# **Shoshone Falls power** still trumps the views

What do you think?

The san enduring debate, really. Whether to harness Shoshoric Falls power or to preserve its aesthetic heatty is an Issue as old as the falls themselves— or at least since they were named by white settlers with shovels and guns.

Look back in the volumes of Idaho history, and you're bound to wander into a debate involving the majestic "Niagara of the West."

The his 2005 book "To the White Clouds, Idahos Conservation Saga," author J.M. Neil Identified Shoshone Falls as "the first (and for many years the only) national park proposal in Idaho. Thaving captured a powerful mystique that started with pioneers and weary travelers rolling through Idaho, the falls became one of the West's most gallant geographical wonders. It was a certain candidate for preservation under the umbrella of a new park system then in its infancy.

The campaign, however, ended as

infancy.
The campaign, however, ended as
abruptly in 1900. Gov. Frank Steunenberg, upon the counsel of
Twin Falls tract settlers, told the federal agencies that irrigation
projects would be at risk under the preservation plath. He asked
that the park plan be pulled and the water used for reclamation

that the park plan be pulled and the water used for reclamation purposes.

Those matters were decided a century ago, but they bubble up from time to time. The year 2006 is no different after a winter of abundant snowfall that pushed 18,000 cubic feet of water per second over the falls in April and May, Tourists flocked once again to the falls to reminisce in the scene.

Now, Idaho Power has made a request with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission to approve a second power facility at the Twin Falls landmark. The expansion would add 50 megawatts of power to the existing generation total of 12.5 MW and would cost \$80 million. One megawatt powers about 650 homes for a year. The scenario brings back all the memories of yesteryear.

Shoshone Falls' development evoked some regret for some residents (as the editorial winten 81 years ago, reprinted below, clearly attests). But that sense of shame shouldn't last long for those who cherish life in southern Idaho.

The need for more electricity in Idaho is unquestioned due to the steady rate of population growth. That growth is impossible without Infrastructure to sustain it. That was the case 106 years ago, and it's not different todax. And by renovating the facility to more than triple the capacity, Idaho Power doesn't have to build newer, and perhaps dirtler, forms of energy production.

And under the new proposal, Idaho Power profosal would still maintain minimum flows of 200 cfs over the Idals from April 1. Intrough Labor Day. That amount could rise even higher during peak visiting hours on weekends, according to company officials. "We share this resource with the community," aid Jim Leonard, project manager for Idaho Power. "More water during the important spring twing times seemed like the best way to demonstrate our desire to work with the community."

This summer's powerful show at Shoshone Falls put locals and tourists once again under the spell of nature's exhibition. The speciacle doesn't happen every year, but when it does, it never disappoints.

o long as the users of Shoshone Falls can provide residents with both the power and the majesty of the structure, life in Twin False captures the best of two worlds. That balance of Shoshone Falls has worked for over a century, it should continue well into another.

Only for aweek or two in the spring is this age-old marvel to be seen in anything approaching its former splendor. And probably after this year there will not even be a week of it.

Southern Idaho still has the site of the Falls. We still possess the place where the Falls use to be, but that its all.

It is a mistake now to number Shoshone Falls among the attractions of the Twin Falls country, because, generally speaking, there isn't any Shoshone Falls. Future booklets on the wonders of Southern Idaho still has the site of the Falls were will be none 12 months out of the 12.

# Top firefighting teams sent to battle Nevada blazes

RENO, Nev. — A national command team and three of the top firefighting teams in the country joined the battle Thursday against wildfires that have blackened nearly 375 square miles of rangeland the part four days threatening. past four days, threatening ranches, mines and wildlife

The Nevada fires are among the largest wildland blazes which have blackened more than I million acres entionally or 1.563 square miles — slightly more than the land mass of Rhode Island.

The national command team was set up in the Elko Convention Center on Thursday and will coordinate efforts with the three elite teams.

"I think all of our large fires are in good shape." Joe Rincar, commander of the national command team, said on Thursday. "If we get through oday's issues, we'll be on the downhill side."

Those issues include temperatures in the 808, humidity in the teens and the ongoing threat of isolated thundershowers.

Fires touched off by dry lightning since Sunday had burned 240,000 acres in Nevada, including the Sheep fire 25 miles northeast of Battle Mountain in Lander County, which exploded to 130,000-plus acres and was 20 percent contained.
In Elko County, the 80,000-acre Amazon fire near Tuscatora, which was 25 per-cent contained, thile the Lif,700-plus-acre Deer blaze near Jackput was 30 percent contained.

No damage to homes or injuries were reported, but the fires continued to pose a threat to scattered ranches and mines as well as wildlife habitat, fire information officer June McMillen said on Wednesday, In Montana, fire officials



# The hidden glacial valley of steel | Steelhead

The last glacial episode ended only about TT,000 years ago and erosion has not had enough time to obliterate the ago and erosion has not had, enough time to obliterate the teltale signs of this recent glacial activity. "Can't see the forest for the trees." This is an expression I have been acquainted with strice childhood, Living west of the Cascades at the time it always seemed appropriate. It is not an expression that I would have associated with a glacial valley, however. Large glatati features such as yellow and the strict of the strict

wash plains are usually hard to miss when encountered. However, on the road passing Steel Mountain, a 9730 fool high peak lying between Featherville and Atlanta, no obvious evidence of glacial activity is easily discernable unless one is very alert. As the road approaches the crossing at Elk Creek, it drops into the canyon along a veeshaped grade, down to the creek on one side and up away from the stream on the other.

As it does this, it passes through a short contact zone between the bedrock and the overlying glacial till on the southwest side. The bedrock is a light-colored crushed and crumbly grantee that has a smooth upper surface where the glacier, probably fairly small and restricted in size, widened the old valley floor as it scraped and gouged its way down stream. Lying directly on this reshaped surface is a thin. flat-lying till, sometimes referred to as a ground moratine, composed of rounded, unsorted grantife. it does this, it passes of rounded, unsorted granitic material ranging in size from boulders to clay.

Just above the crossing, the stream drops about twenty feet over a waterfall creating a beautiful setting resplendent with fir trees, rock out-

The present stream elevation at the top of the falls is about four feet lower than the imaginary line-representing the base of the glacial valley, so over the past 10,000 to 12,000 years. Elk Creek has maninged to the bedrock below the glacial val-ties. Below the talls, stream incision has produced as steeping radient and a deep-or vee-shaped curyon.

Whether the rate of stream incision is the same below the falls as above is difficult to determine since the floor of the glacial valley is not vis-

of the glacial values is increa-ible for reference. While there is a distinct till/granite boundary in the roadcut on the southwest side of the stream at the crossing, no clear demarca-tion occurs on the northeast side.



As everyone knows, a gla-cial valley is more than just one spot along a road. But in this case, due to the growth of large trees and other vege-tation, and the fact that one is standing in the middle of the valley but below its base, this feature is well hidden.

# High-tech tracking Jerome Gun Club slates open house

High-tech method gives researchers new insight into salmon, steelhead

BOISE — Biologists first cap-tured the wild chinook salmon along with hundreds of others in the Walla River in the

along with minutes of the southeastern orner of Washington state.

After nabbing the three-inch-long fish-tin November 2002, they anesthetized it and insperted into its body eavity a half-inch long tracker as part of a rapidly expanding program giving researchers new misghis into the movements of salmon and steelhead in the Columbia River Basin.

It's a program that's had holt scientific and political significance.

It was six months and 71 It was six months and 71 river miles later that biologists next heard from the fish, now known by a code starting with 3D9, as it followed spring flows downstream past McNary Dam on the Columbia River as it headed for the Pacific.

the petitioners that the bald eagle in the Southwest is separate and distinct. They disagreed, however, that its population represented a significant, genetically distinct population or a unique ecological niche.

In addition, "the level of threats described in the petition, as well as information available from the Arizona Game and Fish Department, doesn't indicate that the Sonoram Desert bald eagle population is at risk of extinction," said Steve Spengle, Fish and Wildlite's Arizona field supervisor.

supervisor. Humphrey said the latest population survey of Arizona bald engles earlier this year found 50 breeding areas, most of them occupied, and a total of 166 birds.

Nationally, there are 7,066 hereding pairs in the lower 48 states, a huge increase from the 417 pairs found in the lower 48 states in 1963 — a recovery success that Humphrey attributed to the Endangered Species Act and the banning of the insecticide DDT.

### Grand Teton raft accident survivors praised guide Victims: guide 'did a good job on the river'

CHEYENNE, Wyo. (AP)—
Five of nine passengers who survived a Grand Teton National Park miding accident that killed three people in June praised their guide, and two of the five credited him with swing their lives by telling them beforehand what to do if they fell overhoand. "I want to impress upon you he fact that your thoroughness in fitting the life jackets and instructions regarding water survival certainly contributed to our lives being saved," one couple wrote in a letter to the guide.

"Please don't beat yourself up over this tragic accident."
The couple sent the letter to park ranger Patrick Hattaway and asked him to pass it along to the guide because they didn't know his last name. "We were very sorry not to be able to thank him in person for his thoroughness in preparing us for the "float" injp. the couple wrote to Hattaway.
The accident june 2 occurred when a Grand Teton Lodge Co. art struck the root end of a tree that had lodged in a channel of the Snake River. All 12 passengers plus the guide fell into the water. Elizabeth Rizas, 58, and John Rizas, 63, both of Beaufort.

Sc., and Linds Clark, 69, of Shreveport, La, drowned in thigd, high-running water.

# Potato disease prompts restrictions in Idaho

POCATELLO — Federal and state regulators, trying to limit the spread of a microscopic root-cating worm called the potato cyst nematode, have potato cyst nematode, have restricted the handling and movement of potatoes and farm machinery in a 3,500-acre area in southeastern

Idaho.
The restrictions by the U.S.
Department of Agriculture and
the Idaho Department of
Agriculture last week involve
35 potato growers and 141

potato fields.

"(Growers) have asked a lot of questions, and were in the process of answering those questions. Wayne Hoffman, spokesman for the state Department of Agriculture, lodd the Idaho State Journal. At the very least, we hope to he able to assure our trade parmers Idaho is free of potato cyst nematode. This is one of those steps."

After the initial discovery of the nematode in April, Japan bannet all fresh U.S. potato imports, and Canada and

Mexico banned all fresh potato

Mexico banned all fresh potato imports from Idaho. Idaho is the nation's largest potato' producer. growing about one-third of all the piotatoes in the United States. Last year, the state produced 12.5 billion pounds of potatoes worth about, 5700 million' to farmérs.

Hoffman said farmers in the restricted area whose fields are inspected and declared nematode free will have green stamps affixed to their potatoes, which then can be moved without restrictions.







with the spade finesse working, it looks as if you cannot lose more than two clubs and a diamond flour spades. However, at the -2004-European-Champional flour spades. However, at the -2004-European-Championships the Bulgarian East-West pair produced a brilliant defense to lead Ceclarer astray. After cashing the top clubs, West shifted to the diamond queen. East, Julian Steamov, took his ace and simply continued a club. Now what should declarer do?

If he ruffs in hand, he fatally-shortens his trumps. He will not be able to draw three rounds of trump next and then ruff two hearts later, as he will have only four trumps left. At the table. South drew only two rounds of trump, then ruffed the third cound of hearts with his last trump, but West overruffed for down one.

If declarer had ruffed the third club in dummy, it looks as if he would have been short of entries both to ruff out the hearts and enjoy the established suit. After the heart ace, heart ruff, spade jack ducked, then a spade to the queen, a heart, ruff will not work, as West will overruff again. Conversely, drawing the last trump before ruffing the second heart makes dummy entryless.

The right solution is nonetheless to ruff the club in dummy, discarding your singleton HEART from hand. Now you can start ruffing hearts immediately, the spade queen providing the entry for the second heart ruff, you can use the spade ace both to get to the established hearts and to draw the last trump.




