**West Nile infects 3 in valley**

TWIN FALLS — Three Magic Valley people have been hospitalized with the West Nile virus, the first human cases in the region this year.

One of the three also appears to have the tick-borne Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever.

South Central District Health officials are warning residents to protect against tick and mosquito bites.

Twenty-one human West Nile cases have been reported statewide in 2006. The disease, typically transmitted by mosquito bites, exhibits flu-like symptoms but can cause neurological disease in less than 1 percent of those infected.

"We've had lots of cases in horses and birds over the years," said Tom Machala, director of communicable disease and prevention for the district. "It's pretty prevalent in the area."

The three cases include a Lincoln County woman in her 70s and a Gooding County woman in her 80s. A third patient, a male youth also from Gooding County, has been hospitalized not only with West Nile virus but also Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever, a potentially fatal disease spread by ticks.

Although the district receives reports of the fever every year, the youth's case is the first in Magic Valley in 2006. And the fact that the youth has been diagnosed with both spotted fever and West Nile is very rare, Machala said.

"I've never seen that before," he said.

Machala suggests taking precautions when outdoors. Ticks and mosquitoes are prevalent this year, especially near waterways. Ticks also show up in high grass and brush. And mosquitoes can travel as far as five to 15 miles

**West Nile Virus**

**SYMPTOMS:** fever, headache, muscle aches, nausea, vomiting, eye pain, skin rash and enlarged lymph nodes.

**HOW TO PROTECT YOURSELF:**

- Use insect repellent
- Wear long sleeves and pants or consider staying indoors at dusk and dawn when mosquitoes are most active.
- Have good screens on your home's windows and doors.
- Get rid of mosquito breeding sites by emptying standing water from flower pots, buckets and barrels and children's wading pools. Replace the water in birdbaths weekly.

**Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever**

**SYMPTOMS:** high fever, nausea, vomiting, muscle pain, lack of appetite, rash and severe headache.

**HOW TO PROTECT YOURSELF:**

- Wear light-colored clothing so ticks are more visible.
- Tuck pant legs inside socks so ticks cannot crawl up your legs.
- Apply insect repellents containing DEET to exposed skin or apply permethrin to clothing.
- Carefully check your entire body for ticks after returning from outdoor areas.
- Check pets for ticks.

**away from their homes.**

Health officials recommend using insect repellent when appropriate to guard against mosquitoes and ticks. When returning from the outdoors, Machala said, people should check themselves and their pets carefully for ticks.

"They're kind of hard to find," he said.

**Bush, Blair call for multinational force**

WASHINGTON — President Bush and British Prime Minister Tony Blair declared Friday that a multinational force should be dispatched quickly to help Lebanon regain control of the southern part of its country from the Hezbollah militia.

again stopped short of supporting an immediate ceasefire in the fighting between Hezbollah and Israel, which Arab and European leaders have been urging. As Middle East violence

raged for a 17th day, Bush and Blair said at a White House news conference that the makeup of the multinational force would be discussed at a U.N. meeting Monday called by Secretary-General Kofi

Annun. The force would both lead to stability and help speed the safe delivery of humanitarian aid, they said.

Bush said he was sending Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice back to the Middle East this weekend to help negotiate terms for such a force with both Lebanese and Israeli leaders. "This is a moment of

TWIN FALLS — Wireless is truly both blessing and curse. Right now, for example, I should be writing this story.

But instead, I'm checking my e-mail and the latest news on the Web, all from the comfort of the College of Southern Idaho's Student Union.

CSI is one of many places in town offering public wireless hotspots. Anyone can bring a

laptop to Java, Barnes & Noble or McDonald's and be surfing the Web in seconds. The Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce even plans to offer wireless at the Visitors' Center near the canyon as soon as broadband becomes available there.

Barnes & Noble on Pole Line Road offers access for a price. Wi-Fi nuts who access the store's wireless are redirected to a page where they can pay to use the Web, pro-

vided by AT&T. Options include a Wi-Fi Membership for \$20 or \$40 a month, two hours of online time for \$1 and a prepaid connection card in increments of \$25, \$50 or \$100 allowing 3, 6 or 20 connections respectively.

Robert Lopez, a department manager at the store, said all the finances are taken care of by the store's parent

TWIN FALLS — Seven years ago, Wayne Hiler canceled his home phone service and switched to a cell phone. And he's never looked back. "I miss nothing," said Wayne

Hiler, regional manager for Mountain States Wireless in Twin Falls.

True, his happiness could be because he's a wireless salesman, but Hiler also is one of a growing number of Americans who are trading their landlines for wireless phones.

Last summer, the total number of cell phones surpassed the total number of landlines for the first time, according to the federal government. And studies conducted by organizations from the Federal Communications Commission to Impulse Research, a market-

ing research group, show that between 8 and 14 percent of the nation's homes have no landline phones.

Those studies, of course, had to be done through face-to-face interviews — homes without landlines aren't in the phone book. Not that those

homeowners complain. Hiler said four or five of its approximately 40 customers get Internet service.

**Scientists: Get used to killer heat**

In Fresno, the morgue is full of victims from a California heat wave. A combination of heat and power outages killed a dozen people in Missouri. And in parts of Europe, temperatures are hotter than in 2003 when a heat wave killed 35,000 people.

Get used to it. —For the next week, much of the nation should expect more "extreme heat," the National

Weather Service predicts. —In the month of August, most of the United States will see "above normal temperatures," forecasters say.

—For the long-term future, the world will see more and worse killer heat waves because of global warming, scientists say.

The July burst of killer heat waves around the world can't be specifically blamed on global warming. And they aren't the worst ever — they'll kill can't quite hold a melting candle to the scorching heat of

America's 1930s Dust Bowl. But the trend is pointed in that direction, experts say.

Heat waves and global warming are "very strongly" connected, said Kevin Trenberth, climate analysis branch chief at the National Center for Atmospheric Research in Boulder, Colo. The immediate cause of the California heat wave — and other heat waves — is day-to-day weather, he said.

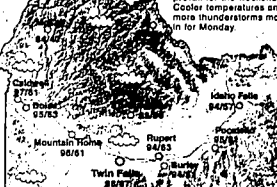

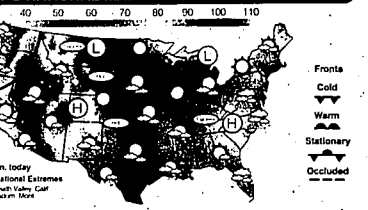

in the upper atmosphere prevents cooler jetstream air, from making it into the West, said National Weather Service meteorologist Dennis Feltgen. "You can't let the global warming into one single event," he said.
But what global warming has done is make the days warmer, and the nights cooler, which help turn merely uncomfortable hot days into killer heat waves, Trenberth said.
Much of global warming science concentrates on average monthly and yearly temperatures, but recent studies in the

Peregrine coin irks some Idahoans in potato country

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — The president of the Idaho Potato Commission says he's bracing for phone calls following the selection of the peregrine falcon rather than a potato on the state's new quarter.

"The absence of the potato on the quarter will be more noted than its presence," Frank Muir told the Post-Register. "In other words, more people will wonder why it's not on the quarter."

He said he had to field similar calls in the 1970s when a picture of a skier with the slogan "Winter Wonderland" was offered on license plates to the public as an option to the "Famous Potatoes."

On Monday, Gov. Jim Risch unveiled the peregrine, Idaho's official raptor since 2004, as the choice for the quarter. The bird was picked by former Gov. Dirk Kempthorne, who resigned to become interior secretary in May.

"What does a falcon have to do with Idaho?" said Jill Kidman at Underground Tattoo in Idaho Falls. "They need a potato on it."

Idaho is the nation's largest potato producer, growing about one-third of all the potatoes in the United States. Last year, the state produced 12.5 billion pounds of potatoes that paid farmers about \$700 million. Muir estimates the industry is worth about \$2 billion to the state.

But a potato design didn't

even make the finals in the quarter competition.

"I think the quarter should represent all of the state, not just a segment," said state Sen. Hal Bunderson, R-Meridian, adding that a potato would not represent his region near Boise. "If you ask what will drive Idaho's economy going forward, you won't say potatoes, you'll say technology."

The World Center for Birds of Prey in Boise played a key role in helping save the birds from extinction. In 1970 the peregrine falcon population had dwindled to just a couple dozen documented breeding pairs in the continental United States, the result of poisoning from pesticides including DDT.

Since then, the center's biologists have hatched more than 4,000 peregrines, releasing many into the wild before the bird was finally removed from the federal endangered species list in 1999.

But the history of the peregrine and Idaho's role in its recovery hasn't impressed everyone in the state, especially in the southeastern part where potatoes are grown and some say a potato should have been put on the coin.

"A sacred potato," said Michael "Arnie" Wells, another customer at the Underground Tattoo.

"With a potato peeler sticking out of it," said Kidman.

Plaintiffs to renew attempt to punish judge for Duncan case

A federal lawsuit against a Becker County, Minn., judge has been dismissed, but attorneys for the plaintiffs plan to renew their claim that by setting a low bail for convicted sex offender Joseph Edward Duncan III, he was able to kill again.

The plaintiffs say that because Judge Thomas Schroeder set bail at \$15,000 on an unrelated child molestation charge, Duncan was able to travel to Idaho where he's

charged with killing three people.

The lawsuit was filed in Idaho on behalf of the estates of two of Duncan's alleged victims.

U.S. District Court Judge B. Lynn Winmill of Idaho on Thursday dismissed the case against the county on jurisdictional grounds.

The decision didn't surprise an attorney representing Becker County. "The (Idaho) court never had jurisdiction," said Jon Iverson, of Bloomington, Minn.

State announces 2007 art grants and awards

BOISE — The Idaho Commission on the Arts announced its 2007 arts grants and awards approved at the last regular commission meeting. A total of \$598,757 was granted, largely to communities, schools and organizations. All funds are matched by local organizations or communities.

County plans for third salary increase

TWIN FALLS — Twin Falls County will spend \$3.2 million more next year if a proposed budget is adopted unchanged.

A \$30-million budget for the 2006-07 fiscal year was presented to commissioners Friday morning. Part of the increase will be spent getting county salaries up to 95 percent of market value, County Clerk Kristina Glascock said. This is the third and probably last year of the salary initiative.

Notable increases included \$230,000 more for the sheriff's department, \$180,000 for criminal justice facilities, \$100,000 more for Glascock's office and \$90,000 more for the prosecuting attorney's office.

Sheriff Wayne Tousey's requests included wages, personnel and new computers. In his words, he didn't get his first or second list of wants, but got his third.

"That was the third installment of wages," he said. "That was kind of our goal all along, was get our wages up so we could at least compete."

His computers will have to wait one year, but he's OK with that.

"I'm satisfied, very satisfied," he said.

The proposed Twin Falls County budget will be printed in the Times-News during the third week of August. Public hearings will take place at the Twin Falls County Courthouse at 7 p.m. Sept. 5 in the third-floor conference room and 10 a.m. Sept. 6 in the office of the commissioner.

Assessor Gerry Bowden, who asked for more appraisers and a digital mapping project, said he will at least get the new employees. His budget rose by

about \$50,000.

"Actually, I've got the people now," he said.

One item from this year is \$1.5 million the county made from selling the Magic Valley Regional Medical Center to St. Luke's Health System.

That money will be placed in a capital projects fund for use when county offices begin moving into the former Twin Falls Clinic building, Commissioner Tom Mikessell said.

Improvements will include new office equipment and a fiber-optic data line to link the clinic with the courthouse. Attention will have to be paid to

the courthouse building as well. "As we move out of this facility, then we'll have to spend some dollars remodeling this, too," Mikessell said.

Only 44 percent of the total budget comes from taxes, Mikessell said. The balance is in the form of grants or fees collected by the various departments.

"We try and make sure everyone pays for everything that they use," he said.

This year's budget is \$26.8 million. The increase is more than that between the 2004-05 and 2005-06 years, when the budget only grew by \$1.7 million.

Fires north of Elko threaten ranches, livestock

ELKO, Nev. — Heat, wind, difficult access and resource shortages continue to challenge firefighters battling three blazes in Elko County, where structures, livestock and wildlife habitats lie in harm's way.

Various structures are threatened by at least two of the fires, said Mike Brown, fire information officer.

The Basco Fire Complex consists of the 15,000-acre Basco Fire about 18 miles northwest of Elko and the 2,000-acre Taylor Fire about seven miles east of Tuscannon.

The Basco Fire was lightning-caused and is burning in sage, grass and pinyon in steep terrain. It is estimated at 10 percent contained. The rough terrain combined with heavy fuels is making suppression difficult and contributing to extreme fire behavior.

There are threats to livestock, grazing allotments, wildlife habitat, ranches, historic cabins and mines in the area. There are more than 300 people work-

ing the Basco Fire.

The Taylor Fire started Thursday afternoon and has burned about 2,000 acres seven miles east of Tuscannon in steep terrain. The fire is threatening school buildings, residences, and ranches as well as substantial mining equipment, explosive caches, drilling rigs, and commercial property, Friday morning, 41 people were fighting the fire.

The fire was human-caused, and determined to be accidental, Brown said.

There is no current estimate of containment.

"The reasons we've combined the Basco and Taylor fires into a complex is that they're in close proximity and we don't want them competing for resources," said Elko Interagency Dispatch Center Manager Bill Roach.

The Winters Fire burning about 10 miles northwest of Midas has consumed more than 30,000 acres and is estimated at 5 percent contained. A Type II Fire Management Team assumed control of the fire Friday. More than 200 firefighters are assigned to the blaze. Though technically in Elko County, the Winters Fire is being managed by the Winnemucca Dispatch Center.

"Our firefighters have seen 25- to 40-foot flame lengths and extreme fire behavior," said BLM Elko Field Manager Helen Hankins. "We will fight the fires as aggressively as we can safely. We have the best firefighters in the country right here. Safety of human life is our No. 1 priority. There is neither one acre of ground nor 1 million acres of ground that are worth a single human life."

Spudman triathlon hits Burley

BURLEY — Ready, set, go. Triathletes from around the country will take to the river and roads around Mini-Cassia this morning for the Burley Lions Clubs' 20th annual Spudman Triathlon.

Sheriff Jim Higgins has announced that some roads where the races will be held are going to be closed to traffic during the event. "It went so well last year and because of the size of the Spudman race, we have to close down the roads to motor traffic," Higgins said.

"Race officials expect more than 1,400 racers. Although the race creates some inconvenience, we had almost no complaints last year because most of the community seems to enjoy the race, the racers and the people this event brings to our community."

Triathlon is expected to be very congested on Highway 91 between Burley and Declo this morning, Higgins said. The Snake River will be closed to all boats from the Burley/Heyburn Bridge upstream to the Golf Course Marina boat docks from 6 to 9:30 a.m., while the swim portion of the race takes place.

The bike race will start on the south end of the bridge and will go five miles east of Declo on Highway 81. That highway will be closed from the Y-Deel Junction near the golf course entrance to Vale Road between 7:15 and 10 a.m., depending on how the bike race progresses.

Local traffic is asked to take an alternate route. Expect long delays at the intersections of Highways 77 and 81 in Declo, from about 8 to 10 a.m., Higgins said. In addition, runners will be crossing Highway 81, about 1/2 mile east of the golf course road, starting, about 8:30 a.m. until around noon, Higgins said.

Higgins is asking that people use extreme caution and, if at all possible, take a different route during these times.

Jerome family making a difference in Peru

ALTO TRUJILLO, PERU — Five-year-old Hannah May is much like any kindergarten. She goes to school. She plays with the neighborhood children. She helps her parents with their gardening. But Hannah has an unusual opportunity at hand: daily exposure to a unique perspective on human compassion.

Nearly a year ago, Hannah and her parents, Ralph and Theresa May, moved from their home in Jerome to the poverty-stricken shums of Alto Trujillo, Peru. So what would bring this Idaho farming family to the barren sands of Alto Trujillo?

In fall 2004, Ralph and Theresa signed a two-year agreement with the Comboni Lay Missionary organization to aid relief efforts in one of the poorest areas of South America. They chose to live among the people they are helping, while working to cultivate vegetables and help out with local school, church and family issues.

"I think that our presence gives the people hope since we chose to live among them and they have so little to

hope for here," Theresa said. "We live with people who live in extreme poverty whose lives are heart-wrenching."

Alto Trujillo is a makeshift shanty town that was rapidly constructed on a sand dune by natives forced out of

mountain farming towns. Alto Trujillo lies on the outskirts of the city of Trujillo and holds a population estimated between 35,000 and 100,000 people. The city receives less than 5 inches of rain each year. Seventy percent of the population is under the age of 25, and locals usually make around two to five dollars per day, leading to widespread malnourishment and a severe problem with gang activity. The streets are not paved, and there is very little power, water and sewage service available.

"We journey in solidarity with the people, sharing their joys and sorrows," Theresa said.

The Mays sold their home and are now dependent on the Comboni organization for financial support, which is funded by private donations.

"Since we have two older college-aged children, we wanted to go some-

where that had good communication (telephone and internet) and is relatively easy to get to," said Theresa.

"Trujillo fit that bill. We were also very drawn by the life the people have carved out for themselves in the dry desert coastland of Peru.

"The May family offers an array of beneficial skills to the people of Trujillo. While in Jerome, the Mays spent 25 years working with 1,100 acres of dry farmland. Ralph has over 30 years of experience in cultivating crops in harsh weather conditions."

"I also see that one of the biggest contributions we can make is to become involved in the lives of the people," said Theresa. "It takes time to build meaningful relationships with others. I want to build such relationships."

The Mays stay in consistent contact with their friends and extended family in the U.S. and have many stories to tell.

"They're just people who are always willing to help. If there is something that needs to happen, they're right there, volunteering," said close family friend Kevin Reznor. "They take ideas and they bring them to life."

## Idaho's new quarter goes to the birds

**JEERS to former Gov. Dirk Kempthorne**, for laying an egg with the selection of Idaho's quarter design.

Gov. Jim Risch, who took over for Kempthorne in June, announced Idaho's quarter which will go into production in 2007. The image is of a peregrine falcon — Idaho's official raptor since ye olden times of 2001.



But that said, the design of the falcon is terrible. Why not show the falcon in flight? Just by the general design it's hard to tell if the bird is a falcon, an angry parakeet, or a missing icon from the Partridge Family.

But the absolute worst part of the quarter is the outline of the state — with a star marking the capital city of Boise. Talk about an insult to the rest of Idaho. The next time you hear a state leader deny any conspiracy to build "The Great State of Ada," just remember it's an excuse that's worth about two bits.

**CHEERS** to the Idaho Department of Correction, for finally acting to move the state's relocated prisoners out of Newton County, Texas.

After moving almost 400 prisoners to the eastern Texas facility in spring, Idaho inmates experienced incidents that included a prison riot, a hunger

strike, some pepper spray confrontations and two escapes.

The GEO Group Inc., the contractor that works with Idaho and its transferred inmates, requested that Idaho approve moving the prisoners across the state to a pair of facilities in Lubbock. GEO Group said Newton County needed the space for its own prisoners.

Have it at boys. Making the offer even better was that GEO Group paid for the entire transfer.

Out-of-state prisoner transfers are a temporary but necessary strategy for Idaho as it struggles with its own

prison overpopulation.

But putting prisoners in unsafe conditions is an issue that could come back in a lawsuit. Officials were wise to get inmates out of the Newton facility.

**CHEERS** to South Central District Health supervisor Cheryl Juntunen, who will be retiring after nearly 30 years at the agency.

Juntunen arrived at South Central District Health as a public health nurse in the Burley office in 1977 and soon became nursing director. She became the first woman director of a district health agency in 1991. In that entire time, the agency has become a model on local and national standards for health issues, emergency preparedness and links to social response.

**CHEERS** to the Twin Falls Cowboys and the Minico Spartans, the two AA American Legion teams that qualified last week for the state tournament in

Boise. As readers may recall, we applauded the Cowboys coach for applying some toughness by suspending players who broke team rules. The suspensions forced the team to forfeit games, but the Cowboys apparently emerged better for it. They won the AA qualifying tournament last weekend at Skip Walker Field and travel to Boise this week with the region's top.

As for the Spartans, they kept their cool in the 100-degree heat on Sunday, holding on for a 10-9 victory over the Idaho Falls Russets.

Temperatures flared on the final out when a base runner was called out and then threw a punch. Players from both teams cleared their benches, but Minico coaches acted swiftly to douse the hostility.

**JEERS** go to the visiting Russets for throwing property and equipment at Skip Walker Field. Police were eventually called to the field to watch as spectators made their way to cars for the ride home.

## The immutable President Bush

It's too bad President Bush spins evolution — both in his view of the world and his view of himself.

Scientists see more and more evidence that human evolution not only exists but is ongoing, as people adapt to changing circumstances with shifts in everything from skin color to the protein structure of sperm.

But with W, it's more a matter of survival of the stubbornist. If you turn on TV, you see missiles flying, bodies lying, nuclear missiles unleashed and a slaughterhouse in Iraq. But don't despair, because Bush announced Tuesday the establishment of a joint committee to achieve Iraq self-reliance. He called it a "new partnership," as if it were some small business.

Isn't it a little late, in July 2006, to be launching a new partnership for such an old mess? Isn't it a little late to realize that Baghdad, a city where 300 garbage collectors have been killed in the last six months, according to press reports, has spun out of control in a press conference at the White House with his rogue puppet, the Iraqi prime minister, Nouri Kamal al-Maliki. Bush explained that "our strategy is to remain on the offense, including in Baghdad." Then why, after three and a half years, does our defense look so much like a defense?

The president sounded like a Jon Stewart imitation of himself when he assured reporters that al-Maliki had "a comprehensive plan" to pacify Iraq. "That's what leaders do," W lectured, in a familiar refrain. "They see problems, and they address problems, and they

lay out a plan to solve the problems."

If only the plan were a little less robbing-Peter-to-pay-Paul, and a little more road-to-Damascus epiphany. Taking troops out of Anbar Province, where the insurgency is thriving, to quell violence in Baghdad doesn't inspire confidence that the plan is truly "comprehensive."

And despite W's praise of al-Maliki's leadership, the plan to start from scratch, in essence, stabilizing neighborhood by neighborhood in Baghdad is, as the *New York Times*'s Michael Gordon writes, "an implicit acknowledgment of what every Iraqi in Baghdad already knows": The prime minister's "original Baghdad strategy plan has failed. In the past two weeks, more Iraqis — civilians have been killed than

president last week, and circled: "Bush thinks the new war vindicates his early vision of the region's struggle: of good versus evil, civilization versus terrorism, freedom versus Islamic fascism. It is as if he believes that when it comes to war and terror, leaders need to decide whose side they are on." The president sees "weakness" rather than the latest chapter in a fratricidal free-for-all that's been going on for centuries. "I view this as the forces of instability probing weakness," he said. "I think they're testing resolve."

The more things get complicated, the more W feels vindicated in his own simplified vision. The more people try to explain that it's not easy, that this is a region of shifting alliances and interests, the less he seems inclined to develop an adroit policy to win people over to our side instead of trying to annihilate them.

Bill Clinton, the Mutable Man par excellence, evolved four times a day; he had a tactical and even recreational attitude toward personal change. But W prides himself on his changelessness and on regards his immutability as the surest sign of his virtue. Facing a map on fire, he sees any inkling of change as the slippery slope to failure.

That's what's so frustrating about watching him deal — or not deal — with Iraq and Lebanon. There's almost nothing to watch. It's not even like watching a paint dry, since that, too, is a passage from one state to another. It's like watching dry paint.

## CIEDRA sets flawed precedent on public land

Congressman Mike Simpson's Central Idaho Economic Development and Recreation Act (CIEDRA) would set a precedent for Idaho and the nation. The bill would create three islands of sub-standard paper wilderness transected by riparianized corridors. Water rights would be transferred from the federal government to the state.

The "buy out" of grazing privileges is now off the table. Generalist outfitters are granted locked-in place use levels and special privileges. It authorizes \$20 million to grease the skids. Congress may never actually appropriate a dollar of that, making the Forest Service management challenge infinitely more problematic.

- The public land giveaways are particularly galling. The current accurate breakdown by county is:
  - State of Idaho near Boise: 860 acres
  - Custer County: 2,565 acres
  - Blaine County: 425 acres
  - Mackay: 380 acres
  - Blaine: 640 acres
  - Clayton: 40 acres
  - SNRA to Stanley: 162 acres
- CIEDRA would negate the previous contract (one that

actually worked) between the American people and Congress: namely the visionary Public Law 92-400 that created the SNRA in 1972.

Since 1972, approximately \$65 million in taxpayer funds has been prudently invested to purchase land or acquire scenic easements on private land parcels within the SNRA to prevent unsightly subdivisions and criss commercial developments. Are we to let CIEDRA throw a major taxpayer capital investment in quality aesthetics and preservation of Sawtooth scenic views achieved with tremendous effort over 34 years in the ashcan?

Privatization of the prime 162 SNRA acres adjacent to Stanley slated for trophy homes, land 4,990 acres of Sawtooth and Challis National Forest and BLM lands is totally inappropriate. As former chief ranger for the

SNRA, Carl Pence (1987-1992) has stated, "What the SNRA needs is bold leadership and Congressional support."

What our precious public lands do not need is to be dismembered with atrocious public land giveaways.

CIEDRA is diametrically the opposite of PL 92-400 and would absolutely accelerate unsightly subdivisions and development on the Sawtooth Valley floor and other locales. This is precisely the visual blight that your original investment was designed to prevent.

Rep. Simpson has publicly stated that it would be wrong to sell off up to 24,000 acres of national forest land in Idaho to fund rural schools. Yet in the same breath he is saying it is OK to give away 5,152 public land acres in his own pet privatization bill. Wouldn't you agree that this is being hypocritical? In my view it is simply not Rep. Simpson's moral or ethical prerogative to slice and dice and give away your precious public lands.

The precedent setting nature of CIEDRA is horrific. The rest of the west is watching intently. If CIEDRA were

to pass can't you just see every other rural town in the Western U.S. with their hand outstretched saying, "Where is our free public land?"

The grim specter of the ugly privatization of our common heritage as public lands — is terribly insidious and dangerous.

Now that CIEDRA has passed the House, the final battle will be in the Senate in September. Sen. Mike Crapo has already caved in. Please contact your Idaho Sen. Larry Craig (therefore neutral) and ask him in the name of common sense to oppose Simpson's terrible bill.

This is a national issue. Please help by standing up for truth, principle, and the bedrock integrity of your Public Lands.

I don't think you want to drive from the Magic Valley to the Sawtooth Valley and witness newly sprouting and outlandish commercial development. CIEDRA is environmentally suspect and fiscally unsound. Our society can and must do infinitely better.

# House GOP pushes pension bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House rushed late Friday to pass pension legislation meant to give retirees greater financial security and prevent airlines from "dumping" their plans on the government. After a year of delays and missed deadlines, the bill could be on the president's desk as early as next week.

The vote on the pension bill was one of the last before the House begins a five-week recess. The Senate has one more week to act on it before

its summer break.

Republican leaders also were determined to force a vote before House members leave Washington on Saturday on a bill coupling a \$2.15 increase in the \$5.15 hourly minimum wage over three years with lower inheritance taxes on multimillion-dollar estates.

The Senate would vote on the minimum wage-tax cut and pension bills next week. But it was far from certain whether the plan would work,

Democrats and moderate Republicans favor the minimum wage increase but many conservatives oppose it. And the idea of cutting inheritance taxes lacks the 60 votes needed in the Senate to overcome parliamentary hurdles erected by Democrats.

The 900-page pension bill, the product of several years of congressional effort, would force employers that have fallen behind in their defined-benefit pension payments to catch up within seven years

and close loopholes that have allowed companies to underfund their plans by an estimated \$450 billion.

The measure also promotes pension alternatives, such as 401(k) plans, through such steps as automatic enrollment. It would give financial firms greater latitude in steering investors toward high-earning savings programs.

## Executive sentenced to life for killing kids

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) — A bank executive who said he had battled depression for years was sentenced Friday to life in prison for killing his 5-year-old twin daughters. David Crespi, 45, pleaded guilty to two counts of first-degree murder to spare his family the trauma of a trial.

#### GOP wants estate tax tied to minimum wage

WASHINGTON — Republican leaders are willing to allow the first minimum wage increase in a decade but only if it's coupled with a cut in inheritance taxes on multimillion-dollar estates, lawmakers said Friday.

As the House pointed toward a session starting past midnight, it was anything but certain that the plan would work. In fact, the move seemed unlikely to result in a hike in the minimum wage, which has been frozen at \$5.15 per hour for a decade.

Senate Minority Leader Harry Reid, D-Nev., pledged to kill the hybrid minimum wage/tax cut bill if it got to the Senate.

### CALIFORNIA

#### Jury convicts racist prison gang members

SANTA ANA, Calif. (AP) — A jury convicted four leaders of a white-supremacist prison gang Friday on charges they used murder and intimidation to protect their drug-dealing operations behind bars.

Barry "The Baron" Mills, Tyler "The Hulk" Bingham, Edgar "The Snail" Hevle and Christopher Overton Gibson were the first defendants to stand trial in the federal racketeering case aimed at dismantling the feared Aryan Brotherhood.

They all were convicted under Racketeer Influenced and Corrupt Organizations law, and offenses known as Violent Crime in Aid of Racketeering. Mills and Bingham are eligible for the death penalty.

Mills, Bingham and Hevle also were convicted on a murder count for the killing of Arva Lee Ray, a prisoner slain at the Lompoc, Calif., penitentiary in 1989.

MALIBU, Calif. (AP) — Mel Gibson was arrested early Friday for suspicion of driving under the influence, a Sheriff's Department spokesman said.

Gibson's vehicle was speeding eastbound on the Pacific Coast Highway when officers stopped him at 2:36 a.m., Sheriff's spokesman Steve Whitmore said.

Gibson, 50, was booked at the Lost Hills Sheriff's station at 4:06 a.m., according to department records. The actor-director was cited and released, Whitmore said. Bail was set at \$5,000.

"The investigation is ongoing," Whitmore said. "As we would do with anyone, we don't want to release any more since the information is fragmentary."

Gibson's spokesman, Alan Nierob, said he was looking into the matter.

**U.S. should close secret prisons, U.N. panel says**

GENEVA (AP) — A U.N. rights panel Friday demanded the immediate closure of any secret U.S. detention facilities and criticized Washington on a range of other issues, calling for a moratorium on capital punishment and "improved" treatment of poor and black citizens following Hurricane Katrina.

Officials in Washington said the U.N. Human Rights Committee was out of bounds in examining U.S. practices outside the United States, but said they would consider its recommendations.

"The committee is concerned by credible and uncontested information that the state party has seen fit to engage in the practice of detaining people secretly and in secret places for months and years on end," according to the 12-page report by the committee, which held a two-day hearing last week on U.S. compliance to a major human rights treaty.

"Our initial reaction is disappointment," said U.S. State Department official Matthew Waxman, who led a U.S. delegation to the hearing. He said the panel appeared to ignore much of the American testimony.

The 18 independent experts on the committee, which examines on a rotating basis the record of all 156 signatories to the 1966 International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights, said U.S. practices violate the rights of detainees and their families.

The United States "should only detain persons in places in which they can enjoy the full protection of the law," the report said. "It should also grant prompt access by the International Committee of the Red Cross to any person detained in connection with an armed conflict."

**Australian scientists identify two ancient marine reptiles**

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) — Scientists have identified two ancient reptiles that swam in icy waters off Australia 115 million years ago, researchers said Friday. They are among the first of their kind to be found from the period soon after the

Jurassic era.

The discoveries — dubbed *Umnoonasaurus* and *Opallinectes* — belonged to a group of animals called plesiosaurs, long-necked marine reptiles that lived during the time of the dinosaurs.

Researchers, led by paleontologist Benjamin Kear and a team from the University of Australia and South Australian Museum, identified the new species after piecing together fossils from 30 individuals collected from an opal mine in the past 30 years.

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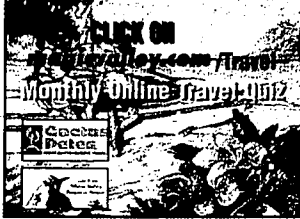
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**Hezbollah fires deepest rocket attack to date**

TYRE, Lebanon (AP) — Hezbollah launched a new kind of rocket Friday that made the deepest strike into Israel yet, rattling Israelis as their warplanes and artillery targeted guerrillas in attacks on apartment buildings and roads.

Lebanese officials said about 12 civilians died in the day's fighting. Israel said it killed 26 militants, raising to about 230 the total number killed in the campaign.

Hezbollah's launching of the new weapon unnerved Israelis, 500,000 of whom are already living in northern shelters because of rocket bombardments. The rocket firing was also likely to escalate a conflict now in its 18th day, with Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice heading back to the Middle East this weekend to make a second attempt to resolve the crisis.

The guerrillas said they used the Khatbar-1 — named after the site of a historic battle between Islam's Prophet Muhammad and Jewish tribes in the Arabian peninsula — to strike the Israeli town of Afula.

"With this, the Islamic Resistance begins a new stage of fighting, challenge and confrontation with a strong determination and full belief in God's victory," Hezbollah said in a statement.

Five of the rockets crashed into empty fields outside Afula, causing no injuries. Still, Israel deployed a Patriot interceptor missile battery north of Tel Aviv, believing the area could be in range of Hezbollah's barrages.

Israel said the Khatbar-1 rockets were renamed, Iranian-made Fajr-5s. They have four times the power and range of Katyusha rockets, making them able to hit Tel Aviv's northern outskirts.

# Aldridge surges to Pepsi title

## Final-round 61 nets Nampa golfer five-stroke win at Idaho Open

**TWIN FALLS** — Give Tyler Aldridge this much — he's a quick learner.

He started golfing as a high school freshman, turned pro at age 19, and on Friday became the 2006 Pepsi Idaho Open champion as a 21-year-old pro out of Nampa. That penchant for quick learning was on display all week at the Twin Falls Municipal Golf Course, as Aldridge followed a first-round 64 with consecutive rounds of 61 to charge past leader Pete Stone, taking the lead on Friday's front nine and running away for a five-stroke victory at 18-under-par for the three-day tournament.

"You know, I just went out there and I had a game plan just to play my own game," Aldridge said. "Not get caught up in somebody else's game and execute my shots. I was fortunate to come out on top."

Aldridge found himself right on Stone's heels after Friday's third hole as his intriguing birdie put, combined with Stone's three-putt bogey, narrowed Stone's lead to one stroke.

(Aldridge) made a good putt there and I thought I hit a good second putt," Stone said. "It's just kind of how the game goes."

By the time the final group of Stone, Aldridge and third-place finisher John Wallace of Nampa made the turn, Aldridge held a one-stroke lead at -14. He pushed the lead to three strokes through 12 after a Stone bogey on the par-3 No. 10 and his own two-putt birdie after driving the green on No. 11. Holding a two-stroke lead on the final hole, Aldridge left no doubt, finishing the tournament with an eagle on No. 18 after slicking his approach shot to within two feet of the cup.

"It feels great to win, especially the Idaho Open," Aldridge said.

He finished the three rounds in 186 strokes to bring home the \$3,600 winner's check. Stone headed back to Bountiful, Utah, with a 13-under 182 after his even-par 68 on Friday.

"As a pro — you turn pro — it's hard to win," the 24-year-old Stone said. "And I wanted to put myself where I'd have a chance to win and feel it, because it's different in the last round when you're in contention or have the lead. You need to learn what that feels like and how to play well."

"They're the only two tournaments I've played, so I feel

good," Curtis said. Twin Falls pros Travis Hofland and Mike Hamblin finished tied for eighth and 11th, respectively, carding tournaments of 195 and 197. Twin Falls native Brett Kleinkopf made a huge charge on Friday with a nine-under-par 59 to tie for 14th at 198 for the tourney. Tolver Latham finished two-under for the tournament to finish tied for 21st.

Aldridge, who will attempt to qualify for the PGA Tour later this year at the 2006 PGA

Q-School, has his eyes on the Utah Open and a number of Nationwide Tour qualifiers before he wraps up his seventh year of playing competitive golf. For Aldridge, all those hours learning the game as a teen are now paying off.

"When I was a freshman, I used to go out there all the time and hit balls from seven in the morning to 10 at night," he said. "I just wanted to be a good player."

**Idaho: A job creation leader**  
Nonfarm jobs increase more than 5.1 percent in second quarter

TWIN FALLS — Idaho Gov. Jim Risch on Friday said the Idaho economy produced new jobs at the fastest pace in the nation between the second quarter of 2005 and the second quarter this year, according to a news release from Idaho Commerce and Labor.

The 31,000 new nonfarm jobs generated over the four quarters represented just over 5.1 percent growth, the news release said. Nevada was second right at 5.1 percent and Arizona third at 4.76 percent.

Nationally, nonfarm jobs increased 1.4 percent.

"The evidence continues to mount on the strength of Idaho's economy," Risch said.

"The commitment of our labor force and the quality of life Idaho offers are the real magnets for business creation, expansion and relocation."

Over 3,100 more employers were operating in the state on June 30 than a year earlier.

After hitting a record low of 3.2 percent in March, the state's unemployment rate has moved only slightly higher in the succeeding months and still remains well below the 4 percent level that economists have traditionally called full employment.

"Our economy has been explosive for more than a year now," said Commerce and Labor Director Roger B. Madsen. "The fact that we led the nation in job creation year over year for the second quarter shows just how robust our growth has been. But there are signs that growth is moderating and likely moving to a more stable level."

The precipitous decline in unemployment — insurance claims the state recorded during the early months of 2006 has slowed. While the number remains extremely low, it has leveled off in May and June at a time when historically there have continued to be significant decreases.

"Indicators point to another strong third quarter but at more of a moderate, sustainable level," Madsen said.

Several economic soft spots remain in the state, the largest being the Lewiston area where there was no growth in non-farm jobs over the year.

Madsen renewed the department's commitment to ensuring the economic expansion is felt in every part of Idaho while at the same time keeping a close eye on national and international events such as the strife in the Middle East, high fuel and energy prices and rising interest rates that can severely impact the state's economy.

"The initiatives by the governor and Legislature to improve broadband access in rural communities, help small towns deal with rapid growth and upgrade the skills of Idaho workers so they can command better paying jobs will play key roles in this effort," Madsen said.

Statewide, construction continues to be the catalyst for

Idaho's growth. This sector saw 18 percent growth, and the nearly 8,000 new construction jobs accounted for over a quarter of all new nonfarm jobs generated since the second quarter of 2005.

"The majority of those new jobs were in the specialty trades category, a category that reflects home construction," Commerce and Labor analyst Kelly Campbell said.

"Idaho has been a national leader in population growth, and the expansion of our construction industry underscores that."

Other major new job contributors were professional and business services and trade, transportation and utilities. Each accounted for 15 percent of job growth.

**Llama relative draws large following for business, lifestyle**

HOOD RIVER, Ore. — Standing in the green grass, with Mount Hood's snowcapped peak on the horizon, it's hard for Marcus and Cathryn Whitman to imagine life any other way: the peace, the quiet — the alpacas.

Like thousands of other Americans, they ditched their former lives for the bucolic experience of raising the easy-going shaggy animals.

A relative of the llama, alpacas originated in South America and were first introduced to the United States in 1984. They were initially popular in the Northwest, primarily among llama farmers wanting to diversify. But the alpaca has since generated a following among nonagricultural types nationwide looking for a tax-friendly business and lower-stress lifestyle.

"For not knowing what an alpaca was six years ago, it's now everything," Cathryn said.

The Whitmans wanted to make a change after weathering a few too many hurricanes working as dive instructors and yacht captains in the U.S. Virgin Islands. At their accountant's suggestion, they looked into farming for the tax breaks.

They picked the alpacas because they "didn't want to raise something that we had to kill, or that would kill

us" Cathryn said.

Cathryn works for a diving magazine from her home but Marcus works full-time on the alpaca business. After six years running Good Fortune Farms, they were able to pay off the debt incurred to start it. The Whitmans now have more than 30 alpacas, a shearing business and an alpaca store on their property.

The animals look like a cross between a teddy bear and a llama. Owners say they are easy to care for: their annual food costs rival those of some dogs and they can fit in the back of an SUV. And, they say, the animals are adorable.

The Alpaca Owners and Breeders Association said the animals are an easy entry into an agricultural lifestyle.

Membership in the association spiked after 9/11, when some people, opted for a simpler life, and it has continued rising steadily since then. The association now has more than 4,000 members, primarily in Western states. But interest has grown nationwide — the largest presence of alpacas in the nation is in Ohio.

The animals only have one offspring a year. Imports from South America are limited and a national registry used for breeding and lineage tracking are closed to imports, further driving interest in breeding.

The price of a nonbreeding alpaca can be a few hundred dollars but the high-end breeding stock, with top appearance and lineage, can sell for as much as \$100,000, according to the association.

The alpacas' soft fiber, which resembles cashmere, is sold — but the market is small. There is limited demand and there are no large-scale processing facilities, which presents the fiber from being readily available.

"We would never tell anybody it's a get-rich-quick scheme," said Bob Black, who runs Black Acre Alpacas with his wife Val from their home in Beaverton, Ore., a Portland suburb.

Both continue to work full-time, he as an information technology manager and she as an attorney. They have 24 animals now and they said they hope to transition into farming full time when they retire.

Breeding can be lucrative. The tax rules favor full-time rather than hobby farmers, and include the ability to write off some farming expenses and benefit from depreciation of property.

But misty say it was as much a lifestyle as an investment decision. "I wanted to retire, or semiretire," said Lorraine Heinauer, who runs Almost Paradise Farms in Forest Grove with her husband, who continues his work as an engineer. "I liked the idea of putting around a farm."

**'Mad cow' bumps imported beef boost**

WASHINGTON — The Bush administration halted plans to increase imports of beef and cattle from Canada amid new evidence that Canada's safeguards against mad cow disease are not working.

The Canadian safeguards are stricter than those in the U.S. which is under pressure from McDonald's and other food companies to toughen their rules in this country.

The Bush administration had been poised to expand beef trade with Canada, but the department said Friday the plan is on hold while Canada investigates a recently discovered case of mad cow disease.

"It is important to confirm that Canada's regulatory system is effectively protecting consumers and livestock so there is no question about safety as we proceed," Agriculture Dept. spokesman Ed Loyd said Friday.

At issue is a ban on using cattle remains in cattle feed, the primary firewall against the spread of mad cow disease. The only known way for cattle to get the disease is by eating feed containing diseased cattle tissue, a practice largely outlawed in Canada and the United States in 1997.

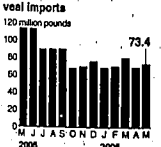
Earlier this month, Canada discovered an infected cow born in 2002, five years after the ban went into effect. The cow's age — younger than previously infected animals — suggests a shorter incubation period for the brain wasting disease, meaning it could have gotten a bigger dose of infection than other Canadian cases.

Researcher Michael Hansen of Consumers Union said if the feed ban were working properly, the amount infected material in the system should drop. And if less contaminated material were getting into the feed, it should take longer for cows to develop the disease.

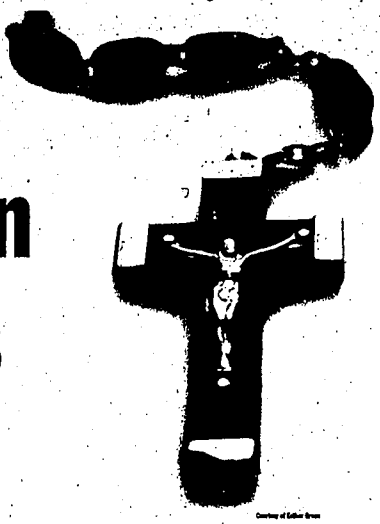
"And we'll survive."

# The rosary in today's lives

## Magic Valley Catholics find peace, aid in tradition

JEROME — It was admittedly boredom that prompted sixth-grade teacher Joanne Draper to begin handcrafting rosaries.

But it certainly wasn't any lack of reverence for the time-honored Catholic prayer beads.

"I say the rosary frequently," she said.

Draper began making handmade rosaries in 2003 when, "I had to have emergency surgery, and I was on a six-week leave," she said.

"I had read and re-read every book in my house. Making rosaries was something I always wanted to do, so I ordered a kit and made a rosary for every one of my sixth graders."

She said she sets aside time to be close to God through using the rosary with which to repeat classic Catholic prayers. But she also uses the ritual of repetitive prayer to see her through frustrating times like being stuck in Twin Falls traffic jams and grocery store lines.

"I just use my fingers (to count off the prayers) instead of getting cranky," Draper said.

The earliest references to the Catholic rosary date back to the second century in the form of graffiti near ancient sites of Christian followers who used repetitive prayer. Evidently — according to historical studies — during the

13th century, Christians began using knotted strings to count repetitive prayers. Muslims and Hindus had already used prayer beads for a long time. Through the late Middle Ages, the practices associated with the Catholic rosary became more complex as those using it as a form of prayer were taught to add meditation on Christ

and spiritual mysteries. By then, a formal rosary with beads had become the accepted norm.

The rosary is biblically based, according to the Rev. Hugh Feiss, a Catholic priest in Jerome. The Lord's Prayer is cited in Matthew 6: 9-13, and phrases from the "Hail Mary" comes from the Gospel of Luke.

Feiss, 67, has been saying the rosary almost every day since he was seven years old. It's his observation that practicing Catholics used the rosary more fifty years ago than today, but the practice is still common, he said.

He surmised the reason for Catholics using the rosary less often is they have added other ways to access God to their repertoire of prayer practices.

"People feel free to use more kinds of prayer now," he said. "They do meditative reading, they use wordless prayer — trying to put yourself in the presence of God. And they use contemplative prayer — or meditation."

Like Draper, Feiss likes to use the tradition of repetitive prayer when he is driving.

"It's a good time; it's quiet with no interruptions," he said. "The one thing about repetitive prayer is that the text is there and the images. They kind of pry to you as much as you to them, and they become a part of you."

And like Draper, Feiss said part of the value in saying the rosary is that it helps him control his thinking.

"There are so many things the world is trying to tell you that aren't true," he said. "Instead of thinking about consumerism, banality, you go into thoughts and images that are holy."

## Some health care providers let conscience decide who gets help

In Chicago, an ambulance driver refused to transport a patient for an abortion. In California, fertility specialists rebuffed a gay woman seeking artificial insemination. In Texas, a pharmacist turned away a rape victim seeking the morning-after pill.

Around the United States, health workers and patients are clashing when providers balk at giving care that they feel violates their beliefs, sparking an intense, complex and often bitter debate over religious freedom vs. patients' rights.

Legal and political battles have followed. Patients are suing and filing complaints after being spurned. Workers are charging religious discrimination after being disciplined or fired. Congress and more than a dozen states are considering laws to compel workers to provide care—or, conversely, to shield them from punishment.

Proponents of a "right of conscience" for health workers argue that there is nothing more American than protecting citizens from being forced to violate their moral and religious values.

Patient advocates and others point to a deep tradition in medicine of healers having an ethical and profes-

sional responsibility to put patients first.

The issue is driven by the rise of religious expression and its political prominence in the United States, and by medicine's push into controversial new areas. It is likely to intensify as doctors start using embryonic stem cells to treat disease, as more states legalize physician-assisted suicide and as other wrenching issues emerge.

"What constitutes an ethical right of conscience in medicine, and what are the limits?" asked Nancy Berlinger of the Hastings Center, a bioethics think tank. "This keeps getting harder and harder for us."

Christian faith when the county health clinic where she worked near Memphis required she dispense the morning-after pill.

"I felt like my religious liberties were being violated," said Shipley, 49, of Atoka, Tenn. "I could not live with myself if I did it. I answer to God first and foremost."

But Paige Gordon, 37, of Leawood, Kansas, believes doctors and nurses should never let their personal values interfere with patient care. Her doctor refused to give her the morning-after pill, citing religious objections.

"I was incredibly angry and just scared to death," Gordon said. "I think it's absolutely wrong to impose your religious beliefs on someone else."

The debate over the right of conscience in health care is far from new. After the 1973 Roe v. Wade decision, many states passed laws protecting doctors and nurses who did not want to perform abortions. Oregon's 1994 legalization of physician-assisted suicide lets doctors and nurses decline to participate.

The clash resurfaced with an abortion prescription refusing to fill prescriptions for the morning-after pill. But recent interviews with dozens of health-care workers, patients, advocates, ethicists, legal experts and reli-

gious and medical authorities make it clear that the issue is far broader. Many health-care workers are asserting a right of conscience in many settings.

Catholics face financial crunch over retired nuns

The Associated Press With tens of thousands of U.S. nuns over age 70, the Roman Catholic Church is facing a massive financial shortfall for the care of retirees in religious orders — a gap that over the long term dwarfs costs from the clergy and youth crisis. Those billions of dollars have been salted away, there still remains an unfunded future liability of \$8.7 billion for current nuns, priests and brothers in religious orders. The first billion is projected by a consulting firm to exceed \$20 billion by 2023. A June survey by the church's National Religious Retirement Office, not yet released to the public, puts spending for

retire care at \$926 million last year alone. That compares with a total of \$499 million received over the last 18 years for annual special parish collections to aid retirees. The retirement realities far overshadow the burden from well-publicized sexual abuse cases, which have cost the American church more than \$1 billion since 1990, with tens of millions of dollars in pending claims. In some ways, religious orders face the same problem as many governments: increasing numbers of older retirees need benefits, but there are fewer workers to support them. America's younger workers pay now for the Social Security benefits of seniors,

while younger religious support their older generations by caring for them. Sisters, who make up 82 percent of retirees, are especially vulnerable. Between 1965 and 2005, their numbers plummeted from 179,954 to 68,634, according to the Center for Applied Research in the Apostolate at the Georgetown University. With far fewer younger novices being recruited, the majority of sisters are now more than 70 years old, the retirement office's new survey said. Even though sisters usually work until age 75, caring for the retired population is a huge task. The problem is discussed in the new book "Double

Crossed: Uncovering the Catholic Church's Betrayal of American Nuns" (Doubleday) by former New York Times religion editor Kenneth Brigg. The book's main theme is that church authorities vetoed sisters' hopes — for dramatic changes that would provide more freedom and effective ministries in the aftermath of the Second Vatican Council. When Briggs completed his research, the annual care cost was running at \$800 million and aid collections then totaled \$400 million. He reports that the annual collections generate more than twice the receipts from the next largest special appeal, showing the regard parishioners have for the sisters and other retirees.

About Rosary

Rosary, from the Latin word *rosarium* for "rose garden," is a religious exercise in which prayers are recited and counted on a string of beads or a knotted cord. By extension, the beads or cord may also be called a rosary. The practice is widespread, occurring in virtually every major religious tradition in the world.  
 In Christianity the practice was adopted in the Third century by Eastern Christian monks, and various forms of the rosary were developed. In Roman Catholicism the rosary became a popular method of public and private prayer. The most common rosary is the one devoted to Mary, the Rosary of the Blessed Virgin, the prayers of which are recited with the aid of a chaplet, or rosary. The beads of the chaplet are arranged in five decades (sets of 10), each decade separated from the next by a larger bead. The two ends of the chaplet are joined by a small string holding a crucifix, two large beads, and three small beads.  
 Traditionally, the Rosary of the Blessed Virgin requires three turns around the chaplet. It consists of the recitation of 15 decades of "Hail Marys" (150 Hail Marys), each one said while holding a small bead. On the larger beads separating the decades, different prayers are said: the Gloria Patri and the Our Father and particular mysteries are meditated upon. The 15 mysteries are events from the life, death, and glorification of Jesus Christ and Mary; they are divided into three sets of five — the joyous, the sorrowful,

and the glorious mysteries. The introductory and concluding prayers of the rosary vary.  
 In 2002 Pope John Paul II added a fourth set of mysteries, the "luminous mysteries," or mysteries of light. The five new mysteries celebrate events in Jesus' ministry, including his baptism; his miracle at Cana, where he turned water into wine; his proclamation of the kingdom of God; the Transfiguration, in which he revealed his divinity to three of his Apostles; and his establishment of the Eucharist at the Last Supper.  
 The origin of the Rosary of the Blessed Virgin is not certain, though it has been associated with St. Dominic, founder of the Dominican order in the early 13th century. The devotion probably developed gradually as a substitute for the recitation of the psalms or for the divine office sung by monks at the various canonical hours each day. It reached its definitive form in the 15th century through the preaching of the Dominican Alan de la Roche and his associates, who organized Rosary Confraternities all over France and at Cologne. In 1520 Pope Leo X gave the rosary official approbation, and it has been repeatedly commended by the Catholic church. Since the 1960s, however, public recitation of the rosary has become less frequent. John Paul II's addition of new mysteries, which are not required for reciting the rosary, was intended to revive interest in the practice; some traditional Catholics, however, have rejected the new mysteries.

 "This issue is the San Andreas Fault of our culture," said Gene Rudd of the Christian Medical & Dental Associations. "How we decide this is going to have a long-lasting impact on our society."  
 Some anesthesiologists refuse to assist in sterilization procedures. Respiratory therapists sometimes object to removing ventilators from terminally ill patients. Gynecologists may decline to prescribe birth control pills. Some doctors reject requests for Viagra from unmarried men.  
 The conscience debate has a flip side: Some health workers chafe at requests to take extraordinary measures for terminally ill patients or object to Catholic hospitals' bans on abortions, sterilizations and the morning-after pill.  
 The issue has become acute for some religious workers, especially devout Christians, for whom the concept of "conscience" plays a particularly prominent role. One development after another has challenged their values: treatments using fetal tissue; physician-assisted suicide; the RU-486 abortion pill; the morning-after pill; fertility clinics discarding thousands of excess embryos; and now a looming wave of therapies derived from embryonic stem cells.  
 "Medicine today is being asked to do all sorts of things that are in conflict with its fundamental healing traditions," said William Hurlbut of Stanford University, a member of the President's Council on Bioethics.  
 The controversy is part of the larger struggle over religion's place in society, mirroring in some ways the fight over teaching alternatives to evolution in schools. "What the conscience debate, the euthanasia debate, the stem cell debate and the evolution debate all have in common is this collision between a religiously inspired view of life and state regulation," said John Green of the Pew Forum on Religion & Public Life, a nonprofit research center.

The issue of refusals in medicine has mostly revolved quietly. Many conflicts are settled informally. Some health-care workers avoid or transfer out of jobs that present moral quandaries. When a conflict arises, co-workers typically step in. Patients often never know it happened.  
 But confrontations do occur when, for example, hospitals or clinics are unable or unwilling to accommodate a worker's

objections. Or an employee refuses to refer patients elsewhere, or is on duty alone or gets drafted to fill in for someone else. Problems sometimes arise after a worker undergoes a religious awakening.  
 In response, hospitals and other facilities, along with medical groups including the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists and the American Society for Reproductive Medicine, are

crafting policies to defuse potentially explosive run-ins. Lawyers, ethicists and advocates are sparring over how to balance the conflicting rights.  
 "Freedom of conscience has been central to our political notions since even before the United States existed," said Loren Lomasky, a professor of philosophy at the University of Virginia. "People should not be forced into doing things that they find morally odious."

# Set up for victory

TWIN FALLS — Kenny Vandermar made his first trip of the season to the winner's circle at the Magic Valley Speedway just two weeks ago, but with race No. 8 of 12 in the InterMountain Pro Race Series coming up tonight at MVS, Vandermar would prefer not to have any last-minute surprises.

Curious to see how the truck would handle in the 90-plus-degree heat at the Magic Valley Speedway after throwing on a few new tires, the dairy farm owner circled the track for several laps on Wednesday evening. After pulling back into the pits, he and his crew chief Art Van Holland came to the conclusion that there is still a little work yet to be done before the No. 12 truck is tweaked in for tonight's 40-lap main event. Since Vandermar believes that dialing in the right setup just as important as the driver's abilities out on the track, making every adjustment count is important. It's just not always easy.

Vandermar has raced truck for more than six years, the last three with the InterMountain Race Truck Series. Along with

Van Holland, Vandermar's son-in-law, Jason Hatfield, is also part of the team, working as Vandermar's spotter during the race. While the majority of the races take place at the Twin Falls track, the series also competes in Meridian and Salt Lake City, Utah, and Vandermar enjoys getting out of town once in awhile to take challenge of a different track.

"I like the traveling that we do with the trucks," Vandermar said. "I know (MVS promoter) Steve York would like to have us here a lot more, but I personally like going to the different tracks."

Each track the Pro Trucks visit is a different shape and has its own disposition. Sometimes the crew may think everything is set just right, but they get a big shock come race time.

"We had one night a few weeks ago where we had all kinds of issues with the truck," Vandermar said. "It was just all over the track. The driver can only do so much with how the truck is handling. That's why the setup is so important. You can set the truck up a certain way and not change anything, bring it back two weeks later and it's just not working for you. That's when you kind of

scratch your head and think, 'Now what do we do?' and hope you make the right decisions. That's what Jason and Art do. They take care of it and then they wish me luck."

Tires, setup, tires, setup. Whether you watch a NASCAR race on television or visit the pits after the evening's events have concluded at MVS you'll hear those words over and over. Drivers and crew members know the importance of both. However, setup they have some control over. Tires are a different animal.

No two tires are exactly the same and the drivers can feel when they have a set of tires that will work well with the vehicle and when something needs to be changed. New tires are preferred, but they're expensive.

"You have to pay attention to what they're telling you," Vandermar said. "We've found out over the years how critical the tires really are."

Van Holland adds that any feedback Vandermar can give him after a few practice runs around the track regarding what to work on to make the truck perform better is key to a successful main event.

"A lot of it depends on the information he (Vandermar)

gives us," Van Holland explains. "Without him giving us good information when he comes in from the track, we can't do anything. We can't make it work without him and he can't make it work without us."

Just before it was time to load up and head home, Vandermar thought about hitting the track one more time before the practice session was finished for the night.

"We still need to work on it," Vandermar said. "I'll maybe go out one for a couple more laps. There's another individual out here today that's running two-tenths of a second faster than we are, but we're in it for the long-haul. We're running for Lap 40. Maybe we could use a different spring, maybe a different shock, maybe a different driver."

Vandermar is doing very well this season, currently third in the MVS point standings and fifth in the series' overall point standings. But should he happen to need any last-minute instructions, he has to look no farther than the sign board that hangs in the back of his truck hauler. The message reads, "Think, pass the person in front of you," which is certainly sound advice for any driver.

# Speedway cuts to the chase

TWIN FALLS — Beginning tonight, the chase is on as the entire season comes down to just five events that will determine the 2006 season champion in each of the four NASCAR divisions at the Magic Valley Speedway.

The Pepsi Premier, Budweiser Grand Nationals, NAPA Pony Stocks and Magic Valley Pipe Thunder Stocks drivers will all compete in Round 1 of the Chase for the Championship tonight. Jerry Rice will be looking to stay as far ahead as possible of 2005 Grand Nationals champion Louis Lopez, while the other drivers try and take as much advantage as they can of their new point-standings gift.

In the NAPA Pony Stock division, Jason Whited, driver of the No. 77 car, had his point lead put out to pasture and now holds only a three-point advantage over Josh Pittz and 2005 Pony Stock champion Lou Anderson.

Whited is one driver who knows how important it is that nothing goes wrong during

# THE ACES ON BRIDGE

Bobby Wolf

"It is a bad plan that admits of no modification."  
— Publilius Syrus

At trick one, defending four hearts, your partner follows with the diamond 10 to suggest four. Declarer wins with the ace and plays a heart, which you win with the king as partner drops the five. What do you know about the hand?

Presumably partner has one heart and four diamonds, most likely with either five spades and three clubs, or four spades and four clubs. In either case declarer can't establish one black suit to discard losers from the other.

Your main concern is that your partner will get employed. That would occur only if declarer can eliminate dummy's diamonds — and he can do that only if you help. Suppose you play another diamond now. South will ruff and play a second trump to you. Even on a club shift, best, declarer will win in hand, cross to dummy with a third trump, ruff dummy's last diamond and exit with the king and another club. Your partner will be thrown in and forced to lead away from his spade king.

After winning the trump king, you can thwart declarer's plan by cashing the trump ace and leading the club nine. If declarer crosses to dummy twice to ruff both the diamonds, he will not have any trumps left at the end. When he plays a heart and another club, your partner can exit in diamonds — so long as he is remembered to keep his small diamond on the second round of trumps.

ANSWER: Rebid one no-trump, not two diamonds, which would promise a six-card suit. Yes, your black suits may be open to attack, but your rebid shows your hand-type, not stoppers in the unbid suits. And you do have a balanced hand, regardless of the absence of stoppers.
