BEIRUT, Lebanon — Hez-boliah rummed arr Israeli war-ship with an unmanned air-craft rigged with bombs and set it ablaze Friday, Israeli mil-itary officials said, after attack jets smashed Lebanon's links to the world one by one and

destroyed the headquarters of the Islamic guerrillas leader. The attack on the warship off Belru's Mediterranean coasts—which left four sallors insing — was the most dra-matic incident on a volent day in the conflict that cripted suddenly Wednesday and appeared to be careening out of control despite pleas from

world leaders for restraint on both sides.
"You wanted an open war and we are ready for an open war," Hezbollah leader Sheik Hasan Nasrallah said in a taped statement. He vowed to strike even deeper into Israel with rockets. strike even o with rockets.



HAILEY—One group says moving Friedman Memorial Airport is all about safety. The other group says keeping it in Hailey is all about preserving the Wood River Walley economy. Relocating the airport was supposedly a done deal in October, when a committee recommended a site south of Timmerman Hill after spending two years evaluating 16 locations. But the mayors of Sun Valley and Ketchum have

The site committee's report "is seriously flawed, significantly incomplete and

could lend to irreparable damage to our economy if used as the basis for airport site selection. Sun Valley Mayor Jon Thorson and Kerchum Mayor Randy Hall state in their letter. Should fewer travelers visit Sun Valley because of this obstace, the edsting air carriers would reduce service, frequency. Without adequate levels of air services, our tourism-based economy would be devastated, the real estate industry would suffer significant damage and many of the restaurants, shops and service providers would be forced to close their doors.

They sent the letter to FAA Northwest Mountain Region manager J. Wade Bryant in Seattle on June 30, and eaked

the FAA to walt 60 to 90 days for a new study funded by "interested public and private stakeholders" to retain an independent consultant to review the draft Study Report.

The Timmerman Hill location has yet to be submitted to the FAA, according to Friedman Memorial Airport Manager Rick Baird.

### 'Bionic eye' plans foiled by FDA panel

WASHINGTON — in the 1970s TV show "The Six Million Dollar Man." the strapping young astronaut got a bionic eye. A U.S. company had hoped that next year that might be your grandmother. Not so fax, a federal advisory panel said Friday. A tiny telescope designed to be implanted in the eyes of some elderly paulents should not receive Food and Drug Administration approval, the panel recommended on a 10-3 vote.

The FDAs ophthalmic devices panel recommended against the pea-sized bionic device for safety reasons, spokeswoman Heidi Valetkevitch said.

Inside of the cornea, according to the company. Patients also may experience a higher rate. of loss of cells lining the cornea, which can require removal of the device and a cornea transplant. In clinical trials, 141 of 193 patients implanted with the device showed after a year improved distance and near visual acuty, defined as the sharpness of vision in reading an eye chart, according to FDA sharpness of vision in reading an eye chart, according to FDA documents. Ten patients reported a loss in aculty in either distance or near vision.

Doctors removed eight of the devices, four of them from patients dissatisfied with how they worked, FDA documents show.

Macular degeneration typically affects the elderly. The disorder leads to a weakening or breakdown of the cells in the macula, or the bull's-eye of the retina crucial for the straight-ahead vision needed to read, watch television and recognize faces. Patients with macular degeneration suffer from blind spots and distorted vision.

Ophthalmologists initially worried about the weight of the device, which even at 1/250th of an ounce weighs more than traditional implanted lenses, but experiments didn't suggest that was a problem, said Dr. Lee Duffner, a Hollywood, Fla., ophthalmology spokesman. # Firefighters make progress against huge wildfires

YUCCA VALLEY, Calif.
Thousands of firefighters aided by aircraft worked Friday.

In filter he late to keep two giant wildfires from gaining a footh of the heavily populated San Bernardino Mountains where millions of trees killed by drought and bark beetles could provide explosive fuel.

Slow movement of the 53,000-acre Sawtooth fire and wind pushing the nearby 9,300-acre for whillard fire away from the mountaintop Big Begir resort region were positive signs, even though heavy smoke filled the sky, It was unclear if any portions of the blazes bad joined in the rugged landscape, but scenarios in which a merger would seriously increase fire activity were believed unlikely, U.S. Forest Service officials said.

Some 2,700 firefighters labored in triple-digit heat. Fire officials said It was still important to establish a line to

Fire Officials said it was still important to establish a line to keep flames from moving into the wilderness of dead trees on the slopes leading up to resort communities.

"It's a real critical plees of line, if we can construct it and hold it." California Department of Forestry Capt. James Yazloff said. "It's very critical we don't allow it to go up to Big Bear."

Several thousand people live In and around Big Bear Lake, which went through its last big scare in Southern California's onslaught of devastating wild-fires in 2003.

But educators said that is a drop in the bucket compared with the nearly \$5 billion the federal government has spent to help younger kids read since 2002.



### Bush refuses to press Israel for cease-fire, allies criticize attacks

ST. PETERSBURG, Russia President Bush refused to press Israel for a cease-fire in Mideast violence Friday, risk-ing a wider breach with world leaders at a weekend summit already confronting crises with Iran and North Korea.

Flying here from Germany, ush called the leaders of Bush called the leaders of Lebanon, Egypt and Jordan to explore ways to end three days of futious fighting between Israel and Hezbollah militants in Lebanon. Turning aside complaints that Israel is using excessive force, Bush rejected a cease-fire plea from Lebanses Prime Minister Fund Saniora.

"The president is not going to make military decisions for Israel." White House press secterary Tony Snow said. He said it was unlikely that either side would agree to a cense-fire

now.

The summit is expected to issue a Mideast declaration, and the United States tried to shape it to be critical of Hezbollah and supportive of Hezbollah and supportive of Lebanon's traglle government. Gasoline futures rose by 2.36 cents to settle at \$2.3249 a gallon — the highest level since late September of last year, when U.S. refluery output was sharply curtailed by hurricane damage.

In London, Brent cryde futures gained \$6 cents to settle at \$77.27 a barrel on the ICE Futures exchange.

"We've reached a level

"We've reached a level where we've put all the scare premium into the market that we can," said James Cordler, president of Liberty Trading in Tampa, Fla. "At this point, we have to have a disruption to move smartly higher from here."

Cordier said that while fuel demand\_in\_the\_U.S.\_is strong, rising energy costs appear to be dampening con-sumer spending in other areas and that could eventuslow the economy ough to help cool energy

prices.

But there won't be any significant decline until at least the end of the summer, and that assumes that the Gulf Coast sustains no serious

hurricane damage this year.

It is being removed now as part of a seven-year, 37.9-billion project to clean up material and equipment left over from decades of tests at the 890-square-mile federal nuclear research area. The electricity will be sold to the Idaho Power Co., the state's biggest utility, and the county will get a share of the profits.

GR Energy and local government officials held a ribbon-cutting ceremony at the site on Thursday. Previously, methane produced at the landfill was burned off in a flare, sending greenhouse gases into the atmosphere.

The air-quality benefit of removing the methane flare is equivalent to taking 25,000 cars off the road, according to Ada County.

# **Utilities** eye clean-coal technology

DENVER — A Colorado mountainside, the high plains of Wyoming or the Dakota prairie may become the next proving ground for a gee-whit technology to clean up coalined power plants.
Several utilities, including Xrel Energy, are considering a

Xcel Energy, are considering \$1 billion demonstratio plant to prove the technology
— called Integrated
Gasification Combined Cycle,
or IGCC — will work in the
West.

or ICCC — will work in the West.

An IGCC plant can cost as much as 20 percent more to build than a conventional plant but the technology could make it more efficient to operate and could help comparies avoid the hassle and expense of adding pollution-control devices, industry officials say.

"That's one of the reasons why companies that are anticipating the possibility of greenhouse gas regulation are trying to build coal gasification facilities," said Dan Riedinger of the Edison Recent of shareholder-owned electric companies. "They're cleaner off the bat."

With increased demand for

cleaner off the bat."



THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

"In a word, the world turned upside down."

(Please note: Only the last two paragraphs pertain to the bidding diagram.)
Today's deal is from the 2002
McConnell Trophy finals. Three no-trump is best, but if in four spades, you would surely prefer to declare it as North to protect your heart queen. Still, the defense can lead three rounds of hearts, and ruff in, as happened against the declarer for the losing team, Disa Eythorsdottir.
On the diamond return, declarer (North) did best, in abstract, to rise with her diamond ace, since she knew she needed the club finesse. But she might not have needed the diamond finesse if clubs behaved — or she might have had a minor-suit squeeze.
—Declarer therefore took the diamond ace and played the spade king and a spade to the ace. Next, she passed the club jack as West ducked, and then ran the club 10, ruffed by East, who returned a diamond for two down.

In the other room Lynn Deas, of the winning team, played four spades from South, the "wrong" side. The defense led a heart to the jack, then played the king and ace of hearts and another heart.—West-ruffed-the fourth heart with the spade nine, but Deas over-ruffed in dummy, played the spade king, and guessed to lead'a spade to the eight.

Now she drew the last trump, Passed the club jack, and advanced the club in, covered by the queen and king. Deas now knew she needed the diamond finesse, so she cashed the club ace, ruffed a club to hand, and ran the diamond queen: contract made.


