# New water chief keen on building relationships

When that moment arrives, Tutthill packs his ropes, boots, bivouac and other climbing gear and escapes to a mountain.

Last year, he scaled Oregon's Mount Hood, then climbed Mount Rainier in Washington and peaks in Colorado. This year, he plans to climb Kent Peak, at 11,664 feet the second tallest peak in the Boulder Mountains north of Ketchikan.

"It's a spiritual experience for me to be in the mountains," Tutthill said in an interview from his sixth-floor office in Boise.

A healthy perspective on disappointment may be a valuable asset as Tutthill embarks on his newest professional challenge.

In January, the Colorado native was named interim director of the Idaho Department of Water Resources, an agency where he's spent his entire career shortly after leaving the University of Colorado with a master's degree in 1975.

In his 31 years with the agency, Tutthill has led the adjudication of more than 10,000 water rights in the Payette River Basin, managed the western regional office in Boise and served as adjudication bureau chief.

## Troop losses in Iraq raise questions about Stryker

### Army's troop-carrying vehicle was once hailed as key to new force

BAGHDAD (AP) — A string of heavy losses from powerful roadside bombs has raised new questions about the vulnerability of the Stryker, the Army's troop-carrying vehicle hailed by supporters as the key to a leaner, more mobile force.

Since the Strykers went into action in violent Diyala province north of Baghdad two months ago, losses of the vehicles have been rising steadily. U.S. officials said.

A single infantry company in Diyala lost five Strykers this month in less than a week, according to soldiers familiar with the losses, who spoke on condition of anonymity because they are not authorized to release the information. The overall number of Strykers lost recently is classified.

In one of the biggest hits, six American soldiers and a journal-

ist were killed when a huge bomb exploded beneath their Stryker on May 6. It was the biggest one-day loss for the battalion in more than two years.

"We went for several months with no losses and were very proud of that," a senior Army official said in Washington, speaking on condition of anonymity because he is not authorized to comment publicly. "Since then, there have been quite a few Stryker losses."

"They are learning how to defeat them," the Army official said of Iraqi insurgents.

The Army introduced the S11

billion, eight-wheeled Stryker in 1999 as the cornerstone of a ground force of the future — hoping to create faster, more agile armor units than tank-equipped units, but with more firepower and protection than light-infantry units.

But the Army and the Marines are already looking for something different that can survive big roadside bombs — the main threat to soldiers in Iraq — meaning the Stryker's high-profile status as the Army's "next generation" vehicle may be short-lived.

## Silver prices have Silver Valley companies booming

KELLOGG — As a precious metal, silver doesn't have the allure of gold. As an investment, it's not as hip as Google. But drowsy old silver is suddenly chic.

Here in Idaho's Silver Valley, the handful of surviving mining companies are enjoying record revenues and big expansions. Two publicly traded companies — Hecla Mining and Coeur — are having banner years.

"In 2006, we reported the highest earnings and lowest cash costs for silver in the history of our 116-year-old company," said Phil Baker, president of Hecla Mining Co. "We now have the potential to set another record in 2007."

The worldwide price for silver is more than \$13 an ounce, highest since the metal

very durable, said Michael Dillenius, director of the institute.

As a result, stockpiles of the metal have disappeared even as demand is rising.

Silver jewelry is also popular in China and India, two huge markets with growing numbers of affluent consumers. The worldwide market for silver jewelry soared from \$1.4 billion in 2000 to \$2.6 billion in 2005, he said.

interim title, making Tuthill the sixth director since the department was reorganized in 1974.

"I guess I'm officially a company guy," Tuthill joked. "I only expected to be here for five years. That was the plan. But since I've been here, I've never considered leaving."

In his short time in the director's chair, Tuthill has wasted little time finding center stage in some of the most vexing water dilemmas any Western state has to offer.

This month, he signed off on two separate rounds of awarding letters targeting hundreds of farmers, dairy producers, businesses and cities and towns that draw water from the Eastern Snake Plain Aquifer.

The notices threaten to shut

off groundwater wells across a broad swath of south-central and eastern Idaho to ensure water delivery to two trout farms and seven other users that contend they need — and with older rights claims are entitled by law — to the precious resource.

The first round of curtailment orders is already headed for a showdown in state court. Tuthill will tell if the second set will be challenged in the courts.

The shutdown threats are not likely to win him many popularity points among groundwater pumpers. But the orders follow the policy set by his predecessor, Karl Dreher and has the governor's support.

"As the governor has said, we're trying to play a bad hand well," said Otter spokesman Jon Hanlon. "The job he's been

asked to perform takes someone with a unique ability. The fact that the governor chose him speaks volumes in the confidence he has in him and his ability to carry out the functions of that office, which in this day and age are daunting."

Last week, Idaho Power Co. demanded in 5th District Court that the state renegotiate a 1984 agreement that gave the utility rights to flows in the Snake River. The power company now claims the pact was based on flawed information about how much water was available to those who draw water from the Eastern Snake Plain Aquifer.

Yet not all developments have been discouraging.

Tuthill says he is pleased with the mood and spirit that emerged from April's water

summit, called by Otter to begin the process of negotiating a long-term solution to eastern Idaho's water needs.

He also points to the results at last week's conference on the Spokane Valley-Ratbdrum Prairie aquifer, the sole drinking water supply for Spokane and two northern Idaho counties. A report featured at the conference concluded that the aquifer is holding up to growth demands, clearing the way for Idaho and Washington to work in tandem in doling out future water rights.

Even more encouraging than the report's findings, Tuthill says, is the collaboration between officials in Idaho, Washington and stakeholders in both states that laid the groundwork for future management of the aquifer.

"At the turn of the (20th) century, there was growing acrimony between Idaho and Washington about the aquifer's supplies," Tuthill said. "But people worked to put those aside and focus on collecting data and building a model" for managing the aquifer.

"As a result, relationships have been made, friendships have been made. That led to the feeling at the conference of success and optimism for the future," Tuthill said.

Tuthill said that philosophy of collaboration is central to the approach he intends to use in solving thorny water issues in basins from Idaho Falls to the Palouse.

"I think it's too early to tell whether there is a change," said Boise water lawyer Jeff Fereday, whose clients

often disagree with department policies.

"But I think his style of problem solving is very effective. He is a good analyst of problems. He is someone who is very interested and promotes collaboration," Fereday said. "I really think he is the kind of person who can bring people to the table and work out solutions."

"It is indeed an open question if the Stryker is right for this type of warfare," said Michael O'Hanlon, a senior analyst with the Brookings Institution. "I am inclined to think that the concept works better for peacekeeping. But based on data the Army has made available to date, it's hard to be sure."

Supporters of the Strykers, which have been used in Iraq since late 2003, say the vehi-

cles that carry two crew members and 11 infantrymen offer mobility, firepower and comfort.

Lighter and faster than tracked vehicles like tanks, each Stryker can rush soldiers quickly to a fight, enabling commanders to maintain security over a wide area with relatively fewer troops. Humvees can carry only four soldiers — and are more vulnerable to bombs even when their armor is upgraded.

"I love Strykers," said Spc. Christopher Hagen, based in Baquba. "With Strykers, you're mobile, you're fast. You can get anywhere anytime. They bring a lot of troops to the fight."

But some analysts have long questioned the wisdom of moving away from more heavily armored tracked vehicles like tanks and Bradley fighting vehicles to wheeled transports, like the Stryker.

They say that is especially

true in Iraq, where powerful bombs — not rocket-propelled grenades or small arms fire — are the main threat.

"The Stryker vehicle was conceived at a time when the Army was more concerned about mobility and agility than it was about protection," said Loren Thompson, a military

analyst from the Lexington Institute. "Stryker was the answer to that need."

The amount of silver used for jewelry exceeded the amount used for photographic paper for the first time in 2005, he said.

Many experts say silver remains a good investment. Mark O'Byrne, managing director of Gold and Silver Investments Ltd. in Ireland, speculated that silver prices could reach \$20 in 2007, as demand grows while the supply does not keep up.

It is estimated that 95 percent of the silver ever mined has been consumed by the global photography, technology, medical, defense and electronic industries," he wrote in a recent commentary. "This silver is gone forever."

Silver production worldwide remains flat, and the amount of

silver mined has been less than demand every year for the past 15 years, O'Byrne said. The difference was made up by stockpiles that are now depleted.

That means production is not likely to grow much even as prices go up, O'Byrne said.

Peru and Mexico are the two largest silver producers in the world. The United States ranks eighth. Two of the nation's largest silver producers are based in Coeur d'Alene.

Earlier this spring, Coeur d'Alene Mines Corp. announced a deal that would make it the largest primary silver producer in the world. Coeur is acquiring all the shares of Bohai Gold Ltd. of Australia and Palmarco Silver and Gold Corp. of Montreal, in a transaction valued at about \$1.1 billion. The deal allows Coeur to expand into Mexico, the world's second-largest silver producer.

"With this transaction we are

establishing Coeur as the clear leader in the silver mining industry," said Dennis E. Wheeler, Coeur's chairman, president and chief executive officer.

The deal is expected to close in the third quarter.

At Hecla Mining, officials are looking to dramatically expand mines such as the Lucky Friday in nearbyullan that have been producing silver for six decades. For the first time in half a century, the company is conducting a major exploration program on its 45-square-mile property surrounding the Lucky Friday mine.

Vicki Veltkamp, head of investor relations for Hecla, said silver is benefiting from a general boom in metals prices. "China and India as they become more developed have a tremendous demand for all types of base metals," Veltkamp said.



## Hundreds of Florida wildfire evacuees still waiting to go home

LAKE CITY, Fla. (AP) — Authorities briefly reopened two highways crossing north Florida into Georgia on Sunday before dense wildfire smoke forced them to again halt traffic, while hundreds of Florida residents waited to return to their threatened homes. Officials said Sunday that the wildfire that had raced through the Okefenokee Swamp in southeast Georgia and into Florida had charred more than 233,700 acres — or about 365 square miles — since it was started by lightning a week ago. Officials warned that storms in the forecast Sunday could bring either much-needed rain or lightning.

Authorities reopened 90 miles of Interstate 75 and 10 for a couple of hours Sunday morning after wind helped push the heavy smoke away from the highways. But they were later forced to close 35 miles of I-75 from the Florida-Georgia state line to Lake City,

Fla., as well as a 40-mile stretch of I-10 in Florida, from Live Oak to Sanderson.

A 15-mile stretch of I-75 from Valdosta, Ga., to the Florida state line remained open Sunday. About 570 residents were not being allowed to return to 150 homes evacuated between I-10 and the Florida-Georgia state line. Firefighters working Saturday and through the night to control the blaze got help from previous prescribed burns near Lake City, Florida officials said.

The fire burned into an area of the Osceola National Forest that had done a prescribed burn in the winter, so there was less fuel to burn," said C.J. Norvell, part of a joint federal-state forestry management team.

The fire started May 5 in the middle of the Okefenokee National Wildlife Refuge. It took just six days to grow larger than another wildfire that has

burned nearly 121,000 acres of Georgia forest and swampland over more than three weeks. The small fire was started by a tree falling on a power line.

The Okefenokee National Wildlife Refuge and Georgia's Steven C. Foster State Park inside it remained closed.

Blaze from the fires had traveled a far south as the Miami area, about 340 miles away. Elsewhere, a blaze feeding on drought-stricken forest in northern Minnesota was only 15 percent contained as of Sunday morning. Meteorologists said there was a 40 percent of thunderstorms Sunday. They could produce the first significant rainfall in the parched area in almost a week, but the hope of rain was outweighed by the threat of wind gusting to 25 mph.

"We don't think the rain is going to help us a whole lot," said Mark Van Every, a spokesman for the firefighting effort.



# Bush commemorates America's birthplace, celebrates democracy

JAMESTOWN, Va. — Foad of promoting the endurance of freedom, President Bush on Sunday hailed the nation's humble beginnings as a reminder that new sacrifices require huge sacrifices. "From our own history, we know the path to democracy is long, and it's hard," Bush said in a ceremony honoring the 400th anniversary of Jamestown, America's first permanent English colony. "There are many challenges, and there are setbacks along the way," Bush said. "Yet we can have confidence in the

outcome because we've seen freedom's power to transform societies."

On his first visit to Jamestown as president, Bush soaked in the scene like a tourist — first watching a dig for artifacts, then climbing aboard a replica of a majestic ship.

He even grabbed a baton and playfully led the 400-piece orchestra before heading back home.

In his speech, Bush said the United States must stand with those struggling to gain their freedom. He spoke from the place where the country's roots began centuries ago in a swampland.

"Today, Democratic institutions are taking root in places in places where liberty was unimaginable not long ago," the president said.

He specifically cited Iraq and Afghanistan. "The advance of freedom is the great story of our time, and new chapters are being written every day," he added.

Jamestown in 1607 was a grueling commercial venture, and colonists dealt with hunger, violence and hopelessness. But, over time, it became a starting point of representative government, free enterprise and cultural diversity.

"It is a chance to renew our commitment to help others around the world realize the great blessings of liberty," Bush told several thousand of people in the audience for the celebration.

Earlier, Bush and first lady Laura Bush walked the grounds at a leisurely pace.

On a day that turned from gray to sunny, they began with a walking tour of Historic Jamestown, where archeologists continue to unearth storied remains. The structure of the settlers' original triangular fort — long thought to have been washed away — has been recovered.

Bush marveled at a new find — a hit basket, which is a hand guard that goes around a sword's handle. The item was discovered the day Queen Elizabeth II visited Jamestown recently and excavated on Sunday, said Mike Lister, a spokesman for the National Park Service.

Bush then strolled through Jamestown Settlement, where early 17th century living is recreated. The settlement features replicas of the three ships that sailed from England to Virginia, along with recreations of the colonists' fort and an Powhatan Indian village.

The president looked at weapons and tools of the time, and watched as the sails of the replica ship he had earlier boarded, the Susan Constant, were unfurled.

Then came four ceremonial cannon blasts so loud they dented the president's shoulder.

Bush's speech came on the final day of the anniversary weekend, the centerpiece of an elaborate 18-month commemoration in the works for a decade.

## Democratic candidates prod automakers on fuel efficiency

WASHINGTON — Democratic-controlled Washington stepped in to help save Chrysler nearly 30 years ago when the automaker was on the verge of bankruptcy due to lackluster sales of its fuel-thirsty vehicles.

With the Big Three struggling again, many political leaders now are taking Detroit to task for failing to do more to reduce how much gas their vehicles use. The Democratic presidential candidates are pledging tougher gas mileage rules. Automakers say such changes would hurt an industry already down.

But the political climate is turning against the companies. Concern is increasing about global warming. Pump prices are high. People are worried about U.S. dependence on oil from the Middle East.

"We're talking about saving the auto industry from itself," said Sen. Chris Dodd, who is proposing the highest increase of any presidential candidate.

Dodd, D-Conn., wants to double the average fuel economy for each automaker, from about 24 miles to per gallon today to 50 mpg by 2017.

would be three years later than Dodd's. Richardson plans to offer details of his proposal Thursday.

Former North Carolina Sen. John Edwards wants 40 mpg by 2016. He has urged his audiences to consider sacrificing their gas-guzzling vehicles for the good of the country. In a campaign, line that he uses often and that wins applause, the 2004 vice presidential nominee says, "It's time for Americans to be patriotic about something other than war."

New York Sen. Hillary Rodham Clinton plans to announce her proposal for increasing fuel economy in the coming weeks. Clinton spokeswoman Bill Singer noted that in the past she has supported increasing fuel efficiency by 10 mpg over the next decade.

At a speech last Monday at the Detroit Economic Club, Illinois Sen. Barack Obama urged automakers on their home turf for investing in bigger, faster cars while depending on oil is jeopardizing U.S. security and the global environment.

"The auto industry is on a path that is unsustainable for their business, for their workers, and for America, and America must take action to make it right," Obama said. "That's why my first proposal will require automakers to meet higher fuel standards and produce more fuel-efficient cars, while providing them the flexibility and assistance to do it."

Obama's speech irritated industry officials. They say the sentiment he expressed — while shared by other political leaders — ignores the reality that they are making the vehicles that people in the United States want to buy: Cars and trucks with big engines, towing capacity and room for passengers.

## Wedding insurance covers calamities — and cold feet

DENVER — If anyone knows the value of a good insurance policy, it's Romeo Lavaras.

As the director of emergency management operations for Miramar, Fla., Lavaras has seen his share of disasters. So it was a no-brainer when his fiancée, Stephanie Goldstein, suggested buying insurance for their wedding, set for July 7 during the hurricane season.

"My job is to prepare our city in the event of a disaster, so naturally, this is right up my alley," said Lavaras, whose city was hit by Hurricane Wilma in 2005. "The number one reason (we bought) was hurricane season."

Heading into a prime wedding month in June, and with weddings becoming ever more elaborate and expensive, more couples are opting to buy wedding coverage. Natural disasters aside, many reception facilities now require liability coverage for out-of-control celebrations.

Wedding planners often require insurance, too, in case of cancellations.

Increasingly, policies cover all sorts of contingencies. Lost the bride herself? No problem. Guests stranded by a hurricane or a Denver snowstorm? Covered. Photographer ruins pictures? Piece of cake to re-stage. There is even a policy that offers reimbursement in case the bride or groom gets cold feet.

Fewer than 1 percent of the betrothed purchase policies in the United States, said Kyle Brown, executive director of the British Association of America in Bakersfield, Calif.

But given that the average cost for a wedding is \$27,000, according to insurance industry estimates, Brown thinks it's a good buy.

"For 1 percent or 2 percent of the cost of your entire wedding, you can insure it," Brown said. Since Hurricane Katrina, New Orleans wedding planner Jennie Keller requires every couple to buy insurance. She once required it just for couples marrying during hurricane

season, which runs from June through November.

"I know that you can't play around with Mother Nature," the New Orleans native said. "Wedding insurance will cover it all even if you cancel your wedding."

Among the companies that offer it are Fireman's Fund, Westlife Wedding Insurance Program offered through Affinity Insurance Services Inc., and Traveler's Insurance, which added the coverage in February.

Depending on the company and the type of coverage, a policy can cost anywhere from a couple hundred dollars to more than \$1,000.

Typical coverage can include reimbursement of nonrefundable deposits for, misfortune such as a death in the family or military deployment. Some policies cover repairs for a damaged dress or replacement of lost wedding attire, theft of wedding gifts, and the cost of gathering wedding party members to retake photographs and videotape.

Policies also can pay for some counseling if canceled

or postponed nuptials cause emotional stress, according to the Insurance Information Institute in New York.

Even a "change of heart" can be insured in a special option Fireman's Fund Insurance Co. began offering this month that costs about \$25 on top of the policy. It's for those who pay for a wedding only to have the groom or bride back out, said insurance broker Rob Nuccio of WJ Nuccio and Associates, who wrote the option.

"Often times, there is an innocent person involved in that. There is the poor father who lays out 50 grand and he's just left dumfounded," Nuccio said.

Nuccio drafted his company's first insurance policy in 1990 when couples primarily purchased liability coverage required by reception facilities. Now, he says, more are adding cancellation insurance.

"After some kind of natural disaster like Katrina, the interest is high, but the public has a fairly short memory and it tends to drop off after that," he said.

Judges fail this test just by answering it

Lord knows the conservative Christians of the Idaho Values Alliance have taken their lumps on this page before, but they deserve a couple of hallelujahs for their latest effort.

They sent questionnaires to the 19 candidates itching to replace Idaho Supreme Court Justice Gerald Schroeder if he follows expectations and retires this summer. The group wants to make sure a moral conservative fills the seat, so they asked candidates for positions on everything from polygamy to gun control (because we all know Jesus supports your right to own an assault rifle).

Candidates' answers to these questions should come in very handy when making decisions come Election Day. If a candidate responds to the questionnaire, don't vote for him. He has no business serving on the bench.

Only a fool or blind ideologue would provide you a detailed outline of his feelings on political and philosophical matters that could come before the court.

Justices are supposed to decide cases on their individual constitutional merit and the specific legal issues involved. A justice who comes to the bench with a one-size-fits-all doctrine needs to go back to his guidance counselor and pursue another line of work.

That goes for liberals as well as conservatives.

Justices can certainly have personal convictions, but they're not supposed to decide cases based on their beliefs. They're supposed to make decisions based on the law. Ironically, that's why the Idaho Values Alliance questions grill candidates for their thoughts on judicial restraint.

Conservatives fuss about "activist judges" who make interpretations beyond the letter of the law and legislate from the bench. They claim such rogue judges took God out of the public schools and legalized abortion. Of course, as the questionnaire proves, the Idaho Values Alliance wants holy warriors — if they are conservative.

What the group really fears is liberal judges. To be honest, they should. We should all be wary of any judge — liberal or conservative — who comes packing an overriding political agenda.

At least the questionnaires provide an effective way of exposing candidates who care more about politics than the law.


A sharp reform for elections

A bill that is headed for early action in the House of Representatives threatens to create a major controversy over the conduct of the 2008 election.

Blessed with the wonderful title of "The Voter Confidence and Increased Accessibility Act of 2007," the legislation has the valuable goal of assuring that there is a paper trail to verify the accuracy of touch-screen and electronic voting systems. But it has created an uproar among state and local officials, who say its provisions are so unworkable they could create chaos at the polls next year.

The measure is a response to problems that marred last year's election, with disputes in several states and districts about the accuracy of reported voting tallies on new touch-screen systems. One controversy, involving 18,000 potentially missing votes in Sarasota County, Florida, is still unresolved.

Democrats, whose House candidate in that Florida district was the apparent victim of the possible machine malfunction, are understandably eager to enact remedial legislation. The bill, written principally by Reps. Zoe Lofgren of California and Rush Holt of New Jersey, came out of committee last week and is slated for early action on the floor.

But it has run into a buzz saw of criticism from the people who actually manage elections. The National Association of Secretaries of State, facing a division in its own ranks, has taken no position.

But the National Conference of State Legislatures and the National Association of Counties have declared its deadlines impossible and the funding inadequate.

In a letter to members of Congress, the two groups said "this legislation would exacerbate, rather than assist states and counties in addressing these challenges, which could lead to disastrous unintended consequences in the 2008 presidential election."

The state and local officials added that "even if the requirements of this legislation were realistic within the specified deadlines, state and local governments are understandably skeptical of promises of federal funding for a new, multi-billion-dollar federal mandate for additional election technology

and practices." Aides on the House Administration Committee, where the bill was written, told me that some deadlines have been adjusted — including for the type of paper trail used — and a \$1 billion authorization was added to the bill. Whether that money is ever appropriated is something no one can guarantee.

The measure also has been criticized by advocates for people with vision limitations or other disabilities. The American Association of People with Disabilities said the earliest the provisions could be carried out effectively would be 2014 — not next year's primaries. Otherwise, the group said, it would prevent a step back from the guarantees of equal access to the voting booth contained in the 2002 Help America Vote Act. "It takes away our right to a secret ballot," a spokesman told me.

The committee aides who briefed me said they were not swayed by those concerns because the bill has been endorsed by People for the American Way, a liberal group that they somehow designated as speaking for the disabled. When HAVA was passed, after it disputed 2000 election, it was the product of almost two years of consultation with state and local officials and prolonged negotia-

tions between the parties. There were only two dissenting votes in the Senate and 48 in the House.

By contrast, this new bill was reported from committee on a 6-3 party-line vote. While Democrats claim that several of the Republicans' early objections were met, Rep. Vern Ehlers of Michigan, the ranking GOP member — and like Holt a physicist familiar with electronic voting systems — said "it's costly requirements would be impossible to meet."

As a non-expert, I turned to the man who knows more about the conduct of elections than anyone else in the country, the director of the Houston-based Election Center, Doug Lewis. "I have no problem with the objective of creating paper receipts,"

Lewis said. "But they have rejected every idea we've offered them to show what might work. I've been at this 40-some years, and I have not seen a piece of legislation worse than this. It is overly prescriptive, overly detailed, a cumbersome monstrosity to deal with."

But it is a high priority for the House Democratic leadership — so watch out.

Nuclear power plant pushes load out of state

Subject Proposed 1,600 mw nuclear power plant component of the reliability with geothermal power plants

In the Times-Tribune article Sunday, April 29, Alternate Energy Holdings spokesman Martin Johnson stated, apparently in reference to a suggestion that wind and geothermal power in Idaho be developed first. "We need more base-core power" and further stated that wind and geothermal were unreliable, thus implying these sources could not be used to supply base load power.

Obviously, if the wind isn't blowing, there's no wind power, but what about geothermal's comparison with nuclear? A little Web research shows that for 2004-2006, the average percent capacity for nuclear power plants in the United States was 50.7 percent. The lifetime average of these plants was a surprisingly low 75.9 percent. Modern geothermal power plants, which, like nuclear, are designed to operate as base load plants, operate with annual capacity factors well in excess of 90 percent. So much for the reliability argument.

I also question the statement about the 1,600 mw plant being built to supply Idaho needs. The Idaho Power Website shows its annual average load for 2005 (latest annual data on the site) was 1,834 mw, so the proposed plant would nearly match the current total average load. Sounds to me like this plant is being built to supply power out of state.

that human beings were created in their present form in the last 10,000 years or so.

To these folks, "no" didn't mean anti-science; it meant pro-God and conveyed a transcendent, non-materialistic view of the world. To secular Darwinists, "no" meant either ignorance or pandering to the ignorant — most likely both.

On its surface, the question seems simple enough — if oddly out of century. Darwin's theory of evolution isn't exactly hot off the presses.

But it remains controversial among some people of faith — including some respected scientists — for whom evolutionary theory reduces man's world to a godless accident bereft of moral meaning or structure.

To the faithful, in other words, it is not such a simple question. It also was not a fair question to be asked in the circumstances. Yes or no doesn't quite cover the complex issues implicit in any mention of Darwin these days.

In a conversation after the debate, Huckabee said, "I wish my life were so simple. If it were, I'd be in a game show and not running a presidential campaign... If I'd had time, I would have asked 'whether he meant macro or micro evolution?'"

That's a different sort of answer than what is offered from a simple "no" forced by the manic pace of a 90-

minute "debate" among 10 candidates, none of whom is qualified to seriously debate scientific theory. Not, as president, should they try. In fact, Huckabee says he does believe in evolution (with qualifications) and thinks Darwin's theory should be taught in schools.

"I do know that species do, in fact, adapt and there are many instances of adaptation and mutation," he said, "but I still believe that the design... has a designer and the creation has a creator. I wouldn't pretend to fill in the blanks between what God created and what is today."

Microevolution and macroevolution can't be properly distilled in this space, but broadly speaking, micro allows for the possibility of a creator.

McCain more or less expressed the micro view that evolution doesn't necessarily preclude God.

These are interesting and complex issues that compel smart, thoughtful people to passionate debate and serious investigation — too complicated, in other words, for an instant-response in a politically charged arena.

The debate question was fundamentally a setup for ridicule. No one was served and no one, alas, is the winner.

# Face of Taliban movement tracked down and killed

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan — Mullah Dadullah was the face of the Taliban movement in Afghanistan as it used suicide bombings, videotaped beheadings and targeted assassinations to escalate its insurgent campaign over the past two years.

Dadullah periodically turned up on television to taunt the Afghan government and U.S.-led international forces with threats of ever more ambitious attacks.

On Sunday, his face was on display again, resting on a pink sheet, bloody and lifeless. A bullet hole was visible in the back of his head, with two more in his stomach.

Dadullah, the Taliban's top operational commander, was killed Saturday after U.S.-led troops and Afghan forces tracked him down and surrounded him in southern Afghanistan, according to

Afghan and international security officials.

His death was hailed by those officials as a critical victory in the fight against the Taliban at a time when the movement has destabilized

large portions of the country through Dadullah's uncon-

promising approach to warfare.

"We fully expect Mullah Dadullah will be replaced in time, but for now the insurgency has received a serious blow," said Maj. John Thomas, a spokesman for the NATO-led force that patrols Afghanistan and that supported U.S.-led operations against Dadullah. Thomas described Dadullah as "the top person in our scope in Afghanistan that we were interested in removing."

It was unclear who would replace Dadullah. Another top leader, Akhter Mohammed Osmati, was killed in December, and a third, Obaidullah Akhund, was captured in February. Although the group's overall leader, Mohammad Omar, remains at large, he is believed to play a lesser role in the organization's

military operations.

A Taliban spokesman denied that Dadullah had been killed, but witnesses who inspected the body as it lay at the govern-

nor's palace in the southern city of Kandahar on Sunday identified it as Dadullah's, based on distinctive facial features and a missing left leg.

## Al-Qaida-allied insurgents take responsibility for attack, kidnapping

BAGHDAD, Iraq — The insurgent coalition that includes al-Qaida in Iraq asserted responsibility on Sunday for the ambush south of Baghdad that left four U.S. soldiers and an Iraqi interpreter dead and three other American soldiers missing.

A brief statement purporting to be from the Islamic State of Iraq, an umbrella organization that includes al-Qaida in Iraq, appeared on insurgent Web sites a day after the fiery attack in the rural terrain near Mahmudiyah. The statement praised the insurgents for their "blessed operation" involving a "clash with a convoy of crusaders in Mahmudiyah," but offered few details and no evidence, such as photographs or video, to verify the claims.

"We will give you the full details about this blessed operation as soon as it comes," the statement said.

About 4,000 U.S. soldiers, backed by Iraqi troops, searched homes, palm groves and farmland Sunday for the three missing soldiers. The attack occurred in an area, known as the Triangle of Death, that has long been considered a breeding ground for Sunni insurgents.

Iraq's deputy prime minister, Barham Salih, told CNN that "indications are that al-Qaida and its affiliate organizations are responsible for this attack."

The American soldiers were not moving in a convoy at the time of the attack, but rather parked in two Humvees in an area 12 miles west of Mahmudiyah, attempting to prevent insurgents from laying down roadside bombs, said a U.S. military official who spoke on condition of anonymity. Americans frequently conduct such missions, known as "overwatch," to monitor suspected trouble spots at night. It is unusual to have American soldiers out on patrol in as few as two vehicles.

"This was not a convoy, they weren't moving, they were in a fixed location," the official said. "Their mission was to counter the emplacement of improvised explosive devices."

The coordinated attack began when a roadside bomb blew up on the soldiers, followed by gunfire, officials said. The two vehicles went up in flames and were spotted 15 minutes later by a surveillance drone, after a nearby unit that heard explosions could not get in contact with the Humvees. The extent of the damage made it difficult to identify the slain soldiers.

On Sunday, Maj. Gen. William Caldwell, the top American military spokesman in Iraq, said the interpreter and four soldiers had been killed. Military officials have so far been able to identify all but one of the soldiers, Caldwell said.

Talk of the abductions spread quickly throughout the streets and mosques in Mahmudiyah. Residents said the soldiers had gone through hundreds of homes, shops and farms, through villages and along canals and rivers, while attack helicopters and surveillance drones buzzed overhead.

PONTE VEDRA BEACH, Fla. — In his third week with a new coach, Phil Mickelson suddenly looks as good as ever. What mattered more was how he played. Mickelson missed only two greens in the final round during a well-played duel with O'Hair. This was hardly "Phil the Thrill." In fact, the only excitement came on the 18th hole, when the tournament already was decided.

## Jazz pull away late

Missed free throws again hurt Golden State as Utah takes 3-1 lead

OAKLAND, Calif. — The Utah Jazz had seen enough of the Golden State Warriors' beautiful game.

Carlos Boozer and the Jazz shoved and scraped to slow down the Warriors — and then Derek Fisher put a sweet finish on a victory that put Utah on the brink of the Western Conference finals.

Boozer had 34 points and 12 rebounds as the Jazz handed the eighth-seeded Warriors their first home loss of the postseason, 115-101 Sunday night to put Utah up 3-1 in their second-round playoff series.

Fisher scored 14 of his 21 points in the fourth quarter for the surprising Jazz, who can clinch their first trip to the conference finals since 1998 with a victory at home in Game 5 Tuesday night. Deron Williams had 20 points and 13 assists as the Jazz finally solved the riddle of Oracle Arena, where the underdog Warriors won their first four playoff home games with the uptempo offense and fan support that dazzled the nation.


But with a Jerry Sloan game plan that hearkened back to those bruising days when Karl Malone and John Stockton ruled the West, Utah simply bullied past Golden State.

Al Harrington scored 24 points before fouling out, but Baron Davis had just 15 points and seven assists. The Warriors were a dissonant mess through most of their first home loss in 10 games dating to the regular season — yet they still held a lead in the final minutes before Utah's superior posse won it again.

Fisher's 3-pointer put Utah ahead to stay with 5:57 to play, and the veteran guard — traded by Golden State to the Jazz last summer — hit a long jumper and another 3-pointer in the final minutes to silence the Oakland din.

Fisher dropped to the floor in a heap after a scary collision with Davis with 1:37 left, but eventually got up to finish the game. Jason Richardson then was ejected for clotheslining Mehmet Okur on a drive to the basket with 37 seconds left, prompting angry shouts by both players. Okur added one last dig at the Warriors, hitting a 3-pointer when Utah had a 13-point lead and 10 seconds to play.

Utah finished the game on a 22-10 run, including a 10-2 push in less than 2 minutes after Richardson's

3-pointer with 3:47 left pulled Golden State to 93-91.

Golden State stayed close for all four quarters despite awful shot selection and little inside game, but not even its mass of yellow-clad fans helped against Utah's defense. The Jazz forced bad shots by

the Warriors' all-too-willing shooters, then got inside for consistent points on the other end.

Poor free-throw shooting — the Warriors' undoing in Game 2 — also hurt them again in Game 4. Golden State was 21-of-34 from the line, including back-to-back misses by Davis with 4:39 to play.


DARLINGTON, S.C. — As steam poured from his engine, Jeff Gordon figured his chance at victory had gone up in smoke.



CHICAGO — The Chicago Bulls built another big lead, and the Detroit Pistons were rallying. Snout familiar?

# Cat survives trip from China to North Carolina in cargo crate

HENDERSONVILLE, N.C. (AP) — After Eric Congdon opened a crate from China and discovered a cat inside, coming up with a name for the furry stowaway was easy. China the cat had chived through one of the boxes before it left Shanghai on April 3 and spent at least 35 days on a ship inside the container filled with motorcycle gear.

"I saw something in the container movie," Congdon said. "I turned up the headlights on the fork lift to get a better look."

That was when he saw the cat cowering in a corner, weak but still alive. Congdon, owner of Olympia Moto Sports in Hendersonville, said he and a co-worker called the county's animal services when the cat would not let them near.

A co-worker of Congdon's plans to adopt China, as animal service workers are calling her. If she checks out with a veterinarian, North Carolina law says any animal coming into the country must be

vaccinated and quarantined for six months.

How could China survive for so long on no food and water? "Usually we say that animals can only survive a few weeks without food and only a few days without water," said Raleigh veterinarian Michelle Misavage. "The theory is that cats have such good kidneys their bodies adjust to the lack of water and somehow they received small amounts of moisture from condensation."



# Stand and deliver

Working on your feet all day can take its toll physically

TWIN FALLS — For most of the past 41 years, waitress Cecilia Marler has been on her feet for eight or more hours a day.

"I started when I was 12 and I'm 53 now," said Marler, now a shift manager at the Depot Grill. "I've got rheumatoid arthritis, and my one knee gives out from time to time, but mostly I just don't have problems with my feet and legs."

Increasingly, she's an exception. According to the federal Occupational Health and Safety Administration, the estimated 30 million U.S. workers who do their jobs standing are at higher risk of ailments ranging from varicose veins to tendonitis.

And it's only going to get worse. As the population as a whole ages, more workers over 50 are being called upon to stand and deliver.

"When something is out of balance with the feet and the legs, the body does things to compensate for it," said Dr. Randal Wraalstad, a podiatrist who works with a group of Twin Falls orthopedic surgeons. "Pretty soon, there are other problems."

Prolonged standing creates an accumulation of blood in parts of the feet and legs, which leads to irritated and inflamed veins. A 2005 Danish study reported that folks who work every day on their feet are nearly twice as likely to develop varicose veins as those who sit down on the job.

Yet the most common problems are found in the knees and the feet.

"Standing on a hard surface for a long period of time grinds down the (knee) joints," Wraalstad explained. "You lose cartilage."

So eventually, you may develop arthritis.

The same thing can happen with the feet. Even your big toe is a joint, and it can become arthritic.

But even for those with healthy joints, there are risks inherent in working on your feet.

Standing for long periods decreases the blood supply to the legs and feet, which in turn increases fatigue and muscle soreness, according to the Canadian Center for Occupational Health and Safety.

When a person stands in one place all day, the lower extremities are under pressure from gravity, causing localized pressure points in the heels and the balls of the feet, according to an article by Carolyn Neuhoff, a graduate student at Finch University of Health Science, in the online journal Occupational Hazards.

"That can mean you're standing differently at the end of the day than you were at the beginning.

## An exercise in prevention

There are certain stretching exercises that can be done in the morning, at lunch and after work that will keep the muscles and ligaments warmed up and prepared to handle the physical stress of the day:

- Rolling an ordinary unopened 12-ounce can under the arch of the foot for five minutes each is useful in stretching the plantar fascia that runs along the arch.
- Pile up a towel off the ground using only the toes 30 times with each foot stretches the forefoot muscles and the plantar muscles and tendons. These are the supporting muscles in the foot and are therefore the most important to warm up each day in order to prevent excessive strain and inflammation that result in serious pain and damage.
- Stretching the calf muscles by leaning against a wall with one knee bent and the other leg straight out behind you with both feet flat on the floor can be beneficial. The plantar fascia is stretched during these calf exercises.

"When the foot is pronated (turned toward the inside), it's out of balance," said Dr. Craig Holman, a Twin Falls podiatrist. "That forces the knees, hips and back to have to make adjustments."

Pronation is the source of all sorts of problems, but the most common by far is plantar fasciitis, the painful inflammation of the connective tissue that supports the arch.

"That can happen even to those who don't stand all day on hard surfaces. It's a problem for farmers, because they have to walk on so many uneven surfaces," Holman said. "The foot gets twisted and puts the ankle and knee under more pressure."

But people who work on concrete are especially vulnerable. "Concrete doesn't give," Wraalstad said. "So your body does."

Thousands of Magic Valley workers, especially those in food processing, spend many hours standing on concrete floors.

In the fish processing plants, workers sometimes have to stand on hard, wet surfaces wearing rubber boots.

"There are a couple of problems with that," Wraalstad said. "First, rubber boots give absolutely no support to the foot. And when the feet get wet, that invites athlete's foot."

Doctors can temper the negative effects of working on hard floors, but they can't make the experience trouble-free.

"There are some jobs, like those that require lifting heavy objects, that you can do for about 20 years," Wraalstad said. "After that, the physical consequences of aging and wear and tear are just too much."

Doctors can use orthotics and other measures to mitigate problems, but they can't save them off forever.

"If you've got a stress fracture, for example, and you still have to work on your feet, there are things we can do to keep you going," Holman said. "But if there's enough damage, it

has to rest in order to heal," Wraalstad said.

If you're overweight and working on a hard floor, that's an open invitation to trouble, he says.

"When you put on a few pounds, the knees, legs and feet have to adapt," Wraalstad said.

"I'm on my feet 12 to 16 hours in a typical day," said Marler, who jetskis in her spare time. "I get a pretty good workout, and I don't have the problems that other waitresses sometimes have."

Both Wraalstad and Holman stress the importance of choosing the right shoes.

"I'm a believer in good athletic shoes (for work)," Holman said.

"If you're working on a hard surface, you need to change shoes about every four months," Wraalstad said.

"Buy good shoes, try them on and ask questions to the shoe salesman." According to the American Podiatric Medical Association, a work shoe should grip the heel tightly, the

forefoot area should be wide and allow movement, the toe of the shoe should be in line with the heel rather than curved or bent, and there should be fastening across the arch to decrease pronation.

Buy shoes at the end of the day, podiatrists advise, because your feet are most likely to be swollen then and you'll get a more realistic fit.

Although foot doctors make extensive use of custom orthotics, over-the-counter shoe inserts can be valuable, Wraalstad says. But he cautions against buying expensive orthotics at the county fair, off the Internet or on cable television.

"Most of them, you can't return, I can't adjust them, and they do you no good," he said. "A patient comes in and says, 'But I spent \$300 on these.' And I have to say, 'Well, you just lost \$300.'"

Knee surgeries on seniors more common

Is there a new knee in your future? Or can the old one be salvaged?

According to the American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgeons, about 418,000 knee replacements are done each year. The fastest-growing segment of the population getting knee-replacement surgery are people 45-55. And the Centers for Disease Control says knee replacement surgeries on seniors grew 90 percent between 1992 and 2001.

The main reason people get knee replacements is to relieve pain. For seniors, joint pain caused by osteoarthritis is their most common health complaint, according to

researchers at San Diego State University. In addition to pain, symptoms of osteoarthritis include a knee that continually hiccups, locks or becomes swollen.

"Is there anything you can do short of the surgeon's knife to lessen the pain? Yes. Walk it off.

While some may think exercise makes their knee pain worse, the opposite appears to be true. The surgeons' groups say regular low-impact flexibility and "delay or eliminate the need for surgery."

The academy recommends stretching, cycling or walking on a treadmill. And consider a nice day on the links. Golf may be a high-frustration activity, but it is also a low-impact exercise.

Respecting your elder gym rats

Willie Wortham finishes up her set of chest presses and easily glides off the weight machine, ready to tackle another. Told she looks in great shape, with perfect posture and a steady gait, Wortham replies, "Yes, for a 91-year-old lady."

At this gym, she doesn't stand out so much as fit in.

Nifty After Fifty is a small, independent gym in Whittier, Calif., specifically for middle-aged and beyond. It offers easy-to-operate pneumatic weight machines; comfortable, low-impact cardio equipment; yoga and tai chi classes; licensed physical therapy; balance training and even non-exercise programs such as a driving simulation course, dances and aerobics.

To the growing list of niche gyms — for women, children and men — comes gyms for the older set. The market is vast, although largely untapped. Many older people who want to stay fit have been lured into a sprawling, brightly lit center with a younger, iPod-toting crowd at large gyms. As such, they're mostly relegated to senior center programs, adult school classes or the odd session at a gym or YMCA.

"People walk into bigger gyms and see a younger clientele doing intense exercise, and that's sort of an intimidation factor," says Michael Rogers, an exercise physiologist and research director of the Center for Health Activities and Aging at Wichita State University.

The new niche gyms and specialized programs in larger clubs offer a healthy dose of mostly moderate-intensity exercise in a comfortable, low-pressure environment, often with a specially trained staff. Employees at these gyms and programs, says Rogers, are more likely to understand that some conditions, such as arthritis, call for specific types

of workouts. Among the gyms and programs vowing an older clientele is Club 50 Fitness, a new franchise of Curves-like circuit-training gyms based in Reno, Nev., and begun in 2003. The chain boasts about 50 clubs across the country, with more to come.

Silver Sneakers fitness classes, a for-seniors program started in 1992 (free through summer Medicare health plans), are in more than 1,200 gyms and YMCAs nationwide. Bally Total Fitness has them in 45 clubs nationwide and will add 22 soon. About 50 of the 600 or so Gold's Gyms offer the program.

Even some larger independent gyms have special senior programming.

"We've seen (niche gyms for seniors) grow from one or two facilities 10 years ago to probably a few hundred now," with a big push in the last three years or so, says Colin Milner, chief executive of the Vancouver, Canada-based International Council on Active Aging, a membership organization concerned with aging healthfully.

Barbara Aton would probably rather skip exercise altogether than set foot in a warehouse-size building filled with complicated machines and loud dance music. The 76-year-old Nifty After Fifty member says of mainstream clubs: "I don't want to change clothes and run around in one of those suits."

In fact, it's not unusual to see gym members here wearing comfortable street clothes — stretchy pants and tops with sneakers, plus makeup, jewelry and carefully coiffed hair.

## Filer students complete 50-mile walk

About 90 fourth-graders from Filer Elementary School participated in this year's Big Walk, which ended Friday. Students walked 50 miles in five days, 10 miles each day.

FILER — It's become one of the most anticipated seasons of the school year, but not for the reasons you might expect.

Each spring for more than a decade, fourth-graders at Filer Elementary School have braved nature's elements and endured blistered feet for the chance to be numbered among the few who have finished a five-day, 50-mile event known as the Big Walk.

On Friday afternoon, about 90 students finished the last leg of this 12th-annual trek that started southeast of Glendale at Malad Gorge State Park and progressed through Ingersoll, Butte and back to Filer. This year was the final year of the Big Walk. The walk will be scaled down to shorter day trips in the future.

Their arrival was met by a police escort and congratulatory shouts from residents lining Main Street. The Filer Fire Department put a finishing touch on the experience by soaking the victorious with an icy blast from one of their trucks.

At the end of each day's 10-mile goal, the students were picked up by buses and taken back to the school. The next morning, they were transported to where they had left off, and the walk resumed.

"In a little sore in the morning, but Mrs. Leach is always telling us

that if we can (do) the 50-mile walk, we can do anything," said fourth-grader Serene Short. "And I like it because it's supposed to make you healthy."

Vicki Leach, the elementary school physical education specialist, came up with the Big Walk idea after hearing Rob Sweattall speak at a convention.

"I came up with the idea after hearing Rob Sweattall, who has walked across the United States seven times, speak about taking kids on a big walk in 1995 and I thought this would be great," Leach said.

About 1,200 students have completed the walk since its inception in 1996.

By participating in the walk, students not only meet requirements

for physical education but also for science, English and Idaho history.

They were also encouraged to keep a daily journal. Fourth-grader Alissa Miller said one of her journal entries focused on animals and reptiles.

"I saw animals and a snake on the street that was run over by a car," she said.

The walk has received its share of state and national attention. During a State Physical Education Convention in Boise, Leach was named the Idaho Physical Education Teacher for 2001. A video tape of the 2001 Big Walk, along with a discussion of the academic and logistical challenges faced each year, was presented at the convention.

"Most of the physical educators

were amazed that we could do this kind of project," Leach said.

In 2004 the Big Walk was featured in an article published by Parade Magazine. The publication, with a circulation of about 36 million, appears as a supplement in Sunday newspapers across the nation, including the Times-News.

The article was written by local freelance writer Julie Fanslow who sent the idea to Parade in 2002 and joined the Big Walk a year later.

Dakila Divind, who still serves as managing editor for Parade, said that was the first time his publication had profiled a program like Filer's and pointed out three reasons the story stood out from others.

"It deals with young people getting excited about learning, addresses a common health problem and parallels the Oregon Trail," he said.

One year later, Congressman Mike Simpson even paid tribute to the program on the floor of the House. His speech was made part of the Congressional Record.

"I will always walk with children and I have a wonderful support staff of teachers and parents, but this (was) our final Big Walk," Leach said. "We appreciate the support from community members and parents, but it has become too difficult to raise the \$5,000 in funds we need to do it right."

## Parks and Rec to give update on renovations

TWIN FALLS — The city's parks and recreation department is scheduled to give a presentation to the Twin Falls City Council tonight on the status of the \$1 million renovations at Shoshone Falls and Tierkes Lakes.

The city and Idaho Power Co. in 1999 agreed to each invest \$500,000 toward improving the park. Almost half the money was used in 2001 for the upgrades currently visible, including the new parking lot, fencing and landscaping.

Several thousand dollars were recently invested to upgrade the ticket booth by the entrance, and the city is preparing to build an informative and historical kiosk by the lower parking lot. A new parking lot by the entrance is slated, too. Both projects are expected to finish by September.

Shoshone Falls, which draws about 300,000 visitors each year, had its most profitable year in 2006, making more than \$275,000. That was generally due to the unusually high amount of water flow.

Future projects include renovating a bathroom by the falls and a shelter in the upper area of the park.

The city is also scheduled to consider the final plan for 80 acres of the new Twin Falls High School at Washington Street North and North College Road.

Middle school academic pentathlon teams win state tournament

WENDELL — Do you know the atomic mass of Oxygen, the origins of Islam or the author of the classic 1947 novella *The Pearl*?

If not, you may be smarter than a fifth-grader, but probably not smarter than the Jerome and Wendell middle school's academic pentathlon teams, who recently earned top honors during the state tournament.

For the tournament, students were tested in mathematics, social science and literature.

"I am awfully proud of all of our students who participated," said Lorina Pringle, Jerome Middle School social studies teacher and academic pentathlon coach. "Our seventh-grade teams took first and second place and our eighth-graders took first and third."

This is the fifth year Jerome participated in the program.

"Our school has built the program into our curriculum; it's an actual class," Pringle said.

While preparing for the test, students must study many subjects and read a novel.

This year Jerome had close to 40 students divided into four teams — two teams for both the seventh- and eighth-grade levels.

And it was the second year that Wendell Middle School integrated the program into their extra-curricular activity schedule.

"I knew we had some pretty good kids in Wendell and (that) they would do well, even with the much larger schools represented," said Coach Robert Moore. "I think that our kids are ready to move on to the high school level decathlon challenge. They are an amazing group of kids."

One of the brightest is eighth-grader Dillon Benson who outscored every other eighth-grader across the state. He maintains a 4.0 grade point average and is already planning for college.

Awards at the high school level include scholarships.

"You learn more every time you take the tests because you have studied so much. Plus it's a lot of fun," Benson said. "I hope they get a high school team put together so we can compete."

Moore is optimistic that his own school system will continue to stretch these talented student's academic gifts. He is also encouraging other schools to create their own teams.

## Richfield art shop creates sheet metal animals

RICHFIELD — Upon entering the town of Richfield by Highway 26, the usual sightings of cows and horses meet with a Jurassic reawakening. Here, you may spot a stegosaurus included as part of an animal parade.

Of course, these animals are made of sheet metal and often pique the interest passersby.

"You just don't see anything like this," said Pete Jasso, a neighbor of Diaz Metal Art, the company that creates the animals. Jasso, a welder himself, said not just anyone can do this type of art.

It all began 10 years ago in Riverside, Calif., when Noel Diaz and Ricardo A. Breceda decided to take their welding experience to new heights. Their collaborative vision allowed them to create a 16-foot dinosaur. Although their first attempt was not what they considered a stellar performance, their confidence and dreams were fulfilled when they opened a metal art business four years later.

Then, Diaz and his wife Decey relocated to Idaho three years ago to be closer to his family. But his enjoyment of working with metal kept him traveling back to California to create metal art with Breceda, Decey's cousin.

"My family thought we were crazy," said Decey Diaz. "Noel made the decision four months ago to bring our animals here."

Her family's concerns were valid: the ani-

imals did not stroll into Idaho two-by-two, but rather in pieces.

Diaz attained a CDL so he could transport the framework to Richfield. On average, the

family travels to California about every three weeks. When the metal pieces are collected, Diaz then welds them together and adorns them with details — from horses' wavy-haired curly tails to birds' feather texture and curly characteristics. The process, from start to finish, takes 15 to 30 days depending on size and specifications.

Diaz also dabbles in metal art for home décor, for inside and outside the home.

"This makes me very happy," he said.

# Million dollar donation beats deadline for Kroc Center

**COEUR D'ALENE (AP) —** The Kathryn Albertson Foundation has announced it will donate \$1 million to the Salvation Army for construction of a community center to be named after McDonald's founder Ray Kroc and his wife, Joan.

Most of the money to build the two-story, \$65 million center is coming from the \$1.5 billion that Joan Kroc left to the Salvation Army when she died in 2003. The request is to be used to build 30 community centers across the country.

The first Salvation Army Ray and Joan Kroc Community Center was opened in San Diego in June 2002.

Coeur d'Alene was one of six cities in the West selected by the Salvation Army last year for one of the centers.

The Coeur d'Alene project

includes about \$32.5 million for construction of the building and another \$32.5 million to fund an endowment to offset operating expenses.

But Coeur d'Alene — as a test of community support — had to raise \$6.1 million to build the 109,000-square-foot center

that is expected to employ about 150 full- and part-time workers and serve nearly 700 people a day.

The Coeur d'Alene Tribe pledged \$1 million toward the center last year. More than 350 people and organizations have also contributed.

"Our foundation believes that the new Ray and Joan Kroc Corps Community Center will create a lasting benefit throughout the Coeur d'Alene and North Idaho community," Lori Fisher, executive director of the Albertson Foundation, told the Coeur d'Alene Press.

"When I heard this gift was a possibility I was blown away," said Salvation Army Maj. John Chamness. "When we found out how much money was going to be needed, I asked God for help. I said, 'God, we can't do this by ourselves, we need you to help us.' It's an

incredible fundraising effort and an incredible community."

Ground breaking for the center is planned for June 20. It is scheduled to be finished in late 2008.

"Although I was speechless when I received the news, I was not surprised by their generosity," said Mayor Sarah Bloom. "The IA and Kathryn Albertson Foundation has had an enormous and positive impact on Idaho communities. Through its generous giving, the foundation affects the lives of thousands of children and families."

## Four-year state college presidents get raises

**BOISE (AP) —** Each of the presidents at Idaho's four-year colleges have been given raises by the State Board of Education.

The raises, approved Friday, reflect both market forces and merit, said Mark Browning, board spokesman.

Boise State University President Bob Kusira received a raise of 8 percent, going from \$261,262 to \$282,463.

President Tim White received a 2 percent raise, seeing his salary increase from \$286,198 to \$291,912.

The president of Idaho State University, Arthur Adams, received a 5 percent increase that boosted his salary from \$260,000 to \$273,000.

Dene Thomas, president of Lewis-Clark State College, saw his salary rise 6 percent from \$137,669 to \$146,141.

## Popular Bible exhibit to be extended at Museum of Idaho

**IDAHO FALLS (AP) —** A popular exhibit looking at the history of the Bible at the Museum of Idaho is being extended and expanded with additional material.

Museum officials said that by Memorial Day up to 50,000 people will have seen "Ink and Blood," which opened in February and was scheduled to

close later this month. It will now remain at the museum through Labor Day, officials said.

The exhibit is also being expanded with 32 artifacts from the Qumran caves east of Jerusalem, where in 1947 the Dead Sea Scrolls were found. Those items include three lamps that date back to before

506 B.C. The museum will be closed May 29 to 31 so the new artifacts can be placed in the exhibit.

Executive Director David

Pennepek said the exhibit has drawn people from as far away as Salem, Ore., and the summer tourist season should bring even more people.

# Rural Alaskans brace for increase in mail rates

ANCHORAGE, Alaska — With the U.S. Postal Service raising mail rates today, rural Alaskans are worried about a cost more than paying 2 cents for a stamp.

The Postal Service is also bumping up rates for Alaska's one-of-a-kind discount mail program, which ensures that groceries and other basic supplies arrive regularly in 139 villages unreachable by road.

The roughly 13-percent increase in postage will almost certainly drive up prices to varying degrees for all sorts of items, from milk to fresh fruit, in dozens of communities where prices are already high, retailers say. Already, a regular-size box of cereal can cost more than \$8 in some villages and milk can rise to more than \$7 a gallon.

"The villages are already having a hard time. A lot of people live on food stamps and I don't think they get very far," said 85-year-old Josephine Roberts, who lives in the Athabaskan Indian village of Iana.

The community of 260 people lies 130 air miles west of Fairbanks, Alaska's second-largest city. Large shipments can only arrive by plane or the barges that traverse the nearby Yukon River after the summer thaw.

"I don't know why they don't just build a road down here already because air freight and postage is going up," Roberts said.

The USPS program pays Alaska's air carriers to deliver

the mail and gives shippers a break, charging third- and fourth-class postal rates for what is essentially first-class service. Packages sent through the program are known as "bypass mail" because they avoid the post office and go directly to air carriers for delivery.

Shipments must total 1,000 pounds or more to qualify for the reduced postage and the individual parcels that make up a shipment weigh between 35 and 70 pounds each. The cost to mail one 50-pound package through bypass will rise to \$12.39 from \$10.95, according to a statement from Sen. Ted Stevens, R-Alaska.

Only businesses based in Anchorage or Fairbanks can qualify to pay bypass rates. Shipping companies and retailers in the cities customarily pass the lower rates on to their village clients, including school districts, stores, restaurants and individuals.

"When the program started the purpose was to keep the

costs of living down in the remotest parts of the state," said David Harding, spokesman for North Slope Borough mayor Edward Ito. "When rates go up it calls into question the original intent."

The bypass mail service was started in the 1970s under legislation written by Sen. Ted Stevens, R-Alaska, to help buoy the economies of far-flung villages. The communities, most of which are Alaska Native, still practice traditional food-gathering such as hunting, fishing and berry harvesting.

The service costs the Postal Service close to \$70 million each year, said Steve Deaton, a USPS network operations specialist in Anchorage.

"It's a program that the Postal Service supports in recognition of the unique circumstances of Alaska residents," Deaton says. "We are committed to keeping it going in the state of Alaska."

The increase is the second largest in the history of the program, according to Rex


Wilhelm, president and chief operating officer of the Alaska Commercial Co., the largest rural retailer in the state. Eighteen of its 29 stores are located in communities that qualify for bypass mail.

"The price increases in the stores will largely depend on

the weight of the item," Wilhelm said. "Very heavy items will see a more noticeable increase when freight goes up."

The largest increase came in 2001 when bypass mail rates went up about 20 percent, Wilhelm said.


Aaron Saunders, a Washington-based spokesman for Stevens, said the Postal Service had originally planned to push the new bypass rates even higher, by about 40 percent, but the senator reportedly negotiated for the increase to be reduced.

## Once fierce Santa Catalina fire now mostly under control

AVALON, Calif. (AP) — A CONTINUED cool weather helped firefighters Sunday maintain control of a blaze that had threatened a resort community on Santa Catalina Island and keep it from spreading from the island's rugged, unpopulated interior.

The 3,200-acre fire was 69 percent contained Sunday and was expected to be extinguished by Tuesday evening, Los Angeles County Fire Inspector Scott Ross said. One home and six businesses burned Thursday but no one was seriously injured.


Businesses were open again in the seaside resort town of Avalon as most of the 4,000 evacuated residents had returned to the island, where damage was estimated at \$2.1 million.

"We have a sense of duty to the town to bring it back to normal," delicatessen owner Rick Miller said as he unloaded supplies from his van. "People get hungry and it doesn't hurt to see businesses open and eat restored."

Fog and high winds in the 60s diminished the threat of the fire spreading. It was isolated in the back country of the 76-square-mile island, more than 20 miles off the Southern California coast.

About 200 customers were still without electricity because of power lines damaged by the fire, said Gil Alexander of Southern California Edison.
