One killed, three injured in collision

TWIN FALLS — One person was killed and three were injured in a Dodge pickup towing a horse trailer that ran a stop sign and collided with a cement truck, according to the Twin Falls Sheriff's Office.

The collision at the intersection of 3700 N and 10th S killed an unidentified passenger in the pickup. A second passenger was airlifted to Boise and two more were taken to St. Luke's Magic Valley Regional Medical Center.

The crash also killed a horse and dog traveling with the pickup.

The Twin Falls Sheriff's Office is not releasing the names of the victims until family members have been notified. Lead Investigator Deputy Jay Wiggins said none of the victims was from Idaho.

The driver of the Idaho Concrete Co. truck left the scene of the accident in a private vehicle and reportedly checked himself into a hospital later Wednesday.

No more information was available by press time Wednesday.

Cory Lidle and passenger killed in crash into 50-story skyscraper

NEW YORK — A small plane carrying New York Yankee Cory Lidle slammed into a 50-story skyscraper Wednesday, apparently killing the pitcher and a second person in a crash that rained flaming debris onto the sidewalks and briefly raised fears of another terrorist attack.

A law enforcement official in Washington said Lidle — an avid pilot who got his flying license during last year's offseason — was aboard the single-engine aircraft when it crashed into the 30th and 31st floors of the high-rise on Manhattan's Upper East Side. Mayor Michael Bloomberg said "both people aboard were killed."

It was not immediately clear who was at the scene. See CRASH, Page A3

In the balance

Water ruling may affect conservation program

BOISE — Time may be running out. Groundwater pumpers who have expressed interest in lifting their land in exchange for money as part of the Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program may miss their opportunity to join the program, depending on the outcome of a case soon to be before the Idaho Supreme Court.

The court will hear on Dec. 8 an appeal of 5th District Court Judge Barry Wood's June ruling that declared conservative management has been the protocol for water distribution for about a dozen years.

If the court upholds Wood's ruling, groundwater users fear their junior water rights will likely be curtailed.

- 5 Grab a carrot, a replica of the Washington Monument or any other phallic object. According to Romans, such objects seduce the evil spirit away from you — however, your carrot might then be possessed.

Iraq troop levels to stay same until 2010

WASHINGTON — For planning purposes, the Army is gearing up to keep current troop levels in Iraq for another four years, a new indication that conditions there are too unstable to foresee an end to the war. Gen. Peter Schoonmaker, the Army chief of staff, cautioned against reading too much into the planning, which is done far in advance to prepare the right mix of combat units for expected deployments. He noted that it is easier to scale back later if conditions allow, than to ramp up if they don't.

American indicted on charges of treason

LOS ANGELES — The charge of treason was used for the first time in the United States' war on terrorism Wednesday, filed against a California man who appeared in propaganda videos for al-Qaida. Adam Yehiye Gadahn, 28, could be sentenced to death if convicted of the charge, which has been used only a few dozen times in U.S. history and not at all since the World War II era. He also was indicted on a charge of providing material support to terrorists. Gadahn "knowingly adhered to an enemy of the United States, namely, al-Qaida, and gave al-Qaida aid and comfort ... with intent to betray the United States," according to the indictment, handed up by an Orange County grand jury. The suspected al-Qaida operative has been sought by the FBI since 2004.

controls and who was the second person aboard. Law enforcement officials, speaking on condition of anonymity, said Lidle's passport was found on the street.

Federal Aviation Administration records showed the plane was registered to Lidle, who had repeatedly assured reporters in recent months that flying was safe and that the Yankees — who were traumatized in 1979 when catcher Thurman Munson was killed in the crash of a plane he was piloting — had no reason to worry.

"The flying?" the 34-year-old Lidle, who had a home near Los Angeles, told The Philadelphia Inquirer this summer. "I'm not worried about it. I'm safe up there. I feel very comfortable with my abilities flying an airplane."

The crash came just four days after the Yankees' embarrassingly quick elimination from the playoffs, during which Lidle had been relegated to the bullpen. In recent days, Lidle had taken abuse from fans on sports talk radio for saying the team was unprepared.

The law enforcement offi-

cial said the plane had issued a distress call before the crash. The FAA said it was too early to determine what might have caused the crash. The National Transportation Safety Board sent investigators.

"This is a terrible and shocking tragedy that has stunned the entire Yankees organization," Yankees owner George Steinbrenner said in a statement. He offered his condolences to Lidle's wife and son.

The crash rattled New Yorkers' nerves five years after the Sept. 11 attacks, but the FBI and the Homeland

Security quickly said there was no evidence it was anything but an accident.

"It wasn't until I was halfway home that I started shaking. The whole memory of an airplane flying into a building and across the street from your home. It's a little too close to home," Sara Green, 46, who lives across the street from the 'Belair.

"It crossed my mind that it was something bigger or the start of something bigger."

If that happens, many groundwater users will likely miss out on the CREP — a \$258 million program in which state and federal money is given to water users in exchange for allowing their land — because the program requires enrollees to prove access to water.

The CREP is one of the only things groundwater and surface water users agree on. Both sides worked with legislators for more than two years to finalize the CREP. The program is designed to recharge the Snake River Plain Aquifer and provide habitat for wildlife.

Slated to run for 15 years, the CREP will take 100,000 acres out of production and reduce pumping on the aquifer by 200,000 acre-feet annually.

That's enough water to cover the same amount of land in water one-foot deep.

As of today, 39,000 acres of Idaho land are being evaluated for the program, but water users representing about 200,000 acres of land have expressed interest in joining, said Lynn Tomlinaga, director of the Idaho Groundwater Appropriators.

About 4,500 acres are already contracted in and are sold despite the ruling. Once a water user is accepted in the CREP, it doesn't matter if his water is curtailed or not — he still gets the money from the program, said Chuck Pentzer, state CREP coordinator with the Idaho Soil Conservation Commission. But if he isn't in the program when, and if, his water is curtailed, he'll lose eligibility.

As of now, water users have until December of 2007 to get into the program, but that may change pending the Court's ruling.

The Idaho Department of Water Resources, the office that currently manages water distribution, won't comment on the CREP situation because

of the pending court case, said Michael Keebler, spokesman for IDWR. But in a motion to stay Judge Wood's decision filed by IDWR, which was denied by the court, the group wrote: "Based on his understanding of the District Court's order, the (IDWR) Director... will be required to order the curtailment of virtually all groundwater diversions from the Eastern Snake Plain Aquifer."

And for the water users who control the 161,000 acres not yet contracted in, that may prove disastrous.

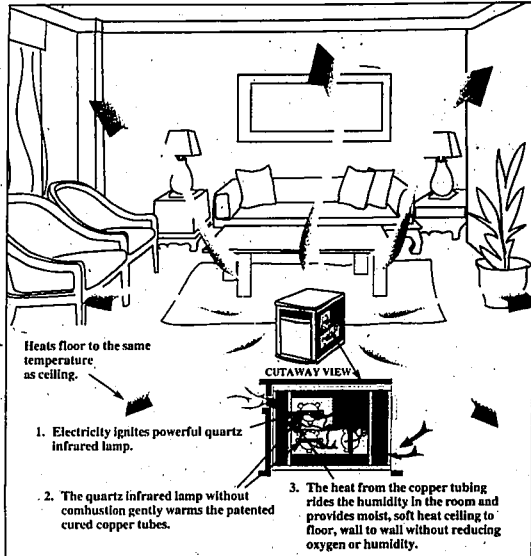

Army may keep Iraq troop levels through 2010

WASHINGTON — For planning purposes, the Army is gearing up to keep current troop levels in Iraq for another four years, a new indication that conditions there are unsustainable to foresee an end to the war.

Gen. Peter Schoomaker, the Army chief of staff, cautioned against reading too much into the planning, which is done far in advance to prepare the right mix of combat units for expected deployments. He

noted that it is easier to scale back later if conditions allow than to ramp up if they don't.

"This is not a prediction that things are going poorly or better," Schoomaker told reporters. "It's just that I have to have enough armor in the magazine that I can continue to shoot as long as they want us to shoot."

Even so, his comments were the latest acknowledgment by Pentagon officials that a significant withdrawal of troops from Iraq is not likely in the immediate future. There are now 141,000 U.S. troops there.

At a Pentagon news conference, the top U.S. commander in Iraq, Gen. George Casey, said that as recently as July he had expected to be able to recommend a substantial reduction in U.S. forces by now. But that plan was dropped as sectarian violence in Baghdad escalated.

While arguing that progress is still being made toward unifying Iraq's fractured political rivalries and stabilizing the country, Casey also said the violence amounts to "a difficult situation that's likely to remain that way for some

time." He made no predictions of future U.S. troop reductions.

Appearing with Casey, Defense Secretary Donald H. Rumsfeld said he and other senior Pentagon officials are still studying how the military might keep up the current pace of Iraq deployments without overtaxing the Army and Marine Corps, which have borne the brunt of the conflict. Rumsfeld said one option is to make more use of the Air Force and Navy for work that normally is done by soldiers and Marines.

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Reid got \$1 million for land he hadn't owned for 3 years

WASHINGTON — Senate Democratic leader Harry Reid collected a \$1.1 million windfall on a Las Vegas land sale even though he hadn't personally owned the property for three years, property deeds show.

In the process, Reid did not disclose to Congress an earlier sale in which he transferred his land to a company created by a friend and took a financial stake in that company, according to records and interviews.

The Nevada Democrat's deal was engineered by Jay Brown, a longtime friend and former casino lawyer whose name surfaced in a major political bribery trial this summer and in other prior organized crime investigations. He's never been charged with wrongdoing — except for a 1981 federal securities complaint that was settled out of court.

Land deeds obtained by The Associated Press during a review of Reid's business dealings show:

—The deal began in 1998 when Reid bought undeveloped residential property on Las Vegas' booming outskirts for about \$400,000. Reid bought one lot outright, and a second parcel jointly with Brown. One of the sellers was a developer who was benefiting from a government land swap that Reid supported. The seller never talked to Reid.

—In 2001, Reid sold the land for the same price to a limited liability corporation created by Brown. The senator didn't disclose the sale on his annual public ethics report or tell Congress he had any stake in Brown's company. He continued to report to Congress that he personally owned the land.

—After getting local officials to rezone the property for a shopping center, Brown's company sold the land in 2004 to other developers and Reid took \$1.1 million of the proceeds, nearly tripling the senator's investment. Reid reported it to Congress as a personal land sale.

The complex dealings allowed Reid to transfer ownership, legal liability and some tax consequences to Brown's company without public

knowledge, but still collect a seven-figure payoff nearly three years later.

Reid hung up the phone when questioned about the deal during an AP interview last week.

But in a news conference Wednesday in Las Vegas, the senator said he believed he did nothing wrong but was willing to change his ethics report's account of the sale if the Senate Ethics Committee ordered him to do so.

"Everything I did was transparent," Reid said. "I paid all the taxes. Everything is fully disclosed to the ethics committee and everyone else. As I said, if there is some technical change that the ethics committee wants, I'll be happy to do that."

The senator's aides said no money changed hands in 2001 and that Reid instead got an ownership stake in Brown's company equal to the value of his land. Reid continued to pay taxes on the land and didn't disclose the deal because he considered it a "technical transfer," they said.

They also said they have no documents proving Reid's stake in the company because it was an informal understanding between friends.

The 1998 purchase "was a normal business transaction at market prices," Reid spokesman Jim Manley said. "There were several legal steps

Consider ways to drop references to 'squaw'

Idahoans can't plead innocent to a history of racism when their state map clearly states otherwise. What's worse, however, is when the language allows hatred to persist today. Members of Idaho's American Indian tribes argue that the days of painful prejudice aren't just remnants of the past, so long as the word "squaw" is attached to a number of geographic locations. Idaho's state map is dotted with 93 creeks, canyons, peaks and springs that bear the name squaw.

Once again, the Coeur d'Alene Tribe says it's time to drop the moniker. Its members may be well to the right.

Coeur d'Alene tribe members are expected to petition the state to drop squaw from 13 locations on the state map. Linguists and historians have debated the actual meaning of the word, which many today identify as simply Indian woman. But northwest tribes argue the word originated with French trappers, as a reference to a woman's genitals.

"It's been a long time coming to have such a derogatory word taken off our maps," Coeur d'Alene tribal council member Norma Peon told the Spokesman-Review. "We know why they used that word back in the day."

Such a reference is obviously an affront both on a context of race and gender. Yet the discussion to purge the term is hardly new. In 2001, the Idaho Legislature failed to pass a measure that would have removed the term from all Idaho maps. The proposal fell in a House committee after passing the Senate 33-1. A year later, a resolution passed that urged individuals and local governments to recommend name changes to offensively named places.

Then this year, the Idaho Geographic Names Board, the organization that gets the ball rolling for landmark name changes, officially recommended that squaw be recognized as a derogatory name. In a meeting held last week in Boise, the state discussed the proposal to actually drop the name on the 13 landmarks, but action was deferred to February.

But in keeping the name, Idaho may go beyond remembering racism, and toward preserving it. Tribal members who grew up with the term note how its usage continues to deliver a direct attack on their identity. If the term means what they claim, there's even closer similarity to it against other minorities, or to men, for that matter. The stigma attached to the word isn't just about the people who lived over a century ago, but those who live with the perception of it today.

By re-examining the historical and modern use of one word, Idaho can rightfully cling to its historical roots without demeaning the native people of the state.

She said, "My father is dying, and I'm in the middle of this election. What should I do? I want your advice."

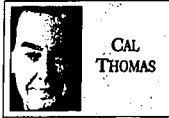

School violence begins in wider culture

On the day Lee Boyd Malvo, one of the two "Belway snipers," pleaded guilty to six shootings in Maryland in 2002, President Bush headlined a summit on school violence in Chevy Chase, Md., not far from the scene of one of the attacks.



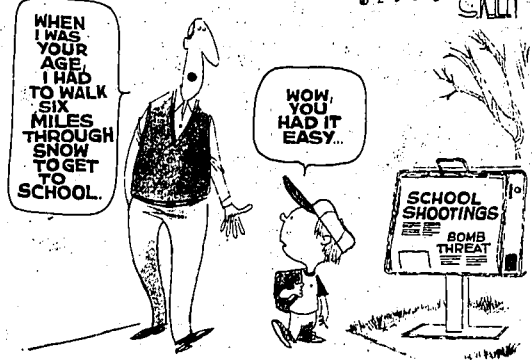

School violence and street violence are part of the same picture. When I was in school, safety focused on traffic (it was a member of the safety patrol) not injuring yourself in shop class and making sure "spotters" ringed the trampoline so no one got hurt. The one student who got in trouble with the law for stabbing another student off campus was ostracized. That kind of behavior was not to be tolerated by either adults or my classmates.

While certain inner-city schools in New York were "blackboard jungles," to recall a Glenn Ford-Sidney Poitier film from that era, most parents and students viewed their schools as safe. Then, metal detectors were devices you took to the beach to locate coins and drugs were obtained at a pharmacy with a legal prescription from a doctor. We mostly lied about sex and the few we knew were having it wore taps on their shoes, had their hair styled a certain way and if they were girls, took typing instead of Latin.

The school summit consisted mostly of bromides. No one has a real "solution" to the disturbing rise in guns to school and slaughter children. There was talk of better student-parent-teacher communication, but short of turning schools into detainee centers, there are no guarantees that even under the best of circumstances more shootings won't occur.

The real problem lies outside of school and in the human heart and wider culture. Kids see violence celebrated throughout the world. Fanatics blow themselves and others up on orders from their god and in pursuit of a twisted

view of heaven on earth. The news is filled with stories about missing and abused women, most of whom suffer a violent death.

Entertainment programs are drenched in blood and gore. Gunfights are sometimes in slow motion so that the viewer can watch a bullet entering and exiting a human body, destroying tissue and splattering blood. While most who watch do not copy such behavior, some sick people do.

According to the Bureau of Justice Statistics, more than 16,000 people were murdered in the United States in 2004 (the latest year for which statistics are available). Murder rates in 1950 and 1960 were half those in the 1980s and '90s before declining slightly in subsequent years.

We read and hear about kids being shot and killed for a leather jacket or a pair of high-priced sneakers. Why

has human life become so cheap and why has moral conduct eroded to the point that many commit murder without a second thought? Sociologists and culture critics have spent years studying this question and have produced mountains of paperwork analyzing violence and its causes. They have also proposed solutions, none of which appear to be working to stem school shootings.

Elizabeth Thomas, founder of the Center for Media Literacy, contributes one answer: She writes, defensively at first, "For years, like other communicators, I believed that tolerating some things I didn't like, including depictions of violence, was the price we paid for a free and open public discourse. ... The answer, I believe, is no longer one of protecting free speech, but protecting human life: it is not a question of censoring ideas but of

changing behaviors that are endangering the health and safety of every citizen, young and old."

The media won't change and government isn't about to make them change, other than imposing fines for broadcasting certain vulgar words. So the task falls upon the parents. Get rid of the TV, or at least prohibit children from watching violent shows. Don't allow violent and crude music in your home. Don't divorce, which causes children to feel abandoned and become angry. Stop aborting babies, because if human life is seen as cheap and disposable at its early stages, we lose a moral argument for preserving it at later stages.

Talking about school violence is not a bad thing. Doing the tough things that will reduce it is better. Abandoning the notion that parents should be "friends" with their children would help, along with the investment of quantity time in their lives. But that would require major changes in many households that now put building wealth ahead of building character.

Evangelicals size up Mormon candidate

In a recent radio interview, prominent evangelist activist James Dobson said he thought that conservative Christians wouldn't feel comfortable casting a ballot for a Mormon.

Chances are, he's wrong. Sure, plenty of evangelical Protestants refuse to consider Mormonism a branch of Christianity. A Pentecostal missionary recently referred to the heavily Mormon state of Utah as the "last frontier" for Christian proselytizing in the United States.

While Protestants and Catholics accept two books of Scripture, Mormons have three. Mormons believe that church founder Joseph Smith was a prophet of God and that anything except the founder of, at best, an unusual sect. Perhaps most troubling to many evangelicals, Mormons believe that the Almighty has a physical body. In other words, theologically speaking, Mormonism is much further away from Christian evangelicalism than, say, Catholicism or any mainline Protestant denomination.

But when it comes to American politics, it seems clear that cultural affinity and a shared political agenda can trump theology. Evangelical activists, for instance, have joined forces with conservative Jews and Tibetan Buddhists on human-rights issues such as sex trafficking and North

Korean gulags. Since the earliest days of their religion in the early 19th century, when they were openly persecuted, Mormons have cultivated both their distinctiveness and a greater acceptance by society at large. Indeed, the church's decision to ban polygamy in the late 19th century was tied to its desire to have the Utah Territory accepted as a state. Once keen on establishing their own Zion in the West, Mormons became increasingly eager over time to integrate.

By the late 20th century, Mormons had developed a reputation for being as American as apple pie, even if their beliefs were way out of the mainstream. They also became loyal Republicans. As recently as this summer, Utah voters — two-thirds of whom are Mormon — gave President Bush the highest job-approval rating of any state.

Joseph Cannon, chairman of the Utah Republican Party, calls Mormons the blacks of the GOP because about 70 percent vote Republican. He says their affinity for Bush and his party derives from shared values. Of course, the same could be said about evangelicals, who

at 40 percent make up the single biggest demographic bloc in the Republican coalition.

The conservative "values" agenda — anti-abortion, anti-gay marriage, a shared vision of what constitutes America's moral fiber — that connects each group to the GOP also links them to each other, at least politically. "Some evangelicals may think that Mormons are going to hell," says Notre Dame sociologist Christian Smith, "but at the same time, they might think that it wouldn't be too bad to have one in elected office."

In the end, for all the talk of faith being central to the political behavior of religious conservatives, it can take a back seat to their social and political agendas. Evangelicals are probably the least ceremonial of the major Christian groups in the country. They believe in evangelization, bringing the Gospel to new peoples, and in the inerrancy of Scripture. They are highly invested in their version of religious truth and less willing to find theological compromise with other denominations and religions.

The secularism of the late 1960s and early 1970s pushed the once otherworldly evangelicals into the political arena. Feeling put upon by modernity, evangelical

activism was fueled by indignation and the belief that they received little respect in an increasingly plural nation. But the political and cultural successes of recent years, and their unprecedented influence on the Bush administration, have begun to change that situation.

"It's harder to keep seeing yourself as an embattled minority when, in fact, your values are becoming increasingly accepted," says Baylor University religion scholar Rodney Stark. "Fifteen years ago, nobody made Hollywood movies to appeal to evangelical Christians. Things have changed."

While some overly confident evangelical activists may feel their numbers mean they don't need to build bridges with those with whom they disagree, a growing number of evangelicals have begun to feel what Stark calls a "confidence and calmness."

Now that their sense of exclusion has diminished, they are more willing to find common cause with nonevangelicals. Christian evangelicals may think Mormons are wrong on fundamental issues of faith, but they share a conservative social vision. Despite Dobson's true-believer (and anti-Mormon) stance, U.S. politics will no doubt — in its time-honored way — once again make strange bedfellows. And Romney, who has called himself an "evangelical Mormon," could reap the benefits.

Elk farm criticism misses the mark

Inaccurate information has been conveyed in the media regarding domestic elk in Idaho.

Law requires two types of identification — one must be visible from 150 feet, not yards as reported, with no requirement for a "blitz orange" tag. The animals that escaped and their ancestry were tested for genetic purity and declared pure elk, therefore leaving no basis for the assertion that they pose a threat to the genetic pool of wild elk.

The genetic makeup of many comes directly from wild elk removed from Yellowstone and sold to domestic elk breeders by Fish and Game.

Recently, two cattle herds were found to have brucellosis. In one case, the disease came directly from wild elk. Less than 1 percent of wild elk in Idaho were tested for chronic wasting disease in 2005 domestic elk are 100 percent tested. There has never been a case of brucellosis, tuberculosis or CWD in domestic elk in Idaho.

Don't be fooled by Fish and Game's accusations against domestic elk. They are not disease-ridden, are genetically pure and provide many good things to Idaho: a healthy meat alternative, joint supplements for people and pets, millions of dollars spent in Idaho by people who choose to hunt on preserves.

Someone who chooses to hunt on elk ranches are special needs people, veterans and elderly hunters. Attacks on the morality of such hunts is hypocritical, considering that some game bird farms invite people to pay to shoot a bird released from a cage. The combination of public land and preserve hunts will generate revenue, hunters who vote and help preserve our right to hunt.

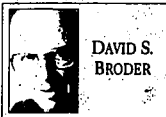

High noon arrives for Congress

Voters have been pointing a symbolic gun at the Republican regime in Washington for many months now.

The old theater adage demands that if you show a pistol in Act 1, you better fire the gun in Act 2. That same wisdom applies to politics.

The voters have been pointing a symbolic gun at the Republican regime in Washington for many months now. All that remains for Election Day is to pull the trigger. When you examine the latest round of pre-election polls, what is striking is the stability of public attitudes over the preceding months. In this week's Washington Post-ABC News poll, for example, President Bush has a job approval score of 38 percent, with 60 percent disapproving. Eleven months earlier, in November of 2005, the scores were identical.

In between, Bush got up as high as 47 percent and fell as low as 33 percent. But at no time did more Americans approve of his job performance than disapproved.

The public has shown similar consistency with party support for Congress. In the latest poll, Democrats lead Republicans, 54 percent to 41 percent, among registered voters. In November 2005, the Democrats led 52 percent to 37 percent. The margins are almost identical.

To take one more example, look at the broad question of the overall direction of the nation — right path or wrong track. In this latest poll, by a margin of 66 percent to 32 percent, people said, "wrong track." Last November, the comparable numbers were 68 percent and 30 percent.

What all this suggests is a settled judgment on the part

of the majority of Americans that the current leadership of the nation is not doing the job that people expect. This is the government the people chose in 2004, but now they are showing clear signs of buyer's remorse.

The disillusionment is not the product of the Foley scandal — which is shifting few votes as far as I can judge. And it also reflects more than the continuing spate of bad news from Iraq, though that has had a large effect on public opinion.

What is driving public opinion is an overall impression — that those in office — meaning mainly Republicans — have let things slide out of control and need to be relieved. What voters may not know is that the same judgment has been reached by a significant number of people who are part of — or close to — the Republican majority. If I have heard it once, I have heard it a dozen times. Major Republican figures, including top officials of several past GOP administrations and Congresses, say, "We deserve to lose this election."

The failure is most evident at the Capitol end of Pennsylvania Avenue. The one measure of opinion that has shifted significantly in the past year is the public judgment on Congress. In the latest poll, it is negative by a 66 percent to 32 percent margin. Last November the gap was much smaller, with 59 percent disapproving and 37 percent approving.

The failure of this past

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Congress to act meaningfully on immigration, energy, health care or other vital needs has left the public frustrated — and the members of Congress feeling emboldened.

But there is also a palpable sense of weariness in the executive branch, and a need for relief there as well. Fortunately, the voters have the power — if they pull the trigger on Election Day — to create a new plot for the Washington drama. This election campaign has been a learning experience for candidates of both parties, incumbents and challengers alike. They have been bombarded with messages from their constituents, telling them that the public is tired of the partisan hickering, tired of the gridlock, and eager to elect people who will focus on the real problems and work together to find solutions.

If that lesson is reinforced

by the election results, Washington will change. Congress will be run by people who talk with each other, across party lines. And even if the White House may learn that it needs to end its isolation and engage more broadly at home and abroad, if it is to salvage some substantial accomplishments from Bush's final two years in office.

That kind of fundamental change in the political environment is possible — indeed, it is imminent and will be welcomed. But it will happen only if voters pull the trigger. Elections do matter, and this one matters more than most.

R.W. "Johnny" Apple, the New York Times political reporter who died last week, set the standard for his business for all of his working life. He covered the beat — and wine and dined — better than anyone else, and the joyfulness of his life was infectious.

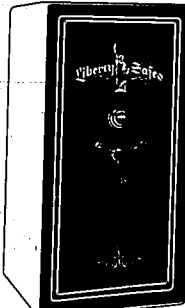

American indicted on charges of treason, aiding terrorists

LOS ANGELES — The charge of treason was used for the first time in the United States' war on terrorism Wednesday, filed against a California man who appeared in propaganda videos for al-Qaida. Adam Yehiyeh Gadahn, 28, could be sentenced to death if convicted of the charge, which has been used only a few dozen

times in U.S. history and not at all since the World War II era. He also was indicted on a charge of providing material support to terrorists. Gadahn "knowingly" adhered to an enemy of the United States, namely, al-Qaida, and gave al-Qaida aid and comfort ... with intent to betray the United States," according to the indictment, handed up by an Orange County grand jury.

The suspected al-Qaida operative has been sought by the FBI since 2004. Based on the indictment, the FBI added Gadahn to its list of most wanted terrorists and offered a \$1 million reward for information leading to his arrest or conviction. Gadahn, who is believed to be in or near Pakistan, is suspected of having attended the terrorist group's training camps in Pakistan and serving as one of its translators. He has become known by his nom de guerre, Azzam al-Amriki, or "Azzam the American."

Gadahn appeared last month in a 48-minute video along with al-Qaida's No. 2 leader, Ayman al-Zawahiri, calling on his countrymen to convert to Islam and for U.S. soldiers to switch sides in the Iraq and Afghan wars. It was the second time he appeared in the same video with al-Zawahiri. In a July 7 video marking the one-year anniversary of the terror attack on London, commuters, Gadahn appeared briefly, saying no Muslim should "shed

tears" for Westerners killed by al-Qaida attacks. Beyond that, authorities believe he is the masked figure who appeared in two previous videos from al-Qaida.

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Supreme Court mulls whether victim's photos on buttons influenced trial

WASHINGTON — The Supreme Court on Wednesday debated whether a murder victim's family prejudiced the trial of an accused killer by wearing buttons to court bearing a picture of the slain man.

The justices waded into issues of defendants' rights, struggling with the question of whether the buttons visible to the jury in Matthew Mustadin's case denied him a fair trial or were a harmless expression of grief. The state of California is arguing to win the Mustadin conviction, which was thrown out by the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals.

In a separate case, the justices considered when a judge's discretion to impose additional time behind bars violates a convict's constitutional rights.

In the buttons case, some of the justices seemed uncertain about how to proceed.

There is "a pretty darn good argument" the buttons gaged the defendant's right to a fair trial, Justice David Souter said. At the same time, Souter asked, "What ... do I make of the fact that not one single cent has ever reached out conclusion as a constitutional matter?" He questioned where such a line would be drawn.

"What if the three buttons worn by the family of murder victim Tom Studer had said 'Hug Mustadin, would you say there was not sufficiently clear law from this court to find that practice unconstitutional?' Souter asked.

"What would you do with buttons? ... Signs, placards?" asked Justice Anthony Kennedy. Or mourning family members dressed in black, wondered Chief Justice John Roberts.

California Deputy Attorney General Gregory Ott said the state is not asking the court to adopt a general rule, a path that several justices posed as a hypothetical.

"Let's wait until the ACLU (American Civil Liberties Union) brings a case about people who want to wear buttons in court," said Justice Antonin Scalia. "Then you're going to have people arguing people ought to be able to wear buttons, just as they can wear a shirt that says 'Blip the Draft.'"

Scalia said the message of the buttons in the Mustadin case did not point to the defendant as the killer, the same conclusion reached by the trial judge.

Mustadin said he acted in self-defense in the shooting death of Studer, the fiancé of Mustadin's estranged wife. Studer was shot twice, the second time as he lay under his draft in an attempt to escape the gunfire.

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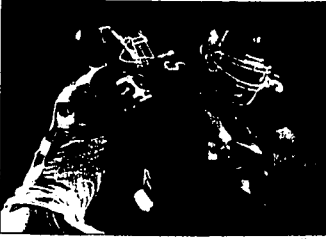
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Petersen: No BCS talk among undefeated Broncos

Boise State coach Chris Petersen says getting a BCS bid isn't a topic for discussion with his players. At least one impartial observer of the Broncos' latest winning streak thinks it should be.

"I've read where they say that no matter if Boise goes undefeated, they're not a BCS team. Who do you think is putting that stuff out?" said New Mexico coach Rocky Long. "The big boys (BCS teams) want to keep it quiet how good they are."

While Long doesn't have to worry about trying to beat the No. 20 Broncos — they're not on New Mexico's schedule — that's

not the case with New Mexico State. The Aggies (2-3, 0-1 WAC) take on Boise State (6-0, 2-0) Sunday night in Las Cruces, N.M.

It promises to be a daunting challenge for New Mexico State, which has lost 16 straight games against Division I opponents. The Aggies went 0-12 last season and their two wins this season were against I-AA members Southeastern Louisiana and Texas Southern.

Boise State went undefeated in the 2004 regular season but couldn't crack the BCS. The Broncos lost to Louisville in the Liberty Bowl and finished

ranked No. 12 in the AP Top 25. Petersen, the first-year Broncos coach, was asked this week if there's been any BCS talk among his players this season.

"There's no talk about getting into the BCS," he said. "That means nothing to this team at all. We have six games left and that doesn't have anything to do with this team right now."

For now, all the Broncos can do is keep winning, something they've been very good at. Boise State is on its way to its ninth straight winning season and fifth straight Western Athletic Conference title. The Broncos are 33-1 in WAC games since

2002. Petersen, the former offensive coordinator under Dan Hawkins, took over when Hawkins was hired by Colorado, and the Broncos haven't broken stride. This year, they've outscored opponents 236-75 and rank sixth in the nation in scoring. Two weeks ago they handed Utah (36-3) its worst home loss in 17 years.

So what chance does New Mexico State have? This is the program that owned the country's longest losing streak going into this season and has had just four winning seasons in the past 39 years.

Tigers build 2-0 lead on A's

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — Jim Leyland trusted his gut and changed designated hitters, going with little-used Alexis Gomez for Game 2 of the American League championship series.

The results: a 2-0 advantage heading home to Montreal.

Gomez hit a go-ahead, two-run single and later added a two-run homer to lead the Detroit Tigers to an 8-5 victory over the Oakland Athletics on Wednesday, a somber night following the death of former A's pitcher Cory Lidle in a plane crash earlier in the day.

A career minor leaguer, Gomez had just one home run in the majors and contributed only six RBIs in 103 at-bats this season.

"He does have big-time power," Leyland said. "Unfortunately, he showed most of it in batting practice."

Milton Bradley homered twice for the A's, and beat out an infield hit with two outs in the ninth inning that loaded the bases. But closer Todd Jones retired Frank Thomas on a harmless fly for his second save of this postseason.

"What a challenge," Jones said. "It was a lot of fun. We're up 2-0 and we're going back to Detroit."

Leyland, who turned around the Tigers in his first season as their manager, benched righty Marcus Thames and his 25 regular-season home runs in favor of Gomez, who hadn't been on the field in nearly two weeks and spent much of the year at Triple-A Toledo.

"We just took a shot that maybe, by chance, a lefty may have a shot," Leyland said beforehand.

Leyland already had to reshuffle his lineup to replace Sean Casey after the first baseman injured his calf in Tuesday's opener. The moves paid off and the Tigers won their fifth straight postseason game. Game 3 in the best-of-seven series is Friday at Detroit's Comerica Park, featuring Rich Harden for Oakland against former A's pitcher Kenny Rogers.

Harden, who returned to make three late-season starts after missing more than three months with an elbow injury, did not pitch during the division series sweep of the Minnesota Twins. Rogers pitched shutout ball against the New York Yankees in Game 3.

A moment of silence was held before the national anthem for Lidle, who most

of the order with a sacrifice fly for the wild-card Tigers.

Detroit left the Bay Area with the comfort of knowing that all eight road teams to take a 2-0 lead in LCS history have gone on to reach the World Series.

The A's took an early lead by getting a hit in their first opportunity with a runner in scoring position — in Game 1, they tied a postseason record by going hitless in 13 at-bats in those situations.

But Oakland couldn't hold this edge. "I think you've got to give our hitters some credit. We wound up putting some runs on the board," A's manager Ken Macha said.

Both teams brought their infielders in with a runner on third and one out in the first two innings, apparently anticipating a low-scoring pitcher's duel.

Instead, the Tigers' bats came up big in the fourth.

As patient as Detroit has been in these playoffs, Loaiza threw more strikes early and retired six straight batters after Carlos Guillen's leadoff double in the second.

Then, back-to-back singles by Placido Polanco and Magglio Ordonez started the rally.

Guillen struck out and Loaiza walked Ivan Rodriguez before Monroe's double brought a mound visit from A's pitching coach Curt Young. Gomez followed with a two-run single off Chavez's glove at third base, and Inge added a sacrifice fly a night after his three-hit, two-RBI performance.

Gomez, twice designated for assignment by Detroit, followed Monroe's two-out single in the sixth with a home run over the right-field wall.

"Comez again, faster than you can blink an eye, his another home run," Macha said.

This was Gomez's biggest performance yet, though the 28-year-old Dominican did hit four home runs on Aug. 7 against the Columbus Clippers to tie an International League record and had a 12-game hitting streak in Triple-A.

Game 1 of NLCS postponed by rain

NEW YORK (AP) — The New York Mets might have to face Chris Carpenter sooner than expected.

Game 1 of the NL championship series between New York and St. Louis was postponed Wednesday night because of a steady rain, giving the Cardinals a chance to pitch their ace on full rest in Game 2.

The best-of-seven series will now begin Thursday night, and Game 2 at Shea Stadium is to be played Friday — which was supposed to be an off day in the series.

Carpenter had been slated to start Game 3 on Saturday when the series shifts to St. Louis. But the 2005 NL Cy Young Award winner would be working on his regular four days of rest if the Cardinals decide to bump him up to Friday.

"That's his fifth day. You've got to seriously think about what that means. It's up for grabs in my opinion," St. Louis manager Tony La Russa said.

My first 30-45 minutes of looking at it, I said I'd probably stay with it. Sitting here for 15, there's more there. There's a decision to make, no doubt about it."

The Mets will stay with Tom Glavine in the opener, and the 40-year-old left-hander said he expects to come back and pitch on only three days' rest in a potential Game 5.

"I've done it before. I know what to expect, how to prepare from tomorrow's start to my next start knowing it's going to be on short rest. But you still have to go out there and do it," Glavine said. "The most important game for me is tomorrow, and trying to win that game for us — then worry about starts I may have after that."

Jeff Weaver was to get the ball for St. Louis in Game 1, originally planned.

Rookie right-hander John Maine is slated to pitch Game 2 for New York. Jeff Suppan had been penciled in for the Cardinals, but he could be pushed back.

Minutes before the game was called, La Russa said a rainout probably wouldn't alter his rotation, explaining that he didn't think there was any benefit in "switching" and that he thought Carpenter was a better choice for Game 3 — and a possible Game 7.

But after the postponement, La Russa sounded as though the might change his mind.

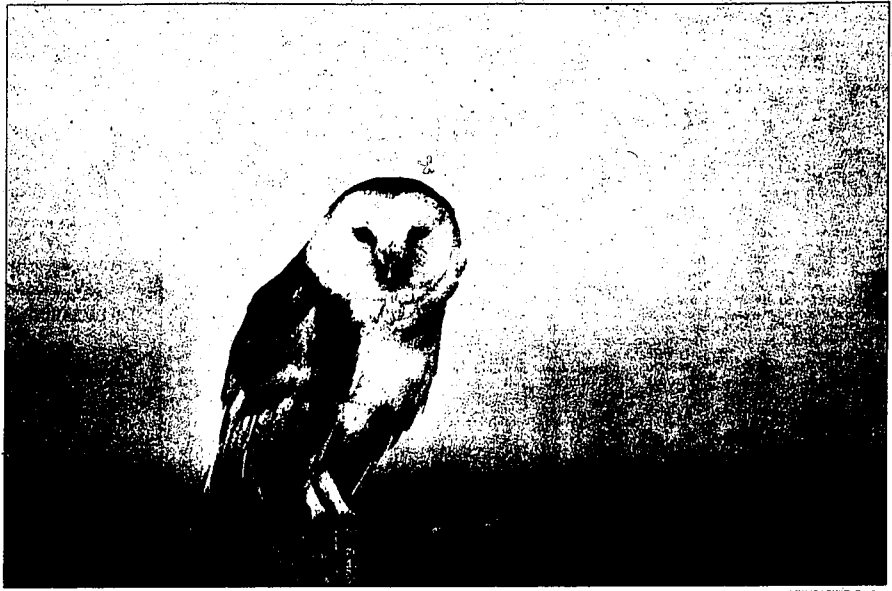

"Depending upon climatic conditions, owls will move around searching for food (mice and voles are favorites)." A common barn owl will have a 35-inch wingspan and stand about 14 inches tall. Favorite nesting spots include tree cavities, cliff ledges and holes, old nests and abandoned structures. Two barn owl research studies continue at BSU.

Howling wolves prompts Forest Service workers to be evacuated

KETCHICUM — The sound of howling wolves prompted two U.S. Forest Service employees to call for a helicopter evacuation from the Sawtooth Wilderness late last month, officials said.

The employees — both from Utah — became frightened Sept. 23 after seeing wolves chasing a hull elk across the meadow and later hearing the animals howl, said Jim Waldapfel, a spokesman for the Sawtooth National Forest.

"A little while later they started hearing wolves howling all around them," Waldapfel told the Idaho Mountain Express. "They called on their radio or satellite phone and asked their supervisor if they could leave the area."

Waldapfel did not know the employees' names, but said they were from the Rocky Mountain Research Station in Ogden and were conducting forest inventory work in the Sawtooths.

"No matter which way they went they said they could hear the wolves," he said. "They admitted they were very scared and wanted to get out of the area."

The employees' supervisor called national forest officials and "asked for a helicopter to come in and retrieve them," Waldapfel said.

The wolves never made any aggressive moves toward the pair. There are no documented cases of wolves attacking humans in Idaho, though the employees may not have known that, Waldapfel said.

"They're not part of our regular work force and so they hadn't had training for this kind of wildlife encounter," Waldapfel said.

Steve Nadeau, wolf program supervisor with the Idaho Department of Fish and Game, was shocked that howling could prompt a helicopter evacuation.

"Holy moly — sounds to me like someone's read too many of Grimm's fairy tales," Nadeau said. "I'm flabbergasted that (the Forest Service) would go to that extent over wolves howling in the woods because wolves howl in the woods all the

time. That's how they communicate."

Howling, especially in rocky, mountainous areas, can echo, said Lynne Stone, a Stanley resident who regularly observes backcountry wolf behavior.

There are great wolf-howling acoustics. They probably weren't surrounded by wolves," Stone said. "I'd be more afraid of running into a moose cow with calves, or a black bear with cubs, than encountering howling wolves."

Sawtooth National Forest officials will review training procedures to better prepare out-of-area Forest Service personnel for the wildlife they may encounter in Idaho, Waldapfel said.

YMCA bans swim coach from pool

Move comes shortly after advisory board is formed

TWIN FALLS — The YMCA revoked the membership of the Twin Falls High School assistant swim coach Tuesday, days after the city outlined an aquatic advisory board to resolve concerns related to the pool.

Assistant coach Mike Trabert said he met with the YMCA Wednesday and was not allowed on pool property. Consequently, he can no longer coach the swim team.

"Whatever they're giving me is a line of BS," he told the Times-News Wednesday. "I'm not really happy with them. I'm trying to find out what rules have broken and how long it's supposed to be."

City and YMCA officials, however, acknowledged that although the swim team — which is a club sport is not officially sanctioned by the high school — had problems in scheduling pool time because of a crowded

roster of users.

Trabert said he was frustrated by both apparent contract disputes between the YMCA and swim team, which is managed by parents, as well as sharing the pool with the Magic Valley Marlins YMCA Swim Team, a USA Swimming-sanctioned team that requires its kids be members of the YMCA.

Trabert said he was told Wednesday that employees were "afraid" of him and he showed an "attitude problem" when coaching. He said the YMCA broke the contract by having the pool area ready in time for practice.

YMCA President Karen Jachimowski acknowledged Trabert's membership was revoked but declined comment.

"The contract has nothing to do with why he's not here," she said.

Jeremy Belliston, a high school teacher who serves as the swim team adviser, said he was not surprised to hear about Trabert's revocation.

"Mike acts before he thinks," he said. "It's a very aggressive person. The way he handles situations, he's ruined a lot of things for the kids."

Noella Bledenbach, president of the Marlins' parent board, said she supports the high school situation, but was surprised problems arose.

"Yeah, the pool, it's probably near capacity, but there's plenty of room for people who are there," she said. "The YMCA done an excellent job of using the facility around the clock without stepping on each others' toes."

Since 2004, the city pays the YMCA a \$50,000 base fee yearly and covers utilities, which are estimated at \$182,000 for 2007. Before the arrangement the city lost about \$350,000 each year, according to the city.

Bledenbach said that the Marlins practice year-round (primarily) at the city pool and have as many as 80 swimmers. The team com-

petes regionally, holds competitive meets, and employs about four coaches year-round — all of whom are hired and fired by the YMCA.

The YMCA charges for pool use, and although the Marlins are required to be YMCA members, the swim team can pay \$23 a month. The Marlins also require a coach's fee, which can range from \$25 to \$50 a month, depending on swimming ability. The team requires an additional \$15 transaction fee, as well as any other costs to the team separate of the YMCA.

Bledenbach said the city pool is larger, has more lanes and the Marlins raise money to pay for its starting blocks.

In the past, both teams have occasionally shared coaches. This year Trabert hired John Twiss, a former employee of the YMCA.

"We're not part of the YMCA, we never wanted to be part of the YMCA," said Trabert.

Embezzler has one day to find work

Thompson still has to check into jail on Oct. 22

TWIN FALLS — The first part of her sentence for stealing from her boss required her to get a job so she could pay him back.

But on Wednesday, with only three days remaining before the cut-off date set by a judge, Penny Louise Thompson had yet to get a full-time job.

Senior Deputy Prosecutor Jill Sweesy said Thompson embezzled \$376,192 from Mueller Auto in large part to fuel her gambling addiction in Jackpot, Nev.

Thompson has to pay \$250 a month to the Muellers through 2018. She missed her first payment, which was due Tuesday.

Regardless of whether she finds work Friday or not, Thompson will check into the jail on Oct. 22. Thompson will spend at least the next year sleeping in jail at night and being on work release during the day. If she can prove Friday, she has a job, one year is all she will spend.

If not, the judge will peg an additional 90 days to her jail sentence.

"You essentially have today and tomorrow and Friday to get that done," 5th District Judge G. Richard Bevan said Wednesday. "I gave you approximately a month to find full-time gainful employment."

A job search document showed Thompson has been seeking a job.

"I think she realizes she is in a dire predicament ... not having employment," said Stan Holloway, chief deputy public defender.

The judge also has ordered, at the request of the prosecutor, that Thompson be prohibited from gambling.

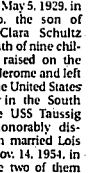

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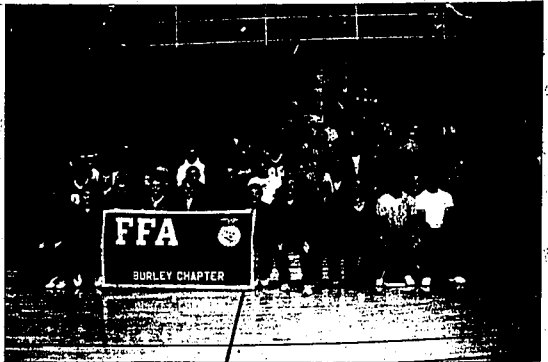

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Alaska's Prudhoe Bay oilfield shutdown will last several days

ANCHORAGE, Alaska — America's largest oil field will be shut down for several days as operator BP scrambles to fix an electrical problem.

So far, the loss of 300,000 barrels a day of Alaskan output has not rattled oil markets. BP PLC said electrical shorts that shut down Prudhoe Bay on Tuesday followed three days of dust storms, and then rising, coating insulators on high-voltage lines with mud.

The London-based company, which has faced intense criticism following two oil leaks in Alaska over the past seven months, said the shutdown of its power system was not a reflection of aging infrastructure.

BP spokesman Daren Beaudou planned the problem on a "highly unusual weather

event," partly attributable to the mud now in the region.

But at least one industry analyst questioned whether BP's latest troubles could be blamed entirely on weather.

"People who are bad carpenters hit themselves on the thumb repeatedly," said Michael Lynch, president of Strategic Energy and Economic Research Inc., of Winchester, Mass.

Lynch acknowledged that BP faces brutal weather conditions on Alaska's North Slope and that he did not know the details surrounding the recent power failure. However, he added, "things like this should be dealt with pretty quickly, generally, or not even happen."

Beaudou said the company is systematically removing the mud from the insulators and that the oil field will come on line in phases, but he could

not specify when production will be fully restored.

"It's going to take some time. Don't know how long. We'll do it as quickly as we can. The emphasis is on safety," he said.

The electrical system has been partially re-energized, Beaudou said, though that power has been devoted to the living quarters of its workers. Backup generators also are in use.

For unrelated reasons, the price of oil fell to its lowest level this year on Wednesday. Crude oil futures have plunged by more than \$20 a barrel since mid-July amid rising global inventories, concerns about slowing economic growth and a mild-then-anticipated hurricane season. On Wednesday, doubts grew that there is a consensus within OPEC for an immediate output cut, sending oil futures to \$57.59 a barrel.

Nevada town considering banning banking by illegal immigrants

PAHRUMP, Nev. (AP) — Nevada's banking community is worrying that a proposed local law in Nye County's largest community would bar illegal immigrants from opening accounts or cashing checks.

"How do I do business in Pahrum with an ordinance like this?" Bill Martin, president of Nevada State Bank, said of the proposed "English Language and Patriot Reaffirmation Ordinance."

The law would prohibit accepting foreign identification, offering housing, or loaning or giving money to undocumented immigrants in this fast-growing town 60 miles west of Las Vegas. It would make English the official language and prohibit flying a foreign flag by itself.

Officials said the identification provision could stop the town's banks from accepting as identification a card that

since 2002 has issued by the Mexican Consulate in Las Vegas.

The consulate has issued nearly 106,000 of the cards, which confirm the identity and current residence of the bearer. The cards are not an immigration document.

Wells Fargo Nevada regional chief Kirk Clausen said the identification provision posed a "huge concern" for banks. He said he planned to seek guidance from bankers associations.

Nevada State Bank has two branches in Pahrum, a town of 33,241 where the state demographer estimates the Hispanic population at about 11 percent. Martin questioned how a bank would enforce the ordinance.

"If they (customers) look Hispanic, do I ID them?" the Nevada State Bank official asked. "Can I profile? I don't think so."

Living where she does, she's bound to find something better suited for her than where she is now — or maybe she should switch to a different department in the same hospital.

DEAR BTDT: With the shortage of skilled nurses in this country, your departure from the field is everybody's loss. Until I read your letter, I had never heard the expression "nurses eat their young." But it was echoed by a surprising number of nurses who responded to that letter. Like you, they wanted to remind "Susan" that other opportunities are available in this specialized and important field. Read on:

DEAR ABBY: "Susan in St. Louis" has many ways she can use her nursing training. If she likes teaching, among the specialties she might try are obstetrics, pediatrics, intensive care and dialysis. If she doesn't like hospital work, there is school nursing, which includes teaching, screening for various problems like scoliosis, as well as first aid. There is also industrial nursing, where you work for a private company.

In addition, there is research, writing for journals, flight nursing, TV therapy, case management, holistic, forensic, home health, nurse-anesthetist, nurse-practitioner, and

many other options. Once you become a nurse, the world is your oyster. I know of few other careers that offer so much variety.

Trains collide in northeastern France; 5 dead

ZOUFTEGEN, France (AP) — A passenger train collided Wednesday with an oncoming freight train in northeastern France, killing at least five people and injuring 16, two seriously, officials said.

The impact of the crash lifted one of the passenger train's

cars on top of another, compressing it. Several cars of the freight train were either crumpled, bent skyward or tipped over on their sides. More than 300 police and rescue workers from both France and Luxembourg were at the scene. Rescuers had retrieved five

bodies by evening, police said, and did not believe any survivors were trapped inside the twisted wreckage, although rescue efforts were expected to continue through the night.

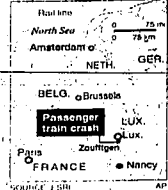
"If we pull out any more people, they will not be alive," said Kristine Schmidt of the

Luxembourg police.

Another official, Bernard Francoz of the Zouffingen police, said there could be as many as three more bodies in the wreckage on the tracks about a mile south of the border.

The number of passengers aboard the train was unknown.

The passenger train was traveling from Luxembourg to the French city of Nancy. The train line it was traveling on was being repaired, so it switched onto a second track, hitting the oncoming freight train, said France's SNCF rail operator.



Whose best interest is served when celebs, or any Westerners, adopt African children?

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa — Reports that Madonna may have adopted a Malawian child have focused attention on foreign adoptions in Africa — and raised questions about whether it's in an African child's best interest to be spirited away to the wealthy West.

"Are celebrities doing it for the right reasons and not to make a statement?" asked Pam Wilson of the Johannesburg Child Welfare Society. Comments on talk radio across the region have been even more pointed, with callers accusing the pop-music star of going on a "shopping expedition."

At this time, current legislation in Malawi does not even allow for inter-country adoptions. This would make it illegal for Madonna to take home a child from Malawi, although there are rumors that restrictions were to be waived for her.

The adoption of children from poorer, nations — Cambodia, Ethiopia, Romania — by rich foreigners has been happening for decades. Angelina Jolie adopted her son, Maddox, from Cambodia and her daughter Zahara from Ethiopia. Mia Farrow, now the mother of 14, began adopting children from poor countries in 1973 with an orphan from the Vietnam War.

Wilson said there would always be a "demand" for children from developing countries.

"There is a shortage of healthy babies in the First World, particularly now when there is no longer such a stigma to being a single parent and there are few babies in the system," she said.

Adoptions of orphans from abroad have been increasing steadily in the United States — to more than 22,000 in 2001. Russia, China and Guatemala have been the main sources of these children; only a few hundred per year have come from Africa.

By 2010, the U.N. estimates, 10 million African children will have lost a parent to AIDS. Already there are more than 43 million orphans on the world's poorest continent.

In Africa, orphans usually are absorbed into extended families, but AIDS has affected many of the people who might have traditionally provided support. So, many of those millions who have lost parents to AIDS or other causes are in orphanages — or find themselves living on the streets.

While some may see a great need being left unfulfilled, international adoptions are not "an easy option," said Jackie Schoeman, executive director of Cotlands, a South African organization that cares for children affected by HIV.

"For us, first prize is to place the kids locally or even regionally. If the only other option is for them to be in a long-term institutional then we would consider international adoption."

Schoeman said there were

advantages to international adoptions. Recently one of the children for whom her organization cares was adopted by parents in the U.S. and now can receive medical care unavailable in South Africa.

However, Schoeman and others are concerned about the long-term effects of such a big move on a child, particularly in the development of cultural and individual identities.

"We don't really know enough about what a black child growing up in Finland is going to feel. I don't think it would be an alien culture because they would have grown up exposed to it. But will they have felt better staying at home?" she asked.

At the heart of the matter is the motivation of people wanting to adopt orphans from troubled countries, especially HIV-positive children.

"Sometimes the response is emotional. They just want to help without understanding the long-term implications," Schoeman said.

Some advocacy groups in the United States say Americans seeking to adopt should turn first to children in the U.S. foster care system, but Adam Portman — executive director of the Evan B. Donaldson Adoption Institute — says both domestic and overseas adoptions are growing, and should be encouraged.

As for celebrities adopting poor children from Africa, Donnan said there was no reason to be critical or cynical.

Ross buying 46 Albertsons sites

PLEASANTON, Calif. — Ross Stores will acquire 46 former Albertsons supermarkets in six states as part of its ambitious expansion plans next year, the company said.

The Pleasanton retail chain announced plans Tuesday to take over sites in California, Florida, Texas, Arizona, Colorado and Oklahoma by November, converting them into Ross discount stores or DD's Discounts, its sister brand. The conversion could happen as early as March.

The deal does not include any stores in Idaho. The company expects to spend between \$1.5 million and \$2 million on each site but did not disclose the terms of the acquisitions.

Its latest plans for expansion are among the biggest in the history of Ross, which

started as a family-run junior department store chain in the San Francisco Bay Area in 1957.

Ross would not specify which of the Albertsons stores it will take over.

Albertsons, the nation's second-largest supermarket chain, was sold in January to a consortium of investors that includes several real estate companies.

In July, the newly formed Albertsons LLC closed 37 stores in and around the Bay Area.

Ross, which sells name-brand apparel and accessories at prices that are 20 to 60 percent below those of department stores and specialty shops, operates 766 stores in 27 states and Guam.

The company is the second-largest off-price retailer in the country, with \$4.9 billion in revenue last year.

Economy, energy helped Fed leave interest rates alone

WASHINGTON — A slow economy and retreating energy prices made it somewhat easier for the Federal Reserve to hold interest rates steady last month.

That was in sharp contrast to the August meeting when policymakers wrestled with their next move. They ultimately decided at the August session to halt a two-year string of interest rate increases.

But the Fed members also said that had been a close call.

At the Sept. 20 meeting, some softer indicators of economic activity and slightly lower readings on core inflation "pointed to a modestly better inflation outlook and hence made the policy decision today somewhat" less difficult than it was in August, when it was seen as a particularly close call, said minutes of the session released Wednesday.

September's decision marked the second meeting in a row where policymakers decided to leave interest rates alone.

Jeffrey Lacker, president of the Federal Reserve Bank of Richmond, Va., was the lone dissenter at both meetings. Lacker said he would have preferred that the Fed increase interest rates by one-quarter of a percentage point.

Mr. Lacker dissented because he believed that further tightening was needed to bring inflation down more rapidly than would be the case if the policy rate were kept unchanged. The minutes of the September meeting said.

In a speech in Washington, Lacker argued that "should inflation persist around the current elevated level" a rate increase would be needed to "restore price stability."

Fed policymakers made clear they are keeping a close eye on the nation's price climate.

The Fed minutes said "many meeting participants emphasized that they continued to be quite concerned about the outlook for inflation."

On the growth side of economic equation, policymakers said a "significantly more sluggish performance than anticipated could not be entirely ruled out."

Producers line up to back interstate shipping plan

TWIN FALLS — With Congress in recess until after the elections, a bill to allow interstate shipment of meat and poultry won't be seeing any action any time soon. But the legislation is seen as promising and could create numerous opportunities in the marketplace for farmers and ranchers.

In September, Representatives Roy Blunt, R-Mo., Earl Pomeroy, D-N.D., and 12 of their colleagues in the House introduced H.R. 6150, the New Markets for State-Inspected Meat and Poultry Act of 2006. According to Blunt, under H.R. 6150, beef, pork, poultry and lamb approved by state inspection agencies in the

28 states that currently have their own meat and poultry inspection programs could be sold in every state in the United States. It will allow the facilities inspected by such state programs to take advantage of opportunities in other states.

On the Senate side, Senator Orrin Hatch, R-Utah, introduced a similar bill, S. 3519. Idaho Farm Bureau Federation Public Relations Director John Thompson said, although IFBF doesn't have written policy on the topic, he thinks the bill is a good one. "It is something IFBF would support if there were opportu-

nities out there for smaller, mom-and-pop slaughter facilities," he said.

Thompson said competition is sorely lacking with the Wal-Mart model of retail. Action to encourage smaller local agriculture business is needed.

Montana Farm Bureau Federation President Dave McClure agreed. "It's high time that our food producers can ship their beef, lamb, poultry — any meat commodity — from one state to another," McClure said. "Bills S. 3519 and H.R. 6150 provide open, free and fair trade opportunities in the mar-

ket, as well as expanding small business and promoting rural economic growth and regional trade."

"The legislation would most benefit the 28 states that currently have state inspection programs. The proposed legislation would allow those programs to more closely align with U.S. Department of Agriculture federal inspection programs. If the legislation is approved, it will allow the facilities with state inspection programs to take advantage of opportunities in other states. For those states that have already surrendered their state

programs to federal inspection, the gain would be minimal to nonexistent.

Lloyd Knight, executive vice president for the Idaho Cattle Association, said Idaho has not had a state inspection program since the 1960s.

"Under federal inspection rules, states can already ship meat anywhere in the nation," he said.

Mark Thornberry, Ranchers Cattleman Action Fund USA vice president, said, "Removing these obstacles will level the economic playing field for small business owners, spur additional competition in the marketplace, create a more uniform meat-inspection system, and also enhance food safety and consumer confidence in the domestic food supply."

Getting out the vote

Organization for Hispanics faces challenges in getting Latinos to the polls

TWIN FALLS — Just four weeks away from election day, Maria Gonzalez Mabbutt received a nice surprise — namely, the number of Hispanics in Idaho who were eligible to vote.

As executive director of the Idaho Hispanic Caucus, she estimated 40,000. But a study by the Washington, D.C.-based Pew Hispanic Center put the number at 46,242 eligible voters.

"The number is a lot higher than we who are entrenched in it thought," she told the Hispanic Business and Professionals Network meeting in Twin Falls on Tuesday.

The challenge is to get those people registered and out to vote, but that is what the caucus is all about, said

Gonzalez Mabbutt, a Mini-Cassia native.

As it is, about 25 percent to 27 percent of eligible Hispanics voters cast their ballots.

"Which is pretty low," she said. Especially if you compare it to between the 47 percent to 49 percent of Caucasian- and African-Americans who vote.

"I get passionate about this work because I want us performing at that higher level," she said.

The caucus has two arms — one that engages in more advocacy

efforts, such as candidate endorsements, and another aimed at research and education. Its Idaho Latino Vote campaign started in 1999 also works to register Latinos, get them out to vote and provide people with training "that will not only enhance them as voters, but as voter advocates."

Through Idaho Latino Vote efforts, the number of Latinos registered to vote in Idaho has gone from 10,000 in 20,000, she said. But given the number of eligible voters, that is not even half.

One thing Idaho Latino Vote has done to increase the number is encouraging Hispanics to use absentee ballots. Hispanics may find those easier because they may not get time off of work to vote, or may feel uncomfortable at the polls,

Gonzalez Mabbutt said. "She hopes more people will volunteer to take Hispanics to the polls and help them through the process, and that more Hispanics sign up to work at the polls.

There are other challenges for the caucus, she said. While only U.S. citizens are eligible to vote, it is illegal for county election clerks or anyone to ask people about their citizenship when they register, Gonzalez Mabbutt said. While Idaho Latino Vote has heard of such problems, this year they may take action against such behavior.

In addition, the organization is sharing other information. For example, people who have been convicted of a felony may believe that they are forever banned from

voting, but after they have served their sentence, they may reapply as registered voters, she said.

Mabbutt urged people to check out voter guides and candidate stances and find out in which precinct they vote.

"All of us should know what our political address is," she said.

What has helped Idaho Latino Vote is the IdahoVote.gov site, where people can learn in an instant where they go to vote.

If Latinos get out to vote, they can help make changes in government, Gonzalez Mabbutt said. Despite the fact that Latinos make up about 9 percent of the state's population, there is only one Latino state legislator at any one time.

"We need to work to change that," she said.

Tentative deal would end teachers strike

MEXICO CITY — Striking teachers and leftist activists reached a tentative agreement with the federal government to end a five-month teachers strike in the state of Oaxaca and lift the blockades that have paralyzed the state capital and shut down much of the region's tourist industry.

The agreement, negotiated late Monday by federal Interior Minister Carlos Abascal, must be submitted to rank and file teachers and activists for their approval. It would authorize federal authorities to take control of the Oaxaca state police force, and several top Oaxaca state security officials would resign.

The protesters dropped a demand for the immediate resignation of state Gov. Ulises Ruiz. The striking teachers and activists say Ruiz is corrupt and has used armed allies and police to intimidate his opponents.

A federal Senate committee was scheduled to meet Tuesday evening to debate a resolution to dissolve Ruiz's government and remove him from office.

"We will continue to seek the departure of Mr. Ruiz by institutional means," Enrique Rueda, a leader of the teachers' union, told reporters in Mexico City after the negotia-

tions with Abascal had concluded.

On Tuesday, leaders of the Popular Assembly of the People of Oaxaca (known by its Spanish initials, APPO), the umbrella group of anti-Ruiz activists, met with senators to discuss the governor's removal.

The protests have seen Oaxaca state's quaint capital become home to ugly street battles, with activists meeting out street justice against perceived enemies and gunmen opening fire on the activists. It began in May with striking teachers demanding pay increases and evolved into a mass movement demanding that Ruiz step down.

When Ruiz ordered police to clear the city center of protesters in June, public opinion turned sharply against him. Farm groups and leftist activists joined the teachers' protest. City Hall and many other government buildings were shut down. The APPO raised its homemade flag over City Hall. The demonstrators occupied Oaxaca city's central square and periodically closed off the city's airport.

On Sept. 24, the U.S. Embassy issued the latest in a series of travel advisories to American tourists, warning of "increasingly violent demonstrations" in Oaxaca that have led to at least two fatalities.

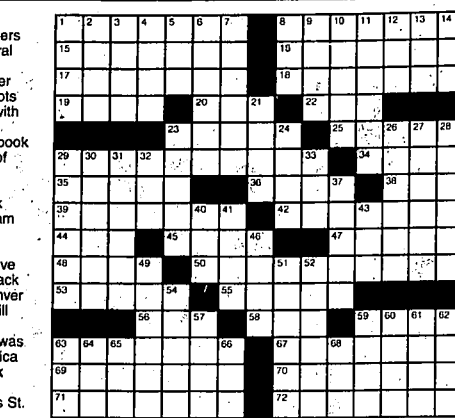

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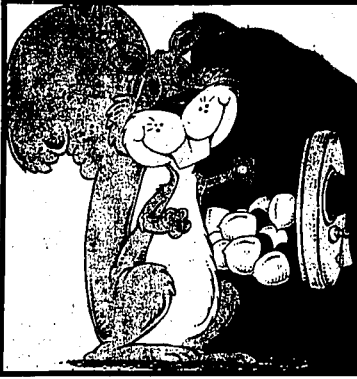

THE ACES ON BRIDGE® Bobby Wolff

At the Dyspeptics Club, players do not give up their opportunity to play the hand without a struggle. When South heard his right-hand opponent make a one-heart overcall, he decided against doubling, preferring to introduce his four-card spade suit, judging that a spade contract on a 4-3 fit might be optimal. If you play negative doubles, this route normally promises five spades, but South's action was far from unreasonable, whatever his motives for doing it. What was less reasonable was his line of play in the spade game.

When the defense led three rounds of hearts, South ruffed and cashed two top trumps. When the spade nine appeared on his left, South sniffed the air for a few seconds, but decided against playing for the actual life of the cards. (Attacking the side suits might have let him take 10 tricks.) Instead, he drew another round of trumps, and now East had the last trump and two heart winners for down two.

When South started to bluster that the spade nine might have been a false-card and that drawing the third trump might have been received on a different day, he received short shrift from North, who cut him off by letting him know where his real error was. Can you see it?

All South had to do was discard a club on the third heart. Now he can ruff the fourth heart in dummy and draw trumps in peace and quiet for his 10 tricks.

ANSWER: It is tempting to blast to three no-trump here. But you might be off the whole heart suit, or not have nine tricks facing a singleton spade. Cue-bid two spades to show a limit raise or better in diamonds. You can always bid three no-trump on the next round, but at least you give partner a chance to get involved in the final decision.

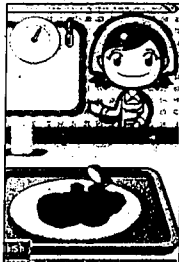

'Cooking Mama' best enjoyed in small bites

At first bite, "Cooking Mama" is a gourmet meal at a five-star restaurant. But be careful: too much of this delightful new culinary video game might give you an upset stomach.

No real-world food skills are required by this E-rated, \$19.99 Nintendo DS game from Japan. Anyone who can boil a pot of water or open a milk carton will find "Cooking Mama" an immediate pleasure that's hard to put down initially.

It makes good use of the DS touch screen as you prepare one of 76 different pizzas.

Some, like Pizza or Salisbury steak, will be instantly familiar to Western palates.

But many are straight out of the "Iron Chef" television show with specialties like fried octopus dumplings or grilled gyoza stuffed with cabbage and meat. The goal of "Cooking Mama" is to correctly prepare ingredients and then quickly cook the meal. Each task serves as a microgame that's very similar to Nintendo's "WarioWare" series.

Do well and you'll get a gold star and a satisfying smile from saucer-eyed Mama.

But she can turn hateful with a slip of a knife: even a few ill-timed egg cracks and she'll stare you down with flaming eyes.

Some dishes require you to blow into the microphone, but mostly you'll be using the DS' plastic stylus to simulate slicing, peeling, stirring, kneading, deep frying and sauteing, among other things.

This variety of tasks keeps the game light and fun in brief spurts.

Some are quite hard: I still haven't quite mastered peeling

potatoes. This contrasts with stupefyingly simple goals like setting a timer to 30 minutes, then pressing enter.

Anyone with a passing interest in food will enjoy how easy and intuitive it is to play "Cooking Mama."

But like a doughnut, the sugar rush doesn't last long. After a few hours, I was hungering for more to do as the game felt repetitive.

You can also combine dishes (pork curry and rice with grilled mackerel, anyone?) or try to earn a gold star of approval from Mama for every recipe.

What "Cooking Mama" really needs is some sort of wireless multiplayer feature where you can compete in cook-offs with others.

Heck, I would have settled for a secret, unlockable dessert menu, which this game completely lacks.

If the developers do make a sequel, hopefully they won't forget to add these features a second time.

'MAN OF THE YEAR'

Williams' political satire in need of a sharper wit

We've seen plenty of "Tom Stewart" for president" bumper stickers, and it would be fun to see a straight-talking, seething, satiric guy like him on the campaign trail against the usual suspects.

Barry Levinson's "Man of the Year" aims for that scenario, though, funny as he is at times, Robin Williams in the commentator-turned-candidate role is a lightweight, almost as empty a suit as the career politicians he's up against.

With a premise too absurd for belief even alongside 2000's photo-finish presidential election, "Man of the Year" becomes a campaign of character, relying mainly on its cast to see it through.

Luckily for writer-director Levinson, Williams, and especially co-stars Laura Linney, Christopher Walken and Lewis Black, deliver well enough to keep the movie in the race, making viewers care about these people more than the story merits.

The actor and filmmaker behind "Good Morning, Vietnam" reunite for the story of Tom Dobbs, a political commentator who seems less about substance and more about the manic standup jabber on which Williams built his early career.

Williams' Tom is the comic lost of a political talk show that supposedly tells it like a sick-and-tired electorate wants to hear it. We're led to understand that Tom's an insightful wit whose assaults on Washington's power brokers have made him so beloved his TV audience wildly cheers at his innocent comment about running for president himself.

The trouble with Levinson's screenplay is that Tom talks a lot but doesn't say much. We essentially see Williams doing his schtick, prattling in such a bluster that the mildly amusing mite-

rial sounds funnier than it is, with some generic politically rabble-rousing dithers thrown in to establish him as a voice of dissent, a title the character doesn't deserve.

Even so, Tom shakes up the establishment by jumping in as an independent alternative to the bland Republican incumbent and the blander Democratic challenger. Though Tom polls like a respectable third-party candidate, it's all meant as a lark and a reminder to the real politicians that their job is to serve the American people.

Then the impossible happens. Under a new computerized voting system, Tom wins the election. As his sickly manager

(Walken), head writer (Black) and other minions prepare for the transition to ultimate power, an employee of the company that developed the voting system, Eleanor Green (Linney), turns up claiming a software glitch mistakenly handed the election to Tom.

His left to Tom to reveal the possible mistake or keep his mouth shut and take the job.

With the exit-polling that private parties do in every election, Levinson's plot just crumbles. His far-better political satire "Wag the Dog," with its outrageously manufactured TV war to distract the electorate, was credible stuff by comparison.

It's outlandish that a guy on

the ballot in just 13 states — and polling a distant third in those — would be declared the winner without an uproar. Yet the media, the political parties and the public simply shrug and accept the fact that Tom won.

What keeps "Man of the Year" alive is the honny fantasy of its principals, Tom's talk-show staff coming off like a fun family of kooks, Walken's grand old man as the entertainment manager who becomes an unlikely king-maker, despite an odd subplot about his character's health problems from smoking.

Black, toned down from the hell of his standup act, is surprisingly even-keeled as Tom's wise and wisecracking writer. Jeff Goldblum is thrown in to little effect as the dastardly corporate attorney hiding the truth about whether or not the computerized voting system was flawed.

Linney's the real victor, creating a rich, noble, conflicted character who's much worthier a successor than Tom to the everyman heroes of such films as "Mr. Smith Goes to Washington," which Levinson seems to be emulating.

There was a much better movie tucked inside the story of Linney's Eleanor, the meek corporate self fighting back against corrupt bosses.

If the title wasn't already taken by a Katharine Hepburn-Spencer Tracy classic, Eleanor would have made a fine heroine for a movie called "Woman of the Year."

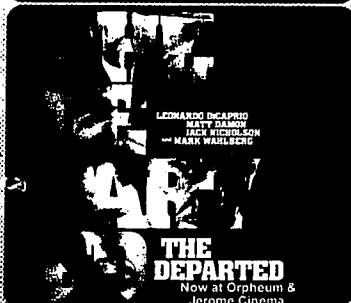

Movie nuggets

• **"The Convent"** / **B-** In Renny Harlin's entertaining but empty horror film, young prepies have mystical powers that date back to Puritan times. 1 hour, 37 minutes. PG-13 (profanity, violence, partial nudity, sexual content)

• **"The Departed"** / **B** This is what you want in a Martin Scorsese film: beautifully edited, brutally violent sequences, brimming with life even as bodies are hitting the floor, all awash in a blaring Rolling Stones song. (In this case, "Gimme Shelter" again.) Even though this is an Americanized version of the 2002 Hong Kong hit "Infernal Affairs," its vintage Scorsese — for a while at least. The veteran director has made two-thirds of a great film about Boston cops and mobsters, with rich, meaty performances from a dizzyingly stellar cast and an ambience that screams Scorsese's typical cultural authenticity. (It's as if the fellas from "GoodFellas" took a road trip up I-95.) Leonardo DiCaprio, reuniting with the director for a third film, stars as a Massachusetts State Police detective who's gone undercover to take down a crime boss (Jack Nicholson). Matt Damon, meanwhile, stars as the crime boss' protege, who's been working his way up the state police ranks. Each of them is asked to sniff out the rat — to

seek out each other. It's a clever premise and it can be thrilling. But "The Departed" is also about a half-hour too long, and tends to drag just when it should be at its most intense. R for strong brutal violence, pervasive language, some strong sexual content and drug material. 150 minutes.

• **"Employee of the Month"** / **D** Jessica Simpson, Dana Cook, Dax Shepard and colleagues will not be in the running for Hollywood's employee of the month for their new comedy. Except for standup comic Cook, who manages to come off as likable enough in this dreadful workplace tale, everyone else involved belongs in the unemployment line. First-time director Greg Coolidge goes screenwriting credit with Don Calame and Chris Conroy, and it's sorry day on the job when it takes the toll of three people to come up with a comedy so lame and gags so pathetic. Set at a bargain warehouse store, the movie pits Cook as a slacker box-boy against Shepard as an odious super-drome competing for the latest employee of the month contract. But convinced fun, winning is the only way to win the heart of a gorgeous new cashier (Simpson). Simpson is so flat and vacuous, she delivers her lines with all the personality of a 10-pound can of cling peaches. PG-13 for crude and sexual humor, and language. 108 minutes.

• **"Everyone's Hero"** / **B** This feel-good, computer-animated feature about a 10-year-

old boy who becomes an unlikely World Series hero for the 1932 New York Yankees is the last project Christopher Reeve worked on — which is bound to contribute to its appeal. But the voices of Rob Reiner, Whoopi Goldberg, William H. Macy and Robin Williams are what give the movie its good humor and heart. Rated G. 1 hour, 28 minutes.

• **"Flyboys"** / **D** It's hard not to think of Snoopy vs. the Red Baron — that's just how silly and cartoonish this melodramatic movie about the experiences of World War I aviators in France is. And that's a shame, because the story of the all-American, all-volunteer Lafayette Escadrille squadron has the right stuff to make a late, overdue realism on the order of "Twelve O'Clock High." Rated PG-13 (war action violence and some sexual content). 2 hours, 14 minutes.

• **"Griddle Gang"** / **C+** Based on fact, it often feels like just another version of all those fictional triumph-through-pisgkin films you've seen before. Dwayne "The Rock" Johnson plays Sean Porter, a real-life corrections officer for juvenile offenders who decides to raise the kids' self-esteem by turning them into football players. What follows you've seen many times before. Porter drills the kids ruthlessly and, pointing out his players' flaws, learns that he has some himself. And two kids from different gangs learn to get along. Awww. Still, Johnson shows growing confidence as an actor. He even manages to pull off a couple of emotional moments. Rated PG-13 (some startling scenes of violence, mature thematic material and language). 2 hours.

• **"The Grudge 2"** / **No rating** The curse keeps on spreading in

this sequel to the 2004 hit. Amber Tamblyn and Sarah Michelle Gellar star. PG-13

• **"The Guardian"** / **D** Action flick in which Kevin Costner attempts to resurrect his career by teaming with youthful pop-culture icon Ashton Kutcher. It's super-serious stuff, all about lifesaver training, the Coast Guard, military salutes, raging sea storms and trumped-up dramatic situations. Costner is Coast Guard veteran and macho man Ben Randall, who gets sent to train hot-dog Kutcher, and other unsuspecting newbies as rescue swimmers. A silly movie made of apod-together. Hollywood hokum. Rated PG-13 (intense sequences of action/peril, brief strong language and some sensuality). 2 hours, 16 minutes.

• **"Invincible"** / **D+** It isn't. Meant as an inspirational movie based on the true story of Vince Papale (Mark Wahlberg, just fine), an average Joe who played for the Philadelphia Eagles in the mid-'70s, the film is riddled with feel-good platitudes and plagued by an overacting supporting cast. Greg Kinnear (also good) is new coach Dick Vermeil, who gives Vince his shot. "Rudy" is a better little-guy-who-could-lick-the-Rookie" is a better aging-athlete-who-fulfills-his-dream picture. And "Rocky" is, well, "Rocky." But if you're looking for a movie about bad '70s hair and sports-movie cliches, here it is. Rated PG (sports action and some mild language). 1 hour, 44 minutes.

• **"Jackass: number two"** / **B** The Three Stooges have nothing over the intoxicating physical comedy humped upon moviegoers in the latest edition of the totally bad-boy "Jackass." It's more of the same physical buffoonery — outrageous stunts and gags with branding irons, bees, a game of "medicine ball dodge ball in the dark" and such — only often more gross. These clown are so good at what they do (or is it that they are so wonderfully inept) that the film is often drop-jaw funny. But be forewarned, when you're not laughing out loud, you

could well be crying hard not to lose your lunch. Rated R (extremely crude and dangerous stunts throughout, sexual content, nudity and profanity). 1 hour, 35 minutes.

• **"Jet Li's Fearless"** / **C+** This Chinese martial arts film, physically jet Li's last, has the physical stuff down pat — the fights are mostly impressive with blistering hand and foot moves. But its story, an epic sweep involving the founding of the International Jing Wu Sports Federation, is overly melodramatic. Director Ronny Yu avoids almost every remnant of camp, which is odd, since that is the precise element that elevates some Chinese actioners (such askung fu kickzoid "Iron Monkey" and is what makes Yu's earlier films, "Freddy vs. Jason" and "Bride of Chucky," so darned watchable. Rated PG-13 (violence and martial arts action throughout). 1 hour, 43 minutes.

• **"Little Miss Sunshine"** / **B+** An out-of-the-blue gem. The set-up sounds depressingly like "RV"/ Chevy Chase territory: a dysfunctional-family road trip in an equally dysfunctional vintage VW bus. But this movie has more in common with the complex humor and bittersweet tone of the Thanksgiving-themed "Pieces of April." Little Olive (adorably chubby Abigail Breslin) wants to compete in a beauty contest, so her family hits the road. The flawless ensemble cast includes her parents (Greg Kinnear and Toni Collette), grandpa Alan Arkin and gay uncle Steve Carell. Smart and gaff, tender and laugh-out-loud funny, this is the sleeper hit of the summer. Rated R (language, some sex and drug content). 1 hour, 41 minutes.

"Click" follows from the premise that Adam Sandler, impersonating workaholic architect Michael Newman, acquires the ultimate in universal remotes—that is, a remote that controls the universe. With the click of a button, he is able to fast forward through the boring or unpleasant parts of his life, pause to consider snappy comebacks or extract a petty revenge on oppressors, turn down the volume on arguments with his wife (poor, forlorn Kate Beckinsale), pretty much treat his life as a DVD. It even has a commentary section, where some snarky critic offers unpleasant interpretations of his decisions.

It's certainly the movie that the trailers and the mega-million-dollar pub campaign suggested you were going to get for your money, a crass physical comedy of unrelenting irrelevance with a gag or two amid the many other examples of bad taste, extrapolating toward infinite on a theme of remote control reality.

But what's wrong with this movie isn't the movie, it's Sandler himself, his sensibility, his sense of humor, which is aggressively hostile. Why does screwball scientist Mory (Christopher Walken) give the gizmo to Sandler's Michael? Because he's a good guy who deserves a break.

Except he's not a good guy who deserves a break. He's a selfish, self-absorbed, snarky little scoundrel, who turns on everybody at the drop of a hat, who cheats to succeed, who brutalizes his children, who screams at his wife, and who looks to be a pretty mediocre architect in the bargain. In fact, halfway through the overlong film I was the one wishing for a remote. I'd have at it that off button so fast it'd make your nose bleed.

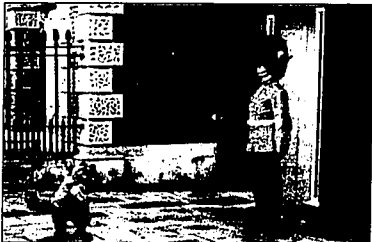

"Kitties" really draws its inspiration — well, maybe that's too grand a word — from Mark Twain's "The Prince and the Pauper," about a high-born and a low-born of identical appearance and age who involuntarily switch places in the capital city of the British empire, to each's mutual benefit and education.

But instead of prince and paupers, the transferees are fat, blobby, orange American tabbies, one the famous Garfield of cartoon fame (Bill Murray does the laconic, hipster voice) and the other named Prince, the heir apparent to an English estate (Tim Curry does that voice). And, of course, there's no empire anymore. The movie is intermittently amusing, particularly when the American human

part of the cast (Breckin Meyer and Jennifer Love Hewitt) are off-screen, the longer and farther the better.

Mostly what the movie documents has to do with the animals' has to do with the enfilades against the opportunings of the Knavish Mr. Derslich (Billy Connolly) to expel them and turn the place into a theme park or retirement home or some such. It's mostly a fall-down-go-boom sort of enterprise, though now and then a musical breaks out as when Garfield leads the barnyard through a rock ode to the making of lasagna. Nothing happens that you haven't seen before, although if you haven't seen it before (you would have to be younger than 3), you might crack a smile or two.

"A Prairie Home Companion"

The end toons large in Robert Altman's "A Prairie Home Companion," which nevertheless takes its sweet time saying goodbye. Written by Garrison Keillor, creator and host of the long-running public radio show, the movie is a pretty curious artifact — a retraction of a send-up, in which Keillor's mild, pleased-with-itself spoof of old-time radio variety shows is recast as an actual old-time radio variety show. The audience filling the Fitzgerald theater in St. Paul, Minn., in the movie doesn't appear that different from the ones who might fill it in real life or who tune in from the coasts. But the performers on stage — including a handgong emcee known as G.K. (Keillor) — don't exactly look like NPR coffee-mug types. Most of them are shucky and woebegone for real.

Altman has made a long, varied career of peeking under the rug of various subcultures to reveal the underside of the veneer. On the face of it, making a movie about "A Prairie Home Companion," a show that has run for 32 years, would seem to make sense. But far from taking a "Larry Sanders Show"-style approach, Keillor's script wants to be "interesting" more than it wants to be honest. Rather than focus on internecine rivalries, disconnections between the characters, and the people who play them, "A Prairie Home Companion" creates an alternative universe that resembles the fictional universe of his show. It's as if Restoration Hardware's marketing department woke up one day suddenly believing its own copy.

The result is at once familiar and disconcerting, meta-Keillor done in Altman's desultory, distracted style. The formidable cast of characters fluttering around the imperturbable host includes Meryl Streep and Lily Tomlin as sisters Yolanda (Streep) and Rhonda (Tomlin) Johnson, the last remaining members of a musical family whom Yolanda de-

scribes to her daughter Lala (Lindsay Lohan) as "the Carter family, only not famous"; a hard-boiled private detective Guy Noir (Kevin Kline) of the public radio show's occasional pulp fiction parody; Maya Rudolph as a put-upon assistant; and Woody Harris and John C. Reilly as a duo of singing cowboys — characters who don't belong on the same plane of existence, let alone in the same movie.

The gumshoe business isn't being what it used to be, Guy has taken a job doing security for the show. The movie takes place almost entirely within the confines of the theater on the night of the 30-year-old show's final broadcast, as the radio station has been bought by a Texas conglomerate run by Bible-thumping vulgaritians — they've never even heard of Scott Fitzgerald — who plan to shut down the operation. While he's expecting "The Aeseman" (Timmy Lee Jones) to make an appearance, Guy doesn't know what to make of the apparition in a white trench coat who shows up unannounced.

Of course, no one expects the angel of death, especially not when she looks like Virginia Madsen. But that's what she is — the celestial continuation of a long-time "Prairie Home" listener who laughed at a joke, lost control of her car and died, come to escort an elderly cast member to the Lord.

Given their status as living anachronisms, it's natural that "A Prairie Home's" fictional characters would feel threatened with extinction. But the fear seems to come from an unusual source. Of all popular entertainment programs, surely "A Prairie Home Companion" has the least to fear from the nippie-censoring fundies, even if it is a bastion of Minnesota liberalism. What's harder to figure is why the modern world Keillor and Altman have created — with its censoring Christians, phillistine corporations and hysterical regulatory agencies — feels so old-fashioned and off the mark.

TWIN FALLS — Don't even enter Maxie's Pizza & Pasta unless you're planning to indulge.

Sure, there's a salad bar. But the warm atmosphere laden with delicious scents simply demands that you eat pizza or lasagna. And at the counter where you'll stand and order, you'll see straight into the kitchen.

Go ahead. Pick a pizza. You won't regret it.

On our recent visit, my husband and I shared a 10-inch Idaho's Delight (\$9.95) — our favorite pizza in town and, judging from its popularity at Maxie's, a favorite among a good many other folks. It's a not-so-unusual combination of pepperoni, Canadian bacon, ground beef (for which you can substitute Maxie's own Italian sausage), mushrooms, green peppers, onions, black olives and cheese. With not-so-usual flavor.

Even Maxie's owner, Max Humphries, can't remember the

modeled and remodeled and remodeled.

The result is disjointed, with different decor froo froo to room. But fireplaces and seat-worthy informality encourage conversation in those homey rooms. The restaurant's display of community sponsorship plaques speaks to its long history and local ownership. Indeed, Maxie's is a place where even a newcomer can feel like part of something larger.

It's Trailing of the Sheep time

Blaine County event turns 10 years old

KETCHUM — The sheep were late to their own party the first year.

Even Wood River Valley schoolchildren turned out for the first Trailing of the Sheep that clear, crisp Columbus Day.

But the sheep had parried under a full moon the night before, and it took more time for sheep-headers to round them up.

"The Trailing of the Sheep Festival has gone full steam ahead since, growing into a three-day event complete with a folkife fair, cooking classes, sheep-herder carving talks, music and dancing and talks by authors such as Ivan Dujig.

"The first year we stood back and said, 'Well, that works. That was fun.' Then the next year we said, 'Let's try it for one more year.' It really has been a year-by-year process," said Diane Josephy Peavey.

Peavey and her husband, John, organized the first Trailing of the Sheep simply as a way to explain to newer residents of the valley why sheep were passing their condo windows and running down their bike paths.

"The first trailing attracted one protester holding a sign denigrating the sheep industry, and he attracted far more boos than thumbs up."

"We hadn't realized we had so much support in the valley," said Peavey. "I think for the people who have lived here 15 to 50 years it's like going home. It's about who we are and who we were."

It didn't take long before the Trailing was attracting the attention of the national media, including "CBS Sunday Morning," which filmed it as an antidote for sadness and anxiety that had enveloped the country

HAILEY — For 11 years, Company of Fools has approached theater in conventional fashion — presenting plays for an audience sitting on the other side of the stage.

Now the Fools are turning the tables.

For the next three weeks theater members will be taking the audience alongside professional actors on stage and technical directors behind the stage as they seek to show the magic of theater from every room in the house.

"It takes a village to put on a play — not just three of us. We're kicking open our doors and inviting the community into our home. And in the process we hope they learn something about us, and we hope we learn something about them," says Denise Simone, one of the Fools' core artists.

"Fools Exposed" is a mind-boggling array of 11 play readings, three performances, and six workshops offering John Q. Public the opportunity to learn about playwrighting, improvisation and the technical aspects of theater.

You'd be a fool not to check it out — each event is only \$5. And a pass good for all the events is \$25.

"Five bucks. Five bucks. Five bucks. Why so cheap? Because sometimes the best things in life should be," Simone said.

The idea came from the community, according to John Glenn, one of the Fools' core artists: "We'd go grocery shopping or to the Burkin' Basement and we'd get comments like, 'I loved what you did.' Or, 'I didn't understand why you did this.'"

"People would say, 'Where are

you off to?' and when they'd find it we're going to the theater, they couldn't understand what we'd do there during the day. They didn't realize it's a full-time job making this happen and they were full of questions. We thought we'd look for small ways we can share that information."

Fools Exposed will include a staged production of John Patrick Shanley's "Danny and the Deep Blue Sea," which explores the relationship between a guy and a gal from the Bronx as they seek to rise above their self-loathing and feelings of guilt.

Play readings include Tom Lehrer's "Tomfoolery," a satirical look at racism, the Boy Scouts and more through song.

Three Thursday lunch workshops will challenge participants to tap their creativity and show participants how the Fools create technical magic.

Aspiring playwrights can explore the craft of playwrighting in a two-part workshop with James Sill, who wrote "And Then They Came For Me" — a fresh take on the Anne Frank story, which the Fools performed a few years ago.

Even preschoolers and their adult companions will get the opportunity to share the wonder of sounds through 35-minute storytelling-and-music sessions at Iconoclast in Hailey.

The Fools hope the various events will attract newcomers to their theater in addition to long-time supporters. Last year, for instance, the Fools found that people love play readings and that readings often attract an entirely different audience than those who attend full productions.

This time they plan to offer two of the performances of "Danny and the Deep Blue Sea" at 9:30 p.m. for younger audience and those who work late.

The kitchen uses fresh vegetables whenever possible and shuns pre-prepped ingredients. Humphries — and old Humphries — mixes the tomato-sauce spices. Even Hayes isn't privy to the spice secrets.

But that recipe and the others handed down by Humphries' parents — including a locally famous lasagna developed with the help of an Italian cook from New Orleans — are written in a safe place.

That tomato sauce is crucial to the Idiot's Delight flavor that Mark and I savor. So is Maxie's characteristic crust, which emphasizes the other ingredients, and the stone on which the pizza is cooked, which bakes the bottom of the crust.

I hope those recipes really are safe.

Symphony opens season with Haydn — and Uranus

TWIN FALLS — Consider the thin line between music and acrobatics.

"How do we turn those voiceless papers of black notes and symbols and a few words, mostly Italian, into the sublime sounds you look forward to hearing?" said Tad Hadley, Magic Valley Symphony musical director, who will conduct the season-opening symphony on Sunday in the College of Southern Idaho Fine Arts Center auditorium.

"We bring to the stage 50 or so sound-producing devices, crafted to close tolerances, but still capable of both music and noise. We place them under the control of 50 or more people, each bringing to their own art a unique life of study and experience, and capable of an infinity of emotions."

"The alchemy that follows still comes as surprise to Hadley. "In its pure form, magic is no more than the unexplainable process of making the unexpected appear, or maybe vanish." Hadley writes in the program notes for Sunday's concert. "It is as if saying 'magic words' makes the impossible happen. That timeless incantation, 'abracadabra,' even means 'I create as I speak' in the ancient Hebrew-Aramaic."

On Sunday, Hadley and his orchestra will conjure up Joseph Haydn's "Surprise" symphony, and "Uranus the Magician," part of British composer Gustav Holst's seven-movement orchestral suite "The Planets."

Soloists are obolst Trent Parke, a junior at Carey High School, and pianist Pernelia Heinemann, a University of Idaho sophomore from Kimberly. They were the winners of the symphony's Youth Soloist Competition for 2006.

Parke, son of Dan and Shama Parke, commutes to Twin Falls to study oboe with Janie Griff and piano with Sue Miller. He plans to study oboe performance at Brigham Young University and

eventually earn a doctorate in music.

Heinemann, daughter of Wayne and Gayle Heinemann, was home-schooled and learned to play the violin from her dad. She performed with the Magic Valley Symphony for six years from age 10, and studied piano with Margaret Vincent for almost 12 years. Heinemann hopes to follow a career in the specialized area of piano accompaniment.

"The depth of talent attracted to our biennial contest was a challenge for our judges, which you will appreciate in the capable musicianship of our winners," Hadley said.

Haydn is called "the father of the symphony" (he's also credited with inventing the string quartet). The 18th century Austrian court musician changed the format of the symphony radically, expanding its length, weight and complexity and making the orchestra dominant and the chorus secondary.

His 94th symphony, the "Surprise," was one of his best. First performed in 1792 when Haydn was living in London, it includes one of the composer's trademark musical jokes: A jarring chord sounds near the beginning of the second movement after a tranquil opening. The chord "disappears" as quickly as it arrives, and the music immediately returns to its original dynamic, as if nothing had happened.

"(It's) a joke Haydn was said to have intended to wake up an inattentive audience," writes the Magic Valley Symphony's publicist and historian, Paula Brown Sinclair, in the program notes.

"But the rest of the notes, too, bring delight. Imagine as the soundtrack for the stage show of any famous illusionist. Hear the drama as the stage is set, the peering of the audience, the titter as the rabbit appears or the white girls disappear, the intervals of high spirits and quiet wonder, building to an exuberant climax worthy of any magician, or symphony."

Holst, an English composer of Swedish extraction, was influenced by Indian spiritualism and English folk tunes. He wrote "The Planets" during World War I, but they weren't performed until after the Armistice.

"At a time of middle crisis, a traveling companion introduced him to astrology, reawakening his leaning toward mysticism and unlearning repressed creativity," Brown Sinclair wrote. "The result was what he called a 'series of mood pictures' based on the astrological, not astronomical, characteristics of the seven known planets in order of distance from earth."

"Uranus," the sixth movement named for the seventh planet, uses a bassoon as the voice of the magician, bolstered by a "mischievous woodwind melody," according to Brown Sinclair. The low brass portays evil. "The Planets" brought fame and fortune and international recognition, all so unwelcome to Holst that he swore off casting in astrology (though still belief in horoscopes for friends until his death), while the work that brought most acclaim was for the composer, without joy," Brown Sinclair writes.

The Magic Valley Symphony's season will continue Nov. 14, accompanied by lyric tenor Cole Seaton. Other performances are scheduled for Feb. 25 and April 27.

A lot has happened in 10 years, Peavey said. Some of the sheep men and women who have swapped stories at the Sheep Tails Gathering, including John Peavey's mother Mary Brooks, have died. Others, including Pete Cenarrusa, have left the sheep business.

And there are only about 25,000 sheep in the area — way below the 2.65 million that plodded through in 1918 when Ketchum and Sydney, Australia, were the leading sheep exporters in the world.

On the bright side, the festival has grown to encompass the stories of the various people who have worked with sheep over the years from Navajos to Polish Highlanders.

And sheep ranchers who were bemoaning prices that fell to 38 cents a pound a few years ago are now getting \$1.05 a pound, thanks to a new packing co-op Western ranchers have organized.

The break-even point is just under a dollar a pound, Peavey said.
