## Parents complained about bus driver before bomb threat

**FILER** — Some parents described Albert Armstrong, the bus driver accused of calling in a bomb threat to the Filer School District on Thursday morning, as a strange man who never spoke with parents but frequently threat-

ened students.

They said Armstrong, 34, always wore a baseball cap low over his eyes, which were usually covered with dark sunglasses.

"My kids would come home and tell me that he would be a screaming terror," said Daniel Lyons, whose three children rode the school bus driven by Albert Armstrong. "There were parents who even filed complaints about him because he would terrify the kids so much."

## Gunman kills hostage, then himself at Johnson Space Center office building

**HOUSTON** — A NASA contract worker took a handgun inside an office building Friday at the Johnson Space Center and fatally shot a hostage before killing himself, police said. A second hostage escaped with minor injuries. The gunman, William Phillips, 60, was able to take a snub-nosed revolver past

NASA security and barricade himself in the building, which houses communications and tracking systems for the space shuttle, authorities said.

NASA spokesman Doug Peterson said the agency would review its security.

"Any organization would take a good, hard look at the kind of review process we have with people," Peterson said.

To enter the space center, workers flash an ID badge as

they drive past a security guard. The badge allows workers access to designated buildings.

NASA identified the slain hostage as David Beverly, a civil servant who worked at the agency. Beverly, who was shot in the chest, was probably killed "in the early minutes of the whole ordeal," police said. A second hostage, identified

## More and more parents crossing the line when helping with homework

**WASHINGTON** — Joe knew just what to do when his daughter, who was studying Roman history, came home with an assignment to build a catapult. He ordered a catapult kit from the Internet and put it together himself.

The task, he was sure, was not in his 12-year-old daughter's skill set, and he wanted to give her a hand. His effort earned a D, said Joe, who asked that his last name not be used to avoid antagonizing officials at his daughter's Montgomery County, Md., school.

His daughter's overall grade suffered from Joe's D. But what most annoyed him about the project he called "stilly" was that other catapults — clearly built by parents with more

expensive kits — got higher grades.

"It was obvious parents made them all," he said.

The episode underscores a growing tension over how much parental involvement in daily homework and projects is appropriate and who is to blame when parents cross the line.

Educators say that the correct level of involvement depends on the child and his or her developmental stage but that some parents are so competitive that they go overboard.

"You sometimes run across parents who are what I call Machiavellian parents who are trying to justify the ends any way they can," said Dan Kent, a social studies teacher at Broad Run High School in

# Sentenced for murder

## Convicted of shotgun slaying, Pina not eligible for parole before 2035

**TWIN FALLS** — A man convicted of first-degree murder in the Nov. 29, 2005, sawed-off shotgun slaying of Jesse Naranjo was sentenced at noon Friday to spend 30 years to life in prison.

Juan Carlos Fuentes Pina, 33, who the judge classified as "short-fused," "his own worst enemy," and "a serial violent offender" hardly batted an eye as he was read his sentence and guards escorted him from Courtroom One into the jail.

A district judge listened to Twin Falls County prosecuting Attorney Grant Loeb's recite Pina's long history of violence, which occupied the body of Loeb's argument. Fifth District Judge G. Richard Bevan agreed with Loeb that there was no mitigating evidence — justification for reducing Pina's punishment — and chose "to come down on the side of

protection of society" rather than rehabilitation.

"You are a person with a very, very short fuse," said Bevan, discussing Pina's explosions of violence threats made to witnesses in his case. "This was not a crime of passion. It was a

crime of intimidation in the drug culture."

A jury convicted Pina for kidnapping Naranjo, which led to Naranjo getting shot as he tried to escape Johnny A. Shores, the trigger man, pleaded guilty to voluntary

 Parents reported that Armstrong would frequently yell at students and threaten to leave them on the side of the road.  
 But the Lyon family was shocked when he actually carried through with the threat. "The temperatures were in the low-teens and he decided to leave my son at the school because he was running late," said Deena Lyons. "He didn't call the school or the dispatch office — he just left my 11-year-old son in the freezing weather."  
 Twin Falls County Sheriff's deputies found her son an hour later trying to walk home in the snow.  
 Other parents said Armstrong simply did not know how to work with children, even though some of Armstrong's youngest riders were in kindergarten.  
 The bus company that employed Armstrong said he did pass all background checks required for his employees to drive a school bus.  
 "We're obviously trying to see what, if anything, happened in terms of the review procedures for the employee," said Tony Barnhart, CEO of Western States Bus Company. "We require state and federal background checks, as well as

other screenings, and we didn't find anything of concern in his record."  
 But when asked if the company knew about the complaints filed by parents of students who rode the bus driven by Armstrong, he said they were now noting some "issues in his file."  
 "We started looking at the files, and there could be something more than beyond what we initially look for," Barnhart said. "We are screening some things like the way he was communicating with children."  
 Western States Bus Company provides bus services for the Filer School District, as well as several other schools throughout the Magic Valley.  
 The Filer Police Department is not releasing details of the investigation, which led them to believe that Armstrong was responsible for the bomb threat.  
 Armstrong is being held on a \$100,000 bail in the Twin Falls County Jail. He will be arraigned at 8:15 a.m. April 27 at the Twin Falls County Courthouse.

 Loudoun County, Va. "There is such a push to get the kids in the best colleges that sometimes you find a parent who goes over the edge and does the work for the kids, even in high school."  
 Teachers also say parents don't always understand the lessons a child is supposed to learn from a particular project: making a collage, for example, isn't a waste of time, as some parents contend, but can promote fine-motor, classification and other skills.  
 But some parents say schools are demanding more parental involvement by giving assignments that children can't do on their own — such as math problems kids don't

have a clue how to attack — and falling to draw boundaries about what is acceptable parental involvement.  
 "I think teachers are well-intentioned, but some of the assignments are impossible for some kids to do," said Marcia Simon, a Montgomery public school parent of two, recalling one assignment in which her elementary school-age son had to design "a very lovely" restaurant menu with pictures and nutritional information about the food.  
 "For kids who like to do art projects, it is fine, but for kids for whom this is not a strength, it was torture," she said.  
 The involvement of a parent in a child's education has long

been shown to be important to student success, although research suggests that intrusive parents — especially in adolescence — can diminish developmental outcomes.

 manslaughter before testifying against Pina in his trial. Shores' sentencing is scheduled for May 3.  
 The victim's mother, Bertha Manjlo, demonstrated incredible strength when she stood up to address the court. Her words reached out to Pina's mother, sitting across from her in the courtroom.  
 "I'm not here to hate anybody," Bertha said in a quivering voice. "It is true society needs protecting. You can't undo what happened. But I want his mother to know that I don't feel hate. I know what he did. And my son did not deserve to die."  
 Pina's violent record spiked

louder than any other noise in the courtroom. It caused more damage at sentencing than anything the prosecutor said or that the defense attempted to downplay.  
 "There is a significant, if not certain, threat you'll commit more crimes," Hevan said.  
 Pina will not become eligible for parole until 2035. But his attorney Andrew Barnes said normally parole boards do not release first-degree murderers as soon as they become eligible.

 by NASA as Fran Crenshaw, escaped after being bound to a chair with duct tape, police Capt. Dwayne Healy said.  
 The gunman, an employee of Jacobs Engineering of Pasadena, Calif., shot himself once in the head more than three hours after the standoff began, police said. Initial reports indicated two shots were fired about 1:40 p.m. and another shot was heard about 5 p.m.  
 None of the people involved was immediately identified.

John Prosser, executive vice president of Jacobs Engineering, confirmed that the gunman was a company employee but declined to release any information about him.  
 Police said homicide investigators searched the gunman's house where he lived alone and found no guns or any evidence at all about the shooting. Mike Coats, the director of the Johnson Space Center, said Phillips had worked for NASA for 12 to 13 years and "up until recently, he has been a good employee."

Classes resume at Lewis-Clark State after threat

LEWISTON (AP) — A Lewis-Clark State College student was arrested Friday morning without incident after he allegedly threatened to shoot people in the school building during the brief closure of the college and all public schools in town, police said.

The 18-year-old student had told others he planned to

climb the college's clock tower and shoot people with a rifle to mark the eighth anniversary of the Columbine massacre, police Sgt. Don Blair said. Blair said the student would give Lewiston "its own little Columbine," Blair said.

Police kept the student's dorm room under surveillance and he was arrested while

heading there around 7 a.m., Blair said. Blair could not say whether the student was armed.

The threats prompted the shutdown of Lewis-Clark State, which has about 3,500 students, plus Lewiston High School and other public schools in the city of 30,000, Blair said.

Classes resumed at 10 a.m. at Lewis-Clark State and at city schools, officials said.

"It's hard to tell if it was a serious threat," college spokesman Bert Salberg said. "With this being the anniversary of Columbine, and look what happened at Virginia Tech, you really do have to take that into consideration and

put safety first."

The man, identified by police as Richard Sonnen, had allegedly made similar threats in other places he has lived, and the threat was taken seriously, Blair said.

In southwest Idaho, two schools were locked down Wednesday morning amid concerns caused by a parent

who attended a school board meeting the previous evening.

According to police, the parent wore a T-shirt with references to school shootings that read: "Columbine, Amish and Shadow Butte." Shadow Butte Elementary was one of the schools locked down Wednesday. Police said no arrests had been made.

Utah colleges have questions about 'roommates without guns' law

SALT LAKE CITY — Stephanie Espinoza is like a lot of college students across the country concerned about campus safety after a gunman killed 32 people at Virginia Tech earlier this week.

"You're not safe anywhere anymore," said Espinoza, a University of Utah freshman from Los Angeles. She fears that's especially true in Utah, where concealed weapons are allowed on public university campuses.

A state law that allows students to request a roommate who does not have a concealed weapon permit won't take effect until April 30, long after most students have already filled out their dormitory applications for the fall semester.

"Most people already have done their housing applications. It's very hard to get a room this time of year," she said. "Of course I would have asked" for a roommate who does not carry guns.

Guns used to be banned at the University of Utah, which has about 2,300 students living on the Salt Lake City campus. But last year, the state Supreme Court decided that campus policy could not run counter to state law, which allows people to carry firearms with a permit.

The legislature agreed to soften its stance this year by allowing students to request a roommate who does not have a concealed weapon permit, but school officials through-

out the state say they're not sure they could identify students who have permits.

"People who have concealed weapons aren't under any obligation to let us know if they have one. The question is a moot one," said Dallin Young, resident life director at Dixie State College in St. George.

At Utah State University, where about 2,500 students live on the Logan campus, nobody has submitted a written request not to have a roommate with a concealed weapon permit, said housing director Steve Jensen. He said there's also been no discussion of adding a question to housing applications that would clearly identify a weapon-free room as an option.

However, at the University of Utah school officials say they'll update their online housing application questions soon as they hear from their legal counsel how they can identify students with concealed weapons permits.

"At whatever point we receive the recommendations, we can alert students that a new question has been added and encourage them to go back online," said Barb Rensburg, associate director of housing. "It'll be interesting, I would say that given the Virginia Tech crisis, I don't know if it's on the top of a lot of people's minds."

That includes students like Claire Ratcliffe, a 19-year-old freshman from Lancaster, Pa., who would prefer no guns

were allowed on campus and is frustrated a question about concealed weapons permits isn't on housing applications already.

"I think they need to put that up right now," she said. "Students deserve that option."

Even some proponents of concealed weapons on campus agree, such as Austin Gray, a freshman from Layton. "I support the fact that we can have concealed weapons on campus. I think that the tragedy at Virginia Tech would have been a little bit different if they had concealed weapons," Gray said. "But I think if it's a thing you worry about you should have the right to know that (a roommate) has a concealed weapon."

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Web site: Idaho loses Capitol Hill power in Democratic shift

BOISE — Idaho voters again went an all-Republican delegation to Congress last November, leaving the state with the least political power in a newly Democratic-dominated Washington, D.C., according to a Web site that tracks the annual wax and wane of Capitol Hill muscle.

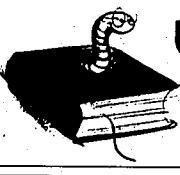
U.S. Sen. Larry Craig and Mike Crapo, with Reps. Mike Simpson and Bill Sali, are ranked dead last among all state delegations, Congress.org said this month. Its power rankings criteria include tenure and committee assignments, as well as indirect influence and legislation passed.

Idaho's delegation downplayed the study, calling it an interesting exercise for "political wonks" but of little value in judging effectiveness. Still, congressional observers say it stands to reason Idaho has lost ground.

"When the Republicans are in charge, Idaho is in clover," said Larry Sabato, director of the University of Virginia's Center for Politics. "When the Democrats are in charge, it's a poverty zone."

With Craig considering retirement in 2008 after three terms in the Senate, Idaho's power could wane further. Sabato said Craig ranks 61st out of 100 U.S. senators, down from 47th in 2006, according to the site. Crapo is 66th, down from 59th, while Simpson slipped to 31st from 68th. Sali, Idaho's freshman conservative firebrand, ranked 423rd, out of 435.

Neighboring states with Democratic delegations fared better.

# VT shooter's family feels 'hopeless, helpless and lost'

BLACKSBURG, Va. — The family of Virginia Tech gunman Seung-Hui Cho told The Associated Press on Friday that they feel "hopeless, helpless and lost," and "never could have envisioned that he was capable of so much violence."

"He has made the world weep. We are living a nightmare," said a statement issued by Cho's sister, Sun-Kyung Cho, on the family's behalf. It was the Chos' first public comment since the 23-year-old student killed 32 people and committed suicide Monday in the deadliest shooting rampage in modern U.S. history.

Raleigh, N.C., lawyer Wade Smith provided the statement to the AP after the Cho family reached out to him. Smith said the family would not answer any questions, and neither would he.

"Our family is so very sorry for my brother's unspeakable actions. It is a terrible tragedy for all of us," said Sun-Kyung Cho, a 2004 Princeton University graduate who works as a contractor for a State

Department office that oversees American aid for Iraq.

"We pray for their families and loved ones who are experiencing so much excruciating grief. And we pray for those who were injured and for those whose lives are changed forever because of what they witnessed and experienced," she said. "Each of these people had so much love, talent and gifts to offer, and their lives were cut short by a horrible and senseless act."

The Chos' whereabouts are unclear. But Virginia State Police said they are under law enforcement protection.

The statement was issued during a statewide day of mourning for the victims. Silence fell across the Virginia Tech campus at noon and bells tolled in churches nationwide in memory of the victims.

"We are humbled by this darkness. We feel hopeless,

helpless and lost. This is someone that I grew up with and loved. Now I feel like I didn't know this person." Cho's sister said. "We have always been a close, peaceful and loving family. My brother was quiet and reserved, yet struggled to fit in. We never could have envisioned that he was capable of so much violence."

She said her family will cooperate fully and "do whatever we can to help authorities understand why these senseless acts happened. We have many unanswered questions as well."

Wendy Adams, whose niece, Leslie Sherman, was killed in the massacre, said of the family's statement: "I'm not so generous to be able to forgive him for what he did. But I do feel for the family. I do feel sorry for them."

Bodies of two miners found in collapse

BARTON — Workers found the bodies of two miners Friday trapped when a wall section collapsed in an open-pit coal mine in western Maryland, a federal mine official said.

One body was found in a backhoe the man had been operating Tuesday when the two were buried beneath at least 45 feet of debris, said Bob Cornett, acting regional director for the federal Mine Safety and Health Administration. The second body was found inside a bulldozer a few hours later, he said.

Cornett said the men appeared to have died instantly. "With the extensive damage I saw on the equipment, I don't think that we worried whether they suffocated to death," he said.

Many Social Security numbers put on Web

WASHINGTON — The Social Security numbers of up to 150,000 people who received Agriculture Department grants have been posted on a government Web site since 1996, but were taken down last week.

Free credit monitoring is being offered to those affected.

The security breach was only noticed last week and promptly closed, the Agriculture Department and Census Bureau announced Friday.

But a study has begun to see if 32 other federal agencies may have followed the same practice. The Agriculture data that included Social Security numbers were removed from the Web on April 13 and similar data from 32 other agencies were taken down April 17 as a precaution, said Agriculture spokeswoman Terri Teuber.

Governor breathing without ventilator

CAMDEN — Gov. Jon S. Corzine was breathing on his own again Friday after doctors removed a breathing tube he'd been using since he was critically injured in an April 12 high-speed crash, his spokesman said.

Doctors removed the breathing tube shortly before 12:30 p.m. Friday, spokesman Anthony Coley said.

Breathing unassisted moves Corzine closer to having his condition upgraded. He has been listed as critical but stable since he was brought to Cooper University Hospital last week.

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# Hart finally gets around to tax season

JEERS to state Rep. Phil Hart. It's about a seven-year standoff on his personal income taxes.

Think you had trouble with the Internal Revenue Service this week? He grateful you're not in Hart's shoes. Estimates show the lawmakers owes nearly \$90,000 in back taxes, penalties and interest.

Not that it's bothered him in the past. Hart stopped paying income tax in 1996 after filing a lawsuit against the IRS challenging the federal income tax system as an unconstitutional application of the 16th Amendment, which gives Congress power to collect income tax. After the Supreme Court in 2003 rejected his petition to consider an appeal, Hart started paying income taxes and the IRS debt.

Except when he ran for the Legislature in 2004. Hart conveniently didn't mention his fiscal proclivities. Hart said he reached an agreement this week before he was to make a court appearance. Part of the agree-

ment is to divulge the number of charity books he has sold, and the sales of Liberty Dollars, which are illegal as currency.

The fitting title to one of Hart's books: "Constitutional Income: Do You Have Any?"

CHEERS to Twin Falls County and the Safe House expansion for foster care.

The county is building upon the success of its first Safe House on Sixth Avenue North in Twin Falls, with a new renovation for a second non-profit group home — this one for those Street in Twin Falls.

The homes are situated for struggling issues and the second house will allow them to be gender specific. The proposal for the new house goes before Twin Falls Planning and Zoning Commission on Tuesday for a special-use permit.

Today's Safe House has been consistently full for eight straight months. Teens and families have stayed as long



as six months. The environment allows them to find structure and counseling that isn't found in other taverns, and certainly not in youth detention.

JEERS to the Dietrich School District, for telling an unnecessary gag order on educators.

Administrators and school board members sent a letter last week to teachers, telling them to "Stop, cease and desist from discussing board decisions in and around the school during school hours."

Officials said the main concerns were that teachers would speak criti-

cally of the board in front of the students. The district also has also adopted a school policy that prohibits "partisan or political activity during school hours."

But the catalyst for this uneasy-handled policy appears to be a unsettled contract dispute regarding two teachers. Dietrich is a small community and the closeness is quite prevalent in the school as well. Still, the ban on discussing school board decisions at all staff levels exceeds the decorum of professional limits.

CHEERS to Shoshone High School's Valerie Pantone, the school's first state rep for Idaho State FFA in over 20 years.

To be chosen a state officer for FFA is an honor in itself, but it's been a rare accolade at the small Lincoln County school. The last state FFA rep from the school was in 1985.

In addition to being a state representative, Pantone will travel throughout the United States as one of 16 rep-

resentatives for the state club. "With all the talents she has, I'm sure she will have plenty of opportunities in the future," said her advisor Brand Lewis.

JEERS to Micron Chief Executive Officer Steve Appleton, for a thinly veiled insult to Idaho workers. Appleton is quoted in the current edition of *Business Week* magazine saying the company has no real obligation or need to expand in Idaho or the U.S.

"I don't have to hire one more person in the U.S. I don't have to invest one more dollar here — and we'll be just fine," he said in the April 23 edition.

That's just one quote from a story that details U.S. companies that are cutting their domestic operations. So it's hard to tell what the entire tenor of Appleton's approach really is. The quote, however, appears to be an obtuse comment considering the state's loss of another corporate giant in Albertsons.

### Gooding students deserve full programs

With good reason, many citizens in Gooding are questioning the supplemental levy that will be voted on Tuesday, April 24.

Specifically, our budget deficit began in the 2005-2006 school year. It was apparent that the district was spending more than it was receiving via state reimbursements. In the 2005-2006 school year, the budget deficit was \$357,000. That is not a small amount by any means.

Why then, has the district waited until now to address the problem? Why did the board not act a year ago and curb expenses? Why didn't the board start evaluating programs and other budget items? Why didn't the board address this problem with the community back then?

A better system needs to be in place to oversee the actions of the school board. I challenge the board to be more transparent and visible in its actions and decisions. A committee of community stakeholders needs to be established to evaluate our district's budget, programs, technology expenses and facility building needs. The board needs to actively look for ways to balance the budget without resorting to a supplemental levy.

A credible administration with a proven track record of skilled and successful fiscal budgeting, along with interested community members should be in place to advise the board.

Einstein's views on the evolution-creation debate ("Einstein & Faith," Time, April 17, 2007).

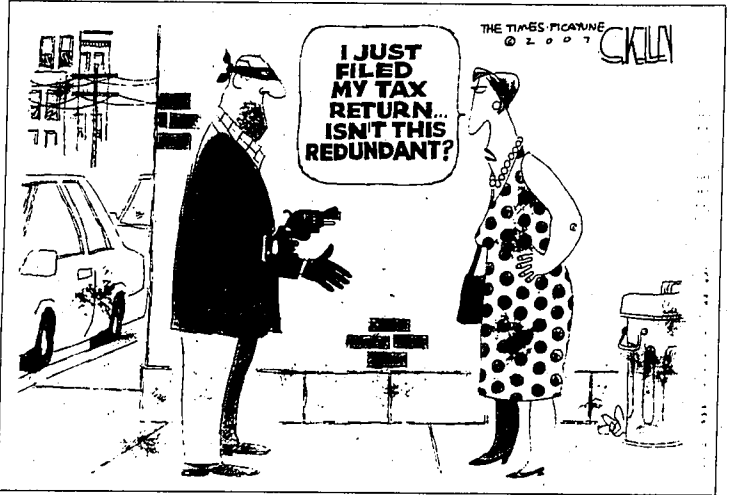

## Cupid and Cupidity at the World Bank

There have been many tender love stories in war. Ike and Kay, Pamela Harriman and Edward R. Murrow, Aeneas and Dido, Achilles and his tent temptation, Patroclus. But my favorite is the unfolding saga of Wolfe and Shaha. Never has a star-crossed romance so perfectly illuminated a star-crossed conflict.

The weekend meetings of the World Bank and the International Monetary Fund were consumed with the question of how the bank chief could fight corruption while indulging in cronyism. Who could focus on a weak yen when you had a weak yen Wolfe with a strong yen for Shaha?

In addition to the story about Paul Wolfowitz's giving his girlfriend, Shaha Ali Riza, a promotion and a \$60,000 raise because he felt guilty that she had to be transferred from the World Bank to the State Department when it took over. The *New York Times* reported on Tuesday on more imperialist banky-panky.

Steven Weisman and David Sanger wrote that in 2003, when Wolfe was No. 2 at the Pentagon, the office of his consigliere, Douglas Feith, directed a private contractor to hire Riza, then at the World Bank, to spend a month traveling in Iraq to study ways to set up the new government.

(It was simple to get the contractor, the Science Applications International Corp., to play along.)

As Vanity Fair reported, the Pentagon awarded SAIC seven contracts valued at more than \$100 million before the war, without com-

petitive bidding. Feith's deputy was Christopher Henry, a former SAIC senior vice president.)

Wolfe and Shaha did not let a little thing like World Bank rules — which barred the bank from providing economic assistance to an area under military occupation — keep them from pushing the neocron delusions.

When she returned, Riza briefed members of the executive board of the World Bank on her trip, giving them a sanguine account of Iraq's future and the fate of women there.

"The bank was under a lot of pressure at the time to do something in Iraq very quickly," Jean-Louis Sarbib, a former bank vice president for the Middle East and North Africa, told *The New York Times*.

But some of the bank's directors, he said, were "very concerned about why she was briefing the board, under which authority and with whom she had gone there. I did not know anything about this at the time, and I was the vice president, and she was reporting to me."

The president has backed him up.

Astonishingly, W. Wolfe, Dick Cheney and the Prince of Darkness himself, Richard Perle, have learned nothing from their mistakes of blindness and hubris, except to sweep them under the bed and indulge in more blindness and hubris.

In a chapter shown on Tuesday night of the PBS series "America at a Crossroads," Perle chatted with Pat Buchanan, his old colleague from the Reagan administration, arguing that America should ignore naysayers and work for regime change in Iran.

There's got to be some advantage to being a superpower," Perle said grandly.

Asked by Bob Schieffer on "Face the Nation" on Sunday whether the administration had a credibility problem,

given the problems with Alberto Gonzales, the optimistic statements about the death spiral in Iraq and the perjury conviction of Scooter Libby, the vice president replied, "You do the best you can with what you've got, obviously," an echo of Rummy's famous "You go to war with the Army you have."

In America last week to promote a book about the occupation of Iraq, Ayad Al-Alawi, Iraq's former prime minister and failed U.S. puppet, told a group at the Council on Foreign Relations that the Bush administration had caused an "imagined" country.

The Financial Times reported Alawi as saying that "the Iraqi exiles who advised the U.S. war planners described the country of their memories. Sadly, the Iraq with a solid infrastructure, a solid middle class and a secular tradition had ended decades ago."

Shouldn't Rummy and Cheney have followed their own advice: You go to war against the country you have, not the one you imagine?

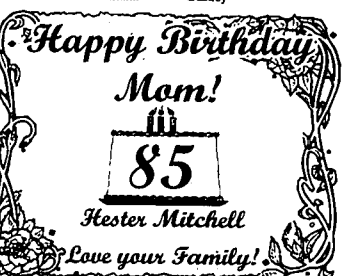

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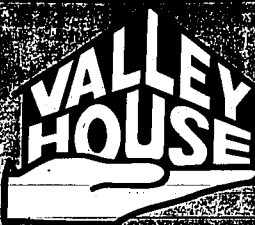

Leigh Steinberg calls concussions 'a ticking time bomb' at summit

MARINA DEL REY, Calif. (AP) — An estimated 350,000 athletes endure some kind of head injury while playing sports every year in the United States, and that's only counting the ones who lose consciousness after impact.

Counting the rest of the dings, plings and "rung bells" that result in concussions, the total could be as high as 3.8 million.

That's why concussions are, in the words of agent Leigh Steinberg, a health epidemic, the consequences of which are a ticking time bomb that may not be seen in their totality for 10, 15 or 20 years.

Steinberg and NFL Hall of Fame quarterback Warren Moon, who suffered the first of his half-dozen concussions at age 11, headlined a summit Friday designed to draw attention to the growing problem of concussions in sports.

It's a problem most widely recognized in the NFL, where the suicide of former defensive back Andre Waters and the story of former Patriots linebacker Ted Johnson's hurried return to the field made recent headlines.

But the issue has repercussions in almost every sport, at almost every level. "A lot of parents aren't aware of what concussions are and what the severity is," Moon said. "My first concussion didn't necessarily come from a collision. It came from my head slamming against the infield where we practiced on a baseball diamond."

"What are the stakes? It's one thing to go out and play football and understand that when you turn 40, you can bend over to pick up your child and have aches and pains. It's another thing to bend down and not be able to identify that child."

One study showed that athletes are six times more likely to suffer a second concussion if they return within a week of the first one. A client of Steinberg's, former 49ers quarterback Steve Young, retired after precisely that kind of quick return and repeat injury.

Other studies showed that in cases where athletes had three or more concussions over their lifetime, they were five times more at risk for early onset Alzheimer's disease, three times more at risk of significant memory loss and four times more likely to have severely elevated depression.

The NFL and the NFL Players Association have done some things to lessen the impact of head injuries — most notably with rules changes and the gradual elimination of Astroturf as a playing surface. They're looking at changes in helmets and mouthpieces to lessen the severity of hits to the head.

Steinberg some day also would like to see neurologists present on every NFL sideline and more effective use of baseline tests that establish players' capabilities before they get injured and can be used as good markers for the tests they take after concussions.

Not as easily changed is the football player mentality. From a young age, they're taught to play in pain, to sacrifice their bodies, to stay on the field and to make their coaches happy.

"Most athletes are in a state of denial," Steinberg said. "They're taught to ignore pain."

He hopes some of the most recent studies will lead NFL management to conclude that rushing players back isn't in anyone's best interest. After all, is getting a player back for one week worth risking him for the rest of the season — or his career? It's a question that has gained more traction as salaries and signing bonuses have exploded over the past decade.

Almost as difficult as changing the mind-set simply is determining what is or isn't a concussion, which would translate into determining the kind of medical attention these players receive.

To illustrate this challenge, one doctor showed two plays from a recent Oregon-Arizona college football game. One showed a player's helmet getting popped off after a particularly vicious hit made under his chin. Another showed one player knocking his teammate to the ground in a congratulatory body bump after a good defensive play.

The player in the first example walked away with a cut lip. The player in the second example had a concussion because his head banged against the turf as he received the congratulatory bump.

Virginia Tech baseball team returns to playing field for first time since massacre

BLACKSBURG, Va. (AP) — It was a small rally, yet it signaled the start of a much, much larger one.

Trailing Miami by five in the bottom of the eighth, the Virginia Tech Hokies scored three quick runs to tighten their baseball game Friday night, injecting life into a crowd desperate for it.

Tech would lose 11-9, but on a day marked by tears and mourning, prayer vigils and tolling bells, an evening at the ballpark — Virginia Tech's first sporting event since Monday's rampage by a student gunman — provided a hint of relief.

"We won before we got to the field today. The scoreboard was insignificant," Hokies coach Pete Hughes said.

"It was a bittersweet feeling playing this game," outfielder Jose Cuelto said. "It feels good to get out and get away from everything but the fact that we're getting away from that tragedy makes it hurt."

In certain moments, there was a strange sense of normalcy. A little boy played catch with his dad. Teens scrambled to scoop up foul balls. Fans shifted impatiently in the long lines to buy hot dogs and Cracker Jack.

But Friday was a day of statewide mourning, and even at the ball game, the pain from the slayings of 33 people, including 23-year-old gunman Seung-Hui Cho, was never far from the surface.

Tears spilled down the cheeks of one player from the home team as a recording of Virginia Tech professor Nikki Giovanni's poem, "We Are Virginia Tech," echoed through the stadium. Several Hokies cried as the national anthem played.

Miami players and coaches wore black wristbands in memory of the victims during the three-game series against the Hokies.

Miami head coach Jim Morris drew raucous applause when he presented a \$10,000 check on behalf of the university for the Hokie Spirit and Memorial Fund.

The rowdy crowd of more than 3,000 — five times larger than average — grew warmer as they roared to observe a 32-second moment of silence.

Clutching a sign that read "4.16.07 Never Forget" — senior Kristyn Helsler marveled at how the Hokies were able to play under the emotional circumstances.

"I think it's a symbol of moving forward and not letting this define who we are," said Helsler, 22.

Athletic director Jim Weaver echoed her sentiments. "You've either got to move forward or you move backward," Weaver said. "We think it is the beginning of the healing process."

Freshman Andrea Hacker, 19, said the game would help her see the horrific memories from Monday when she heard Cho's gunshot from a nearby building.

"Looking around, seeing the seas of orange and maroon — it's a special time today," Hacker said.

# Oden, two teammates enter NBA draft

COLUMBUS, Ohio — Greg Oden is through with school.

The 7-foot freshman center said Friday he will leave Ohio State to enter the NBA draft, where he figures to be one of the top two picks along with Texas freshman forward Ken Dumant.

Freshman teammates Mike Conley Jr. and Deaquon Cook also said they will make themselves available for the draft. Unlike Oden, they have opted not to hire an agent for now — meaning they will retain the option of returning to school in the fall.

"This is a very tough decision for me," Oden said in a statement released by Ohio State. "I love OSU and love being a Buckeye, but I also have a great opportunity to take my game to the next level and compete with the best players in the world. I've discussed this with family, friends and Coach (Thad) Matta, and I feel the time is right."

The players were not available for comment. Conley is expected to be an honorary head coach for Saturday's Scarlet vs.-Gray spring football game. Oden is out of town to attend his aunt's wedding.

At a press conference Friday afternoon, Matta said the departure of the three players, though not unexpected, would leave a hole in the program. Matta said he was proud of their accomplishments and hoped the success of players such as Oden, coupled with the team's trip to the national championship game, would lure talented recruits.

"Honestly, it's been kind of a goal of mine to have a player selected as high as Greg is going to be," Matta said. "This is a situation where we've got to handle it and continue to build."

Matta said he thinks Oden had a tough time making the decision to leave and that he told him he understands his dream to play in the NBA.

Matta said he told Oden, "I think if you did come back and everyone came back, I think we would have a chance to be one of the greatest college basketball teams ever, but that's selfish on my part."

All three players were key figures for the Buckeyes, who went 35-4 to set a mark for victories and won the Big Ten regular-season and tournament titles before advancing to the first round of the championship game since 1952, where they lost to two-time champion Florida.



Ohio State center Greg Oden said Friday that he will leave Ohio State after leading the Buckeyes to the national championship game and enter the NBA draft where he figures to be one of the top two picks.

After getting a late start at Ohio State because of a wrist injury, the 19-year-old Oden lived up to his billing as a two-time national high school player of the year, leading the Buckeyes in scoring (15.7) and rebounding (9.6) and topping the Big Ten in shooting percentage (61.6).

The 6-1 Conley, who many believed was just a throw-in for recruiting Oden, ended up setting Ohio State records with 239 assists while handling the ball almost all the time against high-pressure defenses. His assist-to-turnover ratio was among the best in the nation at 2.77, with only 86 turnovers in 39 games — a little more than two per contest.

Cook got off to a fast start for the Buckeyes, but wilted down the stretch. He was averaging more than 15 points a game midway through January before finishing at 9.8.

## Kings fire Musselman

SACRAMENTO, Calif. — The Sacramento Kings fired coach Eric Musselman on Friday after just one tumultuous season.

The Kings went 33-49 and missed the playoffs this spring after reaching the postseason eight consecutive times

under Rick Adelman.

"There is no particular joy in making this decision," said Geoff Petrie, the Kings' president of basketball operations. "However, I feel it is in the best interest of everyone going forward."

NBA committee to study Vegas proposal; no 'Plan B' for Sonics

NEW YORK — There are no plans yet for what happens if the SuperSonics leave Seattle. Las Vegas still has hopes of being the possible destination.

Las Vegas' bid of landing an NBA franchise is still alive after commissioner David Stern said Friday he will appoint a committee of owners to study the proposal. Mayor Oscar Goodman submitted about how his city would handle a team.

Stern has been opposed to playing in Las Vegas while there is gambling on the league, though he invited Goodman during All-Star weekend to make his proposal and said he would include it in the agenda during the two-day board meeting.

Goodman's letter failed to offer a compromise that would block betting on a potential Las Vegas franchise, but that has not been the case. Stern said that after subsequent discussions with city officials, the owners asked for the committee to see there could be further study "without prejudging anything."

Well, 25 races later, Gordon still doesn't know.

The four-time series champion, who leads the Cup points standings, is seeking victory No. 76 in Saturday night's Subway Fresh Fit 500 at Phoenix International Raceway. He's had five top-five finishes and six top 10s in the first seven races this season — but no wins.

And the 1-mile oval at Phoenix is one of three active NASCAR tracks where Gordon, who will start from the pole Saturday, has yet to win.

"I've been on the pole here. We've been fast here. We've been consistent here. We've been everything but in Victory Lane here," Gordon said, shaking his head and grinning.

"We're just going to work just as hard as we can — the same as we do everywhere. And I'm going to try not to make the mistake we made last week because I felt like we had a good shot at winning last week in Texas, and I blew that one."

At Texas, another track where he has yet to win, Gordon led with 21 laps to go when he scraped the wall and damaged his car's handling. He wound up fourth.

"I don't like giving up any win," Gordon said. "That one race hurt because I felt like we had a winning car."

"But, as long as this team continues to give me the race cars that they're giving me right now and the effort they're giving me, we're going to win races. And I would love it if I would coach here. I would love to finally be able to get this one checked off our list so I don't have to hear that question again."

The wild card in Saturday's race is NASCAR's new Car of Tomorrow, running for the first time on a track longer than a half mile.

Even with precision testing and this

"But I'm still not convinced of this car in traffic. I think we'll learn a lot more (Friday in practice) when we're running around other cars. And then on Saturday, too."

Gordon said his Chevrolet Impala SS-COT hasn't been the easiest car to drive.

"When I took off in practice, the car would not turn in the middle of the corner. And I didn't think we'd ever get it to turn, to be honest. So our qualifying was promising."

"But I'm still not convinced. It's just

physics. You've got a car punching a really big hole. You've got a car that has less downforce — especially front downforce. If you go behind that car, I don't see how you're going to be able to have downforce to be able to make the pass."

Kevin Harvick, who won both Cup races here last year, will start eighth Saturday and is hopeful the COT will be just as good as the Chevrolet he drove in 2006.

"The Impala SS is a lot different setup-wise than (at) Martinsville or Bristol," Harvick said. "I think people are making a bigger deal of it than they have to. Obviously, we have some kinks to work out, but I think that is the responsibility of the drivers and the teams to make the cars better and, in the end, it is safety first. That's where we started."

## Earnhardt looking for some luck on race track

AVONDALE, Ariz. (AP) — While everyone else worries about Dale Earnhardt Jr.'s future with his late father's team, he insists the present is the biggest concern.

"The Bud team has really been great this year, but people who haven't been paying much attention may not have recognized it because we've had a lot of bad luck and haven't had the finishes the entire team deserves," Earnhardt said.

Entering Saturday's Subway Fresh Fit 500 at Phoenix International Raceway, Earnhardt is 18th in the points, with two top-10 finishes in seven starts.

His contract negotiations with DEI, controlled by stepmother Teresa Earnhardt, have gotten a lot of attention this season. Right now, the most important thing is on-track performance and, hopefully, racing for his first cham-

Earnhardt had one of the strongest cars, led 96 laps and was a likely top-five finisher before slowing to avoid a spinning Tony Stewart. Earnhardt said he hit hard in the rear by Kyle Busch and wound up 36th.

"It wasn't anything we had control over," Earnhardt said. "But the things we do control, like car preparation, pit stops and me driving my butt off, we had all of those things going our way. And it's been the same story all season. We know if we keep doing what we've been doing, we'll be celebrating sooner rather than later."

Earnhardt loves the mile Phoenix oval, where he won races in 2003 and 2004. But this week's wild card is the Car of Tomorrow, making its third Nextel Cup start and first on a track longer than a half mile.

"I was really encouraged by how well we've done in the first two races with the Car of

Tomorrow," said Earnhardt, who finished seventh at Bristol and fifth at Martinsville.

"I think everyone in the garage is anxious to see how this new car reacts on a track that's longer than the two short tracks we've raced on so far," he added. "We've been able to find some things in the setup that the COT seems to respond to, so I'm anxious to climb in and get out there."

Earnhardt led qualifying for a while Thursday evening, but eventually wound up 15th in the 43-car field.

"The car was pretty good," Earnhardt said. "I was happy with the lap and we'll see tomorrow in practice what the car feels like in traffic. It's probably not going to be the easiest car to drive in the race, but we'll be OK."

Meanwhile, Earnhardt said an online report that he has been offered ownership in DEI is "news to me."

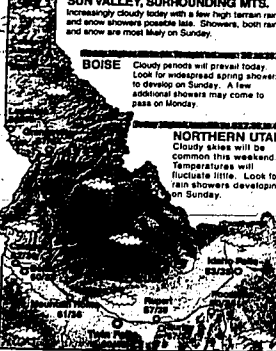

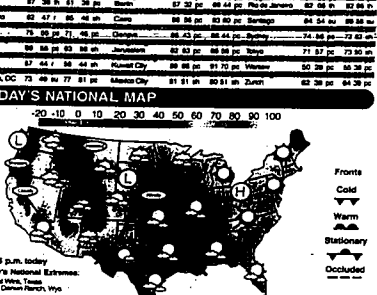

## Some parents say they weren't notified of student evacuation from Filer schools

FILER — Parents are wondering what number the Filer School District was calling when it tried to notify them that their students were being released due to a bomb threat.

Several parents called the Times-News on Friday — the day after students were evacuated from Filer schools — to say that they never received a call from the school district notifying them that their students were being released.

"A phone call — what phone call?"

Parents say they voiced concern about bus driver before threat.

asked Chad Dooley, whose son attends Filer High School. "The only way I found out about it (the evacuation) was because my son had a cell phone with him."

But many students were not so lucky.

Because law enforcement officers requested students from taking school bags with them, many students were forced to leave behind

their cell phones, wallets and even warm clothing.

One parent said her daughter was forced to leave the middle school in her gym clothes without her jacket. Her daughter was one of several middle-school students evacuated to a local bowling alley until officials allowed them to leave.

But even school and law enforcement officials seemed unclear about any procedure Thursday morning.

One Filer police officer told the Times-News that a press conference was being held at the same time that students were being released to

parents, but no such conference existed.

Although school officials said students were only being released into the custody of a parent, several students could be seen walking home alone.

Many parents said their students were on their own after school because parents were not notified about the evacuation.

## Rupert OKs city finance committee

## Kicked out Wendell City Council removes resident from meeting after outburst

WENDELL — After being escorted out of a recent city council meeting by the chief of police all Diana Sterk wants to know is, "If you can't go to the city and ask them questions, who can you go to?"

Beliefs have positive impact on patients, doctors think

LOS ANGELES — For more than 20 years, Dr. John M. Robertson has seen patients' religious beliefs influence the outcome of their surgery. Patients with strong spiritual beliefs, he says, often go through their treatment not with fear, but with a sense of peace.

Robertson isn't alone in his observations. A nationwide study released earlier this month found that 85 percent of 1,144 physicians surveyed believed that religion and spirituality have a positive influence on a patient's health.

"They believe they will do better if God is on their side," said Robertson, chief heart surgeon at St. John's Health Center in Santa Monica, Calif. The study, published in Archives of Internal Medicine, found that only 1 percent of the respondents said religion can have a negative effect on health. Two percent said that religion had no effect at all, positive or negative.

The study, which touched on a variety of subjects, also asked whether doctors believed that God or another supernatural being "ever intervenes in patients' health." Fifty-four percent said "yes," 20 percent said "no," and 18 percent were undecided.

The question of whether spirituality influences health has been an ongoing debate within the medical community for several years, with at least two decades of research. But there is hardly consensus on the issue. Some physicians disagree to what extent, or in what ways, religion and spirituality have a positive or negative influence on a person's health.

However, the claim is popular enough for many medical schools to include courses on religion, spirituality and health. Several institutes, such as Duke University's Center for Spirituality, Theology and Health, also conduct research on the topic.

Dr. Farr Curlin, the lead author of the study released this month, and an assistant professor of medicine at the University of Chicago, said he hopes this paper, which he called "united," will shed light on how doctors' own religious beliefs shape how they interact with patients. Common beliefs between patient and doctor might also influence care, such as birth control or end-of-life decisions.

"It's always struck me as insufficient to describe physicians as mere objective scientists," Curlin wrote. "Fifty-five percent of doctors believe another positive influence of religion and spirituality is a patient's religious community, which provides emotional or practical support."

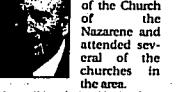

Councilwoman Ilene Rounsfield pulled her to the side and chided her for "lecturing the council and going over a three-minute time limit for visitors."

With the beating of his gavel, Strickland then stood from his seat—and ordered Police Chief Kirtus Gaston to remove her from the building.

At this, both Councilmen Jason Houser and Rounsfield tried to calm the mayor and proceed him back into his chair.

"This is such a disappointment," Sterk said outside of city hall. "I am embarrassed that our city leaders would conduct themselves that way. I didn't want any trouble and never expected to get forced out. They never really answered any of my questions, which provides emotional or practical support."

Strickland wouldn't comment on why Sterk was ordered to be removed from the meeting and said the council is looking into her concerns.

# After Tillman death, Army clamped down

SAN FRANCISCO — Within hours of Pat Tillman's death, the Army went into information-lockdown mode, cutting off phone and Internet connections at a base in Afghanistan, posting guards on a wounded platoon mate, and ordering a sergeant to burn Tillman's uniform.

New investigative documents reviewed by The Associated Press describe how the military sealed off information about Tillman's death from all but a small ring of soldiers.

Officers quietly passed their suspicions of friendly fire up the chain to the highest ranks of the military, but the truth did not reach Tillman's family for five weeks.

The clampdown, and the misinformation issued by the military, lie at the heart of a burgeoning congressional investigation.

It is also a central issue as the Army weighs punishments against nine officers, including four generals, faulted in the latest Pentagon report on the case of the NFL star-turned-soldier.

Military officials said those recommendations could come in the next several weeks.

The nearly 1,100 pages of documents released last month at the conclusion of the Army Criminal Investigation Command's probe reveal the mechanics of how the Army contained the information of Tillman's death by friendly fire on April 22, 2004.

For example, the day after Tillman died, Spc. Jade Lane lay

in a hospital bed in Afghanistan, recovering from gunshot wounds inflicted by the same fellow Rangers who had shot at Tillman. Amid his shock and grief, Lane noticed guards were posted on him.

"I thought it was strange," Lane recalled. Later, he said, he learned the reason for their presence: The news media were sniffing around, and Lane's superiors "did not want anyone talking to us," he said.

Inside Forward Operating Base Salerno, near Khowst, Afghanistan, a soldier heard the dreaded call come across the radio: "KJAs." There were two killed in action, one allied Afghan fighter and one Army Ranger, identified only by his code name. Had this soldier wanted to share the news outside the tactical operations center, it would have been difficult.

"The phones and Internet had been cut off, to prevent anyone from talking about the incident," he told investigators.

Nearby on the same base, a staff sergeant was in his tent when a captain walked in and told him to burn Tillman's bloody clothing.

"He wanted me alone to burn what was in the bag to prevent security violations, leaks and rumors," the staff sergeant testified.

The superior "put a lock on communications" in the tent, he testified. Other Army officers said this was probably a directive to keep the conversation to himself. Then he left the staff sergeant to his work placing Tillman's uniform, socks, gloves and body armor into a 55-gallon drum and burning them.

# Virus linked to stillbirths, researchers find

Infections by a recently discovered virus might be responsible for a significant fraction of stillbirths, Swedish and American researchers reported Thursday in the journal *Birth Defects Research*.

The Ljungan virus is named after the Swedish river valley

where virologist Bo Nilksson of Uppsala University discovered it in voles in 1998. The virus is apparently also common in American rodents, said his co-author, geneticist William Kiltz of the Public Health Institute in Oakland, Calif.

Nilksson and Kiltz initially observed that the incidence of stillbirths in Sweden was related to the population den-

sity of rodents in that country, which varies in a cyclical manner every 3 to 4 years.

Previous studies reported in *Birth Defects Research* showed that 86 percent of pregnant laboratory mice infected with the virus delivered dead pups, compared with 14 percent of virus-free mice.

In the new study, researchers examined still-

births and placental tissue from humans. They found the virus in four of 10 stillbirths that they autopsied and in five of 20 placental tissues from normal pregnancies.

The small size of the sample, Kiltz said, was because of the difficulty of obtaining the stillbirths, and they hope to expand on the findings.

# Researchers find peptide in blood that blocks HIV

German researchers have found a peptide in human blood that blocks HIV and have identified a synthetic variant that is 100 times more potent, they reported Friday in the journal *Cell*.

The synthetic version has been shown to be safe in animals and the team hopes to begin trials in humans this year, they said.

The peptide could be a major improvement over existing anti-HIV drugs because it works equally well against drug-resistant viruses, said virologist Frank Kirchhoff of the University of Ulm, who led the team.

"That's a big advantage," he said.

Several other compounds isolated from human blood have been shown to block HIV replication, but none yet has proved useful as a therapeutic or preventive agent. The team does not know if the newly discovered compound, called "virus inhibitory pep-

ptide," or virip, plays a role in the natural resistance some people display against HIV infection.

Kirchhoff and his colleagues discovered virip by screening hundreds of thousands of proteins filtered from the blood of patients undergoing kidney dialysis. The peptide they ultimately identified contains 20 amino acids and appears to be a fragment from the end of an enzyme called alpha-1-antitrypsin. So far, they have found no natural function for the peptide, but the extremely small "quantity" present in humans makes such studies difficult.

In laboratory dishes, virip blocked all strains of HIV they tested, and none of those strains appeared to develop resistance. The peptide targets a viral protein called gp120 fusion peptide, which plays a crucial role in entry of the virus into cells. That viral peptide appears to be stable to mutation, which may explain the lack of resistance to virip.

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# Pope revises limbo, says there is hope for unbaptized babies

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope Benedict XVI has reversed centuries of traditional Roman Catholic teaching on limbo, approving a Vatican report released Friday that says there were "serious" grounds to hope that children who die without being baptized can go to heaven.

Theologians said the move was highly significant — both for what it says about Benedict's willingness to buck a long-standing tenet of Catholic belief and for what it

means theologically about the Church's views on heaven, hell and original sin — the sin that the faithful believe all children are born with.

Although Catholics have long believed that children who die without being baptized are with original sin and thus excluded from heaven, the Church has no formal doctrine on the matter. Theologians, however, have

long taught that such children enjoy an eternal state of perfect natural happiness, a state commonly called limbo, but without being in communion with God.

"If there's no limbo and we're not going to revert to St. Augustine's teaching that unbaptized infants go to hell, we're left with only one option, namely, that everyone is born in the state of grace," said the

Rev. Richard McBrien, professor of theology at the University of Notre Dame.

"Baptism does not exist to wipe away the 'stain' of original sin, but to initiate one into the Church," he said in an e-mailed response.

Benedict approved the findings of the International Theological Commission, a Vatican advisory panel, which said it was reassessing tradi-

tional teaching on limbo in light of "pressing" pastoral needs — primarily the growing number of abortions and infants born to non-believers who die without being baptized.

While the report does not carry the authority of a papal encyclical or even the weight of a formal document from the Vatican's Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, it was

approved by the pope on Jan. 19 and was published on the Internet — an indication that it was intended to be widely read by the faithful.

"We can say we have many reasons to hope that there is salvation for these babies," the Rev. Luis Ladaria, a Jesuit who is the commission's secretary-general, told The Associated Press. He stressed that there was no certainty, just hope.

#### Clashes erupt near mosque in Baghdad

BAGHDAD — U.S. helicopters pounded an area near a Shiite mosque with heavy machine-gun fire Friday, killing two militants just ahead of the start of weekly prayer services and outraging preachers loyal to radical Shiite cleric Muqtada al-Sadr.

The attack took place as al-Sadr's militia is increasingly showing signs of impatience with a U.S.-led push to secure Baghdad, raising fears it might resume its campaign of violence after more than two months of laying low.

The U.S. military said American soldiers called for support and cordoned off the area after they were attacked by small-arms fire from the Al al-Bayaa mosque in a religiously mixed neighborhood in western Baghdad at about 9:45 a.m.

#### Secitarian murders down in Baghdad, Bush says

EAST GRAND RAPIDS, Mich. — President Bush said Friday that sectarian murders have dropped by half in Baghdad since the U.S.-Iraqi military buildup began in February, rejecting a Democratic leader's claim that the war is lost.

"These operations are having an important effect on this young democracy," Bush said in a speech on terrorism, his second in two days. "They're showing Iraqi citizens across the country that there will be no sanctuary for killers anywhere in a free Iraq."

Bush said he continues to believe that Iraqi Prime Minister Nouri al-Maliki is committed to peace and reconciliation. At the same time, he said the U.S. military commitment in Iraq is not open ended.

#### Robotic falcons enlisted to fight pigeon menace


LONDON — You could say it's a bird of a different feather. Liverpool, plagued by pigeons that poise the city center with their droppings, is introducing a mechanical falcon which squawks and flaps its wings in hopes of scaring the pesky birds away. The fat pigeons, who feast on junk food, are an embarrassment to a city chosen to be next year's European Capital of Culture.


The city council is buying 10 Robops, short for robotic bird of prey, at a cost about \$4,000 each. But cleaning teams spend many hours each day scraping droppings from streets and buildings at a cost of about \$320,000 a year, the council said.

Only two of the Robops have been installed so far.

"The key is that we move (the Robops) around, so the pigeons don't get used to them," council spokeswoman Sarah Langworthy said. "It keeps (the pigeons) on their toes."

On today's deal East did well to bounce in the five-level at 10. West led the club king and South won, drew trumps in two rounds, then returned a club, hoping to set up a long club in dummy for a diamond discard.

On lead, West realized that the heart ace could win if East had that card, but there might be some urgency to play on diamonds if declarer had the heart ace, so West switched to his low diamond, as seemed quite plausible given the auction.

So West switched to his low diamond. South could not do two things at the same time. On a diamond switch at trick two, he is high or low one. South wins, draws trumps, then exits in diamonds, setting up dummy's 10 for a club discard.

If a club is continued at trick two, East can ruff, but South still has the ace intact to control the suit and can set up a club for a diamond discard. If East refuses to ruff the second club, South wins, draws trumps, then plays his third club from hand. West's diamond switch comes too late. Declarer plays diamond ace, heart ace, heart ruff, club ruff, trump 10 to dummy, and the losing diamond disappears on the established fifth club.

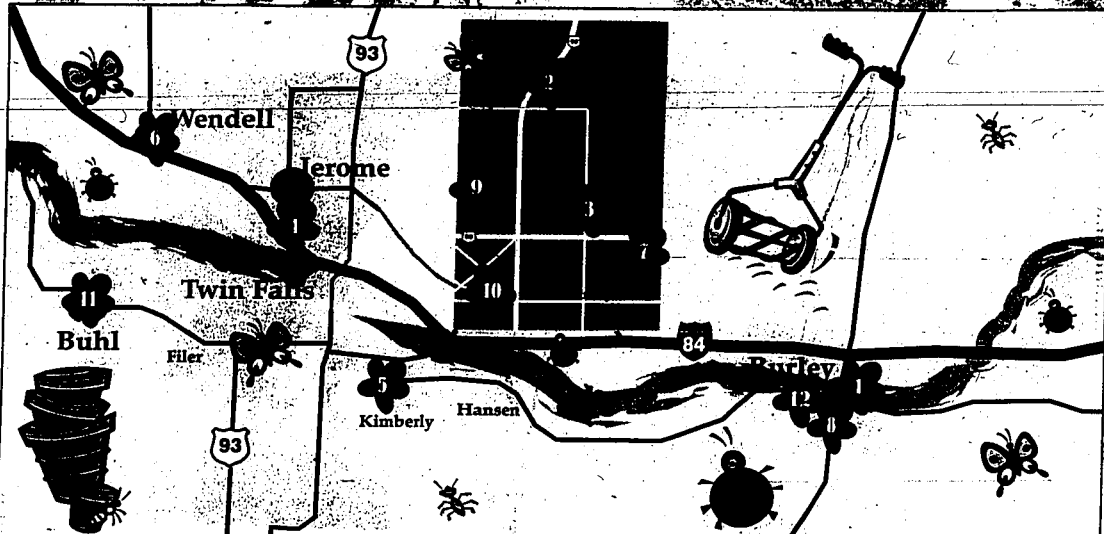

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## John Paul II already a cinch for sainthood

The late pope does not need a nun's word to qualify for sainthood. John Paul II already has done that in his own unique way. The process to name him a saint in the Roman Catholic church is under way. That arduous task often takes 200 years or more. The present pope, Benedict XVI, waived the normal rules. Initiated the effort early and essentially assured that his predecessor will be among the heroes of the faith.

John Paul II, who died two years ago this month, will be a saint. He already is one according to the New Testament standard that calls all baptized Christians saints of God.

The Roman Catholic Church long ago established another tier of faith heroes that it calls saints and requires that they be responsible for at least two miracles to make the grade. The late pope will easily make that cut as well.

John Paul II will be a saint. He already is one according to the New Testament standard that calls all baptized Christians saints of God.

But he does not need the testimony of Sister Maria Simon-Pierre. She claims that God healed her of Parkinson's disease by virtue of the pope's prayers. His supporters may use that as evidence of his miracle working.

Such spiritual machinations strain credibility and are not necessary to find genuine miracles in this pope's ministry. Two come quickly to mind.

He changed the course of history, helped end the Cold War and rid Eastern Europe of Communist rule. He did that nonviolently in a day when politicians and generals planned to do it with nuclear mutual self-destruction. Miracle enough for sainthood.

His other obvious miracle was intentionally creating a good relationship with the Jewish community, probably for the first time since the pope himself, Peter, was Jewish 2,000 years ago.

John Paul II grew up in Poland during the Nazi occupation. Auschwitz was near his home. He could easily have been an anti-Semitic Polish Catholic like thousands of his countrymen. Instead, he embraced Jews as elder brothers in the faith. Rabbi James Rudin of the American Jewish Committee called him "the best pope Jews have ever had."

Miracle enough for sainthood. There are more. Agree with him or not, this pope spoke clearly and with conviction. He was principled, honest and hugely popular. He had the gifts that qualified for sainthood in the early church when selection was by popular acclaim rather than institutional fiat.

The church should drop its demand that would-be saints accomplish a couple of biblical miracles. Rather, it might measure candidates by the kind of wonders John Paul II performed.

JEROME — America's troubled immigration system isn't somebody's else problem for members of Father Ron Wekerle's congregation. It's his workday reality.

"Our congregation is about 60 (percent) to 40 (percent) Hispanic (to non-Hispanic)," said Wekerle, pastor of St. Jerome's Catholic Church. "A lot of people feel very strongly about it."

Quietly, immigration reform — a hot-button issue that touched off waves of protest demonstrations by Hispanics and others when it was being debated by the U.S. House of Representatives in 2005 and by the Senate in 2006 — is being embraced by Catholics throughout the Diocese of Boise, which covers all of Idaho.

About 67 percent of Hispanics in Idaho are Catholic, according to the 2001 American Religious Identification Survey and the 2002

- Revamp green card system, placing immigration caps and waiting periods on parents of U.S. citizens and "cleaning up" family backlogs by cutting family visa preferences.
- Bring illegal workers out of the shadows by giving them indefinite temporary status: All undocumented immigrants would have to register within a one-year period. After passing background checks, the immigrant could obtain a new "Z-visa." The Z-visa would be good for three years and renewable every three years thereafter, but in order to renew the first time the person would have to pass a English/civics naturalization test. Each time he or she applies, the immigrant would have to pay a \$2,000 fine plus a \$1,500 processing fee, plus any Social Security tax collected from the immigrant while working illegally would be forfeited (so, it will cost \$3,500 every three years). Z-visa holders would not be eligible for any public benefits except emergency care and elementary and secondary education. After regular immigration backlogs are cleared, Z-visa holders could apply for permanent residence in the United States, but would have to pay an additional \$10,000 fine and would have to apply

### BRAISED BONELESS RIBS

- 1 1/2 (3-ounce) cans tomato sauce
- 2 tablespoons canola oil
- 2 x 1 1/2 pounds boneless ribs, beef or pork
- 1 cup coarsely chopped celery
- 1 cup coarsely chopped onion
- 1 cup coarsely chopped carrot
- 1 (6-ounce) can tomato paste
- 1 cup red wine
- 1 cup beef broth
- 2 teaspoons garlic powder
- 1 teaspoon kosher salt
- 2 teaspoons ground pepper
- 2 pinches of dried parsley
- 2 teaspoon good Hungarian paprika
- 2 tablespoons cornstarch mixed with a little water to make a slurry for thickening (optional)
- Heat oil in Dutch oven or large heavy skillet. Quickly brown ribs. Add celery, onion and carrots. Dab on tomato paste. Pour on red wine and beef broth. Season with garlic powder, salt, pepper and parsley.
- Cover and simmer gently for 1 1/2 hours or until ribs are tender. Add paprika, test seasoning and adjust as needed.
- Thicken as desired with slurry of cornstarch and a little water. Let rest off heat for a few minutes until you're ready to serve.

- 1 (24-ounce) jar marinara or spaghetti sauce
- 1 (25-ounce) bag frozen ravioli, cheese or mushroom
- 1 (15-ounce) container ricotta cheese
- 1 cup sliced pepperoni Italian sausage, to taste (optional; see Note)
- Vegetables, to taste (optional; see Note)
- 1 (16-ounce) package mozzarella cheese
- Sprinkle of Italian seasoning
- Sprinkle of garlic powder
- Sprinkle of ground pepper
- Fresh shredded Parmesan cheese, to taste
- Preheat oven to 350 degrees.
- In baking or casserole dish make single layers of ingredients. National Survey of Latinos. Twenty-nine percent of the Gen State's 285,000 Catholics are Hispanic and 37.5 percent of Idaho Hispanic Catholics are 30 or younger.

But the movement for liberal immigration reform includes some non-Hispanic Catholics, who have traditionally been social conservatives.

"Catholics are guided by the Bible, which tells us to be the stranger," Wekerle said.

"At the height of the first great wave of immigration — in 1920 — three out of every four Catholics was an immigrant," said Mark Franken, the Washington, D.C.-based executive director of migration and refugee services for the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops. "Today, two out of five are immigrants, but that proportion is rising, because some 300,000 Catholics come into this country each year."

"Idaho has gotten a bad reputation as a place that is racist and does not welcome immigrants," said Billy Garcia, attorney and organizer of the social activist Idaho Community Action Network in Burley. "I don't think that really reflects the attitudes of most Idahoans."

At issue is efforts by the Bush administration and by members from both parties in Congress to reform America's immigration laws and create a legal channel for illegal migrants already in the United States to eventually become citizens or permanent residents.

"They also want to crack down on future illegal immigrants."

But their approaches vary widely. The bill passed by the House 1 1/2 years ago would have made illegal presence in the United States a felony.

Legislation approved by the Senate last spring would have made all illegal immigrants who have been in the country for less than two years to leave, and set up a series of hefty fees and fines for those seeking legal residence.

All that is anathema to Hispanic and migrant-rights groups, but they're equally unhappy with the current system.

"Families can be separated (by visa waiting periods and processing delays) for years," said the Rev. Michael

St. Marie, pastor by St. Nicholas Catholic Parish in Rupert, which is two-thirds Hispanic.

The USCCB has been a catalyst for efforts for reform immigration while respecting the rights of immigrants. According to John Gehring, assistant director of media relations for the bishops' association, the USCCB's immigration reform agenda includes:

- Earned legalization program that allows undocumented immigrants to gain permanent residence.
- A guest worker program that protects foreign-born workers and safeguards American workers.
- Family-based immigration reform that reduces waiting times for family reunification.
- Restoration of due-process protections for immigrants.
- Policies that address the root causes of migration.

Although it doesn't include all of those provisions, the bishops have endorsed bipartisan legislation introduced in the House of Representatives earlier this year.

"The bishops conference believes that currently H.R. 1645, the Security Through Regularized Immigration and a Vibrant Economy Act of 2007 (STRIVE), best compares with the principles needed for a just and humane immigration reform," Gehring said in a telephone interview from his Washington office.

The bill, authored by Rep. Jeff Flake, R-Ariz., and Luis Guterrez, D-Ill., would make illegal immigrants who were in the country before June 1, 2006, eligible for legalization after a \$300 fine, a security clearance and proof that they had been employed. After six years, immigrants who learn English, study in the country each year to fill jobs that Americans don't want.

Earlier this year, President Bush proposed a law that would allow undocumented workers to apply for three-year work visas, renewable indefinitely, at a cost of \$3,500 each time. But to get a green card that would make them legal

permanent residents, they would have to return to their home countries, apply for re-entry at a U.S. embassy or consulate, and pay a \$10,000 fine.

Under the Bush plan, more green cards would be made available to skilled workers by limiting visas for parents, children and siblings of U.S. citizens. Temporary workers could not bring their families into the country.

"The administration's initial proposal is a step back, in our view, from the president's address to the nation last year," Kevin Appleby, director of migration and refugee policy for the USCCB, told the Washington Post.

But both bills could be a hard sell in Congress, according to the newspaper, in many congressional districts with high unemployment, opposition to immigrant labor remains high.

"It's going to be very, very difficult to pass an immigration reform bill," Rep. John Yarmuth, D-Ky., told the Post.

"Too many of our fellow Catholics believe the immigration reform conference in Washington earlier this week. 'Immigrants are criminals; immigrants don't pay taxes; immigrants are a drain on public resources. Immigrants don't want to integrate within our society; immigrants are taking our jobs — none of these perceptions are real. Yet, for many, many people perception is fact.'"

So Catholic proponents of liberal immigration reform are trying to start a conversation, according to the Rev. Victor Manuel, parochial vicar at St. Edward's Catholic Church in Twin Falls.

"Inform yourself," he said. "Talk about it. That's what (the average person) can do."

ICAN will be part of an immigration reform rally in Julia Davis Park in Boise on May 1, and Garcia expects many Catholics will be there too.

"It's really just a question of doing what's right," he said.

Growing Pentecostal denomination elects new leader

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP) — Bishop Charles E. Blake, an influential Southern California pastor, has been named presiding bishop of the Church of God in Christ Inc., the world's largest predominantly black Pentecostal denomination.

Blake, pastor of West Angeles Church of God in Christ in Los Angeles, replaces Presiding Bishop G.E. Patterson, who died in March at 67 of heart failure.

The Memphis-based church body claims 65 million members worldwide, mostly in the United States.

Blake's church has a history of involvement in the local community and in global outreach programs, and he said he planned to continue that tradition.

"In addition to pursuing the basic principles of service to God and our ministry to the community in spiritual areas, my focus is always been on community development and global involvement," Blake said.

Blake said he would be adjusting over two years depending on labor market needs in the United States. A non-seasonal worker would get a two-year visa, then would have to return home for six months, and repeat that process two more times — for a total of six years working. Workers would not be allowed to bring family members to America. A seasonal worker would get a nine-month visa, then would have to return home for three months, after which he or she could get another nine-month visa renewable indefinitely. Family members could not accompany the worker. There would be a \$1,500 fee for visas.

Future illegal entrants would be permanently barred from the U.S.

Representatives (on March 22)

- Increases criminal penalties for passport, visa and document fraud; for firearms offenses by aliens, and for smuggling illegal aliens.
- Enhances penalties for aliens associated with money laundering and for unauthorized employment of aliens.

- Provides new workers, their spouses and children with a pathway to apply for conditional permanent residence and, eventually, citizenship. The immigrant may apply after working for five years and paying a \$500 application fee.
- Creates a new visa program — conditional non-immigrant status — for undocumented immigrants and their spouses and children in the U.S., which would be valid for six years.
- Provides conditional non-immigrant status and their spouses and children with a chance to apply for lawful permanent resident status — a green card — and eventual citizenship. Applicants would go to the back of the line for permanent visas.
- To qualify for earned citizenship, aliens must meet employment requirements during the six-year conditional period. They would have to pay a \$1,500 fine plus application fee, complete criminal and security background checks, meet English and civics requirements, and pay all taxes.

Policy affecting those interacting with immigrants

- Requires employers and subcontractors to use within 18 months an electronic system to verify that new hires are legal. Increases the maximum fine on employers for hiring illegal workers to \$20,000 for each worker and imposes jail time for repeat offenders.

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## Many U.S. commuters aren't very 'eco-friendly'

Despite growing awareness of the positive role that mass transit can play in addressing global warming, a new international workplace survey by staffing company Kelly Services finds that many Americans aren't as eco-friendly as their global colleagues when it comes to getting to and from work.

The Kelly Services Global Workforce Index found that only 14 percent of the Americans surveyed prefer public transportation over their own vehicle for their daily commute. That's about half the global average of 64 percent and the second-lowest rate among all countries surveyed (Turkey came in at 29 percent).

Earth Day 2007, being celebrated April 22, is focusing worldwide attention on the impact of climate change and finding solutions.

But the survey strongly suggests that it may be a lack of convenience and accessibility — not anti-environment attitudes — that is steering many Americans to their own wheels. Only 51 percent of those surveyed said they had the choice of public transportation, compared with a global average of 72 percent and as much as 90 percent or more in Hong Kong, Hungary, Indonesia and Russia.

"Many people are perfectly happy to use public transportation rather than drive a private motor vehicle, but if the system is inaccessible or too costly, they are left with little choice," said George Corona, senior vice president of Kelly Services. "A public transportation system that is dependable, safe and affordable, however, can make a valuable contribution to the economy as well as to individual prosperity by making it easier for people to get to and keep their jobs."

Asked what single factor would encourage greater use of public transportation, the largest group of Americans (32 percent) cited more convenient access, followed by more frequent services (16 percent) and lower prices (10 percent). Concerns about safety and comfort ranked relatively low.

"Convenient, reliable public transportation can make a difference in people's job satisfaction and productivity because it eliminates a workday stressor," said Corona. "It also facilitates their ability to change jobs or work flexible hours, enabling them to react quickly to the needs of business in response to fluctuating economic conditions and employment trends."

# Stocks advance sharply

## Dow nears 13,000

NEW YORK — Wall Street bounded higher Friday, hurtling the Dow Jones Industrial average to a record close approaching 13,000 as investors celebrated a week of surprisingly strong earnings reports. The major indexes all had their longest such streak since October.

Investors who had tempered their expectations for first-quarter earnings at the beginning of the week were energized Friday by the initial wave of upbeat results, 50 far into the earnings season, 16 of the 30 Dow components have posted financial results for the

first three months of the year — with 10 surpassing analysts forecasts. Dow components Honeywell International Inc., Caterpillar Inc., Pfizer Inc. and McDonald's Corp. all reported earnings Friday.

Better-than-expected results allowed stocks to extend their best April rally in four years, and one that pushed the Nasdaq composite index and the Standard & Poor's 500 Index to six-year highs.

"It's not a matter of 13,000 for the Dow. We could be looking at 14,000 by the end of the year," said Robert Froehlich, chief investment strategist for investment firm DWS Scudder. "There's too much money out there chasing too few companies. This story isn't ending anytime soon."

According to preliminary calculations, the Dow closed up 153.35,

or 1.20 percent, at 12,961.98, after setting a new intraday high of 12,966.29. The blue-chip index has hit 34 record closes since the beginning of October last year.

The S&P 500 index soared 13.62, or 0.53 percent, to 2,526.39, and the Nasdaq rose 21.04, or 0.84 percent, to 2,526.39.

For the week, the Dow surged 2.8 percent, the S&P 500 added 2.2 percent and the Nasdaq rose 1.4 percent. Advancing issues outnumbered decliners by more than 3 to 1 on the New York Stock Exchange, where volume came to 1.95 billion shares.

Bonds held steady as many investors focused on stocks. The yield on the benchmark 10-year Treasury note was unchanged at 4.67 percent. The dollar was mixed against other major currencies, while gold prices spiked.

# Hotel service with style

## Employees get designer clothing

Move over, Tyra Banks. Bellmen, bartenders and concierges are the latest inspiration for fashionistas, who are outfitting hotel workers in name-brand designer duos.

Gone are the red jackets with gold buttons and starched white maid uniforms. In their place: wrap dresses by Diane von Furstenberg, trendy bubble skirts and Michael Kors slacks and shirts so stylish that workers don't need to change their clothes before hitting the bar after their punch out.

"When you put someone in a 100 percent polyester, binding thing that is uncomfortable and shiny and does not allow the person to be themselves, it's hard to expect them to do their best work," said Ross Klein, president of W Hotels, where employees wear seasonal lines by Michael Kors.

There are still plenty of fashion crimes on display in the lodging industry, such as the beefeater get-ups at the Sir Francis Drake in San Francisco or derby hats on employees at the Hotel Del Coronado in San Diego.

Adopting the belief that a stylish worker is a happy worker, hoteliers increasingly are turning to designers for fashion makeover.

Daniel Vosovic, a former finalist on Bravo channel's fashion competition show "Project Runway," is designing a line for W Hotels, the first of which will open this year in Plano, Texas.

Cynthia Rowley created concierge and housekeeping uniforms for the Kimpton Hotels' Hotel Monaco in Denver. And Jason Pomeranc has tapped a slate of designers to dress the staff at several of his Thompson hotels, including the Hollywood Roosevelt, 60 Thompson in New York, and the Thompson Beverly Hills, which opens in June.

Cintas Corp., one of the world's largest manufacturers

of mass-produced uniforms, is even trying its hand at trendier threads. The company started "Define Your Dress" contests a few years ago, offering a designer makeover to winning hotels. This year, Cintas is rolling out a new wardrobe for the third contest winner, Laguna Cliffs Marriott Resort & Spa in Dana Point, Calif.

"We have designers and merchandisers that are constantly looking at fashion trends," said C i n t a s

Ahmed Said, hotel employees "don't want something that looks and fits and feels like a uniform. They want to look like they just went to a department store and picked it off the shelf. People tend to feel better about wearing a designer label."

That's exactly what the staff likes about the new uniforms at the W in Westwood, where the women behind the front desk wear black pants and peasant blouses or crocheted babydoll tops and the guys

don't "smart casual" button-down shirts and leather belts with a W on a brushed silver buckle. Maids wear all black.

Before the Michael Kors outfits were adopted this year, welcome desk agent Joey Malaban, 25, said she always had to "politely decline" post-work invitations because she was wearing her uniform.

Now, she said, "I don't feel the need to strip down after work."

Jessica James, 22, agreed: "As soon as I leave here, I go out partying in my work clothes."

That's fabulous, I say. Thanks, it's my uniform."

Her favorite piece, she said, is a mandarin-collared jacket that she personalizes by folding down one side of the collar and accessorizing with a string of beads. Her non-uniform-wearing friends liked it so much they have asked to borrow it.

The guys appreciate their designer garb, too. "I feel great when I throw this on," said Jose Alvarez, 32,

who works the late-night shift behind the front desk. "I feel like I'm wearing a \$150 to \$200 uniform. It's not cheap." Uniforms are paid for by the hotel.

At the Laguna Cliffs Marriott, general manager Jim Samuels said that before the clothing switch, the resort had become a hedgepodge of uniforms with no property-wide theme.

The hotel needed a uniform makeover to stay competitive with the nearby Montage, Ritz Carlton and St. Regis Monarch Beach. The new look — what Samuels described as "upscale resort" — has injected a sense of enthusiasm among the staff.

"Even the housekeepers are very excited," Samuels said.

Jason Pomeranc, co-owner of Thompson Hotels, said chic clothes were important, especially in the competitive boutique segment.

He uses different designers for his hotels, depending on the mood and tone he's trying to capture. Diane von Furstenberg dresses at the Hollywood Roosevelt capture a "European flavor, bordering on American chic," Pomeranc said.

# Nacchio convicted on 19 counts of insider trading

DENVER — In the latest in a series of convictions against corporate executives, one-time CEO Joe Nacchio was found guilty of illegally selling \$52 million in stock amid an accounting scandal that nearly sank Qwest Communications. Nacchio left the federal courthouse with his wife and son Michael after the verdict, declining to comment yet determined to appeal the 19 insider trading convictions, each of which carries a sentence of up to 10 years in prison and a \$1 million fine. Nacchio is one of a handful of former Qwest executives

who have been convicted of criminal charges stemming from a multimillion-dollar scandal that forced the Denver-based telecommunications company to restate \$2.2 billion of revenue. He also is the latest to be convicted as part of the government's push to punish white-collar executives stemming from accounting fraud at companies from Enron to WorldCom.

"The government has another notch in their belt," Houston securities lawyer Tom Ajamie said. "They've had a tremendous winning streak in these corporate crime cases."

The government accused Nacchio of selling \$101 million in stock in 42 transactions from January to May 2001 based on non-public information that the company faced financial risk and used one-time sales to meet revenue projections.

A former Qwest finance chief and former president were among government witnesses who described writings they gave Nacchio late in

2000 about his revenue targets, which forecast growth up to 17 percent despite aggressive competition and a weakening economy.

In early April 2001, Qwest released financial results indicating it had met its quarterly objectives, but Nacchio did not mention the huge amount of revenue from one-time sales used to achieve the goals.

The jury acquitted Nacchio on 23 insider trading counts involving sales before April 2001 but convicted him on 19 counts tied to sales of 1.33 million shares for \$52 million in gross proceeds from April 28 to May 29, 2001.

# 3D films face a duel on big screen

HOLLYWOOD — Movie studios looking to boost two-budget movies on a holiday weekend because it keeps cash registers whirring.

But an abundance of riches has put theaters in a bind for Memorial Day 2007. Both 20th Century Fox and DreamWorks Animation have chosen that date to release what each hopes will be their first 3D blockbuster. DreamWorks' "Monsters vs. Aliens" will be up against "Avatar," a science-fiction thriller from James Cameron, the director of against other major currencies, while gold prices spiked.

The nation's largest exhibitors say they don't have room for both.

"As many as 5,000 screens are expected to be equipped to show 3D movies by 2009, up from 700 today, but DreamWorks and Fox both want all of them. "I would not want to be put in the position of choosing one over the other," said Mike Campbell, chief executive of Regency Entertainment Group, the nation's largest theater chain. "I want both — just not on the same day."

Campbell is confident that it will change its date over the next two years.

"It's too early in the game to start panicking," he said.

# Third company recalls pet food

WASHINGTON — A third company on Friday recalled pet foods made with an imported Chinese ingredient only recently found to have been contaminated by an industrial chemical.

The pet food ingredient, rice protein concentrate, is the second found in the U.S. to be contaminated by melamine. Previously, testing revealed that wheat gluten also had been contaminated.

Royal Canin USA said it was recalling some of its dog and cat foods made with tainted rice protein concentrate.

Also this week, the French company's South African unit recalled dry dog and cat dry pet foods after they were found to contain a third ingredient, corn gluten, also contaminated with melamine.
