**Journalist wants to see if county really needs new jail**

HAILEY — My plan was to spend a full day — 24 hours — as an inmate in the Blaine County jail. I didn't make it. With 21 hours down, I left my cell for a quick visitation with a coworker, and after getting out from behind the bars and hearing a familiar voice, I couldn't stand the thought of another three hours. The problem wasn't my cell mates — who were nicer than I ever would have expected — or the quality of the food. It was the boredom.

I was fortunate. When I had had enough, all I had to do was tell the jail staff I was ready to leave, gather up my jail-issue bedding and toiletries, and I was back on the outside.

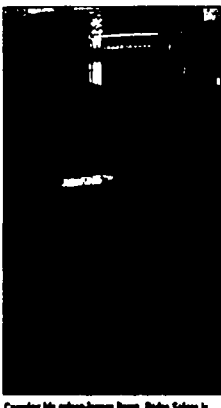
Law enforcement officials say the Blaine County jail is outdated and inadequate. I decided to dig a little deeper and see for myself. County officials were more than willing to let me spend the night as an inmate — provided I signed a release, clearing them of any liability in case something happened to me.

I arrived at the Blaine County Jail in Hailey at 2 p.m. on Jan. 17. They buzzed me through the first door and began treating me as any other inmate.

"Spread your legs out — more — back up more. Do you have anything on your person that will poke me during my search?" the guard asked.

After the frisking, he wiped his hands with sanitizers.

I was moved into the next hallway. Mugshots were taken — staring straight

ahead and facing left. No, I don't have any tattoos, scars or distinguishing physical features to photograph.

The guard tells me to tell my cell mates that I'm in jail for a one-day sentence for driving under the influence. I'm not to tell them I'm a reporter as they might hold me for ransom. That's a sobering thought. The rattling of keys is followed by a dull

buzzing sound, and the door to my cell slides open. Inside are five young men, all of whom are staring at me. Looking around I can see that the five steel bunk beds bolted the floor are already made up.

I soon learn a guard walks by every 15 minutes, 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. You hear the keys jingling about 10 seconds before you see him or her. They usually stop to share a few words with the inmates, focusing on what's on TV, the card game in progress or the weather.

I drop my rolled up mattress in a small space under the pay phone, sit it on and open my paperback. I'm not able to concentrate on the book, I'm just looking around.

My cell has two small rooms, separated by a narrow hallway with a small shower stall. One room has two beds and small table, the other has three beds, a table and a television — paid for by the inmates. The rooms are small and smell of cleaning chemicals and body odor. The floor is green. The walls are white. The television is on. It doesn't go off until midnight when the guards pull the plug.

I realize that five inmates socialize, watch TV, eat, sleep and shower within a few hundred square feet.

The next guard who comes by says the jail's 24 beds are full and I'm left to sleep on the floor. The beds are steel, the floors are concrete. It really makes no difference from a comfort standpoint.

A cell mate looks at me and asks me why I'm in jail. When I say DUI, he points to himself and another cell mate and says, "trafficking."

**Blood loss**

Some states have shortage; Idaho has adequate supply

BOISE — Idaho continues to maintain adequate blood supplies even as neighboring states struggle with shortages.

The Associated Press reported that a blood supply shortage in Utah has caused several transplant surgeries at local hospitals to be put on hold. A nationwide shortage of O positive and O negative blood is partially to blame.

But officials say Idaho donors are helping the state maintain adequate blood supplies.

"There isn't a shortage here (in Idaho), but we climb that mountain every day to meet the need for blood," said Debi Mahler, a recruitment representative for the Idaho Red Cross.

Mahler said Idaho is not experiencing a blood shortage such as those in Utah and Oregon, but she said the state always struggles this time of year to maintain adequate supplies.

She said blood donations decline during winter because of the cold and flu season, as well as the ongoing risk of hazardous driving conditions.

The Red Cross in Portland, Ore., is still trying to increase blood supplies after a winter storm last week prevented many donors from commuting to donation centers.

Transplant and trauma patients also are sapping supplies, while the cold weather is keeping blood donors at home, ARUP blood services spokesman Lance Handley said.

ARUP is the sole provider of blood for several hospitals in Utah.

to get 60 people with O positive blood and 40 with O negative blood to donate over the next few days. Those 100 pints would get the center through one weekend holiday.

The "demands change constantly, especially with all of the car crashes we've had lately," he said. "Anytime we're hearing about car crashes or we're hearing those helicopters taking off, we're anticipating more patients coming in."

St. Luke's Magic Valley Regional Medical Center receives its blood from the Idaho Red Cross, so it relies on the organization's blood supply.

Typically, when the local blood supply runs low, hospitals can buy blood from out-of-state sources.

Mahler said about 5 percent of people in the United States donate blood, but more than 70 percent will need blood sometime in their lives.

"A lot of people just don't know how easy it is," she said.

**Boom in vaccine discovery could save millions of lives**

Technological breakthroughs, increased funding and higher profits are spurring a boom in vaccine discovery and development that could save or improve the lives of millions of people by attacking such scourges as cancer and malaria.

Three new vaccines arrived on the market in 2006, the most in a single year. They include vaccines for the human papilloma virus, linked to cervical cancer in women, and for rotavirus, which causes severe diarrhea and kills 100,000 children globally each year. Another prevents shingles in the elderly.

As early as the end of the decade, scientists say, there may be new immunizations against herpes simplex, rheumatoid arthritis and a better seasonal influenza vaccine.

Researchers also are talking about a potential vaccine within five years to fight malaria — long one of mankind's deadliest and most elusive adversaries.

**Suit against Yosemite could affect access to national parks**

**YOSEMITE NATIONAL PARK, Calif.** — The plunging waterfalls and soaring crags cherished by the Merced River draw millions of visitors each year, but the crowds are precisely what threatens the wilderness and the park.

Efforts to safeguard the Merced have spawned a court battle over the future of development in Yosemite National Park's most popular stretch. The case may come down to

the challenge facing all of America's parks. Should they remain open to everyone, or should access be limited in the interest of protecting them?

In November, a federal judge barred crews from finishing \$60 million in construction projects in Yosemite Valley, siding with a small group of environmentalists who sued the federal government, saying further commercial development would bring greater numbers of visitors, thus threatening the Merced's fragile ecosystem.

"The park's plans for commercialization could damage Yosemite for future generations," said Bridget Kerr, a member of Friends of Yosemite Valley, one of two local environmental groups that filed the suit.

The government is appealing, leaving the ruling could force the National Park Service to limit the number of people allowed into Yosemite each day, a precedent it doesn't want to set elsewhere in other parks.

"I don't think we've ever had a ruling with these kind of

implications," said Kerri Cahoon, a Denver-based planner for the park service. "It's going to have a direct influence on the public who care about these places."

The case has Yosemite's most loyal advocates sharply divided over how to balance preservation with access to public lands.

Even environmentalists can't agree on how to minimize the human footprint — some believe cars should be kept out entirely, others say visitors should have to make

reservations in advance.

Yosemite was the first land in the country set aside for its scenic beauty, declared a public trust in 1864 by Abraham Lincoln. Its 1,200 square miles of granite peaks and towering waterfalls became a national park in 1890, and with few exceptions its gates have been open to all ever since, though backcountry permits are limited to minimize the human impact on wilderness areas.

The Merced itself is protected under the federal Wild and Scenic Rivers Act.

The next day I go to the courthouse and look up their names. One of my cell mates was being held for driving under the influence, arrested a few days earlier. Three of them are in for trafficking, but they were not arrested together. There are charges for trafficking in methamphetamine, heroin, cocaine and marijuana, and a charge of grand theft. I'm not sure why my fifth cell mate was there.

I would guess it was approximately 5 p.m. — no way to know for sure without finding the Weather Channel — when I catch a whiff of what had to be food. The cramped kitchen is only a few yards from my cell.

A little while later, the sound of keys rattling, and cell doors sliding open. It's dinner time.

A cart is wheeled down the narrow passageway between cells and one of my cell mates motions for me to move. I realize I am sitting under the slot through which dinner will be passed.

For such man there is a glass of milk, a glass of bug juice — an old Navy term for any Kool Aid-type drink made primarily of sugar and water — and a tray with the components of chicken fajitas.

Everyone passes food to each other, sits down on their bed or at the table, and eats incredibly quickly. There is no conversation during the meal.

As each inmate finishes he offers his leftover food around to the others, including me.

then scrapes it all into the toilet. The toilets suck everything down. I assume they do this to make less of a mess for the cook. We stack the dishes in the slot to be picked up.

Half of the lights go off at approximately 10 p.m., I estimate. The lights never go fully out because the guards need to see everyone in the cell at all hours. The television stays on. I unfold my mattress and make my bed. I fish around in my plastic box and find my toothbrush and small container of toothpaste, and make my way to the sink. In a few minutes all of my cell mates are in bed and three are sleeping, which surprises me considering how loud the television is.

I'm still reading my book, not yet tired enough to sleep. I'm about 350 pages in and no more interested in the story than I was earlier.

I would guess it was midnight when the television automatically shut off. The only sounds left are snoring, the occasional toilet flushing, keys jingling — like clockwork every 15 minutes, and a few muffled conversations that I can't make out.

The lights go on and I'm instantly awake. Though the distorted glass I can see that the sun isn't up yet, but I'm instantly wide awake. My neck hurts.

I'm wide-awake and restless, and my cell mates are all still sleeping. I get up to take a shower. The water comes in 20-second bursts and is plenty warm. My towel is thin but gets

me dry enough. I fold up my mattress and sit down with my book again. I finish the book, all 410 pages, without ever really enjoying it.

Breakfast comes through the slots. Loops, sausage links, Fruit Loops, applesauce, milk and bug juice. I eat more than any of my cell mates. It's not that I'm hungry — I'm just trying to experience it. The leftover food is offered to me, then flushed down the toilet. One of my cell mates doesn't rise for breakfast, and jail staff later tell me that many inmates sleep as much as possible to make the time go by. In fact, I never see him rise again.

I'm sitting on my folded up mattress re-reading part of the book I didn't like the first time around. A guard calls out my name and tells me I have a visitor. I know from the rule book it's not regular visiting hours. I leave the cell and am escorted to the visiting area. I have a small window into the visitors' room and pick up the phone to talk to a co-worker who has come to see me.

I've been in jail for 21 hours. I tell her to tell the jail staff I have had enough.

I leave the visitors' room and the guard escorts me back to my cell to gather up everything I was issued.

I toss the jail clothes into the laundry basket as well, and pass through a security door back into the holding area. The guard passes me the rest of my belongings and I sign for them. He buzzes me out of the jail

area and I-beeline it for the door. Fresh air never tasted so good.

such as tobacco, by "teaching" the body to fight back. They're further away but hold the potential to transform medical care, experts say.

"It may turn out we have a perfect storm here of several different things coming together at the right time. This is a tremendous time of opportunity for both the developed and the developing world," said David Fleming, director of the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation's global health strategies program, which has made vaccine

development and access a priority.

"It's clear there is a renaissance going on around vaccines," said Dr. Anthony S. Fauci, director of the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases. "We have made more progress with some (vaccines) in the past few years than we have in the past 30."

The current immunization boom could rival or even surpass the golden age of vaccine development between the late 1940s and early 1960s, experts say, when scientists including Jonas Salk discovered inocula-

tions for polio, flu, mumps and measles. Fewer vaccines were found in the decades that followed, partly due to lack of profitability and reduced vaccine research funding.

Perhaps the best evidence of a vaccine revival is that the pharmaceutical industry is returning to the market.

Drug giant Pfizer Inc., which shuttered its human vaccine unit in 1976, reopened it in the fall by acquiring a small British vaccine company. Even with planned layoffs announced last week, Pfizer says it plans to increase funding in its vaccine business.

## No time to wait

School district official recommends organizing planning committees as soon as possible for new high school

TWIN FALLS — The clock is ticking. Dale Thornshery, Twin Falls School District's plant facilities director, is recommending that the school district organize a planning committee as soon as possible to help prepare for the new high school.

In a statement to Willey Dubbs, superintendent of the Twin Falls School District, and the board of trustees, Thornshery recommended that a committee be established by February.

"The committees would be advisory and provide

written or oral reports to the Board of Trustees on a regular or as-needed basis," he wrote in the statement.

Included with the statement was a draft of 15 issues that need to be addressed before the district can transition into Canyon Ridge High School, which is expected to be completed by summer 2009.

Thornshery suggested that each committee have 20 to 25 members, who would include district staff, board members, administrators, teachers, students and community members. However, committee appointments would be based on the scope of each committee's oversight.

### Proposed sub-committees, and their responsibilities:

- Facilities** — To oversee the installation of equipment and utilities in new facilities.
- Staff** — To help determine the process and procedure for selecting and moving staff members to appropriate buildings.
- Policies** — To suggest policies relating to having two high schools.
- Budget** — To recommend a long-term budget plan, as well as a budget for immediate needs of the new high school.
- Zoning** — To help determine new boundaries for the two high schools and the middle schools.
- Furniture and equipment** — To assist in budgeting and purchasing equipment.
- Busing** — To assist in decisions about busing schedules and costs, as well as transportation between programs at each high school.
- Academics** — To help determine the academics that will be offered at each high school.
- Technology** — To assist in the planning and installation of technology, and to help plan for a district-wide network.
- Partnerships** — To assist the partnerships with St. Luke's Magic Valley Regional Medical Center, the College of Southern Idaho and Twin Falls High School.
- Construction** — To assist in strategies and updates to the board and public.
- Equity and fairness** — To insure equal programs, access and budget between all schools.
- Landscape** — To assist in planning the landscape design.
- School colors** — To recommend the school colors, and how they will be used.
- Traffic and safety** — To recommend controls for traffic and pedestrian safety.

far have been at the request of private property owners. Rothweiler said most annexations last year were for residential subdivisions, while most so far in 2007 have been for commercial and industrial uses.

There are about seven other pieces of property under consideration for annexation. Four of the tracts are located near the intersection of 100 South Road and 100 East Road. One parcel contains the new LDS church and Canyonside Christian School.

Property taxes remain the same for annexed properties because the county collects all taxes for the city, Rothweiler said.

## Money to move — out of state

Education budget includes increased funding for 'border contracts'

BOISE — The cost of transporting students is blurring state boundaries.

When Tom Luna, state superintendent of public instruction, presented his 2008 education budget for \$1.38 billion to lawmakers on Tuesday, it included a 25 percent increase in funding to send Idaho students to schools in other states.

Although less than 10 years

ago it would seem strange to pay schools in Montana, Washington and Oregon to accept students from Idaho, the rising cost of fuel is making it a more cost-effective method of educating students who live on the Idaho border.

"It's something that has been done in the past," said Melissa McGrath, public information officer for the Idaho State Department of Education. "If students live closer to schools in other states, and it's approved by (local) school

boards, then the state will pay schools in other states to take in Idaho students."

The 25 percent increase in border contracts is more than the 12 percent increase for in-state student transportation costs. However, the actual cost increase is significantly less than what it would cost the state to transport some students to in-state schools.

Idaho has struggled to rein in school transportation costs as the cost of fuel continues to rise. Last year the state spent more than \$64.3 million on student transportation — Luna requested an additional \$2.7 million in his budget for 2008.

In 2003, Idaho lawmakers passed House Bill 463, which requires school districts to remain within a yearly transportation budget or face state penalties. Last year, 22 school districts, including the Twin Falls School District, appealed the penalties after spending more than the state had budgeted.

The 25 percent increase in border contracts — an additional \$220,000 to the existing \$800,000 — will pay for an increase in the number of students attending schools in other states.

Officials did not say if that number would continue to rise as the cost of fuel increases.

WENDELL — Until she was married, Pauline Thomas didn't know about the tough times her father faced growing up.

Her father, Albert Athel Denney, died Jan. 20. He was 88.

As a young boy, his parents and their nine children moved to Idaho from their farm in Arkansas. It was a long journey that meant dividing the family and sleeping in school yards.

"His dad didn't drive," Thomas said. "So he had to hire someone to drive his car and another fellow was coming out so he drove the other half."

Upon settling in Idaho, they discovered the man who drove them from Arkansas had taken the family's money. They ended up sleeping in twentys and used sagebrush for cooking and heat.

youngest boy herding sheep. The Tattersalls became like family to Denney and while there he met his future wife, Lucile, when she filled in as a cook.

He eventually worked for local farmer Charlie Fisher who helped him get a start at his own farming operation.

"Farming was about all he knew," Thomas said. "But Dad's real love was for horses."

Denney gave up farming after awhile and moved to the Sawtooth Mountains where he managed Cape Horn Lodge, a dude ranch, now known as

Camp Bradley. After two years of running the ranch, he farmed again in Murtaugh.

Later the couple bought a grocery store in Stanley, where Denney met Bill Harrah, former owner of Harrah's Casino in Las Vegas. The two struck up a friendship and Harrah hired Denney to be a guard and packer at the Middle Fork Lodge for guests Harrah sent up.

Debbie Reynolds, Bobbie Gentry, Vikki Carr, Jimmy Dean and others often came to Stanley for hunting and fishing trips. They even sent him

notes and signed pictures that he kept in a scrapbook and enjoyed sharing with others.

"He just loved the mountains and loved horses," Thomas said. "And he would help anybody with anything he could."

Candy Anton, his registered nurse during his stay at Hospice Visions, said he was a kind man to everyone he knew. And he loved to tease — but in a subtle way.

"He had such a sparkle in his eye," Anton said. "He'd land of sucker you into believing things."

He was also the resident checkers champion who played with anyone — staff or fellow residents — and he loved to tease and pull pranks. His easy, slow-going personality, and his hard work ethic and caring nature were also trademarks.

"The way he grew up and the things he had to go through, I absolutely marvel at what kind of man he turned out to be," she said.

No need for a 'swat' team in California

Who knew that in her spare time, the glamorous California Assemblywoman Sally Lieber has been elected by her television, riveted by episodes of "Supernanny"?

Lieber apparently wants to be the Jo Frost for all California's children. In a trial balloon that could remove all metaphor from the phrase "nanny state," the assemblywoman announced plans last week to introduce legislation that would make it illegal for parents to spank their own children under the age of 4.

Lieber contends that a spanking ban would end the "ridiculous situation of having our law saying there's justifiable beating of children." But our laws say no such thing.

There are existing statutes against beating children. Teachers, peace officers and health-care professionals (among others) are all mandated to report even suspected cases of child abuse that they come across.

The first is none of the state's business; the second already is.

To state what should be obvious, spanking does not typically cause more irrevocable harm to children than spitting up their families by hauling their parents off to the slammer. One shudders to imagine how such a ban would be enforced.

This is hardly the first time a California legislator has threatened to take the state where no government belongs.

Who can forget last year's AB 2360, informally known as the "Tom Cruise Law," which would have prohibited the sale of diagnostic ultrasound equipment to anyone but licensed health-care providers.

The American Academy of Pediatrics — which estimates that 90 percent of American parents have spanked their children at some time — also maintains that the practice does more harm than good.

It may chasten them momentarily, but the lesson doesn't stick. And repeated spanking can lead to aggressive, anti-social behavior.

These are discoveries that society is making all by itself, without being threatened with jail time.

At a critical hearing on Tuesday, senators happily blew a chance to grill Lt. Gen. David Petraeus. W's choice to try to rescue Iraq, on whether those 21,500 additional troops will be cavalry to the rescue or lambs to the slaughter.

Why dwell on the most consequential elements of U.S. strategy when they can linger over something even more repulsive: its own political reputations?

Hillary Clinton, who dogged a recent important Iraq hearing by flying to Iraq, did not have any questions at all for the general. She simply

lectured him crisply on her belated discovery that the administration has a "dead-end" and "blank check" policy, as she tried to seem like the kind of gal who could command the most powerful military on earth. This is odd from someone who is running informercials on her Web site promising "a conversation."

In their questioning, Sen. Joe Lieberman and McCain seemed most interested in enlisting the general's prestige for their own campaign to discredit colleagues in both parties who are fired of passively watching W's disaster unfold. If the Senate sends the additional troops but conveys the belief they cannot succeed, McCain asked, "what effect does that have on the morale of your troops?"

"It would not be a beneficial effect," the general replied. Lieberman also asked whether a Senate resolution expressing disapproval of the Surge would give the enemy in Iraq "encouragement" that the American people "were divided."

The general agreed: "That's correct, sir."

Much of the rest of the hearing was squandered in attempts by Democrats and Republicans who had criticized the war to get the general to back away from his opinion that the troops would be hurt and the enemy emboldened by any impediment that

the legislative branch might throw in W's way.

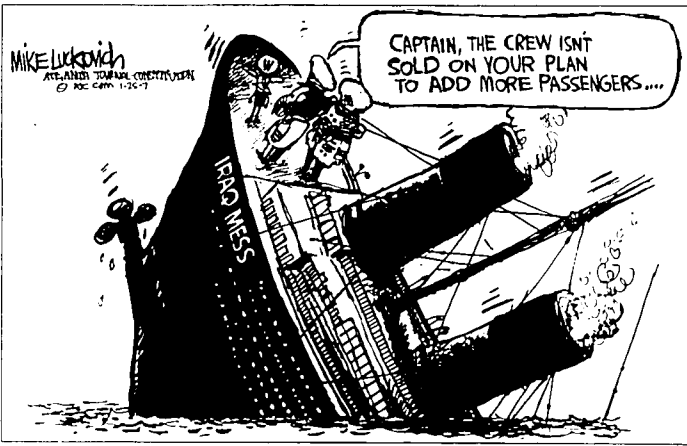
"Honorable people have different views, and they will voice their criticisms," chided John Warner, who presented a bipartisan resolution on Monday declaring that the Senate "disagrees with the 'plan' to augment our forces."

He told Petraeus that as President Nixon's secretary of the Navy, he had sat where the general was, justifying another impossible war. "I hope," he warned the witness, "that this colloquy has not entangled you into some responses that you might later regret."

The fact that Warner attacked The Surge in a formal way means that a substantial majority of the Senate are willing to stick their necks out. It's the beginning of a slow procession to limit spending on the war and rein in Bush. As one does in a job interview, the general tried to oblige everyone. After getting caught in a political mine field, he demurred that he had learned "that mine fields are best avoided and gone around rather than walked through."

Hillary Clinton takes a careful line on Iraq

When Lt. Gen. David Petraeus came before the Senate Armed Services Committee last week in open session, its members understandably had many questions for the new commander of American forces in Iraq.

They knew of his reputation as a battlefield leader, a traucer of Iraqi troops and the author of the Army manual on counterinsurgency warfare. They also recognized the difficulty and importance of his new assignment.

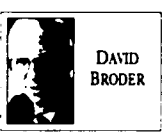
Many of the questions probed deeply into the rationale for the president's new strategy of injecting more U.S. troops into Baghdad neighborhoods wracked by killings by rival Sunnis and Shiite gangs. Others challenged the readiness of Iraqi forces and the Baghdad government to do their part in reducing sectarian violence.

A few of the questions were aimed at serving or off on tangents.

But virtually the entire membership of the committee was present and senator of both parties recognized the value of probing this experienced and candid witness.

With one exception, Sen. Hillary Rodham Clinton of New York used her time to make a speech about Iraq policy and did not ask a single question of the man who will be leading the military campaign.

Her speech employed some of the themes from her news

resource necessary to protect these young men and women' going into battle.

"I'll do that, senator," Petraeus said, and after that four-word response, Clinton was finished. She had no questions to ask.

Judging by all the polls, Clinton is the leading candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination. Sen. John McCain of Arizona, a leading candidate for the Republican nomination, is also a member of the Armed Services Committee.

McCain asked Petraeus 14 questions, ranging from the political situation in Iraq to the morale of the troops to the time line for the planned "surge." He ran out of time before he ran out of questions — quite a contrast to Clinton.

Clinton asked the senator to think it was important to rebut the comments from several other committee members suggesting that congressional resolutions opposing the president's policy would "undermine the troops." So she used her time for that purpose. But I can think of three other possible explanations for her remarkable reluctance to probe the general's thinking.

First, she has been treading a careful line from her early support of military action against Saddam Hussein to an increasing sharp criticism of the war and calls for troop reductions. Perhaps she feared that clashing with Petraeus would lead her into dangerous, uncharted waters. Caution is warranted.

able, but she is sometimes faulted for being too calculating.

Second, the hearing came only three days after she announced her presidential exploratory committee, and she may have decided it was a good opportunity to repeat her views on Iraq policy before TV cameras rather than share time with the general. That wouldn't say much about her priorities as she begins a second six-year term as senator, but New York voters last November presumably knew she might have lofty goals than just jangling her senate duties.

The third, less benign possibility is that Clinton is reverting to the mode of her ill-fated 1993-94 health-care initiative, when she gave members of Congress and other interested folks a long list of questions she thought she had all the answers — so please just do as I say. In that period, she and her deputy, Liz Magraw, two of the smartest policy wonks in captivity, were also surprisingly self-absorbed — and in some ways arrogant. And it cost them support, even among potential allies.

Last week, Clinton began her presidential campaign, as she did her first race for the Senate in New York by saying she wanted to do a lot of listening. She sure wasn't listening to Gen. Petraeus. She wasn't even asking.

Iraqis claims 250 dead in battle near Najaf

BAGHDAD — U.S.-backed Iraqi troops on Sunday attacked insurgents allegedly plotting to kill pilgrims at a major Shiite Muslim religious festival, and Iraqi officials estimated some 250 militants died in the daylong battle near Najaf. A U.S. helicopter crashed during the fight, killing two American soldiers. Mortar shells, meanwhile, hit the courtyard of a girls' school in a mostly Sunni Arab neighborhood of Baghdad, killing five pupils and wounding 20. U.N. officials deplored the attack, calling the apparent targeting of children "an unforgivable crime."

Two car bombs exploded within a half hour in the northern city of Kirkuk, killing 11 people and wounding 34, police Brig. Gen. Sarhad Qader said. Three ethnic groups — Arabs, Kurds and Turkmen — are in a bitter struggle for control of that oil-rich area.

In addition to confirming the two Americans killed in the helicopter crash near Najaf, the U.S. command announced three combat deaths from Sunday — one Marine in the Sunni insurgent stronghold of Anbar province and two Army soldiers in the Baghdad area.

Authorities said Iraqi soldiers supported by U.S. aircraft fought all day with a large group of insurgents in the Zaqra area, about 12 miles northeast of the Shiite holy city of Najaf.

Col. Al Nomas, spokesman for Iraqi security forces on Sunday, said more than 250 corpses had been found. Iraqi army Maj. Gen. Othman al-Ghanem also spoke of 250 dead but said an exact number would not be released until today. He said 10 gunmen had been captured, including one Sudanese.

WASHINGTON Pentagon trying to cut extensions for troops

In an action branded a backdoor draft by some critics, the military over the past several years has held tens of thousands of soldiers, sailors, airmen and Marines on the job and in war zones beyond their retirement dates or enlistment length.

It is a widely disliked practice that the Pentagon, under new Defense Secretary Robert Gates, is trying to figure out how to cut back on.

Gates has ordered that the practice — known as "stop loss" — must "be minimized." At the same time, he is looking for ways to decrease the hardship for troops and their families, recruit more people for a larger military and reassess how the active duty and reserves are used.

"It's long overdue," said Jules Lobel, vice president of the Center for Constitutional Rights and lawyer for some in the military who have challenged the policy in court.

"It has created terrible problems of morale," Lobel said last week. "It has in some cases

made soldiers feel that they were duped or deceived in how they were recruited." Gates has asked the chief of each service branch for a plan by the end of February on how they would rely less on stop loss.

New report warns global warming could be worse than previously expected

WASHINGTON — Later this week in Paris, climate scientists will issue a dire forecast for the planet that warns of slowly rising sea levels and higher temperatures.

But that may be the sugarcoated version. Early and changeable drafts of their upcoming authoritative report on climate change foresee smaller sea level rises than were projected in 2001 in the last report. Many top U.S.

scientists reject these rosier numbers. Those calculations don't include the recent, and dramatic, melt-off of big ice sheets in two crucial locations: They "don't take into account the gorillas — Greenland and Antarctica," said Ohio State University earth sciences' professor Lonnie Thompson, a polar ice specialist. "I think there are unpleasant surprises as we move into the 21st century."

Michael MacCracken, who until 2001 coordinated the official U.S. government reviews of the international climate report on global warming, has fired off a letter of protest over the omission.

The melting ice sheets in Greenland and Antarctica are a

fairly recent development that has taken scientists by surprise. They don't know how to predict its effects in their computer models, but many fear it will mean the world's coastlines are swamped much earlier than most predict.

Others believe the ice melt is temporary and won't play such a dramatic role. That debate may be the central one as scientists and bureaucrats from around the world gather in Paris to finish the first of four major global warming reports by the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change. The panel was created by the United Nations in 1988.

After four days of secret word-by-word editing, the

final report will be issued Friday.

IOWA

Clinton wants all U.S. troops out of Iraq when Bush leaves office

DAVENPORT, Iowa — Hillary Rodham Clinton said Sunday that President Bush has made a mess of Iraq and it is his responsibility to "extricate" the United States from the situation before he leaves office.

It would be "the height of irresponsibility" to pass the war along to the next commander in chief, she said. "This was his decision to go to war with an ill-conceived plan and an incompetently executed strategy," the Democratic senator from New York said in her initial presidential campaign swing through Iowa.

"We expect him to extricate

our country from this before he leaves office" in January 2009, the former first lady said. The White House condemned Clinton's comments as a partisan attack that undermines U.S. soldiers.

About 130,000 American troops are in Iraq and Bush has announced he was sending 21,500 more as part of his new war strategy.

Clinton held a town hall-style forum attended by about 300 activists, giving a brief speech before taking questions for nearly an hour. Pressed to defend her vote to authorize force in Iraq before the U.S.-led invasion in March 2003, Clinton responded by stepping up her criticisms of Bush.

### Luna: I'll lead education board decisions

LEWISTON — Superintendent of Public Schools Tom Luna said the conflicts that occurred between his office — before he took the post — and the Idaho State Board of Education are over.

"I plan on leading the efforts of the board when it comes to K-12 education," Luna told "The Lewiston Tribune." "I will be going to the board and leading them and I am convinced I will have their full support."

He also said that this spring, after the legislative session ends, he plans to travel the state to meet with teachers, parents and students.

"I did it during the campaign and I plan to do it again," he said. "It is kind of difficult when the Legislature is in town."

Luna's predecessor, Marilyn Howard, was the lone state-wide elected Democrat while she served as public schools superintendent. She clashed with the state board over budget issues and the authority of her department.

Luna, a Republican, has proposed a budget increase of 7 percent to \$1.38 billion, surprising some. When he ran for the post four years ago — a loss to Howard — he said the state was spending too much money on public education.

"In the past other people have tried to define me," he said. "Any dollar we are spending inefficiently is a dollar we aren't spending in the classroom. We are going to run the department lean."

One possible plan that Luna said could be used to help bring teachers to rural areas would be to offer them tuition assistance or loan forgiveness, with the requirement that they teach in a rural setting.

"Offer them tuition assistance if they will come to our

rural areas and teach higher-level math," he said.

Luna said he didn't know which school districts should receive money first to deal with outdated facilities. And where that money would come from is unclear.

"Every child, regardless of where they live in Idaho, needs to be going to a school that is safe," he said, adding that his own children went to a school in Nampa that was condemned by the fire department.

### N. Idaho lawmakers say additional property tax relief is unlikely

COEUR D'ALENE — Additional legislation to reduce property taxes in Idaho is unlikely this year, two northern Idaho state lawmakers said, because budget requests have already eaten up most of the state's projected \$200 million surplus.

Sen. Jim Hammond, R-Post Falls, and Rep. Frank Henderson, R-Post Falls, said that possible plans, such as freezing valuations for people who have had homeowners' exemptions for 20 or more years, probably won't happen.

Hammond said the budget proposed by Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter is "fairly austere," but that there still wasn't much left over.

"When you start plugging things in, (the surplus is) only \$12 million," Hammond told the Coeur d'Alene Press.

Henderson said he was disappointed that Rep. Dennis Lake, R-Blackfoot, the new Revenue and Taxation Committee chairman, had decided not to hear any new property tax bills.

"This year he has closed his mind," Henderson said.

In a special session in August, Idaho lawmakers cut \$260 million from property taxes and raised the sales tax to 6 percent from 5 percent.

However, some lawmakers are concerned about taxing groceries. To deal with that, the budget surplus would be reduced about \$60 million by a proposal to expand the grocery credit — a way for people to recoup taxes paid on groceries.

"We're optimistic this will go," Henderson said.

Just six states now levy a full sales tax on groceries. Twenty-nine states and the District of Columbia have eliminated sales tax on most food items, according to the Washington, D.C.-based Center on Budget and Policy Priorities.

### New state park could still be built despite not getting funds from Otter

BLACKFOOT — Lawmakers in eastern Idaho said that a new state park could still be built along the Snake River even though Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter didn't put any money in his proposed budget to make it happen.

"It wasn't in the governor's budget, but that doesn't mean it's dead in the water," said Sen. Steve Barr, R-Blackfoot, who serves on the Joint Finance and Appropriations Committee.

The Idaho Park and Recreation Board in October chose a cottonwood-studded wetland on the Snake River between Firth and Blackfoot as the site for a proposed new state park, a 4.5-mile stretch of

wetland along the Snake River known as Rising River.

The proposed new park is part of former Gov. Dirk Kempthorne's "Experience Idaho" parks initiative. The 2006 Legislature allocated \$1 million to begin work on locating and designing a new state park within 60 miles of Idaho Falls.

### N. Idaho man accused of killing child charged with first-degree murder

LEWISTON — A northern Idaho man is accused of killing a 23-month-old child last year and has been charged with first-degree murder.

Stacey (Stace) Lewis Grove, 28, escorted by his attorney, turned himself in last week at the Lewiston Police Department. He was being held in the Nez Perce County Jail.

Kyler Martin died July 10 at a Spokane, Wash., hospital, and the death was later ruled a homicide due to blunt-force trauma.

Lewiston Police Capt. Allan Sharp said that Grove used to be the boyfriend of Lisa M. Nash, Stacey's mother.

Dan Spickler, Nez Perce County prosecutor, said the murder charge followed a grand jury proceeding last week.

"The grand jury found that Stacey Grove committed murder in the first degree via or during the commission of aggravated battery on a person

under the age of 12," Spickler said.

### CALIFORNIA Mountain lion victim heads to San Francisco for more surgery

SAN FRANCISCO — A Northern California hiker attacked by a mountain lion last week was heading Sunday to a hospital in San Francisco, where he will likely undergo more surgery.

A spokesman for Mad River Community Hospital in Arcata said doctors wanted to airlift Jim Hamm to a major research hospital in San Francisco early Sunday, after doctors performed emergency surgery on his scalp and downgraded his condition from fair to serious.

But dense fog along the Northern California coast prevented the medical plane's liftoff all morning. When the fog broke around 3:30 p.m. Sunday, ambulance drivers rushed Hamm to an airport in Arcata, and he is expected to

arrive in San Francisco by 5 p.m., said Mad River Community Hospital spokesman Tom Ayotte.

Ayotte emphasized that moving Hamm to a hospital with more doctors and sophisticated equipment was a "proactive, highly precautionary" measure.

The 70-year-old Fortuna man first underwent surgery Wednesday after a female mountain lion ambushed him at Prairie Creek Redwoods State Park. He and his wife, Nell, were hiking in the park when the lion pounced on him, scalped him, mauled his face, ripped off part of his lips and inflicted other puncture wounds and scratches.

Ayotte said Hamm's relatives asked him not to publicly divulge the name of the hospital where Hamm will be staying in San Francisco. But almost all medical transfers from Arcata go to either University of California San Francisco Medical Center or California Pacific Medical Center.

## Federer holds back nothing but tears

MELBOURNE, Australia — Roger Federer held back the tears this time. He didn't hold back much else at the Australian Open.

Federer underlined his 10th Grand Slam singles title by winning 21 straight sets, saving a set point in Sunday's final before finishing off Fernando Gonzalez 7-6 (2), 6-4, 6-4.

The last man to go through a major without dropping a set was Bjorn Borg at the 1980 French Open. The only other man to win the Australian Open without dropping a set was Ken Rosewall in 1971, although he had to play only five matches.

"Equaling records, doing something that hasn't been done for a long time, it's really nice, no doubt," Federer said. "All I care about in the end is to hopefully hold that trophy. Of course, now that it's over, it's great to think, 'Wow, you know, not having dropped a set.'"

It's quite amazing," Rosewall was in the crowd Sunday night, and Federer gave him a nod in a composed victory speech. It was the mere presence of another Australian great, Rod Laver, that reduced Federer to tears the previous year at the trophy presentation.

"I can't force them out every year!" Federer said of his sobbing celebration in 2006, when he accepted the trophy from Laver. "I had a wonderful tournament. A great end. Just because there were no tears doesn't mean it doesn't mean anything to me."

Laver, the last man to win the Grand Slam — all four majors in one season — made the trip from California to see Federer dismantle Andy Roddick 6-4, 6-0, 6-2 in the semifinals.

He met with Federer in the locker room after the semifinal and said he had little doubt the 25-year-old Swiss star could beat Pete Sampras' record 14 Grand Slam singles titles, and just about every other tennis record as well.

"The best way to beat him would be to hit him over the head with a racket," Laver joked in a newspaper column.

Federer improved his streak to a career-best 36 wins, became the first man in the Open era to twice win three straight majors and has collected six of the last seven Grand Slam titles.

He tied Jack Crawford's 73-year-old record by reaching his seventh consecutive final in majors.

"If somebody would have told me I'd win 10 Grand Slams from mid '03 till today, I never would have thought there was any chance," he said. Even before the tournament he had enough points to ensure he will break Jimmy Connors' record of 160 consecutive weeks atop the men's rankings by the end of next month.

Although he knows he's only one-quarter of the way there in 2007, a season Grand Slam is his objective. He was two sets from that last year, when he

## Barbaro has a setback

NEW YORK — These have been bad days for Barbaro.

The Kentucky Derby winner suffered another significant setback over the weekend, and his fight for survival may have reached a critical point.

After Barbaro developed a deep abscess in his right hind foot, surgery was performed Saturday to insert two steel pins in a bone, one that was shattered but now healthy, to eliminate all weight bearing on the ailing foot.

The procedure is a risky one, because it transfers more weight to the leg.

If the bone were to break again, chief surgeon Dr. Dean Richardson said: "I think we'll quit."

"When things start to go bad, it's like a house of cards," he said Sunday in a telephone interview with The Associated Press. "If one thing fails, that puts more stress on another part. And if that fails, then you're stuck with managing two problems. That's why these are difficult cases."

The right rear leg was on the mend until recently. It's the one Barbaro shattered at the start of the Preakness Stakes eight months ago, and the three broken bones had completely healed.

Now this. The surgery, in which a cast was removed and replaced by an external brace known as a skeletal fixation device, addresses one problem but could create others.

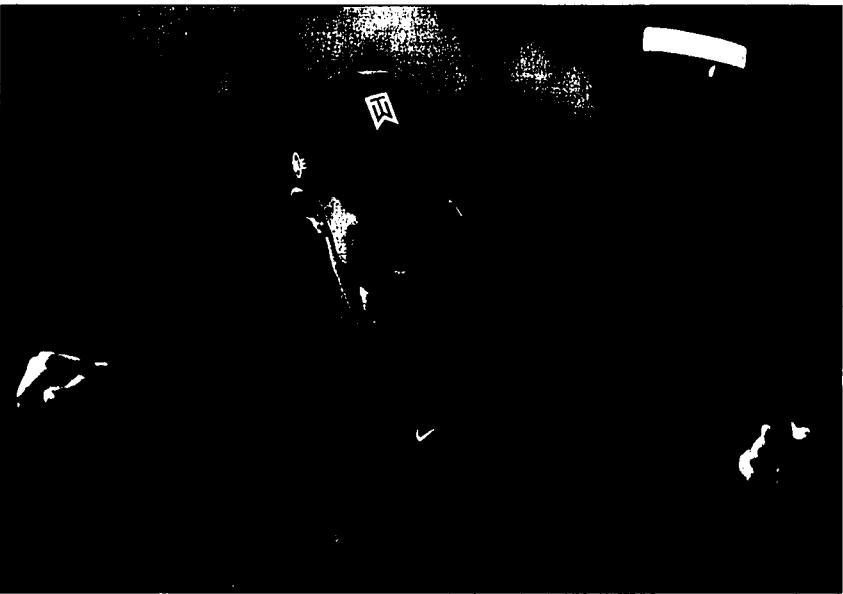
Barbaro likely will have to bear more weight on his front leg because of the ailing back leg, making him more susceptible to laminitis, a painful and often fatal disease caused by uneven weight distribution. Laminitis already struck Barbaro's left rear foot in July, and 80 percent of the hoof was removed.

"It's something that we are watching closely, and that could also be a thing that could lead to us quitting," Richardson said.

The colt was doing well Sunday, according to Richardson, and "we will continue to treat Barbaro aggressively as long as he remains bright, alert and eating," he said in an update sent out by the University of Pennsylvania's New Bolton Center in Kennett Square, Pa.

Based on Richardson's advice, owners Roy and Gretchen Jackson have been making the decisions concerning Barbaro. Their major concern from the start has been to keep Barbaro comfortable.

"No one is interested in putting the horse through any type of misery," Richardson said. "We're going to treat him the best way we can as long as he stays comfortable. And we're going to stick with that no matter if his chances are 1 percent or 90 percent."

## Seven straight for Woods

SAN DIEGO — Tiger Woods returned his improbable pursuit of Byron Nelson with a result that was all too predictable.

Woods caught up to the pack with an eagle, buried the hopes of his final challenger with a birdie and closed with a 6-under 66 on Sunday to win the Buick Invitational for his seventh consecutive PGA Tour victory, the second-longest streak in history.

Nelson set the record in 1945 with 11 in a row, a record long thought to be

out of reach.

The way Woods is playing — no worse than second in stroke play anywhere in the world since July — that might no longer be the case.

Woods won six in a row in 2000, a streak that Phil Mickelson stopped at Torrey Pines. But against a cast of challengers short on experience and victories, the world's No. 1 player met little resistance in winning the Buick Invitational for the third straight year.

Woods doesn't consider this a true winning streak because he lost once in Europe and twice in Asia since September. But it still counts in the

PGA Tour record books, and the only question is when it will resume.

Woods was headed for the Dubai Desert Classic on Sunday night, and he was not sure if he would play his next PGA Tour event at the Nissan Open on Feb. 15 in Los Angeles, where the Accenture Match Play Championship in Arizona a week later.

"To somehow sneak out with the win is a cool feeling," Woods said.

He got some help from Andrew Buckley and Jeff Quinney, both of whom had at least a share of the lead on the back nine until stumbling in a span of about 15 minutes on a cool,

breezy afternoon at Torrey Pines.

Charles Howell III provide the final challenge with three birdies in a four-hole stretch, but Woods answered with an approach to 2½ feet from the 17th hole for birdie that allowed him to play it safe on the par-5 closing hole.

Woods finished at 15-under 273 for his 55th career victory, the fifth time he has started a new season with a trophy.

Howell had a 50-foot eagle putt on the 18th that could have forced a play-

## Montoya leads Ganassi team to Daytona endurance victory

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. — Signing Juan Pablo Montoya is already paying dividends for Chip Ganassi, and the start of the NASCAR season is still three weeks off.

Montoya, co-driving a Lexus Riley Daytona Prototype with veteran road racer Scott Pruett and Mexican phenom Salvador Duran, is in elite company. He and racing great Mario Andretti are the only drivers to have won the Indianapolis 500, an American open-wheel championship, a Formula One race and, the Colombian's latest conquest, a sports car endurance race at Daytona International Speedway.

What's next?

"I'm back here for the Daytona 500 in a couple of weeks," said Montoya, set to begin his first full season in NASCAR's Nextel Cup series. "Hopefully, we can do something about that one, too."

Andretti won that NASCAR race in 1967. Ganassi was asked if the win in the Rolex 24 bodes well for Montoya's move back to the U.S. after several successful but unfulfilling years in F1. "It's a good start. I'll tell you that," said Ganassi, for whom Montoya won the CART title in 1999 and Indy in 2000.

Montoya gave his team the lead Sunday morning and Pruett kept it to the finish. This is the second straight year that Ganassi's team has

won the grueling 24-hour event. Former IRL champions Dan Wheldon and Scott Dixon combined with NASCAR driver Casey Mears to win the 2006 race.

"This was just a total team win," said Ganassi, the first team owner to win this race back-to-back since Al Holbert in 1986 and 1987. "Al was somebody I wanted to be like when I was growing up and I'm going to think about this for a long time."

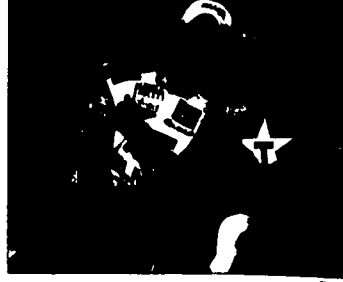
The winning car covered 668 laps and 2,378 miles. The race was slowed by 13 full-course caution flags and a 78-minute red flag stoppage at the halfway point after a GT class car knocked down 80 feet of guardrail.

Two cars finished on the

lead lap. With only three hours to go, three cars were nose to tail for the lead, separated by less than 6 seconds, with Montoya third and battling Scotland's Ryan Dalziel and Italy's Max Angelelli.

"It's amazing," Montoya said in the tumultuous Victory Circle. "It's incredible after 20 hours there are three cars on the same lap. It was like qualifying every lap. Very exciting."

Dalziel, a rookie in the Champ Car World Series this season, held off the two veterans until he pitted during the 24th hour. That gave the lead to Angelelli, but the former Daytona winner was quickly passed by Montoya and the eventual winners tied the rest of the way.

# Suns burn Cavs for 17th straight

CLEVELAND — Steve Nash scored 23 points and kept Phoenix's high-energy offense purring with 15 assists as the Suns extended their winning streak to 17 games — the NBA's longest in seven years — by beating the Cleveland Cavaliers 115-100 on Sunday.

Shawn Marion added 23 points, Amare Stoudemire 22 and Leandro Barbosa had 19 for the Suns, who improved to 3-4 since opening their season 1-5. Phoenix, which had a 15-game win streak earlier this season, also matched a franchise record with their ninth straight road win and are 20-1 vs. Eastern Conference teams.

Lefron James scored 20 points to lead the Cavaliers, who were within four points going into the fourth. However, they couldn't match the Suns' blazepace-and-down pace and managed just 13 points in the final 12 minutes.

The Suns' winning streak is the league's longest since Kobe Bryant, Shaquille O'Neal and the Los Angeles Lakers reeled off 19 in a row during the 1999-2000 season.

## Spurs 96, Lakers 94, OT

LOS ANGELES — Michael Finley's 3-pointer with 1.3 seconds left in overtime gave cold-shooting San Antonio an improbable victory over Los Angeles.

Finley took a pass from Tim Duncan well behind the arc and hit nothing but net on his long jumper over Lamar Odom, helping the Spurs avoid their first regular-season sweep at hands of the Lakers in nine years.

Tim Duncan made his 3-pointer as time expired didn't come close. Kobe Bryant, who had 31 points, six rebounds and seven assists, was unable to get open, leaving it up to Radmanovic to try the final shot.

The Spurs won despite shooting a season-low 43.7 percent (12-28) but they were 5-of-8 in overtime, when Tony Parker scored seven of his 19 points. Duncan led San Antonio with 21 points, 14 rebounds and a season-high nine assists, while Manu Ginobili had 21 points and seven rebounds.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. — Playing on the road against the defending national champions before an energized sellout crowd, No. 2 North Carolina didn't flinch.

Ivory Latta scored a season-high 32 points, and the unbeaten Tar Heels exacted a measure of revenge against No. 3 Maryland with an 84-71 victory Sunday night.

The crowd of 17,950 was the largest to watch a women's basketball game in Atlantic Coast Conference history, surpassing the 17,243 that viewed the Terrapins' loss to Duke in February 2005. Maryland has hosted the top five crowds in ACC history.

On this night, however, the Terp (21-2, 5-2) waited too long to match the intensity of their enthusiastic fans. Maryland led behind with five minutes elapsed and never caught up, crumbling under a series of turnovers and missed shots.

off, but he played it too high over the edge and wound up three putts for par to close with 73.

"I gave him a run," Howell said. "Anytime you try to win a tournament against that guy, it's tough. I played well down the stretch. He just never flinched."

The same couldn't be said for Buckle and Quinney, who each took double bogey along the back nine on the South Course to quickly take themselves out of contention. Brandt Sneedker, tied for the 54-hole lead with Buckle, closed with a 71 and finished third.

Woods' streak resumed after a nearly four-month break from the PGA Tour, when he won the eighth shot in the American Express Championship outside London on Oct. 1. He skipped the season-ending Tour Championship and the season-opening Mercedes-Benz Championship, and learned that his wife was pregnant for

the first time.

One thing that hasn't changed is his golf.

The PGA Tour winning streak dates to his victory in the British Open last July, and Woods is now 124-under par during that stretch.

This win looked like so many others, especially at Torrey Pines. Part of it was due to him, most of it due to the guys falling apart down the stretch.

Buckle held it together for the longest time.

Woods erased a two-shot deficit in four holes, but the 24-year-old Australian bounced back with an approach into 6 feet for birdie on No. 5, and nearly reaching the par-5 sixth green from the right rough to set up a simple up-and-down birdie and a one-lead. And even after a roar that resonated across the course, Buckle didn't blink.

Woods hammered a 3-wood from the ninth fairway to 25 feet and holed the putt for eagle and a share of the lead. Buckle was walking up the ninth fairway to his tee shot,

calmly taking a drag from a cigarette. He looked up when he heard the cheer, flicked the cigarette to the ground and compelled it out, then birdied the next two holes.

He still had a two-shot lead over Woods and Quinney when he reached the 12th tee, but his tee shot caught a corner of grass on the edge of a fairway bunker, and that's when everything collapsed.

Buckle's feet slipped in the sand as he struck the ball, which sailed well to the right and left him little green between a bunker and the flag.

Attempting a flop shot to get himself a short putt, it came out too strong and tumbled over the green on the other side. He pitched to 4 feet and missed the putt, taking double bogey.

Woods took the lead for the first time with a 65-foot eagle putt that curled around the back of the cup and came an inch within falling, while Buckle against chipped around the rough and had to save par. Two holes later,

Buckle was up to his ankles in ke plant and his chances were sliding over the cliffs lining the Pacific.

Quinney also disappeared, trying to play a perfect bunker shot that came up short and led to double bogey on the 14th.

As quickly as those two contenders vanished, Howell emerged.

He made the only birdie of the final round on the 477-yard 12th hole, followed that with a two-putt birdie on the 13th, then nearly holed out an 8-iron on the 15th, the ball grazing the edge of the cup that pulled him to within one shot of the lead. He had the momentum. He was due to have something good come his way.

But he was playing with a guy for whom little goes wrong.

Woods, who saved par from the bunker on the 14th and 15th hole, hit his approach from 143 yards into 30 inches on the 17th hole, effectively ending the tournament.

That was his only defeat in the last seven majors. Nadal was 26-0 on clay last year and is a record 62-match streak on the surface.

"French Open is obviously the next big one for me," Federer said. "I've made one step further every year. Now, when from tennis I finish. Got closer to Rafa, as well."

That and three other losses to Nadal were his only downers of his 2006 season — he was 91-1 against every one else and picked up 12 titles.

But he's going to be a very interesting French Open for me — hopefully win a 'dream' come true. That's the only way I can make this season a better one than last year.

Otherwise it won't be possible.

Federer says Gonzalez coming. The Chilean beat former No. 1 Lleyton Hewitt and Masters Cup finalist James Blake before pounding Nadal in straight in the quarterfinals.

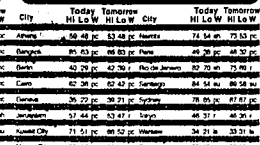

**Steps to Take When a Loved One Dies**

- After a loved one dies, you'll have to cope with grief. And yet, if you have even partial responsibility for settling an estate, you have no choice but to focus on some financial matters. By handling these issues as efficiently as possible, you can help ease some of the strain that everyone in your family is feeling.
- Ideally, of course, you should learn as much as you can about your loved one's financial affairs while he or she is still alive. This may not be a comfortable conversation to have, but it's necessary. If you have a good relationship, you should be able to ask sensitive questions, such as: Do you have a will? What about a living trust? Do you have a safe deposit box? What are the names of your broker and bank? The more you know about your loved one's situation, the better off you will be when it's time to deal with the estate.
- When that day arrives, what steps should you take? Here are a few to keep in mind:
- **Find the will.** Obviously, it's a lot easier to locate a will if you learned its location while your loved one was still alive. When you do find the will, you may want to contact an attorney who is experienced in settling estates. Even a well-drafted will might offer options that an attorney can help you understand. Although you might want to work with the attorney who drafted the will, you are certainly not required to do so. If you do not have an attorney, ask friends or your financial professional for a referral. If you are the executor, you'll have to start the process of carrying out the will's instructions. If you aren't the executor, contact the person who has been named to this position.
  - **Inquire about probate.** Contact your attorney or the state's probate court clerk to determine if probate is necessary. If it is, the executor or executrix should initiate proceedings right away, because probate can be time-consuming.
  - **List assets.** Try to find the paperwork for the decedent's financial assets: bank accounts, securities, real estate, insurance policies, retirement plans, etc. Take special note of who is the beneficiary of these assets; the naming of a beneficiary can even supersede instructions on a will.
  - **Notify relevant agencies.** Notify creditors, banks, the Social Security Administration and other entities about the death of your loved one.
  - **File life insurance claims.** An insurer doesn't automatically pay benefits upon the death of the insured. Contact the decedent's insurance company and file any required insurance claims.
  - **Open a checking account for the estate.** It may seem like a strange job to do, but if you are the personal representative or executor, you might want to open a checking account in the estate's name. Use this account to pay any bills or deposit funds received while the estate is being settled.
  - **File tax forms.** You may have to file state and federal estate and income tax returns. Your attorney and tax advisor can help you in this matter.

Settling the estate of a loved one will never be a happy task. But if done right, it can show respect for the memory of the deceased — and that's a worthy goal for which to strive.

ANSWER: Although a diamond lead could easily be right, my instincts urge to lead a spade. Declarer is quite likely to have a singleton. 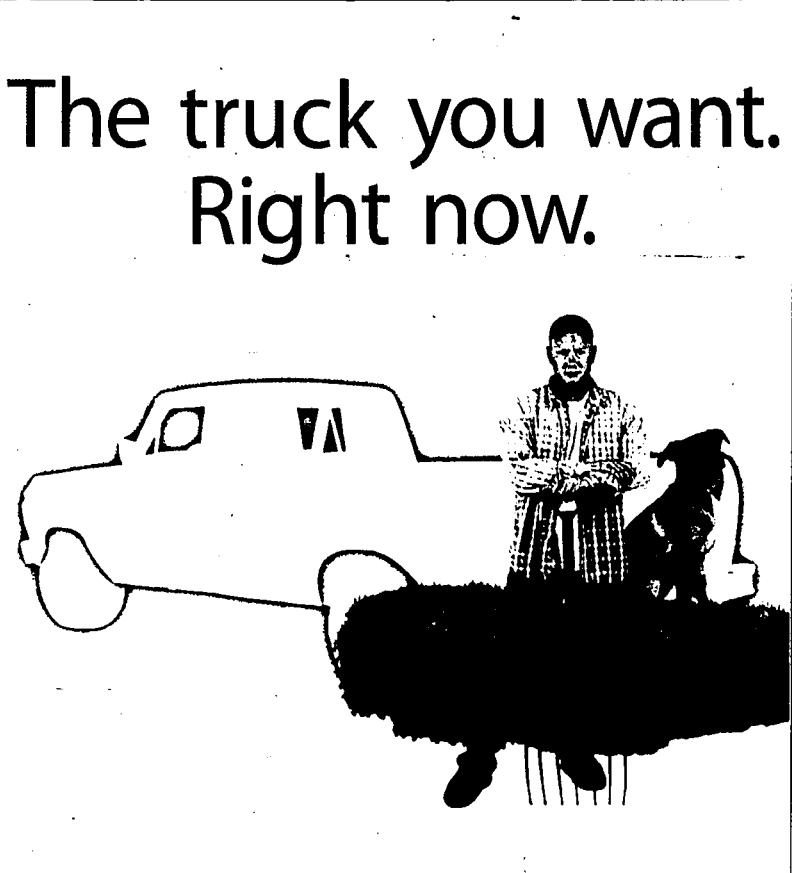

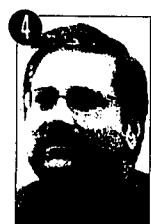

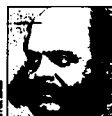

# Baldus beard project

## News editor samples facial hairstyles

TWIN FALLS — It was a 1989 episode of the television sitcom "Cheers" that got Chris Baldus interested in beards.

"I was in college, and in one episode the guys had a beard-growing contest," he said. "So my friends and I did too."

His own result, Baldus recalls, was long but spectacular — but a lifelong habit was born. Now the news editor of the *Times-News*, he has mostly worn a beard ever since. "I come by it honestly," he said. "My uncle and my father-in-law both have beards."

Baldus, who's 37, has been tinkering with his beard for years, by turns shaving it off and watching it grow back in various shapes and lengths. But he wondered what some styling might do. So we asked stylist Shanan Wall to work her magic.

"I've seen a lot of beards," said Wall, who works at Studio One Hair in Twin Falls. "Some guys still want to have them trimmed. If they grow a beard for hunting season, for example, they like to have it trimmed up."

Baldus showed up at Studio One Hair on a recent afternoon with a full beard, which he'd been working on for a month. Wall expertly shaped it, then pared it down by turns to a Fu Manchu, a goatee, a pencil mustache — and eventually to just a bit of stubble.

"I trim the beard according to the shape of the face," explained Wall, who's been styling hair for 29 years.

Using a variety of electric clippers, she steadily whittled away at the whiskers on the side of Baldus' face and on his chin. The results impressed him.

"I liked the pencil mustache and

the Fu Manchu," he said. "Actually, I may stick with that one."

"But when guys ask me to trim their nose hair, I pretend that I didn't hear them."

## 'The Raven' was first published on this date

This day in history: Quoth the raven, "Nevermore!" On Jan. 29, 1845, the New York Evening Mirror published a creepy new poem called "The Raven." Written by the young writer named Edgar Allan Poe, they paid him \$10.

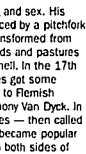

Original: Goatees almost certainly originated with drawings of Satan because the devil's image is based on Pan, the ancient Greek half-man, half-goat deity. When early Christians began abolishing pagan religions and their gods, they needed someone to play the heavy. They chose Pan, a lover of music, dancing and sex. His figure was replaced by a pithefork and he was transformed from the god of woods and pastures to the ruler of hell. In the 17th century, goatees got some respect thanks to Flemish painter Sir Anthony Van Dyck. In America, goatees — then called "imperials" — became popular with officers on both sides of the Civil War. The look remained in vogue after the war, thanks in part to Buffalo Bill Cody, who toured the country with his Wild West Show. Goates became a favorite of impoverished French intellectuals — the bohemians — in the second half of the 19th century. The Beat Generation in the U.S. adopted the style in the 1950s. From 1959 to 1963, the television show "The Many Loves of Dobie Gillis" brought a goateed man by the name of Maynard G. Krebs into millions of American living rooms. Bob Denver played the role of Maynard, a likable beatnik who dressed like a bum and listened to jazz. By 1969 the goatee cropped up regularly on the popular cartoon "Scooby Doo." Shaggy, the beatnik among the teenage sleuths, sported a long, thin goatee. (Source: Cincinnati Inquirer) Made it look good: Maynard G. Krebs.

Original: This beard with long sideburns that comes forward and ends under the chin resembles a chinstrap — hence the name. Its origins are murky, but probably early 19th century Europe. Made it look good: Brigham Young. Made it look bad: Abraham Lincoln. In a typical weaver: Guys who can't stand milk mustaches. Quote: "As to the whiskers, having never worn any, do you not think people would call it a piece of silly affectation if I were to begin it now?" — Abraham Lincoln in a letter to 11-year-old Grace Bedell, who suggested he grow a beard (1860). He did grow one, of course.

Study suggests aspirin may keep adult-onset asthma away

Taking aspirin may decrease the likelihood of developing adult-onset asthma, suggests a new study published in the American Journal of Respiratory and Critical Care Medicine.

Those taking low-dose aspirin (85 milligrams every second day) had a 22 percent lower risk of an asthma that poses than those who took placebo. More than 20 million people in the United States have asthma, nearly half of

whom children. Adult-onset asthma occurs more often in women than in men.

No reason for a prescription — The findings were based on a randomized, double-blind, placebo-controlled trial involving more than 22,000 healthy male physicians. Over nearly five years, asthma was diagnosed in 113 men in the aspirin group, compared with 143 in the placebo group. The findings appear consistent with those from an earlier study showing that women who frequently took aspirin had lower rates of new asthma

diagnoses than those who didn't use aspirin at all. Taking aspirin also has been shown to lower the risk of heart attack and stroke in men, in women, it's less clear-cut whether the benefits outweigh the risks.

The findings "may give an insight into potential reasons for why people get late-onset asthma" — perhaps because of inflammation processes that may be affected by taking aspirin, said John Kurth, one of the study's co-authors and an assistant professor of medicine at Brigham and Women's Hospital in Boston. But "our

study cannot be taken as evidence that physicians should recommend aspirin for patients who face a risk of asthma.... More studies are needed."

Nothing's simple — The study did not investigate aspirin's effect on adults who already had asthma; in fact, for a small proportion of asymptomatic aspirin is known to worsen asthma symptoms. Other "patients with asthma improve when challenged with aspirin and other non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs," the study reports.

A DIGNIFIED PASSING

QUESTION: Told she has less than six months to live, my grandmother is scheduled to undergo a number of difficult operations and treatments. She wonders whether this is the best road to take. Any ideas?

Most importantly, your grandmother should know that in her usual-life circumstances, she is in the possession of the top. She should take seriously the counsel of her physician and her family, but should know that ultimately the vital decision on which path to follow is to take is with her.

Medical providers are exploring their communications with patients and discussing a wider array of choices in getting informed consent from patients. However, there is still, all too frequently, the circumstance where the patients with chronic conditions, terminal illness, and diminished capacity are unable to assert their right to care and responsibility in making end-of-life choices.

Palliative care is a relatively new approach to medical care for persons in end-of-life circumstances. It approaches dying persons with the goal of decreasing pain and distress and increasing quality of life.

With the concurrence of medical professionals, palliative care offers the dying person an alternative to being procedured to death as a person of opportunity to focus on the meaning of life in the face of death, the opportunity to take the most of one's life and the opportunity to complete relationships in need of attention.
