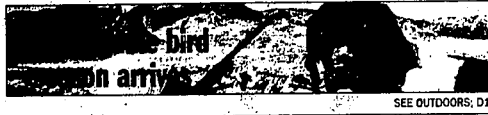

## Idaho potato farmers feeling squeezed by election-year politics

**BOISE** — As politicians in Washington, D.C., spar over who has the best election-year border control and immigration plan, Jack Hoopes wonders who will harvest his seed potatoes.

Normally, he needs 50 people for his three-week harvest starting next week. He has just 35, including students who get a week off from school in the Teton Valley, a farming region northeast of Idaho Falls.

Hoopes said his current Hispanic workers tell him President Bush's plan for 6,000 National Guard troops on America's 1,951-mile southern border and the intensifying spotlight on illegal immigration have had a chilling effect on Mexicans willing to come north.

On Thursday, the U.S. House voted 293-136 to build a 750-

mile-long fence along the Mexican border, part of a Republican effort to keep the illegal immigration issue before voters. A similar bill passed the "House in December.

"The emergency measure" now goes to the Senate, which in May approved a broader immigration bill with provisions for guest workers and 370 miles of fencing.

With the debate unresolved, farmers like Hoopes say they've drawn the short straw. "It's going to take longer to harvest the potatoes," he told The Associated Press. "I've spoken with other neighbors, and they're having the same problem. Something needs to be done with immigration reform. We depend on immigrant workers."

Thirty years ago, Idaho's children and unemployed

## Shock and awe

### Fish and Game monitors fish populations using electricity

**HAMLEY** — Forget the pole and worms.

When the Idaho Fish and Game Department goes angling, it brings the electricity — 300 volts, in fact.

They call it electrofishing, but it's actually a river-fish population count, said Rob Ryan, a regional fisheries biologist with Fish and Game.

Ryan and an eight-person crew of Fish and Game employees and volunteer s were knee-deep in the Big Wood River on Thursday, nets in hand, ready to scoop up the next stumped rainbow trout.

Once every three years, Fish and Game goes electrofishing in the river to tally trout. With the information, the department sets angling regulations and monitors the general wellness of Southern Idaho's most popular gilled creature.

Here's how electrofishing worked Thursday: A gas-

powered generator, floating in a canoe, produced electricity that ran via a buoyed cord to two 8-foot-long, wire-loop-tipped poles. The poles were passed through the water in a sweeping motion. Anything within 5 or 6 feet got shocked. The fishers wore rubber, neoprene-lined waders and rubber gloves to prevent being zapped.

It's just enough current to disable fish without killing them, though 300 volts is more than twice the output of a standard home electrical outlet. Ryan, who manned the canoe, held a finger trigger that could turn off the current if anyone tripped into the water.

Once the fish were stunned, the crew netted them and like a bucket brigade passed them down the line and into a live well in the canoe.

It was an efficient process until more than a few fish went belly up at once, which happened often. Then, the crew resembled a youth hockey team

hunched in a corner, hucking and slapping to snag fish before the current swept them away.

It was serious work, but there were more than a few laughs, especially when a curious young mouse lumbered to the bank to watch.

Once the live well filled, about 20 minutes into the operation, the crew moved to shore to count, measure and tag each fish. Tagging — punching a small hole in

the tail — let the crew know if the fish had already been captured.

Ed Papenberg of Fish and Game entered each measurement into a handheld computer while the nettr's rested.

Being zapped, poked and handled may sound uncomfortable, but Ryan said that a minute after being released, the fish

## Air bags on motorcycles?

**MARYSVILLE, Ohio** — Jeanene Parsons' husband steered their motorcycle to the ground seven years ago to avoid hitting a passenger whose cycle went down on a twisting mountain road in Kentucky.

The couple emerged from the accident with a few road burns and frazzled nerves. The passenger's leg was shattered.

Marifran Mattson lost part of her left leg when the motorcycle she was on was struck by a semitrailer in 2004 near Crawfordville, Ind.

Pittsburgh Steelers quarterback Ben Roethlisberger was seriously injured June 12 when a car turned into the path of his motorcycle June 12. Roethlisberger, who wasn't wearing a helmet, suffered a concussion, broken nose and jaw and damaged teeth.

As cyclist injuries and deaths increase, motorcycle

makers are installing more safety features, making greater use of antilock brakes and adding air bags while stressing safer-ride education and use of helmets.

Some people wonder how effective air bags will be, how much of a market exists, and how much they would save cycle owners on insurance.

Honda Motor Co. added air bags in June to its fully loaded Gold Wing, an 800-pound

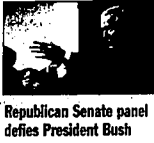

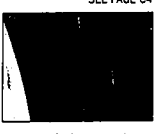

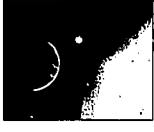

touring bike designed for distance diving in comfort and made near this central Idaho city.

Yamaha Motor Corp., with U.S. headquarters in Cypress, Calif., is developing an air bag system and is using a scooter with air bags for research in Japan, according to the company's Web site.

"The motorcycle manufacturers are engaging in a lot of R&D in the area of — some would call it 'safety,' some would call it risk management," said Tom Lindsay, spokesman for the Pickerington, Ohio-based American Motorcycle Association. "It's part of a trend."

The motorcycle industry posted \$7.6 billion in sales of 725,000 on-highway bikes in 2004, up from about \$4.7 billion and 471,000 bikes sold four years earlier.

Motorcycles accounted for 2 percent of all registered vehicles in 2004 but made up 9.1 percent of all highway deaths, nearly double the 5 percent in

1997, according to government statistics.

Honda's air bag system consists of crash sensors attached to the front fork of the motorcycle. The sensors detect rapid deceleration and send the information to a small on-board computer, which determines whether a crash is occurring.

The computer sends a signal to an inflator, which releases nitrogen gas to deploy the air bag, packed into a dashboard-like module in front of the driver. The process takes a fraction of a second.

The system is designed to keep the driver's body from hitting whatever the motorcycle hit and reduce the chances of the driver being thrown over the handlebars. It is not designed to protect from side or rear impacts or to protect passengers.

Honda began working on its air bag system in 1989 after determining that more than half of the motorcycle accidents that result in deaths or injuries occur when the front of the motorcycle strikes

another vehicle or object.

Honda won't say how many air bag-equipped Gold Wings it plans to produce by the time the 2006 model year ends in late September, other than it will be a limited number. Last year, the 600 workers at the plant produced 60,524 motorcycles, including Gold Wings.

Parsons, 45, of Dayton, favors the idea of air bags and doesn't shrink at the added cost — about \$1,500 on a \$24,900 Gold Wing.

Mattson, associate professor of communications at Purdue University, where she is spearheading a motorcycle-safety campaign, also applauds Honda but said the air bags wouldn't help in many crashes, including the one she was in. And she worries that the air bags might cause riders to disperse with wearing helmets.

"I'm concerned this might send a false sense of security," she said.

Honda officials acknowledge that some people are going to question whether motorcycle air bags will be

effective.

"But we've seen so many test videos — you become a believer," said Jan Conzheimer, senior manager of Honda's manufacturing/planning group.

Honda's air bag system has been tested with crash-test dummies and in one case with a human to see what would happen if an air bag deployed accidentally. Honda officials said the air bag didn't knock the driver backward or injure him, affect his field of vision or impact his travel down the highway.

Bob Hartwig, chief economist for the New York City-based Insurance Information Institute, said the insurance benefits of having motorcycle air bags probably would be small because the devices protect only the driver and only in frontal crashes. Air bags in cars protect drivers and passengers in front and side crashes.

Hartwig also said motorcycle riders who buy air bag-equipped bikes are probably safer drivers and less likely to be involved in crashes.

local women were enough for harvest season. Now, Hoopes says, women work, some kids aren't interested and farms are larger. That demands hired help.

But with the construction boom in Idaho and neighboring Wyoming's chic Jackson vacation area, area residents are pounding nails, not looking for seasonal jobs like potato harvesting that pay just a few dollars an hour.

Idaho's unemployment rate is 3.3 percent, just 2.3 percent in eastern Idaho's potato country.

Mexican laborers are needed, the potato industry says. "I wouldn't for a minute argue that we should just have an open border," said Keith Espin, director of the Potato Growers of Idaho in Blackfoot, with 250 growers. "But I think what this does show is that we really need to have a guest worker program. There really are people in Mexico who would like to come up here for a few months and work."

It's unlikely Hoopes and Espin will get what they want before Nov. 7.

A spokesman for Sen. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, who has been pushing the Senate alternative, said the focus in the two-month election run-up will be on border security, as Thursday's House vote indicated.

Only after that will reform efforts with guest-worker provisions stand a chance, said Dan Whiting, Craig's spokesman in Washington, D.C.

Craig knows how rancorous the issue is: In Coeur d'Alene in August, the senator was screamed down by foes of immigration reform.

There's not the political will in Congress right now to pass comprehensive reform," said Whiting. "The anti-immigration argument is a 10-second soundbite, but when you talk

about the need for guest-worker programs, it takes you a good 10 minutes just to calm the crowd down."

U.S. Rep. C.L. "Butch" Otter, R-Idaho, who is running for governor, voted for Thursday's fence measure in the House. Had the Senate acted on the House's plan approved last December, Otter contends, debate over guest workers for farmers could have long since begun.

"The congressman has always said we need to streamline the process of bringing

workers here legally that our employers need," said Mark Warburton, Otter's spokesman in Boise. "But right now, our first priority must be securing the border. If your boat is leaking, you don't start bailing until you plug the leak."

Hoopes said he won't hire anybody without documents showing they are entitled to work here.

Still, a 2002 U.S. Department of Labor survey showed more than half of America's agriculture workers are here illegally, mostly from

Mexico. That's why a guest worker program is needed, Hoopes said.

"On the face, their cards look legitimate," Hoopes said of workers. "The pictures are so good, you should see what's happened with the cards in the last 10 years."

have no recollection of what happened.

The crew took special precautions to ensure the experience was as pain-free as possible for the fish. Oxygen was pumped into the live well. And when the fish were counted, a clove-oil anesthetic was dropped into the holding bucket to numb them before handling.

The count, Papenberg said, is essential to maintaining healthy trout populations.

Nick Cox, a volunteer who participated in the first Wood River fish count in the late 1980s, agreed.

Not a problem for the crew — they expected to net about 500 fish in a 1-kilometer stretch of the river.

# Forest Service fire militia threatened by outsourcing, employee groups say

**BOISE** — A Bush administration study on whether some jobs and duties in the U.S. Forest Service could be done more efficiently by private contractors compromises the agency's in-house firefighting force, say groups representing federal employees.

Administration officials dispute the claim, but the question of whether "competitive sourcing" studies — which determine whether non-government activities should be kept in-house or turned over to private firms — undermine the "fire militia" has caught the attention of Congress. The General Accountability Office earlier this year began an as-yet-uncompleted probe after a bipartisan group of senators asked if the outsourcing competition studies give enough consideration to the Forest Service's long-term ability to manage wildfires.

While Congress has prohibited the Forest Service and the Department of Interior from studying outsourcing of federal jobs that are dedicated to fire suppression and management full time, there's no similar protection for staffers in other jobs who are cross-trained in fire duties, say union officials, wildland firefighter associations and watchdog groups.

"If you outsource Clark Kent, what are you going to do when you need Superman?" said Mark Dwyer, a Forest Service chemist in Madison, Wis., who's a member of the Forest Service Council, an arm of the union representing federal employees. "They are making outsourcing decisions based on a program that gives no consideration to the fire qualifications of the employees."

Some employees of federal land management agencies are summoned to fire duty from their regular jobs, such as wildlife biologists, payroll clerks and maintenance workers, when full-time and seasonal firefighters are in short supply. That happened this year, when the fire militia was activated in late July as the number and size of fires overwhelmed existing resources.

Currently, almost all of the national and regional fire management teams directing suppression efforts on wildfires are made up of Forest Service and Interior Department employees who have been temporarily assigned from their "day jobs" to work fire duty.

Forest Service officials say the studies of potential private jobs competitors recognize fire suppression and management is "mission critical" to the agency.

"Fire resources are not going to be hurt by competitive sourcing or other studies being done," said Forest Service spokesman Joe Walsh in Washington, D.C.

If fire support is identified as part of a particular job, that requirement would be included in any proposal seeking outside contractors to do the work cheaper and more efficiently, said Jacqueline Myers, the Forest Service's competitive sourcing director. Fire duty is a minor component of most Forest Service employee's job performance, with less than 5 percent of their time usually dedicated to supporting the suppression mission, she said.

"It's a myth those folks are out on fire lines all the time," Myers told The Associated Press. "If we have more fires, we hire more temps and contractors. We don't send everyday Forest Service employees out to do that stuff."

Employees who leave their usual jobs and join fire teams are specially trained and certified to work in a firefighting environment. But the number of regular employees who are getting that specific fire certification is dropping because of fewer incentives being offered by the agencies, said Casey Judd, head of the Idaho-based Federal Wildland Fire Service Association.

"They've failed to address recruitment and retention of the fire militia even though the Forest Service has relied on it

for years," said Judd. "Rather than strengthening it, they now want to go out and hire private firefighters, for three times the rate federal folks cost."

Myers said the agency is proceeding with the best interests of the forest resource and taxpayers in mind, but acknowledges the studies stir passionate responses among employees.

"A very small percentage of jobs examined have ever gone external because the federal work force is doing a good job," she said. "But I work for the public and it's my responsibility to make sure I am spending their money well."

Deployed medic cared for sick Iraqi children

A medic deployed to Afghanistan with the Idaho National Guard has spent the last nine months caring for sick and injured local children, a departure from the role she imagined for herself in the region — helping soldiers mend.

"I love kids, and it's hard seeing them when they are sick or hurt," said Spc. Jessica Guzzetti, 20, a Task Force Falcon medic with the 1-18th Aviation Regiment that's based in Boise. "And it's especially hard sometimes when you can't fix them up or do anything for them."

Guzzetti dons scrubs every day for duty at a clinic near Forward Operating Base Salerno on the eastern Afghan border with Pakistan. Sometimes, she says, locals are wary of the U.S. presence.

"They either don't know that we are here for them, or they don't feel comfortable seeing us," she said. "Afghans who do have trust are extremely grateful, she added. "Sometimes they bring us small gifts, like jewelry and other stuff. It's not much, but it's their way of showing they appreciate what we do," she said.

Guzzetti's father, a 20-year veteran now serving in the National Guard, is stationed in Kandahar, although the two have yet to link up in the turbulent country that in recent weeks has seen increased resistance from Taliban fighters in addition, her brother and uncle recently returned from National Guard duty in Iraq.

Reservists departing for Iraq duty this weekend

About 300 Idaho Army Reserve soldiers depart this weekend for hazardous duty in Iraq, where they'll spend the year clearing roadside bombs that have been responsible for hundreds of U.S. troop deaths and injuries.

"This mission is obviously crucial," 321st Engineer Battalion Capt. John Vogt said. "The roadside bombs are the leading cause of casualties over there."

The soldiers have been training in Missouri and Wisconsin this summer, learning urban warfare tactics and how to spot and remove roadside bombs, Vogt said. The Idaho soldiers, along with 300 soldiers from other states, are bound for western Iraq, though for their safety their exact destination hasn't been disclosed.

In addition to Boise, the battalion has companies in Hayden Lake, Idaho, and Ogden, Utah.

They'll be joined by soldiers from Wisconsin and Georgia.

Task force aims to quell Northwest gang violence

A two-state, three-county anti-gang task force is working to quell violence from groups that may be committing crimes in eastern Oregon and southwestern Idaho.

Members of the recently formed Tri-County Gang Task Force, serving Malheur County in Oregon and Payette and Washington counties in Idaho, say the Salmon River that divides the two states has been no harder to gang activity centered in southwestern Idaho towns including Caldwell and Nampa. There are concerns the unrest could spread into more rural communities.

"The bridge does not stop gangsters from going back and forth," Payette Police Chief Mark Clark said.

Each law enforcement agency in the task force dedicates one officer for monthly meetings, where they debrief each other on gang activities in their respective areas. Clark said gang training is essential to this venture, and he hopes the next meeting will feature a member from the Nampa or Caldwell task forces.

"I want to get this going,"

Clark said. "I agree we all have a common problem."

'60s pop star sued by highway flogger

A 1960s pop star who rode the British Invasion to U.S. fame for his songs "Teenage Follies" and "Rest in Peace" has been sued by an Idaho highway flogger who says he smacked her with his car while driving through a construction zone.

Chad Stuart, 65, the guitar-playing half of the duo "Chad and Jeremy," in August agreed to a plea-bargain arrangement in Blaine County under which he pleaded guilty to a misdemeanor charge of failure to give immediate notice of an accident.

Stuart, who lives in Hailey where he sometimes plays benefit shows, originally faced felony charges of aggravated battery and leaving the scene of an injury accident.

The lawsuit filed by Barbara Chandler of Twin Falls seeks at least \$10,000 in damages,

claiming "injuries to her body" that caused pain and suffering, loss of sleep and enjoyment, and required medical attention.

Stuart was scheduled to enter his guilty plea at a 5th District Court hearing earlier this month. The hearing was postponed until Sept. 18 at the request of Stuart's attorney, Doug Nelson, after he learned of Chandler's lawsuit.

"We've learned that a civil lawsuit has just been filed, and we want to review it before we enter a plea," Nelson said.

Tighter fiscal controls  
needed for downtown

The Historic Downtown Business District of Twin Falls has seen better days, and it's bound to see similar prosperity in future years. But it won't happen with an office that can't stay fiscally afloat.

A delicate dispute has bubbled up among downtown businesses, the Historic Downtown Business Improvement District, and board members for the agency, over the direction of downtown. For the 2005-06 fiscal year, the district ended operations with a \$27,332 deficit — not a small sum for an agency that deals with a total expense budget of \$240,750. (The district's total revenue was \$213,417.)

In a board meeting held last week, board members and BID staff discussed how that deficit emerged, and how to cut into it quickly. Board members have recommended trimming personnel costs, which were \$91,658 for three paid positions in the past year.

But other board members said the greatest expenses are not with staff, but in the BID promotions, such as Oktoberfest and Twin Falls Tonight. BID officers: notably the executive director Karla Williams, have been applauded for their work to enhance the downtown area and its events.

But board member Jeff Hepworth has a legitimate point that personnel make the most practical choice for budget examination. The promotions are what help attract people to the downtown area. Cut into these areas, and there's fewer ways to celebrate the region's assets.

From that perspective, the board has decided to solicit a proposal from the Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce to assist in operational and financial management of Historic Downtown. And that's where the debate grows more frictional.

Some will argue that giving the chamber more authority over downtown management could create one single canal for rental and business interests. Hence, the proposal arouses suspicion on what the chamber's motives really are. (One note of disclosure: the publisher of the Times-News is a board member for the Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce.)

Those suspicions don't hold up against reality. One must ask why the chamber would even want that authority when the revitalization effort has been so difficult. If the chamber, however, can help make promotional and financial management more efficient, its involvement is certainly worth pursuing.

Should the financial struggles continue for the BID, it may have to revert in its history. The district was created in the early 1980s when laws passed allowing cities to create those districts. There's nothing that says a city cannot regain that authority in full.

"The district's the creation of the city, so we ultimately have some responsibility there if they, for whatever reason, are unable to take care of their own financial affairs," said City Manager Tom Courtney.

Parties involved should be more concerned with the actual strength and vitality of downtown, and less so on who oversees it. Otherwise, the wait for downtown prosperity will just continue.

## The 'stubborn' President Bush

Had it been a small group of liberals rather than conservative writers meeting with President Bush in the Oval Office on Tuesday, they might have run from the room like scalded dogs when he said: "I've never been more convinced that the decisions I've made are the right decisions." The president volunteered he knows people consider him stubborn and responds to such criticism with, "If you believe in a strategy... you have to stick to that strategy."

Is this ignoring "facts" that things don't appear to be going swimmingly on the ground in Iraq? No, says the president. He believes the struggle will be a long one with "Islam-radicicalism." He said, "The politics of Iraq are going to just take a while to get out. People are still trying to get Saddam (Husseini) has a chance to come back."

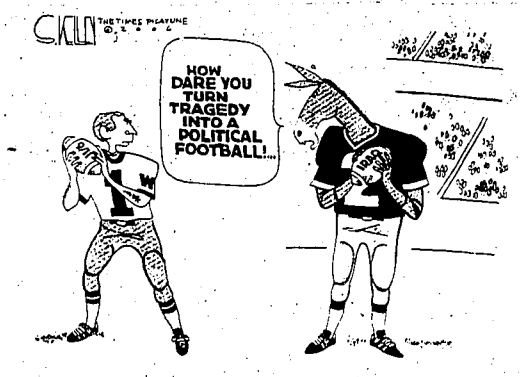
He acknowledged with hindsight "we probably could have trained people... quicker," by which he meant the Iraqi militia Iraq troops, adding quickly, "there are all kinds of ways to look back," but "ideological struggles take time. We live in a world in which there should be... there needs to be instant success... things must happen rapidly." He said he thinks this comes from "too many TV channels" where even the most difficult situations are resolved in an hour or less.

Other points the president made regarding the Middle East included:

"Fifty years from now, it is conceivable that there will be violent forms of Islam-radicicalism competing. It's conceivable that moderate government be toppled and oil used as a political weapon, which would mean a Middle East where young democracies have been undermined could be dominated by state sponsors of terror with nuclear weapons."

"The long-term strategy is to change the conditions that enable this ideology to flourish, to out-compete it with better ideas."

He hopes to leave to his successors "foundations" for fighting terrorism and interrogating suspects that will allow future presidents to success-

fully wage the battle. — About whether more troops are needed in Iraq: "If [Commanding General] (George) Casey feels like he needs more troops, we'll send them." He said he does not intend to repeat the mistakes of Vietnam during which tactical decisions about military strategy were made by civilians in the White House, and is leaving such decisions to the commanders on the ground.

The president pledged to "try all diplomatic means" in dealing with Iran. "We're in the beginning of dealing with the Iranian issue diplomatically," he said, adding this is what was done with Iraq. But he said insight into the Iranian government is "some-what clouded." He also said "the world tends to be risk-averse" in its approach to nations and ideologies that threaten us, an apparent reference to European opposition to U.S. policies.

I asked him if he thinks

Democrats will win a majority in Congress in the November election. "I don't think they're going to win," he stated. "I don't believe they'll win it, because I believe that these elections will come down to two things: one, firm belief that in order to win the war on terror there must be a comprehensive strategy that recognizes this war is being fought on more than one front; and two, the economy." He did lament that some Republican candidates think they can win by distancing themselves from his policies, noting that could send a message that people who do such things are political opportunists. He implied such a strategy might turn off the GOP base.

The president said 12 to 15 races would decide who runs the next Congress. That view was endorsed by a top White House strategist, who forecasts a post-election spread of 52-48 or 53-47 in the Senate, with Republicans maintaining their majority, and a loss of eight to 12 seats in the House, but with the GOP still in charge. With the president's approval and support rising to the mid-60s, the strategist said that all Republicans need is a couple more points to be OK.

The strategist, who spoke at

an off-the-record lunch, predicted Hillary Clinton will get the Democratic nomination in 2008 and will run against a very good Republican.

Look for the dominant issues leading up to the November election to be the war, taxes, education and the economy. No one at the White House wants to say it publicly, but gas prices continue to fall, and the president might wonder why, when gasoline was \$3.50 a gallon, it was on the front page, but now that prices have dropped 80 cents or more in some places, one doesn't see as much attention given to it.

The president suggested he wants to again take on Social Security and Medicare reform, earmark reform and the line-item veto as his domestic priorities after the election. If he's right in his election forecast, he might be able to find it, he'll be taking on investigations and possibly impeachment resolutions by mostly liberal congressional committee chairs. A lot is riding on the outcome. Maybe that's why he called us in.

FDA approval of the morning-after pill is long overdue. Newspaper editors mostly applaud the FDA's decision, but I don't hear anyone discussing what this controversy is all about.

This controversy isn't about the health and safety of the morning-after pill. The morning-after pill was proven safe and effective three years ago, and it contains the same hormones that are in the birth control pill. It is no less safe than the myriad 20-plus forms of family planning.

This controversy isn't about the morning-after pill as an easy out for promiscuous teenagers. The FDA approval does not make the morning-after pill available over the counter to teenagers under 18. While the potential for teenagers to get access to the morning-after pill exists, this is true about a lot of things.

This controversy isn't about the potential rise in casual sex. A single dose costs \$25 to \$40. Women aren't going to pop these babies like Tic Tacs. This is especially true because taking a heavy dose of hormones is nauseating for most. I don't envision hordes of women wanting to hurt on a regular basis when there are so many other forms of birth control available.

This controversy isn't about a potential rise in STDs. People are either going to use condoms or not, regardless of the availability of the morning-after pill. The birth control pill, the diaphragm and a host

of other birth control methods does not prevent transmission of STDs.

This controversy isn't about the questionable "studies" posted on pro-life Web sites claiming a rise in STDs after the introduction of the morning-after pill. Such claims are refuted by a 2005 July British Medical Journal study that found no significant increase in unprotected sex once the morning-after pill became available over the counter.

Let me tell you what this controversy is really about: It's about the seeming lack of "consequences" of having sex: it's about taking sex lightly. Pro-life Web sites all confirm what we already know: The only effective means of birth control is "100 percent abstinence." True. And this is the issue.

This controversy is about what conservatives view as our moral decline, resulting from our laissez-faire attitude about premarital sex. To control this decline, they feel they must control women's bodies. Conservatives believe women should be ashamed or embarrassed when their sexual indiscretions, not given consequences. And this makes them outraged.

SHAUNTI FELDHAMN: The people who should be embarrassed are those editing the morning-after pill's "long overdue" availability without a prescription. This

supposed victory for women is a dangerous sham.

Yes, the Plan B Morning-after pill both prevents and stops an early pregnancy after unprotected sex, and so initially it's not surprising that liberally oriented women's groups would celebrate.

Apparently, we should be thrilled that women are more "free" to couple up without consequences. But aren't those same women's groups supposed to be fiercely protecting women? Look at these facts:

• Plan B is an ultra-high dose of the regular birth control pill, which itself is available only by prescription because it's dangerous for women with liver problems, heart disease and diabetes (including the half-million American women who don't know that they have diabetes). Without a doctor's screening, women can now get a much higher dose and risk their health without knowing it.

Where is the outrage of women's groups? • Plan B's makers gave the FDA not one single study that showed this high-dose pill was safe for repeated use. Effective, yes. Safe, no. Why are women's groups not rising up en masse to condemn using our bodies as guinea pigs?

• Studies all over the world show that when morning-after pills are available without a prescription, there's not only

an increase in STDs and abortions — yes, including Britain — but they're also given by providers and abusive partners to hide sexual abuse.

Where are the fiercely protective women's advocates? From the beginning, the FDA's advice to approve Plan B was spurred by political pressure, not science. Several pro-abortion activists are on the approving panel, and the FDA eventually went along with it because Hillary Clinton and other Democratic senators were holding an FDA appointment hostage to Plan B's approval.

When it comes to sexual issues, "women's advocates" appear caught between two completely conflicting goals: They can't both protect women and promote the idea of enjoying sexual "liberation" without consequences. For years they've erred on the side of freedom, but I had hoped that with women's health and sexual abuse so clearly at stake, they would favor protecting women over politics on this one issue. I was wrong. And that is what makes me outraged.

# Bush assassination film could prevent it

The loudest buzz at this year's Toronto International Film Festival concerns a British-made movie, "Death of a President," which enacts the assassination of George W. Bush.



James Pinkerton represents larger currents in the world today: "strong disapproval of Bush, not just politically, but cosmologically." For his part, Gabler is a disapprover, too, although he is even more emphatic in his disapproval of murder.

But at the same time, Gabler notes the power of movies — the power not only to reflect culture but to shape its politics. Every film is a personal statement by the filmmakers, to be sure, but when it clicks with audiences, too, that's a sure sign that it speaks to some need or yearning in the public. For example, the "Rambo" films of the 1980s, starring Sylvester Stallone, might have started out as respect pieces on Vietnam, but they soon blossomed — some would say masturbated — into rip-roaring vindications of Ronald Reagan's foreign policy.

In essence, the "Rambo" movies weren't Hollywood's only comment on Vietnam. Oliver Stone, for example, made three Vietnam-themed movies, the most famous being "Platoon," all addressing the war from a distinctly anti-Rambo point of view.

And so the political struggles

continue, through the medium of movies. Back in the United States, another film, "The Path to 9/11," which aired on ABC this week, provoked its own storm of controversy by placing most of the blame for the attacks on former President Clinton. These divergent 9/11-themed films may or may not get at the truth, but the controversy they generate is sure to attract copycats — copycat filmmakers.

But what about the looming question here in Idaho? Will a copycat president-killer? We'll know the answer to that question in about a century, but in the meantime, David D'Arcy, film critic for Greenecomm, offers one hopeful thought: that the depiction of the assassination will heighten the vigilance of the U.S. Secret Service to keep such a tragedy from ever happening. Which is to say, "Death" could work in an ironic way, helping to save the life of Bush, a man whom the filmmakers clearly despise.

Movies are indeed powerful — and sometimes they work in powerfully mysterious ways.

## Idaho refuses to act on West Nile Virus

A recent call to our health clinic raised the following response regarding West Nile Virus:

"We're overwhelmed with people calling who have 'flu-like symptoms.' The test costs \$100, which you will have to pay. There's really nothing we can do for you (unless you have neuro-invasive symptoms). You should treat your symptoms as if you have the flu, rest and plenty of fluids."

An astute local observer commented: "The difference between Idaho and other states which have far fewer documented cases of WNV is that in other states, WNV is a public health issue; in Idaho WNV is a political issue."

If the reported 19 people afflicted with the neuro-invasive symptoms of WNV represent the 1 in 100 of us to be seriously affected by WNV, then we can predict there have been at least 8,300 human cases; the 364 reported in the news are the ones who got tested and whose test results got counted.

Officials have the means for contending with emergencies on the county and state level, but we ignored the warning last year from the Centers for Disease Control to prepare for an onslaught of WNV this year. We have only three or four mosquito abatement districts in the entire state. We even have a regulation allowing 1,500 tires per confined animal feeding operation; water-filled tires breed mosquitoes, to name one source.

How many more deaths will it take 'til we know that many people have died from our lack of response to a serious health problem?

### Sign could have prevented fatality

The groom awaited the rest of the wedding party at the 11 a.m. outdoor wedding with joy and anticipation. The bride, along with four others of her wedding party, were on their way to the wedding near Bush. Wesley received the heart, sinking noses at 55 ft. At the intersection of Hoblarton Road curving into Clear Lakes Road, an unnecessary car accident seriously injured his bride and killed a friend of honor Jennifer. Jennifer fell with the car, St. Luke's Magic Valley Regional Medical Center in Twin Falls, then to Saint Alphonsus in Boise with bleeding in the brain. The others in the vehicle were taken by ambulance to Magic Valley Regional. The accident occurred Saturday, Aug. 19.

For an eye-witness, "The vehicle hit loose gravel as it entered the curve... the driver veered left, then right trying to control the vehicle; almost succeeded when the car hit more loose gravel, turned sideways and violently rolled

many times into the ditch... When I called the police, I just said 'another accident at Shorley's Corner' and they knew exactly where I was talking about." He indicated there had already been 17 accidents here. His opinion was "they should slow down to 35 mph or slower..."

The driver has always been considered a good driver, so I decided to drive the same route as he did that fatal day. There was only a 50 mph sign before the curve, no signs indicating loose gravel and no warning of any hazards except a curved arrow at the accident site. This tragedy could have been avoided with a simple sign.

What does it take for people to notice something so obviously hazardous? Could people be so cavalier as to not put up proper signs and dispose of over-abundant loose gravel properly?

### Pay-per-season

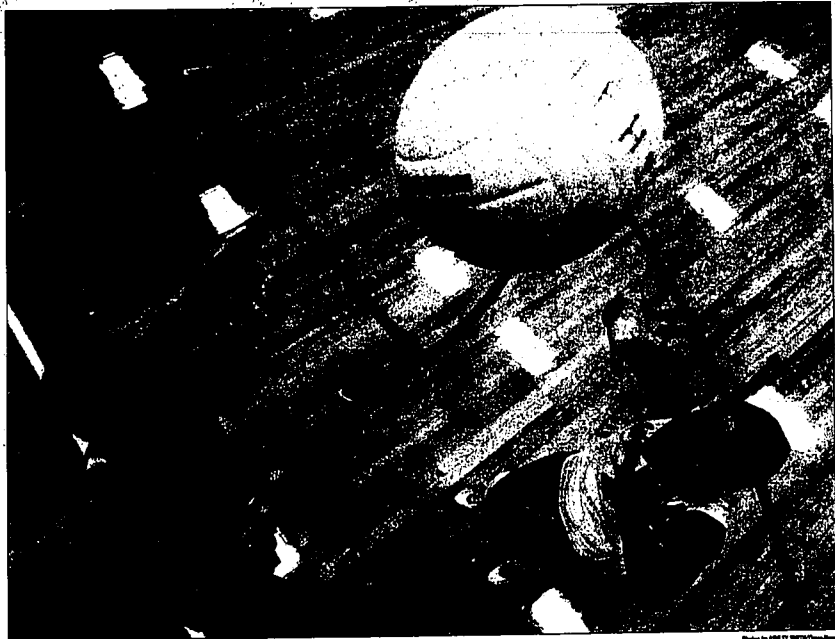
It's the death knell of free sports programming on television as we know it.

# Tiger's winning streak ends at 5

VIRGINIA WATER, England (AP) — The putt wasn't perfect. In fact, it wasn't the putt at all. Tiger Woods turned away in disgust, removed his cap and walked over to shake hands with Shaun Michael.

One round, and his tournament was over.

And for the first time in two months, he left without a trophy.

The longest winning streak in Woods' career — five tournaments — came to an abrupt end Thursday in the World Match Play Championship when Michael put him in a deep hole and waited to see if the world's No. 1 player could escape.

Woods' last hope was a 15-foot birdie putt, and like so many other putts at Wentworth, it never had a chance. The score was 4 and 3, tying Woods' worst beating in match play.

"I don't think you're ever excited when you've lost," Woods said.

It's been a long time since he has.

The winning streak began some four hours away in Hoylake when Woods captured the British Open. Then came a three-shot victory in the Buick Open, followed by his 12th career major at the PGA Championship, a playoff victory in the Bridgestone Invitational and his 63rd in the final round of the Deutsche Bank Championship to rally from three shots to beat Vijay Singh.

But in his favorite format — 36-hole matches — against the No. 77 player in the world, Woods finally looked mortal.

"He didn't have too many fast putts today, which is unusual for him in a 36-hole day, because he usually runs off five, six birdies in a row," Michael said. "And he just wasn't able to do that."

The only thing more surprising than Woods' losing was the company he kept on his way out the door.

Jim Furyk, who rose to No. 2 in the world by winning the Canadian Open on Sunday, got hammered by Robert Karlsson, 6 and 4. Also losing were Ernie Els, a six-time winner of the U.S. Open, and Match Play Championship. Els tried to rally against Angel Cabrera, but hit two tee shots out of play on the 17th hole and conceded the match, 2 and 1.

The only consolation for Els was the match ending about 200 yards away from his hole.

Only two of the top seeds in the 16-man field advanced to the second round and kept alive their hopes of golf's richest prize — 1 million pounds (\$1.47 million) — to the winner. Defending champion, and top seed, Michael Campbell dispatched Simon Khan, 3 and 1, and Luke Donald (No. 7) outlasted Tim Clark, 2 up.

In other matches, Paul Casey beat two-time U.S. Open champion Fred Couples, 6 and 5. Colin Montgomerie beat David Howell, 1 up; and former Masters champion Mike Weir defeated Adam Scott, 3 and 2.

Woods' immediate future was unclear. The U.S. team arrives Monday morning in Dublin for the Ryder Cup, and Woods didn't know if he would stick around the British Isles or return home to Florida.

"Right now, I'm probably going to work out and get some of this frustration out," he said.

"What he needed to work on was his putting, the key to his success during his winning streak. Woods missed 17 birdie putts inside 18 feet, including one stretch of five straight holes that could have helped him stay close to Michael in the morning."

## Clarke 4-under at Madrid Masters

MADRID, Spain — European Ryder Cup player Darren Clarke shot a 4-under 68 in his first tournament since his wife's death, leaving him three strokes behind leader Jean-Francois Luquin after the first round of the Madrid Masters.

Heather Clarke died of breast cancer Aug. 13.

Luquin opened with a 65, Richard Fildes and Miguel Angel Martin shot 66s, and Padraig Harrington was in a group at 67.

# Wie bit of trouble: Michelle outmatched again on PGA

FARMINGTON, Pa. (AP) — The course was too long, the competition too good. Michelle Wie has an exceptional golf game for a 16-year-old, except when she's playing against the men.

Flowey overnight rain softened up the third-longest course on the PGA Tour and created ideal scoring conditions Thursday at the 84 Lumber Classic, but not for Wie. Her sixth attempt to become the first woman in 61 years to make it cut in a four event looks to be unsuccessful, much like the other five.

Wie, playing in her third and last U.S. men's tournament this year, shot a 5-over 77 on a day when there were 25 scores in the 68s on the expansive Mystic Rock course. She has almost no chance to make it cut, which was set even par a year ago.

"I don't feel any extra pressure because I'm a girl out there," said Wie, who turns 17 next month. "I had six or seven putts that looked like they were going to go in the hole and didn't. And that was really frustrating."

She was in a five-player tie for 125th, with the top 70 and ties after the second round advancing to weekend play.

Nicholas Thompson, a 2005 qualifying school graduate who is 181st on the money list, took advantage of an early starting time on a course soaked by 1 1/2 inches of overnight rain for an 8-under 64. It was the tournament's lowest round

since Vijay Singh's opening-round 64 in 2004. Thompson hopes to follow Singh and 2005 champion Jason Gore by turning in at least a share of the first-round lead into a title.

"I had it not rained an A the scores had been this low, I would have been surprised," Thompson said. "Due to the rain, it salted up the greens" and allowed golfers to aggressively go for greens they knew would hold their approach shots.

Thompson, a former U.S. Walker Cup team member, had a two-shot lead over a crowded group of six at six that included Rory Sabbatini and Reno-Iahoe champion Will MacKenzie. Six more were at 67.

Sabbatini, a speedy player, was paired with Ben Crane for the first time since becoming so upset with Crane's overly deliberate play in the 2005 Booz Allen Classic that he intentionally played out of order to show his unhappiness. Crane had a 73.

Wie also played slowly, and not all that well. She got off to an encouraging start with three consecutive pars after starting at No. 10, potentially calming her nerves on a course the 16-year-old high school student knows well. But her round began getting away when she missed a short par putt on the par-13th, starting a stretch of three consecutive bogeys.

# Dodgers suffer tough setback

CHICAGO (AP) — Aramis Ramirez hit a three-run homer off reliever Brett Tomko in the seventh inning Thursday and the Chicago Cubs rallied for a 6-5 victory that reduced the Los Angeles Dodgers' lead to the NL West to a half-game.

The Dodgers headed home after losing two of three at Wrigley Field to the Cubs, who are 29 games under .500. Los Angeles begins a key four-game series Friday with second-place San Diego.

J.P. Drew's three-run homer off Carlos Marrero gave the Dodgers a 5-2 lead in the sixth and put Hong-Chih Kuo in position to win his second straight start.

But Tomko (6-7) was roused up. Ronny Cedeno's single, a bunt single by Juan Pierre and a two-out RBI single by Ryan Theriot made it 5-3. Ramirez followed with his 33rd homer, giving him 100 RBIs for the season.

# Jones pulls out of World Cup, finished for season

(AP) — Marion Jones pulled out of this weekend's World Cup in Athletics in Athens and won't race again this season.

The five-time Olympic medalist said her conditioning wasn't good enough for her to compete at a high level after missing more than a month of competition following her positive test for the banned endurance enhancer EPO. The 30-year-old sprinter was cleared to run again when her second sample tested negative.

"I was in top condition when my season was interrupted more than three weeks ago by the leak of my positive test," Jones said in a statement released by attorney Rich Nichols on Thursday.

"I was ready but missed top August competitions in Zurich, Monaco and Brussels and it has been more than six weeks since I raced," she said. "Unfor-

tunately, I just don't feel that my condition is there."

Her coach, Steve Riedel, had said all along it would be better for Jones to call it quits for the season, then come back strong for next year's world championships in Osaka, Japan.

Riedel said he has been selected to compete on the United States World Cup team," Jones said, "but I have always said that if I am not ready to compete in top form, I won't get on the track."

Jones also withdrew from what was to have been her season-ending meet in Shanghai.

The positive EPO test came at the U.S. championships in Inglewood June 23, when she won the 100 meters, her 14th national title — first since 2002. She withdrew from the Zurich meet when word of the test results were leaked to the media.

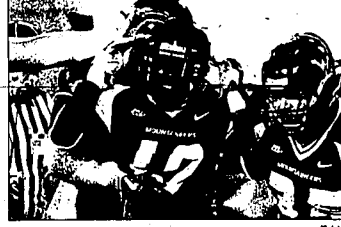

## Bengals hope to run past Vandals

**POCAHELLO** — The schedule says it's the third week of the season, but the reality is that the season truly begins for Idaho State on Saturday afternoon.

ISU (1-1) renews an old rivalry when the Bengals visit the Kibbie Dome to take on Idaho (0-2) and new head coach Dennis Erickson (3 p.m. kickoff). It's the first time the two in-state schools have met on the football field since 1998 when Idaho embarrassed the Bengals 52-3. Idaho leads the all-time series 26-11 with ISU's last win coming in 1995.

The reason ISU is the unofficial start of the season is because no one expected ISU to beat UNLV and no one expected ISU to lose last week to Division II Ft. Lewis. From here on though, every ISU contest figures to be highly contested.

"The kids are up for this one sure," said Bengals head coach Larry Lewis. "I've heard them talking about it in practice. It's a state rival and naturally the kids want to play well."

"No one knows who the real Idaho is and that's one of the questions coming into the game. The Vandals played very well in losing the opening yuck at Michigan State 27-17, but got blown apart by Washington State last Saturday in a 56-10 defeat.

One player who has played well for the Vandals in both contests is linebacker David Voltera. The junior had 16 total tackles in East Lansing then tacked on 14 more against the Cougars. He leads the WAC with those 30 stops and is second in the NCAA after two games.

For the Bengals, they responded versus Ft. Lewis, rolling up 475 yards in total offense. Quarterback Matt Gutierrez was 11-for-19 for 196 yards and two scores. He was aided by Josh Barnett's 185 yards on the ground. That's one of the keys for ISU on Saturday, according to Lewis.

"We have to run the football. That's one of the things we have to do," he said. "Run the ball and control the clock."

On the defensive side of the football the Bengals are hoping the stellar play of Terrence Calloway continues. Calloway was named the Big Sky Conference defensive player of the week after forcing three fumbles against the Skyhawks. One of those was returned 45 yards for a score by Anthony Henderson. ISU hopes to continue their turnover tendencies Saturday.

Dennis Erickson has a name and a reputation. He's won just about everywhere he's gone and he desperately needs to win Saturday. Idaho does not want to drop to 0-3 in his first season back with a tough game at Oregon State on the horizon. Erickson expects to win.

The Bengals, meanwhile, want to win, but it's also a fact that in the grand scheme of things the game is meaningless. Win or lose it does nothing for ISU in the Big Sky standings. But it could give them some momentum heading into the conference opener.

Of note, the last time Idaho State won at Idaho was in 1981 — the same year the Bengals went on to win the I-AA national championship.

# Montreal gunman blogged about playing online Columbine game

MONTREAL — A 25-year-old man who mounted a deadly shooting rampage at a Montreal college had posted pictures of himself on the Internet with a rifle and said he was feeling "crazy" and "postal" and was drinking whiskey hours before the attack.

The man also said on a blog that he liked to play a role-playing Internet game about the Columbine High School shootings in Colorado and wanted to die "in a hail of gunfire."

In the end, the attacker — dressed in a black trench coat like the Columbine shooters —

put his own gun to his head and pulled the trigger during a shootout with officers at Dawson College on Wednesday, police said.

By that time, he had already wounded 29 other people — one of whom, an 18-year-old woman, Anastasia De Sousa, later died. Four shooting victims remained in critical condition Thursday.

The gunman, who arrived at the downtown college armed

with a rapid-fire rifle and two other weapons, was identified by police as Kimveer Gill of Laval, near Montreal.

The Internet postings and a neighbor's description reveal an angry, solitary young man who lived with his mother, sported a mohawk, dressed in black and was filled with hatred for everyone from jocks to preppies and everything from country music to hip-hop. He often worked for a car-pet company and more recently an auto parts business.

"Work sucks ... school sucks ... life sucks ... what else can I say? ... Life is a video game you've got to die sometime," he wrote in his profile for a Web site called vampirebreaks.com.

Authorities searched Gill's home Wednesday evening and seized his computer and other belongings.

"I don't know what they found in the computer," said a woman who answered the phone at Gill's home and said she was his mother. "They took everything."

She described her son as "a good man."

"Just ask anybody. Ask the neighbors. He was a good son," the woman told The Associated Press, she refused to give her name.

A neighbor across the street said he was a loner.

"There were never any friends," Louise Leykauf said.

"He kept to himself. He always wore dark clothing."

Another neighbor, Mariola Fruschini, said she noticed a change in his appearance in recent months when he started wearing a mohawk and black clothes.

In postings on vampirebreaks.com, blogs in Gill's name show more than 50 photos depicting the young man in various poses holding a rifle or a knife and wearing a black trench coat and combat boots.

One phone has a timestamp hearing his name and the epithet: "Lived fast died young. Left a mangled corpse."

The last of six journal entries Wednesday was posted at

10:41 a.m. about two hours before Gill died at Dawson.

He said on the site that he felt "crazy" and was drinking whiskey that morning and described his mood as "postal" the night before.

"Whiskey, in the morning, mmmmmmm, mmmmmmmmm, good!!!" he wrote.

"The name is French, you will come to know him as the Angel of Death," Gill wrote at another point on his vampirebreaks.com profile.

"He is not a people person. He has met a handful of people in his life who are decent. But he finds the vast majority to be worthless, no good, conniving, betraying, lying, deceptive."

This inscription is below a picture of Gill aiming a gun at the camera: "I think I have an obsession with guns ... muahahaha."

"Anger and hatred simmers within me," said another caption below a picture of Gill grimacing.

"I wrote that he is 6-foot-1, was born in Montreal and is of Indian heritage. It was unclear whether he meant east Indian or American Indian, but Gill is a common name in India."

"He said his weakness is laziness and that he fears nothing depending to the question, 'How do you want to die?' Gill replied 'like Romeo and Juliet — or in a hail of gunfire.'"

## Twentieth Century Club marks 100 years

**TWIN FALLS** — Its numbers may have dwindled, but the Twentieth Century Club has remained an active part of Twin Falls County's civic and social fabric for decades, and this year marks the club's 100th anniversary.

In March 1905, the Milner Dam project with 1,000 miles of canals came online and water diverted from the Snake River began transforming desert soil into an agricultural oasis envisioned by Ira Burton Perrine. But the rigors of life on the new Twin Falls Tract offered women few opportunities for cultural stimulation.

"Unlike men, most women couldn't just go and talk to each other over the fence," said Joyce Larson, a member of the Twentieth Century Club Board of Control.

However, rather than bemoan their plight, early Twin Falls residents Mrs. Kennedy Puckard (the first president), Mrs. H.W. Cloucheck (the first vice president) and eight other like-minded women put a little female ingenuity to work and formed the Syringa Club, a fine arts, study and reading club. The first meeting was held on Sept. 10, 1906, in the studies of Mrs. M.J. Sweeney. In 1909,

the name was changed to the Twentieth Century Club. "It (Syringa Club) was started by a few women who moved out to this area from the East," Twentieth Century

Club Treasurer Willia Rider-Fowler said. "They were used to a much more refined way of living and doing things than they found in Twin Falls." By 1913, the club's 100

members had incorporated and bought a lot on the corner of 6th Avenue North and 2nd Street. Plans to build a private luncheon at the Yurt Club in Twin Falls.

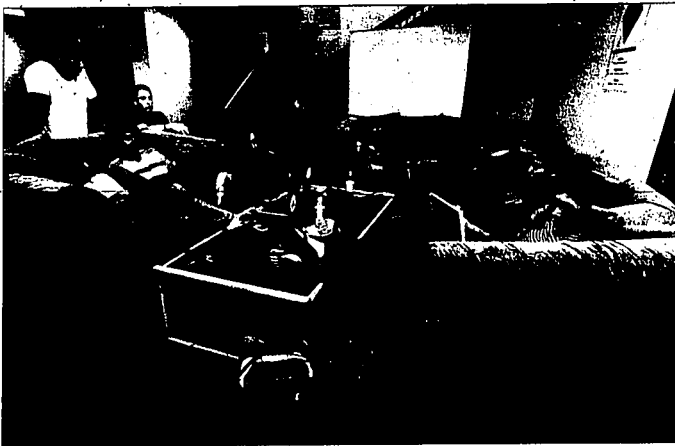

## Students struggle to find affordable housing

**TWIN FALLS** — David Allred didn't think his biggest challenge in college would be finding a place to live.

But that was his biggest obstacle when he started at the College of Southern Idaho.

"When I came to Twin Falls, like I thought I had a place to live, but when I asked the lady how much rent was, she said it was like \$150 plus last month's rent, a deposit and some other fees," Allred said. "I told her, 'Lady, if I had that type of money right now, I wouldn't be here. I'd be in Harvard.'"

Allred found another place to live, but he said it wasn't easy.

CSI has attributed its success to providing affordable education, but some

students are finding that it's more difficult to find an affordable place to live.

As CSI has continued to grow and attract students from communities that are farther away, the city has been unable to keep up with the demand for student housing.

"The College of Southern Idaho has moved from 52 percent of our students living within Twin Falls and Jerome counties to a little over 47 percent," Jerry Beck, president of CSI, told an interim college committee this week. "Less and less are we remaining an in-district institution, and I think, like many community colleges across the nation, we are becoming more of a statewide college."

Increasingly, more students are moving to Twin Falls and seeking a place to live rather than commuting between

home and school.

Although students seem to be painfully aware of the shortage, builders have only recently begun meeting the demand.

But some students say more needs to be done.

"I'm not like the average renter or homeowner, because I'm looking for a place to live while I'm in school, not something that I plan to retire in," said Allred, a second-year student in general education. "But it seems like there's a real shortage of that type of thing here."

Although not intentional, many apartments are not accessible to students because they require lengthy leases, and they're usually too expensive for students — especially students at CSI.

# Constitution Day: CSI will hold mock debate today to mark the signing of historic document

**TWIN FALLS** — Does the federal government have the right to listen to your phone conversations during times when national security is threatened? Do states have the right to conduct stem-cell research, even though the federal government prohibits it? These are some of the questions that will be discussed during a mock debate today at the College of Southern Idaho. CSI is holding the event to

mark Constitution Day, which Congress has mandated to commemorate the signing of the U.S. Constitution on Sept. 17, 1787.

Edna May Clifford-Bell Rea

HAGERMAN — Edna May Clifford Bell Rea, a native of Hagerman, died Tuesday, Sept. 12, 2006, at Magic Valley Assisted Living Center in Wendell. Edna May Clifford, a native of Hagerman Valley, was born Dec. 2, 1907, on the old Clifford-Baneli southwest of Hagerman to Will and Anna Cecilia Olson Clifford. She was the middle one of three children. Her mother died when she was 10 months old. Edna was married to Fred Rea in 1925. They had five children: William, Howard "Happy," Edna, Francis "Budgie" (Anderson), Friedrested, Richard, Doyle and Milton. She went to school in Hagerman, her first grade teacher was Miss Stella Jusace. She graduated in 1925. That year, she was excused early enough to get her team of horses from the school to Mrs. Moore's and be waiting for the children at 4 o'clock with the school wagon. Her brother, Bill, always barnessed the horses. Her salary was \$48 a month, which was used to pay Edna Peck from Camas to cook and do housework as her mother had suffered a stroke. She attended Albion Normal School of the year 1925-26, and the next year taught at a one-room school at Sand Springs. She walked up the Thousand Springs grade with the Woodhead children, Helen, Bertha and Albert, and the other children from Sand Springs Ranch. She boarded with her sister, Elvira, whose husband was employed at the power plant. She returned to Albion and received her life teaching diploma in 1928. She later taught in a one-room school at Upper Clover Creek, boarding with the Bostroms at the White Arrow Natatorium and riding a horse to school each day—Henry and Friedrested-Badermacher Ranch. Edna married Harland James "Ted" Bell on June 21, 1933, on the lawn of his Aunt Lottie and Uncle Glenn's home at Bell Rapids and lived

on an acreage he bought in the Buckle, Death. In 1941, he traded for an acreage and the rock house, which was formerly the Huckleby School. She taught in Hagerman Elementary for 12 years. Edna loved teaching children and fondly remembered them all. Ted and Edna farmed and lived there until misfortune came on Feb. 6, 1967, when Ted was killed in a farm accident. Edna later taught in Richfield School for three years and retired from school teaching there in 1972. She married Donald E. Rea on Feb. 11, 1975. They lived in Wendell. He died Jan. 14, 1994. The last several years, she resided in Magic Valley Manor in Wendell, where she received loving care from the staff and residents. Edna was a longtime member of the Methodist Church in both Hagerman and Wendell and was active in the U.M.W. and Sunday school. She was a 64-year-old resident of the Hagerman Valley Grange, a member of the Wendell and Pomona granges and the Pioneer Association of Settlers in Hagerman since 1940. Edna was preceded in death by her husbands and all her siblings. Raymond Mikesell, member of Bretton Woods conference, dies

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — Raymond Mikesell, who was believed to be the last known surviving member of the Bretton Woods conference at the end of World War II, has died. He was 93. Mikesell died Tuesday at his Eugene home of age-related causes, according to officials at the University of Oregon, where he was an emeritus professor of economics. Mikesell was the aide to Harry Dexter White, an economist who led the formation of the International Monetary Fund and the World Bank during the historic July 1944 conference at the Mount Washington Hotel in Bretton Woods, N.H. The IMF and the bank helped fund the European recovery from the war and opened up the modern era of global economic expansion. Mikesell earned his doctorate in 1939 from Ohio State University, where he also was an undergraduate. He went to work for the federal government after several years as a fac-

ulty member of the University of Washington. In his later years, Mikesell argued for reform of the IMF and for abolition of the World Bank.

where more than half of the student body receives financial aid.

And places that do cater to students are full.

The Northview Apartments, which are owned by CSI, have no vacancies, and neither do most of the apartment complexes in Twin Falls.

"Some apartments make it difficult for students to move in, so it keeps us full," said Wanda Luna, who manages the Northview Apartments. "We might have some vacancies during the semester breaks, but during the semesters we are usually full."

Even apartments such as

Rivercrest Apartment Community, that do not specifically cater to students have no vacancies.

CSI does offer students a list of private homes and apartments available to them.

Last year, Utah-based Paramount Development opened the first of seven apartment buildings that each house 12 six-bedroom apartments. The Campus Park Housing development, which still has about 100 bedrooms open, has been a relief for many students who have been searching for affordable housing near the campus.

"We really try to work with the students, even trying to

work around their financial aid," said Halli Taskiewicz, who manages Campus Park Housing.

"And, although we have some vacancies, we are still getting students coming in during the semester."

Campus Park Housing has increased the number of living units available to students, but some say it won't last long because the college continues to grow.

"Yeah, it sure would have been great to have those apartments a couple of years ago when I first came here," Alfred said. "But, give it another couple years and I bet they will be packed, and students will have to scavenge for someplace to live."

facility on the site later fell through and the lot was sold.

Though the club has continued to meet on the second Tuesday of each month since its inception, the locations have shifted and have included the Park Hotel and American Legion Hall. The Turf Club now hosts their meetings. Many other things have changed as well.

"Our meetings used to be real social events where the women would dress up in their fancy coats and hats, but now we've gotten more casual," club President Esther Ketterling said.

Club activities have also moved beyond just meeting the social needs of its membership to include an ever-widening variety of community service projects.

Extending from the 1915 construction of a lava rock drinking fountain in the Twin Falls City Park and volunteering for Red Cross work during World War I, almost \$1 million has been contributed to the Twin Falls Public Library, YMCA, YWCA programs, college scholarships and sponsorship of 41 Idaho State Olympians.

"I joined in 1987 because I wanted to be part of an organization that does good for the community," club Vice President Loraine Stevens said. "Twin Falls and the county have given me a lot of my family, and I felt this is one way to give back."

One of the Twentieth Century Clubs largest undertakings has been the development of Buck Creek Park in the 1970s and 80s. Spearheaded by then-club President Betty Jackson, and assisted by other civic groups, \$3,000 was raised, and matched by state and federal funds. The money from fashion shows, Idaho stationery and candy sales was used to revitalize a site just west of the Magic Valley Regional Medical Center where junk cars had been dumped into the canyon. These were removed and the area cleaned up for public recreation. The club donated another \$1,000 in 1985 to further expand Buck Creek Park facilities, and nine additional acres of Twin Falls Canal Company land were donated to the park in 1987.

Jackson's daughter, Susan Jackson Austin, said that completion of the park is one of her mother's happiest moments.

"Every time we're up that way, we like to take her far to drive to what the kids call grandma's park," she said. "It really lifts her heart to know she was involved with such a beautiful place."

At its peak, the club roster boasted about 300 members, but that number began to drop in 1933 when it was decided that association with the General Federation of Women's Clubs in Washington, D.C., should be discontinued.

"We were having to pay too much money to the federation and that was taking away from the things we could do locally," Rider-Fowler said.

With only 39 active members, and the difficulties of sparking interest with the younger generation, the Twentieth Century Club's

future is uncertain. But years of commitment to each other and achievements in the community are a legacy that speaks for itself.

"We're like sisters and we're always there for each other," Ketterling said.



## Republican Senate panel defies Bush, approves bill on treatment of terror detainees

WASHINGTON (AP) — A rebellious Senate committee defied President Bush on Thursday and approved terror-detainee legislation he has vowed to block, deepening Republican conflict over terrorism and national security in the middle of election season.

Republican Sen. John Warner of Virginia, normally a Bush supporter, pushed the measure through his Armed Services Committee by a 15-9 vote, with Warner and three other GOP lawmakers joining Democrats. The vote set up a showdown on the Senate floor as early as next week.

Earlier in the day, Bush had journeyed to the Capitol to try to gain down support for his own version of the legislation.

"I will resist any bill that does not enable this program to go forward with legal clarity," Bush said at the White House.

The president's measure would go further than the Senate package in allowing classified evidence to be withheld from defendants in terror trials, using coerced testimony and protecting U.S. interrogators against prosecution for using methods that violate the Geneva Conventions.

The internal GOP struggle intensified along other fronts, as Colin Powell, Bush's first secretary of state, declared his opposition to the president's plan.

"The world is beginning to doubt the moral basis of our fight against terrorism," Powell, a retired general who is also a former chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, wrote in a letter.

Powell said that Bush's bill, by redoubling the kind of treatment the Geneva Conventions allow, "would add to those doubts. Furthermore, it would put our own troops at risk."

Firing back, White House spokesman Tony Snow said Powell was confused about the White House plan. Later, Snow said he probably shouldn't have used that word.

"I know that Colin Powell wants to beat the terrorists too," he said.

Countering Powell's letter, as the administration produced one from the current secretary of state to Warner. In it, Condoleezza Rice wrote that narrowing the standards for detainee treatment as Bush proposed "would add meaningful definition and clarification to vague terms in the treaties."

In the committee vote, Warner was supported by GOP Sens. John McCain of Arizona, Lindsey Graham of South Carolina and Susan Collins of Maine. Warner, McCain and Graham had been the most active senators opposing Bush's plan. The vote by the moderate Collins underscored that there might be broad enough GOP support to successfully take on Bush on the floor of the Republican-run Senate.

As the battle mushrooms, it threatens to undermine campaign season assertions by the administration that it has shown a steady hand on security matters and that Republicans should be trusted over Democrats on such issues.

Amplifying Bush's threat to block the committee's plan, White House spokesman Snow said, "The president will not accept something that shuts the program down" for interrogating detainees. His comments came a day after National Intelligence Director John Negroponte told reporters that the Senate plan would be likely to end the CIA interrogation and detention program.

# House OKs Mexican border fence

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House voted for the second time in a year to erect a fence along a third of the U.S.-Mexican border—part of a Republican effort to keep illegal immigration an issue before voters.

A new 700 miles of double-layered fencing won approval on a 263-139 vote, a bigger margin than last December when the House passed it as part of a broader bill that also would have made being an illegal immigrant a felony. The nearly 2,000-mile border now has about 75 miles of fencing.

Rep. Peter King, R-N.Y., said the separate fence bill was needed to show Americans "we can take meaningful action to secure the border."

The House's bill last December and one passed by the Senate last May are so far apart on issues that Republican leaders haven't even tried to negotiate a compromise.

The main difference is that the Senate bill would provide legal status to millions of illegal immigrants already in the U.S., a concept supported by President Bush but opposed by most House Republicans.

The Senate bill calls for 370 miles of fencing along the Mexican border.

Supporters of the House bill said the new fencing would let Border Patrol agents focus more on apprehending illegal immigrants crossing from Mexico rather than having to man the entire border.

"We have to come to grips with the fact that our Border Patrol agents need a border fence on our southern border ... where we're now facing infiltration by members of terrorist organizations like Hezbollah," said Rep. Ed Royce, R-Calif.

The bill passed Thursday doesn't pay for the fence, Republicans, estimating the cost at more than \$2 billion, said that will be covered in a later spending bill. Democrats estimated the fence would cost \$7 billion.

# NASA unfurls space station's new solar wings

HOUSTON (AP) — NASA unfurled the international space station's new solar wings for the first time Thursday. In what looked like a giant accordion being stretched out in orbit.

"Big day for space station. Congratulations." Mission Control radioed space shuttle Atlantis as the electricity-generating panels glinted like gold bars in the sunlight. "We're all extremely happy."

The unfurling of the 240-foot wings was delayed about three hours because of a software glitch involving the hardware's Ferris wheel-like rotating joint. That mechanism allows the solar panels to move with the sun to maximize the amount of electricity generated.

The crew did not run into any trouble with the folded-up panels sticking together in the

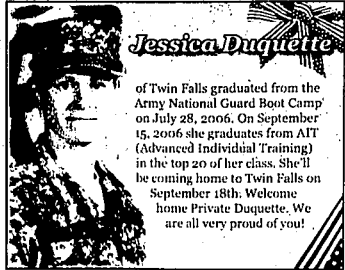
cold, a problem that came up during a mission in 2000. This time, NASA devised a method for unfurling the solar wings that allowed them to be heated up by the sun.

The solar wings — part of a new \$372-million addition that arrived aboard Atlantis earlier this week — were folded up and mounted on blankets during the ride into space. They will provide about a quarter of the space station's power when the orbiting outpost is completed in 2010.

The flight marks the first time since the Columbia disaster 3½ years ago that construction on the half-built space station has resumed. The new piece was installed during two spacewalks earlier this week.

Astronauts Joe Tanner, and

Heidemarie Stefanyshyn-Piper will begin their spacewalks on Friday to conduct the third and final spacewalk of the 11-day mission. Among other things, they will replace an antenna and gather up science experiments.

## Astronomers find distant, fluffy world

WASHINGTON (AP) — The largest planet ever found orbiting another star is so puffy it would float on water.

The newly discovered planet, dubbed HAT-P-1, is both the largest and least dense of the nearly 200 worlds astronomers have found outside our own solar system. HAT-P-1 orbits one of a pair of

stars in the constellation Lacerta, about 450 light-years from Earth.

"This new planet, if you could imagine putting it in a cosmic water glass, it would float," said Robert Noyes, a research astrophysicist with the Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory. The planet, a gas giant, is probably a puffed up ball of hydrogen and helium.

HAT-P-1 is an oddball planet, since it orbits its parent star at just one-twentieth of the distance that separates Earth

from our own sun. While Earth takes a year to orbit the sun, the newly found planet whips around its star once every 4.5 days.

Astronomers believe HAT-P-1 may belong to an entirely

new class of planets, along with a second, smaller distant world that's also puffier than theories would have predicted.

Noyes said. Astronomers used a network of telescopes in Arizona and Hawaii to discover the planet. Its parent star is too faint to see with the naked eye but can be spied with binoculars.

Now law-abiding, killer caught 30 years later

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — A convicted murderer who escaped from a Michigan psychiatric facility in 1976 was back behind bars Thursday after fleeing most of his 30 years on the run as an otherwise law-abiding family man in Tennessee, authorities said.

Thomas Ball, 76, was arrested at his Nashville home Wednesday morning. Deputy U.S. Marshal Danny Shelton said.

Ball had been using the name Thomas Fry and had run a storage business near Nashville for years with a woman he called his wife, Shelton said. After she died last year, he turned to the government for financial help, and that led the marshals to his door.

"Maybe he never thought the knock would come, but it did yesterday," Shelton said Thursday.

Ball was convicted in the 1960s of stabbing a 19-year-old woman to death at the Strand Hotel in Detroit, said Michigan Corrections Department spokesman Leo Lalonde. He said "Bill" had "killed" the woman for about a week.

Mexico issued a warrant for Chapman's arrest for his alleged kidnaping of Max Factor heir Andrew Luster three years ago.

Chapman's capture of Luster — a serial rapist — in Mexico catapulted the bounty hunter to fame and led to the reality series on the A&E channel.

"He arrests the bad guys — and he is definitely not one of

them," she said, adding he would be vindicated.

CDC: Black-white gap in vaccinations gone

ATLANTA — For the first time in at least a decade, the vaccination rate for black children in the United States has caught up to that of youngsters in other racial groups, the government reported Thursday.

"This is an important milestone. It shows you that racial and ethnic differences can be eliminated" in health care, said Dr. Walter Orenstein, an Emory University vaccination expert.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reported that a survey found no "statistically significant" difference in 2005 among blacks, whites, Asians and Hispanics in vaccination rates for children ages 19 months to 35 months. In each racial group, about 76 percent to 79 percent of children received the entire recommended series of shots

against whooping cough, diphtheria, tetanus, polio, measles, mumps, rubella, chickenpox, hepatitis B and Haemophilus influenza type B.

High court to release same-day transcripts

The Supreme Court announced Thursday that it will post same-day transcripts of its oral arguments for free on its Web site, the quickest and most complete public access to its proceedings the court has ever offered.

There is no sign that the court is about to yield to calls for live television coverage, which the justices have steadfastly refused. But, in the quiet, tradition-bound world of the Supreme Court, Thursday's decision was almost revolutionary, court analysts said.

"It's a tremendous opening to the outside world," said Richard Lazarus, a professor of law at Georgetown University and co-director of the school's Supreme Court Institute.

Jury: Reprimand Navy chaplain who disobeyed

NORFOLK, Va. — A jury on Thursday recommended that a Navy chaplain receive a letter of reprimand for disobeying an order by appearing in uniform at a political news conference at the White House.

The jury also recommended that Lt. Gordon Klingenschmitt forfeit \$250 pay per month for a year but suggested that the monetary punishment be suspended.

Rear Adm. Frederic Ruche, commander of the Navy's Mid-Atlantic Region, must decide whether to approve the recommendation.

The jury of five officers at Klingenschmitt's special court-martial determined Wednesday that he had disobeyed a superior officer's order prohibiting him from wearing his uniform during media appearances without prior permission.

The charge centered on a March-30 news conference protesting a Navy policy that requires nondenominational prayers outside of religious services.

Klingenschmitt had argued that he was allowed to wear his uniform if conducting a "bona fide worship service." He said he believes he was punished for making a political speech in uniform because he prayed in Jesus' name.

# Couple fought genocide amid Nazis

## Sharps join 'righteous' honor roll at U.S. Holocaust Memorial Museum

WASHINGTON — As the Nazis marched across Europe in 1939 and 1940, a Unitarian minister from Massachusetts and his wife rushed into the coming Holocaust to save Jews and other refugees, including dozens of children.

For their heroism, the U.S. Holocaust Memorial Museum dedicated plaques Thursday in memory of Waitstill and Martha Sharp — only the second and third U.S. citizens named to an honor roll of 21,000 "righteous" gentiles, non-Jews who risked their lives to rescue Jews.

But the moral example of the Sharps is arguably much greater, and certainly more complex, than those bare facts suggest. When they made two lengthy trips to Europe to save the children of strangers, they left their own children with relatives and parishioners. Their 2-year-old daughter and 7-year-old son were separated, and the daughter nearly died

of pneumonia in her parents' absence.

Decades later, their descendants are still working out the emotional consequences — and thinking over the ethical questions — created by the couple's wartime activity.

"The moral dilemma they pose for each of us is not just 'Am I willing to risk my own skin to save someone else's life?' It is 'Am I willing to impose risk and sacrifice on my children to save other people's lives?' said their grandson, Artemis Jonkowsky III of Boston.

Waitstill Sharp died in 1984. Martha Sharp Cogan, who had divorced and remarried, died in 1999. Jonkowsky, 45, is proud of them. He has done more than anyone to win their recognition by Yad Vashem, the Holocaust memorial. In Jerusalem, that maintains the list of righteous gentiles, including Oskar Schindler and Raoul Wallenberg. He is making a documentary film and writing a book in hopes that

their story will inspire Americans to act boldly when emergencies occur in such places as Darfur, Sudan.

Yet he said he could never do to his children what his grandparents did to his mother and uncle.

"I have to say, they crossed a certain line. One of them leaving was fine. But the fact that they both left, especially the second time, when they knew what they were getting into ... It was heroic, but it

crossed a line." Marianne Shecker-Feder of Laguna Hills, Calif., is not so sure.

She has a gallery but enduring memory of Martha Sharp, reinforced by a fading photograph taken on a sun-dappled street in the French port of Marseilles.

"She was a very, very elegant lady. Kind of serious and very concerned. You looked up to her. She demanded respect," said Shecker-Feder, 79.

## Government to require anti-rollover technology on new vehicles

WASHINGTON (AP) — New cars, SUVs and other vehicles will need to have anti-rollover technology by the 2012 model year, the government says, predicting the change will prevent thousands of roadway deaths a year.

"No other safety technology since the seat belt holds as much promise to save as many lives and prevent as many injuries as electronic stability control," Nicole Nason, administrator of the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, said Thursday in proposing the change.

Electronic stability control could save between 5,300 and 10,300 lives each year and prevent up to 252,000 injuries annually, the agency said. About half of the deaths in rollover crashes could be prevented with full deployment.

While seat belts and air bags protect motorists in a crash, the technology can help drivers avoid an accident in the first place, especially under icy and slick conditions. It senses when a driver may lose control of the vehicle and automatically applies brakes to individual wheels to help make it stable and avoid a rollover.

extremely dangerous, leading to more than 10,000 deaths a year even though they only account for about 3 percent of all crashes. More than 43,000 people are killed on the nation's roadways annually.

Studies have shown considerable benefits. The Insurance Institute for Highway Safety said earlier this year that 10,000 deaths could be avoided annually if passenger vehicles had the technology. They said it cut the risk of single-vehicle rollovers involving sport utility vehicles by 90 percent.

Armed with the evidence, automakers have updated their models with the technology, particularly on vehicles more prone to rollovers. General Motors Corp. said nearly two years ago that it would make the technology standard in all vehicles by 2010, including all SUVs and some full-size pickups in the 2007 model year.

Ford Motor Co. said earlier this week that it would put stability control on its entire line-up by the end of 2009. Toyota Motor Corp. said Thursday stability control would be a standard feature across all its models by 2009.

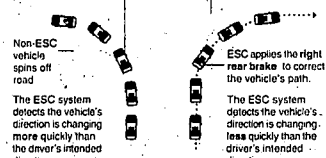
### Getting a handle on extreme maneuvers

Electronic stability control (ESC) technology senses when a driver may lose control and applies brakes to individual wheels to stabilize the vehicle.

Examples of ESC in extreme steering maneuvers

Spinning out (overspeeding) is a result of a vehicle entering a curve that is too extreme for the speed it is traveling. ESC applies the right front brake to correct the vehicle's path.

A vehicle may plow out (understeer) when entering a turn while running out of traction. Non-ESC vehicle plows off road.

## Paragliding wings over Wood River

Hang-gliding, and my one attempt at the sport, was my topic in this column March 17. Rick Hazen, a Twin Falls resident, contacted me and encouraged me to discover paragliding, and soon.

Paragliding is similar to hang-gliding. Hang-gliders have a rigid, fixed-wing. Paragliders are a parachute-like-nylon-wing under which you are suspended. I agreed to set a date for a tandem flight (pilot and passenger) from the summit of Sun Valley's Bald Mountain. I booked a flight with Fly Sun Valley, who operates a concession at the base of Baldy (River Run side) in Ketchum.

6 a.m.: I left Twin Falls with a scheduled meeting time of 8:30 a.m. with Hazen and tandem pilot, Tim Meehan at 9 a.m.

8:25 a.m.: I meet Hazen at the River Run landing zone. 9:06 a.m. Meehan and his comic relief arrive. "A good day to die, er, uh, fly," Tim chirps.

9:14 a.m.: I sign an injury waiver. The participant (me) must print in my own handwriting the following sentence: *realize that paragliding is an inherently dangerous sport that may result in injury, paralysis or death to me.* "Big deal," I say, "as long as I can write about it later."

"How much later?" asks Meehan.

We three ride the chairlift to the top. A long trip considering my apprehension and that the lift operates at half-speed during summer for those who want to look about. Meehan and Hazen spoke over my head (I had the middle seat on the chair lift), regarding what was good and bad about the current flying conditions.

We arrive atop Baldy. I forget when. As the launch site Meehan is wound tight. I watch him click from one check point to another. Droplets of sweat drip from his brow. Responsibility is evident in his every action. Meehan has been paragliding since 1989 and still moves without any visible impediment (save for his Boswell-athletic helmet, glasses and flying suit). I feel less doomed. Meehan mentions his worst and his best tandem flights: a birthday gift for his 66-year-old mother and an 84-year-old former P-38 fighter-pilot who last flew in combat. It's your guess which is which.

"Three, two, one. Go! Go! Go!" Meehan says and I lean forward and run. Meehan, harnessed to me, runs forward in my footprints. The wing fills with a sssnnnaaappp, sounding remarkably like a potato chip bag crinkling, albeit a huge bag.

10:29 a.m.: Suddenly we are aloft. Way high. The ride is very smooth. A slight thermal provides lift and we climb higher than Baldy. Meehan instructs me to lean prior to turns. It works. I take photos, lousy photos. To me the view is simply OK, nothing to write about. I've enjoyed it while skiing many times.

The intensity of Meehan's actions behind me represses my vision and I incredulously listen. Meehan's speech is clipped, and is a combination of tour guide, grunts, and breaths resounding as a reverential prayer.

"Thermal lift remains constant and we fly east across the valley. Our wing is built to haul up to 450 pounds. Together Meehan and I weigh 285. The wing is no P16, and it responds more like a C-5.

"I ask for a "make me sick" maneuver. Meehan instructs: "lean left, good! Lean right, good! Now left!" The wing stands vertically on its starboard tip and we are in a wing-over dive. Soaring like a tetherball that Tugga (the big guy in gym class), just belted. A 60-mph arc. We live, we land. I will earn more money for another ride or to purchase a wing of my own.

## Upland game bird season arrives for 2006

As fall approaches upland birds become the focus of many hunters. One of the first questions uttered by many shotgunners generally relates to pheasants.

In 2005 dependent pheasant hunters experienced a better than usual season due to a delayed first alfalfa cutting caused by rains. In 2006, the cutting was on schedule in late May and June disrupting initial nesting attempts.

A quick examination of the numbers established by roadside counts explains the difference between these two years. In 2005 0.45 birds per mile were sighted. In 2006, August sightings were 0.25 pheasants per mile which is slightly higher than the 10-year average of 0.24 pheasants per mile. The forecast is for a stable population but not a banner year.

Pheasant stocking will continue at Niagara Springs Wildlife Management Area and at several wildlife tracts north of Paul. Hunters should also be aware that a youth pheasant season opens on the first

weekend of October. It is open statewide and lasts for two days. This season is for all licensed hunters 15 years old or younger. All youths must be accompanied by an adult of at least 18 years old. One adult hunter may accompany more than one youth.

young hunter. The Niagara Springs WMA will receive a stocking of pheasants prior to the youth hunt so the young hunters will be assured that "targets" are in the area.

Pheasants:  
Area 2: Oct. 21 through Nov. 30.  
Daily bag limit - three cocks.  
Possession limit after first day - six cocks.  
Area 3: Oct. 21 through Dec. 31.

### New rule on orange

All upland game hunters and upland game bird hunters are required to wear hunter orange during pheasant season when hunting on Wildlife Management Areas where pheasants are stocked, under a new rule adopted by Idaho Fish and Game.

The new rule does not apply to waterfowl hunters, dove hunters, big game hunters, and those upland hunters using the Management Areas before or after pheasant season. It does apply to other upland game bird hunters during the pheasant season.

There is no set amount or piece of wear of hunter orange required. Free hunter orange hats and will be available on the WMA's this year to educate hunters about safety and encourage them to observe the new requirement. Hopefully, the use of hunter orange this year will make people even more safety conscious and greatly reduce the chance of an accident spoiling an otherwise wonderful fall hunt.

Chukars appear to be a bright spot on the fall horizon. Fluctuations are quite normal in the chukar population. Numbers for 2006 do indicate a slight decline from the very good chukar numbers experienced during the 2004 and 2005 seasons, but areas

## Outdoor Idaho program highlights bird hunt

**BOISE** — A dog, a gun and an early fall day in Idaho — time for a wing-shooting outdoor as upland game bird seasons begin.

Producer Jim Peck samples several locations in this new Outdoor Idaho episode, which airs Thursday, Sept. 21, at 8 p.m., and again Sunday, Sept. 24 at 7 p.m.

Peck joins friends and family members to move through the pre-dawn quiet and the intense shades of autumn of the later hours of the day in search of

ducks, pheasants, chukars and grouse.  
"It's the anticipation of fall and winter, lots of birds, the first time you've seen friends and family in a while. Oftentimes, kids come home and it's cooled off a little bit. It's always a very special start to the season," Peck says.

Wingshooting is the act of shooting birds that are in the air. In flight, it takes skill, steadiness, quick response and a keen anticipation of where the bird will be, rather than

where it is now.  
"When done right, there is simply something beautiful about wing-shooting, a combination of nature, human grace, focus and good bird dogs," Peck says.

The camera documents each day's experience as the birds, the terrain, and the season change. Some constants remain: sense of surroundings, sights, sounds, sounds and atmosphere. Sometimes, a shot is successful and a dog retrieves the

hunts. Sometimes it is just a beautiful day in Idaho, which is rich in good upland game bird habitat.

"In fact, missing a shot is not that bad. What would be tragic is missing what is surrounding the hunter — missing out on Idaho."

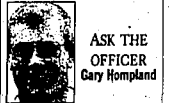

## Fishing limits reduced at Anderson Ranch

**Question:** "I know some guys that were elite in the 1970s of kokanee salmon on the South Fork Boise River. Isn't the kokanee limit 25?"

**Answer:** The kokanee limit on Anderson Ranch Reservoir is per day, 50 fish. However, in the South Fork Boise River the kokanee daily bag and possession limit is reduced to only 6 fish of any size.

salmon run up the South Fork Boise River in the fall to spawn. In their brilliant red fall spawning colors they are vulnerable to disturbance and over har-

vest by anglers. To protect future fishing opportunities in Anderson Ranch Reservoir, fishing limits for spawning kokanee have been reduced.

Past practices of snagging spawning kokanee have been reduced for many years. Licensed anglers are allowed to fish for and catch fall kokanee using conventional fishing gear. Kokanee can be enticed to rise for jugs, some baits, and flashy lures.

## Scientists salvaging, scrapping sea lion data after lawsuit

**ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP)** — Scientists are salvaging the loss of antelope amounts of data on steller sea lions after their study permits were revoked in a lawsuit by an animal rights group in early summer, the best time of year for observing the endangered animals.

The decision found that the National Marine Fisheries Service, which issues the permits, had not properly assessed whether some research techniques, such as branding sea lion pups, were essential to studying the animals.

"We missed the peak pupping period," Laurie Rea, head of the Alaska Department of Fish and Game in Fairbanks, said Wednesday. "We don't know how many gave birth and lost pups or had stillbirths, so the data is all compromised."

A data gap could stymie understanding of the severe and enigmatic decline of Steller sea lion populations in the last three decades. The western population of sea lions, whose range spans central Alaska to northern Japan, inexplicably dropped from 200,000 in the 1970s to 35,000 animals in 2002, according to federal estimates.

Andrew Trites, research director for the North Pacific Universities Marine Mammal Research Consortium, was tracking what Steller sea lions eat, which animals were giving birth, which were surviving, and to what extent commercial fishing could be affecting the blubbery animals' abilities to feed.

"Our ability to answer those questions was stopped," Trites said. "Hopefully it doesn't have a long-term consequence."

A settlement in the suit, filed in May by the Humane Society of the United States, allowed some observational research to resume in June. But scientists said merely watching the animals from afar is not enough. They need to be close enough to count ears, fins and tails, and to brand new pups annually to keep years-long studies accurate and up-to-date.

Trites scrapped a \$300,000 foraging and dietary study of the animals in southeast Alaska as a result of the ruling because his team was banned from getting close enough to collect fecal waste.

"It was our worst casualty," Trites said. "While we could have gone out and still counted

animals, we'd have been spending a lot of money to find out very little."

The Alaska State Center at Seward had to release a group of juvenile Steller sea lions in the midst of a study, said scientist director Matt Damon Atkinson. The center shifted \$100,000 in Steller sea lion research money to studies on other pinnipeds, a family that includes seals, sea lions and walrus.

Rea said a five-year, \$1 million study on sea lion breeding in southwest Alaska will be less precise than she hoped, but was salvaged by doing extra observations later in the summer.

"So much money has been invested in this species, and years of studies are just now coming to fruition," Atkinson said. "It wasn't the best time to stop them."

Six permit holders have been left in limbo as the fisheries service scrambles to craft the environmental impact statement required in the ruling by Judge William Alton Howe of the U.S. District Court in Washington, D.C.

The Humane Society said the fisheries service is at fault for the scientists' quandary. In 2003 it had warned NMFS it would file a lawsuit over the lack of justification for the research.

"Any delays, lost research or financial loss falls squarely on the doorstep of NMFS," said Humane Society attorney Jonathan Lovorn. "We had offered them the same deal in this case that they ended up rejecting, they said no."

Lovorn said the lawsuit had to coincide with the issuance of the research permits. In invalidating the permits, he said, the court could not differentiate between the various types of research methods because the permits covered them all.

Officials at NMFS said court battles are routine in shaping marine policy. The lawsuit is the latest in the long, five-year challenge to endangered species research. The others involved green sea turtles in Hawaii and gray whales of the California coast.

"If you've never challenged in court, you may not recognize your shortcomings," said Steve Leathers, former chief of NMFS' division. "Litigation is an important part of public policy."

Leathers said the agency had done less extensive studies on Steller sea lion research, but avoided a full-blown environmental impact study.

"It's a long time and a lot more money,"

## Lawsuit filed over deaths of Japanese students

According to the lawsuit, Graybeal told them to swim rather than stay with the canoe and "made no effort to assist or save Tanaka or Nasu."

such as the Brunede drainage and Jarbridge canyons should have very good numbers of the gregarious birds. Surveys at Brownlee and Lucky Peak reveal that chukar numbers are about average. Not surprisingly, prospects for chukars in northern Nevada are also good this season.

Hungarian partridge numbers in the farmed areas of the Magic Valley have declined slightly from 2005 but are still above the 10-year average. August 2006 surveys revealed 163 birds (0.29 Huns per mile) as opposed to 200 birds (0.29 Huns per mile) during 2005.

The 10-year average is only 0.17 birds per mile. Worth noting is that the roadside survey is conducted in agricultural areas. Hungarian partridge numbers in the South Hills and on other areas that are not cultivated are not measured. These areas may produce good hunting but the numbers of Huns in unknown areas. Opener: Sept. 16 through Jan. 31.

**Chukar and gray partridge:** Sept. 18 through Jan. 31, 2007. Daily bag limit — eight chukar and eight gray partridge. Possession limit after first day — 16 chukar and 16 gray partridge.

**Sage grouse numbers** have almost doubled since 1994 in the Magic Valley Region. Above average spring precipitation in 2005 produced excellent nest-

ing conditions and brood-rearing conditions. While numbers have increased, concern is focused on sage grouse due to loss of habitat from fires. Approximately 40 percent of the sage grouse hunters and harvest came from the Magic Valley between the years of 2001 through 2005. Not unexpectedly, the largest concentrations of sage grouse are found near stands of extensive sage brush. Areas in the vicinity of Anderson Reservoir, Thorn Creek, Browns Bench, and Shoshone Basin contain typical sage grouse habitat. Opener Check the regulations published by IDFG since the areas are somewhat segmented.

**Sage grouse:** Area 1: closed, with some exceptions. Area 2: Sept. 16 through Sept. 22. Daily bag limit — one. Possession limit after first day — two.

Area 3: Closed in Owyhee County west of Brunede River, elsewhere Opener Sept. 16 through Oct. 6. Daily bag limit — two. Possession limit after first day — four.

California quail are expected in above average numbers but will not be as plentiful as last season. Roadside surveys indicate a decrease of twenty-one percent from last year but the numbers were still twice as good as the ten-year average. As usual, the highest

concentrations of quail are found along the Snake River and its tributaries and west of Twin Falls.

**Bobwhite and California quail:** Sept. 16 through Jan. 31. Area 2 only, Area 1 closed. Daily bag limit — 11 total. Possession limit — 11. First day — 20 total.

Fluffed grouse are difficult to monitor. Field reports suggest the numbers of ruffed grouse will be slightly down in the South Hills and Sublett Mountains. Early season hunters generally do have difficulty locating birds due to the fact that vegetation is quite dense during the opening weeks of the season.

Blue grouse reports from the field are somewhat consistent. Several reports from Blaine County have indicated good grouse numbers but those reports are offset by hunters who have not had success. One report is that hunters might try exploring at somewhat lower elevations in hopes that the blue grouse have not yet moved upward.

**Forest grouse** (blue, ruffed, spruce): Sept. 1 through Dec. 31. Daily bag limit — four total. Possession limit after first day — eight total.

Sharp-tailed grouse numbers appear to be stable based on lek surveys. While stable, the numbers are lower than counts conducted dur-

ing 1999 and 2000. Hunters should find sharp tails in CHIP fields that have green alfalfa or other green forage. If the weather remains dry, hunters would be well advised to hunt the edges of fields that border shrubs and contain green forbs and wild berries.

"Sharp-tailed grouse have recently been introduced into historical range in southern Twin Falls County and south eastern Owyhee County. Twin Falls County, Owyhee County and most of Cassia County are closed to the hunting of sharp-tailed grouse."

Where hunting is legal, be sure to identify a sharp tail since it may also share the habitat of sage grouse.

**Sharp-tailed grouse:** Oct. 1 through Oct. 31. Daily bag limit — two total. Possession limit after first day — four total.

## Snails infest fish preserve

**LAS VEGAS (AP)** — Wildlife officials have removed some of the few remaining Devil's Hole pupfish from a concrete tank near Hoover Dam after it became infested with invasive snails.

The rare desert fish were captured earlier this month and taken to an aquarium at Mandalay Bay hotel-casino on the Las Vegas Strip, the Willow Beach Fish hatchery on Lake Mohave and a temporary holding facility near the dam, the U.S. Fish-and-Wildlife Service said.

Hole pupfish was listed as an endangered species in 1967. Officials have struggled to protect the fish despite management mistakes and a recent drop in population.

Fish traps fell into the hole in September 2004 and killed about one-third of the fish population in April, wildlife officials counted 67 fish in existence: 38 at the hole and 29 at the Hoover Dam preserve. Bob Williams, Nevada's state fish supervisor for the Fish and Wildlife Service, said it was not clear how the non-native snails or their eggs had infested the Hoover Dam pre-

# Banshee boardin'

## Board system maker hopes for sport to catch on

**HORSESHOE BEND** — Kevin Veon leaps from a rock into the Payette River and lets its swift current tug him downstream. With both hands, the 31-year-old president of Banshee Riverboards grips one of his company's thin fiberglass boards beneath the surface.

A small hook on the board's underside is attached to a bungee cord, which, in turn, is tied to a shoreline boulder.

Once the bungee stretches to 200 feet, Veon flattens the board, allowing it to rise.

Suddenly, he's speeding forward at 30 mph. Standing like a surfer for eight or nine seconds, he sends a wall of spray toward the riverbank.

In two years since helping found the company as a student at Boise State University, Veon has met dozens of investors he's got \$200,000 from the Yoshida Group, the Portland, Ore. sauce maker that owns Chronos snowboards, gone ahead (Banshee won a best-new-product competition at a 2006 trade fair in Germany) and learned to appreciate his wife's credit card ("She's probably the only reason there's a Banshee Riverboards today," he said).

Veon, who graduated this year with a master's degree in business administration, is counting on newly acquired business acumen — plus a very basic principle of sports-product marketing — to keep Banshee from wiping out.

"If something is cool, it's going to grow," he said, adding he foresees competitors and even soda-pop commercials for the riverboarding industry.

"Late this summer, Veon is on the hunt for more investors.

"I'm almost 30 percent sure we've started something," said Veon, who hopes to eventually sell Banshee to a large company. "What I'm trying to do now is make sure we're there at the end."

The idea behind riverboarding isn't so new.

For decades, kids have been constructing homemade plywood contraptions in their garages, attaching ropes to bridge supports and riding currents. That's how Robert Geler, Banshee's resident inventor, got started as a youngster.

"There was a canal two blocks from the end of my street," said Geler, 39, whose day job is wading through tax records at the Idaho State Tax Commission.

Despite experimenting with elastic surgical tubing from a medical supply store, Geler lost interest. The tubing was expensive and broke quickly. Three years ago, however, Geler's interest was rekindled when he saw kids at a local Boise bridge with ropes and plywood boards of their own.

"Kids were screaming," he said. "I said to myself, 'I'm going to have to start building those again.'"

His first stop for advice was at Boise State University's Small Business Development Center.

There, Kent Neupner, a business professor, turned Geler's idea into a class project. Veon, one of Neupner's students, developed a business plan for Banshee.

After winning a BSU business competition, Veon told Geler he wanted to incorporate.

Neupner signed on as an investor.

"The attractive part of it was, it was a traditional Idaho pastime — take a piece of rope, attach it to a tree, float the Boise River," said Neupner. "You can basically surf without a boat. You don't need \$3 a gallon for gasoline to have a great time."

The combination of board and bungee are patented, so nobody can copy the idea, Veon said.

Using 30 dealers mostly in the West, Banshee has sold about 300 boards so far, and 200 in 2006, he said.

Its least-expensive version, a wooden board and bungee, costs \$300.

The fiberglass version, called the "Evolution," runs \$650.

But the price isn't the biggest hurdle, some dealers say.

The biggest drawback is so few people have heard about

riverboarding. Chris Grier, owner of Geler's Peedler in Bend, Ore., discontinued the boards after selling just one last year.

"We couldn't get out there on the river and show people," he said.

Paul Barker, who owns Extreme Outdoor Supply near Salt Lake City, has sold five boards through his Web site.

"When I tell people about it, they say, 'That's crazy. So, you basically just slingshot up the river?' My wife was really worried about it," said Barker, who has a board himself. "You've got to get something famous on these boards. There's got to be a buzz."

Getting more store employees to ride will be important to spreading the word, Veon said.

Both he and Geler said much of their new business comes from people floating past on the Payette or Boise rivers while they conduct field testing to improve the boards. A cumbersome handle is gone, for instance, and a patent is pending on the hook that allows the bungee cord to detach mid-ride.

On a recent summer afternoon, Geler cased down the bank of the Boise River and tied a bungee cord to a tree in preparation for a riverboarding session. A man on a nearby footpath came to the river's edge.

"He said, 'So, you're the next

Jake Burton," said Geler, a reference to the man regarded as the father of another, better-known board sport: snowboarding. "I thought about it a second, and said, 'I hope so.'"

# Evidence indicates wolf in Oregon

**PORTLAND, Ore. (AP)** — Videotape and repeating sightings indicate a young black wolf is roaming over a 120-square-mile area of Walla Walla County in northeast Oregon, biologists said.

"It's sure appears at this point it's a wild wolf," said Russ Morgan, the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife wolf coordinator based in La Grande.

The wolf's presence would confirm what biologists have long said — that it was only a matter of time before a booming wolf population in Idaho overflows into Oregon. Sightings of what may be another wolf in the Wallawa Mountains still have not been confirmed.

Other wolves have entered Oregon. But officials captured one and moved it back to Idaho, while the others were killed — one on a highway and the other illegally shot — before their presence became known.

This time, the wolf has been hovering in Wallawa County for more than a month, and, there are no plans to remove it. Biologists say it could stay in the area on its own or suddenly take off for new terrain.

"It appears the animal is working some kind of a home range," Morgan said.

The return of the wolf will test whether the state can cope with a predator exterminated decades ago to make the range safe for livestock.

four breeding pairs each in Eastern Oregon and Western Oregon, and calls for state biologists to monitor the animals. Wolves in Oregon are protected by federal and state endangered-species acts. It is illegal to shoot wolves in Oregon even if they attack livestock.

State biologists are keeping ranchers notified of the latest wolf reports, Morgan said.

Walla Walla County is on the front lines when it comes to wolves. It borders Idaho and is home to many ranches. Ranchers worry their livestock could be vulnerable to wolves and have strongly opposed the predator's return.

"We knew this was going to happen, I guess," said county Commissioner Irv Roswell. "What people in this community want is simply the means to protect their property."

## Economic development: It is a regional effort

TWIN FALLS — One of the benefits of having a regional economic development organization is that you have a phone number. And a business looking for a place to relocate or expand just might just might call that number.

Jan Rogers, executive director of the Southern Idaho Regional Development Organization, answered the phone to hear someone from Ilex Poly Co. on the line. Ilex Poly is a leading manufacturer of plastic bags and film products.

"They were looking for a location and a facility," Rogers said Thursday following a SIEDO meeting. "It just so happened we had the Moore facility in Jerome."

The Moore Co., which made office forms, had closed its Jerome location, leaving behind an empty building.

The building wasn't empty for long. With help from SIEDO, Ilex Poly opened operations in the spring of 2004. By the time the company celebrated its grand opening in the fall of 2005 it had completed its third expansion. Today, more than 100 employees working round the clock produce more than 5 billion plastic bags annually. More expansions are planned this year.

Rogers said it's an amazing operation to watch.

"When you see what goes into making plastic bags — it's 'Saw Wars' stuff," she said.

SIEDO was born back in June 2001 as a joint venture of the public and private sectors to help diversify and strengthen the local economies of Twin

Falls and Jerome. Since then, the community of Butte, as well as the Maui-Cassa and Hailley-Sun Valley regions have jumped on board.

With an estimated \$130 million in capital investments, the region has sited at least a dozen industrial companies employing some 800-plus workers, including the Dell Technical Support Center, Jayco — an RV and trailer manufacturer, and Gossner Foods, a cheese company. Many of the companies have undertaken major expansions resulting approximately 800 new jobs and more than \$100 million in capital investments, according to SIEDO.

"What has made SIEDO so successful in recruiting business to the area? Team work, and a phone number."

"It's a concerted effort," Rogers said. "Several businesses wouldn't have even been here

without a contact base — without this regional effort."

SIEDO aims to continue that successful recruiting record. SIEDO members discussed the organization's annual report Thursday at the Herrett Center at the College of Southern Idaho. In 2005-2006, 38 active leads were generated resulting in 17 site visits to southern Idaho. Three of those companies decided to make southern Idaho their home, including Multihulland Positioning Systems and Dutchmen Manufacturing in Burley, and the Secular Co. in Jerome. Currently, SIEDO and its partners are pursuing 18 active new business leads, according to the report.

## Business Plus contracts Hartgen for fundraising

TWIN FALLS — Steve Hartgen calls his latest gig a "labor of love."

That's because Hartgen loves economic development. And now Business Plus Inc., the Magic Valley's economic development organization of businesses, has contracted with Stephen Hartgen and Associates for executive management and fundraising functions.

Stephen Hartgen Associates LLC is a local media relations and political strategies firm founded by Hartgen, former publisher of the Times-News and the Wood River Journal. The firm specializes in public policy development, issues positioning and campaigns.

Hartgen not only "loves" economic development, he "knows" economic development, said Joy Tremblay, who heads up Business Plus. She said choosing Hartgen for the job was a no-brainer.

Steve has many years of experience in regional economic development," Tremblay said. "He truly understands the mission of BP Inc., which is providing incentives for job creation by the expansion of existing businesses and the recruitment of new businesses."

Business Plus is the successor to previous rounds of economic development dating back to the early 1980s, according to a news release from the organization. The group, which has an all-local investor board, consists of more than 70 contributing members, headed by Tremblay, director of community relations for St. Luke's, Magic Valley Regional Medical Center.

"In contract with Hartgen's," she began Sept. 1, Tremblay said. Hartgen's mission will be to double the number of contributing members to 150 companies and businesses, and to raise about \$2 million over three years — nearly double the \$1.2 million raised in a similar fundraising effort in Business Plus' previous effort. Hartgen will also help create a business recruiting endowment that would help fund economic development through a revolving loan fund to applying businesses. Under the contract, Hartgen will also function as the Business Plus executive director, explaining the group's goals to business leaders and in the community.

"It's a labor of love for me," Hartgen said. "There's hardly anything more important in a community than economic development. It's a team effort of government, business and the private sector." Hartgen would not disclose how much he would be paid through the private contract with Business Plus. Business Plus does not receive tax dollars, said Dan Olmstead, a Business Plus board member.

Began in 1980 and continued through three rounds, Business Plus I, II and III have helped fund such major employers as Solo Cup, the Dell technical support center and Ilex Poly Co., which, among other things, makes the plastic bags shoppers cart their groceries home in. More than 1,000 jobs were created in the Magic Valley in the most recent five-year program.

Business Plus started as an arm of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce and incorporated this year as a stand-alone organization. Its membership comes from area counties, including Twin Falls, Jerome, Minidoka, Cassia and Blaine.

"It's privately funded and business driven — a very unique entity in this region," Tremblay said.

Hartgen was the publisher of the Times-News from 1990 to 2004. During his 14-year tenure, he served on the Business Plus board and participated in the group's earlier fundraising efforts to attract Solo Cup and Dell, among others, to the area.

As businesses consider an area, a package of land-use regulation, appropriate zoning and monetary incentives are often needed to attract top companies, Hartgen said in the news release. The role of Business Plus is to provide a financial pool with which communities can attract well-paying jobs in environmentally-sound industries.

"The Magic Valley" has many, many positive business attributes, including a long list of businesses committed to growth and an attractive business climate," he said. "I'm proud to be associated with this effort and am honored to be selected by Business Plus to lead this effort."

Hartgen retired from the newspaper business in September 2005 and founded Hartgen and Associates. He's worked as a member and past vice chairman of the Idaho Association of Commerce and Industry and is a two-term member of the Idaho Capitol Commission, which is set to open the state's premier public building.

He came to the Magic Valley in 1982 as managing editor of the Times-News, taking over the top office in town. He's a graduate of Andover College and holds a PhD from the University of Minnesota. His wife, Linda, is trial court administrator for Idaho's 5th Judicial District.

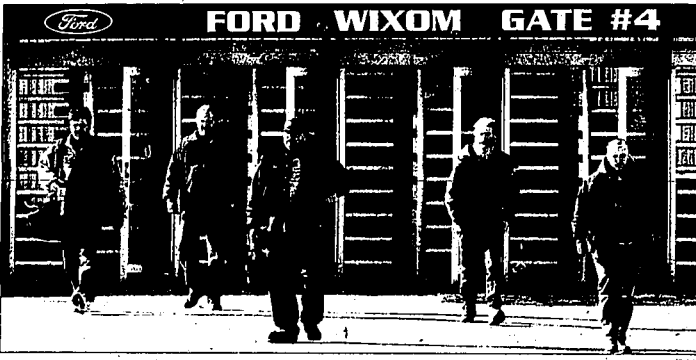

## Union leader says Ford to offer buyouts to more than 75,000 workers

DETROIT — Ford Motor Co. plans to offer buyout and early retirement packages to more than 75,000 of its employees, a United Auto Workers union official said Thursday.

The union told its members about the plan after discussions with Ford on the proposal, said Chris Kimmons, president of UAW Local 919 at the Norfolk, Va., assembly plant. The buybacks are aimed at

helping Ford cut costs as its sales shrink and fierce competition from more fuel-efficient models from Asian automakers.

Ford's board of directors has been meeting for two days over expanding its restructuring plan. The nation's second biggest automaker said it would announce details of the new plan at 7 a.m. EDT Friday.

The plan is likely to include job cuts and plant closings to give Ford's manufacturing

capacity in line with slumping demand for its cars and trucks. Kimmons said the packages offer \$45,000 to \$140,000 to workers who leave the company, depending on their years of service and retirement eligibility.

"I think it's a good package," he said. "I think they worked real hard on it. They've got to do something to help Ford out of this crisis."

Depending on which plan is chosen, workers may have to give up health benefits,

Kimmons said. "Once again, our members are stepping up to make hard choices under difficult circumstances," UAW President Ron Gettelinger said in a statement.

## Segway recalls scooters Software problem can cause riders to fall off

NEW YORK — Segway Inc. is recalling all 23,500 of the self-balancing scooters it has shipped to date because of a software glitch that can make its wheels unexpectedly reverse direction, causing riders to fall off — and in at least one incident, broke some teeth.

The U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, with whom Segway is cooperating on the voluntary recall announced Thursday, said consumers should stop using the vehicles immediately.

Segway has received six reports of problems with the Personal Transporter, resulting in head and wrist injuries. The vehicles were previously known

as the Human Transporter. Segway is offering a free software upgrade that will fix the problem. The upgrades will be done at Segway's 100 dealerships and service centers around the world, according to Segway spokeswoman, Carol Vallano, and the company based in Bedford, N.H., will pay to ship the devices to the appropriate center if need be.

It is the second time the scooters, which sell for about \$4,000 to \$5,500, have been recalled since they first went on sale in 2002. The 2003 recall involved the first 6,000 of the devices, sold, and involved a problem that could cause riders to fall off the device when its battery ran out of juice.

Segway Chief Technology Officer Doug Field, who has been involved with the develop-

ment of the device since its earliest days, said the problem that sparked the latest recall was found while the company was testing its new model. He said a very unusual and specific set of conditions can cause the problem.

The scooter's speed is determined by how far forward the user leans, and if the rider leans too far forward, a "speed limiter" pushes them back to keep the device at its maximum speed of 12.5 mph.

The problem happens after the speed limiter sits back, the rider steps off the device and then gets back on it quickly. After the company found the six incidents believed to be related to the problem, it notified the CPSC and got the ball rolling on the recall, Field said.

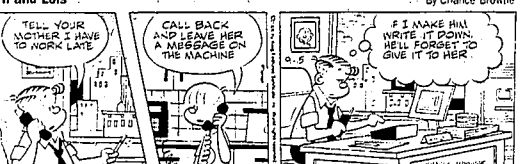

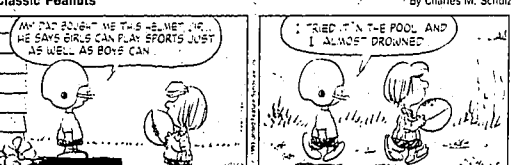

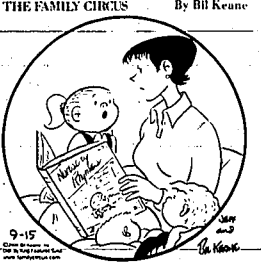

# Shower could turn stormy if troubled friend attends

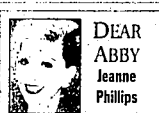

Gerskin wrote on the publication's Web site that he has not been trying to kill the cats and was using Humane Society traps to help get them to safe homes.

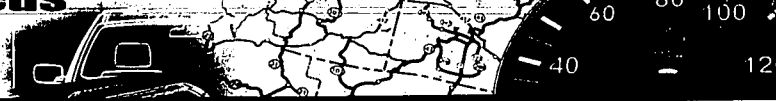

A. It sounds like you might have accidentally overworked the lighter circuit, which isn't difficult to do with a current hungry inflator pump. Start by checking the Caravan's rear cigarette lighter for proper operation. If it's OK, we know the No. 6 and the lighter accessory relay (both located in the under hood power distribution center) are OK, as both lighters share these components. If not, and you're sure you've checked the correct fuse, renewing the relay may be a costly fix, if you gamble.

If the rear lighter isn't OK, this leaves the front lighter socket as the wiring connector as the most likely cause of the problem. Check the front socket for a burned or fatigued contact at the center-bottom of the socket - compare it with the rear one as necessary. If it looks good, take a look at the wiring connector at its backside for a burned or loose connection. If the problem isn't found here, it's time to seek professional help to check and repair a possible faulty inline connector between the power distribution center and instrument panel.

If you plan to reuse the mattress inflator again, I'd consider installing its lighter plug and using all of your heavy-duty battery clips to the wires, and when needed, connecting the clips directly to the Caravan's battery terminals.

# THE ACES ON BRIDGE® Bobby Wolff

"A right rule for a club would be... no man with presence excludes any one topic..." - Ralph Waldo Emerson

Against: four hearts your partner leads the two clubs to your left, declarer dropping the jack. Who had the singleton club, and what is the right play at trick two?

The answer is that partner had only one club with twin he would have had the higher of his doubleton. Since partner can hardly have a natural trump trick, you decide to return the nine of clubs, which partner ruffs. As the nine is suit-preference for the higher suit (of spades and diamonds), partner obediently returns the seven of spades to you. What now?

The only possible place for a fourth defensive trick must come from your partner's hand, and it must come from the diamonds.

If declarer already has sufficient spade winners on which to discard dummy's diamond losers, there is nothing you can do about it. What you can do is make sure declarer cannot set up a club trick for the discard of a diamond from hand. To prevent any possibility of that, play the seven of clubs now, while partner still has a trump in his hand. This will kill the potential club trick in dummy, and whether declarer ruffs high or discards, the defense must get one more trick.

Incidentally, had you cashed the club ace at trick two and played a third club, declarer would have ruffed high, drawn trump, and pitched his diamond loser on the fourth club. He would have lost just the three top tricks in the black suits; contract made!

**ANSWER:** Were you tempted to rebid two clubs to show a minimum and emphasize your sixth club? Wash your mouth out, and then repeat after me: "I will always bid a four-card major rather than repeat a six-card minor suit if I can do so economically." One spade is the right bid here; it shows your second suit, and you can always bid the clubs again later.


