment of Puget Sound's problems on Monday, stressing the need for public awareness and participation in recovery efforts. Its recommendations for tackling the problems are due in November.

Kempthorne said he was pleased to have company as he learned more about the role of USGS and its parent, the Interior Department, in the recovery effort.

"The role of science is key," Kempthorne said. "Science can inform federal, state and local decision-makers of the priority steps that can start today or should be undertaken

in the future" to ensure that such Northwest species as orcas and salmon "will continue to thrive."

Of his visit Wednesday to the USGS lab near Mount St. Helens, in southwest Washington, the secretary said, "Twenty years ago, we did not connect the word 'prediction' with volcanoes."

Researchers have learned a great deal since St. Helens' deadly 1980 blast, he said — and USGS "now has an emergency response team that take advanced volcano monitoring gear anywhere in the world."

"It does save lives," he said. Kempthorne also said he will be taking part in a series of "listening sessions" around the country, to gather feedback — on President Bush's interest in "cooperative conservation."

Polygamist's brother gets probation for harboring him

DENVER (AP) — The younger brother of Warren Jeffs was sentenced to three years' probation Friday for harboring his fugitive sibling, saying he knew he was wrong in hampering the search for the polygamist sect leader.

Seth Steed Jeffs of Hildale, Utah, was also fined \$2,500. In a brief statement in court, Jeffs, 33, said he wants to live in Colorado and "get on with my life."

"I knew what I did was wrong as I was doing it, but I didn't realize the severity of what I was doing," he said. "I did all I can to remove myself from this situation ... I never want to find myself in that situation again."

Prosecutor Phil Brimmer asked for a three-month prison term, saying it would serve as a better deterrent. U.S. District Judge Robert Blackburn, however, said he found Jeffs to be cooperative and praised him for trying to remove himself from the sect.

"I must not and will not visit the sins of your fugitive brother on you," Blackburn said.


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
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
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
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
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
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

You could also post a sign on your front door that reads, "No Cell Phone Zone." Others have done it with some success.

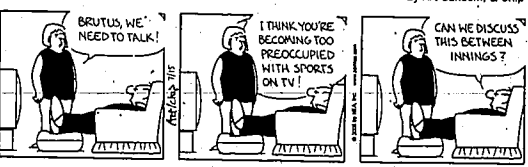

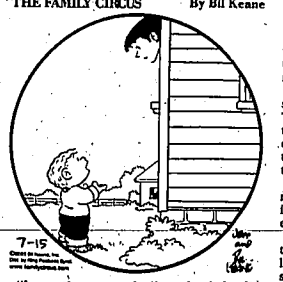

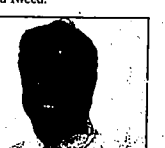

939th Air Wing takes some legend with it when it leaves

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — A KC-135 refueling tanker barreled down the runway and into the skies Friday, starting the phase-out of an Air Force Reserve unit that once helped rescue people from an Oregon mountain and from a trapped Russian submarine.

The gradual demise of the 939th Air Refueling Wing, an air rescue unit until it was reshaped in 2003, is part of the 2005 decision that closed 22 major bases, reconfigured 33 others and affected hundreds of smaller installations to save an estimated \$4.2 billion.

By late summer, all eight planes will be gone.

There are people here, too, said Lt. Col. Aaron Vangelisti, commander of the Air Force Reserve flying squadron at Portland.

"There is a history of over 40 years in this community. Some roots run very deep here. Some are third generation," said Vangelisti, who flies for United Air Lines in his civilian job.

Now, he said, they must consider options that include leaving the community and the Northwest, or leaving the reserves.

"You can't transport it, you can't replicate it," he said. "When you turn off the lights and see jets off station...it's the end of an era."

The tankers, military versions of the Boeing 707, will be moved to bases in California and Oklahoma. The first left Friday.

From relatively obscure Portland, the unit's activities ranged from mountain rescues to support for a Navy team that helped save the crew of a Russian submarine trapped

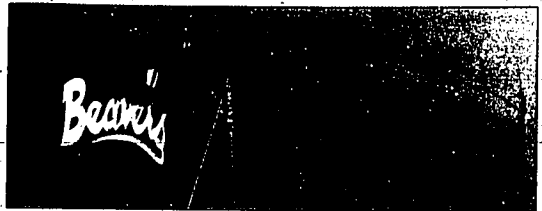
600 feet deep in 2005.

This year it brought back the remains of an American serviceman killed in Vietnam.

From bases in Spain and Turkey the unit supported Operation Enduring Freedom, the American military response to the 9/11 attacks. In

its rescue unit days, it flew more than 100 missions after the 1980 eruption of Mount St. Helens.

The 939th flew support missions in the Balkans and helped rescue an American fighter pilot downed near Belgrade in 1999.

Air Force officer admits to defacing Bush stickers

DENVER — An Air Force officer with hundreds of hours of combat time pleaded guilty Friday to defacing cars with bumper stickers supporting President Bush, and was given a two-year deferred sentence and ordered to pay for the damage he caused.

Lt. Col. Alexis Fecteau, a decorated officer who flew 500 combat hours in the Gulf War, Kosovo, and Bosnia, pleaded guilty to felony mischief and must pay restitution to the owners of the damaged cars to clear his record.

Fecteau, 43, of Colorado Springs, did not speak during the hearing nor comment after it.

Fecteau's lawyer, Patrick Mulligan said his client, a 20-year veteran, has submitted his retirement papers. Negotiations are underway to determine at what rank and with what benefits he will be retired.

Mulligan said he will work with other lawyers to determine how much must be paid in restitution. Fecteau has always expressed a desire to pay for the damage he caused.

Mulligan said the plea agreement "affords Lt. Col. Fecteau the opportunity to get back on track," noting his record will be cleared in two years if he stays out of trouble.

Fecteau originally faced 13 charges for defacing vehicles at the Denver airport from January to July 2005. Fecteau admitted to investigators he had vandalized cars starting around the time of the November 2004 election, but pleaded guilty to a single charge of criminal mischief that named all 13 victims.

Fecteau blacked out pro-Bush bumper stickers and then spray-painted an epithet over them.

After the charges became public, Fecteau was removed as director of operations for reserve forces at the National Security Space Institute at Peterson Air Force Base in Colorado Springs.

"Dinner will be ready in a few minutes," she said briskly as she hurried past him and into the kitchen. He heard a bit of rattling and slamming that seemed to indicate that meal preparation was under way. He was about to tell her that he hoped she wasn't fixing anything too heavy because he was still full from all the food he had consumed at the office during the afternoon, but he thought better of it.

He hadn't been worried. Soon Wanda brushed past him again, this time on her way to their bedroom. "Your dinner is ready," she said before slamming the door shut.

It takes a village

Hailey Christians find common ground with Maasai of Kenya

HAILEY — Seventy out of 1,000 babies born to the Maasai people of southern Kenya don't survive infancy, not surprising, since many Maasai women are married at puberty.

"They're being married off at younger ages so that their families, who are poor, can get the dowry," explained Dot McIntire, a 48-year-old bookkeeper and member of the Life Church in Hailey. "I heard about a mission that a couple had set up to try to help these girls, so I went to take a look for myself."

The result is the Seeds of Hope project, an effort backed by members of the non-denominational congregation to build a solar-powered hot water system for the village, followed by a solar electrical system.

That would greatly improve health care because it would make it possible to keep medications that must be refrigerated, McIntire explained.

It might also connect the village of Oloitokitok — located 120 miles and a six-hour, kidney-busting drive south of the Kenyan capital of Nairobi — with the Internet, opening educational horizons for the young Maasai.

That's especially significant because in contrast to many cultures in Africa, Maasai women are influential, McIntire says — especially in raising children. Given access to resources, there's the potential of greatly improving the education of both boys and girls.

Aside from the Zulu, the Maasai are probably the African culture best known in the West, and for good reason. Nomadic and warlike, they dominated large swaths of the Great Rift when the European colonial powers arrived in force in the 19th century.

"The Maasai are an proud people with many accomplishments," McIntire said. "With access to the right kind of resources, there is a lot they could do for themselves."

The Seeds of Hope project aims to raise between \$50,000 and \$100,000, and McIntire and other members of the Hailey congregation plan to go to Kenya in September. McIntire will stay indefinitely.

"I'm not a doctor, I'm not a missionary," she said. "I'm just looking for a way to help."

About the Maasai

The Maasai, a semi-nomadic people located in Kenya and northern Tanzania, are probably the only of the great hunter-gatherers of East Africa. 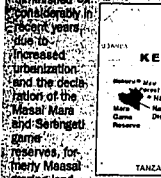

Their herd, consisting of a large circular thornbush fence around a ring of mud-dug houses, holds four to eight families and their herds. The basic institution of social organization is a system of age-sets. Groups of the same age are initiated (circumcised) and adult life during the same open-milition period of the age-sets thus formed is a permanent group, lasting the life of its members. They move up through a hierarchy of grades, each lasting approximately 15 years, including those of junior warriors, senior warriors, and junior elders, until they become senior elders authorized to make decisions for the group. The Maasai are a nomadic people who have been traditionally nomadic herders of cattle and sheep.

ation in the bush, learning tribal customs and developing strength, courage and endurance — traits for which Maasai warriors are noted. The Kenyan and Tanzanian governments are encouraging the Maasai to make permanent agricultural settlements; and to give up the practice of isolating young men, in favor of formal education and greater assimilation.

The Maasai were probably at the height of their power in the mid-19th century, when they suffered when they were the British colonization of Africa and the resultant ecological and political changes. Rinderpest, an

infectious cattle disease, apparently accompanied the British, decimating the herds that supplied the Maasai with milk and blood; famine and then smallpox followed. The weakened Maasai, rather than cooperating with the new rulers, in 1904 and 1912-13 the British government relocated the Maasai population to distant southern Kenya and Tanzania, where they now live.

In Kenya, they inhabit Kajiado and Narok districts in Rift Valley Province, an area of about 16,000 square miles located west of Mount Kenya. Most of the Maasai territory is in northern Tanzania, but the majority of the population lives in Kenya. Their main towns are Kajiado, Namanga (on the Tanzanian border) and Narok. Estimates of the Maasai population in Kenya vary from 350,000 to 463,000; they comprise about 1.5 percent of the country's population. The total Maasai population, including the Tanzanian Maasai, is approaching 600,000.



Lay committee says Presbyterian 'apostasy' cannot be reversed

LENOIR, N.C. — A major organization of lay members says the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) "crossed a critical line" of "denominational" last month by allowing local congregations and regional bodies some leeway to install

openly gay clergy or lay officers who live with same-sex partners.

The Presbyterian Lay Committee's board said in a statement that followed conservatives "are not capable of reversing the denomination's plunge into apostasy" any longer

— so now they must find a way forward.

The long-standing committee, which has a mailing list of 450,000, objected to the actions in June of a national assembly of the 2.3 million-member denomination. A 2005 poll released by

church headquarters shows that 26 percent of Presbyterian members and 44 percent of pastors "definitely" or "probably" favor allowing sexually active gay clergy.

The Presbyterian Lay Committee's statement also denounced the assembly for

failing to reject a paper on worship of the divine Trinity that proposes gender-neutral alternatives to the traditional "Father, Son and Holy Spirit." It said the paper conflicts with the Ten Commandments and the Lord's Prayer as taught by Jesus.

Japan asks U.S. for meat improvement

TOKYO — Japanese customs officials have spotted banned beef products as part of a shipment from the United States, the Agriculture Ministry said Friday.

A box containing U.S. roast beef was spotted Monday as part of a shipment of more than 3,000 boxes containing turkey and ham from the United States, the ministry said.

The incident renewed concerns about the reliability of U.S. export controls as Japan is in the final stages of lifting a ban on U.S. beef imports. Japan halted imports of U.S. beef in January after discovering a shipment with banned parts — only weeks after lifting an earlier ban imposed in 2003 over concerns about possible mad cow disease among U.S. cattle.

Delta consultants seek another \$32 million

ATLANTA — Lawyers and consultants involved in Delta Air Lines Inc.'s bankruptcy case are asking for another \$32.8 million in fees and expenses primarily covering four months of work.

A hearing on the requests by 23 different firms and individuals is scheduled for Aug. 22. If approved, it would bring the total amount of professional compensation allowed so far in the case to \$74.2 million.

That total doesn't include money requested by certain firms that have not yet been paid and money held back from Delta's auditor on a previous pay request.

Atlanta-based Delta, the nation's third-largest carrier, which contracts with SkyWest Airlines for Delta Connection flights to and from Twin Falls, filed for Chapter 11 protection in New York in September 2005. — compiled from wire and staff reports

Stocks plunge amid oil concerns

NEW YORK — Surging oil prices pulled stocks sharply lower for a third straight session Friday, with bland earnings at General Electric Co. and weak consumer data further dampening the economic outlook. The Dow Jones Industrial average shed 396 points in the past three days.

"I don't think you're going to bring out a lot of buyers in the market after a week like this," Jay Suskind, head trader at Ryan Beck & Co., said of escalating

political turmoil in the Middle East, Iran and North Korea. "Uncertainty over the world situation is just too much for the market to have a solid up day."

Crude futures reached an intraday record of \$78.40 a barrel as Israel intensified its attacks on Lebanon, raising concerns about potential supply disruptions throughout the Middle East. Crude eventually settled at \$77.03 a barrel, up 33 cents, on the New York Mercantile Exchange.

Retail sales fell unexpectedly in June, as did consumer confidence for July. Industrial and financial conglomerate

GE's second-quarter earnings matched analyst estimates, but the in-line results troubled investors already concerned that the recent spate of profit warnings was a sign the economy could be headed for a downturn.

The Dow tumbled 106.94, or 0.99 percent, to 10,739.35. The blue-chip index fell more than 121 points Wednesday and lost almost 167 points Thursday, and is just 21 points from turning negative for 2006.

Broader stock indicators also declined. The Standard & Poor's 500 index dropped 6.09, or 0.49 percent, to

1,236.20; the Nasdaq composite index declined 16.76, or 0.82 percent, to 2,037.35, a 14-month low.

Declining issues outnumbered advances by about 2 to 1 on the New York Stock Exchange.

Wall Street has slogged through a gauntlet of mounting uncertainties in recent weeks, with concerns about a potential slowdown in the global economy now exacerbated by increasing political turmoil throughout the world. The commotion sent investors running for cover, giving stocks their worst week this year.

Utilities eye clean-coal technology

DENVER — A Colorado mountainside, the high plains of Wyoming or the Dakota prairie may become the next proving ground for a gee-whiz technology to clean up coal-fired power plants.

Seven utilities, including Xcel Energy, are considering a \$1 billion demonstration plant to prove the technology — called Integrated Gasification Combined Cycle, or IGCC — will work in the West.

An IGCC plant can cost as much as 20 percent more to build than a conventional plant but the technology could make it more efficient to operate and could help companies avoid the hassle and expense of adding pollution-control devices, industry officials say.

"That's one of the reasons why companies that are anticipating the possibility of greenhouse gas regulation are trying to build coal gasification facilities," said Dan Riedinger of the Edison Electric Institute, an association of shareholder-owned electric companies. "They're cleaner off the bat."

With increased demand for electricity and concern about global warming caused by carbon dioxide, there is renewed interest in clean-coal technologies like IGCC and FutureGen, a \$1 billion power plant project designed to essentially eliminate polluting emissions. Multiple states are bidding for the project, which is in the planning stages.

In a conventional power plant, coal is pulverized and burned in a boiler to produce

electricity. Emissions are caught and filtered at the back end of the process.

IGCC technology converts coal to a gas that is burned in a turbine to produce electricity. Pollutants are removed before the fuel is burned, Riedinger said. The technology is being used in plants in Indiana and Florida but has yet to be tested with Western coal at a higher altitude.

Western coal has a higher moisture content and lower heating value, so it takes more coal to produce the same amount of heat as coal mined in the eastern United States, said geologist Nick Jones of the Wyoming State Geological Society.

Besides the technological challenge of having to remove the moisture from Western coal, power plants built at altitudes where the air is thinner tend to be less efficient, said Steve Waddington, executive director of the Wyoming Infrastructure Authority.

Like other technologies aimed at cleaning up coal, IGCC is an "arrow in the quiver to help with global warming issues," said John Neilson of Western Resource Advocates, a Boulder-based environmental law and policy organization.

"When you talk with utilities, there is a recognition at some point we are going to have these regulations and this would be one technology that could help address those greenhouse gas emissions," he said.

Taking technology a step beyond IGCC is the FutureGen project, which converts coal into highly enriched hydrogen gas that burns cleaner than coal.

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

THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Bobby Wolff

(Please note: Only the last two paragraphs pertain to the bidding diagram.)
Today's deal is from the 2002 McConnell Trophy finals. Three no-trump is best, but if in four spades, you would surely prefer to declare it as North to protect your heart queen. Still, the defense could lead three rounds of hearts, and ruff in, as happened against the declarer for the losing team, Disa Eythorsdottir.
On the diamond return, declarer (North) did best, in abstract, to rise with her diamond ace, since she knew she needed the club finesse. But she might not have needed the diamond finesse if clubs behaved or she might have had a minor-suit squeeze.
Declarer therefore took the diamond ace and played the spade king and a spade to the ace. Next, she passed the club jack as West ducked, and then ran the club 10, ruffed by East, who returned a diamond for two down.
In the other room Lynn Deas, of the winning team, played four spades from South, the "wrong" side. The defense led a heart to the jack, then played the king and ace of hearts and another heart. West ruffed the fourth heart with the spade nine, but Deas overruffed in dummy, played the spade king, and guessed to lead a spade to the eight.
Now she drew the last trump, passed the club jack, and advanced the club 10, covered by the queen and king. Deas now knew she needed the diamond finesse, so she cashed the club ace, ruffed a club to hand, and ran the diamond queen: contract made.

ANSWER: A simple raise to two spades is quite enough. This is a constructive sequence, and since your partner's range is 0-9 points, you do not have to drive him in game. Partner should be able to appreciate that with a decent hand and five spades, he has enough to advance.
