## Last minute preparations under way for Otter-Easley wedding

**BOISE** — It took a decade of wooing — and five proposals — but this month Lori Easley is set to walk down the aisle with one of Idaho's most ram-bunctious bachelors.

The move could make her Idaho's next-first lady, if U.S. Rep. C.L. "Butch" Otter's attempt for the governor's seat against Democratic Jerry Brady is successful this fall.

The invitations have been sent, the gown chosen and the flowers picked for the Aug. 18 wedding at Meridian's Holy Apostles Catholic Church. But despite the couple's high profile, their wedding selections have been down-to-earth.

Easley will be wearing a gown with a cathedral-length train from chain retailer David's Bridal's Oley, Cassin line. Capital City Florists will be handling the flowers, and local photographer Brad Hollenbaugh will be snapping portraits of the bride in her strapless, champagne-colored dress, Otter spokesman Mark Warbis said. A string quartet will play during the ceremony, Warbis said.

The guest list was kept as small as possible, said Idaho Rep. Debbie Field, Otter's campaign manager.

"Butch Otter and Lori Easley have so many people they know, as you can imagine, and the two of them have large families, but they've kept it to pretty close family and friends," Field said.

Otter is 63 and Easley is in her late 30s to early 40s.

Though the Friday evening wedding is just a little more than two weeks away, procrastinators still have plenty to chase from in the Otter-Easley gift registry. The couple registered at Macy's, mainly for dining and entertaining supplies and mostly eschewing high-end brands for mass-market items.

One splurge: A set of Waterford crystal wedding heirloom flutes, priced at \$150 each. And for the romantics, a few items for the bedroom: A baffle-box down comforter and a feather bed mattress cover.

They also registered at the Boise boutique Gibson & Lane, favoring horse-themed trays and other items by designer Arthur Court as well as cream Italian pottery.

## WEST NILE VIRUS 'This is not a public health crisis'

Biologists confirm case in northern Nevada sage grouse

**TWIN FALLS** — On the day after health officials confirmed a dead 12-year-old boy tested positive for West Nile Virus, biologists reported a

case in a northern Nevada sage grouse, a sensitive species. State officials urge caution, not panic from the public.

"This is not a public health crisis," said Mark Drew, a veterinarian who tracks the spread of West Nile for the state.

On Monday, the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare verified that Rocco Magliozzi of Norwood, Mass., had West Nile Virus after being

exposed while attending a youth camp in Gooding. The department suspects that Magliozzi also was exposed to Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever, and that a combination

## Mideast war in fourth week

**BOURJ AL-MULOUK, Lebanon** — Hezbollah fired its biggest and deepest volley of rockets into Israel on Wednesday as Israel pursued the guerrillas with 8,000 soldiers on the ground and heavy bombing. With fighting in its fourth week and diplomatic efforts stalled, the region braced for a bitter and long war.

In eastern Lebanon, villagers wept as heavy machinery carried off the bodies of those killed in an overnight raid against a Hezbollah stronghold. Across northern Israel, forests and

fields lay scorched from rocket fire that killed a Massachusetts native fleeing on his bicycle after a warning siren went off.

**HOPES IN CUBA:** All eyes on Castro, despite a plea from Pope Benedict XVI for a quick solution. U.N. diplomats debated a draft resolution that would lay down the conditions for an international force to go in; they claimed they were making progress but acknowledged no immediate deal was in sight.

## Group tries to solve case of the vanishing aspens

**POCATELLO** — A working group has been formed in southeast Idaho to find out why aspen trees are disappearing.

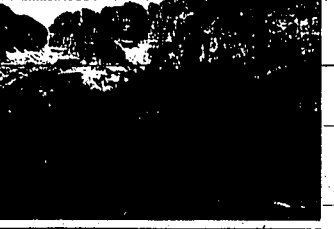
"The trees are dying like they're supposed to do, but then something happens that is killing the root system out completely," Dale Bartos, an ecologist with the Rocky Mountain Research Station's Forestry Sciences Laboratory in Logan, Utah, told the Idaho State Journal. "This is a big concern of a lot of people right now. I suspect it will be determined to be

some type of disease that's in there.

Aspens send out suckers to create "clone" trees. But in many stands in the West, including southeast Idaho, this process is not working. The group wants to figure out why.

The group's made up of workers with the Idaho Department of Fish and Game, Idaho Department of Lands, Idaho

## Local law enforcement putting dogs to work

**TWIN FALLS** — K-9 officers love the look. It's a look a suspect who has just been pulled over does not yet have. "Everything's cool," they tell themselves, "try not to panic."

But when a second patrol car carrying a K-9 pulls up behind the first car, sometimes from the Twin Falls Police Department — which has four dogs — or the Twin Falls County Sheriff's office — which has

two — the suspect starts to panic. In that moment, the ball is in patrol officer Ken Rivers' court. If the driver is clean, he'll soon know.

If not, the driver probably will crack like a stale cookie.

It's a moment Rivers relishes. Suspects may not know that a K-9 can complete a search in 10 to 15 minutes that would take officers four hours. They may not know that a scent detected by a certified K-9 gives the officer probable cause to search the vehicle.

Yet something about the dog assures a guilty driver he'll be found out. "They go, 'Here it is,'" said Rivers.

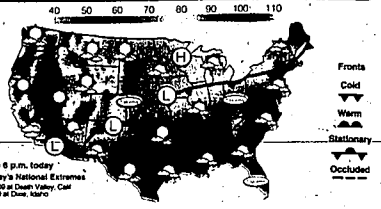

Continued from page A1 Of the two caused his death, said Ross Mason, a spokesman for Health and Welfare. "It's unlikely that West Nile would have done it by itself," Mason said. West Nile primarily is a bird virus transmitted to humans and animals through mosquito bites. Most infected humans develop no symptoms or mild flu-like symptoms. Only one percent of those infected develop neurological disease. Spotted Fever is a rare tick-borne illness. "In the past decade, there have been 19 confirmed cases of Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever in Idaho — only one person died from the disease. Drew has been monitoring West Nile in Idaho since 2003, keeping an eye on certain species of birds as an indicator of the virus' presence. West Nile first showed up in 2003 at an alligator farm in Hagerman. The virus has been found in Magic Valley horses and several bird species.

West Nile Virus in wildlife

Technically a bird virus, West Nile can be transferred to humans and other species via mosquito bites. Certain families of birds, called corvids, are particularly susceptible to the virus, including crows, ravens, blue jays and magpies. Sage grouse, a sensitive species once considered for protection under the Endangered Species Act, also are vulnerable to West Nile. Officials confirmed West Nile in a northern Nevada sage grouse. The department accepts dead birds for West Nile testing from residents as long as the bird has died within 48 hours. The sage grouse death poses a new concern for wildlife biologists. The grouse was found on the Nevada side of the Duck Valley Indian Reservation. "There is obviously a concern not only for sage grouse but also for other ruffed grouse," said Scott Bailey, a regional nongame biologist. "Sage grouse, which live in sagebrush ecosystems often used by ranchers for livestock grazing, were considered for protection under the

Endangered Species Act

Endangered Species Act and still are considered a sensitive species. Biologists believe the grouse is particularly susceptible to West Nile. As the summer heats up, sage grouse are attracted to wet areas where mosquitoes hover, increasing their risk of exposure to the virus, said Randy Smith, regional wildlife manager for Fish and Game. "Documenting West Nile in sage grouse, however, could prove difficult. Sage grouse live in remote areas. To test a dead animal for the virus, biologists need to get to it within 24 to 48 hours, Smith said. Magic Valley Fish and Game has seen an increase in birds brought in for West Nile testing this year. The department sent samples from 25 birds already this year. Roughly 17 tested positive, results are still pending on eight. The regional office saw only nine cases last year. "We weather and warm temperatures contribute to the higher incidence of West Nile in the region. However, Drew doesn't believe the region is in a West Nile crisis. "We don't want to push the panic button," Drew said. "Not every dead bird that people find died of West Nile." Reporter Michelle Dunlop covers natural resources for the Times-News. Continued from page A1 Dogs are prepared for this moment in two ways. A K-9 officer and his dog have logged 60 hours of training for narcotics work for something as simple as patrol training. But what makes an effective K-9 is also part hereditary. "You want them to be possessive of something or willing to work for something," says Deputy Morgan Case at the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office, who has worked with K-9s for three years. He is also president of the Idaho Police Canine Association. "The easiest thing is going to be a ball reward," said Case. "It's a bizarre obsession," he said. "My dog will climb

mountains for that stupid ball.

But a K-9s devotion to the ball is linked solely to his master. Strongly bonded to their master, they remain imminently suspicious of everyone else. A pat on RIVERS' back, a hug, a jab in just all can provoke Robbie to lash out to protect his master. "And nothing can distract the dog's focus from a single goal," Police Patrol Officer Rick Van Vooren accepts that as an article of faith about his dog Carlo now. Three years ago, it was a lesson he had to learn. VanVooren grew annoyed with Carlo when he appeared more interested in a roasted chicken sitting on the front seat of a stopped vehicle than in finding drugs. "He indicated on the chicken," Van Vooren said. "And I

was like, 'You're full of it!'"

VanVooren picked the roasted chicken off the seat and put it on the hood of the car. Carlo went for it again. This time Van Vooren questioned himself, "I'm not a dog person, but I got grams of meth and powder used to mix with meth to increase sales profit. "It was inside the cavity of the chicken," he said. Last fall, it was the same scene only this time it was a cheeseburger. "The first time I questioned it," he said. "The second time I knew what to do." Carlo led VanVooren to drugs hidden between the bun and burger. On Wednesday, while training K-9 units on the CSI campus, authorities planned two halves of an Egg McMuffin in the parking lot to distract the dogs from hidden drugs. Carlo and Robbie seemed to pay no

attention. The ball won.

At the point, a detective approached to close a case. Rivers and Robbie sprang into action nearly devouring the detective's protective gear, "he said. "In an annual six-day conference of K-9s in Boise, Twin Falls dogs from the county and city departments performed well but placed lower than in past years. "Dogs will always perform as well as the master's being trained them," Case said after the June event. He took fourth in obedience and second in agility. The next conference is scheduled for April 29 to May 5 in Twin Falls. Continued from page A1 Department of Agriculture, U.S. Bureau of Land Management, and Forest Service, ecologists, and certified citizens. "Right now, they're still building their mailing list," said Wendy Lowe, a consultant hired to run the meetings. "They have chosen to define their membership as anyone interested in participating. They're just getting started. The first thing they wanted to do is create more about it." According to Fish and Game, aspen numbers in eastern Idaho have declined 65 percent in the past century.

Records show that 45 percent

Records show that 45 percent of the Caribou-Targhee National Forest in southeastern Idaho was once covered by aspens. Aspens now cover about 27 percent of the forest. To try to help aspens, Fish and Game has killed conifers that compete with them for space, said Jennifer Jackson, a regional conservation educator with the agency. The Forest Service also has projects planned to help aspens return. Barrow said planting aspens is difficult in the wild. A better way to bring back aspens, he said, was to help existing populations by giving them additional space.

wedding, Field said.

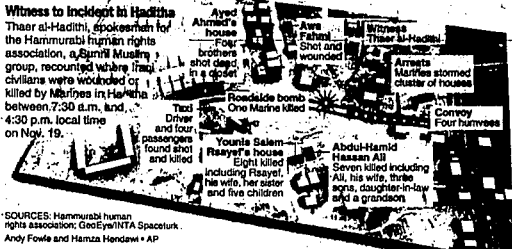

### Pentagon investigation supports Haditha accusations

Pentagon officials announced evidence collected in the Haditha probe supported accusations that U.S. Marines deliberately shot civilians, including unarmed women and children. Marine and Navy prosecutors will review the case and determine whether to recommend criminal charges.

**Nov. 19:** U.S. military begins investigation of attacks.  
**Feb. 14:** Army Lt. Gen. Peter Chiarelli commander of Multi-National Corps in Iraq, appoints an Army colonel to lead investigation.  
**March 11:** President Bush is told about case.  
**June 10:** Lawyer for a sergeant who led a squad of Marines says the unit followed procedures, did not intentionally target civilians or try to cover up the incident.

**Nov. 20:** Marines release a preliminary report saying 15 Iraqis had been killed by an improvised explosive device.  
**March 10:** Donald H. Rumsfeld and Gen. Peter Pace are notified.  
**June 7:** Gen. Michael Hagege, the Marine commander, says Marines at Haditha set standards of behavior will be held accountable.

## Heat wave scorches East

WASHINGTON — Record-breaking heat and oppressive humidity made people across the eastern half of the country miserable Wednesday and sent tourists in the nation's capital scrambling for relief in the cool marble halls of Capitol Hill.

At the Library of Congress daycare center, children stayed inside because it was deemed too hot to swim. Washington Redskins coach Joe Gibbs cut his players a break by pushing back their 4 p.m. practice session to 7 p.m.

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## Criminal probe backs accusations against Marines, official says

WASHINGTON — An initial U.S. military probe supports allegations that American Marines deliberately shot 24 Iraqi civilians in Haditha last November, a Pentagon official said Wednesday.

The Marine Corps and Navy prosecutors are now reviewing the evidence to determine whether to recommend criminal charges. That decision may be weeks away and the lawyers may ask investigators to probe further, two officials said.

They discussed the matter on condition they not be identified because the case — among the most sensational of several involving Iraqi civilian deaths — has not yet produced charges.

"It's fair to say that the majority of the work has been done," said a third official, Ed Dulce, spokesman for the Naval Criminal Investigation Service that is leading the probe. "But it's impossible to predict how much longer the investigation will take. It is very much open and ongoing."

The case is open because prosecutors and officers in the chain of command of the Marines being investigated may consult with the naval

investigation service even after any charges are brought. A decision on whether to press charges ultimately will be made by the commander of the Marines' parent unit, the 1st Marine Expeditionary Force at Camp Pendleton, Calif. That currently is Lt. Gen. John Santner, but he is to move to a Pentagon assignment soon. His successor will be Lt. Gen. James Mattis.

Investigators conducted a wide range of interviews with Marines in Iraq and with Iraqis in Haditha, but they failed to obtain permission to exhume the bodies of the 24 who were killed, two officials said. Nonetheless the probe did collect evidence from the Marines and from the scene of the killings.

The case is one of several involving allegations of unjustified killings of Iraqi civilians that have emerged this year, damaging the U.S. image abroad and triggering calls by some Iraqi leaders to end the arrangement under which U.S. troops are immune from prosecution by Iraqi authorities.

The Marines initially reported after the Nov. 19, 2005, killings at Haditha that 15 Iraqi civilians had been killed by a makeshift roadside bomb and in crossfire between Marines

and insurgent attackers. Based on accounts from survivors and human rights groups, Time magazine reported in March that the killings were deliberate acts by the Marines.

A criminal investigation was then ordered by the top Marine commander in Iraq, Maj. Gen. Richard Zilmer.

A parallel investigation is examining whether officers in the Marines' chain of command tried to cover up the events. That probe, which has not been made public, faults some officers for failing to pursue discrepancies in the initial reports about what happened in Haditha and for not launching an early investigation.

Asked about the matter at a news conference Wednesday, Marine Gen. Peter Pace, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, said the cover-up probe's report was 2,000-4,000 pages long and being reviewed by Army Gen. George Casey, the top commander in Iraq.

Regarding the criminal investigation, Pace described it as "ongoing" and said it would remain so until military authorities have reviewed its results as well as the findings and recommendations of the cover-up probe, "to make sure that every single possible cross-thread has been looked at."

Others fought to work outdoors guzzled icy drinks to cope with the heat wave that has sent temperatures soaring over 100 across the East and parts of the Midwest.

"This is unbelievable," said Bob Carter, a tourist from Atlanta who retreated with his family into the air-conditioned comfort of the Capitol. "They get the hottest days of the year while we're here."

By late afternoon, the temperature at Ronald Reagan Washington National Airport had risen to 89, with a heat index of 106. It was even hotter on the steaming pavement downtown. In New York, the temperature rose to 101 at LaGuardia Airport and 96 in Central Park. Philadelphia and Baltimore climbed into the upper 90s.

The National Weather Service posted heat advisories and warnings from Maine to Oklahoma. Forecasters said the heat would linger until Thursday night, when a cool front was expected to bring temperatures down into the 80s.

Thousands who made it through the heat of a day found themselves in the dark Wednesday night after thunderstorms downed trees and power lines in parts of Massachusetts. Most of the power was expected to be restored overnight.

At the Capitol, tourists filled water bottles at drinking fountains and doused themselves. Others drenched their baseball caps before putting them on.

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## Studio to auction 'Star Trek' memorabilia

LONDON — More than 1,000 items — including props, costumes and detailed models — went on display Wednesday at Christie's in a preview of the first official auction of "Star Trek" studio items.

The collection, valued at \$1.8 million, is being sold by CBS Paramount Television Studios to celebrate the 40th anniversary of the first "Star Trek" episode, said Helen Bailey, head of entertainment collections at Christie's.

"Star Trek," which starred William Shatner as Capt. James T. Kirk and Leonard Nimoy as Mr. Spock, ran from 1966-69. It spawned five spinoff series and 10 films.

Memorabilia from the original series, through the 2002 movie, "Star Trek: Nemesis,"

## Men arrested for abduction, assault of girls

HAILEY — Two Hailey men are charged with abducting, drugging, and sexually assaulting two Hailey girls, ages 12 and 13.

Jose L. Vivar Olivera, 21, and Emmanuel Bautista Aguayo, 21, were arraigned Tuesday afternoon in Blaine County Magistrate Court before Judge Mark Ingram. Each man is being held in the Blaine County jail on a \$250,000 bond. If they are released on bond, they may

not interact with the alleged victims.

Blaine County Prosecutor Jim Thomas said he expects to amend his criminal complaint and charge both men with rape before their scheduled preliminary hearing Wednesday in Blaine County District Court.

According to the Hailey Police Department and the prosecutor's office, at approximately 9 p.m. July 26, the two girls were enticed into entering Olivera's vehicle near the intersection of Berycreek Drive and Woodside Boulevard. They were then

offered a Pepsi cup containing Crown Royal whiskey and an unknown substance, which rendered them unconscious in a matter of minutes.

Hailey Police Chief Brian McNary said he believes the girls were then driven to a secluded location up Southlighthouse Canyon, east of Bellevue, where they were sexu-

ally assaulted.

Between 1 and 2 a.m. on Thursday, the two girls were dropped off near the new Woodside Elementary School in South Woodside. They reported the incident to their families and authorities Thursday afternoon.

McNary said both girls suffered multiple physical injuries

consistent with sexual assault. They were both treated at St. Luke's Wood River Medical Center and released.

"This crime shocked my conscience and to be honest, it made me angry," McNary said.

After an investigation, during which the girls identified their alleged assailants, Olivera and Aguayo were arrested on Monday without incident.

McNary said the two suspects left evidence behind in Southlighthouse Canyon, including a receipt from the purchase of the Crown Royal

with Olivera's debit card. Other evidence has been sent to the Idaho State Police crime lab for analysis. Ingram read from the criminal complaint, which formally charges each man with six felonies: two counts of administering drugs, two counts of sexual abuse of a child under the age of 16, and two counts of battery with intent to commit a felony; and two misdemeanor counts of enticing a child under the age of 16.

If convicted of all charges, each man faces up to 71 years in prison.

## Burley mother charged with murder

BURLEY — The mother of Johnny Angel Carranza, who died in March with a fractured skull, waived her preliminary hearing Wednesday in Cassia Magistrate Court.

Maria A. Elias Carranza, 26, of Burley, was arraigned before a local judge Wednesday for a preliminary hearing on first-degree murder charges. Authorities contend that Elias Carranza caused the death of her 11-month-old son, Johnny Angel Carranza, in March.

The infant was taken by Elias Carranza to Cassia Regional Medical Center on March 10 after he suffered seizures at their home, according to court records. The child was transferred by LifeFlight Air Ambulance to Primary Children's Regional Medical Center in Salt Lake City, where doctors determined he was suffering from a non-survivable brain injury caused by blunt trauma to his head.

Doctors told local investigators the infant also had rib injuries that had occurred at a previous time and were beginning to heal. Barrus said the first-degree charges stem from the felony murder statute which states that any person who batens a child under the age of 12 and it dies is guilty of first-degree murder.

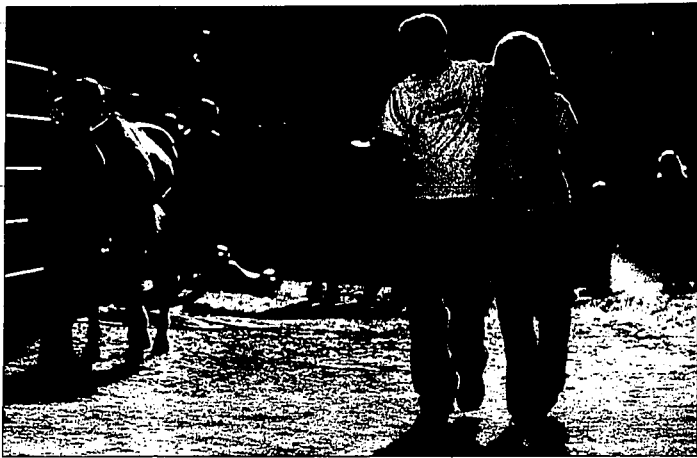
"We were all set to go with the prelim when she waived," Barrus said.

No date has been set for Elias Carranza's next court appearance, which will be an arraignment in district court, Barrus said.

A plea agreement has been tendered in the case, Barrus said, but Elias Carranza has not indicated if she will accept the agreement.

"This is a very serious case and it warrants punishment, so we don't know what she'll do," Barrus said, indicating the agreement was not just a slap on the wrist. Elias Carranza remains jailed on a \$1 million bond awaiting further court proceedings, Barrus said.

## It's better than work

Movie college gives youth on probation a place to play

TWIN FALLS — Michael Clair wasted no time when he arrived in Twin Falls.

It took him a little more than a month after he moved his film college to pitch to the county his program for troubled youth.

"We're excited," said Kevin Sandau, chief probation officer. "Twin Falls historically has been a tough place to find things for kids to do."

But now they'll have at least one thing to do — learn the fine art of film and music creation at the Western States College of Film and Recording, formerly of Gooding but now located on Main Avenue in Twin Falls.

In Gooding, Clair designed his film production classes to give underprivileged youth a chance to enter the field and give youth on probation something productive to do. Available classes include audio and video editing, green screen use, film composing and a monthly film camp.

In addition to short movies, the video students create short

commercial, sometimes for real businesses.

"It's a neat way for them to give back to the community and let people see them in a different light," Clair said. "Now that we're here, I think we can really make a difference with these kids." One probation youth was already visited the school and Clair is drawing up the curriculum for the regular classes. The youth pay the same amount for the classes as everyone else, \$299 each.

Clair is quick to point out that the cost is much less than the \$48,000 per year that regular film schools charge. "People just don't have that

kind of money," he said.

About 40 of the 200 youth who pass through Sandau's camp every month would be right for the program, he estimated. The classes would be a good outlet for youth who paint graffiti or play music, he said.

"I have plenty of kids that have the ability and interest to do this," he said. And the program comes highly recommended. For the second time, Clair has been nominated as one of five people in Idaho to compete for the 5th Annual Volvo For Life award, which honors charitable heroes worldwide.

## Hailey airport sees two small-plane mishaps

HAILEY — Two accidents involving small planes occurred within about an hour of each other at Friedman Memorial Airport in Hailey.

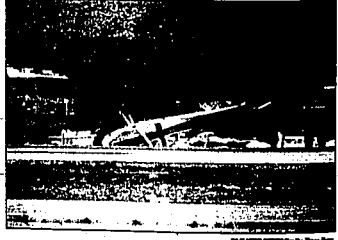

## Murtaugh officials face waste disposal problems

MURTAUGH — Not so fast, the Idaho Department of Environmental Quality is telling Murtaugh City Hall.

A proposal for a 47-unit subdivision to be connected to the city's wastewater treatment plant won't work unless the city upgrades its waste facilities, says Idaho Department of Environmental Quality engineer Greg Misbach. According to Misbach, Murtaugh has

been out of compliance for three years in the amount of nitrites it discharges into the ground from its treatment ponds.

"Growth is a good thing, but what it comes down to from where I'm sitting in my chair is they have to meet regulations," he said. As a result, new Murtaugh mayor Dee Hunsaker will meet with Misbach today to discuss why Murtaugh is out of compliance and what that might bode for the city's future.

Murtaugh, a city with a population of about 150 people, could more than double its population in the future if a proposal advanced by local residents Larry and Louise Ward and Salt Lake City residents Steve and Debra Camp goes forward. In July, the City Council approved a project for 47 homes to be located southwest of the city.

Plans had called for most of the homes to obtain wastewater services from the city. But Misbach said when he read

about the proposal in the Times-News, he contacted the mayor and told him, "We have to have a talk."

Seepage into the ground from infiltration systems has been excessive for the past three years, according to DEQ records.

There is no room for more hookups, Misbach said. Hunsaker said Wednesday that a preliminary study on the problem, required by the DEQ, could cost the city between \$18,000 and \$23,000. Hunsaker

said that the city could encounter problems finding that amount of money.

Louise Ward, who is a real estate agent, said plans are in the works to revise the subdivision in order to avoid the waste issue. The developers plan to remedy the problem by increasing the size of the lots to accommodate septic systems. The lots would be a minimum size of one acre, which is Idaho's minimum requirement size for homes with individual waste systems.

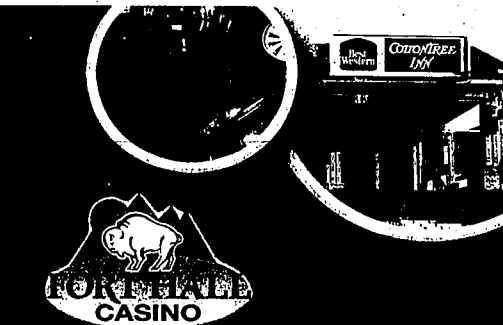

Staying power adds to Hezbollah's appeal

BEIRUT, Lebanon — Still in the fight after three weeks of war with Israel, Hezbollah is riding a surge of popularity in Lebanon and has acquired increased influence in the Lebanese government and its component factions, according to senior Lebanese officials and analysts.

were more attuned to Lebanon's tradition of tolerance and Western orientation than to Hezbollah's mix of Islamic fundamentalism and Arab nationalism.

But the three-week war, now defined for many people here by the deaths at Qana, has tipped an increasing number of secular Shittes toward

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — Diplomats said Wednesday that any U.N. Security Council resolution to stop fighting in Lebanon could take until next week, as the United States and France struggled to bridge wide differences on what to do first: send in peacekeepers to disarm Hezbollah or impose a cease-fire.

making progress on a deal on a Security Council resolution, though the U.N. for the second time canceled a meeting of nations that could send peacekeepers to south Lebanon.

The United States and France claimed they were

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Prime Minister Fouad Siniora, a Sunni Muslim who has long worked to assert government authority in the south and disarm Hezbollah's Shiite militia, gave a telling glimpse of the new attitude in a meeting Sunday with foreign ambassadors. Asked about his relations with Hezbollah by a female reporter clad in the scarf and long dress of a conservative Muslim, he replied that he was a good friend of the movement's leader, Hasan Nasrallah, and admired his militia's fight against Israel.

"I thank his eminence Seyyed Ali for his presence," Siniora said, using Nasrallah's familiar name and title, "and I also thank all those who are sacrificing with their lives for the independence and sovereignty of Lebanon, and I ask God to reserve a place in Heaven for all those who have lost their lives for the sake of Lebanon."

The jump in support for Hezbollah, reticent and feinting as it may be, has become a complicating factor in efforts to end the fighting, according to the Lebanese cabinet minister and other analysts. The United States and Israel have insisted that a cease-fire can consist only as part of an overall settlement, the analysts noted, but the radical Shiite Muslim movement has what amounts to a veto by its presence in the government, its long-proven Orthodox Christian sunbathing it has earned by confronting Israeli forces for 21 days without backing down.

"The war of all Lebanon" declared the headline on a front-page editorial in Tuesday's al-Nahar newspaper. "It has united the Lebanese in position and word, instead of dividing them and sowing dissent among them as some may have hoped," the editorial concluded.

"The main issue is that Hezbollah has not allowed the Israelis to attain anything near their objectives," said Fayez Trabulsi, a former militia leader and political science professor at the Lebanese American University. "This has gained a lot of support for Hezbollah."

Most Sunni Muslims and Christians in Lebanon, a country of about 4 million people, have long shared the Bush administration's goal of bringing Hezbollah under government control by disarming its militia and making the national army the country's only military force. "I hope the Israelis finish the job," said Rina Neme, an Orthodox Christian sunbathing by a swimming pool in the resort of Junyah north of Beirut.

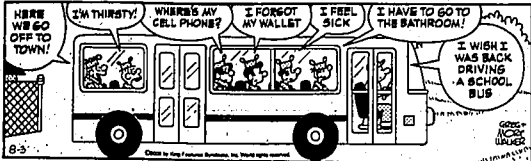

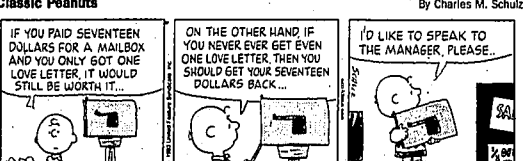

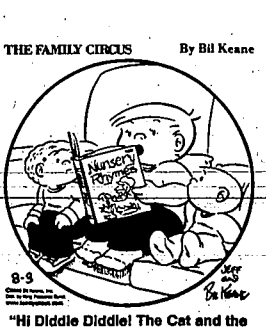

### Students need alternative to four-year colleges

**G**ive Art Vallas points for boldness. It takes moxie for Idaho State University's new president to stand in a "no-fly zone" when the waters are rushing in. Vallas emerged as a voice in the wilderness last week, crying against a statewide community college during the Interim Committee on Community Colleges open hearing in Idaho Falls. Legislators, especially those from the Treasure Valley, are determined to ramp up support for more community colleges, after efforts last fall failed in the Legislature. Vallas, however, said that expanding the system could cost ISU up to \$5 million a year as students in Pocatello go elsewhere for entry-level classwork and professional technical courses. Vallas quipped his skepticism by saying the potential declines are based only on "what-if" scenarios.

The local property tax support for the schools) and you start to see why university presidents are sweating. Vallas may also be balking at the new system, given how one institution — Boise State University — appears to be leading the discussion for it. That raises a number of suspicious points about how a Treasure Valley college would align its curriculum as a feeder school for BSU.

If that is the case, then Vallas needs to jump into the game and fight for ISU's own piece of the pie. The fact remains, however, that larger universities are contributing to the need for community colleges with inflation pushing tuition

higher. Skyrocketing costs for college education are hitting Idaho families hard. ISU, University of Idaho and Boise State University all charge an Idaho resident undergrad around \$2,100 a semester for fees or tuition. At the College of Southern Idaho, it's about half of that. When you can earn an associate's degree at half the cost of a traditional university, many students will take it.

The need for more community colleges has also grown as students struggle to make the transition from high school to a larger four-year school. And then there are students who are more inclined to learn trades and skills, not traditional academic subjects.

Even with those considerations, university officials will fret over more Idaho colleges sharing the same pool of higher ed dollars. It's a reasonable concern, and one that proves further why a property tax should continue to play a part in creating community colleges. Keeping that portion of the funding pie would keep autonomy with these new colleges, and take less away from—the bank-of-higher education.

## Where victory descends into defeat

**I**f you think there is an echo in the air when officials discuss the twin evils in Iraq and Lebanon, you are not hearing things. In both cases, the argument for carrying on the destructive current policy comes down to a claim that "we can't afford to let the other guy win."

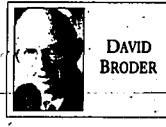
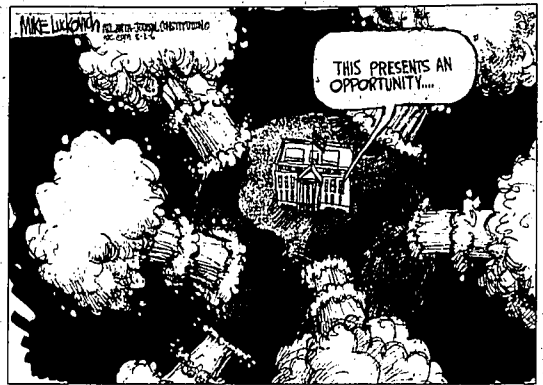
President Bush says over and over that cutting short the occupation of Iraq would turn that country over to the terrorists and embolden them to carry their wicked plots ever closer to our shores. He also endorses — implicitly — Israeli Prime Minister Ehud Olmert's view that an early cease-fire with Lebanon would strengthen Hezbollah and make its prime sponsor, Iran, even more of a threat to its neighbors. That political support enables Olmert to wage the kind of campaign he has in Lebanon.

In both cases, the argument is not that continuing on the present course will necessarily or likely yield a positive result. On the contrary, it is basically a claim that it is unacceptable to change — because the other side will claim a victory.

But if Hezbollah in Lebanon and the insurgents in Iraq really are deadly threats to Israel and the United States, respectively, then those nations should have used their full military might — which is overwhelming — to deal with the menace.

For Israel, that would have meant a large-scale ground and air offensive aimed at driving the Hezbollah forces far from the border and eliminating their missile sites. But Olmert stopped short of making the full commitment to eliminating the enemy, instead waging an effort largely from the air, using U.S.-supplied munitions that is wounding havoc on the civilian population of Lebanon.

For the United States, it would have meant moving into Iraq with a large enough force to overthrow the regime of Saddam Hussein, it topped.

not the pared-down deployment that Defense Secretary Don Rumsfeld insisted would be adequate. And, as Tom Ricks of The Washington Post describes in deadly detail in his book "Fiasco," it would have meant serious planning for the occupation. That planning never took place, making it impossible for Iraqis to live their lives with hope.

In both cases, the leaders of government failed to make the kind of commitment that could have produced a lasting victory.

Now they are reduced to saying that they cannot accept defeat. That is a terrible turn.

But once the hope for victory is gone, the issue remains: What do you do? The answer from Bush and from Olmert is: Carry on. Do not waver. And

do not question the logic of prolonging the agony.

History suggests that is not always the right answer. The United States has failed to achieve victory in two of its recent wars — with very different results.

In Korea, we settled for a stalemate, a line dividing North and South Korea, after Gen. Douglas MacArthur's rush northward brought the Chinese into the fight and led to a terrifying retreat by the American forces. No one would claim that has been an ideal solution. North Korea remains a communist dictatorship, and its nuclear ambitions and missile development are a continuing problem for the United States and the Asian neighbors.

On the other hand, North Korea has not moved against South Korea for more than 50 years, the peace has held.

The other war was in Vietnam. If I know there are still people who believe it was lost in Washington, on Capitol Hill, when it could have been won in the jungles. But the fact is that we with-

draw, and Saigon fell.)

It is hard to remember now, but at the time, we were told that if Ho Chi Minh prevailed, communism would roll south through Malaysia and spread to the Philippines and threaten Australia — to say nothing of American influence in the Pacific. We took those warnings seriously, and so it was a bitter moment when the Viet Cong occupied the old American embassy in Saigon.

And today, the embassy is again open — in Hanoi — and the United States is trading freely with a united Vietnam.

The point is that history and economics have their own logic. A military mission that fails to yield a victory does not always produce disaster. Today, virtually no one argues that we should have continued fighting the North Koreans or the Viet Cong and North Vietnamese. Can we think about the costs of carrying on without an end in sight, against Hezbollah and the insurgents in Iraq?

## Athletic panel not to blame for GPA inaction

**T**he lead story in the July 26 Times-News informed readers that the Twin Falls School District is finally considering the modification of academic standards for students in extracurricular activities. For those who missed the article, students in the Twin Falls School District are allowed to participate in extracurricular activities with a minimum 0.7 grade point average. If the student is taking seven classes, he can participate so long as he earned a minimum five D's and no F's.

In the article, the board stated that it had been waiting for several years to receive a recommendation from the Athletics Advisory Committee on this topic. This statement clearly suggests that in the opinion of the board, this issue has languished at the committee level.

I served on this committee for over three years, including two as chairman. On Feb. 2, 2004 the Athletic Advisory Committee passed a motion recommending the district increase academic standards to a minimum 2.0 GPA for students in extracurricular activities. This topic originated in August 2003 at the request of a committee member (a coach and teacher in the district) who was concerned about low

academic requirements. This topic was thoroughly researched with the support of administrators and a school board trustee who were members of the committee.

After researching how other districts manage this topic, the committee passed a motion to recommend a change. When we surveyed school districts in fall 2003 in surrounding states, 100 percent of those surveyed had at least a 2.0 GPA requirement, as did local districts including Jerome, Filer, Kimberly, Minico and Burley. Many districts surveyed didn't allow any F's.

The motion passed with assurances from both TFFS principal Ben Allen and our school board committee member that the district had sufficient programs and resources to assist students desiring to increase academic performance. We were also told that if additional resources were needed, it would be the responsibility of the district administrator to identify those resources and manage the process.

After numerous attempts on the part of the committee, the board refused to hear and dis-

miss this recommendation.

Particularly disheartening was the voiced opposition from coaches and junior/senior high administrators to the committee's recommendation.

On March 22, 2004, a district coaching staff representative informed the committee that the coaches did not support any change in the existing 0.7 GPA requirement. The presenter told us that if the standard was raised, "we might not be able to beat Highland." On Feb. 15, 2005, a representative of the junior/senior high administrators informed the committee that the administration was content with the existing standards and did not support any change.

While serving as committee chairman in summer of 2004, I was personally told by each board member that the school board would address the issue upon the completion of the November 2004 Idaho High School Activities Association board meeting. However, at our committee meeting on March 16, 2005, the committee was told by the local board that the Advisory committee recommendation would not be discussed or considered at a public board meeting due to the fact that the board, district administration and coaches did not support any type of change.

It is notable that the lack of consideration of this recommendation was contrary to the "2000 and Beyond Strategic Plan" of the Twin Falls District which expresses a commitment to:

- Involve parents and the community in district activities and decision making.
- Establishment of a rigorous curriculum based upon standards and without an end in sight, against Hezbollah and the insurgents in Iraq?

If any district patron would like to review the committee minutes and e-mails that document this process, please feel free to contact me.

On March 30, 2005, I resigned from this committee due to the lack of leadership and action by the board and administration. I ended 16 consecutive years of voluntary service to our district as a frustrated and disappointed patron. It is gratifying to know that current committee chairman Scott McNeley has continued to pursue this important issue. For the board to suggest that the lack of action is the fault of the committee is, at best, distinguished.

# In no way is Hezbollah a victim

Watching the anguish in Lebanon following an Israeli airstrike that killed at least 37 children in Qana Sunday put me in mind of Susan Smith, the South Carolina mother who drowned her children several years ago.

The Smith parcel requires a small stretch of free association, so bear with me.

You'll recall that Smith killed her children, then tried to blame a fictional villain. After allowing her car to slip into a lake — with the boys strapped to their car seats inside — Smith claimed the children had been kidnapped. Her infertile imagination provided a racist cliché: a black man did it.

Fast forward a few years and I bumped into a woman who had just visited Smith in prison, where she is serving a life sentence for the double murder. When I asked how Smith was doing, the woman replied: "Like any grieving mother, she's mourning the loss of her children."

Then Rod Serling stepped into the frame and read the "Twilight Zone" soundtrack. Let's see: You kill your children, and then you get sympathy for your loss?

That dissonant comment has haunted me ever since, and it came to me a few days ago as I watched reports of the Qana airstrike. As the Qana myth unfolds, the children's deaths are blamed on the Middle East's perpetual villain — Israel — while Hezbollah's

millions gnash and wail for the cameras. We are expected to join in vilifying Israel while Hezbollah enjoys a bounce in popularity.

Obviously, the anguish of the Lebanese people is heartfelt and no one celebrates the loss of innocent life. Wait, civilian. No one except Hezbollah, which pioneered that nihilistic addition to modern warfare, the suicide bomber. The suicide bomber's purpose, of course, is to kill as many civilians as possible. Hezbollah excels at that sort of thing. The "Party of God" is also a proud inventor in the use of human shields, especially young children.

Indeed, Hezbollah relies on the civilized world's outrage as part of its strategy. By bringing the war to suburbia in violation of the Geneva Conventions and launching rockets from villages such as Qana, Hezbollah virtually ensures that civilians will die. Pending an investigation, many facts are unknown, including whether the building in which the children died came down as a result of Israeli fire. The Associated Press and others now report that the Israeli strike on Qana came

between midnight and 1 a.m., but the building didn't collapse until 7 or 8 a.m., possibly as a result of munitions inside the building.

Whatever the case, Israeli Defense Forces had dropped leaflets into Qana a week beforehand, warning residents to evacuate. Although international humanitarian law forbids the deliberate targeting of civilian areas, exceptions are tolerated under certain circumstances.

As Human Rights Watch explains on its Web site (humanrights.org), a civilian area can be targeted if it "makes an effective contribution to the enemy's military activities and its destruction, capture or neutralization offers a definite military advantage" to the attacking side in the circumstances ruling at the time.

The humanitarian guidelines also call for "proportionality" in "dual use" areas and for precautions to protect civilians. Parsing the language of "dual use" when bombs are killing sleeping children seems absurd when measured against such senseless loss. But it is also necessary if we are to maintain perspective against a cowardly enemy who hides among women and children, then relies on emotion to gain traction on the battlefield of public opinion.

Why some residents of Qana didn't leave given fair warning is a point of speculation, but Hezbollah reportedly has blocked residents from evacu-

ating other areas. Proportionality is a trickier question, but let's be clear on the issue of moral equivalence. There is none. Hezbollah aims to kill civilians; Israel aims not to. But by firing rockets from civilian areas, Hezbollah forces Israel to return fire, thus including the condemnation of civilized nations and fueling the reliable outrage of the Arab street.

The fog of war may prevent absolute clarity, but this much seems certain: Those dead women and children are casualties of Hezbollah, not Israel. As in the case of Susan Smith, we mourn the deaths of the children, but have no sympathy for the responsible party. Only in the Twilight Zone is Hezbollah a victim.

# Bombs and mortars kill 14 on soccer fields in Baghdad

BAGHDAD, Iraq — Bombs exploded on a soccer field Wednesday killing 11 young people, and at least 42 other people — two of them Americans — died elsewhere in sectarian or political violence. Still, the president said plans are on track for Iraqis to take over security.

The two homemade bombs went off on a soccer field in the mostly Shiite district of Amil in west Baghdad, killing both players and spectators ranging in age from 15 to 25, police 1st Lt. Maltham Abdul Razzaq said.

Two mortar shells struck another Shiite district, Abu Dahir, killing three people under age 15, police Capt. Firas Qutub said. One shell exploded on a soccer field and the other hit a house, wounding a couple and their child, he said.

Two Americans died in combat in Anbar province, the Sunni insurgent stronghold west of Baghdad; the U.S. command said. One was a Marine assigned to the Army's 1st Armored Division and the other was a soldier with the 9th Naval Construction Regiment, the command said.

No group claimed responsibility for the Baghdad attacks, which appeared to be part of the tit-for-tat attacks by Sunni and Shiite extremists. The attacks threaten the unity government of Prime Minister Nouri al-Maliki, which took office May 20.

The surge in sectarian violence has prompted the U.S. command to send at least 5,700 American soldiers from the northern city of Mosul to reclaim the capital's streets

from Sunni insurgents, Shiite militias, rogue police, criminals and freelance gunmen.

Despite the violence, President Jalal Talabani said the government remains confident it can cope with the security crisis and vanquish extremist groups, calling recent attacks "the last arrows in their quivers."

"We are highly optimistic that we will terminate terrorism this year," Talabani said. "The Iraqi forces will take over security in all Iraq provinces by the end of this year gradually, and if God's will, we will take the lead."

Talabani's prediction was far rosier than those from U.S. commanders and Iraqi officials, and the president's staff quickly sought to explain that he was referring to the beginning of a "process" for Iraqis to assume control, not the final step.

The Iraqis have been given security responsibility in only one of 18 provinces — Muthanna. It is a remote southern province with an overwhelmingly Shiite population and is among the most peaceful in the country.

"What he meant is that the process will be under way by the end of this year," said Talabani's media adviser, Ilwaa Osman. "We are not expecting a complete hand-over by the end of this year — nobody really is."

Defense Secretary Donald H. Rumsfeld said he did not see Talabani's remarks but hopes Iraqis will take over as conditions permit. "He's the president of Iraq, and he can make his statements. And I didn't see the context of it or the translation of it, and I can't comment beyond what our policy is."

# British drug testing program fuels civil liberties debate

FAVERSHAM, England — A British school has launched a pilot program where students as young as 11 are subjected to random drug tests — a project that has generated interest in Washington and fed a civil liberties debate on both sides of the Atlantic.

The Abbey School in this southeastern market town is testing students by mouth swab for traces of heroin, cocaine and marijuana. Parents must give permission for the testing, and even then students can refuse.

Former headmaster Peter Walker, who started the program, gave up his school job to become Britain's official

ambassador for drug testing. He recently went to Washington to give a presentation to John Walters, director of the White House drug policy office.

Since the program began in January 2005, only one out of nearly 600 students has tested positive for marijuana — a record Walker attributes to students steering clear of drugs

because of the tests. "I've got nothing to hide," says Daniel Kelly, 14, who was plucked out of class to have his mouth swabbed and saliva tested for drugs. He doesn't mind the testing, saying that since it applies to most students: "It's not as if I'm the only one." Critics say the tests violate students' privacy and could open the door to lawsuits.

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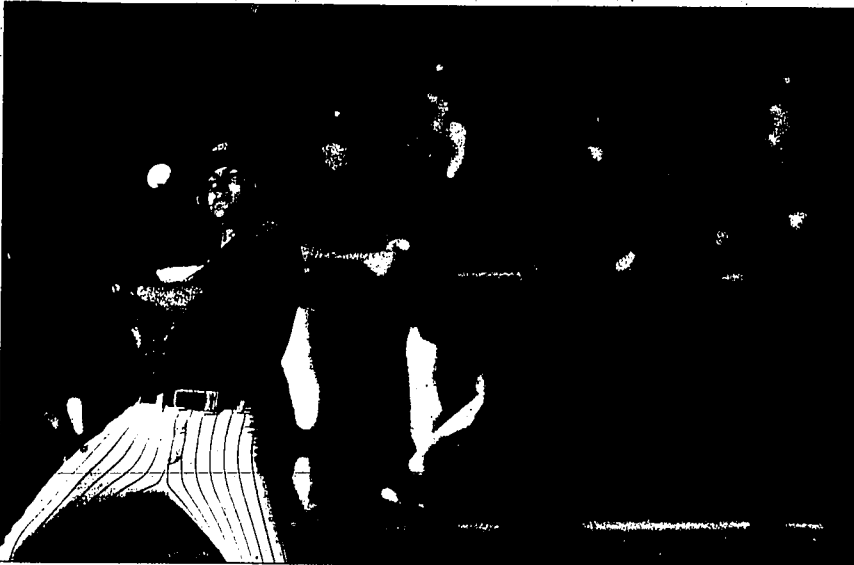

## Woods is loose after British Open victory

GRAND BLANC, Mich. — Tiger Woods smiled and joked with pro-am partner Jerome Bettis as they walked off the ninth hole.

Woods later walked across a green when he spotted a friend from junior golf, Gilberto Morales. After a warm embrace they spent the next 15 minutes catching up between shots. Woods also posed for pictures, signed autographs and did a TV interview Wednesday, the day before the start of the Buick Open.

The last time he was in the public eye, the scene was dramatically different.

He was sobbing uncontrollably in the arms of caddy Steve Williams and wife Elin two weeks ago, at the British Open after winning for the first time since his father's death in May. The touching moment was replayed on TV and captured by photographers, but Woods said he hasn't seen it.

"I remember being in Steve's arms and crying like a baby and him pushing me away into my wife and just bawling there. I've never done that," he said. "It was the first time I've been in a golf tournament without Dad, either seeing me or being around physically where I could call him."

"Those days are over. I've never had that again."

Woods said the timing of one of his regular stops — two weeks before the

PGA Championship — couldn't be better.

"It works out perfect," said Woods, playing the Buick Open for the eighth time. "I got a chance to unwind for a few days, and then get back up and ready for this event."

"I have all next week to go home — well, maybe go home, hurricane might be blasting through again. I get to go somewhere and practice and get ready. I always find it nice to get ready in solitude and have my gun where I want it when I go into a major championship."

But before Woods heads for Medinah in suburban Chicago, where he won the 1999 PGA championship, he'd like to win his second Buick Open.

...Buick, one of Woods' sponsors, announced it signed a four-year contract extension with Warwick Hills to keep the Buick Open here through 2010. The tournament will end July 1 next year, placing it between the U.S. and British Opens instead of early August.

"I think it's still a good place on the schedule because guys will want to get a tournament in between those two majors," Woods said before being whisked away in a Buick. Vijay Singh will attempt to be the first to win three straight Buick Opens and four overall in a field that includes four of the top five players on the money list, with only Phil Mickelson missing.

## Phelps wins twice at U.S. nationals

IRVINE, Calif. — Michael Phelps was a double winner in the U.S. Summer National swimming championships Wednesday night, and threatened his world record in the 200-meter butterfly before falling off the pace.

"The butterfly has been the stroke that has felt the best the past two weeks," he said. "To come in and be so close, it's kind of disappointing."

Phelps led all the way in the 200 fly and was 0.02 seconds under his world-record pace after 100 meters. But he came apart on the third lap, although he still beat Michigan training partner Davis Tarwater by nearly 3 seconds.

Phelps won in 1 minute, 54.32 seconds.

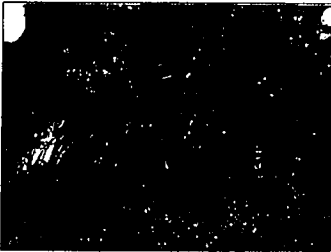
"I haven't done a best time since 2003 in the 200 fly," he said. "It's disappointing for me to be so close so many times and not get there. I want to do a best time. That's my goal. By the end of this week we'll like to do a best time in my best event."

Tarwater finished in 1:57.00 and Danel Medwed of the same North Baltimore club, where Phelps started, was third.

About 45 minutes earlier, Phelps and his Club Wolverine teammates, Klete Keller and Peter Vanderkaay, swept the top three spots in the 200 freestyle. Ryan Lochte was fourth.

Phelps won in 1:45.53. Keller, the 400 free champion Tuesday, was second in 1:46.62.

Phelps picked up his 29th and 30th national titles, tying him with Ann Curtis for fifth on the career list.

He is 2-for-2 so far this week, having won the 400 individual medley Tuesday despite being unshy with his time. Phelps is scheduled to swim four more races before the meet ends Saturday.

"I'm more satisfied with the two swims tonight than I was with the one yesterday," he said. "The top three finishers earned spots on the U.S. team for the Pan Pacific Championships later this month in Victoria, British Columbia."

World-record holder Aaron Peirsol held off Randall Bal to win the 100 backstroke in his hometown pool.

Peirsol touched in 53.38 seconds — his second-best time behind his world mark of 53.17 set last year. Bal finished in 53.91 and Peter Marshall was third. Bal led through 50 meters and was 0.2 seconds under Peirsol's world-record pace, but Peirsol came off the wall faster and moved out to the lead.

"Randall and I swim the race totally different. Randall's a great front-halter. If I can stay with him, my part is the back half," said Peirsol, still gasping for air afterward. "I knew I was in good position coming off that wall. When I started pumping just a little more, I felt really good and I just kept going."

Natalie Coughlin, a five-time medalist in the Athens Olympics, withstood the challenge of 17-year-old Katie Hoff to win the 200 freestyle.

Coughlin took the lead after 150 meters and won in 1:29.11. Hoff, whose morning preliminary time erased Coughlin's meet record, finished at 1:28.16. Dana Vollmer, a 2004 Olympian, was third.

Coughlin won't swim the 200 free at Pan Pacs. But she had to Wednesday to try to earn a spot on the 200 free relay team. That forced her to miss up-her specialty, the 100 back, which she'll return to in Canada.

# Owens, Bledsoe struggling to find a rhythm so far

After the deep ball that didn't come close in a drill without the pass that was underthrown in double coverage and the one that went high, wide and out of bounds, Drew Bledsoe must have sensed frustration rising in Terrell Owens.

So the quarterback made a pre-emptive strike Wednesday morning. Soon after they went to the sideline. Bledsoe went looking for Owens, walking about 50 yards merely to give him an encouraging pat on the rear.

Such an exchange between most quarterbacks and receivers would hardly be noticed, especially during the seventh practice of training camp. However, everything that happens between this receiver and his quarterback is news-worthy.

So, I.O., is everything OK between you and the coach?

"Every day is a day of improvement," Owens said following the practice and a chat with coach Bill Parcells, which included technical talk about hand placement on a specific type of catch.

"If we take a step back, we go back to the drawing board and we try to correct our mistakes and build on those the next day. Every day is critical, but it's no reason to panic right now."

The early session Wednesday in Oxnard, Calif., was the second straight in which Bledsoe and Owens were out of whack.

"We're getting there," Owens said. "We're not there, but as I said from Day 1, this is what training camp and practice is all about. We're not going to get it done in one day, a week. The season is yet to get here. Once the season starts, I feel we'll be ready."

Owens' attitude is a good sign for the Cowboys. They've invested \$10 million this season alone in Owens being on his best behavior and so far he's shown no signs of the problems that prompted San Francisco and Philadelphia to give up on him regardless of his All-Pro ability.

Owens is the only newcomer among Dallas' top four receiving threats. Bledsoe already is comfortable throwing to Terry Glenn, Jason Witten and Patrick Crayton, so part of the problem with Owens right now could be the normal feeling-out process all quarterbacks and receivers must go through.

"That's what those drills are for. No. 1 to get our timing down to an absolute for me to get some balls in my hands so I can get familiar with his touch," Owens said.

Parcells wouldn't elaborate on his talk with Owens, but the receiver called it "a good conversation."

"At this point, we're just trying to take it day-by-day, camp practice-by-camp practice," Owens said. "It's been fun so far."

Owens said they discussed "a little bit of everything," from football to diets.

"He's eating healthy these days," Owens said. "He's slurred down, ... I kind of complimented him on his good shape coming into camp."

Also Wednesday, the Cowboys and star safety Roy Williams agreed to a five-year deal worth \$25.2 million, with \$11.1 million guaranteed.

Williams was entering the final year of his rookie contract. The new deal gives him a raise this season and locks him up

for four more years, through 2010.

"I am going to be a Cowboy for life," said Williams, who came to Dallas as the eighth overall pick in 2002. "I'm staying here."



**Giants**

The effects of his first concussion left Jeremy Shockey nauseous, sensitive to light, reduced his motor skills and made it difficult for him to sleep, the three-time Pro Bowl tight end said Wednesday.

"Don't get too close. I might get sick," a soft-spoken and rather subdued Shockey said. "I am feeling better but I have headaches and I am pretty sensitive to light."

The comments at lunch were Shockey's first to the media since he sustained what the Giants described as a mild concussion in a collision with safety Will Demps late in a training camp workout on Monday night at the University at Albany.

"I have never had a concussion," said the 25-year-old Shockey, noting that he has taken some big hits to his head before. "It's just a strange thing."

**Patriots**

New England linebacker Tedy Bruschi missed his fourth consecutive practice Wednesday because of what coach Bill Belichick termed a "probably" sore wrist. Bruschi is listed as day-to-day.

The extent of the injury is unclear, but the Boston Herald on Wednesday reported that the wrist might be fractured and Bruschi would be sidelined at least a week while the team

determined the severity of the injury.

The 33-year-old Bruschi missed the first six games last season after suffering a mild stroke 10 days after the Patriots' 2005 Super Bowl victory over Philadelphia.

After saying he would sit out the season, Bruschi returned in late October and helped lead the Patriots to a third straight division title. He shared the Comeback Player of the Year award last season with Carolina receiver Steve Smith.

**Buccaneers**

All-Pro cornerback Ronde Barber signed a five-year contract extension Wednesday that he hopes will give him an opportunity to play his entire career with Tampa Bay. The 10th-year pro was entering the final year of a six-year

contract he signed after the 2000 season. The new deal is worth up to \$24 million.

Last season, Barber became the first cornerback in the NFL history with at least 20 career interceptions and 20 career sacks. With 28 interceptions in nine seasons, he trails Donnie Abraham by three on Tampa Bay's career list.

**Chiefs**

Kansas acquired running back Michael Bennett from New Orleans on Wednesday for an undisclosed 2007 draft pick, but insisted that didn't mean Priest Holmes would retire.

Holmes, holder of many Chiefs rushing and touchdown records, is being held out of contact by doctors because of a neck and spinal cord injury he sustained in a game last October at San Diego.

Thyroid medication or all three were behind the elevated testosterone-epitesterone levels uncovered in his initial sample.

Soon enough, Landis tailored his story again and insisted his body's natural metabolism caused the elevated results. He also said he'd undergo further tests to prove it.

Two developments in the days since suggest those tests probably aren't necessary.

The first, which Landis' lawyer has confirmed, had a testosterone-epitesterone ratio of 11:1, so far above the 4:1 limit that even Charlie Steen would have trouble explaining it away. The second was a report in the New York Times that a second analysis of the "A" sample, called a carbon isotope ratio test, had detected synthetic testosterone in Landis' system.

So much for the cyclist's "my-body-makes-too-much-of-the-stuff" defense.

Where Landis goes from there is anybody's guess. He's staying out of view for several days now, a smart thing considering the last time he turned up, he was sporting a baseball cap turned backward, a few days' growth of beard and reading from a prepared statement that made him look wooden and sound even worse.

Landis gets another chance to clear his name when a second set of tests on his "B" or "control" sample, is expected to be released Saturday. A negative result and just like that, he walks away free and clear.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HOLLISTER, IDAHO, PROHIBITING THE STORAGE OF DAMAGED HOUSEHOLD GOODS OR EQUIPMENT, AND PROVIDING THAT VIOLATION OF THE ORDINANCE SHALL BE PUNISHABLE AS A GENERAL MISDEMEANOR.  
BE OBTAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HOLLISTER, IDAHO: The words contained in this Ordinance are defined as follows: **HOUSEHOLD GOODS AND EQUIPMENT:** All articles usually referred to as household goods and articles used in housekeeping including but not limited to chairs, tables, davenports, beds, refrigerators, stoves, washers, dryers, furnaces, appliances, grease, oil, paint and their containers. **MACHINERY:** All articles of industrial, farm or domestic machinery or equipment, including but not limited to all metal or wooden machinery, motors, equipment, tools or property. **MISCELLANEOUS PROPERTY:** All other property including but not limited to old toys, iron trunks, copper, tin, lead, rubber, bags, baggage, bottles, scrap, toys, bicycles or boats. **MOTOR VEHICLES:** Any vehicle propelled or drawn by power other than muscular power designed to travel on the ground by wheels, tracks, or stored upon said property for a period of time exceeding forty (40) days and any transport portions of property or pull machinery, including but not limited to automobiles, trucks, trailers, motorcycles, mopeds, buggies or wagons.

**PERSON:** Any individual, corporation or partnership. No person shall place, allow, discard, maintain, park or store any dismantled, abandoned, non-operating, junked, damaged or destroyed household goods or equipment, motor vehicles, machinery or miscellaneous property as herein defined upon any public street, alley, sidewalk or other public property within the City. 

## Beef trade will take time to rebuild

## Economist: Regaining trust with Japanese will be a slow process

OMAHA, Neb. — Now that Japan has lifted its ban on U.S. beef, American beef producers are eager to resume trade there, but analysts say restoring sales to pre-ban levels and regaining the trust of Japanese consumers will be a slow process.

"The Japanese consumer likely has a lot of questions about the safety of the U.S. product," said Darrell Mark, an

agricultural economist with the University of Nebraska's Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources.

Fears of mad cow disease prompted Japan and other countries to ban U.S. beef in 2003, but that ban was lifted in December.

Safety concerns prompted a new ban in January when Japanese inspectors checking a veal shipment found banned parts believed to be at risk of carrying the illness. The latest ban was lifted Thursday after

Japanese representatives toured U.S. facilities to ensure they met safety guidelines.

Mad cow disease — formally known as bovine spongiform encephalopathy, or BSE — is a degenerative nerve disease in cattle. In humans, eating meat contaminated with BSE is linked to variant Creutzfeldt-Jakob disease, a rare and deadly neurodegenerative disease.

U.S. officials and industry representatives maintain that there is no reason to question the safety of American beef, and groups like the Denver-based U.S. Meat Export Federation have already started trying to convince the Japanese.

The federation has tried to

keep Japanese customers informed about new procedures and safety precautions, federation spokesman Lynn Heinze said. There will also be a campaign to let Japanese beef importers and consumers know that American beef producers care about safety of their product, he said.

The beef trade with Japan is "important to the industry because it was the top export market for U.S. beef. About \$1.4 billion of U.S. beef was sold in Japan in 2003."

Beef producers from Australia, New Zealand and South America have moved into the Japanese market since 2003, but Heinze said less beef

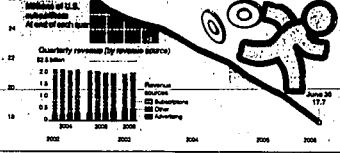
is being eaten in Japan today than before the scare about mad cow disease.

Before the ban, beef accounted for about 5 percent of the protein consumed in Japan, he said. Now, beef accounts for only about 3.5 percent.

Opinion polls the federation has conducted in Japan show that less than 10 percent of consumers say they're confident the U.S. Department of Agriculture's inspections will ensure beef is safe. At the height of U.S. beef sales there, only about 20 percent of Japanese consumers expressed confidence in the inspections, he said.

## Strategy shift

## AOL makes more of its services free

NEW YORK — Stepping up the chase for online advertising dollars, AOL will give away e-mail accounts and software now available only to its paying customers in a strategy shift likely to accelerate the decline in its core Internet access business.

The decision, announced Wednesday by AOL parent Time Warner Inc., removes the few remaining reasons for AOL subscribers to keep paying when they already have high-speed Internet access through a cable or phone company.

AOL hopes that by making services free, it can draw Internet users to its ad-supported Web sites and keep them from defecting to Yahoo! Inc., Google Inc. and Microsoft Corp., which have offered free e-mail for years.

"We're going to stop sending our members to competitors," said Jeff Bewkes, Time Warner's president and chief operating officer.

The move marks the end of an era for a company that grew rapidly in the 1990s by making it easy to connect online, giving millions of Americans their first taste of e-mail, the Web and instant messaging through discs that continually arrived unsolicited in mailboxes.

"This is the final goodbye to the days when AOL was the king of the internet," said Jeff Lanctot, general manager of a Quantive Inc.'s Avenue A/Razorfish, an agency that places some ads on AOL sites. "The way you know they are the underdog."

Lanctot said AOL could pull off the strategy shift given its "tremendous potential" to tap video and other resources from other Time Warner units as well as a sizable subscriber base — which, while dwindling, still makes AOL the leading Internet access provider.

AOL has about 6.2 million U.S. subscribers who have broadband but pay extra — generally \$15 a month — for AOL services, meaning AOL could lose more than \$1 billion in annual revenue from those customers alone.

Executives believe they can find that amount in savings by the end of 2007 by cutting marketing, network and overhead costs.

"Acquiring narrowband subscribers has been unprofitable," Bewkes said. "If we did nothing else and just this, this one move alone would increase earnings." But every year I do better and better."

losing dial-up subscribers, perhaps at a faster rate as the company scales back its notorious aggressive retention efforts. Time Warner and AOL executives refused Wednesday to provide their estimates on subscriber losses.

AOL will still offer dial-up accounts at \$26 a month for unlimited use, but the company no longer will aggressively market the service. That's likely to mean the end of promotional CDs and an unspecified number of job cuts in marketing and customer service.

And to compete with lower-cost dial-up services from companies like Verizon Online Inc., AOL is creating a new \$10 monthly plan with unlimited access but fewer features than the \$26 plan.

Free e-mail accounts are available immediately, while some other features, primarily parental controls, won't become free until early September.

Subscribers who dropped AOL within the past two years — about 6 million households, some with multiple e-mail addresses — will be able to reclaim their old AOL.com addresses simply by logging on with their old passwords.

The changes were announced Wednesday as Time Warner reported a profit of \$1 billion for the second quarter. Its cable TV business grew thanks to more high-speed Internet and digital phone customers, offsetting weakness at AOL, which saw a 2 percent drop in revenue.

AOL accounts for one-fifth of Time Warner's revenue, and most of that contribution comes from subscription sales.

So the bet here is that advertising can rise fast enough to supply the declines in subscription revenue. After factoring in cost savings, it's a trend possibly already in action. In the second quarter, AOL's ad sales rose 40 percent, while subscription revenue dropped 11 percent.

BUHL — It was during the dog days of last summer that Joy Pleticha came up with a cool idea.

The Buhl resident, a regular vendor at festivals and farmers' markets, noticed people wearing cooling ties around their necks that they purchased at other booths.

She had been making and selling dog bandannas when she thought of using the same principle to make dogs comfortable in hot weather — a "Cool-Danna."

"I talked to ladies that made them and found out what it was they use in those to cool them down," she said. "Actually, it's a soil additive you put in soil so it will hold moisture, called 'Soil Moist.'"

Pleticha checked with the company that makes it and found that it makes it and the polycrylamide crystals in Soil Moist are non-toxic. They told her if a dog should decide to chew it, to just give him a drink of water.

To make a Cool-Danna, she folds over a dog kerchief, stitches one end, measures five bits of the crystals into a funnel, pours it inside, then

sews up the other end.

When soaked in water for 20 minutes, the Cool-Danna swells up and remains cool all day. Pleticha sells the small Cool-Dannas for \$3, medium Cool-Dannas for \$3.50 and large Cool-Dannas for \$4.

Rubie is one of Pleticha's satisfied customers. She is a "vixen," a medium-size, red Hungarian hunting dog who knows what she wants.

Her owner, Angie Hollon (Pleticha's daughter), said Rubie will go to her Cool-Danna, pick it up and then take it to her.

"She pretty much brings it up and says, 'put it on me,'" Hollon said.

Pleticha said during a recent family camping trip, Rubie wore it every day. And when the temperature dipped, she wanted her jacket on.

"She went over to it and was 'staring' at it," she said. "So we like 'OK you can have

your jacket."

The jacket is also Pleticha's creation. She turns out the fleece jackets in a variety of colors and patterns in seven different sizes. They are designed for warmth and comfort and have velcro closures.

"I've bought jackets for my dogs and I'm never happy with the way they fit," she said. "They're binding or uncomfortable looking, so I just wanted a simple little jacket that had no sleeves in it. Just to keep their backs warm."

While chilling out in the heat of the day or warming up when it's cool, dogs can enjoy dog treats she bakes for sale through her home-based Dog House Bakery. They have no additives, preservatives or artificial coloring. She uses canola-oil-and-whole-wheat flour and puts fresh fruit and vegetables in them.

Pleticha was optimistic enough to quit her day job three years ago to concentrate on her new business.

"I'm still in the red, but it's getting closer," she said. "At the end of five years, I will assess whether or not I should continue going. But every year I do better and better."

One more time, Santana plans on a 'healthy' career

Don't think for a second that Crosby, Stills, Nash & Young have the market cornered on Hall of Famers spouting political views.

It's the first topic that springs from that shamanistic mystic Carlos Santana during our brief phone chat. I think a lot of people are afraid that America's becoming like the Spanish Inquisition. You can't actually say what you feel now.

"During Vietnam we said it was wrong to kill people. It's wrong not to show the war on TV, because then it's impersonal." When we saw Vietnam on TV, all of a sudden it was about our sisters and brothers and sons and daughters. Right now we don't look at it like that. We look at it like an accountant looks at numbers."

Clearly he remains almost as outspoken as his peers. Yet—there is a crucial difference between CSN&S's soapbox stance and Santana's show.

"I speak very little about this during the concert," he says. "I just say, 'This song is called 'Evil Ways,' and we dedicate it to George Bush.' But the song right after that is (Coltrane's) 'A Love Supreme.' That's the difference. We still believe that the power of love will transcend the love for power."

"For me it's about consciousness. It's not important to bash Democrats or Republicans, to Bush, Starbucks, Nike, Coca-Cola. That's what patriotism is to me. Just products that people can invest in emotionally and financially. For me, it's more important to utilize the music to..."

He cut-off his own thought to make a point. "Are you ready for this one? This is the one that counts."

"OK, shoot. My role is to remind individuals that there is divinity in our DNA."

President takes steps to clear streets of protesters

MEXICO CITY — The national government urged Mexico City officials Wednesday to clear the streets of protest camps supporting leftist Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador's battle to be declared winner of last month's disputed presidential election. The camps put up Sunday have blocked the main avenues in the capital's financial and cultural heart, snarling traffic, hurting business and causing Mexico's stock market and currency to falter.

President Vicente Fox's administration has said it will not intervene with federal forces unless the city government requests them. That is unlikely since the local government is controlled by Lopez Obrador's Democratic Revolution Party.

At a morning news conference, Fox spokesman Ruben Aguilar called on city officials to find a legal and peaceful way to end the street protests. He said the demonstrations were costing the capital commerce and keeping people from their jobs. "The city of Mexico is for everyone," Aguilar said, reading a statement from Fox's office. "Democracy should be defended by respecting it."

"They want to win in the streets something they weren't able to win at the voting booth," Calderon told reporters Tuesday. A more combative atmosphere has spread through the

# Storm Chris threatens to be first hurricane

**SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico** — Tropical Storm Chris swept through the eastern Caribbean on Wednesday, forcing cruise ships to change course and causing at least a few small islands off the coast of Puerto Rico as it threatened to become the first hurricane of the Atlantic season.

The storm had just sustained winds up to 41 mph as it whirled past the northern Leeward Islands and moved west-north-

west toward the U.S. Virgin Islands, the British Virgin Islands and Puerto Rico. A hurricane watch was issued in the southeastern Bahamas and the Turks and Caicos Islands, the National Hurricane Center said. The watch meant hurricane conditions of winds of at least 74 mph were possible by late Thursday.

The storm was projected to pass at least 100 miles north of Puerto Rico, but could produce strong gusts of wind and up to 8 inches of rain. Authorities in the U.S. territory warned of possible flash floods and mudslides. The center of the storm was about 115 miles northeast of St. Thomas in the U.S. Virgin Islands at late Wednesday afternoon.

Royal Caribbean, the cruise line operator, said it was changing the itineraries of three ships — the Navigator of the Seas, the Explorer of the Seas and the Freedom of the Seas — to keep them clear of the storm. Royal Caribbean will continue to closely monitor weather conditions, the company said. Trevor Basden, senior meteorologist with the Bahamas National Emergency Management Agency, said he expected Chris to strengthen into a weak hurricane as it passed through the island

chain. He said the storm was likely to reach the Bahamas on Friday morning. Bahamian officials advised people to stock up on water and canned food and be prepared to take precautions — such as heading up their homes — if the storm reaches hurricane strength. There were no reports of major damage or injuries as the storm skirted the Leeward Islands. In Anguilla, Chris brought heavy rain and strong winds overnight but the storm was

much less severe than expected because it shifted to the north at the last minute, said Elizabeth Klute, director of the disaster management agency for the British Caribbean territory. The first named storm of the 2006 season, Tropical Storm Alberto, swept over Florida in mid-June, then plowed northward along the U.S. coast past the Outer Banks. It was blamed for one death. Last year's hurricane season was the worst in more than 150 years of record-keeping.

## Cuban focus remains on Fidel

**HAVANA** — Fidel Castro still appeared to be running the show in Cuba on Wednesday after undergoing abdominal surgery and naming his brother acting president, while police and civilian groups paraded neighborhoods that have seen civil disturbances in the past. Raúl Castro remained out of public view two days after the temporary leadership change was announced. The state news media's focus remained solely on the elder Castro and his recovery, creating uncertainty about who was really in charge.

"The revolution will continue while Fidel recovers," proclaimed Juventud Rebelde, the Communist youth newspaper. "Fidel, get well," read a front-page headline in the Communist Party daily Granma.

Parliament Speaker Ricardo Alarcon told the New York-based independent radio show Democracy Now! that Castro was "very alive and very alert" when the men spoke Tuesday. Other than that, there was no new information about Castro's health. State television has broadcast no new images of either brother since the handover was announced.

It was unclear why Raúl Castro had not appeared. While the elder Castro could be reluctant to relinquish power after his 47-year rule, even temporarily — to the brother he reportedly trusts more than anyone, state media also could be focusing solely on Fidel out of respect and habit. Raúl, who has long referred to his elder brother, could be keeping a low profile for the same reasons.

The latest statement attributed to Castro was issued Tuesday night in an effort to assure the Cuban people all was well. It said his health was stable and the island was safe from potential attack.

Even so, there appeared to be an increase in police patrols in some working-class neighborhoods and in coastal areas that have seen civil unrest, such as during running power blackouts in the summer of 2005.

The Committees for the Defense of the Revolution, the government's neighborhood watch groups, stepped up volunteer night patrols. Rapid Action Brigades, pro-government civilian groups, used in the past to handle civil disturbances, were placed on standby.

Many Castro supporters expressed confidence Wednesday that the use of the Communist system would remain intact, no matter what happens to the only ruler most Cubans have ever known.

"Either way, the revolution has to keep going," said Carlos Santos Perez. "Fidel is a leader, but there are many leaders here, like his brother."

In Washington, Republican senators began drafting legislation to implement a plan by the White House to give \$80 million over two years to Cuban dissidents fighting for democratic change.

Sen. Robert Bennett, R-Utah, said President Bush told him the administration was caught off-guard by Castro's illness. "I think all of us can say we had no idea this was coming," he said.

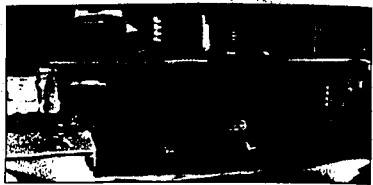

## Xbox Live Arcade rolls out old-school arcade games

The Xbox 360 is the most advanced video game console on the market right now. But apparently, high-def graphics and stereo surround sound aren't enough for everyone.

Microsoft Corp. recently began a promotion to showcase a "new" retro game each Wednesday on its Xbox Live Arcade casual games service. A subscription to Xbox Live, the company's online service, is required to download and play.

I checked out several titles available such as the recently added "Frogger," as well as a few classics that have been available on Xbox Live Arcade for a while now like "Robotron: 2084" and "Zaxxon."

For the most part, these arcade games capture the look, sound, and feel of the originals, sans a quarter slot.

And several things make the updates better: the ability to play "Frogger," for example, on a high-def widescreen TV with others in cooperative multiplayer; online mode was even more addicting than playing alone.

You can also compare high scores on an online leaderboard to see who's best at dodging speeding traffic and hopping over floating logs and turtles.

The graphics aren't going to win any awards, but "Frogger,"

gets a bit of a facelift with richer colors and more detailed graphics. Some, however, might miss the blocky graphics of the original.

"Joust" and "Robotron: 2084" were already fun retro games offered available for download. Last week's release doesn't really fit into Microsoft's old-school lineup, but it's a good game nonetheless.

"Cloning Clyde" is a new side-scrolling title where you play a human who tries to escape from a cloning lab, by morphing into mutant chickens and frog creatures. Each animal-human hybrid gives your character unique abilities needed to navigate the maze-like levels.

The upcoming release schedule looks even more promising with the space shooter "Galaga" (one of my all-time favorite games), the browser "Street Fighter II: Hyper Fighting" and the dot-munching "Pac-Man."

But these games, old as most of them are, are a bit pricey at \$5 to \$15 each. That's a lot of quarters.

Buying the games is itself a process in currency conversion. You have to first buy "Microsoft Points" which you can then redeem on games and other items on Xbox Live.

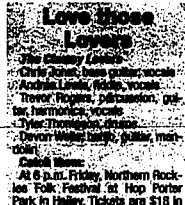
I spent \$27.06 (tax included) for 2000 points, enough to buy four games and still have a few hundred points left over. This is on top of the \$50 a year for my Xbox Live Gold membership.

# Their own private Idaho

## Clumsy Lovers aren't a homegrown band, but they just as well be



"Sure, it was nice to have an underground sort of thing going," said fiddler Andrea Lewis during a recent cell phone interview as she zipped through Vancouver traffic in her Mini Cooper after a visit with her father. "But I wish more people would realize that having one of your songs played at The Gap is more like props than selling out."

But after nearly a decade cramped in a touring van, Lewis said the group wanted — no, deserved — more for putting up with the rigors of the road.

"You don't have to pay me to play the violin," Lewis said. "You do have to pay me to sit in airports, stay in hotels and ride around in a van."  
So they found Network.

Actually, Network found them. As a Canadian awards show, label representatives approached the Lovers and offered them what Lewis would later call "a great deal." Network would produce and market a new album, plus cover the costs of the group's then-latest record, "After the Flood."

"It was against it at the time," said Lewis, who was worried about losing the momentum the band had built on its own. "Luckily, I got outvoted. It's pretty hard to turn down a deal like that when it's sitting in front of you."

"Smart Kid," the ensuing album released in 2005, marks the Lovers' push toward a more marketable sound. Three-and-a-half minute songs, studio effects and lots of input from producer John Webster. It's sleeker than previous recordings, which were more like live shows caught on tape. "Smart Kid" is purposeful.

That's thanks in part to cultivated, introspective lyrics by chief songwriter Chris Jonat. "Smart Kid" is, after all, their first album since Jonat and Lewis divorced in late 2004.

"Smile serene when I've lost all hope/There's dinner and drinks if I learn to cope," Jonat writes in "Okay Alright."

Truth be told, Lewis said, the band might be better off since the breakup, though she admits it took its toll on her bandmates.

"For the first little bit, I felt bad for them. They were right up front for a really emotional thing," she said. "But we're a family, and everything worked out OK."  
"I know this sounds sort of cheesy, but Chris and I are really best friends. I even give him girl advice. We love each other, you

know, and things are easier now without the marriage pressure."

The Lovers are enjoying the largely rave reviews "Smart Kid" garnered, including a write-up in Rolling Stone. They've made a music video that aired on CMT, and their tour area has expanded to the East Coast this fall, though they've promised to slow their schedule a bit as they rely more on album revenue instead of ticket sales.

However, those road-hardened troubadours aren't ready to give up their frenzied tour schedule just yet. They've got a few Idaho gigs left in them.

"Idaho is definitely one of our favorite places to play," Lewis said. "There's something about the people and the altitude there — it's not Virginia."

"No, it's not. And that's what keeps them coming back."

"Some places you go, you really feel like you're a long way from home, but Idaho, we know them."

## Will it go 'round in circles?

Ricky Bobby goes straight, then he turns left. Then he goes straight, then he turns left again. Around and around, over and over.

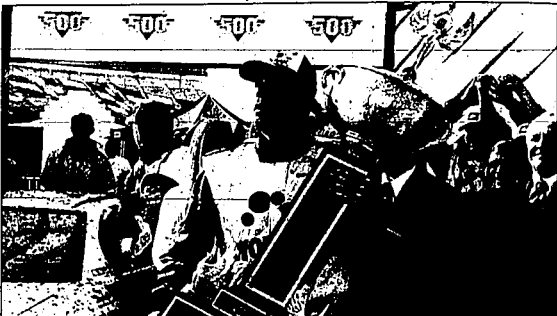
Such is life in NASCAR, but it's also true of the auto racing comedy "Talladega Nights: The Ballad of Ricky Bobby." Like the sport it spoofs, the movie has its thrilling moments but mostly feels repetitive — it's constantly moving but never really goes anywhere.

It's also just too much like "Anchorman: The Legend of Ron Burgundy" — or at least it's trying to be, but comes up short.

Same star (Will Ferrell), same director (Adam McKay), same writers (Ferrell and McKay again). Same basic character (a fervently clueless doofus who's unflappably confident in his abilities), same plot (he's at the top of his game but experiences a downfall at the hands of a new rival), same outcome (he returns to the top of his game having gained perhaps a smidgen of humility, if that).

"Anchorman" was dead-on, though, and it was novel. Ferrell's shick can be hilarious — he's fearless as always, unpredictable, and he just seems so intensely committed to making you believe that Ricky Bobby totally believes in himself, you can practically feel him vibrating with energy through the screen.

The movie itself, though, isn't nearly so focused. It begins with Ricky realizing at a young age that he wants to go fast like his car-racing daddy, then quickly finds him as an adult (though not a grown-up) at the top of the NASCAR heap. Jane Lynch plays his tough-love

mama, with Gary Cole as the loven, alcoholic father whose love and approval Ricky still seeks. (Yes, all the clichés are in order. There are even references to the Waffle House and Applebee's, which should be amusingly familiar to Southerners; everyone else will just feel smugly superior.) Ricky owes much of his success to his teammate and best friend since childhood, Cal Naughton (John C. Reilly, revisiting his police officer mustache from "Magnolia"), who always agrees to finish the race in second place. There's something sweetly delicate and sad about

the way Cal simultaneously worships and resents Ricky; that's no surprise, though, since Reilly brings complexity to every supporting role he's in, even in a manic comic like this.

Ricky has it all — the generically hot, blond wife (Leslie Bibb), the ostentatiously huge house (with oversized pickup trucks parked outside), even a couple of kids (with awesomely inspired first names).

But all that becomes jeopardized when a driver from the Formula One circuit bursts onto the NASCAR scene. Sacha Baron Cohen plays the role of the flamboyantly French Jean Girard and the same way he inhabits his own character's he's created, including the cross British rapper All G and Born, the overzealous TV reporter from Kazakhstan; by immersing himself completely in it and making you believe you're watching a fully realized, screwed-up human being.

After the premise is established, though, "Talladega Nights" ... well, it would be too easy to say it runs out of gas. But that's what happens. Ferrell's Ricky Bobby act, which was so exciting off the top, grows old because there is simply no depth or nuance to this character. Then once his wife coldly leaves him, a new love interest (the adorable Amy Adams from "Junebug") comes out of nowhere and feels unfounded.

Worst of all, "Talladega Nights" just stops being funny, and resembles one of those "Saturday Night Live" sketches that's been agonizingly stretched out from a few minutes to a feature-length film — like "A Night at the Roxbury," for example.

"Talladega Nights: The Ballad of Ricky Bobby," a Columbia Pictures release, is rated PG-13 for crude and sexual humor, language, drug references and brief comic violence. Running time: 97 minutes.

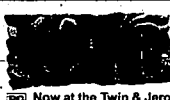

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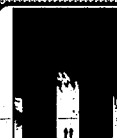

## Movie nuggets



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• **"The Ant Bully" / B** The beach knees, Ten-year-old Lucas, who likes to torment ants, learns what it feels like on the other end when he's reduced to bug size and forced to live in an ant colony. Visually, the movie larit up to, say, "Cars," but it's got any number of impressive action pieces (like a wasp attack) and countless imaginative contrasts ("The Incredible Shrinking Man" as a doca on the size of the Empire State Building, a shag-carpet jungle). The producer is Tom Hanks, which says something right there, and the stellar voice cast includes Julia Roberts, Nicolas Cage, Paul Giamatti and Meryl Streep. / Rated PG (some mild rude humor and action). 1 hour, 23 minutes.

• **"Cars" / C** A critic-proof horror— a garish, noisy, soulless, surefire hit from Pixar. En route to a race, an arrogant hot-shot race car (voiced by Owen Wilson) is forced to spend time in a sleepy little town, where he discovers life out of the fast lane. The tale is terrific, but the life lessons are imparted with zero charm or nuance and, at almost two hours, it somehow manages to be both frenetic and leaden. That said, the kids will love it— though you may feel like you've been run over. / Rated G. 1 hour, 56 minutes.

• **"Clerks II" / B** Kevin Smith became something of an indie film cult hero in 1994 with his audacious grunge-no-budget gem "Clerks." A dozen years, and a half-dozen films later, the sequel brings Smith back to his roots, and his strengths as a writer-director. And that's good news for longtime fans. Rated II (pervasive sexual and crude content including aberrant sexuality, strong language and some drug material). 1 hour, 37 minutes.

• **"The Devil Wears Prada" / A-** Killer cast, killer clothes, killer laughs. And you don't have to know the difference between Donna Karan and Donna Summer, or to delight in its wicked workplace politics. Based on Lauren Weisberger's roman a clef about life as a lowly and abused assistant to Vogue's feared editor Anna Wintour, the movie casts Anne Hathaway (ever more impres-

sive) as her luckless heroine and Meryl Streep (hundred Impressive) as her monster boss at *Runway* magazine. Rated PG-13 (some sensuality). 1 hour, 46 minutes.

• **"John Tucker Must Die" / No rating** Presented with the extreme title "John Tucker Must Die," you initially can hope that a teen flick in the vein of that great black comedy "Heathers" might be in store. Instead, you're treated to a dose of the cutes, but the movie still is a cut above the typical adolescent fare. For teenage girls, there's a quartet of likable young women who bond in a positive fashion rather than cat-fighting their way through cinematic high school clichés— As a bonus, girls also get to see Jesse Metcalfe, Eva Longoria's gardening hunk on "Desperate Housewives." / Shardless and even dressed in nothing but a thing while for the guys who are dragged along to the movie, that quartet of young women is very, very easy on the eyes. Director Betty Thomas and screenwriter Jeff Lowell refreshingly sidestep the gross-out gags that litter most youth comedies. Though the movie strays deep and often into saccharine country, the filmmakers treat the characters with more respect than teen protagonists normally get in Hollywood.

• **"Lady in the Water" / F** A washout. M. Night Shyamalan's newest film isn't merely a disappointment; it's a catastrophe— a picture so wrongheaded you watch through an embarrassed haze. **"The Shaggy Dog"**

Just when you thought "Doo-gal" set the lowest bar possible for a dog comedy, here comes "The Shaggy Dog," a pointless remake of the 1959 Disney classic. The comedian (in the most latitudinal sense of the term) Tim Allen picks up where Dean Jones left off in the 1976 sequel, "The Shaggy D.A.," here playing assistant district attorney Dave Douglas, a Type-A careerist and dog-hater who, through a series of mishaps too ridiculous and tiresome to describe here, is injected with the blood of a 300-year-old dog. When Douglas himself turns into the mop-topped pooch of the title, he discovers that, as he puts it, he may not be a bad dog, but he has been a terrible husband and father.

Directed by Brian Robbins with zero flair or humor, "The Shaggy Dog" is a nasty, unappealing Allen vehicle, whose comedy chiefly derives from stupid stunts (Allen running on all fours, Allen lifting his leg to urinate, Allen catching a Frisbee with his teeth) and a Moresau-nic menagerie of animal clones that figure in the movie's anti-Big Pharma plot. As a comic actor, Allen's palette is limited to varying degrees of beige. He is not only boring, obnoxious and narcissistic. Whereas the ASPCA when you need them?"

"The Benchwarmers" is not terrible, not terrible at all. As always, Lovitz seems to be inhabiting an entirely different-filmic dimension, with a strange Brechtian distance between himself and the lines he stilly utters. He is the Jeff Goldblum of vulgarity. "This is music to my ear hair," he announces, with lascivious relish.

There are the usual fart gags and excrement fixations, but there are also moments of beauty. One character describes a cathartic encounter with a long-time tormentor: "As I covered in my peanut butter fort, he apologized to me..." And the spectacle of defeated jocks groaning beneath self-administered nipple-twists will not soon be forgotten. Craig Kilborn slides across the screen, enjoying himself as usual, and shouts "Let's strap it on and beat these geeks!" Reggie Jackson appears as himself. Pizza Hut and PlayStation are plugged with great assiduousness.

What not to like?

# Where Idaho cuisine goes on Saturday night

SUN VALLEY — Idaho is a steak-and-potatoes kind of place, and even when they're done superbly they're usually done plainly.

So twice in a while, it's worth a visit to one of the very few Idaho restaurants at which continental cuisine is more than a boast on the menu.

The Sun Valley Lodge Dining Room, on the second floor of the Sun Valley Lodge, is a magical place — all silver and crystal and linen and tasteful jazz. Now in its 70th year, the LDR belongs to an earlier time, when Hollywood's A-list would get off one of Averell Harriman's trains and sample the experience of a true winter destination resort — something unique in the U.S. at the time.

Harriman, the chairman of Union Pacific Railroad and Sun Valley's founder, ordered all the steps pulled out to accommodate his high-toned guests, and the LDR is the most visible remnant of that era, with a wine cellar fit for a French chateau and a menu full of fresh local ingredients and world-class culinary

The offerings include rack of lamb for two, carved up your table, for \$68; sauteed elk loin with bucklebriars, roasted shallots and roasted butternut squash (\$26); and pan-fried Idaho trout with meunere butter and almonds (\$29). Not Itodeo Drive fare, it's distinctive enough to appreciate that there is such a thing as an Idaho cuisine and that it's richer and more complex than most people give us credit for.

My wife and I waited on our first anniversary last month. It happened to be the weekend that Allen & Co. brought, legions

of media high-rollers to conference at the Sun Valley Resort, so we expected a wait. Turned out we had the LDR almost to ourselves — four or five couples and the Joe Fro Trio, which plays the room regularly.

The experience turned into a party. We talked and laughed and drank wine with the other diners and danced to the music (well, those of us who can dance did). In the most refined of surroundings, it was the most unrepresencing experience.

Victoria and I both ordered grilled filet mignon with crust of gorgonzola cheese, served with vegetables. Every red-blooded Idahoan thinks he knows filet mignon, but it's a difficult cut of beef that's easy to overcook. Filet mignon comes from the tenderloin, a noble, weight-bearing muscle that runs

along either side of a cow's spine. If the short end of the tenderloin is cut into portions before cooking, it's known as filet mignon — for the filet, the French word for bonest meat, and mignon, meaning "small" as two minnows are cut from the smaller tail end of the tenderloin.

The filet is considered the tenderest cut of beef and one of the most expensive; the average cow provides no more than 4-6 pounds of filet. It deserves better — much better — than to be wrapped in bacon.

The LDR's version was cut thin and grilled at high temperature, enough to expose the seasoning but not enough to take the pink out of the meat. It was delicious. Dessert wasn't even on the menu. My wife, a great fan of flaming dishes, persuaded the waiter to whip up an order of cherries jubilee. He survived the experience with his eyebrows and our undying admiration for his craft intact.

The Lodge Dining Room isn't cheap — our entrees were \$32.50 a pop — but it isn't the kind of place you go for dinner on an ordinary Saturday night. This is a special-occasion territory; savor every moment.

## RECENTLY RELEASED CDs

**Tom Petty**  
**"Highway Companion"**  
 (American)

Tom Petty knows from the road.

On "Highway Companion," his third solo album and 14th studio release overall, the Florida-born rocker who has crisscrossed the world for the past 30 years travels down musical avenues to the past, ruminates on his path to the future, and contemplates where he is now.

In 12 elegant, spare, and instantly singable tracks, you can hear the 55-year-old recognizing that the sands in the hourglass are more plentiful in the bottom than the top. "This could well be your last stand," he sings on the lightly swinging "Flirting With Time." But instead of sounding mournful in the face of his mortality, Petty offers reassurance, satisfied resignation, and a bit of optimism.

Nowhere is that more true than on the slinky boogie of the first single, "Saving Grace." With a rolling John Lee Hooker-style guitar groove, Petty openly questions his identity but stays in the



hunt for the elusive answers, figuring a bluesy shuffle and light harmonies are good allies in the search.

The sigh of contentment that is "Square One" finds the singer, over an almost lullaby-style acoustic guitar, assessing his regrets and gladly finding he's only had a few. He ties up loose ends and revisits his roots in the lyrics of "Down South," stages a ro-

manic rescue mission on the British invasion cool of "Jack," and shakes off the dust in the playful shuffle "Big Weekend."

Longtime friend Jeff Lynne produces here, but "Highway Companion" sounds more like a Rick Rubin affair. Petty's familiar slouchy vocals are front and center throughout, and Iyame and Heartbreakers guitarist Mike Campbell, the only musicians

besides Petty (who plays drums) on the disc, provide the lightest of accompaniment, giving the album an intimate sensibility better suited to lazy, dreamy, late-night cruising on back roads than to rocking down the highway.

A couple of the tracks feel almost too light — like the nonsensical "Ankle Deep" — and the unremittingly moderate tempos eventually weary you crying out for one really good, urgent rocker. But as the album closes with "Golden Rose," a waltz-time sea chantey you can picture Captain Jack Sparrow drowning his rum-soaked sorrows in — there is a sense of completeness that makes you feel that if by some tragedy of fate this was the last Tom Petty album, it would be a fitting caper.

While the songs are more reflective than riproting, they remain a worthy addition to Petty's canon and a great companion no matter how far down the highway the listener happens to travel.

**Jurassic 5**  
**"Feedback"**

Since their debut in 2000, Jurassic 5 has always made hip-hop that's groovy and gangster-free.

The five-piece's third album, "Feedback," is their best yet, celebrating classic '70s sounds, '80s West Coast rap and music's overall feel-good factor. Charlie 2na, Zanki, Aki, Mark 7 and newcomer Nu Mark (who replaces longtime DJ Cut Chemist, who left in 2004) even mix it up with Latin rhythms, rocker Dave Matthews and super-producer Scott Storch.

The guys rhyme about discovering hip-hop in the '80s in "Radio," which sounds like a classic jam from that era. In the "House" samples from the L.A. Dream Team, an early Los Angeles hip-hop act, the '70s show up in "Gotta Understand," with a

hook reminiscent of Curtis Mayfield, and "Turn It Out," which channels Parliament.

Matthews adds melody to "Work It Out," the kind of upbeat anthem that inspires spontaneous swaying. Storch works his

magic on "Brown Girl," a sexy jam featuring reggae duo Brick & Lace.

The rappers speak their minds most on "End Up Like This," which looks at the ill effects of abundant violence, and "Where

We At," which upholds the value of smart thymes and questions the popularity of gangsta rap.

Aki sings, "I refuse to bust gats and water down my raps."

## The Flaming Lips have lots to say

Wayne Coyne of the Flaming Lips is describing his vision for an upcoming Hollywood Bowl stage show.

It goes something like this: A giant UFO descends onto the stage.

The Flaming Lips members—Steven Drozd, Michael Ivins and Coyne—step out from the bottom of the craft, which then turns over and becomes “an elaborate, freaked-out light show.” At the end of the night, the band rebounds the UFO.

Sounds great!

“Yeah, well, I’m going to be honest,” Coyne says. “I don’t think it’s going to come together.”

It seems that, down to the wire, essential parts still have yet to arrive, things that would keep the 3-ton craft from crashing down on Coyne and his boys: nuts and bolts and railings and such.

And even at the 11th hour the question of whether the Hollywood Bowl would even allow such theatrical edgeplay still hangs in the air.

“There are things that you could do in Oklahoma that I know the Hollywood Bowl won’t have,” he says.

Coyne simply calls it “fumbling in the dark.” Kind of like the 45-year-old charismatic frontman, visual artist and budding filmmaker—look for “Christmas on Mars” next year—is doing now as he tries to put the finishing touches on the UFO, built out of elaborate lighting trusses and “stuff” that he admits not knowing much about.

“I’m learning more as the day goes on. I must admit, but, honestly, a lot of these things that we do we do because we know we have to do new things. You find yourself putting yourself in the audience and thinking, ‘What

would I want the Flaming Lips to do? I'd like to see them come down in a flaming UFO and—Wayne could come out of the UFO in his space bubble and go into the crowd,” he says. “Well, maybe that would be cool. But as much as you dream it up, you immediately have to start doing it or it will never happen. And so you work in a bit of a panic.”

The Flaming Lips have been working in a panic ever since 1984, when the Oklahoma psychedelic pop band put out its first release on the Restless label. In 1990, the band signed to Warner Bros.

Four years later, the band saw its first hit with “She Don't Use Jelly.”

Since then, the band—whose style might be best described as astro-whimsy and that All Music.com calls “deliciously weird”—has produced more than a handful of albums and subsequent radio singles, including “Do You Realize?” and, most recently, “The Yeah Yeah Song.”

The latter single comes from “At War With the Mystics,” an album whose songs were inspired by everything from a dream of DeWanda Banhart trying to change the mind of a suicide bomber to the idea that Coyne was writing a song for.

“All songwriters do it. They may not admit to it, but you just

take on another identity and it sort of frees you from the cliché path that you take in your own revealing of yourself,” he says, calling it the Ghandi approach to art. “I make the thing that I wish existed out there.”

Like, a UFO?

“Well, yeah, especially when I was younger,” he says. “The idea of UFOs and all that being real now, you know, that’s faded into being more like fantastical (expletive) to just dream about and think about. I no longer think that UFOs are real but I still think there’s some grand mythology about the idea of space exploration. It’s the great unknown of our time, maybe.”

Then they'd pull it out of the pit, throw it in the back of a pickup and sponsor a free barbecue at the fair — at least, until the health department forced them to stop the practice.

"It used to be quite the thing," recalled Eldredge, a retired cattle rancher. "It used to draw a terrible crowd — a big crowd — from Hatley, even Ketchum. The whole thing used to be a helluva lot of work. But it was worth it; anything to help the kids."

## Northern Rock at 29: 'Should be a hootin' good time'

**HAILEY** — One is an alternative country icon whose songs regularly crisscross between country and rock.

The other claims to play country music—but from different countries—all served up in a musical gumbo of rock, funk, African, rhythm and blues, soul, soca, reggae, roots, jazz, blues, highlife gospel, hillbilly and zydeco.

The 29th Annual Northern Rockies Folk Festival will parade out both this weekend as headliners Rodney Crowell, and The Bonedaddys take the stage in Hailey's Hop Porter Park.

"It should be a great festival," said organizer Kit Nemas. "Rodney Crowell has played for us before and he's back by popular demand. He's one of the nicest guys I've ever met — very charming. And this year he's been nominated for two American awards so obviously he's doing very well."

"The Bonedaddys are real popular in Los Angeles where they play a lot of public events. They're the type to get the whole family up and dancing," he added.

The folk festival kicks off at 5 p.m. Friday with an hour's worth of music by the local bluegrass group Public Radio before The Clumsy Lovers and Rodney Crowell and The Outsiders take the stage.

The festival continues at 1 p.m. Saturday with music by Kelsey Barrow and Friends, Headwaters, Hot Strings, the Kim Stocking Band and The Bonedaddys.

Booster buttons good for both days are on sale for \$18 in advance at Iconoclast Books in Ketchum and Hailey, Chapter One Bookstore in Ketchum and Big Bad Bills in Hailey. They're \$20 at the gate.

Kids under 12 and seniors over 65 get in free. And there will be a number of non-profit food

booths serving up hamburgers, burritos and other festival food. Here's a look at the musical icons:

### Friday

#### • 5 p.m., Public Radio

This group of locals has been out and about playing everything from Best of the Valley to Ketch'om Alvo this summer.

The group was formed in late 2003 when Jeremy Halden began jamming with Hart Gibson and Chip Booth, who played for 10 years with a Grateful Dead tribute band. Cody Gibbs joined a year later, rounding out the group's blend of bluegrass, folk music and cowboy western.

#### • 8:30 p.m. Rodney Crowell and The Outsiders

"The Houston Kid," as he's been dubbed, has a story tale life that would make a good country western song.

Both his father's and his mother's family played at the Depression-era barn dances of Paris, Tenn., and Calloway County, Ky. His mother and father met during World War II at a Roy Acuff concert in Buchanan, Tenn.

At 11, Crowell became the drummer for his father's band, The Rhythmaires, playing honky-tonk, Texas swing and Ap-

palachian folk music in the honky-tonks on Houston's East Side.

A college roommate talked him into going to Nashville to write songs and soon they found themselves averaging five or six dollars a night passing the hat at Bispo's Pub—a combination soup kitchen and open mic stage that attracted such musicians as Johnny Rodriguez, Steve Earle, John Hiatt and Lucinda Williams.

Crowell hitched a ride around the world three times over and up the career ladder, as well as a member of Emmylou Harris' band after she recorded two of his songs: "Til I Can Gain Control Again" and "Bluebird Wine."

His songs have been recorded by an assortment of artists ranging from The Grateful Dead to Andy Williams. The Oak Ridge Boys recorded his "Leaving Louisiana in the Broad Daylight," Tim McGraw took "Please Remember Me," Bob Seger got a hit out of "Shame on the Moon," and Keith Urban picked up Crowell's "Making Memories of Us."

His own first hit song was "Ashes By Now," followed by the album "Diamonds and Dirt," which produced five No. 1 hits during a 17-month span in 1988 and 1989. He received a Grammy for "After All This Time."

In 1994 he called it quits from touring to spend more time with his four daughters, following his divorce from Rosanne Cash.

It ended up being the best thing he could have done, he says.

He developed a deep and lasting connection with his daughters. He and his new wife Claudia learned how to live their lives together, building a marriage from the group up.

"And I also found a way to reinvent myself as an artist," he said. "The reinvention paid off in a

concept album called "The Houston Kid," story songs drawn from Crowell's hometown.

"I Wish It Would Rain," for instance, tells the story of a drug user looking for help. "Wandering Boy" shares the story of twin brothers who reunite after one runs off and presumably contracts AIDS.

And "Highway 17" is about a career robber who hopes to recover the loot he buried along a highway only to find out that there's now a superhighway over the spot.

Crowell's subsequent album "Fates Right Hand" is a quasi-journalistic attempt to articulate the day-to-day task of dealing with the uncertainty of a clouded future and the sorrow of a botched pass.

"In the end, adulthood is the complex matter of figuring out who and what to put your faith in," he says. "Yourself? God? Wealth? Fame? Beauty? Sex? Reality television? The Internet?... The remaining Beatles? The United Nations?"

His latest album, "The Outsider," has garnered a nomination for Best Album at the Americana Music Awards, which will be presented Sept. 22. "Don't Get Me Started" has picked up a nomination for Best Song.

#### • 1 p.m. Kelsey Barrow and Friends

This group is made up of six local youngsters.

#### • 2 p.m. Headwaters

This bluegrass band from Stanley was named after the headwaters of the Salmon River, which is situated in the Sawtooth Mountains. It has played at the Sawtooth Mountain Mamas' Arts and Crafts Festival, Sawtooth Society soiree and Redfish Lodge.

#### • 4 p.m. Hot Strings

Hot Strings' first paying gig was playing at the 1996 Telluride Bluegrass Festival for tips at the

bus stop. Four years later the quartet returned to open that festival. Not only have they taken home the best bluegrass band award from Telluride but they've also won their state's Rocky Grass Bluegrass Band contest.

The group's founding members—mandolin player Josiah Payne, his brother and guitar player Jared Payne and their cousin and fiddle player Carson Park—have been playing together since they were 11, 9 and 7 years old respectively.

Classically trained bassist Leah Usinowicz joined the group two years ago, becoming "the old man in the bunch at the ripe old age of 23."

One of the group's signature tunes is a bluegrass-ized version of Peter Dinklage's classic rock anthem, "Do You Feel?"

They've recorded four CDs—the most recent of which is "Uncharted," an album that plays to the group's passion for mountain biking, hiking, skiing snowboarding and rock climbing.

#### • 6 p.m. Kim Stocking Band

This local group plays an assortment of soft acoustic folk-type music with harder driving rifts. They've performed at the Sun Valley Center for the Arts Arts and Crafts Festival and at a number of local gigs including the New Artists Market in Hailey.

#### • 8:30 p.m. The Bonedaddys

This seven-piece group from Los Angeles takes the music of Brazil, West Africa, Jamaica and throws it into a gumbo of musical notes from New Orleans and Newark, N.J.

And no wonder.

Its band members boast a mesh of different cultural backgrounds and musical interests.

Singer Kevin Williams, for instance, grew up in Watts and Topeka, Kans. Saxophonist Jay Work was raised in New Delhi and the Midwest. And saxophone and harmonica player Mike Rose plays it all from polka to bebop to hillbilly to funk. ...
