TWIN FALLS — Using your sprinklers just got a little pricier — or maybe not. Either way, city residents may not know about the extra cost.

The city of Twin Falls is sending out thousands of letters to water users reminding them to have backflow checks or risk losing water service. However, what a uppears to be a routine checkup for homeowners might be anything but.

response to federal

In response to federal and state requirements, the city passed ordinances nearly a decade ago to require all users of city water to annually have their water systems — mostly sprinkler systems — inspected by certified testers.

But notices have been

mailed to residents for only about three years. Twin Falls Public Works Director Lance Bates said. Chy code does not specify a notifica-tion schedule. As a result, some resi-dents have received notices two years in a row, others





A dangerous bus ride

States, Congress fail to pay to clean up school-bus diesel emissions

Day in and day out, children across the U.S. are riding to school on aging buses, breathing what some activists say is a dangerous brew of pollutants up to five times dirtler than the air outside.

It is a situation that Congress and many states have sought to fix in recent years. In fact, in 2005 federal lawnakers passed a measure to replace or retrofit the direlest diesel engines across the nation.

But little has been done.

Around the country, state officials are struggling to find the money to carry out

Hilton gets 45-day jail term for probation violation

A Los Angeles judge handed drown the sentence after prosecutors contended in a two-hour hearing that Ililion had violated her probation when she was ticketed in late February for driving a blue Beniley Continental GTC on Stunest Boulevard with a suspended license. 

Clean bus advocates hall California as the leader on the issue. Voters there approved \$200 million last year to clean up its school bus fleet. "There were studies done about the health risks for children riding in diesel-powered buses," said Patricia Rey, a

spokeswoman for the California Air Resources Board. The governor and Legislature found it to be a priority. And Californians agreed with that. But in Pennsylvania, Louisiana and elsewhere, state money to help schools retrofit buses has been nonexistent. Congress passed the Diesel

Emissions Reduction Act, a bipartisan initiative that authorized \$1 billion to help states clean up diesel fleets, But states have seen none of that noney. The Bush administration proposed modest funding for DEBA in its last two budget requests, but Gongress has not acted.



DOE Idaho seeks public comment on alternatives for Power, Burst Facility demolition and vessel disposal



The U.S. Department of Energy, in cooperation with the state of Idaha and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, is seeking public comment through June 3, 2007 on the proposed cleanup final end state of the Idaha National Laboratory Site's Pewer Burst Facility reactor building and the reactor vessel. The work is being conducted as part of the Idaha Cleanup Project.

Project.

The Power Burst Facility reactor was completed in 1971 and operated from 1972 until 1985. The PBF reactor was designed to perform experiments on nuclear fuel. Samples were exposed to extreme conditions to test fuel and materials under simulated accident conditions. The reactor reactor expense of the performance of the perfor simulated accident conditions. In treation core was capable of millisecond bursts of power over 100 g/gawatts. Knowledge gained from PBF testing contributed to the design and operation of current generation safety systems in the nuclear industry.

All nuclear flow has removed from the PBF building in 2003, and all remaining coolant water was removed in 2005. An Engineering Evaluation and Cost Analysis (EE/CA) document describes three atternatives for disposition of the remaining PBF structure:

F structure:

• Alternative 1 is "no action," used for comparative purposes.

• Alternative 2 is "grouling the PBF-vessel in place" and would include grouling and backfilling the below

ground level portions of the building basements and encapsulating the above-ground portions of the reactor vessel under a concrete monolith.

· Alternative 3 includes removal of the Alternative of melocolor
 PBF reactor vessel and internals, along

Alternative 3 includes removal of the PBF reactor vessel and internals, along with demolition of the building to below ground level, filling the void space with grout and inert demolition debris from the aboveground portion of the building, then backfilling to ground fevel with clean native soil. The PBF vessel would be disposed at the Idaho CERCLA Disposal Facility located on the INL.

As the EE/CA domenstrates, the preferred alternative, Alternative 3, is protective of human health and the environment and supports the DCE good of reducing the site's risk tootprint' by consolidating waste at the ICDF and reducing surveillance and maintenance costs at DCE facilities. The demolition and decommissioning work is proposed to be done under the Comprehersive Environmental Response, Compensation and Linbility Art (CERCLA, otherwise known as Superfund), as a non-time critical removal action.



But it never happened and McMurray struggled to fit into the organization. He inherited 2004 champion Kurt Busch's crew and equipment, but lacked chemistry with crew-chief firminy Fennig and strug-gled to drive the cars. Jack Roush made an early crew chief switch, to no avail.

crew chief switch, to no avail. Things never improved and McMurray asked Roush for another crew chief change for the final 10 weeks.

"I Joked around and sald it cain get worse, and then you would show up the next week and it would be worse," McMurray said. "I would lay in bed at night, stressed out, because I didn't know what to

do. I didn't know how to make it better. You literally feel like you have to learn how to drive

again."

Because McMurray had run
through three crew chiefs in
one season, Roush decided to
let McMurray handpick who
he wanted to run his team this

year. McMurray definitely did his making a list of McMurray genancry uncurs homework, making a list of every crew chief from all three of NASCAR's top series. He got referrals and cross-referenced, constantly looking for the per-fect fit.

Turned out the one name missing from his list — Larry

missing from his list — Larry Carter — was the answer, Because Carter was working behind the scenes at Michael Waltrip Racing, McMurray overlooked him and didn't have him under initial consid-eration.

By the time his name crossed McMurray's radar in December, McMurray had a

tough sell to make and only a little bit of time to do it. "I told him. 'This isn't going to be easy, you are going to have to come into a team that is down and struggling and it's going to be a lot of work. This is going to be a lot of vook. This is not going to be fun for a while." McMurray remem-bered. But he verhally com-mitted and then we had con-tract issues to work through, but he came on hoard and its just chicked." Hagerman council looks to solve flooding hazard

A few weeks ago. Wendell City Council President Here Rounsefell heard a neighbor's idea about how garbage is currently picked up in the city. Instead of garbage trucks making two urbs down city roads and alleyways to pick trash up along each side, it might be easier to place all receptacles along one side of the thoroughfare, the neighbor suggested.

HAGERMAN — Waking up to find your yard under water is something no homeowner wants to see; it's not the ideal picture of a nice spring morning. But that's exactly what happened to one Hagerman residdin recently, said City Superintendent Casey Kelley. The flood was caused by a clog in an irrigation ditch that runs adjacent to properties that sit along South Avenue. Kelley brought the issue before the City Council Wednesday in efforts to

find a solution to the problem, which affects all of the houses along the street, he said.

Resident and local developer Doug Wickham said he also has noticed the problem, which, he says, stems from different shapes and sizes of pipes that obstruct water flow. Wickham suggests that the city simply remove the old pipes and leave the ditch open, with the option for residents to install uniform piping.

But some residents volced safety concerns about an open ditch and possible mosquito problems.

Removing old piping will probably be the best solution, agreed Kelley. Councilman John Mason and City Attorney Phil Brown also agreed.

Mason said any obstructions should be removed as soon as possible.

The council has not yet voted on what to do, but Kelley says he will speak with property owners to discuss possible solutions that he can present to the council next month.

as a staff writer and held varias a stail writer and field vari-ous editing positions, includ-ing metropolitan editor and assistant managing editor for investigations.

He returned to reporting in

1993 and was covering the federal courts when he retired in December 2005. Rosenzweig recused him-

Rosenzweig recused nim-self from covering a molesta-tion case in Los Angeles in the 1980s when he acknowledged that he had become romanti-cally involved with Rubin, who was lead prosecutor.

Previous research by Shep-pard found elevated levels of tungsten and cobalt in airborne and surface dust in Tallon.

"The research suggests interesting patterns of tungsten with this incredible cluster," Sheppard said. "There needs to examine the relationship between this metal and the development of leukemia."
Tungsten is a naturally occurring heavy metal that is mitted and used in hardened tools and tools exposed to high emperatures, such as drill bits and the filaments of incandescent light-hulbs. It has not been shown to cause leukemia, but research suggests it can damage DNA in cells in combination with other metals.







Religion and marriage: a long history

From Its beginnings, Christianity has emphasized the spiritual nature and indissolubility of marriage. Jesus Indissolutility of marriage as Christ spoke of marriage as instituted by God, and most Christians consider it a per-manent union based upon mutual con-

Since the Middle Agos, Christian weddings have taken place before a priest or minister,

and the ceremony involves the exchange of vows involves the exchange of vows, readings from scripture, a blessing, and sometimes the eucharistic rite. Liturgleal Christian communions — Angilcanism, Catholicism, and o Orthodoxy — consider marriage to an expression of grace, termed a socrament or mystery. While most Reformed Christians would deny the elevation of marriage to the status of a sacrament, nonetheless it is considered a covenant between spouses before God.

Colostial marriage is a doctrine pecu-

Colestial marriage is a doctrine pecu-liar to Mormons. It is an ordinance associated with a covenant that takes place only inside Chardr of Jesus Christ of Latter day Saints temples by those authorized to hold the sealing power. A three-judge panel of the 10th U.S. Gircuit Court of Appeals dismissed the city's claim that it would be immediated with requests from other individuals and that the park would be flooded with monuments. The panel sent the case back to a lower court, granting the group's request for an injunction against the city 30 miles south of Salt Lake City. City.



Yahoo spokeswonan Jounal Steepers also declined comment, saying We don't discuss rumors and speculation."

The Wall Street Journal said executives of the two companies are looking at a merger or some other kind of matching and said the talks appear to be early-stage discussions.

It said the companies explored the idea of combining last year but the talks led nowhere. The newspaper reports each cited unidendified people familiar with the situation.

Industry analyst Matt Rosoff with Directions on Microsoft in Kikland, Wash, said a huge takeover is unlikely, noting that it would duplicate services Microsoft's MSN already provides, such as instant messaging and e-mail.

Microsoft is feeling increasing pressure to compete with Google, which plant to beef up its portfolio with a \$3.1 billion purchase of online advertising, company DoubleClick Inc.



Homeowner hoping to trade up learns the ropes of buying repossessed property

LOS ANGELES — Many see trouble in falling home prices and rising foreclosures. Karen Krynen sees opportu-

There were 5.977 foreclosed—homes on the auction block in Southern California in the first three months of the year, up from 711 in the same period last year, according to research firm DataQuick Information Systems.

Homes typically enter fore-closure when borrowers can no longer make their payments and can't sell their homes for amounts that would pay off their loans. State law requires these properties to be sold at public auction, which in theory puts everyone on an equal footing, Amateurs such as Krynen, however, face competition from professional real estate investors as well as the lenders themselves, who come to the auctions ready to bid for homes they issued loans for it appears that the properties can be resold at higher prices. For years, Krynen had seen he ads and come-ons promising to reveal the "secrets" of buying foreclosed property. "That scared me a bit, that I couldn't see inside." Krynen said. But her husband, a pro-lessional contractor, assured her that he would be able to mend whatever needed fixing. From her online research, Krynen learned that the road to a foregregating said single properties and single properties are single properties.

Krynen learned that the road to a foreclosure sale in California typically begins when a homeowner misses three mortgage payments. The lender then files a notice of default with the county

recorder.

If the homeowner fails to pay up in 90 days, the trustee — usually the title company —

sets a date for a public auc-

tion.

By long-standing custom, most auctions are held outside courthouses or the recorder's office. Krynen found this aspect of the process especially appealing.

"If it goes to the courthouse steps, there's a level playing field," she said.

Neither local government nor the courts play a role, however. The title companies and other trustees hire professional auctioneers to run the

sional auctioneers to run the

sional auctioneers to run the sales. It's the real estate equiv-alent of last rites, making Kyle Speer something of a priest of property. At 10 a.m. sharp each week-day, Speer, 38, takes his place on the courthouse steps in Norwalk.

Norwalk. With his back against the marble wall and his face to the crowd, the professional auctioneer cracks open his leather portfolio, clears his throat and begins the archate ritual of 'crying the sale.'

A 17-year veteran of foreclosure auctions, Speer says he's seen a sharp increase in new-

bies such as Krynen showing up. Bombarded by questions from beginners, he recently began offering a \$200 seminar every Thursday to decode the auction process.

One day last month, as Krynen stood off to the side taking notes, prepping for the upcoming auction of the Whitter house, Speer kicked off the bidding for the day's auction by reading the property's street address, followed by a long string of parcel numbers, deed numbers and loan numbers, deed numbers and loan numbers.

"Do I have any opening bids?" he asked. "Cashlers cheeks needed in quality."
That was news to Krynen.
Before entering the hidding, you must show the auctioneer a cashler's check good for at least the minimum bid amount. Auction pros carry cashler's checks in varying sums.

There were six homes on the block this day. They were bought in 2005 and 2006, at the crest of the housing boom, by buyers who financed the entire purchase. That means "I have a right to be standing next to a seasoned professional. My dollar is as good as : his — as long as I can get the last word."

the homes are probably worth the same, or less, than the amount the buyers owe. No one bid.——"I-get-asked-every-day if there are any good deals," Speer said. "Too many right now."

Homes that aren't sold are turned over to the lender, which can then sell the property however it chooses.
When there is a bargain, a bidding battle usually ensues,

which there is a bargain, a bidding battle usually ensues, pros say.

Deals like that give Krynen confidence that there are hidden traps also, she learned.

Properties often have more than one mortgage or other financial baggage such as tax liens. If the auction buyer doesn't know the other ourstanding loan armounts, he could find himself assuming much more debt than he counted on.

To avoid surprises, the prosecrafully research the properties, subscribing to fee-based foreclosure information services and conducting searches to ensure the title to the property is clear.

to ensure the title to the prop-erty is clear.

Krynen, realized that she needed to be just as knowl-edgeable, so she went to the county recorder's office to

review the property records on the Whittier house.

"It's amazing what you can find there," she said.

Among other things, shi discovered that the owners had defaulted on their mortgage years before but kept the house. But she also learned that the house had few other liens against it, making it appear to be an even better deal than she first thought.

As the day neared when the Whittier home would go up for neutron, Krynen steeled therself for battle. She and her husband decided to take out a home equity line of credit so hely would be able to produce a large check on auction day.

She never got the chance. A few days before the auction, Krynen called the trustee company and learned that the owners had paid their debt.
