





TWIN FALLS — Only when the charter jet cut its engines, and their shrick had faded, did the quiet snifes of family and close firends become audible.

Navy Petry Officer 2nd Class Curtis Hall, who was killed in Iraq last week at the age of 24, came home in a casket Friday. His body was greeted by the first honor guard ceremony for any fallen Magic Valley serviceman returned from Iraq by charter aircraft.

Hall was killed April 6 near Kirkuk when an improvised explosive device blew up the convoy in which he was riding.

Shasta Groene and her father struggle financially

COEUR DALENE—In the two years since she was rescued from a sexual prestator who mundered most of her family, 10-year-old Shasta Groene has faced nearly incomprehensible emotional challenges. But the girl and her father have also faced financial challenges, including being homeless for a time. Disturbed by this development, a local group is ratisfing money to build a home for Shasta and Steve Groene; 50, who has throat cancer and no longer

Windermere Foundation, which decided the money can be used only to help with Shasta's medical, dental and educational coats throughout her life.

Steve Grone has been very protective of his daughter's privacy since her rescue from the clutches of foseph Edward Duncan III. But he agreed to answer some questions from The Associated Press regarding the family's financial condition that were relayed through Smock. Steve and Shasta have lived in three different homes since her rescue, with



CSI nears completion of major wetlands project

TWIN FALLS — An extensive westands project at the College of Southern Idaho is still two weeks from completion, but already dozens of ducks are calling the four-pond spread home. The westlands project, funded largely by grants, will reduce sediment loads and pollution in the Perrine Coulee, a Twin Falls Canal Company waterway that empules into the Snake River north of the college. The westlands also become an instant research laboratory for the colleges students and faculty, as well as a new home for waterfowl and plant species.

Reduced pollution is the quantifiable benefit, though the project's leader said that might be difficult to measure.

"I don't know what percent reduction we'll get," said Ross Spackman, a CSI professor directing the project. But he said there will be a noticeable difference in the agricultural, industrial and municipal poliution that until now ended up in the rive.

Survivor of grizzly attack recounts ordeal

IETONIA (AP) — Timothy Henderson stepped out of his house in eastern idaho at dusk to look for his dog, Ladybug, He first heard Ladybug running, and then spotted her 50 feet away being chased by what he estimated to be a 350-pound gitzly bear.

"I panicked," a bandaged Henderson,
33, told the *idaho Statesman*. "I turned and
got about two steps before the bear-top-

got about two steps before the near-top-pled me."

. He said the bear grabbed him by the head during the Thesday attack and shook him like a rag doll. He said he rolled into a ball to protect himself and the bear finally

Henderson said he dropped to the ground second time and rolled into a ball before the bear bit him and "Ropped me around a little bit."
After the bear left and disappeared into the woods, Henderson remained still for several minutes while Ladybug continued to bark.

After what seemed like a long time, he said, he began crawling back toward the house with Ladybug walking slowly beside tim and still barding.

"She was distracting, trying to keep the bear away," Intenderson said.

When he got back to the house, he stood up, lie had been gone 15 minutes.

His wife, Jenny, heard Ladybug barking and opened the door to find her husband bleeding. She called for help and an ambu-

the bear's teeth, and other wounds to his shoulder, back and buttocks.
He said the family doesn't plan to return to the house in rural Tetonia, about five miles from the Idaho-Wyoming border, until the Idaho-Department of Fish and Game eatches the bear.
Game agents are using traps and snares baited with road-killed deer, but were unsuccessful through Friday aftermoon.
Officials say the bear was likely feeding on a dead moose that was about 50 yards from Henderson's house. Despite his foljuries. Henderson said he would rather the bear be relocated than killed. He said he doesn't think the bear was trying to kill him.

I really didn't feel it was the bear's fault,"
Henderson said. "Istumbled into his area."
But Jittery neighbors aren't so sure.
They don't bother me, but they are an enemy," said Jeany Murri, who wants the bear killed. "People want to make them out to be warm cuddly teddy bears, but they're

not."

The reason we live up here is to be near-the-wildlife,"—said-Ann-Toy-Broughton-who doesn't want the bear killed. "It may cause some inconvenience, it may cause some sacrifice and it may lead to some dangerous situations, but really it's the same here and everywhere."

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service has given the state permission to remove the bear from the wild to proteet public safety. Authorities have not said whether the bear would be killed if captured.

But the missing e-mails posed some of the weightlest questions, namely whether White House officials such as Rove purposedy conducted

White House officials such as Rove purposely conducted official business on RNC e-mail servers — and then deleted the e-mails — in violation of the law. Rove's lawyer said the sensor presidential adviser had no idea that his, e-mails were being deleted from the RNC server.

'Core' items flat

WASHINGTON Wholesale prices shot up by I ercent in March, mostly effecting more expensive asoline and food.

reflecting more expensive gasoline and food.

However, when, those colatile energy and food prices are removed, all other prices were flat in March, suggesting that inflation is not spreading throughout a wider range of goods in the economy, the Labor Department's report, released Friday, also showed.

The 1 percent increase in the Producer Price Index, which measures the costs of goods before they reach stores shelves, came after a 1.3 percent spike in February. The flat reading on "core prices marked an improvement from a 0.4 percent rise in the previous month.

"Food and energy costs are surging, but if you don't have to eat and drive, life is not that bad." quipped Joel Naroff, president of Naroff Economic Advisors. "This was a prefix good record."

From the Federal Reserves prespective, the biggest risk facing the economy right now is that inflation doesn't recede as pollcymakers expect. The Fed. cares so much about inflation because when it starts spiraling it can be hard — and painful — to control inflation eats away at workers and peoples investments and can put a squeeze on companies' profits.

The Fed hasn't budged a key interest rate since August. Before that it had steadily boosted rates for two years to fend off inflation. The Fed hasn't ruled out another rate increase if inflation were to show signs of worsening. Although the Fed watches a variety of inflation baronneters, it is especially interested in the behavior of core prices and food, which tidd to swing widely from month or month. The good behavior of core prices in March suggested that inflation is not in danger of spreading throughout the economy, it also suggested that the strain in passing along their higher fuel costs in the prices they charge wholesalers.

WASHINGTON — The U.S. trade white deficit improved for a second month as oil imports fell sharply and the politically sensitive deficit with China narrowed to its lowest point in nine





Underwater turbines use the tide to produce electricity in NYC

NEW YORK (AP) — The murky rivers around New York City bring to mind many things — garbage, chemicals, perhaps mobsters' bodies. Clean energy is not one of them.

But the state is trying to tange that thinking.

But the state is trying to change that thinking. It is tearning up with a Virginia company to use the East River for a unique experiment in renewable energy-Six giant turbines are being placed underwater in a 57 million project to harmess the energy of the tides and produce electricity.

of the tides and produce elec-tricity.
One of the 16-foot-diameter, windmill-like turbines is already operating, supplying power to a grocery store and a garage on Roosevelt Island. The other turbines are being installed over the next two weeks

Instance weeks.
"We're looking for the most cost-effective way to get the most energy out of moving water while having a positive impact on the environment," said Verdant Power President

Trey Taylor. Hydroelectric and wind Hydroelectric and wind power operate on similar prin-ciples, with water or air turn-ing turbines. But those proj-ects require dams or wind-mills, which can be costly, intrusive and objectionable to
