Tears, salutes greet the body of Burley sailor killed in Iraq

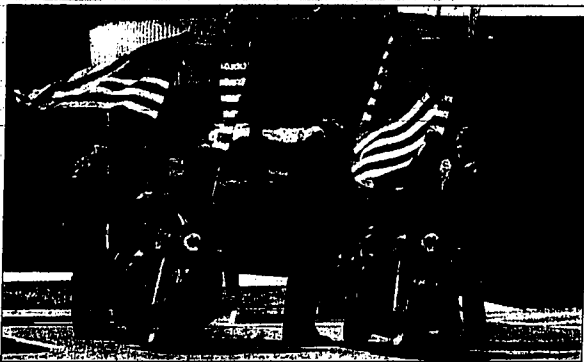

TWIN FALLS — Only when the charter jet cut its engines, and their shriek had faded, did the quiet sniffling of family and close friends become audible.

Navy Petty Officer 2nd Class Curtis Hall, who was killed in Iraq last week at the age of 24, came home in a casket Friday. His body was greeted by the first honor guard ceremony for any fallen Magic Valley serviceman returned from Iraq by charter aircraft.

Hall was killed April 6 near Kirkuk when an improvised explosive device blew up the convoy in which he was riding.

Asking for an ag program

Wendell School District seeks bond election that will rebuild ag program

WENDELL — "Concerned" is the simplest way to explain how many Wendell residents felt when the school district discontinued its agriculture program in 1991.

But when state officials took the district's ag equipment and distributed it among other schools throughout Idaho, the community's sentiment went from "concerned" to "infuriated."

Now, under a different school administration, the Wendell School District is asking the community to support a \$1.75 million school bond election to rebuild the district's ag program as well as its athletic facilities.

Only 16 percent of the bond money will go toward completion of the athletic

A name to remember

Twin Falls High baseball field to be named after former baseball coach

TWIN FALLS — The Bruins' ballpark will finally get an appropriate name, school officials say.

When Twin Falls High School plays its next baseball game at home on April 21, the field will officially be named after Bill Ingram. Ingram, who was the Bruins' head baseball coach during the 1980s and early '90s, was unaware that the ballpark would bear his name — even while the Twin Falls School Board discussed the issue.

"We wanted to keep it a secret until we

Shasta Groene and her father struggle financially

COEUR D'ALENE — In the two years since she was rescued from a sexual predator who murdered most of her family, 10-year-old Shasta Groene has faced nearly incomprehensible emotional challenges.

But the girl and her father have also faced financial challenges, including being homeless for a time.

Disturbed by this development, a local group is raising money to build a home for Shasta and Steve Groene, 50, who has throat cancer and no longer

can work.

"They are currently living on Shasta's Social Security and Steve's disability," said Midge Smock, an owner of Windermere Coeur d'Alene Realty Inc. who is leading the effort to build a home for the Groenes. "He did not give me an exact figure, but I'm quite sure it is around the poverty level."

While nearly \$90,000 in donations poured in from around the country after Shasta was rescued from her abductor in July 2005, the money is held in trust for the girl until she is 25 and can't be used for daily living expenses now, said Shasta Groene Charitable Trust trustee Lee Anderson. The fund was set up by The

Windermere Foundation, which decided the money can be used only to help with Shasta's medical, dental and educational costs throughout her life.

Steve Groene has been very protective of his daughter's privacy since her rescue from the clutches of Joseph Edward Duncan III. But he agreed to answer some questions from The Associated Press regarding the family's financial condition that were relayed through Smock.

Steve and Shasta have lived in three different homes since her rescue, with

He died on his second tour in Iraq, along with two other sailors in his naval explosives unit.

Before a federal law went into effect in January, Hall's body would have been flown home on an ordinary commercial flight. Protests from the father of a soldier killed in Iraq led to a change in the law.

Gwen Beck, a close friend of the Burley family, stood with about 25 family members and their friends on the tarmac at the Twin Falls airport.

"Real," Beck said, recalling the feeling of watching the honor guard transport the casket from the plane to a Rasmussen Funeral Home hearse. Beck's face began to contort, and she cried with her hand on her chin.

"It makes it all real," she said. "You hear it on television and everything. But it's all real... The sacrifices he made for us."

The honor guard carrying Hall's casket passed between two rows of veterans holding flags. The body was loaded into the back of the white hearse.

The crowd left the tarmac. Two policemen on motorcycles led a motorcade to U.S. Highway 30 and then to Burley. Two Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office cars followed to the Cassia County line.

Then came the hearse, saliers in SUVs, the family in a Buick Regal, and more sailors. Twelve members of Patriot Guard Riders — mostly veterans, some who had

facilities," said Greg Lowe, superintendent of the Wendell School District. "But 84 percent will be used to build the ag program."

The bond will be "wrapped around" an existing bond to pay of the cost of the new middle school and high school buildings. The bond issue would increase the property tax on a \$100,000 home by about \$9 per year.

If voters approve the bond issue, the district will build ag science facilities, including two classrooms, a full shop, a greenhouse and a work shed. However, most of the greenhouse will be paid for through a federal grant.

More than 70 community members have volunteered to form a campaign committee to promote the election — mostly out of concern for the future of the district's ag program.

Sixteen years ago, the district shut down the program amid concerns about how it was spending money.

According to state law, a school's resources can be reallocated to other schools in Idaho if those resources are no longer being used. That's exactly what happened following the closure of the Wendell district's ag program.

But about a year ago, a new school administration began the process of rebuilding the program. The district hired a part-time ag-science instructor, organized a community advisory committee and planned to approach the community with a bond issue election to recoup the resources it needs.

"This is the chance for the community to voice their support or concern about the future of an ag program," said Patty Southfield, a volunteer for the citizen committee.

Iraqi lawmakers meet in session in "defiance" of terrorism

BAGHDAD — Iraq's parliament met in an extraordinary session on Friday in defiance of terrorism, and declared it would not bow to terrorists. A bouquet of red roses and a white lily sat in the place of Mohammad Awdi, the lawmaker killed in the parliament dining hall suicide bombing claimed by al-Qaida.

Parliament — speaker Mahmoud al-Mashhadani opened the session and asked lawmakers to recite verses from the Quran in honor of Awdi, whom he called a "hero."

The unprecedented Friday meeting was called to send a clear message to all the terrorists and all those who dare try to stop this (political) process, that we will sacrifice in order for it to continue," said al-Mashhadani, a Sunni Muslim.

"We feel today that we are stronger than yesterday," he said. "The parliament, government and the people are all the same — they are all in the same ship which, if it sinks, will make everyone sink."

An al-Qaida-led amalgam of Sunni insurgents claimed one of its "knights" carried out Thursday's suicide bombing in Baghdad's Green Zone and warned the "monkeys in parliament" to brace for more attacks. The U.S. military revised the death toll sharply downward, saying one civilian was killed. Late into Thursday the military had said eight people were killed and 23 wounded.

While the attack was widely believed to have been an al-Qaida mission, investigators said Friday they were focusing on security guards inside and outside the parliament building. The officials spoke on condition of anonymity because of the sensitivity of the investigation.

Iraq's Shiite-dominated Interior Ministry, which runs the police and national paramilitary force, on Friday took over security for parliament. The military on Friday announced that three U.S. soldiers and two Iraqi translators were killed in two attacks south of Baghdad. Eight soldiers were wounded.

In the worst of the two incidents, two soldiers were killed and seven wounded in an attack on their base south of the capital Thursday. The two Iraqi interpreters also died. The military statement said U.S. forces dispatched a quick reaction force and attack helicopters to relieve the unit.

In an attack Friday, the military said, one soldier was killed and one wounded in a roadside bombing, also south of Baghdad.

Twenty people were killed or found dead across Iraq on Friday with just one victim of sectarian assassinations found in the capital. That was the second lowest daily toll since the security operation began in Baghdad on Feb. 14. But Thursday's bombing in the heart of Baghdad's most secure region, coupled with the stunning destruction of one of Baghdad's Tigris River bridges, was a heavy blow to the Bush administration's plan to put an additional 30,000 American forces in Iraq by summer.

Civilian deaths down in Baghdad — but up elsewhere

BAGHDAD — Iraqi civilian deaths have fallen in Baghdad in the two months since the Feb. 14 start of the U.S.-led offensive, according to an Associated Press tally.

Outside the capital, however, civilian deaths are up as Sunni and Shiite extremists shift their operations to avoid the crackdown.

And the sweeps have taken a heavy toll on U.S. forces: Deaths among American sol-

diers climbed 21 percent in Baghdad compared with the previous two months.

Since the crackdown began Feb. 14, U.S. military officials have spoken of encouraging signs that security is improving in the capital but have cautioned against drawing any firm conclusions until at least the summer.

Figures compiled by the AP from Iraqi police reports show that 1,536 civilians were killed in Baghdad between the start of the offensive and Thursday. That represents a sharp drop from the 2,871 civilians who died violently in the capital during the two months

that preceded the security crackdown.

Outside the capital, 1,504 civilians were killed between Feb. 14 and Thursday, April 12, compared with 1,009 deaths in the two previous months, the AP figures show.

"We know this increased security presence and cooperation from the people is having an impact in Baghdad," U.S. military spokesman Maj. Gen. William C. Caldwell said this week.

"It is a good beginning, but it is not nearly enough. The violence across the rest of Iraq remains at unacceptable levels."

1950 'shoot refugees' letter was known to No Gun Ri inquiry, but went undisclosed

Six years after declaring the U.S. killing of Korean War refugees at No Gun Ri was "not deliberate," the Army has acknowledged it found but did not divulge that a high-level document said the U.S. military had a policy of shooting approaching civilians in South Korea.

The document, a letter from the U.S. ambassador in South Korea to the State Department in Washington, is dated the day in 1950 when U.S. troops began the No Gun Ri shootings, in which survivors say hundreds, mostly women and children, were killed.

Exclusion of the embassy letter from the Army's 2001 investigative report is the most significant among numerous omissions of documents and testimony pointing to a policy of firing on refugee groups — undisclosed evidence uncovered by Associated Press archival research and Freedom of Information Act requests.

South Korean petitioners say hundreds more refugees died later in 1950 as a result of the U.S. practice. The Seoul government is investigating one such large-scale killing of refugees stranded on a beach, newly confirmed via U.S. archives. No Gun Ri survivors, who call the Army's 2001 investigation a "whitewash," are demanding a reopened investigation, compensation and a U.S. apology.

Harvard historian Sahr Conway-Lanz first disclosed the existence of Ambassador John H. Muccio's 1950 letter in a scholarly article and a 2006 book "Collateral Damage." He uncovered the declassified document at the U.S. National Archives.

"When asked last year, the Pentagon didn't address the central question of whether U.S. investigators had seen the document before issuing their No Gun Ri report. Ex-Army Secretary Louis Caldera suggested in The Associated Press that Army researchers may have missed it.

After South Korea asked for more information, however, the Pentagon didn't address the Seoul government that it examined Muccio's letter in 2000 but dismissed it. It did so because the letter "outlined a proposed policy" not an approved one.

But Muccio's message to Assistant Secretary of State Dean Rusk states unequivocally that "decisions made" at a high-level U.S.-South Korean meeting in Thagoe, South Korea, on July 25, 1950, included a policy to shoot approaching refugees. The reason: American commanders feared that disguised North Korean enemy troops were infiltrating their lines via refugee groups.

"If refugees do appear from north of US lines they will receive warning shots, and if they then persist in advancing they will be shot," the ambassador told Rusk, cautioning that these shootings might

cause "reprisals in the United States." Deliberately attacking noncombatants is a war crime.

Told of the Pentagon's rationale for excluding the Muccio letter from its investigative report, No Gun Ri expert Yi Mu-hyul, retired head of Seoul's National Institute of Korean History, suggested the letter was suppressed because it was "disadvantageous" to the Pentagon's case.

"If they set it aside as nothing significant, we can say that it was an intentional exclusion," he said.

Conway-Lanz called the Pentagon's explanation "thoroughly unconvincing."

The Muccio letter in plain English says, "Decisions were made," the historian noted.

No Gun Ri survivors said U.S. soldiers first forced them from nearby villages on July 25, 1950, and then stopped them in front of U.S. lines the next day, when they were attacked without warning by aircraft as hundreds sat atop a railroad embankment near No Gun Ri, a village in central South Korea.

Units of the 7th U.S. Cavalry Regiment followed with ground fire as survivors took shelter in twin undergrounds of a concrete railroad bridge.

The killings remained hidden from history until an AP report in 1993 cited a dozen ex-soldiers who corroborated the Korean survivors' accounts, prompting the Pentagon to

open its inquiry after years of dismissing the allegations.

The Army veterans' estimates of dead ranged from under 100 to "hundreds." Korean survivors say they believe about 400 were killed.

Korean authorities have certified the identities of at least 183 dead or missing.

No Gun Ri, where no evidence emerged of enemy infiltrators, was not the only such incident. As 1950 wore on, U.S. commanders repeatedly ordered refugees shot, according to declassified documents obtained by the AP.

One incident, on Sept. 1, 1950, has been confirmed by the declassified official diary of the USS DeFaven, which says that the "Navy destroyer, at Army insistence, fired on a sea-side refugee encampment at Pohang, South Korea.

Survivors say 100 to 200 people were killed. South Korean officials announced in February they would investigate.

More than a dozen documents — in which high-ranking U.S. officers tell troops that refugees are "fair game," for example, and order them to "shoot all refugees coming across river" — were found by the AP in the investigators' own archived files after the 2001 inquiry. None of those documents was disclosed in the Army's 300-page public report.

South Koreans have filed reports with their government of more than 60 such episodes during the 1950-53 war.

Despite this, the Army's e-mail to the AP maintains, as did the 2001 report: "No policy purporting to authorize soldiers to shoot refugees was ever promulgated to soldiers in the field."

The 2001 official report instead focused on a single document issued the day the No Gun Ri shootings began, a Korea-wide Army order saying refugees should be stopped from crossing U.S. lines. That order did not say how they should be stopped, but retired Army Col. Robert M. Carroll, a lieutenant at No Gun Ri, said the meaning was clear.

"What do you do when you're told nobody comes through?" Carroll said in an AP interview before his death in 2004. If they didn't stop, he said, "we had to shoot them to hold them back."

Earthquake strongly felt in Acapulco, Mexico City; no damage or deaths reported

ACAPULCO, Mexico — A strong earthquake shook southern Mexico early Friday, knocking out power in parts of Mexico City and Acapulco, swaying tall buildings and sending frightened people into the streets in their pajamas.

Civil defense officials in Mexico and the Pacific coast state of Guerrero, where the magnitude-6.6 quake was centered, said there were no reports of any deaths or widespread damage.

Dozens of buildings in Mexico City were evacuated amid reports that they suffered structural damage, and officials were inspecting them to determine if they were still safe.

Among them was a five-story apartment building that

was leaning precariously and another graffiti-covered, art-deco apartment complex riddled with fissures. Some two dozen families, residents of both buildings, spent the night in the street or in their cars.

One person was injured falling down stairs trying to get out of a building.

The quake, which hit at 12:42 a.m. (11:42 a.m. EDT), was felt strongly from the Pacific coast resort of Acapulco to the mountain capital of Mexico City because it was centered inland — 90 miles northwest of Acapulco — and just 18 miles below the earth's surface, the U.S. Geological Survey said.

Many of Mexico's earthquakes are centered at sea. Several aftershocks followed, including one, pre-dawn magnitude-5.1 that was felt throughout much of western Mexico.

Cuban foreign minister, Venezuelan president say Castro is recovering

CARACAS, Venezuela (AP) — Venezuelan President Hugo Chavez on Friday said his close friend and ally Fidel Castro has "almost totally recovered" from his illness, and Cuba's foreign minister said the ailing leader is getting stronger every day.

Speaking at a televised news conference, Chavez said the 80-year-old Cuban leader's medical improvement is clear.

"Almost totally recovered is the very reliable information that I keep receiving," Chavez said. "The reports that I have and that keep arriving speak of — and not only the reports but his own notes, his voice on the telephone ... a doctor would say real recovery."

Cuban Foreign Minister

Felipe Roque, traveling in Vietnam, said Castro had improved steadily.

"President Fidel Castro is recovering very well," Roque told reporters after an hour-long meeting with his Vietnamese counterpart, Phan Gia Kiem.

The 80-year-old Castro hasn't made any public appearances since undergoing emergency intestinal surgery last July, when he ceded his leadership responsibilities to his brother Raul, the Cuban defense minister.

Castro's condition and exact ailment remain a state secret, but he is widely believed to suffer from diverticular disease, a weakening of the walls of the colon that can cause sustained bleeding.

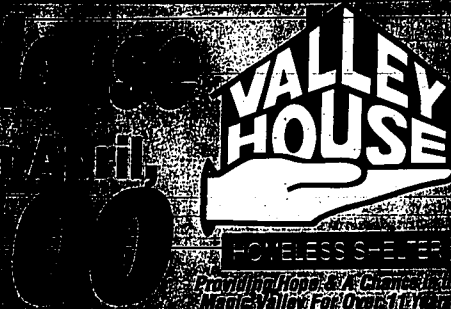

Worry over whey Glanbia says extra discharges are insignificant

GOODING — Air emissions good enough to eat?

Sounded hard to believe to a handful of Gooding County residents who met Friday evening with representatives from Glanbia Foods about the company's plans to release an additional 2.88 tons of particulate matter into the air each year.

Glanbia is seeking a permit to upgrade a whey-production system. The proposed changes will result in additional air discharges from its Gooding facility, and Glanbia hosted the meeting to fulfill part of its permit request — through the Idaho

Department of Environmental Quality — and to dispel perceived myths about the upgrades. "This is the stuff we want people to eat," said Todd Hughes, the company's environmental manager.

He said the emissions from the upgrades are not like traditional pollutants.

They're organic; tiny whey particles too small for the production system

to capture, and they pose no health risk.

Hughes spent the majority of the 45-minute meeting reassuring the public, which included Gooding County Commissioner Terrell Williams, that these upgrades will pose no health risk and have nothing to do with the company's controversial waste-treatment plant.

The half-dozen or so residents at

the meeting, however, were not easily persuaded.

"My fear is that you're putting more chemicals out," county resident Heidi Olson said. "My feeling is that there are already a lot of health effects (that stem from the company)."

However, by the end of the presentation, Hughes had assuaged the fears of most at the meeting, even Olson.

"I feel like this is safe," Olson said in an interview afterward. "But I'm still concerned about other health problems people have in our area."

Wetland-ready

CSI nears completion of major wetlands project

TWIN FALLS — An extensive wetlands project at the College of Southern Idaho is still two weeks from completion, but already dozens of ducks are calling the four-pond spread home.

The wetlands project, funded largely by grants, will reduce sediment loads and pollution in the Perrine Coulee, a Twin Falls Canal Company waterway that empties into the Snake River north of the college.

The wetlands also become an instant research laboratory for the college's students and faculty, as well as a new home for waterfowl and plant species.

Reduced pollution is the quantifiable benefit, though the project's leader said that might be difficult to measure.

"I don't know what percent reduction we'll get," said Ross Spackman, a CSI professor directing the project. But he said there will be a noticeable difference in the agricultural, industrial and municipal pollution that until now ended up in the river.

The ponds aren't functional yet, but the pollution difference is already noticeable —

thanks to a machine upstream of the ponds that sucks solid trash out of the water via a conveyor belt. On Thursday, it had been two days since the machine was last powered and perhaps a

hundred pounds of twigs, plastic wrappers and foam cups waited to be scooped out of the green water.

A yet-to-be-built wind turbine and solar panels will power the garbage machine once the ponds are operational.

The wetlands are at the Breckenridge Endowment Farm on North College Road, just south of the Lazy J Ranch — a mobile home retirement community where residents, Spackman said, have been supportive of the dozens of ducks who've become their neighbors.

The wetlands could also

help the canal company meet sediment regulations. In recent years, the company has developed several large sediment projects, including a new holding pond near Filer, after trouble meeting government regulations.

Canal company sediment expert Brian Olmstead was out of town and could not be reached for this story.

He's worked with the college on the project for nearly 13 years — since the canal company installed the first sediment-retention pond at the site.

Since then, ponds were added here and there as more

grant money became available. But this spring's upgrades are as far as the wetlands project will go. There simply isn't anymore space at the site.

But that's fine by Spackman, the canal company and the resident ducks: He's got a research center for his students, the canal company returns cleaner water to the river, and the ducks have a new home.

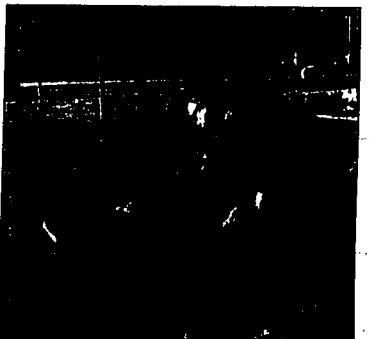
City officials are hoping Kena will help curb some of Wendell's illegal drug activities.

Survivor of grizzly attack recounts ordeal

TETONIA (AP) — Timothy Henderson stepped out of his house in eastern Idaho at dusk to look for his dog, Ladybug. He first heard Ladybug running, and then spotted her 50 feet away being chased by what he estimated to be a 350-pound grizzly bear.

"I panicked," a bandaged Henderson, 33, told the *Idaho Statesman*. "I turned and got about two steps before the bear-toppled me."

He said the bear grabbed him by the head during the Tuesday attack and shook him like a rag doll. He said he rolled into a ball to protect himself and the bear finally let go.

"I got up. That's when I heard him charging again."

Henderson said he dropped to the ground a second time and rolled into a ball before the bear bit him and "flopped me around a little bit."

After the bear left and disappeared into the woods, Henderson remained still for several minutes while Ladybug continued to bark.

After what seemed like a long time, he said, he began crawling back toward his house with Ladybug walking slowly beside him and still barking.

"She was distracting, trying to keep the bear away," Henderson said.

When he got back to the house, he stood up. He had been gone 15 minutes.

His wife, Jenny, heard Ladybug barking and opened the door to find her husband bleeding. She called for help and an ambulance arrived in 15 minutes, and Henderson was later flown to Eastern Idaho Medical Center in Idaho Falls. He was released Friday.

the bear's teeth, and other wounds to his shoulder, back and buttocks.

He said the family does not plan to return to the house in rural Tetonia, about five miles from the Idaho-Wyoming border, until the Idaho Department of Fish and Game catches the bear.

Game agents are using traps and snares baited with road-killed deer, but were unsuccessful through Friday afternoon.

Officials say the bear was likely feeding on a dead moose that was about 50 yards from Henderson's house. Despite his injuries, Henderson said he would rather the bear be relocated than killed. He said he doesn't think the bear was trying to kill him.

"I really didn't feel it was the bear's fault," Henderson said. "I stumbled into his area."

But jittery neighbors aren't so sure. "They don't bother me, but they are an enemy," said Jenny Murri, who wants the bear killed. "People want to make them out to be warm cuddly teddy bears, but they're not."

"The reason we live up here is to be near the wildlife," said Ann-Toy Broughton, who doesn't want the bear killed. "It may cause some inconvenience, it may cause some sacrifice and it may lead to some dangerous situations, but really it's the same here and everywhere."

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service has given the state permission to remove the bear from the wild to protect public safety. Authorities have not said whether the bear would be killed if captured.

Feds: Chances slim for new Idaho national park

BOISE — The National Park Service says a 15-year-old list of potential Idaho national park sites submitted recently to the federal agency by the state is unlikely to gain traction because it doesn't have grass roots support.

Carl Wilgus, head of Idaho Department of Commerce and Labor's tourism division, recently gave a copy of a 1992 University of Idaho study to the U.S. Interior Department that names Hells Canyon National Recreation Area, the Sawtooth National Recreation Area and the Craters of the Moon National Monument, among others, as possible national park sites.

Interior Secretary Dirk Kempthorne is Idaho's former governor.

Aside from a small part of Yellowstone National Park, Idaho doesn't have a national park, and Wilgus said this week that getting one some

day could boost tourism dollars.

"It would seem appropriate that someday we have a national park in Idaho," Wilgus told the *Lawston Tribune*.

Still, Jeffrey Olson, a National Park Service spokesman, said such lists aren't generally considered seriously when his agency promotes new parks. A member of Congress must first propose studying a particular site.

"That's not the way things become national parks," Olson said.

There have been efforts in Congress to expand Idaho's wilderness areas, and those could resume this year, U.S. Rep. Mike Simpson and Sen. Mike Crapo, both R-Idaho, have proposed wilderness preserves in the Boulder, White Cloud mountains and the Owyhee canyons.

Spokane police officer arrested in off-duty shooting

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP) — A Spokane police officer who chased and wounded a man while off duty was arrested Friday for investigation of assault and reckless endangerment.

The Spokane County Sheriff's Department, which investigated the Feb. 25 incident, arrested Officer Jay Olsen and booked him into jail for investigation of one count of first-degree assault and two counts of reckless endangerment, Sheriff Ozzie Knezovich said.

Police Chief Anne Kirkpatrick placed Olsen on unpaid leave status, meaning the pay and benefits stop immediately, spokesman Cpl. Tom Lee said. An administrative process will determine whether Olsen will be fired.

Olsen, a 16-year department veteran, told investigators he was leaving a downtown bar

after hours when he saw his truck being stolen. He and a friend chased the man by car and on foot to the Peaceful Valley neighborhood west of downtown, where Olsen fired five shots, striking the fleeing man once.

Shoneto Pete, 27, was treated for a bullet wound on the back of his skull.

On Friday, sheriff's detectives served a warrant charging Pete with taking a motor vehicle without permission. He is currently serving a six-month sentence in the Spokane County Jail on an unrelated charge.

Pete, a Navaho circle drummer from Mountain, contended he was nowhere near Olsen's truck, but investigators found Pete's fingerprints on the outside and the steering wheel of the truck.

Documents released Friday showed Olsen told Officer Zach Dahle at the scene that Pete threatened to kill him and made a motion that suggested that he had a weapon in his hand, Olsen said he feared for his life, but investigators said Pete was not armed.

Jury sees interrogation videos in Pocatello stabbing trial

POCATELLO (AP) — The jury in the murder trial of Brian Draper, charged in the stabbing death of a high school classmate last fall, got mixed messages about his role in the slaying after watching videotapes of the police interrogation.

Draper, 17, is on trial in 4th District Court here for first-degree murder and conspiracy to commit first-degree murder in the slaying of Cassie Jo Stoddard. Prosecutors say Draper and Torey Adamcik, 16, stabbed Stoddard while she was house-sitting for relatives near Chubbuck on Sept. 22.

At the time, all three juniors at Pocatello High School; Adamcik's trial on the same charges is scheduled to begin next month.

On Thursday, the second day of testimony, Bannock County Chief Deputy Prosecutor Vic Pearson played for the jury videotapes of Draper's interviews with detectives on Sept. 27 and 28.

In the Sept. 27 interview, Draper admits he and Adamcik were present when Stoddard was killed, but he denied stabbing her. The

video also captures Draper — in tears and speaking in hushed tones — explaining how they moved through the darkened home, saying he believed they were playing a prank, at least up to the moment he realized Stoddard had been killed. He also told detectives Adamcik threatened him if he cooperated with police.

But during the Sept. 28 interrogation, Draper offered a different version of events. Draper questioning by Idaho State Police detectives, Draper said he stabbed his classmate more than once under pressure from Adamcik.

Adamcik "came over and says, 'make sure she is dead. You need to stab her.'" Draper said on the tape.

Stoddard's body was found two days later when her relatives returned home. Adamcik and Draper were arrested Sept. 27. In the Sept. 27 interview, Draper also describes the clothing, masks and knives they grabbed before entering the house and their method for disposing the evidence in the Black Rock Canyon area afterward.

Teenager sentenced to life in prison in counselor killing

SALT LAKE CITY — A jury has sentenced a teenager to life in prison without parole for killing a youth counselor who gave him a ride.

After a weeklong sentencing hearing in Boulder's 2nd District Court, the jury voted 11-1 Friday to give Robert Cameron Houston a life sentence.

On Feb. 15, 2006, Houston was at the Youth Health Associates group home, where Houston attended classes and once lived. Despite the aggravated murder charge, Houston was ineligible for a possible death penalty because he was 17 at the time of the stabbing.

over to a jury to decide between a life sentence with or without the opportunity for parole.

At least 10 of the jurors had to agree on the life sentence. Otherwise, Houston would have received an indeterminate sentence of 20 years to life in prison with the Utah Board of Pardons and Parole deciding how much time he would serve.

On Feb. 15, 2006, Houston was at the Youth Health Associates group home playing basketball. He asked Elton for a ride to his independent living center.

When they arrived at the house, Elton was alone and Houston told Elton she needed to sign him in, according to prosecutors.

He then threatened her with a knife, raped her, stabbed her and cut her throat, according to court documents.

Lawyer: Rove didn't intentionally delete e-mails

WASHINGTON (AP) — Karl Rove's lawyer on Friday dismissed the notion that President Bush's chief political adviser intentionally deleted his own e-mails from a Republican-sponsored computer system.

The attorney said Rove believed the communications were being preserved in accordance with the law.

The issue arose because the White House and Republican National Committee have said they may have lost e-mails from Rove and other administration officials.

Democratically chaired congressional committees want those e-mails for their probe of the firings of eight federal prosecutors.

At the same time, documents released by the Justice Department Friday showed a new contradiction—in the

administration's accounting of the firings. Indicating that replacements for those dismissed were being considered by department officials nearly a year beforehand, Attorney General Alberto Gonzales' former chief of staff told a Senate panel last month that he had no replacements in mind when the first seven prosecutors were fired on Dec. 7.

But the missing e-mails posed some of the weightiest questions, namely whether White House officials such as Rove purposely conducted official business on RNC e-mail servers — and then deleted the e-mails — in violation of the law.

Rove's lawyer said the senior presidential adviser had no idea that his e-mails were being deleted from the RNC server.

His understanding stazing

very, very early in the administration was that those e-mails were being archived, Rove's attorney, Robert Luskin, said.

The prosecutor probing the Valerie Plame spy case saw and copied all of Rove's e-mails from his various accounts after searching Rove's laptop, his home computer, and the handheld computer devices he used for both the White House and Republican National Committee, Luskin said.

The prosecutor, Patrick Fitzgerald, subpoenaed the e-mails from the White House, the RNC and Bush's re-election campaign, he added.

Any e-mails Rove deleted were the type of routine definitions people make to keep their inboxes orderly, Luskin said. He said Rove had no idea the e-mails were being deleted from the server, a central computer that managed the e-mail.

CSI clobbers Cardinals

Williams drives in nine runs in sweep of No. 11 NIC

TWIN FALLS — Like, whoa. Nobody saw that coming. Not the College of Southern Idaho fans, the Golden Eagles softball players, and certainly not the No. 11 North Idaho College Cardinals.

After CSI's 11-3 and 9-0 ambush of the Cardinals in Friday's Scenic West Athletic Conference doubleheader, the man that orchestrated the biggest shocker of the SWAC season admitted he didn't see two lopsided, five-inning wins coming at Brulin Diamond.

"No. Definitely not," CSI head coach Nick Baumert said. "We talked yesterday about what kind of games you'd expect to see. I would have thought the 9-7 or the 2-1, but never the 11-3 and the 9-0."

Not even sophomore third baseman Jalena Williams, who broke the Cardinals' backs Friday with a combined 5-for-9, nine-RBI performance thought she and her 27-23 (18-12 SWAC) Golden Eagles teammates would make such a statement against the 32-17 (20-10 SWAC) Cardinals.

"No. Actually, I didn't think that at all," she said. "I'm kind of shocked right now, actually."

But here we are. The Cardinals enjoyed a 1-0 lead after the first half-inning of play Friday, but for the next three hours, the Golden Eagles put on a display of opportunistic base running, timely hitting and steady pitching that NIC simply didn't match. Even with Cardinals ace pitcher Kelley Cavan in the circle, the Golden Eagles rallied to a 6-1 advantage after two innings in the first game.

It was then Williams' time to shine. With the CSI trio of Candice Bernard, All Spear and Rachel Evans leading the bases, the sophomore slugger worked her way to a three-ball, one-strike count before taking Cavan's fifth pitch of the at bat out of the park to straight-away center, putting her team up by an insurmountable 10-1 score.

"I think the big thing was when Ja hit her grand slam, she was at 3-1 and we always talk about looking for a pitch," Baumert said. "She got a pitch she was looking for."

Williams evidently got a lot of pitches she was looking for, as she backed up her Game 1 performance with five RBIs off two singles and a double in the second game. While Williams got the glory, she credited her CSI teammates for giving her the opportunity to drive them in. Rochelle Noren scored five runs on the day while both Spear and Evans crossed home plate four times.

"People had to get on for me to hit them in, so everybody was doing their job today," Williams said.

That includes the CSI pitching duo of Game 1 starter Jody Zillner and Game 1 hurler Desrae Thomson. Zillner scattered three runs on five hits while striking out

six to win her start, while Thomson was nothing short of dominant, tossing a one-hitter to improve her season record to 6-8.

"Our pitchers were awesome today," Williams said. "They got up early, then kept us in it the whole time."

Designated hitter Stephanie Holmes connected on a three-run home run in the second game, but the Golden Eagles won more on their short game than on the long ball. A slew of infield singles and a

combined seven NIC errors kept runners in scoring position for the Golden Eagles, which helped negate Cavan's 12 thrown strikeouts over a combined 6 1-3 innings pitched.

"We always talk about how the great teams put pressure on people," Baumert said. "I thought we really did that today. I don't know how many times we took second base, whether they didn't hit their cut or didn't get it in right away. Then all of a sudden, it's second and

third, with runners there and you're not having to sacrifice bunt."

While the Cardinals infield looked sleepy at times, there was no shortage of moments where NIC showed glimpses of how dangerous it can be. One such moment came when Twin Falls native Justine Williams laced a two-out double in the top of the fifth to narrow CSI's Game-1 lead to 10-3, extending the game another half-inning before Belinda

Boise State ends spring without starting QB

BOISE — Boise State had two main goals during this year's spring practice: Select a new quarterback and avoid injuring star running back Ian Johnson. The Broncos only partly succeeded.

"The quarterback question will loom through the summer following an intrasquad scrimmage Friday night that wrapped up spring practice.

But the often-injured Johnson didn't get hurt, a result of Broncos coaches not allowing him to take part in any spring drills.

"I wish I could be out here more than anything," said the 5-foot-11 Johnson, a junior who plans to increase his durability by gaining 10 pounds to play at 205. "But I'm recovering from the things that happened last season and letting the young guys get their thing going."

Johnson had to sit out one game after suffering cracked ribs and a punctured lung. But still led major college football last regular season with 24 rushing touchdowns and averaged about 145 yards a game as the Broncos went 13-0 and ended up ranked No. 5 in the final AP poll.

Johnson scored the winning points against Oklahoma in overtime in the Fiesta Bowl with the last of three stunning trick plays, which the Broncos have been trying to downplay ever since.

"I think the only people who think about the trick plays are outside our program," said coach Chris Petersen, who earlier this year agreed to a new contract that includes incentives that could push him over the \$1 million mark. "These kids know what's going to win the championship for us and it's not trick plays. We win championships with great defense and a hard-nose running game."

The Broncos return 11 starters, four of them on an offensive line that dominated opponents last season.

But the Broncos didn't name a quarterback to replace Fiesta Bowl offensive MVP Jared Zabransky.

"I think it's good to keep all of us in it over the summer," said Taylor Tharp, a 6-foot-2, 210-pound senior who backed up Zabransky last year. "I think that's the way the coaches would like it, to not have all aerial solidified guys in a race like this so everyone keeps busting their butt and working hard."

The other three trying for the job are 6-foot-3, 200-pound senior QB Trent Johnson and the son of former NFL QB Neil Lomax and Michael Coughlin, a 6-foot-5 freshman who red-shirted last season.

"I think certain guys have made steps," said Petersen. "But I don't think anybody has stepped far enough ahead

WASHINGTON — The U.S. trade deficit improved in a second month as oil imports fell sharply and the politically sensitive deficit with China narrowed to its lowest point in nine months.

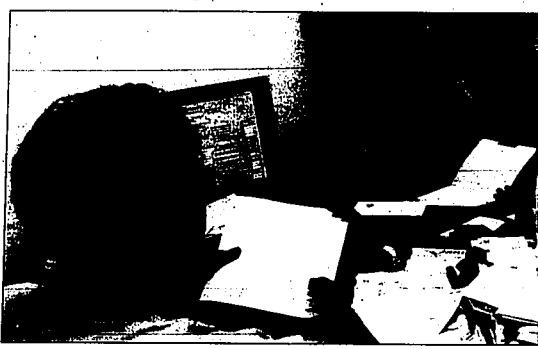

Immigrants and taxes Despite controversy, illegal immigrants file taxes more than ever

RICHMOND, Calif. — Carlos Diaz broke the law when he crossed the border and took a job at an office janitor. But he's not about to break another by failing to pay his income tax. 'I've been talking to other people who've done it, and I want to follow the law,' said Diaz, an undocumented immigrant from Guatemala who squirmed in his seat at a neighborhood tax preparer's office.

A quiet debut for 'Forever Stamp'

LOS ANGELES — It's called the "Forever Stamp" — and it might just take that long for customers to catch on to it. Unveiled Thursday, the 41-cent first-class stamp is eternally valid, no matter how much the rate of first-class postage increases in the future.

The American Postal Workers Union has called it a major loss to the American people, but few folks in the line at the Westwood Village post office had heard of their victory — and even fewer were planning to buy it.

"I heard about those Star Wars ones," said Devern Fleming, gesturing to the posters featuring Ewan McGregor wielding a lightsaber in honor of the Star Wars stamps that will be released in May. Fleming goes to the post office every day for his job but felt a bit out of the loop: He didn't know the rate of first-class postage is rising May 14 from 39 to 41 cents.

No ads for the Forever Stamp graced the walls of the Westwood Village post office. Even those who had heard of new product seemed unsure of how it works. "You can use them forever," said Mark Drake. "Even if the rate goes up a dollar."

Drake bought three books of Forever Stamps and promptly sent them on her mailing list, with 2 cents per card because the postage rate has not yet gone up. Drake didn't mind.

"People will be impressed when they see these," she said. "They look good."

The stamps feature the Liberty Bell, which last appeared on a stamp issued Oct. 13, 1975, said Ken Martin, deputy director of the American Philatelic Society. It cost 13 cents.

Martin said the Postal Service is a little bit behind the times with its Forever Stamp: Britain has had one for more than two decades, he said.

"Customer convenience is the No. 1 reason we're doing this," said Mark Saunders, a Postal Service spokesman. The rate of postage rises consistently with inflation, and customers who buy the Forever stamps won't have to buy 2-cent stamps to top their postage the next time rates rise.

Disgruntled customers often leave pennies on post office counters to protest one inconvenience of buying 1- and 2-cent stamps, said Nora Chester, a postal service sales associate. The price of a Forever Stamp will rise as postage rates do, so penny-pinchers could buy a bundle now and save money once costs climb. A law signed in December will tie the rate to the consumer price index, which could lead to annual rate hikes.

Former CA Inc. CEO to pay \$52M in fraud case

NEW YORK — A judge has signed off on a restitution agreement requiring the former chief executive of Computer Associates International Inc. to pay at least \$52 million — including proceeds from the sale of his yacht and pair of Ferraris — to victims of a huge accounting fraud at one of the world's largest software companies. U.S. District Judge Leo Glasser approved the deal on Friday following a brief hearing in Brooklyn at which a special master overseeing a restitution fund announced that tens of thousands of people who lost money in the company would recover only a small fraction of their investments. The agreement with Sanjay Kumar, who was sentenced to 12 years in prison in November for his role in the scandal, would theoretically make him liable for as much as \$798.6 million in payments to

ment payments of \$40 million, \$10 million and \$2 million by December of 2008, then pay 20 percent of his annual income once he is released from prison. Those payments would continue for the rest of his life. Kumar, 45, will be forced to sell off his stock portfolio, a 57-foot yacht in Naples, Fla., and four Ferraris, including the yellow one. But his family will keep his estate in Upper Brookville, on Long Island. The agreement "allows his family to live reasonably well," said Kumar's attorney, Lawrence McMichael. "That's fair. They didn't commit a crime." Kumar, who attended the hearing, left court without speaking to reporters. He must report to prison on Aug. 14. The \$52 million will go into a restitution fund that currently totals \$235 million, said the special master, Kenneth Feinberg. The roughly 35,000 investors who are eligible for restitution will recover, only

about 2.3 percent of their loss, he said. The judge acknowledged that many investors would be disappointed with the payout. "But that's the nature of the beast," he said. Kumar pleaded guilty a year ago to obstruction of justice and securities fraud in connection with his actions at the company, which since "has become known as CA Inc." Prosecutors said Kumar plotted to report more than \$2 billion in false revenue between 1999 and 2003, and was the architect of an elaborate fraud and cover up that included backdating contracts, lying under oath, and trying to buy the silence of a potential witness. As part of the deal, the government agreed not to pursue certain assets held by Kumar's relatives. It also waived an \$8 million fine that was imposed at sentencing, with the intent of making more money available to fraud victims.

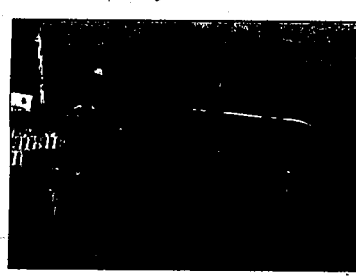

Underwater turbines use the tide to produce electricity in NYC

NEW YORK (AP) — The murky rivers around New York City bring to mind many things — garbage, chemicals, perhaps mobsters' bodies. Clean energy is not one of them.
But the state is trying to change that thinking. It is teaming up with a Virginia company to use the East River in a tidal stream in renewable energy. Six giant turbines are being placed underwater in a \$7 million project to harness the energy of the tides and produce electricity.
One of the 16-foot-diameter, windmill-like turbines is already operating, supplying power to a grocery store and a garage on Roosevelt Island. The other turbines are being installed over the next two weeks.
"We're looking for the most cost-effective way to get the most energy out of moving water while having a positive impact on the environment," said Verdant Power President Trey Taylor.
Hydroelectric and wind power operate on similar principles, with water or air turning turbines. But those projects require dams or windmills, which can be costly, intrusive and objectionable to environmentalists.
Project organizers say this is the first time the underwater-turbine concept has been used in the U.S.
"We picked New York on purpose, because the regulations are so strict, and because the East River is a tidal strait, there is a high current," Taylor said. "You know what they say about New York: If you can make it here..."
The project is now entering an 18-month testing phase. Its backers hope to expand use of the technology in New York if it works out.
One downside is that the river sometimes moves too slowly.
"On average, the turbines rotate enough to generate electricity only about 77 percent of the time.
At full capacity, the 10-megawatt project could power 10,000 homes.

Abstinence students no more likely to abstain from sex, study indicates

WASHINGTON (AP) — Students who took part in sexual abstinence programs were just as likely to have sex as those who did not according to a study ordered by Congress.
Also, those who attended one of the four abstinence classes that were reviewed reported having similar numbers of sexual partners as those who did not attend the classes. And they first had sex at about the same age as other students — 14.9 years, according to Mathematica Policy Research Inc.
The federal government now spends about \$176 million annually on abstinence-only marriage education. Critics have repeatedly said they don't believe the programs are working, and the study will give them reinforcement.
However, Bush administration officials cautioned against drawing sweeping conclusions from the study. They said the four programs reviewed — from several hundred across the nation — were some of the very first established after Congress overhauled the nation's welfare laws in 1996.
Officials said one lesson they learned from the study is that the abstinence message should be reinforced in subsequent years to truly affect behavior.
"This report confirms that these interventions are not like vaccines. You can't expect one dose in middle school, or a small dose, to be protective all throughout the youth's high school career," said Harry Wilson, the commissioner of the Family and Youth Services Bureau at the Administration for Children and Families.
For its study, Mathematica

looked at students in four abstinence programs around the country as well as students from the same communities who did not participate in the abstinence programs. The 2,057 youths came from big cities — Miami and Milwaukee — as well as rural communities — Plover, Wis., and Clarksville, Miss.
The students who participated in abstinence education did so for one to three years. Their average age was 11 to 12 when they entered the programs back in 1999.
Mathematica then did a follow-up survey in late 2005 and early 2006. By that time, the average age for participants was about 16.5. Mathematica found that about half of the abstinence students and about half from the control group reported that they remained abstinent.

Injured governor apparently was not wearing seat belt

CAMDEN, N.J. (AP) — Gov. Jon S. Corzine was apparently riding without a seat belt, in violation of state law, when he was critically injured in the crash of his official vehicle, a spokesman said Friday.
A state trooper was at the wheel and the governor was sitting as usual in the front

passenger seat when the SUV slammed into a guard rail Thursday night, authorities said. Corzine broke a leg, his breastbone, 12 ribs and a vertebra.
Corzine, 60, was sedated and on a breathing tube, and a doctor who helped treat him said the governor was fortunate he was not more seriously hurt.
"Here's no way to tell specifically how close he came to more severe injuries, but based on pictures I've seen of the crash, I think he's lucky," said Dr. Steven E. Ross, trauma chief at Cooper University Hospital.

He demanded access to the safe, but she said she didn't have the keys.
He told her to empty the cash register into a bag. He

then pulled up a stool for her to sit down and told her he was doing this because no one would hire him and he had bills to pay.
She started hyperventilating and pleaded with the gunman for help.
"I have heart trouble. Help me," Parker said.
"I'm sorry, ma'am," the gunman replied.
"I have heart trouble," Parker told him.
"Ma'am, it's going to be all right," the gunman said.
"I'm probably going to have a heart attack," Parker said.

We may be witnessing a church's schism

The Anglican Communion came into being because of the Episcopal Church and might soon expel that same church from its membership. The issues, then and now, concern freedom, promise and human dignity. The Episcopal Church was right to be responsible for the start of the communion and, if necessary, right to leave.

The communion is a spiritual consortium of independent national churches that once were part of the Church of England and the British Empire. Today, more than 75 million people from 38 provinces make up what is the third-largest Christian organization after the Roman Catholic and Orthodox churches.

It began shortly after American independence. The Church of England in this country said daily prayers for the king. That practice could not long survive the shot heard "round the world." The church in America soon declared itself independent.

But that new church needed bishops ordained by other bishops. The first bishop in America, Samuel Seabury, was ordained by the Episcopal Church of Scotland, which would do anything to embarrass the Church of England.

Soon, the English church agreed to ordain bishops for this first independent church beyond the British Isles. That gave birth to what has become the Anglican Communion. As the British Empire broke into independent countries, the communion grew with newly independent churches that were once part of the empire.

Today, conservative bishops of member churches in Africa that dominate the communion threaten to expel the Episcopal Church. They reject the American church for its recognition and ministry to homosexuals. The ordination in 2003 of a gay man, Gene Robinson, to be a bishop was the last straw for many Anglican Communion leaders.

They met recently in Tanzania and gave the Episcopal Church until Sept. 30 to repent its actions and turn its back on homosexuals. The Most Rev. Katharine Jefferts Schori, the presiding bishop of the Episcopal Church, is leaning toward giving in to the demands "for a season" until the rest of the communion catches up with the Gospel. Prejudice and ignorance could stall that for generations.

It would be extraordinarily painful if the Episcopal Church had to leave the communion that it caused to come into being.

Still, the imperative of the Gospel to love one another and embrace the outcast among us may make that necessary.

Growing a church

Things are changing for Twin Falls' Orthodox Christians

TWIN FALLS — St. Ignatius of Antioch Orthodox Church has a new priest — and soon, perhaps, a new look.

The Rev. Mark Hieromonk, formerly the assistant pastor, has succeeded the Rev. Patrick O'Grady as priest of the 50-member parish. O'Grady took a position at an Orthodox church in California.

And there are tentative plans to remodel the Addison Avenue East facility, which the Orthodox congregation bought 13 years ago. With a parsonage that sits near the front of the property and a small temple that's located to the rear, only a sign out front identifies it as a church.

While the appearance of the setting is immaculate, "it's not recognizable," said Karen Hefner, a long-time member of the congregation. Building a new church isn't an option right now.

Hence, "the changes are necessary," said Hefner, whose father, Benjamin Roberts, helped establish the church at its present location.

"We've looked at property," she said, but the consensus is to work with what's there.

"It's the best way to go," Hefner said.

Tentative plans include remodeling parts of the temple's interior, but the more noticeable changes will be to the exterior of the parsonage. The project will bring the two buildings together, with a new facade that takes on "a more Orthodox look," Father Mark said.

The hope is that the makeover will benefit both the congregation and the community.

"The community is moving forward," he said, and to keep pace the

About the Antiochian Archdiocese

After the Bolshevik Revolution threw the Russian Orthodox Church and its adherents abroad into chaos, Orthodox Arabs in North America — simultaneously shaken by the death of their bishop St. Raphael — chose to join the Patriarchate of Antioch, based in Damascus, Syria. Because of internal conflicts, Antiochian Orthodox Christians were divided between two archdioceses — New York and Toledo, Ohio.

In 1978 the two archdioceses were united as the Antiochian Orthodox Christian Archdiocese of North America, now with its headquarters in Englewood, N.J. Since then it has grown through conversion of other American Christians and emigration of Orthodox Arabs from the Middle East to the United States and Canada.

The Antiochian Archdiocese is the third-largest Orthodox Christian "jurisdiction" in North America, with an estimated 41,840 full members and 83,700 adherents.

In 2003, the Holy Synod of the Antiochian Orthodox Church granted the archdiocese's request for autonomy to allow it to better govern itself, improve and increase its outreach efforts, internally organize itself into several dioceses, and progress further on the road to the administrative unity of the Orthodox Church in the Americas.

There are three Antiochian parishes in Idaho — in Twin Falls, Boise and Post Falls. They come under the jurisdiction of the Lynnwood, Wash.-based Pacific Northwest Deanery, which is part of the Diocese of Los Angeles and the West.

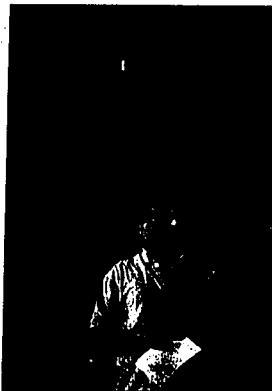

Testosterone teachings

Men-only church meets in gym

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. — No hymnals. No pews. No steeple. No stained glass windows. And no women.

The Church for Men flips around the look and feel of worship and its leader says that's a good thing — guys are "bored still" in many churches today.

"We try to make it interesting for them. We meet in a gym and we talk about issues that mess men up," said 46-year-old Mike Ellis, the church's founder.

The Church For Men meets one Saturday evening a month, drawing about 70

guys dressed in everything but straight-faced shirts and neckties. The service features a rock band, a shot clock to time the preacher's message and a one-hour in-and-out guarantee.

Ellis' church is part of a national movement to reverse a long-standing problem. Studies show that men are less likely than women to show up on Sunday mornings, and now churches around the country are reaching out to men, teaching theology with a twist of testosterone in the presentation.

One study found that the average U.S. adult church

congregation is 61 percent female, said David Morrow, author of "Why Men Hate Going To Church." The research shows women are more likely to attend church, Sunday school and small church groups.

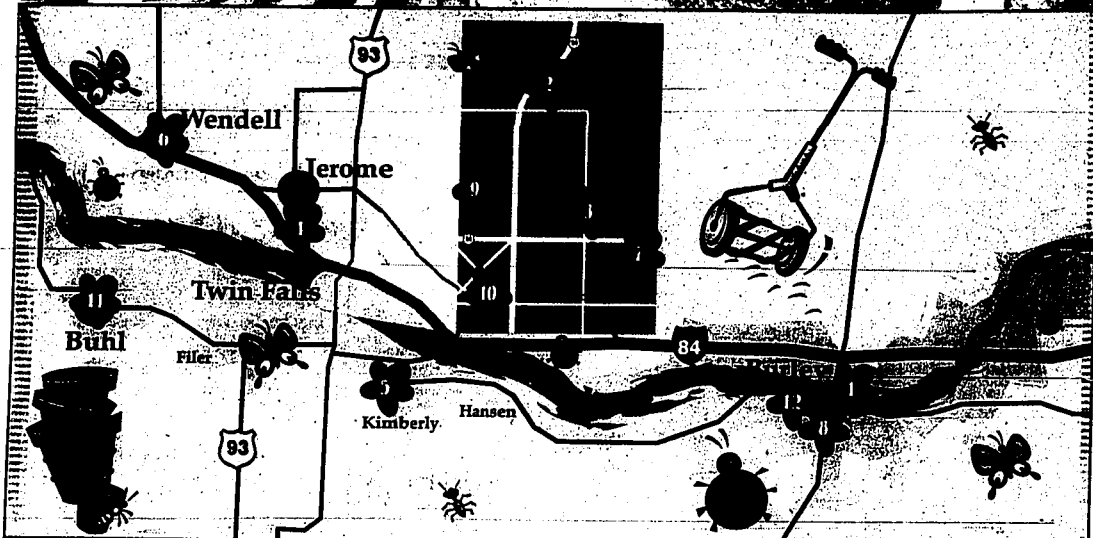
"Going to church is perceived as womanly behavior," said Morrow, who is based in Anchorage, Alaska, and travels the country lecturing about the issue. "We don't go to church for the same reason we don't wear pink."

When this deal was first reported, the accompanying comment was that Gunnar Hallberg's greatest pleasure in life came from deception. The suggestion was that if he shakes hands with you, remember to count your fingers afterwards and check to see that you still have your watch.

On this deal from the Sillodur Open Pair in Dallas last year, Hallberg opened one spade and played three. Since South had not had the opportunity to rebid his suit, he had given away very little about his hand.

The opening lead was a top club, East contributing the nine ten upstake-down signal to discourage the suit. As Hallberg played the jack, not so deceptive, you say? Well, when the defense shifted to a heart, Hallberg took East's queen.

Naturally, West assumed declarer had only two clubs, so there was no need to cash out. When he played second heart, Hallberg took the jack, ruffed a club, pitched a diamond up and rebid the ace, and claimed nine tricks for a great matchpoint score.

If many tables South played two or three spades on a top-club lead and heart suit. When declarer took an early spade trick, West could work out to win his spade queen and could see there was no future in either club or heart. So he could guess to shift to the diamond queen, and now three rounds of diamonds would create a trump promotion to hold South to seven tricks.

ANSWER: You have too much to bid with three spades, too little to bid four spades. Compromise by doubling for takeout, then correcting a three-heart response to three spades, or passing a three-spade bid. In most auctions, doubling, then bidding partner's suit, suggests a better hand than raising directly.
