

But the new rules, approved in November, had one change that hit Kent Scarle as he worked toward doubling the state of his beath—the had spent three years on his expansion, which he completed stat summer, and four years getting

last summer, and four years getting water rights straightened out.

When he received a recent audit from

the county compliance officer asking how many cows he had on the farm, Searle went to County Administrator Kerry McMurray.

"He suggested we look it up in the

The suggested we look it up in the ordinance and at that time, I learned we should have sought a permit before we began our expansion years ago. Searle said. I felt kind of silly because I had actually testified at the CAFO ordinance said. I felt kind of silly because I had actually testified at the CAFO ordinance bearings in favor of the change from five to two animal units ... but I had just figured. that our being grandfathered allowed us to do the expansion we had asked for in the first place.

Source said if he had completed the dudit and gone into the county office before the zorting ordinance changed in November, there would have been no issue.

When he realized he needed to get a permit for his expansion, even though it was completed, he made the effort to do

Williams was fired as a secretary to Coca-Cola's global brand director at the company's Atlanta headquarters after the allegations came to light.

The government said Williams stole confidential documents and samples of products that hadn't been launched from The Cocal Co. and gave them to Brablim Dimson and Edmund Duhaney as part of a conspinery to sell the items to Purchase, N.Y.-based PepsiCo Inc. for at least \$1.5 million. The conspinery warned Atlanta-based Coca-Cola that it had received a letter in May 2006 offering Coca-Cola trade secrets to the "highest blidder."

The FBI stunched an undercover investigation and identified the letter writer as Dimson.
Dimson and Duhaney have pleaded guilty and are awaling sentencing. Duhaney testified during Williams' trial that Williams speatheaded the scheme. Dimson did not testify.

WASHINGTON — The U.S. WASHINGTON — The I.U.S. intelligence assessment on Indiadances around one of the most detacted questions facing the Bush administration: Has the bloodshed become a civil war? The government analysts who wrote the report that was released Friday try to stay out of politics. So they bowed a bit to

both sides.

On the one hand, they found, the term 'civil war' does not adequately capture the conjection for the conflict in Imagincluding Shla-on-Shla violence, attacks on coalition forces and criminally motivated violence.

On the other hand, they said, the phrase accurately describes key elements: the hardening of groups' identities, 'a sea

change in the character of the violence and population displacements.

Their overall message was a lot clearer No matter the label, the situation in Iraq looks grim. The sobering assessment from the National Intelligence Council was seen by congressional Democratis—and some Republicans — as new evidence that President Bush's Jinq policy is falling.

"I do not see anything so far in the report that suggests the president's new plan is a win-ning strategy that protects America's national interest."



## For Episcopalians, a time of turmoil

Since the ordination of Gene Robinson — an opening ay man in a gar relationship — as the Episcopal bishop of New Hampshire in 2003, a number of dissenting bishops, nelses and congregations have moved to disassociate themselves from the Episcopal Church and place themselves under the jurisdiction of theologically conservative Anglican primates, such as the bishops of Rovanou, Southeast Asia, Nigeria, Kerna and Bolivia. Rovan Williams, the archibishop of Canterbury and the leader of the worldwide Anglican Communion, has not so far recognized threst realignments.

these realignments.

In addition to the gay issue, there is disagreement over the authority of scripture and historic church teachings in current Episcopal doctrine and practice, about the relationship betwee independent Anglican organizations and the Anglican Communion, and about the legal disposition of church proper-

On Dec. 12, a small group of Anglican exangetical leaders met with Williams and presented "A Covenant for the Church of England," a controversial document requesting alternate church structures for exanglical congregations now under the authority of theologically liberal bishops. The group claimed to represent a wide range of exanglical cand charsmatic Anglicans. Also in December, the Anglican Church of Tanzania issued a declaration breaking it ties with the Episcopal Church of the United States of America. South has just enough for a help-suit game-try at his second turn, and North, with a lot of black-suit honors, can drive to the spade game despite his dull pattern. Now let us look at how declarer should play after the top diamond lead if West continues the suit. Declarer has a reverse-dummy play to score 10 tricks: He ruffs the diamond and plays a club to

If so, West should play the 10, preventing declarer from finessing dummy's club nine to gain an extra entry.
