Rat poison found in recalled pet food

ALBANY, N.Y. — Rat poison was found in the pet food suspected of causing kidney failure that killed at least 16 cats and dogs, but scientists still don't know how it got there, state officials said Friday. The toxin was identified as aminopterin, which is used to kill rats in some state Agriculture commissioner Patrick Hooker said. WASHINGTON — The House voted Friday for the first time to clamp a cutoff deadline on the Iraq war, agreeing by a thin margin to pull combat troops out by next year and pushing the new Democratic-led Congress ever closer to a showdown with President Bush.





TWIN FALLS — An outdat-ed city transportation plan is about to become a lot more

about to become a lot more innovative. The Twin Falls City Council approved a comprehensive update to the Transportation Master Plan, which will change the way the city manages its streets and roads. The update will give city engineers the ability to calculate the impact of residential growth on city streets by computerizing the transportation management system. But city officials say the biggest benefit will be seen farther down the road. "State and federal (transportation) departments require an updated transportation plan to qualify for funding for road projects," said Jackie Fields, city engineer. "What this does is help us qualify for other transportation funds in the future."

She said the city's master clan is outdated and inade-

She said the city's master plan is outdated and inade-quate for managing trans-portation as Twin Fall's con-tinues to grow. She said the update will use software that will help city engineers estimate how development affects city streets and roads.

we comment affects city streets and roads.

"We have a noble goal of updating the plan every 10 years, but the plan we currently have is 15 years old, Fields said. "It was good for the size of the city at that time, but it doesn't work for the size of the city today."

The new system will help determine where transportation upgrades are needed to accommodate new subdivisions, commercial areas and existing roads with transportation comment.

existing roads with trans-portation concerns.

For example, city engineers will be able to calculate the best location of a traffic signal

best location of a traffic signal based on predicted growth.
The city approved a \$270,000 contract with Civil Science — a civil engineering group based in Salt Lake City — to update the master plan. Fields said that more than 90 percent of the cost will be paid for through federal aid.

Civil Science will spend the next eight months surveying all city streets, and building a computerized model.

Fields said the city plans to complete the update before Dec. 25

Besides assisting in planing and development, the new system also will informatly engineers about requested repairs, as well as the expiration of pavement and resurfacing.

Idaho lawmakers to resurrect open primary bill Monday

By John Miller Associated Press writer

BOISE — Lawmakers on Monday will consider a resurrected plan to restrict crossover voting in Idaho's partisan primary elections after efforts so far this year failed. It's due to be introduced in the state Senate. The bill wasn't public as of Friday, but lawmakers and others familiar with it said the new plan would prohibit registered Democratis, Republicans and Libertarians from crossing over and easting votes in each other's primaries for partisan offices. It would still allow independents to vote in any one party's primary. Since the early 1970s, Idaho's primaries for partisan to vote in whichever party's primary they choose. The new secretiny of Idaho's primaries comes after Republican Party members last lune voted at their state convention in favor of closing their primary elections. They were concerned Democratic voters were switching sides at the pollis members and Republican ballots to skew the results.

results.

In March, Attorney General Lawrence Wasden said Idaho's current open primary may be unconstitutional, because the U.S. Supreme Court has ruled political parties have a right to choose their own candidates.

choose their own candidates. The new proposal "is better than having the court do something you don't want to." House Majority Leader Mike Moyle, il-Star, told The Associated Press, following meetings among lawmakers, Gow, C.L. "Butch" Otter and state Republican Party Chairman Kirk Sullivan said he was satisfied the approach is consistent with his party's wishes to close Idaho's primary, while still allowing independent voters to participate.

— this, in a city with only about half its pre-storm population of around 450,000. Attendance at firearms classes and hours logged at shooting ranges also are up, according to the gun industry.

Gun dealers who saw sales shoot up during the chaotic few months after Katrina say that sales are still brisk, and that the customers are a cross-section of the population — doctors, lawyers, bankers, artists, laborers, stay-at-home moms.

Prosecutors say the Rileys intentionally tried to quiet their daughter with high doses of Clonidine. Relatives told police the Rileys called Clonidine the 'Happy medicine' and the 'sleep medicine'. Through their attorneys.

Some psychiatrists believe bipolar disorder, which was traditionally diagnosed in adolescence or early adulthood, has become a trendy diagnosis in young children.

A study of mentally ill children discharged from community hospitals, published in January in the Archives of General Psychiatry, found the proportion of children diagnosed with bipolar disorders Jumped from 2.9 percent in 1990 to 15.1 percent in 2000.

A report released by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention in 2002 estimated that about 7 percent of elementary school-age children— or approximately 1.6 million youngsters ages 6 to 11— have been diagnosed with ADHD.

"We don't have any trends that we'veldentified in the past year or two that would suggest there is any organized effort to attack factory farms or large-scale hog operations," said Jim Saunders, spokesman for the lowa Department of Public Safety. The reasons behind all these incidents could var." Since August, the Coalition to Support lowa's Farmers has identified at least seven significant acts of violence and threats aimed at farmers. The majority targated hog producers who have expanded their operations or pursued govern-

ers who have expanded their operations or pursued govern-ment permits to do so, but cat-tic producers have also been victims, sald Aaron Putze. executive director of the coali-tion, which helps farmers meet environmental regulations. There has always been farm vandalism on some levels. But we have certainly noticed an escalation in the more violent, threatening types of reports, Putze sald. "It could be that farmers are more comfortable

reporting incidents these days.

But the real question is what is the motivation behind this?"

Towa is the nation's leading og producer, and the indusreprepid growth in the past ecade has provoked a public acklash on several fronts.



Detractors complain that large-scale hog and cattle operations threaten the environment and public health, depress property values and economically squeeze smaller producers.

As a result, opposition to corporate and super-sized operations has branched out beyond the usual suspects — animal rights activists and urban environmentalists — agriculture academics and supporters said.

"People locally are promoting a lot of anger and mislinformation." said Mike Lawrinenko, a long farmer from La Porte City in central lowa. 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





At last, a church designed specifically for the deaf

BRENTWOOD, Tenn. — Brian Sims was sitting in traffic when a car with a booming stereo pulled up next to him. Feeling wibrations from the pulsating vehicle, the Baptist pastor who ministers to the deaf got an idea: creating a one-of-a-kind church exclusively for deaf peo-nie

ple.
Today, the Brentwood Baptist Deaf Church has more than 30 speakers' beneath the floor so congregants can feel the vibration of the music.

the vibration of the music.

Many churches provide sign language for deal and partially deaf worshippers, but this church in a Nashville suburb is unique because it was built specifically with a deaf ministry in mind.

There is a hearing church, basically, on every corner, but there's not really any place like this. Sims said. "It's a place where the deaf know, This is for me, that t meets their needs." Sims said.

The church has a loop system, which allows anyone with a hearing add to tie into the sound system with the flip of a switch.

Each seat also is wider to give church nembers more space to communicate in

sign language.
The Southern Baptist church has abo 150 people who attend, with Sunday services that are now simulcast for 600 to 700 people in 16 locations across the

700 people In 16 locations across the country.
Sims said he wants the church to become a training ground for deaf pastors and church leaders, because most seminaries currently require deaf students to have their own interpreters and most can't afford such an expense.
The church held a pilot conference last year to train deaf pastors and leaders, with about 100 people from around the

"Historically what takes place in a deaf church that's under a hearing church is they're moved from place to place because they're low man on the totem pole. Deaf work is not a money maker."





Other denominations find new purpose for old Catholic churches

WALTHAM, Mass. (AP) —
His church sarted in his living room, growing steadily as it moved wherever it found space, from public parks, to a YMCA to a former wood-working shop.
But by 2002, the New Covenant Christian Church of Cambridge was straining the old shop's walls, and Rev. Thomas St. Louis knew more toom was badly needed. Then, the financial stress on the Boston Archdlocese provided an opportunity for St. Louis' Ilatitan-American compregation. congregation.
St. Louis' church now

meets at the former St. Joseph Church in Waltham, which was among 44 church build-ings shut down as 62 Roman Catholic parishes were dis-solved in a broad consolida-tion in the Boston

solved in a broad consolida-tion in the Boston Archdocese that began in 2004.

About half of the 26 church properties that have been sold are being used for new housing, while eight were purchased by other churches, including New Covenant, a 400-member evangelical Protestant church. 400-member evangelical Protestant church. Now when St. Louis deliv-ers his sermons in Creole, he's

preaching to empty pews that his church has a chance to

nis church has a chance to fill.

"Honesdy from my heart, I wish the Catholic church in Boston and greater Boston never had any problems to force the cardinal to sell those churches, because I know what those churches cheause I know what those churches meant to the parish, St. Louis said. But one positive result, he said, is "the church could be used again as a church." Other churches with strong ethnic identities like New Covenant's have found homes in former Catholic properties, including another

Haitlan congregation that bought St. Peter in Malden. A Serbian Orthodox church bought immaculate Conception in Cambridge and a Greek Orthodox Church bought St. James in Arlington.

Church bought St. James in Adington. Jubiliee Christian Church in Bioston, one of New England's Inston. One of New England's largest churches, purchased Our Lady of the Rosary in Stoughton as a satellite for about 2,000 members who live in that area. Another Protestant congregation, Greater Faith Pentecostal, Worship Center, bought St. Joseph in Boston's Hyde Park.

As the unemployment rate in Mini-Cassia continues to dip down to new lows, many local residents remain underemployed.

Jan Roeser, regional economist for Idaho Commerce and Labor, said there is still a significant number of workers in Mini-Cassia who are underemployed. Although they are not technically out in the job market, they may be waiting for the right opportunity to come along. A person is considered under-employed if he is not using all of his skills in his current job, is working part-time when he would prefer to be

full-time or is working multi-ple jobs to make ends meet.



Scientists engineer mice to see the color spectrum




